General Conference Progress

NEW VOLUME

This is the first issue of Volume 4 of PROGRESS JOURNAL. October 15 will be the first issue of Volume 51 of *The Restitution Herald*. Each year at this time, as the editor reminds himself of the new volume and issue numbers, he thinks of the years of progress of the Church of God, and the fact that each passing year draws us nearer to the coming of Christ and the establishment of the Kingdom of God on the earth.

GET ACQUAINTED CAMPAIGN

A letter, sample handbill, and order form have been sent to all Church of God pastors, secretaries, Sunday school superintendents, and other key leaders, notifying of plans for the "Get Acquainted Campaign" for November. This home mission project is designed for use by each local church to help people in the neighborhood become acquainted with the Church of God, its message, and its local congregations.

A special issue of *The Restitution Herald* is being prepared for mailing before November 15. It will contain articles introducing the Church of God, telling the importance of worship in the Church of God, setting forth the importance of its doctrinal position, reviewing its prophetic hope, and its missionary outlook. Special, two-color handbills will also be printed for each church participating. The handbill will list the name and address of the pastor, and schedule of regular services.

*The Herald*s and handbills will be furnished the church in sets of one hundred each (minimum order) for \$12.00 per hundred. This is the cost of *The Herald*s alone and handbills are furnished free.

It is hoped that each participating church will arrange a door-to-door distribution campaign to place a *Herald* and handbill in each home in the vicinity of the church. Tied in with personal visitation and a personal invitation to attend services of the church, this could be an effective evangelistic campaign. NEW MISSION BUILDER'S APPEAL

We are about to close out the appeal for the Hector, Minn., Church of God, and begin a new Mission Build-

er's Appeal for the Church of God at Troy, Ohio. Reminder cards were sent to Mission Builders recently, since many have not yet responded to the Hector appeal. Perhaps some did not receive the appeal, or forgot it, so the reminder was mailed. To date a total of \$3,700.00 has been sent to the Hector Church to assist with the building costs there. There are now 963 Mission Builders.

FOREIGN VISITOR EXPECTED

We look forward to a visit in October of Mr. Alan Hayward, from Scotland, a leader in the Christadelphian Bible Mission. Bro. Hayward has used many Spanish language tracts printed by the General Conference in his work of literature distribution in Panama and the Bahama Islands. The editor has enjoyed corresponding with Bro. Hayward and the staff looks forward to meeting him personally.

PASTORAL CHANGES A SIGN OF GROWTH

In the process of pastoral changes this summer, there have been some signs of growth. Several churches which did not have pastors last year are now enjoying the services of resident pastors. Bro. Ted Armes is now pastoring the Church of God at Hendersonville, N. C.; Bro. Rex Cain is at Morse Mill, Mo.; Bro. James Rencontre is at Felida, Wash.; Bro. Clyde Long is at Arkansas City, Kan.; Bro. Belus Holt is at Browntown, Va.; Bro. Walter Wiggins will be pastoring a new congregation in Phoenix, Ariz.; and Bro. William Dick will be pastor of a new congregation in Ontario, Calif. Each of these places was without a resident pastor last year, or is a new congregation.

In addition to this, there is the new congregation at Whitnel, N. C., with Bro. Z. B. Duncan as pastor, and the four new congregations in the Philippine Islands.

There are still several areas, however, where pastoral service is needed. In these places, as in some of those already mentioned, a pastor would have to depend upon some secular work for income, but there is opportunity for growth with pastoral leadership. Pastoral aid from the General Conference is helping some, but at the present cannot be extended to all who need it, nor in amounts large enough to fill the whole need. A growing church will probably always find itself in this position.

NEW FISCAL YEAR

October 1 also marks the beginning of a new fiscal year for the Church of God General Conference. The decisions made at the last General Conference delegate session in August go into effect now. The budget, which provides for the new program, also goes into effect now. This budget of \$50,550.00, the largest in the history of the General Conference, would be smaller than last year's *except* for the addition of new missionary projects. A full-time Superintendent of Missions, Bro. S. O. Ross, has been added to the staff, and support for pastors in the Philippines has been approved to the extent of \$470.00 per month, or \$5,640.00.

THE END OF THE YEAR

In 1960, the General Conference delegates adopted a goal for giving for the fiscal year October 1, 1960, through September 30, 1961, of \$42,860.00. As of September 29, the total received toward this goal has been \$36,006.28. This means that we close the fiscal year with a deficit in giving of \$6,854.00.

All the bills of the Church of God General Conference are paid and there is no indebtedness of any kind. No funds have been available to modernize equipment or to repair buildings, though \$4,000.00 of the goal for giving was specified for depreciation to cover these costs.

As we have already noted, the goal for giving for the new year just beginning is much higher than last year, due to the *addition* of almost \$10,000.00 for missionary work. This goal for giving is not a fictitious figure, but represents funds that *must be paid every month* to fulfill commitments the General Conference has made.

To continue the operation of Oregon Bible College, publishing and printing of literature of truth, the expanding mission service, the Berean Youth Fellowship, and the many other general services of your General Conference, the goals for giving must be reached. We trust that this will be a matter of prayer and sincere concern by every Church of God member in the year to come.

Work is beginning on the republication of "Systematic Theology," by Bro. Alva Huffer. The first printing is nearly gone and reprinting will soon begin.

Work is also beginning on the reprinting of "One God, God of the Ages," by Bro. R. H. Judd. It will take some time to reprint this book, but the work is started.

The Songbook Committee is also working on the revision of "Songs of Truth," and it is hoped that it can be reprinted as revised in the near future. The supply of songbooks from the second printing is all gone.

Evangelism and Missions Progress

"Send the Light"

Sunday, November 5, 1961, has been set aside as Missionary Day throughout the Church of God General Conference. Each church in the Conference is asked to devote this day to missions. Pastors are urged to bring special missionary sermons on that day. Special programs may be held. Some are already planning all-day services. Special charts and banners can be prepared and special missionary offerings taken. The Church of God is moving forward in the mission field and the full co-operation of the entire Conference is needed.

The Church of God General Conference is beginning to awaken to the great needs around us. We are finding many open doors. We are finding places where we can share the gospel with those who know it not. We are finding people at home and abroad who are hungry for the truth. We can now begin to share our "morsel" with those who are without.

If we fail to share these gospel truths, which we believe are so necessary to eternal life, we are withholding from the poor their desires and partaking alone of our morsels, as Job 31 warns us not to do. We must share with those who may be lost, those who have not the truth, those who know not Christ, and those who are hungry for the gospel. If not, we may say with Job 31:22, 23, "Let mine arm fall from my shoulder blade, and mine arm be broken from the bone. For destruction from God was a terror to me, and by reason of his highness I could not endure." We will be held accountable to God if we fail to share the gospel with those outside, those who are hungry and in need of the truth. We have a responsibility.

Nova Scotia

The work in Digby, Nova Scotia, continues to move ahead under the leadership of Bro. John Denchfield. A number of young people from there attended the General Conference and National Youth Camp. They gave inspiring testimonies and are indeed an excellent example of the work and progress that the Church of God is making in Nova Scotia. (See front page picture.)

Three Bible schools were held in 1961: one in Digby and two in surrounding areas. The possibilities of growth and expansion in this field are very encouraging.

Philippine Church of God

In the past year four churches in the Philippines have been received into fellowship in the Church of God Gen-

eral Conference. There is work being done also in three other locations there. Six men, Bros. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, Bonifacio Gabanes, Estefanio Sibayan, Santiago Somera, Insturo Magno, and Crispin Callawagan, are bringing the wonderful gospel of Jesus Christ to many in these areas. Sr. Rizaline Aquinaldo leads and teaches music, trains teachers, and teaches children. The opportunities for expanding the work in the Philippine Islands is tremendous. There is no limit to the possibilities there, plus the mainlands of Japan and China and the surrounding areas. The fields here are indeed ripe unto harvest.

Literature Distribution

The past year has seen a great upsurge in the requests for Church of God literature and publications. Letters have been received from more than twenty places in Australia, New Zealand, England, Scotland, South Africa, and India, in addition to the numerous contacts from people in the United States and Canada who are outside the fellowship of the Church of God, but who are interested in the teachings and doctrines that we hold so dear. These people want to know more about our teachings and want to receive our tracts, *Heralds*, and other publications. The need for more foreign language tracts is also apparent.

Budget Needs

All of the above programs need funds to carry them out. \$50,550.00 in contributions is needed in this new church year to meet the total General Conference budget that was approved by the General Conference delegates. Of this amount, nearly \$20,000.00 will be used directly in missionary work. This includes the support and maintenance of the work in Nova Scotia; pastoral aid to churches; administration of the Mission Builder's program; traveling expenses of the Missionary Board attending board meetings; salary and traveling expenses of the Superintendent of Missions; distribution of literature; and many other incidental items in addition to the cost of the work in the Philippine Islands.

The Conference delegates in session set the goal of support to the seven workers in the Philippines at \$470.00 per month. Special commitments have already been received from various organizations and individuals in the sum of \$195.00. If the work there is to be carried on properly, and the best results obtained, special commitments for the entire \$470.00 are needed.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE REPORT FOR 1960-1961

A complete record is kept of all activities in which our college students participate during each school year. The following will give you some idea of the work they do over and above their regular studies. This does not cover other forms of service during the summer.

During the year they witnessed to 168 people; distributed 1,103 tracts, filled 53 speaking engagements, acted as Sunday school superintendent 25 times, taught 115 Sunday school classes and 46 Bible classes, made 70 house calls, sang 161 specials, played for 167 services, and conducted 139 song services. The over-all picture shows they were involved in 1,191 different forms of Christian service projects during the year. All of this was done in addition to 7,209 hours of work, plus their hours in school.

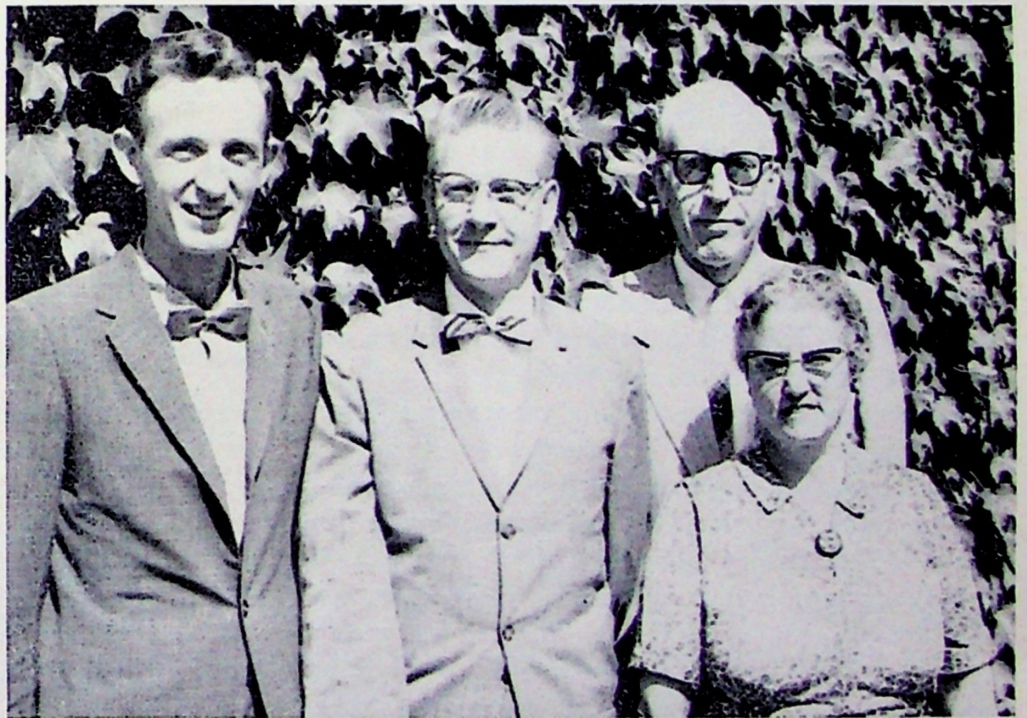

Decade of Development Progress Report!



A LAYMAN MINISTRY

A recent conference with a leader of the Christadelphian Church of England revealed some of their methods of mission work which are unique, and in some cases might be usable in the Church of God. The secret of the recent growth of this church in the United Kingdom (England, Australia, New Zealand, and the British West Indies being the strongholds) is individual initiative by each member of the body. Having no ministers to whom to shift the burden of witnessing and missions, each member feels the personal responsibility to be a missionary. The church has grown to number about thirty thousand members by means of this personal zeal.

One way that the church has spread out from its center is through migration of members from England to other countries in the Empire and to countries outside the United Kingdom. Wherever these members have migrated, they have become the center of a Bible class which in many cases has become an ecclesia, or church body. Often, these "isolated" brethren insert ads in a local paper, distribute literature of their church, and engage in preaching and teaching to secure a following in their area.

Another outstanding example of the personal touch is the use of vacation time. A place is chosen where there is no Christadelphian fellowship. Members from many areas congregate here at one time to spend their "holiday," or vacation, as we call it. They use the week or two in house-to-house calling, spreading of literature, and concentrated preaching services in the city or village they have chosen.

There are united efforts through an organization very similar to our General Conference. Some of the work is centralized for greater efficiency and economy, as is the General Conference. The Church of God has the added advantage of a dedicated, trained ministry. But the secret is that each member seeks to know the truth to the extent that he can communicate it to others, and feels a personal responsibility to do this, no matter where he is, or whether or not he is the only one in his community

to believe as he does. Enough members of this body are thus qualified and convinced that contact points have been developed all over the world.

WITCH HUNTING

In the liberal versus anti-Communist feuds we have often heard the term "witch hunt." Some have accused the ultra-conservative, anti-Communist groups and leaders (such as Joseph McCarthy and the John Birch Society) of seeing a Communist behind every bush and at every turn of the road.

There is an area of danger of "witch hunting" even in the Church of God. There are always people whose whole vision is introspective. They are always looking within the church for "witches" to criticize or to exorcise. To them, the church is always going to the dogs, or falling away, or becoming liberal, or becoming pentecostal, or is too active, or is too inactive.

If this same concern were shown for the millions who are lost, for strengthening the church and the brotherhood, and for looking out on the fields white unto harvest, much of the energy dissipated in witch hunting could be put to useful purpose.

It is, of course, wise to "examine ourselves" from time to time, and to "try the spirits," but to make this one's Christian career can be a most unfruitful life for Christ.

A Junior Worship Service

THE Dixon, Illinois, Church of God has been experimenting with an additional church service during the past year. The new service has been called, "Junior Worship." It has been conducted similar to the adult worship service, except that it is geared for children of ages four through ten years. This service is held at the same time as the morning worship service, and provides an additional hour of spiritual instruction for children who ordinarily attend Sunday school only.

Discovery of the Need

With Communism and Catholicism increasing in power, and with moral standards deteriorating there seems to be a need of more concentrated religious instruction in the Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith. It is our conviction that the second coming of Jesus Christ is near, and that only those who are prepared will rise to meet Him. The future of our church rests in the hands of the youth who attend today. Unless those youth are trained properly in the Lord's work we shall cease to exist as a distinct truth-seeking body of believers.

It is sad to see Church of God young people leave the church when they become old enough to leave the Church of God home. The very fact that many of our youth do leave the church and the Lord at such an early age should show a definite lack in our church training program. The church of tomorrow will need good, capable leaders who are willing to let the Lord work through them to accomplish His will. From where will they come if the youth of today are not firmly grounded in the truth?

Purpose of the Service

The primary purpose of this service is to educate Church of God children in the basic doctrines and principles of the Bible by planting the Word firmly in their hearts and minds. By so doing the youth will be better prepared to be devout Christians and diligent church leaders. The aim is to train the pupils in the way that they should go—to encourage them through Bible instruction to accept Jesus Christ and be baptized in His name.

While mother and dad are learning more about God from the sermon, their children are learning more about God in more simplified language. Instead of having the children sleeping in the pew beside their parents, the children are in a service learning about the Creator. This will remove restless, energetic, noisy children from the sanctuary, and will permit the parents to give undivided attention to the sermon. The additional hour in church will be more interesting to the youngsters and it will encourage them to attend more regularly.

Experiences Related

In the past fifteen months of our junior worship service we have seen a marked improvement in the behavior of this age group in Sunday school as well as other church services they attend. This service is conducted as much like the adult worship as possible, stressing reverence and devotion. We are strict about discipline and find the children respect us for it.

The attendance at church services has increased since this program has been instituted. The children are eager to attend and many stay for this service who would not ordinarily stay after Sunday school. In some cases parents attend because the children have a special service of their own.

We have witnessed the results of some of the stories dealing with honesty, sharing, prayer, and thoughtfulness. The children readily volunteer to offer prayer and to help with special musical numbers. We find that they are eager to learn Bible stories, Scripture, and doctrine at this age. One of our young people is receiving valuable training and experience as pianist for the group.

Facilities Needed

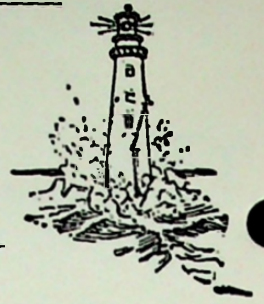
Materials that we have used have included flannel-graph, object lessons, story books, chorus books, and attendance awards. Our total expenditures the first year, with an average attendance of twelve, was under \$25.00. We were quite conservative in the purchasing of materials, and we feel that much of the material can be used again. At the present time there is need for material teaching Church of God doctrines as well as duties of church officers and members. We feel if they were educated at this age in their duties to their church we would have a stronger church.

A separate meeting place is needed so this service will not interfere with the adult worship service. We used two teachers; one for the music and one for the stories. Each should be well qualified and be able to present material to children in the most interesting and effective manner.

Evangelism and Missions Progress

"Send the Light"

The board held its first meeting since General Conference at South Bend, Ind., on September 28. The board acts in an advisory capacity to the Missions Department and to the General Conference Board, and it helps to plan and promote special missionary programs and the general work in both home and foreign mission fields. This board puts much time into this work and is indeed worthy of thanks for its conscientious efforts.

Philippine Mission

The latest report from the Philippines is that the work is progressing very well. Bro. Ortiguero is pastoring the church at San Nicolas, Pangasinan, teaching Christian doctrine in an academy there (equivalent to high school). He is using Bro. Alva Huffer's "Systematic Theology" as the textbook. He also is doing evangelistic work. Bro. Gabanes is beginning his work at Solano and several families there are asking for baptism. Bro. Magno will be working at Roxas, Isabela, a new field with great promise. Bro. Somera will pastor the Abut church, Bro. Sibayan the Quezon church, and Bro. Calawagan the Tabuk church. The churches at San Nicolas, Abut, Quezon, and Tabuk are member churches of the Church of God General Conference. Solano and Roxas are the new fields. Sr. Aquinaldo gives her assistance to all of the churches in teaching, training teachers, and helping with the music. We have now received commitments for this work totaling \$310.00 per month. An additional \$160.00 is needed to fully support the seven workers there.

