A History of the Church of God General Conference

PART TWO

In the November 7 issue of Progress Journal the first article in this series appeared. It contained the history of the first Church of God General Conference, organized in 1888, and the reorganization of the Church of God General Conference at Waterloo, Iowa, in 1921. The remaining part of this history will consider the General Conference by departments of its work and trace the history of the Bible Training School and Oregon Bible College; the development of publications; evangelism and missions; the development of the Constitution; the Decade of Development Program; and missellaneous items of General Conference history.

History of the Bible Training School and Oregon Bible College

At the meetings of General Conference delegates in 1923, discussions were begun concerning the need for a Bible training school to teach ministers for the work of the Church of God. This need had also been recognized in 1888. The Restitution Herald, reporting on the 1924 General Conference, contained these words of Bro. F. L. Austin, "Returning in thought to August a year ago, it will be recalled that the Executive Board approved of an effort to commence Bible study class work at the earliest possible convenience. There are some of our young men, who had already been patiently waiting for a year or two, for the opening of such an operation. Your secretary (F. L. Austin) felt that, in duty to them, it was all but obligatory to undertake this work. Therefore, little dreaming of the difficulties to be encountered in seeuring proper management for the greenhouse, these men were informed that class

work would begin early in November, 1923. They made their plans accordingly. This class of young men worked under immense difficulties during these months. The class consisted of Paul C. Johnson, Arthur Johnson, Cedrie Pope, Melville Lyon, Charles Fletcher, and Harry Sheets. In addition, other young men and women attended the class more or less regularly but not with the same definite aim in view. It has been possible to have the class work in the evenings only."

In 1926, the following action was taken by the Conference delegates. "The Board, in outlining the work for the future, has arranged to make an effort to carry out the wish of the Conference. It was the voice of the Conference that the Bible Training Class should be considered an established and permanent fact. Instead of operating from year to year as in the past, it was the wish of the Conference that the Bible Training Class should be continued permanently. Therefore we wish to announce that the Bible Training Class will begin its work for the year on Tuesday morning, October 5, 1926."

In 1933, after the Bible Training Class had been in operation for ten years, financial problems of the depression beset the General Conference and it was reported by the Executive Board, "The General Conference has instructed us to discontinue the Training School for a time, a thing which we are regretful to do, but could not avoid. The Board has also been authorized to dispose of the greenhouse as speedily and advantageously as possible. Our manager has informed you of the results along that line."

In August, 1936, after the Training School had been closed for three years, an article appeared questioning the wisdom of continuing without the Bible Training School. The writer reminded that those who had been trained in the Bible School were all active in the ministry except two. He wrote, "When the Training Class was dropped, one of the main objections was that it cost too much. Has it cost too much to prepare young people to go out and gather the golden grain? Will they be lost if neglected? Who will be responsible then? Is it not our main objective to win others to Christ? The National Bible Institution is still faced with the problem of its expenses and the problem of meeting its obligations as before. An appeal to meet expenses is made now as before, yet there is no Training Class. Have we stopped to realize that someone must replace those who are falling asleep in death, and those who can work no longer?" Others were also asking these questions, and there seemed to be an interest in reforming the Bible school for the training of ministers and workers.

In August, 1937, a committee which had been appointed in 1936 to study the possibility of reorganizing the Bible Training School reported, "Having put forth a diligent effort to acquaint the Church of God throughout the country with the conditions under which a Training Class could be established. and having requested that all who would be interested in such a class from the standpoint of preparation for Christian service should signify their desire to attend under the conditions specified, the committee through its chairwoman, Miss Leila Whitchead, regretted to report that but one application had been made for entrance and that no other inquiries had been received. Therefore, it is impossible

at this time to attempt revival of the class.

It was moved by Bros. C. E. Randall and G. E. Marsh, that it be the sense of this conference that a committee consisting of the presidents of the General Conference, the National Berean Society, the Ministerial Association, and the chairmen of the Board of Evangelism, provide, as far as financial support is available, for the training of young people of our denomination who desire special preparation for public Christian service. The motion carried.

In August, 1938, a Board of Education was established. This Board of three people studied throughout the year the possibility of establishing a school for the training of Christian workers.

In August, 1939, Bro. G. E. Marsh presented the following resolution: "Be it resolved that the Board of Religious Education be instructed to establish a nine-mouths Bible Training School, heginning this fall, and be empowered to make such arrangements as necessary to carry out said instruction. Be it further resolved that the curriculum, entrance requirements, policies, financial and otherwise, and all such matters pertaining to setting up and operation of said school be placed under their jurisdiction." The adoption of the resolution was moved by Bro. Marsh and seconded by Bro. Harvey U. Krogh, Jr.

After discussion and encouragement for passage of this motion by Bros. Randall, Krogh, and Marsh, it was passed without a single dissenting voice.

In regard to the motion, a letter was read from Ero. Norman McLeod which said in part in recommending the establishment of a school, "Let us build the religious school will, in turn, build our evangelistic work. The evangelistic work will build the church."

In 1941, Bro. C. E. Randall spoke for the Board of Religious Education of two matters that had been studied by the Board and were being recommended to the Conference. He stated, 1) The degree of Bachelor of Theology will be granted those who graduate from

our school, and, 2) the Board wishes that a more appropriate name would be chosen for the school. He moved that the name "Maranatha College" be adopted. Bro. John Eagleston seconded the motion.

After considerable discussion it was decided to table the matter of a name, leaving the decision to the Board of Education.

During the years 1941-42, the Board of Education named the school Oregon Bible College. It was also noted that Oregon Bible College would soon outgrow its present quarters, if the Lord continues Ilis blessings on the school. Without any solicitation, \$1,000.00 had already been received for a Building Fund for expansion of Oregon Bible College.

By 1943, the fund had increased to the \$15,000.00 mark. It was then the recommendation of the Board of Education to continue advertising the need of a college building, hoping to increase the fund to \$30,000.00 during the ensuing Conference year.

The Board of Education appointed a Site Committee to make investigation during the General Conference week of 1943, and to report as soon as convenient to the Board of Education or to the Conference assembled, that a suitable site and campus might be purchased as soon as reasonably convenient.

The Committee investigated a site north of Oregon, Illinois, and reported thus to the Conference delegates. "I move that this Conference instruct the Executive Board to purchase the twenty acres of the Spoor property lying east of the highway for the sum of \$26,000.00 as soon as \$21,000.00 shall have been paid into the building fund in eash, or underwritten by parties which the Board considers reliable." The motion passed, and the matter of details of purchase was left to the Executive Board. The property was purchased that year, and Oregon Bible College moved there.

In 1950, this property was sold at a profit and construction of the present building was undertaken in the city of Oregon to provide offices, print shop, classrooms, and other facilities for Oregon Bible College. The building was completed and in use late in 1950.

Bro. C. E. Randall expressed the opinion that the ministry should be kept before the young people of the church as the highest possible calling. The College, he felt, was the greatest evangelistic effort of the Church of God.

By August, 1957, it could again be seen that Oregon Bible College was outgrowing its present facilities, and study of possible means' to expand facilities was begun.

The following actions were taken in this regard at the 1957 Conference. It was adopted that: A building fund be set up with contributions, wills, bequests, and special grants encouraged; a study be made, securing qualified individuals to help, of the most practical, long-range plans for the development of a desirable and adequate campus; that a dormitory for boys and then one for girls be secured.

Sr. Lucille Ratering moved the adoption of the following resolution: "We recommend that a site for a future housing center for Oregon Bible College students be selected, and that, as funds are available and circumstances allow, housing and dining facilities be provided there for single students, and apartments for married students." The motion was adopted.

In 1958, at the August Conference, Bro. Harry Sheets moved and Bro. Raymond Brown seconded that the Board of Directors be empowered to expand College facilities on the present property as soon as financial conditions permit. This motion carried.

At this same conference, Bro. Dale Ward and Bro. Roy Humphreys moved that the Board of Directors take what steps were necessary to make Golden Rule Home a part of Oregon Bible College.

In 1959, further action was taken concerning the future of Oregon Bible College. Bros. C. E. Randall and Harold Doan moved that "Oregon Bible College be maintained as a non-accredited school in its efforts to train ministers, teachers, and evangelists for the Church of God. This is not to be construed as barring future accreditation if circumstances and needs so require."

Also passed, was a resolution that a building campaign be begun immediately to raise funds for a building on the Golden Rule Dormitory site for a men's dormitory, dining facilities, library, and other facilities. It was recommended that pledges be taken from individuals, groups, and churches to be paid over a period of five or ten years. The importance of not letting this Campaign detract from the giving for the regular work of the General Conference was emphasized. This is to be an extra effort by the Church of God.

In the year that followed, preliminary plans were drawn for such a building and the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign was begun to secure \$125,000.00 for a dormitory, dining room, library building. At this writing, about \$106,000.00 in contributions and commitments has been received. It is hoped that this building will be in use by 1964, the Silver Anniversary of Oregon Bible College.

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Evangelism and Missions Progress

"Send the Light"

THE FIELDS ARE WHITE

So often we feel that the doors are all closed to the missionaries and to missionary effort. We contend that the doors are not ALL closed!

Churches are growing rapidly in South America, and, let it be emphasized, Protestant churches are growing in number and strength. Thousands and thousands of Bibles are being distributed in South America, and where they are being distributed, churches are being built.

Brazil, according to J. Merle Davis author of *How the Church Grows in Brazil*, states that the church is growing there more rapidly than anywhere else on earth.

We are told that the Presbyterians, Methodists, Pentecostals, and Baptists are growing very rapidly. The main reason for their phenomenal growth is that they are building on the Bible. The secretary of the Bible Society of Brazil in a 1952 report said, "How account for the vitality, the strength, the progress, the dreams, the influence of the evangelical movement in Brazil? The answer is: it is Bible-centered. Evangelical Brazilians believe in the Bible. . . . In my many travels I have never encountered a people so Bible-conscious as the evangelical people of Brazil."

There is a denomination which is adding to its numbers every day in Brazil. This denomination lays great stress on evangelism as a permanent part of the church. But they have gone further. They have set the month of September aside as a month of evangelism. During September they use all of their strength, all of their prayers, all of their action on striving to reach those who know not God. Their effort is not a hit-or-miss affair. They systematically set about reaching every house in the community. They give a copy of John's Gospel to every family. (They use nearly 250,000 copies of this Gospel a year.) Then they tell the family what God means to them, and invite them to the meetings which will be held that week. This effort takes only the first two weeks of the month. The third week of the month is filled with meetings of all kinds. The fourth week is taken up with calling on every home which indicated even the slightest interest in the work. When the workers call back the second time, they again leave a book of the Bible, probably another Gospel.

This method has proved to be extremely effective in

winning Brazilians to the Lord. We are also people who hold high the Word of God, but we have not launched out in South America. We quote God's Word, "Therefore said he unto them, The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest" (Luke 10:2). Do we earnestly mean what we pray? Do we go the second step and seek young people to go? Will we support additional workers in the field?

We feel that we have the truth of God's Word; now it is up to us to become dissatisfied with what we have done in the past, improve our present efforts, and do more for the Master tomorrow. Now is the time to plan for future work, future expansion, future conversions.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

All members of the Board of Directors were present for a meeting Friday and Saturday, November 11 and 12. Many matters of important business concerning the work of the Church of God General Conference were discussed and plans made for the future of the work.

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN

A letter has been sent to all members of the Church of God who have not yet taken the opportunity to participate in the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign for the expansion of Oregon Bible College. We hope that each member family in the Church of God will respond to this campaign so that each will have a part, even if a small part, in the building of our church college.

Each of us benefits from the training received by students at Oregon Bible College. These graduates pastor our churches, are guest speakers at special services, call in our homes, marry and bury our loved ones, write for our publications, and carry on much of the work of the General Conference. Each of us has a part to play in providing the facilities and the means for their training, since we receive the benefits.

Only one out of each six families of the Church of God has made a commitment or contribution to the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign to date. We know that there are many more who are able and who will respond. Use the coupon in the letter you receive to do your part.

BRICKS WITHOUT STRAW

Pastor J. R. LeCrone, in speaking of the responsibility that is laid upon the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, likened their work to that of the Israelites who were commanded to make bricks without straw. The taskmasters wanted Israel to produce the same number of bricks they had before, but refused to furnish straw for the bricks. (Ex. 5:5-14.)

Certain work is outlined each year for the General Conference to accomplish. A budget is adopted which represents the amount of money that is needed in contributions to carry out that work. Delegates, who represent the entire Church of God membership, vote for the projects and approve the budget. To then fail to contribute the funds that are needed to carry out the work that has been authorized, is to say to those who must do the work, "Make bricks without straw."

This is not deliberate action, we know. The Lord's people love the work and intend that it should move forward. It is simply that we often forget, or become involved in other undertakings, and hope that someone else will take over our part of the burden. But each one must do his proportionate part and carry his phase of the burden as the Lord has blessed him!

On the opposite page you will find the Treasurer's Report for the last fiscal year. The excess of funds received over expenses was due to contributions for the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign, and the Mission Builder's League, funds which are outside the regular budgeted operating costs of the General Conference.

Contributions in the past fiscal year were \$34,952.59, toward a budget goal of \$42,710.00. This was a deficit in contributions of \$7,757.41. Had these contributions been received, there would be funds available to move forward in areas where we are now lacking. There are ways in which we should be moving ahead in home and foreign missions, printing and publishing the gospel, expansion and improvement of Oregon Bible College, improving the Berean Youth Fellowship, and caring for the needs of the churches. This progress can only be made when we reach the budget goals we set for ourselves at the annual General Conference.

The tithes of churches and conferences, and the offerings of individuals, are needed to meet these goals. Below, you will see the financial report for the current fiscal year which began October 1. We cannot make bricks without straw. Make this a matter of prayer and discussion in your church and family.

CHURCH OF THE OPEN BIBLE Bedford, Ohio

Formal dedication of the congregation in its new building at 689 Adams St., Bedford, was held the afternoon of Sunday, October 9, 1960. The pastor, by request of the congregation, was in charge. We were glad to welcome visitors from Golden Rule Church of God, Cleveland, and a number of others from outside the Church of God family.

The service aimed specifically at participation by the congregation itself, at emphasizing the need for our working with God and for trying to keep our personal lives in conformity with His will. Children sang choruses that tied in with this idea. More than the usual number of public prayers were called for, including one by a thirteen-year-old who was given no advance notice. (Sunday school teachers have stressed training in prayer among the children.) A short sermon, based on 1 Peter 2:5, followed the theme of "Rededicating Ourselves to God."

Two guest speakers have visited the Bedford church recently, Bro, Frank Perkins, now seeking a license from the General Conference, spoke on October 2 and assisted in the Communion service afterward, Bro. Fred Schuld, Jr., spoke on October 23, while the pastor was out of town. Both men are from the Golden Rule Church of God.

The church extends its heartfelt thanks to the Mission Builders, who so far have contributed \$3,800 toward its building debt, and to others outside the Mission Builders who have, over the last year, contributed liberally. also. Without this co-operation from others. the church would have had a long time of repayment of its \$6,000.00 building debt. As it is, the debt, through outside contributions and the work of the church itself, has been poid in full

Considerable remodeling and renovating must be done on the building, but this is something we now shall be able to take care of without much difficulty. We hope we shall be able to help others in the future as they have helped us-and that the work of God may advance in the Bedford area.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Teachers and Workers' Conferences

Sunday school teachers and workers' conferences are important.

No one would think of a large business corporation operating without its board of directors meetings. Likewise, one should not hink of the Sunday school operating smoothly, efficiently, and progressively, without a meeting of its directors.

The question is sometimes asked: "Why should we have teachers and workers' conferences?" One good reason would be that "two heads are better than one." A person who is an officer, teacher, or worker in the Sunday school may sit at home and think of many things about which he would like to voice his opinion with reference to improving the Sunday school. This singular thinking, however, usually does not result in any corrective action. On the other hand, a Sunday school teachers and workers' conference is the place and opportunity where constructive criticism may be voiced profitably, and where suggested ideas will be earefully weighed, discussed, and, if found practical, will be adopted for use in the Sunday school, It is the place to promote positive, spiritual, Christian thinking.

The responsibility for these meetings rests upon all the workers. Let us look at the responsibilities and benefits to the different members.

A) Sunday School Superintendent: The responsibility of planning, arranging, and conducting the conference rests with the superintendent. It is important that a regular time and place be set for the conferences so all the workers can reserve this time to attend.

Every effort should be put forth by the superintendent to see that the conferences are carried on in an interesting and stimulating manner. One factor which tends to discourage attendance at these conferences is a dull, uninteresting presentation of the Sunday school problems. The timing is also important. The meetings should always be adjourned on time and, above all, don't forget your most important guest, God Himself. Open and close your conference with prayer. Pray for His blessing upon your conference and for Him to direct you in your efforts to serve Him. Then thank Him for all that He has done for you.

B) Pastor: The progressive pastor is always interested in the Sunday school and its growth. He knows that the Sunday school is the feeder for the church. The pastor should always strive to be present at the conferences to render advice and to offer suggestions which he, as a minister, will be qualified to offer. The pastor should help to co-ordinate the Sunday school and church programs and activities.

C) Officers, Teachers, and Workers: Needless to say, all officers, teachers, and workers should sense their responsibility to the extent that they will make a special effort to be present for every conference. The conference can be successful only when the superintendent has the full co-operation of all officers, teachers, and workers. The entire group should be loyal to and co-operate with the lirective personnel of the Sunday school organization.

A workers' conference helps to secure unity

in the Sunday school work. It gives a feeling of the group spirit in Sunday school activity. It will assist in co-ordinating the work of the various departments. It will give each department a view of what the others are doing and what problems they are meeting and how they are winning the victory over these difficulties. A good Sunday school needs to be a united Sunday school, and this unity can be promoted as problems are shared in the teachers and workers' conference.

