A Call to Leadership

THERE are no bargains at the leadership counter. However, God will make you a leader if you have the will to serve. Many in the world would like to be successful, president of their company for example, but they are not willing to make the sacrifices necessary. They will not prepare for it; they will not become involved. Often the same is true in the church.

A successful man is a leader. A leader is a director, a co-ordinator, a planner. These things presuppose great preparation. Certainly a good leader has many qualities, but among them are the five following:

The *first* one is meekness. "If any man desire to be first, the same shall be last of all, and servant of all" (Mark 9: 35). One is not ready to lead until he learns to follow. The Bible teaches that a novice should not be elected to a place of leadership. With God, the way up is down. Christians are humble today; they will be exalted in the world to come. (Matt. 23:12.)

A leader does not do all the work. "It is better to put ten men to work than do the work of ten men." Moses learned this lesson from his father-in-law. (Ex. 18:17-24.) Moses was one of the greatest leaders, but also one of the meekest men. (Num. 12:3.)

The *second* quality of a church leader is knowledge. He must have a clear understanding of basic Bible teachings and have some definite convictions about them, having experienced regeneration himself. The Church of God does not have to come behind other bodies in this respect. We have been called to leadership of the great truths which we have in earthen vessels. We have a history of fidelity to the Bible, the inspired Word of God. We have been a people of the Book, and we expect to stay a people of the Book. All controversies must be settled on the authority of the Bible.

A knowledge of human nature, furthermore, is very important. We have to deal with things as they *are*, not as they *should* be. Our knowledge should not inflate us.

Meekness and knowledge go hand in hand with the Christian. "Knowledge puffs up; but love builds up" (I Cor. 8:1, Wey.).

The *third* characteristic of church leaders is love, as is expressed in 1 Corinthians 13. If our doctrines do not motivate us to loving service we have become as "sounding brass or a clanging cymbal." Perhaps most of us do not need to learn more about the Bible as much as we need to apply and use what we know. Most of us have enough knowledge to last us the rest of our days. The need is to apply it to our lives.

A leader gets his satisfaction through efforts of others. He will get loyalty in proportion to the confidence and loyalty he inspires in others. "You lose your leadership when you cease to lead." The leader must keep the good of the group in mind. If he leads for selfish reasons it becomes not leadership but dictatorship.

The love chapter is a good description of the life and character of Jesus. This kind of love would have solved the problems of the Corinthians; it would solve a lot of ours, too. When old saints are at outs with each other and

ENLARGEMENT THEME CONTINUED

Again with this issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL, as in further issues, we will be bringing you some of the various messages and studies on the theme of *Enlargement* which were considered at the 1965 General Conference. The message on the cover, by Brother Hollis Partlowe was one of the evening sermons, in fact the concluding sermon of the Conference.

On the five following pages, you will find a summary of the important discussions in which delegates shared their thinking in regard to ways to enlarge the Church of God under the leadership and guidance of the Lord. These were most stimulating sessions, led by members of the Board of Directors. Coupled with the ideas that were presented as springboard thoughts (June issue), they set before the Church of God a multitude of ideas for experimentation, and also some forceful admonition in regard to our present condition.

There is serious concern within the Church of God, centered on the fact that while we have made great strides in buildings, in increasing pastoral leadership, in opening mission fields, in financing, and in youth work, there has not been a proportionate growth in the membership of the church. The "home base" which is the local church upon which the work of outreach of both state and general conferences depends, has not grown as rapidly as it should.

We have no intention of retrenching in any of the work already undertaken, nor to overlook any opportunity to go into "all the world," but we do intend to concentrate our attention on ways and means to develop existing churches.

Ultimately, of course, as was recognized by the delegates in the various buzz sessions, neither the General Conference, nor the state conferences, nor even the local churches as groups can really accomplish this. Enlargement is a *personal*, *individual* responsibility as we *each* go out in the name of the Lord to reach others for Him, and as we each pray and seek for places and ways to organize new Bible classes, Sunday schools, and churches.

It is only as the Lord works through each of us, and as the Spirit of God is channeled through each of us, that people will be reached for the Lord and His church.

BAPTISMAL REPORTS

One of the most encouraging facets of this editor's work is preparation of the news pages for the JOURNAL. As we wade through church bulletins and as we read reports sent by faithful secretaries and reporters, we are thrilled each time we type out the lines "BAPTISMS AT _____." During the past few months, there has been an ingathering. Many have come into the body of Christ through the faithful witnessing of friends and relatives and faithful preaching and teaching by men and women of God. We praise God for each such report!

We are impressed with the number of young people who make their decisions at the various youth camps held throughout the country. Each year about this time the churches rejoice as young lives are dedicated to the Lord. The efforts of parents, youth leaders, counselors, pastors, and teachers reach fruition as we see teen-agers stepping forward to accept the Lord Jesus Christ. There can be no greater evidence of the value of the work now being so ably carried on by the General Youth Director, Brother Paul Shaw, and the youth workers and teachers in every church and state conference.

THE EDITOR'S ILLNESS

The editor has appreciated the many expressions of concern and the many prayers that have been offered in his behalf in the past few weeks. ENLARGEMENT through Home Missions

At the 1965 General Conference delegate meetings, one afternoon was devoted to buzz sessions on the theme of "Enlargement Through Home Missions." The seven areas of need that were included in the June PROGRESS JOURNAL were used as the basis for the discussions.

There were seven discussion groups, each of which devoted itself to study of one of the seven areas of need in this field of home missions. The following morning, secretaries or the leader of each group, reported a summary of the ideas and suggestions that came out of each group, in addition to those that had already been suggested in Progress Journal.

Following are the summarized reports of these seven discussion groups. The reports contain many ideas for your study that were suggested by delegates in the group.

GROUP ONE: TOPIC—THE NEED FOR INDIVIDUAL PERSUASION

Group Discussion Leader, Hollis Partlowe; Secretary, Kenneth Vancil.

The Need: To enlarge our borders, everyone must realize that he is a missionary and a preacher and teacher of the gospel. Growth of the church depends upon individual faithfulness in witnessing and winning others.

How to Meet the Need in the Local Church

- 1) Subdivide the pastoral work by appointing a few members to be shepherds over other newer members or prospective members. This would be a type of "buddy" or "big brother" system, to gain and hold members for the church.
- 2) Each person must make personal contacts and use persuasion. We should not dictate, or argue, but be persuasive. Use of tracts, the Systematic Bible Study Course, *The Restitution Herald*, and other literature is recommended. (See the list of Tract Kits and other literature prepared for these purposes in *The Restitution Herald*.)

3) Carry the contact one step further by inviting people

to a specific service and then picking them up to go with you.

- 4) Have a picture of your church, and pictures of some of its classes and activities to show people.
- 5) Always be friendly and courteous in your contacts for the Lord. Go out in the name of the Lord, first praying for yourself and then for the one whom you will contact. Keep on praying and working!

How the General Conference Can Help

- 1) Send important news as press releases from the Conference office to local pastors to be used in local newspapers.
- 2) Advertize services of local churches in Conference papers.
- 3) Include missionary news and photos of Church of God mission work in *The Restitution Herald*, as well as PROGRESS JOURNAL.
- 4) Use of color in tracts and *The Restitution Herald* if the cost is reasonable. (It was understood by the group that some of these things are already being done.)

How Oregon Bible College Can Assist

- 1) Personal work should be made a larger part of the curriculum and Christian service program of Oregon Bible College.
- 2) There should be a special course in personal witnessing.
- 3) College students might work in jails, homes, and other such places when possible.
- 4) Teach ways to give out tracts and other literature that will arouse the curiosity of the reader.

General Summary of the Group Discussion

Individual contacts produce the best results in enlarging the borders of the church. Someone went into a Quaker meeting one time and asked, "When does the service

begin?" The answer was, "The service begins as soon as the meeting is over." If the Church of God is to grow, each individual member of the Church of God must win another, and another, and another, to the Lord.

GROUP TWO: TOPIC—THE NEED TO ENLARGE EXISTING CHURCHES OF GOD

Group Discussion Leader, E. Richard Smith; Secretary, Shirley McQuinn

In discussing the need to enlarge the existing Churches of God, the question was immediately asked, "Why are some Churches of God so small?" (You will remember that five out of eight Churches of God have fewer than fifty members.) Some thoughts presented on this subject were:

- 1) That the problem starts basically in the home in that entire families do not attend services together.
- 2) On the other hand, some are satisfied if they have only their own family in church, and are not concerned about winning others.
- 3) Sometimes older members dampen the enthusiasm of younger members through lack of interest or encouragement. They sometimes think negatively, believing that certain works are impossible, when others are interested in serving.

It was agreed by the group that one answer to enlargement of existing Churches of God is a continuous visitation program. The Rockford, Illinois, Church was cited as an example of having such a program. It was pointed out that such a program may begin with only one or two zealous members, but if they do not become discouraged, the program will spark the interest of other members. Visitation must be accomplished with consecration, prayer, and a real concern and zeal for the lost.

A great deal of discussion was centered around the question of how the pastor and the church can work together to meet the need of enlarging the Church of God. It was emphasized that the pastor must take the leadership and show the way, but each member must also assume responsibility and work side by side with the pastor. The members must work at the task of getting people in-

to the church and the pastor must work at the task of feeding them the true Word of God when they are there.

The greatest asset in a pastor-church relationship is when the church thinks of its pastor, not as a hired servant, but as a co-worker in the Lord's vineyard. It was pointed out that even if the pastor is not an eloquent speaker, if he and his people are working together as men of God, the church will grow in spite of his weakness in this regard.

The group thought that we can often learn from the methods that other churches (especially growing churches) are using. We can often adopt or adapt these methods for our own use, as long as they are in keeping with the Word of God.

It was emphasized that we must each learn to deny ourselves, to give of ourselves, and of our time and money, in order to help the church to grow. There is no substitute for hard work.

It was noted that the local church cannot expect the state or General Conferences to help a local church grow, until and unless it does all in its own power to do so. Smallness is not a sign of righteousness, or a sign that God is blessing a church.

GROUP THREE: TOPIC—THE NEED TO FILL EXISTING PULPITS

Group Discussion Leader: Wayne Laning; Secretary, Mildred Laning

The Problem: There are twenty-six more-or-less organized groups which have Sunday school and (or) church services, which do not have a regular pastor. Some have no pastoral services; some have only irregular services. In several of these places, there is a church building.

Various suggestions were made by this group as to ways to provide services for these places.

- 1) Possibly a survey would be the first step in each place—maybe by someone other than a local member—to find out if the members of the group are *really* willing to work and sacrifice for a regular church program.
- 2) It was emphasized that tithing by each of the members would be one of the essentials to enable the church to secure pastoral services.
- 3) It was suggested that a church might release its experienced pastor for a period of time to establish or reestablish such a field. He could be replaced in his church temporarily by a lay minister, or recently graduated minister. The small churches and home mission fields need the experienced men. "Missions need better men more than better methods," as Bro. Alva Huffer stated in his message to the delegates.
- 4) Several suggestions were presented in regard to the important matter of helping to finance these smaller churches so that they can secure pastoral leadership.
- a) Each state or district conference could consider hiring an evangelist who would go into one of these areas

and reside for a period of time to build up the members until they can call a resident pastor. If one conference has no such field in its own district, perhaps it could help another conference to develop its program.

b) Larger churches might include in their budgets a sum of money to assist a smaller church.

- c) The General Conference Pastoral Aid program is also a source of assistance for several churches each year which need enough extra funds (up to \$75.00 per month) to secure services of a resident pastor.
- 5) Several suggestions were made in regard to Oregon Bible College assistance and training for work in these smaller churches that need pastoral leadership.
- a) Include in the College curriculum definite courses in how to build up small churches and how to work in new areas.
- b) It was suggested that the six-weeks training school for laymen be revived so that local lay leaders can receive additional training to assist in building up the smaller churches until pastoral leadership can be provided, and to assist the pastor in the new work.

GROUP FOUR: TOPIC—THE NEED TO ESTAB-LISH MORE BRANCH CHURCHES FROM EXISTING LARGER CHURCHES

We were fortunate to have in our group representatives from Southlawn, Michigan; Tempe, Arizona; Brush Creek, Ohio; and Hillisburg, Indiana; all churches that have had experience in starting branch churches and Sunday schools. So a good part of our discussion consisted of exchanging ideas and experiences.

We discussed two main ways of doing this kind of evangelistic work. 1) Lay the groundwork for a new church, plan extensively, and then go "first class," so to speak, with everything set up and organized at the first church service. 2) Start off with a few from the mother church; have meetings and Bible studies; and grow gradually into an organized church. There are advantages and disadvantages to both of these methods, of course, and we decided that the method used would depend on the particular church and area.

The Christian Reformed Church in Michigan was used as an example. When a mother church reaches a certain size, then they say, "It's time for you to start another church. We will help you get started." Sunday school leaders tell us, too, that when a class gets to be about ten in number, it is time to divide; it is easier for a class of five to grow than one of ten. The same principle applies to a church. People may often lose their identity in a large church, and they may feel more a part of the church if it is smaller.

Who should be responsible for getting a branch work

started? It was felt that the pastor should not necessarily be the one, but that a new work should be the result of the vision of the people in the locality. Some of our churches have been started because members at a distance wanted a church closer to them. Others have been started because the members wanted to reach out and do some evangelistic work. Actually, it is better to look for opportunities to grow (new housing developments are good), without necessarily considering what is convenient for the members.


How much should be required of the pastor of the mother church? One church said that their pastor had attended planning meetings held once a month and was ready for consultation at any time. How can the pastor encourage the members to step out on a work like this without depending on him to take the lead? This must be a spiritual thing and has to come from within the people. They must be given the desire to expand.

Of course, in all our planning and working, we realize, first of all, that we must start with prayer, seeking the guidance of the Lord, as we work for Him.

GROUP FIVE: TOPIC—THE NEED TO BUILD NEW SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHURCHES WITHIN THE GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS OF EXISTING STATE CONFERENCES

Group Discussion Leader, Emory Macy; Secretary, Opal Hayse

- 1) Our responsibility is to establish Sunday schools and churches wherever there seems to be a definite need. There must be someone desiring to hear the gospel and there must be someone ready to preach and teach the gospel.
- 2) A church census taken in a new area might reveal the presence of a need and opportunity to start a Sunday school. Finding and developing interest and securing a proper place to meet seems to be the problem that needs to be attacked.
- 3) Initiative should come from individuals who are isolated from existing churches. They should inform the state conferences or the General Conference of the need and the opportunity in their areas. Bible classes held regularly in such areas may lead to Sunday school and church services.

- 4) One of the principal needs is for church secretaries and pastors to keep track of isolated people, and people who move. If they go into the vicinity of another Church of God, the local pastor or leader there should be informed immediately. If they move to an isolated area within the district served by a conference, the state conference officers should be notified. If they move to an area outside any state conference, the General Conference office should be notified of the move and the interest of the member in the possibility of services where he now lives. (The General Conference attempts to keep a current mailing list of every member of the Church of God, and keeps in touch with the member through Progress Journal.)
- 5) There was discussion of the problem of financing these new Sunday schools and churches. It is impossible to anticipate each situation, but financing should be considered thoroughly by the people in the new group, the state conference, and the General Conference, and often a combination of the three groups can supply the need.
- 6) Within the state conferences, arrangements can be made for existing churches to share their pastors with newly organized groups, as has been done in Minnesota and Ohio, and possibly other states. The pastor, who is to "do the work of an evangelist" should be seeking such places and opportunities.
- 7) The greatest need again seems to be for dedicated, zealous people who want a new Sunday school started in their community, and other dedicated, zealous people who are willing to serve there.

GROUP SIX: TOPIC—THE NEED TO ORGANIZE WHOLLY NEW SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND AND CHURCHES IN AREAS OUTSIDE THE GEOGRAPHICAL BOUNDARIES OF EXISTING STATE CONFERENCES

Group Discussion Leader, S. O. Ross; Secretary, Francis E. Burnett

Brother S. O. Ross had a large map of the United States and outlined the areas now served by existing state and district conferences. As most members of the Church of God know, there are many states outside of these state conference boundaries where there are no active Churches of God. In many of these states, there *are* isolated members of the Church of God.

1) How to discover areas within these states where there is opportunity to teach and preach the gospel.

- a) A paid Sunday school worker (a layman) might be hired to go into an area and develop a work. A work might be developed in two years.
- b) Find an isolated family, or group of families, and start with them. This family, or families, would have to be really interested in promoting and supporting such a work. Investigation should be made of their interest.
- c) Friends of isolated members, or secretaries and pastors, should supply the General Conference with names of isolated people so that further contact can be made. (This is one reason for the importance of accurate delegate forms—these are used to keep up a full and accurate list of members.)
 - 2) How to supply workers for such an area.
- a) Employ a full-time worker—either a minister or qualified layman—or possibly a retired couple, to go into such an area for a year or more to develop this field.
- b) Women graduated from Oregon Bible College might be sent into such areas to start a Sunday school and begin the development of a work.
- 3) What to do in an area where there is no isolated family to start such a work.
- a) Advertise Church of God literature, using newspaper ads for the Bible Study Course, or ads asking for reply to a box number, or even spot radio or television announcements asking for replies. If there is response, work could begin with those who have responded or shown interest.
- b) Watch the population growth of certain cities and then send someone into a rapidly growing area to start a work. A home in such an area could be used to begin a Sunday school.
- c) Perhaps land could be purchased in a rapidly growing residential area with a view to building a church there.
- d) Consideration should be given to going into the poverty areas, and downtown areas of big cities. Many churches have moved into the suburbs, leaving large downtown residential areas unchurched.
- 4) A closing thought was presented that money need not be a factor to hold us back. If we do as they did in the apostolic church, each one would become the center of a work for the Lord, no matter where he lived. The words of Acts 8:4 were quoted, "They that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the word."

GROUP SEVEN: TOPIC—THE NEED TO FIND A PRACTICAL MEANS FOR MASS EVANGELISM

Group Discussion Leader, Alva G. Huffer; Secretary, Darrell Maddock

The Need: Some way should be found to give the Church of God world-wide recognition, to prepare the ground for the sowing of the seed. We must face the fact that the Church of God is now small, obscure, and unknown, and its message is foreign to the vast majority of people in the world.

We found in our group that this was a fertile field for discussion. Many ideas were forthcoming, which we have divided into three major groupings, as follows: I) Literature; II) Radio and Television; III) Miscellaneous Mass Evangelism.

I. Literature

- 1) Due to smallness and limited funds of our General Conference, it was expressed that we might place tracts in all countries written in their own language. It was also expressed that possibly we could look ahead to writing a language where there is only a spoken language at the present time. (Tracts are one of the least expensive ways of propagating the Word of God).
- 2) Promotion of Church of God literature at such places as the World Olympics, the World's Fair, state fairs, and other such public affairs. Here also would be an avenue for tracts in different languages.
- 3) Using mass mailing lists, such as those used by companies to expand their product, or the mailing lists of those who believe a great deal like the Church of God.
- 4) Have more of our material available for quick use for those who might desire some of our quarterlies or other materials that we print in fairly small quantities. This would probably in time increase the economy of our General Conference.
- 5) Sell our *Songs of Truth* through national advertising, which would ultimately lower the cost of the book and at the same time set forth the doctrines of God's Word.
- 6) Use our Church of God members in the armed forces for distribution mediums for our literature.


