MISSION PROGRESS

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The Philippine Conference has begun evangelistic team work. They have been supplied with a portable sound system for this purpose and will be holding special evangelistic services in various villages of northern Luzon.

A weekly radio program will start on October 16 over a popular station near the Uddiawan Church. The program will be on the air each Sunday at 12:00 o'clock noon and run for one half hour. It will be called "The Herald of Truth" program, and will generally consist of a song by the quartette, prayer, a solo or duet, a message, another quartette number, and the closing prayer. Radio programs are popular in the Philippines because Japanese radios can be purchased at a very low price.

A new work is being started in the village of Sta. Fe. Services are being held each Sunday conducted by either Bro. Bonafacio Gabanes or Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero, as it is only a two-hour motorcycle ride from Uddiawan.

Consideration is being given to the opening of a work in Bayambang, the capital of the province of Pangasinan. There has been some Christadelphian work carried on there in the past and many people are sympathetic to our teachings.

Bro. Ortiguero and the Philippine churches send their special thanks for the sound system. He says, "It is very nice and good for the use of the evangelistic team."

MEXICO

Eileen Moore, younger daughter of Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore, was quite ill for a time with ameobic dysentery. The germ apparently comes from some foods and can be quite serious. The doctors, however, have assured the Moores that the germ is dead and that she is completely well now. They try to be very careful with their foods; however, children can pick up things unknowingly.

One of the baptized members of the church at Labor

Vieja was drowned sometime ago while returning home from church services. Some heathen elements of the village lay the blame of the death on the church. For a time it did have an ill effect, to the point of causing concern for the safety of the pastor and leaders of the church. Recently, however, the majority of the villagers have become sympathetic to the church and its work and the work there is now progressing even better than before the accident. God works in miraculous ways His wonders to perform.

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah has now received his Ordination Certificate and sends his thanks to all for their assistance in granting this to him.

Plans are moving ahead on the proposed church building in Bangalore. It is in the plan to have a sanctuary and two smaller rooms, with a baptismal tank at the rear. It will be enclosed in a compound wall with two iron gates. These walls are customary in most public buildings, hotels, churches, and many homes. The contributions to this India Building Fund have now exceeded ten thousand dollars. Praise God for His wonderful blessings in this project.

A typewriter has been purchased and will be most helpful to Bro. Manoah in preparing materials for services, in making his reports to the General Conference office, and in many other ways.

November is observed throughout the Church of God as Mission Month. This year, instead of offering bulletin covers, we will be mailing free bulletin inserts to each pastor for distribution to the membership through the church bulletin or by other means. The inserts will be mailed in the middle of October.

General Conference Progress

MEMBERSHIP AND PASTORAL SALARY

At General Conference it was suggested that some of the statistics accumulated from the statistical forms returned by church secretaries be printed for the membership. We think that the following statistics will be of interest.

Twenty-three churches with a membership of fifty or more people reported. Of these, the highest membership was 175, the lowest was 52, and the average membership was 98. Thirteen of these twenty-three churches furnish both parsonage and utilities. (We estimate their cash value at \$1,200.00 per year for these statistics.) Eight of these twenty-three churches furnish only parsonage (valued at \$900.00 per year). Two furnish neither parsonage nor utilities. The average salary paid by these twentythree churches, including travel allowance, parsonage, and utilities was \$5,156.00 in 1965. The highest salary was \$6,700.00 per year and the lowest in this group was \$3,300.00 per year.

Fifteen churches reported with a membership of less than 50 which have nearly full-time ministers. Some of these may have a few hours of part-time work or pension or retirement income in addition to pastoral salary. Of the fifteen, the highest membership was 49, the lowest was 20, and the average was 33. Six of these fifteen furnish both parsonage and utilities; five furnish only a parsonage; and four furnish neither. The average salary of the fifteen ministers, including travel allowance, parsonage, and utilities, was \$4,080.00. The highest paid was \$5,100.00 and the lowest paid was \$2,100.00.

LAST YEAR'S GOALS FOR GIVING

We finished the fiscal year September 30, 1966, by going slightly over our Goal for Giving for the year. We appreciate the faithfulness of the membership of the Church of God in standing behind the programs of your General Conference with prayer and financial support. Without this widespread interest and support it would not be possible to carry on the broad programs of missions, Oregon Bible College education, publishing, printing, Berean Youth Fellowship development, Sunday school promotion, and the other many services of your headquarters organization.

The number of churches and conferences who support

the Lord's work through the General Conference is increasing. The number of individuals who support the work is increasing. Total giving to local churches, the state conferences and the General Conference is increasing. With the gifts for Mission Builders appeals, Oregon Bible College Boosters, the Silver Anniversary Building Campaign, and the special India Building project, total giving is at an all-time high. This is indicative of growth, for which we praise God!

NEW GOAL FOR GIVING


October 1 began the new General Conference fiscal year. The Goal for Giving unanimously adopted by the delegates at the 1966 General Conference meetings was \$69,170.00. This Goal will provide funds for missions (42%), Oregon Bible College (29%) general services (11%), publishing (8%), Berean Youth Fellowship (7%), Sunday School Department (3%). The percentage figures tell how each dollar contributed to the General Conference Goal is divided and used.

In addition to this Goal for Giving which provides the funds for actual operating expenses for the varied programs of your General Conference, approval was given for beginning a building program for an Oregon Bible College residence for women. Two Mission Builders Appeals will be made during the new fiscal year, as in the past.

While the opportunities for stewardship have been greatly expanded in the Church of God in the past years, it appears that local churches and state conferences have also enlarged and grown during the same time. Ministers salaries have increased and many church buildings have been built and improved as we have broadened our total vision and participation in the worldwide work of the Lord.

SUBSCRIPTION CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN NOVEMBER 15

The Berean Subscription Campaign for new subscribers to *The Restitution Herald* will begin November 15, 1966, and will be carried on for a two-month period, concluding January 15, 1967. All Berean youth groups will be invited to participate in this evangelistic project. Provision has been made to allow 75 cents of each subscription price to be retained by the Berean group which sells the subscription and thereby provide a means of raising funds to support the various projects of the group. A packet of materials will be received by youth leaders in October explaining the project and providing the necessary forms for recording and reporting the subscriptions sold. The terms of the campaign will apply only to new subscriptions, not renewals, and to subscriptions sold within the dates of the campaign.

Other second-year members of the Council are Dale Ramsey, Michael Hale, and Jena Runyan.

CONTEST DIRECTOR APPOINTED

Jim Mickey, director of Berean Bible Quizzing activities for the State of Illinois for the past two years, has been appointed to be in charge of the administering and promoting of the entire Berean contest program, including both the Christian Speech Contest and the Berean Bible Quiz Contest. It is hoped that Bro. Mickey can help some of our other conferences learn some of the winning techniques exhibited by Illinois contestants in the contests the last several years. Any person having suggestions for rules or procedure changes for either of the contests should write Bro. Mickey at the General Conference address.

STATE YOUTH DIRECTORS TO MEET

Plans are underway to hold another meeting of state and district youth directors this year. The meeting will be held in Oregon, Ill., and will be planned for sometime late this year or early next year. There was high interest in last year's meeting, with ten conferences represented. We are hoping for an even larger participation this year. All conferences are encouraged to pay their youth leaders' share of the transportation pool, which has been roughly estimated to be \$45.00. The value to the youth of the conferences involved of the new ideas for youth work gained at the meeting is well worth the minimal cost for transportation of the youth leaders. NEW BEREAN LESSON MANUALS BEGIN JANUARY 1

January 1, 1967, marks the date when the new, improved Berean lesson manuals will go into use. All youth leaders and pastors have been mailed forms on which to order copies of the manual for the youth of their churches. The new manuals have been changed in many ways. The printing format has been improved. There are now separate manuals for senior and junior Bereans. Each manual contains enough lessons for a six-month period. Churches which do not have formally organized Berean groups may wish to use the materials for youth classes held during the midweek service. We are hoping for one hundred percent cooperation from the churches in this new venture of your Youth Department.

MISSION DOLLAR CLUB THRIVING BUT SHORT OF GOAL

Membership in the Mission Dollar Club, which stands at an all-time high of 142, is still 58 members short of the goal set for this year of 200 members. The women's residence is filled to capacity, with sixteen students. The men's residence is near capacity, with twenty—room for only four more!

Arrangements will have to be made to accommodate an expected increase next year, and plans are going forward to erect a new women's residence as soon as possible.

The Mystery of Missions

As the Church of God has become more and more active in the field of foreign missions there has been concern that we could reach the point of overemphasis. This concern is based on the fact that a strong domestic church is required to underwrite subsidized mission fields. It is thought that we *could* grow so rapidly in foreign missions that the balance between a strong home church and a developing foreign program could be upset.

Some of the factors to be considered in this matter are not obvious, nor even logical, but yet have a bearing on the whole picture. On the basis of experience, it appears that as the Church of God has delved more deeply into carrying the gospel into foreign fields, the church at home has prospered in many ways. As funds and attention have been devoted to development of missions, there appears to have been an upgrading of church buildings, a growth in membership, more adequate provision for many ministers through better salaries and better parsonages, an enlargement of Oregon Bible College, and the founding of several new congregations as branch churches or evangelistic efforts of state conferences.

We think of this as the mystery of missions. The fact seems to be that when the seed is sown, the sower receives a harvest. The prayers, the funds, the attention, and the time devoted to assisting in preaching the gospel anywhere seems to return a harvest everywhere.

Home fields have not been neglected. Mission Builders appeals, pastoral aid, staff services, training conferences, literature, and the majority of Oregon Bible College graduates, primarily build up the home churches. That portion of our effort devoted to foreign work, however, also has a resulting invigorating effect on the home fields and they are stimulated to greater growth and service. What has been done in mission work has returned much more than has been given. There is an area of weakness, however, that should be recognized. There is the possibility that, as individuals, we will convince ourselves that we have fulfilled the Great Commission and have received our full blessing when we have supported the organized mission efforts of the Church of God. We have not given too much for missions, nor undertaken too much for the Lord in foreign fields, but perhaps we have not exercised our own personal responsibilities to witness to and to win the people in our own circle of life. This is the phase of home missions that has been neglected and which must be corrected.

One of the intangible rewards of missions is the joy of satisfaction in having done the Lord's will as His ambassadors. Paul wrote of his work in Thessalonica: "What is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming? For ye are our glory and joy" (1 Thess. 2:19, 20). Having seen these people brought out of the world and into the hope of the gospel, knowing that they would receive salvation at the coming of the Lord, was reward to Paul. His glory and joy were in his converts.

This joy is present in the Church of God as it realizes that people throughout the world are now coming to a knowledge of the truth through various mission programs. This joy is reflected in more devoted and diligent service in the home fields. But the joy received from sowing the seed that brings people to Christ could be greatly enlarged if, as individuals, we could see friends and relatives accept the Lord, and rejoice in our personal fellowship with them in the Lord. In not doing so, we may be missing much of the blessing the Lord has in store for us. We are receiving this blessing as a church as we reach out and sacrifice for the gospel. We could enjoy it more as individuals if we would reach out in our own circles of society to witness for Christ.

The Quarterly Philippine Ministers' meeting will be held November 7-12, 1966. At this meeting doctrinal subjects are discussed and the general operation of the conference work is planned. Decisions will be made regarding the new work at Bayambang and the radio and evangelistic team work. Bro. Ortiguero asks the prayers of the membership for these efforts, "that God may guide, help, and bless these works that it may help much in the growth and strengthening of the local churches as well as to convert many unbelievers to Christ."

The membership is anxious to complete some final work on the Uddiawan building. Some painting, walks, and landscaping are to be finished. Average attendance at the Uddiawan Church was one hundred eight during September.

INDIA

Plans for the church building in Bangalore are ready. Construction will begin as soon as the plans are approved by the General Conference Board. Heavy rains have continued later than usual. The people, however, still continue to come and the attendance during September averaged one hundred sixty-five. Bro. S. S. Manoah and the leaders in the work in India are hoping to start branch churches or Sunday schools in other areas of Bangalore after the project of building the church is completed. Bro. Manoah is giving special instructions to several of the young men, training them for the leadership in this outreach program.

MEXICO

Bro. Francisco Martinez, who formerly pastored the work in Potosi, has been transferred to pastor the group at Labor Vieja. Some of the non-Christians there have been quite antagonistic toward Bro. Ascencion Lara, the former pastor, due to one of the church members drowning in the river during a flooding period. This feeling is being overcome, but it was considered advantageous to the work in general to change pastors for the present.

The members in Saltillo have rented a small building in which to hold regular services. Bro. Lara will pastor this work for the present. He will live in part of the building and share the rent with the membership.

Bro. Dean Moore says in his report, "The work here seems to be growing. We appreciate the prayers and financial support of the people of our churches. Because of their help there are many people here in Mexico who are learning the great truths of the Bible, and through faith are finding a better way of life. May God bless each person who prays and gives for the salvation of others at home and in the foreign fields."


NOVA SCOTIA

Judging will be done on the basis of special reports submitted by youth leaders.



OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

(Phase Two)

PICTURED is a preliminary drawing of the proposed new women's residence for Oregon Bible College. The proposed building would have one and one-half floors on two levels, approximately forty-six by one hundred feet. The upper floor would house twenty-four students and a housemother, and the lower floor would contain a lounge-canteen area, laundry, storage, and boiler room. The style of architecture is similar to that of the men's residence with some refinements and variations.

Oregon Bible College women are now housed in the one-hundred-eight-year-old Golden Rule Dormitory. It now houses sixteen women, which is its capacity. By providing these more modern and safe facilities for the women, Golden Rule Dormitory can be held in reserve for an expected overflow of men from the now almost-filled men's residence.

Phase two of the Oregon Bible College Development Program (phase one was the construction of the men's residence, library, cafeteria building) will include this women's residence, landscaping of adjoining land, completion of a classroom-chapel in the basement of the men's residence, and conversion of the present chapel to a classroom. The estimated cost of phase two of the Oregon Bible College Development Program is \$150,000.00.

Funds are already being received and we have on hand in this account about \$2,500.00. While a planned fundraising program as such is not yet under way, there are many who have seen the great need and who want to give now. We will be happy to receive these funds and to hold them for use in this phase of Oregon Bible College Development.

Because of the "tight" money situation, the immediate need for this building, and the inflationary trend that can add greatly to cost of construction as we delay, we hope that cash funds can be raised more rapidly for this phase of development than in phase one of our program. (For instance, the architect estimates that if we had waited until now to build the men's residence it would have cost at least \$25,000.00 more than it did three years ago.)

As definite plans are made to go ahead with this undertaking approved by the delegates at the 1966 General Conference, your prayers, ideas, and support are necessary.

MEXICO

Services are conducted each Sunday in Saltillo now with Bro. Ascencion Lara as pastor. Sr. Rachel Krogh is doing some work on the Spanish hymnbook being used there, correcting doctrinal errors, and making them more usable for the congregations. She and Bro. Moore are also teaching classes regularly. The present courses cover teaching, music, and doctrinal subjects.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

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
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ANNIVERSARY AT SOUTHLAWN



Mr. Percy Bilton

G OD be with you till we meet again," intoned about four hundred persons gathered in the auditorium of Phoenix Women's Club recently. "Till we meet . . . till we meet at Jesus' feet," sung a little self-consciously by some, assured and strong by others, but joined by almost all. "God be with you till we meet again"; and so came to a close the *Bilton Crusade* of Phoenix, Arizona.

What had attracted so many members from Phoenix and Tempe Church of God congregations, as well as friends and residents of the greater Phoenix area? Percy Bilton, British industrialist, leading building contractor, controlling a worldwide financial empire from his London offices, was the personality around whom the crusade was planned. Mr. Bilton, an expert on Middle Eastern affairs, author, keen Bible student, and some-times lecturer was uniquely suited to the task. Wealthy, urbane, and with a quick wit, Mr. Bilton has the air of one who has known success and riches long enough to no longer be impressed or affected by them. Sense of humor, friendly, interested, are all terms that describe him, but of greatest importance is the love of God, intense drive to know

God's will and plan for the future and burden that others should find Christ that is evidenced by his life.

The crusade began Wednesday, October 5, 1966, and continued for four consecutive Wednesdays. Perhaps we should say it began back in early spring when an interested group met to discuss ways and means that the Church of God might take advantage of Mr. and Mrs. Bilton's planned visit to Arizona.

From a chance remark in a letter that he (Mr. Bilton) would welcome an opportunity to some way serve the Lord while in Phoenix and at the same time help the newly organized Phoenix congregation, through the planning and the crusade proper, we feel the Lord was leading. Even though we believe it commendable, our purpose is not to commend the project nor to praise individual participation but rather to report to you what, why, and how it was accomplished.

Why the Crusade?

To reach people in the community and our own friends that could not be reached in the usual ways; to have a joint participation project that would spark enthusiasm in our own church groups; to advertise the Church of God, headquarters Oregon, Illinois, were our purposes. In this area we are not well known. We hoped to create an opportunity to approach our individual circles of friends and acquaintances, on an intellectual tack; especially those who would be defensive and closed-minded to church *per se*. Then we desired that they might come in contact with the truth of Christ's second coming and the Kingdom on earth.

