Why the Minister Quit

It is a recognized fact that few pastorates end on a pleasant note. Nine times out of ten a minister closes his work in one community and seeks another church because a small segment, and sometimes a large element, of the church is against him. This may vary from a mild dislike to an outbreak of bitter feeling on the part of the minister or by members of the church. There are many reasons for these unhappy situations, but they can be summed up in two categories. Sometimes the church is to blame, sometimes the minister.

Let us look at the first of these categories. It is strange that a doctor, banker, or attorney may stay a lifetime in a community and be honored for his service therein, but a minister may stay but a few years in comparison to these other professional men and then must move on. It is due to the fact that the personality of the minister enters vitally into his success or failure. No matter how many years he has been before the public in a city or community, he is always on trial. One significant misstep, one discernible error in judgment, and he is done. His conduct at all times should be exemplary.

Yet the minister is not always at fault if he leaves. "Where there is no vision the people perish." That is just as true as when the writer of Proverbs put it down. Some churches have no vision or interest in expansion or greater usefulness. They are satisfied to have a smaller group. Sometimes they resent "outsiders" coming in and do not make them welcome. "Me and my wife, my son John and his wife, us four, O Lord, and no more," is the attitude sometimes

spoken, often implied. Sometimes, no matter how hard a man may try to bring a vision of better things, he is not able to change that attitude of exclusiveness, so he has to move on.


Sometimes pastor and congregation get to taking themselves for granted. The romance of new acquaintance is soon over and the church sees the minister, or thinks it does, for what he is, with his strong points and his limitations. In that realization people get restless. They want another personality who does not have these limitations, whatever they may be; a better mixer, a better worker with the young people - or the old - a good singer, a money-raiser, or relief from the "promoter," a pulpit orator, or an aggressive soul-winner. Invariably, a church settles for something less. A minister is like a school superintendent, he is gifted in various ways. One man may be able to do various things; another may go at the problem with a different approach and get just as good results.

Again, a minister may leave because of a "church boss." The church boss may not have much money to contribute to enforce his demands or threats, but the would-be-dictator has a well-developed desire for power just the same. Woe be to the minister who does not do just what the would-be-dictator, male or female, wishes, whether on settled policy or fickle whims of the moment.

Again, a man may labor diligently and tactfully over a period of years to change the settled viewpoint of a group. Then all at once he wakes up to the reality that he has not changed that viewpoint; old and young have closed their ears to his presentation of truth. When that is evident, even though his heart is breaking, the minister must move on. Jesus experienced this in his ministry on earth, so he said, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear."

Let us look at the other side of the picture when the pastor is at fault for closing his work. Sometimes it is an obvious fault or weakness, even immorality, that brings about dissatisfaction. In such cases, the sooner the better. Remember Paul's advice to be an example to the believers "in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. . . . Take heed to yourself" (1 Tim. 4:12, 16, R.S.V.). A minister's lack of financial sense may get him so deeply in debt he is always embarrassed by it. The lack of tact and patience, irritability, or display of temper, instantly limit his work. The writer knew a man who greatly desired a new house of worship for his congregation. He was asked to dismiss the business meeting when the proposed building was turned down. In his disappointment he prayed, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." This one sentence put an end to his influence in that community. Plain indolence or slothfulness is self-defeating. The writer remembers a minister, who, while in his undershirt and barefooted, met a woman at the door who came to make funeral arrangements for her mother. He did not bother to put on a dress shirt or shoes. Is it any wonder he moved every two or three years? Then there was the minister who greatly influenced the writer in his youth as to dispensational and prophetic matters. But his was a sensational, flam-(Please turn to page 8)

General Conference Progress



The above is the emblem that has been adopted as the official emblem of the Churches of God that are affiliated with the General Conference with headquarters in Oregon, Ill. This can be reduced to a size suitable for letterheads, tracts, or any printed materials. It can also be enlarged to any desired size, and would be suitable for road signs, outside bulletin boards, or any advertising purpose. When used on a local level it immediately identifies that church with the General Conference at Oregon. The name of the local church would be placed below or beside the emblem.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS TO MEET

The next meeting of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference will be held at Oregon, Ill., November 15 and 16. Many matters of policy and direction will be decided at this, and other meetings of the Board. We covet your prayers for God's blessing upon these meetings.

MEETINGS OF OTHER BOARDS

Several departmental and special boards have held important meetings during October. On October 5 the General Conference Sunday School Board held a meeting in Oregon, and plans and projects for the coming year were outlined and developed.

The Mission Board of the General Conference met on

October 8 and discussed the work being carried on in the various fields, and formulated some policies for future administration and development of the Mission work.

The Board of Trustees of the Church of God Ministers' Voluntary Retirement Association held its first regular meeting of the newly organized group on October 15. The Board set February 15, 1969, as the deadline for initial enrollment in this retirement program. Ministers and churches who are not in the program may contact S. O. Ross, Secretary-Treasurer, at Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061, for further information. The program went into effect on October first, and first dues will be payable after January 1, 1969.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FINANCES

The new fiscal year of the Church of God General Conference began on October 1. The Goals for Giving in the amount of \$83,000.00 is the largest in the history of the Conference. It appears that the giving for October will fall short of the goal.

When the final figures for the past fiscal year were in, the giving for the year was \$1,500.00 short of the needs. The delegates at the annual sessions of the General Conference approve the plans and projects for the coming year. It becomes most difficult for the staff and Board of Directors to carry out these projects in each department of the work when the goals fall short. A loan of \$3,000.00 was made to carry out the commitments for October.

These commitments include support or partial support to twenty-three missionaries and their families, pastoral aid to nine churches, staff salaries, and the usual monthly expenses.

We know that the membership of the Church of God will make this a matter of concern and will meet the needs that God's work might go forward to his glory.

INDIA

The Church of God in Bangalore, India, observed the first anniversary of its church building with special services on August 11, 1968. The congregation met outside the building and after prayer they all marched around the building once, in memory of one year of service, singing "The Church's One Foundation" and "Praise Him! The service lasted two and one-quarter hours, yet most of those in attendance, which numbered nearly five hundred, remained still longer to sing, meditate, and pray for all the great blessings they have received.

Bro. S. S. Manoah is now teaching a pre-baptism class to at least ten persons. Bro. Manoah again expresses his thanks to the General Conference membership for their prayers and support.

Mrs. David Lawrence, wife of one of Bro. Manoah's close workers, has been extremely ill, and he asks for your prayers for her.

A number of individuals have contributed funds for a sewing machine for Sr. S. S. Manoah and the ladies of the Bangalore church. This gift was much appreciated.

EL-CHIBBAK, LEBANON

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a reports that he recently assisted a young lady in putting on Christ in baptism and that two more have asked to be baptized soon.

Bro. Sunna'a is now translating the Systematic Bible Study Course into Lebanese and is using it as a Bible correspondence course among the membership and contacts.

Sister Sunna'a is in the hospital, having suffered a fall which caused her to give birth to a child prematurely. He requests that we remember her in prayer.

PHILIPPINES

The Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College has agreed to support the radio ministry in the Philippines. This is a half-hour program each Sunday noon over one of the large stations. We praise the fellowship for this effort, as well as for the several other projects that they carry on in the interest of missions.

Pastors and members of the churches at Minagbag and Gattaran are being persecuted and threatened by a member who has become disgruntled over some trival matter. Pray for the safety of these brethren.

NOVA SCOTIA

A successful Bible school and conference has been completed at Lighthouse Mission Church of God in Digby. One hundred twenty-three were enrolled in the Bible school and the high attendance was one hundred eight. Many new contacts have been made.

It appears that a new work will be started in the village of Centerville, about twelve miles from Digby. A Bible school will be held there and then it is hoped that a Sunday school will develop. Pray for this new project.

NIGERIA

At last report from Bro. A. A. Obot, he had high hopes that the civil war would end shortly. Many members have lost their lives at the hands of the enemy and by starvation. It is reported that CARE packages are now getting into the strife area, however Bro. Obot has not as yet reported receiving any.

Bro. Obot says, "Continue to pray for us. Our work is progressing and we still hope to open our school in January, 1969."

MEXICO

Bro. Dean Moore returned to Mexico for a week of services in September, and Sisters Rachel Krogh and Alice Aldrich continue to reside in Saltillo and are working with Bro. Francisco Martinez in carrying on regular services in Saltillo and Bisnaga as well as special services in other villages at times.

ALASKA

Sr. Sara Jane Peters, a registered nurse, who graduated from Oregon Bible College last June, is now working in a government hospital in Tanana, Alaska. This is a small village outside of Fairbanks. Sr. Peters is using her talents to witness in this area. She has a large supply of tracts and materials for distribution and we hope that a Church of God work will begin there.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education fulfills a vital function in the higher education program of the Church of God. This Board acts in an advisory and promotional capacity for Oregon Bible College, and makes specific recommendations regarding its operation to the Board of Directors of the General Conference. Alva G. Huffer, President of the College, is chairman of the Board of Education, and the four other members of this Board are appointed, each for a term of two years, by the Board of Directors. This Board meets during General Conference each August, during the January ministers' meeting, and at other times.

Current appointed members of the Board are: Ruth Halls, Cleveland, Ohio; Dallas Demmitt, Phoenix, Ariz.; Don Overmyer, LaPorte, Ind.; and Charles Pryor, De-Kalb, Ill.

General Conference delegates, in August, adopted the following motion: "We recommend that the Board of Education study the possibility of establishing an internship program for Oregon Bible College whereby graduating students may have practical pastoral experience before they enter the ministry." Members of the Board of Education have given much study to such a program.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

YOUTH GIVING TOPPED \$9,000

Contributions toward the Youth Department giving goal by young people and Berean groups totaled \$9,297.19 by September 30, 1968, which was the end of the fiscal year. While overall giving toward the General Conference Goal for Giving fell short by about \$1,500.00, it is encouraging that the young people surpassed their \$8,500.00 goal by \$797.19. This goal had been set by the youth delegates at the 1967 International Berean Youth Conference. The previous year's goal had been \$4,250.00. The goal set this past summer for the *current* fiscal year is \$10,000.00.

ANOTHER CARAVAN PLANNED

Another youth caravan is being planned for this summer; tentatively planned as a 16-day trip to Virginia, Washington, D.C., and the Carolinas. The eight-member gospel team will be chosen from among those young people (entering eleventh grade and older) who apply to go on the trip.

STATE YOUTH DIRECTORS' MEETING HELD

Six conferences were represented at the meeting of state youth directors held October 25, 26, 1968, in Oregon, Ill. Present were: Mr. & Mrs. James Jannereth, representing Michigan; Mr. & Mrs. Loyd Cooper, representing Missouri; Oral Miller, representing Illinois; Kent Ross, representing the Northeast Conference; Jim Mickey, representing the contest program of the Youth Department, and informally representing Minnesota; and Paul Shaw, representing the Youth Department of the General Conference, and informally representing Arkansas.

Some of the topics presented at the meeting were: "Organizing a New State Youth Program," "How to Publish a State Youth Newsletter," "Developing Leadership Through the Youth Program," "The Berean Contest Program for 1969," and "Planning Better Youth Meetings."

(Continued from front page) boyant personality, and he delighted in denouncing the college and professors in the city where he served. On being taken to task for it, he publicly denounced the criticism, saying he would preach what he pleased; if people did not like it, they could stay away. His extreme utterances provoked such antagonism, inside and out of the church, that in a couple of years he left for another city and gradually sank into obscurity.

Then there is the preacher who soon "runs out of gas." In two or three years he has used up his store of ideas—he may not have had any to begin with, except some slogans or epigrams. He does not replenish his mind by reading, study, or thought, and so begins to repeat or go in eircles. He may be a man of good in-

tentions but has little to offer, so moves on.

In this category should be included the minister who has but "one string on the fiddle." It may be prophecy, or baptism, or conditional immortality, or denunciation of the errors of other churches. If one constantly harps on these themes, needed as they may be, people tire of it. They may not be able to define it or definitely sense it, but people need Christ and the good life held up to them.

A good minister is hard to define. There are so many combinations of qualities in personalities, and all ministers have their deficiencies and limitations. The pulpit orator may lack administrative or promotional ability, and the man who has administrative ability may lack the force of the pulpit orator. A man should not be condemned for what he does not have

innately. Many men who "cannot preach for sour apples," have pleasant, attractive personalities and good judgment. To borrow the sentiment in the frontier dance hall, "Don't shoot the pianist, he is doing the best he can."

Motives for Christian Service

By the Editor

OFTEN, when a student does not do well in school, or an employee does not do well on his job, we say he is not properly motivated. One who is motivated has a motive for what he is doing. Webster defines "motive" as, "Something (as a need or desire) that causes a person to act . . . any emotion or desire operating on one's will and driving it to action." When someone says or does something, we often say, "What's his motive?"

In order for a person to be a true servant of God he must have a motive. There are different motives to Christian service—some better or more perfect than others.

The least perfect motive for Christian service is *fear*. Some people serve and worship God out of fear of judgment and destruction. The days of the "hell fire and damnation" evangelists are pretty much a thing of the past. Recent surveys show that few people believe in the old-fashioned burning hell. People need to have a little more healthy fear of the God who will indeed judge man and destroy those who do not accept him and believe his gospel. (2 Thess. 1:8, 9.)

But, like a person who obeys traffic laws only out of fear of arrest, or the child who obeys his parents only out of fear of punishment, the Christian who serves God only out of fear has an imperfect motive. "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love" (1 John 4:18). Hebrews 11:7 says, "By faith Noah, being warned of God of things not seen as yet, *moved with fear*, prepared an ark to the saving of his house." Faith in God was the *primary* motive that caused Noah to obey and serve God.

A better motive is service to God for reward. The reward system has its merits; it is the basis of almost all animal training. Many businesses and industries have an incentive plan, whereby an employee receives a little extra in his pay envelope for working a little harder.

Our faith in God acknowledges that "he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Heb. 11:6). Hope of reward caused some of the saints of old to allow themselves to be "tortured, not accepting deliverance; that they might obtain a better resurrection" (Heb. 11:35b). We admit that becoming an heir of the Abrahamic promises is an incentive to being baptized into Christ; actually there is no hope for reward outside of becoming heirs of Abraham through Christ. Too, our recognition of the fact that we are death-destined creatures, without life and without hope, causes us to "by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honour and immortality, eternal life" (Rom. 2:7). In the extreme, serving God out of a motive of reward is selfishness.

Without a doubt, the *highest motive* for Christian service is the *response* to God's love, mercy, and goodness! We love God because he first loved us and gave his Son to save us. (1 John 4:9, 10, 19.) We repent and make our decision to serve God, not wholly because he has commanded us to in light of coming judgment (Acts 17:31), but because "the goodness of God leadeth [us] to repentance" (Rom. 2:4), and his longsuffering gives us the time in which to repent (2 Pet. 3:9). Paul beseeches us to present our bodies to God as a living sacrifice, because of God's mercy. (Rom. 12:1, 2.)

Our motive for telling the good news to others is that somebody else told us. Paul said to Timothy, "The things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" (2 Tim. 2:2). Too, our love for others will cause us to speak out for their good, and to witness to those going the wrong way.