II. Radio and Television

- 1) Promotion of some Church of God talent over a network television program, such as the "Mike Douglas Show" with the thought of advertising our General Conference and Oregon Bible College.
- 2) Sending recordings of our recorded talent to radio stations in local areas as a gift. In connection with this it was suggested that we make requests of the radio stations for these recordings, thus arousing interest, questions, etc.
- 3) The use of radio work pushed to a larger scale with the intent of a network and (or) world coverage.
- 4) The distribution of pre-set radio sets especially in mission fields where we might have our own radio station. One such suggestion was the Philippines, where there is a desire for radio work.
- 5) Using "spot" advertising on radio or television to publicize our literature, correspondence courses, Oregon Bible College, etc.
- 6) Recording of Bible stories for use over religious radio stations.

III. Miscellaneous Mass Evangelism

- 1) Use of our service men to spread the gospel to different parts of the world through Bible study classes, preaching, etc.
- 2) Gospel teams used as assistants for a Church of God evangelist.
- 3) Recordings of Church of God talent put into "juke-boxes."
- 4) Due to the increase of camping in the United States, why not put on services at different campsites throughout the country? An idea is now being discussed for a "camping caravan" to do this very thing, especially throughout the summer months. This would be voluntary.
- 5) Having services at drive-in-theaters during seasonable times of the year.
- 6) Sponsor a General Conference-backed group, with soloist, trios, quartets, special music, and speaker and present a program in some large city auditorium. Tent meetings in different parts of the country could be used also. It was expressed maybe this could start in the South where people seem a little quicker to respond to this type of service.
- 7) Evangelism through national and international youth programs.
- 8) Older youth traveling through Europe on bicycles, using "youth hostels," and distributing the Word of God through Church of God literature.
 - 9) "Pen pals" with foreign youth, etc.
- 10) Church of God sermon outlines published in national magazines, such as *Pulpit Digest* and *Sermon Builder*.
- 11) Pre-taped devotions for telephone use, used as a "Dial-a-Devotion" in our city churches especially.
- 12) A mass library of church services on tape for use with shut-ins.
- 13) Sponsoring of a Bible study in your homes after the manner of the "Stanley" parties, with gifts, etc. Moving to different areas with this means of evangelism.
- 14) Working with civic clubs in the local church area. This could apply to church businessmen as well as pastors.
- 15) Reaching the minds of people through a more publicized view of Israel in the light of prophecy fulfilled (Please turn to page 15)

General Conference Progress

1964 - 1965 GOAL FOR GIVING OVER THE TOP

In the past year, ending September 30, 1965, the Goal for Giving was \$63,553.00. By the closing date the total given was \$64,455.00. The Goal for September was \$5,676.00; the amount given in September was \$6,578.00. Thus we went over the Goal for the month and for the fiscal year. We praise the Lord for this blessing, and praise you, His people, for the sacrificial giving which has made this accomplishment possible.

During this same period of time, more than \$30,000.00 was contributed for such other projects as the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign, Mission Builders, Christian Service, Oregon Bible College Boosters, and scholarships, and Student Assistance, so that total giving for the year was nearly \$100,000.00. (A complete audit report will be made in the December issue of Progress Journal.)

The giving of Church of God people is above average; in fact, is indicative of real faith and devotion to the Lord's work. We are grateful for these gifts, large and small, which together underwrite the outreach of the Church of God General Conference.

NEW GOALS FOR GIVING - 1965 - 1966

At the 1965 General Conference, the delegates approved the largest Goal for Giving in the history of the Conference, \$67,070.00. The Goal was based upon the following estimated income and expense for the Conference for this year. This is the operating income and expense, and does not include the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign, Mission Builders League appeals, or capital expenses for large equipment or building expenditures.

A CALL TO LEADERSHIP

will not speak to each other, they fail to practice this love. It's bad to have dissension, but it's worse if it causes us to part company. Divisions can happen in the church because we have a difference of opinion, and they sometimes become strong. They are only opinions, however. We are not mature until we learn to disagree agreeably.

Furthermore, the fourth quality of a leader is power of persuasion. Being a good leader is determined in a large measure by what one is able to get others to do. The early disciples persuaded people. Being filled with the Spirit, they moved people toward their Lord. Likewise, we need to speak out with relevance in our confusing age. The gospel of Jesus Christ is as relevant today as it was then. In a very real sense every Christian is a leader. The layman is a man on the front lines. He has to supply answers to the neighbors and those in the office and factory. Our greatest need is men and women whose lives and lips speak in perfect harmony. Otherwise we will be like a man who would write a check for five hundred dollars with only fifty in the bank. It will catch up with us—either way. Our mouths should not stretch farther than our legs. "More people are won to Christ by faithful laymen than by eloquent sermons and polished preachers."

Finally, the *fifth* characteristic of a church leader is dedication to Jesus Christ. He is its head. (Col. 1:18.) We "are "members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones" The first printing of the annual Church of God Direc (Eph. 5:20). The head directs the rest of the body. Orgospels sometimes displace Jesus as Head. We have the gospel of civil rights and the gospel of anti-communism, but the best opposition against either is the cross of Jesus.

It takes hard work and sacrifice to be a leader. If you do not want to pay this price do not shop at the leadership counter. No one ever became a great leader or a great success on an eight-hour day. Nearly all converts are won by "second-mile" Christians.

Jesus is the Lord of the church. That is one thing that the resurrection settled nearly two thousand years ago. He is in charge. Until one accepts that, he will not amount to much in Christian work. That is why the early church made such an impact on its generation. He was in charge of their lives; He gave the orders. They had learned to follow, which made them good leaders. He told them where to go and where not to go. He is the proven leader.

To us He says, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Yes, that is the Great Commission which most of us have heard since we were knee-high. To be involved in it is to make the richest contribution to your generation. To do less is disobedience to God. The mandate is simple, clear, and direct. This calls for leadership—consistent, constant, and positive!

While full details are not available at this time, the contest will be held in the spring, probably the month following Easter. The contest will be for a shorter duration than the three-month contest held last year. While the details of the contest are still somewhat tentative, we wanted to announce the approximate date of the contest early, so that state conferences and individual churches will be able to go ahead with their own long-range plans for possible contests or other promotions.

The Highest Calling - The Mission Field

IT IS the Spirit of God that should bring action and response. The Church of God is God's church. When we as God's people respond to His leadership, the love of God is manifest in and through us. We are then able to live the words of the chorus we so often sing, "Lord lay some soul upon my heart and love that soul through me."

Learning the will of God comes through a study of the Word of God. A knowledge of the Word of God allows one to do the work of God in truth. It is our purpose to share together our thinking about the work which God as entrusted to His church.

The highest calling is the program of salvation through Christ. The Scripture speaks to us about the worth of this program of salvation. "How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!" (Rom. 10:15). "Esteem them very highly for their work's sake" (1 Thess. 5:12, 13). The work of the program of salvation is the highest calling. It is the wonderful calling of presenting the message of salvation to a needy people.

The mission field is the place of service, where the message of salvation reaches a needy people! The mission field is more precious than places. It's *people!* God is not concerned with land; He is concerned with lives. He is not so much concerned with soil as He is with souls. Not the cities, but the citizens are the concern of God. The true mission field is the human heart!

When we speak of Nova Scotia, the Philippine Islands, India, Mexico, or any other place in the world, are you thinking about places, programs, and projects or are you thinking about people? God is much concerned with the eternal welfare of the people in these places. This should be the concern of the people of God in the Church of God, that we might be faithful to the work that God has commissioned to His church. Wherever there are hearts that need to be touched with the grace of God in Christ Jesus, there is the calling of the Church of God. *This* is the highest calling.

God always matches an obedience with an opportunity! This is what He has done for the Church of God in these last days; He has opened doors to us as we have accepted each opportunity with obedience. The mission field of the Church of God has been enlarged from Nova Scotia to the Philippine Islands to India and to Mexico because we have accepted each opportunity with obedience. When we fail to accept an opportunity that God has placed before us, then I believe that these opportunities will cease. God opens the doors as long as we are ready to go through them.

We would hasten to inject a word of caution at this point. If our missionary work on foreign soil becomes a means of soothing our concern for not doing anything here at home, then we are in for trouble. The demand will soon exhaust the supply. We must have a united mission emphasis in the Church of God to accomplish the ministry of the church. We all need to be missionaries here at home. We must strengthen the local church as we seek

to enlarge the witness of the church throughout the world.

Jesus said, "I lay down my life for the sheep. And other sheep I have which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold and one shepherd" (John 10:15, 16). God has given us the responsibility of being keepers of His sheep. "Abel was a keeper of sheep, but Cain was a tiller of the ground" (Gen. 4:2). We are aware of the results when each brought his offering to God. The acceptable offering from the Church of God is to be a keeper of the sheep. For our purposes this illustration from Genesis will serve to show the choice between obedience to the true purposes of God's church and the many minor things which often strangle the real ministry of the church. "A tiller of the ground" will represent all of the activities that take so much time in the church that we cannot accomplish our true calling. How much business of the church has to do with reaching people? So much of our business has to do with the mechanics of running the church rather than with men reaching the lost for Christ! We must be directed by our highest calling—the mission field. We must be about our Father's business, presenting the message of salvation to a needy people.

There are three major areas of missionary need.

The Home. There are many persons of the families of the church who have yet to be reached with the word of salvation.

The second area is the *Community*. To achieve this we have instituted the "Each One Reach One" program.

The third area is the World. It was the world that God so loved, the world into which Christ sent His apostles to preach the gospel. We believe in conditional salvation, not universal salvation. We believe that an understanding of the gospel is vital to salvation, that a person must be baptized into the name of Christ, that he must live a life of service in the will of God.

Let us get to the mission fields where these needs need to be met! Others may be able to sit by and relax, but not the Church of God!

ENLARGEMENT THROUGH VISITATION

Who Shall Visit?

MANY people are thrilled by the stories missionaries can tell of their experiences. A large number would like to be missionaries, that is, returned missionaries. Few would be willing to make the sacrifices necessary.

All agree it would be wonderful to have our church grow in numbers. Many consent that something should be done, and are willing to let George do it. A few will say, "Lord, here am I, send me."

Jesus told His disciples plainly that His cross, suffering, and death would precede His glory. They did not understand, so had to have it demonstrated to them. He left them and us an example that we should follow in His steps.

Methods of Visitation

Many methods have been tried to build up the Lord's work; all kinds of blue-and-red contests, awards for new members, lunches, suppers, and banquets. God is not seeking for better methods, but for better men.

Jesus sent His apostles and disciples out two by two to be His witnesses. After His death, resurrection, ascension, and Pentecost we read: "With great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus" (Acts 4:33). The Lord added to the church daily. The apostler made the personal contact first. Paul later said, "Of the hope and resurrection of the dead I am called in question" (Acts 23:6). Christians in the early church witnessed of a living, loving Saviour, and men were brought face to face with the question, "What shall I do with Jesus which is called the Christ?" It was then that all other questions became small and trivial.

Those who will go out to visit or do personal work must be prepared to give Bible answers to those who are convicted of sin; the anxious; those not convicted of sin, the self-righteous; those having doubts, difficulties, or excuses; those depending upon false hopes; and those who are skeptics. Only by the Word of God and the power of the Holy Spirit of God will anyone be able to meet and overcome all these problems. We know of no better methods than to be fully armed and take the Sword of the Spirit.

Who Shall Visit?

The pastor is the key to the whole visitation program. (Please turn to page 12)

TOTAL YOUTH GIVING \$2,918.40

The General Conference 1964-65 fiscal year has closed, and a statement of total contributions appeared last month. However, for the last several years, the Bereans of the church have maintained a "goal within a goal" for their contributions. All contributions of Bereans and of all other persons and churches are listed in the General Conference Goals for Giving Report and the list of donors. However, a separate accounting is also kept of the contributions of Bereans and Berean groups. Each summer at the General Berean Youth Conference the youth of the church set a goal for the next fiscal year. The goal for the 1964-65 fiscal year was \$2,500.00. Actual youth giving during the period ending September 30 was \$2,918.40 more than four hundred dollars over their goal. These figures speak for themselves regarding the enthusiasm of our youth in supporting the Lord's work.

At last summer's Berean Youth Conference a goal was set for the 1965-66 fiscal year of \$3,150.00. The additional \$650.00 is to be used to help finance a new missionary project of the Berean Youth Fellowship, a Youth Mission Caravan to Mexico.

As a shepherd of the flock, he will follow Christ's example in seeking and saving the lost. He will be among his people as a servant. He will set the example.

We all find it so easy to sing with our lips, "Crown him Lord of all," but it is quite another story to make Him Lord of our lives. Saul met Jesus on the road to Damascus but had to be blinded and struck down before his pride would permit him to ask, "Who art thou Lord?" And, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" (Acts 9:6). Later he told the Corinthian Christians: "Ye are not your own. For ye are bought with a price, therefore glorify God in your body" (1 Cor. 6:19, 20).

When we have surrendered our wills to His divine will there will be no alternative. "Ye are my witnesses!" Who else? Only the child of God can tell what Christ has done, is doing, and will yet do for men. It is only when His Holy Spirit fills our hearts that we will gladly be used to witness for Him. (Rom. 8:9.)

Witness - Men of Compassion

The Parable of the Good Samaritan will always be a masterpiece to illustrate in simple terms the compassion of Christ or one of His followers to meet the needs of men. Jesus looked on the multitudes of His day and had compassion upon them. They were needy, suffering, hopeless. The harvest was white. The laborers then were as few as today, but divine love and compassion fills mens' hearts with a desire to meet need whether spiritual or physical.

There is much work in our churches today, but little witnessing. No matter how many members we may have, or how much money we raise, how elaborate our services, or how many meetings we may have, if there is no compassion for the lost we are failing to meet and fulfill Christ's Great Commission. "Go ye into all the world" is still His last command, and "he that winneth souls is wise."

How Shall We Get the Job Done?

It is easy to "let George do it." Others are more qualified, have more time, find it easy to talk to people, or have less work to do. What would we think of a man who would refuse to rescue a child standing in the path of an oncoming train? Suppose he would say, "Let the parents care for their own children." That child might perish if neglected at that particular moment, and who would be to blame? Jesus said the vine that produced no fruit was to be cut off and burned.

Our Motivation—Christ Must Be Lord!

Jesus our Lord died to save men, but has been rejected ignored, and vilified for centuries. But God has highly exalted Him that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father. (Phil. 2:9-11.) When

our faith makes us act like *Jesus is Lord* of our lives now, we shall witness with love, enthusiasm, and gladness. Like David, we will say, "Then will I teach transgressors thy ways; and sinners shall be converted unto thee" (Psa. 51:13). When we see ourselves as "sinners saved by grace" (Eph. 2:8, 9) then we can really have compassion for those living in sin and will do our utmost to save them from perishing.

In Conclusion

Be not afraid to do personal work, but be a mouthpiece for God.

May we not argue with others, but humbly show them that their eternal future depends on what they will do with Jesus Christ, the Son of the Living God.

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION PROGRESS

There were not enough ministers and churches enrolled in the proposed Ministers' Retirement Association to put it into effect this year. Therefore the deadline is extended and it is still possible for ministers and churches to enroll. At least half of the member churches (39) and half of the eligible ministers (41) must be enrolled before the program can be inaugurated.

In proposing the Ministers' Retirement Association, in accord with actions taken by the Ministerial Association and the General Conference delegates, the committee understands that the program is small. The contributions required (1% of the gross income of the church and the minister who are members) are small, but in proportion the proposed benefit of \$50.00 per month upon retirement is generous.

For instance, a premium of \$60.00 per year (1% of \$6,000.00 income) would not begin to purchase insurance or annuities that would pay \$50.00 per month at age sixty-five. Only co-operative action by the ministers and churches working together, can provide a realistic retirement program for the Church of God ministry.

Working Together

NE of the essentials for accomplishing anything as a group is working together. On the athletic field it is called teamwork. When two of you try to row a boat you discover the necessity of rowing together to make the boat go in the right direction.

The work that God has given us to do as individuals in local churches, state conferences or districts, and in the General Conference is the serious and important business of preaching the gospel and helping others to grow in Christ in these closing days of this age.

The essential truths regarding working together are set forth abundantly in the Scriptures. Paul said, "Ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular" (1 Cor. 12:27). He was speaking of the church. We are members one of another. We remember that Paul began this thought with the illustration of the human body, how that each part of the body works together as a unit.

Once while eating, someone told me my mouth opened every time my elbow bent. I thought I was being teased; but should not the mouth prepare to receive the food when the arm brings it?

Paul wisely used his illustration to help the members of the Corinthian Church avoid divisions which tend to destroy the church and make it ineffective.

The most important part of the body is the head. If there were something wrong with the head, the legs might not hold the body up. An ailing head may cause the feet to turn one from the right path.

There is nothing wrong with our head. CHRIST is our Head and He is perfect. Christ is God's masterpiece, the firstborn from the dead, the Head of the church.

Second in importance for good co-ordination and effective work, is good communication between the head and the other parts of the body, and between one member and another. If the nerves or nerve centers are diseased, the communication may be cut off and the body is ineffective. Paralysis is often fatal.

The best illustration of the effect of disrupted communication in a group of people is found in Genesis 11. It was during the building of the tower of Babel that God confounded their language, and the record says, "They left off building the city" (v. 8, R.S.V.).

We are thankful for *The Restitution Herald*, Progress Journal, and church bulletins. Our fellowship each Sunday and Wednesday evening in the local church, our conferences and other meetings provide the opportunity for vital communication.

There is other communication that is more important. It is the message that God has given us in His Word and we are told to study to show ourselves approved of God. This is not enough. We are to pray to God in the name of Jesus and we ought not to think of it as a one-way communication. Most of us were taught to ask God for things we need and to thank Him for our blessings, but how about listening to hear what God has to say to us? If you have studied God's Word He may remind you of some part of it that is important for you today, that is, if you will listen and expect to hear Him.

Jesus came to do God's will. We, too, should seek to do His will. We ought to seek earnestly every day to do God's will. Paul said, "It is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure" (Phil. 2:13). "Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God" (2 Cor. 3:5).

This is the secret of working together. One body, the church, is directed by a single head, Christ, who has committed Himself completely to the Father. When we are willing to let Christ be our head and will do God's will, we will be working together. It is that simple! We all have the same Word that God has given to us. It is also stated in Ephesians 4:4 that "there . . . is one Spirit," and in Romans 8:14 we read, "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God." We are sons of God.

Mexico Trip Report

I WAS my happy privilege to spend a week in Mexico visiting with Brother and Sister Dean Moore and meeting each of the mission workers there. I was to have arrived at Saltillo on Friday evening, December 17; however, due to bad weather in Monterrey, our plane had to carry us on to Mexico City, some six hundred miles beyond. We experienced some difficulty getting back, so did not arrive at the Moore home in Saltillo until Sunday morning at about five o'clock.

We left shortly after to drive with Brother Moore to visit the work at the village of Potosi. This work is pastored by Brother Francisco Martinez and we were thrilled when about sixty children and several adults came to the service which was held in a very small room of the Martinez home. These people are in process of building an adobe church where the services can be held to much better advantage. This village of twenty-three hundred inhabitants has only one other minister and we believe there are great prospects for the establishment of a large church here.