If you are not now having teachers and workers' conferences, why not start the new year by organizing and holding regular upto-date, inspirational conferences?

*PROGRESS JOURNAL

A History of the Church of God General Conference

Compiled by Pastor Francis E. Burnett, Secretary, Church of God General Conference

PART THREE

This article continues the review of the highlights of the progress of the Church of God General Conference since its beginnings 1888. This section will cover the first steps in the recognition of ministers, purchase of property, Conference publications, and the history of Conference financial policies.

MINISTERIAL RECOGNITION

One of the first steps taken by the reorganized Church of God General Conference in 1921 was to make provision to approve ministers and recommend them to the Churches of God.

December 7, 1921, the following statements were made in The Restitution Herald.

"Ministers Approved by the General Conference. The following names have been advertised and there having been no charges of improper conduct placed by anyone, the General Conference of the Church of God approves the persons named, for evangelists and pastors, in accordance with the state conferences which have issued ministerial certificates thereto: E. O. Stewart, Mrs. M. A. Woodward, J. E. Cowles, S. J. Lindsay, F. E. Siple, F. L. Austin, D. E. VanVactor, J. W. Williams, A. M. Jones, T. A. Drinkard, F. V. Blakely, J. A. Patrick, C. E. Randall, G. E. Marsh, L. E. Conner, A. W. Darby, A. S. Bradley, J. H. Anderson, Signed, J. A. Patrick, President, and F. L. Austin, Secretary."

In 1922, a Committee to Hear and Judge Complaints was established. The following explanation was given. "No little harm has been done to the cause for which the Church of stands by the persistent circulation of complaints of immoral or habitual unchris-

tian conduct by some of the ministry. This injury is not alone to the church. It is equally serious in its effect upon the ones against whom the complaints are made—providing the charges are wrong, or are magnified. To correct this condition, for the good of the cause, has been one of the first labors of this General Conference effort. Owing to the distance separating, the slowness of some replies by mail, the preparation to Scripturally proceed with the matter has been greatly delayed. The Conference president announces the names of five of a committee appointed for this work. He wishes to appoint two more as soon as possible."

From this beginning, progress was made to the appointing of a permanent Committee for Licensing and Ordination. Standards were established over the years by the Ministerial Association and the General Conference delegates and an effective program for raising ministerial standards and licensing and ordaining of ministers has developed. PURCHASE OF PROPERTY

With the decision to locate the Church of God General Conference in Oregon, Illinois, property was purchased to house Conference activities. The office building which had been used by S. J. Lindsay for the publication of The Restitution Herald was secured for offices and print shop.

In 1922 Golden Rule Home was purchased for the care of the aged. This was a large brick residence near the center of Oregon, built on a hillside. This Home has since become the dormitory for women at Oregon Bible College, and the site is the proposed location for expansion of Oregon Bible College. (See December Journal.)

In October, 1923, a greenhouse and floral and gift shop were purchased. This branch of the work was undertaken after careful consideration by the Executive Board. It was largely in the nature of an experiment, seemingly necessary in order to extend the floral service in the city. The gift phase was added to add revenue to cover the overhead expenses of the operation.

This experiment in commercial business did not prove successful and these businesses were later sold. A store for the sale of church and Sunday school supplies was operated from 1950-58, but it also was closed, due to lack of sufficient business volume to justify its existence.

CHURCH OF GOD LITERATURE

In October, 1926, action was taken to begin publication of Sunday school quarterlies. It was proposed that the beginning be made with adult quarterlies to sell for six or seven cents each. These were to be followed by a quarterly for juniors and then one for primary age. It was stated, "If there are enough subscriptions to justify publication we will, D.V., have a quarterly ready for January 1, 1927. But we must know at once! We must know how many quarterlies will be taken for the first quarter of 1927."

Although orders were not sufficient to cover cost of publication, decision was made to begin publishing Truth Scoker's Quarterly for adults, intermediates, and the home department, in January, 1927.

In August, 1939, James McLain spoke relative to a more organized and determined effort in Sunday school work, He advocated that all teachers, superintendents, and ministers should be more concerned about the education of our Sunday school children; emphasized that there is a present need for suitable material for children which is not found in the present Truth Seeker's Quarterlies; and listed several members of the Church of God whom he thought capable of editing such Sunday school materials for children.

Sr. Elsie Moore also spoke relative to this matter and advocated the preparation of quarterlies especially for children. She stated that Sunday schools were now forced to use literature that was doctrinally questionable, and presented several samples of such materinks.

Bro. McLain moved the formation of a committee to serve for one year to study Sunday school needs and to report at the 1940 Conference on the best Sunday school organization it would be possible to have. The motion was carried after second by J. R. Le-Crone.

Truth Seeker's Quarterlies are now published by the Church of God General Conference for Nursery, Pre-School, Primary, Junior, Junior High-Senior High, and Adults. About sixty-five hundred quarterlies are printed each quarter.

THE RESTITUTION HERALD

The Restitution Herald was begun in 1911 by the late S. J. Lindsay. In 1921 it was incorporated into the Church of God General Conference and became the official organ of this body. It was published weekly and sent only to subscribers. It contained articles, news of the churches, and promotional material for the General Conference and the churches.

In 1950, the Conference secretary, in behalf of the Executive Board, presented the opinion that the primary purpose of The Restitution Herald was to fulfill the Great Commission. Why, said he, should we sponsor drives for our own members and present news also for them in which strangers would have no interest?

In August, 1953, it was moved by Brothers Overmyer and McLain that The Restitution Herald be made a bi-weekly and that news items be reviewed to decide whether or not they should be included in The Herald. The motion lost.

In 1956, action was taken by the General Conference delegates to change the publishing dates of The Restitution Herald. Thereafter it was to be published three times each month. The first issue was to be a news issue mailed to subscribers and every member of the church. The other two issues were to be evangelistic in nature and mailed to subscribers and users of Restitution Herald racks.

This first issue of the month later became Progress Journal, which is mailed to every member family in the Church of God. The other two issues of the month are mailed to subscribers and users of racks and carries the name The Restitution Herald,

In 1945, a Songbook Committee, previously appointed, reported that work had been done on a new songbook. It estimated that \$5,000 would be required to publish the book and that publication could not begin till at least \$3,000 of that amount was in hand.

In 1947, Bros. Harvey U. Krogh, Jr., and Francis Burnett moved that the report of the Songbook Committee be accepted and that one edition of at least five thousand copies be published as soon as possible. Motion carried. The book was published in 1948, A second edition was published in 1954, and work is now in progress for a third revision and edition of Songs of Truth.

Publication of "One God-God of the Ages"

In 1947, progress of the work of Bro. R. H. Judd, Colborne, Ontario, in his book, "One God-God of the Ages," was reported. The Executive Board encouraged Bro. Judd in this work. On motion of Bros. John Denchfield and Albert Siple, the Conference went on record favoring the publication of this book. It was printed and widely distributed, The book is now out of print.

"Systematic Theology"

In August, 1957, acting on a motion by Bro. Gerald Cooper, the Conference authorized underwriting the expense of publishing the book, "Systematic Theology," by Bro. Alva G. Huffer. The book was printed in 1959 and distribution began early in 1960. Copies of the first edition are almost all sold.

Church of God History

In 1944, Bros. C. E. Randall and G. E. Marsh were appointed historians for the Church of God and began accumulating historical materials for a printed history of the Church of God.

Books, papers, and pictures collected by G. E. Marsh were deposited in the Church of God Historical Library at his death and Bro. Paul Hatch has taken the task of cataloging this material, and organizing it for a written history.

Members who have such literature for this work of arranging a history of the church are urged to add them to this library so the work can proceed.

Supporting the Conference

When the General Conference was organized in 1921 it was unanimously agreed that voluntary support, financial as well as talent, was the true principle of the gospel. "The financial policy of the National Bible Institution shall be based wholly upon the principle of voluntary contribution. The Executive Board shall be governed in the work undertaken by the voluntary support of those interested."

In 1948, a committee on stewardship reported the following program of tithing. Bro. John Denchfield reported for the committee, "1) Our people must be educated in tithing.
2) Every minister should become a tither. 3) Every member should tithe to his local church." The committee moved that the Gen-The songbook, Gospel in Song, was pub- eral Conference "direct its Board to proceed

committee to promote tithing in co-operation with the Conference Board." Motion carried.

From that time forward, the tithe became the basis for all Church of God financing. In 1959 the Finance Committee, summarizing actions taken over a period of many years, recommended "that the tithe continue to be the basis of giving, with the relationship ber tween giving and Christian living as taught in the Scriptures emphasized." The recommendation was adopted.

The revised Constitution and By-Laws, to become effective in August, 1961, states, "The financial policy of the Church of God General Conference shall be based upon the principle of giving of tithes and offerings by all members, both churches and individuals, The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference shall be governed in all work undertaken by the unified budget adopted by action of the delegates at the annual General Conference session."

Purpose of the General Conference

The first Conference Declaration of Understanding in "What constitutes a Conference?"

- 1) We understand that a Conference is a conferring together of any or all members of the Church who may choose to be present.
- 2) That by voluntary assembly members of the Church meet at designated time and place to confer on any or all matters pertaining to Christian welfare; working toward better understanding of truth, and more unity where differences of faith exist; printing and dissemination of literature and books; charitable and benevolent work; and all other Christian activity.
- 3) That the overseers of the Church consist of evangelists, pastors, teachers, and deacons.
- 4) That in such Conference each individual member should conduct self in a Christian


Under the Working Rules were the following statements:

- 19) The purposes for which the National Bible Institution shall be incorporated are:
- A) That the evangelistic work of the church be extended so it may better serve all needs of our people, and reach new fields of missionary labor.
- B) That publishing facilities may be provided, under special editorial supervision, for the issuance of all necessary literature, such as books and booklets, tracts and systematized lesson leaflets, etc.
- C) That facilities be provided to aid in education of those desiring to prepare themselves for the ministry, Bible training, or other religious work.
- D) That a board of benevolences be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise.

Here is a quotation from the first Couference report: "The kindness of spirit which prevailed throughout these discussions is worthy of special mention here. It was so prominent that it became the subject of frequent comment during the remainder of the week."

A brochure from Hiram College, forwarded to us by Bro. Don Swartz, relates the ancient story of stone soup.

In England, many years ago, a traveler stopped at a castle to ask for alms. The servants told him that there was nothing to give. They could not afford to give, since they had nothing themselves.

The traveler asked if he could have a kettle of water to make "stone soup." Intrigued by the idea of stone soup, the servants brought a kettle of water. Putting it over the fire and adding a smooth stone, the traveler soon had the water boiling around the stone. Tasting it, he asked for a little salt and pepper for seasoning.

Tasting again, he pronounced the soup quite good but thought it could be improved if there were some scraps of vegetables and meat that could be added to it. Fascinated by this time, the servants scurried to the kitchen and brought back several offerings for the "stone soup." After some sauces and condiments had been added to improve the stone soup, the audience was invited to taste it. They were all amazed at the excellence of this simple "stone soup."

The story has not lost its significance and meaning in the five hundred years it has been told. We have more than we realize to contribute to the "stone soup" being made today. If each adds his little bit, the result can be excellent, though the beginning may be small and the task seem impossible.

The story has its application to the work of the local church. One of the most disconcerting problems in many local churches is the fact that few people carry the load. Asked to help with the work, the response of many is, "We have nothing to give. There is nothing we can do." So the leadership must make "stone soup." It is only when each one adds his part, a little here and a little there, that progress can be made and results achieved. Tasks that may seem impossible can be accomplished when each one does his part. While our individual talents and gifts may be so small that alone we would be embarrassed to offer them, when the "stone soup" is begun and each casts in his offering, wonderful results are realized.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "Every man shall bear his own burden" (Gal. 6:5). Each one has talents and possessions for which he is personally responsible to the Lord. What others do or do not do with their burdens is of no consequence since we have our own for which we are ac-

countable to God. The fact that others do more than their share does not lessen our responsibility, nor does the fact that others do less than their share.

When Jesus told Peter, "What is that to thee? follow thou me" (John 21:22), He meant that Peter was not to gauge his service by John's but was responsible only to the Lord. What John did, or did not do, had nothing to do with what Christ expected of Peter. The Lord's work thrives on something from everybody, not much from few. Even the man with only one talent was responsible to his master.

The work of the Church of God General Conference can also be like making "stone soup." It needs the fragments, the tithe of the tithe of each church and each individual, if it is to succeed. It needs the support and the prayers and talents of all the people, not just the faithful few.

In the 1959 fiscal year which ended in September, we saw the results of the work of many. Yet, of the total membership of the Church of God, relatively few participated. Contributions large and small were received from 293 individuals out of a membership of more than 5,500. Contributions were received from 42 churches out of 100. Contributions were received from six conferences out of 16. Think what could have been done with the "stone soup" if each one had taken part!

In the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign for the expansion of Oregon Bible College, 550 families of a possible 3,300 families have made a contribution or a commitment. This seasons the "stone soup," but think what could be done with all the fragments from all the people! No one person could do it—or should do it! Every one should have a part! As each adds his gift, the blessings increase for all.

Sometimes with soup, "too many cooks spoil the broth," but not so with the Lord's work. The more who engage in the work, the more who add to the ingredients, the more who give their mites, the more wonderful the outcome. Those who give receive the blessing as well as those who partake. We need more "cooks" in the local church and more "cooks" in the General Conference. Those who are working and who are giving might do more, but it is better that those who are not working and not giving do some.

The pot is boiling and the "stone soup" is in the making. What will you do?



Does It Really Matter?

DOES it really matter what you believe? Many people say it makes no difference what you believe as long as you do believe something. They say that as long as you are sincere in your belief and you have good intentions, your theology or religious belief is not important. They also refer to the worn-out expression, "All roads lead to Rome." They ask, "Aren't we all worshiping the same God, but just taking different paths that all lead to this same God?" There are also some who assert that all religions are capable of leading to God.

"Some men feel that heathen religions are as valid as Christianity. They think Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism, and Mohammedanism are just as good as Christianity. They suggest that Christianity should combine with the best elements of all religions in order to create one universal religion."—Huffer, Systematic Theology, pp. 28, 29.

Is Sincerity Enough?

Would you like to take a vacation trip to Yellowstone National Park? Would you be able to find your way to the park if you relied on sincerity alone? You probably would have to stop and ask directions, or get a road map within the first few hours of your trip. It would be almost impossible to find the way without first knowing the way or by following a road map.

Would you have graduated from high school or college if you had never studied to learn the truth? Would your sincerity have been enough to get you passing grades? You probably would have "flunked out" very early in your school life. Sincerity would not have obtained your diploma for you.

How many places in the Bible do you find the following thought being presented, "Thou shalt have sincerity and thereby inherit eternal life"? There is no place in Scripture that such a statement is made. The Bible does not teach that sincerity or good intentions will bring you salvation.

What Does the Bible Say?

The Bible teaches that there is only one road that leads

to God. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). When questioned by the high priest, Peter said, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Paul taught that there is but "one mediator" through whom we may reach God. (1 Tim. 2:5.)

When God spoke to Adam concerning the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, He said, "In the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die" (Gen. 2:17). The serpent said, "Thou shalt not surely die" (Gen. 3:4). As you know, Eve believed the serpent. Did her sincerity in believing the serpent keep her from dying? Her sin, not believing the truth, brought upon her and the whole human race the penalty of death.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said that not everyone who cries, "Lord, Lord," shall enter into the Kingdom. (Matt. 7:21-23.) In verse 14 of this same chapter Jesus said, "Narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." Jesus showed that you must know the truth and the way in order to have salvation. The Bible clearly shows that truth is important, and that sincerity in itself is not sufficient for your salvation.

What Must We Believe?

Let us next ask the question, What is this truth that you must believe? Can you find the truth by turning to human reason? Can you depend upon tradition or creeds to have the truth? Some church denominations claim to have the truth. They have formulated such "doctrines" as the trinity, immortality of the soul, baptism by sprinkling, burning hell for sinners today, and others. Does any church have the right to formulate such doctrines and call them truth if they are not in the Scriptures?

The Bible alone tells us what we must believe. You must not be content to sit back and accept some teaching as truth just because your church or your pastor believes it. You are expected to "study to shew thyself approved" (2 Tim. 2:15). If you do not find a certain teaching in the Bible, do not believe it.

The Bible teaches that it is necessary to conduct oneself according to true Christian principles and to uphold correct belief.



SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Suggestions for 1961

By Paul Overholser, President National Sunday School Department

Here is a suggested Sunday school attend- Monday in April. Concentrate on enrolling ance chart which gives good results. Of course, we make it large enough for the whole year, A 30 x 48 inch or 24 x 36 inch sheet of heavy white cardboard is excellent. Attendance figures on the left should be selected to be suitable for the attendance of your Sunday school. Be sure to make them high enough to have something to shoot at. Make the printing large and heavy enough so it can be read from the back of the room.

Plot your 1960 attendance ahead of time on the chart and then try to better the mark for your 1961 attendance. This chart can be used for several years by using a different color crayon each year.

We suggest that the chart be hung up for Sunday school and taken down before the start of worship service.

We think you will be pleased with the interest this chart creates and that it will help to increase your attendance. Of course, this is only one of the contributing factors, but during the nine years we have been keeping the charts our average attendance per Sunday has increased from 62 to 160.

Special Days to Observe

Activities for Sunday schools on special days throughout the year and some of the more appropriate ones are hereby suggested.

New Year's Sunday. The first Sunday in the New Year. This is the Sunday to recognize and make awards to the students with perfect attendance records for the past year. Start a new Sunday school attendance chart or graph (to show each Sunday's attendance) as outlined above.

Valentine Day. You can do something of interest for the children. You could even have a "school days" party for the adult classes some evening.

Easter. A Sunrise service followed by an Easter breakfast (no expense to the Sunday school if each family brings something). Provide appropriate altar flowers and special music. A high peak on your attendance chart should be reached.