Used clothing for relief can now be sent to the Philippines as the incorporation has been completed. Packages up to forty-four pounds can be sent by parcel post without any customs costs when plainly marked for relief use. They should be addressed to Pastor Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, San Nicolas, Pangasinan, Philippines.

Regarding a typewriter for Bro. Ortiguero it now appears wise to send the money and have him buy the typewriter there. \$50.00 has now been pledged toward a typewriter which will cost approximately \$300.00.

Mission Builders Appeal

Mission Builder's Appeal number six which was for the Hector, Minn., church is now completed and the final payment made to the Hector church treasurer. About \$4,200.00 was sent to this church. We thank each one who sent payment for this worthy cause.

Appeal number seven for the Troy, Ohio, church will be in the mail about November 15. This is another opportunity to assist a small and growing congregation to secure an adequate meeting place from which to proclaim God's Word more effectively.

Mission Work in General

We would encourage more of our membership to make use of our printed materials. The use of tracts is too often neglected by our own people. Many people outside of the Church of God membership realize the importance of the printed Word, and especially of the truth according to the Scriptures, and are sending the Word forth through our tracts, *Heralds*, and other publications to many countries of the world. A tract enclosed in a letter or left in a motel or hotel room or bus seat or in any one of a number of other places or handed to someone may bear much fruit. We are required to sow the seed and water. God will bring the increase.

Latest reports from Nova Scotia are most encouraging. The Digby work continues to progress satisfactorily and possibilities of work in other parts of Nova Scotia are also apparent. Let us daily pray for the whole missionary program.

Local Missionary Reports

Dorcas Society of Happy Woods Church of God, Hammond, Louisiana: We maintain a *Herald* rack in the local bus station and have had one definite convert as a result of *Heralds* taken from this rack.

Litchfield, Minnesota, Ladies Aid Society: We have twice sent boxes of clothing to Digby, Nova Scotia, and once to Roddy Pike at Yarmouth. We give regularly to the national missionary work and to Bro. Manoah in India.

Willing Workers, Blood River, Louisiana: We prepare boxes of food and clothing for needy families and contribute to the Oregon Bible College Building Campaign and Mission Builder's League. Our special prayers go out for the work in the Philippine Islands.

Each year in the fall term our college classes are dismissed for one day and all of the students and staff have an outdoor breakfast together in one of the beauty spots near Oregon. After a well-prepared breakfast of biscuits, eggs, sausages, fruit juice, coffee, and milk, we worshiped the Lord together in song, prayer, and a devotional period. Such times of Christian fellowship are long remembered by all who are present. Then, while the social committee took care of the pots and pans and clean up, the remainder of the students joined in hiking, badminton, touch football, and just basking in the sun.

FORMER STUDENTS SPEAK AT CHAPEL

We are always glad to welcome home graduates of Oregon Bible College. It makes us happy to know they are being used of the Lord in His vineyard, and we know they are an inspiration to those now in college.

This past month Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown conducted evangelistic meetings at East Oregon Chapel. We were blessed to have them minister to us in song and word. Bro. Paul Shaw, a graduate of 1961 and at present pastor of East Oregon Chapel, was our guest speaker at chapel on October 20. Bro. Paul Hatch also brought us a message on the historical findings.

WATERLOO VISITORS AT COLLEGE

The Church of God at Waterloo, Iowa, felt it could best promote the College among its young people by bringing them here for a visit. Sr. Blanche Harland brought five young people for the weekend visit, September 30-October 2. They were Stephen Moore, Loretta and Vincent Bartz, and Karen and Robert Bormes. They attended services at Flagg Center, where our College students assist in the services, then were at the B.Y.F. and evening services in Oregon. The College young people then gave them an hour of fellowship at the girls' dormitory after the church hour.

On Monday morning they were all present at the 7:30 classes and for the remainder of the morning. It was with some reluctance that they started homeward after the noon meal. We were happy to have them with us,

and expect that sometime they may be regulars in the College.

TEACHER'S INSTITUTE

For the past several years the College staff has been attending conferences during the summer. We have found much help for Bible college instructors through the discussion of our mutual problems. Last year Brothers Otto Dick and Kenneth Milne attended a fall institute in Chicago at Moody Bible Institute. They felt the gain received was enough to warrant having the entire staff attending.

He is a leader in the Christadelphian Church centered in Birmingham, England. Another visitor was Mr. Clarence Kirby, Executive Secretary of the Advent Christian Foreign Mission Board, who spent a few pleasant hours with us on his way to a mission convention in Colorado. A delegation of leaders of the Berean Church in Chicago also visited to learn more of the organization and the various projects being undertaken by the Church of God General Conference. With the new fiscal year one month gone, contributions have been \$4,261.77 toward a goal for this month of \$4,213.00. The goal for giving for this year is the highest in the history of the General Conference, because of the great added opportunities that have been received to reach out into the world with the gospel. The Church of God General Conference has become a channel through which more than \$30,000.00 will be given *directly* to churches in Mission Builder's assistance, pastoral aid, and missionary salaries.

In addition to the missionary undertakings, the General Conference underwrites Oregon Bible College, the printing and publishing of the gospel, the Berean Youth Fellowship, and the general services that are of great benefit to local churches and pastors.

Tithing brethren can easily carry the burden of the local, state, and international work of the Church of God, for the total costs at present of everything that is being done represents only about one half the tithe.

He was baptized on December 24, 1898, by Elder G. W. Smith, and has been a member of the Brush Creek Church of God since that time—a period of nearly 63 years.

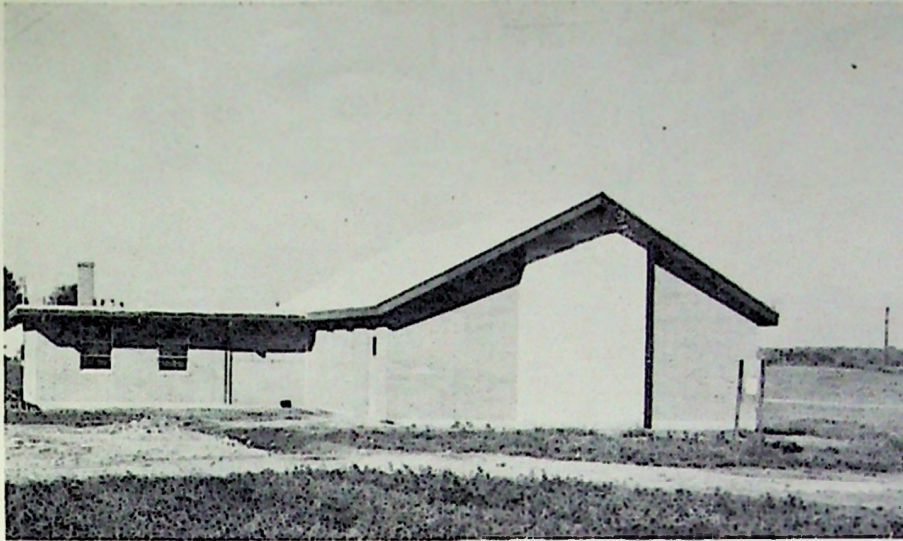

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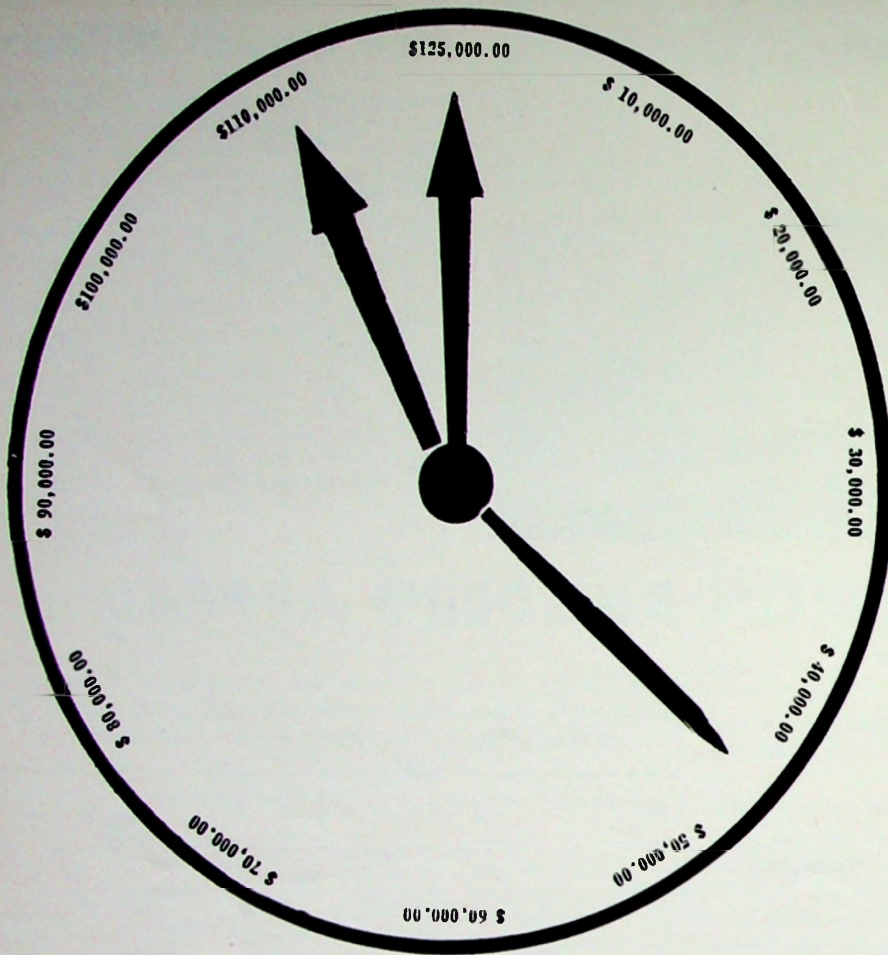

He and Claudia Smith were united in marriage on November 23, 1902. For the last fifty-one years of his life he has been a faithful member of the Church of God.

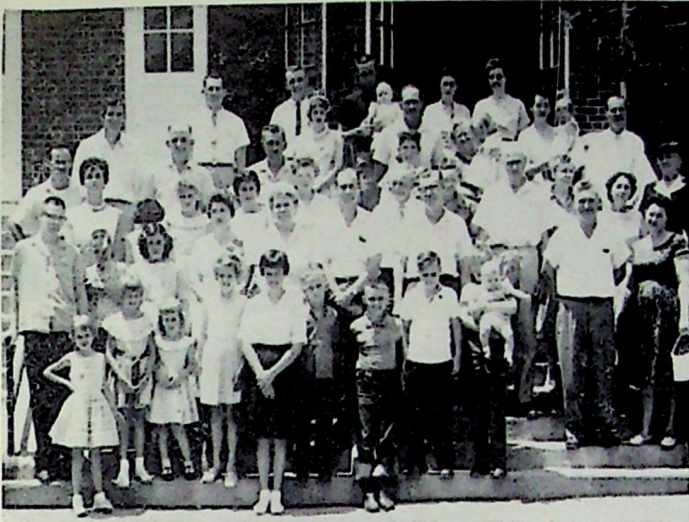

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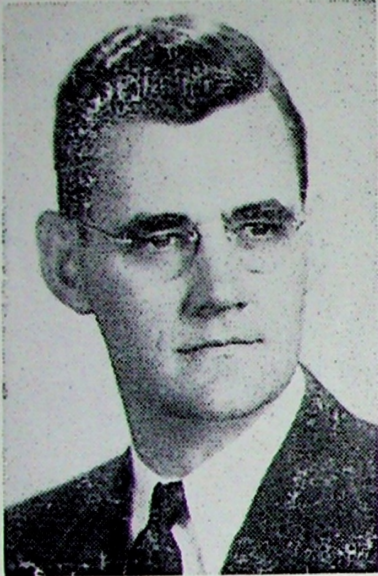

COLLEGE CLASSES

We are enjoying some interesting classes this semester at Oregon Bible College.

In New Testament Studies we are considering, in the Books of Romans, Galatians, and Colossians, the problems of early Christianity, with emphasis upon practical teaching values. Our Training for Service is a course of training in the use of the Bible, in which we get an overall view of the Bible and learn where Bible truths are found. Our book also offers helpful points in Christian pedagogy. In our Prophecy class, we have learned the methods of interpretation and the history of interpretation and are now involved in a study of the covenants and their place in prophecy. The Practice Teaching course is held for two periods once each week. The first hour is spent in the study of the principles and methods of teaching; the second hour is spent in practical application (teaching boys and girls from the East Oregon Grade School who are dismissed each week to attend religious education at the East Oregon Chapel). This is a practical course wherein we learn by doing.

Not all of our courses are directly concerned with the Bible. This year, a course in geology is being enjoyed

by some of the students. Here we study of the formation of our earth and of its physical character, with the primary purpose of inspiring a greater appreciation of God's creation. Music plays an important part in our worship services today. The Music Fundamentals course is an introductory study in the melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic elements of music. We study notation, scales, intervals, and chord structure. Conducting and Song Leading introduces the principles and practices of leading choirs and congregations in singing anthems, hymns, and gospel songs. Choir provides the students with the opportunities both to learn of music and singing, and to apply this learning by serving the Lord in song throughout the year. English, too, is an important subject, for it is necessary in order that one become more effective in communication for his service to God and to Christ.

Oregon Bible College is a wonderful place to learn more about God's Word, and about ways in which we may serve Him better. We need more workers in the Lord's vineyard, and we ask all young people to seriously consider attending Oregon Bible College to train for His service.

LIFE AT THE GIRLS' DORMITORY

As in previous years, the Golden Rule Dormitory is the home for the girls attending Oregon Bible College. This year there are eight girls rooming at the dormitory who come from Canada, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Nebraska, and Virginia. There are four new girls.

The average day of a college girl starts by rising at 6:15 a.m., and then going to breakfast at 6:45. The boys eat all their meals at the dormitory, also. Classes start at 7:30, and by 12:00 the students are back at the dorm for dinner. In the afternoon some of the girls have jobs, such as office work, housecleaning, or babysitting. The students return for supper, which is served at 6:00 at the dorm. Two girls are assigned to do the dishes for the evening meals, with the exception of Monday when the boys do them, and Saturday and Sunday when each one does his own.

The girls must be in their rooms studying by 7:00 p.m. At 9:30 they gather together for a short devotional period.

Each girl takes a turn having charge of devotions for a week. The devotions include spiritual thoughts, prayer request, session of prayer, and sometimes choruses.

Life in a girls' dormitory is enjoyable. There are times when some of the girls gather in someone's room to hash over our problems and just "visit."

This is just a small glimpse of a girl's life in a dorm. I have been here just eight weeks, and I have found dormitory life very different, but it has been one of the most wonderful and exciting times of my life.

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THE STUDENT COUNCIL

Basically, the function of a student council is to maintain harmony between students and administration in working toward the goals and objectives of a college. A student organization such as this is needed because, theoretically, a college exists for the students and not the students for the college. This theory does not mean that the purpose and goals of the college should be changed because of some petty grievances of the students; but it does mean that the college policy should be flexible enough to adapt itself to definite, temporary needs of the student in working toward the goals and purposes of the college.

It seems that in the past students have had to adapt themselves to college policies, but they have felt that certain policies should be flexible, since different students have different needs. However, this is in no way criticizing, for how is the administration to recognize needs if they do not know about them? This is the fault of the students, because they have failed to use their only voice in making college policy, the student council.

Recently, some students have been enlightened of the fact that, if their needs are voiced and brought into the

open, something will be done about them. For instance, some students felt that chapel programs could be more inspiring and beneficial. The faculty met this problem by forming a committee consisting of teachers and students, who worked out the chapel programs together. Another example is that concerning the textbooks. Students felt that certain textbooks were not suitable for particular classes. Again the faculty met this problem by having the students write criticisms of textbooks and by interviewing students individually to get their opinions of the textbooks.

These two examples are things which have been done to better Oregon Bible College and promote harmony between the student body and the administration. Presently, there are many things being considered that will further promote harmony.

What does this mean to you as members of the Church of God? It means that the students and administration are working together to make your College, where your future pastors and church workers are being trained, the most efficient college possible for the Lord. It also means that prospective students and parents of prospective students have the assurance that the rights and grievances of each student are respected. In what secular college can each student go to his council representatives with his grievance, no matter how trivial, and have the grievance brought before the council for consideration?

LIFE AT THE MENS' DOMITORY

Nine men are making their residence at the men's dorm for the fall term at Oregon Bible College. They represent several different parts of the country—Missouri, Indiana, Washington, Nova Scotia, Ohio, Nebraska, and Illinois. Each one is interested in learning more about the spiritual aspects of life and how to receive more benefits from them.

The men's dorm offers a chance for Christian fellowship, and an opportunity to learn from other Christian young men. It also helps develop tolerance, love, and respect for one another. These are some of the extra benefits gained when one attends a Christian college and lives in the dormitories.

Since all of the men have the afternoon free of classes, they work at various jobs in and around Oregon to earn money to meet the expenses of college life. This leaves

the majority of study time for the hours after the sun sets. However, with careful planning and study habits, the men are able to adequately study their lessons.

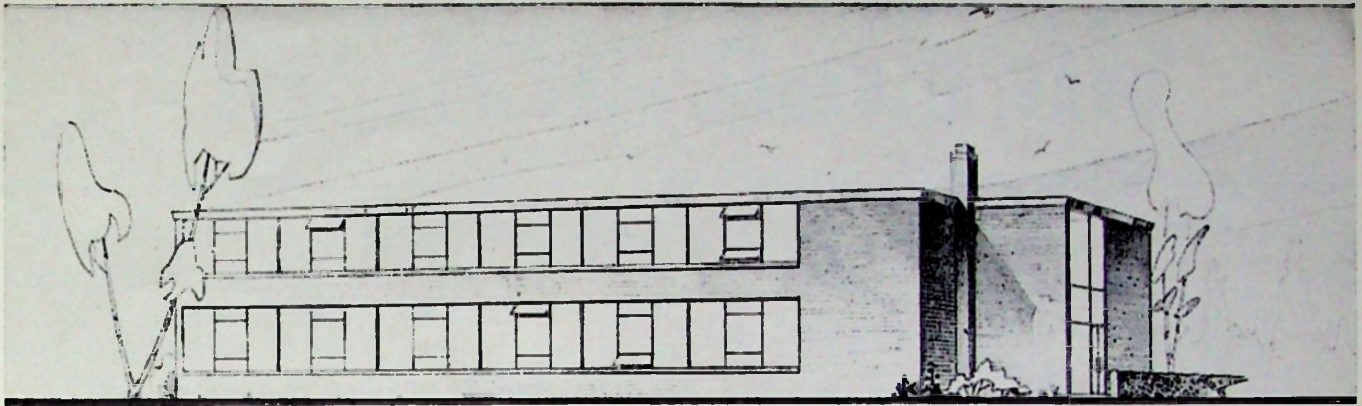

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN for Oregon Bible College

1964 will be the Silver Anniversary of Oregon Bible College. For a quarter of a century, Oregon Bible College has been serving the Church of God by educating ministers, evangelists, missionaries, musicians, teachers, and other church workers.

