Christus Victor By Sean Finnegan

W hy did Jesus die? Although a skeptic might argue Jesus was simply in the wrong place at the wrong time when he angered the wrong people, those of us who believe in Jesus' resurrection cannot let ourselves off the hook so easily. If God's resurrection proves that Jesus was His anointed one—the Messiah—then, of course. God could have intervened to prevent Jesus' torturous and bloody demise, but He didn't. Peter put it this way in the first public statement about Jesus' death, "This man, delivered over by the predetermined plan and foreknowledge of God, you nailed to a cross by the hands of godless men" (Acts 2:23). Thus, Jesus' crucifixion was God's plan all along. Why? God must have had some purpose—an immensely important one—to allow His Son to suffer so greatly at the hands of his enemies. One's answer to this question is their theory of "atonement."

Throughout the ages, Christians have answered this question in three major ways: he died for our sins; he died to defeat evil; and he died as our example. In what follows, I want to focus on the second of these perspectives and explore how Jesus' death and resurrection actually conquered the forces of darkness—a view called Christus Victor. Before I can do this, however, I need first to convince you that spiritual powers exert authority over our world. To begin, consider Deuteronomy 32:8 where we read that when the Most High divided up the boundaries for the nations, "he fixed the borders of the peoples according to the number of the sons of God" (Deut 32:8 ESV).

The book of Job also mentions a day when "the sons of God came to present themselves before the "LORD" (Job 1:6). In fact, Satan himself came with these sons of God to speak to Yahweh. A third example of these spiritual powers comes from Daniel, when Gabriel, the angel, excused himself for taking so long to bring Daniel his answer because "The prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me twenty-one days" (Daniel 10:12). Normally, a prince refers to a human being—the son of a king—but this prince is so powerful that he delayed an angel for three weeks. Gabriel continues, "but Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me, for I was left there with the kings of Persia." Gabriel later identifies this Michael as "your prince" (10:21) and "the great prince who has charge of your people" (12:1). Putting this all together, we see that God has assigned angelic beings in positions of authority over the nations. Michael has charge over Israel, but the other "sons of God" in some way administrate the other nations.

The New Testament (NT) offers much more help in understanding the spiritual powers in control of our age. In fact, the situation is far worse than we may have expected. For throughout the NT, we find Satan described as having authority over all the kingdoms of the world (Luke 4:5-6). The whole world is under the power of the evil one (1 John 5:19). He is the "god of this age" (2 Cor 4:4) and "the ruler of the power of the air" (Eph 2:2). As a result, our world is "the present evil age," (Gal 4:4) and all of us naturally

walk "according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, of the spirit that is now working in the sons of disobedience" (Eph 2:1-2). This is not to say our world lacks good, beauty, or virtue, but it does mean that evil dominates more often than not. Reading through the bloody pages of history, we encounter vast empires which dominated huge territories using brutal force. We hear tales of dictators, monarchs, and megalomaniacs eager to conquer, oppress, and enslave. How many incidents of lust, betrayal, and abuse have occurred throughout the history of humanity? Now we may think, "Yeah, but that was a long time ago; we've grown and learned about human rights and tolerance since then." Although advances in democracy, communications, and technology abound, humans have not only continued to kill each other, but the situation has actually grown much worse. The twentieth century began with the Second Boer War, the Philippine Insurrection, and the War of a Thousand Days with a combined estimated death toll of over 150,000. It ended with the Congo Brazzaville Civil War, the Kosovo Crisis, and Ethiopia's war with Eritrea, totaling nearly 120,000 dead. In between these book ends, we find not ten or fifty or even a hundred bloody conflicts, but well over two hundred totaling more than 76 million battle deaths.² That's 2.3 wars a year for the entire twentieth century! Why is there so much killing? What is wrong with people that they keep fighting? May I suggest that these unbelievably high war statistics confirm

what the Scriptures teach—that wicked forces under satanic control fill our world with evil.

Now let us turn to Jesus and consider how his death relates to all of this carnage and dysfunction. But before we look at atonement, we should first think about Christ's ministry. As it turns out, Jesus fought evil relentlessly throughout his entire ministry. He entered into hand-to-hand combat with demons, casting them out left and right from the people he met. Like a mighty warrior, Christ advanced against Satan's realm and damaged his stranglehold over the people of the land. Furthermore, he healed people constantly. Peter summarized Jesus' ministry as "doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil" (Acts 10:38). For example, Jesus once encountered a woman who suffered a debilitating problem that bent and deformed her back for eighteen long years so she could not straighten herself up at all. After healing her, Jesus asked, "And this woman, a daughter of Abraham as she is, whom Satan has bound for eighteen long years, should she not have been released from this bond on the Sabbath day?" (Luke 13:16). Still, Jesus did not stop there. Beyond casting out unclean spirits and healing the sick, he also challenged systemic and cultural evil by eating with sinners, tax collectors, and prostitutes. He rebuked legalism, hard-heartedness, and hypocrisy among the religious leaders. He confronted greed in the temple courts and taught his disciples how to lead through service rather than domination. Throughout his whole ministry, both in word and in deed, Jesus fought evil wherever it reared its ugly head. Thus, when we come to consider his passion, we can see his work on the cross, not as something new or different, but as a continuation and climax of everything he had done up to that moment.

Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion really bother me because of the rampant and unrestrained unfairness and cruelty. From the Judas' betrayal kiss in the garden to the kangaroo court at the chief priest's house, my heart fills with agony. That fateful night, the Jewish elders—men respected for their dignity and leadership—degenerated into madness as they spat on my Jesus, blindfolded him, and beat him. "Prophesy," they commanded.

"Who is the one who hit you?" they said one after the other (Luke 22:64). Such gang violence outrages me. Why did they treat him thus? Were they drunk with the poison of revenge for the times when Jesus outmaneuvered their attempts to disgrace him publicly? I find this behavior baffling, and yet believable. Next, the Romans whipped him mercilessly. Rather than eliciting compassion from them, the bloodied and battered man served as the plaything of an entire battalion of soldiers. They found a purple cloak and dressed his body in it; they twisted together some nasty thorns into the shape of a crown and put it on his head. Mocking and laughing, they each took turns kneeling before my Jesus and saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews" (John 19:3). Their insatiable cruelty still unsatisfied, they whacked him in the head with a reed, driving that thorny crown deeper and deeper into his scalp. Even once Jesus finally reached the place of the skull, he was not given any respite from their spiteful viciousness. Once crucified and hanging on the cross, his life ebbing, his blood dripping, his body dying, he was not left alone by the onlookers. The passersby, rather than feeling compassion for this poor man, wagged their heads and said, "Ha! You who are going to destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!" (Mark 15:29-30). The chief priests, their spiteful rancor still unabated, shouted out, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let this Christ, the King of Israel, now come down from the cross, so that we may see and believe!" (Mark 15:31-32). Even the man crucified next to him hurled abuse at him and mockingly asked, "Are you not the Christ? Save vourself and us!" (Luke 23:39). Throughout the scene, we observe unmitigated hatred mixed with malicious brutality far beyond what makes sense from a natural perspective. What we have here is not something explicable on the basis of human psychology, but the result of ruthless demonic forces pulling the strings not only to kill but also to gloat over Jesus' slow agonizing demise.

Again, I ask why did Jesus have to endure such a nightmare? Thankfully, Scripture does not leave us in the dark on this question. We read in Hebrews that through death Jesus rendered powerless him who had the power of death (Heb 2:14). Sa-

tan's wild and uncontrolled rage against Christ blinded him from grasping God's redemptive plan (1 Cor 2:7). Jesus voluntarily submitted to God's will and drank that cup of suffering to the dregs (Mat 26:39). He did not tip his hand, but quietly trusted God's wisdom. In the end, he neither reviled the mockers nor threatened the torturers but died with forgiveness in his heart (1 Peter 2:23; Luke 23:34). He did not crack; he did not give in; he did not falter. With the torrent and flood of mal-

ice and cruelty aimed at him, like a sponge, he absorbed it all. Never did he lose control of his mind, his emotions, his pride. He did not check out or disassociate himself from the situation but remained present, observing every crooked gesture, feeling every painful blow, hearing every mocking insult. In the end, his death did something; it changed everything.

Although it may have

seemed to everyone present at his crucifixion that Jesus was on display as a spectacle, in fact, his suffering disarmed the rulers and authorities, making a public display of them (Col 2:15). What appeared to be a great defeat for God and His anointed one was in fact just the opposite—a great victory. Like a judo throw, God used Satan's own momentum and forcefulness against him. Christ unmasked Satan's viciousness and showed the world that such "power" is merely weakness in disguise. As a result of Christ's crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension, God seated him at His right hand "far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come" (Eph 1:21). God put all things in subjection under Christ's feet, including angels and authorities and powers (Eph 1:22; 1 Peter 3:22). Through the blood of the cross, it was the Father's good pleasure to reconcile all things to Himself whether on earth or in heaven (Col 1:19-20). More than merely defeating demons of darkness, Christ's

death liberated and empowered those whom the old regime ensnared and subjugated.

We are the beneficiaries of Christ's cosmic conquest. "And although you were formerly alienated and hostile in mind, *engaged* in evil deeds, yet He has now reconciled you in His fleshly body through death, in order to present you before Him holy and blameless and beyond reproach." (Col 1:21-22)

We are no longer bound in the domain of darkness,

but God has "transferred us to the kingdom of His beloved Son in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Col 1:13-14). No longer do we need to dance to the drumbeat of the devil, as we did before. Christ has liberated us not only from death itself but even the fear of death (Heb 2:14). By suffering the effects of the serpent's venom, he defanged the devil and rendered him powerless to bite his followers. He came to "destroy the

works of the devil" (1 John 3:8), which means his people are freed not only from direct demonic influence but also from sin, meaninglessness, depression, cruelty, bitterness, lust, pride, apathy, and selfishness of every other kind. He has destroyed the works of the devil! People can now truly live for God, reach their true potential, serve others without reservation, enjoy wholeness, and love others as Christ did. We now take on the same mission that Jesus had of opening people's eyes so that they can turn from darkness to light and from the dominion of Satan to God (Acts 26:18). Satan is defeated! Christ is victorious!

The current CBA, Church Builder's Appeal, and the current Alumni Drive (Amanda Jacinto's letter) is about funding and furnishing these projects for student housing. Part of the board meeting centered around the new HMB, Home Missions Board, chaired by Robin Todd. The new committee members are Anthony Buzzard, David Krogh, Greg Demmitt, Julie Driskill, and Dennis Sharp. Robin says the "core business" is evangelism and starting up new congregations." The group will be presenting ideas to the develop this. Rebekah and I will be visiting Robin in the Oregon, Washington groups, November 13-16 to assess how we may help more. The board voted to have the Fall 2016, Church Builder's Appeal to go towards this effort.

The Korean effort will become more focused next year as well. Steve and Sam An will begin to review the process to be able to do TOEFL. The Temple on the Mount

Psalm 102:13-16 "You will arise and have mercy on Zion; for the time to favour her, yes the set time has come to favour her, yes, the set time has come. For your servants take pleasure in her stones and show favour to her dust. So the nations shall fear the name of the Lord and all the kings of the earth Your glory. For when the Lord shall build up Zion; He shall appear in His glory."

Stones, dust, walls, gates, passions, tempers, tantrums, promises and prophecy are all part of the dramatic mix that makes up Jerusalem.

The world's attention is pointing to and zooming down from Israel to Jerusalem to the Temple Mount. This will be a growing centre of conflict, ultimately resulting in the manifestation of the glory of God.



