

Pastors Rashid and Sajjad Emmanuel of Pakistan are modern-day martyrs as well. Please remember their sacrifices along with Michael Servetus.

Brothers and sisters, we are living in exciting times. Could it be that we will be the generation when Jesus literally and physically returns to earth?! Look up, for our redemption draweth nigh!

he vision statement adopted by our delegates in July is "To Join God, Knowing, Loving, Growing, Going, Serving, Teaching, and Preparing for His Kingdom through His Son and His Spirit both our generation and the next." So what does that possibly entail? I hope I got your attention by the title. Read on.

Step One: What is God's plan for the individual that he or she might "Join Him"? "God is not willing that any should perish." God wants you to join him in salvation. "This is eternal life that they may know you the only true God and Jesus Christ " God wants you to join him in the love he has for you. "For God so loved the world." The first great command is to know God (cp. the Shema Dt 6:4: Mk 12:29) and love the LORD our God with all our heart, soul, mind, strength, and with everything we are. Will you reciprocate that love or reject Him? God wants us individually to do His will in each of our lives. "Not my will but yours be done." We may think this only applies to Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, but does it? No! It applies to you and me right now! We need to take individual responsibility for ourselves and join God.

Step Two: God wants your family to "Join Him." Joshua said, "As for me and my house, we will serve the LORD/YHWH." God is not just concerned about you. A man is to love his wife as Christ loved the church (Eph 5:25; Col 3:19). God wants your wife saved. Wives, God wants your husband saved. Paul, in I Cor 7:3 says, "but likewise the wife to the husband." The Greek, eunoia, means affection and love, though the context is about sexuality. Affection and a believer "not leaving" is about sanctification and salvation of *both* the man and the woman. God wants your spouse and your children saved! That word eunoia is also used in Eph 6:7, "Serve wholeheartedly." (NIV) That should equate to more time with the spouse and the kids especially centered around spiritual things such as growing up issues, Bible study, home discussions of God and His plan, church, church attendance, and church events for the family.

Step Three: "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 19:19; Mt 22:39; Mk 12:31; Lk 10:27; Rom 13:9; Gal 5:14; James 2:8)? If you were your neighbor... think about that phrase for a while... without Christ, salvation, or real hope, and you "were in his shoes", I would expect a Christian to build a relationship with me over

a long time, get to know me, care for me in the good and bad times, and... eventually let me know about his/her faith in God. How about having a block party or a block yard sale to get the neighborhood together? A barbecue at your house, or on the neighborhood street? If you had a yard sale, give two things free to anyone on your street. If a pastor (i.e., Rufus Meyers) brings you a truckload of "free" bread, a pallet load of corn, cases of goat milk (yes, he did) or whatever, go to each of your neighbors and share your blessing. If your neighbor's spouse dies, be there. If your neighbor is in an accident, be there. If your neighbor has marital issues, be there. If your neighbor has a barbecue, a bar mitzvah, a birthday party for their kid, be there. Build a tight relationship of trust and friendship that could eventually lead to a relationship to Christ.

Step Four: "Love your enemy," "go...to Samaria," "go... to Nineveh." One of the great lessons of the Bible (in this election year) is from Jonah. Jonah hated the Ninevites, the Assyrians. He didn't like their policies. The Jews of Jesus' time hated the Samaritans, interestingly enough related to the old Assyrian policy of displacement. Jesus said, "you have heard it said, "love your neighbor," but I say to you "love your enemy." Does God love Republicans? Does God love Democrats? What a ridiculous question! I believe the greatest lesson from Jonah is to pay attention to God's will by listening and doing God's word despite what is going on around you. Another good lesson from Jonah is that it did not come from "top down." For many years I superficially read... "the king called for a complete fast." No! First, "the people of Nineveh believed God and proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least." (Jonah 3:5) Then, "when the news reached the king...." (Jonah 3:6)

Top down didn't start the salvation/deliverance of Nineveh. Whether it is King Obama, or King Romney (oops... you know I mean President) where should the change come from? Tony Campolo said, it "will not matter who is in the White House come next year, we will still have our problems." We still pray, "Thy kingdom come." God's plan is for individual revival, that becomes family revival, that becomes neighborhood revival, that becomes church revival, that becomes a revival that politicians cannot ignore. Can we imagine individuals so completely sold out to God that they are being called by His name, humbling *(Continued on page 10)*

Shedding Light on Leadership

Great Leadership Includes Great Communication

Well-spoken words can be a great blessing. King Solomon wrote, "Pleasant words are a honeycomb, sweet to the soul and healing to the bones." (Proverbs 16:24) How well does Solomon's proverb describe your words as a leader?

Just because lips are moving and words are spoken, that doesn't mean a leader is communicating well! Lots of words do not ensure good communication is taking place. What do others hear, feel and experience when you speak? Do they feel spoken to, spoken with, spoken over, spoken around, etc.? Those feelings will go a long way in determining what they really hear and how well they ultimately respond.

Solomon spoke of words being sweet to digest and healing to the listener's spirit. When you speak as a leader (parent, work, church, or otherwise), are your words sweet and healing? That doesn't mean you cover a tough message with honey so it tastes better. You still honestly share the good, the bad and everything in-between. You share truth that answers questions, directs others, encourages others, and sometimes challenges others. Still, you do so in a way that brings sweetness and healing.

A good leader never assumes that people know what they should know. He is always communicating what needs to be known. She is always asking great questions of her followers and listening exceedingly well to what they have to say. Information is not "hidden" or kept "secret". It is freely shared as often as possible, and in as many avenues as possible. It has been said that "in the absence of accurate information, people will assume the worst". Prior to hearing the truth, surely you have sometimes assumed a scenario worse than the reality. A great leader never gives folks the opportunity to assume the worst, because accurate information is shared again, and again, and again. What truth do you need to share with a follower or two so they don't conjure up in their minds the worst possible set of circumstances?

Do you want to be heard? Or, correctly heard? Practice the discipline of asking others what they heard you say, what they think it means, and what you expect them to do with what they think you said and meant. No matter how well-worded your




communication, if it isn't heard correctly, and if it doesn't lead to the response you expect, it is poor communication. Again, never assume. Always check back with the listener.

Do you like being uninformed? Having to wonder? Having to guess? Neither does anyone else! So, make sure those you lead don't have these kinds of experiences because you communicate poorly, or not at all.

Do you enjoy being well-informed? Receiving clear, easy-to-understand details? Having your questions answered before having to ask them? So does everyone else! So, provide that level of communication for those you lead.

Natural Church Development (NCD)

This feature in THE RES-TITUTION HERALD & Progress Journal highlights concepts from NCD. Rather than focus

on a church's growth statistics, NCD is a tool designed to help a church focus attention and effort on its health.

Is Your Church Spirituality Passionate?

This article is the third of eight articles offering an extended view into each of the eight quality characteristics of Natural Church Development. The third quality is Passionate Spirituality.

Each church has a level of spirituality. What NCD cares about is not so much the style of a church's spirituality, but the extent to which folks' faith is exhibited with passion and enthusiasm, both at church *and* in their daily lives.

What really matters is not our current level of spiritual maturity, but whether or not we are continuing to grow and develop as followers of Christ. For example, a fulfilled, growing new believer is significantly more passionate than a stagnant long-time believer.

You might find it interesting to note that NCD research has discovered that passion in our spirituality is less connected to the length of time we pray, study God's word, etc., and much more connected to the inspiration we derive from the quality of our prayer, study of God's word, etc.

NCD measures four critical components for churches seeking to help foster passionate spirituality.

The first component asks, "Are church members integrating their faith into all areas of their lives?" Do folks experience God's involvement and presence in the activities of their daily lives? Do we see folks' lives being transformed?

The second component asks, "Are our folks clearly marked with enthusiasm about our church?" Are leaders clearly teaching what they believe are God's desires for the future of our church? Do folks seem convinced that God is working powerfully in the church and will continue to do so?

The third component asks, "Do the folks in our church spend personal time connecting to God during the week?" Is personal and group prayer integrated into the activities and ministries of our church? Are we teaching folks how to use God's word as a guide for their lives, and are they actually doing so?

The fourth component asks, "What opportunities (in worship, small groups, etc.) are given for folks to talk about God's work in their lives?" How well have we helped folks move their thinking and talking about spirituality from a personal matter to a public matter with each other? Do our church folks naturally talk with each other both about their daily experiences in walking closely with God and about their struggles to do so? How committed are we, privately and publicly, to sharing and praying passionately for each others' physical and spiritual needs?

My vision is to see Churches of God all around the world evidencing the eight quality characteristics of NCD. I see healthy churches ministering well to members, friends, and entire communities, making an eternal difference in folks' lives.

Michael Servetus 1511-1553 A.D. By Robin Todd

his is a brief life summary of a man who was on the leading edge of the radical reformation movement in Europe in the sixteenth century. Only a century before his birth, humanism, with its emphasis on the personal worth of the individual and human values, had come into the political and religious discussion. And as a result of this movement, and in conjunction with growing awareness of corruption in the organized Roman church, Martin Luther was to start the Protestant Reformation just a few years after Servetus was born. Radical reformers were those who wanted more change in doctrine and practice than what was proposed by Luther, Calvin, and Zwingli, etc. This included Anabaptists and Unitarians, as well as others, who were persecuted by both the Catholic and Protestant churches for centuries. Michael Servetus was a staunch opponent of the trinitarian doctrine, as well as other orthodox teachings, including infant baptism. It was especially his unorthodox position on the trinity that would ultimately be the cause of his execution at the hands of the reformer John Calvin in Geneva.

The oldest of three sons, Miguel Serveto Conesa alias Reves was born on September 29, 1511 in Villanueva de Sijena, Spain. During his life Charles V was the emperor of all Western Europe except England, France, and Portugal. Francis I was the king of France, and Charles V's main protagonist. Miguel Serveto had a great propensity for languages, learning to read French, Greek, Latin, and Hebrew. At age 13 he studied the classics and humanists at Zargossa University in Aragon, Spain. This is where he also became familiar with the writings of Martin Luther.

At age 16 he entered the University of Toulouse to study law. It was at this institution, which was a hotbed of radicalism in France, that Miguel Serveto changed his name to the Latinized version of Michael Servetus. He and his fellow students secretly read the Bible and became convinced that Rome corrupted the texts and the fundamental truths of Christianity.

After leaving Toulouse, he became secretary for the confessor of Charles V. This association enabled his invitation to Charles V's official coronation as the Holy Roman Emperor on February 24, 1530. The pomp and pageantry surrounding the Pope's procession during this event greatly disgusted Servetus, and from that point on he determined to begin restoring Christianity to something more akin to the faith and practice of the apostles. Immediately following this event the Spanish reformer traveled to Basel which had been a sanctuary for humanist reformers. Erasmus had made this his home, but he and the other humanist reformers left



town just before Servetus' arrival due to a militant Protestant takeover of the city by Oecolampadius. Servetus did not think Oecolampadius had gone far enough in the reforms, and argued that purging out the trinitarian doctrine would cause the corrupted Roman structure to fall. Oecolampadius disagreed. The disagreement on this and other issues became so strong that Servetus was forced to flee the city.

Arriving in Strasbourg in May of 1531, he began printing his first manuscript *On the Errors of the Trinity.* "Servetus cited over 30 sources in Latin, Greek, Hebrew, and Arabic, and quoted or alluded to fifty-two of the sixty-six books of the Bible, and six books of the Apocrypha" (*Out of the Flames*, Lawrence and Nancy Goldstone, 2002, pg. 71). His book was banned in Spain, and the author was sentenced to death in absentia.

In 1533, now hunted by both Catho-(Continued on page 9)

lics and Protestants, he enrolled at the University of Paris under another name, to study mathematics. John Calvin was also attending at this time, and the reformers were gaining ground in this traditionally orthodox institution. This situation gave Servetus some courage to start coming out of the closet a bit, with his contemporaries, concerning those anti-trinitarian beliefs that had made him a fugitive in the first place. However, the reformers overplayed their hand in a bold political move against the conservative element at the university. As a result the leaders, including Calvin and Servetus, had to flee for their lives. Calvin went to Geneva, and Servetus to Lyon.

Working undercover as Michael Villanovanus in Lyon, he spent the next two years editing a large edition of *Geography* by Claudius Ptolemy of Alexandria. While there he also became acquaintances with Cardinal Francois de Tournon, one of the heads of the French Inquisition. Little did Tournon know at the time that he was having evening meals and discussions with someone who was already a "wanted man".

In 1536, under the name Michel de Villenueve, he registered again at the University of Paris as a medical student. There he completed his course in medicine, and supplemented his income by teaching geography, astronomy, and mathematics. He also wrote a pamphlet regarding digestive aids entitled The Syrups. And, although he wouldn't publish the information for another fifteen years, it was here he discovered the workings of the pulmonary circulatory system, the first to have recorded these findings. But since he published the information in his major theological work (Restoration of Chris*tianity*), no one in the medical field noticed for over a century. By that time someone else had received credit for the discovery (William Harvey of England).

Between 1538 and 1552 Servetus practiced medicine and did more editing work in Vienna. This included a 3-year project on a 7volume edition of the Pagnini Bible, which was a Latin translation printed in 1527. Letters with Calvin began in 1546 and continued for a year. Calvin actually tried to have him arrested at the time by Catholic authorities, but he failed. Servetus completed his book *Restoration of Christianity*, in 1552. John Calvin received a copy.