Sunday after Easter. Day for attendance emphasis. Try not to let your attendance chart drop sharply. Try to hold new students. National Baby Week. Begins with the last

new babies in your cradle roll department all this week. Then see how many you can have present at Sunday school the following Sunday, If you have a photographer in your group, have the babies' pictures taken and present one to the mother of each baby. Also keep a print for your permanent records of church history.

National Family Week, Begins on the first Sunday in May. This gives you opportunity for a contest and to recognize family groups. An elderly couple could easily have fifteen or twenty persons present at Sunday school, ineluding their children and grandchildren. Here, again, is a job for your photographer. Have him photograph the first- and secondplace winners of the largest family groups and present a picture to the head of the family of each group, Again, save a print for your church history record book.

Mother's Day. A mother-daughter banquet some evening of the week preceding Mother's Day is a good Christian social activity. We suggest that your committee be made up entirely of men and boys and, if they are so qualified, they can do the cooking and serving, and can put on the entire program. The mother of every child in Sunday school should be invited. In fact, we think all the attending Sunday school women should be invited. whether they are mothers or not. This will break the ice for many mothers. Then be sure to invite them all back for Mother's Day (and every Sunday). For Mother's Day it is nice to announce some special awards to the oldest mother, youngest mother, mother with the most children present, mother with the youngest baby present. A potted plant makes a nice award. Here is another job for your photographer. Some Sunday schools present each lady with a cut flower or corsage.

Children's Day. The first or second Sunday in June. Something special should be arranged to recognize and honor the children

Father's Day. A father-son banquet and special recognition to fathers on Sunday are suggestions similar to those outlined for Mother's Day except that the ladies he in

Labor Sunday, The Sunday following Labor Day. Vacations are mostly over, the children are back in school, and the summer slump should be over. This is a good time to revitalize your Sunday school program. Why not start an attendance contest to terminate on Rally Day?

Promotion Day, Last Sunday in September or first Sunday in October, although some Sunday schools may prefer to hold it in the spring after school is out or at the beginning of the calendar year.

Rally Day. First or second Sunday in October. The usual activity is to concentrate on attendance (you should get a really high peak on your attendance chart). Be sure to have an especially active Sunday school and church program.

Thanksgiving Sunday. The Sunday immediately preceding Thanksgiving. Special emphasis on Stewardship and Thanksgiving should be the order of the day.

Christmas Sunday, This Sunday is well observed in most Sunday schools and churches. Our suggestion is to get started early on your program-at least four or five weeks ahead of time.

Last Sunday of Year. Make good New Year's resolutions and set new class and Sunday school attendance goals. Announcement should be made of any awards for perfect attendance for the coming year.

We would like to suggest a committee for each special event. These committees should be appointed far in advance. In fact, it would be well to have them appointed at your first Sunday school teachers and workers' conference in the new year. Why not get an "Appointment Calendar" for 1961 and write down all of your special days and events, with the committee in charge of each, for the entire

"A well organized Sunday school is a growing Sunday school." Such planning requires the co-operation of tenchers, superintendent, pastor, and officers of the Sunday school. When each performs his part, the results will be seen in new interest and vitality in the Sunday school and a new growth in the church. Work and prayer are necessary.

Membership

All Church of God Sunday schools are urged to join the National Sunday School Department and share in the benefits and labors of this important part of the General Conference. Dues are \$5.00 per year. They should be sent to Church of God General Conference, Box 231, Oregon, Ill., where they are recorded and forwarded to the Sunday School Department treasurer. This procedure was recommended by the delegates at last summer's conference.

Services of the Department

In the Christian Worker's Manual (which may be secured for \$2.00 from the Church of God General Conference) there is a large section devoted to the organization and work of the Sunday school. Included is a list of books and films available from the National Sunday School Department. These are loaned, free of charge, for teacher training and improvement. (They should be ordered from: Mrs. Leota Foster, 103 Colrain S.W., Grand Rapids, Mich.)

The Department publishes Go Ye, a bulletin for Sunday school workers, containing ideas and suggestions for improvement of the Sunday school.

The Sunday School Board prepares copy for the monthly Progress Journal. (see page 4), with special emphasis on the Sunday school and its problems.

The Sunday School Department is in charge of Sunday School Day at the General Conference, bringing speakers, lessons, workshops, and films to help in the work of the Sunday school.

It also encourages in state and zone rallies, and the organization of state and district conference Sunday school departments. It studies the publications of the Church of God General Conference for Sunday schools and suggests improvements. It encourages ever higher standards for Sunday schools and Sunday school teachers, and tries to inspire ever higher goals.



MISSION BUILDERS RESPOND TO FIFTH APPEAL

A STUDENT'S REACTION

One student remarked, "My whole attitude toward the ministry has been changed by what was said about service. Jesus' words were used in Matthew 20:26, when He said, 'Whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister, and whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant.' This truth struck home with this one young man, but all of us came to realize as never before why people are happy when serving others.

Jesus came to give an abundant way of life to all, but only those who are willing to serve others are genuinely happy. Selfish people are unhappy, and our looking glass often reveals who one of them is. There are also those who serve, but serve with a grudging, miserly spirit, and so miss the joy of service. These are the ones afflicted with self-pity and a spirit of martyrdom. To be greatest in God's sight, is to completely reverse the order of our carnal thoughts and actions!

TEACHERS' RESPONSIBILITY

Dr. Brandt pointed out quite forcefully that it was the job of the teachers to build men and women of character. The greatest problem today in human relations in our homes, schools, and churches, is that of being unable to adjust to people and circumstances.

Obviously, it becomes our job to take the students as they are when they come to college and, with love and compassion, deal with those things, whether good or bad, to make them strong in the Lord. These characteristics may be found in the physical, mental, moral, and spiritual side of their lives. We may grant anyone the right to choose whether he wants to accept the observations made but we will not be *free* to allow the student to break down or destroy the standards or rules established.

Further, it was pointed out that our dormitories can become real tools in Christian development by training the students to live together in peace and love. The great emphasis today has been upon the academic side of life, but this must lead to the character of the individual becoming well-rounded or it is a hollow shell and unstable. They must go hand in hand. This is the ideal toward which we must work to produce strong workers for the Lord.

Of one thing we are confident. Our students really want to be here in Oregon Bible College. Not all have been fortunate to get work, and those who do have work have only a few nickels each week to spend for those things not absolutely necessary.



Oregon Bible College is our only means and place of teacher-preacher training. To build and promote this arm of our work is a task to which we all must give of ourselves and financial strength. We cannot expect to have an *outreach* unless we have some to do the *reaching*.

I believe it is the duty of every member of the Church of God to share in this urgent work. Pray over the part which you can and will carry and God will sustain you in the decision which He lays on your heart.





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

We have paid \$15.00 monthly to our National Missionary Department. With the help of the Michigan State Conference, we have a fifteen minute radio program every Sunday morning over WCEN in Mount Pleasant.

A Herald rack is maintained in a local grocery store and a Herald subscription is sent to the local high school.

We have been fortunate to have had missionaries from foreign fields to come and speak to us and show slides of their work.

One highlight of the year was the service held for the Mexicans each Sunday night in the summer. Of course we are hampered by the language barrier, but a man from near by who could speak Spanish and works with them came and spoke to them. Men of the church brought them to the church. The basement proved too small, so we let them use the auditorium and we used the basement. A large amount of used clothing was given them, as the weather was quite cool for a while. The last night of services we joined them in singing hymns.

A large shipment of clothing was sent to Nova Scotia the first part of December. \$85.40 was given to buy chairs for Lighthouse Mission Sunday School rooms.

On the National Missionary Sunday a collection of \$49.24 was given.

We have contributed \$100,00 to the college building campaign and have pledged \$50,00 per year.

The dimeter banks have also been doing fairly well, with \$206.75 being sent to the National Missionary Department. We are also members of the Mission Builders' League.

New officers for this year are: president, Mrs. Frances Wood; vice president, Paul Riley; secretary, Mrs. Janet Payne; treasurer, Mrs. Maudie Lint.

A History of the Church of God General Conference

Compiled by Pastor Francis E. Burnett, Church of God General Conference Secretary

PART FOUR

(This article presents "Conference Echoes," highlights of Conference actions since the year 1921. It is difficult to condense forty years of miscellaneous Conference actions into a few pages of type, since the work has been so varied in these formative years. These "Echoes," are taken from reports of the Conferences in The Restitution Herald. Previous articles have considered the formation and history of the major departments of the Conference.—Editor.)

1921

After the first General Conference meeting, one of the comments was, "The kindness of spirit which prevailed throughout the sessions is worthy of special mention. It was so prominent that it became a topic of discussion throughout the week."

1928

Different ones brought out throughout this meeting the unmeasured possibilities of the Church of God. It was urged that the Church of God should endeavor to follow closely the Scriptural directions not only in its doctrinal tenets, but also in its workings and activities as to make it an ideal church before God and man. That which constitutes a great church is not its wealth, nor its popularity, but its character and consceration and the spirituality by which it directs all its activities. The only reason a Church of God in any locality can occupy the ideal position in this respect can always be attributed to the Christian life of its membership. It is urged that we emphasize heartier consecration and service in all our church activities.

1931

Bro. G. E. Marsh said in reporting on this year, "If the world needs a scourging, how much more do we, the church, to awaken us to the importance of our mission, to stimulate us to more activity that we might 'save some.'"

This year was the end of the first decade of the General Conference and the secretary reported that the most encouraging thing that occurred in the first ten years was the establishment of the Bible Training School and the work of the ministers who had gone into the field after training there.

1932

The congregational nature of the Church of God was reaffirmed in the Conference of 1932. The secretary, G. E. Marsh, reported, "From the beginning of its history the Church of God adhered to the congregational form of government. When the general work was instituted, its organizers were exceedingly zealous for the right of all the local churches and state conferences. Constant effort was put forth to avoid even the appearance of attempting to assume any of the duties usually performed by the earlier and more localized congregations. The General Conference conscientiously refrains from engaging in any activity which the state conferences can conveniently accomplish. It exists only to aid. encourage, advise, and instruct the brotherhood everywhere in such a manner as not to hinder, hamper, or restrict, in the least degree the work already established and efficiently conducted by the affiliating confer-

1033

Two resolutions this year reflected the spirit of the Conference as it moved into the times of Depression. "Be it resolved that this Conference go on record as favoring deeper spiritual life among our members here present; we are resolved that we will do what we can upon our return to our home churches to promote this important objective. Be it resolved that we recommend to our members that daily prayer be offered for the enlargement of our local, state, and national church life."

1934

In 1934 the Advisory Board was discontinued. It had proved impossible to get the presidents of state conferences, and presidents of other co-operating societies together at one time to conduct the business of the Institution. The Bible Training Class was discontinued during the previous year.

1941

During this year there was a complete revision of the Constitution and By-Laws of the General Conference and National Bible Institution. This revised Constitution then governed the Conference and is still in effect till next August when the new Constitution and By-Laws, revised in 1960, become effective.

1948

This year showed a sudden interest in missionary and evangelistic work. A motion was passed that a missionary department be included in the General Conference budget for 1948-49.

Sydney Magaw, secretary, reported that while attendance was a little below the previous records, this disappointment was atoned for in the increased interest in evangelistic and missionary work.

1050

It was moved by C. E. Randall, and seconded by Warren J. Landry, that the Board be instructed to discontinue receiving into life membership any more members in Golden Rule Home; that hereafter anyone coming into the Home be received as a roomer and a boarder; further, that this motion in no way affects the status of those already resident in the Home through contractual agreement. Since this motion echoed the report prepared by the board in pursuance of its instructions on August 11, the Board's report was not publicly offered. Motion carried.

1951

This conference also showed an increasing interest in missionary work. The Church of God was beginning to look out at the fields, white unto harvest, and desire to reach out to the lost. Bro. H. U. Krogh, Jr., presented a paper on "Building New Fields in Missionary Service."

Reporting on this Conference year, editor James Watkins wrote, "The co-operation of the members at large during this past year has been unequaled by any similar period in the past."

952

The "Community Crusade" was a campaign suggested by the Board of Directors to assist in arousing our people to personal evangelism. This was a unified campaign with a single purpose, goal, mode of action, and approach to non-members of the Church of God. The goal of this campaign was to have one million readers of Church of God literature within the proximity of our local churches, and to reach three thousand homes with the Church of God story.

1953

The "Community Crusade Campaign" that was conducted in the fall of 1952 was successful beyond all expectations. (Summary report: 31 churches participated. Over 7,000 calls were made—the goal had been 3,000; over 30,000 individuals were included in the scope of the calling; over 75,000 pieces of material were sent out for distribution; the (Please turn to page 7)

February 9, 1961, is the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Bro. L. E. Connor. Bro. Connor was born February 9, 1861, and died December 4, 1943. He was a long-time leader in the Church of God General Conference. A pastor of several different Churches of God during fifty-seven years of active ministry, he was president of the General Conference and its business manager for twelve years. In 1943 he was made President Emeritus, the only person so honored since the formation of the Conference.

Bro. L. E. Connor will be long remembered and loved for his kindly spirit and the grace and charity with which he served.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

By Dwaine Demmitt

At the request of the National Sunday School Department, we are presenting this report of the Church of God at Troy, Ohio.

It was during a business meeting of the Ohio State Conference in December, 1957, that it was suggested that the Ohio Conference, in accordance with the Decade of Development, investigate the possibilities of starting a new church in Ohio. After discussing several places where a new church could be started, it was agreed that Troy might be the best place, due to the fact that there were several families living in the Troy area who attended services regularly at Brush Creek, nine miles away.

A committee was appointed by the Ohio Conference to contact those people living in Troy and the immediate area to see what they thought of beginning a new church work. The people of Troy met together several times, for they realized the responsibilities and hard work that go into starting a new church. On October 14, 1958, it was agreed that we have midweek Bible classes so the people could begin working together and planning for the future. Most of these people had, at one time or another, served in offices and as teachers at Brush Creek. Four of the men had been Sunday school superintendents and three of the people had experience as public school teachers. We felt that we had the leaders, teachers, and experience to start planning for a Sunday school.

October 4, 1959, was the day we had our first Sunday school. There were eight adults and six children present for a grand total of fourteen. You would have thought this a day for rejoicing in starting a new Sunday school, but there were several heavy hearts longing to be at Brush Creek with our friends and where the attendance often climbed to one hundred eighty or more. Our fourteen present seemed very small, but it was a big day in the fact that we realized we could not start a new church alone. We needed more than we could provide—we needed God and prayer to help us.

Sunday school was the only service we had on Sunday until January 3, 1960. At this time, the pastors of the Lawrenceville, Glad Tidings Chapel, and Brush Creek churches began to come and hold a morning worship service with us. Each pastor came for a month at a time. We had our worship service at 9:15, then the pastor returned to his own church in time for services there. By December, 1960, our attendance averaged about thirty-five.

In existence at this time was a committee of five, set up by the Ohio Conference, which was active in helping the Troy Church. These men from Lawrenceville, Brush Creek, and Glad Tidings Chapel, formulated a method of procedure to be followed in starting this new church work. Many of the things mentioned here were recommendations of the committee.

One such recommendation was that we hire a pastor. The Ohio Conference, General Conference, and Brush Creek Church pledged to help us support a pastor. Curtis Simpson was hired and began his duties on the second Sanday in July, 1960.

In starting a new church, we found many things to do. One of the main things was organization. This consisted of electing officers, formulating a constitution, and having our services well planned. In December, 1960, our pastor published our first church bulletin, which is sent once each month. We have a long-range calling campaign, which was announced in the local newspaper, so that when we call upon people they are familiar with our project.

There are many things we have yet to do. We will explore different ways of getting people interested in church work and try to find the most effective methods of teaching the gostel.

During the past year we have been looking for a place to build. We have contacted local developers of housing units, trying to get in close to where they are going to build new homes. We have been looking at plans used in the construction of churches, hoping that we, with the help of the Mission Builders' League, will be able to build in the near future. This has been a constant search, and we pray that the Lord will lead us in our selection of a building and a location.

It is the hope of the Ohio Conference, that the procedure used at Troy in starting a new church, may be a pattern for others to follow.

MRS. PEARL HAMMEL

It is with sadness that we announce the death of Sr. Pearl Hammel, at Wray, Colo., on September 5, 1960. Sr. Hammel had been a member of the Church of God since 1903, when both she and her husband were baptized into Christ by Bro. Almus Adams. For many years, Sr. Hammel has been a leading member of the Church at Wray. She now lies at rest in Grandview Cemetery at Wray, where she awaits the call of the Master at His coming.—Rocky Mountain Evangelist.

JAMES WALTER WOOLF



EDITORIALS





SEASONAL EMPHASIS

The Board of Directors has approved a plan for seasonal promotional emphasis of the various departments of the General Conference work. The purpose is to avoid overlapping appeals and to establish a time during the year to give full information on each of the various departments of General Conference service. It is planned to emphasize Oregon Bible College in the spring; General Conference meetings and the Berean Youth Fellowship in the summer; missions and evangelism in the fall; and publishing and printing in the winter. Mission Builders' Appeals will be made in the late spring and late fall each year.

During April, May, and June we will give special attention to the matter of Christian education and the opportunities afforded the Church of God in Oregon Bible College. The JOURNALS for April and May will contain much information about Oregon Bible College, as will the *Challenge* magazine for April. Special mailings will also be made to all the young people of the Church of God, and to the ministers.

We trust that you will join us in this period of time in prayer, and in becoming informed about the advantages of your center for Christian education, Oregon Bible College.

MAY 14, CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY

Special materials will be mailed in April to all Church of God ministers, with the request that May 14 be designated Christian Education Sunday in the Church of God. We pray that Christian education will be accented that day, that each may come to a better realization of the importance of a Bible foundation for all learning.

JOSEPH D. LAWRENCE SCHOLARSHIP

Several years ago a memorial fund was established for the late Joseph D. Lawrence, former president of the Church of God General Conference. The scholarship was created to give graduate school training to teachers and prospective teachers at Oregon Bible College. The fund was also to be used for advanced training for students at Oregon Bible College.