During these years the College has grown in experience and quality of teaching, and has developed a sound, Biblical, Church of God orientated curriculum. It is now in a position for numerical growth and is equipped, spiritually and scholastically, to educate more students.

Physical facilities, however, are not adequate. Several years of study led to the General Conference delegates approving construction of a building such as the drawings above and below propose, for a men's dormitory for twenty-two students, a library of 5,000 volumes, a kitchen-cafeteria to serve up to seventy-five students, and a house mother's apartment.

The proposed building will cost approximately \$110,000 to build, plus \$15,000 for furnishings; a total of about \$125,000.

Commitments totaling \$114,500 have thus far been received. Of this amount about \$42,000 has been paid. When the total of \$125,000 has been committed, and \$75,000 of that amount has been received in cash, build-

ing can begin. It is hoped that construction can start in April, 1963, the building to be in use the following fall.

A much larger enrollment is expected in the fall of 1962. This will necessitate the renting of houses for dormitory space for men. Present dormitory facilities are not adequate for even the present enrollment. There is a pressing need for these facilities if Oregon Bible College is to continue to grow and fulfill the task it has been given.

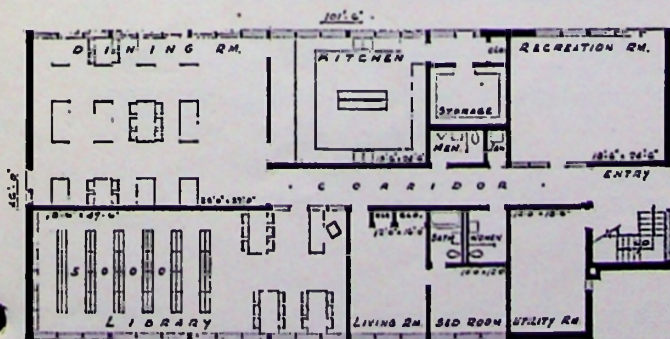

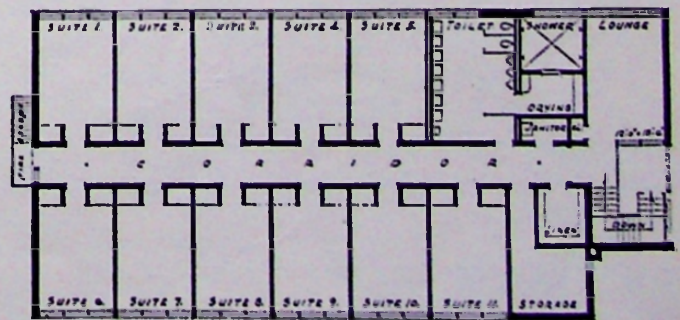

General Conference Progress

BOARDS MEET

The General Conference Board of Directors met in Oregon, Ill., November 10 and 11, and conducted much business for the General Conference. The auditor's report (Longfellow and Ramsey, Warsaw, Ind., auditors) for the past fiscal year was received and approved, a part of which appears on the opposite page.

The Sunday School Department Board plans a meeting at Kokomo, Ind., December 2.

The Mission Department Board plans an early meeting at Burr Oak or South Bend, Ind.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

On the opposite page is a portion of the auditor's report for the last fiscal year, showing the schedule of assets and liabilities, schedule of income and expenses, and the fund balances of the Church of God General Conference, as of September 30, 1961.

Examination will show that the net worth of the General Conference increased last year by \$18,197.46, all of which is in Silver Anniversary Building Campaign funds.

The actual operating deficit for the year was \$6,421.79. This is almost exactly the amount that contributions for the year fell behind budget estimates. Had the giving goal of \$42,860.00 been reached, we would have had a deficit of only \$170.00. This indicates that the budget estimates are very realistic, and when budget goals are not met there is an actual excess of expenses over income of that amount.

The following are quotes from a letter from Bro. Ortiguero dated November 9, 1961. "I am now in receipt of your letter and the check and it would be appropriate to express my sincerest thanks to our Almighty Father in your steps to keep moving the Lord's work here.

"At this time of writing I wish to let you know that our conference is in progress. It started November 4 and will end tonight, November 9. All the preachers are present as shown by the enclosed picture. They arrived Friday afternoon. Saturday morning we immediately proceeded to begin our conference, talked on the assignment of the preachers, and in the afternoon we reviewed on the doctrines of the church. Sunday, November 5, we held our Sunday morning services. All the members in San Nicolas were present. After the services we took some pictures. In the afternoon we continued to study more of the church doctrines and in the night we have an evangelistic service.

"November 6, Monday morning our picture was taken with the director, instructors, and students of the Villa Verde Academy. After picture taking we have our agenda on the causes for a minister's license to be annulled.

In the afternoon we all went out to invite people to attend our outdoor evangelistic meeting on the night. Tuesday morning, November 7, agenda for the advancement of the work. In the afternoon we again went out to do personal works. In the night we again had an outdoor evangelistic meeting.

"Wednesday, November 8, we went to the river to baptize Mrs. Insturo Magno. In the night time we had an evangelistic meeting in the barrio (village) along the river. Thursday morning, November 9, we practiced singing. In the afternoon the preachers worked on their preparation to preach in the evening in our last evangelistic meeting held in our house. Tomorrow, November 10, the preachers will leave San Nicolas for their new assigned places."

His letter goes on to tell further of his work in the school there and of his desire to visit here sometime.

Letters were received also from Bros. Gabanes and Magno. We quote from Bro. Gabanes' letter, "I received my check and I am expressing my sincere thanks to the American brethren who provided this sum heartily. We thank them for their Christian love to the workers of the church in the Philippines. May God the Almighty help us to gather His people in the fold."

The following is a quote from Bro. Magno's letter, "Be informed that my first check is received. Thanks in the Lord for this support. I am temporarily assigned to Roxas. There are many interested brethren here. May we request your earnest prayers that these people be added to the Lord's flock."

It is a real thrill to read these entire letters and to know that the work of the Church of God is growing and progressing in the Philippines even beyond our fondest hopes.

We again thank God for this opportunity that He has so wonderfully laid at our feet. Less than one year ago we had our first contact with Bro. Ortiguero and the great progress made since then could only come with God's blessing and direction. We now have commitments of \$435.00 monthly for their support. Only \$35.00 more per month is needed for full support of these seven workers.

We are now making the necessary arrangements for the purchase of a typewriter for Bro. Ortiguero. Any donations for this effort should be sent to the Mission Department, Church of God General Conference, Oregon, Ill.

Mission Needs

There is need for used clothing in many areas at present. Lightweight and smaller-size clothing are needed in the Philippines and can be sent by parcel post, 22 pounds or less, to Pastor Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, San Nicolas, Pangasinan, Philippine Islands. Heavier clothing is needed at the L'Anse, Mich., Mission, and can be sent to Mrs. Sam Spruce, Skanee Road, L'Anse, Mich. All types of clothing can be used in Nova Scotia and should be addressed to Pastor John L. Denchfield, Box 134, Digby, Nova Scotia.

There is some need for outdated Sunday school materials. If any Sunday school has a supply of such unused material, please advise the Superintendent of Missions, Box 231, Oregon, Ill.

Special Notice About Parcel Post Mailing

In regard to parcel post mailings to the Philippines, there is a special exception on mailing to San Nicolas, Pangasinan. Only 22 pounds are allowed in one package to this city, not 44 pounds as previously stated. We do not know the reason for these regulations, but certain cities in the Philippines are limited to 22 pounds per package in parcel post.

Missionary Day

National Missionary Day, which was observed in most churches on or before November 5, seemed to be a real success in those churches which have reported. Your Superintendent of Missions took part in the Virginia State Missionary Conference October 27 to 29, 1961, assisted in the Missionary Day services in the Oregon, Ill., Church on November 5, and, together with Bro. Harold Doan, journeyed to Grand Rapids, Mich., for services in both Pennellwood and Southlawn churches there on November 12. We would remind the pastors to report on the activities of their churches in observance of Missionary Day.

Mission Builders Appeal

The seventh Mission Builders Appeal has been sent and is for the Troyview Church of God at Troy, Ohio. This building is progressing very well and is near completion. Some services are already being held in the building.

The Hector, Minn., Church of God received the last appeal, and a letter from Bro. E. W. Johnson, treasurer of the church, states, "It has been wonderful to have the Mission Builders' help and we sincerely thank all of you in this effort for our church. God will surely



bless each one. We hope to have a completed picture of it for you before long."

Pastoral Aid Program

The Pastoral Aid program is another of the services of the Church of God General Conference to assist a small growing church. It helps the church to employ a full-time pastor that its work might progress more rapidly. There are five churches now receiving this assistance.

Hillside Chapel at Niles, Mich., was one of the churches receiving such assistance, but at a recent meeting of the congregation, it voted to ask that the aid to them be discontinued and that they would strive to make up that additional assistance on their own. We quote from their letter: "With all the additional missionary opportunities which are opening up, we feel that this money can be used elsewhere by the General Conference." They also expressed their thanks to the General Conference for the help which they have received. We wish to thank the people of Hillside Chapel for this fine expression of faith, and their realization of the missionary needs.

Local Missionary Reports

Tempe, Ariz., Dorcas Society: For several years we have made wheel-chair robes for patients at nursing homes, made layettes for distribution through the County Welfare, and prepared boxes of food for needy families. In all of our packages and boxes we enclosed doctrinal tracts in the hope of further spreading of the gospel of Christ and the Kingdom of God.

Golden Rule Missionary Society, Cleveland, Ohio: We sent used clothing to Digby, Nova Scotia, sent Heralds to Digby and other



places, and donated clothing to a neighborhood school.

Hope Chapel Missionary Department, South Bend, Ind.: We contribute to National Missionary Society and Mission Builders League, award tuition to a freshman student at Oregon Bible College, and send Heralds to hospitals and libraries.

Hillsburg, Ind., Church of God Missionary Society: We are sending clothing to Nova Scotia, and distribute Restitution Heralds in

public places, and supply our pastor with tracts.

Chicago, Ill., Missionary Society: We donated used clothing to Indian Center in Chicago and to other mission works, and contributed to Bro. Doan's trip to the Philippines.

Deborah Circle, Troyview Church of God, Troy, Ohio: Have been organized only for a short time. We are making quilts for the needy, and are having bake sales.

FILIPINO SUPPER

The main course was a national dish called "Adobo," which is a chicken and pork casserole served on rice. The chicken and pork are simmered several hours in coconut milk with savory herbs. Delicious! Candied yams, green beans, fresh relishes, and our strictly American hot rolls (breads do not keep on the islands) completed the main part of our meal, our dessert being a banana. We learned that there are fifty-seven varieties of bananas grown in the Philippines.

After we completed our supper, we assembled in the sanctuary of the church for our spiritual food. The highlight of our evening was having a speaker, who had spent some time in the Philippines, talk to us and show slides of the people and the country. With the aid of a large map of the islands, she showed where our churches are located and told us much about the people and the land. Some of the slides taken by Bro. Harold Doan while he was there were shown and a discussion of our Philippine churches was enjoyed.

In the foyer of the church we placed two long tables for our Philippine display. On one was the island treasures of our guest: beautiful carved pieces, lovely materials and jewelry, some made by school children of the Philippines. On the other table was a display of Philippine exports and the souvenirs of one of our members who spent time in the Philippines during his time in the armed forces.

It was a most enjoyable and profitable evening. An offering, beside our regular evening offering, was taken to defray the cost of the meal, with all over our expenses to be sent to the National Missionary Society to help in our Philippine work. 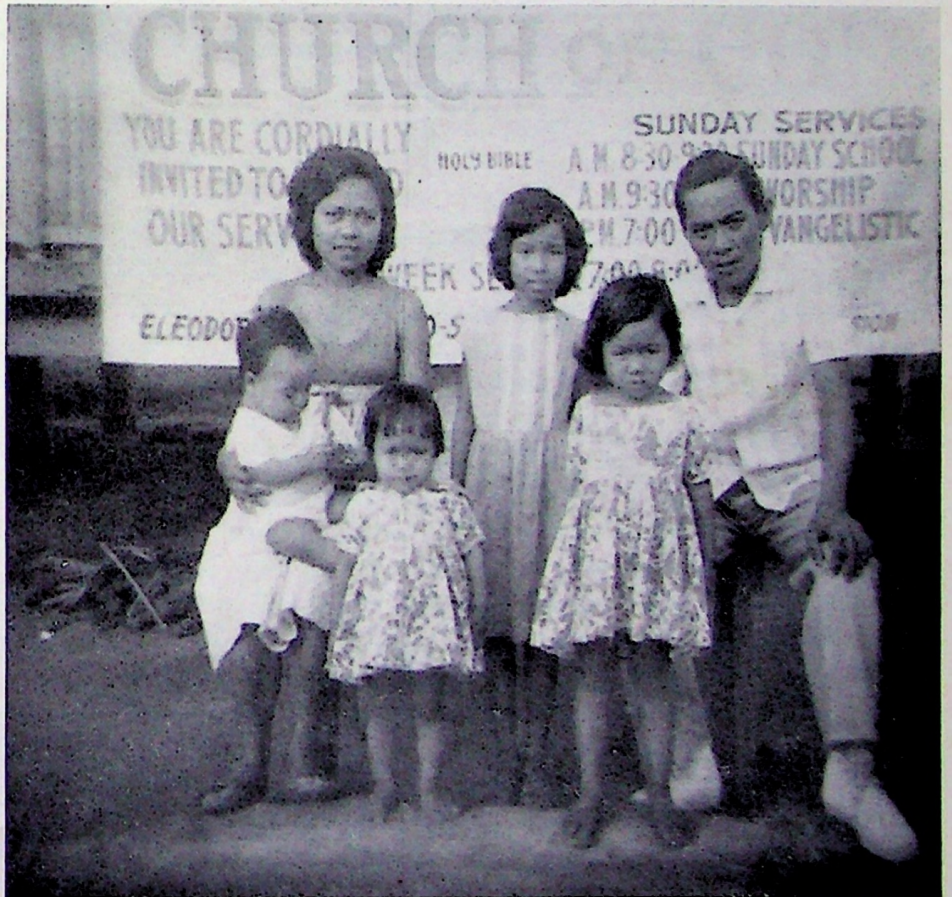

General Conference Progress

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE THIS MONTH

The annual Midwinter Ministers' Conference of Church of God ministers will be conducted January 22-26, at Oregon, Ill. This is an important ministers' retreat from which every minister who attends receives a great spiritual blessing. It is a time of refreshing for the pastors, as well as a time for learning and fellowship.

Ministers pool their expenses for the week-long conference to equalize costs for those coming from long and short distances. Churches are urged to pay their minister's pool expense (usually about \$25.00), so that every minister will be able to attend. The benefits of the conference are reflected to the church in the strengthening and improvement of the ministry, and the value received by the churches is worth far more than the small investment in the pool expenses.

BROTHER DICK ILL

Bro. Otto E. Dick, president of Oregon Bible College, has been in the hospital for several weeks for observation. His condition has been quite serious, but he is now feeling better and is hoping to be home soon. The prayers of the church are asked in his behalf.

Systematic Theology has been reprinted and awaits only folding and binding. The revised *Songs of Truth* is about ready for submitting to the printer. The committee, Srs. Louise Lapp, Evelyn Austin, Leila Mae Doeden, and Bro. William Wachtel, have been working diligently on this.

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Why I United With the Church of God

WHY DID I become a brother in the faith, united with the Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith? The following reasons present some of the major factors involved.

First of all, let me say that by the Spirit of God, which is the Spirit of Truth, the Comforter, the influence of God, I was led to contact and work with this people. The things herein brought forth are personal between myself and the Lord, which can be known only by my testimony. This, therefore, serves only my own personal satisfaction, for I am the only one who knows and understands how God has led me—just as each individual has his own personal experience. I, by the Spirit of God, am convinced and fully satisfied with the leadership by which I have been led.

“It was needful for me to write unto you and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints” (Jude 3). In Ephesians 4:5 I had discovered that there is one faith. Of course, today there are many “faiths” in the world, but concerning the faith which is wonderful and glorious and contains the power to save and deliver into the Kingdom of God, there is but *one faith*. That faith is the one which was once delivered to the saints. Therefore, since all other faiths are of no value, only one can bring salvation.

What faith was it which was once delivered to the saints? Its gospel message was presented from heaven to man, and that faith is still the hope of Bible believers everywhere even to this day. This faith is the Abrahamic faith. Without the Abrahamic faith there can be no future life, no Kingdom of God, no inheritance of the earth, no seed with which to bring about the consummation of God's purpose.

Where could I find a group of people with whom to labor, who was not ashamed of this old-time, wonderful faith? who would not compromise for any amount of popularity? who would rather give up this present life than to deny this faith for one instant? In my search and prayers, God wonderfully led me to this group of people, not because the members were perfect in every detail, but because they were trying earnestly to contend before this present world for the faith which was once delivered to the saints, even as also am I.

Eternal life is a gift of God through His Son Jesus Christ, depending entirely upon our meeting His conditions according to the preaching of the gospel. There is no immortality out of Christ; therefore, natural man dies and returns to the dust. The only hope of living again is by resurrection when Jesus comes again.

“If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: for he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds” (2 John 10). Where in all the earth could be found brethren who were convinced that to receive one with an opposing faith or any other than the one delivered to the saints is wrong? To do such is to become partaker of his evil deeds. They are convinced that to receive one with any other faith would mean that we would be failing to preach, hold up, defend, love, and live by the truth. As Paul said in Galatians 1:8, “Though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed.”

The conclusion proves that we should not look to other faiths for spiritual guidance and instruction, but should look to the Lord Himself and His Word of Truth. This should be done at all times in meekness of spirit, holding forth the gospel of Christ and of the Kingdom without yielding or compromising, living our sermons in and by the grace of God.