What is your motive? Do you attend and work in the church because of mama and papa? habit? to be seen and admired of men? fear? or hope of reward? Better, that you love him and want to serve him!

GENERAL CONFERENCE BOARD

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, Ill., on November 15 and 16. A committee appointed to set up some guidelines on "How to Call a Pastor" reported to the Board and their report was accepted as a helpful set of guidelines for churches and ministers to follow. (See report on page 6.)

By action of the Board of Directors the Daily Vacation Bible School materials for 1969 will be published in five lessons. The cost of preparation of ten-lesson books was approximately \$1,500.00 more than sales, so they were subsidized from contributions in this amount. Since only five churches held two-week schools in 1968, the Board felt that the additional cost was not justified. Those churches which did have two-week schools last year should plan accordingly.

The Board approved the republication of the book, *Systematic Theology* by Alva G. Huffer, since the current supply is running low.

An internship program for graduates of Oregon Bible College on a voluntary basis was approved by the Board of Directors. Watch the College page for full particulars.

DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The 1968 General Conference voted that a Director of Christian Education be hired, as funds and the person become available. Bro. Robert See of Whittier, California, has been appointed to this position without salary. Bro. See has a masters degree and part of this training has been in the area of curriculum. Bro. See, a schoolteacher, will work with the full committee of Warren Sorenson, Charles Pryor, Eugene Stilson, Barbara Harvey, and Enid Maddock.

Since this budget was prepared and approved last summer, several items such as postage, food, repair costs, supplies, and other miscellaneous items have already shown price increases. It appears that contributions beyond the established budget will be needed to fully carry out the proposed programs for the fiscal year. We know that the membership will make this a matter of concern in the months ahead so that the full program of the General Conference may go forward to completion.

Contributions for October and November have fallen \$2,245.00 short of the goal.

MISSIONS BUDGET

The delegates at the 1968 General Conference approved the following mission budget for the current fiscal year:

Nova Scotia	\$4,100.00
India	1,300.00
Mexico	5,400.00
Philippine Islands	6,000.00
Nigeria	1,800.00
Lebanon	1,200.00
Pastoral Aid to churches	5,000.00
Literature	500.00
Board Expenses	500.00
Total	\$25,800.00

From this amount twenty-three missionaries and their families receive support. Nine smaller churches at home are receiving assistance in the support of their pastors. Much literature is needed in many areas of the world and it appears already that the need will far surpass the five hundred dollars allotted.

In addition to the above there are administrative costs including office expenses, staff salary, postage, social security payments for the American workers, and other miscellaneous items that are expenses of the Mission Department. November was Mission Month and most congregations heard sermons and emphasis on Missions so we trust that each member will make missions a matter of prayer, concern, and support in the months ahead.

PHILIPPINES

The weekly radio broadcast in the Philippines began on Sunday, November 17, over station DZMC in Cauyan, Isabela, one of the larger stations in northern Luzon. The air time cost is being provided by the Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College.

The Philippine Conference is now making arrangements to secure a portable engine generator to provide light and sound for Evangelistic Team services and for other special occasions.

MEXICO

Attendance at regular services in Saltillo averages twenty and in the village of Bisnaga about thirty. Special services were conducted in Bisnaga October 25-28, and attendance for these four services averaged well over fifty. There were Bible class lessons, special music, group singing using song cards, puppet shows, slide pictures, and

special preaching services by Pastor Martinez. A church building unused for several years has been made available to the Church of God in Bisnaga.

Bro. Dean Moore has now secured a full-time secular position in Edinburg, Texas, and is not able to make the regular monthly mission trips to Mexico at present.

NIGERIA

Following is a quote from the last letter received from Bro. A. A. Obot, "Greetings to you in Jesus' name. I am writing to tell you that the war in Eastern Nigeria has affected many of us. All the towns in the former Eastern Nigeria have been captured by the Federal troops, but only one town remains, that is Umuahia, and we do not yet know the position there. Please pray for us and for peace."

HAWAII

Sr. Elaine Lapp is located in Honolulu, Hawaii, as a schoolteacher. She is making fine contacts there through her music and witnessing. The Mission Department has supplied her with tracts and literature for her use and distribution. We are grateful for members of the Church of God who use their talents and abilities in a missions effort such as this.

LEBANON

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a writes that the Sunday school in October had an average of one hundred ninety children each Sunday. The services averaged above fifty adults per week, and midweek services had forty-nine average. Four have asked for baptism.

Bro. Sunna'a is a Jordanian by birth and he says, "I am going to Jordan this coming week and will baptize some of my relatives after much correspondence and much discussion on a previous visit there. Pray for these services and that God might lead us in all the things that he wants us to do."

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah reports that he has traded his scooter for a small car, Austin 1948 model. He says, "I can now take my wife and the children for all the services and sometimes can drive old people in my car. Now I think I can do more work as a missionary even if it rains, or even if it is too hot."

THE MINISTRY OF TEACHING

In Acts 4:13, we read, "As they observed the boldness of Peter and John, and noted that they were untrained laymen, they began to wonder, *then* they recognized them as former companions of Jesus" (N.E.B.).

Whether they were untrained laymen or trained workers, they all had the same job and were recognized for their efforts as having been with and were equipped for the work of Jesus.

We believe that we are living epistles known and read of all men. (1 Cor. 3:2.) If this is true, how important should our manner of living be? What about those we teach, and those who watch our every word and deed? Let each please his neighbor for *his* good, to edify him.

Paul said, "With all these witnesses of faith around us as a cloud, we must throw off every encumbrance, every sin to which we cling, our eyes fixed on Jesus, on whom faith depends from start to finish" (Heb. 12:1, 2, N.E.B.). There are many reasons in God's Word for striving to live a godly life, set good examples, and strive for perfection in our lives and in the lives of those we teach.

A real burden for teaching must come upon each of us who would effectively lay before others the true principles set forth in Christ's teachings. HOW TO CALL A PASTOR

A Committee Report

REALIZING that problems often arise for both the church and the pastor relative to the calling of a pastor to serve a church, and recognizing that ethical considerations are often involved, a committee was appointed by the General Conference Board of Directors to study the subject and report back to the Board. The committee realizes that it is impossible to make hard and fast rules for choosing a minister, therefore, what follows should be considered as guidelines for securing a pastor. Diligent study and consideration must be given to the choosing of a pastor, including the needs of the congregation and of the pastor, but prayer as a factor must not be overlooked. If we commit our way to the Lord and trust in him, we believe he shall bring it to pass.

How to Call a Pastor

I Consider the Needs of the Church

For many and varied reasons the needs of any church change. First and foremost a congregation should weigh the needs of the moment. In so doing, the congregation must be perfectly honest with itself, as well as being honest with the needs of the community.

Here are a few of the items to be considered. At this moment, do we need:

- A. Spirituality
- B. Closer fellowship
- C. Better organization
- D. More involvement
- E. Increase in Sunday school attendance
 Increase in worship service attendance
 Increase in membership
 Increase in financial responsibility
 - F. Evangelism of present attendance
 - G. Teacher training
 - H. Community good will

II Consider the Needs of the Pastor and His Family

- A. Housing and utilities available
- B. Salary—a pastor will have a difficult task of being a spiritual leader if he has physical needs for himself and his family which are not being met. A pastor's salary should be on the average of the living standard of his congregation.
- C. Fringe benefits
- D. Schools
- E. Will pastor and his family be happy here?

III After Considering the Needs of the Church and the Pastor—Whom Shall We Call?

- A. Check with members of congregation to see if they have a particular pastor in mind.
- B. Check with General Conference to learn of any pastors who are considering making a change and to learn of recent graduates.
- C. Should we call a pastor who is already ministering a church? Yes, but it may not be wise if he has just begun a new pastorate.

- D. Congregation must unanimously agree upon who should be called.
- E. Congregation must be warned that choosing a pastor is a difficult job and it is the business of that church only.

IV How to Make the Call-Methods

- A. In person
- B. Letter
- C. Telephone
- D. Whichever of the above methods is used, we suggest that the authorized personnel of the church contact one person at a time and let him know that he is the unanimous choice of the congregation. Some may say that it takes too much time to contact the pastors one at a time, but you can find out by phone or letter if he is interested.
- E. Include the following information.
 - 1. Salary and housing facilities
 - 2. Amount of vacation
 - 3. State and national meetings he is expected to attend.
 - 4. Statement of exactly what is expected. Such as:
 a) Number of services held each week and which ones he is responsible for. b) Is he required to teach Sunday school, midweek Bible study, and Bible school classes? c) Do you expect a printed bulletin weekly or monthly?
 - 5. Additional pastoral expenses paid by the church

V Agreements and Proposals

All agreements, proposals, and basic discussions, whether in person or over the telephone, must be backed up by a letter so both parties know exactly what is meant.

VI Recommendations

This committee would like to recommend and encourage longer pastorates. We feel that there is very little to gain in frequent changes. Many times the pastor has just become familiar with the people and the community so he can start to work effectively, and then he leaves.

We also recommend that churches abolish the practice of voting on the pastor every year or two. What pastor could feel needed if only hired for one year at a time? We feel there are many advantages to an indefinite time period. It provides for harmony between the pastor and the church when they are working for one purpose. Should we stop once a year and ask, "Are we going to hire him for another year?"

We would also like to suggest that the month of April be the time when inquiries of pastoral changes be made. Many times announced changes have been made as far ahead as a year to eighteen months. This is too far ahead of actual change.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING FINANCING AND SERVICE PROJECTS

We, the present elders of the Pennellwood Church of God, Grand Rapids, Mich., believe that God's Word teaches that the receiving of tithes and otterings, piedged and unpledged, constitutes the ideal and best means of financing the Lord's work and the entire church program.

Therefore, we conclude that the buying and selling of any product or article by groups within the church organization, or by the church organization itself, for the sole purpose of making a profit, even though that profit is to be used for the work of the church, is not in accord with Biblical principles and therefore with the principles of this church.

We also conclude that there are certain group service projects which afford opportunity for the development and witness of Christian character. Projects of this nature are those which are of benefit to the church, the community, or other people, whether or not a hnancial reward may be received.

One criterion of the acceptability of such a project is that the primary interest of the group in the project be that of the opportunity to be of service rather than that of receiving financial reward. "Freely ye have received, freely give," was spoken by Jesus in relation to good works.

It should also follow that, since the primary object is one of service, whatever tinancial reward may be forthcoming shall be used or applied toward some phase of the Lord's work rather than only for the enjoyment of the sponsoring group.

The following suggested projects (not a complete listing) may serve as a guide for activities which, when properly directed, may be a credit to our Lord and to this church as well as an aid in Christian development: securing Restitution Herald subscriptions—aids turthering of Gospel; handyman days-helping neighbors with leaves, windows, lawns, etc.; car wash days-do extra good work, second mile cleaning; rummage and garage sales—making items available to poorer folks; kitchen and dining service-relieving burden of family at wedding, etc.; paper pickup—aid in keeping clean, prevent fire hazards: special event dinners - as Father and Son, Mother and Daughter banquets, Thanksgiving: etc.

Also the tollowing is a suggested listing of use of any profits from projects: missionary fields; church building funds; church equipment; youth camps; national youth support; General Conterence support; tract distribution; evangelistic meeting support; state conference aid; etc.

Various details will need to be worked out in good conscience as various projects are developed, but we trust those conclusions and observations will guide the planning in this area of our Christian service. Remember, "Whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him" (Col. 3:17).

We continue to emphasize that the time

and energy of the Christian should be utilized in every way possible (working, teaching, calling, distributing) to fulfill the purpose of the church, which is to present Christ and his teachings that the church may be built and strengthened and that many may come to know him and to

Victory in Missions

ESUS chose helpers and teachers, as recorded in Mark 1:17. In his ministry he promised he would build a church. Today, he is still calling teachers, helpers, and missionaries to continue the church and its teachings. Each one of us has a responsibility to talk to others and to try to teach them the truth.

We find ourselves today with a great opportunity to teach others. In the United States there are millions of people who have not heard the gospel. Many of those who have heard socalled gospel preaching are not satisfied, and this gives us a great opportunity to be missionaries. Jesus is still calling individuals to accept him as their Saviour. When we accept him we automatically accept his teachings.

We should automatically become a missionary when we accept Christ. But, most people don't accept being a missionary when they are baptized, even though at this time they claim to accept his teachings. One of the main teachings he has given us is to tell

others about the gospel.

During Christ's time on earth, he spent his whole life being a missionary and trying to teach others. As he taught, he gave to everyone the Great Commission, which is: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Matt. 28:19). There are very few people who do as Jesus said. They are afraid of what others will say, or they think it takes too much time. Others think that mission fields are only in other countries. Very few of us would be Christians today if there had not been missionaries yesterday.

Christian parents are some of the best missionaries in the whole world. They teach their children the principles and doctrines of the Bible. They learned the Bible stories as children. and, as they grow into adulthood, they should search and study to become better Bible students and teach their own children. Most parents are missionaries, but the ones who are not must find help. This is where home

missions begin.

All Christians must be sincere in there beliefs. They must be enthusiastic about their faith and be willing to talk freely about it. When strangers come to church to learn more about the gospel, everyone should greet them warmly; the minister or teacher must make them feel welcome. When people want to go to church, or talk about the Bible, they want to return home filled. It is as if they were sitting down at the table to eat-they want to be filled. Once, when Robert Burns was in a strange city he felt desperately lonely. Wanting companionship, he visited a church where no one spoke to him. Before he left the church, he wrote a short verse telling of his emptiness and unacceptance. This is the way many people feel as they leave some church services. They are still hungry, and feel unaccepted. Have you ever gone to a church where the people were unfriendly toward you and the sermon was presented in a boring fashion? These conditions are the cause of a greater need for missions in our own country.

When one decides he will become a missionary he automatically sets all else aside. We know if we humbly follow Christ's example in the matter

of crucifying our own desires, we can't go wrong. Little mistakes and failures may indicate an overshooting of the Lord's leading, but we must still venture on by faith. Fear and faith are not fellow travelers. Through faith we can do anything we decide to do. God will give us strength to overcome evil and we can do his will.

As we go out to teach others we must remember that we are living examples for Christ. Christian lives, and the life of a missionary himself, are always under observation, even in the privacy of our homes. Our lives will speak powerfuly for or against Christ. As missionaries at home we must watch everything we do and say and make sure it will be for God's benefit. The things we say and teach for God must be from our heart. We must be sincere in our missionary work. No one can give what he does not have. This is where many missionaries fail. They realize that they are not giving their whole life to God; instead they are putting on a false front in trying to help others. They are kind to the people while they are around them, but when they get in the privacy of their home they complain. They begin to feel depressed and think that they shouldn't have to help these people who are not willing to accept God's Word. Men and women who decide to go into foreign missions must realize there are times of depressed feelings; and they will feel as if they are making no headway. This is when their faith should grow, and they should come closer to God. The first years in missionary work

General Conference Progress

MINISTERS VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT ASSOC.

The Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association is made up of ministers, churches, and conferences who unite to provide retirement benefits for ministers when they reach age sixty-five, or if disabled at age sixty-two. Each member church and minister pays one percent of gross income into the fund, with a minimum of thirty dollars per year for the minister and fifty dollars per year for the church or conference.