Methods Used

Advertising and promotion took the most in time, effort, and expense. Before a promotional campaign could (Please turn to page 8)

INQUIRIES

Almost every day the General Conference receives one or more inquiries from people in various parts of the world who want to know more about the Church of God or who are ordering literature for further study. Most of these contacts are made through tracts, *Systematic Theology* books in libraries, or *The Restitution Herald*. In many cases we do not know how the piece of literature was received by the person who manifests interest.

As a result of these inquiries, all of which are followed up with a personal letter, literature, and reference to the nearest pastor when the interest seems to warrant this, several have been enrolled in the Systematic Bible Study Course or directed to attendance at a local Church of God. Greater use of tracts and *The Restitution Herald* would increase these inquiries, contacts, and possibilities of conversions.

PLANNING FOR VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS?

Order forms have been mailed to pastors and superintendents for the 1967 Vacation Bible School books "In Training for Missions." The deadline for orders is February 10, and the number of books to be printed will be based upon orders received by this time. Early planning for your Bible school will insure adequate preparation of all workers and is essential to a successful, fruitful school.

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE THIS MONTH

The annual Midwinter Ministers' Conference is being planned for January 23-27 at Oregon, Illinois. This is one of the most important meetings of the year for the ministers. The fellowship, study, and worship make this retreat most worthwhile for every pastor. Plan now to attend if you are a minister. It is to the advantage of each Church of God to participate in the expense pool so that each minister can attend the Ministers' Conference.

ESTATE PLANNING

More and more people are taking the church into consideration in planning the development and ultimate distribution of their estates. Gifts of real property, stocks and bonds, personal property (business machinery, autos, etc.), and inclusion of the Church of God General Conference as a beneficiary in insurance programs is becoming more common. 

Several individuals have completed the Systematic Bible Study Course and many more are in the process of studying it now.

We are in close contact with these people and much literature is being sent there and we believe that God is again opening a wonderful door of opportunity for outreach for the Church of God. We ask your prayers for the development of this work and praise Him for these open doors.

INDIA

Construction of the church building at Bangalore will begin shortly. This building will have a cement floor, with polished marble stones in it. There will also be benches for the congregation. This will be quite a severe change from the rented prayer hall in use now which has a dirt floor and everyone sits on the floor.

Bro. Manoah expects the new auditorium to seat about five hundred. There will be a baptismal tank, a pastor's study, and a few classrooms. One of these rooms will be quite large for special gatherings, wedding receptions, and the like; much as our social rooms.

MEXICO

Bro. Dean Moore and his family and Sr. Rachel Krogh spent a few days in the United States before Christmas renewing their permits and picking up needed supplies. Bro. Moore then went to Labor Vieja to visit Pastor Francisco Martinez, and the work there.

The classes being taught two nights a week by Bro. Moore and Sr. Krogh are doing well, with attendance being good. Two of the leading members of the Labor Vieja church and their families are now living in Saltillo to attend these classes. They are earning their support while there by making brooms.

Mail is highly treasured (especially at this time of year) by those of us who are away from family and friends and we appreciate your remembering us. PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The severe drouth continues in the northern Luzon area of the Philippine Islands, and has been described as possibly the worst in the history of the Islands. The three churches at Quezon, Abut, and Minagbag have suffered a great deal from shortage of food and clothing. The government is giving some help on foods but the need for used clothing is great. (See December JOURNAL for mailing address.)

HOME MISSIONS

The theme of the 1965 General Conference was "Enlargement." During that Conference study was given to enlargement through home missions.

One item studied at that time was *The Need for Individual Persuasion*. This study session brought out that teaching and preaching in our churches needed to emphasize the urgency of the need of salvation in view of our belief in the soon return of our Lord. ACCREDITING ASSOCIATION MEETING

EVENING COURSE FOR WOMEN

The Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges held its annual meeting near Chicago on October 27 and 28, 1966. Members of the faculty who attended were V. E. ANNUAL SEMINAR



BIBLE QUIZ MATERIALS ANNOUNCED

The books of 1 John, 2 John, and 3 John will serve as the basis for the Berean Bible Quiz Contest for 1967. This was announced by Berean contest director Jim Mickey at the meeting of state and district youth directors last month. It should be pointed out that while three books are being studied instead of one, they are still only slightly longer than the Book of James, studied last year, since the books of 2 John and 3 John have only one chapter each.

This announcement was made early this year so that some groups who wish to do so may begin work early. The official rules and procedures will be published within the next two months, but Berean groups are encouraged to begin work if they desire, since there will be only minor changes in rules or procedures from last year.

YOUTH CARAVAN PLANNED FOR NOVA SCOTIA

A decision has been reached to plan a Youth Mission Caravan to our mission station at Digby, Nova Scotia, for next summer. The caravan will be similar to the very successful caravan taken to our Mexico mission stations last summer.

Preliminary plans call for two cars, with openings for eight or nine young people and two adult sponsors. Forms on which young people may apply to be a part of the caravan will be mailed to the churches in the early spring. A prayerful choice will be made from among those that apply. The likely time for the caravan will be July, probably early in the month. Further details will be released as plans develop.

TIME IS RUNNING OUT!

Time is running out for families who do not subscribe to *The Restitution Herald* to do so as part of the Berean Subscription Campaign. YOUTH WEEK IS NEXT MONTH

February 20-26, 1967, will be observed as Youth Week throughout the Church of God. All churches are encouraged to plan an active observation of the week, and of Youth Sunday, February 26. An idea and planning booklet for Youth Week is being mailed to all churches this month. This year a Youth Week Award will be awarded the Berean group which is judged to have planned and carried out the best observation of Youth Week and Youth Sunday.

Again this year we encourage churches to turn over to the young people at least one of the regular services on Youth Sunday. Young people can serve as speakers, ushers, and accompanists, and can provide special music.

BEREAN MANUALS BEGIN USE THIS MONTH

The new Berean Lesson Manuals go into use this month. There are separate manuals for Junior and Senior Bereans and the manual is planned so that each Berean may have his own copy. The Junior Manual is being edited by Pastor and Mrs. Russell Magaw of Campbell, California, and the Senior Manual by Pastor Eugene Stilson, Maurertown, Virginia.

When fully operational, each manual will contain twenty-six lessons, enough for a six-month period. However, youth leaders should note that two manuals are being published for the first six-month period, one each quarter, and therefore the first manual will contain thirteen lessons. An advantage of this procedure is that an evaluation can be made and possible changes put into operation after only three months, rather than the full six-months period. The first twenty-six lesson manual will be published July 1, 1967.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION STUDIED

The Sunday School Board of the General Conference is making preliminary plans to carry out a special Sunday school promotion in the fall of 1967. The decision was reached at the fall meeting of the Board. Although the exact nature of the promotion has not yet been determined, it has been decided that a theme appropriate to the Sunday school will be promoted by the Sunday schools, possibly by use of automobile bumper stickers and other advertising media. It will not be a contest.

GARDEN PARK ANNIVERSARY

Sunday, November 20, 1966, was a memorable day at Garden Park Church of God, Grand Rapids, Mich. It was the second anniversary of the founding of the Sunday school and church.

More than two years ago, interested brethren with a zeal for "launching out" decided to begin a Sunday school in the southern metropolitan area of Grand Rapids. Through encouragement of many friends in the faith and others, the work has grown from the first Sunday school of seventeen (two of whom were visitors from the other churches) to an enrollment of sixty and a regular attendance of forty-eight.

In December, 1965, worship services were begun with the help and preaching of Bros. Milon Hall and Harvey U. Krogh, Jr., who alternated Sundays. Also during the winter of 1965-66 an addition was built which is used as the sanctuary. It will comfortably seat ninety. This addition was dedicated on February 20, 1966.

In March of 1966, after a meeting of the Michigan State Conference, the Garden Park brethren were encouraged by the Conference with the promise of financial help to secure a full-time pastor. There is also pastoral aid from the General Conference. So one and onehalf years after beginning, the writer was hired to begin September 1, 1966.

In the summer of 1966, a nearly new home (it had been lived in about eight months) was purchased. It is about one-half block around the corner from the present church. The congregation also owns two and one-half acres of wooded land adjoining the parsonage. A large sign has been erected on the corner stating this lot is the future site of the new Garden Park Church of God.

Through the graciousness of an anonymous donor of a substantial gift and other gifts of money and material, a new double garage was built on the parsonage property.

Rally Day was November 20, with sixtyfive in attendance at Sunday school. Anniversary attendance numbered seventy for the afternoon program held at 3:00 p.m. After the service, a fellowship was held in the Sunday school rooms.

Faith and answer to prayer have been key words in the work. Each member feels the graciousness of God and constantly witnesses of His gooduess. By His guidance, we will continue to serve Him in this community proelaiming the gospel and bringing others to a knowledge of it. Francis E. Burnett, pastor.


MINNIE BEHRENDS

be even begun, the goals had to be set. To what group would we direct our effort—church people or the unchurched? Would the meetings be designated services and use familiar church format of choir, hymn singing, etc., or would it be better to adopt an academic approach and identify as a lecture series?

During the first meetings of the committee, the consensus was in terms of the familiar evangelistic services. As the committee meetings continued, ideas were sounded, debated, modified, and discarded until the concept of using the upcoming meetings as a way of reaching out into our community, a way of making people aware of the Church of God and its vital and unique message was adopted. This we would do by de-emphasizing denominationalism and emphasizing Christ, His second coming, and the Kingdom. We would take full advantage of Mr. Bilton's reputation as both a wealthy and successful business man and conscientious Bible student.

Lecture titles were settled on that would best convey the climate of the series. 1) What the Future Holds; 2) Conqueror From Outer Space; 3) Jews in God's Purpose; 4) God's Plan for This Planet.

The advertising committee was given a budget and began to research the possibilities of a limited budget promotion. Newspaper, radio, city bus poster ads, store window posters, and printed brochures were the advertising media used. Newspaper display advertising is prohibitively expensive but with a little ingenuity and tenacity there are many possibilities of promotion through newspapers without cost. A press release was prepared, giving the newsworthy information concerning Mr. Bilton, and this, along with his picture, was delivered to every newspaper and shopping news in the area.

Radio was found to be adaptable, effective, and relatively inexpensive. Two radio stations, one a Christian station and the other a regular program station we made tracted to give eighty thirty-second spot announcement before and during the series. A different announcement was prepared for each lecture and was given several times each day for three days before each lecture. Mr. Bilton was also interviewed twice by a radio personality as part of the regular station programming.

The committee discovered, too, that all radio stations will, without cost, make a public service announcement for any non-commercial activity taking place in the community.

A contract was made with the Phoenix city bus lines to display posters in all buses serving the area. For impact, every other space on the inside, plus full width across the back carried the message of the Bilton lecture series with dates, lecture titles, and location. Large posters for display in store windows, service stations, laundromats, etc., were distributed by Berean groups in both Phoenix and Tempe areas.

Brochures were prepared that were adaptable for handout or for mailing. These were printed in quantities of 3,000 and seemed to be the most effective advertising means of all.

A joint meeting was held by the Phoenix and Tempe congregations two weeks prior to the crusade. At this time a supply of these brochures and envelopes were passed to each member and they were urged to write a personal note on them and mail them first class to their friends and acquaintances. As in all selling, whether it be a product or Christianity, there is no substitute for the personal one-for-one approach.

Many served as hosts and hostesses to meet people and be available to answer questions during the coffee time after each lecture. These persons learned valuable lessons in talking to strangers about Christ, the Bible, and the church.

Some other positive and gratifying manifestations were: thirty-five people turned in cards requesting information, literature, or help of some kind; four enrolled in the Systematic Bible Study Course; twenty-six attended a follow-up discussion group meeting at Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence's home, and a few visitors have attended regular worship service as a result.

The best single thrill came when Mrs. Percy (Ella) Bilton upon confession of her faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and the things concerning the Kingdom of God was obedient to baptism, being immersed by Pastor Alva Huffer at the Tempe Church of God, Sunday evening, October 30.

We feel that there will be future results that will far outweigh the immediate. (1 Cor. 3:7.) We must be reminded by the Apostle Paul that it is God that gives the increase. Seeds have been planted, God's name glorified, and His Kingdom proclaimed. Prayer changes things and oh what a change the Church of God could make in the world in these last days if we would but use the privilege and power and trust the Lord to lead!

The most significant lesson learned was that men of good will who are willing to sit down together and prayerfully consider ways and means to most effectively serve the Lord will be led to the best answers and results beyond their wildest expectations.

By nature we are creatures of habit and bound by tradition. Perhaps we are afraid to try new ideas, use unfamiliar media, unfamiliar approaches. The Apostle Paul said he was "all things to all men that he might win some." We must explore every avenue, be attentive to every opportunity if and fait Lord."

WHICH ATTITUDE?

By Pastor Harry Sheets

WHEN two people approach marriage with the attitude that if they should not get along with each other they will get a divorce, we know that their marriage has a high probability of ending in divorce. Most marriage counselors advise against marriage when either of the two expresses this attitude.

Mature people face marriage knowing that there will be conflict of interests and differing opinions which must be resolved. They know, too, that every difficulty squarely faced can be solved through love, mutual understanding, and a spirit of compromise. They approach matrimony resolutely determined to make their marriage succeed. They have much in their favor.

It is not the writer's purpose in this article to analyze the institution of marriage, but rather to try to understand why some pastors and churches can work together in harmony while others do not. We believe there is an analogy.

I ask, in all sincerity, Church of God members: What is your attitude when you hire a pastor? Is it your thinking: "If we don't like him we can get rid of him and hire another"? If it is, are you laying the foundation of a successful pastorate? or early failure?

Do you approach a new pastor determined to make the new association succeed? When differences arise, do you try to resolve the differences, reach an understanding, and work together for the glory of God?

Every minister that I have ever known was a human being, subject to the same frailties and temptations of other human beings. They are struggling with the same problems which members face. Things which they do and say do not always turn out as they intended. Paul had the same experience. His lament was: "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do" (Rom. 7:19). Invariably your pastor is conscientious and wants to do right. When your pastor displeases you, should you not talk things over with him and seek a solution, before a little misunderstanding grows into a real obstacle to Christian love and cooperation?

NUMBER 5

A pastor of our acquaintance, who usually served a church for seven or more years, took a new pastorate and was rudely dismissed at the end of two years. Naturally, he was deeply hurt. He asked what he had done, or had not done to deserve this. No one would tell him. While discussing the situation, he said: "I don't know why they did it. I never saw it coming." It was evident that no attempt was made to resolve the differences. It was a disservice to both pastor and church.

We know of another church that wants a man to serve over a long period of time. They have had pastors serve them for as long as twenty-five years. "These must have been extraordinary men," you say. In some respects this was true, but in many ways they were just as human as the rest of us. These men, however, had one advantage which all too often is denied the majority of pastors. They had elders who took their jobs seriously. This made the difference.

One pastor, who had some traits and mannerisms which irritated some of the members, was approached by the elders, matters were discussed frankly, and in love, a solution found, and the pastorate saved. He resigned the pastorate only after many years. The members sang his praises for years. He was a success because he had a good Board of Elders. (Incidentally, I visited with the elders of a church which favored long pastorates and I never heard one say, "I think we will be changing pastors." I have heard them say: "We will have to have a talk with our pastor. There are a few things which need correcting." The elders considered it their duty to help the pastor to succeed. Never did they seem willing to "throw him to the wolves" and look for his successor.)

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The quarterly ministers' meeting was held at the Uddiawan church November 7-12, 1966. All the ministers and the Philippine Conference officers gather at these meetings and have special services. Lessons are taught and they make decisions on the furtherance of the church work in the Philippines.

Bro. Mauro Abon, a layman, has been conducting services at the newly formed Cordon church. It was decided at this meeting to give him some part-time monthly support. There are seven churches that have full-time ministry and five of these: Abut, Minagbag, Quezon, San Nicolas, and Uddiawan, are affiliated as member churches of the Church of God General Conference. The Uddiawan church had an average attendance of one hundred twenty-five during the month of November.

INDIA

Beginning the first week in December a group of the church folks went caroling nearly every night until Christmas. There were as many as twenty-five on occasions and this type of service there is called *Bajana*. All the member and many non-member homes were visited.

A special service was held at the church at 4:00 p.m. Christmas Eve. After the service, toys and food were distributed to all and clothes were given to the deserving cases.

A watch-night service was held on New Year's Eve. The service ended about 1:00 a.m. and "then plain coffee was supplied to all the members because it was very cold."

The blueprints of the church have now been submitted to the engineer of the Buildings Division of the Civil Government for final approval. Construction should begin shortly.

NOVA SCOTIA

The brethren here are beginning to look forward to and plan for the "Youth Caravan" that will be visiting Nova Scotia this summer through the sponsorship of the Berean Youth Fellowship of the General Conference. Plans are also being made for a dedication service of the Lighthouse Mission Church building at Digby which will probably be held early this summer.

A Christmas program was held with a good attendance in spite of swirling snow outside. We quote from Bro. Denchfield's report: "All of our group seems to be in reasonably good health—minor ailments at times, but nothing serious and we are thankful for it. One of the blessings of our ministry here—eight years without a funeral service within the group."

MEXICO

Into every life some rain must fall. It is not unusual in mission work to have some disappointments and setbacks. As a whole, our young mission effort has been rather fortunate in this respect. It is now, with much regret, that we announce the loss of two of our native workers in Mexico; Adolfo Alvarez and Ascencion Lara. Support to these two men was temporarily stopped on December 15, 1966, and now it appears this will be permanent.