In the fall of 1960 Bro. William Wachtel, a graduate of Elmhurst College and Oregon Bible College, began taking graduate work at Wheaton College. He is taking a two-year graduate course, planning to graduate with advance degrees in 1962. Thus far, he has maintained a straight A grade in all subjects. Plans are for Bro. Wachtel to join the Oregon Bible College staff in the fall of 1962.

The cost of this program of education is being paid by the Joseph D. Lawrence Scholarship, and will use all of the funds now available. The long-range benefits to Oregon Bible College and to the future Church of God ministry are beyond estimation. A well-educated ministry begins with a well-educated teaching staff and this is the purpose of the Joseph D. Lawrence Scholarship program.

MISSIONARY OPPORTUNITIES

In recent months, many letters have been received at the General Conference office from England, Scotland, South Africa, New Zealand, Australia, the Philippines, India, the Canal Zone, and the Bahama Islands from people who have found Church of God literature, read The Restitution Herald, or read of the church in such books as Mead's Handbook of Denominations.

There have also been many letters of inquiry from places within the United States. One of these inquiries has resulted in the baptism of a former minister of another faith. (Reported on page 7.)

These many opportunities are being followed up with all diligence. Literature is sent and correspondence is continued, with offers for assistance in securing further literature or information. Where possible, a minister or member near by is contacted to call on the person for attendance in a local church service.

Because of the fact that most of these contacts are still in the initial stages, we cannot write at length about them, but suffice it to say that these are exciting days. There is an awakening to truth in many parts of the world and the doctrinal position of the Church of God is attracting

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great interest. It is the *doctrinal* position of the Church of God which has attracted these many inquiries. People are being interested because of the unique teachings of the Church of God. The Lord is working with the Church of God and through the Church of God. Praise Him!

There is no reason to hide our peculiar doctrines or to apologize for them — they are our greatest asset in the work of evangelism and missions.

FINANCING THE INDEFINITE

Much of the work of the Church of God General Conference is intangible, as is much of the work of the church as a whole. We can count the number of graduates from Oregon Bible College, but who can estimate the full impact of the influence of students and former students in the work of the Lord? We can count the number of Truth Seeker's Quarterlies, Restitution Heralds, Challenge magazines, Youth Leader's Handbooks, tracts, booklets, and hymnals printed and distributed, but who can know their full spiritual value to those who read and are taught? We can tell you to the penny the monthly payroll, the cost of food, the cost of heat and lights, the cost of cuts and pictures, the price of paper, the taxes assessed, but who can know what good is done by the final products—the teaching, the preaching, the correspondence—that result from these expenditures?

Our tithes and offerings finance the indefinite—work which is authorized by General Conference delegates and administered by General Conference workers—but full impact and influence is known only to the Lord.

Silver Anniversary Building Campaign

The Silver Anniversary Building Campaign for the expansion of Oregon Bible College seems to have slowed to a walk. With a goal of \$125,000 to build a dormitory, dining room, library building for Oregon Bible College, commitments now total almost \$110,000. Of this amount, \$29,603.32 has been received thus far.

When the total \$125,000 has been committed, and at least \$75,000 of that amount has been received in cash, building can begin. The need is immediate. Single boys now live in a rented residence six blocks from their dining room and classrooms. All students eat in the Golden Rule Dormitory (which was one hundred years old in 1958), in facilities inadequate for the purpose. The College library cannot grow because all available bookspace is used.

The \$110,000 in commitments has been received from fewer than seven hundred of the thirty-three hundred wage-earners in the Church of God. Commitments and lump sum gifts from this small group have averaged \$160.00 each. Think what could be done if every wage-earner took part in this important expansion program at a rate of even one-fourth the average! The size of one's gift is not as important as the interest which is being manifested in the education of workers for the Church of God—workers who will serve us all.

TROY CHURCH OF GOD, TROY, OHIO

A Direct Answer to Prayer

There was an article by Dwaine Demmitt in the February Progress Journal about the organization and progress of the newly organized Troy Church of God. Since the publishing of that article we have some wonderful news to report.

As stated in the article, the group has been diligently searching for a church site for about a year with very special efforts being but forth during the last four or five months, Several sites were finally located, with quite a wide spread in prices and desirability. On several occasions, the congregation met as a group and in a caravan of seven or eight cars, went to inspect all of the sites, after which a business meeting was held to vote on first, second, and third choices. The committee then attempted to negotiate with the owners for the purchase of one of the sites.

The result was discouraging, as one site after another had to be eliminated for various reasons. It looked like they would have to start all over again, because there was only one site remaining and apparently it was going to be too expensive.

Then, through the grace of God, their prayers were answered! Of course, the group had been prayerfully seeking God's guidance for many months, both privately and collectively, but it was decided to hold a "special prayer meeting for God's guidance in securing a church site," instead of the weekly Bible study on the night of February 8, 1961. Also, the Brush Creek Church of God was praying during its weekly "Prayer Band" that God would provide a church site for the Troy brethren.

On February 9, the day after the special prayer meeting, the owners of some land on State Route 55, about one mile east of Troy, sent word to Bro. Dwaine Demmitt to get in touch with them. This being one of the sites under consideration, the owners were immediately contacted and terms of sale discussed. The owners would not set a definite price, but Bro. Demmitt was told to come back the first of the following week when the details would be worked out. He returned on both Monday and Tuesday and was told the details were not all worked out yet. On Tuesday, February 14, the owners delivered an envelope to the Demmitt home, saying it contained a contract, and then hurried away to attend a meeting. When Bro. and Sr. Demmitt opened the envelope, you can imagine their surprise when they discovered that two lots were being given to the church, free of any cost! The larger of the two lots, the site to be used for the church, contains approximately 2.5 acres and is valued at \$6,000. The other lot contains approximately one acre, and is suggested it be used for a parsonage site and is valued at \$2,500.

The next day Bro, Demmitt and Bro, Curtis Simpson, the pastor, went to thank the donors, a man and his wife! The church group also sent a letter of acknowledgment and thanks to the donors.

There is much rejoicing in the group because, with clear title to the land, the prospect of Mission Builders' aid, and church plans decided upon, financing can be arranged through the local bank so construction can start in the near future.

The Bible college movement began as an attempt to meet a growing need for a "back to the Bible" kind of higher education. Many of our colleges and universities were founded upon a strong Biblical faith but are now completely secular and divorced from church support and control. More and more church or religious colleges are drifting toward a liberal arts centered curriculum and toward liberalism or modernism. The Bible college is a reaction against this trend and is distinctive in several particulars.

The Bible college is distinctive in that its curriculum is Bible centered. The Bible's doctrinal testimony, its verbal inspiration, and its authority to govern our lives are considered of major importance. Most Bible colleges have a clear doctrinal statement, which serves as a guide and unifying influence in all instruction and practice. They emphasize study of the Bible rather than study about the Bible. Although the Bible college curriculum is Bible centered, it includes also courses which are profitable to any Christian student.

The Bible college is distinctive also in its spiritual emphasis. By encouraging personal prayer, daily devotions, and separation from worldly practices, the Bible college intends to influence the whole life of the student for Christ. Scholasticism, professionalism, and intellectual-

ism are avoided if they interfere with developing a deep spiritual life. "Formal instruction takes place in an atmosphere of faith; the whole life of the student—social, recreational, devotional, intellectual—is shaped in an environment positively Christian."—Dr. Frank E. Gaebelein.

A third way in which the Bible college is distinctive is in its practical approach to the Bible and to the spiritual life of its students. Bible colleges teach that knowledge learned in the classroom should be used. Some kind of practical training program is used in nearly all Bible colleges. In fact, Bible colleges are gradually requiring and supervising Christian service activities. Thus the student not only learns how to serve, but he also serves while he learns. What he learns in class he puts into practice in church worship services, Sunday school, chapel service, youth meetings, or on gospel teams.

Therefore the Bible college serves a purpose not duplicated by any other kind of school. It has its very important function among institutions of higher learning and needs to make no apologies for being different. The trend away from Christian education can be counteracted by encouraging and supporting Bible colleges.



General Conference Progress

BOARD AND COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The work of the Church of God General Conference depends upon much volunteer service by men and women serving on boards and committees. In April, the License and Ordination Committee met in Wheaton, the Sunday School Department Board met in South Bend, and the Mission Department Board met in Oregon. May 12 and 13 the Board of Directors plans to meet in Oregon. These groups include men and women from various localities who contribute much in time and personal expense for the work of the Conference.

COLLEGE EMPHASIS DAY TO BE MAY 21

It has been requested that all churches observe May 21 as Christian Education Sunday. Special materials have been sent to all pastors and to all young people of the Church of God in keeping with the theme of Christian Education. This issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL also emphasizes the importance of Christian higher education in Oregon Bible College and its benefits to the students and to the Church of God.

GENERAL CONFERENCE PROGRAM

On page 16 you will find a tentative General Conference program for August. Most of the program has been confirmed but some changes may be made, of course, between now and August. In the June issue of PROGRESS JUORNAL will appear reports from departments and the report and recommendations of the Board of Directors for the General Conference. This will give delegations time to study and discuss proposals being made before the Conference convenes.

There are some innovations in the Conference program in the scheduling of business. More time is given for discussion of vital issues, and all voting is being reserved for the last full day so that all matters can have thorough discussion before they are voted upon. A "brainstorming" or "buzz" session is also scheduled to give every person an opportunity to help make vital decisions in regard to the course to be followed in the Home and Foreign Missions work of the General Conference.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Because of the change in the corporate name, and because the term, "Executive Secretary," is more in keeping with church organization and the work which is involved in the office, the Board of Directors recommends

the following amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws. We move to amend Article II, Section 6, (F) of the By-Laws to read, "To employ a competent Executive Secretary who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of the General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned to him." The only change is in the title of the employee.

VAGUE TERMS EXPLAINED

Since the first of the year, there has been a contribution deficit for the operational budget of the General Conference. Operational budget is a vague term that means payroll, payments to churches for pastoral aid, subsidy checks for the mission work in Nova Scotia, light bills, grocery bills, paper bills, postage costs, oil bills, repair bills, taxes, and all the other expenses of continuing the many services you have authorized through your delegates at General Conference. Contribution deficit means that money the delegates anticipated would be given in contributions has not been given. The answer, of course, is faithful stewardship and sacrificial giving.

The services of the General Conference: Oregon Bible College, printing and publishing, home and foreign missions, Berean Youth Fellowship, and the many general services to pastors and churches, are geared to the income received from sales, tuition, and contributions. Sales and tuition income has increased, but not nearly enough to offset the decrease in contributions. This is a matter of seriousness, importance, and urgency.

MISSIONS IN THE CHURCH OF GOD

The Church of God has a mission program which will challenge the thinking of the Christian who is zealous of carrying the gospel message of salvation to those who are in a lost condition. We rejoice that there is a constantly expanding opportunity for us to reach into the world to aid those individuals.

We pray that you will plan now to attend the General Conference, August 6-11, so that you may help the Church of God chart the course which we should follow to carry God's message to those who desire to know more of the truth.

"Then I should like you to know, my brothers, that I have long intended to come to you (but something has always prevented me), for I should like to see some results among you, as I have among other Gentiles, I feel myself under a universal obligation, I owe something to all men, from cultured Greek to ignorant savage. That is why I want, as far as my ability will carry me, to preach the Gospel to you who live in Rome as well. For I am not ashamed of the Gospel. I see it as the very power of God working for the salvation of everyone who believes it, both Jew and Greek, I see in it God's plan for imparting righteousness to men, a process begun and continued by their faith. For, as the scripture says: The righteous shall live by faith" (Rom. 1:8-17, Phillips Translation).

The Scriptural principle which we in the Church of God must follow is that of Paul, "a universal obligation" of "working for the salvation of everyone" who believes the gosnel.

Some churches and individuals have failed to enter wholeheartedly into the mission program, saying, "We have so many needs in our own church," or, "We have all that we can do to pay our own preacher." By the same token, there have been ministers who were too selfish to push the mission program in their churches—they were fearful that they would not make as much as they might.

However, any church which has thrown itself wholeheartedly into the mission work has never been harmed, but it has been strengthened and spiritually inspired to do even more for the Lord of Harvest, Even as God caused Malachi to write to those who were not doing that which was right in the eyes of the heavenly Father, "Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee! In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse; for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation. Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be ment in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not pen you the windows of heaven, and pour on out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it. . . . And all nations shall call you blessed: for ye shall be a delightsome land, saith the Lord of hosts" (Mal. 3:8-10, 12).

God does not expect us to tithe only for the work of the local church, but also for our obligations to those in foreign lands. When God said through His Son, "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you," He was speaking to us today, too. It is our duty to carry the message abroad. We must be about our Father's business.

When we consider mission work, the very core of it is the gospel. We must carry the gospel to others, not increase the size of our denomination, but to give others an opportunity to gain immortality. We are not to compel them to accept the gospel, but they must make the decision for themselves. Our feeling should be comparable to that of Joshua when he said, "Choose you this day whom ye will serve; whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the flood, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land ye dwell: but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (Josh. 24:15).

The Church of God, through the Missionary Department, must provide the peoples of the world an opportunity to accept the gospel if we are to be a witness to all.

We wish that we could emphasize the fact in such a manner that there would never be any question about it at all: we do receive in return for our giving to God. We will recognize the fact that some will say, "Then your giving is for selfish reasons only." No, that is not of necessity true, but it is true that God rewards each for his faithfulness—or unfaithfulness!

God has abundantly blessed us with good gifts. May we use those God-given talents, whether they are talents of wealth, teaching, preaching, or singing. We give material gifts, but God rewards us with rich spiritual rewards. May the Lord bless you as you serve Him.

We actually are behind a little in getting things going because of the building campaign which has taken up so much time and hindered some of the other work that should have been done.

I almost forgot one of our highlights. About three weeks before Christmas we made a large star from a sheet of fiberboard, drilled holes in it and placed strings of tree lights through the holes. We then handed out pledges for attendance on Christmas Day in the form of little stars. For everyone who pledged his attendance we put his name under a bulb and turned it on. All the bulbs were blue except the one in the center which was gold to represent Christ being in attendance. Despite the fact that there was sickness in two or three families, our attendance was between 70 and 75. We certainly enjoyed watching the lights being lit as the names were read. This same type of thing could also be used during other special days of the year, with variations of the basic set-up.



Christian Education

By Otto E. Dick, President Oregon Bible College

Since the Church of God has always considered Christian education to be one of its chief activities, it is important that we review what true Christian education is and to examine our progress in providing a program of Christian education.

A Christian education is learning to know God and His Son, and His Son crucified. It is learning the way, the truth, and the life. It is the acquisition of whatsoever things are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, and of good report, and developing the habit of thinking on these things until one is motivated or activated by his thoughts. It is acquiring a knowledge of God's Word and surrendering to His will. Christian education is seeking and finding truth wherever it can be found, with emphasis upon those truths which promise answers to life's problems and questions. It is a program of study and practice in applying content of study in which the student learns to live truth even in an unfavorable environment or culture. It is an education which aims to produce integrated Christian personalities in which eternal truths are learned, not merely as a segment of knowledge, but as a guide to one's response to every situation or condition. It is knowledge, understanding, and action.

Dr. John R. Mumaw, president of Eastern Mennonite College, Harrisonburg, Va., in speaking of the goals of Christian education, said, "Every aspect of education must be brought into compatible relation to God's truth. There is a sense in which truth is external, and another in which it is internal. That is, outside and beyond us there are realities that do not change with human reaction. Our knowing the truth or not knowing it, our believing it or not believing it, our understanding it or not understanding it, our teaching it or not teaching it, does not change it. It is always external."

Applied to us, this means that God's truth exists independently of our existence, or independently of whether we as a church teach the truth, or whether or not we act upon the truth. He continues, "There is another sense in which the internal meaning of truth achieves its essence by our own human reactions and by the way we use it. In education we are seeking constantly to join the inner experience with the outward reality. The goal of Christian education is to achieve . . . unity for our lives, for our community living, and for our church lives. Out of our complexities, difficulties, and dilemmas we hope to attain to a mature experience in which we feel satisfied that we are in the will of God. Truth is linked to the deed. The whole of Scripture must be related to life if it is to be known for what it is. We must not only know the facts, but we must know how to use them. By some means or other this truth that we are talking about must rise above the levels of discussion to experience; then it has meaning. It must rise above the levels of interest to the point of belief. It must rise above the levels of curiosity to where it actually expands itself in generosity. We are not satisfied with token gestures toward truth. We must learn how to employ the truth." This, then, is the great and vital goal of Christian education; it is learning truth, understanding truth, and acting upon truth.

Now that we have an understanding of what a Christian education is and what its goals are, it is easy to understand why it is Bible centered. Because it is Bible centered, the Bible college is filling a need in higher education that is not being met by liberal arts colleges even though they may have Christian backgrounds, nor by theological seminaries, nor by secular colleges. In the periodical, School and Society for May 9, 1959, is an

A CHANGING MINISTRY

Editorial by Pastor C. E. Randall in News and Prophecy Digest

Last year there were a number of pastoral changes made, most of them having been relatively short pastorates. From reports, it appears that there will be another upheaval in pastor-church associations this year. Of course, there are bound to be necessary changes in pastorates each year, but these one, two, three, or four-year pastorates show unhealthy conditions that warrant careful study by some authorized or established department of our General Conference.

When we were leaving Ontario after having served there for cighteen years, I went to the office of the Welland County Children's Aid Society to offer my resignation as a director of the society. In our conversation, which somehow led to a discussion of short-term pastorates, the superintendent remarked that so often ministers, instead of facing up to the problems of the church, would take the easy way out and resign; thus, the problems would go unsolved, and left a situation which was neither good for the minister nor the church.

