I Found God!! Eureka!

ave you ever had a discovery that was so exciting? Recently Rebekah and I met with a doctor about my continued sciatic problems, bad lower back pain, shooting pain in the right leg, a numb, and even floppy, right foot that had a mind of its own. About every two or three years, it kicked in, usually after I had tried to be "macho man" lifting things I shouldn't have tried to lift. I remember going to chapel at the Morrow campus and just lying on my back on the carpet in the back of the chapel to get some relief for the pain. I also remember cutting a giant limb over my mother's house. The next day I was writhing in pain and going to the emergency room for help. They gave me some "good" drugs that relieved the pain, but had me seeing money floating in the air that I was trying to reach to keep Rebekah from going shopping and spending it. Ask her! The last incident was after lots of bumpy roads in Africa on our mission trip and also lugging around several fifty-pound suitcases. I could barely walk in Nairobi at the end of our trip. I had to lean on someone often just to walk.

Let's fast forward to the doctor's appointment. After Africa, I eventually in September got an MRI from our medical clinic, Kaiser Permanente. We carried the CD of that to the doctor who had access to my files. Having never met the guy, I didn't know how his "bedside manner" would be. Rebekah and I were surprised when he walked in with a weird grin and said, "You have a broken back!" Well, so much for bedside manner, just straight -forward facts. He was very polite after that, and even made a few jokes, but at least I knew what my situation was. He did not recommend surgery, possible fusion of the vertebrae above



and below the broken one, L5, lumbar vertebrae. It would likely be worse after the surgery, he said. He also said, "No more heavy lifting! If it gets worse, call me."

On the way home, Rebekah and I both were stunned, but at least we then knew what the source of my ever recurring situation was! I now have a legitimate excuse to say "I can't help you move. I have a broken back!"

What if we all had a similar problem with joy and happiness? Nothing we do helps, new car, new house, new spouse, new job, new boss, new church. Nothing helps. Eventually we remain the same sad, sorrowful, full of pain person. Oh, the new truck might give us a buzz, but eventually it gets a scratch and the "joy" fades quickly. Oh, the new spouse might give us a "buzz" for a while, but eventually he/ she gets on our nerves like the former spouse/s. Second marriages get divorced about 65% of the time. Third marriages get divorced about 75-80% of the time. We know this is true.

Where then do we get "relief" or true joy, or happiness? The Bible gives us some clear hints. "The joy of the LORD is your strength." (Neh. 8:10) Also, the perpetual happiness seeker Solomon notes in Ecclesiastes 2:25, "For without HIM, who can eat or find enjoyment." (emphasis on HIM added) Solomon, in the later years of life, found the "one" thing. Eureka!

Thirty-one times in Ecclesiastes he uses the term "vanity", compared in some translations to "chasing the wind." Twenty-nine times (KJV) he uses the term "under the sun." What is the point? Under the sun...without God in our lives... we will never find what we seek in everything else, true joy and happiness! I have suggested in my classes, seven "P's" that Solomon considers trying to replace God... Pleasure, People, Power, Places, Projects, Possessions and Position. Possibly for our age throwing in "pharmaceuticals," and alcohol would fit that too, even in Solomon's times.

When we do find the real source of blessing. . . What a blessing! "Seek

ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you!" (Mt. 6:33) Would not the God who created us know what will be best to eventually bring us true joy, happiness and peace? Yes! The Psalmist is clear "Delight yourself in the LORD; And he will give you the desires of your heart." And... they will not be the same desires you or I have had before we set God as the ultimate priority.

I have been on a quest to find YHWH in the Hebrew scriptures for the last seven or eight years, since the new "Bibleworks" software has come out. I could search the tetragrammaton, YHWH, in all its forms, and the number I kept continually getting was 6,828 times! In the pure form, four letters, 6,007 times. I looked through all the prefix forms, L, to or for, B, in or by, V, and M, from out of, but I could never find all 6,828! Usually I found only 6,815 or so. The other day, my study day at home, I decided to look at all the verses, yes all 6,828, for the

form. Imagine looking at יהוה, the name of God 6,828 times! Then, in the middle, after about 3,000 verses of looking, in Psalm 68:21 I found a double prefix, VLYHWH, or And To YHWH, Eureka! With that I eventually found all the rest KMYHWH, YBYHWH, and the tricky two HYHW (The YHWH) and SYHWH (Who YHWH). I am not a Hebrew scholar, but I found every time the name of God is used in the Hebrew Bible!

I haven't "fixed" my back yet, but I know the source now, and how I need to watch myself carefully. Similarly, I haven't found true joy, happiness nor peace since I believe that will only come, come kingdom come. However, I know the source! Through God's plan in Christ Jesus, I can have an abundant, peaceful life anticipating the great abundance and peace of the kingdom itself. Hallelujah, Praise God, Amen! I found God, as the source, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

GIVING STUDENTS A HOME

Giving students a safe place to live in community with others, while attending Atlanta Bible College is extremely important. We are blessed to have two houses within walking distance of ABC... one for male students, the other for female students.

Each house can legally house 6 students, and our men's house is at capacity. The women's house is half-full. If just one more male student enrolls at ABC and needs housing, we don't have room. Our hope, of course, is that more than one additional student enrolls, but it would necessitate renting an apartment nearby. That poses at least 2 problems... 1) it's expensive, and 2) that student is cut off from the others and is not able to live within their student community.

Recently Don and Marj Overmyer have generously given \$100,000 to be used for the construction of an additional home. The cost of a furnished student home is approximately \$140,000-\$150,000. The board will launch a campaign this winter inviting

others to join Don and Marj Overmyer to build and furnish a home debt-free for students. If you would like to join them in this effort, more specific details will be available soon. Your participation will help create a place where students can form life-long relationships while studying God's word for the purpose of ministry in one of our churches. After a discussion with David Krogh, for the coming semester, I will still be teaching at least three days a week with a ten-hour teaching load, which is full-time in some institutions. With our children in both Phoenix and Knoxville, we will have some choices of where to spend more time in the future, just not right now.

I had some "interesting" information recently. I have had what I thought was "sciatica" problems, numbness in the right foot and pain in the right leg. At a recent specialist doctor's visit to review this, he walked in and exclaimed, "You have a broken back!" Evidently, in the past, my L5 lumbar vertebrae was broken in half and floats between my back muscles. He does not recommend surgery, since it might worsen the situation. But he said no more heavy lifting! Now I have an excuse when someone wants me to help them move!

The response to the Louisiana flooding was great. We have received about thirty thousand dollars for that. With the news of the hurricane in Haiti, there is a need there. Plus, other mission fields are in partial distress as well. Please review the mission reports. I am still very proud of the over two hundred thousand dollars given in missions last year. The trip to Peru was a great success. Please continue to reach out from our local churches.

Theologically, the COGGC is in a very special time. In a recent survey of U.S. Christians, it was noted that most Christians believe that Jesus is the greatest creation of God!

(This goes against the current orthodoxy of Nicaea and Chalcedon.) Professor Daniel Kirk speaks of the human Jesus as the second Adam as Paul does. Seventy percent agreed there's only one true God. (Jn 17:3) Most believe "the Holy Spirit is a divine force but not a personal being." This is an interesting report that maybe the regular Christian in the pew, or chair, is simply reading the Bible plainly, though the survey author was talking about how "heretical" America is becoming.

Financially, we seem to be in good shape the first several months of the fiscal year. We still need to compliment our givers on giving and keep them informed. I think we need to do more to help families do Deuteronomy 6:7 in the home, but I don't know how to "fix" it.

Truth or Love

ruth or love – is it really a choice? Is one greater than the other? It often seems that these two great subjects of scripture are treated that way. At what point do we "cast out" or "have nothing to do with" one whose views differ from ours? Or, conversely, should love cover all differences? After all, we are to love even our enemies. We can't just say we love someone as an intellectual exercise because we understand the commands from scripture.

Doesn't it have to come from the heart and be acted upon?

I find this topic increasingly relevant. As one expands their level of involvement in church matters, it leads to an expanded exposure to a variety of ongoing conflict. For the purpose of this article, we will mostly limit our discussion to how we should deal with each other when this conflict involves our sincerely-held beliefs. No doubt you have heard the well-known saying that "all problems are people problems," and all organizations are made up of people-imperfect people. We are all imperfect human beings, flawed and living in a sinful world, which despite our best efforts, wrongly influences us. Paul says in Philippians chapter 3 that he has not been made perfect, he has not taken hold of it (perfection), but that he presses on toward the goal, and so should we.

Please read the next sentence carefully and think about it. It's easy to love the people that are easy to love. That's very simple, and it's very easy to do. We all know people who are easy to love because they always seem to be happy and have a smile on their face. When we talk to them, they let the conversation be about us or subjects that are important to us. They never create or become embroiled in conflict. There is a woman in our church who fits this description perfectly. She is easy to love, and everyone loves her. Before and after church when people are socializing, she will instinctively find people who are alone and strike up a conversation with them. This behavior seems to come naturally to her, but is not inherent in many of the rest of us. Most of us don't have that gift, myself included, so we have to work at it. If we only love the people that are easy to love, we fall short. That road is wide and well-traveled. It takes effort to love all people – a road that is narrow and less traveled. Jesus said, " love your enemies and pray for those who persecute

you....so that you may be sons of your Father in heaven....if you love those who love you, what reward will you get?" That is a simple, straightforward, and tough teaching. It will take work, effort, and sacrifice. That's why John 6:29 is one of my favorite verses, because Jesus tells us that belief is work. Jesus is teaching us that love and unity require effort and discipline. Jesus directs his teaching on love toward all people, the evil and the good. Therefore, when our issues are with fellow believers, obedience to this teaching is imperative, because love brings unity, and division is the enemy that tears us apart and weakens our cause.