We then journeyed another hundred miles to Matehuala, a city of forty thousand, where Brother Adolfo Alvarez is the pastor. The service was conducted in a room of their two-room house, with forty-five attending. The service lasted more than two hours, with no sign of non-attention. The Spanish class of Oregon Bible College had made a tape in Spanish the day before I left. On this tape were greetings from Brother William Wachtel and several of the students, each telling a little about himself. Several songs were sung by the students. This tape was played at this service and was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

We then traveled to Labor Vieja, a mountain village of one thousand people, located near the city of Rio Verde. Brother Ascencion Lara is the pastor. Brother Roberto Badillo and his wife Lupe were recently baptized. Brother Badillo worked in the Blanchard, Michigan, area

in 1961, under the Bracero program and attended some of the special services there. When he returned from that work he was presented a Bible by the Blanchard brethren. We believe this was the first Bible brought into the village of Labor Vieja. He began to study it and to share it with his relatives and friends. Soon they wrote for more Bibles and Brother Badillo is now a strong believer and a diligent worker in the church.

A service was held here on Monday evening, with seventy-five, mostly adults, in attendance. The service was held outside, with two kerosene lanterns for light and the congregation seated on benches, chairs, and the ground. This also was a two-hour service, with two sermons, testimonials, special music, and very inspirational congregational singing, accompanied by two guitars. A building is now being constructed here, made of earthen blocks and heavy corrugated roofing. These people are most anxious to have it finished and get it in use.

We had opportunity to speak to all three of these groups, with Brother Moore translating, and we received a real blessing from this fellowship with these brethren, even though we could not speak or understand their language, except as repeated by Brother Moore.

It is planned to start regular services in Saltillo also as soon as a meeting place can be found. Brother Fernando Alvarez, a member who now lives here, will take over the leadership of this group. Presently there are only Sunday afternoon Bible studies held in the home of a Mr. Cadena, who also worked in the Blanchard area at one time

We believe the work in Mexico is progressing well, after only twenty-eight months of work. We feel that Brother and Sister Moore are doing an excellent work in leading these people, and we ask your continued prayers and concern for the work in Mexico and in all the other fields of mission service as well.

General Conference Progress

ANNUAL MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

The annual conference of Church of God ministers was held at Oregon Bible College, January 24-28. Ministers from various places in the United States and Canada were in attendance and very much enjoyed the period of spiritual retreat, study, fellowship, and business.

This time of refreshing is of infinite value to the minister and to his church. We encourage each church to make it possible for its minister to attend these meetings, by paying his share in the expense pool.

THIRD EDITION OF SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

The third edition of *Systematic Theology*, by Alva G. Huffer, is now ready for distribution. It is essentially the same as previous editions, except that several minor corrections in words have been made and newly designed dust jackets are being used.

This book is beautifully printed and bound, and is an ideal gift to a friend, relative, or library. It is hoped that with this third edition now available, we will be able to complete our project of supplying one copy for each Bible school and seminary library in the United States and Canada.

SUPERINTENDENT'S AND WORKER'S MANUAL BEING DISTRIBUTED

Orders for the Superintendent's and Worker's Manual are now being filled. This booklet, by Paul Overholser, a long-time Sunday school leader in the Church of God, will be an invaluable tool for superintendents, teachers, pastors, and other Sunday school workers. It is written with the small Sunday school in mind, and its practical, explicit, down-to-earth ideas are adaptable in Church of God Sunday schools. The booklet sells for \$1.00 postage paid.

GIVING BROCHURE IN THE MAIL

A brochure is now in the mail to each member family of the Church of God, suggesting some of the ways now possible to improve one's stewardship. New laws and new approaches to taxation open the door to ways of giving to educational and religious organizations that are advantageous to both the giver and the institution. 

There were three baptisms at the Quezon Church in the Philippines in October. Ireneo Matusalem and his two sons, Rudy and Romeo, were immersed, being assisted by Bro. Santiago Somera, pastor of the church.

Bro. Ortiguero asks that any packages being sent to the churches there should be addressed as follows to avoid any customs, and because there are no weight limits when addressed to a religious organization. The address should be: Church of God (Abrahamic Faith), Inc., care Pastor Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, Solano, Nueva Vizcaya, Philippines.

A quote from Bro. Ortiguero's recent letter, "We are very thankful for all the helps that the American brethren have extended for the construction of the Uddiawan Church. The desire of the Apostle Paul recorded in his Epistle to the Galatians has been fulfilled. He wrote, 'Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ' (6:2)."

INDIA

The church in Bangalore had special services both on December 24 and on Christmas Day. At the conclusion of the services on Friday, gifts were passed out to all in attendance. The gifts were mostly wearing apparel of some sort and everyone received "eatables."

MEXICO

The delegates to the last General Conference voted to print the Systematic Bible Study Course (twenty-nine lessons) in Spanish. The printer in Monterrey is now working on these lessons. Proofs have been made of several of the lessons and they are being rechecked for possible errors, and they will soon begin running them off. These will be very helpful in the mission work in Mexico.

We had the privilege of meeting this printer while in Mexico last month. He is a pastor of a Christian Church and, since working on these lessons, he has become very interested in our distinct doctrines. Pray for this project and for him.

Bro. Dean Moore has asked that we express his thanks to all the churches who have so generously sent clothing and supplies for use in Mexico. He asked also that no more be sent for a while. There are over twenty boxes at the Harlingen Church now. Because the amount he can take in each time is limited, it will be sometime before he will be able to transport all of these boxes into Mexico for actual use. When the supply becomes low we will let it be known through this page.

MISSION BUILDERS

The Raymore, Mo., Church, built with the assistance of Mission Builders League, is now completed and in use. It will be dedicated on February 20.

Appeal number sixteen will be for the Truth Seekers Church of God at Elmhurst, Ill., formerly the Chicago Church of God.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

William M. Wachtel, President

WHY A BIBLE COLLEGE?

Ever since the Bible college movement began some seventy-five years ago, there have been Christians who have questioned the value of this type of education. With the large number of liberal arts colleges and the growth of state universities, Bible colleges have had a struggle to justify their right to exist and to prove their competence in the preparation of Christian workers.

Oregon Bible College has not escaped the need of justifying its existence and proving its competence, even in the eyes of its supporting constituency—the members of the Church of God General Conference. Despite more than twenty-five years of successful operation and a sizable body of ministerial alumni, some Church of God parents still view the College's program and the quality of its education with suspicion or condescension. A frank facing of facts and the interests of good public relations call for an airing of this situation and a setting straight of the record.

The writer has not infrequently viewed with dismay what he has considered a tragic misdirection of parental guidance. A promising Church of God young person, nearing high school graduation, aspires to Christian service and shows a definite inclination to enter Oregon Bible College to gain needed preparation. Well-meaning parents, for various reasons, have discouraged or even forbidden their son or daughter to carry out these plans. The writer has cause to believe that in some instances the reason was that the parents felt their child deserved a "better" education than he could secure here.

It is true that Oregon Bible College does not have the most expensive facilities, the largest library, the greatest endowment, the most famous professors. But it is also true that the quality and value of education are not altogether dependent on such factors, desirable as they may be. For the Christian, *eternal* values must always take first place. This writer humbly submits that for Church of God people who *love* the truth which they have accepted, there can be or should be no other institution of learning in all the world quite as dear as the school which is specifically dedicated to teach this truth and to prepare others to teach it! In a very important sense, therefore, how can one receive a "better" education elsewhere?

This does not mean that we should adopt a blind or uncritical attitude toward the deficiencies of the College nor fail to improve the quality of our education wherever needful and however possible. There is always room for improvement, and the present faculty are sincerely dedicated to the achievement of excellence in all phases of Oregon Bible College training. When all is said and done, however, no apology is necessary for the philosophy which brought the College into being and which insists today that the highest caliber of Christian preparation is available within her portals!

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

Every year at the beginning of the second semester several scholarships are awarded to students who have demonstrated academic excellence, outstanding Christian character, worthy leadership, and other qualities. These scholarships, with the exception of one, are tuition scholarships of \$100 each. The exception is the Chester A. Ferrell Scholarship of \$200, awarded this year to Roger Cupp, who achieved a 4.0 average the first semester. The other scholarships were awarded as follows: the S. E. Magaw Scholarship, to Stephen Bolhous; the Boosters' Scholarship, to Michael Mattison; the Norman McLeod Scholarship, to David Krogh; the S. J. Lindsay Scholarship, to Scott Ross; the James A. Patrick Scholarship, to Mary Mickey; the Northeast Berean Scholarship, to Michael Hale; the Brush Creek Sewing Circle Scholarship, to Clarence McQuinn; and the Glen R. and Violet M. Booth Scholarship, to Donald Needham. Grants-inaid in smaller amounts were awarded to Rex Shaw, Darrell Rankin, Alice Aldrich, Kathryn New, Susan Harbison, Steven Mathews, Joyce Railton, Donald Hightower, Janet Heiser, Joe Astolfi, and Sandra Ford.

The Parable of the Talents--Lesson 11

(Due to a series of errors, Lesson 11 in the Adult Truth Seeker's Quarterly, for March 13, 1966, is incorrect. We are sorry for this error and for the inconvenience to teachers and classes. The text for study for this Sunday is Matthew 25:14-30, and not the text printed in the Quarterly.)

LESSON TEXT FOR SUNDAY, MARCH 13, 1966:

MATTHEW 25:14-30

LESSON DISCUSSION

This Parable of the Talents is the third of a series which illustrates the difference between the ideal servant of Christ and the person who reaps destruction. The parable is concerned with how Christians use the time between Christ's ascension and His return to us. Specifically, for you and me, it is concerned with how we use today.

In Matthew 24:42-51, the Parable of the Householder tells us of the condition of readiness, and good care we give each other in the church.

The Virgins Parable in chapter 25:1-13 reminds us that we must maintain the spiritual glow in our lives, that Jesus will see that glow when He returns.

The Setting and Occasion

Matthew 25:14. For. Note how "for" stands for "because." We are pointed back to the preceding verse. Verse 13 reminds us that we do not know what day or hour will mark Jesus' return. Therefore, watch! (Be on the alert!-A.S.B.) We must be alert, for certain results will be expected of us. The Parable of the Talents will describe those results. The kingdom of heaven. These words, being italicized, indicate that they are not found in the Greek manuscripts. Bullinger suggests that the insertion, "the coming of the Son of man," would more properly complete the full sense of the verse. A man travelling into a far country. In the first century, that meant slow transportation for a considerable length of time. Servants. In the Greek, the word signified some form of bondage, as indenturement. Delivered unto them his goods. This parable is an illustration of commercial life. The owner of a sound business was going on an extended trip. He did not want to close the mercantile market, so he turned over to his bondservants all his merchandise and liquid accounts. Each one was entrusted with some of the goods. Each had instructions to put the goods out to trade, to buy and sell and trade for the account of the owner. Apparently, each bondservant was given full responsibility for his allotment of goods. Then the owner departed, having given no suggestion as to when he would return.

15. Five . . . two . . . one. We are given these three examples of the manner of apportioning the goods among all the bond- promise from the lord. The words are identiservants. Talents. A Roman monetary term. It has been estimated that a talent would be exchangeable for \$29,085 in 1960 values. So the five-talent man was entrusted with \$145,425 and the two-talent man with \$58,170. To every man according to his several ability. The apportionment ratios were not determined by the owner's favoritism, the bondservant's skin color, age, sex, or national origin. The value of goods entrusted to each was determined by the value of the abilities each servant could bring to bear upon his trading activities. No one was given more responsibility than one could bear. Each was expected to live up to his potential.

Some Traded, Some Dug

16, 17. Went and traded. Three simple words that stand for zealous activity. A storekeeper combines floorspace, goods purchased at wholesale, utility and other services, employees efforts, advertising, good will, and his own management ability to effect a continual process of "buying low and selling high." Using wisdom and profits, he may be able to double his capital assets every few years. This is the sort of thing the bond servants were doing. Both working servants, after some time, were able to accumulate assets double the value of that with which they had originally been entrusted.

18. But one bondservant went and digged . . . and hid. This man was given one talent for trading. His ability was assessed to be sufficient to handle one. Why did he fail? Was he jealous of his fellows? Was only one talent beneath his estimate of self? Was he afraid he would lose it? Lord's. The parable is concerned with the owner. When the word was brought from the Greek to English, the translators had the feudal system in mind. This system was based on the labors of serfs who worked the land and were bound over to their owners, or lords.

The Owner's Return

20, 22. He that had received . . . came and brought. The owner, having returned, called his bondservants to him to account for their labors in his absence. The men who had the five talents and two talents stepped forward, bearing their purses. Each in his turn was able to hand to his owner the amount that had been given into his care. Then they could sav. "But look, I have gained a profit for you of five (or two) more talents."

21. 23. His lord said. These two men enjoyed a wonderful elevation in life. When the lord had left his business in the care of his bondservants these two men had been but two of all the servants.

In the meantime, the two men had doubled their charge from their lord. The difference between five and two talents is immaterial. The significant point is that each man had done the best he could with what he had. Each had won the same commendation and tion.

cal.

Each heard the praise, "Well done." Each could note that he was called, "good and faithful servant." Each received the same promise, because "thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things." Each was welcomed and invited to "enter into the joy of thy lord." This last phrase suggests what we would term an act of manumission. When an indentured servant's obligation was wiped off the books he was freed of the past and enabled to enter into the same kind of joys known by the master. So, we see that the good servants were elevated from bondage to a share in the responsibility of rulership.

24. He which had received . . . came and said. Look at the other man's classic poor performance. He started talking the moment he got the floor. Having heard the glowing reports of the workers, he knew he was in a bad way. He tried to justify his failure by fabricating a seemingly plausible statement of his understanding. He stated three half-truths: 1) Lord, I know you to be a hard man; 2) You reap where you have not sown; 3) You gather grain where you scattered no seed. And then he said,

25. I was afraid. He said he had hidden the master's talent in the ground. Then, showing the money, he announced, "See, you have what is yours." When we remember that persons often ascribe their own faults to others and then blame their own failures on the other's faults, we can see through this man's

26. His lord answered. The master knew of the man's laziness, and called him wicked, a word that signified, "full of labors and pains in working mischief."

27. "If that is the opinion you have of me," said the master, "then you ought to have put my money in the bank. On my arrival I would have received my money back with interest."

28. Then came the fateful command to take the one talent away from the failure and give it to him who then had ten.

29. Explanation. At the time when accounts are settled, those who have will be given more. But, from those who have not, even their little bit will be taken away. How can something be taken from nothing? Consider the muscle, which is something, but wastes away to nothingness through nonuse. Consider the non-used "savings in a sock" which atrophy through inflation. Consider the brilliant mind that is burned up by alcohol.

Finality of Failure

30. Outer darkness. Not just plain dark. ness, such as night, which will fade into the day. But, outer darkness: blackest, darkest, nothingness: death.

It is hoped that there are sufficient suggestions in the above treatment of the parable that the student can readily make the applica-

ENLARGEMENT THROUGH A VISITATION PROGRAM

By Bernard Hightower, Macomb, Illinois

EVANGELISM may have many definitions. Perhaps we could say that evangelism consists of every possible way to reach outside the church to bring people to faith in Christ and membership in the church. No doubt the very core of evangelism is bringing people to acknowledge and accept Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. Evangelism can be defined as a connected series of steps, each depending on the other.

1. Contact

- a. The first step is to turn toward the church some of the feet which have been passing its doors.
- b. Most of those who pass by it do not dislike the church, neither do they like it, they simply do not think about it.
- c. The need is to contact and to arouse some sort of feeling for the church.

2. Cultivation

- a. This step is to get those who have turned toward the church to put one foot inside the door.
- b. Evangelism through fellowship is important here. Most of those outside the church are not mentally or spiritually able to commit their lives to Christ. They must be held by a personal connection until the day they can join the Christian fellowship.
- c. Contact and fellowship lose their value without commitment.

3. Commitment

- a. This step is to get both feet into the church and help people come all the way into membership and become acknowledged followers of Christ.
- b. There must be a clear-cut and open confession of Christ, as we read in Romans 10:9: "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."
- c. Commitments depend much on what comes next. Sometimes new members are left to sink or swim, and too many of them sink.

4. Conservation

a. When both feet are inside the church, the next step is to start them walking.

- b. The church must unceasingly labor to help its members make its calling and election sure.
- New members are teachable at this stage as they never will be again.
- d. As these new members have turned toward Chirst, it is our duty to help them walk toward Him.
- e. When we evaluate these four steps, it becomes obvious that the church is the only adequate evangelistic agency. This naturally brings us to the subject of visitation.

Visitation

We would like here to consider and to suggest a few steps in bringing about a successful visitation program. Visitation is an essential part of every church program in fulfilling the Great Commission. Jesus gave a good example when He appointed the seventy. "After these things the Lord appointed other seventy, and sent them two and two before his face into every city and place whither he himself would come" (Luke 10:1). We believe it would be wonderful if every church could have seventy who would be willing to go calling in the name of Jesus Christ.

- 1. What is needed for a successful visitation program?
 - a. A burden for those outside of Christ. (Matt. 9:36.)
 - b. A record of people not registered in any Sunday school or church. This information can be had through a religious census that has been taken or by names given by members of the church as they become acquainted in the community. A master file should be kept up to date on all people, including children, not registered in any Sunday school.
 - c. A definite time to call and a definite place to meet should be established. The group of workers should meet at the place of meeting for instruction and prayer together before attempting to make a call.
 - d. Have a definite recruiting program for workers.
 - 1. The pastor and Sunday school superintendent should direct the program.
 - 2. Recruiting workers should be on a voluntter basis.
 - 3. Those especially gifted should be approached by the pastor or Sunday school superintendent or program secretary and urged to help with the program. (To be concluded in April JOURNAL)

Charles French and his co-workers in Sydney, Australia, to become better acquainted with the mission work being done by the Gospel Publicity League, headed by Bro. French. Bro. Lawrence is vice-chairman of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference.

YEAR OF THE BIBLE CONFERENCE PLANS

General Conference for 1966 is being planned with the "Year of the Bible" proclamations in mind. Governors of all the states have proclaimed 1966 as the "Year of the Bible" in honor of the work of the American Bible Society. As the Bible Church of God, we think it appropriate that the 1966 General Conference emphasize the place of the Holy Bible in the church, nations, and our individual lives. Bros. Emory Macy and Cecil Smead are planning the worship program this year.

CHANGING PASTORATES

This is the season of the year when churches are taking action in regard to securing of pastoral services for the next church year. There are several things that churches should take into consideration at this time of the year, but one that needs emphasis now is the value of thinking and planning on the basis of long-term pastorates.

It is best for the church and for the pastor to plan in terms of a long pastorate. In this way the church will receive the most benefit from the services of the pastor, and the pastor will be able to devote the best of his service to the church. It is a fact that a church loses much, and so does a pastor, each time a change is made. The last few months of a man's ministry before he leaves, is often used in bringing together loose ends, concluding programs, and making preparations to move. The first few months of the new pastor's time is spent in getting settled, in getting acquainted, in getting to know his church. In all, a church may lose a year or two of progress because of the problems of making a change.

Sometimes a change is made because of a problem in the church. Often, it would be easier to solve the problem than to change pastors. Sometimes the problem still remains when a change is made, and it immediately faces the new pastor. This works both ways—a pastor can run out on a problem rather than face up to it, or a church can change pastors rather than face up to the problem.

There are often occasions when a change should be made, of course. We should not plan for frequent changes, however, but plan for the most permanent arrangements possible for the good of all concerned.