Again, the Lord led me to this people, not because there was no room for improvement, but because one who becomes a saint by salvation through Jesus Christ must recognize no man as the minister of Christ except the one who preaches as Christ preached. He must live as Christ lived; he must esteem the Word of God in its purity so much that its purity transforms his life to a life of righteousness in Christ. Thus he will live each day by activated faith—faith put into action for the glory of God through belief in Christ and His truth.

“Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And

Evangelism and Missions Progress

"Send the Light"

The reports of the various mission points are very encouraging. The work in Nova Scotia is continuing to progress and plans are being made to complete the church building there in 1962. They now meet in the basement church and it is planned to add the sanctuary on the main floor next year.

Bro. Bonifacio Gabanes is doing a fine work in the new field of Solano in the Philippines. There are four new families being prepared for baptism. He has had some opposition, however, from a pastor of another church there who has tried to disrupt his services and has made threats to him if he does not leave Solano. Both he and Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero say, "Even whatever happens, we will not withdraw our work. We know the Lord is with us." What wonderful testimony! Bro. Gabanes in another letter says, "We need your prayers for the Lord's work here, as I am doing every day for the work there, so that God may help us to make progress in our works. Please greet our brethren there for me. I am so happy that the Lord is helping me in providing my needs through His good people in America."

We have the names and addresses of the seventy-nine members of the Philippine churches. There are 24 at San Nicolas, 24 at Abut, 15 at Quezon, 13 at the Tabuk Mountain Province church at Bannawag, only Bro. and Sr. Insturo Magno at Roxas, and Bro. Gabanes at Solano.

We have now received sufficient commitments so that in December we were able to send support for all seven of the full-time workers there. We praise God for the zeal and desire of the members of the Church of God

to see this work go forward. We are also thankful for the support of the work of the Church of God as a whole, and pray that the work might truly move forward, and that many might be brought to Christ in this year of 1962.

General Information

It appears that clothing shipped to the Philippines may best be sent by parcel post. Parcel post packages are limited to twenty-two pounds; however, they can be mailed directly to the Philippines from any post office with no difficulty. Freight is about the same cost; in fact, even higher if the amount is less than one hundred pounds, and it appears that in most cases arrangements must first be made for an export carrier who will reroute the freight after it reaches the coast. More information will be given in the next *PROGRESS JOURNAL* on this subject.

Dimeters are still available for any organization or individual who would like to use them. They may be had by writing the Missions Department, Box 231, Oregon, Ill.

Information on how to organize a local missionary society may be found in "The Workers Manual." Your Superintendent of Missions is also available for advice and counseling on this subject, as well as suggestions and helps on activities and projects for local societies.

Inquiries have been made regarding writing direct to Bro. Ortiguero for reports and information regarding his work there. Letters of brotherly fellowship and love and encouragement to him would certainly be well received. We would suggest, however, that reports of his work be obtained from the *PROGRESS JOURNAL*, or by direct contact with the missions department for latest and more detailed information. As he reports frequently to this department, it would seem to be unfair to expect Bro. Ortiguero to make reports to each local society, too. He is pastoring the church at San Nicolas, supervising all the work in the Philippines, teaching religious classes four hours a day in the academy there, and doing evangelistic work, so we know that his time for additional correspondence would certainly be limited.

Mission Board Meeting

The National Missionary Board and the Superintendent of Missions met at Burr Oak, Ind., December 9, 1961. Many things were discussed, among them being the study of some qualifications and requirements for missionaries (See "Missions," page 6)

though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing" (1 Cor. 13:1-3). The people who earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the saints, standing strong in the Word and Spirit of our Lord, must also know how to love. They must generate love. Not only must they know how to love one another and esteem each other highly in the work for the glory of the Lord, but they must know how to love even their enemies and those who persecute them; for love is the fulfilling of the law. "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35). This is the outward show to the world, the definite sign as to whether or not we truly are Christ's. Those who love the Abrahamic faith must in every condition and circumstance be living examples of the power and effect of the mighty and powerful love of God shed abroad in our hearts. Bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor, evil speaking, and malice must be removed forever from those who have been baptized into Jesus Christ.

We are living in a generation which by prophecy could well be the generation living when Jesus comes again. The popular teaching of the religious world in this generation is of a triune God, a pre-existent Christ, and that God Himself is Christ. In order to be recognized by world religious standards, we must either admit that the faith which the saints upheld of one God is in error, or else compromise the teaching and preaching of these truths. It is this truth which makes every one of us who believes dear to the heart of God.

We have been brought together with this movement because we believe that the hour is come when the bride of Christ must be ready for His appearing. We must all stand together for these truths of the gospel. We must arise and shine forth for this faith in this darkest hour for humanity since the days of Noah and the flood. Where is the light of the world? Where are the wise? Will they not be found where the truth of God abides? Will not those who have the gospel of the Kingdom herald the gospel of the Kingdom and the restitution of all things through the coming King? Is it not a fact that God is working mightily, far above our fondest dreams, in a great awakening and return to the Lord and His truth? Is He not filling our hearts with His Spirit as never before for a purpose which He has chosen for us in Christ?

What is the work before us in the Lord? By faith in righteous living it is to subdue kingdoms, work righteousness, obtain promises, stop the mouths of lions, quench the violence of fire, escape the edge of the sword, out of weakness be made strong in the Lord, to wax valiant in fight against the evils of this day, and to turn

We resolve that whether we are stoned or whether we wander about in sheep or goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, or tormented, or whether we perish by the sword, we will always, until we fall asleep in death or until we are caught up at His appearing, be unmovable, never compromising. We do this for the glory of our God and His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who gave Himself a ransom by pouring out His life unto death that He might purchase to Himself the bride, the church of the living God, that in the ages to come we might reign with Him upon the earth in the Kingdom of joys and delights.

SUPPLIES NEEDED FOR THE NEW VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL SERIES

We highly recommend Bro. Duncan to other pastors and churches seeking guest speakers.

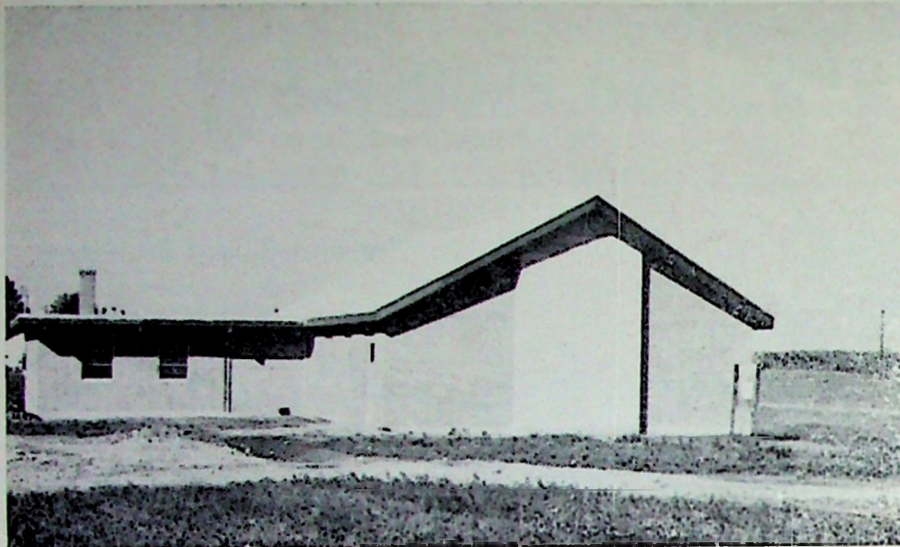
MISSION BUILDER'S APPEAL NUMBER SEVEN

PROGRESS IN THE DECADE OF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

By the Editor

At the General Conference business meetings of 1954, an ambitious Decade of Development Program was adopted by the delegates. The Decade of Development Program established goals for the various parts of the Lord's work that have been committed to the Church of God General Conference.

As the decade has progressed, some changes have been made in thinking and procedures. No one can foresee the future, and the program was not meant to be an infallible or constraining plan. The Decade of Development Program, though not receiving great publicity, has been a guide in thinking and planning for those charged with this responsibility.

Surveying the Decade of Development goals, as they were adopted in 1954, we have much reason for encouragement. The goals for Foreign Missions have been far surpassed. Praise be to God for His provisions! With organized missionary societies on a local, state, and national level, with a full-time mission executive, with several foreign fields opened and staffed, God has richly blessed and led in this field.

The goals for Oregon Bible College have been partially reached. The teaching staff has been expanded and steadily improved with experience and new techniques. We are well on the way to new and better facilities. There is every evidence of new interest in the College among the youth of the Church of God.

In the field of publishing, much that was planned in 1954 has been accomplished. Many of the tracts, booklets, and books needed then are now in print. New publications have been added (*Challenge*, *Progress Journal*, *Primary Quarterly*, *Nursery Quarterly*, *Youth Leader's Handbook*, etc.) and more and more churches are using Church of God publications. The goals for subscribers to *The Restitution Herald* (4,000 subscribers) is far short

(about 2,200 *Heralds* are mailed), but we strive toward the goal.

The work of the Berean Youth Fellowship has been moving toward fulfillment of its goals. Many of the improvements visioned in 1954 are now fact. Much remains to be done, but there is an active, growing youth movement in the Church of God which is evidence of progress and accomplishment.

Stewardship has received much attention and total giving within the Church of God is at a new high. This is not all due to inflation, but to new interest in the total work of the Lord. More people are tithing and more churches are tithing (thirty per cent more in the past year), and more people are devoting their talents and time to serving the Lord through the channels of service of the church.

We are not so naive that we think we have reached perfection, or that there are no signs of weakness. In the past eight years, the Church of God has not realized the numerical growth that it should. There have not been as many conversions as there should have been or could have been. (We are still 4,500 members short of our goal of 10,000 members by 1964.) More new churches, Sunday schools, and Bible classes should have been started. We are convinced, however, that should the Lord tarry this too will come!

Being in a position to have an overview of the work of the Church of God, we take this opportunity to share with you our optimism. As Paul once wrote, "We are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren, beloved of the Lord" (2 Thess. 2:13). The Lord has worked; pastors have worked; lay leaders have worked; the membership at large has worked—together, strides have been made toward the accomplishment of the objectives set before us.

General Conference Progress

NEW VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL BOOKS

Sample copies of one lesson from the new vacation Bible school lessons for 1962, "God's Promises Are Sure," are in the hands of church secretaries and pastors. We are requesting that orders for the new series be placed by March 1, 1962, so that we will know how many to print and be certain to be able to fill all needs. These preliminary orders will be given first preference.

The new set of lessons is very nicely done by Sr. Iris Burnett and her aids, and we know they will be welcomed by every Bible-teaching Bible school.

EXTENSIVE REPAIRS

The General Conference offices have been undergoing some extensive repairs. The old part of the building (more than one hundred years of age) which is used for warehouse storage and mailing, was in an unsafe condition due to dry rot in the floor. An entire new floor is now being installed. New eaves and other repairs have also been necessary at Golden Rule Dormitory. The expense of this necessary work is being partially met with \$800.00 from a special bequest in the will of Sr. Amy Young, Seattle, Wash., who died last year.

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

About forty Church of God ministers and twenty Oregon Bible College students enjoyed a week-long conference at Oregon, Illinois, January 22-26. This annual conference is a wonderful retreat for study and fellowship which has proved to be a great blessing also to the Churches of God.

Possibly these conferences have done more than any other one thing to promote unity and harmony within the Church of God. Under the blessing of God, the conferences offer a way to iron out differences and to come to a unity of the faith that has been a boon to the General Conference and to every Church of God.

We encourage every church to make it possible for its minister to attend the conference, and to pay his share of the expense pool. It is one of the best investments a church can make.

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Evangelism and Missions Progress

"Send the Light"

It has been said, "The church that is not a missionary church will soon become a missing church." We praise God that the churches which are affiliated with the Church of God General Conference are fast becoming missionary churches. Most local churches now have missionary societies or missionary committees within the church who carry on projects of mission work on their own and in conjunction with the National Missionary Department. In order that our records might be more complete, we ask each of these local societies to send the names and addresses of their officers to Superintendent of Missions, Box 231, Orgon, Ill.

The State of Indiana has a fine missionary program and one that some other states may like to use as a pattern for their program. They have launched a campaign to make each Indiana church a "Gold Star Missionary Church." To qualify as a Gold Star church the following standards must be met: 1) Pay national missionary dues; 2) observe national missionary days; 3) contribute to the state missionary work; 4) co-operate with state missionary projects; 5) have a missionary meeting, a missionary sermon, or Bible study lesson at least once each month.

In accordance with number four, a project is set up for each month. In November, it would be to have a missionary day; December might be preparing a box for a missionary area or for a needy local family; another month might be Nova Scotia month; another might be Philippines' month; another, Mission Builder's month.

Shipping to the Philippines

In the January JOURNAL we promised further information on regulations for freight shipments to the Philippines. We are now ready to recommend that all shipments of used clothing, etc., be made by parcel post in packages of twenty-two pounds or less. Considerable difficulty, delay, and "red tape" are required to ship by freight, and we advise against it. A missionary director of another denomination writes, "Your people would have grave difficulty in shipping things by freight to the Philippines. Our missionaries must spend about a week in Manila on shipments of freight, and then have a broker take care of it. We send nothing by freight any more, except when it is accompanied by a missionary." This is from a man of great experience in Philippine's missions. Please ship there by parcel post only.

Philippine Islands

During the Christmas holiday season Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero visited all of the Philippine churches and took part in a "Christian Fellowship Program" at the Abut Church of God. It apparently was a very interesting program with many musical numbers, five messages by various pastors and laymen, a summarization by Bro. Ortiguero, an invocation and benediction, and an open forum discussion. The theme of the service was "Giving Our Everything to God."

I am sure the service did not end in *one hour*. Ten came forward and confessed Christ at the service and one of them, Pedro Santos, was baptized at 2:00 a.m. the same night. The others are receiving further studies in the Church of God teachings before they will be baptized. Bro. Santiago O. Somera, the pastor there, is also holding Sunday evening services in the village of Minagbag.

Bro. Bonifacio C. Gabanes, at Solano, has also begun holding services in San Juan, a barrio of Solano, with thirty people attending. Bro. Virgilio Lacangan was baptized at Solano. Many former members of another church have asked for baptism and will be baptized after being taught further in the Church of God doctrines.

As Bro. Ortiguero wrote his last letter to us on January 9, 1962, he had just received telegrams from both Bro. Gabanes and Bro. Somero for him to come there. They are receiving serious persecutions at Solano and Minagbag respectively and have asked for his help. Pastors of another church are causing them much trouble. Bro. Ortiguero says, "I am not surprised of these because the Apostle Paul predicted that 'all that will live godly shall suffer persecution' (2 Tim. 3:12)." Pray for these men!

Nova Scotia

Bro. John Denchfield reports the work going well. Severe winter storms have made some services difficult. The Christmas program had to be postponed one week; however, 122 were in attendance when the program was given. The average attendance at the various services of the church there for the month of December was: Sunday school 74; worship service 74; Bereans 42; and devotional 24. CORRESPONDENCE FROM PHILIPPINE BRETHREN

Following are excerpts from two letters recently received from Bros. Insturo Magno and Crispin Calawagen, Church of God ministers in Luzon, Philippines.

Roxas, District No. 11, Isabela
January 2, 1962

Dear Brother Ross:

This is to inform you of the progress of the Lord's work here in Roxas. The work is just a six weeks' old work and of course has not yet attained wonderful results. However, with all sincerity I am glad to say that for the last two Sundays of December, 1961, an attendance of six adults and three children attended both the Sunday school and the Divine Service on December 24. The following Sunday, December 31, there were eight adults and four children. On the first, second, and third Sundays of our services only three to four adults attended excluding the children. These are still unbaptized, nevertheless I hope that through the invisible work of the Holy Spirit of Lord God, I expect that they might fall very soon as the church members of our church.

I would like too to let you know something of our fellowship program held on December 25 in Abut, Isabela. There was a worship and prayer meeting in the evening. Some members of the church in Minagbag attended it. Pastors Ortiguero, Somero, Sibayan, Gabanes, Javar and Calawagen were all present including Sr. Aquinaldo and myself. It was indeed a happy occasion because there was a one hundred per cent attendance of Abut Church of God members plus a good number of outsiders. All of the ministers spoke of different topics. The meeting was finished at twelve o'clock p.m. It was high-lighted with one baptism, this ceremony being made exactly one o'clock a.m., after the fellowship program. The recipient was Bro. Julian Santos.

On December 26 and 27 we had Bible studies on the great doctrines of our church. The following day December 28, we left Quezon

for Roxas. Bro. Ortiguero, Gabanes, Sibayan, Sr. Aquinaldo and myself all went to Barrio Simmimbaan to preach in the evening. There was a small crowd because of inclement weather. Again the following day Bro. Ortiguero, Gabanes and Sr. Aquinaldo left Roxas bound for San Juan, a barrio in Solano, Nueva Vizeaya where Pastor Gabanes is pastoring the church. According to Bro. Gabanes barrio San Juan is wanting us to preach there. As many as thirty residents of this barrio have been requesting for Sunday services in their barrio. I think this is a forward march of the work of the Lord in that place.

Enclosed with this letter of mine is the letter of Bro. Calawagen our fellowworker in Agbannawag, Tabuk, Mountain Province. I wrote for him his letter because he could write and speak only the Ingles. He dictated me in our dialect and I wrote it in English.

Regards to Bro. Doan and thanks to him because of their family picture and thanks to thee also.

Dear Brothers Ross and Doan:

This is in reply to your note of November 17, 1961. I was unable to answer it due to lack of knowledge of your language. I have only a limited knowledge of our Ilocano dialect.

I noticed the interest of all of you brethren there regarding the Lord's work here. For this reason it would be proper for me to say my thousand thanks for your great interest in the advancement of God's venture. I ask you not only your moral and financial support, but I request for your fervent prayers. I am also thanking you for your family pictures. It may serve as an opportunity of meeting your families with us.

On my part since November, after our General Conference in San Nicolas, we have been holding our Sunday services regularly. Most often we have an attendance of more than ten to fifteen, excepting children. As we have

not yet a chapel we held our services at school of our barrio. By February I might bring two or more souls who will accept Lord Jesus as his Redeemer.

Last December 25 we have fellowship program in the evening in Abut. All the ministers were present including church members as representatives from the different churches. That night one brother, Julian Santos, was baptized by Bro. Magno.