We believe these men are still sound doctrinally, but they are interested in working with another mission and are not willing to work under and cooperate with Bro. Dean Moore and the Mission Board.

We do regret the loss of these two capable workers, but from it many lessons of procedure have been learned which should be helpful in the future work in Mexico.

Bro. Francisco Martinez continues to work through our missions effort and we trust that the preaching of the great gospel message may continue to go forth. Many times trials will give strength and we pray that this happening will add strength to the remaining workers and membership in the Mexico field.

Regular services are being maintained at Saltillo and Labor Vieja and some special meetings at Potosi. The teaching classes by Bro. Moore and Sr. Rachel Krogh continue in Saltillo.

One hundred Bibles in the Efik dialect have been sent to Opobo, Nigeria, West Africa: ten churches are diligently studying the Systematic Bible Study Course.

YOUTH CARAVAN TO NOVA SCOTIA

Below is a form on which young people, those entering eleventh grade through age twenty-two, may make application to be a part of the Youth Caravan to Nova Scotia next summer. The Caravan will be held July 7-23, 1967. Two carloads of young people and their adult sponsors will leave Oregon, Ill., on July 8 for Digby, Nova Scotia, where Bro. John Denchfield carries on our Church of God mission work. On the way, the team will stop for half a day at Expo 67 in Montreal. The team will be in Nova Scotia for six days doing visitation work, distributing literature, and helping to carry out a vacation Bible school and evening evangelistic services. Upon leaving Nova Scotia July 17, the team will make a tour of six churches in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, at which they will present a service in support of mission work.

Those chosen to be a part of the Caravan will pay a tuition charge of \$15.00 and pay for incidental expenses (not lodging) and meals enroute while in the United States. The total cost, including tuition, for each Caravan member has been estimated to be \$45.00.

YOUTH WEEK IS THIS MONTH

February 20-26, 1967, is being observed throughout the Church of God as Youth Week. Many churches are planning special youth activities during the week and climaxing the week with observance of Youth Sunday on February 26.

YOUTH CONFERENCE SLIDE SOUND SET RELEASED

A set of 35 mm full-color slides, with narration on tape recording, based on the 1966 Berean Youth Conference was released during January and is available for immediate showing dates. The set, entitled "This Refreshing Time," was produced by John Smead of Boise, Idaho.

YOUTH CONFERENCE TUITION TO BE RAISED

Tuition for the 1967 Berean Youth Conference will be \$27.50 per camper. The \$2.50 raise in tuition was prompted by a growing deficit in Youth Conference finances over the past several years. Last year's camp lost nearly \$500.00. One reason for the deficit has been that the increasing size (284 last year compared with 205 in 1964) has brought about a need for more administration and more diversification of the program, thereby bringing about a greater staff-member-per-camper ratio. The increased tuition rate will insure that a quality program will not have to be curtailed as we anticipate our biggest and best camp yet.

SUBSCRIPTION CAMPAIGN SUCCESSFUL

Thanks to all the Church of God members and friends who subscribed to *The Restitution Herald* as a part of the Berean Subcription Campaign. The two-month campaign ended January 15. A total of 222 new subscriptions were sold by Bereans during the Campaign. Thanks are due also to all the Bereans who worked so hard. The Bereans of the Guthrie Grove, S. C., Church of God sold the most subscriptions, thirty-three, while Lawrenceville, Ohio, came in second with twenty-five.

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

Every year, at the beginning of the second semester, a number of scholarships are awarded to students who have demonstrated academic excellence, outstanding Christian character, worthy leadership, and other qualities. These are mainly tuition scholarships in the amount of \$125.00. An exception is the Chester A. Ferrell Scholarship of \$200.00, awarded this year to Scott Ross, who has consistently maintained an average of 4.00 or nearly so.

Other scholarships were awarded as follows: the S. E. Magaw Scholarship to Vivian Kirkpatrick II; the Boosters' Scholarship to David Krogh; the James A. Patrick Scholarship to Roger Cupp; the Northeast B.Y.F. Scholarship to Michael Hale; the Glen R. and Violet M. Booth Scholarship to Michael Mattison; the Leila Mae Doeden Scholarship to Margaret Holley; the Everett S. Rogers Scholarship to Ronald Sanders; the S. J. Lindsay Scholarship to David Hall for the first semester, and the Norman Mc-Leod Scholarship to David Hall for the second semester. The last two were awarded directly by the donors, the Southwest Conference.

Other scholarships given directly by the donors this year were as follows: the Otto E. Dick Scholarship, from Indiana Conference, to Cynthia Ford; the Grover Gordon Scholarship, from Central High Plains Conference, to Edward Bender; and the Iowa Berean Scholarship, to Loretta Bartz. Mary Jo Brewer was awarded the General B.Y.F. Scholarship as a result of competitive examination at the 1966 Berean Youth Conference. Half of this was applied to her first semester tuition

The funds for several grants-in-aid for the second semester have been provided by Bro. and Sr. Lyle D. WHICH ATTITUDE? (Continued from front page)

Most church constitutions state that it is the duty of the elders to promote the spiritual welfare of the church and its members and "taking the oversight thereof" (1 Pet. 5:2). In this capacity they must act as mediators between pastor and church members, and between members and members. This at times may be a distasteful task, but it is theirs and must be faced if they are true to their office.

"Hiring" and "firing" time will soon be here for many Churches of God. Already you are pondering the matter. Are you entirely satisfied with your pastor? Generally satisfied? Dissatisfied? Have you met with him to tell him of your satisfaction? Have you tried to understand his reasons and viewpoints in matters of misunderstanding? Have you tried to make his ministry more effective and meaningful? If a problem exists, have you tried to solve the problem? or ignored it? or become a part of the problem?

Experience tells me that no church can dismiss a pastor (even for conduct unbecoming a minister) without suffering some harm. Always some become miffed and quit. Friends of the church become disillusioned and wander off. The pastor himself may want to give up the struggle, consider himself a failure, and look for other employment.

If you decide to dismiss your pastor, is it because he has failed? Is it because your elders have failed, or because both have failed? I plead with you to give this your honest consideration.

Correspondence resulting from my Search and Research page in The Restitution Herald and discussions with church and conference officials have focused my attention upon the need for adequate communication and better understanding between pastors and church boards, followed by genuine problem-solving efforts.

As one of the senior ministers of the Church of God, I felt it my duty, and privilege, to speak up in the interest of better understanding and cooperation between pastor and congregation.

If I have "talked through my hat" and been "off base," please deal kindly with me, and remember that I am just another human being who chose to be a minister and a pastor.

THE CHURCH'S ROLE IN MAN'S WORLD

PRESSURE is being applied upon the church to keep up with the ever-changing society. Confronted with this crisis, the church should remember that she has certain basic truths which must not change with each generation. Only man in his world of discovery and advancements must change in competition with himself. The Bible is very specific in giving the church certain basic guide lines.

God's Message to Man

The first and all-important role of the church in this age is to present God's message to man. This message is often called the gospel or good news of God. The disciples who followed Jesus and were eyewitnesses of His crucifixion, death, and resurrection were united in their message. Peter strongly affirmed that "thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matt. 16:16). Paul, though not at the time a friend of Jesus, saw and spoke to the resurrected Christ while on the road to Damascus. He was so convinced of the importance of the message that he wrote to the Corinthians, "I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2).

The early church, when it heard of the resurrection of Christ "went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). The enthusiasm of the church to carry this message caused its enemies to say they "turned the world upside down" (Acts 17:6). When Paul described his experiences with the risen Lord and said this is the "Christ" whom Moses said "should come," he caused one man to cry out, "Thou art beside thyself" (Acts 26:24). The thought of having to face this living Christ caused King Agrippa to say, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." This historic message meets man's need today. It needs no change.

Gather the People

The second role of the church is to gather the people into an assembly. The writer of the Book of Hebrews encourages the people: "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another" (Heb. 10:25). The assembling of the God-fearing Israelites was essential in the ancient days of Moses. Moses instructed the people that they should assemble at the door of the tabernacle to worship and to receive direction from the Lord. (Num. 10:3.) Our Lord and His disciples maintained the ancient practice by meeting in the temple and in the synagogues on every worship day.

The church is a laboratory of love, sometimes called a clinic for sin-sick man. We are the test tubes. We assemble in one place to pour out our hearts in song and prayer, and to receive an in-pouring of God's Spirit. If we find opportunity to explode to our neighbor before we leave the laboratory then we have failed to pour in the proper measurement of Christian ingredients. A sick man can take one of many patent medicines at his home and feel some relief but a trip to the clinic is needed to diagnose the ailment. Individual evangelism and home study are important, but every sin-sick person should be encouraged to attend the assembly of believers.

Relate Man to God

The third role of the church is to relate man to his God. Today, the church finds itself entangled in the world's affairs and at a loss in searching for a single patent cure for all sins. In her quest for unity, the historic church has fallen into one of two temptations. She has, at times, become isolated from the world or else she has become (Please turn to page 8)

General Conference Progress

STAFF TRAVELS

One aspect of the service of the General Conference which is often overlooked is the contact of the Conference staff and Oregon Bible College students with the churches and conferences. Staff members and gospel teams travel thousands of miles each year to participate in worship services and conference meetings in various places. Where possible, regular services are conducted by staff and students in churches which have no pastor and in new fields just being opened. Personal participation in pastoral and evangelistic work helps the staff as well as those served.

MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

The annual Midwinter Ministers' Conference was conducted at Oregon Bible College in January. Fifty ministers from Canada, the United States, and Mexico, met with the college students and staff for sessions of study, devotions, prayer, Communion, and fellowship.

The week was climaxed with a severe snowstorm that kept many of the ministers in Oregon over the weekend. Roads east did not become passable until Monday after the Conference ended on Friday, and even then they were hazardous. Members of the Board of Directors also had great difficulty in reaching Oregon from their various homes and returning home after their meeting. We are thankful, however, that as far as we know, everyone did arrive home safely, though late.

Evening worship services and papers read at the Conference and discussions which followed, were tape recorded and are available to ministers from James Rankin, Rt. 1, Cashmere, Wash. If a minister wishes a copy, please send a blank tape to Bro. Rankin and tell him the speed at which the tape is to be recorded and he will make a copy of any part of the Conference on your tape for you.

RAISE IN PRICES

Due to great increases in the cost of printing and postage, prices on all publications will be raised, effective July 1, 1967, by action of the Board of Directors. Quarterlies and Vacation Bible School books will be raised in price to \$.55 each (less than one-half the actual cost of producing children's quarterlies and vacation Bible school books). Prices will be raised about \$.05 per dozen and \$.25 per hundred on tracts and booklets, but prices of Songs of Truth, Systematic Theology, and The Restitution Herald will remain the same as at present. The new prices will reduce the amount of subsidy needed for Conference publications.

PLANS FOR SUMMER CONFERENCE

Preliminary planning is finished and assignments are being made for the summer General Conference program. The theme of the Conference (August 6-11) will be: "God's Son for Man's Needs." Full Conference plans and reports and recommendations will appear in the June PROGRESS JOURNAL.

BROTHER EUGENE STILSON TO JOIN CONFERENCE STAFF

Brother Vivian Kirkpatrick, after three and one-half years of faithful service to Oregon Bible College, resigned his teaching position.

Brother Eugene Stilson, graduate of Manchester College and Oregon Bible College, and now pastor of the Churches of God at Fort Valley and Maurertown, Va., has accepted appointment to the Oregon Bible College staff beginning in September, 1967.

GOAL FOR GIVING IN FEBRUARY

WEST AFRICA


Correspondence with people in Nigeria and Ghana in West Africa continues to be thrilling. One group of ten churches, having a total membership of approximately three thousand people, have adopted the name "The Church of God" and want to affiliate and work with the General Conference. The pastors have all taken the Systematic Bible Study course and many of the members are now taking the course also. About twenty-five percent of the members speak English. The dialect is Efik and we have provided one hundred Bibles in the Efik dialect for their use.

In addition to the ten churches in Nigeria, we have many individual contacts in both countries. Fifteen in Ghana and twelve in Nigeria have either completed or are now taking the Systematic Bible Study Course and several of them have been presented the book *Systematic Theology* by Bro. Alva Huffer through the generosity of an anonymous donor.

Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence of Phoenix, Ariz., plan to leave on March 27 for a trip to Africa and are planning to visit these people in both Ghana and Nigeria while there. We are so grateful to Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence for making this trip and for the two previous trips in which they were able to bring back much valuable information that was a guide to the Mission Board and the General Conference as a whole in projecting the work of missions.

\$2,000 GOAL SET FOR COIN CRUSADE

The observance last month of Youth Week and Youth Sunday throughout the Church of God was marked by the most ambitious series of youth activities ever undertaken by Church of God youth in any one week. Church after church is sending in reports of a complete week of varied activities, some of them involving every day of the week. Some churches had evening services sponsored by the youth which were the first series of evening weekday services ever held in the history of their churches. There were prayer breakfasts, pizza parties, calling campaigns, youth board meetings, special suppers, evangelistic meetings, gospel teams, panel discussions, films, projects, Berean Bible quiz competition, essay contests, work days, youth rallies, and a host of other activities. The youth in many churches took complete charge of the worship services on Youth Sunday.

Currently the difficult decision is being made as to which group carried out the most complete, well-planned, and effective Youth Week and Youth Sunday observance. The group chosen will receive a special Youth Week Award which is being awarded this year for the first time. It is in the form of a plaque which will be passed on to next year's winner.

Preaching the Word

By Pastor Dale Ward, Kokomo, Indiana

(Excerpts from a message presented to Church of God ministers, 1967)

"Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season: reprove, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Timothy 4:2).

WHY are we concerned with preaching the Word of God? First of all, it is a matter of obedience. God has commanded it. We might think of 2 Timothy as the words of the Apostle Paul to Timothy. We should rather think of them as the Words of God to any and all who will concern themselves with them. Preachers are sent of God and commanded to preach His Word. God said to Israel through the Prophet Jeremiah, "Because they have not hearkened to my words, saith the Lord, which I sent unto them by my servants the prophets, rising early and sending them; but ye would not hear, saith the Lord" (Jer. 29:19). Many of the people had no concern for their own salvation, but God had a concern for them. God took the initiative in the matter of salvation. He sent forth His Word by the prophets.

Jesus said, "Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as doves' (Matt. 10:16). Paul was "sent" to the Gentiles. (Acts 26:17.) The question is asked in Romans 10:15, "How shall they preach except they be sent?" Preach the Word! It is God's commandment! Most men do not know of the peril of everlasting destruction, or the way to escape it through faith in Jesus. God knows about it and He is doing something about it in sending forth His servants with the word of salvation. Perhaps we ought to be glad that He is willing to give us a part in this great work.

We should remember that it is God's Word that we are to preach. The Bible is a big Book. It is not easy to do it justice. Probably most of us preach only a very small part of God's Word. Our question often is, "What shall I preach?" We mean we have run out of things to preach. If we knew the Word of God better we would ask, "How can I get it all preached?" The e is no lack of subject matter, only a lack of knowledge about it.

Perhaps we are reluctant to preach certain parts of the

Word. "Not for fear or favor" are the words of a song. This is the way our handling of the Word of God ought to be. With God's help we can do a little better.

NUMBER 7

There are two reasons for preaching. One reason is to lead people to repentance and faith in Christ. This is the important result that should follow preaching. It is God's desire that this happen, and it is our desire. It gives us pleasure when this result follows our effort.

There is another way to think of it. God wants the Word preached so that people will have the opportunity to hear and repent. God wants the Word preached even though no one heeds it. There may be a fine line of difference between these two thoughts, but I believe that it is important that we see the difference.

By sin men lost all claim upon God. As sinners God owes no man another moment of life. Man has forfeited the right to life through sin. God, in one sense of the word, owes no man eternal life. But God has made Himself responsible to the human race on His conditions. He owes the faithful eternal life because He has bound Himself by promise. He has obligated Himself to do that which He was under no obligation to do. He has further obligated Himself to make known His salvation. To preach the Word is God's program. He sends the preacher. To accept or reject is man's part. Success in preaching the Word is preaching the Word. Success is not the number converted. Of course if we are honest about it, we will do our best to convert. But even if no one is converted, God still wants His Word to go out.

I believe that it will help our preaching when we realize that we discharge our responsibility in the matter when we do our best to get the Word out; when we are willing to leave the results in the hands of God. God has said, "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it" (Isa. 55:11). Even this does not necessarily mean that conversion is the only thing the Word will accomplish. In many instances it will accomplish condemnation. In these cases that is what God wills it to do. Church of God General Conference was a beneficiary in the will of Sr. Mary Elton of Cleveland, Ohio. We are thankful to the late Sr. Elton for her concern for the Conference work and to Sr. Ruth Halls, administrator of her estate. Wills can be an instrument to insure that a portion of the goods with which one has been blessed by the Lord will be returned to His service at one's death. Such bequests have been very helpful in the work of the General Conference in the provision of capital funds for buildings, equipment, scholarships, etc.