Through continuing efforts by John Calvin in Geneva, Servetus was arrested by leaders of the Catholic Inquisition in Vienna on April 4, 1553. However, he escaped after the trial, avoiding, for the time, certain death. A few months later in August, he was arrested in Geneva as he was traveling to what was probably a safe haven in Naples, Italy. On October 27, 1553, after a sham of a trial, Michael Servetus was executed by being burned alive on a pile of green wood, along with copies of his books. It took half an hour for him to die. His last words are reported to have been, "Oh Jesus, Son of the Eternal God, have pity on me (notice he did not say, "oh, eternal God the Son")!" In a letter written by William Farel (evangelist friend of John Calvin) to a friend, Farel tries to defend the execution of Servetus this way: "The wretched man could not be brought to say that Christ was the Eternal Son of God. When I urged him on the subject, he desired me to point to a single place in the Scriptures in which Christ is spoken of as the Son of God before birth...but would not acknowledge the Son of God, save in the man Jesus"

(*Servetus and Calvin*, R. Willis, 1877, pg. 485). Such was the capital crime of Michael Servetus.

Amazingly, although the whole town turned out for his execution, his enemy and accuser, John Calvin, stayed home. Later, in a short tract defending his actions in the affair, "Calvin bragged about causing Servetus' arrest, initiating the prosecution, and drawing up the charges..." (*Out of the Flames*, Lawrence and Nancy Goldstone, 2002, pg. 201).

"So died, in advance of his age, one of the gifted sons of God, the victim of religious fanaticism and personal hate" (*Servetus and Calvin*, R. Willis, 1877, pg. 487).

It is interesting to note that even after his death, the writings of Servetus were instrumental in the beginnings of the unitarian movement in Poland. A Polish minister by the name of Gonesius discovered his writings in 1556 and began proclaiming these anti-trinitarian positions in Poland. He managed to convert a man named Jan Kiszka, the second-largest landowner in Poland, who owned over 400 villages and 70 cities. All 20 churches in his vast territory were converted. A unitarian school was established about fifty miles south of Krakow. The unitarian church flourished in Poland until it was officially suppressed in 1660.

There are only three original copies remaining of Michael Servetus' book, *Restoration of Christianity*. They are located in the Nationalbibliothek in Vienna, the Bibliotheque Nationale in Paris, and in the library of the University of Edinburgh.

Christian university. Now she is asking me and the class questions! Can you imagine your neighborhood becoming so relationally close that nothing major happens without them seeking your godly advice? Can you imagine a nation whose God is the LORD/YHWH, (Psa 33:12) where the vast majority becomes completely sold out to God and lives like it by bending the knee to Jesus to the glory of the Father? LORD, help us!

Verses to Live By

God watches over His people. He is always mindful of our needs.

In fact, God watches all people: "The eyes of the LORD are in every place, watching the evil and the good" (Prov. 15:3). But we must wait for that time to come. And it will. But it will be in "the age to come."

This does not cause our faith in God to diminish. It means I understand God's plan better, and must wait patiently for that day to come. *God will* answer those prayers *at that time*! Praise God!

Seek YHWH Seek Yahweh: The Tetragrammaton in the First Century

Scholars often refer to the four-letter name of God, YHWH, as the Tetragrammaton. It is commonly believed that the name of God, which appears over 6,000 times in ancient Hebrew manuscripts, was no longer in use during the first century. Rather, with the translation of the Greek Old Testament known as the Septuagint, the name of God was replaced with the Greek word kurios. It is believed that Jews had stopped using the name and instead used the word *adonay* when speaking the name of God. The Encyclopedia Britannica explains: "After the Exile (6th century BC), and especially from the 3rd century BC on, Jews ceased to use the name Yahweh...."¹ While this may be a commonly accepted belief about the Tetragrammaton, textual evidence suggests a different truth.

Before the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls, the oldest known complete Old Testament manuscripts were Greek, dating from the fourth century AD. Two renowned complete Greek Bibles are the Codex Sinaiticus and the Codex Vaticanus. In both of these famous codices, written after the time of Constantine, the name of God does not exist. Rather, in all uses, the name is replaced with the Greek surrogate kurios. While these are the oldest "complete" versions of the Greek Old Testament, they are not the oldest manuscripts that have been found. Some partial Old Testament Greek manuscripts and fragments exist from the second and third century AD as well. In these documents, as with the fourth century codices, the name of God is not present, but rather, the Greek surrogate kurios had replaced the name.

It is also noteworthy to mention that there are no extant New Testament manuscripts from the first century. The oldest known New Testament manuscript is a fragment of the Gospel of John in Greek, dated at the earliest to 125 AD. There are later second and third century New Testament manuscripts that have been found. As with the Old Testament Greek manuscripts, the Tetragrammaton, the four-letter name of God, cannot be found in any of these surviving New Testament manuscripts.

However, extant Old Testament manuscripts dat-

ing from the first century and earlier tell a different story. In fact, in all extant manuscripts and fragments of Old Testament writings from the first century or earlier, the Tetragrammaton or some form of it was being used. Textual evidence suggests that the use of the Greek word *kurios* did not begin replacing the name until the second century. In first century Old Testament manuscripts that have been discovered, the name of God is written in three different ways: in Herodian Hebrew script of that era, a more ancient Paleo Hebrew script (see examples at the end), or in some instances, rendered in Greek by the letters IAO.

In all of the Hebrew Old Testament manuscripts discovered in the caves around the Dead Sea, the Hebrew name of God is present, written in the Herodian Hebrew script as hwhy. These manuscripts date between 100 BC and 70 AD. In some instances, the main body of text is written in the Herodian Hebrew script, but the name of God is written in the more ancient Paleo Hebrew. There were also a few Greek Old Testament fragments found among the Dead Sea scrolls. One such manuscript is from the book of Habakkuk. In this beautiful text, dated at the turn of the Common Era, the words are all in Greek, except when it comes to the Tetragrammaton. The name of God is not written in Greek, but rather it is in Paleo Hebrew (see example below). From cave four, manuscript 4Q120, is a fragment of Leviticus 4:17. In this Greek manuscript dated to 1 BC, the name of God is written as a Greek rendering of IAO. In his book, The Complete Dead Sea Scrolls in English, author Geza Vermes writes, "The Tetragram (the divine name YHWH) is rendered semi -phonetically as *Iao*, and is not replaced, as was customary later, by the Greek Kurios (Lord)."²

The Dead Sea Scrolls are not the only first century manuscripts discovered. In the deserts of Egypt from the Oxyrhynchus collection, a few first century Old Testament manuscript fragments were uncovered. One such manuscript is a Greek text from the book of Job, dated to around 50 AD. And, as with the Habakkuk scroll found at Qumran, in this first century Greek Old Testament, the name of God is not replaced with the Greek word



kurios, but rather, the name of God appears in Paleo Hebrew Script (see below).

Scholars and paleographers are aware that manuscripts from the first century and earlier do not use a surrogate *kurios* for the name of God. This practice does not show up until codices of the second century. What does this mean for Bible students interested in a study of God's name? The evidence suggests that Old Testament scriptures used by Jesus and the disciples most likely contained the name of God. In Luke chapter four when Jesus went to the synagogue in Nazareth and read from the scroll of Isaiah, the Tetragrammaton could have been present. When Philip met the eunuch from Alexandria in Acts 8, and he was reading from the scroll of Isaiah, this manuscript most likely contained the name of God. Also when Paul reasoned with the Bereans "out of the scripture" in Acts chapter 17, these disciples very likely had a rendering of YHWH, either in Paleo Hebrew script, or in a Greek rendering, semiphonetically as *IAO*. All of these New Testament records took place before 70 AD, and there is no textual evidence that the Greek word *kurios* (translated into English as "Lord"), was being used as a replacement for the Tetragrammaton until the second century AD.


The name of God, YHWH, in Herodian Hebrew script from first century era

G reetings,

On August 20, 2012, the Korean Extension successfully began the 2012 fall semester with 71 Korean students. Despite the decrease in student enrollment from spring (78), we were blessed with 14 new students from Korea. This semester's decrease is attributed to the nine students that graduated last May, including 12 students who were unable to re-enroll. As part of our recruitment efforts, we will continue to contact and attempt to visit and encourage the students who were unable to return. Our purpose for doing this is to keep relationships positive and offer support, and hope that God will change their situations. We pray God grants these students direction and opportunity to return, and provides our current students with knowledge, faith, and strength to complete their biblical studies.

In spite of the decline in enrollment, the Korean Extension's enthusiasm and eagerness to teach the Bible has not diminished. The staff continues to counsel and minister to our student body. The instructors concentrate on developing their teaching skills and class materials, striving to offer our students good Christian knowledge. In light of the decrease, one of our graduates, Chae Yun Baik, was accepted into a master's program at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary for the fall 2012 semester. The institution is also nationally accredited! Chae Yun did contact our office recently to let us know that she is doing well, receiving education at her new school. We are aware of the variations in theology between the Korean Extension and the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, but we are confident that Chae Yun will overcome the differences.


Most of you will recall almost four years ago, the Korean Extension had another student, Hyun Ju Kim, a graduate from our program who was accepted into the master's program at Fuller Theological Seminary. Although her initial acceptance was conditional, we were surprised to learn that Hyun Ju attained full scholarship to the program upon her second semester. Thereafter, she visited our school to address the Korean Extension students with her testimony. She reassured the students that the education they are receiving at the Korean Extension is invaluable and adequate enough for them to pursue a master's course—possibly with a scholarship at any nationally accredited college. Last year, I had a similar experience. I too am a graduate of the Korean Extension, and I was accepted into a master's program (Master's in Education specializing in TESOL—Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) in August 2011 at Lincoln Christian University in Lincoln, Illinois. This school is also a nationally accredited school, integrating the Bible into the specific field of study. Although I have not been offered any scholarships, the knowledge I attained at the KE was substantial enough for me to remain on the dean's list since my initial enrollment. In my view, as a student of a higher education course, the knowledge that is provided to our current students is exceptional.

I have also been working closely with a professor from the University of Georgia, Dr. Sarah Ann Shope. Dr. Shope holds multiple degrees, a Master of Arts in Professional Writing, Master of Education specializing in TESOL, and a Doctorate in Education specializing in TESOL. She also teaches multiple academic courses in various universities in Georgia: Reinhardt College, Dalton College, Georgia Perimeter College, Georgia State University, and University of Georgia. Dr. Shope considers the education at the KE as "an ideal model of multi-cultural Christian instruction and training." She has even supplemented some of our courses into her students' assignments and projects. Her students are asked to monitor our courses as part of her course requirements. Thus far, three of her students have monitored our classroom instruction and voiced their admiration. According to Dr. Shope, the three students have expressed how they were impressed with the bilingual classroom instruction and the multitude of Christian knowledge they had received.

In closing, we are all servants of our Father God (ABC and KE). We must maintain and strive to recruit future servants for God and to teach them how to serve Him! On behalf of the Korean Extension staff and student body, the Korean Church Conference, and churches and pastors (Korea and U.S.), I thank you all for your consistent prayers and support.





Prophecy Page

The End is Near!

S top the Christmas shopping! You may not have to worry about what to get for great aunt Gertrude or which family gets you Christmas Eve and the other Christmas day. What you have not read in the Toys R Us, Wal-Mart, Kmart and Target ads is the world will be coming to an end on December 21st. Now this is not a problem for me, since I always hold out for the bargains on December 24th in the late afternoons, so I should come out of this in a sweet position.

Perhaps you have forgotten the Mayan prophecy of the apocalypse on December 21st.

Dr. Michael Coe is one of the greatest living experts on ancient Mayan civilization. He stated in 1966 that the end of the Mayan calendar could actually be the biblical Armageddon. Coe is an archaeologist with a doctorate from Harvard who has worked for the CIA. That's what really started it all! Now, for nearly 50 years, we have been building this up in our social conscience.

In 2006, the History Channel stated that the ancient Mayans were masters of time and practiced prophets who could predict that the world would end on December 21, 2012!

Others also linked the Mayan calendar to other various doomsday predictions such as: an ABC News 20/20 aired the "Last Days on Earth", in 2006; a second History Channel segment entitled "Doomsday 2012 - The End of Days", aired in 2007; an A&E produced program entitled "Seven Signs of the Apocalypse" aired on the History Channel in 2008; and another History Channel produced documentary entitled "Nostradamus 2012" aired in 2009.

We really don't have a track record of accuracy by the Mayans. The Mayan culture disappeared long before their calendar ended. The Mayans may have been an advanced race in astrology and mathematics. However, they were not so proficient in their predictions. They might have foretold the end of life in the year 2012, but they could not predict the disappearance and demise of their own culture. Isn't that the test of a true prophet? Consider this:

There are at least 333 prophecies of the first coming of Christ that were literally fulfilled. Here are just a few of them:

- 1. Isaiah 7:14 Born of a virgin
- 2. Micah 5:2 At Bethlehem
- 3. Jeremiah 31:15 Slaughter of children
- 4. Hosea 11:1 Called out of Egypt
- 5. Psalm 41:9; 55:12-14 Betrayed by a friend
- 6. Zechariah 13:7 Disciples forsake Him

There are prophecies yet to be fulfilled. Some of them are:

- 1. I Thessalonians 4:16; Acts 1:11 He shall come Himself to the earth
- 2. I Thessalonians 4:17 The dead are raised and changed believers will be caught up to meet Him
- 3. Zechariah 14:4 He will come to the same Mt of Olives from which He ascended
- 4. Matthew 24:30 He will come in the clouds of heaven with power and glory
- 5. Revelation 1:7 Every eye shall see Him
- 6. Luke 1:32; Isaiah 9:6-7; Jeremiah 23:5-6 He shall have the throne of David upon the earth

These are but a few of the many prophecies that will be literally fulfilled at the second coming of Jesus. Many specific prophecies tell of the events to precede His coming. They mention Russia, the western nations, China and the third world nations. They speak of the events that will bring all nations against Jerusalem triggering the final battle. These will be fulfilled with the same accuracy as the prophecies that have already been fulfilled.

