

YOUNG PEOPLE MAKE INSPIRING GIFT

The 180 young people at the National Berean Youth Conference in August, gave offerings of \$558.00 from their spending money to help support the work of the Berean Youth Department and missions. These funds were given in freewill offerings at worship services from money that the teen-agers would ordinarily have used for candy, pop, ice cream, and other things from the canteen. As a result of this generous giving the Bereans more than reached their personal goal for giving in the current year, giving nearly \$1,800.00 to the work of the Church of God General Conference.

SYSTEMATIC BIBLE STUDY COURSE

The "Systematic Bible Study Course" is in the process of printing and will soon be ready for distribution. As soon as all printing is finished and the procedures for distribution worked out, notice will be given in the Progress Journal and other publications so that advertising can begin and orders can be placed. This is a large printing undertaking requiring some time to complete.

We thank Srs. Austin, Whitehead, and Marsh for materials of historic interest added recently to the historical archives of the Church of God. BOARD OF DIRECTORS TO MEET

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference plans to meet in Oregon, Ill., on November 8. The dedication of the new Oregon Bible College building is planned for that evening.



NEW BUILDING PROGRESS

Due to several small delays (some missing electrical fixtures, missing heater control knobs, misfit hardware, etc.) we are still not moved into the new College building. It is now hoped that we can move into the dormitory section during the first week of October. The building is being very beautifully finished and furnished and when in use will be an asset to the College and the Church of God.

DEDICATORY SERVICE

A dedicatory service is being planned for Friday evening, November 8, at 7:30 p.m. The service will be held in the basement of the new building which, though unfinished, is the only room large enough to hold the anticipated attendance.

Those who plan to attend the dedication and who wish us to reserve accommodations should write soon to Harold Doan, Box 231, Oregon, Ill. We will be reserving rooms in nearby motels and hotels and private homes.

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN FUNDS

A total of \$155,000.00 in contributions is needed to complete and furnish the new Oregon Bible College Building. Of this amount \$144,239.00 has been received in contributions and commitments. \$10,761.00 is needed in new commitments and contributions to complete payment. (There are sixty commitments, totaling \$8,132.00 on which no payment has as yet been made.)

This is the time for *all* Church of God members who have not yet participated in this important work of faith to help complete this project successfully. Use your General Conference Prayer Calendar to make your contribution or commitment.

SCHOOL BEGINS

Thirty-four new and returning students are enrolled in the first semester of the 1963-64 school year. Of these, thirty are carrying a full load of studies (at least twelve semester hours), and five are part-time students. Of the full-time students, twelve are freshmen, seven are sophomores, six are juniors, and four are seniors. Several prospective students have indicated that they intend to enroll second semester.

A three-day period of orientation opened the school year for all students, September 9-11. Opportunity was given to become acquainted with the College, its staff, its objectives, and its program. Christian emphasis services were held the first two evenings in the College Chapel. Speakers this year were Bros. Kenneth Milne and Harry Goekler. Regular classes began September 12.

MIGRANT WORK

Students and staff members have resumed work among migrant laborers near Rochelle, Ill. Please pray that we may carry on an effective ministry for the Lord to these people.

PRAYER BAND

The College Prayer Band meets every Wednesday morning before classes to intercede before the Lord for those who have sent in requests for prayer. Brethren and friends everywhere are invited to send in their prayer requests. The Prayer Band, sponsored by the Christian Service Committee, is made up of students and staff members who volunteer this time for prayer because they believe God answers prayer and because they desire to be of help to others. STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

We are glad to report that all of our students have been able to secure outside employment this year, for which we thank the Lord. The employment situation is much improved over last year, and we pray that it may continue so. We are grateful for their dedication in carrying a full load of college studies in addition to their employment, as well as fulfilling various Christian service assignments. MEXICO

The above photo was taken on the Mexican border as Bro. Dean Moore and his family entered Mexico on September 9 to begin the first missionary work of the Church of God General Conference in the country of Mexico. The photo shows Sr. Moore and one of their two daughters with their vehicle and trailer before the customs office. They are now located and their present address is General Delivery, Saltillo, Coahuila, Mexico. They have begun to make contacts and will soon begin a further study of the Spanish language to be better equipped to spread the precious Word of God to the people in the area of Saltillo. A number of people who have been contacted as migrant workers in the Blanchard, Mich., area live near here and it is the hope that they will form a nucleus for the first Church of God in Mexico.

THE BLESSINGS OF GOD

Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero arrived from the Philippine Islands on August 1. For some time we had looked forward to the time when we could all meet this brother who has done such wonderful work as leader of the Church of God mission work in the Philippine Islands. In the fifty days that he was in our midst he traveled some 12,000 miles in the United States and Canada, spoke thirty-three times at twenty-six churches, General Conference, National Berean Youth Camp, and Oregon Bible College Chapel, and personally met untold numbers of people.

I am sure he was a real blessing to all who met him or heard him speak, and we trust that his visit here may be of some help in his future work with the people in the Philippine Islands. A radio work is now being started

and other plans for expanding the work are being laid.

Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence of the Tempe, Ariz., Church of God have completed their world tour and have brought back much helpful information regarding the contacts that have been previously made by mail in England, South Africa, India, and others. They also visited the mission work in the Philippine Islands. When their full report has been made and a meeting had with them, it will be very helpful in planning future expansion of the mission work around the world.

Mr. Don Bilton of the South Africa group recently visited the United States and spent two days in Oregon visiting Oregon Bible College, General Conference offices, and meeting with the General Conference staff.

The building of the Lighthouse Mission Church of God at Digby, Nova Scotia, is nearing completion and plans are being made to expand the work there with extension Sunday school work in a new area.

Many fine results are being reported from the "Each One Reach (at least) One" program. The delegates to the General Conference session in August voted to continue this fine program for another year.

A responsibility card was enclosed with each delegate folder and many churches are now urging their membership to use these cards. We have a supply of these "My Responsibility" cards on hand and they will be distributed without charge upon request to Mission Department, Box 231, Oregon, Ill.

CENTRAL HIGH PLAINS CONFERENCE

The 77th annual meeting of the Central High Plains Conference (formerly the Western Nebraska Conference) opened August 18, 1963, with Sunday school, followed by a sermon by Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero. That same afternoon Bro. Ortiguero spoke of the work in the Philippines to an interested audience. Unfortunately, a heavy rain the night before made it impossible for many people to get out.

Sunday evening the sermon was delivered by Bro. E. E. Graham of the Denver church, as was the sermon on Monday morning.

During the week, Monday through Saturday, there was an adult class under the leadership of Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick, pastor of the Holbrook church, where the conference met; and a young people's class under the leadership of Bro. Clyde Long, pastor of the Arkansas City, Kans., Church of God. During the week these two pastors alternated in preaching at the 11:00 a.m., and 8:00 p.m. services.

On the last Sunday of the conference, August 25, Bro. Kirkpatrick delivered his farewell sermon to the Holbrook church and to the conference. In the afternoon the final sermon of the conference was delivered by Bro. Roy Graham.

At the conference business meeting in the afternoon of Thursday, August 22, Sr. May Todd was elected vice president for a three-year term, replacing Bro. Gordon Cross whose term expired. Sr. Ruey Lathrop was elected to a three-year term as secretary, replacing Sr. Judith Kirkpatrick,

It was decided to continue for another year the \$15.00 per menth that was being sent to the General Conference for the Philippine work.

On a trial basis for this year, the conference started an Oregon Bible College Scholarship of \$25.00 in memory of Bro. Grover Gordon. It was hoped that this scholarship would be made a permanent thing. It was, if possible, to be restricted to a student from the Central High Plains Conference studying for the ministry. If there were no ministerial student, then it might be given to another

not studying for the ministry, but who must be from the conference churches.

Feeling that the conference, using conference pastors, was a success this year, the new conference board, at a meeting on Sunday morning, decided to use local conference pastors for the 1964 conference. After discussing the need for evangelistic work with Bro. Roy Graham, and hearing of his desire to do that kind of work, the conference went on record as backing his efforts, which were not then to be his efforts, but work done for the Central High Plains Conference. He spoke of two or three places where evangelistic effort might be put forth and still be near enough to Denver for him to work.

The Holbrook pastor and family were surprised on Friday night of the conference with a going-away party. On the table were signs suggestive of Holbrook and Oregon. Between the signs was a car pulling a U-Haul. Beside the U-Haul and the car were pipe-cleaner figures with the picture of each member of the Kirkpatrick family. In the U-Haul was a quantity of that "nice green folding stuff" which, beore the family left, had increased to \$75.65.

It was felt by all that this was one of our better conferences. We did set new figures over the 10-year span we have been keeping them—both high and low—but we had one of the most even service-by-service attendances over that span of time.

Bro. Ortiguero spoke before a full house. The meeting was well received; people came from Broadmoor, New Hope, and Oak Grove churches, and from Pleasant Plains, Royal, and near Muskogee, Oklahoma. In behalf of the Broadmoor Church, may I express our thanks to Bro. Ortiguero for his visit to our state and our area, and for his stimulating address; to Bro. Pearson our sincere appreciation for his good work as "navigator" for the visitor, and his valuable contribution to the meeting. Our thanks, also, to Bro. Roy Humphreys who presided.

NEW CHURCH BUILDING Eden Valley, Minnesota

The accompanying photo is an exterior view of the new church building recently completed by the Church of God at Eden Valley, Minn.

The building was constructed on a half block of land north of the old church, purchased by the congregation in April, 1962, and provides adequate off-street parking.

The plans and contract for the construction of the present building on this site were approved by the congregation at a meeting on August 29, 1962. After formal groundbreaking ceremonies, work on the building started in September. Construction of the framework started on October 20 with the erection of the laminated wooden beams in the sanctuary portion. A dry open fall and early winter permitted the crection and closing in of the building without the loss of a working day because of weather. Work on the interior continued throughout the winter, with the first service in the new building being held the week before Easter this year. The finishing of the exterior was accomplished in late spring and early summer.

Formal dedicatory services for the new facilities were held at 2 p.m. June 30, 1963, with Pastor C. E. Randall of Omaha, Neb., as guest speaker. Members of the sister churches in Minnesota and people from Illi-nois and California helped fill the house for this joyous occasion. Open house was held following the dedication so that our friends and neighbors could view the new facilities.

The prime contract for the building was for \$38,970.00 with Larson Bros. Lumber Co. of Atwater, Minn., and included plumbing, heating, and wiring. The finished price was about \$46,000.00 including furniture, fixtures,

decorating, and yard work.

'The building of a little over 5,000 square feet of floor space is of frame construction in an "L" shape creeted on a concrete slab. The exterior is redwood board and batten with limestone planter and front. The sanc-tuary features an open ceiling with laminated wooden beams, and knotty cedar roof deeking. The lights are on rheostat for effective control of lighting during the services. With the overflow area, the seating capacity is about 250. There are separate rooms for the ten Sunday school classes, plus a church office, a pastor's study, and a modern kitchen. The sanctuary is not used for classes. A large social room provides adequate space for the social life of the church.

This new building provides much-needed facilities for the worship, study, and social activities of this active congregation. One of the nicest plants in our brotherhood, it is a

real credit to the churches of the General Conference of the Church of God. May God be glorified through it, as His Word is proclaimed therein, and as people are brought into correct relationship with Him, as a result of giving heed to His Word.



OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE OBJECTIVES

To succeed, any person or organization must have an object or plan in view. Not many years ago the faculty of Oregon Bible College saw the need to formulate such a plan. After much study and prayer, a set of objectives was formulated and adopted by our General Conference. It is not our purpose here to explain all of them, but to give an idea as to what the object of the College is.

The first object set forth was: "To lead a student to a thorough knowledge of the Bible, the inspired Word of God, and to a correct understanding and acceptance of the doctrines of the Church of God." Since this College is for the training of ministers of the Church of God, it is necessary that the teachings of the church be given a prominent place in our curriculum. The staff is aware of the danger of our day in letting slip those things that are important to us as a people. Each teacher is dedicated to the teaching of those truths as outlined in our doctrinal statement.

Another area important to the welfare of the student is his development spiritually. In order to lead any person or congregation to a life dedicated to God, one must first be a partaker of the fruit himself. The means used for the development of spirituality are: chapel services, where the deeper life in Christ is presented, and days of prayer, when a time is set aside for fellowship in the Lord by prayer and meditation. Each morning the chapel is open for private prayer before classes start. Devotions are also held in each dormitory. The aim is to put the Kingdom of God first.

The second objective is to train the student in Christian service activities. It is necessary to have the opportunity to put into practice what has been learned in the classroom. Christian service, to be effective, must be supervised. This we have been trying to do. Some of the students have the opportunity to work with one of our pastors in a near-by church. This gives them the opportunity to lead song services, help in baptisms, and in the serving of Communion. Gospel teams also give the students opportunity to go to other churches outside Oregon and help in other states in special services. Radio and television in Rockford have provided some with the opportunity to use their talents in presenting the Word of God

Another objective is to guide and cultivate habits of sound scholarship characterized by a spirit of inquiry and research and by creative thinking. It is not our purpose to tear down what has been built by the forefathers of the church, but to expand the truth that has been entrusted to us.

The aim of Oregon Bible College is to produce well-trained, well-grounded men and women to carry on the work of preaching the gospel of the Kingdom of God in all the world. We ask you to pray with us that these objectives may be carried out in each and every student who attends the College.


THE SOCIAL COMMITTEE



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THE "LITTLE COMMISSION"

By Edgar Harvey, National Sunday School Department

MUCH has been written and said about Christ's Great Commission. Too often what I have chosen to call His "little commission" has been ignored. There are many different phases of the Great Commission and actually the "little commission" is one of these. I sometimes wonder if the glamour and excitement of far-off places do not have much to do with our interest in foreign missions; while the drab, monotonous day-by-day or week-by-week type of mission is slighted.

It is fascinating, especially if we do not have to do the actual work, to consider the foreign fields. How many of us, however, are willing to contribute time and effort for local work? How many are willing to spend hours of study to properly prepare for teaching Sunday school or Berean classes? This is something into which we can put our whole heart and soul. This is something we can do in carrying out Christ's "little commission."

Yes, "go ye into all the world and preach the gospel" includes participation in our Sunday school, but many find it easier to contribute their money than their time. However, the "little commission" given by Christ when He rebuked His followers, saying, "Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not," is just as binding upon us today. You may protest that you have not stood in the way of preaching to the children, that your church doors are always open, and that your Sunday school services are adequately advertized. If you have not personally prepared yourself and offered your services to teach those of your community who have shown an interest by accepting the hospitality of your church, then you have personally failed to obey the "little commission" and, by lessening the number of dedicated workers, have withheld from those about you the opportunity for salvation that has so freely been given you.

If you have failed to provide facilities for, or have failed to invite the children to hear from your own lips those Bible stories that should be a part of every child's heritage, then you have not fulfilled the "little commission" no matter what you have contributed for foreign fields or paid your minister. No one can do your work for you! Tithing of your income is only part of the matter, for God demands personal sacrifice.

The Sunday school is the best opportunity you have for serving personally, and it is wholly dependent upon such service. There is no other branch of service that can be started as easily. There is no more economical method of spreading God's Word. There is no other department that can become self-supporting in as short a time. There is no other branch that deals with young adaptable minds so directly or has more appeal for the young. It is a training school for lay members, a recruiting service for the church, and can easily become the nucleus about which a new church can grow.

Yet, with all these advantages, it is often the least organized and least effective department of our church. It is time that we realize the potential of the Sunday school and take proper advantage of it.

We are pleased to learn that the Indiana State Conference has inaugurated a campaign to organize new Sunday schools in the state. They visualize every isolated member as a potential new Sunday school.

When the early church was driven out of Jerusalem and scattered throughout the known world, people went everywhere preaching the gospel. They did not light as dead ash, but as glowing sparks in their new environment, and soon the Middle East was ablaze with Christianity.

For a period of almost two years we were located in a distant city with none of our churches near enough to attend, and we fully realize the problems of the isolated member. Like many others, we bemoaned the lack of opportunity to meet with others of "like precious faith" and only now do we realize that we should have accepted the opportunity presented to pioneer in a new missionary field.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE LIBRARY

During the latter part of October and the first part of November, the Oregon Bible College library journeyed to its new location in the new men's dormitory. Here, in a welllighted room and on new bookcases, the library is gradually being changed from a conglomeration of books into a well-organized, useful room of books. Up to this fall, all books had been classified under two alphabetical systems-one of authors and the other of titles. Now we are slowly classifying all books under a single alphabetical system based on the Dewey Decimal System. This procedure, when completed, will have all books classified by author, title, and by subject. To make sure this is done correctly, we are purchasing for each book sets of cards from the Library of Congress. Since this gives proper classification numbers, our first task is to erase the old numbers, then coat the spine of the book with plastic, letter on the proper classification number, record the book on assession sheets, correct or place new card pockets and charge-out cards in the books, file the eards for each book, and finally place the book in its proper position on the shelf.

To date, we have completed the processing of approximately 450 of our 3,000 or so books. We are hoping that by the end of the school year we will have approximately half of the books classified.

One of the problems that we face in doing this classification work is the fact that Library of Congress eards are expensive, averaging something like 30 cents or more for each book. Our second problem is that it requires something like thirty to forty-five minutes to classify a single book.

There are several persons throughout the country who have the College library very much at heart and who are constantly sending us books to increase the size and usefulness of our library. All such books are gratefully received.

We have reserved certain shelves in the library on which we place the books which are sent in as specific memorials to individu-



General Conference Progress

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

Forty-two ministers and thirty Oregon Bible College students enjoyed a profitable Ministerial Conference in Oregon, January 27-31. The meetings were held in the new Oregon Bible College building, with evening services in the Oregon Church of God.