CONFERENCE FINANCES

For the first time in several months we fell slightly beshind our Goal for Giving this month. The expanded programs of education, missions, youth work, Sunday school work, publishing, printing, and general services, have presented the Church of God with its greatest financial challenge. We rest assured that the challenge will be met and that the Goals for Giving will be exceeded in this year of Enlargement. We continue to be grateful to the many faithful individuals, churches, and conferences whose sacrificial giving have made these Conference outreach programs possible.


DEADLINES FOR APPLICATION





BE A MISSION BUILDER!

The Mission Builders League was begun by vote of the delegates at the Church of God General Conference, August 8, 1957. A goal of one thousand members was set for that year. The purpose of the Mission Builders League is to help new churches and small churches to secure adequate church buildings. Members of the Mission Builders League pledge to pay at least \$5.00 for each appeal for assistance for a new building program.

The first church to receive the assistance of the Mission Builders League was the Church of God at Dayton, Ohio, which was constructed in 1958. Since then there have been fourteen more appeals for Mission Builders League assistance. The Church of God mission in Digby, Nova Scotia, received proceeds from two of these appeals. In all, fourteen new church buildings have been built with the help of Mission Builders. They are pictured on these pages.

Mission Builders have contributed about \$58,000.00 toward this new construction since 1957 when the League was formed. There are now about 850 members who are active in the League by responding to the appeals for assistance.

These and a host of other interesting and challenging activities are awaiting those who attend the Conference.

BEREAN SPARTAN CAMP

This new training camp for older youth (entering eleventh grade through age 22) will be held at Long Lake Bible Camp, Eden Valley, Minn. - 4. Announcements and publicity should be given to the group of workers. The entire church should know who the workers are and what is being accomplished.
- 5. Good books on evangelism and visitation should be read. Some suggestions are:
 - a. Effective Evangelism, by George E. Sweazey
 - b. Evangelism in the Home Church, by Andrew W. Blackwood

2. Steps for each caller:

- Make sure you come to Sunday school and church yourself.
- b. Select the name and address of the prospect.
- c. Pray before you go, as you knock, and as you converse.
- d. Take an appropriate tract, church bulletin, gospel literature, etc.
- e. Tell the purpose of your call.
 - 1. You are calling on behalf of the "Church of God Sunday school or church," and you want to invite all the ones to come who do not attend Sunday school or church regularly.
 - 2. You will probably have little trouble conversing. Most people will be glad you are interested in them.
 - 3. Try to talk about the work of the church, Sunday school, Bereans, etc.
 - 4. Remember you are performing a service in the name of Jesus Christ.
 - 5. Caution: These calls are not the place for gossip, telling tales, mentioning faults of the church, pastor, choir, etc.

f. Personal habits of the caller:

- 1. Always be friendly in your approach.
- 2. Be direct—there should be no question why you are there.
- 3. Be courteous. Be tactful.
- 4. Be persistent. Accomplish your purpose—you need not apologize.
- 5. Be composed, not in a hurry. Your call is important.
- 6. Be brief. Know when your visit has accomplished its purpose and leave.
- 7. Suggest available transportation. (Offer to pick them up.)
- 8. Know as much about your church program as possible, time of service, etc.
- 9. Use the positive approach.
- 10. Evaluate the call:

- a. Is this a "good prospect"?
- b. Does he attend church at all? Elsewhere?

3. Who should go calling?

- a. All are encouraged to participate—not just teachers and assistants. However, teachers should be out in front, saying, "Come on, let's go calling." One pastor expressed a problem common to all; "My trouble is this, too often my best qualified people have to be prodded into participation, while the willing hearts are sometimes the emotional type, and therefore less qualified to represent the church."
- 4. On whom do we call?
 - a. It is wise to encourage folks to call on those within the same vocational circle.
 - b. Call on ones in your immediate neighborhood.
 - 1. Proximity is an asset in any visitation program.
 - c. Neighborhoods around your home and church are within the scope of the Great Commission, as well as is China.
 - d. Groups to keep in mind:
 - 1. Inactive members.
 - 2. Visitors at church last Sunday.
 - 3. New converts.
 - 4. Lists from census, utility companies, etc.
 - a. Give the Sunday school superintendent or pastor names of any you would like called upon.
 - 5. Parents of children in Sunday school.
 - 6. Caution: Don't expect to win people to Christ the first call.

2. General aims of call:

- a. Get acquainted, if not already acquainted.
- b. Establish friendly relations.
- c. Lead them to clear-cut decision for Christ, if possible.
- d. Visiting can be evangelistic.
- e. Visiting can be reclamation. Some who were once active are now a part of the non-churchgoing mass. They are often the hardest to counsel because of deep emotional problems. They did run well (Gal. 3:7); now they are well stocked with excuses.
- f. Believe in the call. God will not fail you.
 - 1. Give each prospect a special reason for coming next Sunday.
- 6. When to visit (two suggestions):
 - a. Have a definite calling night each week at the church; have prayer together and a briefing; then go out two

by two. Return in about an hour to discuss and evaluate the calls.

- b. Some groups do not find it feasible to set a definite evening for calling. Visitation is done at the discretion and convenience of each worker. This puts each worker on his honor and demands self-discipline.
 - 1. If you live a distance from church, Sunday afternoon might be a better time.
 - 2. If the husband and wife in the home being called upon both work, perhaps the call would have to be made in the evening.

7. Things to remember:

- a. Jesus taught multitudes, but converted few. Seek the
 - 1. The most important thing about visitation is not the method, but that it be done.
- b. Use the psychology of Dale Carnegie and the persistence of the Fuller Brush man.
- c. Insurance companies advertise, but they know it is the local salesmen working on the prospects who sell the policies.
- d. The key word is "desire."1. If we really want to, we will find time.
- e. It will be a real blessing to walk into church and see some there that you invited the week before.

Each stop will be a challenge and an opportunity to reach out to new people for Christ as well as viewing the work already in progress in several areas. May God bless this trip, each service held, each contact made, and may He direct in all the work of the Church of God that it might bring glory and honor to Him and His Son Jesus.

NOVA SCOTIA

The work at the Lighthouse Mission Church of God at Digby goes forward under the direction of Bro. and Sr. John Denchfield. January and February attendance averages are thirty-seven for morning worship and forty-three for evening service. They plan their first service in the new sanctuary on Mothers Day, May 8.

The Walter Cromwell family have had much difficulty in recent weeks. Their son Roy was found nearly frozen to death aboard a pulp ship; Bro. and Sr. Cromwell wrecked their car on an icy hill and on March 15, a fire burned a large hole in the roof of their home. Bro. PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

MUSICAL TRAINING AT THE COLLEGE





Applications for the assistance of the Mission Builders League are directed to the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. A set of standards to be met by the applying church was adopted by the General Conference delegates and is the guide used by the Board in determining whether or not the assistance of the League can be given to the church. When a church has met the standards and its plans are approved, an appeal is mailed to each member of the Mission Builders League informing him briefly of the history and plans of the church and asking for his contribution for the church building. The funds are collected by the Church of God General Conference and then forwarded to the church as construction begins. The General Conference is the administrative and collecting agency, and all funds, less expenses for mailing of appeals, are sent directly to the church which is building.

The benefits of the Mission Builders League have been great. While the amount of money contributed to any church is relatively small (about \$4,000.00), and is only a fraction of the actual cost of construction or purchase in most cases, the amount received from the Mission Builders League is often the difference in whether a church decides to go ahead with its building program or wait. The promise of funds from the League has been enough to secure loans, in several cases.

Equally important, is the fact that the congregation which receives the assistance of the Mission Builders League is greatly encouraged by the participation of many people from far and near in the building program. The interest and confidence that this manifests is stimulating to the church which is building. Giving to the Mission Builders League is also stimulating to the Mission Builder, because he has a personal interest in each church he has helped to build. The new church is not only the object of his gift but of his prayers, and the benefits are great to all.

Enlargement Messages From 1965 General Conference

(The following messages are synopses of some of the Bible classes taught at the 1965 Church of God General Conference meetings at Camp Mack.)

MAKING THE GOSPEL RELEVANT TO OUR GENERATION

By William M. Wachtel

Webster defines "relevant" to mean "bearing upon, or applying to, the case in hand; pertinent." Making the gospel "relevant," therefore, means making it meaningful to the present generation, full of its intended power. The Apostle Paul's estimate of the gospel is declared in Romans 1:16, where he calls it "the power of God unto salvation." He considered it highly relevant.

The title of this lesson suggests that the gospel has somehow lost its relevance, either because 1) the power is no longer there, or 2) because the terms in which the gospel is expressed no longer convey meaningful ideas to people, or 3) because people's present outlook on life and the universe makes it impossible for them to accept those ideas, even granting that those ideas are expressed meaningfully to them.

To counteract these factors, it has been suggested that the church 1) show our generation that the power is not departed from the gospel—using the unanswerable argument of changed lives and demonstrating the presence and working of a spiritual dynamic in the church today; 2) rephrase or recast the terms in which the gospel has been traditionally expressed, to make it better understood and more acceptable to those for whom the old terminology seems outmoded or meaningless; 3) convince those who reject the ideas essential to the gospel that those ideas are true after all, and that the modern outlook which rejects them is itself mistaken and not in harmony with the facts. Instead of using these three approaches, however, much of Christendom is experimenting with questionable means of making the gospel (or, their gospel) relevant.

The question, "Is the power gone from the gospel?" is answered by the following scriptures: Matthew 24:35; 28:18-20; Acts 1:8; Hebrews 13:8; 1 Corinthians 1:21-24; 2:1-5; 6:9-11; 2 Timothy 3:5; 2 Corinthians 5:17-19; and Romans 3:23-25. The problem of meaningless terminology is largely solved by modern translations of Scrip-

ture, if people will only read and ponder them. It is our task to get the Scriptures to them and let God's Word go to work. (Isa. 55:11; Jer. 23:39; John 5:39; 1 Tim. 4:16; 2 Tim. 2:15; 3:14-17; 1 Pet. 1:22-25; 2:1, 2.)

The problem of the modern "scientific" outlook which makes many think the gospel is irrelevant is answered by the fact that the natural man has always found God's ways unacceptable (Rom. 1:18-23, 28-32; 2 Tim. 3:7, 13), and there is evidence at hand to disprove the so-called modern outlook.

"COME AND SEE"

By Ellsworth Routson

In John 1:38, 39 we find two disciples following Jesu and asking Him where He dwelt. He said, "Come and see." They came and saw where He dwelt, and abode with Him that day. Would a person visiting one of our church services be able to see that Christ dwells among us? Would he be persuaded by what he observes to "abide" with Him?

What Is Our Responsibility Toward Enlargement of Our Church?

Invitation: One method of enlargement is by invitation. Jesus said, "Come and see." The church is more than a physical building, and its first purpose is to glorify God. We are to "shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Pet. 2:9). The love of Christ compells us to want to share our salvation with others, and the simplest way is to invite them to church, and to invite them to know Christ.

Visitation: The second duty of the church is spreading the gospel. In addition to inviting people to church, we can take the gospel to them. "Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, be ginning at Jerusalem. And ye are witnesses to proclaim the gospel" (Luke 24:46-48).

Other purposes of the church are to strengthen the faith of its members, and Christian fellowship. Fellowship, therefore, is not just a part of the Christian life: it is the Christian life. Christians are "living stones" built together on the foundation of the apostles and prophets to be a new temple, a sanctuary indwelt by the Spirit. (Eph. 2:19-22; 4:16; 1 Cor. 12:12, 31.)

BIBLE TRUTHS THAT INTRIGUE ME

"Intrigue" means to interest or make curious. The class members were in agreement that there were many, many Bible truths that interested or made them curious.

There were three major truths emphasized in this class. The first truth was the "Oneness of God." The Bible teaches that God is one. He alone created and sustains the universe. He is Father of all mankind and is to be worshiped and praised. If we say God is not one, we contradict Scripture and are not stating truth. (Deut. 6:4; 1 Tim. 2:5.)

Jesus is not God because God is immortal. (1 Tim. 1:17.) Jesus died. (1 Cor. 15:3.) God is not a man (Num. 23:19), but Jesus was. (Acts 2:22.) God is almighty (Gen. 17:1), but Jesus was dependent on God. (John 5:19.) God is invisible (1 Tim. 6:16), but Jesus was seen. (1 John 1:1.)

The second truth studied was "The Second Coming of Christ." This is a certain event that is to happen in the future. The angels said: "He shall so come in like manner" (Acts 1:11). Paul wrote to the Thessalonians that "the Lord himself shall descend from heaven" (1 Thess. 4:16). We know that at His coming every eye shall see Him. It will be sudden and unexpected, yet when He comes everyone will know it. It will be such a glorious and triumphant event that it cannot help but be known.

Christ's second coming will mark the beginning of His reign as King of Kings. The work of cleansing the earth will begin. Preparation for the eternal Kingdom will begin until a perfect state is reached.

This led us to the third truth about the Kingdom of God. There are many false ideas about the future home of the saints and the Kingdom of God. The Scriptures point out that the eternal home of the saints will be on the earth and that the Kingdom of God is still future.

Christ's Kingdom will be on the earth. "Go to Jerusalem to worship the king" (Zech. 14:17). Isaiah says: "Out of Zion shall go forth the law" (Isa. 2:2).

In His Word God promises that believers will inherit the earth, and their reward is not in heaven. "The meek shall inherit the earth" (Matt. 5:5). "The earth is given to the children of men" (Psa. 115:16). John reveals: "We shall reign on the earth" (Rev. 5:10).

The truths revealed in Scripture that the Church of

God so dearly holds and believes must continue to be taught and preached in each church. We must never change or alter these truths to satisfy human ideas but always keep them as God has written them in His Word.

GREAT DECISIONS: EDUCATION AND VOCATION

Vocation: "A summons or strong inclination to a particular state or course of action; specific: a divine call to the religious life. 2. The work in which a person is reguarly employed." (Webster, 7th ed.) With Mr. Webster we would agree, for Jesus said, to make the Kingdom the first thing in our lives. (Matt. 6:33.) He tells us, too, that if we seek (for spiritual things?) we will find that for which we seek. (Luke 11:10.)

If we are following our "vocation" properly, then we fulfill Jesus' instructions to "let your light so shine before men" and in so doing we also become the "salt" and the "light" of the world. (Matt. 5:16, 13, 14.)

While our vocation is to prepare for the life to come, we realize that not all are called to the ministry. There is a spiritual work that we all can do. (Eph. 4; 1 Cor. 12.) While we follow our vocation, we also need an avocation to follow, that we might have a means of earning a livelihood and a means of financially promulgating the gospel.

To properly prepare for both (vocation and avocation), we need to educate ourselves. For full-time spiritual work we suggest Oregon Bible College. To prepare for another life work, other types of education are required. However, since the "vocation" is the most important, there should be a minimum of one year's preparation at Oregon Bible College, for regardless of what our business-lifework may be, we should take our place in the church world in Sunday school teaching, serving as church officers, etc. For this, the year at Oregon Bible College can furnish some preparation, while a college or vocational school as a follow-up prepares for the avocation.

GOSPEL TEAMS

Even though our classroom lectures are important, our personal studies and growth in the Scriptures are more important. By this means we can continue our Christian training after we have left college.

There are other subjects to mention besides the Bible-related ones. The various courses in improving communication (teaching, preaching, and foreign language), as well as courses in human understanding and relationships, require some homework and much outside study. Of course, some time is spent on personal improvement courses, such as literature and shorthand.

When our courses are viewed as a whole, I believe I would have the full agreement of all the students in saying that the hardest, but the most rewarding, and thus the most time-consuming courses are the ones in which we study the Bible itself.





Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

This report and recommendations were approved at the regular meeting of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, May 13, 1966. The report and recommendations are presented in this form so that delegates to the 1966 Church of God General Conference business meetings in August, 1966, will have opportunity to study them and seek opinions from the groups they will represent.

The report and recommendations concern the various departments of the Church of God General Conference, and also some general observations in regard to the work and position of the Church of God as a whole. The reports are presented in the order they will be discussed at the General Conference meetings. Since only eight months of the current fiscal year have passed at this writing, the report covers only part of this year, and cannot cover some important activities and programs that will be concluded in the last four months of the year.

Youth Department

The director of the Berean Youth Department is Brother Paul Shaw.

The Berean Youth Department continues to work under the provisions of the constitution adopted at the 1964 Berean Youth Conference. The constitution provides, among other things, for the yearly chartering of Berean groups (there are 48 Senior and 26 Junior groups chartered), delegate representation at the General Berean Youth Conference, and support of the General Berean Youth Fellowship work by the tithes and contributions of Bereans and Berean groups.

During the year, Youth Leader's Handbook was published quarterly; Challenge magazine was published every two months; and the Youth Worker's Memo was printed monthly.

Youth Sunday was observed, with a high percentage of churches participating in its observance.

The Coins-for-Christ Crusade was highly successful. This project-contest has been carried on for the past three years to help support the work of the Berean Youth Fellowship Department. Total giving for this year's Crusade was \$1,780.00, more than doubling the goal of \$750.00 which had been set for the project. The winner of the contest between the groups was the Berean Youth Fellowship of the Golden Rule Church of God, Cleveland, Ohio.

The young people of the Church of God are taking more

responsibility each year in setting goals for youth giving and in supporting the work. A goal has been set for the 1965-66 fiscal year of \$3,150.00. Last year's goal was \$2,500.00, and the goal for the 1963-64 fiscal year was \$1,700.00. The Mission Dollar Club has also been active, with sixty members enrolled.

Two new activities, which will be completed this summer, are the Berean Spartan Camp to be conducted in Minnesota, and the Mission Caravan that will work in Mexico and visit several churches. Reports of these projects will be given at Conference.

The Berean Youth Conference held last summer at Camp Mack was a source of tremendous inspiration to those who attended. There were 223 campers in attendance and a staff of thirty counselors. Youth Conference attendance has increased each year: 1961—145 campers; 1962—173 campers; 1963—182 campers; 1964—200 campers; 1965—223 campers. Attendance at the 1966 Berean Youth Conference is expected to continue this trend of steady growth.

The Berean young people of the Church of God are to be highly commended for their participation in the local, state, and international programs of the church. Their vitality, talent, and financial support are a great contribution to the work

Sunday School Department

Brother Paul Shaw is superintendent of the Sunday School Department.

The Board of Directors of the Sunday School Department (Sr. Leota Foster, Bros. Paul Overholser, Bernard Hightower, and Robert Petry) met with Bro. Shaw twice during the year to discuss matters relating to the work of the Sunday School Department.


A church-wide Sunday school contest "Partners in Growth" was conducted during April and May. Each Sunday school was assigned a "partner" school with which to carry on special competition. Partner Sunday schools were encouraged to exchange pictures, letters, and other information in order to become better acquainted.

The Sunday School Superintendents' and Workers' Manual, written by Bro. Paul Overholser, was printed and released for distribution during the year. It is proving to be a valuable help to the leaders who are making use of it.

It appears that general Sunday school attendance is increasing, though it is doubtful that it will increase by ten

percent, the goal for 1965-66. The present rate of increase appears to be about five percent.

During the year a set of evaluation forms was mailed to each superintendent to be filled out by each teacher in the Sunday school. The purpose is to evaluate these answers by the teachers who use Truth Seeker's Quarterlies (they are the experts who really know whether or not the quarterlies are helpful) to make any necessary and practical improvements in the quarterlies. When all forms are received they will be analyzed by the publishers and editors.