Christ is coming again. We can be assured of that. But, if the world was going to end on December 21st, would they have sold me a two-year warranty on my new air compressor last week? The LORD has work to do. (Jer. 50:25 NIV)

This phrase taken from Jeremiah symbolizes to me our job. We are to join God in whatever He is doing, His work. It seems His will is clear on the big things— "not willing that any should perish." (II Pet. 3:9) Since he is "not willing," or wanting, any to perish, His Son gave us our orders, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." (Mk. 16:15) What part of "God is not willing" and "Go…" can we misunderstand?

I reread the purpose statements from our official constitution of the ABC/COGGC. The By-Laws, Article One says, "The Church of God General Conference, through partnership with conferences and local churches of God. assists members in the performance of their commission to make disciples of Jesus Christ." In our vision statement we are "To Join God..." and in our mission statement we are "To Serve Churches and Individuals...." The By-Laws continue in that paragraph, that we "...serve as an advocate of the Church of God to the world."

Again, what part of join God in His work and will, go, serve and proclaim the gospel is confusing? None, I believe. We have had an election. What changes on our end? Nothing! We are to be about our "Father's business."

Jerry Briggs, for a class sermon, spoke on "We are the salt of the earth!" It was a great message that we are the change agent and preservative in a fallen world. Too much salt and abrasiveness can be a bad thing, but the right amount in a saline solution purifies wounds. Jack Kmiecik had a sermon on "All In!" Using the card game illustration, he asked, "How many of us are 'All In' for the kingdom and Christ in the work of God?" Good question! Are we all in?

These young men have challenged me, and therefore I challenge you. Are you all in to being the salt of the earth for Jesus and the kingdom, even in trying times? If so, carry on!!

THREE OTHER THINGS for this holiday season and new year. Many of you should have received, or will be receiving, letters from me and the staff suggesting three things you can do for your General Conference and your Atlanta Bible College. They are FIRST-PRAY! The work of God is based on individuals tuned in to God and His will and direction. Please pray for our pastors, our board, our staff, our students, our youth, our mission fields, our churches, etc. Prayer is the basis for God working in us to do His will.

SECOND - GIVE! A priority in giving tithes and offerings is the local church. I don't think Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount takes us into legalism. I think He takes us into generosity beyond our imagination. If people generously gave to the local church, and the local church generously gave a tithe to local conferences, and tithed to the General Conference, probably no church or conference would have "money problems." As evidenced by the recent giving to missions, our missions are well-supported. Still, someone needs to pay the light bill from the General Fund. Your giving to the General Fund and ABC Boosters is very important.

THIRD - REMEMBER! The local church. Atlanta Bible College and the General Conference in our estate planning/wills. Obviously don't forget the kids (Prov. 13:22 - "A good person leaves an inheritance for their children's children.") Just a year away, we remember the miraculous gift of Pastor Jack and Louise Hearp. By the time you get this, I will officially be a "senior". I am wondering what can I do, if the Lord tarries, and I die, for the work of God? I encourage you to do this as well. David Krogh is an excellent source for wills, bequests and annuity giving. Start planning for God's part.

Shedding Light on Leadership

Great Leaders Listen Well to God and to People

Great leaders speak well, inspiring others, instructing others, carefully laying out the path to be taken. But before the leader can speak well—and be heard well—the leader must listen well. Easy to say. Not so easy for every leader to do.

Listening is hard work, assuming we actually desire to hear what is being said, honor the speaker and incorporate what we hear into our leadership decisions. If we aspire to be great leaders, we must listen well to both God and people.

First, and of highest priority, is that we listen well to God. The Old Testament prophet Jeremiah recorded a tremendous promise from God, "Call to me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know." (Jeremiah 33:3) Please don't miss the implications of this promise. God, the creator of the entire universe, declares that if we will call to Him and listen, He will speak to us, telling us things we don't already know!

Maybe God will speak to us in a clear, soft voice. Maybe He will inspire our mind, heart and eyes to think, feel and see what He thinks, feels and sees. Maybe He'll communicate in some other way. Bottom line? How dare I take a step in leadership without seeking God's perspective and claiming His promise that He will communicate to me if I listen well. God wants me to listen to Him!

Of course, listening well means I'm quiet long enough to listen, I'm actually interested in hearing God's perspective and making it mine, and that I'm going to let God's perspective mold my decisionmaking and leadership. These are critical keys to hearing God well.

I know that in my leadership decisions and actions



over the years I have not always listened well to God first. One of the proverbs suggests that makes me a fool. "The way of a fool seems right to him, but a wise man listens to advice." (Proverbs 12:15) I don't like thinking that I have been a fool at times, but the scriptural truth is clear. If I lead without first listening well to God, my leadership will suffer, and the folks I lead may suffer as well.


This proverb also applies to listening to the advice wise people around us can provide. How well do we listen to folks around us? Folks we lead? Even folks that disagree with us?

"My dear brothers, take note of this: everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry." (James 1:19) A great leader will listen well before speaking, and will listen well before becoming angry. James asked his readers to carefully take note of the fact that they should listen first. Perhaps he also wished them to take note of the fact that God provided two ears and only one mouth. It is sometimes suggested that the two ears imply God intends us to listen twice as long as we talk. That may be a very good guideline for a great leader.

Work to be a great listener...of God and of others.

This feature in THE RES-TITUTION HERALD & Progress Journal highlights concepts from NCD. Rather than focus on a church's growth sta-

tistics, NCD is a tool designed to help a church focus attention and effort on its health.

Are Your Church Structures Effective?

This article is the fourth of eight articles offering an extended view into each of the eight quality characteristics of Natural Church Development. The fourth quality is Effective Structures.

Some level of structure (or organization) exists in every church. The key issues revolve around whether or not the structures currently in place truly support the work of the church, or, actually hinder the work of the church.

There are at least two tough truths to remember in the quality characteristic of effective structures. Truth number one: it is highly unlikely that an organizational structure that is a great fit for one church will also be a great fit for another church without careful, church-specific alterations. Since no two churches are identical, likely no two churches' structures will be identical if they are truly effective.

Truth number two, related to truth number one: once found, a church's organizational structure is not "carved in stone" forever, but must be a living structure evaluated and changed as needed to make sure it is well-serving the church, rather than requiring the church to serve it. As the church changes, so too should the structure—if it is to remain effective.

NCD measures four critical components for churches seeking to build and maintain effective structures. The first component asks, "Do we plan effectively?". How well, and how often, does our leadership team set goals and plan strategically? Do we help folks understand and stay connected to church goals? Are our programs and activities clearly well-planned? Do we review well and adjust accordingly?

The second component asks, "How well are our ministries and programs connected to our structure so it supports them?". How well do our folks understand the structure? In what ways does our structure facilitate our ministry? In what ways does our structure hinder our ministry—and need to be changed?

The third component asks, "Do we innovate and manage change well?". How does our structure both allow and encourage appropriate change? Do we give freedom for new ministry development? Are we able to give attention and understanding to the emotions of our church family during changes that take place?

The fourth component asks, "Does the structure support the effectiveness of our leadership?". Are ministry leaders equipped to give great oversight to the folks they lead? Is training made available to both workers and leaders? Does our structure encourage and provide for folks to be well-mentored? Do we identify and train apprentices?

The church structure should never be assumed to be effective. Only when it actually is effective is the ministry it supports also effective.

My vision is to see churches of God all around the world evidencing the eight quality characteristics of NCD. I see healthy churches ministering well to members, friends, and entire communities, making an eternal difference in folks' lives.

ost of us have an Authorized (King James) Version of the Bible. You will note that the One Who inspired it to be written is called, "The LORD," as in Exodus 3:15, where He is quoted as saving, "Thus shall you say unto the children of Israel, The LORD God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, hath sent me unto you: this is my name forever, and this is my memorial unto all generations."

Again, in the Ten Commandments, Exodus 20:7, the third commandment, is quoted as saying, "Thou shalt not take the name of the LORD thy God in vain; for the LORD will not hold him guiltless that taketh His Name in vain."

Most other translations of the Bible also render His Name as "the LORD," or "GOD," in small capital letters.

But is this the Creator's Name? Is this what He inspired to be written? No, it most definitely is not! The Bible was originally written in the Hebrew language, because it was given to Hebrew prophets He had called for that purpose. What they wrote was the Name He gave Himself: the Hebrew letters, Yod, Hay, Waw, Hay, corresponding in English to YHWH. This is called the Tetragrammaton, or the "four letters." Look up in your own dictionary or encyclopedia, "tetragrammaton," "YHWH," Yahweh, Jehovah, God and Lord.

Originally the Hebrew language did not have vowels. Only consonants were written, and the reader provided the vowel sounds. The Jews confirm that the Name should be pronounced "Yahweh," in their

own encyclopedia, but they will not pronounce it. They developed a superstition that it was too sacred and holy to be pronounced, so they substituted "Adonai," meaning "My Lord," or "the Lord." They used two scriptures to justify this: the third commandment, Exodus 20:7, and Leviticus 24:16, which says, "And he that blasphemeth the Name of Yahweh, he shall surely be put to death; all the congregation shall surely stone him: as well the stranger, as he that is born in the land, when he blasphemeth the Name shall be put to death."

They thought the best way to avoid blaspheming His Name

was to avoid it altogether. So they quit using it, writing the vowels of "Adonai" up over it where it appeared in their Hebrew Scriptures (about 7,000 times), so the reader would read "Yahweh," but pronounce "Adonai."

And Bible translators for the most part have followed this

unauthorized man-made custom in their own translations. Yet most of them tell us in their prefaces or forewords what they have done, and that the proper name of the Most High is Yahweh.

Well, you might ask, what difference does this make? He knows who I'm referring to when I call Him Lord or God, doesn't He? He knows who the translators meant, doesn't He?

Yes, He knows our hearts. He knows our very thoughts. But the difficulty lies in the fact that LORD or GOD is not His name, and by quoting Him as saying, "I am the LORD," we are putting lying words in His mouth. We are making Him out to be a liar. We are establishing our own righteousness, and disobeying Him. We are saying we know better than He does what He should be called.

Yahweh attaches great importance to His Name. He says it is Holy, it is to be revered, it is not to be polluted or used in a vain way. Incredibly, His

Name appears in the Old Testament manuscripts approximately 7,000 times (One thousand times more than seven, the biblical number of completeness)!

Yet, foolish man in his "wisdom" has tried to obliterate His Name completely. For instance, in the King James Bible, His Name appears only four times (in the corrupted form Jehovah), and once as Jah (Psa. 68:4). The "j" originally had the "y" sound. Everywhere else, it has been rendered "The LORD" or "GOD."

Certainly this is Satan-inspired, in an attempt to lead man astray. Let's examine a few scriptures either quoting Yahweh Himself, or one of His prophets, that show the importance He attaches to His Name.

Exodus 20:7 Thou shalt not take the Name of Yahweh thy (El) in vain; for Yahweh will not hold him guiltless that taketh His Name in vain. This is the third commandment. "In vain" means to bring to nothing, to make useless or of none effect, or to misuse it. This commandment means far more than just not cursing and swearing. It means, among other things, to not forsake it or take it away, which is just exactly what foolish man has done.

Psalm 83:18 That men may know that thou, whose Name alone is Yahweh, art the most High over all the Earth. Isaiah 42:8 I am Yahweh: that is My Name: and my glory will I not give to another, neither my praise to graven images.

Psalm 68:4 Sing unto (Elohim), sing praises to His Name: extol Him that rideth upon the heavens by His Name Jah (Yah, the short, or poetic form of Yahweh, as in HalleluYah). This praiseful expression is known in almost every language on earth, and means, "Praise ye Yahweh."

Ezekiel 43:7 And He (Yahweh) said unto me, "... and my holy name, shall the house of Israel no more defile,"

Proverbs 30:4 "... what is His Name, and what is His Son's Name, if thou canst tell?"

Isaiah 12: 2, 4: "...Yah Yahweh is my strength and my song; He also is become my salvation." "And in that day shall ye say, 'Praise Yahweh, call upon His Name, declare His doings among the people, make mention that His Name is exalted.""

Isaiah 52:5-6 Now therefore, what have I here, saith Yahweh, that my people are taken away for nought? They that rule over them make them to mourn, saith Yahweh; and My Name continually every day is blasphemed. Therefore My people shall know My Name....

Ezekiel 39:6-7 And I will send a fire on Magog, and among them that dwell carelessly in the isles: and they shall know that I am Yahweh. So will I make My Holy Name known in the midst of My people Israel; and I will not let them pollute My Holy Name any more: and the heathen shall know that I am Yahweh, the Holy One in Israel.

Psalm 111:9 "... Holy and reverend is His Name."

John 17:6, 11, 12, 26 (This was in the prayer that Yahshua prayed the night before He died) v. 6: I have manifested (made known) Thy Name unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world..., v. 11: ... Holy Father, keep through thine own Name those whom thou hast given me, v. 12: While I was with them in the world, I kept them in Thy Name... v. 26: And I have declared unto them Thy Name, and will declare it

Revelation 19:1, 3, 4, 6 all use the worshipful phrase, HalleluYah (Gr. Alleluia).

In like manner that man has taken away Yahweh's Name and brought it to nought (took it in vain), the name of Yahweh's Son has also been corrupted. His Name is Yahshua, the same as the Israelite general who succeeded Moses, the one called Joshua in our English Bibles. There was not then, nor is there now, a letter "j" in either the Hebrew or the Greek language. All proper nouns (names of people, cities, countries, etc.) found in the Bible that start with a "j" should be

pronounced with a "y" sound. For more on this, write for free literature on The Name. It will be sent by return mail.

There is no question that our Creator has a name, and so does His son. Those names are Yahweh and Yahshua (Yahshua means Yah's salvation. See Matthew 1:20-21. The angel said, "you shall call Him Yahshua for He shall save His people from their sins.") Yahshua means salvation of Yah, or Yah's salvation. He carries the family name, whereas the term "Jesus" has no meaning.

The only question is: can you understand the importance of knowing and using these names, or will you continue to use the names of local deities and idols which He hates, when calling on Him, or worshipping Him?