The great truths of the Abrahamic Faith are the reason that religion has been a sustaining force in my life. Belief in the one God, Jesus our Messiah, the kingdom of God, and sleep of the dead are all critical parts of broader statements of faith held by our conference and churches. These beliefs are at the crux of my life and devotion to the Church of God. Jesus says in John 4:23 and 24, "...the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth." Jesus doesn't say we should worship in spirit and truth, he says we must worship in spirit and truth. How can we do that? Again, it takes some work and effort. Jesus is our teacher (Rabbi), and we must, with an open mind, study and understand his teachings. Nicodemus said to Jesus, "Rabbi, we know you are a teacher who has come from God." If the God who created and loves us has given us a teacher, should we not fully utilize the life-giving teachings of Jesus? Jesus says in John 14:23, "If anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching." We can only obey his teaching if we know his truth. We will only know his teaching and truth if we read and study his word. Paul tells us in I Timothy 4:16, "Watch your life and doctrine closely." Paul establishes a direct association between our life and what we believe - truth. We cannot and should not separate ourselves from what we believe-that which defines who we are. Our statements of faith must be common ground. Outside of them we will have disagreements, but unity demands we are in agreement on these core beliefs.

So how do we reconcile these two great subjects? Certainly much more can be said about love as well (continued on page 6)

as truth, but the priority and importance of each is evident. The fact is that we don't have to reconcile them. God has already done that for us. Love is the foundation for truth. Because He loved the world, God gave us His Son. The reason we have a Savior/Messiah and His teachings of truth is because God loves us. Paul tells us in Ephesians to "speak the truth in love" and that is how we grow up in Christ. He tells us in 2 Thessalonians to "love the truth". The consequence of not loving the truth is that we are not saved. We are perishing. Have you truly made every effort to reconcile your differences with your brother/sister in Christ? As God's word directs us, have you gone to them alone, have you then taken the relevant people with you, and finally, have you gone to the church? There is a method to resolve these issues because they *must* be resolved, so that as Paul says, "we may be bound together in perfect unity." Division is our enemy. It destroys what we have worked so hard to build.

When asked by a teacher of the law to identify the most important commandment, there is a reason why Jesus begins his answer with the Shema. He replies, "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one." Then Jesus continues with "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these." To be completely effective, this most important commandment that God is one must be built on the foundation of love—both loving God and loving each other. Matthew underscores this by telling us, "All of Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Therefore, all truth is most effectively presented when done with genuine love for each other. If conflict is not resolved and unity is not achieved, we are not only ineffective. We fail to follow the instructions of the most important commandment.

Jesus famously said in his Sermon on the Mount, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called Sons of God." Sid Hatch, a wonderful pastor and teacher who I had the good fortune to be acquainted with, correctly pointed out when explaining this verse that Jesus said "peacemakers" and not "peacekeepers." He explained this was because before you can keep the peace, you have to make the peace. We must make peace. We must live in love and unity. Who do you need to make peace with? Let us exert every effort to make peace and receive the blessings of being "sons of God."

ABC News

ABC started this semester with 67 students - 23 new and 44 returning at the south campus. Thirteen are distance learning students, and one is from Kenya. Sixteen are Church of God students. Eight students are living in the two ABC houses.

The following instructors are teaching this semester: Anthony Buzzard, Rebecca Dauksas, Sean Finnegan, Bob Jones, Jack Kmiecik, David Krogh, Joe Martin, Rebekah Martin, Jogi Mauger, and Dave Riley. They are delivering 17 courses. Twenty Moodle and distance learning courses are being delivered for a total of 71 semester hours.

We are grateful for the contributions that were received at Christian Workers Seminar and the summer General Conference to cover the cost of a tuition reduction for Church of God students. We believe this assistance has made it possible for students to attend who might not have been able to attend or to attend full-time.

We are still rejoicing that ABC was recertified by INS on April 21 to receive international students. Our certification expired on May 28, 2014, and the recertification process was started on February 2013. Our certification will need to be renewed by April 20, 2018.

The annual ABC Booster Campaign is underway. We have received some contributions as a result of the promotion of the college in our churches. Bulletin inserts and envelopes were sent to our churches in late August, requesting that one Sunday in September or October be designated as Booster Sunday. If you have not become a booster for this school year, we invite you to provide prayer and financial support.

In addition to our Moodle and distance learning offerings, we have started using Zoom for our classes. One student is taking a campus class by Zoom, and five students joined one of our October block classes. Zoom has also been helpful for several students who have had to be out of town for one or more of their campus classes. We have a student who is a military contractor who has to be in North Dakota 4 or 5 times during the semester. He really wants to make progress toward his degree, so he is able to continue in school with Zoom.

A Go Serve Team is traveling to the Blood River Church in Springfield, LA to assist with an event for youth in Arkansas, Texas, and Louisiana.—David Krogh

Prophecy Page

The popular James Bond movies relied on the politics created by the Cold War.

The Cold War caused military and political world tensions starting in the late 1940s. The big players were the United States and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR). They each had their allies. Mostly, it was a verbal war with an occasional war by proxy.

Through a series of internal setbacks and the lost influence of the Communist Party, the USSR formally dissolved on December 26, 1991. It seemed that the Soviet threat to the world had ended. Each one of the individual republics of the former union were now left to struggle for their own survival.

Rising from what seemed like a mortal wound were the Russians, the largest and most powerful of the states from the former Soviet Union. As the seat of the Soviet empire that existed for over 70 years, the Russians wielded tremendous power both within the USSR and in the international sphere. They began exerting a growing muscle in the Middle East. They have grown to become a dominate influence in world affairs once again.

Just look at some of the most recent headlines.

From the Washington Examiner August 23, 2016—"Recent events seem to indicate Russian moles have made off with every surveillance secret held by the United States... which means the country probably has the ability to crack almost any form of virtual security, including that of American intelligence agencies."

From Reuters October 1, 2016—"Russia is sending more warplanes to Syria to ramp up its air campaign...as the United States said diplomacy to halt the violence was "on life support"... Fighting continued to intensify a week into a new Russian-backed Syrian government offensive..."

Again from *Reuters* October 8, 2016—"*Russia has* moved nuclear-capable Iskander-M missiles into the Kaliningrad enclave bordering Poland and Lithuania...A U.S. intelligence official said Friday that Russia had started moving the Iskander-Ms into the enclave on the Baltic in what he said could be a gesture to express displeasure with NATO."

Now this, as reported through several news sources: A warning from Vladimir Zhirinovsky, a Russian ultra-

nationalist ally of President Vladimir Putin, that the US is at risk of being dragged into a nuclear war. Russian officials and their families have been warned to come back to Russia as global tensions rise. This warning is said to have come directly from Vladimir Putin. He called for them to bring their families back to the "Motherland."

Russian political analyst Stanislav Belkovsky is quoted by the Daily Star as saying: *'This is all part of the package of measures to prepare elites to some 'big war'.'*

The Russians have extended the boundaries of their country to include a wide variety of non-Russian people. The Russian czars have a long history of expansionist policies. An important part of the Russian national identity is that of leader of a large empire.

Such an individual leader identified as Gog moves a group of nations toward Israel. The text of Ezekiel 38 and 39 seem to indicate that some type of nuclear or contaminating weapons is involved. God intervenes to keep Israel from being obliterated.

Gog is identified as the "chief prince" of the attackers. The Hebrew phrase translated "chief prince" is *nesi rosh*. The word *rosh* can be "head" or "first". It can also be a place named "Rosh". Rosh is the root of the word Russia. Some writers are emphatic that it is meant to be a proper name. This is why so many Bible students have insisted that the text is about a Russian invasion.

Gog leads into battle people who come from the list of nations in Genesis 10.

Magog (Scythians): Professional warriors that eventually settled in the area of present-day Russia. They left their mark from the Caucasus Mountains of Russia to the Great Wall of China. Kurgans (grave sites) of Scythians are found in Siberia.

Meshech (Moscow?): One of the sons of Japheth that dwelled in Turkey.

Tubal (Tobolsk?): Another son of Japheth living along the southeastern shores of the Black Sea. These all fit the geography of remote north (Ezekiel 38:6, 15; 39:2). Who is farther north to Israel than Russia? Moscow is directly north of Jerusalem.

Whoever is the identity of the principles in these two chapters, it doesn't end well for them. They find defeat here, and God will be glorified!

Update On Louisiana Flood

About 75 of the families' homes in the three Louisiana churches of God flooded. The interior wall covering has to be cut away about 2 or 3 feet above the flood line, because the water wicks up the insulation. So even a few inches of flood water is devastating. Many homes were flooded several feet deep, some to the ceiling. A few families plan to abandon their house and relocate.

The donations of financial assistance and labor from fellow church members and Atlanta Bible College people were deeply appreciated. Several ABC students traveled to help in late August.

For lots of pictures and general news, search online for "2016 Louisiana floods". Christians have come from all over the country to help in the cleanup. These have included our own Church of God, Amish, Baptists, Catholics, Methodists, Mormons, Pentecostals, Presbyterians, and on and on. The only group I have not seen represented in the assistance are atheists. I'm not saying there aren't any here, but where would we be without Christians?

Estimates of the total number of homes and businesses that flooded are over 100,000. These included Wal-Mart, Target, Winn Dixie, strip malls, schools, hospitals, even



cemeteries. Hundreds of caskets floated out of the ground. About 1/3 of the state was affected by flooding.

There is occasionally a humorous story. Mrs. Kathleen Foretich, aged 87, our retired church piano

player, had to be evacuated by boat. The rescuers couldn't get the door shut, which is a little tricky to close. Her son, Paul, who was also flooded, went over the next day to check her house. There was a deer in her bed! At least the deer was high and dry for a day. The deer managed to find the exit without breaking any windows.

My neighbor had a pet boa constrictor in a cage. They evacuated to a shelter. The shelter made them keep the snake in their car! How inconvenient!

The Baton Rouge food bank lost 300 tons of food. Rain kept falling for several weeks.

Mosquitoes were able to breed in the water pockets of the debris in front of homes, and we would be "eaten alive" in the early evenings outside. The debris caused quite a stench! Most of the debris has now been removed. Statewide this was about 200,000 truckloads of carpet, wood, appliances, furniture, family pictures, and memories.

Walking through my neighborhood now is like walking through a ghost town. About 80% of the homes flooded and are still vacant.

The gutted homes have been sprayed for mold, dried out, and some remodeling has begun. Many people have to refinance their homes to rebuild. Moving back into a home can take three or four months. Temporary housing has included living with friends and family or in trailers or RVs. Jon has lived in a Blood River Church classroom, Billie and Irene are living with Charles and Sylvia Bottolfs, and Dan and Carola have married children and their grandchildren living with them.

One of the difficult realities of recovery is dealing with paperwork and negotiations with flood insurance companies and FEMA. Even when it's over, it's not over. Some people from the New Orleans area with settlements from Hurricane Katrina from 11 years ago are just now being told by FEMA they have to refund part of their grants because the FEMA adjusters made mistakes.