Forty-two ministers, forty-three churches, four state conferences, and the General Conference are enrolled in the program. Retirement benefits are presently set at fifty dollars per month and one fourth of that amount for a widow. The membership of this association has the right to improve these plans at any regular meeting of the association.

Many larger denominations began their retirement programs on a smaller scale than this. Churches and ministers who are not yet in the program are encouraged to make application to enroll. Each additional member will help to strengthen the group and make the plan better.

February 15, 1969, has been set as the deadline to enroll in the program as an initial member. An initial member does have certain benefits. There is an expense pool which includes meals at the conference and travel expense. In this wav each one attending pavs a like amount whether living near or far from Oregon. Local churches should encourage their pastors to attend this conference, and most churches do pay the pool expense.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT

The heart of an academic institution is the faculty and the library. The staff of Oregon Bible College is committed to the task of systematic development of our library. To improve the services of our library we are preparing a budget showing yearly expenditures for supplies, magazines, and books. A professional librarian is getting our card catalogs and other records in order. The staff is studying the present books of the library to improve the use of them, and to determine sections that need to be improved. Each staff member will study the parts of the library related to his teaching area, and prepare lists of books to be purchased as funds permit. We have appreciated assistance given by Northern Illinois University in loaning us materials and advising us in library procedures.

ADDITIONS TO LIBRARY

We have purchased the *Great Books* by Britannica. This is a 54-volume set that includes a two-volume Syntopicon that indexes the great ideas that have been discussed

throughout the ages. The Great Books deal with the major works in philosophy, literature, history, and science. This reference set is useful in almost any research.

We have received gifts of about thirty books thus far. Each donor has written asking the titles of books that we need most. We commend this wonderful cooperation. It avoids unnecessary duplication of the same books, and insures that the books are vitally related to the courses of the college. If others desire to give gifts to the library they can either give money or request titles that we would like to add. GOSPEL TEAM ACTIVITIES

There are many reasons for having gospel teams. They are a service to God; they give the students valuable experience; they keep the churches in close contact with the work of the college. The local churches see the college students daily, but gospel teams provide an opportunity for the students to become acquainted with the whole Church of God. During the Christmas vacation "The Brothers and the Sisters" visited churches in Virginia and Ohio, presenting programs of religious folk music. The Student Recruitment Committee has prepared a slide series that they hope to present in churches and youth rallies through the country. We envision a program of outreach with a Bible College program of some type sent to every state, youth rally, or conference, each year.

GOSPEL TEAM AND STUDENT RECRUITMENT FUNDS

The students have raised funds for their personal efforts to promote Oregon Bible College. I am sure they would welcome your gifts. As the College presents services, offerings received are placed in the Gospel Team Fund to pay travel expenses. The cost of a team to the fund is six cents a mile for travel, and fifty to seventy-five cents for meals during travel. We encourage your generous support of this fund to enable us to increase the outreach of the College. We suggest that churches at a great distance plan special crusades, so that when the College teams come you will be ready to receive a maximum blessing.

There must be much advance planning in regard to financing and arranging school and individual student schedules in preparation for all Gospel teams. The purpose is to plan so that the student receives maximum benefit both spiritually and educationally.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

Sunday schools don't grow, they are built up a piece at a time under the direct supervision of almighty God. We must work diligently to keep adding new pieces to our Sunday schools and simultaneously keep the old.

People attend Sunday school because they are searching for something. If we fail to supply it, we'll lose them.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL OPENING, as well as all of our teaching must be vibrant, alive, and meaningful. The opening must be supplemented with object lessons, new choruses, puppet shows, testimonies, and other pertinent activities. This, as well as every part of the Sunday school, must be used to plant the seed, hoe it regularly, and then constantly ask God to make it grow.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD MEETINGS can make or break a Sunday school. Consider the following suggestions:

- a) Conduct Sunday school meetings regularly and stick with it.
- b) Encourage teachers to speak up and feel free to bring problems to the board.
- c) The Sunday school board should establish the "cadet system": or "on the job training" for assistant and new teachers.
- d) Encourage teachers to explain their teaching techniques and why they work. Set up hypothetical classroom problems and have each teacher explain how he would cope with it.
- e) The Sunday school board must educate itself by conducting teacher training classes.
- f) The Sunday school board must constantly watch for and correct the four things which steal the pupil's attention:
 - 1) Discomfort
- 3) Disturbance
- 2) Distraction
- 4) Disinterest

Remember, the very next thing you lose after your pupil's attention is his respect.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE. Is your Sunday school board using every evangelistic arm it could? A workable follow-up and visitation system must at all cost be established.

- a) Each Sunday evening each teacher and the minister should receive a list of absentees of that Sunday morning.
- b) The teacher can elect to: 1) Make a home visit; 2) make a phone call; 3) send a card. (Turn to page 7)

WHY THE MINISTER OUIT

The article, "Why the Minister Quit," by Gordon Smith in the November Progress Journal was very frank and enlightening, as well as timely. I know it will bring back many memories, and provoke many discussions. As a member of the church here in Fonthill for over sixty years, we have served in many positions both in Sunday school and church; teaching many classes, now superintendent of the Sunday school, and adult teacher. We have served in positions from janitor to first elder; now on the trustee board and finance committee. We have served under all the pastors in this church, starting with F. L. Austin, and now under Emory Macy; ten pastors in all. F. L. Austin and C. E. Randall served 17 years each. Grover Gordon was here twice, and M. W. Lyon died while serving here.

Having had personal contact, and working with all of these pastors, I know why they all decided to change pulpits. Why they changed pulpits was of their own choice for different reasons. I know people say, "Why can a business man enjoy living in a community all his life, but a minister's usefulness is for just so long a term?"

A minister's life is different from any other profession. He is put on a pedestal, and has every move he makes watched; even the way he shakes your hand. I remember one minister that some of the members found fault with, just because his wife wore better stockings than they did. (They didn't know they were a gift from her sister, better off than she was.) Another thing, a preacher has to preach and minister to persons preschool, babes in Christ, as well as to those who sometimes know more about the Bible than he does. Then again, some people worship the minister, and cause others to become jealous. Again, each minister has a distinct personality, which draws or appeals to some persons, but repels or drives away other people. So, he is different from you and Then again, the congregation is also made up of different personalities, and what appeals to one does not appeal to another. Then, some want to run everything and everybody. Others are willing to "let George do it" all. There are some who are willing to give as well as to take, trying to work in cooperation and harmony. This kind of church is one that stands out and goes ahead.

If you have a dedicated minister, one who has the interests of the community and people at heart, and a congregation like-minded, then you have a pattern laid down by the Master himself, who said, "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to vou, do ve even so to them" (Matt. 7:12). We should be ever ready to help those who need help. This is not the work of the pastor alone, but for all the congre-

It was the vision, plans, cooperation, and sacrifice of the many members throughout their lifetime, that made it possible for the present board and members to cause our new sanctuary on Hillcrest Road to become a reality. We were greatly honored by having Bro. Randall here to dedicate the same, and to hold a five-day ession of meetings. The wonderful response he received from all the people in

will be the hardest but the following years will bring many rewards if you are sincere in your work. (See *Mission to the Head Hunters*, by Frank and Marie Drown.)

In preparation to accept Christ and become a missionary, one must first make sure his beliefs and doctrines are the truth; the right teachings of God. Others' words must not be accepted. We should search the Scriptures for ourselves. This will help prepare us by learning where things are found in the Bible. Also, in this process we will be strengthened and realize that God and Christ are the only ones who can help us. They are the only hope. This will give us a purpose to be missionaries. Our main purpose should be not for personal praise, but to try to bring others to Christ so they can be propagators. In Luke 24:47 we find a need and reason for foreign missions, "Repentance and

remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations." Also, "The Lord . . . is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (2 Pet. 3:9).

A young couple who were great missionaries in Ecuador wrote a book on their missionary work. They wrote, "Our story differs little from the stories of many other missionary couples; the hardships and dangers described are no greater than those they have faced. Our lives should be regarded as a typical account of missionary work on the Christian front in any primitive part of the world. It should be clear that we view ourselves neither as heroes nor as martyrs, nor are we gifted with special strength or talent. We are just ordinary folks filled with joy, energy, and enthusiasm for carrying on the Lord's work. Ours has been, and still is, a rich and rewarding life, full of happiness in our family circle. We would have it no other way." [Ibid.]

The rewards for being a missionary

are much greater than the work.

Great Commission to the church is still valid, and will be so until the Lord Jesus comes again. It was a challenge during the apostolic age when his spirit-filled disciples evangelized in the midst of an opposing pagan world. It was carried out dur ing the Middle Ages when the fires of the Roman inquisition lit up the gospel's human witnesses. Down through the ages which followed, the Great Commission withstood the powerful onslaughts of its persecutors, up to our modern age, when dauntless men and women dared to break gospel trails into every part of the world in obedience to it. Today the Great Commission holds forth an even greater, more urgent and promising challenge than ever before, as if it were the last call to arms before the closing of this dispensation of grace. What are we doing about it? Who is helping to shoulder the divine responsibility for world missions? (See World Missions by Martha L. Moennich.)

The Church of God Can Grow!

By the Editor

EDWARD GIBBON, eighteenth century English historian, authored the famous book, The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire. Most interesting to us is his chapter on "The Rise of Christianity," in which he lists the causes of the rapid growth of the early church. They are: 1) The inflexible zeal of the Christians; 2) the doctrine of a future life; 3) the miraculous powers of the primitive church; 4) the austere morals of the first Christians. We believe these principles could be applied profitably in our day, and the church would experience growth.

1) Inflexible zeal. The record in Acts is a testimony to the zeal of the early church. Having been in constant fellowship with the Master during his ministry, they knew the truth. Through God's power, all things Jesus had taught them were brought to their remembrance. (John 14:26.) Being witnesses to the things they had seen and heard came naturally. They had not invented Christianity; they were not attempting to lend credibility to fables. Jesus was alive from the dead -they had seen him! Could they be persuaded to say otherwise? They could not! When commanded by the Jewish council to cease preaching, they answered, "We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:28, 29). The truth was seething and boiling inside them—it had to come out.

In order for a person to have zeal today, he must have something inside. To have anything inside, it must be put there. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). Conviction comes by study. Many of our people have no

zeal in witnessing to others the truth of God's Word, because they have not studied it personally enough to be convinced of its importance and saving power.

2) The doctrine of a future life. The disciples lived in a world of Greek culture and philosophy. The philosophers had the questions, but not the answers, to the problem of man's destiny. This offered scant hope to dying men. At best, the doctrine of the immortality of the soul offered a shady existence in the nether world. To others, this life was an end in itself.

The gospel of the Kingdom, as demonstrated and preached by Jesus and the apostles, brought the first real hope to men. Death is certain and real, but the Son of God will really return to this earth, and there will be a literal resurrection of the dead to life again. In Christ's reign all enemies will be destroyed, including death, and there will be peace, health, and righteousness in the literal worldwide government of God on earth. In the face of death at the hands of their persecutors, these Christian martyrs could be calm, because they knew eternal life awaited them if they endured.

Too, the knowledge of coming events added a sense of urgency to the message of the early church. Jesus is coming and this age is coming to an end; shouldn't we be ready? God will judge the world, and destroy those not acknowledging him; on which side are we? Our friends, neighbors, and family need this message!

3) Miraculous powers. The evident purpose in the spiritual gifts imparted to Jesus and his apostles was the confirmation of the Word of God. The Gospel of John uses the Greek word for sign in every occurrence of the word "miracle" in the King James. The turning of water into wine, healing the sick, giving sight to the blind, raising the dead, all constituted signs of his Messiahship. The apostles repeated Jesus' words and acts of power, a witness that they were his followers. (Heb. 2:3, 4.) The Word has been recorded and confirmed, so the purpose for these miraculous powers has been fulfilled, and they have ceased.

This does not mean that God is no longer working. Through the power invested in his Word, we are still able to behold the miracle of changed lives, of love toward others. "The gospel of Christ... is the power of God unto salvation" (Rom. 1:16), and God's Word "is a living and active force" (Heb. 4:12, Moff.). We are not miracle workers, but God can work a miracle in us through his Word.

4) Austere morals. The pagan world could not help but take note of the purity and openness of the Christian community. Their faith was evident by their virtue. This was a great contrast to the heathen religious practices, as well as to the hypocritical religion of many of the Jews. Our actions are a result of our faith. Our way of living may be the only "Bible" some people will read; we must be careful.

We are convinced that the Church of God can grow today, if these four principles present in primitive Christianity are put into practice. Our aim is not to *swell* the church roll, but to experience real *growth* spiritually as well as numerically. God blessed the early church, and we believe he will bless us as we submit to his will.

These men carry on the work of the Gospel Publicity League and distribute large quantities of literature all over the world, including many of our tracts and other publications. The attendance at the Lighthouse Mission Church of God at Digby, Nova Scotia, continues to hold up well. Often as many as thirty-five are brought in by bus or car. The bus that was purchased last summer has been having some mechanical problems, so this has put a burden on the cars that are used.

The average attendance at the Centerville Sunday school was twenty-three during December. A few adults are now showing interest, so do pray for this new work.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The Philippine Conference held a meeting in Uddiawan on December 28-31, 1968. The program featured Bible studies, Bible quizzes, singing and preaching contests, recreation, a Communion service, exchanging of gifts, and preaching services.

Recently four were baptized at the Cordon Church. Pray for Fermina Walat, Vicenta Estanero, Jessie Hernandez, and Florentine Sanglay, as they begin their Christian walk of life.

MISCELLANEOUS

Mission Builders Appeal number twenty-one for the L'Anse, Michigan, Church is in the mails, and those who have not yet contributed are urged to send their contribution shortly. A down payment will be required soon to complete the purchase, possession can be acquired later in the summer. The Michigan State Conference has joined in the appeal for purchase of the property.

The Bible Church of God at Phoenix, Arizona, which had nearly two years left on the Pastoral Aid Program, has requested that the aid to it be discontinued. We praise God for the growth and zeal of this congregation to now be able to carry on the full pastoral program on their own.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM FOR O.B.C.

Need for additional specialized education for our young ministers has been recognized for many years by students, college staff, and the General Conference. Following graduation, many students have attempted to remove educational deficiencies at some other college, often in a haphazard manner. There have been repeated suggestions for a pastoral internship program for new ministers. The Board of Education has considered this need at many meetings in connection with making long-range plans for the College.

General Conference Action

Delegates at the August, 1968, meeting of the Church of God General Conference adopted the following motion: "We recommend that the Board of Education study the possibility of establishing an internship program for Oregon Bible College whereby graduating students may have practical pastoral experience before they enter the ministry."

The Board of Education, consisting of Alva Huffer, Ruth Halls, Dallas Demmitt, Don Overmyer, and Charles Pryor, has considered such a program in much detail. It has prepared a program whereby the motion adopted by the Conference can be implemented. This program was approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting, November 15, 1968. It will begin in September, 1969, at Tempe, Arizona.

Criteria for the Program

It seems that the internship program should be voluntary; not required. It should follow the student's completion of his four years of education. It would be open to ministers who have been in the field a few years also. It would last two semesters during the academic year. Persons in the program would have the status of students, not assistant pastors; this to avoid possible complications.