Since Conference of 1965, new Sunday schools were started at Phoenix, Arizona, and Sycamore, Illinois.

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department is responsible for the publishing of The Restitution Herald, Truth Seeker's Quarterlies, Systematic Theology, Songs of Truth, tracts, booklets, the Superintendents' and Workers' Manual, vacation Bible school books, Systematic Bible Study Course, special bulletin covers; and for the sales of such items as Bibles, concordances, books, etc. The Publishing Department is now a separate department for the purpose of keeping more accurate records of the actual income and costs of the various publications.

The Publishing Department operates at a loss due to the low volume of sales. Because its market is primarily the Church of God, its sales are limited by the size of the church. Such items as the Sunday school quarterlies and vacation Bible school books, which are written with the special needs and uses of the Church of God in mind and are denominational in character, cannot be expected to sell outside the Church of God as those materials written and distributed by the "interdenominational" or more orthodox publishers.

Some of the products of the Publishing Department do have appeal beyond the Church of God—such as Systematic Theology, Songs of Truth, the Superintendents' and Workers' Manual, and certain tracts. If they can be printed in volume and the per unit production costs minimized these can be offered for sale through bookstores and by direct mail through national advertizing. Investigations are being made into these possibilities.

The Restitution Herald has about 2,200 subscribers, including those Heralds used in racks. More than half of the families of the Church of God do not subscribe to The Restitution Herald. Enlarging the magazine and cutting down the number of issues would make printing costs more economical. If The Restitution Herald had at least 4,000 sub-

scribers, and if it carried a limited amount of quality advertizing, it would "break-even" without having to be subsidized.

About 7,600 Truth Seeker's Quarterlies are distributed each quarter. These include 3,400 adult; 1,200 teen-age; and 1,000 each of the children's quarterlies. We break even on quarterlies. About 3,000 Vacation Bible School books are sold each year. There is a loss experienced because the quantity is small. Preparation time for printing is the same whether 50 books or 5,000 books are printed. Thus the need for volume is emphasized in each item produced by the Publishing Department.

Since last summer, Srs. Doris Brown and Amy Schaefer have become the editors of the Primary Quarterly, and Sr. Genniel Anderson has become the editor of the Beginners (formerly Nursery—Pre-school) Quarterly.

With better understanding of costs, it is assumed that revisions will occur in published materials to eliminate unnecessary and unprofitable items and to try to increase volume and thus reduce costs on necessary and much-used items.

Printing Department

The Printing Department is under the supervision of Bro. Paul C. Johnson.

The Printing Department does almost all the printing for the Publishing Department, and for the other departments of the General Conference (Berean Youth Publications, College publications, office forms, stationery, etc.). It also does some commercial printing as time, personnel, and machinery are available to do it.

Much new machinery has been added to the Printing Department inventory in the past few years, including a new Rosback Chain Stitcher purchased this year with funds given in memory of Floyd and Lulu Stilson.

Missions Department

The Superintendent of Missions is Bro. S. O. Ross.

The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference is made up of the Superintendent of Missions, S. O. Ross, chairman; Warren Sorenson, Macomb, Ill.; Edith Eades, Eden Valley, Minn.; Charles Jones, Chagrin Falls, Ohio, and Lee McQuinn, Oregon, Ill. The board has met three times during the year in addition to several meetings held during General Conference.

The mission work has shown progress the past year in many ways. Mission stations have been strengthened, new areas opened, and the work viewed by the Superintendent of Missions on the trip to Mexico in December and the world mission trip in the spring.

The new building at Uddiawan in the Philippine Islands is completed and was dedicated on April 5 during the annual Philippine Conference with Bro. Ross the dedicatory speaker. New work has been started at Villaros and Estrada and members, and state conferences. Handling of inquiries, staommendation passed at the last General Conference the evangelistic team and radio work are now under way. There have been forty-three baptisms in the past year, eighteen of them were immersed by Bro. Ross during his visit there. He also found the laymen to be consecrated and many good leaders among them, and the singing was a real inspiration. He found the work there to be stable and under good leadership with Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero and his staff of ministers.

The India work is growing but is considerably hampered for lack of space in their small rented building. Over two hundred fifty attended both morning and evening services during Bro. Ross' visit, and several families who usually attended were away. Here again, the enthusiasm and dedication of Bro. S. S. Manoah and the membership are a thrill to behold, and their music and singing are a real inspiration. They sit on the floor cramped in very tightly but this does not detract from their devotion and consecration. Twenty-six have been converted in the past year, and eleven of these were baptized by Bro. Ross.

The Mexico work has made strides this year. Sr. Rachel Krogh began work there in February and has been a big help in providing Sunday school materials, musical leadership, and typing lessons for printing. The Systematic Bible Study course is printed in Spanish and will be most helpful in the work. Bros. Adolfo Alvarez, Ascencion Lara, and Francisco Martinez are pastoring groups at Matehuala, Labor Vieja, and El Potosi, respectively. Regular services are also conducted at Saltillo by Bro. Dean Moore, and in some of the neighboring villages. Labor Vieja and El Potosi are providing buildings for their worship. Bro. and Sr. Moore are providing excellent leadership in this field.

Bro. and Sr. John Denchfield continue to do a good work in the Nova Scotia field. The building is now being finished on the inside and should be entirely completed shortly.

Much correspondence is being carried on with interested people in various places in the world who come to know of the teaching of the Church of God through literature. This continues to verify the value of the written Word in the proclamation of the gospel.

Bro. Ross visited with one of these contacts, Bro. Jamal Sunna'a, in Beirut, Lebanon, and assisted him in baptism in the Mediterranean Sea on April 22, 1966. This man has been a minister of another denomination and after diligent study has left that church and is working with a group of people teaching them the doctrines that are held by the Church of God.

Every Bible college and seminary in the United States and several in Canada have now received a copy of Systematic Theology by Bro. Alva Huffer, and every country in the world has at least one copy in a library.

The Raymore, Missouri, and Lombard (formerly Chicago), Illinois, churches have been built this year with the assistance of the Mission Builders League. Six churches are receiving Pastoral Aid. The General Conference staff has assisted with many churches, state conferences, and special meetings, and stands ready always to assist as they are able in the work of the local churches and state conferences.

Oregon Bible College

The 1965-66 school year witnessed an enrollment of forty-two students during the second semester, the highest in our history. Of these, thirty-four were full-time students (a course load of twelve hours or more), three were part-time students (five to eleven hours), and five were special students (less than five hours). Two seniors were graduated: Alice Aldrich and Clarence Lee McQuinn. Bro. McQuinn will begin the pastorate of the Lombard (formerly Chicago) Church of God on July 1, 1966.

The present staff includes William M. Wachtel, President and Instructor; V. E. Kirkpatrick, Instructor. Christian Service Director, and Librarian; Paul Shaw, Instructor; Kenneth Milne, Instructor; Harold Doan, Instructor; Stan-

ley Ross, Instructor; Nora Anderson, Dean of Women and Cook; Inez Gordon, Men's Dormitory Housemother. Other staff members working on a part-time basis are Shirley McQuinn, Ann Cullen, Alice Aldrich, Edward Bender, and Stephen Bolhous. Sr. Edith Eades, of the Eden Valley, Minn., Church of God, is to become Dean of Women next fall. We are grateful to Sr. Anderson for the fine work she has done in this capacity during the past three years.

Bro. E. Richard Smith, pastor of the Lawrenceville, Ohio, Church of God, conducted a one-week seminar course in Pastoral Leadership during the second semester. Bro. E. Milon Hall, pastor of Pennellwood Church of God, Grand Rapids, Mich., led our Christian Emphasis Week during the first semester.

The Freshman Foundation Year, instituted during the school year 1964-65, was continued without change during the present school year. We believe it has proved its effectiveness and benefit, and those who complete it successfully are now awarded certificates of recognition. A continuous study of our curriculum is carried on, with the purpose of constant improvement. A significant increase in the size of our student body will necessitate certain changes and adjustments, both in the curriculum and in the number of faculty members.

The Board of Education met in August, 1965, and twice during the present school year—once in January and once in April. Out of these meetings came several recommendations to the Board of Directors and also certain suggestions and guidelines for the future work and expansion of the College.

An enlarged program of College promotion and recruitment has been carried on. An active student committee has written letters to many young people, encouraging them to enroll in Oregon Bible College. The Junior-Senior Weekend, begun last year, was held again this year, April 28, 29. The program was designed to give these visiting high school students a taste of Oregon Bible College life.

Efforts are being continued to secure official recognition from the State of Illinois for our College program and degree. Formal accreditation by a recognized accrediting agency still seems rather far away, but as the size of the College increases, accreditation becomes a greater possibility.

Long-range plans for enlarging our physical plant are being studied. We look forward to the time when greater enrollment will make it essential to add to our facilities. Under the direction of Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick, the classification of our College library is almost completed, and the total number of classified volumes will approach 5,000.

Because there were not enough enrollments by the April 1 deadline date, it was not possible to conduct the Laymen Leadership Course this year. Perhaps another summer more lay leaders will be able to enroll to make this course possible.

Many evidences of God's blessing have been apparent at the College. A greatly enlarged program of sending out gospel teams has provided more of these this year than probably any other year in our history. Prayers have been answered. There has been personal consecration to a closer walk with the Lord. We are grateful to the Lord for His



constant care over us, and we appreciate the support of the church membership at large! Continue to pray for us!

General Services

In addition to the specific work of the various departments there are innumerable general services performed by the General Conference for churches, pastors, individual members, and state conferences. Handling of inquires, statistics, public relations, doctrinal questions, church problems, liason between ministers and churches seeking ministers, keeping records, ministers' insurance and retirement, maintaining physical properties, advising in special financial problems, visiting churches and conferences, and answering mail occupies much of the time of the staff. The "clearing house" service of the General Conference is intangible, yet an important part of its function.

General Conference Finances

The General Conference has continued to appreciate the increasing support of the brethren of the Church of God. As its work has expanded, its missionary outreach enlarged, its services increased, and the need for more and more funds developed, the church has responded in a wonderful way to the challenge. This response has not cut into the work of the local churches or the state conferences, but has seemed to stimulate greater growth and development in them also. For this we praise the Lord, and commend His people.

The General Conference, like every institution that purchases such things as paper, groceries, utilities, cleaning supplies, insurance, automobile service, transportation, and the other necessities of living and doing business, has felt the pinch of inflation. All expenses are rising. Some of these costs are being absorbed as we enjoy a larger student body, as prices on a few items have been increased, and as sales have increased. Some of this additional cost, however, is reflected in larger Goals for Giving each year. Missions and services have greatly increased, but we must candidly face the fact that it costs more today to do the same things we were doing two years ago. We know the Lord will provide for His work and will bless that which He directs to be undertaken for Him, but we should understand that the burden of supporting this work may become greater as we move forward.

As Oregon Bible College increases in size, the need for new facilities presses upon us. It appears that we may have difficulty in 1966 housing all the single girls in existing facilities. In fact, we could enter the fall semester with the men's residence also filled. New facilities must soon be provided for a larger student body and a larger faculty. Specific recommendations are being made to accomplish this. Accepting this challenge will mean undertaking a building program in the very near future.

We are grateful to the many people who made possible the construction of the men's residence now in its third year of use by Oregon Bible College. There are still outstanding commitments from this building program which we trust will soon be met.

Highlights of Development

The past several years have seen the development of many new opportunities and avenues of service within the Church of God. The Lord is to be praised for the things He has done through His people. It might be of interest to review some of the changes that have taken place in this decade.

Missions have been opened in Nova Scotia, Philippines, Mexico, and India.

The Mission Builders League was begun and has helped build fourteen new church buildings.

Golden Rule Home was closed as a home for the aged and became a women's dormitory for Oregon Bible College. The new men's residence was constructed. The faculty and curriculum have been expanded. About \$180,000.00 was invested in new buildings and equipment.

The Restitution Herald was changed from a weekly to a bi-weekly. Progress Journal, Challenge, Youth Leader's Handbook, printed Nursery—Pre-school, Primary, and Teen-age Quarterlies were begun. Systematic Theology was printed. Songs of Truth was revised and reprinted. Systematic Bible Study Course was prepared, and many new tracts and booklets were originated during this period.

The Berean Youth Fellowship was expanded with a regular director. The Berean Youth Conference, the Spartan Camp, the Youth Caravan, Coins-for-Christ, the Advisory Youth Council, and other programs were instituted.

The Constitution of National Bible Institution was revised and its name was changed to Church of God General Conference. There are now seven instead of five directors. The fiscal year was changed to close on Septemer 30 instead of June 30.

The net worth of Church of God General Conference increased from \$131,000.00 in 1955, to \$305,000.00 in 1965. Total giving increased from \$31,000.00 in 1955 to \$89,000. 00 in 1965. Oregon Bible College income from tuition was \$4,501.00 in 1955 and \$22,390.00 in 1965.

More than \$25,000.00 worth of new equipment was added to the Printing Department during this time. About \$70,000. 00 in wills and bequests was received.

The Lord has blessed the Church of God in many ways. Several new Sunday schools and churches were organized; new buildings were built; many congregations increased manyfold in membership. The financial strength of many local churches and state conferences became greater, partially as a result of greater participation in mission and outreach work.

Things Undone

We should not overlook certain basic problems that exist among us. These should not discourage us, but challenge us to find their solution.

There is a critical shortage of workers. Many churches that would like to have regular pastoral services cannot secure the services of a pastor. There are at least twenty places in the United States alone, where there are organized churches, often with buildings and regular Sunday school services and occasional worship services, where pastors are needed. Many of these cannot afford to hire a full-time pastor, and must find a person who can build the church

while partially supporting himself at secular work. It appears that new churches are being developed faster than we are supplying leadership for them.

It is apparent that the Church of God, not unlike other organizations, has too few people who carry the load of work and support of the church. The same "faithful few" bear the burden of the work of the local church, the state conferences, and the General Conference. The same names appear time after time among the Mission Builders, contributors, subscribers, conference workers; and in church bulletins as teachers and officers and contributors to local and state programs. It is probable that fewer than half of our total membership of 6,000 people could actually be called vitally involved in the work of the Church of God.

From time to time serious contentions arise within a congregation which can destroy the church or minimize its effectiveness within the community. We have not developed a way to help in these situations. While there are concern and love and a desire to salvage the church, conferences and other churches often are not able to help. Perhaps some thought should be given to this difficulty.

We praise God for the harmony and unity that exist within the Church of God and for the love of the brethren one to another. As we look out upon the chaotic religious scene of 1966, we marvel at the family-like atmosphere within the church. People outside the church have been amazed time after time at the way Church of God people rally to the aid of those in difficulty, and this is as it should

be. We might say of the church as Paul did of the Thessalonians: "The Lord make you to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, even as we do toward you" (1 Thess. 3:12). In these last days of increasing sin, it is possible that we will have to face threats to this unity and love. We should be aware that there are potential areas of disagreement and prepare ourselves to meet these disagreements with love and understanding and unity in the Lord as we have in the past. The issues of civil rights, military service, ecumenicism, relationship with other churches, Communion, etc., may find their way into our midst and require our decisions.

There must be a greater determination within the church to reach out to the lost in the communities where Churches of God already exist. The Church of God must become known throughout the world through its literature and through its people. We must take the bushel off the light and let it shine.

Conclusion

This report is only a summary of all that could be said in regard to the current work and progress of your Church of God General Conference, and of the position of the Church of God in the space-age world. The monthly issues of Progress Journal bring you regular details of operations. The prayers and the earnest study of each Church of God person are solicited for the future of the Lord's work through His church.

- 1) We recommend that the Berean Youth Fellowship be encouraged to sell subscriptions to *The Restitution Herald* and that the local group receive 75 cents for each subscription sold to be used for their projects.
- 2) We recommend that *The Restitution Herald* be made a monthly magazine with thirty-two pages, plus cover, beginning October 1, 1966, and that advertizing be accepted to fill not more than 10% of the available space.

The reasons for this recommendation are: 1) Monthly publication is more economical, saving time on several printing operations and mailing operations; 2) thirty-two pages plus cover would allow more space for articles and features, even with 10% of the space used for commercial advertizing; 3) it will be more feasible to use color on the covers, since they can be printed by a different process, separately from the rest of the paper; 4) with new zip code regulations, sorting and handling time can be cut down.

3) We recommend that Church of God Vacation Bible School books be printed only in five-lesson sets beginning in 1968, and that Church of God Bible schools be encouraged to have five-day schools using Church of God books.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The reasons for this recommendation are: 1) most Bible schools are conducted for only five days and the excess lessons are often unusable; 2) it is difficult to guess how many books to print and a uniform policy would help us to avoid waste through overprinting, or dissappointment to some schools when not enough books are available; 3) because of the fact that too few books are used it is impractical to print both five- and ten-lesson sets; 4) five-lesson sets would be less expensive to purchase, but at the same time could cut down on the deficit to the General Conference in publishing the books.

- 4) We recommend that assistance be given Bro. Jamal Sunna'a, Beirut, Lebanon.
- 5) We recommend that we begin immediately to plan for and secure funds for Phase Two of the development of Oregon Bible College facilities, which will include construction of a large classroom-chapel in the basement of the men's residence, and a residence for from twenty to twenty-six women. Possible cost of this phase of development would be \$135,000.00.

SPECIAL REPORTS

LICENSE AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee met a number of times during the past year to carry out its assigned duties. Two of our young ministers were ordained at the 1965 General Conference. They are Bro. Ted Armes, pastor of the Morse Mill Church of God, Morse Mill, Missouri, and Bro. C. Jesse Pestle, pastor of the Dixon Church of God, Dixon, Illinois. This brings the number of Ordained ministers to thirty.

The applications from three Mexican pastors for Ministerial Recognition of the Church of God General Conference were received, translated by Bro. William Wachtel, carefully studied by the committee, and on January 25, 1966, were approved. These brethren were baptized by Bro. Dean Moore in Harlingen, Texas, in September, 1964, and have been studying under him, and had had some previous Bible study and training. They are: Bro. Adolfo Alvarez Diaz of Independencia No. 16 Sur, Mexico, Bro. Francisco Martinez Ibarra of Potosi, Galena, N. L., Mexico, and Bro. Conception Lara Torres of Rio Verde, S.L.P. Mercado Calon No. 124. They have received their ministerial licenses and recognition cards.

Two students, Sr. Alice Aldrich and Bro. Clarence Lee McQuinn are being graduated from Oregon Bible College this year. Bro. McQuinn's application for Ministerial Recognition has been approved and his license and recognition card will be given following graduation from Oregon Bible College. As we write this report, the total number of licensed and ordained ministers including Bro. McQuinn is 95 of whom 11 are inactive having preached fewer than 20 sermons during the year ending July 15, 1965.

A change is being made in the Certificate of License which will make the certificate valid until ordination, provided the licensee has a current Annual Ministerial Recognition Card. The licensed ministers who make application for the recognition card by July 15, on the form which is sent out before that time will receive the new Certificate of License and the Recognition Card at the coming General Conference. If the minister is not at the General Conference a license and card will be sent to him before the first of September.

REPORT OF RETIREMENT COMMITTEE

There has been little progress made in setting up the Retirement Program which was adopted at the last General Conference. The Program is stalled for the want of more ministers and churches to enter into the plan to make up the minimum number of participants necessary to put the plan into operation.