Atlanta Bible College started the fall semester with 69 students - 32 new and 37 returning. Nine are distance learning students. We have two international students from Kenya this semester. Fourteen Church of God students are eligible for free tuition this semester. Because of the large number of recipients, the interest earnings from our invested scholarship funds are being rapidly depleted. In order to continue this program in the next school year, there is a need for contributions from those who believe this is an important investment. It is clear that the free tuition has increased enrollment of Church of God students, and it

is producing more students committed to full-time ministry. Contributions can be designated "for free tuition grants."

The following instructors are teaching this semester: Kyle Casey, Sean Finnegan, Bob Jones, David Krogh, Joe Martin, Rebekah Martin, Jogi Mauger, Rufus Meyers, Dustin Smith, and Mary Ann Winkler. ABC student Josiah Cain is leading the Worship Service Planning Lab. Forty semester hours are being delivered.

We are in the process of converting several 2 semester hour courses to 3-semester hours so that students taking a full course load are not required to prepare for 7 or 8 courses each week. No changes are being made in which courses are required for graduation.

The annual ABC Booster campaign is underway. Thanks to all who have provided contributions and promised prayer support. If you have not yet become an ABC Booster, please join in praying for the work of the college and making a financial contribution to help with our work. Large gifts are appreciated, but even small gifts from many donors will be a big help to the college.

Korean Extension Report

From the Korea Campus

The fall semester began on September 5th with 15 students, and Younghee An and I have been facilitating the courses. The classes are held at the Yahtop church facility weekly on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Sundays for students from the Seoul-city area and on Saturdays at the Daejeon church facility approximately 100 miles south of Seoul-city to accommodate students from the southern region. The semester will come to a close on December 22.

Many of our students are lay leaders from local churches I have visited and introduced the Abrahamic Faith to in the past. The students are willing to expand their Christian knowledge to enhance their ministries to impact their own churches. As they progress in their learning of the Abrahamic Faith, their joy and hope for the kingdom increases. During class, I have also noticed some students are brought to tears when listening to class lectures that describe the hope of the coming kingdom. We have experienced these dramatic moments in the past at the Korean Extension campus in Duluth.

"It is easy to learn but hard to practice!" As lay-leaders, the students are faced with a serious conflict stemming from false teachings from their home churches such as hedonic blessings, prosperous life in the evil age, guarantee of salvation, Christian dead souls are presently in heaven, and Jesus is God and etc... Not many

people are surprised that church pastors are driving luxurious cars like Bentley, Mercedes, BMW because "Good pastors should know how to obtain God's blessings." The idea reminds me of the medieval age where Christianity was under Catholicism. Our hope is the Korean Extension students inspire reformation within the Korean Christian community, upholding the Bible and the Abrahamic Faith. Some pastors and elders are deeply convicted because of their false teachings (In the classroom, I have asked them to read Revelation 20:10 where John explains that false prophets will be punished together with the devil for the undertaking). As a result, most felt obligated to retract their false messages that they have advocated to their members. The Korea campus took a break on September 26 to 29 to

observe the Korean Thanksgiving holiday, which is a tradition in Korea that originated from Confucianism celebrating the harvest of the first crops. The premise is that the first crops are offered as a sacrifice to honor their ancestors' souls, and the community believes that the harvest is a gesture of grace from the dead souls of their ancestors who are believed to be in the heavenly realm. Koreans still practice the tradition where it has become a semi-required function. I was surprised that it can be punishable by law if you disturb the ancestors' worship even for family members.

Catholicism has chosen not to challenge the ancestral worship traditions, allowing members of the church to continue to follow the tradition. It was declared by Soo Hwan Kim,

> the first Cardinal in Korea who passed away some years ago, who demonstrated ancestral worship publicly in numerous places. Kim's efforts have inspired many reformed Christians with family members who are non-believers to look to the Catholic church. Some of my students have asked for wisdom to help them remediate that they have with their non-Christian family members. Evangelism seems to be the only remediation to assist the students in persuading their loved ones to seek the truth.

In terms of recruiting, I have been visiting local churches to present the ABC/ COGGC theology as well as American history and culture, and also to assist youth groups to attain English as a second language. In light of the efforts, I also meet with local pastors, lay leaders, KE graduates, and former KE students to inspire them to sustain the good fight. The recruiting effort is not limited to the Korea campus. It is also to

advertise the Northeast campus. We provide an option to the prospective students to choose the location of their study, whether it is in Korea or the U.S., or both.

Korean Church Conference meeting

Recently, I have received numerous inquiries for training bilingual (Korean and English) Sunday school teachers and youth pastors. I have noticed that the demand for bilingual Sunday school teachers continues to increase alongside of the demand for English language learning fever in Korea. A certain level of English language proficiency is required to apply for most jobs. According to recent Korean news, a majority of prominent universities are incorporating the TOEIC (Test of English for International Communication) (continued on page 15)

score as a part of the graduation requirement for most of their fields of the study. The increasing demand motivates local churches to hire bilingual Sunday school teachers and youth pastors.

Yeongbeom Kim, a 2009 KE graduate, returned to Korea and completed a Master's program at a major seminary. Presently, he is serving as a youth pastor in a local church with 200 members. He has strongly suggested that the Korean Extension offer an additional English training course

for Korean students in both campuses. I believe God has already prepared us to enlighten the Korean students of the Abrahamic Faith and English as their second language to fulfill the needs of the Korean Christian community. Several years ago, Sam and I completed a teacher's-certificate course at the University of Georgia (Global TESOL-Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) that permits us to teach English as a foreign language. Sam moved on to earn a Master's degree in Linguistics, specializing in TESOL from Lincoln Christian University.

The Korea Campus and the Northeast campus are mere reflections of each other collaborating to develop and enhance courses in order to fill the needs of the Korean Christian community.



Beatitudes of Revelation By Pastor S.O. Ross

n Matthew five, which is part of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, we find recorded what is known as the Beatitudes. These are blessings that can be ours. In verses three through eleven of this chapter we find Jesus declaring: Blessed are the poor in spirit, they that mourn, the meek, and those who hunger after righteousness. Blessed are the merciful, the pure in heart, and the peacemakers. Blessed are those persecuted for righteousness' sake and those reviled and falsely accused.

If we are found in that list, we can rejoice. Verse 12 says, "Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you." Certainly the blessings are great.

I want to share with you the beatitudes of the Book of Revelation.
"Beatitudes" is defined by Webster as "blessing," or "perfect blessedness or happiness." We will look at seven

such beatitudes.

Revelation 1:3: "Blessed is he that readeth, and they that hear the words of this prophecy, and keep those things which are written therein: for the time is at hand." Sometimes we think the book is too difficult, and we often avoid it. We may not fully understand everything written in this book, but we are exhorted to read and study it.

The revelator unmasked many things that were revealed to him and which he was told to write. Revelation 1:10, 11a: "I was in the spirit on the Lord's

day, and heard behind me a great voice, as of a trumpet, saying, I am the Alpha and Omega, the first and the last: and, What thou seest, write in a book, and send it unto the seven churches which are in Asia." Here then we have the revelations to the churches. "Blessed is he that readeth,

and they that hear the words of this prophecy." Much meat for all churches.

A second beatitude is found in Revelation 14:13: "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them." We can all recollect many saints of old, perhaps ones whom we knew and loved, who had a great influence on us...perhaps a parent, Sunday School teacher, pastor, or friend who had been a rock of strength for us in one way or another. Their works do follow them. Their good deeds live after them. Certainly this is true of the patriarchs of Scripture and those founding fathers of our churches and conference and on and on. Their works do live after them

It then is incumbent on us to live our lives so that we can be an influence for good on someone's life, perhaps even years after we are dead. We most assuredly are influencing someone; let us make sure it is for good and not for evil. The results of the works and labors we do today will follow us.

Thirdly, another beatitude appears in Revelation 16:15: "Behold. I come as a thief. Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments, lest he walk naked, and they see his shame." The scripture reveals that there will be a falling away at the end time. The church needs to watch and be aware. It is the church members that will fall away. Someone has said, "Ya can't fall away from someplace ya ain't never been." The church member needs to watch lest he be found naked. Paul said in the Thessalonian letter that we need to "Watch and be sober" (I Thes. 5:6.) We need to be attuned to the times in which we are living and watch.

"So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him [watch] shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Heb. 9:28.) Also we need to watch that our garments are clean and unspotted before him. We are naked before him. We may fool our family, friends, co-workers...even our spouse sometimes...but we do stand naked before our Maker.

A fourth beatitude is found in Revelation 19:9: "Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb. And he saith unto me, These are the true sayings of God." We can depend on that statement as it is of

God. In contemporary terms we can say, "You can take that to the bank!"

You remember the account of the "Great Supper" in both Matthew and Luke. All that were invited had excuses: bought a piece of land, bought a yoke of oxen, or married a wife. All seemed to take priority over the supper. Most excuses for nonservice fall into one of these categories: the lust of the eye, the lust of the flesh, and the pride of life. John tells us in I John 2:15, 16, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world." So we need to get our priorities straight and put the Lord first, not the world.

The story is told of the two fellows who decided to go golfing on Wednesday night, even though it was Bible study and prayer service night. As they were teeing up on about the fifth hole, one said, "I feel kind of bad, really; old Pastor Jones is up there leading the service. I feel kind of guilty not being there." The second fellow replied, "Well, I couldn't have gone to Bible study tonight anyhow. My wife is sick." Priorities?

One of the disciples in the Luke account said, "Blessed is he that shall eat bread in the kingdom of God." When Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper, he declared that he would no more eat bread or drink of the fruit of the vine until he would partake it anew with His followers in the kingdom of God. What a supper that will be! Blessed are they which are called to the great supper, the marriage of the Lamb and His bride, the church.

The fifth beatitude is found is Revelation 20:6: "Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years." What a hope and what a blessing! The real desire of a Christian is to have part in the first resurrection and the assurance of reigning with Christ. "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him: if we deny him, he also will deny us" (2 Tim. 2:12.) The blessing of God is to reign with Jesus 1,000 years in the kingdom and to live for-

ever with God throughout eternity. What a hope one has when he accepts Christ as personal Savior and lives for Him. "For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. But every man in his own order: Christ the firstfruits [first one to come from the grave to live eternally]; afterward they that are Christ's at his coming" (I Cor. 15:22, 23.)

The sixth beatitude is in Revelation 22:7: "Behold I come quickly: blessed is he that keepeth the sayings of the prophecy of this book." In chapter one (the first beatitude), we were admonished to read and hear the prophecies of this book, and now we need to keep these sayings to have the blessings. We need to hold fast these teachings. "Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering; (for he is faithful that promised)" (Heb. 10:23.) Paul admonishes in I Timothy 4 to be an example of a believer, in word, in conversation (our very citizenship), in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity. He further says that we need to take heed to ourselves and to the doctrine (teachings that we follow) and to continue in them, because by doing that we can save both ourselves and them that hear us. We can be truly blessed if we keep these savings.

Finally, the seventh beatitude is in Revelation 22:14: "Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city." This is further assurance of life eternal if we are obedient and do His command. One command of Jesus is, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned."

Oh! What a blessing is that seventh beatitude if we keep His commandments and walk in His ways. What a promise can be ours...access to the tree of life so we can live eternally.

Let us read, study, and live by these prophecies and look for and long for the day when God sends His Son back to this earth to reign and rule. "Unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Heb. 9:28b.)

"He which testifieth these things saith, Surely I come quickly. Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus" (Rev. 22:20.)

■ reetings and Happy New Year. As my wife and I were driving back home from St. Louis for the birth of our seventh grandchild, we saw a homemade sign on the side of the interstate that read, "Heal, Inspire, Revive." A search committee is finalizing its work to identify persons interested in this position, and we need the prayers of every COG member to find the right leader to direct toward fulfilling our mission, "To serve churches and individuals in the ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and God's Kingdom."

started off my rabbit hunt Bible study in I Samuel. You know those kinds of study where you begin in one place and wind up somewhere far away? It was a great study in I Samuel, of Hannah, her barrenness, her heartfelt prayer, Eli thinking she was drunk, and then God blessing her with a child. I got a little interested in the geography where Ramah meant heights or hill country, and Shiloh was obviously a place and the center of worship in Israel before the temple was built in Jerusalem. The etymology, origin of the word Shiloh, was a little odd and I guess that's where I "went down the proverbial rabbit hole."