I believe the foregoing observation contains some good judgment. Short-term pastorates may sometimes be advisable, but as a rule they are unable to meet the needs, problems, and forward-looking, long-range planning of a congregation. Church building, community serving, deep-seated problems, a projected educational program, understanding the personal needs of people, awareness of the community needs, problems, and opportunities; these all require years to understand, cope with, solve, and carry to a fruitful and spiritual termination.

What kind of national headquarters, publishing plant, or college would we have, if its leadership was to change every two or three years? A nomadic ministry is not conducive to sinking deep roots in the local church field. It is the pastor who is able to "stay on" who becomes the spiritual leader in the community—a tower of strength. He is the one who knows, understands the sheep, and also the pasture.

Green pastures, wonderful people, fruitful opportunities, pleasant surroundings are not in faraway fields. They are right where one is located. The saying, "The boy is seventy per cent you," is largely true of the church field. By and large, the pastoral field is the reflected image of the pastor.

CONFERENCES NEXT MONTH

Two outstanding events in the church year occur next month. They are the annual General Conference business meeting, August 6-11, and the annual Berean Youth Fellowship Conference, August 14-20. Both meetings will be held at Camp Alexander Mack, near Milford, Ind.

Each church and state conference is urged to have delegations present for the General Conference meetings, when decisions will be made that will affect every Church of God. This is the opportunity for every church and conference to take part in making the program and decisions that will determine the future course of the General Conference. Make full use of your opportunity by sending the best delegates possible.

Young people will find the same blessings awaiting them at their conference, where they will have fellowship, study, worship, and recreation experiences that will build Christian character and make them better members or potential members of the body of Christ.

Important state conference meetings are also being held this summer. More and more state conferences are assuming responsibility for evangelism within their range of influence and the General Conference is being freed for evangelism and missions outside the areas now served by state conferences. This is a good trend and every effort should be made by every member to strengthen the hands of the state conferences.

One of the responsibilities of being a good church member is to be informed. The best way to be informed is to attend the conference meetings and take part in them yourself. The second best way is to choose good delegates and then give them time and attention as they report the happenings of the meetings they have attended.

When you are aware of the opportunities and the possibilities that are before the Church of God in every field of its labor, you will be enthused and active in helping it to take advantage of these opportunities.

Philippine Church of God

We have just returned from a trip to the Philippine Islands where it was our privilege to meet, study with, and baptize Bros. Elcodoro S. Ortiguero and Bonifacio Gabanes, two of the leaders of the Philippine Church of God.

For reasons of health, difficulties of language, travel problems, floods, and other causes, it seemed that the Lord led us to hold our meeting in the city of Manila rather than in the northern province of Isabela. In several days and many hours of meetings with these two men, we were able to go into great detail in examination of our mutual faith, and to satisfy ourselves of their understanding of God's Word and zeal to proclaim the truth.

On Sunday morning, June 25, 1961, at Manila, we baptized both these brethren and presented them with ministerial licenses from the Church of God General Conference, in behalf of the License and Ordination Committee. We then continued our conference concerning the extent of the work in the Philippines, the future plans for the work, and ways in which we can serve together to proclaim the gospel throughout the world. A complete and detailed report of the meeting will be presented at General Conference in August, after we have had time to organize the information.

Pastor Ortiguero is the recognized leader of the work in the Philippines. As an evangelist for the Church of Christ, he was commissioned to form churches in northern Luzon. His policy was to start a church in a new field and, as soon as possible, train one of the members to serve as pastor. Bro. Ortiguero, who is a graduate of the Philippine Bible College, would then move on to another place to start a church and train a pastor. He was able to start six churches and train six pastors in five years using this system.

When he came to a knowledge of the truth as understood by the Church of God, he was able to persuade four of the six churches and their pastors to remain with him. These churches are at Quezon, Isabela; Abut, Isabela; San Nicolas, Pangasinan; and, Tobuk, Mountain Province. Three men pastor these four churches: Estafanio Sibayan, Quezon and Abut; Santiago Somera, San Nicolas; and Crhpin Calawagan, Tobuk. Bro. Gabanes will settle in Solano, Vizcaya, to begin a church there. Bro. Ortiguero will settle in Urdaneta, Pangasinan, and continue his evangelistic work from there. Insturo Magno will settle in Manila to begin a work there.

After our meetings in Manila, Bros. Ortiguero and Gabanes went immediately to Quezon to conduct a meeting of the other ministers mentioned, to baptize them and to send them back to their churches, where they will baptize those who come forward for membership in the Church of God. The group includes six ministers, one deaconess, Mrs. Rizalina Aquinaldo (who teaches children, trains teachers, and is a musician), and that number of members who will demonstrate their faith with baptism into the newly formed Churches of God.

Steps were taken with the government of the Philippines in Manila to incorporate the churches under Philippine law, and to gain recognition by the government of the churches and their ministers.

Without going into detail at this time, our general impression was that this is a sound and Scriptural work. We were greatly impressed with the faith, understanding, zeal, and thirst for Bible knowledge of Bros. Ortiguero and Gabanes, and with the planning and organizational ability of Bro. Ortiguero. He is an experienced debater and evangelist, and we are confident that he is sincere in his newly found faith. He has suffered much already because of his new faith.

This is a new work in many ways. It is going through a transition because of the changes in leadership and affiliation. It is not yet certain how many individual members are ready to come into the Church of God, though the membership of the four established churches is now 128. Bro. Ortiguero believes that most of these will come into the Church of God, but he is very careful in baptizing, and expressed his conviction that he must be sure of a candidate's understanding and faith before accepting him into membership.

By General Conference time it is hoped that definite membership information will be available, and that statements of affiliation will be submitted for accepting the organized churches into membership in the Church of God General Conference.

There are many ways in which this new work can be assisted by the Churches of God. Granting recognition to the churches, accepting them into affiliation, pastoral aid, and assistance with equipment and with goods for the needy are some of the ways in which we can participate in this work. A complete report and discussion will be given this work at General Conference, and it will be entirely up to the delegates at the General Conference to decide the future of this work as it involves the General Conference.

We are thankful for the funds that were given to make this trip. The total cost of about \$1,450.00 was almost met by the many special gifts that were given. We are thankful for the prayers of the brethren, for, though many difficulties were encountered, the Lord was with us in every way.

SUPERINTENDENT
OF MISSIONS
EMPLOYED

Since the resignation of Bro. Walter Wiggins as national evangelist, and the later resignation of Sr. Verna Thayer as children's evangelist, the need for a man to supervise the work of evangelism and missions for the General Conference has been recognized. Several succeeding Conference meetings have seen motions passed approving the employment of such a leader. The Board of Directors, because of lack of funds and reluctant to take an active pastor from the field, has not been able to take action on this request till now.

Faced with the problem on its agenda, the National Mission Board, after prayer and discussion, took a new look at the need and recommended that the Board of Directors consider Bro. S. O. Ross for this position. Bro. Ross, who is now president of the General Conference Board of Directors, and has previously served as secretary and treasurer, has enjoyed the confidence of the delegates to the General Conference and has an unparalleled background of experience in the General Conference work.

Bro. Ross, who is Clerk of the District Court, Meeker County, Litchfield, Minn., has been a lay preacher for several years. He is a leader in the Litchfield Church of God, and a leader in the Minnesota State Conference.

Accepting the recommendation of the mission board, Bro. Ross was asked by the Board of Directors to consider accepting this position. Though it will mean a great financial sacrifice for him, and the necessity to leave a home and work that have meant much to him for many years, he has formally accepted the position offered.

Those who know Bro. Ross are assured that he brings to this position experience, ability, dignity, spiritual discernment, and a desire to serve the Lord proven by his willingness to sacrifice to perform that service. We look forward to great developments in the field of missions under the direction of Bro. Ross, and the advisory work of the National Mission Board.

The executive secretary, who has been attempting to serve as general manager, youth director, editor, and evangelist will be relieved of some responsibilities which will be assumed by Bro. Ross. Some areas of work now being neglected can be more efficiently handled by Bros. Ross and Doan.

OTHER OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUTREACH

In addition to the opportunities in the Philippines reported elsewhere, there are many openings for outreach by the Church of God in this country. Work is being undertaken at Beaver Falls, Pa., with Bro. Sprately, under the auspices of the Ohio Conference. There are possibilities for expanded work in North Carolina. New work is being investigated in central Canada.

With these opportunities go great responsibilities, and this work cannot be done without sacrifice and generous giving. A tithing church will have the funds necessary to reach out and undergird new works until they are self-sufficient. With our prayers for open doors should go vows of dedication to provide the means to take opportunities as the Lord presents them to us.

AMENDMENTS TO BE CONSIDERED AT GENERAL CONFERENCE

1) That the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference be amended as follows: We move to amend Article II, Section 6, (F) of the By-Laws to read: "To employ a competent Executive Secretary who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of the General Conference for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned to him." This recommendation is being made by the General Conference Board of Directors and involves only a change in the name of the office.

2) Pastor J. Arlen Marsh recommends the following amendment to the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference. The following addition would be made to Section 1, (K) Prayer. "We believe that sincere prayer, made in faith, brings specific answers from God. 'Sincere prayer,' however, involves the desire that 'God's will be done in [the] earth as it is [done] in heaven.' We believe that prayer, whether spoken or thought, is an expression of our attitude toward God, and that the prayerful attitude should be a constant part of every Christian's life."

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

(Continued from page 1)

article entitled, "The Bible College in American Education Today," by Frank E. Gaebelein, headmaster of the Stony Brook School, New York State. In this article, Dr. Gaebelein discusses the history of the Bible college movement and the reasons for it. He says that since the 1880's there have been founded in this country nearly two hundred Bible institutes and Bible colleges with at least 30,-000 students and that, although ignored in the histories of education, they continue to exercise in their special field of education a vital and crucial influence. He points out that these colleges and institutes have consistently held to two things that still distinguish this form of education: 1) a course of study in which the Bible is central, and 2) an insistence upon the practical application of classroom work through a regular program of service assignments as part of the curriculum. He explains further that Bible colleges offer a highly specialized form of education with one major field, that of the Bible, together with a few closely related areas. It is an undergraduate school with a professional aim, similar on its own level and for its own purpose to the teachers' college.

A recent report from Harvard University indicates that educators are wondering what

will bring order out of a disintegrated, widely diversified, ununifying educational program of higher education. Peter Marshall put it as follows in one of his sermons: "The latest inventions and discoveries have made war more terrible, and while they have given us many conveniences and comforts, they have made life more complicated, peace more difficult to achieve, and the human heart more troubled. Undoubtedly we have improved means, but unfortunately we have not improved ends. We have better ways of getting there, but have no better places to go. We can save more time, but we are not making any better use of our time."

This kind of analysis of our age is disturbing educators and has caused many to take an honest and critical look at the typical college program. They recognize a vacuum in the spiritual realm, in the realm of God's supernatural truths and in the satisfactory integration of these truths into a Christian personality which finds real satisfying purpose in life. They recognize that the typical program of higher education does not contribute enough to the stability of students in this time of great social and economic instability.

I feel that Oregon Bible College, a department of the Church of God General Conference, has been at least moderately successful in imparting truth to potential leaders for our various departments which are responsible for fulfilling the requirements of Christian education in the Church of God. The staff has tried to provide the kind of program that will best fill the needs of the church for Christian leadership. We shall continue to try to maintain our distinctive purpose as a Bible college, that of Christian education. Maintaining a college climate in which all personnel and students are able to live in the will of God is not easy, but it is necessary if we are to accomplish the aims of Christian edueation.

Each member of the church can be of invaluable service to God by recognizing the importance of Christian education on a higher level and by expressing his convictions at opportune times. Our youth should be informed of the eternal value of a Christian education and about the purpose of Oregon Bible College. Personal contacts are the best method of informing young people about these things. We invite you to seek young people who are mentally and morally capable of benefiting from our College program, and who are willing to make the necessary sacrifices for surrendering their will to that of

"The high calling of God is to those who are willing to place themselves within calling distance." It is a challenge that not many are willing to accept. As you talk to young people, you will find much competition from the glamorous, romantie, and prestige appeals of other institutions and job opportunities. Your job of "selling" a Christian education will not be easy, but it is a challenge that must be met if your College is to fulfill most effectively the mission for which it was established.

I urge you to think upon these truths, to be thoroughly convinced that they are true, and then to act upon your belief. Pray for your College. Talk to young people about your College. Help us, in whatever way you can, to grow in our effort to do God's will for us.

The first meeting of the forty-first annual Conference of the Churches of God was called to order by President Ross and prayer was offered by Bro. C. E. Randall.

The first order of business was the seating of the delegates. Credentials Committee chairwoman, Sr. Evelyn Austin, instructed the delegates and seated them. Other members of the committee assisting in the delegate seating were Srs. Janet Turner and Ruth Halls.

The president's message followed, giving many challenging thoughts. Here are some of the thoughts of President Ross, "I have served on the Board of Directors of the General Conference nine out of the last eleven years, During that time there were, including the present time, nineteen men with whom I have served. It is interesting to note that they have been evenly divided between the laymen and the ministers, . . . I am pleased to see so many delegates in this Conference because there are many important matters for us to discuss. . . . I would like to read from John 4:34-36, part of the 35th verse being the theme of this Conference, This is our challenge!

"We are in the seventh year of the Decade of Development Program. We are moving forward and this past year has proven so. . . One sad thing to call to your attention is the shortage of contributions which is causing this year's budget to fall short.

"On the credit side, we have much to be happy about. We have new churches in Ontario, California, and Phoenix, Arizona. We have a church in North Carolina asking for affiliation. There is an awakening! Many others are using our Church of God literature and songbook. One year ago we had only one outside field—Digby, Nova Scotia. In this forty-first Conference year, there have been inquiries from England, Africa, the Philippines, and numerous places in the United States. Literature is being sent into all parts of the world. Many important things will need to be and are to be decided in this Conference.

"We want to present to you the recommendations of the Board of Directors in this opening message. We would like to mention a little more about the Philippine effort. The Board authorized Bro. Doan to make a trip there. He will give a full report at a later time.

"Where do we go from here? We implore you to give this matter your carnest consideration. Please express your feelings in the fouzz' sessions to be held on Wednesday.

"I would like to mention the statement of affiliation which each church and conference must file with General Conference headquarters before the Conference of 1962.

"What is the delegate's purpose of being tere? I am told there are three kinds of peole: 1) people who make things happen; 2) people who watch things happen; and 3) those who never know when a thing has happened. We should be the people that will make things happen. It is up to you and me to take the gospel to all the people. Everywhere is a mission field. We ask you to pray about these things that we may go forward."

Recess was called for ten minutes after prayer of dismissal by Bro, Delbert Jones.

The treasurer's report was then considered. Bro. Doan filled in for Bro. Naylor who was unable to be present. Bro. Doan informed the Conference on several items in the Schedule of Income and Expense. He pointed out that total contributions were more than \$55,000 though the budget is now approximately \$6,000 short of the goal, Bro. Delbert Jones moved the acceptance of the treasurer's report. Seconded by Bro. Warren Landry. Motion carried.

Sr. Louise Lapp gave the report of the Songhook Committee. (See this report on page 6.) The committee has four members, the others being Srs. Evelyn Austin, Leila Mac Doeden, and Bro. William Wachtel. The committee in the revision will endeavor to correct errors in musical notes, make substitutions, and add 32 or 64 songs in the back of the book, depending on the cost, and make other minor changes.

Next was a report by Bro. Alva Huffer, chairman of the Arbitration Committee. (See this report on page 6.) This committee was first suggested by the Ministerial Association. It was recommended the board be called Counseling and Arbitration Board, and consist of three members. This recommendation is to be considered at a later time. There was a motion by Bro. Cyrus Shaw to accept the reports of the Songbook and Arbitration committees. Seconded by Bro. John Railton. Motion carried.

The reports of the Board of Education, Minister's Fund, and the License and Ordination Committee had been printed in the Progress Journal. A motion was made by Bro. C. E. Randall and seconded by Bro. Milon Hall that the preceding reports be approved and placed on file. Motion carried.

The meeting was then opened to nominations for president of the Missionary Department. Bro. Jones, retiring president, was in charge. Nominees were Warren Sorenson, Delbert Jones, and Ellsworth Routson. A motion was made to close the nominations by Bro. Milon Hall and was seconded by Bro. Louis Kump, Motion carried.

The report of the Credentials Committee for the morning session showed officers 5, ministers 40, and delegates 76, making a total of 121 compared to 100 in 1960.

The meeting recessed at 11:45 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. Bro. Richard LeCrone dismissed in prayer.

Afternoon Session

The meeting was called to order with prayer by Bro. Warren Landry. There were 340 who ate the noon meal. It was pointed out that we have been praying for open doors

for mission fields. Bro. Randall took charge of arranging for prayer sessions for Wednesday at 7:00 a.m. and the following days.

The meeting was turned over to Bro. Delbert Jones, missionary president. He pointed out that reports of the missionary secretary and treasurer and of Bro. John Denchfield had all been printed in the Progress Journal and should have been read by all.

Bro. Emory Macy was called to the floor to report on his trip to investigate a missionary field near Flaxcomb, Saskatchewan, Canada. Many Restitution Heralds and tracts were distributed in towns in Canada. He preached four sermons—one in Regina, one in Prelatt, and two in Flaxcomb. On the way home he stopped in a mission field which is a project of the Minnesota State Conference, at Little Fork, Minn.

Next, Bro. Doan gave a report of his trip to the Philippines and his findings there. (See this report on pages 7, 8, 9.) A motion was made by Bro. Warren Landry and seconded by Bro. Ellsworth Routson to receive Bro. Doan's report and place it on file. Motion curried.

President Ross then introduced Bro. Z. B. Duncan of Conover, North Carolina, Bro. Duncan spoke highly of the wonderful relationship in Christ in the Church of God.