I hope this gives you a little "feel" for what the longterm recovery from a flood is like.



The Son of God

Christian usage of the word "God" in our day is usually reserved for a reference to the one God of the Bible. Yet, in the times of the biblical authors, the term was used much more freely, even to describe human beings or angels. There are only two instances in which the word "god" (Greek: "theos") is used of Jesus for certain in the New Testament. (There are seven other highly disputable texts: Jn 1:18, Rom 9:5, Tit 2:13, 2 Pet 1:1, 1 Jn 5:20, Acts 20:28, 2 Thes 1:12). These have been widely doubted as identifying Jesus as "God" by textual analysts for a variety of reasons. Trinitarian Christopher Kaiser notes that "explicit references to Jesus as 'God' in the New Testament are very few, and even those few are generally plagued with uncertainties, of either text or interpretation" (Christopher Kaiser, The Doctrine of God - London: Marshall Morgan & Scott, 1982, p. 29). Trinitarian William Barclay agrees: 'On almost every occasion in the New Testament on which Jesus is to be called "God" there is a problem either of textual criticism or of translation' (William Barclay, Jesus as They Saw Him -Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1978, p. 21.) It is often said by Trinitarians that these instances qualify as the best proof that the biblical writers believed the man was nothing less than the one and almighty God, and that this is the central most overwhelming revelation of the New Testament. Our suspicions are raised, however, when, in the over 1,327 occurrences of the word "god," only two of them refer to Christ. The lack of evidence for consistent application of the word "God" to Jesus is widely considered, even by Trinitarians, to be problematic. One scholar writes:

> "For example, Jesus never used the term "God" when referring to Himself, none of the synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark, or Luke) ever explicitly gives the title "God" to Jesus, no sermon in the Book of Acts attributes the title "God" to Jesus, no existing Christian confession(s) of Jesus as "God" exist earlier than the late 50s and, although there are seventeen texts that are considered to be possible "Jesus-God" passages, only four of them appear in the approximately fifty Greek New Testament manuscripts that predate the fourth century. Also, and perhaps the biggest obstacle in ascribing the title "God" to Jesus, the existing New Testament manuscripts differ in *all* potential passages that explicitly call Jesus "God." (Brian J. Wright).

Furthermore, "god" is found to be used just as many times of other persons in the New Testament, once of Herod (Acts 12:22), and another time of Satan (2 Cor 4:4). The standard lexicons provide these usages of the Greek word "theos": "a god or goddess, a general name of deities or divinities, whatever can in any respect be likened unto God or resemble him in any way, God's representative or vice-regent, magistrates and judges." (Strong's) Looking back to the Old Testament,



we find that the Hebrew for "god" (el or elohim) is used in this same way for other men or angels (Ps 45:6; Ps 82:1-6; Ex 7:1). In Psalm 8:5, the Hebrew text refers to "elohim" (god), but when the passage is quoted in the New Testament, the Greek says "angels". Similarly, in the Septuagint version of Job 20:15, the Hebrew word "god" (el) was even replaced with the Greek "angel" by the Jewish scribes. Because the title "god" is often found in the biblical documents describing kingly persons with god-like authority, such as human judges of Israel (Jn 10:34) or angels (Ps 8:5), many popular English editions of the Bible even translate "god" as "judge" or "ruler."

Identifying other beings who were not Yahweh as "god" did not pose a "theological problem" for either the ancient Hebrews or the New Testament Jews. As mentioned previously, the biblical principle usually at work



here is known as "the law of agency." When God imparts his authority to his agent, that agent may himself be called "God," and may speak and act as God on his behalf. Again, Moses and the judges of Israel were addressed as "God": "Then Yahweh said to Moses, 'See I have made you God to Pharaoh, and Aaron your brother shall be your prophet"" (Ex 7:1). "I said, 'You are gods, you are all sons of the Most High"" (Ps 82:6). Exodus 22:8 also speaks of the human rulers of Israel in this way; the Hebrew refers to these persons as "God" or "the gods," but the Amplified Bible translation makes it clear: "the house owner shall appear before God, the judges as His agents, to find whether he stole his neighbor's goods."

There are in fact many "gods" mentioned in the scriptures, though for the nation of Israel, there is clearly only one *true* God, the others are evidently gods in a representational, derived, or secondary sense. The Apostle Paul even defines

which god is the true god of the New Testament community: "There are many gods, but for us there is but one God, the Father" (1 Cor 8:6). Indeed, as Christ agreed, "the Father" is "the only true God" (Jn 17:1a, 3). It is this great God who designates certain other persons, those whom he has directly authorized or inspired, as "God." Christ himself explains the principle:

Jesus answered them, has it not been written in your Law, 'I said you are gods'? If he called them gods, to whom the word of God came (and the Scripture cannot be broken), do you say of him, whom the Father sanctified and sent into the world, 'You are blaspheming,' because I said 'I am the Son of God'?" (Jn 10:34-36).

Jesus being called "the Son of God," or even "god," does not mean that he is to be identified himself as Yahweh. Certainly Christ is the supreme agent of God, but he is no more Yahweh than Moses is, according strictly to the language involved. Nevertheless, the claim persists that the New Testament clearly identifies Jesus as the one God due to the use of "theos" to describe him.

Hebrews 1:8, which applies the classic Psalm 45:6 to Jesus, is a prime citation in this popular argument: "But of the Son He says, 'Your throne, O God, is forever and ever, and the righteous scepter is the scepter of his kingdom'" (Heb 1:8). Certainly the writer identifies Jesus as "God" in this passage. However, the original Psalm the writer is quoting was evidently addressing the *human* king of Israel at that time:

I address my verses to the king... Grace is poured upon your lips, therefore God has blessed you forever... Your throne, O God, is forever... you have loved righteousness, therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of joy above your fellows... King's daughters are among your noble ladies; at your right hand stands the queen... (Ps 45).

As the king of Israel, this man was representationally "god". He sat on God's seat of authority over the nation (see 1 Chron 29:23). Of course,

this pattern applies directly to Jesus as the Messiah, the ultimate king of Israel (Jn 1:49). It is also important to note that the very next verse applied to the Son in Hebrews says that the Son, like the human king to whom the hymn was originally addressed, actually has a God himself: "Therefore God, <u>your God</u>, has anointed you with the oil of joy above your fellows" (Heb 1:9). This reference to the king's own God serves as a helpful mechanism for achieving a better view on his exalted status. Jesus, as king of Israel, may be recognized as "divine," but that "divinity" is diffused through a subordinationist prism, and ultimately reflected back onto his God as a representational divinity.

The writer of Hebrews furthermore argues here that because Jesus had "loved righteousness," his God had now highly exalted him, making him even superior to the holy angels (Heb 1:4). In the next chapter of the epistle, it is even argued that Jesus has now been deemed worthy of even more glory and honor than Moses (Heb 3:3). This, of course, is an entirely pointless argument if both the writer and the other Christians at that time believed Jesus was Yahweh. It would have gone without saying that God was greater than Moses. Certainly the writer's intentions are not to identify the man Jesus as "god" in the exact same sense that Yahweh is God. Nevertheless, we will here perform an in-depth examination of the surrounding context in Hebrews to prove our point.

Before verse 8 we read that the son:

Was not speaking to the fathers in ages past (1:1-2)

Had to become superior to angels, meaning he previously was not (1:4)

Gained an inheritance he didn't previously have (1:4)

Would be considered a son to God (not God himself) (1:5)

Was "begotten" by God (1:5)

Is a representation of God (not God himself) (1:3)

Now, after verse 8 we read that the Son:

Has a God (1:9)

Has been anointed above his fellows (1:9) (God has no fellows and no need for anyone to anoint him) Was made lower than the angels (2:9)

- Is now crowned with glory and honor because he died (2:9) (he wasn't crowned beforehand)
- Is the pioneer of man's salvation (2:10) (i.e., the first to receive salvation)
- Calls men his brothers (2:11) (God does not have brothers)
- Says that he will put his trust in God (2:13)
- Was made like his brothers in every single way (2:17)
- Was tempted (2:18) (God cannot be tempted)
- Is now counted worthy of more glory than Moses (3:3) (*if he is Yahweh, this should go without saying*)

In light of the immediate context, how pressed are we to deduce that the writer is not describing an exalted human being, but the Almighty Yahweh, the monolithic Creator of all things? Of course, Jesus is never explicitly called Yahweh by the writer of Hebrews or by any other biblical author, but he is described as "a man" (Acts 2:22; 1 Tim 2:5; Jn 8:40) who has been invested with divine authority (Matt 28:18). Jesus is thus certainly "god" in the sense that he is a chief dignitary, a holy prince, and a powerful ruler who represents God. The Father himself had given Jesus this lordly status (Acts 2:36; Phil 2:9), and the writer of Hebrews clarifies that it is precisely because of his great service to God that he has "now been crowned with glory and honor" (Heb 2:9). Jesus has thus been made "a god" in the most biblical sense of the term.

Ultimately, the "law of agency" interpretation remains the best choice for making sense of the New Testament community's view of Jesus while avoiding conflicts with Jewish monotheism.

Legacy. Responsibility. Opportunity.



Legacy: Honor the Past

The Church of God (COG) has been around a long time. I have not. I've only been around since 1971. My grandfather, S.O. Ross, served as the Executive Director of the Church of God General

Conference from 1968-1980. Some reading this will remember him, and many will not. When I was born, I

when I was born, I was named so that I might bear the same initials as my grandfather, so I am also S.O. Ross. He was Stanley Otto, and I



am Seth Owen. He gave me this baseball (see picture) when I was born, and it sits on a shelf in my office. It reminds me from where I have come, and it reminds me of those who have gone before. The Church of God has a rich legacy of service, faith, and sacrifice. There have been many who served faithfully for many years. We are here today because of them. We'll not forget them.

Responsibility: Live in the Present

But it's possible to dwell so much on our past successes that we fail to live in our present moments. Consequently, we run the risk of being complacent with the message and blessings that have been handed to us by others. We have a task. We have a mission. There's much to do. We have amazing people across the country who serve in our churches. We have much more going for us as a conference than we often recognize. God has blessed us. So the question begs, "What are we doing with what we've been given?" It's a question of stewardship. As a people of faith, we've been given truth, talents, abilities, resources, and relationships that all ought to be leveraged to advance the gospel of Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God. So let me rephrase the question, "What are YOU doing with what YOU'VE been given?"