The plan as adopted by the Conference requires that fifty percent of eligible ministers and churches must subscribe before it becomes operative. This goal has not been reached. Presently there are 34 ministers and 29 churches that have committed themselves to participate. We need an

additional 10 ministers and 11 churches to reach the required minimum. Unless these are forthcoming by time of General Conference, it would seem that the plan will have to be dropped for lack of cooperation.

During the year the Superintendents' and Workers' Sunday School Manual, by Paul H. Overholser, was printed and released for distribution. The policy has been continued of sponsoring worker training conferences in areas which are not at present carrying on their own training program. Worker training conferences were held this year in Virginia, Ohio, and Arkansas.

MINISTERS' FUND REPORT

Since last General Conference, payments have been made each month to a minister's widow and to a retired minister. A loan of \$200.00 was made to a minister to help with moving expenses in September. The balance now in the Ministers' Fund is \$2,240.00.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

Since our last annual report, the Board of Education has met three times—at General Conference time last August; on January 24, 1966; and on April 29, 1966, during Junior-Senior Weekend. The next meeting will be held in August. At each of these meetings much study was given to the needs and improvement of Oregon Bible College, and specific recommendations were prepared for consideration by the General Conference Board of Directors.

The Board of Education consists of five members, including the President of Oregon Bible College as chairman. The other four members are Bro. Francis Burnett, vice-chairman, Sr. Ruth Halls, secretary, Bro. James Mattison, and Bro. Donald Overmyer. Each member is appointed by the Board of Directors to serve a two-year term. This year two terms will expire, those of Bro. Burnett and Bro. Overmyer.

Appointments to the Board of Education are made at the November meeting of the Board of Directors.

Planning during this past year has involved such matters as promotion and long-range development of the College, a proposed summer course, problems of accreditation and the granting of degrees, school finances, the Booster program

and budget, the library and its budget, and other items of business. The work of the Board of Education is essential to the success of Oregon Bible College, and the writer feels it a privilege to serve on this board together with its dedicated members.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

CAMP COSTS: Camp Mack is owned by the Church of the Brethren. They graciously make their facilities available to us for the same charge as is made to Brethren camps. The Church of God General Conference pays \$3.10 per day per person for each person who attends the General Conference meetings. Children under twelve are charged \$1.55 per day. This includes lodging, three meals, and insurance. We are charged 25 cents per day for "short-term campers" who are on the grounds only for portions of the day and who do not eat at the camp.

The past two or three years there has been a deficit in meeting this expense. Last year the deficit was nearly \$500. 00, which had to be taken out of the General Conference operating funds. In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are other conference costs for promotion, travel, folders, printing, displays, supplies, etc. It is the belief of the Board of Directors that every effort should be made to at least "break-even" in the conference costs.

Collections are received each evening at the services and funds received are used to cover these various charges. Those who wish a receipt for their payments may pay at the desk and receive a receipt. Each person who attends should come prepared to bear his share of the actual costs. Offerings over and above this will go directly into the Lord's work through the General Conference operating funds.

CONFERENCE THEME, DISPLAYS: In keeping with the Year of the Bible being observed throughout much of the world in honor of the American Bible Society, the theme "God's Word in Man's World" will be emphasized in the 1966 General Conference. In addition to various Bible posters and Bible facsimile displays, we would like to display some old Bibles of historic and personal interest. If you have such a Bible, perhaps one used by one of the old-time ministers or one that is unusual or that has a unique family record, you might like to bring it and share it with others. Display space will be provided. If you have questions about such items please contact Harold Doan, Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061.

NURSERY: A nursery for small children is conducted during the morning and afternoon sessions. Mothers with small children are asked to take turns helping in the nursery. In this way each mother will be free part of the time to attend some of the daytime sessions.

YOUNG PEOPLE: Teen-agers who attend General Conference, some planning to stay over for the General Youth Conference, will have a special program of classes and activities during the General Conference. Bro. Charles Graham will be youth director. Young people coming in ahead of the Youth Conference are expected to contribute their costs for lodging and meals while at General Conference. The following rules will apply during Conference.

- 1) Young people will be required to attend all activities that are planned for them by the Conference, unless they obtain permission from the Youth Director.
 - 2) Those driving automobiles will be required to leave

them parked in the area provided for them, unless they have good reason to leave. Then, only by being accompanied by parent or adult. We will attempt to be as fair as possible in governing this rule. It is for your health and safety as well as others.

- 3) Radios, comic books, etc., tend to distract from Conference spirit. So we would rather you leave them at home. Instead, bring your best smile. It attracts.
- 4) Everyone should obey all other camp rules, as all live closely together. We must respect each other as one family under God.

INTERCESSORY PRAYER: During the week the Stone Chapel will be used as a special prayer room in hours when classes are not conducted there. People are encouraged to go there at any free time for meditation and prayer, especially prayer for others. A book will be in the chapel in which anyone may write his prayer requests and bring them before the throne of grace in prayer.

SHARING SESSIONS: As you will notice from the program, each afternoon, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, will be devoted to a worship service and a series of Christian Sharing Sessions. These Sharing Sessions are to be primarily training sessions to get to the root of the problem of "how to do" the work of the Lord. By sharing ideas and experiences church leaders and workers will find new ways to improve service or to inaugurate new service activities in the church. Plan to attend several of these sessions and come prepared to share your questions, ideas, and experiences!

LODGING: Lodging is provided in separated cabins and lodges for men and women. Parents with small children are housed in Sarah Major Lodge as much as possible. Young people attending General Conference are housed in separate cabins with counselors in charge of each cabin.

DELEGATE POOL EXPENSE: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the costs of travel for those from far away and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church and conference is encouraged to enter into the pool to make attendance at Conference possible for all churches. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES: There are morning and afternoon classes for children of all ages, in addition to the adult and teen-age activities. Sr. Doris Brown is in charge of the children's program. Parents are requested to call for their children immediately after classes morning and afternoon.

CONFERENCE CHOIR: There will be a conference choir under the direction of Bro. and Sr. Jesse Pestle. It will rehearse each evening but Sunday and Thursday at 6:30 in the Tabernacle. Soloists and those playing musical instruments are asked to come prepared with music, also to render special numbers during the conference.

WORLD MISSION TRIP

As Superintendent of Missions it was my privilege to make a round-the-world trip beginning on March 26 and returning May 1. I was accompanied by Bro. Merle A. Patrick of the Columbia Church of God in Ohio who made this trip at his own expense. It was a wonderful help to me to have him with me. His counsel and friendship were invaluable.

We made stops in Los Angeles and Honolulu and after losing March 28 crossing the International Date Line we arrived in Japan and spent two days there. We visited with Bro. and Sr. John Holt who have been carrying on a ministry here mostly with service men. We found Japan a very busy, industrious place and Tokyo a modern city.

We then went to Manila, Philippine Islands, and spent a day before flying to Bagio City, where we were met by Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero and others of the Philippine staff of ministers. We then went by car to San Nicolas where we held our first services on April 3. Two came forward and we assisted them in baptism following the morning worship service.

We then drove about one hundred ten miles (over a ten-hour trip) to Uddiawan with twenty of us in the Jeep. The Annual Philippine Conference convened here on Monday, April 4, and continued to April 9. During this time several classes were taught, messages given, the new church dedicated and a wonderful time of fellowship was enjoyed. The people are zealous and enthusiastic, and their singing is a real joy to hear and take part in. On Friday morning we assisted sixteen in putting on Christ in baptism.

Our next stop was to be Villaros. Due to very bad roads, Jeep trouble, and other reasons it was decided to turn back and go to Quezon. Here the brethren from Abut and Minagbag gathered with the folk from Quezon and services were held. Afterward we enjoyed a time of fellowship and feasting with a "lechon" which is a whole pig roasted over an open fire with rice and other side dishes.

We felt it was a wonderful opportunity to meet with these of like precious faith in the Philippines and to have this close fellowship with those who live so far from us, and yet are so close in the body of Christ.

After a stop in Hong Kong, where we spent a short time with Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence who were returning from their trip to Australia, New Zealand and Fiji Islands, we went on to India. We landed first in Bombay and were appalled at the poverty we saw. Literally thousands were sleeping on the streets at night, and many were lying dead.

We arrived in Bangalore on the morning of April 15 and were met by Bro. S. S. Manoah. We spent about seven days here in services, visitation, and fellowship. We held two services in the little church where over two hundred tried to crowd into a building that is only 10 X 16 feet in size. Naturally, many were outside, but the inside was jammed with people sitting on the floor and taking part with all joy and enthusiasm. Here, too, the music and singing are a real thrill. We had Cottage Prayer services in various homes each day and we assisted eleven in baptism. These people are consecrated and desirous of serving their God and will often walk many miles to church or to a prayer meeting.

After this, we met with Bro. Jamal Sunna'a in Beirut, Lebanon. After much discussion and prayer we went to the shore of the Mediterranean Sea and assisted him in baptism. He has been carrying on a work in Beirut and on April 24 we preached to this group, which meets in the home of Bro. Sunna'a. There were about thirty in attendance. There had been forty-two children in an earlier Sunday school service. There is not room to carry on Sunday school for both children and adults at the same time. Bro. Sunna'a appears to be a dedicated servant of God and we pray for his work among the people of Beirut.

We then toured the Holy Land, Damascus, Dead Sea area, Jerusalem (both Jordan and Israel), Bethlehem, Hebron, Tel Aviv, and the surrounding areas. It was a real thrill to walk the places that we know Jesus and His disciples walked and we are thankful for this opportunity.

We then visited with Bro. Percy Bilton in London, England, and visited many famous sites there. On May 1 we attended worship services in Westminster Abbey and left shortly thereafter, arriving in Chicago at 5:00 p.m. on a direct flight from London.

We are thankful to the General Conference for making this trip possible and we want also to thank each church and each individual who remembered us in prayer. We know that God was with us, as there were many evidences of this throughout the trip.

A 43,000 RUPEE OPPORTUNITY

On their visit to India, Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence were much burdened by the need for an adequate building for the Church of God congregation in Bangalore. On his recent world trip, Bro. S. O. Ross was impressed with this same great need. More than two hundred people were crowded into and sitting in the driveway of the little building pictured above (about the size of a one-car garage) when Bro. Ross spoke to the Bangalore congregation. Bro. S. S. Manoah, the pastor, knows of many more people who would attend regular services if there were only room for them.

Feeling the burden of this great need, the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, in an unprecedented action at its meeting May 13, 1966, resolved to try to raise enough funds this summer to secure land and build a building for this congregation.

The vacant land pictured below is directly across the street from the little garage building being used by the church. Since Bangalore is a large city of several million people, land is expensive. It is sold by the square foot. Four thousand square feet (a lot 40x100) will sell for about \$5,000.00 or 23,000 rupees. The building will cost about \$4,000.00 or 19,000 rupees. Thus, the total cost of a lot and a church building will be about \$2.25 or 11 rupees per square foot.

Various plans were discussed long and prayerfully by the

Board of Directors. Should we have an extra Mission Builders Appeal? Should we borrow money and try to add it to the Goals for Giving in years to come? Should we delay action till next year? Finally, it was decided to give each member an opportunity to help this congregation with its need for an adequate building from which to hold forth the Word of life.

This step is taken at a very unusual time. The usual summer "slump" is already felt. The Conference treasury is empty. Heavy commitments must be met from our regular Goals for Giving. We cannot let this special opportunity detract from our already expanded financial needs. At the same time, as we took note of the fine church buildings, the nice homes, the new cars, the color TVs, the bountiful crops, and the booming prosperity, we could only believe that there is sufficient for all the needs of the local churches, the state conferences, the General Conference, and a suitable place of worship for our India brethren.

We urge your contribution to this cause. \$100.00 will buy 40 square feet of land and building. \$50.00 will buy 20 square feet of land and building. \$10.00 will buy 4 square feet of church and building. Even children and Sunday school class groups can buy one square foot for \$2.25. Let us remember that this is sacrificial giving—over and above what we would have done anyway for the total program of the Lord's work. This is a project of faith!

An ordination service will be planned for an evening service during General Conference for the ministers who make application and qualify. Following are the rules adopted by the General Conference in August 1963:

Qualifications for ordination are set forth in the New Testament in 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:7-9. All ordinations shall take place under the auspices of the License and Ordination Committee. Applicants twenty-three years of age or over who shall have met the necessary requirements shall appear in person before the committee. No person may be or-dained to the ministry until he shall have held a license to preach and shall have been in active work as a pastor or evangelist for approximately three consecutive years. Application for ordination shall be accompanied by recommendation of at least two elders of the church in which he has served, or, if no church organization exists, from two leaders in the community in which he has worked. This may apply to men or women. All applications for ordination must be in the hands of the License and Ordination Committee at least one month prior to General Conference.

Those ministers meeting the qualifications are encouraged to write to the Church of God General Conference, Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061, for ordination application forms.



A 43,000 RUPEE OPPORTUNITY

On their visit to India, Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence were much burdened by the need for an adequate building for the Church of God congregation in Bangalore. On his recent world trip, Bro. S. O. Ross was impressed with this same great need. More than two hundred people were crowded into and sitting in the driveway of the little building pictured above (about the size of a one-car garage) when Bro. Ross spoke to the Bangalore congregation. Bro. S. S. Manoah, the pastor, knows of many more people who would attend regular services if there were only room for them.

Feeling the burden of this great need, the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, in an unprecedented action at its meeting May 13, 1966, resolved to try to raise enough funds this summer to secure land and build a building for this congregation.

The vacant land pictured below is directly across the street from the little garage building being used by the church. Since Bangalore is a large city of several million people, land is expensive. It is sold by the square foot. Four thousand square feet (a lot 40x100) will sell for about \$5,000.00 or 23,000 rupees. The building will cost about \$4,000.00 or 19,000 rupees. Thus, the total cost of a lot and a church building will be about \$2.25 or 11 rupees per square foot.

Various plans were discussed long and prayerfully by the Board of Directors. Should we have an extra Mission Builders Appeal? Should we borrow money and try to add it to the Goals for Giving in years to come? Should we delay action till next year? Finally, it was decided to give each member an opportunity to help this congregation with its need for an adequate building from which to hold forth the Word of life.

This step is taken at a very unusual time. The usual summer "slump" is already felt. The Conference treasury is empty. Heavy commitments must be met from our regular Goals for Giving. We cannot let this special opportunity de-

tract from our already expanded financial needs. At the same time, as we took note of the fine church buildings, the nice homes, the new cars, the color TVs, the bountiful crops, and the booming prosperity, we could only believe that there is sufficient for all the needs of the local churches, the state conferences, the General Conference, and a suitable place of worship for our India brethren.

We urge your contribution to this cause. \$100.00 will buy 40 square feet of land and building. \$50.00 will buy 20 square feet of land and building. \$10.00 will buy 4 square feet of church and building. Even children and Sunday school class groups can buy one square foot for \$2.25. Let us remember that this is sacrificial giving—over and above what we would have done anyway for the total program of the Lord's work. This is a project of faith!



General Conference Progress

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL GENERAL CONFERENCE NEXT MONTH

Plans are almost completed for the forty-sixth annual Church of God General Conference meeting at Camp Mack, near Milford, Ind., July 31 - August 5. Churches and conferences have returned delegate forms in most cases, and delegates are being instructed for actions contemplated for the Conference. Each member family received complete Conference information in the June *Progress Journal* and each delegate will receive a folder of information at Conference.

Some changes and improvements have been made in Camp Mack facilities, and we look forward to a good attendance and an inspirational General Conference meeting. Pray for the Conference, and be sure that your church and conference are represented if at all possible.

GOD'S WORD IN MAN'S WORLD THEME

The Year of the Bible will be emphasized in the Conference theme, "God's Word in Man's World," at the General Conference. Classes and worship services will center on this topic. If you have Bible displays, old Bibles, unique Bibles, or charts of Bible information you would like to display, it would add to the color and theme of the Conference if you will bring what you have to share with others.

RECOMMENDATION WITHDRAWN

In the recommendations printed in the June JOURNAL to be considered at the General Conference, the Board of Directors is withdrawing its recommendation that Jamal Sunna'a be supported. Since the Board met and since the June JOURNAL was published, it has been learned from Bro. Sunna'a that he will not be able to work with the Conference except with full support for himself and the church, which the Board feels is beyond the reach of the Conference under the circumstances that prevail. Further explanation can be given at the Conference meeting.

FINANCIAL PROSPECTS AND PROJECTS

Your Church of God General Conference finds itself under heavy financial pressure at this time. Contributions have decreased since April; expenses have been increasing all year due to inflation and costs not anticipated in the Goals for Giving; there has been some loss of anticipated revenue; we have undertaken the project of helping our brethren in India buy land and construct a much-needed church building; there is still a large number of unpaid commitments to the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign; and summer brings with it some extra expenses in repair and refurnishing work that must be done between school years.

The project undertaken to purchase land and a building in India has so far (June 27) resulted in contributions of \$1,227.00, about one seventh of the need. About half of this amount has come from Hope Chapel Church of God in South Bend, Ind. Of the 4,000 square feet needed, at \$2.25 per square foot, about 550 square feet have been purchased and pledged. (See news pages.)

You will note below that we are about \$1,100.00 short of our Goal for Giving for the month of June. We trust that all the work of your General Conference will receive your interested support through prayer and giving.

This season when we sometimes experience a "summer slump" calls for the best stewardship of the church. We appeal especially to the many who have not yet participated in the work of the Conference, to take part now with your prayers and gifts. A relatively small number of individuals have carried the load (and realized the blessing of doing so) but your Conference needs the support of everyone. Between now and the end of the fiscal year, September 30, we can go over the top with everything we have undertaken with the blessing of the Lord and the concern of His people.

Bro. John L. Denchfield, missionary to the work in Digby, Nova Scotia, reports that the group there was thrilled to use the new auditorium of the building for the first time on Sunday, May 15, 1966, This was also the sixth anniversary of using the basement area of the building. The church is now in the process of landscaping the grounds and work is progressing on the completion of the building.

Attendance at the services has been running about fifty at the morning services and nearly sixty in the evening. There were five high school graduates this year. One is a prospective student for Oregon Bible College.

MEXICO

The work in Labor Vieja, under the leadership of Pastor Ascencion Lara, is growing. Several new people have been attending services regularly. They are enjoying the use of the church building that they recently constructed. Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore and Sr. Rachel Krogh are continuing to have Sunday school in Saltillo on Sunday morning and holding afternoon services in the mountain village of Sierra Hermosa.

The printing of the Systematic Bible Study Course in Spanish has been slowed down due to having to change printers; however, they are now nearly complete. Sr. Krogh is working on translating and typing the lesson sheets.

Bro. Moore writes that he and Sr. Moore and Sr. Krogh, as well as the native ministers and members, are all looking forward with much anticipation to the arrival of the

Youth Caravan. I am sure this will be a real blessing to the work in Mexico, to the members of the Caravan, and, we trust, to the churches that will be visited along the way. Bro. William Wachtel, who will be traveling with the Caravan, will remain a few extra days in Mexico in concentrated study with the native ministers and some of the laymen.

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah and his membership are so happy for the action of the General Conference to propose to raise the funds to provide a place of worship for the people in Bangalore. They are having regular prayer services each week for this project. Have you sent your contribution to this worthwhile endeavor?