BOARD AND COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The Church of God General Conference Board of Directors met in Oregon, Ill., January 31 to discuss the work of the Conference and take necessary actions regarding the work.... The Board of Education also met in Oregon on January 27 to consider matters regarding Oregon Bible College.... The committee considering a retirement program for ministers met in Elmhurst, Ill., January 27 to begin work on setting up such a program.

NEW TRACTS

A new tract in Spanish by Bro. Timothy Pearson, "A Simple Message" (Un Mensaje Sencillo), is now ready for distribution. The tract will be used by Bro. Dean Moore and others working in Spanish-speaking countries. (20 cents per doz., \$1.00 per hundred, postage paid.)

The tract, "An Introduction to the Church of God," is also now ready for distribution. It is designed to be used in calling campaigns or other efforts to acquaint people with some brief facts concerning the history, government, and beliefs of the Church of God. (40 cents per doz., \$2.50 per hundred, postage paid.) This tract replaces the former booklet on the history, etc., of the Church of God.

SYSTEMATIC BIBLE STUDY COURSE

The new Systematic Study Course (see back page) is ready for distribution for use by churches and individuals in booklet form and lesson leaflet form. We are not quite ready to begin the free home Bible study distribution advertising, but should be shortly.

Several pastors plan to use the lessons for midweek study, giving each person a leaflet to study for the next week. Others plan to distribute the lessons with bulletins, in tract racks, or in connection with sermons. The leaflets are also excellent to give to a person who asks what the Church of God believes on any of the points covered by the lessons.


CALENDARS

MEXICO

The picture shows a group of people gathered together in a little village near Saltillo, Mexico, where Bro. Dean Moore has stopped to talk and hand out tracts. These people are usually willing to accept materials, and seem willing to hear about the Bible of which they have heard and seen little.

In a recent letter from Bro. Moore, he says, "We are enjoying our work more all the time as we become better acquainted and more prepared to go ahead. I just wish I knew the language well right now so that I could spend all my time working with these people." Bro. and Sr. Moore spend some portion of every day in study of the Spanish language.

PHILIPPINES

The Philippine Conference has now purchased a jeep for Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero to use to travel from place to place. The plans to begin radio work in the northern Luzon area have been delayed until better air time is available.

It is the plan now to work toward developing the present churches into stronger congregations and to evangelize the areas near the present churches. Plans are also under way for their annual Philippine Conference which is usually held in early April.

INDIA

The work of Bro. S. S. Manoah in and near Bangalore, South India, is now a mission field of the Church of God General Conference since support to this work was started in January, 1964. Bro. Manoah's report of his work

in the month of December shows an average attendance of 130 in the main meeting place, and an average of 23 and 115 in the other two places where services are held each Sunday.

An open-air service is held in the market place about once each month, and on December 15, 1963, there were 130 present for this service. Bro. Manoah also reports two converts for the month of December. They were women of the ages of twenty-five and thirty, but he neglected to give their names.

His letter closes with these words, "My best Christian wishes and New Year greetings to all of you; and please remember the Lord's work here in your prayers and we also do the same for you."

LOCAL PROJECTS

The Guthrie Grove, S. C., Ladies Circle has been gathering yard goods and have sent them to the Philippine Islands to be used for garments.

The Tempe, Ariz., church is planning to send a copy of *Systematic Theology* to a public library in each country in the world where the English language can be read. So far, books have been sent to Scotland, Ethiopia, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Netherlands, Turkey, Germany, New Zealand, Ireland, Switzerland, and Japan.

The Ambassador's Class of the Eden Valley, Minn., Sunday school is sponsoring a Mexican supper on February 23, to emphasize our mission work in Mexico.

The Mission Club of Oregon Bible College has recently sent *Systematic Theology* to several college libraries, and have held buzz-session discussion groups on how the students can better serve in a mission capacity. The club has also contributed to the purchase of equipment for the Philippine Islands brethren.

Sunday School Progress

Sunday School Department, Church of God General Conference

Following is a portion of a presentation by Pastor Raymond Brown at the Sunday School Day, 1963 General Conference.

IDEAS FOR THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

By Pastor Raymond Brown, Hillisburg, Indiana

AT THE 1963 Midwinter Ministerial Conference one of our ministers stated, "Give us the tools; place them in our hands that we may work." With this thought in mind, we wish to present some ideas that could possibly work in your congregation. The first is entitled, "Strive for Goals" contest.

A church in Tuscon, Ariz., started with a Sunday school attendance of 99, and in eight weeks the attendance was 212. Here is the way the contest worked:

"At a teachers' meeting, each teacher accepted a class goal which was based on enrollment. This goal remained the same throughout the eight weeks, except for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, when it was raised to present an extra challenge. Goals were realistic, but high enough to cause the classes to work.

"A picture was taken of each teacher and these pictures were mounted on a large bulletin board. By his picture, the teacher's name was placed; below was the name of the class, with the goal on one side and a place for the day's attendance on the other side. If the teacher did not reach his goal, he was given a red face by placing red cellophane on the picture!

"Each week of the special emphasis the teacher with the highest increase was honored as 'Teacher of the Week.' The teacher who received this honor the most number of times during the contest was presented with a prize. Slogan for the drive was, 'As the class goes, so goes the school.'

"On Palm Sunday and Easter the pastor and the Sunday school superintendent were to receive red faces if the school did not reach its goal. Happily, there was no need for the red cellophane.

"'One class that started the contest with three as an average climbed to an even dozen, and more after the contest ended,' reported the pastor. Absenteeism decreased sharply in all the classes. The boys and girls loved the contest. Each Sunday they rushed to the board to see how their class had done—and to see whether their teacher had a red face. It was felt that the special emphasis had lasting effects on the Sunday school."—Church School Builder.

Baby of the Week Campaign: the purpose is to enroll parents and children in Sunday school.

- 1. Launch the drive March 1. Introduce Cradle Roll visitors. Present plan and materials. Enlist the help of all.
- 2. Enroll as many new Cradle Roll members as possible during the five weeks—March 1 through April 5—minimum of one baby each week.
- 3. Get parents to bring the new Cradle Roll member to church on a Sunday morning during the five weeks.
- 4. Photograph the new Cradle Roll member. Mount picture on a Cradle Roll Certificate.
- 5. Display the certificate on the church bulletin board the Sunday the parents and baby attend church.
- 6. During the service recognize the new Cradle Roll member present as the "Baby of the Week," and present the certificate to the parents.
- 7. Close the campaign on April 5 with a baby dedicatory service. Include old and new Cradle Roll members.
- 8. Following the campaign, attempt to get all Cradle Roll families to attend Sunday school on April 12.

The second semester officially began January 27, 1964, but classes were not held that week to enable students to attend Ministerial Conference. Classes began February 3. During the first week of classes, Bro. Timothy Pearson, pastor of Hope Chapel Church of God, conducted a seminar for all students on pastoral visitation. Each evening of that week he was also speaker in a series of Christian Emphasis services in the College chapel.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE DEPARTMENT

By V. E. Kirkpatrick, Director

The Christian Service Department of Oregon Bible College directs that work in which students acquire some practical experience in various types of Christian service that will benefit both the church and the student.

This year, looking forward to the possibility of giving some college credit in the future, certain changes have been made in the procedure of students going out, and in the follow-up work of the students. To begin with, it was felt that before a student went out into Christian service work he should have some preparatory background. In line with this, no freshmen were sent out under Christian service, though, if they wanted to work in one of the churches and the church could use them, it was permitted. During the first year, students acquire some musical knowledge in the choir and music courses, and in the teaching courses get some understanding of how to teach.

During the sophomore year, the students are sent out on their first Christian service assignments. Forms are sent to the co-operating churches—Dixon, East Oregon, Flagg Center, Oregon, and Rockford—asking if they can use students; for what service they could use them; and who their choice might be, if any, among individual students. At the same time, forms are given to eligible students, asking what type of Christian service they might like to do and what their preference might be as to the particular church in which they would like to work. As much as possible, then, we match church desires with student preferences.

Work being done by the students in the various churches includes: song leaders, Sunday school teachers, Berean or youth leaders, vocal work, and instrumental work.

Every Monday morning during the first semester, each student turned in to Bro. Kenneth Milne, who assisted in this work, a form sheet listing the actual Christian service work done during the past week. This included

services attended (morning and evening), Sunday school, Bible study, Berean meetings, etc., as well as a report of Bibles, tracts, *Restitution Heralds*, and other literature distributed, persons contacted, hospital visitations, etc.

It was our feeling that by the time students become seniors, especially men who are planning on entering the ministry, they need more practical experience than that of the regular service work. In line with this, early in the semester we wrote to a number of our churches which were without pastors, asking if they might be interested in our seniors as student pastors for one or more services each month. The response to this was beyond our expectation. In no time we had all of our senior men out on pastoral assignments—Jack Hearp to Morning Star church in South Bend, Arlen Rankin to the St. Louis church, and Robin Hayse to the church in Hedrick. Later on, a junior—Kent Ross—was hired as the assistant pastor of the Flagg Center church.

In December we were contacted by the president of the Illinois State Conference in regard to using students to help in a new work that was being planned in New Lenox, near Joliet. Final choice for the work here was Roger Denchfield and Robert Murphy. These two sophomores make a weekly trip to this new area, alternating preaching and teaching. At present we are being asked to make arrangements for a young lady to make this trip weekly also to serve as a song leader for this new little congregation.

One of the opportunities which has been much appreciated, although it required missing part of one and sometimes part of two classes, was the conducting of devotional services at Pinecrest Manor, a home for senior citizens located in Mt. Morris and operated by the Brethren church. At three different times since September we have furnished students (and sometimes teachers) to be there at 8:15 a.m. to conduct fifteen minutes of devotions for the people there. Each of these times we have had a full two weeks of devotions (each morning, except Sunday of each week). We have been asked to furnish a student to conduct devotions there each morning during the week of Ministerial Conference. The people attending these services have expressed their great appreciation for the work of these students.

The College is grateful for all opportunities made available to our students for various kinds of Christian service, for we realize that, much as students may learn from classes here, it requires practical work and experience to fully develop the individual into "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."



Because of distance, work schedules, and other reasons, about one half of the total number of Church of God ministers were not able to be in attendance at the Conference.

In the hands of the ministry rests the responsibility of the temporal leadership of the Church of God. Paul's admonition to the elders at Ephesus still applies to the shepherds of the flock. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the Church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood" (Acts 20:28).

There is an increasing need for more men who will give their lives to the ministry. There are many small flocks with no shepherd. Sacrifice and devotion are required of one who would thus serve, but the compensations are also great.

General Conference Progress

NEW TRACT

A new tract, "Your Introduction to the Church of God," has been prepared and is ready for distribution. The eight-page tract (40c per doz., \$2.50 per hundred, postage paid) is designed to be given to people who are unacquainted with the Church of God.

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN

Annual statements have been mailed to check records on commitments to the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign. The goal for completion of payments on the new building is September, 1965. We trust that most commitments will have been paid by that time, and that new gifts and commitments will make up the small amount still needed to complete this program of expansion for Oregon Bible College. (Note figures below.)

NEW STAFF MEMBER

Bro. Paul Shaw has been employed full time beginning June 1, 1964, as Youth Director, Superintendent of the Sunday School Department, and teacher at Oregon Bible College. Bro. Shaw has been serving part time as Youth Director and teacher the past year.

This step will fulfill part of the decisions made at General Conference last year that a full-time Youth Director and Superintendent of the Sunday School Department be employed.

STAFF TRAVELS

S. O. Ross, Superintendent of Missions of the General Conference, visited in Michigan, with services at the Blanchard Church on Tuesday, February 25; at Pennellwood Church in Grand Rapids on Wednesday, February 26, where the evening began with a pot-luck supper in the church basement; and at the Southlawn Church on Thursday, February 27. At each of these places he showed the slides of the Lawrences' trip and spoke on the mission work.

Bro. Ross is also scheduled to appear at the Nebraska churches in March.

Bro. Doan has conducted several services recently in Monroe Center, Wis.; Casey, Ill.; and L'Anse, Mich.; he will be conducting special services in Eden Valley, Minn.; and taking part in dedicatory services in Dixon, Ill., and Omaha, Neb., in the near future.

Bro. Paul Johnson and Bro. Ross have been supervising

a new Sunday school and church work at New Lenox, Ill. . . . Bro. Paul Shaw has conducted services at Fredericktown, Mo., and will travel extensively with the Oregon Bible College choir this spring. . . . Bro. William Wachtel carries on pastoral work at the Chicago Church of God.

Conference staff members, in addition to their office duties, spend much time in the field, especially with new home mission work.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The third annual Philippine Conference will meet in Solano April 6-10, 1964.

The San Nicolas Church is now raising money to purchase a lot for a future church building site. Some of the other Philippine churches are helping in this project.

Bro. Eleodoro Javar is now the regular pastor of the San Nicolas church. He was formerly working in the Mindanao area prior to the persecutions there. The group is meeting in a schoolhouse.

MEXICO

Meetings are held each week in the Cadena home near Saltillo. Bro. Dean Moore states in his January report, "In these meetings I have been explaining and emphasizing the fundamental doctrines of our church, and they seem to be glad to learn more from the Bible. We are grateful for the prayers and financial support of the people at home. We will try to do our best in the work that

lies ahead. God has surely been with us in many ways."

Bro. and Sr. Moore had contemplated moving to a house with less rent and the owner then let them stay on at about half the former rental price. Bro. Moore says, "We have much for which to be thankful, and pray that God will bless our brethren at home as He has blessed us here."

PRAYER

A missionary laboring in a tropical country had had more than the usual difficulties learning the language; one setback after another befell him; death took first his little daughter and then his wife. Finally ill health beset him and his mission board sent him home sooner than his friends back home had expected.

He arrived in his home town on prayer meeting night and hastened to the little church for services. The prayer meeting had already begun and he waited in the doorway as one member after another offered his prayer without one mention of the missionary or his mission field. Finally the pastor closed the session with a short prayer and not once did he mention the missionary.

The missionary then stepped into the room and the church members were surprised and delighted to see him. After the first excitement at the appearance of their member, the pastor asked him to say a few words, and this is what he said:

"When I left four years ago, all of you promised to stand with me in prayer. In the light of your promise I could not understand why I had such difficulty in getting the language; I could not understand why I lost first our darling daughter and then my wife; I could not understand why I should return home almost completely broken in health. But since I came to the door of your prayer room tonight and waited all through the prayer session to hear my name mentioned, and did not hear it spoken even once, I now understand. You failed to pray."

Let us not be guilty of failing to pray for our missionaries, for our work in general, and for God's guidance in our Chrisian service.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

SECOND SEMESTER BEGINS

The second semester of the 1963-64 school year got under way officially with registration on January 27. The first week of the new semester was devoted to the annual Church of God Ministerial Conference, and classes were dismissed to enable students and staff to attend the sessions.

Classes began Monday, February 3. The following courses are being taught this semester. Bro. Vivian Kirkpatrick's courses are Old Testament II (Job through Song of Solomon), Pastoral Work II, English II, Psychology II, and Medieval History (taught by correspondence). Bro. Paul Shaw's courses are Music Fundamentals and Directing II, Teaching II, and Choir. Bro. William Wachtel's courses are Hermeneutics (the science and art of Bible interpretation), Expository Preaching, Greek II, and Spanish II. Bro. Harold Doan is teaching Introduction to Doctrine, a required freshman course. Bro. Kenneth Milne teaches an evening course called Modern Cults—covering the distinctive beliefs of several groups, such as Mormons, Jehovah's Witnesses, Christian Scientists, and others, with the Church of God answer to their doctrines.

Bro. Timothy Pearson, pastor of Hope Chapel Church of God, South Bend, Ind., was with us during the first week of classes to present a seminar on pastoral counseling. He spoke each morning during the chapel period and also each evening in a special service. He taught the Pastoral Work class that week and was available to students and staff for personal counseling. Everyone seemed to appreciate the help Bro. Pearson gave us. Further seminars of this type are planned for the future, Lord willing.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT

The student enrollment for second semester totals 27 full-time and part-time students. Twenty students are carrying twelve or more semester hours of work (twelve hours is the minimum for a full-time load). Seven students are carrying fewer than twelve hours. One new student enrolled second semester. Several students who had enrolled at the beginning of the first semester dropped out of school during the semester or at the end of the semester.

Several prospective students for next fall have already sent in their application for admission, and we understand that others plan to do so soon. Those considering coming this fall are urged to contact us early. Please write to William M. Wachtel, President. The prayers of the brotherhood at large are earnestly requested, that the Lord

may send us those young people whom He would prepare for His service. Also, please send us the names and addresses and ages of any young people you think we should contact. Your help is very important!

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETS

During the Midwinter Ministerial Conference, the Oregon Bible College Board of Education met several times to discuss the work, needs, problems, and promotion of the College. Chairman of the Board is Bro. C. E. Randall, pastor of the Omaha Church of God. Many valuable suggestions came under consideration, as providing guidance in matters of College policy and procedure.

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

Every year at the beginning of the second semester several scholarships are awarded to students who have demonstrated academic excellence, outstanding Christian character, worthy leadership, and other qualities. These are tuition scholarships worth \$100.00 each—the cost of one semester's tuition. The S. E. Magaw Scholarship, provided by the Oregon Bible College Alumni Association, was awarded to Darrell Rankin, a freshman. The Oregon Bible College Boosters' Scholarship was given to Kent Ross, a junior. The Norman McLeod Scholarship. provided by the Southwest Conference, went to Harold Routson, a sophomore. The S. J. Lindsay Scholarship, also provided by the Southwest Conference, was awarded to Alice Aldrich, a sophomore. The James A. Patrick Scholarship, provided by the Ohio Conference, was awarded to Elaine Magaw, a freshman. The F. L. Austin Scholarship, provided by the Oregon Church of God, was modified this year to become the F. L. Austin College Library Memorial, in the amount of \$50.00 each semester to purchase books in Bro. Austin's memory for the College library. Several other students are receiving scholarship assistance from local churches, state conferences, individual members, and the Berean Youth Fellowship.