Some thirty times Shiloh is used in the Hebrew scripture, and all but one is about the place. Except, in Genesis 49:10 where the patriarch Jacob is blessing his boys and when he got to Judah, he said, "The sceptre shall not depart from Judah, nor a lawgiver from between his feet, until Shiloh come; and unto him shall the gathering of the people be" (KJV). Of course Genesis 49:10 is one of the greatest *epangelia* promises of the Messiah. It, I believe, rates with Gen. 3:15 where the seed of the woman will crush the serpent's head, and Gen. 12:3 where the whole world will be blessed through the eventual offspring of Abraham. I believe the eventual Messiah of the LORD God, Yahweh El Shaddai, is Jesus!

He truly had to be then, the "seed of the woman." He also had to be of the ancestry of Abraham. Compare Matthew 1:1! With Genesis 49:10, he also had to be of the tribe of Judah, and later, a descendant of the great king David (2 Sam. 7:16).

In regards to Shiloh, besides being one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War in Hardin County, Tennessee, and the name of the daughter of Brad Pitt and Angelina Jolie, we are still given multiple possible meanings. In Strong's Concordance, we find no less than five possible spellings in the Hebrew: *Shiyloh, Shiloh, Shiylow, Shilow* (Strong's # 7886/7887), from the possible root (#7951) *Shalah*. Remember most Hebrew roots are three consonants. These three are SH (\mathfrak{V}) L (\mathfrak{P}) and H (\mathfrak{P}). Then even *Shalom* and *Shalah* are similar in sharing two consonants. The root *Shalah* often means tranquil, to be happy, to be successful, to prosper.

When I saw that, I thought, the kingdom is tranquility, happiness, success. Why couldn't "until

Shiloh comes," simply mean until the kingdom comes. The sceptre will not depart from Judah, until the King is totally revealed in His kingdom, and then he will be revealed as the King of Kings, not just Israel or Jacob?

I had to "Google" the possibilities. I found one site that said, "Later Jewish commentators such as Rabbi Stomo, a 16th century Italian rabbi and physician, have tried to translate it as "until tranquility comes." (you could Google for the reference) On another site, "hebrew4christians.com," Genesis 49:10 is noted, and it says, "According to midrash, Jacob wanted to tell his sons about the 'End of Days' when the Messiah would come.... The Talmud likewise supports the interpretation that Shiloh was a reference to the Messiah: 'Rabbi Yochanan taught that all the world was created for the Messiah.... In later rabbinical tradition, 'Shiloh' was construed to mean 'final tranquility' or the worldwide peace brought through the rule of the Messiah, when all the nations of the earth would submit to him. Understood in this light, 'Shiloh' would refer to the establishment of the kingdom of God upon the earth."[1]

At its meeting in October, the Board of Directors received and reviewed a report from Robin Todd who was appointed Home Missions Board director. At Robin's suggestion, the board appointed Anthony Buzzard, Greg Demmitt, Julie Driskill, David Krogh, and Dennis Sharp to serve with Robin on the Home Missions Board. They also approved the fall 2016 Church Builders Appeal to be used for startup expenses for new churches that will be started. Below is a report from Robin.

Just over two years ago I began what I hoped would be a pilot project for a renewed U.S. missions work. That was the Western Washington Church of God. My wife, my grandson and I started meeting with around a dozen or so biblical savvy and excited believers and have slowly grown to more than 50 who are now attending on a regular basis. There have been a number of adjustments along the journey in terms of where we meet, but the goal has been to follow God where He is working as best we can. We currently meet in three locations up and down a 175-mile stretch of highway, one Sunday a month per location. It's not much, but some of us travel to more than one location in order to get additional fellowship, worship and study time. Two or three individuals have stepped up to help with Bible studies and sermons, which has been amazing and greatly appreci-

ated. Local leadership and the sharing of gifts and talents is highly encouraged. We are now exploring ways to start meeting twice a month in each location. Please pray for additional leadership since cloning humans is not yet possible (as far as I know!). The established Wenatchee Church of God on the east side of the state is working with the west side to explore ways we can be more united in fellowship from a statewide perspective. A combined summer youth camp is in discussion, for example.

Now that the U.S. Home Missions Board has been established by vote of the conference membership, a work beyond the first project in western Washington can commence. We are barely off the ground and already a new congregation in Houston, Texas is being contemplated. Local leadership has been identified, and conversations are in full swing between them and conference headquarters. I will continue to report on progress with this in the weeks ahead. Please pray for continued direction and success with our mission of growth in evangelism and church planting in the United States.

Living forever has been on everyone's mind from the beginning. Pyramids, monuments and mythology have been dedicated to some type of afterlife. Why the preoccupation? Solomon says "He has also set eternity in their heart... (Eccl. 3:11b NASB). That's why man pursues eternal life. That's why resurrection is given as a promise.

Enter the 21st century Dr. Frankenstein.

If entrepreneur Josh Bocanegra has his way, you won't have to depend on God to provide resurrection.

Bocanegra has attracted a lot of attention when he announced his new artificial intelligence company Humai. Why? Because he claims that by 2045, they'll be able to resurrect the dead.

The new company is aiming to "extend and enhance life" by freezing human brains for extended periods of time using cryonics, a deep freezing technology using very low temperatures, and then putting them into artificial bodies.

But Josh claims the company's ultimate goal is to preserve a human brain BEFORE a person dies.

He claims if they were able to transplant a live person's brain into a bionic body, than it would "achieve a point where no one has to die at all." After all we do artificial knees, arms, legs, hands now. Inserting a brain into a mechanical body is not that more unusual, is it?

Josh hopes to accomplish this in the next thirty years.

Responding to any criticism he and the company may face over their shocking proposal, he says: "There are promising breakthroughs happening every year in neuroscience and biotechnology."

"We plan to implement [these breakthroughs] as we work towards performing the first surgical procedure of restoring and implanting a human brain to a new bionic body."

Man has always believed he could do what only God can do. Remember the enticement in the garden? "For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." (Genesis 3:5 ESV)

That didn't work out so well. God's solution was provided just a few verses later. "You and this woman will hate each other; your descendants and hers will always be enemies. N ineteen new students are taking courses for the winter/spring semester at the south campus in McDonough. A pre-semester briefing was held on January 9, and classes started on January 11.

This semester several courses will be taught that have not been delivered for awhile. Aaron Winner will be teaching Introduction to Worship and Music. Jake Ballard and Jack Kmiecik will team teach Christianity and Church for Twenty-Somethings. Jack Kmiecik and Robin Todd will team teach Church Planting. A third semester hour will be added to Christian Education Principles and Practice. It will focus on the practical application of teaching. Bob Jones will continue to teach the basic class, and Lynne Krogh will lead the

practicum. Rufus Meyers will be team teaching Homiletics with Joe Martin

A revision of the curriculum has been taking place over the past several semesters. We will be offering more three semester hour courses and less two semester hour courses. This will help students to be more focused on a smaller number of class topics. In the past, a student taking 15 or 16 semester hours would have been preparing for 7 or 8 classes each week. Now it may be only 5 or 6. Some of the courses that have already been converted are Greek, Hebrew, Principles of Counseling, Crisis Counseling, Ethics, and Hermeneutics.

Pastor Sean Finnegan is one of our regular adjunct instructors. He was on campus in the fall to teach Apologetics and Basic Bible Doctrine. He will be on

campus in February to teach Evangelism and Church History II.

In addition to teaching several courses, Jack Kmiecik has been appointed as registrar for ABC effective January 1. He has been assisting in the registrar's office since August 2015. He will be responsible for enrolling new students, registering students for classes, maintaining student files, preparing grade reports and transcripts, assisting at pre-semester briefings, handling course evaluations, etc. David Krogh, who has been registrar for the past 15 years, will continue as academic dean, overseer of recruitment, working with the Moodle distance learning program, teaching several classes, and assisting with financial matters for the college/conference, churches, and pastors.

Atlanta Bible College is offering several courses this semester that will "equip you right where you are" for ministry. We will be delivering classes live through video conferencing which is an economical method of teaching and training people for ministry who cannot come to the campus. Through the use of a computer that is equipped with a camera and microphone, students can interact with a live classroom session in real time from the comforts of their home or church with Internet connection. Students will be able to talk to the professor from their computer and ask questions as well as see other students in class, experiencing the classroom setting without actually being here. The instructors and students in Atlanta will be able to see and interact with those who are connected.

The three classes that will be offered on video conferencing in the winter/spring semester are: Homiletics/ Preaching, New Testament Survey II, and Christianity and Church for 20 Somethings.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments:

The board of directors is proposing the following amendments to the constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference. The Board believes that the title "Executive Director" more accurately describes the work of the head of our conference/college, rather than "Chief Administrative Officer." Under this proposal, the title "President" of Atlanta Bible College will be retained. At present Dr. Joe Martin carries the titles of CAO and President. If these amendments are adopted, he will have the titles of Executive Director and President. Delegate action on these amendments will take place at the 2016 summer conference.

Article II, Section 3 c: Current reading regarding who is a delegate at the summer conference: "The Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, President of Atlanta Bible College, and Director of Church/Pastor Services."

New proposed reading: "The Executive Director of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, President of

Atlanta Bible College, and Director of Church/Pastor Services."

Article IV, Section 4: Current reading regarding the submission of nominations for the board of directors: "Names of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference by May 1..."

New proposed reading: Names of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Executive Director of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference by May 1 . . . "

By-Laws, Article II, Section 6 H: Current reading regarding duties of the board: "To employ a Chief Administrative Officer who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors The Chief Administrative Officer shall meet the qualifications . . . The Chief Administrative Officer may be either male or female."

New proposed reading: "To employ an Executive Director who shall be responsible to the board of directors. . . . The Executive Director shall meet the qualifications . . . The Executive Director may be either male or female."

Korean Extension Report

From the Korea Campus

The 2015 fall semester closed successfully with 14 students on December 14. The classes were held at the Yahtop church facility weekly on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Sundays for students from the Seoul-city area and Saturdays at the Daejeon church approximately 100 miles south of Seoul to accommodate students from the southern region.

Many of our students are church lay-leaders from the surrounding areas where I have visited and introduced the Abrahamic faith. The students have a willingness to expand their own Christian knowledge and ministries to impact their own churches. As the students develop their understanding of the Abrahamic faith, they seem to long for the kingdom where some are driven to tears during class lectures. We have experienced these dramatic moments in the past at the Korean Extension campus in Duluth.

The phrase "it is easy to learn but hard to practice" seems to be what most of our lay-leaders understand and still experience. These students are faced with tremendous conflict stemming from exposure to false ideologies from their home churches such as hedonistic blessings, prosperous life in the evil age, guarantees for salvation, Christian dead souls are presently in heaven, and Jesus is God, etc... Most Korean-Christians are not surprised when they see church pastors driving luxurious cars (Bentley, Mercedes, BMWs) because of the false Korean-Christian principle "Good pastors should know how to obtain God's blessings" extending into the vast Korean-Christian community.

The idea reminds me of the medieval age where Christianity was under Catholicism, and our hope for the Korean Extension students was to inspire reformation within the Korean Christian community upholding the Bible and the Abrahamic faith. Some pastors and elders in the classrooms are severely convicted because of their false teachings. During classes, I have asked them to read Revelation 20:10 where John explains that false prophets will be punished together with the devil for the undertaking. As a result, most feel obligated to retract their false messages that they have advocated to their members.