CHURCH EMBLEM OR SYMBOL

Interest has been expressed in developing a church emblem or symbol that can be used in publications, advertising, letterheads, and on road signs for local churches. Ideas are being accumulated and sources investigated for design and for production.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY ADVERTISING

All funds from the Hearp Memorial Loan Fund have been loaned to churches with new buildings. The Fund has been a great help to these churches and we are thankful to have had these funds for loan to them.

With a total goal of \$69,170.00 for the fiscal year, \$34,571.00 has been received in contributions. PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

A cablegram received March 15 from Bro. Bonifacio Gabanes says, "Pastor Ortiguero met motorcycle accident. Left leg broken serious." We have not yet learned the full details of the accident or how serious he is or if he is hospitalized; however, we ask the prayers of all for his early recovery.

The January report of the Philippine work brought other sad news. Sr. Ambrocia Herrera and her son and daughter (both grown) were killed. They were returning from working in the field when about two miles from the Abut church some wild mountain people (Kalingas) rushed upon them with knives and killed them. They were seriously cut up and parts of their bodies were taken away. "The Philippine churches are mourning the deaths of these faithful workers," says the report. Funeral services were conducted in the Abut church by the three Isabela ministers, Bros. Eleodoro Javar, Santiago Somera, and Domingo Valdez.

The brethren of the Uddiawan church were happy when Corazon Gaburno, Leonie Ortiguero, Estrella Aguinaldo, Villamor Bartolome, Marcelina Sarmiento, and Rodrigo Saludaris accepted Christ and were baptized.

WEST AFRICA

We are sorry to announce that the trip of Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence to visit the people in Ghana and Nigeria has been canceled. This became necessary when it was impossible to obtain proper visas into Nigeria and due to the fact that scheduled flights into Nigeria were being canceled. This is apparently due to inner political turmoil in Nigeria. The mission department is, of course, disappointed that personal investigation of this door of opportunity must be delayed.

It is now possible that Pastor Lee McQuinn, a member of the General Conference Mission Board, may visit this area in June if flight arrangements and proper visa can be obtained by then. This proposed trip has been made possible through the generosity of an anonymous donor.

NOVA SCOTIA

We regret to announce that Bro. John Denchfield has resigned from the leadership of the mission work in Digby, Nova Scotia, effective September 1, 1967.

Bro. and Sr. Denchfield have done a fine work there

the past nine years. During this time, the church has been built and a stable congregation established.

The foundation work is completed on the building project and when this is properly dried, construction will start. Apparently the cement and stone work must set a long while and be covered with mud and watered five or six times each day for a long period of time. The mud has now been removed so things are progressing. It is hoped that the building will be completed in June.

Bro. S. S. Manoah has been extremely busy with the building program, buying materials, generally supervising the work, and keeping the whole program of the church progressing. He says he will not sleep properly until the building is completed satisfactorily as he says, "because you all trusted me and have given me this great responsibility to answer to our Saviour Jesus Christ, and to all the brothers and sisters of the Church of God."



We think about the fact that not all the world has heard the Word of God preached. This is not God's fault. It is the church's fault. God has commanded, and the church has failed to keep the commandment. Can we each honestly say that we have done all we can do in this matter? In this matter it has pleased the Lord to condemn us about this by His Word. This does not mean that we shall be lost because of it. It does mean that we are among those unworthies who have a hope that we do not deserve.

I should not neglect to say that our preaching has another important purpose. It helps to keep the faithful faithful; to grow in grace. Jesus said to Peter, "Feed my lambs; feed my sheep." For most of us this is the work we do the most. The reason is simple. The people we preach to have made a profession of faith in Christ. We need to keep up the effort to get more of the unsaved under the sound of the gospel. It adds much interest to the service to have these people in it.

Preach to whom? Usually, we are satisfied if we may preach to a few. We might wish that there were more, but

"After that in the wisdom of God the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe. For the Jews require a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom: but we preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumblingblock, and unto the Greeks foolishness; but unto them which are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God'' (1 Cor. 1:21-24).

Courses Taught This Year

English. The first semester of this class is devoted to the study of the fundamentals of grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, and vocabulary. This course is to lay the groundwork for the second semester when the class deals primarily with composition. This required freshman course was taught by Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick and Bro. Paul Shaw.

Preaching. Bro. Wm. Wachtel, the instructor of this three-hour course, emphasizes and reviews the types of sermons, as well as instructing in fundamentals of good sermon building. Preaching practice is given during the class period and during Chapel.

Systematic Theology I. The study of the doctrine of God, anthropology, and hamartiology is a three-hour course taught by Bro. Wm. Wachtel.

Public Speaking. This is a course in effective speaking, with practice in preparing and delivering speeches, taught by Bro. Paul Shaw. In this course, as in preaching, students are given the opportunity to speak in class and come under constructive criticism.

Chapel. This is a forty-minute period on Mondays and Fridays set aside for singing, meditation, and worship. It offers the student a chance to hear special speakers and those participating in Preaching class.

Bible Survey. This is a two-hour course taught by Bro. Kenneth Milne. In this class, the student is taken on a brief survey of all the Bible books, with their contents.

Gospel of John. A detailed study of John's Gospel, under the instruction of Bro. Wachtel.

Bible Geography. The prime objective of this course is to acquaint the student with the topography of Bible lands and their importance to the understanding of Bible history. It was taught by Bro. Kirkpatrick.

Biblical Introduction. Bro. Milne instructs the freshmen in the history and nature of the Scriptures with special attention being given to the English Bible and its various versions.

Choir. This course provides opportunity for musical expression and for inspiring and valuable experience in the singing of sacred music. The choir is under the direction of Bro. Shaw.

Teaching. Bro. Shaw and Sr. Jean Doan taught this class with the emphasis on methods, techniques, and materials needed for effective teaching.

Old Testament I. Genesis through Joshua is studied in detail. This course is primarily concerned with the historical content of these important books; but attention is also given to their interpretation and doctrine. This course was taught by Bro. Kirkpatrick. Missions II. This course was taught by Bro. S. O. Ross and deals with missionary principles and practice. A study of the theory of missionary work and the methods by which the missionary carries on his work. Attention is also given to the lives of great missionaries and to encouraging students to catch the vision that leads Christians to go into "all the world."

Introduction to Doctrine. This course, taught by Bro. Harold Doan is a survey of the fundamental doctrines of the Bible, with emphasis on the distinctive doctrines of the Church of God.

Christian Ethics. A study of the Biblical principles underlying Christian conduct, morality, spirituality, and the devotional life. This course is taught by Bro. Wachtel.

New Testament Greek I and II. A study of the essentials of Greek forms, syntax, and vocabulary to enable the student to read the New Testament in the original language. This course is taught by Bro. Wachtel.

Systematic Theology II. This course, taught by Bro. Wachtel, is a study of Christology — Christ's nature, ministry, purpose, death, resurrection, heavenly ministry, and future work; soteriology—the doctrine of salvation; ecclesiology—the doctrine of the church; eschatology—God's plan for the future.

Old Testament II. Judges through Esther in detailed study. Historical content is emphasized, with some consideration of doctrinal interpretation. This course is taught by Bros. Doan and Ross.

Church History I and II. A survey of the history of the Christian church—its important men, movements, events, and trends. Church History I covers the period from the church's beginning in New Testament times until the end of the Middle Ages. Church History II continues this study up to our time. This course was taught by Bros. Kirkpartick and Wachtel.

Evangelism. This course taught by Bro. Milne shows how the church may employ practical ways and means of evangelizing the community—theory of evangelism, publicity, visitation, conduct of evangelistic meetings, follow-up, and how the pastor can teach his people to witness for Christ.

Music Fundamentals and Directing I and II. An introductory study of the melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic elements of music. Notation, scales, intervals, and chord structure are studied. Also studied are the principles of directing church choirs and congregations in singing anthems, hymns, and gospel songs. Much opportunity for actual practice in directing is provided. This course was taught by Bro. Shaw.

The Life of a Dorm Mother

Let me start by saying that life is not dull at Oregon Bible College. We have our times of happiness and also times when tears are shed.

I will tell you some of the work I have to do. There are always light bulbs to replace; nails to pound for one reason or another; shades that refuse to go up or down, usually because they are pulled half way off the rollers; one bed that the springs fall through when two or three girls jump on it at once; and of course, general cleaning and preparing the evening meals at the college cafeteria.

One morning about six o'clock, one of the girls came to my bedroom and said, "Sr. Eades, there is a big animal in my bedroom. Come up and kill it! It must be a big rat or something bigger! It's chewing my dresser—eating it up!" Half asleep, I trudged up the stairs. It was just a poor little mouse that was causing all the trouble. That is just one incident among many.

My apartment is open to the girls at all times, and at night in my kitchen, we usually have lunch if anyone wants it, and almost every night the girls pop corn. When a girl has a birthday, we have a cake and a small gift for her after devotions.

The piano is in use almost constantly. Several are taking piano lessons and some are taking voice lessons. They also practice for gospel team trips or chapel services, and some play just for pleasure.

Friday and Sunday night are date nights. Usually some of the boys come over and they play and sing, or work jig saw puzzles, or just sit by the fireplace and talk.

This may sound like all is play, but such is not the case. We have devotions several nights a week with a different girl having charge each week, and I have charge one night a week. Several times we have had combined devotions here with the boys, and have a fire in the fireplace.

On Sunday mornings at eight o'clock in the basement of the men's dorm, we have prayer band for all who care to attend. On several occasions when we have had difficulties or decisions to make, we had prayer at the dorm for all at six a.m. for a week at a time. We know that God does answer our prayers, and we are so thankful to him for his goodness to us.

Many of the young people have come and discussed their problems with me. Also, there are couples who have come with eyes shining to tell me they are engaged.

I thank God for the privilege of being here and do hope that in some small way I have been a blessing to the girls and boys here at Oregon Bible College. I love every one of them.

LIFE AT THE MEN'S DORM

At the present time there are seventeen young men residing in the dormitory: three seniors, one junior, eight sophomores, and five freshmen. This is not including myself—freshman, maintenance man, and house father.

The day usually starts around six a.m. with some indecision; whether to get up and eat breakfast or use the time to study, or to sleep. Then, its off to classes, which for some start at seven o'clock and may last until 12:15. Usually, after supper, there is action to be found in the basement in the form of a fast game of ping-pong or shuffle board. Quite often there will be music pouring from the piano in the basement, possibly accompanied by one or more vocalists.

Dorm life is far from all fun and games. Most of the time the fellows will be found in the library or in their room studying. Around exam time, this activity extends into the wee hours of the morning. Walking down the hall late at night, one can find a few students in several rooms, with each group studying a different subject.

Each week a different boy has charge of the tri-weekly devotional session in the evening. These group devotions, plus personal devotions, Bible study, and prayer groups, help us all grow spiritually.

Living together in a dorm like this is a lesson in itself, teaching consideration, respect, and love for our fellow classmates. As we read in John 13:35, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." This Christian love is the unifying factor in college life, and makes life in the men's dormitory enjoyable.



NOVA SCOTIA



The Church of God in Nigeria has baptized seventeen hundred eighty-five persons since coming to their new understanding of the doctrines of the Bible. More than forty have completed the Systematic Bible Study Course. We trust that someone might be able to visit them soon; however, it appears that presently political turmoil within the country will prevent any visitors from going in.

INTEREST HIGH AT SOUTHEAST TRAINING CONFERENCE

Interest was high at the Worker Training Conference held April 15, 1967, at the Guthrie Grove Church, Pelzer, S. C., as more than sixty workers traveled from the churches in North and South Carolina to be in attendance. A number of helpful workshops and messages were presented and a time of good idea-sharing was enjoyed. We appreciate the hospitality of the Guthrie Grove Church in hosting this conference. We also appreciate the workers from outside the conference area who traveled to South Carolina to be a part of the training conference staff. They included Leota Foster, Charles Pryor, Willis Turner, and Paul Overholser. The conference was sponsored jointly by the General Conference and the Southeast Conference.

TRANSPORTATION POOL PLANNED

If a sufficient number of Berean groups register for participation, a Transportation Expense Pool will be held at the 1967 Youth Conference. Explanation sheets and participation forms have been mailed to all groups which call for registering to be a part of the pool by June 1, 1967.

The pool will be handled almost identically to the General Conference expense pool, except for one important difference. The basis will be 2 cents per mile, rather than 4 cents per mile as with the General Conference pool.

The general idea of the pool is that the expenses (2 cents per mile, round trip) for one car from each chartered Berean group represented at the Youth Conference and electing to participate in the pool will be combined and then redivided to equalize the expenses. If all groups represented at last year's conference had participated in a pool, the average cost for each group would have been about \$20.00. The advantage of having an expense pool is that Berean groups which must send youth to the camp from great distances will receive some financial help in their expenses. Such a pool has a "share your neighbor's burden" spirit to it.

TWELVE APPLY FOR CARAVAN

Twelve young people have made application to participate in the Youth Caravan to Nova Scotia to be held in July. Eight young people will be chosen from among the applicants to take this seventeen-day trip. They will be announced in the May-June issue of *Challenge*. The plans for the trip call for a stopover at Expo 67, almost a week spent in Digby, Nova Scotia, and a trip through parts of Ontario, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois holding services in support of missions.

COINS-FOR-CHRIST CRUSADE COMPLETED

The Coins-for-Christ Crusade has been completed for another year. The final results of the project-contest, which has been carried on during March and April, are not yet available, but will be reported in the June JOURNAL. Sponsored by the Youth Department, the proceeds go toward supporting the various ministries of the Youth Department.

FRED L. SNYDER


Fred L. Snyder, born January 29, 1918, fell asleep in death February 11, 1967, after suffering a coronary heart attack.

Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors in Oregon, Illinois, May 11, 1967. The report is presented in this form so that delegates to the 1967 General Conference business sessions (August 6-11, Camp Alexander Mack) will have opportunity to study it and form opinions and seek suggestions from the groups whom they will represent.

The report concerns the various departments of the Church of God General Conference, and also some general observations in regard to the work of the Conference and the Church of God as a whole. Since this report covers only the first eight months of the current fiscal year, programs inaugurated since last Conference have not run their full course. Some important activities will occur between now and General Conference also, and these will be reported orally at Conference.

We praise the Lord for his goodness and blessing upon the work of the Church of God in the past year and thank him for progress that has been made and for opportunities that have been offered to his people.

Youth Department

The director of the Berean Youth Department is Bro. Paul Shaw.

During the year, *Challenge* was published every two months and the *Youth Workers' Memo* was published monthly. On January 1, 1967, new Berean lesson manuals went into use. Changes from the former *Youth Leader's Handbook* include the following: there are separate manuals for junior and senior Bereans; there are copies provided for each Berean rather than for the leader only; and the new manuals are on a purchase basis rather than being paid for through budgeted funds.

Contact continues to be maintained with state and district youth directors in an effort to bring about improvement in the total youth program. The second annual meeting of conference youth directors was held December 2, 3, 1966, in Oregon.

Two slide-sound sets were produced during the year. "Caravan Adventure" was based on the 1966 Youth Caravan to Mexico and "This Refreshing Time," produced by Bro. John Smead, was based on the 1966 Berean Youth Conference. These sets were shown more than fifty times during the year.

The program of Berean contests, under the direction of Bro. Jim Mickey, experienced another successful year. A number of churches and conferences participated in the Berean Bible Quiz Contest and the Christian Speech Contest. A new activity this year was the trip of 1966 contest champions during the Christmas holidays. Bro. Mickey took the young people on the trip, which included churches in Iowa and Minnesota.

A special International Youth Week Award was presented for the first time in connection with the observance of Youth Week and Youth Sunday. The Bereans of the Blood River, La., Church of God won the award, which was in the form of a plaque which will be passed on yearly to the winning group. Enthusiasm and participation in Youth Week observances were at an all-time high as a large number of churches planned extensive activities.

A two-month subscription campaign for *The Restitu*tion Herald was held in which 235 new subscriptions were sold. The most subscriptions were sold by the Bereans of the Guthrie Grove, S.C., Church of God.

A Youth Mission Caravan will be taken to Nova Scotia during July and will afterward visit several churches in Ontario, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois. A report of this project will be given at Conference.


The young people of the Church of God are taking more responsibility each year in financial support of the youth work. The youth delegates at the 1966 Youth Conference set a giving goal of \$4,250.00 for 1966-67. Last year's goal was \$3,150.00 and the goal for 1964-65 was \$2,500.00 Both of these goals were surpassed. These youth giving goals are maintained within the framework of the goals for giving of the General Conference.

Two stewardship projects were carried on to aid in the raising of these funds, as well as to teach good stewardship. The Coins-for-Christ Crusade was held for the fourth consecutive year, with a large number of Berean groups participating. The Mission Dollar Club has had a very active year, with a membership of 175, almost triple last year's membership of 60. Bereans or Berean groups joining this club agree to contribute \$1.00 per month in support of the Berean Youth Fellowship work.

The Berean Youth Conference held last summer was a source of great inspiration to those who attended. The attendance was again at an all-time high, with 284 campers in attendance. This was a sizable increase over the 1965 attendance of 223. Plans for the 1967 Youth Conference anticipate an attendance of about 300 campers.

The young people of the Church of God are to be highly commended for their enthusiastic participation in the local, state, and international youth programs of the church. It is for their benefit the programs are planned and it is their participation and support which make them successful.