GROPS OF STUDENTS VISIT

Groups of high school students with their sponsors will visit Oregon Bible College the first two Fridays in March. The groups are from the Dayton, Ohio, and Pennellwood (Grand Rapids, Mich.) churches. Visiting classes and touring the buildings, they will receive a fore-taste of college life.

After several years being bedfast, Sr. Belle LeCrone, Fremont, Neb., yielded to the enemy, death, on January 22, 1964. Death came as a release from an existence described by Solomon as the time when one shall say of his days, "I have no pleasure in them." Up to the time of her death, her faith served as a daily blessing. Her loyalty to the church will serve as an example to her relatives and friends. Services were conducted by the writer in Fremont, after which she was laid to rest in resurrection hope in the cemetery over-looking the little town of Kennard, where she first found her faith in the Church of God.

She left three children: Richard, pastor of the church in Fredericktown, Mo.; Lucille Appleby, Fremont, who is also a minister of the church, and Leslie of Omaha.

What God Expects of the Teacher of Children

Importance of Teaching Children

AT NO time in a lifetime are the senses as keen or the memory as clear as during childhood. By the age of *three*, parents have done more than half of what they will ever do to influence their child's life. Since the adult life is wholly built upon the foundation of childhood, it surely is the Christian obligation of teachers of children to give much study to the calling.

Israel, under God's direction, placed much importance on the teaching of children. In no other denomination today does the religious training of children take a higher place than in God's chosen race.

Christ magnified child life by saying of them, "Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not" (Mark 10:14). He further cautioned us, "Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones" (Matt. 18:10).

Long before Christ, God said through Solomon, "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Prov. 22:6).

With these facts confronting us, can any deny that the teaching of children is a most vital part of the work of the church and worthy of much time and study and effort? I believe that one reason the Church of God has not grown more numerically and spiritually is that we have not given enough attention to the teaching and training of our children.

1. Determining Goals

A. Our primary goal in teaching and training our children is to bring them eventually to salvation.

To paraphrase a well-known scripture, we must "press [them] toward the mark for the prize of the high calling

of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:14). We must present the time of their conversion and baptism as a time to be worked toward and yearned for "when you are old enough." The teacher of the adolescent or teen-ager does not accomplish this alone. The junior teacher helps, as do the primary and beginner teachers. The cradle roll teacher plants the first seed. Some "plant," others "water," and God will "give the increase." (See 1 Cor. 3:6.)

B. Another goal, subordinate to the first, is to help our children to acquire knowledge of God, His Word, and all it contains. A child is born with a capacity for knowledge. This capacity will be filled. John Quincy Adams said, "So great is my veneration for the Bible that the earlier my children begin to read it the more confident will be my hope that they will prove useful citizens of their country and respectable members of society." Since we want even more for our children than to be useful and respectable citizens—the "more" being for them to become citizens of God's Kingdom—let us fill them with the knowledge of the Word of God.

C. A third goal is to help children to learn to love and worship God. Bro. Alva Huffer, in Systematic Theology, states that God created man with an inborn ability and instinct to believe in and worship a supreme being. The human heart, said Augustine, finds no rest "until it rests in God." We must direct this natural instinct toward the one true God.

BEIRUT, LEBANON

Over the past several months Oregon Bible College and the Mission Department have carried on considerable correspondence with Jamal Sunna'a of Beirut, Lebanon. Formerly a pastor of another denomination, this man has by his own study come to accept the doctrines taught and believed by the Church of God. His first interest was to come to Oregon Bible College for more education and preparation in our teachings.

He is now holding meetings with a group in Beirut and has had as many as twenty-eight adults and fifty children at one service. He is presently taking a correspondence course from Oregon Bible College and is being granted a small amount of assistance as we study with him and further investigate the possibilities of working with him in this area. He has a wife and five children, and appears to be a zealous worker for the Lord.

MEXICO

A missionary of a large denomination who returned from Mexico made this remark recently: "One of the great opportunities for evangelism in this century lies across the border in Mexico. Everywhere there is a growing sense of the need of God. The gospel must be carried to Mexico now. Children must be saved now. Churches must be built now. Evangelism must be carried out now, before the tides of communism turn the people's attention away from God."

How fortunate that we do now have our foot in the door! How glad that we do have workers in Mexico. Bro. Dean Moore and his family came to the states a few days early in March to renew their alien permits and to pick up materials and clothing that had been sent to Bro. Leon Driskill at Harlingen, Texas. Bro. Moore reports that he now has sufficient clothing to fill the needs until late summer, when they will be returning to the United States again.

The language study of the Moore family is progressing well. They find it is becoming much easier to speak of the things of God in the Spanish language. The weekly meetings continue in the Cadena home, with twelve in attendance.

INDIA

The February report of Bro. S. S. Manoah in India shows an average attendance of 151 in the main meeting place, with a high of 180 on February 23, 1964. A film entitled "Christ's Life Ministry on the Earth" attracted 285, and an open-air service in the market place drew 150 listeners. The harvest truly is great. Are we sending forth sufficient laborers into that harvest?

Bro. Manoah has translated the tracts "A B C's of Salvation" and "An Invitation" into the local dialect and has printed one thousand copies of each. This is another means of taking the gospel of Christ to many people in India.

BOARD DECISIONS REGARDING THE COLLEGE

Because of rising costs, the General Conference Board of Directors has adopted a price increase for board and room. Beginning with next September, students will be charged \$325.00 per semester for board and room—an increase of \$25.00 over the present cost. Tuition will remain the same—\$100.00 per semester. The cost of an education at Oregon Bible College is still much lower than that at most other schools, thanks to the support it receives through the General Conference.

The Board also decided that, effective this year, the dormitories will not be open to student occupancy during summer vacations.

The month of May has been set aside as Oregon Bible College Booster Month, and May 17 will be Booster Day. Every year Church of God members and friends through-

out the General Conference churches have joined together to boost the College by their prayers, interest, and a special contribution for the College. THE COLLEGE LIBRARY

We are happy to report the purchase of two sets of books which we feel will be invaluable to our students: The Jewish Encyclopedia (12 vols.) and The Catholic Encyclopedia (16 vols.). These are both used sets, so the cost to us was much lower than that of new sets. (These hard-to-find sets were secured with the help of Sr. Idona Romine, San Diego, Calif.) When finances permit, we hope to purchase two sets by Spurgeon: The Treasury of David (3 vols. on the Psalms, \$24.75 list price); and Treasury of the Bible (4 vols. on the Old Testament and 4 on the New, \$49.50 list).

A complete count of the books in the library has just been made. We have 910 books and sets now classified (each set is listed as a single volume). In addition, we have 2565 unclassified volumes (again, sets are counted as single volumes). To classify these unclassified books is the big job which lies ahead in fully preparing the library to do its most effective work. However, the classifying work is almost at a standstill at the present time because of lack of funds to complete the purchasing of Library of Congress catalog cards. It will take an estimated \$800.00 to complete this phase of the work alone.

We are grateful to the brotherhood for the interest that is taken in the College library, as evidenced by the constant flow of new and used books coming in. We will be happy to see the time when the library is filled to capacity—about 7500 volumes, with the addition of a few more bookshelves.

NEXT SEMESTER'S CURRICULUM

The curriculum for next semester will include the following courses: Preaching Ib and IIIb, Public Speaking I, Systematic Theology I, New Testament III, Old Testament Survey, Child Psychology, Ancient History I, Teaching I, Hymnology, Choir, Biblical Introduction, Bible Geography, World Literature, and New Testament Greek III. Plans are going forward for the continual expansion and improvement of our curriculum.

WHAT GOD EXPECTS OF THE TEACHER OF CHILDREN

D. The last goal, still leading toward the first, is to train our children to live God's way. All the knowledge of the Bible they might acquire would be worth little if they do not learn to live by it.

Perhaps here is a good place to insert a word about the vacation Bible school books. We were asked about our goals in planning the books. They are as stated here, though we may fall short of them. First, our intent is to teach the children "truth." We feel we must constantly be on guard to combat all the false doctrines that are taught. Our second goal is to give modern application that the children may learn to live and act and grow in accordance with God's will and way.

2. How to Attain These Goals

A. The teacher's first concern must be with her own life as an example of Christianity to the child. The best way for a child to learn to fear God is to know a real Christian. The child's religion is a reflection of the religion he finds around him.

Children are imitators. Here is a little story to illustrate this fact. A father started for his office early one morning after a light snowfall. Turning, he saw his two-year-old boy endeavoring to place his tiny feet in his own great footprints. The little fellow shouted, "Go on! I'se comin', I'se comin', Papa, yite in yer tracks." He caught the boy in his arms, carried him to his mother, then started again to his office. It had been his habit to stop on the way at a saloon for a glass of liquor. As he stood on the threshold that morning, he seemed to hear a sweet voice calling, "Go on! I'se comin', I'se comin', Papa, yite in yer tracks." He stopped and looked the future squarely in the face and turned on toward his office.

The personality of the teacher, says Clarence Benson, author of "An Introduction to Child Study," is a more powerful factor than the knowledge provided in the average Sunday school. The teacher's personality will have far greater weight with the child than any number of lessons. Many converts could say, "First I learned to love my teacher; then I learned to love my teacher's Bible; then I learned to love my teacher's Saviour."

Jesus said it best: "Let your light so shine before men [and children], that they may see your good works, and glorify your father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16).

As an example, the teacher must know God's Word. A shallow knowledge will soon show. However, one must not hesitate to say, "I don't know, but I'll study it and tell you next Sunday." One cannot, of course, know it all, but a thorough command of the current lesson is not only possible but mandatory.

The teacher's actions both in and out of the classroom must show that she practices what she preaches. Actions speak louder than words. It must not be said of her (or him), "Your actions speak so loud that I can't hear what you say." The children are observing the teacher at all times and, as has been said, imitating.

Be a praying teacher. Pray for yourself as a teacher and for each child. Let your reliance on prayer show.

B. The teacher of children must have an honest love for them. This is one reason the best teachers of children are usually women. A woman has a stronger natural love and empathy for children. Some, to be true, have much more of this gift than others, and it is certainly to be desired that our children can be taught by these women who have a God-given love and understanding for all children.

Sad to say, a growing number of children find little love at home. King Khama said, "You English [and he could have said Americans] take great care of your goods, but throw away your children." This is the truth of many homes today. What a blessing to these children is the Sunday school teacher who compassionately loves these "little ones."

Consider love, then, a primary requisite for the successful Sunday school teacher.

C. Subject them to Bible teaching by every available means. Clarence Benson states that the child is a "believer." Perhaps Jesus had this fact in mind when He said, "Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein" (Mark 10:15). Jesus indicated that a child would receive and believe more readily the Kingdom message.

From the earliest hours, a child begins to gather information. While still a baby, he can recognize by the careful way it is treated, that the Bible is a special Book. He can also recognize very early in life that the contents of the Bible are very special. Paul said of Timothy, "From a child thou has known the holy scriptures" (2 Tim. 3:15). A vital part of religious education consists in storing the mind with facts concerning God and His Word. Build up in the mind of the child a great store of Bible stories, memory verses, and information about the Bible.

Both Jews and Catholics reputedly recognize the need for daily instruction in the Scriptures. God's way goes even further. Consider this from Deuteronomy 6:7, "Thou shalt teach them [God's commandments] diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down and when thou risest up." It is tragic how we, as Christian parents, fail to measure up to this standard.

As Sunday school teachers we have the children less than one hour out of the week. (Clarence Benson suggests that the time should be extended to one and one-half hours!) Let us fill our Sunday school time full of God's Word.

D. Train them how to live, love, and worship. Many children have been told; some have been taught; few have been trained. A child is born with a capacity to know God and an instinct to worship Him. However, this instinct must be developed. Information may provide knowledge, but the development of the emotions creates appreciation and devotion. Devotion results in godly behavior.

Relate every Bible lesson to the child's life and actions. Adam disobeyed; result, punishment. Abraham believed God and was blessed. Children must understand that they will also be punished or blessed in relation to their reaction to God and His commandments.

Demonstrate how to react to ill treatment by your own good-tempered (yet firm) reaction to their bad behavior. This is training. Jesus trained His disciples by living with them. Spend additional time with your Sunday school pupils. A teacher who can enter most completely into their lives is the one they will most likely regard as their ideal.

Teach them to pray and praise, beginning with repeated prayers, sentence prayers, and simple songs of praise to God. To be led to the Christian life, children must be taught not only to know God but to revere, respect, and love first Him, and then others.

E. Maintain discipline. If children are disciplined properly in early years by parents and teachers, society will not find it necessary to do so in later years. Begin discipline with yourself and the classroom. Someone said, "Order is heaven's first law." God said through Paul, "Let all things be done decently and in order" (1 Cor. 14:40). Order is as contagious as disorder; you cannot have order without discipline. The word "discipline" literally means disciple-ing or training in orderliness. If we are to make boys and girls disciples of Christ, order and discipline must be the first requisite.

3. Expect Results

The question is asked, Do we expect too much from our Sunday school children, or not enough? My opinion is, not enough! Children are wells waiting to be filled, sprouts ready to be trained, talents straining to be developed. They will be filled, trained, developed. Let it not be the wrong way. It is up to us to "press" them toward the "mark for the prize of the high calling."

When shall we begin? A woman once asked a great religious educator, "How early can I begin the religious training of my child?" "Madam," he replied, "when will your child be born?" "Born," she gasped, "why he's already five years old!" "My goodness, woman," he cried, "don't stand here talking to me! Hurry home; you've already lost the best five years!"

So expect great progress while they are yet impressionable children. They will reward your expectations.

Dale Carnegie gives applicable advice in his book "How to Win Friends and Influence People." He says, "Be hearty in your approbation and lavish in your praise." Children are people. They are anxious to please and will respond amazingly to praise.

Do we expect too much? No! Expect no less than to bring each child step by step to salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord.

As a church group, we are indeed grateful for our spiritual blessings and extend a cordial welcome to anyone passing through to attend our services,







Purpose and Objectives

Oregon Bible College was established for the purpose of preparing Christian young men and women to carry out the "Great Commission" of Christ to preach and teach the gospel in "all the world" (Mark 16:15, 16; Matt. 28:19, 20). This evangelistic and missionary purpose has guided the school since its beginning. Almost all of our graduates are engaged in Christian service, most of them in the full-time ministry. Other students have attended Oregon Bible College for a year or two in order to gain a strong Christian foundation before entering other fields.

In order to fulfill effectively the purpose for which Oregon Bible College exists, five specific objectives have been adopted to guide the staff and students toward achieving this purpose. The first of these is "to lead the student to a thorough knowledge of the Bible, the inspired Word of God, and to correct understanding and acceptance of the doctrines of the Church of God." This objective involves the three elements of knowledge, understanding, and loyalty.

The second objective of Oregon Bible College is "to assist the student to become a spiritually mature Christian in character and personality." Effective Christian service can be rendered only by those whose lives are Christlike. Carnality and worldliness are deadly to Christian testimony.

Our third objective is "to develop skills necessary for successful Christian service with emphasis upon ability to communicate one's thoughts clearly and effectively." The fourth is "to direct knowledge, understanding, and skills by means of practical Christian service opportunities." Our fifth objective is "to cultivate habits of sound scholarship characterized by a spirit of inquiry and research and by creative thinking."

All of these objectives work together to help make Oregon Bible College a school which the Lord can use in carrying out His great purpose in this age. Pray for Oregon Bible College! Send us dedicated young people! Be co-laborers with us in fulfilling the Great Commission!

"Let Us Worship"

"O come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker" (Psa. 95: 6). "O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness: fear before him all the earth" (Psa. 96:9).

Many times throughout the Bible we are commanded to worship God. When God gave the Ten Commandments to Moses, the first commandment was that no other gods were to be put before God. They were to worship God only. In the above verses the Psalmist saw the need for worshiping God, and he exhorted all to worship Him. Christ knew the importance of worshiping God. When He was tempted by Satan, one of His answers to Satan was, "Get thee hence, Satan: for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve" (Matt. 4:10). As we know, God is the only one whom Jesus served and worshiped while He was here on earth.

We here at Oregon Bible College set aside time from our studies and daily activities for the worship of God. Each morning before classes begin, quiet time is observed in the chapel for approximately fifteen minutes. Students who desire to do so may begin their day by talking with God and asking His guidance and blessing for the day's activities.

Regular chapel services are conducted on Monday and Friday of each week. Students have charge of the services, serving as organists, pianists, song leaders, and providing special numbers. At various times some of our students also give the morning message, thus gaining practical experience for later work in the field.

Several times during the semester, a day is set aside completely free from studies, just for the purpose of prayer and worshiping our Creator. Other worship activities of the College include monthly services at two local rest homes and regular Christian service assignments.

"All the earth shall worship thee, and shall sing unto thee; they shall sing to thy name" (Psa. 66:4).

Study to Be Approved

Courses of study at Oregon Bible College have been tailored to prepare the student to meet the challenge of our Lord and Saviour as He bade us: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). In order to complete this great work before the second advent of Jesus the Christ, one must "study to shew thyself approved unto God" (2 Tim. 2:15), thereby "increasing in the knowledge of God" (Col. 1:10). The Christian may expect to become more proficient in the doctrine and gospel of truth by diligent, systematic study as taught at Oregon Bible College.