The Korea campus took a break on September 26 to September 29 to observe the Korean Thanksgiving holiday, which is a Korean tradition that originated from Confucianism celebrating the harvest of the first crops. The premise is that the first crops are offered as a sacrifice to honor their ancestors' souls, and the community believes that the harvest is a gesture of grace from the dead souls of their ancestors who are believed to be in the heavenly realm. Koreans still practice the tradition where it has become a semi-required function. I was surprised that it can be punishable by law disturbing the ancestors' worship even for family members.

The Catholic Church in Korea has chosen not to challenge the ancestral worship-tradition and to allow members to continue to follow the tradition. It was declared by Soo Hwan Kim, the first cardinal in Korea who passed away some years ago, who demonstrated ancestral worship publicly in numerous places. Kim's efforts have inspired many reformed Christians with family members who are non-believers to look to the Catholic Church. Some of my students have asked me for a wisdom to remediate the issue with their non-Christian family members. Evangelism seems to be the only remediation to assist the students in persuading their loved ones to seek the truth.

In terms of recruiting, I have been visiting local churches to present the ABC/COGC theology as well as American history and culture, and also to assist youth groups to attain English as a second language. In light of the efforts, I also meet with local pastors, lay-leaders, KE graduates, and former KE students to inspire them to sustain the good fight. The recruiting effort is not limited to the Korea campus. It is also to advertise the northeast campus. We provide an option to the prospective students to choose the location of their study, whether it is in Korea or the U.S., or both.

Recently, I received numerous inquiries for training bilingual (Korean and English) Sunday school teachers and youth pastors. I have noticed that the demand for bilingual Sunday school teachers continues to increase alongside of the demand for English language learning in Korea. A certain level of English language proficiency is required to apply for most jobs. According to recent Korean news, a majority of prominent universities are incorporating the TOEIC (Test of English for International Communication) score as a part of the graduation requirement for most of their fields of the study. The increasing demand motivates local churches to hire bilingual Sunday school teachers and youth pastors.

Yeongbeom Kim, a 2009 KE graduate, returned to Korea and completed a master's program at a well-known seminary. Presently, he is serving as a youth pastor in a local church with 200 members. He has strongly suggested that the Korean Extension offer an additional English training course for Korean students in both campuses. I believe God has already prepared us to inform the Korean students of the Abrahamic faith and English as their second language to fulfill the needs and serve the Korean-Christian community. Several years ago. Sam and I completed a teacher's certificate course at the University of Georgia (Global TE-SOL-Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) that permits us to teach English as a foreign language, in which Sam moved on to earn a master's degree in linguistics specializing in TESOL from Lincoln Christian University. The Korea Campus and the northeast campus are mere reflections of each other, collaborating to develop and enhance courses in order to fill the needs of the Korean-Christian community.

In closing, please accept my deepest appreciation for your support for the Korean missions, and may the blessings of God be with you and your family, and your ministry.—

More specifically, Pastor Jae Yun Shim will teach New Testament Survey II, Church History I, and Epistles; Pastor Yeo Il Jang will oversee the Service Ministry class and the New Testament Preaching class; Pastor Young Jung Kim will teach the Instrumental Music II class; and I will provide instruction through Old Testament Survey I class and assist our students to develop their English language skills through three levels of an English language learning class.

We are also excited to announce that the Northeast campus has enrolled six new students for the spring semester with 22 students returning from the previous fall semester, and hope additional late registrations would occur. However, we are disappointed and sad with the loss of a few students who were unable to move on with the program. We pray that they will return soon. The most difficult hurdles our students face is homesickness, lack of financial support, and personal issues back home in Korea. We try as best as we can to help them overcome their issues, but sometimes the help we provide is not enough. Please keep these students in your prayers.

Since October last year, we have been undertaking the refueled recruiting efforts with the students both in Korea and the Korean community in the U.S. And we are confident that enrollment numbers will continue to increase with Steve and Young's return.

God bless the entire Church of God General Conference community, and I sincerely thank you for all your support.



The Importance of Finding a Life of Faith By Dean Moore

inding true peace, happiness, and a real hope of everlasting life seems next to impossible to the average person today. We live in a world of unbelief, false religions, vanity, moral corruption, and rebellion. There has been a great increase in knowledge and education, yet the world grows more dangerous day by day. The lives of millions of people are now in greater danger than any time in history! More and more nations are acquiring nuclear weapons for war, while their leaders boast in their power to destroy their enemies. It is quite evident that the "wisdom" of the world is not real wisdom at all! Mankind needs truth. The need to think and live in harmony with reality!

Much of reality can be seen, but most is invisible to the human eve. This is where faith comes in. It is the confidence or assurance of that which is not visible. As eyes are a gift of our Creator, so faith is His gift. The Bible says: "By grace are you saved through faith; and that is not of yourselves; it is the gift of God." (Eph 2:8). With faith we become aware of innumerable truths concerning God's work with people in the past, present, and future. We learn to understand wisdom and holiness. Because environment is one of the main influences in a person's life, we are able to become holy because He is holy. We can become loving because of His love. We can grow in His likeness!

In the beginning man was made similar to his Creator in various respects, but his unbelief and rebellion cor-

rupted his innocence. He lost the ecstasy of loving fellowship with his Maker. Mankind has inherited a degenerate nature that tends to transgress the eternal laws of righteousness. He is inclined to be self-centered, proud, and mainly interested in sensual pleasure. In place of desiring purity, and love that puts the welfare of others first, man tends to choose self. In place of giving credit to whom credit is due and humbly glorifying his Creator, man has his substitutes. He may even deny the existence of his Maker! Separation from all that is ungodly is essential if he is to have association with his Heavenly Father. For this reason we are commanded to "come out" from the thinking of the world. We read: "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God." (2 Co 6:14-7:1 KJV).

We can see that God has spoken to us by His wonderful works. He has also spoken to us by His written word. We can read the words of Moses, the prophets of Israel, words of Christ, and the writers of the New Testament. Many millions of people have found this witness to be true! They found God's provisions to be more than adequate for their greatest needs. From the scriptures they learned to see things in the right perspective, not human unbelief!

All people are totally dependent. Without God's provisions they would die. Notice the following texts:

¹⁷Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above...

(Jam 1:17 KJV). ³O give thanks to the Lord of lords: for his mercy endureth for ever. ⁴To him who alone doeth great wonders: for his mercy endureth for ever. ⁵To him that by wisdom made the heavens: for his mercy en*dureth* for ever. ⁶To him that stretched out the earth above the waters: for his mercy en*dureth* for ever. ⁷To him that made great lights: for his mercy endureth for ever: ⁸The sun to rule by day: for his mercy endureth for ever: ⁹The moon and stars to rule by night: for his mercy endureth for ever. (Psa 136:3-9 KJV).

It is easy to see that our future depends upon the will of God! We see in scripture that He is saying: "look unto me and be saved, all the ends of the earth; for I am God and there is none else!" (Isa. 45:22).

Each of us must decide whose thinking we are going to trust. We are created responsible beings that must give account! Our entire future depends upon our response! All history shows that people were blessed or rewarded when they chose God's way. There was judgment when they forsook His way. An example is the flood in the days of Noah. We read "The earth was corrupt before God, and the earth was filled with violence. And God looked upon the earth, and behold it was corrupt. For all flesh had corrupted His way upon the earth!" (Gen 6:11,12). Jesus warned that this condition would

be repeated just prior to the end of the age. He said: "As the days of Noah were, so shall it also be at the coming of the Son of Man" (Mt 24:37). The time of the flood was a type of the far greater judgment at the close of the age. Human government failed in Noah's day and will fail again, only in a more extensive way. We read: "For then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, nor ever shall be. And except that those days be shortened, there would no flesh be saved: but for the elect's sake those days shall be shortened."

One of the most obvious things that we learn in our study is that judgment comes upon those who have not repented and accepted God's provision for forgiveness. Repentance and forgiveness are essential! They are not optional! Had not Christ suffered the judgment of men, no one would be saved! Everyone would endure his own judgment. We read: ³⁰And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent: ³¹Because he hath appointed a day, in the which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained; whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead." (Acts 17:30-31 KJV) Jesus said, "36But I say unto you. That every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment." (Mt 12:36 KJV) Paul said, "10 But why dost thou judge thy brother? or why dost thou set at nought thy brother? for we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ. ¹¹For it is written, As I live, saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God. 12So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God." (Rom 14:10-12 KJV). Peter said, "Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselves likewise with the same mind: for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin; ²That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God. ³For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revellings, banquetings, and abominable idolatries: ⁴Wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of *you*:

⁵Who shall give account to him that is ready to judge the quick and the dead." (1 Pe 4:1-5 KJV).

We should meditate day and night upon the thoughts of God revealed in His word. In this way He leads us out of the world's thinking and into His own. We are told plainly that "⁵Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous. ⁶For the LORD knoweth the way of the righteous: but the way of the ungodly shall perish." (Ps 1:5-6 KJV).

How thankful we should be that our Creator is righteous, loving, patient, and forgiving! At the greatest cost to Himself he provided us with our savior. In all the suffering of the Jewish people throughout the centuries He suffered. We read: "⁹In all their affliction he was afflicted, and the angel of his presence saved them: in his love and in his pity he redeemed them; and he bare them, and carried them all the days of old." (Isa 63:9 KJV). How much more was His suffering when He allowed His only loving, precious, sinless son to bear the judgment of sinful mankind! It is not possible to fully comprehend this. Nor can we comprehend the love of Christ. Every day of his life was spent for the welfare of people. He labored for their temporal welfare but primarily for their eternal welfare. He chose his Father's will in place of his own. He placed all of his trust in Him; knowing that He would bring about His great salvation for mankind.

Our response to all of this is of supreme importance. It is easy for us to pay little attention. We could center our thinking on ourselves with other things. However, before long, we would lose everything! God told the people of Israel "The things that I command you for your good always" (Dt 6:24). In view of all that He has done for us throughout our lives, and the cost that He and His son have paid, shouldn't our response be one of humble gratitude that believes and trusts as a small child?

"For thus saith the high and lofty One that inhabiteth eternity, whose name *is* Holy; I dwell in the high and holy *place*, with him also *that is* of a contrite and humble spirit, to revive the spirit of the humble, and to revive the heart of the contrite ones." (Isa 57:15 KJV).

■ race and peace to all my fellow believers in Jesus Christ our Lord. As I was preparing my final message as chairperson of the board of directors. I sat down to watch the video of the funeral of Kent Ross, and my thoughts were filled with the sad reality that yet another of our longtime pastors and leaders had fallen asleep in the Lord. The COG has endured much loss the past few years with many of our pastors being taken by the enemy death. As I listened to the words of those speaking at Kent's funeral, one thought in particular grabbed me that was shared. From the book of Jude these words are relevant to us all today, "Dear friends, although I was very eager to write to you about the salvation we share, I felt I had to write and urge you to contend for the faith that God has entrusted once for all time to his holy people." (Emphasis mine) As I think back on the time I have spent serving you all on the board, I firmly believe that Jude's words ring truer today than ever before. I believe that this charge should be the battle cry in the hearts of us all as we share the gospel message of a soon coming kingdom when the Son of God returns to set up residence on this earth!

The deaths of so many of our church pastors recently should remind us that our time is short. A haunting quote was shared during Brother Ross' funeral that should also remind us of the acute, intense focus we all need to put on sharing with others that gospel message. "Our greatest fear should not be of failure, but of succeeding at things that don't really matter." Think about that for just a moment. Look around you at all the distractions the evil one confuses God's people with in this world. Isn't it very easy to spend our time working on things that don't really matter, when the only thing that really matters is to get as many people into the kingdom as possible? I challenge anyone reading these words to step up and begin focusing your efforts on joining God in His quest that no one be lost, but that all be saved from the wrath of judgement day. Listen for God's call to show you where He wants you to serve Him. Look for ways to serve in your church, your local community, and your state or national conferences. The opportunities are out there, folks! Don't be fooled in this short life by working to

succeed at things that don't really matter. But seek to serve Him who has the power to save all who come to Him and confess with their mouth that Jesus is **fully** Lord of their life.