Selection of Location for the Program

The internship and graduate program should be conducted in an area where we have a strong local Church of God congregation, with a full schedule of services and a broad age range of members. If a large state university is in the area, the program could include selected courses from the university, and its facilities, such as library, could be utilized. Availability of Church of God professional persons would be helpful in that they could present special sessions for the students and serve as resource persons and part-time instructors.

Internship and Graduate Program to Begin at Tempe

It would be possible in the future to have the internship program in operation in more than one area of the country at the same time. It has been decided, however, that we begin the program in only one area and that Tempe, Arizona, would be an ideal place in which to inaugurate the program.

Two Church of God congregations are located in the area: Tempe Church and Phoenix Church. Arizona State University is located at Tempe, Arizona, only one block from the Tempe Church, with 23,000 students, a large modern library, and large campus. Arizona State University, moreover, recognizes Oregon Bible College credits. The writer is completing his doctoral program in college administration at this institution. Many professional persons are in the Phoenix and Tempe congregations.

Program of Studies and Experiences

Three broad general areas will be included in the program: pastoral, academic, and professional. Like university graduate programs, the precise schedule of studies and experiences would be flexible to a degree determined by the student's background, needs, and interests. Each program will include all three areas.

The President of O. B. C. will serve as administrator and coordinator of the program. He will work out the internship program with the individual student. Meetings will be held with all students in the program at regular intervals to coordinate the program, to provide a synthesis for their various experiences, and to evaluate progress. He will also conduct regular sessions in the area of research and theology.

Objectives of the *pastoral area* in the program will be: to gain understanding of the organization and function of the local church; to acquire insight into the position and work of the pastor; to have opportunity for practical experience in various areas of pastoral work.

The academic area of the program will have the following objectives: to provide opportunity for the student to have experiences in higher education through classes at the university and attendance at lectures, seminars, cultural events, and other university activities.

The *professional area* in the internship and graduate program will have as its objectives: to develop a professional self-image and to gain self-confidence as a minister; to be able to feel at ease in all situations; to have opportunities to gain understanding and a meaningful relation

We encourage all Berean groups to participate in the Berean Bible Quiz Contest and the Christian Speech Contest. The Berean Contest Manuals, outlining procedures for both contests, have been mailed to all groups. Bro. Jim Mickey is administrator of the contests, which will climax in the finals of the contests at this summer's International Berean Youth Conference, August 1-7.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

The first qualification of a good teacher is love. "Even though I speak in every human and angelic language and do not have love, I am as noisy brass or a loud-sounding cymbal. And although I have prophetic gift and see through every secret and through all that may be known, and have sufficient faith for the removal of mountains, but I have no love, I am useless" (1 Cor. 13:1, 2, Berkeley).

There are three main avenues of attention and expression of our love: God, Christ, and others.

- 1. Jesus said, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind" (Matt. 22:37).
- a) With all thy heart—to fix the affections supremely on him more strongly than on anyone else and be willing to give up all that we hold dear.
- b) With all thy soul—with all your life. To devote all of life to his service and be willing to die at his command.
- c) With all thy mind—to love his law and gospel more than we do the decisions of our own minds.
- 2. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). The only true attachment to Jesus Christ leads us to do *all* his will, to deny ourselves, to take up our cross, and to follow him through evil report and through good report. In the face of all ridicule and opposition, patiently to do his will. When we truly love him, his command of "Go and teach" is not a command but a blessed privilege; a blessed open door of showing how much he really means to us. Teaching will always be a real joy because we know he is with us, as he promised.
- 3. "All the law is fulfilled in one word, even in this; Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself" (Gal. 5:14). To fulfill the law is perfection!

For the teacher to present God's Word with this kind and degree of love is to have each pupil's present condition and future as heavily on his heart as is his own position before God, now and forever! A teacher thus dedicated will carry his teaching commission day by day, opportunity by opportunity, and not just for a few minutes Sunday morning. Calling in pupils' homes will be a personal joy.

Pray for the Holy Spirit [spiritual gifts, C.B.—Ed.] (Luke 11:13), because the first fruit of the Spirit is love. (Gal. 5:22.)

Urgency of Preaching the Gospel

X E OFTEN speak of "urgent" business, or an "urgent" message. By "urgent" we mean "pressing, calling for immediate attention; instantly important" (Webs.). While we may think our business is urgent, we would find on close examination it is not as urgent as God's business of preaching the gospel. The urgency of preaching the gospel is evident in the so-called Great Commission: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:15, 16).

Why is the gospel message so urgent? The fact that it is God's message makes it instantly important. The fact that there is but one gospel is also important. It is designated "the gospel." The Apostle Paul recognized that other "versions" and "perversions" of the one gospel were extant in his day, but by inspiration of God he pronounced an anathema on any who believed any but the gospel he received and preached. (Gal. 1:6-9.) There is life only in God's message; man's message is devoid of life.

What is the content of God's gospel message that makes it urgent? A study of God's message throughout the Bible will reveal that it is a two-fold message, encompassing "the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ" (Acts 8:12).

The Kingdom As Good News

The Kingdom message is the revelation of God's plan for blessing man—from the very beginning. In a preview of his coming reign, Jesus is heard to say to those on his right hand, "Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the

kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world [kosmos]" (Matt. 25:34). The garden of Eden was the first manifestation of God's Kingdom on earth, but Adam and Eve rejected God's rulership, so were expelled. God then "preached . . . the gospel unto Abraham'' (Gal. 3:8). God promised him land and seed, and it was good news to him. The message was further manifested to Israel, God's "kingdom of priests" (Ex. 19: 6). The throne was overturned in the reign of King Zedekiah of Judah; the kingdom to be no more until Messiah should come. (Ezek. 21:27.) It was offered to Israel through Christ, but they rejected their King, and the Kingdom is held in abeyance until Christ's second coming.

The Kingdom is good news to us, because as members of the Church of God we are "fellowheirs, and of the same body, and partakers of his promise in Christ by the gospel" (Eph. 3: 6), and, having been baptized into Christ, we are "Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise" (Gal. 3:27, 29).

The Kingdom should be good news to all mankind because of its nature. The love we know, the measure of health we have, the beauties of earth we see and enjoy, are but a sample of God's tomorrow. The joys of the Kingdom can be ours, IF we are properly related to God through his Son Jesus Christ; that is the other half of God's gospel.

Jesus Christ As Good News

To sin-cursed and death-destined mankind a Saviour has been provided. The Promised Seed was revealed to our progenitors, Adam and Eve. (Gen. 3:15.) He was destined to be born of

Abraham's family, Judah's house, and David's line. God declared Jesus to be that one. (Luke 1:31-33; 9:35.) His birth brought joy to those who looked for him. His death, burial, and resurrection are a source of joy and hope to the Christian.

What Jesus has done for us is good news-gospel. "Now I make known to you, brethren, the glad tidings which I evangelized to you, and which you received; in which also you have stood, and through which you are being saved, if you retain a certain Word I evangelized to you; unless, indeed, you believed inconsiderately. For I delivered to you among the chief things, what also I received, that Christ died on behalf of our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried; and that he was raised the third day according to the scriptures" (1 Cor. 15:1-4, Diaglott). Notice that the sacrifice of Christ is not the "first of all," nor the "only" gospel, but is "among the chief things" preached by Paul as gospel!

The message of the Kingdom would not be good news to us if there were no way of entering into it. At the same time, what Jesus has done cannot be good news to us, if he is not coming back to earth again to raise the dead and change the living saints; if he does not establish that righteous Kingdom of God on this earth! The gospel story is incomplete if either aspect of this twofold gospel message is neglected.

The Urgency of Preaching

Why is the preaching of this gospel so urgent? Because we can be saved only by believing this gospel and acting upon our faith. There is no other (Please turn to page 7)

The present General Conference of the Churches of God was organized at Waterloo, Iowa, in 1921, and the late Bro. James A. Patrick was elected the first president.

We pray the Lord's blessing on these changes and trust that God will direct and guide in the work of the youth, as well as in all departments of the General Conference work.

PARTICIPATION STATISTICS

Statistics for the past fiscal year reveal that there are eighty-six churches affiliated with the Church of God General Conference. Seventy-nine of these contributed to the goals for giving. A full report will soon be mailed to all churches.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

E. Milon Hall, Editor

The following material is presented to inspire and spark the presentation of each teacher. No one method is the right method all the time. Variation adds to the interest and receptivity of the students of every age. We would encourage the teachers of even the adult class to seriously consider using most of the following methods.

The teaching techniques used in any situation depend upon:

- 1) The aim of the lesson.
- 2) The content to be taught.
- 3) The possibilities of the environment.
- 4) The time allotted for teaching.
- 5) The time the teacher is willing to give to preparation.

CHALKBOARD. The most effective means of reaching the mind is through the eye, as the Chinese discovered long ago. We retain most readily those things we see, especially when coupled with a spoken or written message—hence visual education.

STORYTELLING. The storyteller brings dramatic joy and establishes truth learned and practiced. Storytelling is very practical for every age level. This was the method our Master-Teacher used most. "He spake many things unto them in parables . . . and without a parable spake he not unto them" (Matt. 13:3, 34). Apparently, Jesus figured that his hearers would be most benefited by hearing the truth told in "fictitious narrative of common life conveying a moral" (Strong's Concordance).

MEMORIZATION. Memorized Scripture gives what is needed to continually refresh ourselves in the Lord and his power. It provides the motive for refusing the bad and doing the good that every age needs.

DISCUSSION. This method makes for wider participation and interaction on the part of each. Each becomes more clear in his thinking as he puts his own thoughts in words; learns more about how to express himself and to evaluate.

VISUAL AIDS. Jesus said, "Blessed are your eyes: for they see and your ears: for they hear." Five hundred of the most commonly used English words have 14,071 dictionary meanings, hence the need for "seeing" what is taught. Visual aids: 1) reduce verbalism; 2) add variety; 3) make learning more meaningful and permanent; and 4) stimulate self-activity on the part of the pupil.

Other methods to use are: Notebook, Testing, Assignment, and Buzz sessions.

GLAD TIDINGS CHURCH OF GOD Fonthill, Ontario

The cornerstone of the Fonthill Church of God was opened May 16, 1968. It contained the following historical information: The first meeting held around here announcing these views was by Elder Shipman, in the Bouk Schoolhouse near Centerville, in 1845. The theme of the first discourse announced that the restored earth would be the future home of God's people. Mr. Peter Bouk was the first to be baptized, believing in the Bible truth. He was baptized by immersion on February 2, 1846, at the age of 21 years.

The faithful ones met in the Bouk Schoolhouse until about 1858, when the brethren built a church building, one-and-one-half miles east of Fonthill, just off Canboro Road. No records are available regarding the activities of the church until 1891 when the brethren began meetings in Dalton's Hall in the village of Fonthill.

F. L. Austin of Argos, Ind., visited the church about the turn of the century, and accepted the call to become the first pastor of the congregation in April, 1904. Under Pastor Austin's leadership, the congregation designed and built the Fonthill Church

in the heart of the village. The cornerstone for the building was laid November 2, 1908, and dedication services were conducted in February, 1909, by L. E. Conner of Cleveland, Ohio.

The Fonthill Church of God has grown under the leadership of the following eight pastors: F. L. Austin, 1904-1921; G. E. Marsh, 1922-1928; G. J. Gordon, 1929-1930; also 1948-1953; C. E. Randall, 1931-1948; M. W. Lyon, 1953-1956; E. M. Hall, 1956-1961; E. H. Goit, Sr., 1961-1962; and E. L. Macy, 1962 to the present.

The present building is called the "Font-hill Glad Tidings Church of God." The groundbreaking ceremony was March 31, 1968, with the service theme, "We will build to the glory of God." Inclement weather delayed excavation for one week, then we kept a close watch on the progress of the building. Laying of the new cornerstone was on May 26, 1968, sixty years after the former building was erected.

We took occupancy of the new building the first Sunday in September, 1968, meeting for Sunday school and worship services in the basement, until the sanctuary was completed. Bro. C. E. Randall delivered the dedicatory service, Sunday, November 17, 1969, to an overflowing attendance, and presented services each evening through the following Friday.

The new church edifice is located outside the present Fonthill village limits on Hillcrest Road, a three-acre plot of ground that was purchased and dedicated in 1962.



Christian Goal-Setting

WE ONCE worked for a large retail store; a member of a well-known national "chain." It seemed there was always a "sale" of some sort going on. The men at the top would review the results of the last sales event, and set goals. These goals were then passed on to the districts, the indvidual stores, the divisions and their heads, to the departments, and then to the individual salesperson. Each salesperson, according to his potential, was given a goal. All efforts were aimed at surpassing the goal! The growth and success of that firm was built on goal-setting.

Goal-setting is a Biblical principle; a Christian principle. The individual—the church, the conference—without a goal, will get nowhere; like a train, or a plane, or a boat without a destination.

Personal Goals

The Apostle Paul said, "Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:13, 14). The context indicates "those things which are behind," which Paul chose to forget, were his fleshly benefits, enumerated in verses 4-6; his birth as a Hebrew, his circumcision, his law-keeping, his being a Pharisce and a zealot against Christianity.

Now in Christ, Paul considered all of those things to be "vile refuse" that he may gain Christ. His goal now was that he might know Christ, and "the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made comformable unto his death; if by any means [he] might attain unto [the resurrection out of the dead ones]" (vv. 8-11). Paul's

personal goals involved the present and the future—likeness to Christ in character and destiny. He did set goals.

In setting personal goals we should consider our potential, as Christians, and aim to be like Jesus, our pattern; to grow up into him in all things. (Eph. 4:12-15.) Our ultimate goal should be like Paul's, to be made like Jesus in the resurrection at his coming. But, now, we should make ready for his return by working toward the goal of winning someone to Christ. Unless we are conscious of this goal it is doubtful if we will work toward it. Too, unless we have these meaningful individual goals, it is doubtful if we will aid much in reaching our corporate goals, as churches or conferences.

Church Goals

In the setting of church goals, we must first determine where we are now; what are our weaknesses, our strong points—our potential, or possibilities? As a starter, the church facilities might be surveyed. Are they adequate, attractive, well maintained? Next, look at the organization of the church. Is the essential work of the church being carried out smoothly? In the various departments of the church — Sunday school, Berean, ladies' group, midweek service—is there involvement and commitment? Is there a program of Christian education?

The acknowledgment of our needs will automatically suggest goals. Perhaps the goal of building new Sunday school rooms will emerge; or a teacher training course, or the division of a class into groups more conducive to effective teaching and learning. If your church has a part-time

minister, or part-time services, perhaps your main goal may be to increase to a full-time basis. Candid evaluation will leave a church group with no shortage of goals!

State Conference Goals

Some of our state or district conferences adopt goals, and carry out planned steps toward evangelistic outreach. These conferences have a function. Because of the usual geographical proximity, activities and meetings can be held more frequently than would be possible on a national scale. There also may be peculiar problems, or opportunities, that are best met on local ground. When the goals of the local churches are combined, the goals of the state conference emerge.

General Conference Goals

The General Conference "Decade of Development Program," from 1954 to 1964, provided the impetus for introspection and accomplishment on the local, state, and national level in the Church of God. Not that work has not been done since then, but we believe it is time to adopt another such program of goal-setting!