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Bro. Insturo Magno is working on the translation of several tracts into the Illacano dialect. These will be printed as funds are available.

They are now beginning the Evangelistic Team work and also radio broadcasting. The General Conference has approved the purchase of a portable public address system for this work. The cost will be somewhat over one hundred dollars, and contributions to the purchase of this equipment would be welcome.

MISCELLANEOUS

The project of placing the book, *Systematic Theology*, by Bro. Alva Huffer, in all Bible colleges and seminaries in the United States is now completed. Many schools in Canada have also been supplied.

The Tempe, Arizona, Church has spearheaded and completed the task of placing at least one copy of the book in a library of every country of the world.

Surely, effort is being made to fulfill Matthew 24:14: "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached [published, Diaglott] in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."



The 1966 Church of God General Conference meeting at Camp Mack, Indiana, July 31 - August 5, proved to be one of the most inspirational conferences to date. Much important business was conducted as the Minutes printed in this issue will testify, but other features of the Conference were equally beneficial to those who were in attendance.

The afternoon and evening worship services were begun with a unique program of music, Bible reading, and drama on Sunday evening under the leadership of Bro. Paul Shaw. Sermons throughout the week emphasized the importance of the Word of God as we know it in our heads; stow it in our hearts; sow it in the world; and show it in our lives. The authenticity and infallibility of Scripture were reconfirmed as cardinal doctrines of the Church of God.

Classes each morning, attended by all ages, proved another source of inspiration and information. Ways to understand and use the Word of God to maintain personal faith and integrity, and to overcome the problems of life were as a thread running throughout the worship and study sessions.

The first three afternoons were devoted to Christian Sharing Sessions, led by people experienced in various phases of church work and Christian service. The sharing sessions gave opportunity for exchanges of ideas and sharing of personal keys to success in carrying out some of the important functions of church officers, teachers, and other leadership positions.

Highlights of the week were found in the various re-

ports and pictures of the mission work going on throughout the world. Bros. Ross and Patrick told of their recent trip around the world visiting the brethren, and pictures of the trip were shown at an evening service. Bro. and Sr. Lawrence showed pictures from their trip to the South Pacific, and told of their experiences with believers along the way. Brothers Shaw and Wachtel and members of the Youth Caravan to Mexico reported on their trip and brought a sense of the need and the devotion of the Mexican people in testimony and song. Bro. Dean Moore and Sr. Rachel Krogh were present at the Conference, home for a short time from their mission in Mexico. Bro. and Sr. John Denchfield and other members from Nova Scotia were present to remind us of the good work being done in this mission field.

A record Goal for Giving was adopted, which includes some of the provisions for Home Missions. Representatives of churches receiving pastoral aid and Mission Builders assistance spoke appreciatively of these home mission works. Representatives of several churches were present with their plans for new church buildings. The St. Louis, Mo., church met for the first time in its newly purchased building on August 7. Mission Builders and a Conference loan will help here. The congregation at Washington, D.C., is about to buy a building on the strength of promised Mission Builders help and a loan. Good use of the Systematic Bible Study Course (now available in Spanish) and of other literature was reported. Three new Churches of God have become members of the Church of God General Conference in the past year. Thus there is a forward thrust at home and abroad.

We should not forget the blessings of fellowship; at the Lord's table in Communion; around the Word of God in study and worship; in the cabins; on the grounds; in the dining hall; and at the Chairman's Tea. Old friends met. New friends were made. Families were reunited for a few days. News of the churches and mutual friends was exchanged and the spirit of unity strengthened.

The Conference may have been summarized in the ordination in absentia of Bro. S. S. Manoah, missionary in India; and the baptism on Friday morning of Bill Mc-Kinney. The Church of God international is seen in a native missionary serving his people in India; and a young man brought to a knowledge of the Lord in Oklahoma. The Word of God goes forth; and men and women are brought to the Lord and to His service as a result of the many phases of the work of the Church of God.

Chairman's Message to the Delegates, by Alva G. Huffer

Ministers of the gospel, delegates, and friends of the Church of God, we begin this forty-sixth annual international meeting of the Church of God General Conference in a spirit of gratitude, humility, and courage: gratitude, in response to God's rich blessings upon the church as a whole during the past year; humility, in recognition of our utter dependence upon Him as we seek to fulfill His purpose for the church in these last days; and courage, as we pursue our God-given responsibility to evangelize the world.

With joy and zeal, the church anticipates growth and development as it presents the Word of God, which is the most powerful factor upon this planet. It echoes the words of that great missionary apostle who declared: "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Rom. 1:16).

The Church of God General Conference, in obedience to our Lord's command, seeks to present the whole Bible to the whole world. Its intention is to present a complete Christ-centered scriptural message whereby persons of all races, all languages, on all continents can find that salvation which Christ provides.

What must the believer do with the gospel, the Word of God? He must know it in his head, stow it in his heart, show it in his life, and sow it in the world. Know, stow, show, and sow—these four factors are involved in the theme of our conference and are expressed in sermon subjects for evening services, Bible study lessons each morning, worship service themes each afternoon, and the daily business sessions of the conference.

(On Thursday noon, August 4, 1966, Bro. Huffer left the Conference grounds for Chicago, where he started a trip which will take him to Milan, Florence, Rome, Naples, Italy; Cairo, Egypt; Beirut, Lebanon; Jerusalem, Jordan and Israel; Istanbul and Izmir, Turkey; Athens, Greece; Paris, France; and London, England. The trip is part of his graduate work in archaeology at Arizona State University. Bro. Huffer has served as Chairman of the Board of Directors for the past three years.—Editor.)

The Church of God has always been a church of the Bible. It has been known as a Bible reading, Bible believing, and Bible preaching organization of people. The Church of God (headquarters, Oregon, Illinois) had its historical origin with the Bible. As Harold J. Doan wrote in the booklet Your Introduction to the Church of God, "The Church of God is not a 'founded' church; that is, it was not established by any one leader. It does not trace itself back to any individual other than Christ. It has no prophet or prophetess, nor single founder. It has had outstanding leaders in its past history, but did not radiate out from any one person. The Church of God has its taproots in the Word of God."

Christendom for many centuries had insisted that man himself could bring peace, prosperity, and social justice to the earth, that man himself could "bring the Kingdom in." It indicated that enlightened man could solve his own problems. Late in the eighteenth century and early in the nineteenth century, Bible students around the world began to rediscover that God has a plan for man and a program for this planet. They began to teach once more that the coming of Christ is man's only hope, that His future Kingdom is the only solution to the world's problems. They emphasized the Bible message that Jesus will return to earth, transform this planet, and establish His eternal Kingdom of righteousness and peace. These Bible believers gradually found one another. They gathered together in local congregations, state conferences, and finally in general conferences.

Although the Bible Church of God emphasizes doctrines concerning God's tomorrow, it is very careful to center its message in the Lord Jesus Christ, God's only begotten Son, who is man's only Mediator. The gospel of salvation is Christ-centered. God is reconciling mankind to Himself through the person of His Son. The message of the Church of God seeks to reveal Christ in all His fullness as suffering Sacrifice, indwelling and transforming Lord, and coming King. It emphasizes the blood of Christ, and the transforming power of Christ, as well as the coming kingship of Christ.

The Bible message of the Church of God is the message for the whole world. This is the message all men need. This message alone brings satisfaction. This is the message men really want to hear. This is the message which many persons in many parts of the world are accepting. They are wanting to become members of the Bible Church of

Minutes of the Forty-Sixth Annual CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

Monday Morning, August 1, 1966

The Forty-Sixth General Conference of the Church of God was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Alva Huffer. Bro. Darrell Maddock led the group in singing "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations," after which Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick led in prayer.

After welcoming the delegates, the chairman turned the meeting over to the Credentials Committee, consisting of Sr. Ruth Halls, Sr. Inez Gordon, and Bro. David Krogh. Sr. Halls explained and arranged the seating of the delegates.

Bro. Stanley Ross explained how the delegate expense pool works. Through sharing the expense of travel, those churches from a distance are able to be represented at the Conference.

Bro. Huffer introduced the three new member congregations of the Conference: Garden Park, Grand Rapids, Michigan; Van Nuys, California; and Faith Chapel, Lafayette, Indiana. Also introduced were those people who were there for the first time as delegates.

Secretary Richard Smith read the report from Bro. Orville Westlund, Navy Chaplain, and a letter from the Macomb, Illinois Church of God which announced the date of the dedicatory service of the new Macomb church. It was moved by Bro. C. E. Randall and seconded by Bro. Don Swartz that these communications be received and placed on file. Motion carried.

Chairman Alva Huffer then presented his message of challenge to the delegates. (See page 3.)

Following the message to the delegates, Bro. Huffer called for questions or statements of clarification on written reports printed in the June issue of the Progress Journal. Bro. Harvey Krogh explained about the ministers' certificates being renewed every year, stating that ordained ministers need not have it renewed, since ordination is for life.

Bro. Huffer introduced the General Conference Board of Directors. Bro. Wayne Laning then reported on the work and activities of the Board of Directors during the past year, and also expressed thanks on behalf of the board members to Bro. Doan and his staff, to the state conferences, and to local churches and members for their prayers, financial support and spiritual attitude.

Bro. C. E. Randall gave a report of the Committee for Revision of Standards of License and Ordination. This committee was composed of Bro. Emory Macy, Bro. Harvey Krogh, and Bro. C. E. Randall. Recommendations of the committee were read. Bro. Delbert Jones moved that the report be accepted. Seconded by Bro. Ed Goit; motion carried.

Bro. Randall reported on the status of the proposed ministerial Retirement Program. He stated that at present there is an insufficient number of churches and ministers enrolled for placing the plan in operation. There was much discussion from the floor concerning this matter. Bro. Willis Turner stated that he felt there is a misunderstanding about the program, and that we need to be enlightened about it. In response to a question concerning past advertising of the program, Bro. Doan explained that all advertising had been done directly with the church secretaries and ministers. Copies of the complete proposal were sent out at one time. There was discussion concerning the objections to the plan and whether or not pastors had made their objections known.

After further discussion, Bro. Willis Turner made a motion that the Retirement Plan be further studied and the committee be further expanded to further enlighten the membership and churches. The motion was seconded by David Cheatwood. Kenneth Vancil moved that the motion be amended by striking out the words "and the committee be expanded." Motion was seconded by Don Overmyer. Motion to amend carried. The amended motion now reads, "I move that the Retirement Plan be further studied to further enlighten the membership and churches." The amended motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 36; delegates, 71.

The morning session was dismissed at 11:50 with prayer by Bro. Jesse Pestle.

Tuesday Morning, August 2, 1966

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Alva Huffer. Prayer was offered by Bro. Gerald Cooper.

The minutes of the Monday business session were read. After corrections were made, Bro. Milon Hall moved that the minutes be approved as corrected; seconded by Sr. Lyla VanFleet; motion carried.

Bro. Huffer then called on Bro. Doan to present the treasurer's report as printed and contained in the conference folders held by the delegates. The report shows that the Conference has total assets of \$337,132.06. Our net worth less liabilities is \$329,842.27, less depreciation which would leave a depreciated net worth of approximately \$320,000.00 Income from all sources was \$147,894.23. Total expenses were \$122,082.31. There was a gain over the period of \$25,811.92. Bro. Doan explained each item, pointing out that the \$25,811.92 gain was in the form of special contribu-

tions and trust funds, not available for general operation. There was a net operation loss of \$3,000.00 for the October 1, 1965 to June 30, 1966 period. Bro. Charles Jones moved that the treasurer's report be accepted; Bro. Lee McQuinn seconded; motion carried.

The meeting was then turned over to Bro. Paul Shaw to report on the work of the Berean Youth Department and the Sunday School Department. Bro. Shaw reported that the Youth Mission Caravan to Mexico was a great success, and he gave a brief report of the trip. The Caravan team was composed of Myra Turnpaugh, Mary Jo Brewer, LeAnn Appleby, Sandy Ford, Sara Jane Peters, Scott Ross, Dan Scholtes, David Krogh, Rachel Krogh, William Wachtel, and Bro. Shaw. The Caravan members who were present came forward and sang choruses in Spanish, and gave testimonies of the importance and the challenge of the mission work in Mexico. There were expressions of gratitude for the privilege of going on the trip to Mexico and requests for prayers on behalf of the work and workers there.

Bro. Shaw then presented a graph showing the manner in which giving by the young people of the Church of God has increased steadily since 1961. They have exceeded their goal for giving each year since then.

Bro. Shaw reported that beginning January 1, 1967, there will be new Berean lesson materials. There will be a manual for each of the young people. Bro. Eugene Stilson is editor of the Senior Berean Handbook, and Bro. and Sr. Russell Magaw are editors of the Junior Berean Handbook.

It was reported that pre-enrollments for the Berean Youth Conference are the largest this year in the history of the Church of God. There are 284 campers enrolled and 46 adult counselors, making a total of 330.

In the work of the Sunday School Department, Bro. Shaw reported that a workers' training conference was held in Little Rock, Arkansas, in May. The winners in each division in the "Partners in Growth" Sunday school contest were announced as follows:

Division 1 - L'Anse, Michigan; Division 2 - Niles, Michigan; Division 3 - Hedrick, Indiana; Division 4 - Troy, Ohio; Division 5 - Pennellwood, Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Bro. Shaw presented a graph showing the average attendance in our Sunday school and pointed out that we have had an average increase of five percent over last year.

Bro. Huffer then introduced the present Sunday School Department Board of Directors. They are Bro. Paul Overholser, Bro. Bernard Hightower, Sr. Leota Foster, and Bro. Robert Petry. The nominations for two officers of the Sunday School Board of Directors were opened. The officers whose terms had expired were Bro. Overholser and Bro. Hightower. For director number one Eugene Stilson and Paul Overholser were nominated. Bro. Kirkwood moved that the nominations be closed. The motion was seconded and carried. For director number two, Lottie Pickerl and Bernard Hightower were nominated. Bro. Delbert Jones moved that the nominations be closed; seconded by Bro. Kenneth Vancil; motion carried. Election by ballot followed with Bro. Paul Overholser and Bro. Bernard Hightower being re-elected as directors.

Bro. Huffer then asked for consideration of Publishing Recommendations as printed in the June Progress Journal. Bro. Roland Stilson moved that Recommendation Number One be adopted: "We recommend that the Bereau Youth Fellowship be encouraged to sell new subscriptions to The Restitution Herald and that the local group receive seventy-

five cents for each new subscription sold to be used for their projects." Motion was seconded by Bro. Don Swartz. Motion carried. Bro. Oral Miller was given the floor to present a plan for increasing *Restitution Herald* subscriptions without selling them through the local church if selling is not in accordance with local church policy.

Bro. Ed Goit moved that Recommendation Number Two be adopted: "We recommend that The Restitution Herald be made a monthly magazine with at least thirty-two pages, and that advertising be accepted to fill not more than ten percent of the available space." Seconded by Kent Ross. Bro. Doan explained the nature of advertising that would be placed in The Restitution Herald in answer to questions on this matter. Bro. C. E. Randall spoke concerning the recommendation, and raised various questions about the feasibility of enlarging the paper and the acceptance of advertising for the paper. He asked "What would be the income from the advertising? Is it advisable to enlarge the size of the paper at this time? What will the savings be? What kind of advertising would go into the paper? Would there be sufficient material for the larger publication and would the quality of the articles warrant the larger size?" Bro. John Hayse moved that the motion to adopt this recommendation be tabled until Thursday, August 4. Seconded by Bro. C. E. Randall; motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 40; delegates, 80; total, 129.

The meeting was dismissed at 12:00 noon with prayer by Bro. Harry Goekler.

Wednesday Morning, August 3, 1966

The Wednesday morning business session was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Alva Huffer. Bro. Francis Burnett led in prayer. Minutes of the Tuesday morning meeting were read. Bro. Charles Graham moved that the minutes be approved as read; seconded by Bro. Milon Hall; motion carried.


Nominations were opened for directors to replace Bro. Wayne Laning and Bro. Alva Huffer whose terms expired with the close of the conference. For Director number one, Don Swartz nominated Bro. Merle Patrick, and Elmer McChesney nominated Bro. Don Overmyer. Bro. Wilson Kirkwood moved that the nominations be closed; seconded by Bro. Hollis Partlowe; motion carried. For Director number two, Bro. Kenneth Vancil was nominated by War-

ren Sorenson and Bro. Norvald Sogge was nominated by C. E. Lapp. Bro. Ellsworth Routson moved that the nominations be closed; seconded by Bro. Harold Simpson; motion carried. Each of the candidates was asked to come to the platform to be recognized.

Bro. Stanley Ross, Superintendent of Missions, then introduced the Mission Board members. They are: Sr. Edith Eades, Bro. Charles Jones, Bro. Warren Sorenson, and Bro. Lee McQuinn. Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence were then introduced, and Bro. Lawrence told of their trip to the South Pacific area. They visited in the Fiji Islands, New Zealand, and in Australia. In Sydney, Australia, they contacted Charles French and Alan Gunn who have distributed much of our Church of God literature over the years. The Gospel Publicity League was set up by these men, and through it 23,000,000 pieces of literature have been distributed, some of which have been written by Church of God ministers. They print literature in thirteen different languages, some of which is used in the Philippines and Mexico, as well as in North America by Church of God people. The Lawrences met with Lewis Bernard in Fiji, and talked with people who had become acquainted with the Scriptures as we understand them. They feel that it is not feasible to start a work at present in either Fiji or New Zealand. They spent a week in Melbourne and held conversation with Christadelphians, as was also done in New Zealand. The Christadelphians advocate the return of Christ, resurrection, and the Kingdom of God on earth. It is hoped that there can be further cooperation with this organization in the matter of distribution of literature and other work. Bro. Lawrence also told of visiting the city of Canberra — a planned city built in the desert. Bro. Lawrence pointed out that this city brought to his mind a picture of God's planned city to come.

Bro. Doan read from a letter received from a Mr. Ronald Bray expressing his feeling of gratitude for the work of the Lawrences. Bro. Wachtel told of communication he had received from Bro. Lewis Bernard expressing the same appreciation for the Lawrence's visit.

Bro. Ross told of the manner in which literature published by the Church of God has brought inquiries from around the world, even a request from Africa for a Bible. Bro. Ross then answered questions about his world trip, and in answer to a request told of some personal experiences with much human interest.

Bro. C. E. Randall offered to underwrite the duplication

of the tape recording of Bro. and Sr. Lawrence's report of their trip.

In response to a question about the status of Jamal Sunna'a in Beirut, Lebanon, Bro. Ross explained that Mr. Sunna'a, because we as a conference would not support his work fully, had withdrawn his request for aid.

Nominations were then opened for the election of a mission board director to replace Lee McQuinn whose term has expired. The new director will serve for four years. Bro. Jack Hearp nominated Bro. Lee McQuinn. Bro. Robert Hall moved that the nominations be closed; seconded by Bro. Don Swartz; motion carried, and a unanimous ballot was cast for Bro. Lee McQuinn.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 46; delegates, 84; total 139.

The meeting was dismissed at 11:45 a.m. with prayer by Bro. Milon Hall.

Thursday Morning, August 4, 1966

The morning meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Alva Huffer. Prayer was offered by Hollis Partlowe. Minutes of the Wednesday business meeting were read by the secretary. Delbert Jones moved that the minutes be approved as read; seconded by Willis Turner; motion carried.