In his second letter to the church in Thessalonica, Paul asks for one thing in particular that he knows is crucial to our winning the spiritual battle that rages on against God's people. I want to ask my COG brothers and sisters the same request as we face this challenge, "Finally, dear brothers and sisters, we ask you to pray for us. Pray the Lord's message will spread rapidly and be honored wherever it goes, just as when it came to you." Folks, this battle against evil spiritual forces is real. The one constant defense is the power of prayer. Continue to lift up your pastor in prayer for protection against the evil one. Continue to pray for strength and boldness to be part of spreading the gospel message into all the world, proclaiming the soon return of Jesus Christ, where he will turn the kingdom over to God, the Father. Even so, Come Lord Jesus!

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. (Heb 12:1-2 NIV)

Two funerals in one week! How does that work? I suppose by "fixing our eyes on Jesus" and knowing "the joy set before" us. I got a call from my first cousin in Louisiana, Wayne Martin, that Aunt Norma had died. The funeral was March 23, 2016. While there I was reading emails from pastors, and Seth Ross sent a note that Kent had died. I shouted out loud "What!!" and woke Rebekah up. His funeral was March 29, 2016. We did two funeral trips in the space of a week!

Aunt Norma was as close to me as a second mother. There were other aunts near, and each one would "whip" you just like your momma if you misbehaved in that rural setting. Funny, but I still think of it as kind of a paradise, the trees, the fields, the fishing, the hunting, the river, etc. To supplement income, the families would have farm crops to eat and to sell. The favorite in the area was strawberries. The three little farms next to each other, Aunt Mabel's, ours, and Aunt Norma's used the children as "slave" labor. Towards the end of the berry season the berries would often get soft and could not be shipped too far so the berries were stemmed for preserves or sold to wineries. At that time, little white worms would sometimes be in the strawberries and we had to cut that part out when we packed them. As we were stemming the berries on Aunt Norma's porch, and cutting out the occasional one with a worm, Aunt Norma would sing... "the worms crawl in, the worms crawl out, crawl in your nose

and out your mouth." She knew it irritated us, and she sang it louder. She was a comedian at times.

For her funeral I recalled this, and I Googled it. It is from "The Hearse Song," possibly from the 1920's, "Don't you laugh as the hearse goes by, for you may be the next one to die. They wrap you up in big white sheets and cover you from head to feet. They put you in big black box, and cover you with dirt and rocks. All goes well for about a week, until your coffin begins to leak, the worms crawl in, the worms crawl out..." Yuk! Actually, the words of Job are not too dissimilar: "For I know that my redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth. And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God. Whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another; though my reins be consumed within me." (Job 19:25-27 KJV).

How do we endure this present evil age of death and dying? In Revelation 2:7 Jesus says, "...To him who overcomes, I will grant to eat of the tree of life which is in the Paradise of God." (Rev 2:7 NASB) We all pray, "Our Father who is in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy Kingdom come, thy will be done, in earth as it is in heaven...." But do we really listen to those words? Jesus is coming back, the kingdom will be established, and He will turn it over to the Father in the ultimate end.

Another favorite verse on our previous paradise is Genesis 3:8a, "Then they heard the sound of Yahweh, the LORD GOD walking in the cool of the evening breeze...." The Persian word for garden is paradise. To imagine that eventually we will walk with God again is beautiful. AND WE WILL!! Revelation 21:3 says "... God's dwelling is with humanity, and He will live with (continued next page)

them. They will be His people, and God Himself will be with them and be their God." (CSB) Jesus will have the millennial kingdom to prepare us for the eternal kingdom to be WITH Abba Father! Revelation 21:4 says, "... THEY WILL SEE HIS FACE!!" It will be paradise again to be with the Father. We will rule and reign on the earth (Rev 5:8,10).

As I said, while in Louisiana, we heard that Kent had died. Due to Resurrection (aka Easter) Sunday, the family delayed the service until Tuesday. Driving up on Monday, this past Monday, I remembered all the good times with Kent and the Ross family. I worked with Francis Burnett and Kent in youth camps in the seventies. Russ Magaw's one-word summary of Kent's disposition was "intense." Yes, he was. He was always, in King James language "...earnestly contending for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints." (Jude 1:3 KJV)

I suggested to the family and friends at the service that many scholars are coming to the biblical first-century faith that we are trying to uphold. As I attended the SBL, Society of Biblical Literature, in Atlanta I heard some bold statements which I would fully agree are the true teachings and thoughts of Jesus. This year will be the Twenty-Fifth Theological Conference that was first suggested by Kent. I will present a paper on "The Ineluctable Shema" (Lord willing!). It will remind people of the simplicity and truth of our faith. The Shema,

in Hebrew is just six words, "Shema Yisrael YHWH Elohinu YHWH Echad!" Or... Hear O Israel, the LORD (YHWH) our God, the LORD (YHWH) is one. Compare that to the hundreds and thousands of words in creeds filled with pagan philosophy. What shall we believe? I suggest, the simple words of scripture. For Jesus, how about the ten simple words of Peter that Jesus said were from the Father, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God. (Mat 16:16 KJV) or... "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God!" (Mat 16:16 CSB) Just ten perfect words for biblical Christology!

At Aunt Norma's funeral, I was glad to speak of the hundreds of cousins and relatives, telling them "The Lord himself will descend from heaven with a shout, the voice of the archangel and the trump of God and the dead in Christ will rise..." That coming will initiate the kingdom, and eventually paradise, on earth again. I was glad to hear Alan Cain remind us at Kent's funeral that our Redeemer will take his stand on the earth, and we will be resurrected! We will be with Jesus and His Father, our God!

Two funerals in one week are not for the faint of heart. However, as we fix our eyes on Jesus and the joy set before us, we look forward to the time of no more death, no more crying, and the former things passing away. Come, Lord Jesus!

Prophecy Page

Thousands of people in the Ukraine experienced a power outage after hackers hit electrical substations during the holiday season, signaling a worrying sign of potential cyberattacks to come.

The power outage in the country first took a regional control center offline resulting in half of the homes in the region to be left without power for several hours on December 23, 2015. The report went on to say that the outage was the result of malware that disconnected electrical substations.

According to security experts who have long cautioned about the possibility for cyberattacks on the power grid, electrical outages can lead to ripple effects that leave communities struggling with things like communication and transportation.

Not long ago, India suffered the world's biggest-ever power outage as transmission networks serving areas inhabited by 680 million collapsed, putting the nation's ramshackle infrastructure on stark display.

The result was trains across the country came to a halt, thousands of hospitals and factories had to operate on generators, hundreds of coal miners underground were temporarily stranded, and businesses losses were estimated in the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Recently, Venezuela's main power distribution network failed, depriving 70 percent of the country of electricity and creating traffic chaos in much of Caracas.

Cyberattacks against infrastructure, such as electricity grids, have also been cause for alarm for politicians. In November, UK chancellor George Osborne confirmed almost £2bn in funding to help protect the UK from cyberattacks. "If the lights go out, the banks stop working, the hospitals stop functioning or government itself can no longer operate, the impact on society could be catastrophic," Osborne said at the time.

This year is going to be critical for the world of attacks against internet-connected industries. Malware is only going to become more deadly.

Of the over 500 electric companies in the US, only a few are trying to protect their equipment. Here are four of the most likely reasons why a grid down situation could happen: 1. An earth-directed coronal mass ejection (CME) from the sun. The electromagnetic radiation could fry high voltage transformers; 2. One or more high-altitude

nuclear blasts from an enemy nation causing an electromagnetic pulse (known as an EMP or HEMP). It could fry most electronics; 3. Cyber-attacks that bring down and damage the computers and the electronic equipment that control the grid; 4. Sabotage that is coordinated to target critical points of our electrical grid in order to make it fail.

A recent Air Force briefing warned about the potential threat of America's enemies attempting to shut down its electrical supply for months via a direct physical terror attack or an electromagnetic pulse explosion.

The Washington Examiner, which had a chance to review the briefing, explained that Air Force officials worry that "determined adversaries" such as North Korea and the Islamic State group want to undermine the country's power supply.

The Conservative Tribune reported last year that the Chinese had successfully used cyber-attacks to steal pertinent data about America's critical infrastructure, particularly the electrical power, telecommunications and internet backbones which are vital to the nation's survival.

It is interesting to note that of the known Islamic training compounds in the United States, most are located near electrical power plants.

The U.S. Department of Energy received 362 reports from electric utilities of physical or cyber-attacks that interrupted power services. In 2013, a Department of Homeland Security branch recorded 161 cyber-attacks on the energy sector, compared to just 31 in 2011.

Worryingly, most of the nation's power infrastructure has poor defenses — sometimes only a security camera and fence. In April 2013, PG&E Corp's Metcalf Transmission Substation in CA reported that over 100 ammunition rounds were fired into its transformers, causing over \$15 million worth of damage. The gunmen were never apprehended, nor have the perpetrators of over 300 physical attacks on electricity infrastructure since 2011.

This is not some danger being pulled out of thin air. It is no conspiracy theory. This is a grave danger to the US that is established in scientific fact. All the experts that have looked into the grid down possibility have warned of the dire consequences. Nevertheless, after over a decade of these warnings, no significant action has been taken to protect the lives of millions of Americans.

History is full of examples of people living in false security before destruction came on them. We know such a condition will exist somewhere. Paul says "For when they say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape." (1 Thess 4:5)

Proposed Constitutional Amendments:

The board of directors is proposing the following amendments to the constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference. The Board believes that the title "Executive Director" more accurately describes the work of the head of our conference/college, rather than "Chief Administrative Officer." The head of the organization attends all meetings of the board of directors and is charged with carrying out actions of the directors. The term "Executive Director" was first approved by delegate action at the 1973 summer conference. As the result of an organizational study committee the delegates approved changing the name of the conference administrator to "President" in the summer of 1985. This title was later changed to "Chief Administrative Officer" by action of the delegates at the 2001 summer conference with a separate position of "President" of Atlanta Bible College. Under this new proposal, the title "President" of Atlanta Bible College will be retained. At present Dr. Joe Martin carries the titles of CAO and President. If these amendments are adopted, he will have the titles of Executive Director and President.

According to the constitution and by-laws (Article V, Section 1), amendments must be printed "in at least three consecutive issues of THE RESTITUTION HERALD and/or the PROGRESS JOURNAL, the first appearance thereof to be at least thirty days prior to the convening of the conference by which it is to be considered." Since the HERALD/JOURNAL is only published four times a year, in order to give adequate notice, delegate action on these amendments will take place at the 2016 summer conference.

Article II, Section 3 c: Current reading regarding who is a delegate at the summer conference: "The Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, President of Atlanta Bible College, and Director of Church/Pastor Services."

New proposed reading: "The Executive Director of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, President of Atlanta Bible College, and Director of Church/Pastor Services."

Article IV, Section 4: Current reading regarding the submission of nominations for the board of directors: "Names of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference by May 1..."

New proposed reading: "Names of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Executive Director of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference by May 1..."

By-Laws, Article II, Section 6 H: Current reading regarding duties of the board: "To employ a Chief Administrative

Officer who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors . . . The Chief Administrative Officer shall meet the qualifications ... The Chief Administrative Officer may be either male or female."

New proposed reading: "To employ an Executive Director who shall be responsible to the board of directors. . . . The Executive Director shall meet the qualifications . . . The Executive Director may be either male or female."