One man told me recently that he had "studied the Sacred Name doctrine out, and found there's nothing to it." All I can say to that is that you need to study it some more. All you need is a Bible, a good dictionary, encyclopedia, or Bible helps such as a concordance (and an open mind), and start looking up the words mentioned earlier, such as Lord, God, Jehovah, Yahweh, tetragrammaton, Jesus, Joshua, etc.

Some have said, "Why should we be reading along in our English Bibles, come to the name of the Creator, and suddenly have to speak Hebrew?" What they don't realize is that most of the names in the Bible are Hebrew, such as Moses, Adam, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, even Satan. Jerusalem, Judah, Bethany, all Hebrew. And when they speak these names, they are, in effect, speaking Hebrew.

Names are not translated from one language to another; they are transliterated. This means the same sound is brought forward into the new language as nearly as possible. "The Lord" is not a translation of Yahweh. Neither is "God". They are substitutions. Paul said there are gods many and lords many (1 Cor. 8:5).

"Jesus" was an attempt at transliterating Yahshua's name into English, but it fell miserably short of the mark. Since the "j" had the "y" sound, it was originally pronounced "Yah-soos," because the Greeks did not have the "sh" sound in their language, and an "a" ending carries a feminine connotation, so they ended it with an "s." Later, to get away from the "Yah" sound, they changed that to "Yesus," which is closer to the Jews' "Yeshua." Then, after the "j" was given the soft "g" sound, it was but a short step to what we have today—"Jesus."

Scripture tells us in Joel 2:32, "And it shall come to pass, that whosoever shall call on the Name of Yahweh shall be delivered...."

This is repeated in Acts 2:21, "And it shall come to pass, that whosoever shall call on the Name of Yahweh shall be saved."

Acts 4:12, speaking of Yahshua, says, "neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Yahshua carries Yahweh's name. He is Yah's salvation. That is His Name. No other name will do. He said so, and I believe it. Do you?

Now that you know, what will you do? Will you continue to use the pagan titles and names of foreign gods used by strangers to the covenant when you worship, or will you repent of this evil, and worship the only true Mighty One, Yahweh, and His Son, our Savior, Yahshua the Messiah? It's your decision.

"And it shall come to pass, that whosoever shall call on the Name of Yahweh shall be delivered..."

Joel 2:32

Verses to Live By

"And there shall be no more curse" Revelation 22:3 KJ

"Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presense of the Lord; And he shall send Jesus Christ, which before was preached unto you: Whom the heaven must receive until the times of restitution of all things..." Acts 3:19-21 KJ

These two passages express the Christian's hope. The curse which God placed on the earth in the beginning just after Adam and Eve disobeyed God shall be removed, and Jesus will restore all things that God has promised to restore.

When Jehovah "the only true God" (John 17:3) created all things, He looked over everything He had made and declared that that it was "very good" (Gen. 1:31). When our God makes a statement like that, we can believe it. Everything God made was very good. It is difficult for us, now, to imagine how everything was so good, because very soon, God put a curse on His good earth because of mortal man's failure to believe Him. Man had disobeyed what God had told him to do.

God had planted a garden toward the east, in Eden. There He had placed many trees, but there were two special ones: the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. He gave them their choice. The idea was, if they ate of the tree of life they would <u>continue living</u> (they were created mortal). But if they ate of the other tree, <u>they would die</u>. Now they had no idea what this meant. They were already alive, weren't they? And what was death? They had never seen anything die.

The point of this test was: God wanted them to listen to Him and follow His advice. You can continue to live on, or you can bring death upon you (and the whole human race). (Rom. 5:12) But they weren't thinking that far ahead.

There was a tempter there who twisted God's words, and told Eve: "Hasn't God said 'You shall not eat of <u>any</u> tree of the garden?" The woman corrected him, and told him they could eat of all the trees except one, the tree that would bring to them the meaning of good and evil. And God had warned them that if they chose to eat of it, they would die. Then the devil contradicted what God had told them, saying they wouldn't die. But He didn't tell them the truth. He just didn't want them to be as smart as He is. The serpent said, "God knows that in the day you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God" and know what He knows.

The woman was deceived (Adam wasn't, 1 Tim. 2:14). The serpent picked on the woman on purpose, to put a falsehood in her mind. She believed him and gave this forbidden tree another look. It was pretty, the fruit looked good, and "was desirable to make one wise," so, without checking with Adam, she ate some of it. Then, since nothing happened to her, he ate some, too. Then their eyes were opened, and they knew things were not as rosy as they thought they would be. They realized they had no clothes on, and they tried to make some out of fig leaves, because those were the largest leaves. They didn't realize how scratchy they were. (I've had fig trees for years.)

Then God came and checked them out: "Where are you?" Adam told him that when they heard His voice, they were afraid and they hid. (Imagine trying to hide from Almighty God.) They gave a lame excuse, but God got right to the point and asked them if they had eaten of the forbidden fruit. As Adam was explaining why they did, he blamed Eve, then she blamed the serpent. So God gave them His judgment, starting with the serpent, then Eve, then Adam—judgments which would affect them in this life until the final judgment. Death came upon them, and they would return to the dust from which He made them. Since that day, all of us have died. This is the curse God placed on the earth and everything in it. Everything is cursed, and eventually dies. That's why the thorns and thistles came into being. That's why women have pain in childbirth. That's why men have to work hard for a living.

But, through all the ages God has given us and the earth, the hope of a better day coming—a day where the curse is removed and everything is restored. What a day that will be! It's our hope! Then the eyes of the blind Christians shall be opened, the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped, the lame shall leap as the deer, and the tongue of the dumb shall shout for joy (Isaiah 35:4-10). Doesn't that bring tears to your eyes, you who have loved ones who need healing like I do?

This is why some of our churches are called "Blessed Hope Church of God." If this isn't "blessed hope," I don't know what is.

Korean Extension Update

G reetings to our Church of God conference members,

The history of the Korean Extension is something most of you are aware of and rather than communicating to you about our operation, please allow me to take the opportunity to share some history about a former graduate, who is also a former employee, Young Hee An.

Young Hee arrived from South Korea in 2007, but prior to her arrival she struggled with where God was leading her. She has always been passionate about evangelism, so after graduating from a Presbyterian theological college, she prepared for a long-term evangelical trip to the Philippines. As part of her preparation, she also visited a pastor (Yoo) to discuss the trip. Pastor Yoo has been involved with pastoral leadership for over 10 years in the Atlanta-Korean area, and he has also attended numerous Korean Extension classes to expand his theological knowledge. During their conversation, Pastor Yoo asked whether the information she attained from college is enough to truly spread God's message effectively in the Philippines.

He addressed Young Hee with some thought-provoking questions, like "what if it is not enough, is the attained biblical knowledge true based on what you have discovered in the Bible through your self-studies, am I confident that the knowledge is adequate." The comments and questions convicted Young Hee to rethink her plans. Meanwhile, Pastor Yoo also introduced her to the Atlanta Bible College Korean Extension. He explained his positive experience, and that he attends frequently when he has the opportunity to visit Atlanta. He made a strong recommendation for her to attend and compare the knowledge between both schools, so she can be confident in her faith. She accepted Pastor Yoo's proposition, which marked Young Hee's life-changing moment. She immediately enrolled into the Korean Extension for the fall of 2007, experiencing the Abrahamic Faith and attaining truth, and she graduated May 2011.

After her graduation, she applied and was accepted to be an intern pastor at the Campus Bible Church of God (Duluth, GA). Soon after, she began teaching biblical and ministry classes for the Korean Extension. Upon two years of intern pastoral service, she applied and became a licensed minister under the Korean Church Conference. The Korean Extension is also happy and sad to announce that Young Hee will be leaving the United States in December. Although she was not able to go to the Philippines, she has not lost her desire to evangelize. 

What Happens When You Meet God?

[Excerpted from sermon by author at Cornerstone Bible Church, McDonough, GA, September 2, 2012]

Have you ever met a President? The Queen of England? A famous sports person? A Hollywood or TV star? What happened when you met that person? If you haven't met a famous person, can you *imagine* what you would feel like? What you would do? It brings to mind the movie "Wayne's World" when they repeated "We're not worthy! We're not worthy!"

How about when you meet God? You *have* met Him, haven't you? How did you react? Isaiah met God, and the incident is recorded for us in Isaiah 6:1-8. For me, this text defines true worship. If we study the elements of this incident, we might be able to improve our worship, individually and corporately.

First of all, we need to connect *Prop* with Isaiah to understand how this incident affected him. The year was 740 BC, and good King Uzziah of Judah had just died. "Woe is me!" might have gone through the young prophet's mind. "What will become of us now? We haven't had that many good kings, and I'm really unsure about his son/heir Jotham." Isaiah probably wandered into the temple for a moment of meditation. I have often gone to church when something big was bothering me. I have prayed, sat in silence, and thought through my problem(s). Perhaps that was what Isaiah did in God's house on that day. So guess whom he met there? <u>GOD!!</u>

Let's consider the details. Close your eyes, paint the mental picture, and react to what your mind's eye is seeing. First, "I saw the Lord." (v. 1) Wow! Second, "seated on a throne." A majestic throne for the king of the universe in the temple. Wow! And who's on it? The Lord! Wow! Thirdly, "high By Robert Jones

and exalted." I picture the throne with "the Lord" on it as elevated so that Isaiah had to raise his head to view it. Wow! Fourthly from verse one alone, we have "the train of his robe." OK, royal robe on the Lord. I imagine royal blue or purple with gold embroidery. Wow! Fifth, "filled the temple." The

train of that magnificent robe filled that large room. Wow! WOW!! <u>WOW!!!</u>

Let that image penetrate your thoughts for a moment. That is precisely what I do as I enter any church. I imagine God on an elevated throne in the front of the sanctuary. I want to meet God. Then I react as if it were as real as Isaiah experienced. The Creator God! Almighty Yahweh! The Holy One of Israel! Is it not simply breath-taking?

Verses 2 through 4 describe flying burning creatures, or *seraphim*. The Hebrew word *seraph* means to burn. Creatures that are aflame and are flying and are singing praises to God on the throne. Wow! So lusty was their singing that the

building shook and the temple filled with smoke. Imagine yourself there. God on a throne. High and exalted. Robe and long train. Flying burning creatures. Building shaking and filling with smoke. Wow! You are meeting <u>God!</u> How do you feel about this?

Verse 5 tells us how Isaiah reacted. "Woe is me! I am ruined! For I am a (Continued on page 8)

Prophecy Page

Damascus

By Wally Winner

Damascus is one of the chief battlegrounds in the raging Syrian civil war. It is not the first time that Damascus has hosted a siege, and it will not be the last time.

The LORD said, "Damascus will not be a city any longer; it will be only a pile of ruins." (Isaiah 17:1 GNB)

Here we are plainly told that Damascus, the capital of Syria, will one day be gone. Some say that this prophecy was partially fulfilled in 732 BC when the Assyrians conquered Damascus (Aram). It has been attacked, besieged, and conquered. But Damascus has never been completely destroyed and left uninhabited. Yet that is exactly what the Bible says will happen. The context of Isaiah 17 and Jeremiah 49 are a series of end times prophecies dealing with God's judgments on Israel's neighbors and enemies leading up to — and through — the tribulation.

On the contrary, Damascus is widely claimed to be the "oldest continuously inhabited city" in the world. According to the *Encyclopedia Britannica*: "Among ancient cities of the world, Damascus is perhaps the oldest continuously inhabited. Its name, Dimashq in Arabic ... derives from Dimashka, a word of pre-Semitic etymology, suggesting that the beginnings of Damascus go back to a time before recorded history."

In fact, the continued existence of Damascus today often appears on Bible skeptics' lists for reasons why the Bible is not true and cannot be trusted.

Jeremiah 49 confirms this fiery fate leaving Damascus abandoned. "The LORD says about Damascus: The towns of Hamath and Arpad have heard your bad news. They have lost hope, and worries roll over them like ocean waves. You people of Damascus have lost your courage, and in panic you turn to run, gripped by fear and pain. I once was pleased with your famous city. But now I warn you, "Escape while you still can!" Soon, even your best soldiers will lie dead in your streets. I, the LORD All-Powerful, have spoken. I will set fire to your city walls and burn down the fortresses King Benhadad built." (Jeremiah 49:23-27)

Amos may also predict end times fiery destruction in Syria. "Thus saith Jehovah: For three transgressions of Damascus, yea, for four, I will not turn away the punishment thereof; because they have threshed Gilead with threshing instruments of iron: but I will send a fire into the house of Hazael, and it shall devour the palaces of Benhadad. And I will break the bar of Damascus, and cut off the inhabitant from the valley of Aven, and him that holdeth the sceptre from the house of Eden; and the people of Syria shall go into captivity unto Kir, saith Jehovah." (Amos 1:3-5 ASV)

Today, the most likely way to make a major city become a burnt heap of ruins is, of course, from a nuclear blast.

Isaiah 17 later gives reason to suspect it is a nuclear bomb from Israel.

"Woe to the multitude of many people, which make a noise like the noise of the seas;
and to the rushing of nations, that make a rushing like the rushing of mighty waters!
The nations shall rush like the rushing of many waters: but God shall rebuke them, and
they shall flee far off, and shall be chased as the chaff of the mountains before the wind,
and like a rolling thing before the whirlwind. And behold at eveningtide trouble; and
before the morning he is not. This is the portion of them that spoil us, and the lot of them that rob us." (Isaiah 17:12-14)

From this passage, we learn other key things about this conflict

1. Part of a wider war ("many peoples...many nations")

2. Results from an attack on Israel

("plunder...ravage us")

3. Begins and is decided in a single night ("evening...morning")

Damascus may have one devastating prophecy left for our time.