December 26 and 27 we have two days studies on the great Bible doctrines of our church as: 1) The only true God, 2) Christ as man, 3) Should we observe the Ten Commandments, the law of the clean and unclean meats, and also the Saturday keeping? 4) The true church, 5) The reign of Christ, 6) The Kingdom of God. Regards to your families.

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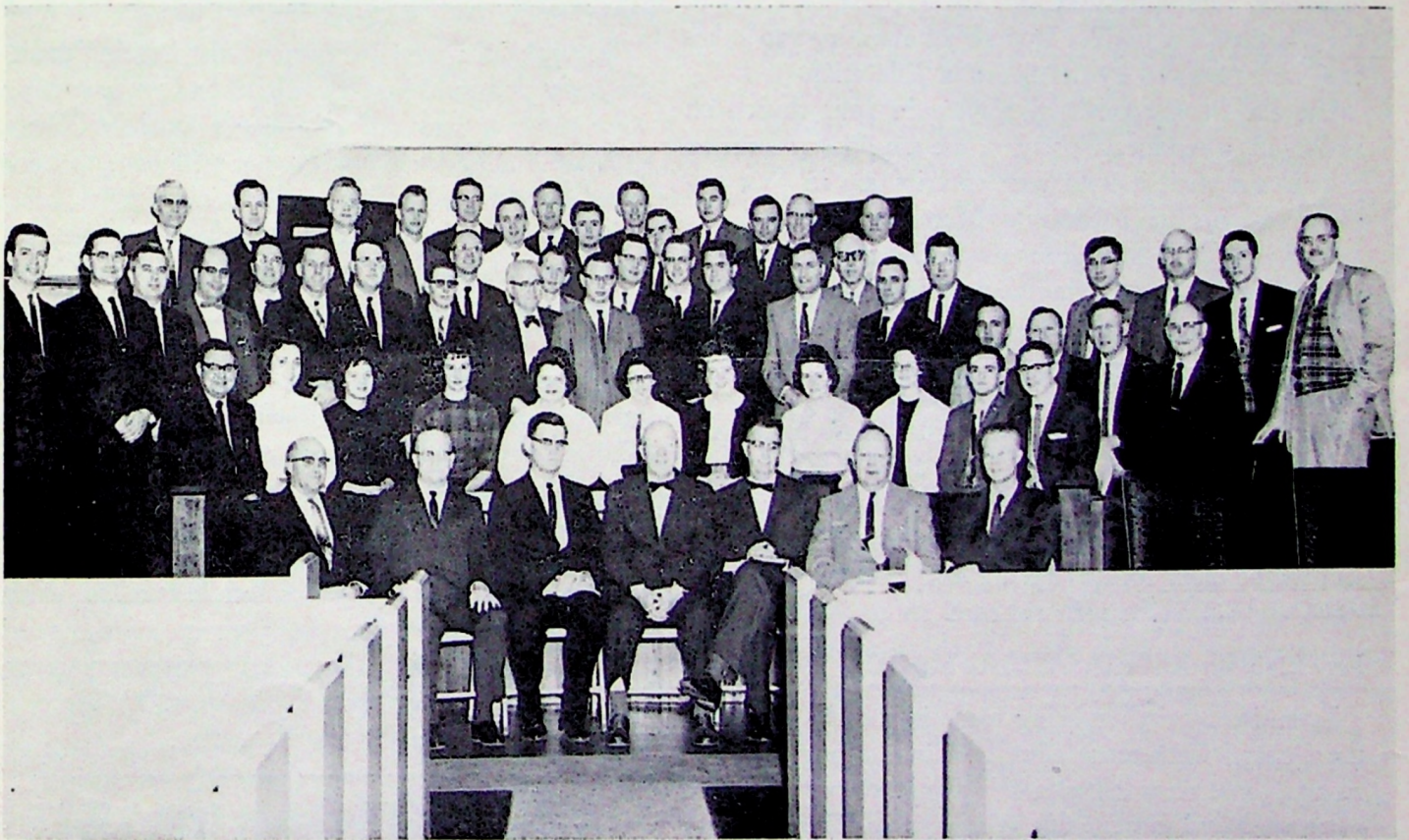

General Conference Progress

MARCH IS BOOSTER MONTH

MARCH is Booster Month for Oregon Bible College. Booster cards and information have been mailed to every Church of God minister for use on March 18, which has been designated Booster Sunday.

The purpose of Booster Month is to call attention to Oregon Bible College, the service that it performs for the Church of God, and the advantages of attendance at the College. The special Booster collection that is received at this time is used for some of the extra projects that boost Oregon Bible College throughout the year: student assistance, faculty conferences, the *Maranatha* issues of the *PROGRESS JOURNAL*, a student scholarship, and other projects authorized by the Board of Education.

Use the Booster cards distributed in your church on March 18 to become a Booster or use the Booster form on page 5 and mail it with your contribution in your calendar envelope for February or March.

Above all, pray for Oregon Bible College, and support its ministry by encouraging young people to enroll there for a Christian education.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL BOOKS

An error was made in the first order forms mailed for pre-publication orders of the new Bible school books, "God's Promises Are Sure." New order forms have been sent to church secretaries and to those who have already sent in the older forms. We are sorry for this inconvenience, and appreciate your patience.

EXTENSIVE REPAIRS BEING MADE

Extensive repairs are being made in the old section of the General Conference office building. Along with the repairs, some remodeling is being done to provide more office space and more usable storage space. The work has been needed for several years and it finally became necessary to do it for safety reasons. While costly, (about \$1,600) the remodeling will improve the buildings and provide necessary work space.

Much work has been done on the Golden Rule Dormitory also, and more is in the offing for this spring. These are items covered in the annual allotment for "Depreciation Reserve" in the General Conference budget. Buildings must be kept in good repair to protect your invest-

ment. The total value of General Conference land, buildings, and equipment is about \$120,000, in addition to about \$50,000 reserved for the proposed new College building.

CHURCH HYMNALS

An order for 10,000 new *Songs of Truth* hymnals has been placed with the Rodeheaver Hall-Mack Co., and delivery is expected in July. Several revisions have been made in the book, with nineteen songs replaced and thirty-two new songs added. We believe the new hymnal will be a blessing for years to come to the churches which use it.

Because of the large investment that is being made in the books, it would be very helpful to have as many advance orders and advance payments as possible. This will reduce the amount of money that will have to be borrowed to pay for the books. The new hymnal, because of increased production costs and the larger size of the books, will sell for \$1.80 each, plus postage. This is equal to or lower in price than comparable songbooks of this size.

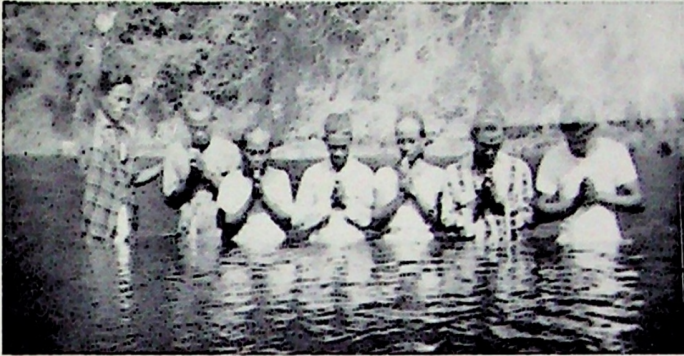

A writer once said, "A religion that is not worth exporting is not worth keeping at home." Thanks be to God that the Church of God is now exporting its religion, the Word of God. Through the distribution of literature, the seven leaders preaching the gospel of Christ in the Philippines, and the Denchfield family proclaiming God's Word in Nova Scotia we are exporting our doctrines and beliefs from our shores. There are now eight locations in the Philippine Islands where preaching services are being held regularly. There is a possibility of some work soon in Mindanao, a more southern island of the Philippines, since a few of the church members have moved to that area.

At the General Conference business sessions last August, it was voted by the delegates "that copies of the book, *Systematic Theology*, by Bro. Alva Huffer, be distributed to all seminary and Bible college libraries in the United States." Some state missionary societies and some local churches are making the distribution of *Systematic Theology* to the Bible colleges in their area one of their projects. This is commendable and is being encouraged by the National Mission Board.

We have available the names of the majority of these schools and will send you the names of those in your area if anyone wishes to make this a project. The General Conference will then supply the remaining schools. The supply of the book is now exhausted but has been reprinted and copies will be available soon for those who wish to begin to work on this project. The names of the colleges that have already been supplied or who will be supplied should be reported to the Missions Department to avoid duplications.

Philippine Islands

Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero reports that he has received two boxes of clothing and he is so thankful for them, and said he will distribute them to the church members.

The work there continues to progress well, although there is considerable harassment and difficulty with at least two ministers of another denomination who try to prevent some from attending services at the Church of God.

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN

Total commitments to the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign for Oregon Bible College now total \$115,148.00. Of this amount, a little more than \$50,000 has been paid and is held in reserve for building. It is hoped that total commitments of at least \$125,000 will be

received, and at least \$75,000 will have been paid by April 1, 1963, so that building can begin. This building will provide much-needed dormitory space for single men; a modern kitchen-cafeteria; a modern library, with room for the books and study space that is required; and other facilities for a better college program.

CHURCH SUPPORTED COLLEGES

Oregon Bible College receives about one third of its support by contributions from the Church of God, and about two thirds of its income from student tuition, room and board, and fees. Strange as it may seem, the percentage of contributions needed for Oregon Bible College, even with a small student body, is less than average. A national study by *College and University Business* magazine states, "On the average, the colleges received 38.1 per cent of their total capital receipts from denominational sources."

With a larger enrollment, we are certain that Oregon Bible College could operate well below this national average, and graduate many well-educated leaders for the Church of God. Costs for operating Oregon Bible College are not excessive; in fact, they are below average.

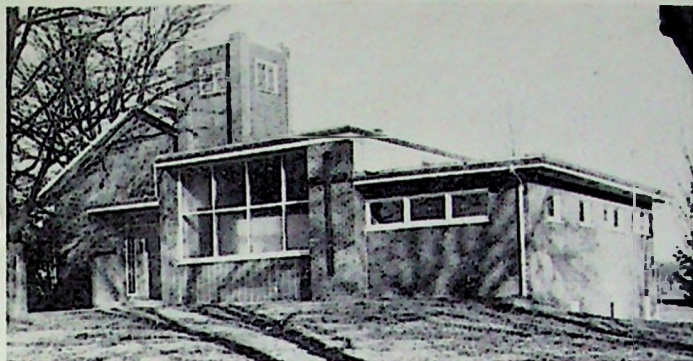

KNOW YOUR SUNDAY SCHOOL

Lawrenceville, Ohio

This Sunday school article is basically the Sunday school superintendent's report as given at the Lawrenceville Church of God annual business meeting by Bro. Dorman Cheatwood.

The Maple Grove Church of God is located about six miles northwest of Springfield, Ohio, in the Village of Lawrenceville. It was organized at this location when a small group of brethren (mostly from Springfield) purchased "the little red school house" from the German Township Board of Education for \$800.00 in 1913. During the next twenty-five years the attendance varied from 16 to 35 per Sunday.

In 1938 the building was remodeled, a basement added, and the first full-time pastor engaged. The gain in attendance was still very slow, but by 1950 the average attendance per Sunday was about 60.

In 1952 an "attendance chart" was made and hung on the wall, with the attendance plotted each Sunday. (We have kept one every year since.) That year the average attendance per Sunday was 63. Early in 1953 it was decided to add an educational wing on the building, which consisted of two floors 30 feet by 30 feet, having seven classrooms and a pastor's study. That year the average attendance jumped to 83. From that time on there has been a steady gain. By 1956 we were over 100, having an average of 109; 1957 - 132; 1958 - 152; 1959 - 154; and 1960 - 163.

Now again it was necessary to enlarge the building as we were up to capacity in both the sanctuary and classrooms. In 1961 we added a first floor and basement of 36 feet by 42 feet, giving more sanctuary area, more classrooms, a new, larger pastor's study, and large basement assembly room. The average attendance jumped to 182 per Sunday with a high of 247. We anticipate an average of approximately 200 this year.

We praise and thank God for giving us this increase and pray that He will continue to bless our efforts, that many more souls may be saved through our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Nine thousand six hundred eighty people attended our regular Sunday school services in 1961! This was an average of 182 per Sunday, an increase of 19 per Sunday over the 163 in 1960. The total number was swelled a little by the fact that there were 53 Sundays in 1961. We have been thrilled with the new families and many young people who have joined with us in worship, study, and service; but are sobered by the fact that we are not yet reaching half who could be reached in our community.

Sunday School Teachers' Conference, February 25, 1961, with Sr. Ruth Halls and Bro. Fred Schuld, Jr. (both of the Cleveland

Church) as guest instructors. Bro. Clark Balentine showed a film strip, "The Christian Teacher," and Pastor E. Richard Smith was in charge of devotions. The local church missionary society served the luncheon at noon, and the conference closed with a communion and consecration service led by Bro. Paul Overholser.

Mothers' Day, May 14, 1962, with small potted flowers for each mother. (The men of the church entertained all the mothers and daughters the night before at the annual "Miss and Mrs. Banquet" prepared and served by the men.)

Son's and Daughter's Day, June 4, 1961, with photos and recognition for 1) those having earned new Bibles for one year of perfect attendance; 2) banner attendance class for the day; and, 3) class having highest per cent of parents present. Pastor Smith's sermon was "Youth Centered," to climax the day.

Vacation Bible School, June 5-9, with average attendance of 141. Sr. Hope Errett was the director. About twenty people were on the staff. The five-day school was climaxed on the last night with a recognition service in which students and teachers demonstrated activities of the week. Parents and friends filled the church to capacity.

Father's Day, June 18, our ladies "pinned" each father with a colorful paper necktie, with a sentimental message typed on each tie. They were made by the ladies, of course, and were quite a surprise.

Homecoming and Anniversary Dinner, July 16, with guests from near-by sister churches; an all-day program of worship, visiting, games, and fellowship.

National Conference at Camp Mack, August 6-11, several of our members were on the Sunday school day program. We earned the honor of having the largest attendance of any church—36.

Sunday School Picnic, September 4, there was fun, food, and fellowship for 125 of all ages, and special "senior citizens" guests from Springfield Masonic Home.

Promotion Sunday, September 24, two new classes were established, making a total of 14. Advancing students were named by past teacher and welcomed by new teacher. All teachers sat in the choir loft, so the congregation could see total teaching staff, and identify age group of each.

Rally Day was October 8, with name tags for all our guests. "Brought One." "Brought Two," etc., pins were awarded to all who brought guests. Pictures were taken of button winners by photographer Ken Maurer of our adult Sunshine Class. Attendance at Sunday School—232.

Everybody's Birthday Party was November 11, with an evening of fellowship and festivity, blended with expressions of thanksgiving and displays of talent. Twelve separate tables, one for each month, were decorated in a theme related to the month by those having birthdays in that particular month. Each group had a five-minute skit or special pres-

entation relating to the theme of their table or month. Several service men were honored (both military and those in the Lord's service) and photos were on the table for their month, along with a beautiful birthday cake.

The Christmas Program was December 24, with a full house, as parents and friends came out strong to see their little loved ones perform as they honored Christ on His birthday.

Many Projects

In addition to many individual class projects, we are listing below a few of the projects sponsored by the Sunday school during the year:

Banner Class. A special banner was awarded each Sunday to the class with the highest per cent of attendance based on enrollment. A trophy was awarded at the close of the year for the class winning the banner the greatest number of times. Both awards are rotating and are based on enrollment which is revised monthly. Anyone not attending at least fifty per cent of the previous month is dropped from "regular" enrollment.

Bibles are given to anyone attending 52 consecutive Sundays. Over 100 Bibles have been awarded since this project was started three or four years ago. The number of Bibles brought is also recorded on the Sunday school register each Sunday and usually exceeds 100.

Directory. Four by six inch directory cards were designed and printed showing name, address, birth date, telephone, children's names and birth dates, and directions to home. After a month of concentrated effort practically every family had filled out a card. From this card file a complete church and Sunday school directory was mimeographed for use of teachers and church members. The card file is very useful to pastor and officers as new members are added, or vital information is needed.

Pencils are awarded each Sunday to those with birthdays, and to visitors. One is marked "Happy Birthday," the other "Welcome," with name of the church also inscribed.

Cradle Roll. A new cradle roll was made, designed in such a way that photographs of the babies and their parents are shown along with the name, birthday, and baby's birth statistics. A cradle roll certificate is also awarded by the cradle roll superintendent at the earliest opportunity.

Planning. Time was set aside at the beginning of the year to set up a schedule of all the major activities of the calendar year, along with tentative dates. As the activities approached, they were planned in detail at the monthly Sunday school cabinet meetings, consisting of Sunday school officers and teachers.

Charts - Equipment. A large graph chart is posted in clear view of the congregation showing the attendance progress Sunday by Sunday. Chalk boards and (or) bulletin boards have been provided for several of the classes. Teacher desks or lecterns are now being considered.

14 Teachers - 14 Assistants. We have been richly blessed with dedicated teachers who are willing to serve the Lord to the best of their ability. A pre-school class, and a post-high class were added at the beginning of the fourth quarter. The assistant teachers not only substitute in case of absence of the teacher, but also assist with recruitment, send cards to absentees, or in the case of the younger classes, assist the regular teacher in the classroom each Sunday.

Evangelism. "Missionary evangelism begins at home, but it does not end there." This

is the philosophy of our church and Sunday school. In addition to the local outreach, which is a prime challenge to any sincere Christian, we're finding new growth and blessing in reaching out with the gospel message to others far away. On the third Sunday of each month the Sunday school offering is "shared" in each class, with over \$20.00 monthly going to our new Philippine foreign mission work. Special offerings have been taken for Oregon Bible College, and help has been given to sister churches in time of need. Church and Sunday school offerings are tithed for use of the state and national work which includes further missionary outreach.

I believe new spirit is sweeping into the hearts of our people at a time when a major local building enlargement program has been successfully completed, because we are getting a better understanding of the fact that has been proven over and over through the ages: You can't outgive God!