To the best of my ability, I intend to handle the General Conference and its member churches with great care. Not to coddle them, but to encourage, inspire, occasionally nudge, and heal where necessary. Leadership of the General Conference has been handed to me for a time, but not forever. It's my stewardship for now. But stewardship is temporary, and we are accountable.

Opportunity: Build for the Future

There's a corollary to the principle of stewardship. The more responsible we are with the blessings given to us, the more likely it is that God will trust us with more. This is a biblical principle of which we're all aware.

The culture is changing, people's church involvement is changing, people's attitudes are changing, the world's geopolitical scene is changing, and technology is changing. Everything is changing. But that's always been the case, though the rate of change seems to be increasing.

But change represents opportunity. There are new ways to reach people, there's a new openness to scriptural truth, there's new willingness to listen to our viewpoint theologically. Can those new attitudes and opportunities lead in negative directions? Sure, but they also can lead to more people coming to a love of the truth. The world was full of sin when Jesus showed up, but that didn't stop him from speaking truth into his culture. The world is going crazy, but let that not stop us from speaking truth into our culture.

There are people to reach, people to equip, people to train. There are churches to plant, churches to inspire, churches to grow. There are students to teach, pastors to train, church leaders to grow. There is work to do, and we have talented people to do it. Those people attend our churches, thus churches need support, encouragement, connection, and partnership.

One More Thought: Flipping the Script

Our history is a rich one. It's a history of both independence and cooperation. That paradoxical combination has led us to where we are today. The balance between independence and cooperation has fluctuated over the years. There's an ebb and flow. Both swings and corrections.

Originally a bunch of independent churches that were willing to stand theologically outside the mainstream began to find each other and cooperate. Eventually they collectively formed a Bible college that existed to support those churches by providing training for pastors and teachers. Over time that equation seems to have been reversed. It was not on purpose. It was not intentional. It's the natural tendency of organizational drift. Eventually it seemed as if the churches existed to support the Bible College. Even if that's not the case in reality, it has often felt like that to many people in their perception. And we know that in many cases perception is reality.

My hope is to reverse that focus once again. Churches are on the front line of ministry. That's where the magic happens. It is my intention to spend much of my time traveling to churches, visiting people, talking with people, and listening to people. Listen, assess, and discern... listen, assess, and discern... listen, assess, and discern. There is much wisdom in counsel according to Proverbs. Together we can make measurable changes in attitudes, direction, involvement, and engagement that can have long-term positive effects.

I'm excited about what lies before us as a people and as a conference of churches. I invite you to share in the adventure. With all of us working together, seeking God's will, wisdom, and direction, great progress can and will be made for His purposes.

For this reason local leadership probably remains the best hope. But I don't want to overlook any potential desire among our own ministry and college graduates.

Thank you for maintaining an interest in what the U.S. Missions Board for Church Planting is doing. And thank you to those who have been contributing in every way that we can think of right now and have resources to do so. This effort will gain momentum as we go, God willing.

Additional cities that we have identified for potential new congregations are: San Francisco, CA; Denver and Colorado Springs, CO; Ft. Worth and Houston, TX; Miami, Orlando, and Tampa, FL.

Something we could use this coming summer might be a student team to place door hangers on homes in the Oklahoma City area in support of our recently installed congregation and pastor there. Also, Steve Taylor and I continue to be interested in screening videos that would fit our vision for the new, outward -facing Age2com.com website.

The Lord's Harvest International Mission Board met in Atlanta. Among items discussed were:

► a new gift catalog of mission projects to be distributed in early December and again as a part of our Marching for Missions campaign.

► a Church Builders appeal has been submitted to the Board of Directors for the construction of a church/headquarters building in Maturu.

► approved a trip to Malawi and Kenya from late May to mid-July 2017.

► \$750 was approved to help support annual theological conferences in Kenya and Peru with \$750 each.

► continuing support of \$1,500 per month will be provided for the work in Haiti to help with reconstruction from the earthquake in 2010 and the hurricane in 2016.

▶ plans were approved for a trip to Peru in late July and early August.

► it was decided to continue with our current policy of building three churches in Malawi and three in Mozambique each year. It was reported that there are about 300 pastors in Mozambique and 125 in Malawi.

► the board connected with Maksim in Russia by Skype to thank him for his work. It was approved to continue to provide church aid for the work in Russia, along with funds for Bibles and for Maksim's involvement with the Big Brother program. Funding was approved for the translation and printing of Focus on the Kingdom magazine and other articles in Russian. Money was also provided for him to travel to visit members who are widely scattered in Russia and nearby countries.

▶ in addition to the seven churches that we work with in Pakistan, contact has been made with individuals in Lahore and Karachi who have taken the Systematic Bible Study course. We also are glad for the contacts and visits to Pakistan by Hadayat Din who lives in Memphis, TN. He is teaching Bible truth to pastors that he knows in northern Pakistan.

Prophecy Page

The media has created the world's biggest lie ever. They are joined by most of the world's politicians, and the world's leaders, teachers and ministers: the so-called "occupation" of "territories" in Israel and the so-called Israeli "illegal settlements". East Jerusalem today is also considered to be part of the "occupation".

The whole world is about to be rocked by this single issue!

The UN Security Council resolution that was passed on December 23, 2016 was one of the most significant events that we have witnessed in decades. Resolution 2334 made all Israeli settlements in the West Bank and in East Jerusalem illegal, it set the 1967 ceasefire lines as the border between the Israelis and the Palestinians, and it granted every single inch of East Jerusalem to the Palestinians. But it stopped short of giving official UN Security Council recognition to a Palestinian state, and that is why a conference was set on January 15.

Representatives from 70 different countries gathered in Paris, France for an unprecedented global conference. The stated goal of the conference was to promote a "two-state solution" as the way that lasting peace will be brought to the Middle East. In Israel, there is a tremendous amount of concern that whatever is agreed upon at this conference will immediately be used as the basis for a UN Security Council resolution that would permanently divide the land of Israel and create a Palestinian state. Donald Trump has already made it exceedingly clear that he would never support such a resolution while indicating a move of the US embassy to Jerusalem.

France has repeatedly tried to breathe new life into the peace process this year, holding a preliminary conference in June where the United Nations, European Union, United States and major Arab countries gathered to discuss proposals without the Israelis or Palestinians present.

The meeting over the issue of ownership of Jerusalem and peace in the Middle East held in France may lead to larger events. The destruction of the nations may be on the agenda.

The gematria (assigned numerical value to a word/ name/phrase) of the words "Gog and Magog" in Hebrew according to the Jewish scholars have the numerical value of 70. The Torah (Table of Nations Genesis 10 & 11) speaks of 70 nations making up the world.

Prime Minister of the Palestinian National Authority, Mahmoud Abbas says 2017 will be the year of Palestinian statehood! If it came to pass, it would mean that Yeshua, the Jew of Jews, would be banished from Israel.

Of course this is the exact opposite of God's word! We know the hundreds of Bible verses declaring that the land of Israel was given by God to the Jews.

Genesis 17:7-8 "I will establish My covenant between Me and you (Israel) and your descendants after you, in their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and your descendants after you. I will give to you and your descendants the land in which you are a stranger, all the land of Canaan (Israel) as an everlasting possession; and I will be their God."

Note in the verse that "all" of the land of Israel has been given by God to the Jews. This includes all of Jerusalem.



If You Loved Me

Each one reading this has probably tried to imagine what it would have been like to have been with Jesus when He walked the earth. Making a pilgrimage to Israel can be an attempt to partially experience that. I've wondered how much of what He said would I have comprehended at the time. How would I have reacted, given my background and conditioning as a Jew or a Gentile? Would I have been an adoring disciple, a self-centered consumer of His miracles of healing and food, or a selfrighteous Pharisee or other doubter? If a follower, how would I have reacted to His reproofs? At the time, thousands made it through these issues to believe and love Him.

Then, especially to his closest twelve, He partially got through to them that it was all about to end—He was going away where they couldn't follow. In their confusion, they were troubled and afraid (John 14:27). Jesus responded to their inner turmoil by saying, "You heard that I said to you, 'I go away, and I will come to you.' If you loved me, you would have rejoiced, because I go to the Father; for the Father is greater than I." (John 14:28). This seems like a self-centered attitude? It seems like Jesus is saying, "Even though you'll be left behind, I'll be ecstatic so you should be happy for me and ignore your misery and loneliness." It's also a strong assertion that they don't love Him! "If you loved me" you'd have a different emotional reaction. Could I have taken that in stride?

Jesus continued to dose out strong medicine: "I am the true vine, and every branch (each disciple) must bear fruit or be discarded, and if it does bear fruit it must be pruned." (Ouch!) But he proceeded to promise if they would keep His commandments, just as He was keeping his Father's, they would be filled with love and joy (John 15:7-13).

Then He capped it off with an astounding insight. Not only was it to be a joy for Him to go away, it would also be better for them! (John 16:5-7). Jesus went on to explain that as long as He was with them in person, He couldn't be with them in spirit. So, far from being selfish, He was leaving them for His and their benefit. Jesus even applied that to us by saying after His resurrection, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations..., teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always even to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20).

Our response to Jesus is to be the same as He wanted from the apostles. Not only are we more blessed to have His Spirit with us than to have Him in person right now, we are also to rejoice that He is with His beloved Father! After realizing this, I experienced several days of pure rejoicing on Jesus' behalf. What a way to lift us above our daily issues, to empathize with Jesus! If you love Jesus, you will rejoice that He is with His Father.

In addition to that, we can empathize with Jesus' way of handling pain and grief as a way of dealing with our own. We are to "fix our eyes on (imitate) Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:1,2). This shows us the motivation of how to endure our own pains and trials. Just as Jesus did, we also can look beyond them, obey the divine commands now, and anticipate the joy of being permanently with our Father.

READER'S RESPONSE:

One thing that impacted me was that He was going to see His DAD. I've always thought of Him going to be with God and sit at His right hand, but I guess the thought never really hit me that He was going to be with His Daddy. How intimate that makes it. He could deal with His suffering here as a mortal, knowing the joy that was set before Him.