I have been reading a lot of history books and articles lately preparing for my new class, B451-The Only True God. His son Tuntankhaten started his rule at eight, was led back into polytheism by the priests, overseers who had rebelled against his father. Tuntankhaten changed his name to Tutankhamun (note Aten to Amun ending). Amun-Ra was the chief god in the Egyptian pantheon. King Tut is known from archaeology for his golden mummy mask. I believe we are still in a similar battle. Has anything changed from Rom. 1? We still worship the creation rather than the creator, Yahweh El Shaddai. Think about it. "American Idols?"

The other strange historical thing I read about was the Rosetta Stone. Have you read the original message?!!? We see a language program advertised almost every day with the same name. But, what was the original (196 BC) Rosetta Stone about? Well, the subject matter was the praise, in three languages, of King Ptolemy V. Remember, the Greek general who took over Egypt after the death of Alexander the Great was Ptolemy. That one was known further as "Ptolemy I Soter." Soter means savior! Compare soteriology.

called in the Rosetta Stone, "the living image of Zeus, son of the Sun, …living-for-ever, …the ever living, the beloved of Ptah, the God Epiphanes Eucharistos, … being a god sprung from a god and goddess… has dedicated to the temples revenues in money and corn… ." Then this man, who was made a god, was called God Epiphanes Eucharistos (God of Manifest Grace/ Thanksgiving) 200 years before Jesus.

I believe what pagan Christianity did to Jesus in the creeds of man is clearly shown by the pagan thinking some hundreds of years before Christ was born. Christians, we need to get back to the word of God and "do not go beyond what is written" (I Cor. 4:6) in both theology and christology. "This is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent...." (Jn. 17:3) God said, "this is my beloved Son...." Jesus said, "I am the Son of God" Peter said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Forget Egyptian, Babylonian, Grecian, Roman, and modern myths, and stick to the word of God.

Great Leaders Balance Today's Tasks and Tomorrow's Dreams

One reader of this feature asked, "how do we avoid a sole focus on the upcoming Sunday so we are sure to plan and implement for the long term?"

Today's tasks. Tomorrow's dreams. As a leader, you know the tension between the two. Sometimes today's tasks drown out tomorrow's dreams. Sometimes tomorrow's dreams make today's tasks seem unimportant and inconsequential.

Some of the truth—if today's tasks are not completed well, we may never have the opportunity to live out tomorrow's dreams.

More of the truth—if tomorrow's dreams are not dreamed well, they will never impact today's tasks.

The good news is we don't have to choose BE-TWEEN today's tasks and tomorrow's dreams, we can choose to CONNECT them! In fact, that is clearly the best way to handle the tension between the two.

Ask boldly and listen carefully for God to give you a dream for tomorrow. Make sure the dream is not merely your dream. Proverbs 19: 21 says, "Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the LORD's purpose that prevails." Since God has "purposes," He certainly wants to communicate them to us and have us build our life, our church, etc. on them.

Finding that dream (purpose) for tomorrow not only gives God the opportunity to plant in us a godly dream for the future, but we are also building the "why" and the "how" for today's tasks. Dreams don't appear without hard work. Tomorrow's dream is what will ultimately bring importance and consequence to today's tasks.



When today's tasks seem dreary, remember the purpose, remember the dream. You will discover the dream can inspire the task. It isn't just a task, it is a building block toward achieving the dream!

It isn't just a Sunday morning service. It is part of building the future of the church. That makes it a very important task. Plan it well. Carry it out well. Enjoy the experience. It is part of building the dream. The dream that God gave.



Natural Church Development (NCD)

This feature in THE RES-TITUTION HERALD & Progress Journal highlights concepts from NCD. Rather than focus on a church's growth sta-

tistics, NCD is a tool designed to help a church focus attention and effort on its health.

Are Your Worship Services Inspiring?

This article is the fifth of eight articles offering an extended view into each of the eight quality characteristics of Natural Church Development. The fifth quality is Inspiring Worship Services.

Any church can (and should) have a worship experience. But not every church's worship experience is inspiring. Contrary to the popular belief of some, inspiration is not dependent on a specific worship style. What matters is not what happens on the outside (style, length, etc.), but what happens on the inside of each worshipper.

The key question is, "Is this worship service an inspiring experience for those who attend?" When the answer is "yes", folks have such a wonderful experience in worship they can't help but want to attend regularly. Do you feel that way about your worship experience? Do other folks in your church feel that way?

NCD measures four critical components for churches seeking to build and maintain inspiring worship services.

The first component asks, "Is worship bringing folks to personal transformation?" Do they both know and feel they are connecting with the God of the universe? Is worship so inspiring folks carrying its influence with them into their homes, schools, places of employment, neighborhoods, etc.? Have we figured out a good way to measure how well our worship service inspires folks for both the day of worship and for the rest of the week as well? The second component asks, "Is the worship experience welcoming to visitors?" Does our music style touch the hearts of folks currently attending? What about folks that attend as our guests? We can't meet the style preference of all folks, but are we reaching a specific group of folks? Do we do a good job of greeting our guests and helping them to feel "at home"? Do you help guests to easily find the nursery, bathrooms, etc.? Do you encourage new folks to connect to the church beyond worship via a small group, a ministry, etc.?

The third component asks, "Do folks in your church have great anticipation for worshipping together?" How do you evaluate whether or not folks look forward to your church's worship service? What do you do or say to encourage folks to anticipate worship? In what ways do you tell folks how important it is for them to be prepared to worship?

The fourth component asks, "Are the children of our worshippers well cared for while their parents participate in worship?" At what level are older children involved in the worship service? For the children that participate in worship, are they able to comprehend what is happening and willingly join in? For children not part of the worship service, how well do you provide for their Christian education and training in classes? For many parents, the degree to which they look forward to worship and participate in worship is directly related to how comfortable they are with the ministry that is being provided to their children in another part of the building.

My vision is to see churches of God all around the world evidencing the eight quality characteristics of NCD. I see healthy churches ministering well to members, friends, and entire communities, making an eternal difference in folks' lives.

man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, Yahweh Almighty." That about hits the nail on the head for the right reaction, don't you think? Indeed we're not worthy. That had better be our reaction. Do you feel that way in the presence of God? *Is* God in your sanctuary? *Do* you meet Him there? Don't you feel unworthy to be in His presence?

Isaiah felt like a filthy sinner. We should feel the same way. Then what? God offered something to Isaiah. With feet riveted to the floor as he witnessed this extraordinary scene, Isaiah watched as one of those flying burning creatures took a coal from the incense altar. (v. 6) "What's happening?" he must have thought. It flew closer and closer to him. "Oh, no!" The blazing hot coal touched Isaiah's mouth, and it said, "See, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for." (v. 7) Forgiveness is what God offered to Isaiah's feeling of unworthiness. Do you feel forgiveness when you meet God? He offers it to us as well.

Notice how all five of the senses are involved in this worship moment. Sight ("I saw God"), hearing ("Holy, holy, holy"), smell (smoke filling the room), taste (live coal touched his lips), and touch (hot coals and building shaking). Can you feel it? Isaiah met God on all of those levels. How often have you had all of your senses "touched" in a worship service? Wouldn't that be exciting? How can you make that happen? It will impact everyone in the service. They will want to come back for another Godmeeting.

But we're not done with this worship moment yet. We've had encountering God. We've had feelings of unworthiness and sin. We've had cleansing and forgiveness. "Now what do I do?" Isaiah may have thought. Verse 8 is one of the most familiar verses in the Old Testament. "Then I heard the voice of Yahweh saying, 'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I. Send me!"" Wow!

Isaiah may have thought, "God wants something done? And he's asking me? Wow!" OK, remember that there was no one else in the room except God and Isaiah when God asked this question. I believe Isaiah wasted no time, blurting out his answer at the top of his lungs. "Don't even look for someone else, God! I'm your guy. Send me!" Was he solemn and sedate? I don't think so. Filled with joy and energy from this exciting meeting with God. That's our Isaiah. God has a job for me! Little old me!! I want to get started right now! What an honor!

That's what happened to Isaiah. That's what *should* happen when you meet God in His house each week. God has a job for each and every one of us. He cleanses and purifies you for the task, then he asks (through the preacher's sermon and conclusion), "Whom shall I send?" How have you responded in the past? How will you now respond? "I'll do it, Lord. I'll do it!" Respond to the message and commission from God. Isaiah did.

Isaiah went to the temple, looking for comfort after the death of a very good king. He met God in the temple. Do you meet Him in your house of worship? How can you facilitate that happening? He experienced God on all levels. Do you experience God on all levels?

What happens when you meet God? Do you feel happy? Humble? In awe? Unworthy? Do you confess when you meet God? Are you still a sinner? Then confess, confess, and confess. We must do so. God then will not leave you hanging with those feelings. He will cleanse you, purifying you for the work He has in store for you to do.

Finally, God, through the words of your pastor, asks, "Whom shall I send?" Will you go out for Him? What will you say? With as much gusto as Isaiah? Don't look anywhere else, God. Send me!

Pastor Larry Mayberry of the Pennellwood Church of God, Grand Rapids, MI, and former president of the Ministerial Association of the Church of God, interviewed Pastor Rick Warren of the Saddleback Valley Community Church in Orange County, CA.

Richard Warren is the founding pastor of the Saddleback Valley Community Church, which is one of the fastest growing churches in America. Beginning with one family in 1980, the church has grown to over 3,000 in attendance during its first eight years, with a high attendance in 1988 of over 5,000.

Larry: Pastor Rick, with such a success story as Saddleback Valley Community Church, and all the attendant publicity and glamour, what would you want to communicate to pastors who feel discouraged because they are not experiencing success of such magnitude?

Rick: Well, I would say first of all, Galatians 6:4 is a key verse that says, "Each one should test his own actions. Then he can take pride in himself, without comparing himself to somebody else" (NIV).

I think that in this verse is really a great warning. I have talked to over 10,000 pastors in the last five years who have been through my seminar on church growth and planting.

One of the biggest mistakes guys

are making today is they are comparing themselves to others. There are two problems with that: 1) you'll always find somebody who is doing a better job than you, so you get discouraged; 2) you'll always find somebody who is not doing as well as you do, so you get full of pride. Either way you get in trouble. The Bible makes it very clear: we are not to compare ourselves.

I actually stopped reading our denominational annual about five years ago, because I was reading it one day and comparing how many baptisms had happened and God just smote me, saying, "I never told you to compare yourself to anybody else."

I believe the Bible says you can take legitimate satisfaction in what you do. One day God is not going to say, "Why weren't you more like Billy Graham, or Chuck Swindoll, or Rick Warren?" But he's going to say, "Why weren't you more like you?"

So discouragement comes when we start comparing ourselves, and the Bible says not to do that.

Larry: You are a church planter, and you specifically planned to be a church-planting pastor. Many Bible colleges and seminaries are beginning to put a lot of emphasis on the training of church planters. What of the man or woman who desires to be a pastor but does not feel he or she wants to be a church-planter pastor? What should the colleges and seminaries do with them? Are they of value to the ministry?

Rick: I think that the problem with a lot of colleges and seminaries is that they are training us to be ministers and not training us how to be leaders. There are very few courses on leadership. So they train us how to be chaplains, how to pray, baptize, serve the Lord's supper, counsel oneon-one. That training in the personal ministry will help a church grow to about 200 people. But, to grow a church beyond 200 members, you must learn other additional leadership skills like:

- Management of your time
- How to delegate the ministry to other people
- How to equip others to do what you yourself have been doing

There is a different set of problems in church planting compared to an established church. It's just which set of problems you want to live with.

In an established church, the problem is resistant leadership. In other words, members don't want to change, and they say, "We've always done it this way," or, "We've never done it that way." There's a resistant leadership.

In a new church the problem is the lack of leadership. There aren't any leaders because you're reaching out to non-Christians, and you don't have the years of experience that have been built up. It's just which set of prob-

(Continued from page 9) lems you want to live with.

So I think it takes a different type of temperament. Not everybody is called to be a churchplanter; not everybody is called to pastor an established church.

To be a pastor of an existing church takes a tremendous degree of patience, the willingness to put up with people's foibles and faults and to realize that change comes very slowly.

You must be willing to wait it out if you're going to pastor an existing church – to see change take place over a period of time.

Larry: So it takes a different type of person to be a planter from one whom goes to pastor an established church?

Rick: That's exactly right. It takes a different kind of temperament and qualifications and characteristics.

Larry: Then do you see two different types of training needed?

Rick: I think our schools need to be training both. We need to train not only for the existing church, but we also need to train for new churches. We need to train for what churches are going to be like 15 years from now.

My fear is that a lot of schools are training pastors for churches that aren't going to be in existence 15 years from now. **Larry:** If you could speak to every church congregation across America, what would you say to them about pastoral leadership and congregational followership?

Rick: Well, I would say that for a church to grow two things must happen: 1) the pastor must be willing to let the people assume the ministry; and 2) the people must be willing to let the pastor assume the leadership.

Now in most churches those roles are exactly reversed. They hire a pastor and say you do the entire ministry, the visiting, the counseling, all the caring, and we'll make all the decisions. As a result the ministry cannot grow beyond the ministry of that single man which is usually about 100 people. So the pastor actually becomes the bottle-neck.

Whereas in the Scripture, the Bible says, "the objective of the pastor is to equip the saints for the work of the ministry." So the members do the ministry, and the pastors are the equippers.

Here at Saddleback Valley Community Church we say, "The members are the ministers and the pastors are the administers." Leadership belongs in the hands of a few, and the ministry belongs in the hands of many.

Larry: With all the talk of burnout, breakdown, and monotony of ministry, what are

you doing to insure that this does not happen to you?

Rick: Well, I experienced burnout the very first year at our church. At the end of the first year we were running about 200 in attendance, I was working 18 hour days, the office was in my home, I was doing all the preaching, teaching, baptizing, caring, and visiting, and I just burned out.