Perhaps it could be a "Decade of Evangelism Development," or Christian stewardship development? Aim and direction are needed NOW for our work!

To set a goal, and work toward it, though never quite attaining it, is better far than not making any effort at all. Calvin Coolidge once said, "We can't do everything at once, but we can do something at once." Let's be realistic. Let us evaluate our potential, and adopt meaningful goals as individuals, churches, and conferences, that we might more effectively work for God!

General Conference Progress

MINISTERS FUND

The Church of God General Conference over the years has maintained a Ministers Fund. Contributions have been made to the fund by churches and Sunday schools, some using their birthday offerings to make their contribution. These funds have been used in emergency situations for ministers and their widows. Three people are presently receiving a small amount of help from this fund each month.

Contributions have lagged the past few years. Some perhaps feeling that the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Fund would make this fund unnecessary. The balance is rather low at present and some contributions to the fund would be encouraged.

STAFF TRAVELS

The General Conference Staff members travel many miles each month conducting services, filling pulpits for pastors who are ill or away, speaking at special events, and attending special services.

Bro. Francis Burnett recently spoke at the Casey, Ill., church, and conducted a gospel team to the Michigan State Youth Rally at Garden Park, and held services in the three Grand Rapids churches on Sunday. Bro. S. O. Ross has spoken at Lombard and Casey, Ill., and Bro. T. M. Ferrell at the Oregon, Ill., church.

DISHWASHER FUND

Many churches and individuals have responded to the fund to acquire a dishwasher for Oregon Bible College and over nine hundred dollars has now been received. It appears that the washer is now in sight and will be installed, at least before the next school year begins. This will be a big step forward in the progress of Oregon Bible College, especially from a health standpoint.

GRADUATES AVAILABLE FOR PASTORATES

Four graduates of Oregon Bible College will be available for pastorates after graduation, which will be held on May 29, 1969. Stephen Bolhous, Verne Berry, Roger Cupp, and James Graham are seeking pastorates. Michael Hale and M. Raymond Hall are presently planning on further education. Bro. Berry had made arrangements to go to the new work at Tiburon, Calif., however, plans have changed. Any of these might be reached by writing to them at Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061.

The figures reveal that seventy-four percent of all mission expenditures go to the foreign field, including missionary support, literature, some travel and miscellaneous items.

In the current fiscal year the percentage going directly to the support of missionaries in the field will increase sharply, since additions have been made in this area. Most denominations plan on fifteen percent or more for administration, so we are pleased with only ten percent here.

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah, his family, and the brethren at Bangalore enjoyed the visit of Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence. Bro. and Sr. Lawrence arrived on February 11, 1969, and left Bangalore on February 17. They took active part in several services while there, including placing a foundation stone in the already completed building.

On February 16, 1969, ten were immersed into Christ Jesus for the remission of sin. They are: Prabhu Dass, Bro. Noel, Glory Dass, David Manoah, Bro. Thangaraj, Bro. Massillamani, Sr. Victoria, Sr. Mable, Sr. Kanta and Sr. Pushapam. May the Lord bless and guide these babes in Christ in the days ahead.

Bro. Manoah says, "The new work at Wilson Gardens is progressing well. I am giving them our truth and faith strictly. Please remember this work is your prayers. I am giving pastoral training to four youths and special training also for Sunday school teachers."

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The Philippine Conference has purchased a portable generator which produces enough power to operate a fan, refrigerator, light, and sound, all at the same time. This has been most helpful in the evangelistic work.

The radio program sponsored by the Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College is producing results. Bro. Ortiguero says, "We are very greatly inspired with

The youth of Digby church are raising funds to buy a bus. Several of them are planning to come to the International Youth Conference in August, and they would use this bus for the trip, and then make it available to transport Sunday school children.

Bro. Raymond Brown says, "We had a thrilling experience last week. From our kitchen window we saw two seals just a few feet offshore. On another occasion this winter we saw a whale in the basin."

MEXICO

Bro. Dean Moore reports his pleasure at being able to work full-time again in the Mexico mission work. He has rented a room in Mexico, and plans to spend at least one half of the month in the field. The balance of the time will be spent in Texas in study, correspondence, preparation for services, and miscellaneous work.

BASIC RULES FOR BIBLE STUDY

- 1. Proper Mental Attitude
- A) We must study with reverence for the Word of God. 2 Tim. 3:16, 17.
- B) Search the Scriptures with a grateful heart, thankful to God for the riches of his Word. 1 Thess. 2:13.
- C) Study with a sense of responsibility, knowing that God demands improvement in us. Jas. 1:22-25.
- D) Let our *one desire* be to be taught of God, and cast in the pure mold of the gospel of Christ. 1 Pet. 2:2-5.
- 2. Rules for Interpretation
- A) Put yourself, as it were, in the times, places, and circumstances of the sacred writers.
- B) Seek the literal meaning before the spiritual. Luke 13:6-9.
- C) Don't "read in" something that isn't there; many false doctrines arise because of this!
- D) Carefully consider the *context* before you draw a final conclusion. *Scripture is its own best interpreter*.
- E) Consider the character of the writer, the state and character of those to whom he wrote, the errors he opposed, and the truths he brought forth and established.
- F) Admit no doctrine as part of the gospel which is not agreeable with the general tenor of the whole. Col. 2:8.
- G) Interpret prophecy by history, not by speculation, conjecture, and fancy.
- H) Scripture was primarily addressed to particular people, yet its truths are of universal extent and perpetual duration, thus applying to us today. 1 Cor. 10:11.
- 3. Practical Rules for Bible Study
- A) Each time, as you open your Bible to study, ask God to open your mind and heart and fill it with the needed knowledge, love, and understanding.
- B) Remember that *each* and *every* word in the Bible was placed there by the guiding hand of Almighty God. 2 Pet. 1:19-21.
- C) Search the Scriptures patiently, not expecting to know in a day all they reveal, or to be in a day all they require. Jer. 29:13.
- D) Study with constant self-interrogation and self-application. What have I learned of this truth? What does this promise hold in store for me? Do I fully understand this warning? Am I living this to the best of my ability?
- E) Every time we study, let at least one fact be "burned in" our minds. If we must read the same sentence twenty times to properly understand and remember it, let us do so. Sometimes by writing down a fact on paper it becomes "locked in" our minds.

ARTHUR OTTO



SPECIAL SEMINARS

THE WEEK following the Midwinter Ministerial Conference we were privileged to have with us at Oregon Bible College two guest instructors, Bro. Alva Huffer and Bro. Dallas Demmitt. Each of these men presented a week-long seminar which all the students were required to attend. Some faculty members and other interested people also took the courses.

The first seminar, held for two hours each morning, was Brother Huffer's on Biblical Archaeology. This study was intended to acquaint the students with this relatively new science. We learned of many famous men in this field of endeavor, became acquainted with some of the methods of research used by archaeologists, and learned of some of the major monuments and discoveries in the area of Biblical Archaeology.

Archaeology can help us in the study of the Bible in several ways. It can confirm the Bible's records or accounts of events, shed light on some vague things mentioned in the Bible, and add missing pieces to the things needed in understanding the people and customs of ancient times. We were able to share in the firsthand experience of Bro. Huffer who had seen many of the things we studied and who had many excellent pictures of them for us to see. It is interesting to note that no archaeological discovery has ever disproved or disagreed with the Bible.

The second seminar, held each morning, was called Personal Understanding of Marriage. This course was aimed at discovering the proper attitudes toward marriage. Bro. Demmitt, who does marriage and family counseling for a living, had much to give us in this area. We spent time discussing the meaning of marriage, and what we as individuals expected from marriage. We all have attitudes about marriage and family life which we have gained from our own experience and background. Often these attitudes prohibit us from experiencing the fullest benefits from married life. Mates need to be understanding of the differences in their attitudes, and to learn to share and give during all of their married life.

We discussed some of the sweeping changes that are going on in family life. We tried to determine what our roles are in the family situation today; what is proper conduct for the husband and father, and also for the wife and mother. Aside from the classroom time, many students participated in individual or group discussions and counseling. We shared experiences and helped one another by telling of our own situation. The importance of learning to communicate and share was stressed very much. Much of the trouble in modern family and married life could be solved if only those involved would learn to communicate with one another. We concluded that marriage, to be successful, is "giving," giving in every way.

THREE AREAS OF GROWTH IN OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE



SPIRITUAL

REGON Bible College is an institution established and supported by the Churches of God of the Abrahamic Faith. Its aim is to teach and commit the gospel to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also. (2 Tim. 2: 2.) Its motive is to raise up pastors, teachers, lay men and women, for the spreading of the teachings of Christ. It is not a college organized to offer any world recognition. It offers no secular degrees or doctorates. Its purpose is to train young men and women in the Bible, and teach them how to lead Christian lives.

Oregon Bible College life is classified into three areas: 1) academic, 2) social, and 3) spiritual. The academic deals with the work put forth by the students, and the learning of the subjects offered. The social deals with the many group activities held to relieve the care and rigors of much study by the students. The spiritual deals with moral, sacred, devotional, and church events. In these three areas incorporated into the college life, the student is directed to the purpose for which the college was founded; that is, to prepare men and women for Christian service.

Academic

The academic life at Oregon Bible College is carried on in the classroom where the subjects are taught, and outside the classroom in the library and the private studies. Here, one exercises his intellect on the courses. The primary textbook of the courses is the Book of Books—the Holy Bible. It is carried in every class. The student is taught its contents and the many subjects related to it; such as, geography, history, English, teaching, speech, missions, preaching, philosophy, world religions, psychology, and Christian ethics. The content of the Bible is taught book by book from Genesis to Revelation over a four-year period. The related subjects are also spread out over these four years.

Social

The social life at Oregon is carried on at the basketball court, the baseball field, in the local parks, the banquet halls, and in the homes of the faculty. Here, one exercises his emotions. Its purpose is to stimulate fellowship, sportsmanship, and relaxation. The students organize among themselves basketball and baseball teams to play against one another. We have fall and spring breakfasts in the local parks, and two banquets during the school year at local restaurants. Occasionally, the faculty members invite the college students into their homes for fun and games.

Spiritual

The spiritual life of Oregon Bible College is the most important aspect of the entire college, for upon this is the college founded. This is carried on in the chapel, the lounge, where we have devotions, and at church. In the chapel each Monday and Friday we call our attention to the worship of God in song, sermon, and prayer. At certain times we have a "Day of Prayer" in the chapel emphasizing prayer — its need, power, importance, and use. Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evenings at the dorms are set aside for devotions, Bible reading, testimonies, and prayer. Every Sunday and Wednesday the student body attends local churches for worship with the pastors and

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

Need for additional specialized education for our young ministers has been recognized for many years by students and staff of Oregon Bible College, and the General Conference. Following graduation from Oregon Bible College, many students have attempted to remove educational deficiencies at some college or university, often in a haphazard manner. There have been repeated suggestions for a pastoral internship program for new ministers. The Board of Education has considered this need at many, many meetings in connection with long-range plans for the College.

Finally, a way to provide further education has become a reality, as this fall graduating students will be given opportunity, if desired, to enroll in the internship program of Oregon Bible College with the facilities of Arizona State University.

The president of Oregon Bible College will serve as administrator and coordinator of the program. He will work out the internship program with the individual student.

The pastor of the church or churches cooperating in the program will present information concerning various areas of the pastor's work to students: organization and function of the local church—constitution, business meetings, church board, duties of offices; schedule of church services; baptisms, Communion, weddings, funerals; pastor's study; technology of pastoral work; church public relations; and evangelism and visitation. Opportunities for practical pastoral experience in one or two congregations will be provided as part of the program.

Students will also be required to take either three or six semester hours of classes each semester at Arizona State University.

Arrangements will be made for students to become well acquainted with persons of other professions. Opportunities will be provided for attendance at meetings of professional organizations. Special classes in communication and counseling will be scheduled as part of the program, using persons such as Dallas Demmitt, and others.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE PROGRAM

The new staff at OBC has brought about a new and vigorous Christian Service Program. This program provides practical experience to the students through their work with nearby churches. From this work they gain experience in evangelism, teaching, and preaching; but more important, the students often find themselves having a meaningful relationship with Christ.

The Christian Service Program is set up so that the freshmen gain experience in evangelism. Once they become sophomores they are introduced to teaching; and later, as upperclassmen, they begin preaching the Word of God.

Many of the students are engaged in evangelistic work at the Rockford, Ill., Church which has shown the great work that can be done. Gospel teams have been traveling to many of our churches. These members often give up their vacation time in service to the Lord. One example of such a team is The Brothers and the Sisters who have given their message in song. This program will involve more of the upperclassmen than past programs. It will be set up so that work with the local churches will not be greatly affected.

Many students have felt the desire and urge to serve Christ for the glory of God and have felt personally involved with the Great Commission given in Matthew 28: 19. These workers are not going out alone, because in verse 20 Christ said, "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." It is this knowledge that Christ is with them that leads Christians to further service.

FOREIGN MISSION FELLOWSHIP

BOARDS AND COMMITTEES MEET

Many men and women of the Church of God General Conference give many hours of their time in serving on committees and boards in the operation of the General Conference work. These people give freely to this effort without pay. Much thanks and appreciation is due them.

The Sunday School Board held a meeting on April 12 at Oregon, Ill. This Board has met almost monthly this current year.

The National Youth Advisory Council met with Bro. Paul Shaw, Youth Director, on April 12, and made plans for next year's objectives.

The Board of Trustees of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Fund met in Oregon, Ill., on April 14. This Board has much responsibility in getting this newly organized Retirement Plan in operation.

The Mission Board met on April 22, and plans and recommendations for mission work in the next fiscal year were proposed and discussed.

The Council of Christian Education met on Saturday, April 26. This Council, which was established at the 1967 General Conference, is giving study and survey as to how our Christian education materials can be improved, and what the needs are in the education area of the Church of God.

The General Conference Board of Directors will meet on May 9 and 10, at which time the reports to the General Conference delegates will be approved, and the recommendations to be acted upon by the delegates at the summer conference finalized. This Board meets three times during the year, in addition to several meetings during General Conference. Many important decisions need to be made at each of these meetings which usually take two full days, meeting both daytime and evening.

Nearly forty people make up the above boards and committees, so one can understand the many man-hours involved in their meeting and travel time, in addition to study, correspondence, and planning time between meetings. May the Lord bless each of them in this manner of service.

MINISTERS RETIREMENT PROGRAM

Forty-five ministers, forty-six churches, and six conferences are now enrolled in the Retirement program. It already appears that this will be a sound program, especially so, due to our relatively young ministry. Average attendance at the Bangalore Church of God for the month of March was about two hundred, and at the Wilson Gardens church was thirty-five. Bro. S. S. Manoah writes, "On March 30 we observed Palm Sunday and the children, with palms in their hands, marched around the church singing Hosanna before the morning worship service."

NIGERIA

It appears that communication channels are now beginning to open up into Nigeria (the Biafran area). Our workers have not yet verified this; however, other organizations have gotten some mail through. We praise the Lord that our leaders and membership have remained firm throughout these troublesome months.