Some day real soon, I believe, the trumpet will sound and Michael will put his arms around his Dad, Jim Mattison. Makes it all worth the battle, doesn't it?

Why the Church of God Abrahamic Faith Matters By Seth Ross, Executive Director

I was born into the Church of God General Conference. My grandfathers on both sides pastored Churches of God. My father and uncle both pastored Churches of God. My uncle has served in various national positions including as chairperson of the national board of directors. My father taught many years at Oregon/Atlanta Bible College and served as Academic Dean. I have large family trees on both sides (Ross and Macy) that trace several generations. I'm related to everyone it seems. I had to marry someone who was born outside the Church of God lest my family tree quit forking.

And so I grew up knowing the truth of scriptures. God is one, and Jesus is his son... really. He died for our sin. God raised Him from the dead. Jesus ascended to heaven and now sits at the right hand of God. Baptism represents the putting on of

Christ. The dead are asleep in the grave until the resurrection at the last trumpet. Jesus will return riding on a white horse, and the millennium will begin. Death will be conquered and the kingdom of God will be established on a renewed earth. Jesus must remain in heaven until the "restitution of all things." I even knew what the title of this periodical referenced (Acts 3:21, KJV). It was all true, and I knew it. I assumed it. It was just part of me, my family, my life. It was life.

The truth was like air to me. It surrounded me. I breathed it, walked through it, and

lived with it daily. And, like air, I took it for granted. I didn't think about it. It was always with me, so I never had to think about it. It was ever-present in my life. It just was.

But you only take air for granted when you have it. Truth is like that. You only take truth for granted when you have it. When a person doesn't have air, they grasp for it, the reach for it, they get desperate for it. So it is with the truth. A person sitting at a desk experiences and appreciates air in a very different way than a drowning man who finally reaches the surface.

I suspect that of many of my peers who grew up in Churches of God, and perhaps even entire churches, have taken truth for granted to some degree. It's not that we no longer believe it, but maybe we've believed it for too long? It's not intentional; we just tend to drift in that direction. We've had truth in our hands as long as we can remember, so why even think about it? We already have it.

A blessing of my new position is that I regularly meet people who are "not us" but have found the truth as we understand it. And what we have perhaps taken for granted, they relish with great fervor, like air to a drowning man. People who did not grow up with the truth as the Church of God understands it experience truth differently than I did growing up. I wasn't particularly excited about it, because I'd always had it. But I'm excited about it again because I no longer take it for granted. The people I meet who spent years of their lives without truth have made me ever more grateful for the truth I had grown up knowing. I count myself as fortunate. If you're in a Church of God, you are also fortunate.

However, you might feel your church is too small, the building is too old, music is too slow or fast, your carpet is outdated, your fellowship hall needs painting, and your kitchen needs to be remodeled. It's easy to feel we're falling behind the Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, non-denominational, You-Pick-The-Brand church down the street. But we have something that matters... truth.

And people are out there trying to find us, to find you, to find your church, to find anyone who might believe in one God, Jesus as the human Messiah, the resurrection of the dead at Christ's literal return, and the kingdom of God on earth. You know... all that stuff you can take for granted. They don't take it for granted, and they want fellowship with you desperately.

In the past two months, we've had visitors to Atlanta Bible College from Korea, the Netherlands, and Australia. They just wanted to see it. Why? Because it's "the only biblical unitarian college on the planet." We teach the truth. And here's the funny part. They wanted to get a picture with the President of Atlanta Bible College. Yes, that seems odd, because it's just me. It's just us. It's just ABC. It's just the Church of God Abrahamic Faith. We can easily take these things for granted because

we've always had them. They're familiar. They're comfortable. They're like air. Air to us, air to them... but vastly different.

And to all of you who belong to Churches of God, I also have a message for you: "You matter. Truth matters. The Church of God Abrahamic Faith matters. Let's appreciate and celebrate that."



THE FATHER AND THE SON The Splendor of Dichotomy; The Joy of Submissive Unity By Dr. Joe Martin

Walter Bauer challenged the whole of Christianity and current orthodoxy in his book, Orthodoxy and Heresy in Earliest Christianity. In it he said, "must not the historian, like the judge, preside over the parties and maintain as a primary principle the dictum audiatur et alter pars [let the other side be heard]?" (p. xxi). We are that other side at this point, but things are changing. Or in the words of Bob Dylan, "The Times They Are A Changin." Bauer is cited by Dunn, Ehrman, Hurtado, etc. as the basis of a new review of what first -century Christianity believed. Hurtado, in his book One God, One Lord (2005), says "It is the thesis of this book that a historical understanding of the rise of Jesus veneration must include both factors... 'divine agency'... and that early Christian religious experiences produced... the cultic veneration of God's chief agent, in this case the risen Christ." (p. 12) Hurtado's response to a question at the SBL session (2015) on the gospel of Mark, "Did Jesus ever think he was God?" His response was an emphatic "H***, no!" Our dilemma today is to honor God, the overwhelming theme of the Bible, but also to honor Jesus as the true biblical human Messiah, the Son of God. I see this clear distinction in the notion of "The Father and the Son, a true dichotomy of God and man (I Tim. 2:5). Yet a dichotomy brought together in Jesus' absolute submission to YHWH, our and his Abba Father. How could enough be said about Abba YHWH?

In Dan Gill's book, THE ONE, his chapter five is most interesting, *Monotheism, An Insufficient Truth*. He says, "To them [God's prophets], it would not matter whether people believed in one god or not, if that one God is not YHWH.... He is their Father (Deut. 32:6)." (p. 87) People who say they are monotheist may, in fact, be more bi-theists, or tri-theists, or poly-theists. An example he gives is Hindus, who may believe in many, even millions of "manifestations" of



God, but feel still there is one God. (p. 90)

In a stirring challenge for Levites, teachers, priests, Malachi says:

⁷ "For the lips of a priest should preserve knowledge, and men should seek instruction from his mouth; for he is the messenger of the LORD [YHWH] of hosts? ¹⁰ "Do we not all have one father? Has not one God created us? Why do we deal treacherously each against his brother so as to profane the covenant of our fathers?" (Mal 2:7-10 NAU)

YHWH is that one Father, one God?

IN THE BEGINNING GOD

These are *four* simple words that explain the origin or our creation and the cosmos. I love thinking about cosmology, parallel universes, multi-verses, the third heaven, black holes, dark matter, quarks and quirks. Here is a quick peek at historical cosmology and the ultimate end:

*The future? Wikipedia says: "*The **heat death of the universe** is a plausible <u>ultimate fate of</u> <u>the universe</u> in which the <u>universe</u> has diminished to a state of no <u>thermodynamic</u> <u>free energy</u> and therefore can no longer sustain processes that increase entropy. Or...

"And there will be no night there and light will not be needed for them or a lamp or the light of the sun, because the LORD God illuminates them and their king, forever and ever." (Rev 22:5 MGI)

At a tour of the Atlanta Temple, the largest synagogue in Atlanta, we Columbia Theological Seminary students queried the rabbi? I asked, "Where do Jews start arguing over biblical issues?? He said the first word, *bereshiyth*, (בְרַאשָׁי) The Hebrew is "B" for "in" and "reshiyth" for "beginning." In the beginning... whose beginning, what beginning, the angels' beginning, humans' beginning, God's beginning, etc.

My understanding is that this is "our beginning." Angels were already there. "When the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy?" (Job 38:7 KJV) Sons of God = (בֵנֵי אֵלֹהָים) Benelohim?"

YHWH ELOHENU YHWH ECHAD Deut. 6:4


Again, here is a challenge to simplicity, since "in many words there is emptiness. Rather, fear God." (Ecc. 5:7 NASB) Though God is the most complex complicated entity thought of, He presents Himself... straightforward, simply, plain, transparent, uncomplicated, intelligible, reasonable, lucid, etc. (thesaurus.com)

Jesus brilliantly affirms this truth in Mark 12:29. "Jesus answered him, "The first of all the commandments is: 'Hear, O Israel, the LORD our God, the LORD is one.' (Mark 12:29 NKJ) This One, *Echad, Eis*, is a particular one, not a multiple manifestation one, not a schizophrenic personality one, He is YHWH our Father, and the Father of Jesus, and Jesus' God as well (John 20:17). "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." (NIV) Your God is not Jesus. Your God is YHWH, Abba Father? Jesus is His Son!

Baruch Atah Adonay YHWH Elohenu Melech Ha Olam

Blessed are you Lord YHWH our Go? King of the universe

At one theological conference, I shared electronically the "over 700 times" Jesus is distinguished from the Father. Joel Hemphill acknowledged this list when he produced one of his books, *God & Jesus*. (ISBN? 978-0-9825196-5-3)



The "dichotomy" is clear? Dichotomy, *a division two things* or "a division into two especially <u>mutually exclusive</u> ... entities." (merriam-webster.com). Yet, there is a splendor in this dichotomy, one is the God, who is "not a man," and the other is a human being, yet Son of God. God is still God, and while Jesus was a true human being, now He is a perfected human being that has been given God's nature on the basis of His submission to the Father's will. Luke 22:42, "not my will, but thy will be done!" (P.S., We are given the same hope!)

"For by these He has granted to us His precious and magnificent promises, so that by them you may become partakers of the divine nature..." (2 Pet 1:4 NASB)

I want to live forever! I want to have no more death, mourning, crying or pain! (Rev. 21:4). [And remember, I have a broken back.]

My favorite review of YHWH God is Exodus 34:6-7— the eight attributes. God shows up to Moses, pronounces his name,

"⁶ So Yahweh passed before him, and proclaimed, - Yahweh, Yahweh, A GOD of compassion, and favour,- Slow to anger, and abundant in lovingkindness and faithfulness: ⁷ Keeping lovingkindness to a thousand generations, Forgiving iniquity, and transgression, and sin, Though he leave not, utterly unpunished." (Ex 34:6-7 ROT)

Basically, C, G, SA, AL, AT, ML, FWRS, YDNLTGU! (using the NIV mostly) These are repeated often. This is God by... God! Don't miss out on his personal selfexplanation!

The New Testament continues the true witness to the oneness of YHWH:

δ μόνος άληθινός θεός

John 17:3 in nominative form, the only true God:

"This is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent." (John 17:3 NASB)

What of the simple beauty that can be compared to "In the beginning God...." Do you want that eternal life with no death, mourning, crying or pain? Get to know the only true God and Jesus!