The Credentials Committee reported attendance of 119 compared to 109 in 1960. There were 5 officers, 40 ministers, and 73 delegates. The meeting recessed at the call of the chair at 3:25 p.m. until 9:45 a.m. Wednesday, August 9. Prayer for closing was offered by President Ross.

Wednesday Morning, August 9, 1961

The meeting was called to order by President Ross at 9:50 a.m. with prayer by Bro. Arlie Townsend. The minutes of the sessions on Tuesday were read and approved as read.

The report of Bro. Emory Macy which had been given on Tuesday was received by a motion by Bro. Willis Turner and seconded by Bro. Warren Landry. Motion carried. Also the reports already printed in the Progress Journal of the missionary secretary and treasurer, and of Bro. John Denchfield were received and placed on file through a motion by Bro. Rolland Stilson and seconded by Bro. Cyrus Shaw. Motion carried.

Mr. William Hawley of Fishkill, New York, was introduced, being a visitor in our conference.

Missionary President Delbert Jones took charge and asked for reports from the different societies. First, a letter was read from Chaplain Orville Westlund, U. S. Navy. Sr. Ada Simpson, missionary secretary, read reports from Hope Chapel, South Bend, Ind.; New Hope Church, Little Rock, Ark.; Hillisburg Church, Michigantown, Ind.; Blood River Church, Hammond, La.: Golden Rule Church, Cleveland, Ohio; Tempe Church, Tempe, Ariz.; Open Bible Church, Macomb, Ill.; Truth Secker's Church, Chicago, Ill.;

Brush Creek Church, Tipp City, Ohio; Ripley Church, Ripley, III.; Southlawn Church, Grand Rapids, Mich.; and the Minnesota State Society.

The Credential's Committee reported that 119 delegates were seated for the voting of missionary president. Bro. Warren Sorenson was elected.

Following the election, Bro. John Denchfield was asked to speak for a few minutes about the Digby work. There were three vacation Bible schools held in that area.

President Ross divided those present into eight groups for the "buzz" sessions. The Board of Directors and the Mission Board served as leaders. Each group then went to its place of meeting. They all came together again after lunch at 1:30 p.m.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was called to order nt 1:40 p.m. and Bro. Ellsworth Routson gave the prayer.

The first business of the afternoon was to receive nominations for the three members to be elected to the Board of Directors. These nominations were listed as Numbers One, Two, and Three. For Number One, Bros. Howard Shute, Fonthill, Ont., Can.; and Willis Turner, Oregon, Ill. For Number Two, Bros. Arlie Townsend, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Warren Landry, Hammond, La.; and Dean Urish, Oregon, Ill. For Number Three, Bros. Ralla Hightower, Macomb, Ill.; Charles Jones, Cleveland, Ohio; and Austin Railton, Kokomo. Ind.

Following the nominations, the secretaries of the "buzz" sessions gave their reports. Here is a summary of the thinking that came out of the "buzz" sessions: All groups were unanimous in agreement that our Conference should: 1) accept the Philippine churches into our conference and fellowship upon request; 2) accept into affiliation the ministers who have been haptized in the Philippines; and 3) that we should continue to search out opportunities for expansion of the Church of God in all parts of the world. Fifty per cent of the groups were agreed that full support, as suggested in the report, should be given. It was generally agreed that we, the General Conference, should use all of our resources to sell the missionary program to our people. Also, it was agreed that God had led the Philippines to the Church of God and that the Board of Directors had proceeded in the right manner in sending Bro. Doan to investigate and establish the work there.

Bro. Cyrus Shaw made this motion, That we accept the Philippine Churches that have asked membership into our Conference. It was seconded by Bro. Arnold Johns. At present, these churches are located at Quezon, Isabela; Abut, Isabela; San Nicolas, Pangasinan; Bannawag, Toluk. Motion carried.

Bro. Alva Huffer made the motion, that we accept into affiliation the ministers who have been haptized in the Philippines. It was seconded by Bro. Milon Hall. Bro. C. E. Randall moved to amend the motion in the following manner: We recommend to the License and Ordination Board the acceptance of the Philippine ministers into affiliation as they request it. It was seconded by Bro. Delbert Jones. The amendment carried. The motion as amended carried.

Bro. Cyrus Shaw made a motion that we approve at this time the amount of \$470,00 per month for the Philippine work. This was

seconded by Bro. Elzie Robbins, Bro. Vernis Wolfe moved to amend, that we adopt as a goal for our General Conference work in the Philippines the proposed amount of \$470.00 per month; that this amount be added to our proposed budget of 1961-62, and that our Board of Directors be authorized to set up the mechanics necessary for the discharge of this responsibility. And furthermore, that our Board of Directors proceed on the basis of extending the support to the Philippine workers as funds are available. This was seconded by Bro. Emory Macy, There was much discussion. Before voting there were a few moments of silent prayer followed with prayer by Bro. Willis Turner. The amendment caried. The motion as amended carried.

Bro. Harvey Krogh moved that we continue to search out opportunities for expansion of the Church of God. This was seconded by Bro. Delhert Jones. The motion carried.

President Ross then brought to the attention of the Conference that a group calling their church, Church of the Resurrection Hope, under the leadership of Bro. Z. B. Duncan, Whitnel, North Carolina, had asked for affiliation with the Church of God General Conference. Bro. C. F. Pryor moved to receive the Church of the Resurrection Hope, Whitnel, North Carolina, into fellowship. It was seconded by Bro. C. E. Randall. Motion carried.

Bro, Ross asked for an expression from the group about the recommendation of the Sunday School Board about having a conference over a week end. The majority favored to continue as we do now.

The Credential's Committee reported an attendance in the morning session of 5 officers, 39 ministers, and 75 delegates—a total of 119. This compares to 117 in 1960. For the afternoon session there were: 5 officers, 37 ministers, and 75 delegates—a total of 117 compared to 108 in 1960.

Bro. Z. B. Duncan expressed his thanks for the wonderful fellowship, and for receiving the church at Whitnel, North Carolina, into Conference affiliation. He said, "We give God the credit and glory." The delegates showed their expression of approval by clapping.

The afternoon session recessed at 3:40 p.m. until Thursday, August 10, at 9:45 a.m. Prayer was offered by Bro. Jesse Pestle.

Thursday Morning, August 10, 1961

The meeting was called to order at 9:50 a.m. with prayer by Bro. E. J. Demmitt. The secretary read the minutes of Wednesday's sessions and they were approved as read. The first order of business for the morning session was the election of officers. The Credential's Committee reported 106 delegates to start the voting. The following men were elected: Bro. Howard Shute, Fonthill, Ont.; Bro. Warren Landry, Hammond, La.; and Bro. Charles Jones, Cleveland, Ohio.

President Ross asked Bro. Doan to give an explanation of the handling of receipts, contributions, etc. He had the delegates examine the Schedule of Income and Expense. Bro. Doan pointed out that all funds coming in fall into the departments listed and are disbursed in the same manner.

The session recessed at 10:45 a.m. for a few minutes. Prayer of dismissal was given by Bro. John Hayse.

The delegates were again called to order

at 10:55 a.m. with prayer by Bro. Gerald Cooper.

President Ross instructed the new directors and all delegates that a joint meeting would be held after the afternoon session for the purpose of organizing the new Board of Directors and to acquaint the new directors with coming business.

Bro. C. E. Randall presented the following motion, I move a rising vote of thanks to the retiring officers for their faithful service. It was seconded by Bro. John Hayse. The motion carried. Again Bro. Randall presented this motion, I move this Conference body instruct its secretary to send greetings and welcome to the new churches received into our Conference fellowship. This was seconded by Bro. Warren Landry. The motion carried.

The next order of business was the voting on recommendations,

Home Missions

Bro. Willis Turner moved that we adopt the following recommendation, that a "Get Acquainted" Campaign be encouraged in every Church of God in November, 1961. A special issue of The Restitution Herald would be prepared and offered in bundle lots to each church. With each bundle of 100 of the special Heralds would be furnished attractive handbill inserts, with the schedule of local services, name of the church and pastor, and addresses and phone numbers. The packet will help the people of the community who are non-members to become acquainted with the local church and with the Church of God as a whole. This was seconded by Bro. Milon Hall. The motion carried.

Bro. Hollis Partlowe moved the adoption of the following recommendation, that the book, "Systematic Theology," be distributed to all seminary and Bible college libraries in the United States. This was seconded by Bro. Rolland Stilson. Bro. Willis Turner moved to amend the motion to read, that copies of "Systematic Theology" be placed in six selected Bible seminaries and colleges, these to be used as a testing ground for experience. This was seconded by Bro. Paul Johnson. The motion to amend lost. The original motion carried.

Bro. Milon Hall moved to adopt this recommendation, that we initiate negotiations with others of "like precious faith," who are now outside the fellowship of the Clurch of God, and who wish to join our fellowship as individuals or as congregations. This was seconded by Bro. Darrell Maddock, The motion carried.

Foreign Missions

Bro. Harry Sheets moved that we adopt the following recommendation, that choice tracts be translated into foreign languages and distributed free through foreign missionaries. This was seconded by Bro, Harry Gockler, Bro. Doan told of the possibilities: a Spanish translation for Panama and the Bahamas; Illacano for the Philippines; and Tamil to be used in India. An amendment by Bro. Richard Dick was, I move that choice tracts be translated into the languages spoken by the groups with which we are working, and that these tracts be distributed free through foreign missionaries and workers repesenting the Church of God General Conference, This way seconded by Bro. Warren Landry. The mo tion to amend lost. The original motion carIt was moved by Bro. Delbert Jones that contacts in foreign fields be cultivated through the distribution of literature, through personal correspondence, and, when possible and advisable, through personal visits by a Church of God member. This was seconded by Bro. Harvey Krogh. The motion carried.

Printing and Publishing

Bro. Darrell Maddock moved, that a Church of God Commentary be published as it is prepared from Truth Seeker's Quarterly and other sources by Bro. Robert Sec. This was seconded by Bro. Kenneth Milne. Bro. Vernis Wolfe moved that the adoption of the motion to publish a commentary be postponed indefinitely. This was seconded by Bro. Paul Johnson. The motion carried.

Bro. Harvey Krogh moved that the Conference commend Bro. Robert See for his work. This was seconded by Bro. Milon Hall. The motion carried.

Bro. John Railton moved, that "Songs of Truth" be reprinted as revised by the Hynnal Revision Committee. It was seconded by Bro. Harvey Krogh. The motion carried.

Bro. Vernis Wolfe moved that the General Conference Board of Directors appoint a committee to do research and survey work to determine the most urgent need in printing of booklets and books. This was seconded by Bro. Willis Turner. The motion carried.

There was a motion to recess by Bro. Harold Doan, and seconded by Bro. Gerald Cooper. President Ross called for a Credential's Committee report, which was 5 officers, 36 ministers, and 73 delegates—a total of 114 compared to 110 in 1960. The session closed with prayer by Bro. James Watkins at 11:40 a.m. until 1:30 p.m.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:35 p.m. with prayer by Bro. Charles Graham.

Oregon Bible College

Bro. Paul Overholser moved, that every effort be made to reach the goal of \$125,000 in commitments this year; that every effort be made to have \$75,000 of that amount in eash by the spring of 1963; and that we strive to have the proposed new college building in use by the fall of 1963. This was seconded by Bro. Rolland Stilson, The motion carried.

Bro. Harry Sheets moved, that Oregon Bible College continue to serve the Church of God as a four-year Bible institution for the education of ministers, teachers, evangelists, and leaders for the Church of God, and that its objectives, curriculum, staff, student body, and governing bodies strive to make it the best in its specialized field of Bible institutions. It was seconded by Bro. Charles Graham, The motion carried.

General Conference

Bro. Alva Huffer moved, that there be four seasons of promotional emphasis of the various departments of the General Conference to avoid overlapping in special appeals. The following plan is recommended: a) emphasis of Home and Foreign Missions in the fall, with Mission Day in November, one Mission Builder's appeal would also be made in the fall; b) emphasis on publications in the inter; c) emphasis on Oregon Bible College in the spring, also, a second Mission Builder's appeal would be made in the spring; d) emphasis upon general services of the General

Conference, Berean Youth Fellowship, and stewardship in the summer months. This was seconded by Bro. Hollis Partlowe. The motion carried.

Bro. Harvey Krogh moved that, we recommend the adoption of the Stewardship Program. (Printed in the June 7, Progress Journal, page 5.) This was seconded by Bro. Warren Landry. The motion carried.

General Recommendations

Bro. Milon Hall moved that the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference he amended as follows: We move to amend Article II, Section 6 (F), of the By-Laws to read, "To employ a competent Executive Secretary who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of the General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned to him." This was seconded by Bro. Harry Gockler. The motion carried.

It was moved by Bro. John Hayse the following amendment to the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference, Section 1, (K) Prayer. We believe that sincere prayer, discussion, made in faith, brings speeific answers from God. "Sincere prayer." however, involves the desire that God's "will be done in (the) earth, as it is (done) in heaven." We believe that prayer, whether spoken or thought, is an expression of our attitude toward God, and that the prayerful attitude should be a constant part of every Christian's life. This was seconded by Bro. Kenneth Milne. Bro. Milon Hall moved to amend the motion by adding the words "through Christ" after the fifth word of the amendment "prayer." Seconded by Bro. Raymond Brown. The motion to amend carried. The motion as amended lost, since discussion concluded that prayer is already emphasized in the section on Christian life.

Bro. Delbert Jones moved the recommendation of the Ministers' Fund Committee be adopted. To provide funds for the ministers' fund in a systematic way, we recommend that each Church of God be urged to voluntarily contribute an amount equal to 1 per cent of its minister's salary into this fund, and that each minister be urged to participate with a similar amount. This will develop a fund which will meet emergencies under the present rules, and possibly become a basis for an expanding ministers' fund. This was seconded by Bro. Kenneth Milne. The motion carried.

Bro. Richard Dick moved the adoption of the following recommendation: We recommend that a Board of Church Counseling and Arbitration be created within the General Conference. This Board will consist of three persons appointed by the Board of Directors, and will be a standing committee similar to the Committee of License and Ordination. It was seconded by Bro. Harry Sheets. The motion carried. (See report of this committee.)

President Ross asked Bro. C. E. Lapp to speak concerning the Gospel Team trip that was made in the summer of 1961. Bro. Lapp said they traveled through sixteen states with total miles of 9,200. They enjoyed the wonderful association and fellowship with Church of God people and especially that so many were praying for the team. They did quite a lot of sight-seeing which was enjoyed by all. The trip was all paid for and a small amount put in the Gospel Team Fund. Bro. William Hauson moved that thanks be given the Lanus

and the Gospelettes, and also for Bro. Lapp's report. This was seconded by Bro. Louis Kump. Expression was by a rising vote.

Bro. C. E. Randall spoke in behalf of the Board of Education. He urged for more consideration for Oregon Bible College. He said, "We need a burning passion for Christian workers and ministers. There will be no graduates in 1962. We had a similar situation in 1954. But in 1958 there was a graduating class of nine. This was done through prayer. There is no need to pray for open doors unless we have Christian workers and leaders to fill the need. We must prepare our men and women—your sons and your daughters, to go through these open doors." The Booster program will continue, with March designated "Booster Month."

The Credential's Committee reported in the afternoon session there were, 6 officers, 33 ministers, and 69 delegates—a total of 108 compared with 107 in 1960.

There was a motion to recess by Bro. Delhert Jones, seconded by Bro. Louis Kump. The session recessed at 3:00 p.m. until Friday, August 11, at 9:45 a.m. The closing prayer was by Bro. Charles Jones.

Friday Morning, August 11, 1961

The meeting opened at 9:55 a.m. with prayer by Bro. Howard Shute. The president called for the reading of the minutes of Thursday's sessions. They were approved as read.

Sr. Marjorie Overmyer reported that 430 or more persons had been registered and had attended the Conference. She also reported that the children of the Conference in the Vacation Bible School Department had taken offerings each day. A total of \$15.50 was received during the week to be used for missions. The Vacation Bible School was under the direction of Sr. Raymond Brown.

Bro. John Hayse moved to give Sr. Overnyer a rising vote of thanks for all the work she had done during Conference week. The motion was seconded and carried by standing.

President Ross instructed the delegates that of the new Board of Directors as follows: Chairman, Bro. Milon Hall; Vice Chairman, Bro. John Hayse; Sceretary, Bro. Francis Burnett; Treasurer, Bro. Willard Naylor; and Directors, Bros. Howard Shute, Warren Landry, and Charles Jones.

Presient Ross instructed the delegates that a motion passed on the Conference floor on Wednesday, August 9, obligated the delegates and Conference to add \$5,640 to the Missions Department. The total budget would be \$50,550. Bro. Timothy Pearson moved the adoption of the budget of \$50,550. It was seconded by Bro. Charles Graham. The motion carried. (The budget as adopted is on page 6, center column.)

Bro. C. F. Pryor asked for a few minutes to speak concerning the Church of the Resurrection Hope, Whitnel, North Carolina, and Bro. Z. B. Duncan. Time was granted.

Sr. Cecil Railton spoke on behalf of the Priscillas, as their president, saying they had had one of the best fellowships ever. The Priscillas recommended to the Committee on Publication Research and Survey to consider a devotional booklet first of all. Sr. Eunice Pearson is working on material at the present time.

put in the Gospel Team Fund. Bro. William Bro. C. E. Lapp made a motion that the Hanson moved that thanks be given the Lapps Conference program of 1962 include the early

time of prayer at 7:00 a.m. each day. This was seconded by Bro, Kenneth Milne.

Bro, Dallas Demmitt spoke concerning the youth conference. He urged that applications be gotten in by the deadline.

Sr. Evelyn Austin, Chairwoman of the Credentinl's Committee, reported the number present for the Friday session-5 officers, 25 ministers, and 45 delegates. Bro. Gerald Cooper and Sr. John Hayse moved and seconded a motion to accept the Credential's Committee report on delegates, membership, etc. The motion carried by a rising vote of thanks.