PHILIPPINES

Bro. Joseph Pascual, a former minister of another church group, who was converted to the truth some months ago, moved his family to the village of Zamora and has started a church work there, holding services in his home. He recently baptized his wife and son, and six others. Those baptized were: Mrs. Modesta Pascual, George Pascual, Mrs. Lucina Tepay, Alfonzo Ancheta, Florentino Sinico, Teodicio Sinico, Maria Sinico, and Domingo Sinico.

The Zamora group realized the need for a meeting place and bought an old house for their church services. The average attendance for the month of February was fiftyseven. Praise the Lord.

A severe drouth is gripping northern Luzon, where several of our churches are located. Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero says, "It has not rained since September, 1968, and small rivers and brooks are dry, and even the larger streams are drying up. Shallow wells for drinking water are dry and many crops have died because of no water."

This condition has caused many families to move from the area, and it may be possible that the whole Villaros congregation may be forced to move to another place. These people depend entirely upon their little plot of rice to feed them and if this does not develop they are in serious trouble. Pray for rain for this area that the drouth might be broken.

MEXICO

The Saturday school is becoming more stabilized and the attendance is more regular, with an average of thirty-two for March. Three classes are held, with Sr. Martinez teaching the little ones, six and under; Sr. Rachel Krogh teaching the middle age; and Bro. Dean Moore teaching the older group on the Saturdays that he is in Mexico.

On March 1 Bro. Francisco Martinez and Srs. Krogh and Aldrich traveled to the village of Potosi for services, with over twenty children at a Sunday school service. This was followed by preaching service with fifty-one present, twenty-five of these being adults. Regular services are held each Sunday at Saltillo and Bisnaga. The average attendance for March was thirty-five at Bisnaga and fifteen at Saltillo.

Bible study and prayer service has been held each Wednesday evening at the home of Bro. Francisco Martinez.

LEBANON

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a is translating the Systematic Study Course lessons and two hundred have enrolled in the course in Lebanon and Jordan. One of the Jordan converts is now holding services in his home.

"Every day they went steadily on with their teaching in the temple and in private houses, telling the good news of Jesus the Messiah" (Acts 5:42, N.E.B.).

Personal calling by the Sunday school teacher is HALF of his work! Personal calling can make a teacher-pupil relationship of eternal value, but the teacher has to go to the pupil. A teacher can use all the methods of teaching in the book and still fail to show Jesus to his pupils—but when he calls in the pupil's home, he is showing Christ's love in action.

Most of Jesus' ministry was done by going to the people. Though he did often teach in the temple, yet he was constantly on the go to reach people on their home ground to show them his love. The apostles went about establishing churches, and their method was "from house to house." (Acts 20:20; 2:46.) Unless the Sunday school teacher goes into the homes of pupils and prospects, he is saying, "You, as students, do not have to obey Jesus' command to go and teach what I teach you."

As the teacher goes calling, there are several points worth remembering and utilizing. These are:

- 1) Rely on God's direction in prayer before you go out, and on his blessing as you speak. (1 Thess. 1:5; 1 Cor. 2:4.)
- 2) As you go, believe that God IS with you. Expect to have people confess their need of Jesus and salvation through him. Expect to have your pupil's entire family respond favorably to your invitation to attend Sunday school next Sunday. (Phil. 1:20.)
- 3) Be courteous and kind. Be pleasant in conversation; showing your love for them. Be honestly complimentary about something in their home early in your call, but as you state the reason for your call keep on that subject. Do not let yourself be led too far or too long from the subject of their need of Jesus, his saving blood, and their need of church fellowship.
- 4) Have a definite time to go calling. We set and adjust our time for the important things we want to do. There is no more important thing we can do than to reach others for Christ! Time is the one thing God has given us to see how wisely we would use it. Ask for wisdom therein.
- 5) Be clean and neat, with sweet breath. It is not a Biblical quote, but a wise saying, that "Cleanliness is next to godliness." We are all careful about our personal hygiene so as not to offend our loved ones—let us use the same respect to show the greatest love man can know.

HAS YOUR MINISTER'S PAY SUDDENLY BEEN REDUCED?

April 15, 1968, will best be remembered by laymen as the deadline for income tax payments. Yet on that date, unnoticed by most of us, a Social Security change went into effect that vitally affects a great many ministers

From that day on the option of being under Social Security has been taken away. Now all ministers (except those whose conscience forbids it) will pay Social Security tax. And those who were already covered had their payments increased—with a "tax bite" that goes much deeper than it does for employed laymen. That's because Social Security regulations designate ministers as "tolk employed" agreement the security regulations. isters as "self-employed" persons. As such, they are required to pay two thirds of the total tax. "Employees," on the other hand, pay only one half of the tax, with their em-

pay only offer half of the tax, with their employers picking up the other half.

Let's take a minister earning \$7,500 a year. The 1968 tax rate was 6.4 percent of his salary or \$480. A \$7,500 corporation employee, for example, would pay only 4.4 percent or \$330. Starting in 1969, the tax

This becomes a drastic pay reduction for some ministers and an increasingly severe drop even for those who have long been on the Social Security program—coming at a time when living costs are climbing.

If you feel that your minister should be earning more, not less, than he did last year, it would be perfectly correct to express your concern to a member of the church board.—Ministers Life and Casualty



Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors in Oregon, Illinois, May 9, 1969. The report is presented in this form so that delegates to the 1969 General Conference business sessions (July 27-August 1, 1969, Camp Alexander Mack) will have opportunity to study it and form opinions and seek suggestions from the groups whom they will represent.

This report covers only the first eight months of the current fiscal year. Those activities which occur between now and General Conference will be reported orally at Conference. The activities and accomplishments of the several departments of the General Conference are reported herein and some comments and observations of the work as a whole are also included.

We feel that much progress has been made in most areas of the Conference work and we praise God for his blessings. We trust that further progress will be made in the remaining months of this year and that the next church year will be one of growth and revival in every local church to the glory of God.

Youth Department

The Director of the Berean Youth Department is Bro. Paul Shaw. Bro. Shaw has tendered his resignation as of September 1, 1969, and Bro. Francis Burnett of Oregon, Ill., has been named by the Board of Directors to succeed Bro. Shaw as the National Youth Director.

During the year, Challenge magazine and the Youth Workers' Memo have been published regularly. Bro. Kent Ross, of Dayton, Ohio, was named as the new editor of Challenge and has been doing an excellent job of publishing the magazine since January 1, 1969. Berean lesson manuals continue to be mailed to youth leaders, pastors, and all those who request them. The editors for the junior manuals are Bro. and Sr. Russell Magaw, and the editor of the senior manuals is Bro. Eugene Stilson.

Contact continues to be maintained with state and district youth directors in an effort to improve the total youth program.

The fourth annual meeting of state and conference youth directors was held in Oregon, Ill., in the fall of 1968.

A slide-sound set was made based on the 1968 International Berean Youth Conference. The set has been viewed by many churches and youth groups since its release in January.

A program of Berean contests under the direction of Bro. Jim Mickey experienced another successful year, with more churches and conferences than ever before participating in the Berean Bible Quiz Contest. The Christian Speech Contest was also very successful.

The annual Berean Scholarship to Oregon Bible College was awarded to Ron Macy on the basis of testing which was held at the 1968 Berean Youth Conference.

Enthusiasm and participation in Youth Week services were at an all-time high. The third annual International Youth Week plaque for excellence in carrying out the observance of Youth Week was again awarded to the Bereans of Faith Chapel Church of God at Peoria, Ill. Because of the overwhelming response to Youth Week by so many churches, it was decided to have second, third, and fourth place winners. Second place went to Digby, Nova Scotia; third place to Dayton, Ohio; and fourth place to Blood River, La.

A gospel team is scheduled to tour churches and youth camps in the midwestern and southeastern states during June. Bro. and Sr. Rex Cain will be the sponsors of the Caravan. The theme of the "Challenge: Southeast" Caravan will be "Up With Christians."

A two-month subscription campaign for *The Restitution Herald* was held in which 226 new subscriptions were sold.

Once again the young people of the Church of God raised their giving standards during the delegate sessions of the 1968 Berean Youth Conference, having reached their alltime high giving goal for 1967-68 of \$8,500. They decided to raise their giving goal for the 1968-69 fiscal year and set it at \$10,000. The young people are to be commended as they take on more responsibility each year in the financial support of the youth work. The youth budget and giving goal are maintained within the framework of the budget and goal for giving of the General Conference. Two stewardship projects were carried on to aid in the raising of these funds as well as to teach good stewardship. The Coins-for-Christ Crusade was held for the sixth consecutive year with a large number of Berean groups participating. In addition to the regular Coins-for-Christ Crusade this year, a \$100 Club was formed, and those churches giving at least \$100 will become members of the Club. The Mission Dollar Club has a membership of over 200. These Bereans agree to contribute \$1 per month for the year.

The 1968 International Berean Youth Conference, with a theme of "Power Through Prayer," was a source of great inspiration to those who attended. Plans for the 1969 Youth Conference include an attendance campaign, with an all-out effort to have the highest number of campers in the history of the Berean Youth Conference. The theme for the 1969 Youth Conference will be, "Now Is the Time!"

The young people of the Church of God are to be highly commended for their enthusiastic participation in the local, state, and international youth program of the church. There is ample evidence that our young people are responding to the work set before them with maturity, good judgment, and enthusiasm, and the Lord is blessing their efforts.

Sunday School Department

The first meeting of this Board was August 6, 1968, at Camp Mack. Willis Turner was elected Chairman and Milon Hall was elected Secretary. The other members are Robert Petry and Bernard Hightower. Terry Ferrell is the liaison between the Sunday School Board and the General Conference Board.

The Sunday School Board asked and obtained permission to have Monday of General Conference designated as Sunday School Day.

They asked and were given a half page in the Progress Journal to promote Sunday school work.

Considerable time has been spent by the Board obtaining, studying, and evaluating material published in the interest of Sunday school work; and in making plans for General Conference Sunday School Day and subsequent Sharing Sessions.

The Sunday school of each church is the greatest evangelistic arm of that church! We ask for your prayers for greater vision, faith, and blessing for the promotion of each Sunday school and the establishment of new ones.

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department is responsible for the publication of *The Restitution Herald*, Progress Journal, *Challenge*, *Truth Seeker's Quarterlies*, *Songs of Truth*, *Systematic Theology*, Vacation Bible School materials, tracts, booklets, and other literature.

About 2,400 copies of The Restitution Herald are printed each month. The Berean campaign of last November netted 226 subscriptions. Favorable comments continue to be received on the full-color covers, and general content of the magazine. Herald rack users report that the racks are soon emptied, where there formerly were copies left over. Changing to a monthly magazine would have some effect. To solve the problem of having the rack empty most of the time we would suggest two things: 1) order more copies, and 2) put out only part of the copies at a time. The special March issue on Israel was well received. The Consulate General of Israel in Chicago alone used 1,100 copies of the issue, and almost every Jewish agency here and abroad received a copy. At least half of all Church of God families do not receive The Herald, including many of our ministers. Faith and spirituality must begin at home; if we do not appreciate the printed truth, how can we expect the world to do so?

About 3,850 copies of Progress Journal are mailed each month to Church of God families. About 1,400 copies of *Challenge* are sent to the youth of the Church of God every two months. These are sent without charge as a service of the General Conference and Youth Department.

About 8,200 Truth Seeker's Quarterlies are printed each quarter, and nearly every Church of God Sunday school uses some of these materials. One editorial change took place during the year, when Sr. Louise Lapp resigned as

editor of the junior quarterly, after fourteen years of dedicated service. Sr. Ruth Lewis is the current editor. The editors and writers of the quarterlies deserve our appreciation.

The Vacation Bible School material was reduced to five days, in order to reduce the large annual deficit; very few schools were using the full ten lessons. This material was edited by Francis and Iris Burnett. They, and their staff are to be thanked. This year's lessons were the last in ten-year cycle.

Interest in the free Systematic Bible Study Course appears to be lagging. As of April 15, more than 1,500 persons had enrolled in the course, and 412 had completed it; including 333 in this country, and 79 abroad. The course is a valuable tool, and its use should be promoted widely. Mats and camera-ready advertising copy are still available.

The Church of God remains in an unfortunate position in publishing because of the low volume of sales, necessitating the subsidizing of most of our publications. We believe this position can be improved as our churches and church families use our materials, and subscribe to our magazine, but, especially, as we learn to utilize our publications for their worth in evangelism. "These glad tidings of the kingdom will be published in the whole habitable, for a testimony to all the nations; and then will the end come" (Matt. 24:14, Diag.).

Mission Department

The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference is made up of five members. The Superintendent of Missions, S. O. Ross, is Chairman of the Board. Elected Board members are Warren Sorenson, Lee McQuinn, Edith Eades, and Mardy Lawrence who is the Secretary of the Board this year. The Board has met three times during the year, plus several meetings during General Conference.

The Mission work of the General Conference has shown steady progress. Information and promotion of the various avenues of the work have been brought to the membership by bulletin insert sheets, a Mission Newsletter twice during the year, and the regular monthly mission page in Progress Journal.

The Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College held the second annual Missionary Conference in March. The Mission Board was pleased to cooperate with this effort, and we feel that the conference was a splendid success. The Bible College students who belong to this Fellowship are sponsoring the radio program in the Philippines each Sunday noon. This program has been a blessing to the work there. A new church has been started in the Village of Zamora. Bro. Joseph Pascual is pastor of the new congregation and several have come to Christ through the preaching and teaching in this village.

The mission work in Mexico has been blessed in having Bro. Dean Moore return to the work on a full-time basis. The Moore family continues to live in Texas, and Bro. Moore commutes to the work in Mexico, giving to it the male leadership and supervision needed. Bro. Francisco Martinez is pastor of the Saltillo church and Srs. Rachel Krogh and Alice Aldrich carry on the Saturday school in their home, as well as teaching in services at the various villages. They translate and prepare Sunday school and other teaching materials.

In India, Bro. S. S. Manoah has begun a second church in Wilson Gardens, a suburb of Bangalore. Attendance continues to grow in the original church and the work has been richly blessed of God. Bro. Manoah is giving special training to four young men in preparation for becoming pastors.

The Lighthouse Mission Church in Digby, Nova Scotia, is progressing well under the leadership of Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown. The Sunday school attendance has been hitting new highs, and a new work has been started at Centerville, a small community about fifteen miles from Digby. A second Maritime Conference and Bible School will be held in August, 1969.

Nine pastors continue to receive partial support in Nigeria, and there have been many baptisms during the year. A school has been opened and progress made despite the severe strife due to the civil war that is raging in Nigeria. Several of the churches have received much damage, and many people have died from starvation and the ravages of war. CARE packages and other relief shipments are now reaching into this war-torn area.

Lebanon, the newest supported work of the General Conference, is showing signs of growth and strength. Several have been baptized and the congregation at El-Chibbak has secured a new and larger hall to rent for their services. The Sunday school attendance holds at about two hundred average, and the adult attendance at the Sunday morning worship, the Sunday evening service, and at midweek service all average over fifty. Several have been baptized in Jordan also, due to the preaching and teaching of Bro. Jamal Sunna'a as he returns to his homeland on occasions. One of his converts is beginning to hold services in Jordan.