The courses offered at Oregon Bible College may be divided into two categories: theological and secular. The number of hours devoted to theological and secular study

are about equally divided.

Since the door has been opened to work in the Mexican mission field, many have shown enthusiasm for learning the Spanish language. This provides a nucleus for possible expansion for preaching the gospel to the Spanish-speaking society, such as the domestic migratory ministry.

The theological study includes Preaching, Old Testament History, Daniel and Revelation, Pastoral Work, Biblical Introduction, Old and New Testament Seminar, Typology and Hermeneutics, Introduction to Doctrine, and Modern Cults. Preaching and pastoral work classes are limited to junior and senior students. The scope of the preaching class study involves theory and its application to sermon formulation and the critical evaluation of the sermons preached by the student. As a muscle is strengthened by work, even so the skill and technique of preaching is perfected by the Holy Spirit as the student flexes the Word of the Sword.

The study of Old Testament History is a survey of the Pentateuch, the historic and poetic books from Genesis through the Song of Solomon. The pastoral work course introduces the student pastor to counseling, ethics, personal calling, the proper method of conducting special services, and the pastor's proper interaction with the church departments. In our Biblical introduction class we have studied the basis for Bible authority, canonicity, genuineness, and authenticity. We also learned about the adverse channels of development of the written Word and how many men followed in the steps of Jesus by giving their lives so that we might have God's Word in our language. Typology and Hermeneutics is an empirical approach to a just interpretation of the oracles of God. This study helps us to be conscious of the fallibility and allegories of man by employing certain guiding principles to safeguard the Bible student from these pitfalls. The Modern Cults course acquaints the student with the doctrinal beliefs of many theological groups in existence to-



day, Scriptural disproof, and how we may Scripturally cope with these various heretical issues.

This well-rounded theological and secular curriculum certainly is a means of preparing the person who dedicates himself (herself) to the Lord's Word. It is a means of "rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15).

Life in the Dormitory

"Here Am I; Send Me"

"We are ambassadors for Christ," Paul tells us in 2 Corinthians 5:20. An ambassador is an appointed messenger. One of the last things Christ told His disciples to do was, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you . . ." (Matt. 28: 19, 20). That makes each one of us an ambassador for Christ. Notice the steps that we must take as His ambassadors. First, we must go. This instruction of ours, in turn, will then enable them to go out and do likewise - teaching others what they have learned.

The purpose of the Oregon Bible College Mission Club is threefold: 1) to promote missions and build up missionary zeal within Oregon Bible College and the Church of God; 2) to prepare ourselves to be ready and willing to say, when the opportunity arises, "Here am I; send me"; and 3) to use what we have learned in Christian service activities.

Our main project in fulfilling this purpose this year has been the erection of a sign advertising the College at one of the entrances of Oregon. We also feel that much can be accomplished through the distribution of the written word, and we have distributed tracts and *Systematic Theology* books. Other projects include taking charge of one chapel service per month and sending \$5.00 to Jamal Sunna'a in Lebanon.

We feel that spreading the gospel is the most important task that we have been given to do, and we pray that the Lord will continue to guide us that we may be good "ambassadors for Christ."

"Serve the Lord"

Oregon Bible College through its Christian Service Department this year has furnished students to several churches, including Oregon, East Oregon, Flagg Center, Dixon, and Rockford. They served in various capacities.

In addition to this work our senior men went out into the field to serve as student pastors at Hedrick, Indiana; South Bend, Indiana; and St. Louis, Missouri; going to these churches twice a month. A junior has been serving as associate pastor at Flagg Center, Illinois. Beginning in December, a sophomore was placed in charge of a new work at New Lenox, Illinois.

Some changes were made in the Christian Service Program this year in preparation for further changes for next school year. Freshmen were not sent out (though we were short of workers to send out, and some went out on assignment the second semester, for we felt they needed the teaching preparation before they went out. Sophomores, then, was the lowest class to be sent out into the work, as it is planned for another year. Juniors and seniors who go out will be under more specific supervision, and for another year will receive College credit for their work.

It is our plan, also, to continue to send out the seniors and, if we need to, the juniors in student pastoral work, feeling that this is much-needed preparation.

In addition to such regular work, the Christian Service Department has furnished students to take charge of devotions at Pinecrest Manor, a home for senior citizens at Mount Morris, Illinois, a number of times during the year. Each served for a two- or a three-week period.

As part of the Christian Service work, students made trips to Grand Rapids, Michigan; Ripley and Macomb, Illinois; Minnesota; and Moorefield, Nebraska, to furnish special music, short talks, and sermons.

All in all, we feel that it has been a profitable year of student service for the Lord, and we are looking forward to another year of expanding service.


The Service Committee is set up to be of service both to and for the College. It carries on the duty of arranging the chapel services for the College each Monday and Friday. Calendars are also one of the projects of the committee, and a Prayer Band, which is one of its bigger weekly services. This service is held every Wednesday morning before classes begin. The group bands together in intercessory prayer for those who have needs, both spiritually and physically.

The Student Voice, our monthly College newspaper has been published regularly this year. The circulation is now in excess of 600 copies. We have been very pleased with the favorable reader response received.


A very ambitious undertaking was the approval to publish *Maranatha*, a College annual this year. Thanks to a hard-working staff, this has been accomplished.

STAFF TRAVELS



NOVA SCOTIA

The Nova Scotia brethren had an Easter sunrise service and a breakfast with about forty in attendance. Later in the morning the regular worship service was held. This was a new event, as previously the Sunday school service was in the afternoon, and the regular worship service in the evening.

The regular schedule of services now is Sunday school at 10:00 a.m., worship at 11:00 a.m., and evangelistic services at 7:30 p.m. each Sunday. Devotional meetings are held each Thursday evening (with Communion observed at this service once each month), and Berean Youth Fellowship each Saturday evening.

Bro. John Denchfield had a broken rib, which prevented him from driving the bus for a few weeks, so the attendance was down some. The average for the first three months was about fifty for Sunday school and slightly less for church.

The building has progressed rather slowly during the winter, but more work will be done on it with better weather. The local group has finished paying for the furnace and can now concentrate on other projects.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Three women were recently baptized into Christ by Bro. Insturo Magno at the Abut church. They were Mrs. Juanita Herrera, Mrs. Estenely Herrera, and Mrs. Adelina Cardama. The annual Philippine Conference was held April 27 to May 1, 1964. This is nearly a month later than other years, due to the schools being dismissed at a later date than previously.

MEXICO

The March report of Bro. Dean Moore in Mexico tells of Sr. Moore being ill, but getting better at his writing. They are making good progress on the language study and their meetings with the people there are progressing.

We quote the closing paragraphs of Bro. Moore's report. "We feel very optimistic and enthusiastic about the prospects of teaching the Word of God to the many needy families who are anxious to learn more of the truth. Most

of the people that I talk with concerning the gospel are wanting to learn more. We definitely are accepted by the people, and we should be able to do a lot of good when we are fully prepared.

"I hope that God will call other workers into this field in the years to come, in order that we might make the most of the opportunity that is open to us. Now is the time to teach the Word of God in Mexico, because the country is in a state of transition and many are seeking the truth concerning God. We are grateful for the privilege of being in a position to minister to these people, and sincerely thank all of our brethren at home for making this possible."

INDIA

On March 1, 1964, a children's sing-song service was held, with 230 in attendance. Mr. and Mrs. Jayamma David were baptized into Christ by Bro. S. S. Manoah on Easter Sunday afternoon at Tata Lake. The average attendance for the morning service during the month of March was nearly 200.

GLEANINGS FROM SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS

By Jean Doan

Last fall we conducted a series of teacher training classes at the Oregon Church of God. We used as our basis for study, "Teaching Techniques for Sunday School," which is published by the Evangelical Teacher Training Association, 1825 College Ave., Wheaton, Ill. Eighteen teachers met with us for five lesson sessions to see if they might improve their teaching techniques, learn to better understand their class age group, and truly be great examples as teachers of God's Word.

There was so much to learn from our study book that we could not begin to write it here, but we would like to print a few thoughts from the teachers themselves as gleaned from their "homework papers."

The Purpose of Sunday School Teaching

The purpose of Sunday school teaching is to help lead the child to God through Jesus Christ.

We are allotted only a short period of time each week, and we are assigned a subject. I approach each subject with 2 Timothy 3:16 in mind: "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." I try to decide into what category the scripture best fits, and bring it to the children in a down-to-earth, practical method. Learning Bible facts will never convert a child—learning how the Bible should mold and affect his life can and will bring him to the Lord.

I believe the first purpose of Sunday school teaching is to win others to Christ. Above this is the opportunity to guide and lead others to be teachers and missionaries. This makes our opportunity unlimited in the number we might reach in this way. This should be our ultimate purpose in teaching.

What Is a Teacher?

A teacher is a person who not only presents, but implants her belief, thought, and knowledge to her student. A teacher must enjoy her students and understand each individual. She must enjoy and believe what she is teaching. A teacher's education is not finished when she starts to teach. She learns something from each lesson she prepares. A teacher must not carry her emotions or her troubles to her class, but be cheerful and understanding at all times. I believe a teacher should have variety in presenting and conducting lessons. What appeals to one stu-

dent may not appeal to another. Do everything possible to make each child want to come to class.

I gained a wonderful experience in a year of working with an experienced teacher. When she left me, I felt like I had lost my crutch and had to learn to stand by myself.

In taking inventory of my qualifications to teach, I find I like children. I like to tell stories. I hope to learn how to turn the incidents of ordinary classroom happenings into teaching and learning experiences. I want to make the Bible both alive and interesting to the children, and the Sunday school period one they will enjoy.

What Is the Purpose of Sunday School Teaching?

The purpose of a Sunday school is to teach the Bible, and in so doing to mold and shape by example and word, that those being taught will desire to give their lives to the Master. In some cases a teacher is teaching a class where the children are too young to take this step, but a child is never too young, nor an adult too old to be loved and understood by his teacher, and to be taught the Word of God. When a person feels he is a part of the Sunday school, he will continue to study and learn until such time as he will feel a need for baptism. In so doing, he will give his life and his all, and in turn want to help others.

The Sunday school teacher who has made a definite impression on me was a teacher of a young adult class. There was never a doubt in our minds that she was a genuine Christian. We knew she was interested in each one of us, and tried to help us in every way, in and out of class. We knew she loved her Bible. She was an enthusiastic Christian, and she made being a Christian something to be earnestly desired, and a goal to be attained.

The idea of keeping a notebook for teaching ideas, illustrations, etc., is very good, I believe. I have found the value of doing so by experience. If one just observes closely the things with which he comes into contact each day, he will have a wealth of material that can be filed and used when needed.

One thing I have noticed in teaching is the effectiveness of the personal experience. This shows that the teacher has actually felt what he is saying, and strengthens the thought he is emphasizing.

The teacher must always be looking for any materials that he might possibly be able to use later in teaching. By building a collection of things, he will be able to go to his files and find helps when the need arises.

DECADE OF DEVELOPMENT

This year marks the end of the Decade of Development Program which was begun in September, 1954. At the General Conference meetings, August 1954, goals were adopted for every department of the Church of God General Conference. Those goals looked ahead to 1964 and envisioned progress in missions, Oregon Bible College, the Sunday school department, the Berean Fellowship, printing and publishing, and the financing of all phases of the Church of God work. While some of the goals now appear to have been overly optimistic, and some changes were made in organization which changed other goals, it is gratifying to review and discover how many of the objectives established a decade ago have now been reached and surpassed.

We have fallen short of the home mission goals of 10,000 active Church of God members; 125 active, organized churches; 115 active pastors; 150 Sunday schools; and 100 Berean groups. There are 95 active churches, 77 of which are member churches in the Church of God General Conference. There are 99 Sunday schools. There are 77 pastors in regular pastorates. There is a total church membership of approximately 5700 people.

In the field of mission work outside the United States, goals established a decade ago were: one foreign mission field opened and staffed by 1964; an organized Missionary Society with a regular allotment from the General Conference budget; established standards for selection of missionary candidates; and encouragement of missionary candidates to prepare for foreign mission work. In the past ten years, missions have been opened and staffed in India, the Philippines, Nova Scotia, and Mexico. The Mission Department is a vital part of the General Conference organization and receives a substantial portion of the annual contributed funds. The goals in this department have been surpassed, due to the great blessing of the Lord and the zealous efforts of many missionary-minded members of the Church of God.

Goals established for Oregon Bible College included: a total of 160 students enrolled in Oregon Bible College during the decade (at least one student from each church during each four-year term); a teaching staff of five instructors; extension of the correspondence study department; and expansion of student housing facilities. The total number of students enrolled during the decade was 146. The number of instructors has been averaging two or three full-time and two or three part-time, depending on

the size of the student body. The number of correspondence courses offered has been increased and several students have completed these courses during the decade. During the Decade of Development, the Golden Rule Home was incorporated into the College and became the Dormitory for Women. The new men's dormitory, cafeteria, library building has also been completed and is in use.

The Sunday School Department has been reorganized and some changes made in its association with the General Conference during the Decade of Development. It has reached many of the goals established a decade ago and is on the threshold of new advancements now. There have been several changes in Truth Seeker's Quarterlies and in Vacation Bible School books during the decade that have improved these helps for teachers. It has maintained training films and books which have been in constant use. It has conducted an annual Sunday school workers' program in connection with the annual General Conference, and has encouraged state and district organizations to have workers' conferences in various states. Nearly every Church of God Sunday school now uses all or almost all Church of God literature in its teaching programs. A Superintendent of the Sunday School Department has now been employed (Bro. Paul Shaw) and will be leading this department into new areas of progress in the months ahead.

The General Berean Youth Fellowship (known as the National Berean Society a decade ago) has also experienced several changes that have helped it to reach many of the goals established a decade ago. Nearly every active, organized church now has a Berean Youth Fellowship co-operating in the general youth program. A Berean Youth Leader's Handbook has been published quarterly since 1955, giving help and lesson materials to Berean Youth Leaders; Challenge magazine, the Berean Youth Leaders' News, the national quiz contests, and the national speech contest have been inaugurated since 1954. Prior to 1954, annual youth camps had been conducted, reaching a top enrollment in 1954 of 106. The conference has almost doubled in enrollments during the decade. A National Youth Director, Bro. Paul Shaw, now heads this department.

In the field of printing and publishing several goals have been reached. The book "Systematic Theology" has had two printings, and the Systematic Bible Study Course based upon it is now in general circulation. The hymnal "Songs of Truth" has been revised and reprinted. A tract

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list has been established and maintained covering most (though not all) of the topics listed in 1954. A series of Bible digest books anticipated in 1954 was begun, but did not receive the general acceptance expected and it is being discontinued. We have fallen short of our goal of 4000 subscribers to The Restitution Herald by 1964. There are now 2000 paid subscriptions. Church of God Progress Journal was begun during the decade and has served a vital function in news and general information concerning the Church of God.

In the field of church buildings the goals were: 20 new Church of God buildings by 1964; every Church of God building made adequate for its needs; a parsonage in every active field; a church loan fund in operation; and a permanent committee to counsel with churches about plans for building, financing, etc. Since 1954, 22 new church buildings have been built and several others have had extensive remodeling. Eleven of these buildings were built with the help of the Mission Builders League, which was started during the decade. Many new parsonages have been bought or built, but several churches still do not own a parsonage. There is no loan fund in operation, though the Mission Builders League (not anticipated in 1954) has in some ways taken its place. A permanent committee was formed, but requests for its services were so few that it has not functioned for several years. Building plans and help in building have been available through the Mission Builders League, however.


In the general field of finances, it is safe to say that we have not reached the goal embraced in the slogan "All Tithe by Sixty-Five." In the first year of the Decade of Development Program, contributions to the Church of God General Conference totaled \$29,497.00. Last year, 1963, total contributions to the Church of God General Conference were \$103,434.00 (including Mission Builder and Silver Anniversary Building Campaign contributions). Contributions to the general operating costs of the General

Conference have doubled in the decade. We believe that giving to local churches and to state conferences has also increased during this period, as evidenced by new and improved buildings and better living conditions for many pastors.

In reviewing the past and analyzing the progress made and the weakness shown, it is our opinion that those areas of work of the Church of God that need the greatest prayer and attention at this time are: 1) personal witnessing to reach new lives that may be brought into the saving name of Jesus Christ and membership in the Church of God; 2) the establishment of new Sunday schools and churches: 3) greater use of the printed word; 4) more encouragement to young men to enroll in Oregon Bible College with the view of entering the ministry of the Church of God; 5) greater effort toward establishing better salaries, parsonages, and provision for retirement for ministers of the Church of God; 6) provision of more assistance to teachers and other leaders as to methods and sources of information for fulfilling their responsibilities; and 7) stronger leadership on the part of the ministry in the realm of instilling love for essential doctrine, holiness, and dedicated service in the hearts of the membership.

LOOKING AHEAD

At the General Conference in 1964, delegates will be given opportunity to plan ahead with the General Conference Board of Directors. With the completion of the Decade of Development Program, we will look together at the years ahead (should the Lord tarry) to establish general guidelines for the work of the General Conference. Delegates should be prepared to think ahead and suggest ways in which they feel progress can be achieved in the work of the Lord. A program will be suggested by the Board of Directors as a starting point for discussion. Pray for direction and for the Lord to bless as we look ahead!

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

(The report and recommendations were approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting May 8, 1964. The report and recommendations are presented in this form that delegates may have the opportunity to study them and receive instructions from those whom they represent, to be prepared to act upon the recommendations at the General Conference business meetings, August 2-7, 1964, at Camp Alexander Mack.)