Beginning September 1, 1967, the work of the Youth Department will be administered by Bro. Shaw from Little Rock, Ark., where he will be pastoring the New Hope Church of God. A cooperative arrangement has been worked out between the General Conference and the local



church which will provide for a division of Bro. Shaw's time between the youth department work and the church work.

Sunday School Department

Bro. Paul Shaw is superintendent of the Sunday School Department.

The Board of Directors of the Sunday School Department (Sr. Leota Foster, Bros. Robert Petry, Bernard Hightower, and Paul Overholser) met twice during the year to discuss the work of the Sunday School Department. By action of the Board of Directors of the General Conference the responsibilities of the Sunday School Board have been broadened to include overseeing and making recommendations regarding Church of God publications.

Sunday school attendance reports continue to be received from the Sunday schools. An analysis of these reports shows that that there is a gradual increase in total Sunday school attendance.

A Worker Training Conference, sponsored jointly by the Sunday school and Youth Departments of the General Conference and the Southeast Conference, was held during April at the Guthrie Grove, S.C., Church of God for the brethren of the Southeast Conference area. A good spirit of cooperation and an encouraging attendance helped to make the conference a real blessing to those who attended.

Since Conference 1966, new Sunday schools have been formed at Rochelle, Ill., Lafayette, Ind., Royersford, Pa., Colorado Springs, Col., and Hot Springs, Ark.

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department is responsible for the publication of The Restitution Herald, Truth Seeker's Quarterlies, Systematic Theology, Songs of Truth, Superintendents' and Workers' Manual, vacation Bible school books, tracts, the Systematic Bible Study Course in English and Spanish, special bulletin covers, and other items of literature used throughout the Church of God.

Many thousands of pieces of literature are published and distributed each year. Most of the new contacts made in foreign lands and in domestic locations outside the influence of local church work, have been made through the various publications that are circulated in many places in the world. Inquiries are received almost daily from people who have received a piece of literature and desire to learn more about the Church of God or to have further information on a specific topic.

The Publishing Department operates at a financial loss, mostly because of the low volume of sales, which is due in turn to the limited market that is presented by a small church. While some literature is used by others, most Sunday school and vacation Bible school and other teaching literature is limited in use to the Church of God by its doctrinal content. We encourage churches to distribute more tracts, *Systematic Theologies*, free Bible study courses, and other evangelistic literature as a means of Christian witness and outreach and also to increase the volume of literature used.

The Restitution Herald has about 2,300 subscribers, including those Heralds distributed through display racks. It is planned to make The Herald a monthly magazine beginning with the October 15 issue. Through combining of papers and changes in format, the monthly will have as much or more reading material, and a monthly issue will be less time-consuming to all concerned with production. We are sure that you will be pleased with the new paper, and we encourage the more than 1,500 Church of God families who are not now subscribers to support this official Church of God magazine by becoming subscribers.

Due to increased costs of printing and postage, it was necessary to raise prices on quarterlies, tracts, and vacation Bible school books on July 1, 1967. The price increases are much less than those that have been put into effect by secular and religious publishers. Some publications are still sold below cost because of the desire of us all to have the truth distributed as widely as possible.

The appreciation of the entire Church of God should be extended to the many people whose services are volunteered in the writing and editing of the various publications, and to the people whose articles, clippings, poems, and pictures make up *The Restitution Herald*.

The Sunday School Department Board of Directors has begun to serve as an advisory publication Board to work with editors and publishers and the Board of Directors and to advise in such matters as: the content of publications; to what extent certain publications can and should be subsidized; whether or not certain controversial issues should be aired and in what publications; how publications can be improved in keeping with their potential sale; and how use of the various publications can be expanded.

Printing Department

Bro. Paul C. Johnson is superintendent of the Printing Department. This Department does most of the printing for the Publishing Department and the other departments (Berean Youth publications, mission publications, College literature, office forms, letterheads, envelopes, promotional materials, etc.) and some commercial printing as time and equipment are available for commercial work.

A Printing Advisory Committee has been appointed by the Board of Directors, and it met in March to begin preliminary study of this department and its needs. Members of the Advisory Committee are: Paul Johnson, chairman; Allan Ramsey, Wayne Laning, Kenneth Milne, and Harold Doan.

Missions Department

The Superintendent of Missions is Bro. S. O. Ross.

The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference is made up of the Superintendent of Missions, chairman; Charles Jones, Chagrin Falls, Ohio, secretary; Warren Sorenson, Macomb, Ill.; Edith Eades, Oregon, Ill.; and Lee McQuinn, Villa Park, Ill. The Board has met six times during the past year (three of these during Ministerial Conference), in addition to several meetings during the General Conference.

The mission work has shown much progress in the past year and many doors of opportunity appear to be opening to even greater outreach. Numerous contacts have been made in Nigeria, Ghana, Northern Canada, and other areas. Several groups of churches in Nigeria are seeking to affiliate with the Church of God General Conference. May God grant the Mission Board, the General Conference Board, and the Conference delegates the wisdom and faith to know how to best continue to work with these contacts.

The church building in Nova Scotia is now completed and dedication services were held on May 21, with Bro. Ross the dedicatory speaker. Bro. and Sr. John Denchfield, who have worked with the Nova Scotia Lighthouse Mission church at Digby the past nine years, have resigned effective September 1, 1967. Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown and family will begin serving the Digby brethren at that time.

The construction of the new building in Bangalore, India, is nearing completion. This building will seat about five hundred and will give the brethren a fine church home of their own. Bro. S. S. Manoah and his co-workers plan to start several new groups in various parts of the city of Bangalore. Plans are being made to bring Bro. Manoah to this country in the spring of 1968. The Foreign Missions Fellowship of Oregon Bible College is the sponsor of this project and will provide the airplane fare and incidental expenses. He will spend one week at Oregon Bible College and then, under direction of the Missions department, will visit many churches throughout the United States and Canada.

There are seven churches in the Philippine Islands that carry on a full-time ministry. Cordon is a new church started within the past year due to many members that moved here from the drouth areas of northern Luzon. The evangelistic team and radio ministry have done much to strengthen the work and to have a greater outreach with God's Word. Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero, supervisor of the Philippine work, suffered considerable injury in a motorcycle accident in March, but has recovered to reasonably good health.

Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore and their family have had recurring attacks of the amoeba infection which is so common in Mexico. This has been a burden to them in carrying on their ministry there. Sr. Rachel Krogh continues teaching the nationals and translating materials for Sunday school and Bible study lessons. Bro. Francisco Martinez is pastor of the Saltillo church and the attendance there is often over thirty. Sunday school and special services are held at the Labor Vieja and Potosi groups. We regret that two former national workers, Adolfo Alvarez and Ascencion Lara, are not active in the mission work at present.

The Missions Department is giving study to ways in which the home areas of mission work can be strengthened. Seven churches are receiving Pastoral Aid this year. Two church buildings have been purchased with the help of the Mission Builders League: the St. Louis Church of God, and the Culmore Church, near Washington, D.C.

Literature distribution continues on a rather large scale, and many contacts are being made around the world because of tracts; *The Restitution Herald*; *Systematic Theology* by Bro. Huffer; and the free Systematic Bible Study Course. The General Conference staff has assisted in services and special meetings on numerous occasions and stands ready to assist as they are able in the general work of the Church of God everywhere. Staff members and gospel teams travel thousands of miles each year and conduct several hundred services in local churches, state conferences, and youth meetings.

Oregon Bible College

A record enrollment of fifty-two students began the 1966-67 school year last September, of whom forty-seven were full-time students (a course load of twelve hours or more); three were part-time students (a course load of five to eleven hours); and two were special students (less than five hours). Fifty-three students enrolled for the second semester, of whom thirty-six were full time; two were part time; and fifteen were special. The large number of special students during the second semester was due to the fact of several students enrolling only in the annual seminar or in the evening course for women. Five seniors were graduated: Edward Bender, Roger Denchfield, Donald Needham, Darrell Rankin, and Clair Rice.

The staff included William M. Wachtel, President and Instructor; Paul Shaw, Instructor and Christian Service Director; Kenneth Milne, Instructor; Harold Doan, Instructor; Stanley Ross, Instructor; Jean Doan, Instructor; David Hall, Men's Residence Housefather; Betty Hall, Cook; Edith Eades, Women's Residence Housemother. Other staff members working on a part-time basis were Nora Anderson, Mary Mickey, Edward Bender, Margaret Holley, Terri Salley, Myrna Mills, Russell Rankin, and Miss Olive Stoffregen. Bro. V. E. Kirkpatrick, having served for three and one-half years as a full-time instructor on the faculty, resigned at the end of the first semester. Bro. Eugene Stilson, of Maurertown, Va., will join the faculty as a full-time instructor this fall. It is hoped that a third full-time teacher also will be added to the staff this fall.

Bro. Alva G. Huffer, pastor of the Tempe, Ariz., Church of God, conducted a one-week seminar course entitled "Bible Lands Survey" at the beginning of the second semester. This course, based mainly on Bro. Huffer's trip to Europe and the Holy Land, was very well received and had a total enrollment of forty-two.

The Freshman Foundation Year, begun in 1964-65, was continued without change. Certificates of recognition were awarded in May to all who had successfully completed the required freshman courses and elective hours.

The Board of Education met in August, 1966, and twice during the present school year—in January and April. Out of these meetings came a number of recommendations to the Board of Directors and also suggestions and guidelines for the work and future expansion of the College (please see Board of Education Report).

Promotion of the College is carried out through letters, brochures, the sending out of College catalogs, the Junior-Senior Weekend, the Booster program, and the new Student Recruitment Committee. This committee of students, with Bro. Harold Doan as faculty advisor, is sending out representatives to various parts of the country this summer to contact prospective students. The Junior-Senior Weekend, held April 27 and 28, has now been held three years in succession. It drew many young people and their leaders to visit the College and get a taste of the life here.

The annual Booster campaign continues to focus attention on the College throughout the local churches and to result in raising a considerable sum for the support of special needs.

The Layman Leadership course, held June 5-9, finally became a reality this year, through sufficient enrollment to offer the course. Since this is the first time it has been held, the staff felt that it was conducted in a somewhat experimental fashion. We trust that the experience gained this year will result in various improvements being made when such courses are offered in coming years.

Long-range plans for expansion of faculty and of our physical plant are being studied. It is hoped to add more faculty members from time to time, thus improving our College program and, hopefully, attracting more students. It is planned to construct a new women's residence as soon as sufficient funds become available and our enrollment becomes large enough to justify such construction.

Student organizations have been very active during the past year—the Student Council, Foreign Missions Fellowship, Home Missions Fellowship, and Social Committee. A special project this year has been sponsored by the Foreign Missions Fellowship to raise funds to bring Bro. S. S. Manoah, our missionary worker in India, to Oregon Bible College in the spring of 1968. The amount needed has been set at \$1,300.00, and most of this has already been raised.

We are grateful for God's blessing and provision throughout the past year, the prayers that have been answered, and for the interest and support of brethren everywhere. We request your continued prayer and support, your suggestions, and your dedicated young people who are willing to come to Oregon Bible College for further preparation in Christian service!

General Services

In adition to the specific work done in each of the departments, the Church of God General Conference performs a multitude of general services for churches, conferences, and ministers. It is difficult to list these services or to estimate the time used in performing them or to guess at their value or lack of value. Among these services is the handling of heavy correspondence from people who inquire about the Church of God. Many college students write the Conference office wanting specific information for term papers or theses about the Church of God. (It seems that every university and college library must have at least one such paper by now.) Individuals write, wanting to know what the Church of God believes, or taking it to task for what it does believe, or wanting an explanation of why it believes as it does. People from various countries write wanting literature, or assistance, or to be put in touch with a nearby Church of God. Isolated members write asking for pastoral counsel. Persons moving to another place write wanting to know of other Church of God people or churches who will be near them. Pastors write about some of their problems in the field, or for information about churches, or seeking special information from books in the College library or in the libraries of the staff. Correspondence conducted by the Conference staff is one of the most interesting services of the Conference, but one which is least seen.

Ministers insurance, maintenance of physical properties, traveling to churches and conferences, participation in dedications, public relations speeches in the community, keeping records, acting as a clearinghouse for the governmental agencies that require records, providing information for publications about churches, and many other such general services, are important functions of your General Conference that are difficult to pinpoint as far as their specific nature is concerned.

General Conference Finances.

The General Conference Board of Directors and staff continue to appreciate the sacrificial giving of the membership of the Church of God. There is evidence throughout the Church of God of more and more maturity in stewardship. New churches have been and are being built in many places. The budgets of many churches have greatly increased in recent years. Some state and district conferences have undertaken ambitious programs of development within their areas. The General Conference Goals for Giving, while steadily increasing, are being met by a faithful people. There is more concern about estates and wills and the disposal of real and personal property and diversion of insurance for the use of the Lord's work after one's death. There are many encouraging signs, as we review the overall progress that has been made in stewardship responsibility in the Church of God.

Because of insufficient records, it is impossible to state accurately the per capita giving of Church of God people. We estimate that it is approximately \$160.00 per person for total Church of God giving. These figures are based on the reports received from secretaries of churches and conferences, and estimates of contributions to building funds, Sunday schools, etc. This estimate is almost double that which we made five years ago, but again we must state that records are not complete and these figures are estimates.

As with every organization that pays salaries and makes purchases today, the General Conference has been caught in the inflation spiral. Salaries, cost of goods purchased, costs of services (insurance, Social Security, repairs, utilities), have all increased, partly due to expansion of the work and partly due to rising prices in general.

It is evident, however, that the Church of God is now blessed with people in positions of leadership in local churches and conferences who consider seriously the needs of the Lord's work and who strive to provide for the financial as well as the spiritual growth of the church through full stewardship of possessions, time, and talents.

Recommendations for the 1967 Church of God General Conference

1) We recommend that an Americana Youth Caravan be planned for the summer of 1968, provided that it is deemed advisable by the delegates at the 1967 Berean Youth Conference and provided sufficient funds are appropriated in the Berean youth budget. This caravan would consist of a gospel team of young people traveling for about two weeks within the United States.

2) We recommend the following addition to the questions asked candidates for License and Ordination: "Will you give full cooperation to the congregation of which you will become a pastor, and will you use all your influence to edify and promote unity of all the members and lead the congregation in the full exercise of all services and rites of the church, such as baptism, Communion, marriage (when in accordance with the Standards for Ministerial Recognition), and other duties devolving upon a pastor? If the time comes when your leadership does not maintain the unity of the members or you will not fully perform any or all the services and duties mentoned above, will you graciously and without creating dissension relinquish your pastoral relationship and sever your leadership both directly and indirectly?"

Explanation: This recommendation was reported at the 1966 General Conference by the Committee on Revision of Ministerial Standards, which was appointed in 1965 by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors.

3) We recommend that the Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance, part 4, be amended to read as follows: "The congregation should have the approval of the state conference with which it is associated. It is *required* that the congregation hold a joint deed with the state and (or) the General Conference."

Explanation: The word "required" is used instead of the word "recommended." The purpose of the amendment is to assure the protection of property in which people from many parts of the conference have made an investment.

4) We recommend that a fund drive be undertaken in the fall of 1967, with a goal of \$150,000.00 to be paid by the Golden Anniversary of the Church of God General Conference, August, 1970, to construct a women's residence building, as Phase Two of the development of Oregon Bible College.

Explanation: Although authorization for this building was given at the 1966 General Conference, we are here establishing a definite goal and timetable for this project.

5) We recommend that we accept the Nigerian Church of God people into membership in the Church of God General Conference according to our understanding of their doctrinal position.

Explanation: There are now more than 1700 persons who have been baptized in the Church of God General Conference of Nigeria after accepting the Lord Jesus Christ and affirming their belief in the doctrines set forth in the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference, as we have been informed by the leaders of this organization.

6) We recommend that the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference, Article IV, Section 6 be amended to read: "The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for three years. No director shall succeed himself for a third term."

Explanation: The word "third" replaces the present word "second." The purpose of the amendment is to allow directors to succeed themselves for one term, and thus serve six years consecutively if elected for a second term. As General Conference business expands and becomes more complicated it is often advantageous for board members to serve for longer periods of time to give greater continuity to the program.

SPECIAL REPORTS

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

Since our last annual report, the Board of Education has met three times—at General Conference time last August; on January 23, 1967, at the college; and on April 15, 1967, at the home of Bro. Donald Overmyer, LaPorte, Ind. Our next meeting will be held in August. These meetings are given over to study and discussion of the needs of Oregon Bible College, proposed improvements in program and procedures, and specific recommendations to be presented to the General Conference Board of Directors.

The Board of Education consists of five members, including the president of Oregon Bible College as chairman. The other four members are Bro. Francis Burnett, vicechairman, Sr. Ruth Halls, secretary, Bro. Donald Overmyer, and Bro. Dallas Demmitt. Bro. Demmitt was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Bro. James Mattison, who resigned from the board. Each member is appointed by the Board of Directors to serve a two-year term. This year two terms will expire—those of Sr. Halls and Bro. Demmitt. Appointments to the Board of Education are made at the November meeting of the Board of Directors.