The election of two directors to the General Conference Board of Directors took place at this time. Bro. Merle Patrick and Bro. Kenneth Vancil were elected.

It was announced that 57 ministers were in attendance at the Conference this year, a record number.

Bro. William Wachtel was then introduced and reported on the progress of Oregon Bible College. He stated that last year Oregon Bible College had a record enrollment of 42 students. There are 32 returning students this year, and there have been 16 new enrollments received for this fall. The girls' dormitory will be filled this year. Bro. Wachtel reported changes in the college staff. Sr. Nora Anderson has resigned as house mother in the girls' dormitory, and Sr. Edith Eades will be the new house mother, starting this fall. Sr. Inez Gordon has asked to be replaced in her job as house mother of the men's dormitory.

Bro. Wachtel also reported that the State of Illinois has made it impossible for Oregon Bible College to grant the Bachelor of Theology Degree. This year a Diploma of Graduation was granted to the graduates. It is hoped that a degree may be offered in the future, and it would probably be the Bachelor of Sacred Literature Degree.

It was reported that the course in Layman Leadership which was planned for this summer had to be cancelled because of insufficient enrollments. The Board of Education has approved this course for next summer, and it is hoped that more will enroll. There would have to be at least ten enrolled in the course before proceeding with it. June 5-9, 1967, is the proposed date for the course next year. Some expressed the opinion that it would be better if the date were later in the summer, because some schools are still in session early in June.

Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick was introduced as the librarian and instructor at Oregon Bible College.

Recommendation Number Four was considered at this time. Bro. Harold Doan presented the plan for the long-range development of Oregon Bible College, explaining that a five- or six-phase program has been projected. He projected the things that would be done in Phase Two of

the plan, and other phases as enrollment in the college grows. Bro. John Hayse moved that Recommendation Number Four be adopted: "We recommend that we begin immediately to plan for and secure funds for Phase Two of the development of Oregon Bible College facilities, which will include construction of a large classroom-chapel in the basement of the men's residence, and a residence for from twenty to twenty-six women. Possible cost of this phase of development would be \$135,000.00." Motion was seconded by Dallas Demmitt. Several spoke for the motion, particularly of the need for development so that our Church of God young people can receive a Christian education. Motion to adopt Recommendation Number Four carried.

Bro. C. E. Randall moved that a vote of thanks be given our retiring directors. Seconded by Wayne Laning. Approval was given by applause.

Bro. Stanley Ross then introduced Bro. Merle Patrick to make some comments about his observations on the trip he took with Bro. Ross around the world. Bro. Patrick remarked that he felt Bro. Ortiguero in the Philippines is a very capable man and that leadership is being developed under his direction, and the future is bright for the Philippine work. He feels that in India the people serve with great sacrifice on their part, and that Bro. Manoah is a person intent on doing the Lord's work. He said we must do our part to help this work or the Lord will hold us responsible.

Bro. Don Swartz asked about the possibility of bringing students from India or the Philippines to Oregon Bible College for training. Bro. Ross stated that he felt it would be best to train them in their own land, among their own people, because of problems they would have in coming to this country.

Bro. Lee McQuinn made a motion that the members of the 1966 General Conference stand in recognition of our Christian love and gratitude to Bill and Mardy Lawrence and Merle Patrick for their unselfish, sacrificial contribution to the propagation of the gospel in their mission travels. Motion carried.

Bro. Wilson Kirkwood asked for a vote of thanks for Bro. Alva Huffer's work in the Conference and on the board, and that we pray daily for his safe journey while he is away. The vote of thanks was given.

Bro. Delbert Jones moved that the motion to adopt Recommendation Number Two be lifted from the table. Seconded by Don Swartz; motion carried. Bro. Doan then presented a report on behalf of the Board of Directors explaining the problems involved in our involvement in the printing and publishing field. Several spoke about the report and to the motion. Various statements of explanation were given along with an expression of thanks by Bro. Randall for the information given by Bro. Doan. A ballot vote was requested for this motion. Bro. Delbert Jones moved that this motion be tabled until next year so that the Board of Directors may make an extended study of the value of having a monthly magazine instead of a semi-monthly periodical. Seconded by Robert Johnson; motion lost. The motion to adopt Recommendation Number Two carried. This motion reads: We recommend that The Restitution Herald be made a monthly magazine with at least thirty-two pages and that advertising be accepted to fill not more than ten percent of the available space."

Bro. Larry Townsend expressed gratitude for the work of Bro. Harold Doan. The Conference floor expressed their appreciation by applause. Bro. C. E. Randall spoke of the good public image created by our General Conference employees in Oregon, Illinois.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers 41; delegates 79; total 129. The meeting recessed at 11:50 until 2:15 p.m. Bro. C. E. Lapp dismissed with prayer.

Thursday Afternoon, August 4, 1966

The meeting was called to order at 2:30 p.m. by Vice Chairman William Lawrence in the absence of Chairman Alva Huffer. Bro. Kenneth Milne led in prayer.

Minutes of the morning session were read by the secretary. It was moved by Harry Sheets, seconded by John Hayse that the minutes be approved as corrected. Motion carried.

Bro. Harold Doan then told of the reorganization of the Board of Directors, with Bro. William Lawrence as chairman, Bro. Robert Huddlestun as vice chairman, Bro. Emory Macy as treasurer, and Bro. Richard Smith as secretary.

Bro. Doan then presented the Goals for Giving for the period from October 1, 1966, to September 30, 1967. The goal will be \$69,170.00. He also showed a chart showing how each dollar contributed is spent. It was moved by Dean Urish, seconded by Gerald Cooper that the Goal for Giving be adopted. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

Bro. Lawrence then presented Recommendation Number Three which reads: "We recommend that Church of God Vacation Bible School books be printed only in five-lesson sets beginning in 1968, and that Church of God Bible schools be encouraged to have five-day schools using Church of God books." It was moved by Bro. Hollis Partlowe, seconded by Kenneth Vancil that this recommendation be adopted. Bro. Lawrence asked for one representative from each church to stand to show the number of Bible schools being conducted for five days and those being conducted for ten days. Thirty-three had five-day schools, six had ten-day schools. There was much discussion pro and con pertaining to this motion. The motion to adopt Recommendation Number Three lost. Bro. John Hayse called for a rising vote of thanks to the editors and writers of the Vacation Bible School books.

Bro. Willis Turner spoke then of keeping things in balance by spending money for foreign mission work and home missions on a more equal basis. Without official knowledge it appears from reports that there were nearly as many

conversions in foreign fields as at home. A study should be made of that which we are doing in youth work, Sunday school, missions, and any other area where our money is being spent.

Bro. C. F. Pryor moved that the editor of Vacation Bible School books prepare nine lessons, followed by a planned achievement program to constitute the tenth lesson. Seconded by Paul Johnson. Motion lost.

Bro. Gerald Cooper spoke of the importance of intercessory prayer, stating that through experience he has learned that God answers prayer in marvelous ways.

Bro. Robert Johnson moved that a committee of five members be appointed by the chairman of the General Conference Board of Directors. This committee would study the needs of the Printing Department of the Conference and make recommendations to the Board of Directors. Seconded by Bro. Paul Johnson. Motion carried.

Bro. Jack Hearp was appointed by the Chairman as parliamentarian for the Conference in 1967.

The secretary read the minutes of the afternoon meeting. After corrections were made, it was moved and seconded that they be accepted as corrected. Motion carried.

Sr. Ruth Halls gave the following attendance report: officers, 8; ministers, 36; delegates, 73; total, 114. The average attendance for the conference was 126 as compared with 124 in 1965.

Bro. Ed Goit moved that we adjourn; seconded by Bro. David Cheatwood; motion carried. The 1966 General Conference was dismissed with prayer by Bro. Edward Goit.

God. They want to become part of this great missionary movement in these concluding days before the Lord returns. They want to belong to "the Church with the Bible."

The General Conference through its many avenues of service seeks to be a medium whereby ministers and members, local churches and state conferences can co-ordinate and channel their united efforts to reach out with the gospel both at home and abroad. We are doing together what we could not have done separately. During the recent past, the Church of God General Conference has experienced amazing growth in all departments and phases of its work: Publishing and Printing, Oregon Bible College, Sunday School Department, Berean Youth Department, Home Missions, and Foreign Missions. Missions have been opened in Nova Scotia, India, Mexico, and the Philippines. The Mission Builders League, during a few short years, has helped build fourteen new church buildings. During this same period, several new Sunday schools and churches have been organized; many congregations have increased in membership; and the financial strength of many local churches and state conferences has become increased as these groups have participated in missionary work. Churches are preparing themselves to launch out with the Word of God to persons in all places on this planet.

World events indicate that Christ's return is near. Time is so brief; the need is so immense. "Work that centuries might have done must crowd the hours of setting sun." The church age is drawing quickly to its close. The time to arise is immediately; the time to launch out with the gospel is now. Now is the time to know, stow, show, and sow the Word of God, the gospel of salvation through Christ!

Largest attendance, 139, smallest attendance, 117; average attendance of delegates, 126; ministers in attendance, 47; delegate forms sent to churches, 77; delegate forms received, 65; delegate forms sent to conferences, 15; delegate forms received, 11.

TOTAL ATTENDANCE

Five hundred seventy-seven people were registered at General Conference this summer—a record number. Many of these were present throughout the entire week. Children's classes had more enrolled for the week than ever before. More than one hundred teen-agers attended conference.

CONFERENCE EXPENSES

We are happy to report that collections received at Conference and payments made at the desk met Conference expenses. With all the Conference bills paid, it appears that income and expense were almost exactly equal. We are thankful for this giving, since it means that the Conference expenses will not have to be subsidized by funds contributed to the Goal for Giving.

DELEGATE POOL

The delegate pool expense this year was \$54.22. Each church and conference entered in the delegate pool thus pays the same amount to be represented at conference. Churches and conferences each should pay their delegate's expenses up to \$54.22. Delegates whose expenses were more than \$54.22 received the difference from the pool, and delegates whose expenses were less than \$54.22 paid the difference into the pool.

CONFERENCE DATES FOR 1967

Arrangements have been made with Camp Alexander Mack to conduct General Conference there August 6-10, 1967, and the Berean Youth Conference, August 11-17, 1967, Lord willing.

NEW GOAL FOR GIVING

A new Goal for Giving of \$69,170.00 was unanimously adopted by the delegates for the fiscal year, October 1, 1966, through September 30, 1967. The Goal is the largest yet adopted and it represents the enlarged program of missions, education through Oregon Bible College, publishing, Berean Youth services, and Sunday school development undertaken by the General Conference.

General Conference Progress

INDIA BUILDING FUND OVER THE TOP

The membership of the Church of God is to be complimented for an experience in sacrificial stewardship. During the past three months (the months of the fabled "summer slump"), in addition to carrying on the work of the local churches, the state conferences, and maintaining a high level of giving for the regular Goal for Giving of the General Conference, more than \$9,000.00 has been received to purchase land and build a building for our brethren in Bangalore, India. Funds received over the \$9,000.00 Goal will be credited to the India mission work for its general operations.

It is gratifying to be proved wrong. This writer was doubtful that this was a good time to try to raise an extra \$9,000.00, even though convinced that the need was great and immediate. The Church of God has risen to the challenge and we are certain it will be blessed for this extra effort for the Lord's work. We praise Him for making this project possible.

LOAN FUND

The Hearp Memorial Loan Fund of \$10,000.00 has been established by Pastor Jack Hearp in memory of his parents. The fund is administered by the General Conference Board of Directors and is to be loaned to churches constructing or buying buildings in emergency situations when funds cannot be secured from other loaning agencies or to carry the church over while it waits for funds from Mission Builders. The funds have now been loaned or committed to two churches in the process of buying buildings. We are thankful to Bro. Hearp for making this memorial fund available for this loan purpose.

NEW BUILDING APPROVED

One of the important decisions of the 1966 Conference was to approve going ahead with plans for a new women's residence for Oregon Bible College. The building is planned for the present college site on Franklin Street in Oregon. Much preliminary work will have to be done with the architect before final plans can be approved by the Board of Directors and a campaign begun for funds for this very necessary building. This preliminary work (soil testing, site survey, grading engineering, and preliminary architectural work) will require considerable funds. We invite interested people to contribute now to the Oregon Bible College building fund for this purpose so we can begin the preliminary work right away.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The new Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, pictured on page 2, will have its first meeting in Oregon, Ill., November 18, 1966, Lord willing. Thanks are due to Board members Alva G. Huffer and Wayne Laning who have served faithfully the past three years. Members of the Board give much time and effort to the Conference work and carry heavy responsibility as the work continues to expand. New members of the Board are Merle Patrick, Ashland, Ohio, and Kenneth Vancil, Bushnell, Ill. Bro. Patrick is a member of the Columbia Station church and Bro. Vancil a member of the Macomb church.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FINANCES

As will be noted in the figures below, General Conference contributions have been excellent in these summer months. In the July-August period we went over our Goal for Giving. If this sacrificial stewardship continues through the month of September, we will finish the fiscal year ahead of our Goal. We praise the Lord for this blessing and commend His people for their loyal support of the Church of God work.

During this same period, as we stated above, we went over the top in our goal for giving for a building and land for the Church of God in India.

In the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign we have not done quite so well. We were surprised to discover in preparing figures for the General Conference that more than \$17,000.00 remain in unpaid commitments. We hope that these commitments will be met also, especially as we contemplate a new building program for a women's residence

The prayerful support and interest of the Lord's people in His work are much appreciated and inspires all.

YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT

Each year members of the faculty and student body of Oregon Bible College take part in the Berean Youth Conference, serving as teachers, counselors, and in other capacities. The following report, by Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick, describes the part the College played in this year's Youth Conference.

"During Berean Youth Conference, Oregon Bible College had three persons on the grounds serving as career counselors. These were Dallas Demmitt, Clarence McQuinn, and V. E. Kirkpatrick. Judging by the number of young persons who took advantage of this service by signing up for interviews with the counselors, it was a worthwhile service and should be continued.

"Each year the General Berean Youth Fellowship awards a \$100 tuition scholarship, half of which is applied during the first semester of the freshman year and half of which is applied during the second semester. This scholarship is awarded on the basis of the results of two tests, one in English and the other in Bible content. This year six prospective students were given the tests on the afternoon preceding Oregon Bible College Night. These were Mary Jo Brewer, Cynthia Ford, Vivian Kirkpatrick II, Gayle Pryor, Dale Ramsey, and Linda Zizert.

"The program on Oregon Bible College Night was in the form of a gospel team service. Bro. Paul Shaw served as master of ceremonies, introducing the musical numbers: a duet sung by Mary Mickey and Clarence McQuinn, a solo by Bro. McQuinn, and a trio by Kathy New, Joyce Railton, and Gayle Pryor. This was followed by the presentation of the BYF Scholarship to Mary Jo Brewer, who had scored highest in the examination. Vivian Kirkpatrick II was the runner-up. The program continued with a series of short talks about college life, work, and activities: 'Background and Purpose,' V. E. Kirkpatrick; 'Courses and Studies,' Roger Cupp; 'Dorm Life, Work, and Costs,' Jim Graham; and 'Opportunities for Christian Service,' Steve Bolhous. These were followed with a series of testimonials brought by college students and incoming freshmen who were on the platform during the entire service.

"Some of the students, feeling that there was not enough publicity at the conference regarding Oregon Bible College, resolved to do something about it. As a result you saw a great many persons on the grounds with large tags reading 'I Went to O.B.C.,' or 'I Am Going to O.B.C.,' or 'I Will Be Going to O.B.C.' In addition they organized a Coke social for those going to O.B.C. and for those interested in going, so that there could be a time of fellowship

and also of questions and answers regarding the College. This, we feel, was a successful event, and bears consideration for future conferences."

SUMMER COURSE

The projected summer course in Layman Leadership, which was to have been offered June 6-10, had to be canceled for lack of sufficient enrollments. We hope that the course may be offered next summer. Suggestions or questions would be appreciated.

FIRST SEMESTER COURSES

Courses for the first semester are divided among five instructors, as follows: Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick's courses are English I, Bible Geography, Old Testament I, Old Testament Poetry, and Church History I; Bro. William Wachtel's courses are Preaching I and III, Systematic Theology I, Gospel of John, and New Testament Greek I; Bro. Paul Shaw's courses are Teaching I, Public Speaking I, Music Fundamentals and Directing I, and Choir; Bro. Kenneth Milne's courses: Biblical Introduction and Bible Survey I; and Bro. Stanley Ross's course: Missions II.

GOSPEL TEAM PLANNING

Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick, Director of Christian Service, is scheduling gospel team trips for the first semester and would appreciate it if interested churches would contact him as soon as possible about a gospel team visit.

BOOSTER SUPPORT

Since Booster Day, May 22, 1966, Oregon Bible College has received just over \$1,500.00 in Booster contributions, probably a record amount for any year! Thank you, everyone who had a part in providing this much-needed help!

YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT

Another very successful Berean Youth Conference was held August 5 - 11, 1966, at Camp Alexander Mack. This year's attendance again set a new record high. There were 284 campers and 46 staff members present. This is an increase of 61 campers over last year, which was itself a record-breaking year. Sunday night featured a special "Second Coming Youth Rally," with Bro. Z. B. Duncan bringing a challenging and inspirational message. Monday was Oregon Bible College Night. Students and staff participated in the service. Tuesday was Missions Night and featured a report service by the Youth Caravan to Mexico. Wednesday was decision night. There were twenty-nine who responded to the gospel that evening and about eighty who came forward for rededication. The message, "The Glory of Rebellion," was brought by Bro. C. E. Lapp. We are thankful for the Lord's richest blessing which we experienced during the week.

YOUTH REACH GOAL EARLY

The youth delegates at the 1965 Youth Conference set a giving goal for the youth of the church of \$3,150.00 for the 1965-66 fiscal year. This goal was surpassed during the Berean Youth Conference held last month, a month and a half ahead of the end of the fiscal year, September 30. This is the second time this has been done. Last year's giving goal was \$2,500.00. The reaching of this year's goal was partly due to the generous and enthusiastic giving of the campers in attendance at the Youth Conference. The youth set a goal for themselves to raise at least \$1,000.00 during the week. By week's end, \$1,015.51 had been contributed, including \$323.39 for missions. At this writing, the goal for the year has been surpassed by more than five hundred dollars. NEW GOAL SET AT \$4,250.00

The youth of the church have again taken a dramatic step forward in financial responsibility. The delegates at the 1966 Youth Conference set a giving goal for 1966-67 of \$4,250.00, an increase of \$1,100.00 over this year's goal. If the goal is met, it will be the first year that the youth of the church have completely financed all the expenses of the Berean Youth Department. The step was made after the delegates heard a report estimating the expenses of the department for the coming year at \$4,000.00. They decided to raise this amount, plus \$100.00 for the tour mentioned below, plus \$150.00 for good measure, making the total \$4,250.00.

During the Christmas holidays of 1966 the winning Bible quiz team and the high-scoring winner of the Christian Speech Contest will be taking a trip to hold services in several churches. SUBSCRIPTION DRIVE PLANNED

Later this year a subscription drive for The Restitution Herald will be carried on as an evangelistic project of the Bereans of the church. Provision has been made to allow 75 cents of each subscription to be retained by the local Berean group participating, if they so desire, and thereby provide a means of raising funds to support the various projects of the youth group. More details will be released as plans progress.

EMILY BLACKWELL