The following report and recommendations cover the various departments of the Church of God General Conference. The departmental reports are in the order in which they will be discussed at the General Conference business meetings. Although only eight months of the current fiscal year have passed at the time of the printing of this report, many signs indicate that this has been a year blessed of the Lord. We praise Him for the good which has been accomplished and for progress made.

Bercan Youth Department

During the past year the Berean Youth Department published *Challenge* magazine, Youth Leader's Handbooks quarterly, and Youth Leader's Newsletters monthly. Work in this department is being expanded as Bro. Paul Shaw begins his work.

The Berean quizzing program has had another successful year. Quizzing this year was based on the first ten chapters of Acts. This program is providing valuable incentive to Bible reading for all who participate. Bro. Edward Houser will serve as the quizmaster for the contest finals which will be held at the 1964 General Berean Youth Conference.

Another contest which will culminate at the Berean Youth Conference is the Christian Speech Contest. This contest, which was begun this year, is intended to develop and take advantage of the abilities of our young people in the field of Christian communication. Bro. E. Milon Hall will be in charge of the finals for this contest. Other citations and awards will be presented at the Berean Awards Banquet to be held at the Berean Youth Conference.

The Berean Youth Conference held last year at Camp Alexander Mack was the largest in history and we believe the best. One hundred eighty-six campers and twenty-three adult staff members were in attendance. Thirteen different states and Canada were represented. We look forward to an even larger and richer Youth Conference this year immediately following the General Conference. A staff of twenty-six adult leaders is planned for this conference.

The National Advisory Council, elected each year at the Berean Youth Conference, and the conference sessions held there daily, bring forth valuable ideas from the young people themselves concerning their program and needs. The young people have taken on the project of contributing enough each year to cover the expenses of the Berean Youth Department. During last year's Youth Conference sessions, they set a goal for giving of \$1,700.00 for this fiscal year.

One of the means devised for reaching their goal this year was the "Coins-for-Christ Crusade." This Crusade was highly successful, with thirty-five different Berean groups participating. The goal for this project was \$400.00, and \$497.31 was received. Plans are under way to make this an annual project of the Berean Youth Fellowship.

Preliminary work has been done in writing a constitution, which will be presented at the Youth Conference this summer by the National Advisory Council. If adopted by the young people, the constitution will provide for the yearly chartering of Berean Fellowships, the setting up of standards of membership, a delegate system of representation and voting in the conference sessions, and a meeting of the Advisory Council during the winter.


The Mission Dollar Club has had its most successful year this year. This club is composed of all those young people who are willing to give at least \$1.00 per month for twelve months toward the work of the Berean Youth Fellowship. This club has eighty-four members this year.

A new program of adult training was begun this year by the Berean Youth Department. In the fall of 1963, a Youth Leaders Training Conference was held at Burr Oak, Ind., for the youth leaders in Indiana, southern Michigan, northern Illinois, and Ohio. Approximately fifty youth leaders were in attendance at this conference. In the spring, 1964, another Youth Leaders Conference was held at Fredericktown, Mo., for youth workers in Missouri, southern Illinois, and Arkansas. Both training conferences were very successful, and it is hoped that other training conferences can be held in other areas in the near future.

Another new venture instituted during the year was the observance of Youth Sunday on February 23, 1964. Many of the churches turned the entire day's services over to the young people, and the reports that have been received indicate that many inspiring services were held.

Printing and Publishing

This department has been very active in publishing and printing literature for the Churches of God. Equipment and printing procedures are being improved as new techniques become available to us. The printing staff strives to keep abreast of new developments and, as funds are



available and volume of printing justifies, new equipment is added to improve the quality and economy of our printed products. The printing department prints all the literature used by the General Conference, except the "Songs

of Truth" hymnal.

General distribution figures are: The Restitution Herald (2,000 per issue); Church of God Progress Journal (3,000 per issue); Truth Seeker's Quarterlies (7,200 quarterlies per quarter); Vacation Bible School books (3,000 per year); Challenge (1,000 per issue); Berean Youth Leader's News (200 per issue); seventy-five different tracts are kept in stock; the twenty-nine-lesson Systematic Bible Study Course is now in circulation in several forms; the books, "Systematic Theology" and "One God: God of the Ages," have wide circulation; the hymnal "Songs of Truth" is being well received; and, in addition, the printing department supplies all letterheads, envelopes, calling cards, promotional letters and posters and bulletins, and special mailings for the other departments, at cost of materials.

This important department of the Church of God General Conference is self-supporting through sales of literature and commercial printing. In spite of the "loss" on some literature because of low volume of sales or free distribution, the "loss" is made up through other sales. Improvements in equipment have been made through wills

and bequests and gain from sales.

We would strongly encourage: 1) that every Church of God family subscribe to *The Restitution Herald*; 2) that the free Systematic Bible Study Course and other literature of the Conference be widely distributed and advertised; 3) that the ministry of the printed word be included in every Church of God outreach program.

Oregon Bible College

This is the Silver Anniversary year for Oregon Bible College. Re-established in 1939 by the foresight and faith of men and women then in position of leadership, Oregon Bible College has faithfully served the needs of the Church of God. Most of the present ministers of the Church of God had all or part of their education for the ministry in Oregon Bible College. Many other leaders now serving as superintendents, teachers, youth directors, church officers, musicians, and in other positions received valuable Christian education in Oregon Bible College.

The College has grown in many ways. Its staff has increased from one full-time and one part-time teacher and a house mother to the present excellent staff. From a rent-ed house and one classroom in the upstairs of the old Restitution Herald building to its present facilities has been a long forward step. The College program has been expanded from a three-year to a four-year course of study; and the curriculum has been standardized and stabilized.

The Silver Anniversary year has been memorialized with the erection and dedication of the fine new dormitory-library-cafeteria building now in use and proving to be a great asset to Oregon Bible College. It stands as a testimony to the faith of many people throughout the Church of God who have manifested their interest in Oregon Bible College and demonstrated their appreciation for its importance to the Church of God by providing the necessary funds to complete this building.

The present staff of Oregon Bible College consists of William M. Wachtel, President; V. E. Kirkpatrick, Instructor and Librarian; Paul Shaw, Instructor; Kenneth Milne, Instructor; Harold Doan, Instructor; Nora Anderson, Dean of Women; Inez Gordon, housemother; and Ed Bender, Ann Cullen, Alice Aldrich, Dolena Shaw, and Elaine Magaw, part-time assistants.

Work is in progress to further expand and departmentalize the curriculum. A freshman course is now es-

tablished and offered to each freshman class.

By action of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, the costs to students for the next year will be \$100.00 per semester for tuition, or \$425.00 per semester for tuition, room, and board. These fees cover about one-half the actual cost of operation of Oregon Bible College at the present level of enrollment.

The greatest need of Oregon Bible College in this anniversary year is for increased enrollment of qualified students. While Oregon Bible College does enroll a relatively high percentage of each year's total number of high school graduates in the Church of God, it can only begin to operate efficiently and fulfill the needs of the Church of God when it has an enrollment of at least forty students. A larger enrollment would justify a larger and more diversified faculty, provide for greater economy of operation, improve student morale and provide additional fellowship and activities, and, greatest of all, would provide more graduates to occupy now-vacant pulpits and to open new fields of service. A larger enrollment would also help us to receive the necessary recognition and accreditation by the State of Illinois, the federal government, and other schools for issuing of degrees and transfer of credits.

Recommendation Number One

We recommend that the Board of Education of Oregon Bible College be reorganized as follows, beginning October 1, 1964. Membership: The Board of Education will consist of five members; four members to be appointed by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, and the President of Oregon Bible College as chairman. Terms of Appointment: Each member will be appointed for two years after the first year. The first year, two members will be appointed for one year, and two members will be appointed for two years. Responsibility: The Board of Education will meet regularly to consider all phases of the operation and expansion of Oregon Bible College. It will serve as an advisory board to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors in all matters pertaining to Oregon Bible College.

Recommendation Number Two

We recommend that all Churches of God strive to attain a goal of forty students enrolled in Oregon Bible College by the second semester, 1965.

Recommendation Number Three

We recommend that all churches strive to pay off all indebtedness on the new Oregon Bible College building by September 30, 1965.

Sunday School Department

The Board of Directors of the Sunday School Department (Sr. Leota Foster, and Bros. Edgar Harvey, Paul Overholser, and Willis Turner) met twice during the year to discuss matters having to do with the Sunday school work of the Church of God General Conference.

Bro. Paul Overholser is working on a Manual for Sunday School Superintendents and, as it is completed, it will be printed by sections in the Progress Journal. It will then be made up in booklet form for free distribution to pastors and superintendents.

By recommendation of the Sunday School Department Board of Directors, Bro. Paul Shaw will be working as Superintendent of the Sunday School Department as part of his duties as full-time employee of the General Conference.

An excellent set of Vacation Bible School books was prepared by Sr. Iris Burnett and her staff. Through a new printing process the books were very nicely printed and saddle-stitched for more practical use as class workbooks. Our thanks are expressed to Sr. Mary Milne, who served faithfully for many years as editor of the Teen-Age Quarterly (formerly Junior High - Senior High Quarterly). She has resigned and, beginning October 1, the Teen-Age Quarterly will be edited by Bro, and Sr. E. Milon Hall. We also thank Sr. Lois Worley, who has been editor of the Nursery - Pre-School Truth Seeker's Quarterly since the illness of Sr. Verna Thayer. She took the work at a difficult time and has served faithfully for several years. Beginning October 1, the Nursery - Pre-School and Primary Quarterlies will be edited by Sr. Jean Doan, and will be closely correlated. Bro. William Wachtel and Sr. Louise Lapp will continue their excellent work with the Adult and Junior Quarterlies.

Sunday School Department board members have furnished copy for the Sunday school progress page of the Progress Journal.

The Sunday School Department Board of Directors believes that one of the greatest immediate needs of the Church of God General Conference is the establishment of new Sunday schools and churches, and the strengthening of existing Sunday schools and churches. The emphasis on Sunday School Day (Tuesday) at General Conference will be on the ways to start new Sunday schools and churches.

Recommendation Number Four

We recommend that every Church of God and state and district conference be encouraged to work toward the starting of new Sunday schools and churches this year, with the assistance of the General Conference with supplies and leadership when requested, and that a goal of five new Sunday schools be established.

Recommendation Number Five

We recommend that each Church of God Sunday school be encouraged to conduct at least one teacher training course this year, and that new teacher training courses be offered by the Sunday School Department.

Recommendation Number Six

We recommend that each state and district conference be encouraged to conduct at least one Sunday school workers' conference during the year.

Recommendation Number Seven

We recommend that each Church of God Sunday school be encouraged to strive for at least a ten per cent increase in average attendance during the year.

Recommendation Number Eight

We recommend that a general Sunday school contest be conducted this year between state and district conferences, and between individual churches.

Missions

The work of the Mission Department of the Church of God General Conference has continued to move forward throughout the past year.

The Digby, Nova Scotia, field under the leadership of Bro. John Denchfield has its new building nearly completed. It has begun having morning Sunday school and worship services, where formerly services were only in the afternoon and evening.

The past year we were blessed in having Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, leader of the Philippine mission work, visit our General Conference sessions, the Berean Youth Conference, and thirty churches and state conferences. Some persecutions have been experienced in the Philippines, especially in Mindanao, but the churches have been strengthened and many are being brought to Christ through the efforts of the ministers of the Church of God in the Philippines.

Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore and their two daughters have been working near Saltillo, Mexico. The past year has been spent in concentrated study of the language and in holding meetings in the Cadena home, and in making contacts and passing out tracts and other literature. We

should be ready for a fine missionary movement here in the coming years.

The around-the-world trip of Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence, Tempe, Ariz., Church of God, brought us much helpful information on various fields. They were most helpful in evaluating the prospects of the mission field of Bro. S. S. Manoah, Bangalore, India. Because of their extensive report and recommendations, and on the recommendation of the Mission Board, the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors decided to begin support of Bro. Manoah's work in January, 1964.

Many other contacts and possibilities for future mission work are being investigated and studied, such as Lebanon,

South Africa, England, and others.

The book "Systematic Theology," by Alva Huffer, has now been placed in all known seminaries in the United States. More than one hundred Bible colleges are still without the book, however.

During the past year pastoral aid has been given to the churches in Troy, Ohio; Hendersonville, N.C.; Morse Mill, Mo.; and some assistance has been given new work at New Lenox, Ill., and the church at L'Anse, Mich.

New church buildings were built at Omaha, Neb., Denver, Colo., and Columbia Station, Ohio, with Mission Builders assistance. Extensive new additions have been made to churches at Kokomo, Ind., and Oregon, Ill., and new churches were built at Lockwood, Mo., and Wenatchee, Wash. Several other groups have secured new building sites, including Fonthill, Ont., Macomb, Ill., and Chicago, Ill., churches.

The "Each One Reach (at least) One" program is a way to strengthen local churches, and many individuals have accepted the responsibility of reaching someone for Christ. More emphasis will be put on the local level next year, that our local churches may keep pace and continue to grow. Let us carry the gospel to all people!

Members of the General Conference staff and Oregon

Bible College students carry on services in several parts of the country and assist in many special meetings. This has been a great help to many small churches and new churches, such as Monroe Center, Wis., New Lenox, Ill., Casey, Ill., New Glarus, Wis., L'Anse, Mich., Flagg Center, Ill., Hedrick, Ind., St. Louis, Mo., Morning Star, Ind., and other places where preaching services and Bible classes have been regularly conducted by staff and students.

Recommendation Number Nine

We recommend that the Church of God General Conference continue the work with Bro. S. S. Manoah in and around Bangalore, India, including financial support.

Recommendation Number Ten

We recommend that the Mexico work with Bro. Dean Moore be continued and supported for another year.

Recommendation Number Eleven

We recommend that the Nova Scotia and Philippine work be continued and supported.

Recommendation Number Twelve

We recommend that in the next year more emphasis be placed on the local mission fields through the "Each One Reach (at least) One" program and other related programs.

Conclusion

While lengthy, this is but a summary of some of the more important phases of the work of the Church of God General Conference. Innumerable other services are performed as part of the function of the General Conference in representing the Church of God and acting as a clearing house for communication between pastors, churches, and conferences. Again we praise the Lord for opportunities to serve, and for the strength and means to serve.

SPECIAL REPORTS . . .

LICENSE AND ORDINATION REPORT

To begin our report we should call your attention to the motion made at the last General Conference on August 8, 1963, by Bro. William Wachtel, seconded by Bro. Kenneth Milne, and carried. The motion was to adopt the following recommendation: "That the present rules for licensing and ordination be modified as follows: 1) All candidates for ordination should serve first as a licensed minister for approximately three years, and that all ordination services be held at General Conference. 2) All applications for ordination must be in the hands of the License and Ordination Committee at least one month prior to General Conference. 3) All applications for licenses must be in the hands of the License and Ordination Committee at least one month in advance of Ministerial Conference or General Conference, when applicant desires to be interviewed at such conference."

Ministerial licenses were granted to two men at the 1963 General Conference. They were: Cecil A. Patrick, 701 Ohio St., Ashland, Ohio, and Doyle Price, 2100 Auten Rd., Gastonia, N. C. Three young men were examined by the License and Ordination Committee on March 23, 1964, and

at this writing are to be given their licenses after they have been graduated from Oregon Bible College in June, 1964. They are C. Robin Hayse, John F. Hearp, and Arlen F. Rankin.

Since the June, 1963, report we have lost two members by death, Bro. Otto E. Dick, Sr., and Sr. Verna C. Thayer, whose works still manifest the faith they held so dear.

Counting the three young men who should be licensed by the time most of you will be reading this, there are ninety-two licensed ministers, twenty-seven of whom are ordained.

Applications for ministerial recognition will be sent to all ministers now holding recognition cards. Applications should be returned by July 15. A prompt return will make it easier to have the records in order by General Conference. Thank you, fellow ministers.

MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Mission Board and Bro. Stanley Ross met several times last August during the General Conference at Camp Mack. We conferred several times with Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero about his plans for promoting the preaching of the gospel in the Philippines. We also met with Bro. Dean Moore to make final plans for his move to Mexico, where he planned to learn the Spanish language and begin his ministry with the people there.

In October we had a conference at Oregon, Ill., with Bro. William Lawrence and Bro. Harold Doan. At this time we received and discussed Bro. Lawrence's report of his round-the-world trip which was made in the interest of Church of God missions. As a result of the meeting, we recommended to the General Conference Board that support be given Bro. S. S. Manoah of India, and that the Philippine Church of God Conference be given support to the amount of \$25.00 per month.

We met again in December and April at South Bend, Ind. At each meeting the work in each mission field was reviewed and recommendations made pertinent to the conditions and need. Recommendations made to the General Conference Board were: 1) That a Mission Builders Appeal be granted to the Philippine Church of God Conference not later than the spring of 1965; 2) That Jamal Sunna'a of Beirut, Lebanon, receive instruction by correspondence and a small monthly financial support be given him; 3) That the General Conference complete the project of supplying seminaries in the United States with copies of "Systematic Theology."

Time and thought were given to planning the mission program for General Conference this year. It is planned to have a Missions Room again, with interesting displays from each field. We are also planning to show pictures taken in Mexico and Digby, Nova Scotia, after the services on Monday and Wednesday nights. On Wednesday there is time set aside in which to discuss the "Each One Reach (at least) One" program, and how it can be put into operation in the local church.

The Mission Board counts it a great privilege and takes pleasure in serving the Lord in this capacity. We solicit your prayers.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

The Retirement Committee, appointed by the Board of Directors, in submitting its report realizes that the report is subject to amplification and is limited in its requirements and benefits, but is as broad and extensive as our denominational circumstances warrant at the present time.