Planning during this past year has included promotion and student recruitment, faculty and staff recruitment, the summer course in Layman Leadership, the college library, proposals for pastoral internship of students, the Booster program and budget, and other matters. The Board of Education fulfills an essential role in guiding Oregon Bible College, and the writer is grateful for the opportunity to serve with these faithful and conscientious co-workers on the board. LICENSE AND ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Since our last annual report Bro. William Wachtel has been succeeded by Bro. C. E. Randall on the committee. In the past year two of our ministers have fallen asleep in death. They are Bro. James M. Watkins and Bro. Thomas M. Savage who are both greatly missed especially by those to whom they ministered. At this writing two of the Mexican pastors, Adolfo Alvarez and Ascension Lara, are not working with us.

At the last General Conference an ordination service was held for Bro. S. S. Manoah although he could not be present. An ordination service will be planned for Thursday afternoon, August 10, 1967, at the General Conference if applications are received and approved.

Three of our ministers formerly recognized made application since last General Conference and their names were placed on the list published last December. They are Bro. Kirby M. Davis, Bro. Harry S. Payne, and Bro. Robert H. See.

Bro. Domingo B. Valdez, Abut, Quezon, Isabela, Philippines, made application for ministerial recognition last summer. His written application was approved by the committee and Bro. Ortiguero's examination and recommendation were accepted and Bro. Valdez was granted a license in September 1966.

Applications for ministerial recognition by the Church

of God General Conference were made by the seniors being graduated from Oregon Bible College in June. The committee met with them on March 6 and 7 for examination. The names of those who will be receiving licenses will be announced later.

Bro. Terry D. Dwyer of 1007 Boyd Ave., Apt. 3, Baton Rouge, La. 70802, who was graduated from Oregon Bible College in 1963 has been granted ministerial recognition.

Not counting the new graduates of Oregon Bible College, there are ninety-six licensed ministers. Of these, sixteen are inactive, having conducted less than twenty regular preaching services during the year ending July 15, 1966. Of the licensed ministers, there are twenty-nine who have been ordained.

Bro. C. E. Randall presented a paper at the 1967 Midwinter Ministerial Conference explaining license and ordination. Applications for ministerial recognition were given to the ministers and sent to those not attending to acquaint them with the written questions asked of new applicants. Applications for ordination were also given and sent for the consideration of those ministers who have not been ordained formally.

Applications for Annual Ministerial Recognition cards will be sent some time before July 1, to ministers now holding a Certificate of License. Applications should be returned on or before July 15, in order to prepare the cards before General Conference.

YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT

The Youth Advisory Council of the Berean Youth Department is a board of nine young people which serves in an advisory capacity to the work of the Berean Youth Department. The council meets once each year during the Christmas holidays and daily during the Berean Youth Conference. Recommendations are formulated which are submitted both to the General Conference Board of Directors and to the delegate body at the Berean Youth Conference.

Members of this year's Youth Advisory Council are Le-Ann Appleby, Jena Runyan, Michael Hale, Paul Duncan, Ronald Elwell, Vivian Kirkpatrick II, Mary Jo Brewer, James Graham, and Dale Ramsey. The chairman of the council is Michael Hale.

MINISTERS' FUND REPORT

During the year \$25.00 per month was paid to a minister's widow and \$25.00 per month to a retired minister from the Ministers' Fund. A loan of \$300.00 was made to a minister for moving expenses; and a gift of \$100.00 was made to a minister for hospital bills. The balance on hand in the fund is \$2,053.00. Contributions to the fund are received from a few individuals and churches during the year. Some churches have used their Sunday school birthday offerings for this fund, and others contribute 1% of their income. Harold Doan

MNISTERS' RETIREMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The Retirement Committee would like to be optimistic in its report, and could be if only a few of the leading ministers and churches would exercise leadership and cooperation and come forward as co-laborers in the only effort that has ever been made to provide a Retirement Plan for ministers. We are on the border line of success in getting an initial plan started. At present there are 34 churches enrolled and 40 ministers. In the few months that remain before General Conference, there is sufficient time for enough enrollments to make it possible for the participating members to meet in business session and set up a working organization at General Conference time. This is both a report and an appeal.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Sunday School Department Board of Directors met three times during the year to consider the work of the Sunday School Department. The policy has been continued of sponsoring worker training conferences in areas which are not at present carrying on their own training programs. A worker training conference was held this spring in the Southeast Conference area. During the year attendance reports continued to be received from the Sunday schools and the attendance statistics derived from these reports regarding the total attendance of the church at large were analyzed by the board.

By action of the General Conference Board of Directors, the area of responsibility of the Sunday School Board was expanded to include the overseeing of publications. Bro. Harold Doan met with the board in its spring meeting to introduce the board to its responsibilities in the area of publications.

The members of the Sunday School Department Board of Directors are Sr. Leota Foster, Paul Overholser, Robert Petry, and Bernard Hightower.

COUNSELNG AND ARBITRATION COMMITTEE

As we draw to the close of another conference year, I am pleased to report that there were no individuals or churches that found it necessary to call for the assistance of this committee. Nevertheless, we stand ready wherever and whenever the need arises. Additional Conference Information

CAMP COSTS: Camp Mack is owned by the Church of the Brethren. They graciously make their facilities available to us for the same charge as is made to Brethren camps. The Church of God General Conference pays \$3.10 per day per person for each person who attends the General Conference meetings. Children under twelve are charged \$1.55 per day. This includes lodging, three meals, and insurance. We are charged 25 cents per day for ''short-term campers'' who are on the grounds only for portions of the day and who do not eat at the camp.

In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are other conference costs for promotion, travel, folders, printing, displays, supplies, etc. It is the belief of the Board of Directors that every effort should be made to at least "break-even" in the Conference costs.

Collections are received each evening at the services and funds received are used to cover these various charges. Those who wish a receipt for their payments may pay at the desk and receive a receipt. Each person who attends should come prepared to bear his share of the actual costs. Offerings over and above will go directly into the Lord's work through the General Conference operating funds.

NURSERY: A nursery for small children is conducted during the morning and afternoon sessions. Mothers with small children are asked to take turns helping in the nursery. In this way each mother will be free part of the time to attend some of the daytime sessions.

YOUNG PEOPLE: Teen-agers who attend General Conference, some planning to stay over for the General Youth Conference, will have a special program of classes and activities during the General Conference. Bro. Charles Graham, 3616 Ballentine Pike, Rt. 2, Springfield, Ohio 45502, will be youth director. Young people coming in ahead of the Youth Conference are expected to contribute their costs for lodging and meals while at General Conference. The following rules will apply during Conference.

1) Young people will be required to attend all activities that are planned for them by the Conference, unless they obtain permission from the Youth Director.

2) Those driving automobiles will be required to leave them parked in the area provided for them, unless they have good reason to leave, then, only by being accompanied by parent or adult. We will attempt to be as fair as possible in governing this rule. It is for your health and safety as well as others.

3) Cabins, beds, and wearing apparel should be kept in a neat and orderly fashion.

4) At mealtimes and class times we request that girls wear dresses or skirts and blouses, and boys wear slacks and sport shirts (rather than recreation clothing).

5) Each cabin will have a counselor and will appoint one of the group to lead in evening devotions before retiring.

Bro. Graham needs volunteers to assist him with the youth program. Please contact him now or immediately upon arriving at Conference if you can help.

INTERCESSORY PRAYER: During the week the Stone Chapel will be used as a special prayer room in hours when classes are not conducted there. People are encouraged to go there at any free time for meditation and prayer, especially prayer for others. A book will be in the chapel in which anyone may write his prayer requests and bring them before the throne of grace in prayer. (more)

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LODGING: Lodging is provided in separated cabins and lodges for men and women. Parents with small children are housed in Sarah Major Lodge as much as possible. Young people attending General Conference are housed in separate cabins with counselors in charge of each cabin.

DELEGATE POOL EXPENSE: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the costs of travel for those from far away and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church and conference is encouraged to enter into the pool to make attendance at Conference possible for all churches. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

CIHLDREN'S CLASSES: There are morning and afternoon classes for children of all ages, in addition to the adult and teen-age activities, in charge of Sr. Carol Schmidlapp. Parents are requested to call for their children immediately after classes morning and afternoon.

CONFERENCE CHOIR: There will be a conference choir under the direction of Bro. Darrell Maddock. It will rehearse each evening but Sunday and Thursday at 6:30 in the tabernacle. Soloists and those playing musical instruments are asked to come prepared with music, also to render special numbers during the conference.

TRIP TO AFRICA

It now appears, as we write these lines (May 22), that Bro. Lee McQuinn will be leaving for Ghana and Nigeria on May 30. A three-week visa for Nigeria will be granted, and a one-week stay in Ghana is planned. With the turmoil that exists in that part of the world, an almost dayto-day change in the situation determines the feasibility of tourists being admitted to the country.

McQuinn in this journey that the Lord will be with him to keep him safe; that transportation to the outlying areas of Nigeria may be found; that doors of opportunity for the Church of God will be opened in these lands; and that Bro. McQuinn will be able to make the contacts necessary to further the work there.

NEW PRICES

Page 16 contains the new price list for Church of God General Conference publications that will become effective July 1. Because of increased costs of printing and mailing, this price rise is necessary. As the summer progresses we trust that you will continue to remember the Lord's work in your local church, in your district conference, and in the General Conference. 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

Limits of Authority

By the Editor

CHURCH of God General Conference, with offices in Oregon, Illinois, is a not-for-profit corporation. Its members are the eighty-four churches in the United States, Canada, India, and the Philippines which have on file in the Conference office a statement of affiliation with the General Conference. Delegates from these churches, plus delegates from state conferences, and ministers licensed or ordained by the General Conference, are, under God, the ruling body of the Church of God General Conference. These delegates elect a Board of Directors which is responsible to the Conference delegates for the operations of the General Conference. The Board of Directors has divided the work into departments and employs a staff to carry on the day-to-day work. The staff is responsible to the Board of Directors.

Church of God General Conference is a congregational organization, and its authority is limited by the Constitution and By-Laws adopted by the delegates in 1960. Generally speaking, this document regulates the General Conference Board of Directors and staff, and the delegates in session, in regard to admitting churches to membership which adhere to the statement of faith contained in the By-Laws; promoting by print and voice and conduct those truths contained in this statement of faith; raising and managing funds to do the work as it is delegated to the various departments of the Conference and approved by the delegates; to secure and maintain the necessary physical facilities to carry out the designated work; and to license and ordain ministers.

There are many things that the General Conference does not have authority to do. Sometimes people do not understand this limitation and wonder why the Conference does not act in certain situations. The General Conference has no authority over the local church. It cannot inject itself into internal problems, hire a minister or remove a minister (except to revoke his license for cause, as set forth in the Standards for License and Ordination), buy or sell local buildings, change local church policies, regulate individual members, establish an order of service, or in any way interfere with the work and responsibility of the local church, *except by specific invitation from the officials of the church*.

NUMBER 10

By resolution, the publishing department of the General Conference is guided by a policy that it will publish only those things "that are commonly believed among us." This policy does not carry over to such matters as the licensing of ministers, admission to Oregon Bible College, or membership of a local church or conference in the General Conference. Here the Conference is guided entirely by the A - J items in the Statement of Faith in the By-Laws of the Conference, and by such other delegateapproved statements as the Standards for License and Ordination; and the Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance.

Membership in the Church of God General Conference is a voluntary act by a local congregation. In affiliating with the General Conference the local church is manifesting its agreement with the Biblical truths set forth in the By-Laws, and its desire to participate in the worldwide work of the Church of God through the General Conference. It assumes a moral obligation to support the work of the General Conference and to maintain fellowship with the other members of the Conference as a brotherhood in Christ. The church does not relinquish any authority, nor place itself under any compromise of its local autonomy. It does, with membership, have opportunity to assist in the formation of policies and programs through its delegates and its pastor. It does have opportunity to enlarge its borders through expanded opportunities for missions and education through the various departments of the Conference. It does open the doors to larger fellowship and greater contact with brethren in Christ.

As we look forward to the forty-seventh annual meeting of the General Conference, we hope this brief explanation of the authority and limits of authority will be-helpful to all delegates.

NEW PRICES—NEW BOOKS

New prices for publications went into effect on July 1. Also, with the July quarter, Primary and Beginners Sunday school quarterlies are in the form of a Teacher's Guide and Student's Activity books. The student's pages for each Sunday can be easily slipped from the packet so that each student will have only a four-page sheet to work on rather than a stapled book. We trust you will find this new form more convenient.

GENERAL CONFERENCE, AUGUST 6-11

The Forty-Seventh Annual Church of God General Conference will convene at Camp Mack on Sunday, August 6, 1967. The program for the Conference is again printed on page 2, and the reports and other business to be considered were mailed to each member family in the June JOURNAL.

While official delegates are the only ones who vote in the business sessions, the Conference is open to all people. There are devotional periods, prayer sessions, classes, seminars, and preaching services in addition to the daily business meetings. Everyone is invited to the business meetings and may participate in the discussions.

We trust that each church and conference will make a careful selection of delegates and will be sure to be officially represented at the Conference meetings so that a genuine cross section of thought and conviction will be presented.

ENCOURAGING REPORTS

As we compile news reports monthly for the JOURNAL, we are encouraged by the number of churches which have made extensive improvements in their church buildings and parsonages, and which have constructed new buildings. While the building is not the church, and is not *always* a genuine reflection of the spiritual character of the congregation, it is a manifestation of the faith and the interest of many people.

The most encouraging news is that after these new facilities are provided, attendance often increases and there is an ingathering of harvest for the Lord. Thus the facilities are being used by the Lord as instruments to reach people with the gospel and to bring them into a new relationship with himself. Reports of baptisms, of expanded services, of record attendance, all lift up the entire brotherhood and all rejoice with the progressive churches which are moving ahead in the Lord's work.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

We recommend that the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference, Article IV, Section 6 be amended to read: "The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for three years. No director shall succeed himself for a third term."

Explanation: The word "third" replaces the present word "second." The purpose of the amendment is to allow directors to succeed themselves for one term, and thus serve six years consecutively if elected for a second term. As General Conference business expands and becomes more complicated it is often advantageous for board members to serve for longer periods of time to give greater continuity to the program.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FINANCES

As you will see from the figures below, we have fallen short of our Goal for Giving for the month of June. While we are not unduly alarmed by this, having experienced the summer decline before, we do immediately notice any failure to meet the goal for contributions. The expenses of staff salaries, mission support, pastoral aid, and other operating costs go on throughout the year, and there is no vacation from the payment of Conference obligations. It is important that we strive to meet the monthly Goal for Giving so that the work can be carried forward. It has been necessary to borrow operating funds to meet expenses for July.

We are thankful to each person and group for the faithful stewardship that has made all the outreach programs of the General Conference possible, and to the Lord for making this stewardship possible.

There will be no PROGRESS JOURNAL in August, so the Goal below is for July and August.



COIN CRUSADE TOPS \$2,000 GOAL

The Coins-for-Christ Crusade, the youth stewardship project, held during March and April, topped its goal of \$2,000.00 for the Crusade, as total giving reached \$2,351.82. We appreciate the hard work and sacrifice put forth by all of the groups to make this possible. The Bereans of the Oregon, Ill., Church of God ranked first in the competition, raising \$312.90. The enthusiastic giving in connection with the Coinsfor-Christ Crusade, as well as other giving by Bereans and Berean groups, has brought the total youth giving to within \$500.00 of the Youth Giving Goal for the year, \$4,250.00. It is now anticipated that the goal will be reached during the International Berean Youth Conference, or possibly before it begins, and that total giving will reach \$5,000.00 before October 1, the end of the fiscal year.

PLANS FOR INTERNATIONAL BEREAN YOUTH CONFERENCE

We are anticipating a record attendance of near 300 campers for the 1967 International Berean Youth Con-

ference, to be held August 11-17, 1967, at Camp Mack, Milford, Ind. The camp is planned for all Church of God young people from those entering eighth grade through age twenty-two. The tuition charge is \$27.50 per camper, including all meals and lodging.

Interesting and challenging activities are planned to appeal to young people of widely varying interests. Some of the features of the week are: full recreational and sports program, plenty of free time, two volunteer camp choirs, volunteer camp band, thirty-member camp council, Junior Counselor program, Missions Night Service presented by the Youth Caravan to Nova Scotia, the 1967 Berean Awards Banquet, special extravaganza Victory Rally, special activities for older campers (moonlight cruise, beach party), full-length movie "I Hear a New Song," the finals of the Berean Bible Quiz Contest and the Christian Speech Contest, new training session ideas (Idearamas, Group Discussions), Oregon Bible College Night, Decision Night, conference business sessions, interesting classes with electives for most ages.

TRANSPORTATION EXPENSE POOL PLANNED

Seventeen Berean groups have enrolled in the Delegate Transportation Expense Pool to be held in connection with the 1967 International Berean Youth Conference. The pool, which is based on two cents per mile, round trip, for one car from each chartered Berean group, will cost an estimated \$16.00 or \$17.00 per group with the present groups enrolled. Chairman's Message to the Delegates

AS I WAS preparing an introduction for my address today, I reread Alva Huffer's message to the delegates of 1966 and found the introduction so inspiring that I knew that I could not improve on it, so with his permission I would like to quote it.

"Ministers of the gospel, delegates, and friends of the Church of God, we begin this forty-sixth annual international meeting of the Church of God General Conference in a spirit of gratitude, humility, and courage: gratitude, in response to God's rich blessings upon the church as a whole during the past year; humility, in recognition of our utter dependence upon him as we seek to fulfill his purpose for the church in these last days; and courage, as we pursue our God-given responsibility to evangelize the world."