Nominations for the Board of Directors

At General Conference, two directors will be elected to the board of directors. The terms of Julie Driskill and Bob Morrison expire. They may not be nominated. Currently there are two nominees. The board consists of seven directors elected by delegates to the summer conference. The term is for four years.

KOREAN EXTENSION REPORT

KOREA CAMPUS - We have 14 students for the 2016 spring semester, and Younghee An and I have been teaching 3 Bible and 1 ministry classes. As usual, classes are held at the Yahtop church facility for the students from the Seoul-city area every Monday, Tuesday and Sunday; and in the Daejeon church facility, which is approximately 100 miles south from Seoul-city every Saturday for the students from the southern region.

The students have been able to find the biblical truth, especially the coming kingdom, which is the core teaching of Jesus Christ and the core value of the Abrahamic faith. Our ongoing prayer is that these students become the seeds of the Abrahamic faith and be fruitful in South Korea. The students are somewhat sad to hear that Young and I are returning to the North Campus, and I promised to provide online lectures continually as well as block classes. Moreover, four students have decided to travel with me to the U.S. to continue their studies at the North Campus.

Besides our routine recruiting activities, we successfully obtained a promising opportunity to present the Korean Extension and the Abrahamic Faith to a Korean youth group. We were invited to a winter youth retreat, similar to that of FUEL, for several churches in Namwon city 120 miles southwest from Seoul. I was invited to teach Bible content from 9:00AM to 12:00PM on February 13. There were approximately 50 youngsters and several pastors in attendance, and I presented background information about ABC/COGGC and the Abrahamic faith. I also highlighted training for bilingual youth ministers at the North Campus.

By the help of the Spirit, I was able to manage the twoand-half-hour session including a ten minute break without boring the attendees. I still practice one of the teaching principles from Mrs. Lynne Krogh's Christian Education class, which is "Do not bore people with the Word of God." Most of the attendees showed sincere interest in my presentation, and I had positive feedback and commendation from many of the young adults including the pastors. I hope to be invited again.

It is not possible that the truth that saves God's lost children be preached in South Korea without your support and prayer, and we, the Korean staff and the students, would like to extend our sincerest thanks and appreciation to you!

We continue to receive enrollment inquiries, so we are praying that student numbers will exceed our expectations throughout the summer and into the fall.

In terms of our current class offerings, Steve is facilitating two internet-based classes, the Evangelical Theology and the Fundamentals of Theology classes. Pastor Yeo Il Jang is assisting our students through the Service Ministry class by helping students recognize the importance of serving God through every opportunity, and Pastor Young Jung Kim continues to help our students grow closer to God through Christian music and worship classes. Pastor Jae Yun Shim teaches the New Testament Survey, the Epistles, and Church History classes as well as assisting me with administrative duties. I continue to provide instruction through the Old Testament survey class as well as helping students develop proper English language skills through English conversation classes.

The Korean Extension is in the process of developing an accredited English as a Second Language program where students from various cultural backgrounds would have the opportunity to develop English language proficiencies through leveled courses. We are excited about the program as the opportunity would help our institution grow, expanding our educational footprint within the Korean community. I ask for prayer for the program.

In closing, I thank you for the opportunity to be a part of the Church of God General Conference and to serve God through the Korean ministry. Although we have been through a rough patch, I am confident that God has a plan, and I know He will work through us.

- 8. **Lodging/Apartment Rent** rent received from students for apartments rented by the college
- 9. **ABCDF Support** transfer of investment income from the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation
- 10. **Interest and Late Fees** finance charges on outstanding student accounts
- 11. **Application/Miscellaneous Fees** charges for specific services for college students, such as application fees
- 12. **Conferences & Workshops** net income is tracked separately for each event; together, all events provide a modest net income
- 13. Interest interest earned on checking account
- 14. **Other Income** miscellaneous income
- 15. **Tenant Income** income from tenants leasing space in the McDonough, GA office building
- 16. **Transferred In** amounts transferred in from Restricted Funds: from interest income and from funds designed to support General Fund expenses



Summer Conference Report

he 96th annual summer General Conference was held at the North Hills Church in Springfield, OH. The theme of the conference was Church Well Done. Attendees were greatly encouraged during the conference to hear of the church planting efforts of the newly formed Home Mission Advisory Board of Evangelism and Church Growth. Robin Todd, the coordinator, spoke at the first evening service during which he informed the audience of a new church to be started on July 17 in Oklahoma City with Pastor Scott Perciful.


The second evening, Lord's Harvest International Coordinator Rick McClain shared of the tremendous strides that are being taken in mission work around the world. He reported that over \$220,000 was raised and distributed in our mission fields during the past fiscal year.

Dr. Joe Martin was the speaker at the final evening service as he shared additional thoughts about our mission work as well as the work of Atlanta Bible College, the Korean Extension, and the South Korea campus.

Jan Stilson and David Krogh represented the History Committee in the Thursday morning worship service by honoring the 25 pastors who have died in the first 16 years of this century. Pastor Dan Gill encouraged the membership by reporting on the great opportunities to advance the message of truth and salvation through social media and websites. He spoke at the Thursday afternoon service. Seth Ross

presented a challenging message about youth ministry at the Friday morning worship service. Pastor Wally Winner and Greg Demmitt introduced two recently licensed pastors: Daniel

Calcagno of Glad Tidings Church in Fonthill, Ontario, and Scott Perciful of Oklahoma City. Prayer was offered for them and Daniel's wife, Sarah, at the Friday afternoon service.



At the Friday afternoon business session, Board Chairperson Bob Morrison announced that Pastor Seth Ross has been selected as the new Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference and President of Atlanta Bible College. Earlier in the meeting, delegates had approved constitutional revisions which change the title of the administrator of the Conference from Chief Administrative Officer to Executive Director. Seth will assume his duties in January 2017. Following the announcement of his appointment, he spoke briefly to the delegates about his sense of God's leading toward this work while being conflicted about leaving the North Hills Church where he has served for the past twenty years.

New Board Members

Pastor Michael Cisler and Pastor Joe Myers were elected to four-year terms on the board of directors, replacing retiring members Julie Driskill and Bob Morrison. Plaques were presented to



Julie and Bob by Dr. Martin. Following the election, the board elected officers. Chris James is chairperson; Carrie Briggs is vice chairperson; Dan Knowlton will continue as secretary; and Dennis Sharp is treasurer. The board was installed at the Friday evening service by Pastor Michael Hoffman, representing the Ministerial Association Leadership Team.

Registration

Eighty delegates consisting of 38 church delegates, 6 state/district conference delegates, 7 board members, and 29 pastors were present. About one hundred thirty were registered for the conference, about 275 attending at least part of the conference. Two hundred attended the first evening service.

Many workshops on a variety of topics were presented. Music was directed by Nate Kizer and others. A couple of musical numbers were presented by the Maranatha Singers, a group that sang together at Oregon Bible College in 1966-67.

Other Business

Rebecca Dauksas was re-elected by the delegates to a three-year term on the Youth Advisory Council.

Chairman's Message to the Delegates

Welcome, delegates, pastors, pastors' wives, youth, and other members to the business session of the 96th General Conference of the Church of God Abrahamic Faith. Abrahamic Faith. I remember reading that on a church sign in Lafayette a block from my uncle's house in the little store front church that served that neighborhood. My friends and I would meet sometimes on that corner, since it was an easy landmark in that area. We thought it was a Jewish synagogue, or something related, because of the "Abrahamic Faith" moniker.

That was over 40 years ago. I was baptized at that church as the start of my spiritual journey, taking Jesus Christ as my personal savior. It's a decision I have never once questioned nor regretted. My understanding of biblical truth started in that little church and grew from the Berean youth camps I would attend throughout the rest of my childhood. It was all due to a love for God and His Son, and a love for preaching the

truth by the several pastors who influenced my life over all these years, and who still do influence my life. Just last month I had another dose of influence from my best friend Tom New, as his persistence in getting me to help at the Arkansas Youth camp finally got me there. He introduced me to the kids of the 'kids' he had in camp a couple decades ago as he labored to build up the camp and the youth groups in those states. Delegates approved a revised budget of \$932,550 for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. This compares with \$893,050 for the 2015-2016 fiscal year. The new budget calls for contributions of \$410,000. A proposed budget for the 2017-2018 fiscal year of \$990,050 was also approved by the delegates. The minutes of the meeting appear on pages 9-11.

The board asked delegates for a straw vote on increasing the amount requested for each appeal for the Church Builders League. The current amount of \$25 was adopted in 1990. Because of inflation, it would take about \$45 to equal the \$25 set twenty-six years ago. Delegates were supportive of suggesting \$35, and perhaps increasing the amount again in the future.

Appointments

The Board appointed Cheryl Ross, and reappointed Jim Hamilton and Valerie Smith to terms on the ABC Development Foundation board.

Board members serve on Advisory Committees and organizations within the conference. Chris James was reappointed to the Academic Advisory Committee. Michael Cisler was appointed as the representative of the board to serve on the Youth Advisory Committee. Scott Millard was reappointed to the Lords Harvest Board. Carrie Briggs was appointed to the Investment Committee. Dennis Sharp was appointed to the Home Mission Committee.

We are very grateful for the hospitality of Pastor Seth Ross and the North Hills Church that hosted the conference. We also are thankful for all who served on the program and helped to make the conference a great success. Thanks to all for the great food, great fellowship, and wonderful hospitality.


Next year's conference will be held at the Cornerstone Bible Church in McDonough, GA July 26-28. Make plans now to attend.

It's been quite an experience, one that I'm not sure I'd want to do over again, but one that I'm proud and humbled to say I served as best I could, and always tried to put the interest of the conference first, and always... always, tried to listen to God's voice. Which I can say I heard in more ways than one on several occasions.

This year has been a good year to be serving on the board of directors. There are several things I'd like to highlight.

- Exciting year as we began the process of finding a new CAO/Executive Director after Dr. Joe announced he was ready to move on and begin serving where God wanted him next. We began by creating a search committee, who met for months, calling many people. The board then interviewed several really good candidates, and we are now on the verge of announcing who was chosen and asked to serve you in this capacity. We need and ask for your continued help and support to transition to a new staff for the future. I'm hopeful that we all see this as an exciting decision in the COG and that we support this change. I ask that you all support this change with prayer, with encouragement, and financially.
- Assistance to churches has increased substantially as we look to the proposed 2017/18 budget. I remember my first year on the board, the assistance to churches was nearly zero. Next year it's set to be around \$40K. This is due mainly to the great work that Robin Todd is doing with planting churches throughout the west and his work in Washington state.
- SWAT teams are being organized to plant these churches. Core groups are being started and ready to support a church plant in numerous cities. The board accepted the Oklahoma City church to the conference yesterday! We welcome Scott Perciful as their first pastor. Robin Todd is using people working full-time jobs and devoting time to ministry. Wouldn't it be great if some of you in this room would step up to be part of this work. I want to encourage you all to support this project.
- Due to some great effort by Dr. Joe and his staff, giving is up this year! It is so much easier to plan the work of the conference when so many

people support the work and show it by the generous giving that is taking place. Thank you!





a possible path toward accreditation to accept students who need to learn English. Plus being a huge help in recruiting new Korean students.

- Steve An is back in the US after his mission work in Korea to get another college extension started. We are so grateful for his work, and Sam's leadership while Steve was gone, and glad to have him and Young back.
- New housing for the college students is well under way. One house is built, and a second was purchased for less than construction cost. This will eliminate the need to rent from the apartments and be at the mercy of increases, and, once loans are paid, will eliminate rent payments to the apartments. Last year about \$60K was spent on rent. This is money which in the future can be used to support the ministry instead of paying a landlord. This is the first year we haven't had to pay rent through the summer!
- Free tuition program for COG students was a success, with many students taking advantage of the opportunity. We now have several minister interns working this summer at our churches, who will soon be ready to pastor churches on their own. I have one of these young men helping me in my own pastorate. But we need donors for future tuition program. Money used was from the interest from scholarship endowment fund. That available money now stands at \$0.
- Mission trip to Africa was a great success. Three church buildings are to be built in Mozambique, and three in Malawi. The team traveled to Kenya and met with twenty prospective pastors for three days. The COG is now legal in Kenya and is starting to boom!