The committee recommends that a Retirement Plan be

set up, with participating ministers paying one per cent of their gross cash income per year, and that the churches pay one per cent of their total operating income per year. Payments are to be made on a monthly basis. Retirement benefits will be \$50.00 per month (with widows being given twenty-five per cent of this amount).

It is recommended that the General Conference Board of Directors be empowered to appoint a committee to administer the Retirement Fund.

It is recommended that disability compensation be held in abeyance until sufficient funds become available in the fund to start such a program.

It is recommended that contributions, bequests, or other types of assistance in building up the Retirement Fund be encouraged.

It is recommended that the Retirement Fund be made available for building loans to our churches when reserves warrant.

To be eligible, ministers must be active licensed or ordained ministers of the Church of God, headquarters, Oregon, Ill.

It is recommended that the Retirement Plan becomes operative when fifty per cent of the recognized ministers and churches elect to come into the plan, and June 1, 1966, be set as a target date to commence retirement payments to eligible retirees.

It is recommended that new members come into the Retirement Plan within six months after becoming eligible, and pay into the plan for at least ten years before becoming eligible for retirement pay.

MINISTERS' FUND REPORT

During the past year assistance has been given each month to a retired minister and to a minister's widow. Two ministers were given emergency assistance of \$300.00 each, under the provisions of the fund, during the year.

Bro. Harry Goekler is chairman of the committee which administers the fund, and other members are Bros. Kenneth Milne, Jesse Pestle, William Wachtel, and Harold Doan.

The balance remaining in the Ministers' Fund on June 1, 1964, was \$3,005.51.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Camp Cost. The total cost per person for one staying at the camp and using all facilities is \$3.10 per person per day. Children under twelve pay half price, and children under two are free. The cost breaks down as follows: lodging, 75 cents; breakfast, 55 cents; lunch, 85 cents; supper, 85 cents; insurance, 10 cents. There is a charge of 25 cents per day for "short-term" campers who do not stay at the camp, but come in for the day's activities. Offerings are received at each evening service, and the camp treasurer receives contributions during the day for payment of the camp costs.

Lodging. Attendance at General Conference sessions has been increasing each year and it is necessary to use every available bed. For this reason we are asking that family accommodations be discontinued except in certain circumstances.

Parents with infant children will be housed in Sarah Major Hall. Others will be housed with men and boys on one side of the camp and women and girls on the other. Young people will be in separate cabins, under jurisdiction of the youth director and counselors.

Camp Rules. Rules are simple. Since this is community living, with about three hundred people in a small area, there must be order. Lights out at 10:30 p.m. should be observed. This is too early for some and too late for others, but a fair compromise. When leaving the camp (even if only for a short time), please notify the desk in ease of an emergency, or if you should receive a phone call, or someone is looking for you.

Check with the camp director or program chairman on any unusual changes in the program or for special requests.

Rules are established by the camp itself that will be explained and must be observed. These have to do with water sports, dining room, and care of property.

Delegate Pool Expense. A committee will be designated at the beginning of Conference to receive expense accounts from delegates from churches and state conferences participating in the expense pool. Expenses will be averaged and those whose expenses are less than average will pay the difference into the pool, and those whose expenses are more than average will receive the difference from the pool.

Pool expense forms have been sent to all secretaries. Churches and state conferences should approve participation in the pool before Conference.

Children's Classes. Children's classes will be conducted morning and afternoon and will be in charge of Sr. Doris Brown and other teachers. Parents are requested to call for their small children immediately after classes.

Nursery. A nursery will be in operation mornings and afternoons. Mothers of small children and babies who will be in the nursery will be asked to take turns serving in the nursery so that each mother will be free part of the time to attend meetings and classes. Parents will be asked to help supply balloons and refreshments.

Bunners and Displays. Churches and state conferences are encouraged to use displays, banners, or special identifying costumes to advertise their locality.

Oregon Bible College and the Mission Department are planning displays for the Conference. We invite states and churches to have displays from their meetings. These will be of interest to all the delegates.

Conference Choir. There will also be a Conference choir under the direction of Bro. and Sr. Richard Dick. It will meet first on Monday at 6:30 p.m., at which time we trust that all musicians will be present. There will also be a need for special music for evening services. Soloists and other musicians are urged to come prepared to render special music. If you wish to offer special music, please contact Pastor Richard Dick, Rt. 3, Box 51-C, Hammond, La.

The Tempe, Ariz., Church of God has placed "Systematic Theology" in about forty foreign country libraries. This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached ['published,' Diaglott] in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (Matt. 24:14).

MIGRANT WORK

This appears to be the last year that migrants will be allowed to come from Mexico to work in the fields in the United States. The states of California, Arizona, Colorado, Arkansas, Illinois, Michigan, and perhaps others will have these workers this year. Any Church of God in these areas would do well to make as many contacts with them as possible through tracts and personal witnessing.

A quote from Bro. Dean Moore's April report says, "Government officials of both the United States and Mexico have announced that this is the final year for Mexican workers in the United States, and I believe we should make a special effort to work with as many as possible while they are in the United States. In the past the men have seemed quite receptive, and when their day's work is through, especially on Sundays, they seem glad to have an opportunity to attend a meeting and learn more of the faith of peoples in the United States." What will you do about it?



I found two families who were out of town the day I was there, and two families could not be located, as they failed to report their new addresses to the General Conference or to the Texas Conference.





Why a General Conference?

IN THE last issue of Progress Journal some of the statistics concerning the various departments of the Church of God were listed. These statistics do reveal some of the many aspects of work, but not the human side of the picture. The General Conference is people; people at work for the Lord.

For instance, Oregon Bible College produces a product —people educated for Christian work. There will be at least eight Churches of God which have requested the services of a pastor for this year who will have no pastor. Three men graduated from Oregon Bible College who will be entering the ministry this year, but three churches have pastors for the first time this year.

A man picks up a Restitution Herald in Montreal. He reads it and finds that he has found a people who teach many of the truths that he has always believed but has not found taught in the many churches he has attended. A minister in Kentucky enrolls in the Systematic Bible Study Course, completes it, and writes that it is the best he has ever taken. A man in Tanganyika finds a Church of God tract and writes, wanting more information about the Church of God. Printing and publishing the gospel is not just paper and machinery—it is evangelism. It is people who are reached with the gospel; Sunday school pupils who learn from study books; young people who are inspired to service.

A man travels four days on foot through the jungles of Mindanao to help organize a Church of God among new settlers in the interior. Two men, one playing the violin and the other a portable pump organ in an open market place in Bangalore, gather a crowd to whom they speak about the gospel. A man in Lebanon has a small Bible class in the living room of his home. The treasurer of a Church of God in the United States opens his mail and finds the monthly pastoral aid check which helps his church to have the services of a resident pastor. Missions

revolve around people who serve and people who are reached with the gospel message.

The writer sat with a group of people recently and two young women, married and with small children, were remembering their experiences at the General Berean Youth Conference. They say they will never forget the wonderful experiences in worship, study, and fellowship that were theirs at these youth conferences. A group of young people spends hours in practice memorizing Bible verses for participation in quizzing. A young man practices and polishes a speech for the Christian speech contest, gaining invaluable experience and poise as he does so. The Berean Youth Fellowship is people—leaders who love young people and young people who are brought to love the Lord.

A church writes for help in finding a pastor. An isolated member wants help with a difficult text. A pastor wonders where he can secure a certain set of books. A minister needs help with his insurance claim. A superintendent wonders to whom he should write about a Sunday school contest he has heard about. A teacher of beginners says, "I have been wonderfully helped by the lesson books." A local pastor is called away unexpectedly and the Conference office is asked for a speaker for the Sunday service. A group of people in an isolated area would like to have some preaching services, and want a Conference worker or student to help. An individual says he is writing a research paper on the Church of God for college and wants more information. This is typical of the daily mail—the people and their needs—served by the General Conference.

VERNA C. THAYER MEMORIAL AUTOMOBILE

A year ago, Bro. and Sr. Robert Hall gave the General Conference an automobile for use in the travels of the staff and for other Conference business. The car was driven nearly 30,000 miles during the year.

By action of the Board of Directors and with the consent of the family of Sr. Verna C. Thayer, this car was traded for a 1962 Ford station wagon for Conference use as a memorial to Sr. Thayer. She, as a field worker for the Conference, was on the road many days of the year, and was always concerned about the transportation problems of the workers. Her son, Bro. Lyle Thayer, believes that the car is a fitting memorial.

Several have asked about a memorial for Sr. Thayer, and we recommend this item of equipment to you. Send your memorial gift to the General Conference. Designate your memorial gift for this purpose and memorial cards will be sent to the Thayer family in your name.

FREE SYSTEMATIC BIBLE STUDY COURSE

There are now 210 individuals enrolled in the free Systematic Bible Study Course. Thus far, two have successfully completed the course and have received certificates.

This course is offered to individuals who personally enroll, or who are enrolled by name by a friend.

It is the policy in regard to the course that complete free sets are not sent out for class or group study or for general distribution by an individual. In its free form, it is strictly a correspondence course for enrolled individuals.

The course is offered in book form (\$1.25 per book), or in looseleaf form (85 cents per set) for class use, or for general distribution.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL BOOKS

There are several Church of God vacation Bible schools that are only five-day schools. Some have wondered why the Church of God General Conference publishes ten lessons in its vacation Bible school books. There are several reasons.

Several larger Churches of God have ten-day schools. They need a ten-lesson book. A five-day school can use a ten-lesson book, but a ten-day school cannot use a five-lesson book.

Most of the cost of the vacation Bible school books is

incurred in editing, preparation of negatives, preparation of plates, etc., before they even go to the press for printing. Thus, it is economically impractical to print both five and ten-lesson books.


All publishing companies, of which we are aware, offer only ten-lesson books in their vacation Bible school books.

Some schools using only five lessons have used the other five lessons for Berean studies; shared them with another church; or saved them for the next year's Bible school. After considerable study and experimentation, it seems that the most usable and least costly system is that which we are now using, where ten lessons are printed.

FINANCIAL REPORT

As can be seen from the figures below, we were about \$825.00 short of our goal for the month of June. This is the first month in this fiscal year that we have not reached the goal (or almost reached it), and we know this is only a temporary shortage.

The Silver Anniversary Building Campaign is slowly progressing toward its goal. The mortgage on the new College building is about \$31,000.00, on which we are paying 5½ per cent interest. We trust that payment of commitments and new commitments and gifts will soon completely pay off this mortgage.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

NEW FILMSTRIPS FOR LOAN

A new set of training filmstrips has been acquired by the National Sunday School Department. The series of four filmstrips, with both written and recorded narration, is entitled "Building a Better Sunday School" and is available for loan free of charge to any of our Sunday schools. This set differs from our other sets of training filmstrips in that it deals not so much with the principles of teaching as with the organization and promotion of the Sunday school as a whole. The subtitles of the filmstrips are "Organization," "Developing the Worker," "Planning the Program," and "Expansion." The set would be ideal for a workers' conference.

SUNDAY SCHOOL EVANGELISM

For what purpose do our Sunday schools exist? What is the primary work which Christ gave the church to do? Is it not evangelism—reaching lost people with the gospel? In our Sunday school workers' conferences it would be well if we occasionally assessed our real purpose. What is our Sunday school accomplishing? What is it not doing that it ought to be doing? Often the answer is that it is not reaching out, not evangelizing, not winning young people and adults to Christ.

The Sunday school, as well as every other organization of the church, ought to be an arm of evangelism. The teachers ought to plan individual counseling sessions with those of junior-high age and older to discuss their salvation. Salvation should be brought in during the lesson discussion.

Sunday schools, although a relatively new innovation in the church, provide one of the best opportunities for evangelism that God has given us. In 1784 John Wesley reports his first observation of a Sunday school. It was on Sunday, July 18. "I preached, morning and afternoon in Bingley church, but it would not near contain the congregation. Before service I stepped into the Sunday school, which contains 240 children, taught every Sunday by several masters, and superintended by the curate. So many children in one parish are restrained from open sin, and taught a little good manners, at least, as well as to read the Bible. I find these schools springing up wherever I go. Perhaps God may have a deeper end therein than men are now aware of. Who knows but some of these schools may become nurseries for Christians."

And nurseries for Christians they certainly did become! Arms of evangelism they certainly did become! Power houses for soul-winning they certainly did become! Let us be acutely aware of the unique opportunity that is be-

fore us each Sunday and re-evaluate the programs of our Sunday schools in order to be certain that we are rising to meet the challenge!

BEREAN YOUTH CONFERENCE NEXT MONTH

Next month, August 7-13, the 1964 Berean Youth Conference will be held at Camp Mack, Indiana. Young people from all over the United States and Canada travel to this conference each year. Last year there were 209 present, counting the adult staff members. A varied and interesting program is planned for this year's camp, which will include ample recreation, training workshops, interesting and informative classes, the Bible quiz and Christian speech contests, the Berean Awards Banquet, campfire services, camp choir, and many other activities and events.

Since the last report, work has been progressing slowly but steadily. Our number of classified books has now risen to 1034, with more cards on order. However (and this makes us happy), classification has not been keeping up with the arrival of books from friends of the library who are anxious to see its growth. Since the last report we have received from the following persons: Harry Sheets, 45 books; Russell Reyc, The Interpreter's Bible, 12 volumes; Gordon Smith, 84 books, a complete file of the magazine Christianity Today, along with other religious magazines; Elizabeth Ordnung, 5 books; Leona Marsh Conrad, 22 books; Arlen Rankin, 1 book; Betty Schwier, The Treasury of the Bible and The Treasury of David, 11 volumes; Emory Macy, 1 book; and Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Marshall and Mr. and Mrs. James Lippert, Pulpit Commentary, 52 volumes. This makes a total of 233 books received in this period. The Pulpit Commentary was given as a memorial to Bro. and Sr. Charles Gesin, and The Treasury of the Bible and The Treasury of David were given as a memorial to Henry Schwier.

In addition to the need for further funds to purchase Library of Congress catalog cards, we note other shortages we hope to rectify in time. A copy has been mailed to all Church of God young people near or of college age (all, that is, of whom we have any knowledge). All the ministers have also received a copy. 



GENERAL CONFERENCE REPORT!

Three Dimensions of Growth

By Alva G. Huffer, Chairman of the Board of Directors

(This message was presented by Chairman Huffer as the keynote of the 1964 Church of God General Conference delegate meetings.)

MINISTERS of the gospel, delegates, and friends of the Church of God, we begin this forty-fourth international meeting of the Church of God General Conference with feelings of humility, gratitude, and courage.

The Church of God recognizes its utter dependence upon God as it seeks to fulfill His mission for the Church in these last days. The Bible Church of God realizes that its God-given work during these concluding years of the Church Age is to evangelize the world. It knows that its mission is not to bring the mass of humanity to Christ, but to bring Christ to the mass of humanity. The responsibility of the church is to take the gospel of salvation to every sinner in the world; the responsibility of that sinner is to receive the gospel and to be transformed by it.

Around the world, many persons of many languages are waiting to hear the Bible message of the Church of God. This is the message for the whole world. This is the message all men need. This message alone brings satisfaction. This is the message which many persons in many parts of the world are accepting. They are wanting to become members of the Bible Church of God. They want to become part of this great missionary movement in the concluding days before the Lord returns.

The Church of God is filled with gratitude as it acknowledges God's abundant blessings upon our local congregations around the world, as it receives answers to prayer, and as it realizes the wonderful growth of the General Conference during the past decade.

The Church of God is filled with courage as it looks to the future. The church expects future growth as it presents the gospel, the Word of God, the most powerful factor upon this planet. God's Word will be successful; it will not fail. God has promised, "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it" (Isa. 55:11). The church seeks to present the whole gospel to the whole world. Its intention is to present a complete Scriptural message whereby persons of all races, of all languages, on all continents can find that salvation which Christ provides.

Three dimensions of growth are a reality within the Chuch of God General Conference: upward, inward, and outward. To paraphrase an ancient philosopher, the General Conference is the individual believer's "writ large." The individual Christian experiences a threefold growth in his threefold relationship with God Himself, and his neighbor. He has been instructed to love the Lord God supremely and to love his neighbor as himself. One cannot have a satisfactory horizontal relationship with his neighbor unless he has a proper vertical relationship with God through Christ. Man must lift his heart to God before he can extend his hand to man. Man's life is like a tent. It must have a vertical pole to lift it up and give it meaning; otherwise, it will sag and collapse. As someone has said, "If we have not within us that which is above us, we will soon surrender to that which is around us." The above, within, and around are the three directions of growth not only for the individual Christian but also for the General Conference.

Isaiah wrote: "Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations: spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes" (54:2). This text constitutes a great missionary challenge. It is an exhortation for us to experience this threefold growth. We need to experience an upward growth in our spiritual relationship with God, including prayer, theology, Bible study, and the devotional life. We need to experience an inward growth within the General Conference and to strengthen local congregations. Then, we need to realize an outward growth as we fulfill the great missionary commission. We lengthen the cords as we launch out in carrying the gospel to the whole world. We strengthen the stakes as we become better organized and stronger in our local congregations and General Conference.

The Church of God General Conference has experienced amazing upward and inward growth during the past decade. It has been preparing itself to become a vast missionary movement to evangelize the world. Our Executive Secretary, Harold J. Doan, wrote: "This year marks the end of the Decade of Development Program which was begun in September, 1964. At the General Conference meetings, August, 1954, goals were adopted for every department of the Church of God General Conference. These goals looked ahead to 1964 and envisioned progress in missions, Oregon Bible College, the Sunday

Minutes of the Forty-Fourth Church of God General Conference

Monday Morning, August 3, 1964

The Forty-fourth General Conference of the Church of God was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Alva Huffer. After singing the first verse of "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah," Bro. Milon Hall led in prayer.