The very last Sunday of 1980 I stood up in the pulpit, began speaking, and I started to faint, and I had to sit down. I was physically and emotionally exhausted. I had to take an entire month off, and I went through a period of deep, dark depression where I had to reevaluate. What were the causes of the burnout I was going through?

There was a long story behind all of that, but one of the lessons I learned is the value of pacing yourself. One of the verses that God gave me was when he told Joshua, "I'm not going to give you the land all at once, but I'm going to drive them out little by little – drive the giants out little by little so you can handle it."

I think that's pacing growth. Rome wasn't built in a day, and neither is the church. I say that "when God wants to make a mushroom, He takes six hours. When He wants to make an oak tree, He takes 60 years." The question is do you want to be a mushroom or an oak tree?

The whole idea is we're in it for the long haul. There are guys who are great starters in the ministry, but they flame out. I'm not impressed with great starts. I'm impressed with consistency. I planted this church when I was 26 years old, and I anticipated a 40-year ministry in one church. So when you take the long haul, you are more apt to look at a pacing thing, not trying to accomplish it all overnight. There's a verse from Proverbs in the Living Bible that says, "A relaxed attitude lengthens a man's life."

I think part of that involves obeying one of the Ten Commandments that says, "Six days you labor and on the seventh day you rest." Now for a pastor Sunday is not a day of rest. So if you're not taking a day off, you're breaking one of the Ten Commandments.

So I think balance is the key to avoiding burnout. You must develop other interests, hobbies, keep in physical shape, try to eat the right things, and develop some close friendships.

Luke 2:52 says Jesus increased in wisdom and stature and favor with God and men. Intellectual, physical, spiritual, and social growth must be kept in balance.

I have found that in the ministry you can either be a workaholic or the laziest person. You can go to either extreme. I have a little formula that I use to keep balance: "You divert daily; take time with your family. Withdraw weekly; take a day off. Abandon annually; take a vacation."

Larry: For the last question. In terms of advice to fellow pastors, what do you intend to do until the Lord comes?

Rick: Larry, I think my greatest advice to pastors would be: "growing churches requires growing pastors." The moment I stop growing, the church stops growing. Imagine a balance of scales in your mind. On one hand you have your personal life. On the other hand you have your profes-

sional life. Those two must be kept in balance. The moment you overemphasize the professional life to the neglect of your personal life, you are in trouble. That's where stress comes. So I think the key is to continually be growing, learning, reading, asking questions, attending seminars, listening to tapes. If you don't keep feeding yourself, you're going to dry up from all the giving out and giving away that pastors must be involved in. I am constantly trying to teach myself to stay sharp.

There is a verse in Ecclesiastes that is one of my life verses: "If the axe is dull and its edge unsharpened, more strength is needed but skill will bring success" (10:10, NIV). What that says is work smarter, not harder. If you're skilled at what you do, it doesn't take much energy. I have seen a lot of guys dedicated in the ministry, but they're unskilled. They are working with a dull axe. It takes more time, energy, and effort to get the same or fewer results. If we learn to sharpen our skills, than we will have less stress and more success.

Korean Extension Update

o the members of the Church of God General Conference,

On behalf of the Korean Extension, I wish all the members a happy and joyous 2013 and extend many thanks and blessings to all for your prayers and support for the Korean ministry.

Since the inception of the Korean Extension, we have awarded 52 Bachelor of Theology and three Associate of Theology degrees. A number of the graduates have traveled back to South Korea to apply the knowledge they received through the Korean Extension program, so they can further their ministries. Currently two graduates are in the process of planting churches. Meanwhile others are involved in Christian ministries in their home churches.

In the previous semester (Fall 2012) eight students completed the program successfully and returned to South Korea. Aside from the graduates, a few students were unable to meet the financial demands to continue their studies and also returned home. However, we have enrolled 14 new students seeking to learn the truth. Among the new students, more than half are young Korean students who display a strong desire to know Christ. We thank God for providing us with the opportunity to make an impact in the students' lives. Moreover, two Korean Extension staff members (Young Hee An and Yeong Beom Kim) have also departed to South Korea temporarily as a result of immigration procedures during the summer. Recently, Yeong Beom Kim was preparing to return to the United States to continue his role with the Korean Extension, but his father, who is senior pastor at Yeong Beom's home church, has fallen ill, and he has been unable to continue serving the church. In the meantime, Yeong Beom has occupied the position as senior pastor until his father recovers.

We also are excited to share some good news. Two new staff members have joined the Korean Extension team Jin Suk Park and Mi Sun Park (no relation). Jin Suk is an active student who is currently fulfilling the role of receptionist for the Korean Extension, and Mi Sun Park will facilitate the "Church and Personal Finance" class.

Again, I thank you for all the support you have provided and please continue to pray for the Korean ministry as we start the Spring 2013 semester.

A Teenage Testimony

f someone were to come up to you and ask you why you believed in God, and why Jesus was your Savior, what would you tell him or her? I've always been told to have my testimony in mind, so that if asked, I can give an answer and not be stumped. Do you want to know why I believe? I'll tell you. Growing up, I'd always assumed I was a Christian. In fact, I assumed everyone knew about God, and that everyone loved Jesus. My family didn't go to church every Sunday, nor did we go on Wednesdays. In fact, we only went on Easter. And that was the only time we ever went to

when my parents decided we would go. But, like I said, we rarely went. I didn't really understand religion. I mean, after all, I was a child. I didn't know what it meant to accept Jesus into your heart as your savior. I knew the Easter story, the Christmas story, but I didn't know what they meant. And I wouldn't know how much they meant to me until later. You see, when I was in the fourth grade, my parents got a divorce.

At first, my dad visited me like the visitation said he was supposed to. But that only went on for about a month, and it slowly stopped. He kept making up excuses. "It's too far, and I can't pay for gas." Or "I'm sorry, I have to work, so I can't." Or my personal favorite; " (My new sweetheart) and I have something to do this weekend. I'm sorry, Punkin." It hurt a lot. I felt abandoned, like I didn't have a father anymore. To be honest with you all, I was incredibly upset. I got depressed. I wasn't really a child anymore at this point. I was worrying about grown-up things. Trying to figure out ways I could see my dad. It never really worked, and then, all of the sudden, I never saw my dad any more.

This was when I really felt alone. I didn't understand. I'd ask God why my dad had to leave. Why my dad didn't want me anymore. What had I done to deserve all of this? Why would he leave me without a dad? But then I realized that he hadn't. Look at Romans 8:15. It says, "So you have not received a spirit that makes you fearful slaves. Instead, you received God's Spirit when he adopted you as his own children. Now we call him, 'Abba, Father.'" I realized that God didn't leave me fatherless, but adopted me as His own child. If anything, I am His daughter more than I am the daughter of my earthly father. And though my earthly father tries and fails at being there for me, I can always count on God to be my father and to give me the love that I greatly need.

Don't misunderstand; I do love my dad very much. But I know that he can't always be here for me, and he's not always what I need. God is the father I need the most, the one that I can always count on. Once I knew this, my faith had been strengthened. It took me almost three years to realize it, but I wasn't alone. My parents' divorce happened for a reason. My dad stopped being able to see me for a reason. So that I could have the opportunity to know God the way He wants me to know Him and to strengthen our relationship. He's saved my life plenty of times, and He's protected me, been there for me, shown me the way and answered my prayers. Not always in the way I expected a majority of the time.

It may take a while to notice it, but God is there in everything we do. His name is written on every aspect of our lives, and the evidence is real. It's there. And I am so thankful for the way things have turned out. And I am glad to be a part of this church. Thank you.

Verses to Live By

"God...now commandeth all men...to repent:

Because he hath appointed a day, in the which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained, whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead. And when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked."

Acts 17:30-32 KJ

Paul, in this place, spoke to the philosophers on Mars Hill of Christ's resurrection from the dead, and how this important teaching will affect God's day of judgment and, in addition, how it will affect our own resurrection (Rom. 6:5; John 14:19).

God wants all men to know that a judgment day is coming when all men will be judged according to their faith and works. He has given all men <u>assurance</u> of this, that a judgment is coming <u>by raising Christ from death to be the</u> judge of the living and the dead at that day.

One of the African mission tracts that all the pastors there have is called: The Importance of Christ's Resurrection. God has gone to great lengths in the Bible to make sure we all know that HE RAISED THE MESSIAH JESUS FROM THE DEAD. It is part of the gospel message for our salvation. It is important.

Emphasis is put on the number of people who saw Christ alive after He died on the cross for our sins. "He appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. After that He appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time...to James, then to all the apostles; and last of all...He appeared to me (Paul) also" (1 Cor. 15:1-8). He appeared first to Mary Magdalene, then to the two on the road to Emmaus, then to all the apostles, even to Thomas (Mark 16; John 20).

Why is all this recorded for us to read? Because God's resurrection of His Son from the dead is one of the great Bible truths we are to believe. "By faith are we saved." It is absolutely necessary for salvation. One question asked to every candidate for baptism is, "Do you believe Christ rose from the dead?" It proved He is alive and now is immortal.

It proved that "because I live, you shall live also" (John 14:19.)

It guarantees the resurrection to eternal life of every one of His people, when He comes the second time! It is the hope we have that our dead loved ones will have life forever in God's kingdom Christ will establish here on earth!

He was raised to fulfill Old Testament prophecies that God had given to Israel that Messiah would suffer and die and live again. He would not remain dead. Christ brought this out very plainly to the two going to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-31). After He died, He would "enter into His glory."

If Christ had not been raised, we would have no mediator with God in heaven; no one to beseech God to have mercy on us. This is His third work for God and us: prophet, priest, king. We now have a priest like Melchizedek who has passed into the heavens to mediate for us with Almighty God!! How wonderful that is!!!

If He had not been raised, He would not have ascended into heaven—the only man who has done that (Psa. 110:1). His ascension fulfilled that prophecy. God did not promise this to any of the angels (Heb. 1). He had to ascend before He could descend.

Another great thing about God raising Him from the grave is that God was then able to send the Comforter, the Holy Spirit to us to help us, to teach us, to strengthen us in the spiritual things (John 14:16-18, 23-26). Paul said, "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ, He is none of his" (Rom. 8:9). It is this Spirit that came to believers when Christ ascended that makes us alive spiritually and enables us overcome the temptations of life (vs. 10-14). Without that Spirit of God and of Christ we would be helpless. We cannot defeat sin by our own pitiful strength. This Holy Spirit is available to every Christian when he/she is baptized (Acts 2:38-39). We must live by it to be God's people. It was given for us when Christ ascended. He prayed to His Father to bless us with that Spirit of God.

Also, because He lives, if we ask anything in prayer in His name, He "will do it" (John 14:14).

Conclusion

- If Jesus was not raised, our faith is vain, we are still in our sins.
- If Jesus was not raised, He would not have ascended to God's right hand.
- No Comforter would have come.
- We would have no high priest to intercede for us.
- There would be no hope of resurrection for us.
- There would be no king for God's coming kingdom.
- There would be no judgment day.

But, HE LIVES! God raised Him back to life—eternal life. We have hope! Is the resurrection of Christ important to you? Where will you stand in the judgment?



Always On

A sermon from Christian Workers' Seminar 2013

I have my new phone. Many are getting their "smart phones" and "turning on." I had to turn my sound off at night due to calls from our African contacts in the middle of the night at the strangest hours. We are seven to nine hours before them. Noon there is three or four in the morning here. The phone is always on, but the sound is off so that Rebekah and I can get some sleep.

The Pew Research Center's Internet and American Life Project recently surveyed young people of the current generation. Researchers asked over a 1,000 technology people to review how "Generation AO, or Generation Always-On" will deal with information in the future. With the new devices always on, what will the next generation do? Research suggests the next generation will do great in "multi-tasking" but may be weak in the area of patience if they don't get the info right away!

I know twenty years ago, our living room was as dark as dark could be at night. Now, little lights from the television, stereo, phones, microwave, satellite, DVD recorder, CD player are blinking at me, "READY when you are!"

(A one-man skit in the middle of the sermon) Ring goes the phone! Hi, Rebekah. Where are you? You're in the Christian Worker's Seminar hotel parking lot? Well, I was starting the sermon and thought you might have an

emergency. You have four more boxes from Carol Ring to fit in the van? Well, we are taking Don and Marj back to the airport and I don't know how we can fit more stuff in. You want to put Marj on top of the van? I guess we could duct tape more things on top, but not Marj. You say Joe James wants to sing a song for communion? Has he talked to Paul Shaw? Rebekah, I can't handle this right now, I'm in the middle of a sermon! Always on.



I need you to know, more than anything else, GOD is Always On! In Psalm 121:1-4 it says:

"I will lift up my eyes to the mountains; From where shall my help come? My help comes from the LORD, Who made heaven and earth. He will not allow your foot to slip; He who keeps you will not slumber. Behold, He who keeps Israel Will neither slumber nor sleep!

The LORD God, Abba YHWH, neither slumbers nor sleeps. Our God has By Dr. Joe Martin

promised His presence with those who seek Him. In Psalm 46:1 we read, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." He is AO, Always On.

With the exalted Lord Jesus, who is at the right hand of God, he too now is AO, Always On, I believe. In Matt. 28:20 He promises, "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Over twenty times the New Testament references Jesus at the right hand of Almighty God, as foretold in Psalm 110:1. Acts 2:33 says He receives from the Father the Holy Spirit and pours it out on us.

In whom do we trust? Whom do we rely on? Job said it best in Job 19:25, 26 "As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last He will take His stand on the earth. Even after my skin is destroyed, yet from my flesh I shall see God!" Our God is Always On and now working through His Son, to be with the church as a body.