Bro. Sunna'a has translated and republished the Systematic Bible Study Course lessons and about two hundred are enrolled in the course. Translation and distribution of literature continues to be an important part of proclaiming the gospel message. "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached [published, Diag.] in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."

Two churches, L'Anse, Mich., and Pomona, Cal., have received Mission Builders assistance this fiscal year. The former, which provided a church building for the congregation in the Indian reservation of Northern Michigan, was one of the more productive appeals to date.

Nine churches have received Pastoral Aid during the year. This program has done much to help many small struggling congregations secure a full-time pastor, and to build the church and assist in its growth.

We are thankful for the many letters received, most of them come in response to some piece of literature. It gives an opportunity to witness of the truths that we hold and to proclaim the gospel message. Praise the Lord for the many doors of opportunity provided to the Church of God. May we ever be able to go through these doors and reach the lost and bring them to salvation.

Oregon Bible College

Oregon Bible College is completing its thirtieth year as an institution of higher education for the Church of God General Conference. It is dedicated to the task of educating young men and women for the high calling of Christian service. Prayers and faithful support by its many friends enable the College to accomplish its purpose and to experince continued growth in future years.

The 1968-69 school year began last September with an enrollment of forty-five students. Forty-two of these were

full-time students; three were part-time students. Fifty-five students enrolled for the second semester. Of these, ten were part-time students. Six seniors were graduated, Thursday, May 29, 1969: Verne Berry, Stephen Bolhous, Roger Cupp, James Graham, Michael Hale, and Ray Hall.


Administration and faculty during the past year included: Alva G. Huffer, President, instructor, and Chairman of the Board of Education; John R. Lewis, Vice President, Registrar, Director of Admissions, and instructor; Eugene E. Stilson, Director of Christian Service, Library Advisor, and instructor; Francis E. Burnett, Dean of Students and instructor; Stanley O. Ross, Director of Business Affairs and instructor in missions. During the second semester, Ruth Lewis was instructor for a weekly night class in Teaching Media.

During the week following Ministerial Conference in January, two seminars were held for all students and visitors who enrolled for the classes. Dallas R. Demmitt,, Family Counselor from Phoenix, Ariz., taught classes two hours each morning on Personal Understanding of Marriage. He held numerous sessions with individuals and groups during the afternoons and evenings. Alva Huffer taught a seminar course the first half of each morning on Archaeology and Art History in Bible Lands.

The staff included also: Edith Eades, men's housemother; Elna Ross, women's housemother; Nora Anderson, Helen Pryor, Orpha Ferrell, Roslyn Berry, and others, who served in the cafeteria. Edith Eades and Elna Ross served also in the library. Olive Stoffregen was employed to process books and periodicals for the library.

A new edition of the *Student Handbook* was prepared last August under the direction of Francis Burnett, Dean of Students. The College staff approved the revised edition which incorporates many suggestions made by the Student Council from the previous year and by members of the Board of Education. The administration, faculty, and staff of Oregon Bible College seek to create the proper academic, spiritual, and social environment in our college so that each student can realize his greatest potential in Christian life and service.

Last October, the freshmen traveled to the Sauk Valley College in Illinois to take the ACT test in the American College Testing program. Each year, freshmen at Oregon Bible College will be required to have taken this test. Students planning to enroll are urged to take this test during their senior year of high school. The ACT test is given annually in high schools, or at colleges, in most communities. Oregon Bible College has a special code number. It is 1110. When students take this test, they should put this



number on their test. Results of the test then will be sent to John R. Lewis, our Registrar. This program is a step forward in our college's pursuit of higher standards and will provide a basis for counseling students.

The heart of any institution of higher education is its library. It is one of the seven major areas in a college evaluated by an accrediting agency. During the past year, special attention has been given to the development of our library. Eugene Stilson, Library Advisor, has conducted a thorough study of our library and its needs. He has consulted with specialists at nearby universities and colleges concerning library development in relation to curriculum. He has contacted many professional persons in the Church of God as resource people. Friends of our college continue to contribute funds to purchase needed books. The Board of Education, through this year's Booster campaign, has given special emphasis to using these Booster contributions for the purchase of books for our library.

Pastor Warren Sorenson, Macomb, Ill., was guest speaker for the Christian Emphasis Week in October. His theme was "Growth in Christian Life." The Foreign Mission Fellowship of the College sponsored its second annual Missionary Conference of the Church of God at Oregon, Ill., March 29, 1969. Guest speaker was Bro. Raymond Brown, our missionary from Digby, Nova Scotia. The annual Junior-Senior Weekend was held April 25, 26, at the College. This was the fifth year for this event. Special Prayer Days also were held during the year.

Three semester hours credit at Oregon Bible College could be acquired by persons, if they so desired, by going on President Alva Huffer's annual Holy Land and Europe Tour, arranged through Western World Tour and Travel. The twenty-one-day tour, June 21-July 12, 1968, included: Rome, Istanbul, Izmir, Ephesus, Pergamum, Athens, Corinth, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Hebron, Jericho, Dead Sea, Sea of Galilee, Tiberius, Capernaum, Cana, Nazareth, Haifa, Caesarea, Tel Aviv, Florence, Paris, London, and other places of Biblical and historical interest.

Faculty members are furthering their education and working on additional academic degrees. Eugene Stilson is working on his Master's Degree at Northern Illinois University, DeKalb. He completed two courses during the fall semester, one course during the spring semester, and is taking courses this summer. John Lewis is working on his Master's Degree at the same university and is enrolled in courses this summer. Francis Burnett plans to enroll in two courses at Arizona State University in Tempe during the first summer session. Alva Huffer hopes to complete his Doctor of Philosophy Degree at Arizona State University during the next year.

An Internship and Graduate Program for Oregon Bible College will begin in September at Tempe, Ariz., utilizing facilities of the Tempe and Phoenix Churches of God, as well as Arizona State University. This program has been developed by the Board of Education and was approved by the Board of Directors last November. It implements action taken by delegates at the August, 1968, meeting of the General Conference. This program is open to ministers and former graduates as well as to persons newly graduated from the College.

Three broad general areas will be included in the internship program: pastoral, academic, and professional. The precise schedule of studies and experiences will be flexible

and determined to a degree by the student's background, needs, and interests. Objectives of the academic area of the program will be: to provide opportunity for experiences in higher education through classes at the university and attendance at special lectures, seminars, cultural events, and other university activities; to acquire experience in research methods and use of library materials. Objective of the professional area will be: to develop a professional self-image and to gain self-confidence as a minister; to be able to feel at ease in all situations; to have opportunities to gain understanding and a meaningful relationship with persons of other professions: educators, psychologists, social workers, physicians, etc.; to acquire knowledge and skill in communication and counseling. Church of God professional persons will serve as resource people and parttime instructors.

Oregon Bible College Alumni Association continues to be an important source of encouragement, spiritual enrichment, and blessing for the College. An alumnus is anyone who has been graduated from the College, been granted an honorary degree, or satisfied requirements of the Bible Training School (predecessor of Oregon Bible College), or has received fifteen or more hours of credit from Oregon Bible College. In the last instance, one is considered an alumnus only when his class has been graduated. The Alumni Association meets twice each year, during the General Conference and during the Ministerial Conference. Current officers are: Darrell Maddock, president; Rex Cain, secretary; and Kent Ross, treasurer.

As Oregon Bible College completes it thirtieth year as a theological college for the Church of God General Conference, our thoughts are summarized in three words: gratitude, appreciation, and optimism. We have gratitude for God's wonderful blessings on the College during the past three decades. We have appreciation for the prayers and loyal support of God's people. We have sincere optimism as we look forward to the future. We believe that Oregon Bible College is a college with a future! Administration, faculty, and students seek to join together in the pursuit of academic excellence, centered in the Lord Jesus Christ, and founded squarely on the Word of God.

General Services

In addition to the departmental activities covered in the preceding reports the Church of God General Conference staff performs many services for churches and conferences. Speakers are provided for special services when pastors are away or ill, and many public relations appearances are made within the church membership and at civic functions.

Much information is given through correspondence and questionnaires for governmental, civic, and religious agencies. Much correspondence and counseling are required and many opportunities provided for witnessing for Christ. Many of these taken separately may seem insignificant yet they do take time and are an important part of the overall functioning of the General Conference programs.

General Conference Finances

While the contributions to the Goals for Giving have fallen slightly behind at the midyear point, we feel confident that the needs will be met by the close of the fiscal year. Costs of all services are increasing, printing costs arrising, expenses in the operation of Oregon Bible College are rising steadily, and our mission work is expanding.

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the sacrificial giving of many of the membership and we pray God's blessings upon each of them and upon all the work of the Church of God General Conference during the balance of this year, and may it even grow stronger and more fruitful in the years ahead.

Recommendations for 1969

1) We recommend that a Youth Caravan be held in the summer of 1970, provided it is deemed advisable by the youth delegates at the 1969 International Berean Youth Conference, and providing sufficient funds are appropriated in the 1969-70 youth budget.

- 2) We recommend that, for the purpose of promoting home missions and involving the total membership in a revival effort, the year 1969-70 be known throughout the Churches of God of the Abrahamic Faith as "Jubilee Witnessing Crusade," and that the crusade culminate in the Jubilee conference of 1970.
- 3) We recommend that each local church of the Church of God General Conference enter into a positive evangelistic program for Jubilee Year, and that effort be made to increase both attendance and membership by at least 10 percent. (Explanation: See recommended procedures for implementing this home mission effort on page 8 of this issue.)

SPECIAL REPORTS

Board of Education Report

The Board of Education fulfills a vital function in the higher education program of the Church of God. This Board acts in an advisory and promotional capacity for Oregon Bible College and makes specific recommendations regarding its operation to the Board of Directors of the General Conference.

Alva G. Huffer, President of the College, is chairman of the Board of Education, and the four other members of this Board are appointed, each for a term of two years, by the Board of Directors. This Board meets during General Conference each August, during the annual ministers' meeting, and at other times of the year.

Current appointed members of the Board are: Ruth Halls, Cleveland, Ohio; Dallas Demmitt, Phoenix, Ariz.; Don Overmyer, La Porte, Ind.; and Charles Pryor, DeKalb, Ill.

Meetings of this Board are given over to study and discussion of the needs of Oregon Bible College, proposed improvements in curriculum and procedures, and specific recommendations to the Board of Directors. This Board worked out details for the Internship and Graduate Program for Oregon Bible College which will begin at Tempe, Ariz., in September.

The Board of Education sponsors the Booster Campaign each year during May. Sr. Ruth Halls planned the campaign for this year. Funds received through this campaign are used for special projects for the College. Major portion of funds received will be used to purchase needed books for our library.

The Board is currently considering long-range plans for the College. It is seeking to determine the best manner in which our future ministers can acquire the best possible education to prepare them to serve the Lord in an adequate way.

Board of Arbitration and Counseling

This is a standby committee ready to assist churches and conferences when called upon to help solve problems that frustrate the progress of the work. It is also available to ministers for assistance in meeting difficult situations in which they feel help is needed. During the past year the

committee's services have not been needed, for which we are grateful. However, we want the members of the General Conference to know that our services are available whenever we can be of assistance. Clyde E. Randall, chairman.

Ministers Retirement Association

During the last General Conference, the Ministers Retirement Fund was officially set in operation with the adoption of Rules and Regulations for the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association by the member conferences, churches, and ministers. The target date for payment of pensions has been set for January 1, 1970. It was necessary that there be a time lapse between the start of premiums and the payment of pensions in order that a fund be built up sufficient to carry the pension payments.

There are presently forty-five ministers, forty-seven churches, and six conferences enrolled in the Plan. There is still time for conferences and churches to become members without penalty.

This is the first time in the history of the Church of God that a Retirement Plan has been available for the ministers and their wives. It is necessary that a modest Plan be set up for awhile in keeping with the size of our church group. It is hoped that reserves will soon be built up through premiums, special gifts, wills, and legacies making it possible to increase the amount of pension payments.

There will be a reporting session for the Association at the forthcoming General Conference.

License and Ordination Committee Report

Since the report given a year ago, eight ministers have been granted licenses from the General Conference for the first time. They are Bros. Scott Ross, Michael Mattison, David Krogh, Jim Mickey, Rex Shaw, Don Hightower, James David Rich, and Dennis Baldwin, Jr.

No applications for ordination have been received since the 1967 General Conference session.

As this report is being written, several graduating students of Oregon Bible College are scheduled to be interviewed by the Committee on License and Ordination, with

a view to granting licenses to those who qualify. We also have one other application for license that has not yet been acted upon.

At present, we have 106 licensed ministers, 36 of whom have been ordained. Of the 106 licensed ministers, nine would be considered as inactive, having reported that they preached fewer than twenty sermons during the year.

Because of confusion resulting from various interpretations of the motion passed at the 1967 General Conference, the Board of Directors of the General Conference passed the following motion: "We the General Conference Board of Directors, based on the action of the 1967 General Conference Delegates in upholding open Communion, direct the License and Ordination Committee to continue with this resolution: Be it resolved that the Church of God General Conference believes in and practices open Communion and will not license or ordain anyone who advocates, teaches, or otherwise promotes Communion contrary to this principle."

According to established practice, applications for Annual Ministerial Recognition will be sent out prior to July 1 to ministers now holding a Certificate of License. These applications should be returned before July 15, in order to allow time for licenses to be prepared for distribution at the 1969 session of General Conference delegates. Those which cannot be handed out at that time will be mailed to those eligible ministers who return the applications.

Military Personnel Committee

This committee was formed at the General Conference Board Meeting in January, 1968. A brief report was made at the General Conference last August. A form letter was sent to each member of the Armed Forces, whose name had been sent to the committee. A total of 49 letters have been mailed. A self-addressed envelope was enclosed with each letter, requesting that an answer be given to: 1) an interest in receiving The Restitution Herald; 2) an interest in receiving the Challenge; 3) an interest in receiving letters from other young people.

A total of 14 responses were received and 5 letters were returned with address "unknown." A Christmas card was mailed to each of the names sent to us. A result of this study is that seven subscriptions are being sent (Restitution Herald and Challenge) to the members of the Armed Forces, free of charge.

The General Commission of Chaplains and Armed Forces Personnel was contacted following the recommendations given by Bro. Orville Westlund. Correspondence with this commission has not resulted in any final commitment.

A request still is in effect for the names of military personnel and their addresses, to be sent the committee.

Ministers Fund Report

During the past year \$25.00 per month has been paid to a retired minister and to two widows of Church of God ministers. Two outright gifts were granted by the committee, one of \$50.00 and one of \$300.00, both in cases of illness in the family. Two ministers have made small loans for moving expenses and these are being paid off monthly.

At the last annual report the fund balance was \$1,618.66. Since contributions have been much less than past years, the present balance is \$818.60. We trust that some will remember this fund in their giving so that the help may be continued to those in need.

Recommended Procedure for Greater Home Mission Effort

General Conference

- 1) Emphasize home missions in Conference publications.
- 2) Give more emphasis to evangelism in Oregon Bible College.
- 3) Staff members and members of the General Conference Board of Directors speak at special services and state conferences.
- 4) Provide literature when needed.
- 5) Pastoral Aid and Mission Builders are available for churches that qualify.
- 6) General Conference office can assist in securing pastors and leaders.
- 7) Give assistance in providing brochures and guidelines, and in organizing calling campaigns.
- 8) Staff members available for counseling and advice on procedures for evangelism and home missions.