The Credentials Committee, consisting of Sr. Ruth Halls, Sr. Inez Gordon, and Bro. David Krogh, then seated the delegates. The eard system for the delegates was explained. Folders were distributed to each delegate.

A call was given for communications. An invitation by the Blanchard church was read, inviting all to their fiftieth anniversary celebration. A letter of appreciation was read from the Denver church for the help given through the Mission Builders League. A letter from Bro. Orville Westlund, reporting his work at the Naval Yard in San Francisco, was read. This letter is to be attached to the minutes by a motion made by Bro. Rolland Stilson, seconded by Bro. Edward Goit. Motion carried. (See page 8.)

Bro. Alva Huffer then gave the Chairman's

message to the delegates. Bro. Huffer pointed out the threefold dimensions of service to God: inward growth, outward growth, and upward growth. This growth applies to each individual and also to the Conference as a whole. Isaiah 54:2 was read as a pattern for growth. Bro. Huffer closed his message with prayer. (See page 2.)

The delegate transportation pool was discussed and explained by Bro. Huffer.

Bro. Harold Doan presented the Treasur-er's report in view of the absence of Bro. Warren Landry. Sr. Leota Hanson moved the acceptance of the Treasurer's report; seconded by Bro. Willis Turner; motion carried.

Bro. Paul Shaw reported on the activities of the Berean Youth Department. There are 203 enrolled at the present time for the 1964 Youth Conference to be held next week. The Goal for Giving voted at last year's Conference by the young people has been passed already. A total of \$1900 has been received.

A brief recess was taken at 11:00 a.m.
The meeting was reconvened at 11:20 a.m.,
with prayer by Bro. Vivian Kirkpatrick.
Special reports were referred to in the
Progress Journal. The License and Ordina-

tion report was not read; no questions were raised. The Counseling and Arbitration Com-

mittee report, and Ministers Fund report were also referred to, and again no questions were

Bro. William Wachtel gave the report on Oregon Bible College. There are seventeen returning students, and an estimate of 17-20 new students for the coming year. The curriculum at Oregon Bible College was explained. A new freshman course is to be begun for a basic instruction in the Bible. Seminars are being offered, with a week of intensive instruction on various topics presented by ministers of the Church of God. This year at the graduation ceremony a special award was presented to Sr. Rachel Krogh. The "Silver Disc Award" was given her for high honor in scholastic standing. A new scholarship award was announced to be given by the Indiana conference to a second semester Indiana student for \$100.00. Also, a \$100.00 scholarship was announced to be given by the Northeast Bereaus.

The Silver Anniversary program was given at this time. Bro. Paul Shaw read 2 Timothy 4:1-5. Bro. Wachtel introduced Bro. Clyde Randall, who gave a brief history of Oregon Bible College. Bro. Kirkpatrick then reported on the tangible progress on the College.

The Credentials Committee reported the following delegate attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 39; delegates, 69; a total of 116 compared to 109 at the same session last year.

The morning session closed with prayer by Bro. Kenneth Milne.

Monday Afternoon, August 3, 1964

Bro. Richard Dick opened the afternoon session with singing "The Lord's Prayer." Bro. Hollis Partlowe led a devotional service. Bro. Randall reported on the Booster Club activities.

Recommendations concerning Oregon Bible College were read. Number 1: We recom-mend that the Board of Education of Oregon Bible College be reorganized as follows, beginning October 1, 1964. Membership: The Board of Education will consist of five members; four members to be appointed by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, and the President of Oregon Bible College as chairman. Terms of appointment: Each member will be appointed for two years after the first year. The first year, two members will be appointed for one year and two members will be appointed for two years. Responsibility: The Board of Education will meet regularly to consider all phases of the operation and expansion of Oregon Bible College. It will serve as an advisory board to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors in all matters pertaining to Oregon Bible College. Sr. Lottie Pickerl moved the recommendation be accepted; Bro. Richard Dick seconded the motion.

Bro. Edward Goit moved the motion be amended to read as follows (the first part remaining the same until Membership): The Board of Education will consist of five members; three members to be elected by the Church of God General Conference, and the President of Oregon Bible College and the Executive Secretary of the General Conference serve as the other two members of this

board. This board will elect its own chairman immediately following the General Conference session. Terms of election: The first year one member will be elected for one year; one member for two years; and one member for three years. Thereafter each member is to be elected for a three-year term. Responsibility: The Board of Education will meet regularly to consider all phases of the operation of Oregon Bible College. It will serve as a self-contained board to the Church of God General Conference in all matters pertaining to Oregon Bible College. Bro. Delbert Jones seconded the amendment. Discussion followed. The amendment lost. The motion on the recommendation passed.

Recommendation number 2: We recommend that all Churches of God strive to attain a goal of forty students enrolled in Oregon Bible College by the second semester, 1965. Bro. Jesse Pestle moved the recommendation be approved. Sr. Lucille Ratering seconded the motion; carried.

Recommendation number 3: We recommend that all churches strive to pay off all indebtedness on the new Oregon Bible College building by September 30, 1965. Sr. Leota Hanson moved that recommendation be adopted; Bro. Richard LeCrone seconded; motion carried.

A report on the study of a Senior Citizens Home was read by Bro. Francis Burnett. Bro. Burnett moved this report be placed on record. Sr. Ruth Bulthaus seconded; motion carried.

Sr. Lucille Ratering moved to adjourn until Tuesday morning. Bro. Goit seconded; motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 37; delegates, 73; total, 108; last year, 106. Bro. Darrell Maddock gave the prayer of

adjournment at 2:20 p.m.

Tuesday Morning, August 4, 1964

The meeting was opened with the hymn "Yes, the Lord Can Depend on Me." Prayer was given by Bro. Jesse Pestle.

The minutes of the Monday business sessions were read. Bro. Gerald Cooper moved the minutes be accepted as read; seconded

Chairman Huffer introduced Bro. Paul Shaw as the new Director of the Sunday School Department of the General Confer-ence. Bro. Shaw referred to the report of the Sunday School Department in the Progress Journal. The report was summarized.

The nominations for two new officers of the Sunday School Board of Directors was opened. The officers whose terms have expired were: Bros, Willis Turner and Paul Overholser. Bro. Paul Overholser was nominated. Bro. Hayse moved the nominations be closed and that Bro. Overholser be elected by unanimous vote. Bro. Wachtel seconded; motion carried.

Bro. Bernard Hightower was nominated. Bro. Delhert Jones moved the nominations be closed and that Bro. Hightower be elected by a unanimous ballot; seconded by Bro. Naylor; motion carried.

The recommendations of the Sunday School Board as printed were read. Bro. Willis Tur-

ner moved we accept recommendation number 4: We recommend that every Church of God and state and district conference be encouraged to work toward the starting of new Sunday schools and churches this year, with the assistance of the General Conference with supplies and leadership when requested, and that a goal of five new Sunday schools be established. Sr. William Lawrence seconded the motion.

Bro. Shaw was asked to explain "supplies and leadership" as worded in the motion. Bro. Randall moved the motion be amended to read: We recommend to churches, state, and district conferences to work toward the starting of new Sunday schools, etc. Bro. Milon Hall seconded the amendment. Discussion followed. The amendment carried and the recommendation as amended carried.

Recommendation number 5 was moved to acceptance by Bro. Jack Hearp. Bro. Roy Graham seconded. We recommend that each Church of God Sunday school be encouraged to conduct at least one teacher training course this year, and that new teacher training courses be offered by the Sunday School Department; recommendation adopted.

Sr. Lottie Pickerl moved the adoption of recommendation number 6: We recommend that each state and district conference be encouraged to conduct at least one Sunday school workers conference during the year; seconded by Bro. Maddock; motion carried.

Bro. Paul Overholser moved that recommendation number 7 be adopted: We recommend that each Church of God Sunday school be encouraged to strive for at least a ten per cent increase in average attendance during the year; Sr. Lois Graham seconded; motion carried.

Bro. William Andrew moved that recommendation number 8 be adopted. We recommend that a general Sunday school contest be conducted this year between state and district conferences and between individual churches, Bro. Paul Johnson seconded.

Bro. Harvey Krogh moved the motion be amended to include the following words at the end of the recommendation: "and within each Sunday school." Bro. William Lawrence seconded. The type of contest and rules involved were discussed. No details have been ontlined as yet, but each church will be given plenty of advance notice. The amendment passed and the motion as amended carried.

Bro. Goit moved that the Secretary of the General Conference be directed to write a letter of thanks to our absent and retiring Treasurer, Bro. Warren Landry, for his services to this Conference and inform him that the prayers of the Conference are for his rapid recovery to good health. Bro. Hayse seconded; motion carried, Bro. Richard Diek gave a favorable report on Bro. Landry's health.

Sr. Leota Hanson moved that the delegates give a rising vote of thanks to Bro. Willis Turner for his work on the Sunday School Board. Bro. Paul Shaw seconded. All rose in unison for a standing vote. Bro, Doan moderated a panel of the Sunday School Board, introducing the speakers. Bro. Harvey read his prepared report titled "How to recognize the opportunity to start new Sunday schools and churches." Bro. Paul Overholser spoke on "What to do to start a new Sunday school and church work if you are a layman or pastor in an active church." Bro. Willis Turner reported on "What to do to start a new Sunday school and church work if you are an isolated member." Bro. Paul Shaw spoke on "Growth and development of a newly organized Sunday school."

Sr. Lawrence suggested that a copy of this excellent, inclusive, and comprehensive Sunday school report pamphlet be sent to the superintendent, elders, and pastor of each church not represented at the Conference.

The Credentials Committee reported: officers, 8; ministers, 43; delegates, 79; total 130.

Bro. Shaw dismissed the morning session with prayer.

Tuesday Afternoon, August 4, 1964

The afternoon session opened with the song "Send the Light." A short devotional was given by Bro. Huffer, mentioning the mission fields open to all. Bro. Clarence McQuinn gave an inspiring sermon in song titled, "Why Do I Sing About Jesus?" Bro. Wachtel led in prayer.

Bro. Shaw continued the discussion on Sunday school work. Groups were numbered and sent to various locations for buzz sessions on topics regarding Sunday school work.

Smith, nominated by Bro. Charles Graham; Bro. Cecil Patrick, nominated by Bro. Stadden. Nominations were closed by a motion by Bros. Milon Hall and Delbert Jones, Carried.

For director number 2: Bro. Emory Macy, nominated by Bro. Hayse; Bro. Don Swartz, nominated by Bro. Charles Pryor, Sr. Amy Lutton moved the nominations be closed, seconded by Bro. Rolland Stilson; carried.

onded by Bro. Rolland Stilson; carried.
For director number 3: Dr. William Lawrence was nominated by Bro. Gerald Cooper; Bro. Willard Naylor, nominated by Bro. Timothy Pearson. Bro. Hayse and Bro. Pestle moved the nominations be closed; carried.

Next, nominations were opened for the office of president of the Mission Board. Bro. Warren Sorenson was nominated. Bro. Burnett moved that a unanimous vote be east in favor of Bro. Sorenson for president. Seconded by Bro. Cooper; carried.

The meeting was turned over to Bro. Stanley Ross as Director of the Missionary Department of the General Conference. Bro. Ross asked that Bro. and Sr. Lawrence come to the rostrum for a question and answer period about their recent extensive trip into the mission fields.

Many questions were raised about the physical and spiritual needs of the various areas visited. Much interest was displayed by the delegates.

Bro. Timothy Pearson moved the adoption of recommendation number 9: We recommend that the Church of God General Conference continue the work with Bro. S. S. Manoah in and around Bangalore, India, including financial support. Bro. Randall seconded; carried.

Bro. Burnett moved that the delegates give their sincere thanks to Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence for the fine report and all they have done in behalf of the General Conference Missions. Bro. Milon Hall seconded; carried.

The Credentials Committee reported: officers, 8; ministers, 45; delegates, 84; total, 137. This was the highest number of delegates on record.

Bro. Stilson closed the morning session with prayer.

Wednesday Afternoon, August 5, 1964

The afternoon business meeting was opened with the song "My Prayer." Chairman Huffer led a brief devotion regarding the greatest challenge to every Christian—praying for others. Sr. Mildred Laning sang "Is Your All on the Altar of Sacrifice Laid?" Bro. Clarence Lapp led in prayer.

Bro. Ross called the Mission Board to the platform. The members of this board are: Bro. Warren Sorenson, Sr. Ada Simpson, and Bro. Timothy Pearson. Bros. Dean Moore and John Denchfield were also called to the platform.

Reports as given in the Progress Journal were reviewed. It was stated that "Systematic Theology" has been placed in 83 foreign countries

Bro. Goit moved that recommendation number 10 be adopted: We recommend that the Mexico work with Bro. Dean Moore be con-

Bro. Hayse moved that the General Conference pay for the visa and expenses for bus fare and all other expenses for the three potential workers in Mexico to come to the border to meet Bro. Moore for baptism. Bro. Delbert Jones seconded; carried.

Bro. Robert Hall moved the adoption of recommendation number 11: We recommend that the Nova Scotia and Philippine work be continued and supported. Bro. Don Swartz

seconded; carried.

Recommendation number 12 was moved for adoption by Bro. Willis Turner. We recommend that in the next year more emphasis be placed on the local mission fields through the "Each One Reach (at least) One" program and other related programs. Bro. Alton Shaw seconded; carried.

Bro. John Denchfield moved that we heartily endorse and support the India work under the leadership of Bro. Manoah in every way possible, and that we supply the physical needs, including the provision of a motor secoter, as outlined in the report of the Lawrences. Bro. Macy seconded; carried.
Bro. Robert Hall moved that Bro. Ross

The minutes of Wednesday's business ses-


sion were read. Bro. Stilson moved the minutes be accepted as corrected. Seconded by

Bro. Austin Railton moved to adopt the

"Mission" section; seconded by Bro. Sorenson; carried.

Bro. Charles Graham moved to accept the

"Sunday School" section; seconded by Bro. John Huston; carried.

Bro. Hall moved to adopt the "Berean Youth Fellowship" guidelines; seconded by Bro. Turner; carried.

Bro. Burnett moved to accept the guidelines for "General Conference in Finance" onded by Bro. Maddock. After discussion, the motion carried.

Bro. Hall moved that the motion, tabled during the morning session, be lifted from the table; seconded by Bro. Stilson. Discussion followed the rereading of the motion. Bro. Turner moved that the motion be tabled again; seconded by Sr. Pickerl; carried.

Bro. Paul Johnson moved that on this first anniversary of Bro. Elcodoro Ortiguero's visit to this Conference and the churches in this country, he being unable to be present again this year, we extend our congratulations and best wishes to him and the other Philippine workers for their consecrated work this past year and assure them of our continued interest and care for their material and spiritual welfare. Bro. Charles Graham moved that the Constitution and By-Laws be amended, in Article III, Section 3, to read as follows: That all motions presented from the floor, excluding motions of approval of minutes, treasurer's report, report of communications, etc., will be acted upon until the following day of business, excluding the last day of Conference business, when all motions shall be made in the morning sessions and acted upon in the afternoon sessions; the motions proposed to be posted upon a bulletin board. Motion seconded by Bro. Burnett. No further action was taken on this motion at this time due to the requirements of the Constitution regarding any change in the Constitution. This motion must be processed according to the rules in the Constitution, and will be presented at the 1965 Conference.

Turner moved that the recommendation found in the report of committee on Ministers Retirement Plan, which reads: "It is recommended the retiroment fund be made available for building loans to our churches when reserves warrant" be deleted from the minutes, and that a sound investment plan be initiated under the direction of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors. Looking Ahead

(In order to share its general thinking and to establish certain guidelines and goals, the following "Looking Ahead" program was presented briefly to the delegates. This is not a definite program with a definite timetable, but a general picture of the direction in which the General Conference seems to be moving. Before any of the major changes or programs envisioned here are put into opertion, they will be presented to the delegates in detailed form and acted upon by the delegates in future Conferences.)

"Where there is no vision, the people perish" (Prov. 29:18). While human vision is fallible, it is wise to plan for the days to come. While the Lord may lead in other ways, and plans may have to be changed, it is good to plot a course of progress.

With the Decade of Development now successfully completed, we look again into the future to set a tentative course for the Church of God General Conference for the years ahead. We would suggest the following tentative course of action and objectives for the departments of the Church of God General Conference.

Printing and Publishing

Books: We suggest that we plan to publish, print, and distribute the following books, and others as the opportunity arises:

- 1. Systematic Theology
- 2. One God: God of the Ages
- 3. Songs of Truth
- 4. A book on the so-called "difficult texts"
- 5. A commentary, or series of commentaries on the books of the Bible.

Book publishing can be financed with a revolving fund. As "Songs of Truth" is sold, the fund will grow and can be used for short-range publishing. Sales will replace the fund, which now will total about \$10,000.00 with the sales of "Songs of Truth."

Publications: We suggest the continuation of present publications with the following possible changes:

- 1. The Restitution Herald aim for a subscription list of at least 4,000, and that it become a monthly, 48-page, two-color magazine carrying some advertising.
- 2. That children's quarterlies be saddle-stitched, using negatives and the offset printing processes.
- 3. That we up-date our tract offerings by eliminating some longer tracts and tracts by authors who have died, and replace them with shorter tracts by living authors. Covers should be modernized and printing done in color as much as possible. Costs should be kept at a minimum, even if subsidy of the tracts is necessary.
- 4. That "Systematic Bible Study Course" be distributed as widely as possible, and translated into other languages as soon as possible. That encouragement be given to the program of making filmstrips to go with each lesson.
- 5. That vacation Bible school books be sold by the publisher directly to churches of other denominations through direct-mail advertising when printing facilities make possible faster printing and reprinting. That we continue to print a ten-lesson book as do other publishers.