Regarding Jesus, John 17:3, for eternal life we must know the only true God... and Jesus Christ! I consider this the "joy of submissive unity." Luke 22:42, "Nevertheless, not my will, Thy will be done." Another great current song is *Thy Will Be Done* by Natalie Grant. It is a sad story about a miscarriage, yet submission to God's will and direction. Jesus humbled himself, he "did not grasp at equality with God." How could He, He "... did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped." (Phi 2:6 NASB)

I love the theology and Christology of Revelation 1:4-6. In verse four we see God, who is, was, and is to come. This is a great "Existing One," YHWH, Halleluyah! In verse five, ... and from Jesus. "And Jesus" occurs 134 times in the New Testament, and this one in Rev. 1:5 may be the best. Notice the list... Christ, faithful witness, firstborn from the dead, ruler of kings of the earth, He loved us, He washes us from sins with His own blood, He made us a kingdom, priests to His God and Father!

I also love the theology and Christology of Revelation 2 and 3. With each introduction to the churches (ESPTSPL), Jesus gives an attribute of who he is! This then is "Jesus by Jesus" as we saw "God by God" in Exodus 34:6-7. How does Jesus describe himself? It ...adds SKR, adds up for the SeeKeR?

- Rev. 2:1- He is among the churches in charge of the churches & angels...
- Rev. 2:8- He died, was dead and has come to life, the first and last...
- Rev. 2:12- He has the double-edged sword, the Word of God... (?)
- Rev. 2:18- He is the Son of God...
- Rev. 3:1- He is in charge of the spirits and stars (angels)
- Rev. 3:7- He has the key of David (keys of the kingdom!) & is holy and true
- Rev. 3:14- He is the ruler of God's creation (NIV) (cp. Rev.1:5) *archon/arche*

A REBUT The Greatest Rebuttal by Jesus... ever Jn. 10:36

Google says, "to claim or prove that (evidence or an accusation) is false. The dictionary says a rebuttal is to deny, repudiate, repel, refute! In John 10, the ultimate rebuttal is by Jesus against the Pharisees. Yes, Jesus said many challenging and controversial things to "stir them up" (remember "I can of my own self do nothing...") and to get them to think. On this occasion, Jesus' statement "I and the Father are one," got them going? The Greek is $\dot{\epsilon}\gamma\dot{\omega}$ καὶ \dot{o} πατὴρ ἕν $\dot{\epsilon}$ σµεν. (John10:30, BGT) They picked up stones to stone him! His reply, *rebuttal*:

³⁵ "If he called them gods, to whom the word of God came (and the Scripture cannot be broken), ³⁶ do you say of Him, whom the Father sanctified and sent into the world, 'You are blaspheming,' because I said, 'I am the Son of God '? (John 10:35-36 NAU)

Again, four simple words in Greek:

υἱὸς τοῦ θεοῦ εἰμι (John 10:36 BGT)

If I ever got into an argument with my mother, (generally would not happen with my father!) first I could be accused of "sassing my mama" which generally in the South requires corporeal punishment or in the least washing the mouth out with soap. If she rebutted in a substantially loud voice, "I said... ", repeating her already noted commands, I surely should listen and revise my attitude. In response to Jesus being accused of usurping authority from God (cp. "grasping at equality") He said, "I said, ... I am the Son of God." Write it down for the first graders and pseudo-orthodoxy, He is the Son of God. What did God say at Jesus' baptism? "This is my son, my beloved!" (Mt 3:17) οὖτός ἐστιν ὑ υἱός μου ὑ ἀγαπητός. (Mt 3:17, BGT)

What did God say at the transfiguration? "This is my Son, my beloved, listen to him!" (Lk 9:35) οὖτός ἐστιν ὁ υἰός μου ὁ ἐκλελεγμένος, αὐτοῦ ἀκούετε. (Lk 9:35 BGT)

What did God say to Jesus in the Passion Week? Jesus cried out to His Father...

²⁷ "Now My soul has become troubled; and what shall I say, 'Father, save Me from this hour '? But for this purpose I came to this hour. ²⁸ "Father, glorify Your name." Then a voice came out of heaven: "I have both glorified it, and will glorify it again." (John 12:27-28 NASB)

ό χριστός

¹⁵ He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" ¹⁶ Simon Peter answered, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." ¹⁷ And Jesus said to him, "Blessed are you, Simon Barjona, because flesh and blood did not reveal this to you, but My Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 16:15-17 NASB)

"Then the seventh angel sounded; and there were loud voices in heaven, saying, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ; and He will reign forever and ever." (Rev 11:15 NAU)

THY WILL BE DONE

The absolute submission of Jesus to the total will of God allows for the true exaltation the Father gives to Jesus, to the right hand of God.

³⁹ And He went a little beyond them, and fell on His face and prayed, saying, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; yet not as I will, but as You will." ⁴⁰ And He came to the disciples and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "So, you men could not keep watch with Me for one hour? ⁴¹ "Keep watching and praying that you may not enter into temptation; the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak."

⁴² He went away again a second time and prayed, saying, "My Father, if this cannot pass away unless I drink it, Your will be done."

⁴³ Again He came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. ⁴⁴ And He left them again, and went away and prayed a third time, saying the same thing once more." (Mt 26:39-44 NASB)

"22 I saw no temple in it, for the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb are its temple. 23 And the city has no need of the sun or of the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God has illumined it, and its lamp is the Lamb." (Rev 21:22-23 NASB)

"Then he showed me a river of the water of life, clear as crystal, coming from the throne of God and of the Lamb" (Rev 22:1 NASB)

Prophecy: Damascus By Wally Winner

Does the United States cruise missile strike on Syria have prophetic significance? Specifically, "could it lead to the fulfillment of Isaiah 17?"

Isaiah prophesied the destruction and abandonment of Damascus over 2,700 years ago.

"An oracle concerning Damascus. Behold, Damascus will cease to be a city and will become a heap ruins." ~Isaiah 17:1 (ESV)

Yet, the city continues, despite so many Middle East wars. In fact, it is called "the oldest continuously inhabited city in the world".

Given that, you would think there is little debate that this prophecy is plainly unfulfilled. Yet, you will find Bible commentaries that mention how Isaiah 17 was fulfilled in other events of the Bible, such as in 732 BC when Assyria defeated the Arameans and their capital Damascus (2 Kings 16:9). The problem is that although the prophecy has been partially fulfilled in the past, this does not mean it does not have dual fulfillments, as is often the case with Bible prophecies. Usually all parts of the prophecy are not fulfilled until a later, final fulfillment. In this case, the part about Damascus ceasing to be a city and becoming a heap of ruins is plainly not accomplished. That's a bleak picture that stands in contrast to Damascus' status as the oldest city. (In fact, Bible skeptics use Isaiah 17 as proof that the Bible is not true!)

If this is correct, then Isaiah 17 is a dire warning for this capital city of 2.5 million people. One day the city will suffer tragedy of some kind leaving a heap of ruins in its place. Israel has long had an arsenal of nuclear bombs and is also a frequent target of attacks from Syria. In fact, Israel has already been in several major wars with Syria between 1948 to 1973.

Because Israel's enemies are so numerous and able to overrun the tiny nation so easily, Israel has adopted a nuclear policy called "The Samson Option." Named after the judge of Israel who took his own life by



knocking out the support pillars of the temple he was in to avenge himself on his enemies around him. According to this policy, Israel would nuke the cities of her enemies if she was overrun or about to be defeated. Hitting the leadership of Syria at Damascus would be part of this retaliatory attack.

The idea of Damascus' doom coming from a war with Israel is not surprisingly indicated by several plain verses. Isaiah 17 continues by describing what happens along with Damascus' destruction:

3 Fortified cities will disappear from Ephraim, and the kingdom will disappear from Damascus. The remaining few from Aram will share Israel's honor," declares the LORD of Armies.

4 "When that day comes, the honor of Jacob's people will fade away, and they will

become skin and bones 6 Only a few people will survive. They will be like an olive tree that has been beaten. Only two or three olives are left at the top of the highest branch, four or five olives on the rest of the branches" ~Isaiah 17:3-6 (GW)

When this happens, northern and central Israel are named as taking damage and casualties, although comparatively less than Damascus (Damascus loses the kingdom, but Israel only the fortress). War is never completely one-sided. If Israel is prompted to attack Damascus, they will certainly suffer casualties in the process. Going further in the prophecy we can see that, as has usually been the case, Syria will not be acting alone against Israel:

Ah, the uproar of many peoples, that roar like the roaring of the seas; and the rushing of nations, that rush like the rushing of mighty waters! The nations shall rush like the rushing of many waters...14 At eventide, behold, terror; and before the morning they are not. This is the portion of them that despoil us, and the lot of them that rob us. ~Isaiah 17:12 (ASV)

A multitude of nations attack "us" or the nation that Isaiah addressed in his prophecies: the southern kingdom of Judah (as opposed to the northern nation of Israel). The Jewish people make up the modern state of Israel (which is why they almost called it the state of Judah). Therefore the description fits yet another Middle East war where Israel is attacked by her mainly Arab and Islamic neighbors such as Syria, Lebanon, Egypt, and Jordan (maybe Iran who is not Arab). Yet, like before, Israel will be victoriousand probably even quicker than in the Six-Day War of 1967. Notice in verse 14 that it takes only from one evening until the next morning to achieve decisive victory. It sounds just like the Samson Option is exercised after Israel is left with no choice but to use her nuclear weapons against multiple enemy nations and cities. Their armies will literally be gone, not to mention a large segment of their civilian populations. The nuclear war casualties could easily surpass tens of million people. No wonder Isaiah says that the situation shifts overnight from terror for Israel to tragedy for her enemies.

We can be concerned by the increasing tensions for war across the globe. However, our focus is what happens in the Middle East. It is what happens there that leads to the return of Christ.



The Servant of YHWH יהוה

We are looking at the context, *Sitz im Leben*, of Isaiah, knowing that an ox knows its owner, a donkey knows its master, but Israel does not know YHWH, the LORD, and has even abandoned Him. (1:3,4) This seems like déjà vu, for our times. Does anyone know Yahweh, the LORD God? Jesus said,

"You believe in God, believe also in me." (Jn. 14:1 KJV)

Joel Hemphill suggested, "We need to tell Christianity in our age, 'You believe in Jesus, believe also in God.'" God has a plan through His servant Jesus.