Many events in my life have shown me that God is always on. Once, about 1970, while taking a trip for Christmas from Oregon Bible College to Louisiana for Christmas, we ran into black ice, just out of St. Louis. Prophecy Page

All of this makes us even more certain that what the prophets said is true. So you should pay close attention to their message, as you would to a lamp shining in some dark place. 2 Pet. 1:19

The decisions we make today will affect our future and also our eternity. Making the right decision is crucial, and before you make the right decision, you are faced with choices, preferences, pressures, and temptations. As much as possible, we should premeditate our reactions to specific temptations.

This becomes increasingly important when we consider the prophetic events of the culmination of this age. The word "quickly" (Revelation 22:7, 12, 20) often carries the meaning "swiftly, speedily, at a rapid rate." Hence, the term could simply indicate that when the predicted events first start to occur, they will progress swiftly, in rapid succession.

If they are happening in "rapid succession", it will be difficult to make a number of eternal decisions when logic would seem to say "this makes sense" or "this really is a good thing."

Consider this case in point.

Cattle farmers for a number of years have been placing chips into livestock to prevent rustling. The chips can be tracked by GPS and will show up in a scan at processing plant. It has proven itself successful. The United States Department of Agriculture wants to expand it.

The federal government has launched a new livestock identification program to help agriculture officials to quickly track livestock in cases of disease.

It is the USDA's second attempt at implementing such a system, which officials say is critical to maintaining the security of the nation's food supply. An earlier voluntary program failed because of widespread opposition among farmers and ranchers who described it as a costly hassle that didn't help control disease.

There has been talk for years among consumer advocates about establishing a program that would trace food from farm to plate. The livestock identification system doesn't go that far and isn't meant to. Its main goal is to track animals' movements so agriculture and health officials can quickly establish quarantines and take other steps to prevent the spread of disease.

Michael Doyle, director of the University of Georgia's Center for Food Safety, said livestock identification also helps investigators determine the source of disease - and whether it happened naturally or someone tampered with the food system. This is very logical. It is done for our safety. Carry this on to the next step.

Today, when a child is born in a hospital, a bracelet is placed on their wrist that identifies that child with the mother's (and father's) wrist bracelets. This is a safety device. The infant can't leave the hospital without activating a security system. It is meant to keep someone from abducting the baby. This is a good thing.

The next logical step is the implanting of a computer chip the size of a grain of rice immediately when a child is born to protect them all their life. It could contain all pertinent health and personal information. It would be undated throughout a person's lifetime.

If you were found unconscious, the chip would give emergency responders your name, address, person to call, health information, etc. It could have GPS tracking so it would be difficult to kidnap anyone because authorities could find your location. All this sounds like a very good system. What if you could swipe that chip at a checkout counter to pay for your purchases? It would be an implanted debit card.

The chip is already available. An individual national identification process (first with a card, but that would not be durable enough and gets lost) has been discussed for several years and may be attached to an immigration bill that presently is being considered by Congress.

All people were forced to put a mark on their right hand or forehead. Whether they were powerful or weak, rich or poor, free people or slaves, they all had to have this mark, or else they could not buy or sell anything. This mark stood for the name of the beast and for the number of its name. Rev. 13:16, 17 CEV

Now might be a good time to consider how you will respond.

At General Conference we will be electing two (2) directors for the board of directors. The terms of Carrie Briggs and Joe Myers expire this year. Neither of them may be nominated. Currently we have one (1) nominee. Two additional nominees will be required. Article IV of the constitution directs the process for nominating and electing directors.

ARTICLE IV

Officers of the Conference

Section 1. Seven directors shall be elected in General Conference delegate sessions; said directors shall constitute the Board of Directors of the College/Conference. The Board of Directors shall organize by the election of necessary officers at the first meeting following each annual conference election. These officers shall be a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and treasurer, and three board members. The term of office of a director shall begin at the close of the conference in which said director is elected.

Section 2. No elected director shall be a paid employee of the college/conference for a period longer than two months in any one year.

Section 3. The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of church leaders. A director may be either male or female.

Section 4. Nominations for the Board of Directors of the college/conference may be submitted by: state or district conference boards of the Church of God; churches that are members of the General Conference; Ministerial Association of the Church of God General Conference. Name(s) of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/ General Conference by May 1 and will be printed in the General Conference issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL.

Section 5. Nominations printed in the PROGRESS JOURNAL will be brought to the floor of the busi-

ness session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor; and shall not be closed with fewer than one more nomination than the number of directorships.

Section 6. Nominations shall be made from the floor, but voting shall be done by ballot, and no nominee shall be elected unless he/she receives a majority of the votes cast. The total list of all nominees shall be submitted to the delegates for election. If no majority is reached in the first balloting, the list of nominees shall be reduced to the three receiving the highest number of votes. When no majority is reached with the list of three nominees, the one receiving the fewest votes shall be removed from the list. Of the two remaining nominees, the one receiving the majority of votes is elected. If other directors are to be elected, all names, except the one(s) previously elected, shall be resubmitted, and the same election process repeated until all positions are filled.

Section 7. The term of office for all college/ conference directors shall be for four years. No director shall succeed himself/herself for a second term.

Section 8. Any director who may become inactive through sickness, resignation, prolonged absence, or death, shall be replaced for the unexpired term by election at the next annual conference. Temporary appointment of such directors may be made by the Board of Directors.

Recommendation One:

Delegate Representation of Isolated Members Presented by the Board of Directors

We recommend that a Conference of Isolated Members be established to give isolated Church of God members representation and a vote at the annual summer conference. A delegate and alternate will be selected by the isolated members, procedure for nomination and selection to be established by former board member Dan Siderius and David Krogh no later than January 1, 2014. An

isolated member will be defined as a person who subscribes to the doctrinal statement contained in the By-Laws of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, McDonough, GA; who is not currently an active member of a Church of God congregation; and who does not live within a reasonable driving distance of a Church of God.

Explanation:

Many Church of God members find themselves living in an area where no Church of God congregation exists. However, many still have an interest in the work of the conference and college and many are generous supporters of our ministry. The first Church of God Isolated Member Ministry was formed by a group that met in Blair, NE on May 27, 1912. When the General Conference was organized in 1921, there was no provision made for representation or a vote at the annual conference. This recommendation will formally recognize the legitimacy of forming an Isolated Member Conference with the same representation and voting rights given by the constitution to state/ district conferences.

Recommendation Two:

Establishment of an Academic Advisory Committee for Atlanta Bible College Presented by the Board of Directors

We recommend that an Academic Advisory Committee be selected to work with the Board of Directors and the staff in curriculum review and development, maintaining high academic standards, advising on educational methods, and student issues. The committee will be composed of seven members selected according to the following requirements: 1. all members must be affiliated with member churches of the conference; 2. will include the president of ABC and the vice president of ABC-KE, a member of the board of directors appointed by the board, and two members selected by the Ministerial Association to serve four-year terms; and two additional non-board members selected by the board of directors for four-year terms; 3. Terms of members will be staggered to prevent mass turnover in any single year; 4. No more than four members of the com

mittee will be individuals whose sole higher education was experienced at Oregon Bible College or Atlanta Bible College; 5. Upon expiration of his/her term of service, a committee member may be reappointed.

The committee will meet once per year in person unless there is an emergency situation as determined by the president of ABC. It is proposed that the annual meeting be held in conjunction with the annual General Conference. Additional meetings shall be conducted by phone, videoconference, or email. This committee will report to the Board of Directors through the president of ABC concerning any reports requested of, or required by, the committee. The Academic Advisory Committee will develop its own operating protocols regarding meeting format, documentation of meetings, and distribution of oversight activities.

Explanation:

In the past, our Bible College has benefited from a "Board of Education" and more recently by a "Higher Education Advisory Committee." In 2003, the Advisory Committee was phased out. Because of the expansion of Atlanta Bible College with the Korean Extension and an extensive distance learning program, it seems prudent to seek the advice and counsel of individuals with an interest and expertise in equipping persons for ministry in the best possible educational environment. With a limited staff and a Board of Directors charged with many oversight activities, the ability to do research and development of our programs will be enhanced with additional individuals focusing on the work of this important part of our General Conference ministry.

Board Nominations:

Dan Knowlton of Walkerton, Indiana has agreed to be nominated for a position on the Board of Directors. Information about the nominee will be e-mailed to the membership prior to conference along with the names of any other candidates who are nominated prior to conference. Nominations can also be made from the floor at conference. Nominations will be made on Thursday, July 11, and the election will be held on Friday, July 12.



The Restitution / Apokatastasis Of All Things

By Dr. Joe Martin

t is good to be with you at the 93rd General Conference. Wow, ninety-three years is a long time! The theme for this week is R³ - Revelation, Renewal, and Restitution. I want to take a moment to thank the churches in the area for the great program. I also want to thank the speakers leading up to tonight our final night together. Many people have put in lots of time to make this happen. Thank you!

My history with the area goes back over forty years. On our honeymoon, we stopped at the Duncan's in North Carolina, Z.B.'s famous quote to Rebekah was, "Does your daddy know you're married?" He even called to check with Jim Mattison to make sure if I remember correctly. A year later, we also spent time in South Carolina with Loie and Martha Jones and slept in their house. The Huffers are also long time family friends. I want to thank Myra for putting up the slides for the message. Lots of family and stories.

The title of the message is simply RESTITUTION, which is part of the title of our conference magazine, **"The Restitution Herald!"** The key New Testament passage is Acts 3:11-21 where Peter is explaining God's plan based on Jesus and the healing of the lame man. In verse 19 Peter tells them to "repent and return, so that your sins may be wiped away, in order that times of refreshing may come...." Later he speaks that God would "... send Jesus, the Christ appointed for you, whom heaven must receive until the times of restitution of all things...." (vv 20, 21). The Prince, Jesus, is sitting at the right hand of God... until the time of RESTITU-TION!



A new heaven and a new earth is coming!

The Greek for "restitution" is "*apokatastasis*." It can be broken down into three words, "*apo*," which generally is "from" in Greek, "*kata*," which is "according to," and "*stasis*," or state of being. One dictionary definition is "a legal action serving to cause restoration of a previous state." A literal rendering may be restoring according to the original state. I would like to suggest our original state is found in Genesis 1-2.

But before we go there, there are examples of restitution given in Exodus 22. In verse 3, if a thief steals, he must make restitution. In verse 5, if a field or vineyard is destroyed by someone's loose animal, restitution must be made. If someone starts a fire and it

burns grain in a field,

"...he who started the fire shall surely make restitution." (NASB) In verse 12, if an animal is left in the custody of someone and the animal is stolen from him, "... he shall make restitution to its owner." All of these examples represent returning, as much as possible, to the original state or situation.

In Genesis one, God sees what was created and notes that it is good. This is said six times in

verses 4, 10, 12, 18, 21 and 25. Good, good, good, good, good, good, and then the ultimate "very good" in verse 31. The Hebrew is "*tov mayod*!" Like an old song, "We had it all, just like Bogey and Bacall, starring in our own

Bank on a Stormy Jordan

Almost as redundant as saying "honest truth" is predicting another Arab insurgence.

While other conflicts are drawing attention, Jordan's government, now headed by King Abdullah II, may soon fall in a way similar to the government of Egypt. Abdullah, of the Hashemite family, has the distinction in the Arab world of being the direct descendant of Mohammed.

Vulnerable minorities are the typical victims in most countries. This is not the case in Jordan where a Palestinian majority has been discriminated against. Palestinians make up two thirds of Jordan's population. Palestinians make up the majority of the population of Jordan's two largest cities.

Palestinians pay heavy taxes; they receive close to zero state benefits; they are almost completely shut out of government jobs, and they have very little, if any, political representation.

How long will the Palestinian majority wait before they revolt against Abdullah? Will they then turn their attention toward Israel? If they do, it will be a foolhardy decision.

The Bible makes no reference to a national entity by the name of Jordan. The British and French victors of the first world war divided the Middle East as the spoils of the Ottoman Empire, which had sided with the Germans, creating the nations of Jordan, Iraq, Syria, Lebanon and others.

Biblically that land is known as Ammon, Moab and Edom, and is of great significance in Bible prophecy. The Ammonites and Moabites were the children born of incest by Lot and his daughters, after they fled Sodom and Gomorrah. Edom is the land given by God to Esau and his seed. Traditionally these three nations, though related to Israel, have been her enemies.

"For in a night Ar of Moab has become waste, and is seen no longer; for in a night Kir of Moab has become waste, and is seen no longer. The waters of Nimrim will become dry: for the grass is burned up, the young grass is coming to an end, every green thing is dead." (Isaiah 15:1, 6 BBE)

There is no historical record of the fulfillment of this prophecy. The interesting thing that may tie it to the coming war is that it again mentions destruction in a single night like Isaiah 17. And again the associated desolation of the land and vegetation is consistent with nuclear blasts.

"How are the things of Esau searched out! How are his secret stores looked for! All the men who were united with you have been false to you, driving you out to the edge of the land: the men who were at peace with you have overcome you; they have taken their heritage in your place. Will I not, in that day, says the Lord, take away the wise men out of Edom, and wisdom out of the mountain of Esau? And your men of war, O Teman, will be overcome with fear, so that every one of them may be cut off from the mountain of Esau.

"The children of Jacob will be a fire and those of Joseph a flame, and the children of Esau dry stems of grass, burned up by them till all is gone: and there will be no people living in Esau; for the Lord has said it." (Obadiah 5-9, 17-18 BBE)

Obadiah says Jacob will dispossess Jordan's land after burning them like stubble. Jacob is the original name of Israel.

"This is what the Lord has said: ... My hand will be stretched out against Edom, cutting off from it man and beast: and I will make it waste, from Teman even as far as Dedan they will be put to the sword... and I will take Edom in hand in my wrath and in my passion: ...says the Lord." (Ezekiel 25:12-14 BBE)

"And I will make Mount Seir a cause for wonder and a waste, cutting off from it all comings and goings...I will make you waste for ever, and your towns will be unpeopled: and you will be certain that I am the Lord." (Ezekiel 35:7, 9 BBE)

Ammon, Moab and Edom are all featured in the doomed Psalm 83 war, referred to as "the children of Lot" and "Edom".