MEMORIAL PICTURE DEDICATED

On Sunday, February 17, 1962, a memorial picture, "The Head of Christ" by Sallman, was placed in the sanctuary of the Golden Rule Church of God in Cleveland, Ohio. 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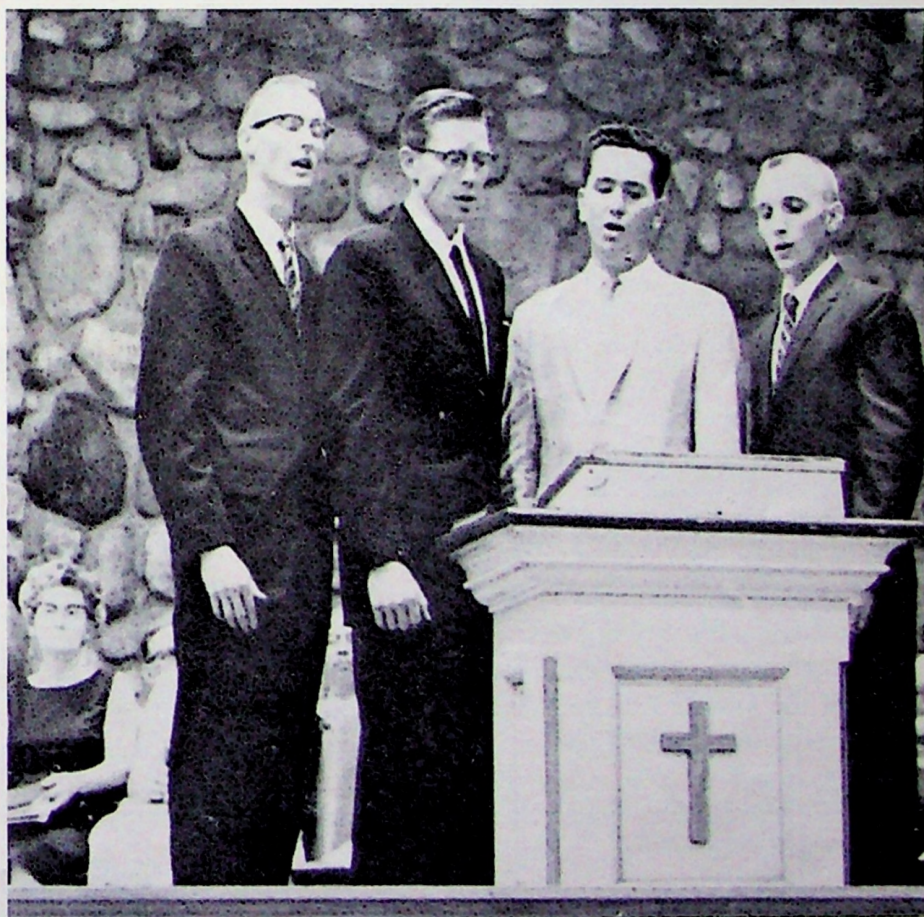

General Conference Progress

GENERAL CONFERENCE, AUGUST 5-10

Plans are moving ahead for the 1962 General Conference meetings at Camp Mack. As plans now stand, Conference will begin after noon on Sunday, August 5, and end Thursday night, August 9. Provisions will be made for those who will stay over for breakfast on Friday morning, August 10, and the camp will be vacated by 9:00 a.m. Plans are for the Thursday evening service, with its installation of officers and Communion Service, to be the climax of the Conference.

YOUTH CONFERENCE, JULY 29 - AUGUST 4

Final plans are also being made for the Berean Youth Conference the week preceding General Conference. This conference will open after noon, Sunday, July 29, and close after noon, Saturday, August 4. Young people staying over for General Conference will be able to stay at the camp under supervision of youth counselors. The deadline for enrollments for the youth conference is July 15. A \$5.00 penalty fee will be charged for all late applications. Regular tuition is \$25.00 through Saturday, \$28.00 through Sunday. Applications will be sent to all ministers or youth leaders sometime in April or early May.

AN OBJECT OF PRAYER

We ask that you make Oregon Bible College a special object of prayer. Pray for the staff of the College. Pray for prospective students now contemplating enrollment in the fall. Pray for present students and for the Lord's blessing and help as they prepare for greater service.

One of the greatest needs of Oregon Bible College is for interested, dedicated support of its student body. Encourage qualified students to enroll. Encourage students who are in attendance to remain true to their calling and to stand fast in their determination and faith.

TIME FOR CHANGES

Each year at this time some churches and pastors make changes. While the Church of God General Conference does not make specific recommendations concerning the placing of pastors, it can often furnish the names of pastors who may be available for a pastorate. MISSIONARY PROGRESS

You will be thrilled with the reports on the missionary page concerning the progress of the work in the Philippines. Sixteen people were baptized in February, and work was begun in two new places. The workers being assisted through the Church of God General Conference are "making full proof" of their ministries. (2 Tim. 4:5.) In spite of some persecution and travel difficulties, they have been able to take advantage of many opportunities.

The faithful giving of the membership is making this mission and the many other phases of the Church of God General Conference work possible. The encouraging thing about giving in the current fiscal year is not only that goals are being met, but many individuals are now taking part in the work through their giving. The size of the gifts, or the total amount given, is not nearly as important as the fact that *many* are giving as they are able. This is an evidence of greater interest, of prayer support, and concern for the Lord's work, which foreshadows greater things to come.

WE DID NOT QUITE MAKE IT

For the first time this fiscal year, we did not quite make the goal for giving for the month. As always, the goals are based upon real costs and needs. (Last year the estimated budget was less than one per cent off actual costs.) We know that this is a temporary setback and that necessary funds will be received to carry on the work that has been undertaken. We thank each one who contributes and thus makes possible the many missionary projects of the Church of God General Conference, through missions, publishing, and Christian education.

Somera), Tabuk (Bro. C. Calawagan), Raniag, Santiago (a new work under Bro. Domingo Valdez).

Philippine Conference Planned

A conference of the Philippine brethren is planned for April 17-20, 1962, at San Nicolas, Pangasinan. An interesting program is planned, with sermons and lectures, Bible study classes, worship programs, and plans to formally organize a Philippine Conference and elect officers. This was one of the subjects of conversation between Bro. Harold Doan and the workers there last summer, and we are happy to see a conference organization in the making. We wish it were possible for several of the brethren from North America to attend this conference.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION REPORT

Since its founding in 1939, Oregon Bible College has graduated seventy-one students. Fifty-one of this number are licensed ministers recognized by the Church of God General Conference. It is difficult to measure the good which has been done and is being done in the Church of God by Oregon Bible College graduates.

In a recent survey for the year 1961, it was revealed that thirty-three alumni preached 2,038 sermons and 75 radio sermons; baptized 89 people; performed 32 weddings and 40 funerals; reported 3,092 calls; conducted 18 Bible schools; and preached 20 sermons outside their local pastorates. Eighteen reported that they publish a church bulletin regularly.

One of the aims of the association is to

promote Oregon Bible College throughout the Church of God. The association offers a scholarship of \$100 each year in memory of Bro. S. E. Magaw. The scholarship this year will go to Bro. OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE OBJECTIVES

Knowledge, Understanding, and Loyalty

Objective number one is to lead the student to a thorough knowledge of the Bible, the inspired Word of God, and to a correct understanding and acceptance of the doctrines of the Church of God. The Bible is the principal textbook. One half of the semester hours required for graduation must be earned in study of the Bible, or in courses designed to give the student a better understanding of the Bible and how to communicate the truth to others. The staff is dedicated to teaching the verbal inspiration of the Bible, and to emphasizing those truths contained in the Statement of Faith of the Church of God.

Character and Personality

Objective number two is to assist the student to become a spiritually mature Christian in character and personality. The College insists that a high Christian standard be maintained by students and staff. It makes an attempt to obtain only students who are consecrated to their Lord and who desire to grow to Christian maturity. Principles of Christian conduct are taught directly and indirectly in class, chapel services, and in standards of conduct set forth in the College Handbook. They are further emphasized in prayer day services, private and group devotions, and through experience in witnessing, which is a requirement of the Christian service program. Personal and group counseling by members of the staff assist further in achieving the above objective.

Skills

Objective number three is to develop skills necessary for successful Christian service, with emphasis upon ability to communicate one's thoughts clearly and effectively.

VALUE OF OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE

The Vision

A vision of a Bible college, where the Church of God might have a place of instruction to train its young men and women in the truths we hold dear, was held by men who looked into the future. They foresaw the day when men would give up the idea of being "self-made" ministerial workers. In their day a few stalwart men of faith and courage farmed six days a week, then walked from ten to twenty miles on Sunday to preach the gospel message. That day has almost been forgotten. Most of those men made tremendous sacrifices of self and family to be able to tell the message of salvation.

Knowledge Has Increased

As Daniel the prophet has said, "Knowledge would increase; many would run to and fro in the earth." The demands of people for a higher education for themselves and for their ministers is something which we must face and endeavor to meet. Scientific studies which we studied in college are now being given in the high schools. This challenge in the world of spiritual thinking is the issue at stake.

Not only has knowledge increased, but those who enter the field of turning men toward God and our Lord Jesus Christ can profit by the experience and training which come by study and counsel of others who have gone before.

Why Get a Biblical Education?

The question is one that needs to be answered, and should be seriously considered by every young person

"What is man that thou art mindful of him?" (Psa. 8:4). These are words that David spoke concerning his status with God. David evidently recognized his lowly position in the sight of God, the Creator of the universe. Upon coming to a full realization of the greatness of God, he uttered the words, "What is man that thou art mindful of him?" David knew that man was made of dust and that he would soon return to dust. Solomon expressed man's situation in relationship to the all-powerful, eternal God when he said, "The living know that they shall die: but the dead know not any thing" (Eccl. 9:5).

Man cannot comprehend the aspects of life and death in relation to himself; he cannot create a universe; he cannot see into the future; he cannot unravel the distant past, but can understand only in a limited way as God reveals things to him. Paul expressed a similar view in 1 Corinthians 13:12 when he said, "Now we see through a glass darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known."

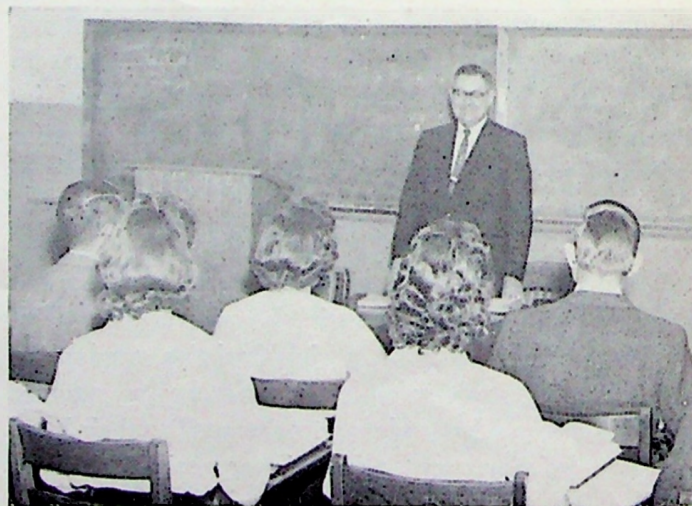
It is when man recognizes the greatness of God that the element of true worship comes into his life. True worship is here defined as the highest form of veneration or adoration given only to God. True worship, then, involves having an intense love and admiration for God. We cannot see God, but can only love and admire Him for the majestic things He has created; for the great things He has done in the past; and for the marvelous things He is doing now that affect each one of us. Paul said that we understand the things of God only through His Spirit. The carnal person sees nothing for which to glorify and worship God. One must be spiritual if he is to worship God. As Jesus said, "The hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshipper shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him" (John 4:23).

Here at Oregon Bible College in all our activities we

are trying to create an atmosphere in which one can worship God. By reading and studying God's Word we learn about Him and His ways. By studying the earth and the universe we learn of the greatness of God, and it makes us stand in awe because of the magnificent things that unfold before our eyes. By prayer we see the hand of God working in our lives in a personal way. Through faith in the things that we see and learn, we worship God in spirit and truth.

Each morning, here at the College, we have an opportunity to go into the chapel to pray and to meditate. To many, this is a very good way to start the day. Three mornings each week, at 9:20, we have services in the chapel so that the students can forget their books and seek a closer companionship with God. Each evening the students have the opportunity to gather for a few minutes for a prayer and devotional period. At other times of the day we take into consideration the admonition given by Paul in Ephesians 5:19: "Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord."

"What is man that thou art mindful of him?" Man was created in the image of God so that he might give glory and honor to God and worship Him. God loves His creation, and expects His servants to worship Him in return for what He has done for them.

STUDY

Today, young people have a wide field of study from which they can make a choice. We, as students of Oregon Bible College, have chosen God's great textbook for man, the Bible, for our study. It is His lamp to our feet and light to our path in this world of sin. (Psa. 119:105.)

As an educating power the Bible has no equal. Nothing so broadens the vision, strengthens the mind, and elevates the thoughts as does the study of the truths of the Bible.

A knowledge of its principles is an essential preparation to every calling. Of all the books ever written, none contain lessons so instructive, precepts so pure, or promises so great as the Bible.

After the resurrection of Christ, when everything else seemed to have failed to convince the disciples that He had risen from the dead, He appealed to the inspired Word, and "expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself" (Luke 24:25-27).

Too much value cannot be placed on the importance of studying the Bible. The need for study of the Word is stated plainly in 2 Timothy 2:15: "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." We should not take these words lightly, but rather obey them to the best of our ability.

Daily searching of the Scriptures is a practice which everyone should follow. It is said of the people of Berea, they "were more noble than those of Thessalonica, in that they searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11).

The purpose of the Scriptures is for our learning (Rom. 15:4). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Tim. 3:16, 17).

Job put a great estimate upon the words of God, for in Job 23:12 he said, "I have esteemed the words of his mouth more than my necessary food."

As the king of Israel was instructed to write a copy of the law and to read therein "all the days of his life" that he might "fear the Lord," keep His Word, and thus prolong his days and the days of his children (Deut. 17:18-20), so ought young people now study the Bible and from it learn that fear which is the beginning of wisdom and that knowledge which is "unto salvation."

SERVICE

In the dictionary we find that service is labor performed in the interest of others; the work of a servant. We have an example from Jesus' teachings of servants working for their master. A nobleman was going to a far country to receive a kingdom and, before he left, he called his servants and gave them instructions concerning their duties while he was absent. The master gave each servant some money which he was to use while the master was gone.

When the nobleman returned, he called his servants to see what service they had rendered in his absence. Some had served well and had gained more money. But one servant had done nothing. The master rewarded the faithful servants, but the unfruitful servant was judged.

We are all servants of our Lord and Master, who has entrusted to us His precious gospel of salvation. While He is away from us in heaven, He expects us to carry on His work. When Christ returns, we, too, shall be brought before Him to give account of our service.

Oregon Bible College provides opportunity for its students to serve the Lord while they are in His training. We have a Christian Service Committee, consisting of Sr. Louise Lapp, Bro. C. E. Lapp, and Bro. Kenneth Milne, which assigns students to serve in near-by Churches of God. This service may be teaching Sunday school classes, young people's groups, playing the piano or organ, leading songs, etc. Each student fills out a weekly report telling how many services he has attended and in what way he participated. Our gospel teams are also under the direction of this faculty committee. Groups of students travel to churches which have requested teams over the week end. They usually take charge of the Sunday morning service, supplying the speaker and special music.

These gospel team trips are of great benefit to the students, as well as the churches visited.

In addition to this faculty committee, there is a service committee composed of students and a faculty adviser. This committee carries on all service functions that will promote Christian activity among the students and enrich college life. Some of its projects have been the preparing of the *Maranatha* issue of *PROGRESS JOURNAL*, conducting services for the Eventide Nursing Home here in Oregon, promoting the use of students' tithes to help those in need, and promoting ways for members of the Church of God to help buy books for the College library. We thank all who have responded to this last project.

The Mission Club is another organization that serves. The purpose of the club is to promote the interest of mission work throughout Oregon Bible College by the way we live in Christ Jesus each day; to become more educated to God's love for all those of the world; to uphold and obey the Great Commission. We begin our meetings with a devotional thought and prayer, continue with a business meeting, and close with a report by one of the members on a missionary or a mission field. Some of our projects are writing to Philippine "pen pals," distributing tracts, and taking charge of one chapel service each month. These chapel services are mission centered, with the members of the club taking complete charge of the program.

The Lord is looking for dedicated young people to be His faithful servants. Oregon Bible College is a Bible-centered school, where such young people can serve the Lord while training for fuller future service. When the Lord says, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" won't you be willing to say, as Isaiah did, "Here am I; send me"?

This is true; but, if one learns to budget his time, he finds the necessary time for studying. Actually, there are advantages to working while attending college.

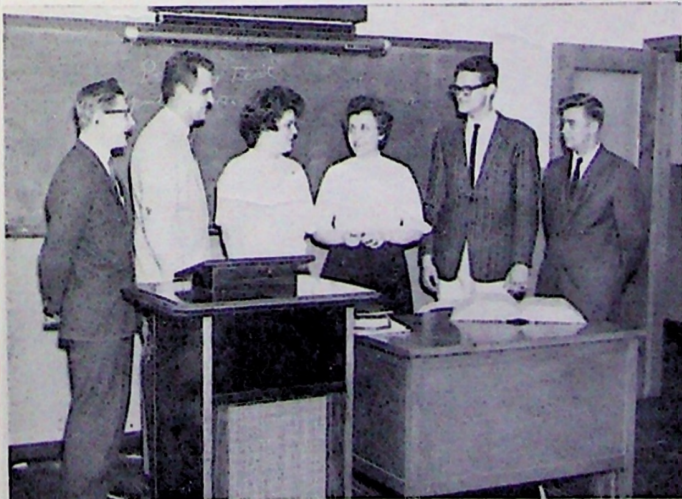

Courses in English Composition, Public Speaking, and Preaching are required of all ministerial candidates. Communication skills are also developed through practice in writing and speaking, in the conduct of classes, and through preaching and teaching assignments.

Service

Objective number four is to direct knowledge, understanding, and skills by means of practical Christian service opportunities. Through the Christian service program of the College, students are required to obtain experience in supervised and recorded Christian service work. Students are expected to take their turn in some part of the chapel worship services. They are assigned duties of leading songs, teaching, visitation, and preaching under the supervision of pastors of local churches. They have opportunities to teach the Bible to public school pupils once each week at the East Oregon Chapel, to lead devotions at the dormitories, to witness to boys at a state boys' camp near Oregon, and to participate as members of gospel teams. Students are encouraged to witness for their Lord whenever they have opportunity.

Scholarship

Objective number five is to cultivate habits of sound scholarship, characterized by a spirit of inquiry and research and by creative thinking. The policy of the staff is to guide the student to a discovery of truth and to firm convictions through directed study, class discussion, personal counseling, and special research projects. Students are encouraged to search beyond their textbooks and assigned work, and to contribute to classes the results of their study.