President Ross asked the incoming chairman of the Board of Directors to address the Conference, Chairman Hall asked for the sincere backing and prayers of the Conference body for the Board of Directors. He said in part, "The future of the Church of God is in the hands of those who take it to their hearts. May God be with us throughout this coming year."

To close the Conference activities, the president asked for the final reading and approval of the minutes. A motion made by Bro. John Hayse and seconded by Bro. Darrell Maddock was, We approve the minutes of the entire Conference and move that they be accepted as read. Motion carried.

Bro. Raymond Brown moved a rising vote of thanks be given the retiring president. This was seconded by Bro. Harvey Krogh. The motion carried by audience rising.

There was a motion to adjourn and it was done in the singing of the first verse of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again." The closing prayer was given by Secretary Burnett. Time of adjournment was 10:50 a.m.

ARBITRATION AND COUNSELING BOARD REPORT

We recommend that a Board of Church Counseling and Arbitration be created within the General Conference. This Board will consist of three persons appointed by the Board of Directors, and will be a standing committee similar to the Committee of License and Ordination.

This Board will be available at the call of a church which may be having serious internal difficulties. As a neutral party the Board could come into a church, hear both sides of a question, and suggest a solution. It would serve only by invitation and would have no authority to enforce action. Detailed policy could be formulated as the Board progressed in its work. Expenses of the Board would be paid by the General Conference. The local church using the services of the Board could be given opportunity to contribute if it desired.

This Board would also provide counseling for pastors and elders seeking guidance in solving church problems. Through giving counsel to pastors and elders, local officers can become better equipped to handle many problems. The Board of Church Counseling and Arbitration should not attempt to solve minor problems which local officers should solve. The Board would screen problems before accepting an invitation to come to a loeal church, An arbitration visit would be justified when the church organization structure is threatened, or when a pastor is likely to be discharged unjustly, Many problems would not require a visit by the Board to the church itself. Problems should be solved by correspondence and telephone as much as possible.

Since our church congregations have matured tremendously in recent decades, we do not anticipate that this Board would be used very frequently. The fact that the General Conference had such a Board would be half its value.

MISSIONARY REPORT Ada Simpson, Secretary

The General Conference held at Camp Mack, August 6-11, 1961, was undoubtedly the most inspirational, harmonious, and forward-looking of any we have had in years. There was an urgent spirit to be up and doing: a spirit of faith in the Lord's ability to help us do what has been put into our hands to do. The action taken by the delegates will be reported by the Conference secretary. Special prayer sessions were held at seven o'clock for three mornings. At this time we prayed for the Lord's direction in what should be done about the open door in the Philippines. Another morning, Oregon Bible College was the subject of our study and prayer. During the third session, prayers were offered for the congregations at home that they would back up the action taken by the delegates.

A group of young people from Digby, N. S., provided inspiration for the worship period on Tuesday afternoon. Six of the girls had accepted Christ in the past year. They sang, "Things Are Different Now," the song (Continued on page 14)

Following are excerpts of a report given at the recent General Conference business meeting concerning the work being undertaken in the Philippine Island of Luzon. After the report was given, a "buzz session" was conducted to thoroughly discuss this work and the decisions reported in the minutes were then made.

Since the General Conference business meetings of 1960, there has been a sudden opening of doors to missionary opportunity for the Church of God. In the late fall of 1960, letters began to arrive at the General Conference office from many parts of the world and of the United States. These were letters of inquiry; letters asking for information about the Church of God; letters in response to articles read or tracts that had been found; letters from people who were in some way searching for further truth, or who had become distillusioned with orthodoxy.

In December, 1960, we received an inquiry from Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, Alunan, Quezon, Isabela, Philippines. Bro. Ortiguero had read of the Church of God in the "Mead's Handbook of Denominations," and wanted more information about the church. A letter was sent in reply, pointing out some of the similarities and some of the differences between the Church of God and the Church of Christ, of which Bro. Ortiguero was a member, and asking him to study the literature being sent in another package.

We did not hear again from Bro. Ortiguero until February 24, 1961. By that time we had decided this was just another of the many letters we get from people who are curious but not really interested in the teachings of the Church of God. The second letter, however, informed me that he had studied the literature sent, as had five other ministers serving under him, and they with their congregations wished to withdraw from the Church of Christ and wished to alliliate with the Church of God. We explained that there were many things we would have to know before such a thing would be possible, and there followed a long series of letters in which in-

formation was exchanged about the work and workers there, and the Church of God General Conference and Churches of God here.

Finally, in April, in response to a letter in which I questioned Bro. Ortiguero concerning the places where the work was located, his own beliefs about a list of subjects, and his feelings about baptism, it seemed wise to plan a trip to the Philippines as soon as possible, preferably before Conference, to visit Bro. Ortiguero personally and baptize him if possible. The National Mission Board and the Board of Directors also felt this way.

Plans were begun immediately after the meeting of the Board of Directors in May, to visit the Philippines late in June. Correspondence was exchanged, passports secured, visas secured, travel arrangements made, innoculations endured, and preparations made for meeting the workers. We left from Chicago June 18, 1961.

Our plans at that time were to travel to Cauayan, Isabela, to meet the workers. Due to various circumstances plans were changed to have the conference in Manila, Consequently, we met with Bros. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero and Gabanes Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Monday at the Manila Hotel. As it worked out, we felt that we were able to work more closely with these men and learn more about them and their faith than we would have in Quezon. We were also able to conduct some business in Manila with the government which is necessary to the establishment of the work there. The way that the work is organized in the Philippines, it is most essential that we work with Bro. Ortiguero, who is the acknowledged leader of this movement.

In our meetings, we followed an organized agenda which I had prepared before leaving Oregon. The agenda included two pages of questions for which I knew the Boards and the delegates would want answers. We first prayed together, and then I reviewed the agenda so that we agreed what we would talk about in our meetings.

The first step was to introduce myself, my position with the Conference, and the reason of or my visit. We reviewed the organization of the Conference and I emphasized that I had no authority to make any commitments or promises to them and that my whole purpose was to get to know them, to learn of their faith, to haptize them, to license them

if this proved wise, to discover ways in which we can work together, and to help them to better know the Church of God as it is working in North America. They had studied the Journals for the last year, the Worker's Manual, and the new Constitution, and they had no questions about the work of the Conference or about the purpose of our meetings. They did want to know on what basis I could license them and I told them I had been granted this right by the License and Ordination Committee to act as their agent.

The next step was to get information concerning the workers who are involved in the Church of God in the Philippines. We wanted to get as much information as possible about each one.

Eleodoro S. Ortiguero. 35 years of age, wife Emilia, five children. He was baptized in the Church of Christ in 1950, enrolled the next year in Philippine Bible College (inderendent, but heavily staffed by Church of Christ), where he graduated in 1955, He was then sent by the Church of Christ to the northern provinces, his home country, to begin new churches. He is an evangelist. He would go to a new place and organize a church. He would then choose a layman who showed particular ability, and teach him preaching, Bible survey, music, etc., three hours each evening, six days each week. After a few months he, would leave this church in the worker's hands and move to a new place. In five years he started churches in: Bannawag, Mountain Province; Tabuk, Mountain Province; Quezon, Isabela; Abut, Isabela; Minagbeg, Isabela; Solano, Vizcaya; San Nicolas, Pangasinan. In each place there was a lay preacher, trained by Bro. Ortiguero.

In 1960 he heard a debate between a Church of Christ minister and a Philippine Church of God minister on the name of the church. He thought the Church of God man won, and began to doubt the name. He looked in Mead's Handbook and saw our name and wrote for information. At that time the name was his only point of difference, though he did object to military service and some Church of Christ mission policies such as not teaching tithing. He was receiving \$250 per month (500 pecos at that time) and was in turn giving each of his assistants \$5 as a gift from this.

After receiving our letter and a package of material, he and Bonifacio Gabanes, the

pastor at Quezon, began to study together. Bonifacio first said, "This is true. This is right," Bro. Ortiguero believed, but as leader and being financed by the Church of Christ, he was reluctant to disrupt the work. They finally did agree, however, and Eleodoro began to preach his newly found faith. Upon hearing of this, the mission directors at Baguio City called him in and questioned him. He admitted he had changed his belief and told them in what ways he had changed. It was decided be should resign, and his support was stopped and equipment owned by the church was given back. This included books, use of a Jeep every other month, sound equipment, and projector. He later sold his typewriter to pay hospital expenses.

Upon withdrawal from the Church of Christ another evangelist was sent into his former territory. The men with whom he had worked, however, followed him, though two of them, Pastors Agdeppa and Jimmy, returned to the Church of Christ. Two others were won, however—Pastors Somera and Magno, from the Church of Christ and Seventh Day Church of God. Of the congregations he started the ones at Tabuk, Quezon, Abut, and San Nicolas have remained with Bro. Ortiguero.

Bonifacio Gabanes. 25 years of age, single, cares for parents, widowed sister, Mrs. Aquinaldo, and her two children. He was converted by Bro. Ortiguero into the Church of Christ, and was baptized in 1955, He studied under Bro. Ortiguero, and the last two years has been preacher at Quezon. He was taught preaching, Old and New Testament survey, and music by Bro. Ortiguero. While learning, he did practice preaching under supervision of Bro. Ortiguero at Quezon. He is a rice farmer, and lives in Quezon. He speaks little English, though he reads and writes English and can understand it spoken. He prayed and spoke in Illacono and Bro. Ortiguero translated. He seems fluent in Illacono. He longs for more education and would like a Bible college in the Philippines so he could attend. He speaks Illacono, Tagalog, Pangasinan, little English. If he obtains support to do so, and if it can be worked out, he plans to move to Solano and start a church there. He and Bro. Ortiguero have relatives and former converts there. (He rents a water buffalo, "Carabo," from the Kalingas, a pagan tribe living in the mountains near Quezon. He says the land is poor at Quezon, and there is no irrigation. Rent of the land is high, and rent for buffalo is high. People are therefore poor.)

Estefanio Sibayan, 36 years of age, married, and has four children, He is now living at Quezon where he has a job as a policeman. He was from San Nicolas, Pangasinan, where he was a member of the Church of Christ. He was converted by Bro. Ortiguero, and trained there to be a preacher. He has preached for four years, He intends to be the pastor of the churches at Quezon and Abut, Isabela. He was baptized in July by Bro. Ortiguero and has requested ministerial license.

Santiago Somera. He is not a convert of Bro. Ortiguero; that is, in the Church of Christ. He was pastor of the Church of Christ at Tayewg. He was trained by the Church of Christ minister at Tayewg, After Bro. Ortiguero withdrew from the Church of Christ, he was contacted by Bro. Somera who wanted to win him back. They met together for a week near Solano, Bro. Somera was very angry for two days and shouted and would not listen. Then he began to see the truth and at the end of the week he left his church at Tayewg and is now working with the Church of God congregation at San Nicolas, Pangasinan. He is 29 years of age, single, and lives at San Nicolas, Pangasinan, now. He was baptized in July and has requested ministerial recognition.

Insturo Magno is 45 years of age, married, has one child in college. He was a preacher for the Church of God (Seventh Day), Salem, W. V. He was a friend of Bro. Somera. Bro. Somera talked to him and brought him over to the Church of God, Bro. Ortiguero has met and talked briefly with him, but he is a convert of Bro. Somera's. I asked if he was really converted and Bro. Ortiguero said, "Well, he is eating pork." These people are identical with us except on the law, the Sabbath, and the health laws they keep. He was put out of the Church of God (Seventh Day) for his change in belief and now helps Bro. Somera at San Nicolas. He was trained by correspondence from Salem, W. V. He is a man who spent several years in the army and speaks good English, Tagalog, Illacono, Bicol, Pangasinan, and several other dialects. He is a good preacher and worker.

Crispin Callawagen is a recent convert of Bro. Ortiguero, who will preach at Tabuk, Mountain Province. We do not have statisties on him, nor his minister's application form. He does not speak or write English, so Bro. Ortiguero will have to fill out his form for him later.

Mrs. Rizalina Aquinaldo, 27, is a sister of Bro. Gabanes. She is a widow with two children. She is a musician, teaches music, leads music, and also teaches children, and trains teachers. Bro. Ortiguero believes she is necessary to the work to be a children's worker.

After they had told me about themselves and the workers, I went over the statements of faith with them point by point. I had found nothing in the written statements to question, except possibly Bro. Ortiguero's reference to Satan being tormented forever and ever. I thought it best to note each point, however, and ask them about specific matters to see how deep their understanding might be.

Some of the points made were that God is a real being, corporeal; all the Bible is true but it must be rightly divided and it must be remembered who the speaker is and the context; all must be baptized after believing

this gospel (there can be no "restoring" as in the Church of Christ); regeneration means that one becomes a new creature. Bro, Ortiguero stated that these things are the gospel and one must believe them to be saved. He would require study and oral confession before baptism. He thinks there should be elders, deacons, deaconesses in the church; is careful about qualifications for elders.

Bros. Ortiguero and Gabanes state that others believe the same and that before baptism or recognition for license, they will assure themselves that these doctrines are accepted. They do not want a weak organization in the Philippines.

After this examination, I agreed that they should be baptized and recognized as licensed ministers of the Church of God. After an early morning baptismal service, I gave the license certificates on behalf of the License and Ordination Committee, We then had a worship service. (Bro. Ortiguero had arranged a pulpit and brought song sheets. He opened the service and led two hymns, Bro. Gabanes gave the prayer. I gave the Scripture reading, preached on the Kingdom, and asked for questions. They asked about the time of tribulation; whether the wicked would live on into the Millennium; about branches and tree in Romans 11, Previously we had discussed the rich man and Lazarus, the thief on the cross-which troubled them. Their questions show they are students. They sang two duets. Music is important to their services and they quoted Ephesians 5:19 in support. They seemed careful to use only Bilelical terms and services.)

Later we continued our discussions, now centering on the work and its organization, and its future and needs, "How many congregations are there? Where are they? Who will be the leaders? How many members in each? Do they have a building? Where will the other workers go?"

Quezon, Isabela. Has a building and parsonage. The town has about 2,000 people. It is very poor. The church is bamboo with thatched roof and dirt floor. The lot was given by the mayor. The building is a remodeled house purchased for P300 (\$100). The attendance is 40-50 in the morning; 40-60 in the evening. There is a weekday children's service with 15 in attendance. They are farm people, of which about two thirds are women. There is much drinking in the barrios (villages). They speak Illacono, though some ean speak English. The men and women sit separately in church. Bro. Sibayan will be the pastor here. Eighteen members have been baptized since July.

Abut, Isabela, is about four miles from Quezon. It is a small village. There is no pastor, but Bro. Sibayan will take care of the work until they can find a leader. They have a building. They are farm people, mostly women. Twenty-one members have been baptized here.

San Nicolas, Pangasinan. Bro. Santiago Somera will preach here. There are 18 haptized members. Many are relatives of Bro. Ortiguero. Each church has three services each Sunday. Attendance averages 38-40 for each service. They rent a building and own no property.

Bannawag, Tobuk, Mountain Province. Crispin Callawagen will be the preacher here. This church owns a lot. They have a membership of 12 baptized members. Attendance averages about 20.

Urdaneta, Pangasinan, is the crossroads of the Island. Bro. Ortiguero will live here, start work here, and work out from here. It is a large city.

"Would you be willing to visit the United States churches?" Yes, we would like to come to Conference, visit the churches and Oregon Bible College.

"What about the future training of workers!" We plan to continue as we have been. We will have ministers' conferences. We would like to see a Philippine Bible School in the future, Bro. Gabanes especially likes such an idea. There might be young Filipinos who could attend Oregon Bible College.

"Will these people do all possible to support their work?" They have not been taught to give, but we are now teaching tithing. They know that American churches will not always support them, and they need to pre-pare for aid to stop. They will do all possible to make self-supporting work as they go along.

There is a need for used clothing here. The people are small, and lightweight summer clothing is required. I have no doubt of their poverty and their need. Bro. Ortiguero does not believe in using clothing as an enticement to conversion, but only as a way to fill great need as a Christian act.

We wish to give God the praise for this work. He was there when we did not know there was such a place. He opened the door, and provided the means, and made possible this contact. Our part was simply to react to the opportunity that God provided and try to do as the Lord led.

In its meetings after the General Conference business sessions, the Board of Directors of the General Conference, with the Mission Board, decided to begin immediately to send essistance to Bro. Ortiguero, at the rate of \$100 per month, and to undertake assistance for the other workers as pledges of support for this work are received from Sunday

A BRIEF STATEMENT OF MY BELIEFS

By Pastor Eleodoro S. Ortiguero

1. GOD. There is only one God (Eph. 4:6; I Cor. 8:6); no other God beside Him (Deut. 4:35; Isa, 44:6-8); Omnipotent (Matt. 19; 26); because He created the universe (Isa. 44:24). God is immortal (1 Tim. 1:17); eternal (Psa. 90:2); Omnipresent (Jer. 23:24); Omniscient (Prov. 15:3); and just (Psa. 119:137).

2. JESUS, Jesus is not God but man (John 8:40); the "only begotten Son" of God (John 3:16); born of Mary by the will of God (Luke 1:30-35). He is Christ, the Messiah (John 4:25, 26); the Saviour of mankind (1 John 4:14; Acts 4:12); a mediator between God and men (1 Tim, 2:5); and our Judge (Acts 10:39-42). He did not pre-exist before His birth, for He is a seed of Abraham (Gal 3:16); and of David (Rev. 22:16; Matt. 1:1).

3. THE HOLY SPIRIT. The Holy Spirit is the power of God, manifest in creation (Gen. 1:2; Job 26:13); in the birth of Jesus (Matt. 1:18-25); in the power of the apostles (Acts 1:8); and in the lives of those consecrated children of God (John 14:26). The Holy Spirit is not a person, but the inthence of God.