The call is still to "come, let us reason together, says Yahweh." (1:18) In the middle of a call for judgment we know of "Immanuel" (7:14), then a child will be born (9:6), for a kingdom of righteousness (9:7), from a shoot/branch of Jesse (11:1), but hell/Sheol is excited over us, so that it can quiet our evil (14:9). Woe to the earth (24:1); woe to rebellious children (30:1); and woe to the one who quarrels with His maker (45:9). In 722 b.c. disaster came, the Northern Kingdom fell, ten of twelve tribes gone! But, "comfort you, comfort you, my people" says your God (40:1) for the "glory of the LORD/YHWH will be revealed."(40:5) These "Deutero-Isaiah"1 passages bring hope. "But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." (40:31 KJV). Within that context, a new hope is clarified, "Behold, My Servant!" (42:1) הֵן עַבְדָי The Ebed YHWH, The Servant of the LORD!

In the middle of Matthew 12:18-20, the author takes the time to explain the activities of Jesus, especially healing, with a quote from Isaiah 42:1ff., with what has become known as one of several "Suffering Servant Songs.²" (Isa. 42, 49, 50 & 52/53, possibly 61³) Matthew quotes the beginning of Isaiah chapter 42:

By Dr. Joe Martin

"Behold, My Servant whom I have chosen; My Beloved in whom My soul is well-pleased; I will put My Spirit upon Him" (Mt. 12:18 NASB)

Then Peter in the book of Acts, with a formerly lame man clinging to him in the temple, explains the healing with "The God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified His servant Jesus, the one whom you delivered and disowned...." (v. 13). Quoting Dt. 18:18 in verse 22, Peter says we should have listened to him (Jesus), "For you first God raised up His Servant and sent Him to bless you by turning everyone of you from your wicked ways." (3:26) Later, in chapter four, Peter and John defend themselves before the Sanhedrin, quoting Psalm 2, "Why do the Gentiles rage... against the LORD and against His Christ.' For truly in this city there were gathered together against Your holy servant Jesus, whom You anointed...and now Lord take note of their threats...while You extend Your hand to heal, and signs and wonders take place through the name of Your holy servant Jesus." (Acts 4:25-30)

I believe the passages in Isaiah, as well as the other

promises and prophecies about the Messiah, make up what could be termed "Jesus' Job Description," or a "Messianic Job Description." Great promises like...

- Gen. 3:15, "the seed of the woman;"
- Gen. 12:3, "the whole world blessed through Abraham's descendant;"
- Gen. 49:10, "the scepter shall not depart from Judah, nor the ruler's staff from between his feet;"
- Dt. 18:18, "I will put My words in his mouth, and he shall speak to them all that I command him (cp. Jn. 12:49 NIV);
- Il Sam. 7:16, "Your throne shall be established forever;"
- Micah 5:2, "From you One will go forth for Me to be ruler;"
- Zech. 12:10, "...they will mourn for Him, as one mourns for an only son...a firstborn," etc.

Also in Acts 8 when Philip is led by the Spirit to join the Ethiopian's chariot while the African was reading Isaiah 53. "He was led as a sheep to slaughter...." (v. 32) This song begins in Isaiah 52:13, "Behold My servant will prosper...."

In Acts 8:35 the story continues, "Then Philip opened his mouth, and beginning from this Scripture he preached Jesus to him." This scripture is a foundational scripture, with the other "Suffering Servant Songs," about what Jesus was to accomplish as he submitted to the Father's will, not his own.

I would like us to see that in those "songs" of Isaiah, one may find as many as 100 points of Jesus' "job description." "Behold, My Servant," scholars have suggested that this is similar to God's announcement to Samuel looking for the first King of Israel, Saul.

"When Samuel saw Saul, the LORD said to him, "Behold, the man⁴ of whom I spoke to you! This one shall rule over My people." (1 Sam. 9:17) If God says it, it is a "royal designation." God is to be pleased with this servant from Isaiah. Remember the voice of God at Jesus' baptism and transfiguration, "This is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased!" (Mt. 3:17, etc. voice at baptism, Mt. 17:5, voice at the transfiguration). The Spirit is to be the key leading in his life (Mt. 3:16 et. al.) He will bring forth justice, be gentle, and be a "country preacher" vs. a mostly city preacher? Faithfully bringing forth justice seems similar to the Messiah's duties of Daniel 9:24, "to make reconciliation...bring in everlasting righteousness."

Jesus is the agent (*shaliah* or *shaliach* in Hebrew) via this guilt offering and servanthood portrayed in these songs of Isaiah. He has "power of attorney" for us.

A *shaliaḥ* (<u>Hebrew</u>: שָׁלִיחָים, pl. שָׁלִיחָים, *sheliḥim*) in <u>Halakha</u> is a Jewish legal <u>emissary</u> or agent. Accordingly, a *shaliaḥ* performs an act of legal significance for the benefit of the sender, as opposed to him or herself.⁵

Yahweh will cause him to prosper; he will be "satisfied;" and by His knowledge, YHWH's Servant will justify many. Isaiah 53:12 notes "great." The right hand of God (21x in N.T.) is very great. Because of His death, we are cleansed.

A final note on Isaiah 61, which some feel is a "fifth" Suffering Servant Song." Though the term "servant" does not appear, Jesus in Nazareth perceives this to be part of his job

as well as noted in his first sermon which he delivered at the Nazareth synagogue. (Luke 4:16 ff) It is the beginning of his ministry.

The spirit of Lord Yahweh is on me for Yahweh has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the news to the afflicted, to soothe the broken-hearted,² to proclaim liberty to captives, release to those in prison, to proclaim a year of favour from Yahweh and a day of vengeance for our God, to comfort all who mourn... (Isa 61:1-2 NJB)

What a beautiful passage. Spirit anointing, good news, liberty, and the "favorable year of Yahweh" preached to all of us sinners. It was the best beginning of ministry ever seen. A ministry that began with the good news of the kingdom from YHWH's Suffering Servant, is to continue through us. In southern Louisiana, the French Cajuns have a saying, Laissez les bons temps rouler. ("Let the good times roll.") We have good news for a messed-up world, just like in Isaiah's time. "This is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus the Messiah/ Christ whom you have sent" (John 17:3) gives us the basis of preaching the kingdom that is surely coming. Jesus is primarily a servant (Mark 10:45). He told us to be servants, giving us an example of foot washing servanthood in John 13 (and Luke 17:10). Let's join Him in obedience to the Father.



2017 General Conference Delegate Session Minutes Cornerstone Bible Church, McDonough, GA

Thursday, 27 July 2017

Meeting called to order by Chairman Chris James at 4:00pm. Michael Cisler opened with prayer.

Seth Ross addressed the delegates regarding his transition to Executive Director. Seth started in this role on the first day of 2017.

Chairman Chris recognized his father, Joe James, on this his 81st birthday. Chris then recognized the first-time delegates and allowed them to introduce themselves.

Chairman's message to the delegates:

Four years is a long time, but it has come and gone quickly. When he was contemplating running for the board, after getting a phone call asking him, he decided to stop over thinking it and turn to prayer. He feels richly blessed by the honor and privilege of serving in this capacity.

At the beginning of his four-year term, Dr. Joe Martin suggested it was about time for him to step back from the CAO role. Now Joe is retired from that position, but still teaching full-time at Atlanta Bible College.

Also, in the last four years, we have purchased five adjacent lots for student housing, as well as an already-built house nearby. We have completed building of a new house, and another is in progress.

Our missions in the US and abroad continue to grow. We are going out into the world and spreading the Good News as we are commanded to do.

We do not know what lies ahead, but our God does. We must remember we are his laborers, and we must seek His blessings and guidance and to to do His will.

After the address, Denise Cramer listed the delegates for these meetings. There are 7 board members, 36 church and state conference delegates, and 26 pastor delegates, for a total of 69 delegates. This is 11 fewer than last year.

Denise then presented the financial reports.

On the income and expense reports, we are a little over budget on salaries and wages. This is not too bad considering the addition of a full-time staff member. We are the only 501(c)3 non-profit in Henry County paying property taxes, and our appeal is still in progress. In the meantime, we had to pay 80% of the tax assessment so far this year.

ABC Development Foundation will be transferring in \$34,000 in the new fiscal year. ABCDF investments did very well in the past year, and there is a formula in place to determine how much to transfer.

Chris asked for the names of nominees for the board of directors. The terms of Chris James and Dan Knowlton are expiring. Anne Fischhaber, Jeff Osborn, and Susan Landry were presented. Their names had been submitted before conference. Chris then opened the floor to additional nominations. With no additional names, David Cheatwood moved to close nominations. Rob Laning seconded. Chris asked the three nominees to step forward and say a few words.

David Krogh then presented the Atlanta Bible College report. We had one bachelor's degree, four associate's degrees, and four foundation certificates given this year. Steve An presented the ABC Korean Extension report. The campus was recently relocated from Duluth to a new suite in Johns Creek. There were 37 students last semester, with 6 graduates. So far there are 20 new student applications.

David Krogh presented the LHI report. Rick McClain, the LHI chairman, regrets he was unable to attend. The giving to missions has been over \$200,000 in the last two years. There was another successful trip to Africa this year. The planned trip to Peru was canceled due to the threat of dengue fever, though some COG members are there now. There is a silent auction for missions going on here at General Conference.

Denise Cramer presented the budget proposals. She reviewed the proposed revisions for 2017-2018 and the proposed budget for 2018-2019 and took questions.

Andrew Hamilton addressed the requested budget increases for the youth program, Turning Point Youth Ministries. They have made as many cuts at FUEL as they can to prevent tuition increases. There will be inevitable cost increases in the next few years, and the TPYM leadership want to keep tuition the same as long as possible. Currently, the lowest tuition rate at FUEL is \$375. They want to be able to spend more on youth worker training and student development. There is currently no money budgeted to travel to churches and train youth leaders.

Seth Ross addressed the importance of giving to the general fund.

Secretary Dan Knowlton read the minutes for today's session.

Chris James adjourned at 5:39 pm. David Krogh closed with prayer.

Friday, 28 July 2017

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Chris James at 4:02 pm. Pastor Michael Montgomery opened with prayer.

We held the first round of voting for the board of directors.