Philippine Islands

The latest report from the Philippines shows that progress continues to be made there. Victorio Fernandez, Resalina Daos, Florida Minia, and Clarita Minia were baptized at the Minagbag Church of God by Bro. Santiago Somera. This makes a total membership of 101 in the Philippine churches. During the month of March, fifty-five outdoor evangelistic services were conducted at the nine church locations, in addition to the regular church services. Each pastor made from eight to twenty-two personal calls in March.

A quote from the March report says, "Three more persons are scheduled to be baptized at Minagbag on April 15. A public debate was made between Bro. Somera and a minister of the Seventh Day Adventist Church in Minagbag last March 24, concerning the question of the 'Sabbath.' The victory of Bro. Somera in this debate created a greater respect of the people here to the Church of God. A big crowd attended."

Villa Verde Academy, the school where Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero has been teaching religion, is now closed for two months for vacation. When the school reopens in June, it is hoped he, or one of the other men, will be able to again take up the teaching there, as it is an opportunity to reach many young people with the truth of God's Word. Bro. Ortiguero says, "My short time of teaching in the Academy has given much attention by the people for our church."

Nova Scotia

A quote from part of his letter says, "My ministry in the Navy has been most satisfactory and rewarding. Truly, this mission field is 'white unto harvest.' In concluding, I sincerely request that this missionary work in the United States Navy be made a part of the prayer ministry of the Missionary Department of our General Conference."

Blanchard, Michigan: A Nova Scotia supper was held on April 3, 1962, and we previously had a Philippine supper. An appropriate program was given at each of these suppers. We are preparing a shipment of clothing for Nova Scotia, and also for the Philippines. In the summer months we take clothing to the Mexican workers in this area. Our main concern now is for these Mexican workers and the possibility of working with them in Mexico.

These new envelopes were made with two pockets, and were perforated in the middle so that the two pockets could be separated by tearing the envelopes in two. We had the name of the church printed on the envelopes, as well as the words "Sunday School" and "Missionary." In practice, the members of the Sunday school put their Sunday school offering in one pocket, and their missionary offering in the other. These enve-

lopes are numbered and each contributor is credited with whatever amount he gives each week.

From the start this system was a success. We soon began to receive an average of \$25.00 per week for missions, as well as the regular amount for the Sunday school. One of our fears had been that people would just shift that amount of money to missions that they had been contributing to other projects. Consider the following statistics.

First, let us look at the Sunday school finances. During the last six months of 1961 (using envelopes) total contributions were \$1,149. During the same period in 1960 (not using envelopes), \$1,113. Even though there was an increase, it was small and does not show the true picture.

So, let us look at the church finances. During the same six-month period, offerings received during the worship service increased nine per cent over the same period in 1960, and twelve per cent over that period in 1959. Now, totaling the increases, we come up with the following blessing. During this six-month period, our church gave \$815.00 to missions, while increasing Sunday school offerings \$36.00, and increasing offerings to the general fund of the church by \$364.00. In one-half year the Lord has blessed us to the extent of \$1,215.00. All this happened without an increase in membership or attendance.

Needless to say, we are now sold on the envelope system as a good way to give to missions. It is our firm belief that prayer and a systematic way of giving have been responsible for this growth. A child brings his pink envelope to Sunday school and turns it in with pride, knowing he is helping support missionaries who preach in all the world.

Since this is the planning Conference for the year in which we hope the new Oregon Bible College building will be constructed, we believe this to be the most appropriate theme for delegate consideration. 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REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

(This report, with recommendations, was adopted at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors, May 4, 1962. It is presented here that delegates might have opportunity to study it and receive instructions from those whom they will represent at the 1962 General Conference business meetings.)

General Observations

Since this report is prepared with five months of the fiscal year (October 1, 1961-September 30, 1962) still remaining, it can be only a partial report of the work of the Church of God General Conference. Thus far in the new Conference year, however, there have been many encouraging signs of progress at the local, district, and international levels of Church of God endeavors. The Lord has blessed the Church of God as it has exerted itself to do His will.

We will consider the departments of the Church of God General Conference separately in this report, in the order in which they will be discussed at the General Conference business meetings.

National Sunday School Department

The National Sunday School Department Board is elected by delegates at the General Conference meetings. The board of four members serves throughout the year to advise concerning Sunday school publications; to plan the Sunday school portion of the General Conference program; to publish "Go Ye"; to maintain a film and book library; and to generally encourage higher standards for Church of God Sunday schools. The secretary of this board will report separately on the activities of the past year.

Seeing a need for reorganization of the Sunday School Department, to bring it into conformity with the organization of the General Conference as a whole, the present Sunday school board makes the following recommendations for consideration at the 1962 General Conference.

1) We recommend that the Sunday School Board of officers be reorganized as a Board of four directors elected for two-year terms. The two remaining officers will serve out their terms as directors and two new directors will be elected in 1962. The purpose of the Sunday School Department Board of Directors will be to act in an advisory capacity to the Executive Secretary in the following areas.

a) To furnish copy for Go Ye, Progress Journal, and The Restitution Herald on Sunday school work.

b) Review and make recommendations concerning the Sunday school publications.

c) Advise on ways to improve and promote the sale of Church of God Sunday school publications.

d) Advise on that portion of the General Conference budget devoted to this department.

e) Develop plans on ways and means to organize new Sunday schools and home study classes.

f) Develop new ideas for the improvement of teaching methods, standards and qualifications of teachers and officers, and training of teachers.

g) Provide ideas for the improvement of Sunday school programs and organization.

h) Plan that portion of the General Conference program having to do with Sunday school activities.

i) Suggest ways and means of making the Sunday school more evangelistic in nature and also better able to prepare pupils for meaningful church membership.

2) We recommend that the Sunday School Department become a budgeted department of the Church of God General Conference and that the remaining funds now in the treasury be credited to the Sunday School Department account in the General Conference. Sunday schools shall be encouraged to give tithes and offerings to the General Conference to support the budget, in anticipation of eventually employing a Superintendent of Religious Education.

It is the view of the Sunday School Board and the General Conference Board of Directors that this reorganization would give more unity to this work and would add purpose and opportunity to accomplish practical goals.

Oregon Bible College

Oregon Bible College continues to serve the Church of God by educating leaders for greater Christian service. A survey of the active ministers' list and of the teachers and officers and other leaders of the Church of God will show evidence of the great good that has been accomplished by the College.

During the first semester of this year, twenty-three students were enrolled, and during the second semester eighteen students were enrolled. Prospects are for an enrollment of at least thirty-five students in the fall semester, 1962. The relative smallness of the number of students enrolled at Oregon Bible College is the source of most of the problems the College experiences. The number of faculty members, the number of courses that can be offered, the development of physical facilities, and the possibilities of expansion are limited by the size of the student body. This is a basic problem which must be solved by the Church of God.

During the year, President Otto E. Diek, Sr., suffered a long illness. His absence was felt throughout the College, but we praise God that at this writing he has made wonderful recovery and is able to be back at his work on a limited schedule. Substitute teachers (Bros. Stilson, Slaw, Doan, Milne, and Ross) continued the teaching program, and other staff members assumed some of the administrative duties in Bro. Diek's absence.

The faculty next year will have three full-

time teachers and one part-time teacher. Bro. William Wachtel, who has completed two years of graduate study at Wheaton College where he graduated with high honors, will join the faculty in September. The graduate study was made possible through a generous scholarship, the Joseph D. Lawrence Scholarship, which has been provided for such graduate study. We are most grateful to the family of the late Bro. Joseph Lawrence who made this memorial scholarship possible.

The curriculum for 1962-63 has been consolidated and revised as part of a comprehensive four-year schedule. Greek will be offered as a permanent part of the curriculum hereafter.

The Silver Anniversary Building Campaign for the expansion of Oregon Bible College has been making encouraging progress. There is now \$117,000 in commitments made toward the goal of \$125,000. About \$60,000 has been received thus far in payment toward the commitments and in cash gifts. We must not fall short now, but make every effort to receive the other \$8,000 necessary to make the goal in commitments and to receive the \$15,000 in payments necessary before building can begin.

Although all the following recommendations have been approved before by the General Conference delegates, there still appears to be some misunderstanding about these decisions. Before beginning construction of the proposed new dining hall, library, dormitory building for Oregon Bible College we believe there should be complete understanding and agreement about these important goals for Oregon Bible College. We therefore propose that the "buzz session" technique, used successfully last year in regard to decisions about foreign mission work, be applied to the following recommendations. These recommendations will be assigned small groups for discussion and report. Then all the recommendations will be discussed together by the whole delegate body and decisions made.

1) We recommend that Oregon Bible College continue to be located in Oregon, Illinois.

2) We recommend that Oregon Bible College be developed on its present property and adjoining property as needed, rather than on acreage outside of the city.

3) We recommend that Oregon Bible College continue to emphasize its Bible-based curriculum and strive to attain the standards of accredited Bible colleges.

4) We recommend that the proposed building as modified and finally approved by the Board of Directors be constructed in 1963.

Missions

In September, 1961, Bro. S. O. Ross, formerly president of the Church of God General Conference, became Superintendent of Missions. In addition to the administrative work of home and foreign missions, Bro. Ross has visited many Churches of God as a mission representative of the Church of God General Conference. Several progressive steps have been taken by the Church of God General Conference in the mission field.

Other members of the Conference staff have also conducted services in many churches throughout the year. Bros. Doan, Lapp, and Diek, and students of Oregon Bible College spent many week ends in conducting services at various places. Bro. Doan has carried on part-time services among Indian families in L'Anse, Michigan.

New Churches of God were established at Whitnel, North Carolina, and in nine locations on the Island of Luzon, Philippines.

Pastors entering or re-entering the ministry during the year or soon to be entering the

field are: Z. B. Duncan, Rex Cain, Russell Magaw, Clyde Long, Billie Kennedy, Walter Wiggins, Harry Payne, S. O. Ross, James Rencontre, and Ted Armes. Pastors known to be leaving the pastoral ministry, at least temporarily, are: Dallas Demmitt, who will become a chaplain in a boys' camp; Gerald L. Cooper, who has become executive secretary of the Southwest Conference; William Wachtel, to join the faculty at Oregon Bible College.

New buildings were constructed or are being constructed at: Hector, Minn.; Troy, Ohio; Digby, Nova Scotia; Wenatchee, Wash.; Lockwood, Mo.; Lawrenceville, Ohio (extensive expansion); Whitnel, N. C.; Kansas City, Mo. Churches with definite plans for new or remodeled buildings are: Macomb, Ill.; Omaha, Neb.; Denver, Colo.; Los Angeles, Calif.; Kokomo, Ind.; Fonthill, Ont.

Mission Builder's Appeals were made for Hector, Minn. (\$4,350); Troy View Church, Troy, Ohio (\$4,450); and an appeal is now being made to complete the building at Digby, Nova Scotia. There are 992 registered Mission Builders.

Pastoral Aid was extended to the Churches of God at Harlingen, Texas; Troy, Ohio; Felida, Wash.; Hendersonville, N. C.; Morse Mill, Mo.; and Gatesville, Texas.

Many copies of Systematic Theology were purchased by local missionary societies and others to be placed in public and college libraries. A list of seminary and Bible college libraries is kept at the General Conference office for those interested in placing books.

In accordance with decisions made at last General Conference, support was extended to seven mission workers in the Philippines. These seven are: Eleodoro S. Ortiguero (\$100 per month); Bonifacio Gabanes (\$85 per month); Insturo Magno (\$85 per month); Estefanio Sibayan (\$50 per month); Santiago Somera (\$50 per month); Crispin Calawagan (\$50 per month); Rizalina Aguinaldo (\$50 per month). Another new worker, Domingo Valdez, receives no support. These eight workers serve nine churches in four provinces of Luzon. (Detailed reports of the Philippine

mission work are printed monthly in the Progress Journal.) The workers there are serving faithfully and sacrificially. There are now 111 members in the nine churches being served. There are excellent prospects of the work being expanded to other provinces and to other islands as the energetic pastors there make contacts through people who are being resettled in a government land reform program.

There now also appear to be excellent prospects of a mission work in Mexico, through individuals contacted by Blanchard, Mich., brethren. Investigation is being made and leads followed.

Literature is still being distributed in England, Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa, but no definite prospects for the establishment of churches are now in sight.

The following recommendations are being made by the Mission Board and by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors.

1) We recommend that Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero be brought to the United States in the summer of 1963 to visit churches and the General Conference. (Estimated cost, \$2,000.)

2) We recommend that five tracts be translated into Spanish and that at least one of these be a simple gospel message written especially with the Mexican people in mind.

3) We recommend that the General Conference continue the support of the Philippine work for the next year.

4) We recommend that all money for mission work be sent to the General Conference office, rather than to the Mission Board secretary-treasurer.

5) The Decade of Development Program which began in 1954 has made or is nearing its goals in most areas. One area has fallen far short, however, and that is the goal of 10,000 members by 1964. This is perhaps the most important of all the goals, because the growth of the church, the body of Christ,

should be our main objective. Membership growth is also important to the progress and increased needs for the support of the growing work as a whole.

We are now in the eighth year of the Development Program. This year has been "Get Acquainted" year, when our communities were made aware of our church and our teachings through the Get Acquainted Campaign.

In the year 1962-63, the ninth year of the Development Program, each member of the Church of God should concentrate on bringing some one person to Christ. To implement this we are suggesting the adoption of a program entitled "EACH ONE REACH (at least) ONE."

This would not be a church project, nor a family project but strictly an individual's project. Each member of the Church of God would be asked to concentrate on one individual who is outside of Christ and, in this next year, endeavor to get that person interested and into the church. The program would be promoted through the Progress Journal and other publications, by one or more direct mailings to each member, and through the cooperation and salesmanship of the delegates to this Conference and the Church of God ministers.

Printing and Publishing

One of the important phases of the work of the Church of God General Conference is the printing and publishing of Church of God literature. Following is a partial listing of Church of God publications and the number distributed.

The Restitution Herald—approx. 2,000 of each issue, 24 issues per year

Progress Journal—approx. 3,200 of each monthly issue, mailed free to all Church of God homes.

Truth Seeker's Adult Quarterly—3,300 of each quarterly issue

Truth Seeker's Junior-Senior High Quarterly—1,100 of each quarterly issue

Truth Seeker's Junior Quarterly—1,000 of each quarterly issue

In addition to these publications, many tracts, booklets, and special publications are printed and kept in stock for sale as advertised in regular publications.

A new committee has been appointed to survey and recommend concerning various publications of the General Conference. The committee reports in this issue of Progress Journal.

A major publishing undertaking has been the revision and reprinting of the Songs of Truth hymnal, as authorized at last General Conference. Ten thousand copies have been ordered for sale at \$1.80 per book. The committee (Louise Lapp, Evelyn Austin, Leila Mae Dooden, and William Wachtel) has served well in preparing this revised book and we know that their efforts are appreciated by all who will be using the new book.

As funds are available and opportunity arises, new equipment is being purchased to improve efficiency at the printing plant, with emphasis on offset printing, and improvement in methods of printing and binding children's quarterlies.

Berean Youth Fellowship

Last year's Berean Youth Conference, with 160 young people present, was the largest and, in many ways, the finest Youth Conference to date. The Youth Conference for 1962 will be held the week prior to General Conference. Seventeen young people came forward to accept Christ and were baptized at their home churches. Bro. Dallas Denmitt, Camp Director for the 1961 and 1962 Youth Conferences, deserves great appreciation from the Conference for his volunteer services in this field.

The Berean Youth Fellowship continues to publish Challenge, the Berean Youth Leader's Handbook, the monthly Newsletter, and other special publications. It maintains a film and book library to loan these supplies to ministers and other leaders; and offers assistance to leaders, camp directors, and others with their youth problems and work.

The Indiana Bible Quiz Team won the national championship last summer in a thrilling contest with the team from Ohio. Several teams will compete in the national finals at Camp Maek this summer.

A questionnaire was sent to all young people and several responded to it. The answers are being surveyed and statistics compiled by Bros. Charles Graham and Dorman Cheatwood, and it is hoped that some answers can be deducted that will help all leaders make the church, the Sunday school, and the Berean Youth Fellowship more meaningful and helpful to Church of God young people.

General Conference Buildings and Equipment

It is our observation that the buildings and equipment of the General Conference are in good repair. Considerable repair work was done at Golden Rule Dormitory during the year, both inside and outside. Painting and decorating, new eaves, repair on porches and overhanging eaves, consumed much time and funds.

The old portion of the General Conference office building, which had been badly in need of a new floor for several years, was repaired with new floors, paint, one new office, and other incidental changes. Downstairs offices were all changed to give a more efficient arrangement and to add to work space and privacy.

Present machinery is in good repair, thanks to the careful maintenance work of print shop men, but is in most cases quite old. Among new items needed are: a more modern foundry for type metal; a larger offset press; a bundle tier; a freight elevator; and some additions to type fonts for the linotype.

Finances

During the first six months of the fiscal year, we have been ahead of our goal for that period. This is a refreshing development, and we are thankful to the Lord for His blessings and to His people for their faithful giving. Due to unforeseen circumstances, expenses have been heavier than expected this year, though we are still within the budget. It is especially gratifying when the need has been great to have had available funds to meet these expenses.

There has been a great increase in net worth, due to the accumulation of funds for the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign,

and due to a larger inventory of books for sale. Every effort is made to be conservative in expenses and to preserve income for the promotion of vital work.

A continuation of the principle of tithes and offerings for the support of the Lord's work will provide the funds necessary for all the work in the local church, the state and district conferences, and the General Conference.

We continue to recommend that giving not be earmarked, but simply directed to the general work so that one department of the work will not receive a surplus at the expense of other, less popular departments.

We believe the General Conference calendars were well received, and recommend that such calendars be mailed to each Church of God family in 1962 for the calendar year 1963.

Again we express our thanks to every individual, church, and conference who, through prayer, letter, encouragement, and financial support, made possible the progress of the Church of God General Conference in the year past, and we covet your continued interest and support in the year to come.

SONGBOOK COMMITTEE REPORT

Members of the committee are: Louise Lapp, Chairman; Lea Doeden, Evelyn Austin, and William Wachtel. The present book has been enlarged to include thirty-two additional pages. A few word changes have been made in the present book and "note" errors corrected. The book will still be called "Songs of Truth" with "Number Two" in the lower right corner so it can be easily identified. The present topical index has been expanded and the following new topics added: Allegiance, Baptism, Bible, Missions-Evangelism, Call to Worship, Special Days, God, Guidance, Peace, and songs appropriate for processions. The committee has selected thirty-six hymns, ten missionary and gospel songs, four invitation songs, six prayer, three call to worship, one Christmas, and two choruses. We recommend that the new hymns be used as special numbers for your choirs so that the congregations can become familiar with them.