Through the grace of God we have all arrived here safely in order to do the business of God's church; you all as representatives of your various churches and we on the Board as your representatives. I believe that it is fitting to outline for you what we can and cannot do; i.e., what you can and cannot do and what I as the chairman of the meeting can and cannot do. This was very well written up by our editor, Harold Doan, in the July issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL. For review and for those who did not have an opportunity to digest this excellent editorial, I would like to quote two paragraphs.

"Church of God General Conference is a congregational organization, and its authority is limited by the Constitution and By-Laws adopted by the delegates in 1960. Generally speaking, this document regulates the General Conference Board of Directors and staff, and the delegates in session in regard to admitting churches to membership which adhere to the statement of faith contained in the By-Laws; promoting by print and voice and conduct those truths contained in this statement of faith; raising and managing funds to do the work as it is delegated to the various departments of the Conference and approved by the delegates; to secure and maintain the necessary physical facilities to carry out the designated work; and to license and ordain ministers.

"There are many things that the General Conference does not have authority to do. Sometimes people do not understand this limitation and wonder why the Conference does not act in certain situations. The General Conference has no authority over the local church. It cannot inject itself into internal problems, hire a minister or remove a minister (except to revoke his license for cause, as set forth in the standards for License and Ordination), buy or sell local buildings, change local church policies, regulate individual members, establish an order of service, or in any way interfere with the work and responsibility of the local church, except by specific invitation from the officials of the church."

The Constitution and By-Laws also define the duties of the delegates and the duties and authority of the Board of Directors. Decision as to how the work of the General Conference is done; the organization of departments to do the work; and the securing of personnel to staff the departments is delegated to the Board of Directors. The reason for this is that there are many details involving business, management, and personnel that are involved in the executive branch of the Conference work that can best be handled by an informed Board of Directors and its staff of employees.

As your chairman I must follow the rules for any chairman as outlined by *Robert's Rules of Order*: 1) to preside at all meetings; 2) keep calm at all times; 3) talk no more than necessary while presiding; 4) have an agenda for the meeting before him and proceed in a businesslike manner; 5) have a working knowledge of parliamentary law

and a thorough understanding of the Constitution and By-Laws of the organization; and, 6) refrain from entering the debate of questions before the assembly.

I will endeavor to follow these precepts as closely as possible. If at times it may seem to one of you that I am showing favoritism or being unfair, please forgive and remember the precepts that I am working under in order for the most to be accomplished by the majority opinion.

For instance, for order to prevail it will be advisable if we do not have business introduced before it is scheduled. For an example, the recommendations listed on page seven of the June PROGRESS JOURNAL are to be presented in the following order: Tuesday, Recommendation 2; Wednesday, Recommendations 6, 5, 3; Thursday, Recommendations 4 and 2.

"Are the Churches in Trouble?" is one of the cover articles of the U.S. News and World Report of April 18, 1967. I would like to quote the paragraph entitled "Dark Age or New Reformation."

"Today, few clergymen are totally confident of the future. Recently a leading Baptist minister in Georgia warned that the twentieth century may parallel the fifth as another 'Dark Age' of negligible religious impact on civilization.

"And a Jewish scholar, writing in the current issue of *Judaism*, stated bluntly his view that the Christian era has come to an end.

"On the other hand, many clergymen see Western religion as going through a radical readjustment to a turbulent age . . . and that out of present-day religious unrest may come 'a new reformation' equal in importance to the one that shook the world 450 years ago."

In general I believe that Christianity is in a new dark age, but I believe that we are in the time of the "New Reformation." Many thousands of persons are looking for what we have—a Bible-based doctrine. The more conservative of the liberal church members are hungry for the teachings of the Bible and are sick of the presentation of sociology on Sunday mornings. I would think that certain groups may be tired of hearing this same thing on Saturday mornings at their meetings.

We must be prepared for this huge mass of people who are basically tuned in on Christianity and who are seeking for the truths of the Bible. Even without conscious effort on our part, they are finding us—for instance the people in Nigeria.

We also have working for us many wonderful persons around the world that many of you do not even know about. In Australia are two men who are the voice of *The Gospel Publicity League*. This non-denominational organization has sent out over twenty-four million pieces of Christian literature. Many of these papers have been our own publications, sent out at no expense to us. It is time for us at this meeting to "Think Big!"

Two fitting age-old adages are, "Behold the turtle, he makes progress only when he sticks his neck out," and "To progress, try reaching for things beyond your grasp."

We continually have larger Goals for Giving and yet the number of families giving is not greatly increasing. We have been thinking big in the past, and we must continue to do so. It is commendable that we each are giving more and meeting our ambitious goals, but it would be more commendable if we were to find more people who wanted to be faithful stewards for the Lord. This obviously would let us further expand our goals.

This message is my opportunity to give you delegates my opinions and I could not let it pass without mentioning one of my most inspiring experiences; that is, working with the General Conference staff. Their devotion to their jobs and untiring efforts are an inspiration to all of us on the Board. Without them the ideas we express at meetings like this one and the requests for action of our "Think Big" recommendations would not get off the ground. They implement what you as delegates and we as Board members ask them to do. They do this with great efficiency and dispatch. We all owe them our sincere thanks.

I am confident that in the interest of Jesus Christ we are going to launch out on some ambitious projects this week and that we are going to "Think Big." I am confident that the General Conference staff can carry out your wishes as they have done before. I am more confident that God will be behind us in all our efforts, for we are all here with the aspiration to do his will.

The Forty-Seventh General Conference of the Church of God was called to order at 10:00 a.m., August 7, 1967, by Chairman William D. Lawrence, M.D., who led the group in singing "Praise Him, Praise Him." Prayer was offered by Pastor Hollis Partlowe.

Sr. Ruth Halls, chairman of the Credentials Committee, explained and arranged the seating of the delegates.

Bro. Lawrence then presented his message to the delegates (see page 1), stating the purpose of the General Conference, outlining those things that the Conference can and cannot do, the working of the Board of Directors of the Conference, and the duties of the Chairman. He spoke of the many things done by all who support the General Conference, advocating that to progress, we try reaching beyond our grasp.

Chairman Lawrence then called for questions and comments on the published reports in the June, 1967, PROGRESS JOURNAL of the Board of Education, License and Ordination Committee, Youth Advisory Council, Ministers' Fund, and Ministers' Retirement Committee. Concerning the Ministers' Retirement Plan, it was reported that there are now 41 ministers and 35 churches enrolled in this plan and that seven more churches are needed to implement the plan. Bro. C. E. Lapp reminded us that there is a difference between the Ministers' Fund (already in existence) and the Ministers' Retirement Fund (not yet implemented).

Bro. Robert Huddlestun then reported on the activities of the Board of Directors during the past year. He stated that it had been a difficult but enjoyable year, and expressed appreciation for the concern and prayers on behalf of the Board.

Bro. Harold Doan then presented the treasurer's report for the nine-month period of October 1, 1966, to June 30, 1967. Total assets for this period were \$368,619.58, liabilities were \$22,530.75; net worth, \$346,088.83. The gain over this period was \$10,047.36. This gain is not an expendable cash gain, but is in trust funds, etc. There was an actual operating deficit of approximately \$3,000.00. Attention was then called to the tentative Goal for Giving as presented in the Conference folder. Bro. Alva Huffer moved that the treasurer's report be accepted; seconded by Edward Goit; motion carried.

The Garden Park Church of God, Grand Rapids, Mich.,

was introduced as a new church being represented for the first time at General Conference. Those who were delegates at the Conference for the first time this year rose and introduced themselves. It was also made known that there are those present who were also present when the General Conference was organized. These included: Leota Hanson, Alfred Anthon, Ada Simpson, and C. E. Randall.

Francis Burnett made a motion, seconded by Delbert Jones, that the special reports as published on pages 8 and 9 of the June, 1967, PROGRESS JOURNAL be received and placed in the records of the General Conference. Motion carried.

Bro. Doan then reported for the Sunday School Department and the Publishing Department. He stated that *The Restitution Herald* and PROGRESS JOURNAL will both be monthly publications beginning this fall. Delegates asked questions and made comments regarding various publications.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 5; ministers 43; delegates, 78; making a total of 126.

A motion was made and seconded that the meeting adjourn until Tuesday morning. The motion carried, and the meeting was dismissed at 11:30 a.m.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 8, 1967

The meeting was called to order at 10.00 a.m. by Chairman Lawrence leading in singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Prayer was offered by Pastor Ellsworth Routson.

The minutes of the Monday business session were read. After corrections were made, it was moved and seconded that the minutes be approved as corrected; motion carried.

Chairman Lawrence then called on Bro. Paul Shaw to report on the activities of the Berean Youth Department this past year. Bro. Shaw presented the Youth Caravan team that traveled to Nova Scotia this summer. Members of the Caravan were: Sue Harbison, Margaret Holley, Debbie Peters, Lois Anthon, Danny Graham, Waldon Winner, Jr., Bob Jones, and Betsy Mattison. Chaperones for the trip were Bro. Shaw and Sr. Edith Eades. The Caravan members presented a brief program, introducing themselves, then telling of the things that transpired on

their trip from Oregon, Ill., to Nova Scotia and return. Some of the members gave testimonies of what the Caravan trip meant to them.

Bro. Shaw reported on the financial program of the Berean Youth Department: \$2,300.00 was given in the Coins-for-Christ Crusade; 175 young people are enrolled in the Mission Dollar Club and contribute a dollar a month to the work; the goal for giving for this year was \$4,250.00, and they are within \$150.00 of meeting this goal; the total giving of the young people for this year probably will surpass \$5,000.00.

Bro. Shaw urged that each Conference have a youth director and that this director be encouraged to attend the annual Youth Leader's meeting. Each Conference was also encouraged to take part in the expense pool for this annual meeting.

Bro. Shaw reported that approximately three hundred young people are expected for the Berean Youth Conference this year, with a staff of forty-five adults. He also stated that the new Berean Lesson Manuals have not sold as well or used as much as was anticipated. He then briefly discussed his move to Little Rock, Ark., as related to his work in the Youth Department.

The Berean campaign for *Restitution Herald* subscriptions this year resulted in 235 new subscriptions being sold. It was stated that this campaign will probably be held every other year rather than annually.

Sr. Mildred Macy presented to Bro. Shaw and Sr. Eades a copy of the Fonthill newspaper which carried pictures and a write-up about the Youth Caravan to Nova Scotia. Bro. Shaw expressed his thanks to the Macy's for their kindness and hospitality shown to the Caravan.

Chairman Lawrence asked for consideration of Recommendation Number 1 as printed in the June, 1967, PROGRESS JOURNAL, which reads: "We recommend that an Americana Youth Caravan be planned for the summer of 1968, provided that it is deemed advisable by the delegates at the 1967 Berean Youth Conference and provided sufficient funds are appropriated in the Berean youth budget. This caravan would consist of a gospel team of young people traveling for about two weeks within the United States." After several invitations were given to the planned Caravan, Kent Ross made a motion that Recommendation Number 1 be adopted; seconded by Charles Graham. Motion carried.

Chairman Lawrence introduced the Sunday School Department business, stating that the terms of Directors Leota Foster and Robert Petry are expiring this year. Bro. Willis Turner asked for an explanation of the duties of the Sunday School Board, and Bro. Doan read the list of their duties and responsibilities. The floor was opened for nominations for Director Number 1. John Hayse nominated Willis Turner, John Denchfield nominated Leota Foster, and Sr. Van Fleet nominated Robert Petry. Bro. Milon Hall suggested that we vote for Director Number 1 before making nominations for the second director. On the first ballot for Director 1 there was no majority, on the second ballot Bro. Willis Turner was elected.

For Director Number 2, Russell Reye nominated Charles Pryor, and Mrs. Van Fleet nominated Robert Petry. Robert Petry was elected.

Chairman Lawrence asked for consideration of Recommendation Number 3, which reads: "We recommend that the Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance, part 4, be amended to read as follows: 'The congregation should have the approval of the state conference with which is it associated. It is *required* that the congregation hold a joint-deed with the state and (or) the General Conference.'" Delbert Jones made a motion that Recommendation Number 3 be adopted; seconded by Harry Payne. After a great deal of discussion of this Recommendation, Allan Ramsey moved that the motion to adopt it be tabled until a later business session; seconded by Willis Turner. The motion to table carried.

It was moved and seconded that we adjourn until 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, August 9.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 47; delegates, 96; total, 152.

Motion to adjourn carried and the meeting was dismissed at 11:45 a.m.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, August 9, 1967

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Lawrence leading in singing of "Living for Jesus." Prayer was offered by Pastor Jesse Pestle.

The secretary read the minutes of the Tuesday business session; the minutes were approved as read.

Bro. Harold Doan moved that we give a rising vote of

thanks to Sr. Leota Foster for her several years of service on the Sunday School Department Board of Directors. The people stood to indicate their second and approval of the motion.

It was moved by Willis Turner, seconded by Wilson Kirkwood, that Recommendation Number 3 be lifted from the table. Motion carried. This recommendation reads: "We recommend that the Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance, part 4, be amended to read as follows: 'The congregation should have the approval of the state conference with which it is associated. It is required that the congregation hold a joint-deed with the state and (or) the General Conference.'" A vote was requested by the delegates. Recommendation Number 3 was adopted.

It was moved by Milon Hall, seconded by Edward Goit, that Recommendation Number 6 be adopted. This Recommendation reads: "We recommend that the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference, Article IV, Section 6, be amended to read: "The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for three years. No director shall suceed himself for a third term." Many thoughts, both pro and con, concerning this recommendation were presented by various delegates. A ballot vote was taken. Bro. Lawrence explained that a two-thirds majority vote is required to amend the Constitution.

While the ballots were being counted by the Credentials Committee, Chaplain Orville Westlund was introduced, and he presented his report of his eight years of service as a chaplain in the United States Navy. It was moved by Edward Goit, seconded by John Hayse, that we receive the report of Chaplain Westlund and that it become a part of the records of this meeting. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported that the motion to adopt Recommendation Number 6 was not carried by a two-thirds majority. The motion *lost*. Sr. Josephine Kennedy moved that Recommendation Number 6 be reconsidered; seconded by Wilson Kirkwood. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Bro. Lawrence, who had relinquished his chair to Vice-Chairman Robert Huddlestun, that the consideration of Recommendation Number 6 be tabled until a later business session; seconded by Emory Macy; motion carried.

Chairman Lawrence asked the Mission Board to come forward, then turned the program over to Bro. S. O. Ross, who reported on the work of the Mission Department the past year. He told of the plans of the Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College for bringing Bro. S. S. Manoah to this country next year.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 48; delegates, 95; total, 152.

It was moved by Edward Goit, seconded by Rolland

Stilson, that we recess until 1:25 p.m., August 9; motion carried. The meeting was dismissed at 12:00 noon.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, August 9, 1967

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Vice-Chairman Robert Huddlestun. Prayer was offered by Bro. Cecil Smead.

C. E. Randall made the following motion: "I move that a committee be appointed by the Board of Directors to study the term of office of the Board of Directors and report to the January meeting of the Directors, with recommendations to be considered by the 1968 General Conference." Seconded by John Denchfield; motion carried.

It was moved by Ellsworth Routson, seconded by Harry Sheets that Recommendation Number 6 be removed from the table. Motion carried. Further discussion on the recommendation followed. A vote was called. The motion to adopt Recommendation Number 6 lost.

Bro. Doan introduced Pastor J. Howard Shaw, Executive Secretary of the Advent Christian General Conference. It was moved by C. E. Randall, seconded by Milon Hall, that Mr. Shaw be seated as a fraternal delegate. Motion carried.

Chairman Lawrence then called for nomination for director number 1 of the General Conference Board of Directors. Sr. Holt nominated Mardy Lawrence. Clark Ballentine nominated Dwaine Demmitt, and Cecil Patrick nominated J. Don Swartz. It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed; motion carried.

For director number 2, Hollis Partlowe nominated Delbert Jones and Dean Moore nominated John Hayse. It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed. Motion carried.

For director number 3, Norman LaMunion nominated Harrv Sheets. Francis Burnett nominated Terry Ferrell, and Arnold Johns nominated Warren Landry. It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed. Motion carried.

Pastor John Denchfield then expressed to the Conference his thanks for the cooperation of all who helped the work while he was working as our missionary pastor at Digby. Nova Scotia. He further stated that he would be available in the future for service in local churches as the Lord leads.

Chairman Lawrence asked for Bro. Ross and the Mission Board to return to the platform. Bro. Ross then spoke regarding the Nigerian mission work and called for ouestions and comments about it. Bro. Ross also introduced the members of the Mission Board, who are: Edith Eades, Charles Jones, Lee McQuinn, and Warren Sorenson.

Chairman Lawrence then presented Recommendation Number 5, which reads: "We recommend that we accept the Nigerian Church of God people into membership in the Church of God General Conference according to our understanding of their doctrinal position." It was moved by Alva Huffer, seconded by Wilson Kirkwood, that Recommendation Number 5 be adopted. The motion carried.