It's a scary comparison to think that we can send a preacher to Africa and can have 400 people show up, many who walk hours to get there just to hear the gospel message of Jesus Christ. Yet,

in America, if one of you pastors ventures into a city park these days you'd likely be met by five people. One who would ask to see your permit, two who would be there to protest your message, and one who would be there to serve you with an arrest warrant.

But the good news is, I know many of our preachers. And I know we will not be deterred from preaching the gospel to all the world. The coming kingdom is upon us! The Church of God has a bright future. We have a vital role in bringing the truth of God's kingdom, with Jesus returning to establish a kingdom upon this earth, where the dead will rise to meet him, then we who are alive to meet him as well. Where we will rule with Christ, in that kingdom, forever! Amen?

Our mission at this General Conference is to look to the future. And as we look to the future, I would like to take just a moment to honor the past.

I would like to begin by honoring two men who have spent their lives serving the COG and the General Conference: David Krogh and Joe Martin.

This conference marks the seventy-first year in a row that David Krogh has attended a General Conference. He has worked tirelessly for more than 40 years serving at the GC. He has sacrificed by giving his talents and abilities rather than seek more lucrative careers in the secular world. I can't say enough about David's heart for service and his dedication to the work of the conference. I have had great pleasure in working closely with David while on the board.

Joe Martin. What can I say? There aren't enough words to express my respect and admiration to Joe. He has served as CAO since 2009. Joe and I have been through so much together the past seven years. I have been blessed by knowing, and serving with, Joe. Joe has faithfully served the conference and college for many years. He could've had a very lucrative career in construction or teaching at a major university. But he stayed and sacrificed for his Lord and Savior to serve the GC and COG. Like so many pastors in our conference have done. He has been an inspiration to me and so many. David and Joe have created a lasting legacy at the college and conference. And more recently, Lynne Krogh and Rebekah Martin, and most recently, Marilyn Morrison. I know you all have your own list of pastor's wives who have been a great influence on you as well.

All of those pastors' wives endured countless nights of worry and hurt over things their husbands were going through. All prayed for their husbands countless times. All tried to figure out where the money was coming from to feed the kids, pay the bills... some going without basic necessities, like glasses, dental checkups, or just going out on dates, a decent car, and decent clothes.

Some of this is due to the shame of some churches, who don't recognize the need or feel the pain to provide a decent living for their spiritual leader. Some I know is due to circumstances beyond a church's control, but often it's due to neglect and lack of compassion. If that's the case in your church, please... work to change that.

I'd like to take a moment to honor Marilyn...to thank her for the many times she saw me struggling with the issues

faced as board chair. She was there always to support and pray for me.

Join me in honoring Lynn... to thank her for the decades of quietly supporting David through countless struggles, meeting budgets and facing criticisms of COG members. Of supporting David's faith and dedication to the conference.

Join me in honoring Rebekah... to thank her for her tireless, dedicated, loving support of Joe as he led the conference through some dark days... often with tears and a heavy heart. Rebekah would always invite me to stay with them during board meetings, and during our drives to the office, Joe and I would often comment on how our wives had to put up with our impatience and critical natures, and just put up with us in general, through our many flaws.

Please join me in honoring all of the pastors' wives... to thank them for their many years of dedication to the ministry of their husbands, supporting their insecurities, along with defending them in the face of trials in their churches.

Where would we be without you all?!

Jesus had women around him who supported him, cared for him, cried for him, prayed for him. Look at these women standing and realize the devotion each of them has for their Lord by the dedication each has shown for their husbands in their ministries. Each could share countless stories of hardship, but also of blessing in serving their God and His Son, their churches, and the conference of the COG.

You all are to be commended for serving from the heart. Nothing compares in this life to the heart of a good wife as she works side by side with her pastor husband.

You have to put up with his insecurities, "Honey, how was my sermon today?" And you have to tell white lies once in a while to protect his fragile ego. "It was very good." "Honey, did you like the way I changed the order of service?" You know from hearing the comments coming from the back row that several thought the changes were terrible. I began by saying that this was a time for looking to the future. And it is. It's good to honor the past, but we should do that only as a means to encourage further work that needs to be done. Honoring the past is way of highlighting good work in order to lift others up to want to continue doing the good work of the kingdom of God

As we look to the future, I want us to consider the words of Paul.

"Now it is God who makes both us and you stand firm in Christ. He anointed us, set His seal of ownership on us, and put His spirit in our hearts as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come." 2 Cor. 1:21, 22

Do you hear what Paul is saying?

God has commissioned you to good work. He has set a seal upon you, His seal of ownership.

And if that's not enough, He made the first deposit or installment by placing His Holy Spirit in your heart as a guarantee for what is to come. Or who you will become. This is better than the six months same as cash deals. It's the first installment on eternal life. The Holy Spirit guarantees that we belong to God. God's Spirit guarantees that salvation is ours now, and that we will receive so much more when Christ returns. It doesn't get any better than this!!!

So I started talking about the list of the positive things that have happened this year for the conference. I want to look at one more aspect of that as we close.

Some of you may think you aren't qualified or have the right talents to serve God in advancing His kingdom. I want to highlight what Robin Todd mentioned last night. If you have a talent, let someone know. Find ways to serve in the great

commission. Which, as my friend Rick McClain likes to say, "to get as many people into the kingdom as possible." But you may have doubts as to your ability. If this describes you, let me give you this illustration.

I think this is like when a couple first gets married. Think about that time for those of you who are or have been married. What qualifications (continued on page 7)

Board Update By Dennis Sharp

What kind of experience is it to be a first-year member of the board of directors? If you keep reading, I'd like to tell you about having just completed my first year on the board. First, I want to thank Bob Morrison for asking me to do this and giving me this space where he would normally be writing his chairman's report. Our new chairman is Chris James, and he will be communicating board highlights for the next 12 months.

The board is composed of seven members, elected by the delegates at our annual General Conference. It's a blessing to serve with these board members who put God first, sacrifice their personal time, and are dedicated to make the college and conference forces to sustain and grow our ministry for God. Each board member serves a four-year term. Broadly speaking, it is the responsibility of the directors to oversee and provide fiscally sound programs and strategic direction for the college and conference. This is what I focused on fiscally sound programs and strategic direction - and where I tried to add value, as a member of the group. Serving as a member of this board is something that I have really wanted to do. We each need to ask ourselves, "What is the best way for me to serve God at this time in my life?" I felt it was the right service at the right time. I had just retired from my job (a little early) and serving on the board was one of five key items in my retirement plan that I wanted to pursue. I am very thankful to the people of the Church of God for giving me that opportunity.

During my first year on the board, my time was focused on understanding the people, the organization, and how it operated. This was very beneficial for me personally, because I have never been involved with the college and conference at the national level. My 50+ years in the Church of God had been largely devoted to my home church – Timberland Bible Church in South Bend, Indiana. I did not have the familiarity with the organization that many have, but serving on the board has given me that opportunity.

It became apparent that four key areas of responsibility would become my prime focus to complement the group. They were finance, the CAO search, Home Missions Board, and the promotion of the college and conference. Some of these were assigned and some pursued of my own interest, which can be easily explained.

My adult work life has been spent in operations management. One lesson I learned very well was that you

cannot understand any organization until you understand their finances: how the money comes in and how it goes out. This was a little different in a non-profit organization. Not only were there still balance sheets, income and expense statements, but also foundations, general funds, restricted funds, money borrowed,



and money invested among the items that needed a clear understanding. Like anything else, you study it until you understand it, and you ask questions. Many thanks go to Denise Cramer for her patience in getting answers to my questions.

The second key area was the CAO search, which was presented to us all. Timing is everything, and it was time. Dr. Joe Martin was ready to move on to other pursuits, and we needed to do our part to make that possible for him. The hiring of a CAO to oversee the conference and college is an important board function. This was a valuable experience for all of us, but definitely a rare and rewarding experience for a first-year board member. We had a part in selecting the person that will lead us into the future, cast a new vision, and a new beginning. He will play a key role in growing and developing our people and churches, and he will be a key facilitator of managing the structure that brings the greatest message on earth to all of God's people. Bob Morrison skillfully handled this so that all board members had equal input into the decision. A search committee was formed, a skills matrix was developed to identify the traits and skills we wanted in a CAO, we assembled a list of potential prospects, contacts were made, interviews were conducted, and we prayed a lot. We had a "day of prayer" throughout our churches asking God for guidance and direction. There is no doubt that the process of going through this search caused all of us to closely examine and analyze the college and conference in a way we would otherwise not have done. It was very beneficial, and again, especially for a first-year board member. The entire board felt God's leading, and, as you now know, He led us to Seth Ross, who we were excited to announce as our new Executive Director.

The third key area assigned to me was the Home Missions Board. Each board member serves on a committee, such as overseas missions (LHI), youth, academic

advisory, and investment. Home Missions is the counterpart to overseas missions. It is headed up by Robin Todd who works with scattered brethren throughout the United Stated in an effort to plant new churches. Their first new church, Restoration Christian Fellowship in Oklahoma City, was just granted membership at try by serving internships: Nathan Massie in Kokomo, General Conference. Robin does the vast majority of the work on this. Board members largely serve as liaisons between the committees and the conference providing financial and strategic direction when needed. Already on the radar for future churches are Tulsa, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, Denver, Colorado Springs, and cities in Florida and California. There is tremendous potential here and we are very hopeful and excited by the early success and future prospects.

Simplicity. How could it get any simpler?

Stephen Covey promoted a saying, "Let the Main Thing be the Main Thing." The Bible says it even better, "the more the words, the less the meaning." (Ecc 6:11 NIV) And, "God made man simple, his complex problems are of his own devising." (Ecc 7:29 JB) Having just gotten back from Africa, I have become fascinated even more by the creed of Jesus and the Jews, "YHWH Elohenu, YHWH

Echad." (Dt 6:4, Mk 12:29)
This is also known as the
Shema. That's just four simple words (in Hebrew) that
we are to listen to and heed.
Shema is in the imperative, a
command. Akoue, in Greek
(Mk 12) is also in the imperative, a command. The LORD/
YHWH our God, the LORD/
YHWH is one.

Why did Jesus quote this at the "first, foremost, chief,

and most important" (various translations of *protos*) command? I told the Africans in Mozambique, Malawi, and Kenya that I would live and die with the simple words of the Bible rather than manmade creeds of man, and later Christianity. I am, we are, biblical monotheist. Let's live and die with the simple words of scripture.

But, but, but... what about Jesus? I can hear some now. Let's take a short look at the simplicity of who Jesus is. In Matthew 3:17 after Jesus' baptism, God also had four simple words to begin with about Jesus, "This is my Son....." He added "...whom I love; with him I am well pleased." (NIV) But please understand the beauty of this simplicity. God/YHWH said simply, "this is my Son." Yes, I

understand there are complications as to "how" and "when" and "why," but the simplicity is absolutely there! Just as the four simple words "in the beginning God..." can get wrapped up in man's theories of chronology and cosmology, could we just for a moment revel in the beauty of the simplicity of these basic things? Take God's word for Jesus. I will live and die for the simple words of God our Father.