All that remains to be done is proofread the book and play all the songs to find note errors. Because of the larger size and higher printing costs, the book will sell for \$1.80 each, plus postage. Louise Lapp, Chairman.

Program Change. As you have noticed, the delegate meetings begin on Monday morning rather than Tuesday morning, as before. The Sunday School Department has agreed that Sunday School Department activities should be a part of the General Conference delegate sessions, rather than being held on a separate day. This will avoid duplication and make any business transacted on that day an official part of Conference business.

The Conference will close with the Thursday evening service, but those who wish to may stay over for breakfast on Friday morning. The camp is to be vacated by 9:00 a.m. Friday.

Proposed Motions and Resolutions. Any motions or resolutions that you may wish to propose and which are now known should be written and sent to the General Conference office, by June 20. They can then be printed in the July Journal for study by delegates.

Children's Classes. Children's classes will be conducted morning and afternoon and will be in charge of Doris Brown and other teachers. Parents are requested to call for their small

children immediately after classes in the morning and afternoon.

Nursery. A nursery, in charge of Grace Cain, will be in operation mornings and afternoons. Mothers of small children and babies who will be in the nursery will be asked to take turns serving in the nursery so that each mother will be free part of the time to attend meetings and classes. No toys will be required, but parents will be asked to help supply balloons and refreshments.

Costs. The cost of the Conference is \$2.85 per day per person, for lodging, meals, insurance, and use of the camp. There will be registration clerks at the desk from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. each day and each person is asked to register upon arrival and check out when leaving. Expenses are met by offerings taken each evening. Children's costs are one-half adult cost.

Banners and Displays. Churches and state conferences are encouraged to use displays, banners, or special identifying costumes to advertise their locality. Nova Scotia delegates have done this for several years and it has added much to the Conference. Why don't you plan something along this line?

Oregon Bible College and the Mission Department are planning displays for the Conference. We invite states and churches to have displays from their meetings. These will be of interest to all the delegates.

Lodging. Attendance at General Conference sessions has been increasing each year and it is necessary to use every available bed. For this reason we are asking this year that family accommodations be discontinued except in certain circumstances.

Parents with infant children will be housed in Sarah Major Hall. Others will be housed, with men and boys on one side of the camp and women and girls on the other. Young people will be in separate cabins, under jurisdiction of the youth director and counselors.

Camp Rules. Rules are simple. Since this is community living, with about three hundred people in a small area, there must be order. Lights out at 10:30 p.m. should be observed. This is too early for some and too late for others, but a fair compromise. When leaving the camp (even if only for a short time), please notify the desk in case of an emergency, or if you should receive a phone call or someone is looking for you.

Check with the camp director or program chairman on any unusual changes in the program or for special requests.

Rules are established by the camp itself that will be explained and must be observed. These have to do with water sports, dining room, and care of property.

Delegate Pool Expense. A committee will be designated at the beginning of Conference to receive expense accounts from delegates from churches and state conferences participating in the expense pool. Expenses will be averaged and those whose expenses are less than average will pay the difference into the pool, and those whose expenses are more than average will receive the difference from the pool. Pool expense forms have been sent to all secretaries, and churches and state conferences should approve participation in the pool before Conference.

Bring Your Musical Instrument. Sr. Louise Lapp and Sr. Evelyn Barr, music directors, plan to organize an orchestra during the General Conference sessions. Bring your musical instruments and take part at 6:30 each evening.

There will also be a Conference choir under the direction of Sr. Barr. It will meet first on Monday at 6:30 at which time we trust that all musicians will be present. There will also be a need for special music for evening services. Soloists and other musicians are urged to come prepared to render special music.

NATIONAL MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT

BOARD OF CHURCH COUNSELING AND ARBITRATION

In accordance with the motion made at the last year's General Conference, a Board of Church Counseling and Arbitration has been created by the Board.

The purpose of this Board is to provide counseling for pastors and elders seeking guidance in solving church problems. It will act as a neutral party and hear both sides of a question and suggest a solution.

As yet, this Board has not been called into service.

The Board is composed of: C. E. Randall, Omaha, Neb.; Leslie Niles, Grand Rapids, Mich.; and Charles Jones, Cleveland, Ohio, Chairman.

LICENSE AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Since the last annual report of the License and Ordination Committee which was published in the June 7, 1961, *PROGRESS JOURNAL*, eight ministers have been added to the list of those having received recognition cards as licensed ministers of the Church of God. They are Bros. Z. B. Duncan, B. C. Gabanes, I. A. Magno, F. A. Perkins, E. S. Ortiguero, S. O. Ross, E. L. Sibayan, S. O. Somera. Their names and addresses were given in the revised list of ministers in the May, 1962, *PROGRESS JOURNAL*.

At the writing of this report there are eighty-five licensed ministers, twenty-eight of whom are ordained. Only about eight of the total number were counted as inactive during the year ending July 15, 1961.

MINISTERS' FUND COMMITTEE

Present members of the committee are: C. E. Lapp, Chairman; Harold Doan, Secretary; Vernis Wolfe, Jesse Pestle, and Kenneth Milne.

The balance of funds on hand September 15, 1961, was \$2,772.07 in cash. During the year one request was made from one of our ministers and the committee granted him a loan of \$300.00.

The present balance as of May 11, 1962, is \$3,096.45.

A recommendation that each Church of God contribute on a voluntary basis an amount equal to 1% of its minister's salary to provide funds for this cause was accepted by the General Conference in 1961. Some of the churches have been sending in their contributions during the year. This fund will help meet emergencies and remain a basis for a future retirement fund for ministers.

At present, \$25.00 a month is being sent to aid a widow of one of our former ministers.

The National Missionary Board has held four meetings and plans to meet once more before the General Conference meeting in August. At our first meeting of the year, working relations between the Mission Board and the Superintendent of Missions were discussed and established. All recommendations needing the attention of the Board of Directors are presented by the Superintendent to the Executive Secretary.

Bro. Ross asked the Mission Board to study home missions as well as foreign missions.

Bro. Ross has met with us each time and kept us well-informed about the progress of our mission work—its development, its needs, and the state of our finances.

Recommendations have been made relative to:

- 1) National Missionary Day—its program and offering.
- 2) How to promote the Philippine work in local churches.
- 3) The distribution of *Systematic Theology* to seminaries.
- 4) Having Bro. Ross visit Digby, Nova Scotia, to survey the needs of the work there and the possibility of enlarging it.

5) What courses can be provided at Oregon Bible College to prepare students for the mission field.

6) Loaning money to Bro. Ortiguero with which to purchase a motorcycle to be used in his work.

7) The feasibility of establishing a work in Mexico.

8) The printing of tracts in the Spanish language, and that at least one of them be the simple gospel message written especially with the Mexican people in mind.

Also under study are:

- 1) A missionary program of education for the local church.
- 2) Revision of the missions section of the Manual.
- 3) Qualifications for missionaries.
- 4) The Pastoral Aid Program.
- 5) Mission Builders progress.
- 6) Specialized post-graduate training for those planning to enter a mission field.
- 7) Mass distribution of literature.
- 8) Building up the missionary section of Oregon Bible College library.

9. Missionary budget and projects for 1962-63.

As the Church of God mission program enlarges, it puts greater responsibility on those who have charge of it, and makes a greater demand on their time and energy. The Mission Board greatly appreciates having a Superintendent of Missions with whom to work, and feels that employing him was a great step forward.

Great things await the Church of God in the future.

RESEARCH AND SURVEY COMMITTEE REPORT

This committee (Vernis Wolfe, chairman, Esta Starbuck, Harry Sheets, Paul Johnson, and Harold Doan) was appointed as a result of a motion passed at the 1961 General Conference sessions. It is formed to do research on, and survey the publishing program of the General Conference.

The committee met three times during the year to formulate plans and procedures for action. The committee will do research into the matter of publications needed for evangelism and for the membership, and to determine a priority list for publications. It will survey present publications to recommend improvements.

Inasmuch as the publishing of books is a long-range and expensive project, the committee has been investigating books already in publication (written and published by the Christadelphian Church) for possible sale by the General Conference office.

Investigation of the present tract list is under way and additions and deletions from this list will be recommended by the committee. It feels that the publication of tracts and booklets is of first importance at the present time.

As the committee continues to function, it will make recommendations to the Board of Directors in the field of publishing and printing. Harold Doan, Secretary.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

The Board of Education met at General Conference on Monday and Tuesday afternoons. Bro. C. E. Lapp reported a very successful gospel team trip of nearly nine thousand miles through the south and west. A scholarship committee report was given by Bro. C. E. Randall. The following recommendations were suggested for awarding scholarships to the College: scholarships should be awarded according to 1) Christian character, 2) academic merit, 3) preparation for full-time ministry or Christian education, 4) sound Bible convictions, 5) contribution to student and church life, 6) financial need, 7) full course load. The committee further recommends that scholarships offered by regional conferences, churches, groups, or individuals shall be awarded in conformity with expressed wishes of donors.

The following are motions passed by the board at its summer meeting.

1) An appropriation of \$100.00 from Booster funds was to be used to purchase books for the College library.

2) The amount of \$500.00 was appropriated from Booster funds to employ students to do work at the College.

3) The Board of Education was to ask the Board of Directors for one-half day at General Conference in 1962 to promote the College.

4) The date for the Boosters' Campaign was set for March 18, 1962, or close to that date.

5) The \$100.00 Booster scholarship was to be continued. (The scholarship this year was awarded to James Fyfe.)

6) Funds were appropriated to cover expenses of staff members to attend such conferences as they deemed advisable. (Bro. Lapp will attend a Deans' conference at Minneapolis and Sr. Inez Gordon will attend a Dean of Women's conference at Chicago.)

The Board of Education membership for the past year was composed of Bros. C. E. Randall, Paul Louzecky, Alva Huffer, Vernis Wolfe, Loie Jones, William Lawrence, Charles Graham, Rolland Stilson, and Emory Macy.

Evangelism and Missions Progress

The Philippine Churches of God held their first annual conference April 17-20, 1962, at San Nicolas. There was an average attendance of fifty-eight at the daytime sessions which included messages, music, and prayer, in addition to the business sessions. The four evening services began at 8:00 and lasted anywhere from 11:00 p.m., to 2:00 a.m. The largest evening attendance was one hundred three, and the average was seventy-one.

The conference elected officers, discussed many phases of improving their work, and voted to use their own tithes and offerings. One of these men, Bro. Virgilio Lacangan, will work in the new field in Mindanao. Bro. Dionisio Descargar will pastor the San Nicolas church to give Bro. Ortiguero more time for evangelistic work and supervising the other workers. Bro. Eleodoro Javar will take over the Quezon church so that Bro. Sibayan can move to the Abut church. This will allow Bro. Somera to devote his time to the Minagbag church, and to the new Solana, Cagayan, group which he recently started.

The final service on Friday night found seven speakers, each speaking on one of the "Seven Last Words" of Jesus on the cross. Bro. Ortiguero then spoke on the subject, "The Lord's Supper—When, How, and Why?" This was followed by the partaking of the Lord's Supper, the presentation of some awards, a parting address by Bro. Gabanes, a hymn and a prayer, which closed the conference at 2:00 a.m.

There were six baptisms during the conference and four at other times during April, making a total membership of one hundred eleven in the Philippine churches. The brethren there have requested and been granted a

\$600.00 loan that they might purchase a motorcycle for transportation for Bro. Ortiguero. This amount will be paid back monthly by some of the workers. The Tabuk, Mountain Province, people are presently building their own church building. The walls are of sliced bojos, the roof cogoon grass, and the floor is hardened earth. The Philippine work is truly moving forward and becoming stronger each month.

Philippine Maps

Many have taken advantage of the Philippine maps being offered through the National Geographic Society. They may be ordered directly from them at Department MBP, Washington 6, D. C., or through the Mission Department, Box 231, Oregon, Illinois. There has, however, been a change in the price of these maps. They are now \$1.00 each for the paper map and \$2.00 each for the linen.

Local Reports

Indiana State Conference: At our conference meeting in April we voted to place *Systematic Theology* in all the Bible colleges and seminaries in Indiana, Kentucky, and Tennessee. Several of them have already been placed, and others will be sent soon. (The project of local churches and conferences supplying *Systematic Theology* to the Bible colleges in their local area is encouraged by the Mission Board of the General Conference. The Missionary Department has the names of these schools, and will supply them for your area upon request.)

Louisiana State Conference: The state conference is supplying the four churches in Louisiana with a linen map of the Philippines, with church locations shown.

Mary-Martha Missionary Society, Oregon, Illinois: We recently sent a box of clothing to the L'Anse, Michigan, Mission; are supplying the Nova Scotia tartan and ribbon for the local Bible school; served the breakfast after the Easter Sunrise Service; regularly remember the Mission Page prayer list; and on May 24 held a special missionary service at the Oregon church for all the ladies of the church, with Bro. S. O. Ross, Superintendent of Missions, as guest speaker.

Nova Scotia

The average attendance in April was: Sunday school, sixty-two; worship service, sixty; Bible class, twenty-four, and Berean Youth Fellowship (senior), twenty-one. The work is progressing well and the erection of the church building will begin soon.

Bro. and Sr. Stanley Ross will visit Nova Scotia for a few weeks this summer. Sr. Ross will lead at least three daily vacation Bible schools that will be held in and near Digby, and Bro. Ross will assist Bro. Denchfield in the services, do some follow-up work on the church building program, and investigate possible opportunities for expansion in other areas of Nova Scotia.

We believe this work is showing great signs of progress and development and we ask your prayers for its continued success.

Recommendations

In the recommendations printed elsewhere in this issue and proposed to the General Conference for action at the annual sessions in August. We wish to write further about two of them.

One recommendation is that all contributions to missions go directly to the General Conference office at Oregon, Ill. In the past, many contributors have sent their mission contributions to Sister Ada Simpson, the secretary of the Mission Board and she had to make a record of them and then forward the funds to the General Conference office, where a second record had to be made. Since the mission work is a department of the General Conference, it is the belief of the Mission Board that it would simplify the records and the best accounting of the funds would be made, if all contributions are sent directly to the General Conference office.

The second recommendation fully supported by the Mission Board is that Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, leader of the Philippine Missions work be brought to this country next year.

It is the belief of the Board and the Superintendent of Missions that it would be a great help to all of us and create a better understanding and a fuller realization of the work there to get first-hand information directly from Bro. Ortiguero. It would also be a help and a blessing to him and his fellow workers in the Philippines to have him come here and meet many of the Church of God members and leaders personally.

It would be the plan to have him here, possibly in July and August, that he could attend the 1963 General Conference sessions and also visit as many of the churches as could be arranged.

Other important recommendations are being made, and it is asked that the churches and delegates study them carefully and come prepared to vote wisely on each one.

We now will be able to give a more organized emphasis on those subjects which are vital to ministers, teachers, and Christian leaders, without slighting important additional studies.

We plan to cover the entire Bible chapter by chapter in a four-year curriculum. Special studies which pertain to and embellish Bible knowledge will also be given. The skills which provide for the presentation of Bible truth through writing and speaking are also an important part of the over-all picture.

NEW COLLEGE BUILDING

The time is drawing near when the proposed new college building will be more than drawings on paper. This building will furnish dormitory rooms, and adequate library, dining room, kitchen, and other facilities. We thank God for the response which has come from the Church of God, and we feel sure God's blessing will be on this new improvement.

WHY THE ADDED INVESTMENT?

Why should there be an investment in another full-time instructor, in a new college building, in many new books for an up-to-date library, and additional facilities to complement these? The answer is simple. As God has opened so many new doors of opportunity both at home and abroad, it will tax our spiritual and material strength to provide for the training of workers who will go out into His harvest field! By all means, we should save some! The day of labor is shortening rapidly. Today is the day of salvation!

General Conference Progress

STATISTICAL FORMS OUT

Church secretaries have received their annual mailing of various statistical forms from the General Conference office. These included the delegate form, church statistical form, delegate pool expense form, and a letter of explanation. It is requested that the forms be filled out and returned as soon as possible, *by July 1 at the latest*.

Because the new Constitution is in effect, *only member Churches of God will have delegate representation at the summer conference*. Since some churches have not yet taken the action necessary to make them member churches (the filing of a form of membership with the General Conference), membership forms have again been sent to these churches. We urge each church to take this step that it might be represented at the General Conference and enjoy the benefits that come from membership.

DELEGATE POOL

As most churches know, delegate travel expenses (four cents per mile for one car from each church and state conference) are pooled by those churches that elect to take part in the pool. We urge this upon every church, since this is the only fair way for all churches to have representation no matter how far or near they may be from the site of the Conference. It does mean more expense to near-by churches and less expense for far-away churches, but we believe this equalizing of expense to be a Christian way of handling this matter. We trust that your church will take part in the pool and will reimburse its delegates their share in the pool expense which is estimated to be about \$50.00.

YOUTH LEADERS AND MINISTERS

Youth leaders and ministers have received statistical forms for names for the *Challenge* magazine. Because of changes in postal rates for returned pieces of mail due to change of address, it is imperative that we make a new, accurate *Challenge* mailing list. The present list is being completely discarded and only those names on the new forms received by June 15 will receive the July issue of *Challenge*.

BEREAN YOUTH CONFERENCE

Enrollments are beginning to come in for the 1962 Berean Youth Conference, Camp Mack, July 29-August 4. We are looking forward to a wonderful camp this year. The deadline for enrollments is July 15. We *must* know

by that time how many campers to count on. After July 15, enrollments will be subject to a \$5.00 penalty.

Young people wishing to stay over from Saturday noon to Sunday noon when General Conference begins, may do so. There is an extra charge of \$3.00. Counselors will be at the camp that day and some activities will be planned.

THE GOALS FOR GIVING

In May, we fell a few dollars short of our goal for giving. With the start of the summer season, we hope that giving will be maintained at the high level we have appreciated throughout the year thus far.

The goals for giving for each month represent one-twelfth of the total budget adopted by the delegates at the 1961 General Conference. This budget is the estimate of income and expense for the fiscal year and the estimate of what will be necessary in contributions to carry out the programs approved. This year a Superintendent of Missions was added to the staff, and extensive support was added to our expenses for the new Church of God missions in the Philippines.

Total expenses have been even higher than was estimated because of generally higher prices and because of some unanticipated problems. Because the goals for giving have been reached each month, however, it has been possible to meet expenses and stay "in the black." For this we praise God and thank you!

One matter that we have never mentioned before, that would help General Conference finances is prompt payment of accounts receivable. Almost \$4,000.00 is due the Conference at present for tuition, printing, and supplies, which could be used to meet bills for paper and other supplies used by the Conference.