Equipment Needed: Following is some of the new equipment that will be needed to keep pace in religious and commercial printing, and to make the indicated improvements in Church of God publications: Photo-direct, automatic camera equipment; Rosback chain stitcher; DSJ Vari-Typer; Typositor or Headliner; elevator en-

largement; foundry equipment; basement storage; new Linotype magazines; photo-type fonts.

Personnel: For efficient and expanded operation of publishing and printing, the following staff would be advisable:

- 1. A full-time editor-in-chief to supervise editorial and layout work on all publications of the Church of God General Conference.
- 2. Two full-time men in the printing shop and one full-time man in offset department.
- 3. One full-time woman to work at linotype and offset.
- 4. Part-time student help for mailing, clean-up, etc.

General Policy: We believe that priority should be given in hiring of personnel and purchase of equipment to the needs of Church of God General Conference publications, and that commercial printing be accepted only as personnel and equipment are available to do it.

Oregon Bible College

Personnel: We believe that we should look forward to securing the following staff as enrollment and finances are available:

- 1. A president, dean, and three full-time teachers; a dean of women, housemother, full-time maintenance man; and part-time help as needed.
- 2. That the full-time teaching staff be persons with advanced degrees and that each be encouraged to further his education, working toward Ph.D. degrees.
- 3. That financial help be given members of the fulltime staff toward furthering their education, with scholarships and other incentives.
- 4. That all members of the faculty and Board of Education be members of the Church of God.

Recognition: We believe that we should strive to make continual improvements in Oregon Bible College:

- 1. To gain recognition and accreditation from the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, and (or) the Illinois State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and (or) the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.
- 2. Continuing to function as a Bible school and seminary until such time as the size of the Church of God enrollment at Oregon Bible College justifies expansion of the curriculum into the liberal arts, and until qualified faculty and Board of Education can be secured from within the Church of God.
- 3. Realizing that finances will have to come from contributions of members and friends of the Church of God, since government funds are not available or are undesirable because of qualifications attached to their acceptance.

Enrollment: We believe that for efficient operation, expansion, recognition, morale of students, securing of faculty, and to be able to offer the best in education:

1. We should strive for an enrollment of at least forty students, with a goal of one hundred for the near future.

Buildings: We believe that new college building should continue at the present campus site, hoping to locate all college activities here, and that:

- 1. A multi-purpose building be built on the north side of Franklin Street for housing single women students, as a first step.
- 2. That the present Golden Rule Dormitory be razed next and replaced with a new administration and classroom building.
- 3. That properties north, west, and south of the present building be purchased as opportunity arises for married student and faculty housing, and for eventual expansion.

Missions

Home Fields (the United States and Canada): We believe that these English-speaking countries, with limited passport regulations or restriction on travel, should be considered as one home mission field.

- 1. We suggest that the General Conference hire ministers or qualified laymen in the various districts to represent the General Conference, and to supervise the work of home missions in these areas. Hired in conjunction with the state conference, they might be full-time workers, or they might be hired on a part-time basis in conjunction with a local church where the person could also serve as pastor.
- 2. We look forward to the hiring of a full-time Superintendent of Home Missions to supervise this field work, pastoral aid, Mission Builders programs, and personally assume responsibility for starting new Sunday schools and churches in those places outside the geographical areas now served by state or district conferences, and that he work with an elected Home Mission Board.

Foreign Fields: In addition to continuing the work now being done in India, the Philippines, and Mexico, and the expansion of these fields as rapidly as possible, we recommend that:

- 1. Every effort be made to initiate new missions in any country of the world where contact can be made.
- 2. That every contact be followed up with the end in view of organizing a permanent Church of God in every part of the world.
- 3. That the work of Foreign Missions be supervised by a Superintendent of Foreign Missions, working with an elected Foreign Missions Board.

Sunday School Department

Personnel: Now headed by a part-time superintendent, we look forward to a full-time Superintendent of the

Sunday School Department, supported by the offerings of Sunday schools. He would work in association with an elected Sunday School Board.

Program: This department can contribute to the work of the Church of God General Conference by:

- Encouraging the organization of state and district Sunday school departments which have regular rallies and workers conferences, and which will stimulate the growth of established Sunday schools and the organization of new Sunday schools.
- 2. It can, through regional workers training conferences, inspire higher teaching standards and promote greater Sunday school outreach.
- 3. It can initiate actions that will bring new Sunday schools into being in areas outside active state and district conference jurisdiction.

Berean Youth Fellowship

Personnel: Now served by a part-time youth director, we look forward to the growth of this department to the extent that a full-time youth director can be hired and supported by the offerings of Berean Youth Fellowships.

Program: The expansion of the programs under way will take several years of development, but these new areas of work are yet to be undertaken:

- 1. A program for the "older young people" of college age and up to about twenty-five. It is in this group that the church suffers greatest loss.
- 2. A summer work program utilizing youthful talent and energy in constructive and charitable projects for local churches or state conferences.

- 3. Regional youth conferences and workers conferences for leadership training.
- 4. The co-ordinated Christian education program including the Sunday school, Berean Youth Fellowship, and Oregon Bible College.

General Conference Finances

Goals for Giving: We anticipate the time when total giving for the work of the General Conference will total \$150,000.00 per year. We recommend that:

- 1. As much as possible, all needs of all departments be included in one total Goal for Giving, and that the amount received then be allocated according to budget adopted.
- 2. We encourage bequests and wills in favor of the Conference and insurance programs in which the Conference is a beneficiary, with the understanding that such funds will be used primarily for new buildings, equipment, loan funds, endowment funds, and other assets.
- 3. We believe that we should avoid government loans and grants because of problems that arise in maintaining independent control of the work when government funds are involved.
- 4. We should strive for more equitable and sufficient salaries for pastors, since satisfied pastoral leadership is essential to the future of the Church of God.
- 5. Continue to emphasize tithes and offerings as the Scriptural way to finance the work of the local church, the state conference, and the General Conference.

Additional Conference Business

REPORT FROM CHAPLAIN WESTLUND

Dear Members and Friends of the General Conference:

The Apostle Paul opened his Letter to the Philippians with these words: "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now." These words express my written greeting and report to you.

About August I, 1964, I will be detached from the San Francisco Naval Shipyard and will proceed on orders to the University of Chicago; where I will undertake nine months of post-graduate training at the desire and expense of the United States Navy.

These two years serving as a chaplain to a shipyard have increased my knowledge of the Navy, and has deepened my experience in ministering to all people. I am very grateful for this dual opportunity.

- 10. Daily Vacation Bible School attendance: 612.

- 13. Launching Ceremonies: 1.
- 14. Sunday school total attendance: 4436.

In addition to my ministry within the shipyard to military men and their dependents, I have had a very fruitful year in participating with the Negro ministry of the San Francisco Hunter's Point Community and sharing in their activities and problems.

I am glad to report that, during the course of this year, I have been promoted to the rank of Permanent Lieutenant in the Chaplains Corps of the United States Navy.

DELEGATE POOL EXPENSE

This year the Delegate Pool expense was \$51.18, slightly higher than last year. There were several delegates present from churches and conferences in distant places, for which we were thankful. The Delegate Pool has been accomplishing, as was anticipated, its purpose of making attendance at Conference possible for delegates from all Churches of God. Each church and conference in the pool should pay its delegate's share of the pool. For instance, if the delegate's expense was \$25.00, the church should reimburse him \$25.00, and pay the balance of \$26.18 into the pool. If your delegate's expense was \$100.00, he received \$48.82 from the pool, and should receive \$51.18 from the church he represented. Thus, each delegate's expense is paid and each church pays the same amount, \$51.18.

THANK YOU, WORKERS

Our thanks are great for the people who helped with the various parts of the General Conference program. Preachers, teachers, cabin counselors, youth leaders, dining room workers, desk workers, ushers, musicians, nursery helpers, grounds keepers, and others helped make the General Conference program a success.

NEW GOALS FOR GIVING

The General Conference delegates at the 1964 meetings approved the largest Goals for Giving in the history of the General Conference. Faced with new opportunities in Mexico and India, with new needs for literature, with a growing Oregon Bible College, the delegates expressed their faith that the Lord is in these programs by adopting a goal of \$63,553.00 to be given for the work of the General Conference in the new fiscal year, October 1, 1964-September 30, 1965.

There are many ways to look at this goal. One view is that this goal represents salaries that are paid to people who are serving the Lord in many different ministries. The earnings of the General Conference through sales and tuition pay for all the overhead of the Conference work (building maintenance, lights, heat, supplies, paper, ink, machinery, etc.) which amounts to almost \$50,000.00 per year.

The amount that is received in contributions then pays for the *people* who are involved in the Conference work: the missionaries, teachers, printers, editors, housemothers, pastors of local churches who are helped with pastoral aid, bookkeepers, secretaries, mailing clerks, maintenance men—*people* who with their time and energy and talents actually carry on the work. Your contributions toward the Goal for Giving, in essence, are used to help *people* serve the Lord.

The minutes of the Conference printed in this issue will reveal the forward-moving actions that were taken.

EACH ONE REACH (at least) ONE PROGRAM

The Mission Board presented a challenging program on "Each One Reach One" on Mission Day. A bulletin on how to implement this program was in each delegate folder. What are you doing to reach someone for Christ this year? What is your church doing about this program?

MEXICO

Three men are waiting to be baptized when Bro. Dean Moore returns to Mexico. These are former pastors in other missions who have studied with Bro. Moore and have come to a better understanding of the teachings of the Bible and want to be immersed and go forth to preach Jesus Christ and the Kingdom of God to others.

Many others are rejoicing in being able to study with Bro. Moore and these other men, and are considering baptism into Christ. Pray for the work in Mexico as it develops and progresses, winning men and women to Christ.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Brethren in San Nicolas, who have been meeting in a schoolhouse, are now building a church. It is expected to be completed by September 1. Dedicatory services are planned for September 6, with Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero as speaker.

Mrs. Esperanza Villamar was baptized in June by Bro. Eleodoro Javar at the San Nicolas church. Miss Clarita Jornadal was baptized at the Uddiawan church by Bro. Bonifacio Gabanes. We would ask the Lord's blessing upon these two as they begin their Christian walk in life.

The Philippine Conference is making plans for the building of a church at Uddiawan in 1965. This will be the place of worship for the Uddiawan church, the headquarters for the Philippine Conference, the site for each annual Philippine Conference, and also have living quarters for Bro. Ortiguero and his family.

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah reports two baptisms in June and two in July. These were a young man, twenty-six years of age, and three women, ages eighteen, twenty, and twenty-two.

Bro. Manoah's greatest need seems to be transportation, as he conducts three services each Sunday and makes visits over a great area of the city. He has only a bicycle at present, and he has great difficulty getting from one church to the other on time, and sometimes arrives tired from pedaling the bicycle. The General Conference delegates voted to supply him with a scooter, and the cost of same was included in the budget for next year.

NOVA SCOTIA

The adult class of the Southlawn Church of God in Grand Rapids, Mich., has recently sent funds to Nova Scotia for use in dental needs among the Nova Scotia church people.

The members of the Lighthouse Mission church are making plans to secure a piano for the new sanctuary which will soon be ready for use.

MISCELLANEOUS

Eight churches have been approved for Pastoral Aid for this coming church year. This is another service of the Mission Department of the General Conference, and is of great assistance to smaller churches. It enables them to have a full-time or nearly full-time pastor to help them to build up their work and become a stronger, self-sustaining church.

One hundred and ninety Bible colleges and seminaries in the United States, and at least four in Canada have now received "Systematic Theology," by Bro. Huffer.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

THE COLLEGE AND THE CONFERENCES

Oregon Bible College had a vital part in the activities of the recent General Conference and the Berean Youth Conference. Monday, August 3, was Oregon Bible College Day at General Conference, and several decisions were made that day by the delegate body which will affect the future of the College. Great interest in the College and its program was manifested by those who attended General Conference, and by many of the young people at Youth Conference. The president, who represented the College at Youth Conference, had the opportunity to counsel with a number of interested young people concerning their future plans as related to the College. According to present indications, a large number of high school juniors and seniors are seriously thinking of attending Oregon Bible College. This means that we should hope and pray and work for a larger enrollment within the near future. With the expanding interest in missionary and evangelistic work, many more workers will soon be needed to man the fields that are opening up. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of Harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest" (Matt. 9:38).

FRESHMEN FOUNDATION YEAR

By action of the Board of Education and the faculty, a new program has been instituted in the curriculum called the "Foundation Year." A prescribed course of study for all freshmen will begin this year, involving eleven hours of required courses the first semester and nine hours the second semester. The Foundation Year will serve a twofold purpose: 1) it will provide basic preparation in Bible knowledge and service skills for those who plan to attend the College for only one year and wish to get as much Christian training as they can during that one year; 2) for those who plan to remain more than one year it will provide a strong base on which they can build advanced Bible knowledge and Christian training skills.

ANNUALS STILL AVAILABLE

THANKS TO BOARD OF EDUCATION

By action of the General Conference delegates, the organization of the Board of Education has been modified to provide for a five-member board, including the College president as chairman. In accordance with this action a new board will be appointed by the Conference Board of Directors this fall. Many thanks are due to the retiring Board of Education members and to Chairman C. E. Randall for the valuable counsel and assistance they have given the College over the years.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

Again this year a scholarship was awarded during Youth Conference. Bro. Michael Mattison of Hammond, La., was awarded the scholarship, after attaining the highest score in a competitive examination which he and four other young people took. Michael will enter Oregon Bible College as a freshman this fall. This scholarship is sponsored by the Berean Youth Fellowship and is in the amount of \$100.00—\$50.00 for each semester of the freshman year.

NEW SCHOLARSHIPS

Two new scholarships have been made available to Oregon Bible College students. The Indiana State Conference has established the Otto E. Dick Scholarship, in the amount of \$100.00, to be awarded each second semester to a qualified Indiana student. Bro. Dick, for many years president of the College, was originally from the Hillisburg, Ind., Church of God.

The Northeast Bereans have established a Northeast Scholarship in the amount of \$100.00 for a student from that area, to be awarded the second semester.

The College is grateful to those who make such assistance available to worthy students.

GRADUATES IN FULL-TIME SERVICE

All four of the seniors who graduated from Oregon Bible College in June have accepted full-time service in the Lord's vineyard. Bro. Jack Hearp has been called to pastor the Church of God at Ripley, Ill. Bro. Robin Hayse has accepted the pastorate of the Fredericktown, Mo., church. Bro. Arlen Rankin has accepted the pastorate of the Hillisburg, Ind., church. Sr. Rachel Krogh is serving the Lord in full-time employment for the General Conference. We pray that the Lord's richest blessings may rest upon these graduates as they faithfully labor in the various fields!

Some of the topics considered were: "How to recognize the opportunity to start new Sunday schools and churches"; What to do to start new Sunday schools if you are a minister or layman in an active church"; "What to do to start new Sunday schools if you are a layman far from an established church"; and "The growth and development of the newly organized Sunday school." All of the papers presented during the day have been bound into a booklet, which will be mailed soon to all Sunday school superintendents. The booklet is entitled "How to Start New Sunday Schools and Churches," and is available free of charge to individuals.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONTEST PLANNED FOR JANUARY

It was recommended by the National Sunday School Board and accepted by the delegates at General Conference to plan a Sunday School Contest on a national level for this year. Although plans have not yet been fully worked out, the contest will begin in January and will be on a percentage basis, so that smaller churches may compete against larger churches on an equal plane.

CONFERENCE DATES FOR NEXT YEAR

SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUILDING CAMPAIGN

The current status of the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign is as follows. The total Goal for Giving for this campaign, which brought the new Oregon Bible College dormitory-library-cafeteria building into being, was \$155,000.00. Of this amount, \$150,681.00 has been given in commitments and cash. About \$25,000.00 is still due to be paid on the commitments made. These should all be paid by September 30, 1965, if possible.

Mortgages of \$31,000.00 are outstanding on the new building which will be reduced as commitments are paid up and as new commitments and cash gifts are made.

Every effort will be made to pay all indebtedness by September 30, 1965, in order to save interest on the mortgages and to clear the way for future programs.

NEW GOALS FOR GIVING

As you will have noticed from the minutes of the business meetings, the largest Goal for Giving ever established by the General Conference was adopted for the new fiscal year, October 1, 1964 - September 30, 1965. That Goal is \$63,553.00, an increase of \$8,363.00 over the current year's Goal of \$55,190.00.

The increase is accounted for in the following items: an additional \$6,153.00 is added to the mission program for Mexico, India, and pastoral aid; \$500.00 is added for library books for Oregon Bible College; and the balance of \$1,710.00 is added for operating expenses.

The total direct expenditure for missions in the year to come will be nearly \$24,000.00, in addition to general overhead and administrative expense for missions. This is a step forward, an indication of obedience to the Lord's command, "Go ye into all the world." While the new goals and the work they represent will place great responsibility upon us, they also are an indication of the blessing of the Lord who continues to go before us, opening the doors of opportunity.

As more students are educated for Christian service at Oregon Bible College; and as more literature is printed and distributed presenting the truths of God's Word; and as more young people are brought to a knowledge of Christ and given training for service; and as more Sunday schools, churches, and Bible classes are begun at home and abroad; the Lord will continue to bless and make this work possible.

CURRENT FINANCIAL PICTURE

As can be seen from the figures below, we are approaching the end of the fiscal year with every possibility of going "over the top" in our Goals for Giving. With one month remaining, we are ahead of the goal and ready to launch out into a greatly expanded program. (See page 9.) We are grateful to the many people and groups whose faithful giving have made possible this progress in the Lord's work. He has blessed the church through those whose sacrifices have supported the work.