4. MAN. Man was created in the image of God (Gen. 1:26, 27); but fell into sin (Gen. 3); a fallen creature (Rom. 3:10; 6:23); and in need of redemption. Man is mortal (Rom, 5:12). Only those in Christ will be made immortal by resurrection or by translation (1 Cor. 15:51-53), In death a man is unconscious (Psa. 146:4; 115:17); not a part is alive (Eccl. 9:5, 6). The soul is the man himself (Gen. 2:7); and he is mortal (Ezek. 18:4). The spirit of man is the man's own breath (Job 27:3).

5. RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD. Taught by Christ (Luke 20:37, 38); preached by the apostles (Acts 4:1, 2; 17:13; 26:8). Christ's own resurrection is a guarantee of ours (1 Cor. 15:12-16). There are two separate resurrections. The first resurrection is for those in Christ (1 Thess. 4:13-17). The second resurrection is for the wicked, after the Millennium (Rev. 20:4-6).

6. THE KINGDOM OF GOD. The Kingdom of God is still future (Dan. 2:44); but it is now near (Luke 21:31, 32). Only it is not for us to know (Acts 1:6, 7); it will be in the seeond coming of Christ (Matt. 25:31). It will be set upon the earth (Psa, 72:8; Matt, 5:5; Rev. 5:10); Christ will be its King (Isa. 9: 6, 7; Luke 1:32); and shall reign the thousand years (Rev. 20:4-6). In the Kingdom of God there is a perfect peace, peace among nations (1sa, 2:3, 4); peace between man and beast (Isa, 11:6-9). No more sickness (Isa, 35:3-6; 33:24); and no more death (Rev. 21:4).

7. THE SECOND COMING OF CHRIST. Promised by Christ (John 14:1-5); and by two men (Acts 1:10, 11). He will come lit-

4:16), He will come visibly (Matt. 26:64: Rev. 1:7): and expectedly (1 Thess. 5:2). He will come to establish His Kingdom and reign (Ezek, 21:25-27: Matt. 25:31: 2 Tim. 4:2); to raise the dead (John 5:29, 29; 1 Cor. 15:22, 23; 1 Thess. 4:16); to reward His servants (Heb. 9:28; 1 Pet. 5:4); and to judge the world (2 Tim. 4:1; Jude 14, 15).

8. THE CHURCH OF GOD. The church is a group of people called out of darkness into the marvelous light (1 Pet. 2:9, 10); people taken out for God's name (Acts 15:14); and be called by the name of God (Acts 15:17. 18). Christ kept the church in His Father's name (John 17:12). Christ built the church (Matt. 16:18); began at Jerusalem (Luke 24:47); where the promised of the Father (Luke 24:49) was given in the day of Pentecost (Acts 2). Christ is the Head of the church (Col. 1:18). He purchased it with His own blood (Acts 20:28); and sanctified it (1 Cor. 1:2). It is the church which is in Christ (I Thess. 2:14); and that He will save it (Eph. 5:23). All the saved shall be added to the church (Acts 2:47).

9. GOD'S PLAN OF SALVATION.

1. Faith. Faith is the substance of things hoped for (Heb. 11:1). Faith cometh by hearing the Word of God (Rom. 10:17), Faith in the gospel (Mark 1:15); and in Christ (John 3:16), Faith pleases God (Heb. 11:6). Faith saves us (Acts 16:30, 31); but a faith with works (Jas. 2:14-26).

2. Repentance. Repentance is a command (Acts 17:30). No repentance, no salvation (Luke 13:3). Godly sorrow of our sins worketh repentance (2 Cor. 7:10).

3. Baptism. Baptism is a command (Acts 22:16); for the remission of sins (Acts 2: 38); to put on Christ (Gal. 3:27); to enter us to the Kingdom of God (John 3:1-5); and for our salvation (Mark 16:16). Much water is needed (John 3:23); and by immersion (Rom. 6:1-9; Col. 2:11, 13). Infants are excluded, because haptism needs belief (Mark 16:16); and a repentance (Acts 2:38). Infants cannot believe and repent.

10. TITHING. God owns everything we have, our real estate (Psa. 24:1): our animals (Psa. 50:10); and our money (Hag. 2:8). We should remember God who gives them to us (Dent. 8:18); and use them to honor God (Prov. 3:9, 10); by giving the tenth of them (Mal. 3:10).

If part of this statement of my beliefs have gone beyond the truth. I will be very grateful if you can guide me to it through the Word of God.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

of the Church of God General Conference

As Amended and Adopted, 1961

PREAMBLE

The Church of God General Conference is a not for profit organization, Delegates and interested members of the Church of God will meet at a designated place and time to confer in all matters pertaining to the spiritual life and business of the churches.

ARTICLE I

Time and Place of Conference

Section 1. The general offices of the Church of God General Conference shall be located at Oregon, Illinois.

Section 2. The General Conference shall meet once each year at such time and place as may be determined by the Conference or its Bonrd of Directors, but in no case shall the date be fixed earlier than July 1, or later than August 31. Announcement of the time and place shall be made by the secretary of the Conference at least one month in advance by publication in The Restitution Herald and (or) Progress Journal. The General Conference may be called at such other times as may be necessary, and may convene upon consent of a majority of the member churches.

Section 3. For the purpose of conducting business, the General Conference is incorporated in the State of Illinois under the name of "Church of God General Conference," a corporation not for profit.

ARTICLE II Delegates

Section 1. Each member church of fifteen or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof.

Section 2. A member church is a Church of God which has on record at headquarters a statement of affiliation with the General Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with the licensed ministers of the Conference and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates-at-large and shall have the same powers as the delegates from the churches.

Section 4. An individual member who has attended at least four services, or who has made a financial or service contribution, during the year is considered an active member of his church. These shall be considered as minimum requirements only.

Section 5. A credentials committee shall be appointed by the chairman of the General Conference before every Conference, and the committee shall have the power to confirm or disqualify any delegate according to the terms of this constitution. Any delegation thus disqualified may appeal to the Conference.

Section 6. Each church shall certify to the secretary of the General Conference the names of its delegates or delegate and alternates; this certification shall be accompanied by a list of the names and addresses of the active members to be represented. No delegate will be recognized in any Conference session with

out having been recognized by the credentials committee. If any delegate is absent from any Conference session, an alternate who has been approved by the credentials committee may be appointed to act.

Section 7. Any church which cannot send a delegate or delegates to the annual Conference may appoint a delegate or delegates from the general active membership of the Church of God. However, any delegate appointed under this section shall have only one vote, and under no circumstances can any delegate represent more than one church or state or district conference. A notice must be sent to the secretary of the Church of God General Conference containing a statement of the intentions of the church and the names and addresses of its active members to be represented, at least fifteen days before the Conference convenes.

Section 8. Each delegate shall have one vote.

ARTICLE III

Business Sessions

Section 1. All matters of General Conference business shall be open to the discussion of all members present, but only delegates may vote or introduce motions. All delegates shall be seated in a section of the auditorium reserved for them, and no delegate shall be allowed to vote unless seated in the reserved section.

Section 2. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of twenty-five duly qualified delegates, Robert's Rules of Order shall govern all questions of parliamentary procedure not covered by this Constitution and By-laws.

ARTICLE IV

Officers of the Conference

Section 1. Seven directors shall be elected in General Conference delegate sessions; said directors shall constitute the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. The Board of Directors shall organize by the election of necessary officers at the first meeting following each annual Conference election. These officers shall be a chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer, and three board members.

Section 2. No elected director shall be a paid employee of the Church of God General Conference for a period longer than two months in any one year.

Section 3. The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of church leaders.

Section 4. Nominations for each director shall be by General Conference delegates in session at least one day before the day set for the election, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship.

Section 5. Nominations shall be made from the floor; but voting shall be done by ballot, and no nominee shall be elected unless he receives a majority of the votes east. In case a majority is not received by any nomineo in the first balloting, balloting shall continue after eliminating the name receiving the lowest number of votes, until an election is reached. Each director shall be elected separately.

Section 6. The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for three years. No director shall succeed himself for a second term. Directors shall be elected in this order: three directors the first year, two directors the following year, and two directors the next year, and directors shall be elected in this order hereafter.

Section 7. Any director who may become inactive through sickness, resignation, prolonged absence, or death, shall be replaced for the unexpired term by election at the next annual conference. Temporary appointment of such directors may be made by the Board of Directors.

BY-LAWS OF THE CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

ARTICLE I

Purpose of the Church of God General Conference

Section 1. The purposes for which the Church of God General Conference is incorporated are:

- (A) That evangelistic work be extended to meet the needs of the Church of God everywhere, and to open new fields of missionary activity.
- (B) That publishing facilities be provided under capable editorial supervision for the issuance of all necessary literature.
- (C) That facilities be provided to aid in the education of those desiring to prepare themselves for the ministry or other religious work.
- (D) That a board of benevolences be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise.

Section 2. The Board of Directors and employees shall walk in a manner worthy of the calling wherewith they are called, "with all lowliness and meckness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another [throughout the church] in love; endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." In such oneness of spirit they shall unito in an effort to edify the body of Christ in utilizing the contributed strength of the church to affirm by print and voice the following Biblical truths and kindred truths, viz.:

Statement of Faith


A. GOD. We believe that only one person is God, and that He is a literal (corporent) being—almighty, eternal, immortal, and the Creator of all things.

B. JESUS CHRIST. We believe that Jesus Christ, born of the virgin Mary, is the sinless and only begotten Son of God. He did not personally pre-exist.

C. THE HOLY SPIRIT. We believe that the Holy Spirit is not a person, but is God's divine power and influence manifest in God's mighty works and in the lives of His people.

D. THE BIBLE. We believe that the Bible is the Word of God, given by divine inspiration, and that it is the only authoritative source of doctrine and practice for Christians.

E. MAN. We believe that man was created innocent, but through disobedience to God fell under condemnation of death—the cessation of all life and consciousness. All men.



being both sinful and mortal, are in need of salvation

F. SALVATION. We believe that salvation is by the grace of God, through the atoning blood of Christ, and that it consists of God's forgiveness of sin, the imparting of His Spirit to the believer, and finally the gift of immortality at the resurrection when Christ returns. The steps in the gospel plan of salvation orat.

- 1) Beijef of the gospel of the Kingdom and the things concerning Jesus Christ;
- Sincere repentance for sin, which may be evidenced by confession and restitution:
- Baptism—which is immersion—in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins:
- 4) Growth in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

G. THE CHURCH OF GOD. We believe that the Church of God is the Scriptural name for that body of people who have been called out from among all nations through obedience to the gospel plan of salvation. Christ is the Head of the Church; and the nature, work, and government of the Church are set forth in the New Testament.

11. THE CHRISTIAN LIFE. We believe that the Christian life is primarily a life of consecrated discipleship to Jesus Christ as Lord, Saviour, and Teacher. It will be based on the standards which He taught and exemplified. Thus, it will be characterized by prayerful dependence on God, study of His Word, and faithful stewardship of time and possessions—with tithing as a practical expression of such stewardship. The Church of God will recognize those members who, because of their religious convictions, claim exemption from military service.

I. ISRAEL. We believe that "Israel" is the name of the literal descendants of Abraham through Jacob. As God's chosen nation, Israel was given the land of Palestine, but because of disobedience they were scattered throughout the world. In accordance with God's covenant with them, they will be restored to Palestine as the head of the nations in the Kingdom of God.

J. THE KINGDOM OF GOD. We believe that the Kingdom of God will be established on earth when Christ returns personally and visibly to reign as King in Jerusalem over the whole earth, with the Church as jointheirs with Him. His Millennial reign will be followed by the final judgment and destruction of the wicked, after which will be established "New Heavens and a New Earth" wherein there will be no more death and God will be all in all.

ARTICLE II

Duties of the Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the chairman to call and preside at all meetings of the General Conference and of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference and to perform all other duties properly belonging to the presiding officer, not otherwise provided.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the vice chairman to assist the chairman when called upon to discharge the executive duties, and to act in the chairman's place in ease of the absence or disability of the chairman.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors, to keep a record of the activities and accomplishments of the Conference, to report such minutes and records to the General Conference when requested to do so, and at any other time when called upon by the chairman or board of directors.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the treasurer or of his representative as authorized by the Board of Directors, to receive all monies, to dishurse the same, and to keep an accurate account thereof. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep safely all funds in the possession and control of the Conference, to make a complete annual report of the receipts and dishursements to the annual conference and to the Board of Directors upon request, to submit such reports for publication, and to see that the accounts of the Conference are kept so as to show its financial standing at all times. The treasurer shall furnish surety to the satisfaction of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to transact and administer the business of the Conference in accordance with these by-laws and Article I above. Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at the call of the chairman or at the call of two or more members of the board, notice having been given of the date and place of meeting a reasonable time in advance. Notice by mail, telephone, telegram, by publication in The Restitution Herald and (or) the Progress Journal, or in person, shall be deemed sufficient. The Board of Directors shall have power to devise ways to accomplish the objects of the Conference as set forth in Article I. Section I. above.

Section 6. The Board of Directors is empowered:

- (A) To acquire and hold real property and personal property.
- (B) To sell or otherwise dispose of property.
 - (C) To raise money by subscription,
- (D) To receive gifts, donations, and bequests.
- (E) To receive and hold monies in trust as foundations or endowments, the profits of which shall be used in maintaining the work of the Conference.
- (F) To employ a competent Executive Secretary who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned him.
- (G) To fill temporarily by appointment any elective office that may become vacant through sickness, resignation, prolonged absence, or death of any incumbent, until the next annual conference, when the vacant office shall be filled by regular election.
- (H) To do any other necessary act for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the Church of God General Conference.

Section 7. The work undertaken by the Conference shall be divided into such departments as may be necessary, each department to be provided with its own head, all under the supervision of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Quorum for Doing Business

Section 1. A quorum of the board of directors for transacting of business shall consist of five members.

ARTICLE IV

Financial Policy of the Church of God General Conference

Section 1. The financial policy of the Clurch of God General Conference shall be based upon the principle of giving of tithes and offerings by all members, both churches and individuals. The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference shall be governed in the work undertaken by the unified budget adopted by action of the delegates at the annual General Conference session.

ARTICLE V

Amendment of the Constitution and By-Laws

Section 1. The constitution and by-laws of the Church of God General Conference may be amended, altered, or revised by a two-thirds majority vote of delegates present at any General Conference meeting, notice having been given of the proposed amendment or revision in at least three consecutive issues of The Restitution Herald and (or) the Progress Journal, the first appearance thereof to be at least thirty days prior to the convening of the conference by which it is to be considered. Said notice shall plainly state the nature and purpose of the amendment or revision. Publication in The Restitution Herald and (or) the Progress Journal shall be deemed sufficient notice.

ARTICLE VI

Auditing of the Books of the Conference

Section 1. The chairman shall appoint a competent auditor whose duty shall be to examine the books and other financial records of the treasurer and to make a full report of their condition in writing to the General Conference at its annual meeting, or at such other time or times as may be required. Said auditor shall in no case be a member of the Board of Directors, or an employee of the Church of God General Conference.

As the General Conference moves forward, it depends upon volunteer services of its faithful leaders in many fields, and it thanks all those who give their time and talent in this service.

CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE FINANCIAL PICTURE

September is the last month in the current fiscal year. October 1 will begin a new fiscal year, guided by the new goal for giving which was approved without dissent by the delegates to the 1961 General Conference.

The financial picture at this moment, as we draw to the close of the present fiscal year, is rather cloudy. Last year a goal of \$42,860 in contributions was approved by the Conference delegates. Work was undertaken in conformity with this approved estimate of income and expense. To date, \$33,100,39 of this amount has been received in contributions. This means, of course, that to meet our goal for this year, \$9,759.61 must be received this month.

In view of the fact that the delegates at the 1961 General Conference, faced with even greater opportunities to reach out with the gospel, set a goal for giving of \$50,550 for the year to begin in October. It is necessary that we reach our goal this year so that we will not start the new year with a deficit.

The term "budget" is a cold term—but it means something definite and coacrete to those who work with it. It represents salaries to workers who teach, preach, print, maintain Conference facilities, answer mail, keep hooks, cook meals, write literature, and perform uncounted other services. It represents subsidies to smaller churches, facilities and materials for the training of ministers and teachers, supplies for the printing of literature. It represents funds to maintain missionaries, a bus, and literature for foreign fields. Because we cannot list every use of the funds, we simply speak of "the budget," or the goals for giving.

Your contributions become work, sermons, articles, tracts, books, Heralds, and students when they are used by your General Conference.

We commend you for your faithful giving, and lay before you opportunities to extend your influence to all the world with your gifts.

NEW CONFERENCE NAME

The new Constitution and By-Laws are now in effect and this means that the corporate name of the General Conference has been changed. The name "National Bible Institution" is no longer valid.

All correspondence, checks, legal papers, wills, insurance papers, deeds, etc., should now be made out in the name of "Church of God General Conference." This is now the legal name of the organization, recognized by the Secretary of the State of Illinois, and by the Department of Internal Revenue, Washington, D.C.

The various departments of the Church of God General Conference also have distinguishing names for the purpose of promotion and identity in the bookkeeping system. Name of these is a legal corporation, however, and all are simply divisions of the corporation, which is Church of God General Conference.

The names of the various departments will be used to identify them and separate them in their work. They are: Oregon Bible College; The Restitution Herald (printing and publishing); Berean Youth Fellowship; Department of Missions; and General Services. Cheeks can be made out specifically for one department, but in most cases we would prefer that cheeks be made out to Church of God General Conference, with a special designation of the department, if necessary, on the corner of the cheek.

Letters can be addressed to a specific department (all receive mail at Box 231, Oregon, III.), or simply to Church of God General Conference and they will be assigned the proper department after they are opened, or a line may be added on the address: "Attention: naming the specific department."

While this may seem confusing at the moment, it will simplify the organization in the end. The name Church of God General Conference will become a witness in itself, and let the light of the Church of God shine out, rather than being hidden in its neutral former title.