Bro. Warren Sorenson's term as a member of the Mission Board expires this year, so nominations were opened for a Mission Board Director. Delbert Jones nominated Warren Sorenson. Bro. C. E. Randall moved that nominations cease and that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Bro. Sorenson. Motion carried unanimously, so Bro. Sorenson was reelected.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: ministers, 48; officers, 9; delegates, 94; total, 151. It was moved and seconded that we adjourn, and the meeting was dismissed at 2:55 p.m. with prayer by Alva Huffer.

THURSDAY MORNING, August 10, 1967

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus." Prayer was offered by Pastor Kent Ross.

The secretary read the minutes of the Wednesday business sessions. They were approved as read.

Chairman Lawrence announced that the committee to study the term of office on the Board of Directors has been appointed. The committee includes: Robert Hall, Jack Hearp, J. R. LeCrone, and Ken Vancil, chairman.

Ballots were then cast for three directors for the Board of Directors of the General Conference. The three directors elected were Dwaine Demmitt, Delbert Jones, and Terry Ferrell. They will serve the General Conference with incumbent directors, Merle Patrick, Cecil Smead, Robert Huddlestun, and Kenneth Vancil.

Chairman Lawrence then introduced Bro. Wm. Wachtel, President of Oregon Bible College, and asked the Board of Education to take the platform. Bro. Wachtel introduced the Board members, who are: Ruth Halls, Francis Burnett, Don Overmyer. Dallas Demmitt was unable to be present.

Bro. Wachtel reviewed the report on Oregon Bible College as printed in the June, 1967, PROGRESS JOURNAL. He stated that eighteen new student applications have been received for this fall, and that there will be 24-26 returning students. He also read a report of the Student Recruitment Committee, prepared by Don Hightower, who was chairman of that committee. Bro. Wachtel answered questions regarding the Layman Leadership Course, dormitory residents and capacity of dormitories, and explained the change in tuition for this year.

Chairman Lawrence then commended the student body of Oregon Bible College for their devotion and their giving to the work of the Lord.

The Chairman then called for Bro. C. E. Randall to present a new recommendation to the delegates, which

was to replace Recommendation Number 2. The new recommendation reads: "Be it resolved that the Church of God General Conference believes in and practices Open Communion and will not license or ordain anyone who advocates, teaches, or otherwise promotes Communion contrary to this principle. The table of the Lord is not a place of discipline. Each professed Christian may exercise his privilege to partake or not partake of the supper (1 Cor. 11:28, 29). Be it further resolved that this resolution will be in force for the coming year, pending a further study of Communion by the ministers." Bro. Randall stated that this resolution had been passed by a majority vote of the ministers attending the August, 1967, General Conference at Camp Mack. He then explained our historic stand since the inception of our General Conference that we only promote those things which are commonly believed among us. Bro. Randall then moved that we adopt this new resolution; seconded by Emory Macy. Cecil Smead spoke on behalf of the Board of Directors, assuring the delegates that if this resolution is accepted, the Board of Directors will see that it is carried out.

Arlen Marsh made a motion that the second part of the resolution be stricken, which reads: "Be it further resolved that this resolution will be in force for the coming year pending a further study of Communion by the ministers." Delbert Jones moved that this motion be tabled until the next business session; seconded by Kent Ross; motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 52; delegates, 97; total, 158.

It was moved and seconded that we adjourn; motion carried. The meeting was dismissed at 11:45 a.m.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, August 10, 1967

The meeting was called to order at 2:30 p.m. by Chairman Lawrence. Prayer was offered by Pastor Harry Sheets.

Chairman Lawrence announced that the re-organized Board of Directors is as follows: Chairman, Robert Huddlestun; Vice-Chairman, Kenneth Vancil; Secretary, Delbert Jones; Treasurer, Cecil Smead.

Arlen Marsh moved that the resolution regarding Communion, tabled at the close of this morning's session, be lifted from the table and that we proceed with a vote on the resolution immediately. The motion to lift and vote carried by a greater than two-thirds majority.

Bro. C. E. Randall moved and it was seconded that we give a vote of thanks to the Credentials Committee, Ruth Halls and Lois Graham. Motion carried.

The resolution on Communion presented by C. E. Randall was adopted. For the sake of clarity in the future, the vote was 133 to adopt, 15 against adopting.

It was moved by Delbert Jones, seconded by Charles

Graham, that Recommendation Number 4 be adopted. This recommendation reads: "We recommend that a fund drive be undertaken in the fall of 1967, with a goal of \$150,000.00 to be paid by the Golden Anniversary of the Church of God General Conference, August, 1970, to construct a women's residence building, as Phase Two of the development of Oregon Bible College." The motion carried.

It was moved by C. E. Randall, seconded by Willis Turner, that we adopt the Goal for Giving as presented in the delegate folders. The motion to adopt unanimously carried. (See printed Goals for Giving.)

It was moved by Edward Goit, seconded by Wilson Kirkwood, that the following resolution be adopted: "Resolved: If the Lord Jesus tarries, the year of our Lord 1970 will be known as 'Golden Jubilee' throughout the Church of God General Conference. Be it further resolved that our Conference Chairman appoint a committee sometime this year, to work with the Executive Secretary to develop a suitable Jubilee Year program and Conference agenda." Motion to adopt carried.

Warren Sorenson presented the following statement to the delegates: "Being a Christian is a dimension of becoming a complete individual. Christian activity and behavior must become as involuntary to the child of God as is breathing. The church and its Christian education program must be dedicated to the development of the whole person. There must be a conscious awareness of the influences affecting the lives of those who subscribe to a program of Christian education. Such an awareness must then be used as a basis for the orderly development of a correlated program of Christian Education to be administered *through each department and age-group of the church.*"

Warren Sorenson then moved and Francis Burnett seconded that the following recommendation be adopted: "It is therefore recommended that a council of Christian Education be formed to evaluate the *total* educational program of the Church of God. The duties of such a council would further include the development and administration of a correlated curriculum for the total Christian Education endeavor of the church. This curriculum should include materials for Sunday school, youth fellowship, midweek classes, vacation Bible school, and catechism. (May be expanded to Dorcas, etc.)

"An effective curriculum must be developed around predetermined aims and objectives. The scope and sequence of the curriculum will be determined by the objectives.

"The council shall be under the leadership of a Director of Christian Education. Membership on the council shall be by appointment. Appointment shall be made on the basis of one's knowledge and understanding of education and its importance to the Church of God." The motion to adopt this recommendation carried.

C. F. Pryor moved and Joseph Fletcher, Sr., seconded that the following resolution be adopted: "Be it resolved that we, the ministers of the Church of God, met together in an assembly at the August, 1967, General Conference meeting and in consideration of the seriousness of the time in which we are living and the events that are current among the nations, believe that we are living in the end of Gentile times and are rapidly approaching the day of the coming of the Lord. Therefore, we dedicate ourselves and our ministry anew to the glory of God and the proclaiming of the gospel of the soon coming Kingdom of God and we recommend that on Sunday, September 24, 1967, we will present a special message and call upon our people to join us in a re-dedication of their lives that we all might make our calling and election sure." The motion to adopt this resolution carried.

Bro. Francis Burnett spoke of the spirit of love and the evidence of spiritual growth manifested at the 1967 Conference.

J. Don Swartz moved that a vote of thanks be given to all the "back stage" workers of the General Conference. A rising vote of thanks was given.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 9; ministers, 50; delegates, 93; total, 152.

A motion was made that we adjourn at 3:30 p.m., and the 1967 General Conference was dismissed with prayer by Harold Doan, Executive Secretary.

REPORT OF CHAPLAIN ORVILLE WESTLUND

Mr. Chairman, Delegates, and friends of the General Conference. It is indeed a privilege, after eight years on active duty with the Chaplain Corps of the United States Navy, that I can be present with you at this Forty-Seventh General Conference and share the good news of this specialized ministry to our men in the Armed Forces.

There is a hymn we have sung many, many times— "I'll Go Where You Want Me to Go." What we have sung in this hymn has received fulfillment in the Navy Chaplain Corps; like "over the stormy sea," "the battle's front," "in the paths of sin."

This ministry has introduced a different dimension in the pastoral phase of our General Conference work as compared to the role of pastor in the local church. In this ministry, especially sea duty, everything is mobile—pulpit and congregation. Your pulpit at one time may be set up in the jungles of Luzon or it may be rigged on the flight deck of an aircraft carrier or it may be on a sand dune in South Vietnam. Your congregation is never stable, always changing. It is made up of men of all Protestant denominations. While on sea duty, your ship may be tied up for a brief time in Kodiak, Alaska. A few months later, as it happened to me, the ship tied up in Bangkok, Thailand. Church buildings do not move around like this. While our communities in the States build institutional churches, our Navy communities just represent them. Yet there is one common denominator. People. Our Lord has called us to minister to them wherever they may be. As he has instructed us "to launch out into the deep," so we are doing in this ministry: to meet the "real needs" of our transient military personnel.

One thing I want to by-pass in this report is a barrage of statistics. Therefore, I have selected three primary categories and summarized them statistically covering eight years of ministry to our men in the Marine Corps and Navy. They are the number of services of worship, the number of people attending those services and, lastly, the number of men seeking counseling. Counseling, that is, guidance, sustaining, reconciliation, constitutes the main thrust of this Navy-Marine ministry. During these eight years, 666 services of worship have been conducted in this military context. 24,087 Navy and Marine people have been in attendance. Covering this period, from 1959 to 1967, 6,377 people have sought counseling. This pastoral work took place within the following commands: Pioneer Battalion of the 1st Marine Division; Escort Squadron THREE, Home Ported San Diego, California; San Francisco Naval Shipyard; USS SALISBURY SOUND AV-13, Home Ported Whidbey Island, Washington; US Navy Mine Defense Laboratory, Panama City, Florida.

We have indeed been privileged to serve a free government such as ours; to be granted permission to minister to the needs of our men in uniform. The Psalmist once said, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." We can only add, "Amen."

Freedom is a key word of the Navy Chaplain Corps. We have a free pulpit. We represent only our own Protestant denomination, though we minister to all people in the finest traditions of our faith. "Cooperation without Compromise" is the official motto of the Corps.

This is a new dimension in the work of our General Conference. It is an honor for me to fulfill this ministry. Yet historically it is not new. Ever since the days of Rules of Warfare outlined in Deuteronomy 20, men have been called to minister to military men. As we know, the One who fulfilled the greatest ministry to the man in uniform was our Lord.

Registration at the 1967 General Conference broke all previous records. Six hundred twenty-two people registered and participated in the Conference. A record number of delegates were present for all sessions.

General Conference Progress

IMPORTANT DEPARTMENTAL CHANGE

By unanimous action of the Board of Directors, it was decided to sell the printing equipment to a company in Mt. Morris, Ill., and to henceforth have all printing done on a job basis. Several factors prompted this decision; difficulty in securing skilled labor, changing technology in the printing industry, the rising costs of printing machinery and service of this machinery, probability of changes in tax laws governing such business, and the possibility of selling the equipment to a nearby firm which can continue to print General Conference publications.

During September and October, when the changeover is being made, it is very possible that some publications will be late, or that errors will be made in mailing. We ask you to bear with us and to inform us of any errors so they can be corrected.

Bro. Paul Johnson will be editorial supervisor, reviewing all publications in preparation for printing.

SEPTEMBER 24 A SPECIAL DAY

As you will see in the Minutes of the General Conference, September 24 has been set aside as a day for prayer and rededication. POOL EXPENSE

YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT

Another successful Berean Youth Conference was held August 11-17, 1967, at Camp Mack. The attendance again set a record high, with 303 campers and 45 staff members present. Last year there were 284 campers present. The Lord's presence was felt in the camp throughout, and a great inspiration was taken back to the home churches by those who attended.

The theme of the camp was "Victory in Christ." Classes were taught on the following topics: Victorious Christian Living, Teen Problems, Dynamic Doctrines, and Witnessing for Christ.

YOUTH AWARDS ANNOUNCED

At the Berean Youth Conference a number of the youth programs and contests which are carried on throughout the year came to their culmination for this year. After an exciting two-day, double-elimination Bible quizzing tournament, the team representing Louisiana swept through undefeated to win the 1967 Berean Bible Quiz Championship on Sunday evening of the Conference. The Minnesota team won second place. The Louisiana team was composed of Richard Gainey, Benny Mattison, David Landry, and Walter Reidlinger. At the Berean Awards Banquet on Tuesday evening, contest director Jim Mickey announced that the all-star quizzers were Ronald Macy from the Northeast Conference, Richard Gainey from the Louisiana Conference, Nancy Foster from the Illinois Conference, and Shelley Gaspar from the Minnesota Conference. On Monday afternoon the finals of the Christian speech contest were held. The winner of the boy's division was Dale Swartz, representing the Northeast Conference; th girl's division was won by Lois Anthon, representing Louisiana.

The \$150 scholarship to Oregon Bible College, which is awarded each year at the youth conference on the basis of competitive examinations, was won this year by Dale Swartz from Columbia Station, Ohio. The award for president of the year—the local Berean youth president who has done the most outstanding job in terms of leadership and Christian commitment—was won by Richard Gainey of the Blood River, La., Church of God.

YOUTH GIVING GOAL DOUBLED FOR '67 - '68!

The youth delegates at the 1967 Berean Youth Conference voted through a bold and daring step, but it will be a step which will be looked back on as a historic step in the Church of God youth program, a milestone in our youth movement. A decision was reached to take the goal for this year of \$4,250.00, which is already an all-time high, and multiply it by two to make the goal for 1967-68 \$8,500.00. The editor can hardly say enough praise for such youth initiative, enthusiasm, dedication, and faith. One of the major motivations behind the action by the delegates was that if this amount of money is raised during the coming year by the young people and expenses for the department run as anticipated, the youth program will be virtually self-supporting by youth contributions.

DELEGATES REVISE MANUAL FORM

Action was taken at the 1967 Youth Conference to change from use of a printed Berean Lesson Manual, which is printed on the basis of providing a copy of the manual for every Berean class member, to a mimeographed teacher's lesson manual with a printed cover. This booklet is to be provided free of charge to the groups. Present editors will be retained and the quality of the lesson materials will be kept at the same high level. This action will constitute a savings of almost \$3,000.00 per year at the current loss rate on the manuals.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Members of the Sunday School Department Board of Directors are: Paul Overholser, Robert Petry, Bernard Hightower, and Willis Turner.

One of the actions of the delegates of the 1967 Conference that will have a bearing on the future work of the Sunday School Department is that of creating a Council of Christian Education. The Council (see Minutes for Thursday) will have a broad scope of responsibility bearing upon literature prepared and published for the educational departments of the Church of God. Members of the Council will be appointed at the November meeting of the General Conference Board of Directors.

"WHAT WILL YOU HAVE ME TO DO?"

Throughout my past years of varied observation and experience it has become my constantly increasing conviction that, as an organization of churches and conferences, we need at least one man available for certain special types of service; one upon whom the individual churches and district, state or General Conference could call in times of specific needs.

One in this position should be qualified to conduct evangelistic meetings and witness crusades; to occasionally serve as guest speaker and, in event of emergency, be able to supply as a short-term pastor.

Having opportunity in the course of his travels to accumulate information from the experience of those having completed their building projects he should develop the ability to provide help for other groups in the beginning of their building programs. By application he should also become able to direct in building fund and other fund-raising canvasses.

Survey work in new areas and the actual beginning of new work in pre-surveyed areas should also become a facet of his abilities.

Having these qualifications in at least some degree, he must also be one who is available upon and within reasonable call—free from pastoral obligations, office duties or other employment and have minimal family obligations.

Of course, such a position would require reasonably good health to maintain ability to travel extensively and to work under pressures. Adaptability to conditions—provincial, climatic (and climactic) would be essential.

Now that we are anticipating that the work of Lighthouse Mission here in Digby, Nova Scotia will be (as of September 1) under the very capable leadership of Bro. Raymond Brown, and as our family now consists of just my wife and self (right where we started thirty-five years ago), and, continuing to recognize the conviction that this manner of work needs to be done, I feel compelled to endeavor to initiate this position by offering myself in this field of service.

To this end I have declined several offers of available pastorates, discouraged further offers, and have set aside the possibility of secular employment.

I by no means assume to possess all the qualifications needed to fill this position, but do feel qualified in part and am convinced that as the Lord leads in this capacity he will also enable.

Although in a different context, yet in similar principle, his Word reads, "Prove me now." Consequently, believing that this position needs to be filled and that I am, at present, in the situation that enables me to endeavor to do so, may it be known to all that, as of September 1, 1967, I will be available to assist in any of the activity referred to above—or even in other work of your choosing.

Considering the opportunity to work with you as "his call" I would ask, "What will you have me to do? and when?"

In beginning this new field of activity, it is my hope that it will become a permanent work and that in the years to come other and continually better qualified men will carry it forward.

During recent years, at conferences and elsewhere, some have expressed a recognition of the need of a "full-time evangelist." This work is of that nature but on a much wider scope.

However it should be understood that our General Conference Board does not feel that it is in a position at present to sponsor this work. Thus it becomes a project of faith in its entirety. This may well be the Lord's desire so that we have opportunity to exercise and thus prove our faith. After all, if our General Conference were to sponsor all our projects very little effort or faith would be required of us.

Î believe God will supply our every need as we labor together in his service. Where do we begin?

A listing of my itinerary will be maintained in our publications to assist you in planning and making contact for specific needs. This will also be helpful in keeping all informed as to the progress of this project.