How about what Jesus said? He was accused of elevating himself to "God status," and he had a major conversation with the monotheistic Jews of his time. In John 10:29, he says the "Father is greater than all," and then the enigmatic, mysterious, "I and the Father are one." (v. 30) They picked up stones to stone him, claiming he made himself

to be God. Please notice the simplicity in Jesus' rebuttal, in the Greek, four simple words, UIOS TOU THEOU EIMI, (υἰὸς τοῦ θεοῦ εἰμι). A direct translation, I said, "Son of God I am." In our English, I AM THE SON OF GOD! Why do we complicate this? Jesus "did not grasp at equality with God!" Yet he is the Son of God, the Messiah.

What did Peter say and what did Jesus think about his answer? In Matthew 16, Jesus questioning the disciples said, "But who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." (Mt 16:16 NIV) Jesus is thrilled with Peter's answer and says,

After Bob's message, Rex Cain showed us a photograph of David Krogh during his racing days. David then shared the delegate numbers for this year. There are 29 pastor delegates, 38 church delegates, 6 state conference delegates, and 7 Board delegates, for a total of 80 delegates. This is 10 fewer than last year.

Denise Cramer then presented the financial reports.

On the income and expense reports, contributions were higher than projected, which

included a particularly large donation. Salaries are higher than projected, though they are lower than last year with a larger staff.

Bob Morrison pointed out the GC is the only 501(c)3 organization in Henry County that is paying property taxes. Joe Myers pointed out we were paying \$12,000 per month in rent for the Avalon building a few years ago.

On the Restricted Funds report, we see \$219,873 in contributions for missions, a huge increase from last year.

On the Balance Sheet, we see loans payable for the house purchase and the house build were moved into the General Fund.

Chairman Bob paid tribute to Bob Jones for his many years of teaching and service, and to his loving wife Nola. He also spoke of Denise, Kim, and Robin for the excellent work they are doing for the conference now, and of Julie

Driskill for her service on the board. Bob and Julie are both leaving the board after this conference.

Bob opened the floor for nominations for the Board of Directors. Nominations for Michael Cisler and Joe Myers have been submitted before conference, though we need a minimum of three. Scott Millard nominated Michael Cisler on behalf of the Ministerial Association.

We next discussed the amendments to the constitution presented by the board. The board proposed a change of the title of Chief Administrative Officer to Executive Director. Keith Williams moved to accept the amendments as presented. Joe James seconded. After discussion, Bob called for count of raised delegate cards. A constitutional amendment requires a two-thirds vote to pass. Motion carried with 70 votes.

Vice Chairman Chris James spoke to the delegates about the CAO search process over the last couple of years. Bob then announced Seth Ross as the board's selection for Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference. He stated he is honored to accept this responsibility, and he is looking forward to working with Joe and the staff and the churches.




Heritage Conference

KOREA CAMPUS

The 2016 spring semester was completed with 13 students on May 9th. And shortly after, Young and I returned to the North Campus in Duluth GA. For the 2016 fall semester, my classes taught at the Northeast campus will be recorded and provided as media files to pastor Younghee An in Korea, and she will facilitate my classes through video/internet. Also, a block class for the students in Korea is scheduled for the winter, in which I will teach in person. My plan is to lead the students spiritually, as well as providing them with academic knowledge. My main focus is to continue to encourage the students to sustain the Abrahamic Faith that they have been learning in the classes.

I have been continually witnessing dramatic conversions among the student body through the Abrahamic Faith in the classes. For example, the Yebon (meaning likeness of Jesus) Full Gospel Church is located in Namyang-ju City in the Kyunggi-do province approximately 25 miles west of the downtown of Seoul. A woman pastor Yeonok Kim has been enrolled since 2015, referred by one of her friends who is a fellow classmate. Pastor Kim has been under dialysis treatment three times a week due to kidney failure. Pastor Kim has been deeply inspired by the kingdom message, the coming kingdom of Messiah on the earth at the return of Jesus Christ. For some time, she had the typical traditional Korean Christianity which is seeking prosperity in this age, such as money, good health, and so forth. This false idea had caused her to be skeptical about God's promise and Christian faith, and as a pastor, she has been reluctant to announce her health condition to her congregation. Since she found the truth of the kingdom message from the Bible, which is the true promise and the blessing of God, her heart was filled with biblical hope and joy similar to that of Apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians. Miraculously, she was convinced of the Christian faith to God's promise, and she announced her health condition proudly like Paul to her congregation. Since then, she has been proclaiming the kingdom message with passion and confidence.

I was invited twice each month for Sunday service messages, including the church's first anniversary service, and I also led Bible studies for the youth group. I have witnessed the spiritual conversions of the adult and the youth members. I expect that the church will replace the sign of Yebon Full Gospel Church to Yebon Church of God Abrahamic Faith soon.

As I have been experiencing this and many other spiritual conversions, I cannot help but to feel a great admiration for the COGGC/ABC for preserving the priceless treasure of the soul saving truth the Abrahamic Faith, which provides truthful hope and joy to the lost sheep of God living in this evil age. I am confident that COGGC/ABC deserves to be called by our Lord Christ, that "You are good and faithful servants!"

My heart is filled with deep respect and gratitude to all of you, and may God bless you, your family and your ministries.



Prophecy Page

To be enacted late in July 2016 is a new Russian law that prohibits evangelism and preaching outside statesanctioned sites. The law will amend a 1997 Russian religion law to ban preaching, praying, proselytizing and disseminating religious materials outside statesanctioned religious sites.

Among its most controversial provisions, the law increases security agencies' access to private communications, requiring telecom companies to store all telephone conversations, text messages, videos, and picture messages for six months and make this data available to authorities. Members of a religious group would also potentially be barred from e-mailing invitations to people interested in services.

Additionally, it bars things like prayer meetings from taking place anywhere except for officially recognized religious buildings. That would potentially forbid house churches.

Russians who share their faith or distribute certain types of religious messages through mass print, broadcast or online media may face fines or potentially be expelled from Russia.

Well, it is Russia. It is long way from the religious freedom of the United States. Except...

 The Iowa Civil Rights Commission is being sued for claiming it has the right to control the content of church services that are "open to the public."

At issue in the lowa case are state mandates that protect "transgender rights." Among them are allowing men to enter women's shower rooms, dressing rooms and restrooms if they say they are women, and banning statements in meetings "open to the public" that "might cause individuals to believe that they are unwelcome because of their perceived gender identity."

The U.S. Supreme Court left standing a lower court decision that Washington state pharmacists who are Christian must violate their faith in order to practice their profession. The second decision came from a federal judge in Mississippi who said county clerks in the state must violate their faith to hold their office.

Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito, who warned there was evidence that the "impetus for the adoption of the

regulations was hostility to pharmacists whose religious beliefs regarding abortion and contraception are out of step with prevailing opinion in the state."

In the Mississippi ruling from Judge Carlton Reeves, who once punished a school district for allowing a voluntary prayer at an optional awards ceremony, said clerks in the state cannot cite their religious beliefs to excuse themselves from issuing marriage licenses to homosexual duos.

- Missouri State University dismissed a student from a counseling program for expressing opposition to counseling same-sex duos.
- Again in Iowa, Gortz Haus Gallery and Bistro owners Betty and Richard Odgaard were sued by a homosexual duo.
- In Texas, David and Edie Delmore, who own a bakery, were approached by Ben Valencia and Luis Marmolejo about a cake for a "gay wedding." They declined, referring the potential customers to other bakers. Subsequently, their home has been vandalized, and their son has been threatened with rape.
- Family-owned Memories Pizza in Indiana owner was interviewed by a local TV station in the aftermath of the adoption of the state's religious freedom law. Responding to a reporter's question, the owner said that while her restaurant serves "gays," her Christian faith wouldn't allow her to cater a "gay wedding." The restaurant immediately became a focal point of outrage with threats of death and destruction, causing the owners to shut down their business.
- A North Carolina pastor was relieved of his duties as an honorary chaplain of the state house of representatives after he closed a prayer by invoking the name of Jesus.

Ron Baity, pastor of Berean Baptist Church in Winston-Salem had been invited to lead prayer for an entire week but his tenure was cut short when he refused to remove the name Jesus from his invocation.

'How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how Everywhere, people wanted us to express to can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? These have long been my favorite verses for working in the mission field. Everyone is not able to go to another country. However, everyone can spread God's good news because you are in a mission field wherever you are. Thank you so much for your prayers, gifts, and financial support for this trip!

In May, Pastor Rufus Meyers, Jeremy Martin (our son), Josiah Cain, Joe and I started out our trip by going to Malawi. We were greatly blessed by being able to stay in a house in Blantyre, recently purchased for use of people going over to Malawi for Africa missions. This will enable us to leave things there that we usually have to haul over to Africa and back every time, as well as have a home base, and we will be able to stay over there longer in the future.

At one of the churches in Malawi, a 20-year celebration of us working together with them was held, and it was great! Many churches came together, and I think there were about 300 people there. It was so good to see old friends who are brothers and sisters in Christ!

All the places we went, there was heartfelt thanks for the support for food and fertilizer. you how much they appreciate your help. The flooding and winds destroyed last year's crops.

They planted this year, and with the fertilizer you helped provide, the crops looked great! Then, shortly before the crops were mature, it stopped raining. The ensuing drought killed most of the crops. Unfortunately, the problem of not having enough food exists again, so they will continue needing help for a while.

We were not able to get visas to cross over into Mozambique because of the 'silent war' going on. Many of the Mozambique pastors were able to cross the river and come into Malawi to two different churches near the border where we had services with them. Please pray for our Mozambique brothers and sisters. Their country is unsafe right now, and the only place of refuge is in a church. The rebels will not harm anyone inside a church building. So, whole villages are trying to fit into churches to be safe. They usually stay the night there. I don't know what they do in the daytime.

A word about the two who have not gone to Malawi before:

Josiah was our official photographer/ videographer and did an awesome job! He organized his work every night, and posted pictures on Facebook, which I know many of you saw and wrote comments about. He also did a great job with his teachings. His red hair was a big hit. :) The word for 'fire' in Chichewa is moto; so, he was called Moto. He is very personable, and was a great asset on the entire trip.

Jeremy also did a wonderful job with teachings! He was very good with the children and a huge blessing on the trip. He's writing about his experiences on the Africa trip, so I'll let him speak for himself. Read his article "What I learned in

Rufus had not been to Malawi for 10-12 years, and was excited about going! Most things were still familiar to him. He is always enthusiastic and upbeat...traits that are always an asset! He and Joe spoke at almost every service. It would have gone too long if each of us spoke every time, so the rest of us took turns at different services.

Jeremy and Rufus left for home after the Malawi trip, and Josiah, Joe and I met Kim Raper and Kim Laurent for the Kenya part of the trip in Nairobi. This was Kim Laurent's first time to Kenya, and she did a fantastic job with everything! (So did Kim Raper!) The two Kims are both *great* teachers and travel-mates. They are both really good with children, and very loving and compassionate with everyone.

Kenya was amazing! The work there is going on very well. The people we work with are very evangelistic, and God's word is spreading quickly. We had a three-day conference in the NW at Maturu, and a three-day conference in the SW at Kisii. There are currently about 20 churches in Kenya, and the pastors formed a national board of directors while we were there!

Many baptisms were reported in each of the countries we visited. We left money for three church buildings in Mozambique and three in Malawi at about \$2,000 each, nine bicycles in

each country at about \$100 each, two motor-bikes for pastors who need to travel long distances at about \$450 each. In Kenya we were able to purchase two different plots of land for church buildings, one for Pastor Aggrey and one for Pastor Chahilu. We purchased and distributed 262 Bibles at \$7 each among the three countries. Highlighters, pens, and eye glasses were donated by some of you (Thank You!!), and distributed in each country. We also gave out some soccer balls and pumps for the children/orphans at several of the churches, and bought clothes and food for orphans.

Thank you for helping serve the African mission field with your love, prayers, and financial support.