As the votes were being collected and counted, Seth Ross recognized Rollin Carlblom for setting up a new server at the Avalon building, saving us thousands of dollars.

Seth then recognized outgoing board members Dan Knowlton and Chris James, presenting us with plaques. We are both grateful for these lovely parting gifts.

The first round was nullified when it was discovered we did not fully explain the need to only vote for one person per round. A new set of ballots was distributed.

It was announced that Christian Workers Seminar 2018 will be held April 8-13. Church of God Heritage Conference 2018 will be July 10, 11 at Oregon, Illinois. General Conference 2018 will be held July 11-13 at Oregon Church of God, Illinois. FUEL 2018 will be July 22-27.

Denise Cramer presented the final delegate count. There were 72 total delegates: 7 board members, 38 church and conference delegates, and 27 pastor delegates.

Dan Cain made a motion to adjourn. David Cheatwood seconded. Motion carried.

Pastor Andy Cisneros closed with prayer. Chairman Chris adjourned the meeting at 4:42 pm.

Remember *"88 Reasons Why the Rapture Will Be in 1988"* and the sequel, *"89 Reasons Why the Rapture Will Be in 1989."* Did you buy both of them? Were you ready for the world to end on Y2K? How about the Blood Moons?

The time that we are in is full of signs all over the place, but as with all things scrip-


Faith Factory serves two main purposes among youth/young adults.

Yesu Wabwino: Jesus is Good By Brendan Gallagher



I found myself gazing out the window of the plane. I watched as the ground passed below at hundreds of miles an hour. I was in disbelief as I flew in a jet for

the first time, especially under these circumstances. I was only just beginning what would be a trip that would change my perspective of myself, Christianity, and the world we live in. I sat with a book in between my clammy hands, unsure of what to expect, but excited to see what God had in store for this trip to Africa.

It all began when I went to the annual General Conference in 2016. The first night that I could attend the services the team who had gone to Africa that summer had shared their stories from the trip and the effect it had on their lives. I had always had a passion for mission work, but hearing about missions in Africa this night really caught my attention. At the end of the service, after listening to the stories that each team member told from their perspective, I decided I was going to go out on a limb and speak with the leaders of the team, Dr. Joe and Rebekah Martin. Without knowing what to expect, I expressed interest in the trip. After over six months, I received a call and was offered a position on the team if the Lord's Harvest International board approves the addition of a not-quite eighteen-year-old to the team.

Once I received the approval I began to get ready, getting the necessary shots, my passport, and the necessary supplies. Before I knew it, I was visiting my future college, graduating high school, hosting a graduation party, and flying out to begin my trip all within the course of a single week. I flew from Ohio to Georgia where I landed, overnighted with the Ross family, and began the process of getting ready to fly out for the long haul. We went to the airport, but were unable to depart, since I didn't have the documents I needed to land in South Africa since I was a minor. Our flight was delayed for the next few days as everything that could possibly go wrong did go wrong. However, despite the frustrating delay, I was able to build a relationship with the Ross family who were more of a blessing than I could've hoped. As Paul writes in Romans 8:28, "[a]nd we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." It is through this trip that I truly experienced God working in through the most unexpected moments. On Thursday, June 18th, Seth and I finally boarded our sixteenhour flight to South Africa.

Seth and I landed in South Africa, overnighted in a hotel, then took a connecting flight to Malawi. Upon landing we were picked up by the rest of our team which included Dr. Joe and Rebekah Martin, Kim Laurent, Rollin Carlblom, and Linda Limbe. We began the drive to the house that we were staying in. I gazed out the window at the passing buildings. Each building was surrounded by a six-foot tall wall, often with shards of glass or electric wire on top to repel intruders. Some buildings had a nice brick wall while some only had a wall made from thatching. Trash littered the dusty streets and people dressed in dirty, holefilled clothes walked within only a couple feet of the car as we drove through the city. We made it to the house, unpacked, and rested for the remainder of the evening.

The next morning, we went to speak at a small church in a village which became daily procedure for the next few weeks as this was what we came to do. We drove as close to the village as we could, but we had to get out of the car and walk the rest of the way through maize fields on the side of a small mountain. As we got closer, we could hear the people singing in Chichewa, the native language in Malawi. We emerged from the corn and found a large group of people singing and clapping as they greeted us into their village. The village was nothing more than quickly eroding clay huts with thatched roofing. A couple scrawny chickens roamed around the piles of clay bricks that the people were in the process of making. The people themselves were gaunt from the lack of food, and they wore clothes that were torn apart and dirty, and most didn't have shoes. However, despite the conditions, I could see nothing but joy in the eyes of the people as they shook each of our hands and greeted us into their home village.

We entered the small church and got situated as 100-200 people completely filled and surrounded the church. It was not big enough to fit everyone. They began to worship and dance with more passion than I had ever seen before. I couldn't believe the joy that radiated from this group of people who, in comparison to American standards, had absolutely nothing. We spoke, sang, prayed, and danced with the people of this village and connected with them in ways that I had not connected even with people from my home. We played with the children who enjoy soccer more than I do, which was another miracle of itself. Each day was filled with services like these which never failed to captivate me.

For the next part of our trip, we traveled to Mozambique to preach the word of God. However, unlike Malawi's friendly public, Mozambique presented a rougher atmosphere. Due to a sixteen-year-long civil war, the heart of the general public was hardened. The hotel the we stayed in also had no running water, and the electricity went out on multiple occasions during our stay. We were exposed to living conditions that we weren't used to, and we felt the effects of it through each passing day, which only began to put into perspective the living conditions of the people we spoke to in each village. However, our team worked with three major pastors during our time there who were the epitome of brotherhood and leadership. These pastors were inseparable and were whole-heartedly invested in preaching the word of God, which encouraged us in our efforts.

Each day we would go to one of their churches and hold a similar service to those that we held in Malawi. By this point I had begun to preach at every church we went to alongside Dr. Joe and Rebekah. Being a seventeen-year-old boy from America, I was beyond intimidated speaking in front of hundreds of Africans who traveled from across the country just to hear us speak. I couldn't even speak in front of a class at home without my knees shaking, but as I sought God through this experience I found peace. Each time I spoke I found words leaving my mouth before I even thought of them. I found myself making connections in ways I had never done before. Despite my inexperience and my weaknesses, I found God speaking through me and using me, as he used my love of soccer to connect with the people of each church.

This trip to Africa was an unbelievable experience that changed the way that I see life. It took me out of my comfort zone to the other side of the world to invest in the lives of people who, in my perspective now, are wealthier than I. I found people filled with joy and passion for God's word who are investing all that they are into spreading the gospel. Although I ran into complications along the way, I found a peace that comes only from God as I learned to accept what he has in store, even when I don't understand what is going on. In this poor, broken part of the world I found true joy. Not that comes with an easy life or possessions, but that comes with knowing the one true God.

2017 Heritage Conference Review By Jan Stilson

Planning the 13th Heritage Conference began January 3, 2017. From there we designed a program that was both classical and current in subject matter. By classical is meant the first several centuries of church history, and by current is meant the 19th and 20th centuries.

The roots of the Church of God began throughout the centuries of church history in Europe, but did not coalesce as the Age to Come movement until Joseph Marsh withdrew from William Miller's Second Advent movement in America around 1845. Marsh's work eventually merged with Benjamin Wilson's work in Illinois to form the Abrahamic Faith movement which became the Church of God in 1921.

Over the last thirty years Church of God historians have studied the formative years in the 19th century involving the publishing of religious journals. Journals such as the 'Advent Harbinger' and 'The Restitution' were forerunners to 'The Restitution Herald'. They advanced key doctrines we still love, and provided news to churches and isolated members. These truths include oneness of God;

sus Christ his Son, and the power of the Holy Spirit; conditional immortality (sleep of the dead and resurrection of the just and unjust for reward or judgment); the second coming of Christ to establish the kingdom of God on earth. The covenant with Abraham, and the return of the Jews to their homeland with their conversion to accept Christ were also important, making Age to Come and Abrahamic Faith very different from the standard evangelical church of the day.

This year the Heritage Conference opened one day prior to General Conference at Atlanta Bible College with a keynote address by our new Executive Director of the General Conference and President of Atlanta Bible College, Seth O. Ross. Seth inspired us as he shared his love for history and truth, and his hope for the future of the organization. We also enjoyed a presentation by Pastor Ed Bender reflecting the important truths we have advanced since the inception of our work entitled, 'Speak, Lord, Your Servant is Listening', and Pastor Scott Perciful of our new church, Restoration Christian Church in Oklahoma City, who presented, 'System Restore', demonstrating his passion for sharing the truth and for preaching. Keegan Chandler of Houston, TX, presented 'Photinus of Galatia: Unitarian of the Fourth Century'. Keegan pastors a small group in Houston and is the recently-published author of 'God of Jesus in Light of Christian Dogma' (2016).

Another program enlightening us on the beliefs of the early church fathers was Dr. John Roller on the topic, 'The Doctrine of Immortality in the Early Church'. He illustrated how patriarchs of the first three centuries believed in sleep of the dead. Their dedication, inspiration and persecution for the truth is an example for us.

In contrast to the classics, David Krogh began a two-part series on the history and statistics of the youth movement in the Church of God. This was pertinent to us all as many or most of us have been part of the camp movement within our state

and national youth programs. He will complete the program in 2018. Along these same lines, Sharon Hastings, a camper from Quaker Haven and Camp Mack of years gone by, presented the History of the Brush Creek Church of God near Tipp City, Ohio. Another interesting and fun program was presented by the Macy Sisters, Cheryl Ross and Karla Macy, with cousin Linda Allen, on the history of Emory and Mid Macy's ministry in Texas.

Other presenters included Sir Anthony Buzzard who shared his faith story, and spoke about the truths with examples of those who are raising questions and coming to understand. Anthony is the author of several books on the important truths, and Focus on the Kingdom, a monthly newsletter.

Finally, Jan Stilson presented a 'tour' of the archives with books, documents and photos from the collection. The archives is a rare book room with materials and artifacts reflecting Church of God history. This collection houses the works published by our authors in the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries. The history of Oregon Bible College, Atlanta Bible College, the General Conference, with collections provided by local churches, pastors, teachers, and state conferences are represented in the collection.

Looking to the future, many archival religious periodicals and books are being digitally scanned