How long before these prophecies against Jordan are fulfilled?

he General Conference this July was a tremendous blessing! We thank the churches of the area for great hospitality! See the report in this issue. For my report, I will summarize several things going on and also some aspects of the reports given to the board in the meetings in South Carolina.

In my report, I noted that our Africa mission work is a blessing. Rebekah and I just got back June 30, and we both went to work the following week. We visited Kenya, Malawi and Mozambique. All are exciting opportunities. LHI, Lord's Harvest International, our mission committee, is overseeing the building of three church buildings in

In terms of the CAO report to the board, I noted the blessings from the first half of this year, the Pastors and Spouses Retreat, the 40th Christian Worker's Seminar, a great ABC-Invitational for prospective students, and a prophecy conference for the Arkansas churches. I am



still trying to get to the churches or a conference at least once a month beside my teaching and administrative duties. As well, the Theological Conference was one of the best.

In terms of leadership, I recalled for the board Numbers 9:21, 22 where when the pillar of cloud or fire moved, the people moved. As we try to ascertain God's will in various situations, we should try to imitate them to the

point it says "At YHWH's command they pitched camp, at YHWH's command they set out, ...they kept the LORD's command." (NJB) Of course we don't have a pillar of cloud or fire, but we need to be in continual prayer for the LORD's leading. "Perilous times will come..." (2 Tim 3:1), and this should not be misunderstood in any sense. Sometimes with all the political and moral issues, what part of this do we not expect? Yet, "those who know their God will be strong and take action."(Daniel 11:32)

Several have responded to the ad in the Herald about future working with the college and conference. We "have our feet in the Jordan" and are watching the pillar of cloud and fire for God's further direction.

At this point, mid-July, we are asking for special prayer for the recertification with INS for our international students. This is a two-step process, and bureaucracy sometimes runs slowly. We ask for prayer for those processing our requests and that God would intervene to allow this to happen before the deadlines in August.

Please also pray for the Burnham family. Bill has been in hospice care and on a feeding tube and requires a lot of attention. At this time, Marion, who has osteoporosis, is also having extreme issues with her back. Gary and Lori are spending lots of time trying to help them.

Proverbs 19:21 says "Many are the plans in a man's heart, but the counsel of the LORD/YHWH will stand." To me, this is the essence of the vision statement, "To Join God...." We plan, we work, but within the LORD's counsel.

Evening Service at Conference

The 93rd annual summer General Conference was held at the Guthrie Grove Church of God in Pelzer, SC. 79 delegates consisting of 5 directors, 42 church/conference delegates, and 32 pastors conducted the business of the conference. 140 were registered for the conference, and more than 100 others attended evening services and the Low Country Boil at the beginning of the conference. The church was packed with delegates and visitors Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights. The theme was Revolution - R³ (R cubed): Revela-

tion, Renewal, and Restitution. Evening sermons by Pastors Wally Winner and Seth Ross, and Dr. Joe Martin; and morning worship speakers Pastor Michael Montgomery and Paul Duncan presented the theme. Many workshops on a variety of topics were presented.

Chris James of the Guthrie Grove Church and Dan Knowlton of the North Salem Church in Plymouth, IN were elected to four-year terms on the board of directors. A plaque of appreciation was presented to Carrie Briggs by Dr. Martin, and a plaque will be sent to Joe Myers who was unable to be present for the conference. The new board elected officers for the coming year. Greg Demmitt will serve as chairperson; Bob Morrison, vice chairperson; Alan Cain, secretary; Rick McClain, treasurer. Africa 2013

Our trip to Africa this year was a tremendous bless- after we left, ing! We visited three countries: Kenya, Malawi, and Mozambique. In Kenya, the work is fairly young, so we focused on teaching and encouraging those who already grasp the truths of the Bible, as well as teaching key leaders who are interested in biblical truth. In Malawi and Mozambique our focus was on teaching pastors and getting to know them better.

The team members this year were Joe and Rebekah Martin and Jack Kmiecik. Bethany Reise was planning to go, but was unable to due to sickness. In Kenya we taught at three places, Webuye to the northwest, Kisii in the west close to Lake Victoria, and then in Kilgoris, in the southwest area. At Kisii, we taught for two days and had 18 present who are interested in our faith. Many well thoughtout questions were asked by the attendees, which we answered. The work is growing, and many are coming to the truth. It is exciting to see this!

In Malawi, we went to seven churches to mainly teach pastors, but on Sundays, the

Linda Limbe-Nkomba was a tremendous blessing. She allowed us to use her truck, and traveled around with us everywhere the entire three weeks we were there. She was our main translator, and it was fun to have her travel with us. The scenery in these countries is beautiful!

At each place in Malawi there were generally 12-20 pastors and associates for the detailed teaching. We taught one God, Jesus as the Son of God, the kingdom of God, resurrection, etc. We always tried to have a question-and-answer period afterwards. The teachings were well-received, and some good questions were brought up. Quite often the chiefs of the village showed up for the teaching as well.

The roads are generally dirt roads that haven't seen a road grader in quite some time. The ride is usually bumpy and dusty, or muddy and slippery. We usually travelled at least two hours each direction to get to and from the church, besides teaching for several hours. This led to very long days, which was very tiring physically. Next time we will plan more 'rest' days.

We did go to the game preserve one day, which was awesome! We saw a total of probably 60 elephants, many with newborn babies! We also saw lots of hippos, crocodiles, impala, monkeys, wart hogs, iguanas, and many other things. God is so creative in all of His creation!!! I often wonder how did He think of all this?!

In Mozambique we also went to seven churches. The longest was four hours from our hotel. It was a 12-hour day!!! And we shortened the teaching some to get back before too late. It's not safe to travel after dark in these countries for several reasons: bad roads, stopped vehicles w/o lights, many people walking on the road at all hours, etc. Did you know there are <u>no</u> paved roads to any of our churches in Mozambique??? Not only are they not paved, they're all like wash boards with huge rocks we constantly have to dodge!

The Mozambique pastors seem to have good working relationships, and their numbers are larger. They have over two hundred churches or prayer houses (sometimes with elders leading in the prayer houses). In both Malawi and Mozambique, we tried to visit the new buildings that were constructed last year. They are doing a great job. Thanks to all who contributed to those.

We left money for three bicycles and three church buildings in both Malawi and Mozambique. The board members determine which pastors need them most, and they are the ones to receive them. The churches being built in Malawi are Pastor Laston Nambwale's church; Chipanje Church; and Kapsepsye (sounds a little like KaPepsi) Church. The church buildings to be built in Mozambique are: Nanguluee, Chidyanyama, and Mongeve.

We took a picture of each of the pastors that were able to attend the pastor's conferences in Malawi and Mozambique. We plan to make a directory for ourselves with the pastor's name under his picture, as well as to make ID cards to give each of them.

Jack is a 'natural' in the mission field and did a great job with everything! He's an excellent teacher, very adaptable to every situation, good personality, and easy going. Our motto over there is 'expect the unexpected.' When plans are changed, and we find out at the last minute, (which happens several times a day) we've learned to just accept it and say TIA (this is Africa!).

Thanks also for the prayers for safety and health! We did have a flat tire on the way to one service in Malawi; the spare was flat also, but we eventually made it to the service. Also, after the entire time of traveling in Malawi and Mozambique, after Linda dropped us off at the hotel, the brakes went out on the truck! We had them fixed the next day. If they had gone out on one of those roads or mountains, it could have been bad. God's presence was evident throughout the trip! We praise Him and stand in awe of His greatness!

Did you know that in African countries our flights have to be re-confirmed 72 hours before travel? If not, even though it's paid for and we have seat assignments, we're cancelled off the flight. This has happened more than once, so we're diligent about reconfirming now that we know we have to. Luckily, we've been put back (Continued from page 9)

on without anyone having to stay behind, once we've reconfirmed.

In each country we bought Bibles (in Swahili or Chichewa) to give at each place, and in Malawi and Mozambique we also gave out Words of Truth booklets printed in Chichewa. We gave out a total of back home! 200 Bibles for a total cost of \$1500. Thank you so much for your support for getting God's Word to the ciate the conpeople!

For health, Rebekah had a cold and bad cough when we got to Malawi. Jack got sick for a 24-hour period. He may have picked up a parasite, or maybe had the flu. We ate lunch quite a few times with the pastors in the villages-not always the standards we're used to, so he may have got something from that, or maybe from the cassava he peeled and ate. Joe kept a spoon in his pocket for when we ate in the villages, and didn't have stomach problems. The last few days, he caught a cold, and on the plane

coming home his stoppedup ears were quite painful.

Greetings in Christ!

Young and I arrived in Seoul, South Korea on May 9 and returned home on June 4. The trip took longer than previous trips, and the 13-hour jet lag, both ways, added to our strain of adjusting to the difference in time zones. However, it was worth the effort to develop Christian relationships and receive valuable blessings that God had in store for us strengthening our spirits to overcome the endeavor.

Saehyun Lee (Military Church)

On Saturday May 11, we visited a Korean battalion in a military church in Si-heung-city 40 miles southwest of Seoul. This is where Saehyun Lee, who completed 6 semesters with the Korean Extension, returned to South Korea to serve his military duties. He is currently fulfilling his obligation by serving as a private chaplain for the church. Among the participants in the meeting were approximately 35 military personnel, Saehyun's family, and his fiancé. Young and I were quite surprised that so many attended on a Saturday morning. Usually, on Saturdays, most of the privates rise later compared to other mornings during the week. At least that is what I am told. I was also told that since Saehyun began serving as a private chaplain, he has been advertising the Korean Extension, collaborating and explaining to the other privates on what he has learned. He had made such an impact on their lives that the soldiers gave up sleep to attend my class in the morning.

We spent two hours introducing the General Conference, the Atlanta Bible College, the Korean Extension and the biblical truth. We had such a wonderful time with the soldiers, sharing a meal and conversing at the camp. Afterward, we facilitated some private counseling sessions to several personnel regarding their personal faith and possibly enrolling into the Korean Extension. During the closing of our visit, we were invited to return during our winter trip. A number of privates who were preparing to be discharged soon also expressed their willingness to attend the winter meeting. Saehyun will be discharged in March 2014, and he was very excited to return to complete his studies. He had also mentioned that his fiancé will be returning with him to enroll into the Korean Extension program.

Salt and Light Church (City of Seoul)

On Sunday May 12, we had the pleasure of visiting a new church in Seoul. I preached Sunday morning and taught Bible study in the afternoon. The topic of the sermon was "Follow the Truth," and the afternoon class topic was "Accepting the 10 Commandments as a Pre-Established Law." The pastor and the congregation, including several elders, expressed that they were able to rejuvenate their souls and adjust their beliefs during the service and through the Bible studies. Members of the congregation were also surprised to read scripture and listen to a sermon that helped them expand their perception on the biblical truth. What amazed them was the fact that the Bible was in their possession all this time, yet not realizing what the truth is.

I believe they learned the importance of referencing the Bible to establish true Christian faith. Most of the members showed interest in the General Conference and Korean Extension and asked us to revisit them in the winter. I was also pleased to see Younghee An, a Korean Extension graduate and a staff member, as well as two former students and family members of active students, attend the service and the Bible study.

Corner Stone Church (City of Shin-tan-jin) The Corner Stone church is located near the Chung-ju Grace Church of God, which is also a member-church of the Korean Church Conference. If you recall, I visited the Grace Church of God last year in May to present the biblical truth to a pastoronly conference where 35 to 40 pastors from the local community came to listen. It was during this time where the Corner Stone Church pastor was inspired and requested that I visit his church to preach the following year. On Sunday May 19, I preached on the topic "Follow the Truth." I was also asked to lead their afternoon Bible study group where I presented the theme of "Biblically Born-Again." Being there for the first time, I was surprised to receive similar reactions from church members as at the Salt and Light Church in Seoul.

The pastor invited the graduates, including those students that were unable to complete their studies, to the pulpit and introduce themselves to the congregation. Afterward, Young and I met with the pastor and congregation members, encouraging them to provide opportunities to our Korean Extension graduates.

Puritan Church of God (Daejeon City)

The Puritan Church of God—Daejeon City is also an affiliate of the Korean Church Conference being a member-church since 2008 and providing ministerial opportunities to our Korean Extension students also. Last year, one of our graduates Moon Sik Kim is currently the associate pastor for the Puritan church. The senior pastor and all of the members have expressed their gratitude, and that they are pleased with the work Pastor Kim is providing. I facilitated a four-hour theology class at the church on May 18, receiving lots of praise and requests to return soon. Young and I expressed our appreciation for providing opportunities to our Korean Extension graduates and encouraged the church to continue with their efforts.

Organization of Alumni Meetings in South Korea

The Korean Extension has been attempting to establish scheduled alumni meetings with graduates and former students for quite some time. We were able to map-out a rough schedule and held an initial meeting on May 21 in Daejeon City, which is a prime location as it is almost in the center of the South Korean peninsula. A member-church of the Korean Church Conference graciously provided a place for the alumni to meet and offered their facility for future gatherings. We also received notification that a second member-church offered their facility for future meetings as well, which was the location of our second meeting on June 1. There were eight members registered at the Daejeon meeting and five at the meeting in Seoul. It was also very nice to see several family members of active students present at both assemblies. During the conference, we were able to elect a temporary

secretary to collect contact information. However, I

of interesting life experiences after the Korean Extension. Young and I informed the members of the present situation of our General Conference, Atlanta Bible College, and Korean Extension, encouraging them to maintain their faith and support the General Conference and the Atlanta Bible College by spreading the biblical truth in Korea.

late night show, just like they did in Key Largo." Brothers and sisters, in the Garden of Eden we had it all. 