State Conference

1) Cooperate with the local churches in their efforts to evangelize.

2) Give assistance to the smaller congregations in your conference.

Local Church

- 1) Adopt Recommendation number 3 in your local church.
- 2) Study and make use of Mission Work and Emphasis for the Local Church found on page 9 of the June, 1969, Progress Journal.
- 3) Use the set of lessons prepared by the Mission Department entitled Missions and the Church of God.
- 4) Use General Conference staff members and General Conference Board members in special services.
- 5) Make good use of brochures, bulletin inserts, film strips, slides, and other promotional materials available from the General Conference.
- 6) Establish a Department of Evangelism with appointment of a Lay Director.
- 7) Establish a Mission Department in the local church.
- 8) Publicize the local church by newspaper advertising, radio spot announcements, special mailings, etc.

Mission Work and Emphasis for the Local Church

By the Mission Board, Church of God General Conference

The foreign mission work of the Church of God has been expanding each year at an amazing rate. In recent years we have been challenged with new opportunities in the field of foreign missions. We understand the commission of God to the church relative to the world. We are thrilled at each new opportunity to enlarge the scope of the Church of God in presenting Jesus Christ and the gospel of truth. The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference realizes that we are at the point where it is imperative that the local church be strengthened before we expand further in foreign mission work.

During this year, the Mission Board is concentrating its planning and emphasis on the strengthening of the local church. The local church must be a strong home mission base from which foreign mission work is carried on. This fact was stated in a paper presented to the delegates for study at General Conference in 1965.

It is generally recognized in the Church of God today that the primary need of the church is for enlargement of home missions.

I. The Need for Individual Persuasion

- A) The need: Each individual member of the Church of God must be persuaded that he is a missionary and that he must be a witness for the Lord and bring others into the influence of the church. There is an apathy and indifference on the part of all of us in this regard. We must each become soul winners, dedicated to preaching and teaching the truth of the gospel to the lost. It now takes about twenty-five of us on the average to win one person per year to the Lord.
 - B) How to Meet This Need in the Local Church
- 1) There must be continual emphasis from the pulpit on the necessity to reach others.
- 2) Sunday school classes and Bible classes should include emphasis on inviting others to church, and ways to witness to others.
- 3) There must be unceasing prayer for the lost; for opportunity to witness; for spiritual conditions in the church that will promote growth.
- 4) There should be teaching and preaching emphasis on the urgency of the need for salvation; the condition of lost sinners; the soon coming of the Lord; the certainty of judgment; the destiny of the wicked.
- 5) There must be greater emphasis on perseverance; upon getting a commitment, and not being satisfied with less than a commitment.
- 6) There must be more definite and emphatic promotion of the principle and importance of "Each One Reach (at least) One."

II. Suggested Programs for Mission Enlargement in the Local Church

- A) Aims To strengthen the local church by: developing mission giving, developing mission vision, and developing misson action.
 - B) Programs to Strengthen the Local Church
 - 1) A Spiritual growth program.

- a) An emphasis from the pulpit relative to specific needs of spiritual growth (plan a series covering spiritual growth).
- b) An emphasis of spiritual experience opportunities: individual participation in devotional Bible reading; a devotional reading guide prepared by the pastor and distributed each week; the Bible reading guide to emphasize areas of spiritual growth.
- e) Individual participation in a prayer program: daily prayer for personal spiritual growth; daily prayer for persons in need of spiritual growth, the inactive, indifferent, the unconverted; daily prayer for the total work of the church program; emphasize one part of the church program for daily prayer each week; a prayer emphasis guide presented to the congregation each week (could be included in reading guide).
- d) An emphasis on the importance of attendance of midweek service: use the prayer time as a spiritual growth time; use laymen to teach a Bible lesson for the study time.
- 2) Increase layman participation in the total work of the church.
 - a) Review membership list and involve more people.
 - b) Use laymen to teach in midweek service.
- e) Use laymen to conduct a Layman Service periodically on Sunday evening (or other service according to situation of the local church).
 - d) Use laymen in conducting home Bible study classes.
- e) Use laymen as much as possible in the work of the church.
 - 3) A program of outreach and visitation.
- a) Share the church that persons will come to the acceptance of Christ; get persons to attend the services of the church; get them active in the fellowship of the church; lead persons to be baptized into the body of Christ.
 - b) Organize a prospect finder program.
 - c) Organize a program of visitation.
 - d) Set a goal of number of contacts to be made.
 - e) A report and a record kept of all contacts.
- f) Put the following evangelistic approaches into action: select a prospect as a personal responsibility; general visitation of several prospects.
 - 4) Develop mission giving.
 - a) Keep people informed about the needs.
- b) Continual education of personal responsibilities (the responsibility of the local church to the conference work).
 - c) Talk about the results of unified cooperation.
 - d) Set goals for mission giving.
 - 5) Develop mission vision.
- a) Use the lesson series on missions in a planned program of training relative to mission work and opportunity.
- b) Keep people informed of the programs of national mission work and the home mission program.
- c) Educate persons as to the opportunities of working in the total program of the Church of God mission work.
 - d) Plan and conduct a local missionary conference.
- e) Encourage attendance of other missionary conferences.

6) Develop mission action.

a) Organize a total church missionary department or committee.

b) Support the National Mission projects. We suggest that one of the mission fields or projects be emphasized each month: Mission Builders, Pastoral Aid, India, Mexico, etc.

c) Encourage laymen to participate in home mission programs.

d) Challenge persons to consecrate their lives to missions. (Bro. Warren Sorenson, member of the Mission Board, will present a sharing session on the foregoing material at General Conference.)

Additional Conference Information

CAMP COSTS: Camp Mack is owned by the Church of the Brethren. They graciously make their facilities available to us for the same charge as is made to Brethren camps. Higher costs of services have forced an increase in rates and this year the Church of God General Conference will pay \$3.35 per day per person for each person who attends the General Conference meetings. Children under twelve are charged half that price. This includes lodging, three meals, and insurance. We are charged 25 cents per day for "short-term campers" who are on the grounds only for portions of the day and who do not eat at the camp.

In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are other conference costs for promotion, travel, folders, printing, displays, supplies, etc. It is the belief of the Board of Directors that every effort should be made to at least break even in the Conference costs.

Collections are received each evening at the services and funds received are used to cover these various charges. Those who wish a receipt for their payments may pay at the desk and receive a receipt. Each person who attends should come prepared to bear his share of the actual costs. Offerings over and above will go directly into the Lord's work through the General Conference operating funds.

YOUNG PEOPLE: Teen-agers who attend General Conference, some planning to stay over for the General Youth Conference, will have a special program of classes and activities during General Conference and they are expected to attend these activities. These young people are expected to contribute their costs of lodging, meals, etc., while at the Conference as the General Conference is charged for each person attending. These rules apply during Conference:

1) Young people will be required to attend all activities that are planned for them by the Conference, unless they obtain permission from the Youth Director.

2) Those driving automobiles will be required to leave them parked in the area provided for them, unless they have good reason to leave, then, only by being accompanied by parents or adult. We will attempt to be as fair as possible in governing this rule. It is for your health and safety as well as others.

3) Cabins, beds, and wearing apparel should be kept in a neat and orderly fashion.

4) At mealtimes and class times we request that girls wear dresses or skirts and blouses, and boys wear slacks and sport shirts (rather than recreation clothing).

5) Each cabin will have a counselor and will appoint one of the group to lead in evening devotions.

INTERCESSORY PRAYER. During the week the Stone Chapel will be used as a special prayer room in hours when

classes are not conducted there. People are encouraged to go there at any free time for meditation and prayer, especially prayer for others. A book will be in the chapel in which anyone may write his prayer requests and bring them before the throne of grace in prayer.

LODGING: Lodging is provided in separate cabins and lodges for men and women. Parents with small children are housed in Sarah Major Lodge as much as possible. Young people attending General Conference are housed in separate cabins, with counselors in charge of each cabin.

DELEGATE POOL EXPENSE: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the costs of travel for those from far away and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church and conference is encouraged to enter into the pool to make attendance at Conference possible for all churches. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES: There are morning and afternoon classes for children of all ages, in addition to the adult and teen-age activities. Parents are requested to call for their children immediately after classes morning and afternoon. Sr. Mary Vadnais will be director of the children's classes.

TENTS AND TRAILERS: It is the policy of the board which governs Camp Mack that tents are not allowed on the campgrounds. Trailers and campers are allowed in the designated parking area, but there are no hookups for water or electricity. The owners of the camp have established these policies to protect the resident nature of the camp. These policies apply to all the groups which use Camp Mack facilities.

There are public and private camping facilities available in the vicinity of Camp Mack, and these are shown in the books listing camping facilities.

The Chambers of Commerce of Syracuse, North Webster, Nappanee, or Warsaw, Indiana, can also furnish listings of camp sites, motels, and other facilities, in their vicinities.

NURSERY: Nursery facilities will not be planned this year. Mothers are encouraged to share baby sitting chores.

NOTE TO TEACHERS AND LEADERS: Teachers of General Conference adult and youth classes, and leaders of the Christian Sharing Sessions, are reminded to prepare mimeographed copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared that those not able to attend their sessions will be able to secure copies.

General Conference Progress

NEW STAFF MEMBER

The administration of the Church of God General Conference is pleased to announce the appointment of Sr. Rachel Krogh to the staff. Sr. Krogh will begin her duties on August 15, 1969, as superintendent of Missions and part-time instructor at Oregon Bible College. Sr. Krogh has spent three and one half years in the Mexico mission field. She has given much study to mission administration and will be most helpful in the furtherance of the Mission work of the General Conference. Arrangements are being made to continue all the projects now being carried on in the Mexico field. Sr. Krogh will teach Spanish, Music Appreciation, and lead the choir at Oregon Bible College.

The appointment of Sr. Krogh will relieve Bro. S. O. Ross of the duties of Superintendent of Missions. He will continue on as Executive Secretary of the General Conference, as business administrator and missions instructor of Oregon Bible College, and will direct the Home Missions projects of the General Conference, which will be given special emphasis in the year ahead.

The hours that Sr. Krogh will teach at Oregon Bible College will release Bro. Francis Burnett from part of his teaching load that he might use that time in carrying out his duties as National Youth Director.

CONFERENCE ISSUE

This issue of Progress Journal has the annual reports, and the proposals for the next conference year. Each member should read these thoroughly, and the delegates should be instructed regarding action on recommendations.

The church and state conference secretaries have received the credentials forms, statistical forms, and the delegate pool form. Each church is encouraged to complete these forms and return them promptly. We trust that each church which sends a delegate will join in the travel expense pool so that the expense of sending delegates will be equalized, whether near or far from Camp Alexander Mack, Milford, Ind., where the conference will be held. Dates of the conference are July 27 to August 1, 1969.

During the Annual General Conference Camp Alexander Mack charges the General Conference \$3.35 per person per day, (Breakfast-60¢, Lunch-90¢, Supper-90¢, Lodging-85¢, and Insurance-10¢) with children under twelve years one half price.

CONFERENCE FINANCES

Contributions to the Goals for Giving of the Church of God General Conference have surpassed the goal by sixteen hundred dollars. This is due in great part to the Coins-for-Christ youth giving of the past two months. We are grateful to the youth of the conference for this extra effort in giving. Nova Scotia

Five were baptized into Christ at Cordon when Amorfina Galvez, Villa Galvez, Pepito Galvez, Benito Walat and Lolita dela Cruz came forward and gave their lives to him.

At the Zamora church Pastor Joseph Pascual assisted a husband and wife in putting on Christ when Francisco and Cresencia Natividad were immersed in the waters of baptism. Remember to pray for these babes in Christ as they begin their Christian walk of life.

Mexico

Bro. Dean Moore spent time in April holding services in Saltillo, Bisnaga, Sierra Hermosa, and Labor Vieja. Bro. Roberto Badillo, a layman, leads the Sunday school in Labor Vieja each Sunday, and sermons by Bro. Moore or Bro. Francisco Martinez are presented on tape several times a month.

The Use of Special Days

God planned and prophesied from the beginning of time for *one special day*: the day of the Lord. He is preparing the bride of Christ for the *one special day*. The spirit of God is given to condition us for that *one day*, and Jesus talked continually of "that day."

Every scope of life has its special day. Many of these are promoted and fostered by the business world to create interest and increase profits. The church can well make use of special days.

Special days in the church can contribute greatly to the success of reaching more people for the Lord.

Of What Worth Is a Special Day?

The chief concern in the selection of the day to be observed is the aptness with which it can be used to advance the pupils' Christian education and maturity and at the same time attract and hold the prospect.

The *teaching value* should be the primary aim and not just the gathering of a crowd.

Those already enrolled in the Sunday school can have their interest aroused, and their willing participation in the entire program can be increased.

Potential leadership will be brought to the forefront. It has been said, "Every Christian has a right to one job before any have a right to two major jobs."

How Can We Have a Special Day?

To make special days more effective, plan continually ahead of time. We suggest one special day every month.

Promotion and publicity must not be slighted. Get notices and write-ups in the local papers, in the church bulletin at least three weeks in advance, and use a phoning committee to contact all prospects.

Plan a program for the opening or closing and include as many people as possible. Remember, programs should supplement the teaching period and not rob it.

Be sure to register all visitors and follow up new contacts with personal calls.

Keep a scrapbook of your special-days features for reference, and a file of ideas for the future.

Here are some suggestions for special days: Anniversary, Appreciation, Children's, Christmas, Contest Kickoff, Contest Final, Cradle Roll, Decision, Easter, Family, Father's, Flag, Grandmother's, Graduation, Homecoming, Independence, Installation (of teacher or pastor), Kid's, Labor, Library, Memorial, Missions, Mother's, Pal, Palm, Promotion, Rally, Stewardship, Teacher's, Thanksgiving, Bible, Valentine, Vacation Bible School, Youth.

Missions and the Local Church

WE FEEL that the Church of God needs more local churches that are missionary minded. It is the duty of Christians to introduce Christ to the world, but many churches rely on the General Conference to do their missionary work. If we compare our General Conference to an army, we find that, like an army, the General Conference is only as strong as the smaller units. If an army consists of many weak and untrained companies of troops, the outlook for winning any battles is very dim.

The work of the General Conference in the missionary field is very wonderful, but it is because more local churches have begun to become more missionary minded. Whenever we think of the word "missionary" we automatically think of some underdeveloped nation with lots of hungry kids. But is this the only mission of the church? Paul said, "How shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard?" (Rom. 10:14). Christ did not command his followers to go to the poorer nations; he told them to go to all nations. (Matt. 28: 19.) As we study the Book of Acts we see that churches began through evangelism in Jerusalem. The apostles did considerable work in the area before branching out into other nations.

From these facts we see a great need for more missionary minded local churches, which, in turn, would increase the strength of the General Conference missionary work. Holding missionary conferences is one way to make a congregation more missionary minded. In fact, many of our churches have done this, but many others have not. For the last two years Oregon Bible College has had

missionary conferences. Their success was brought about by the intensified work of several students. Much planning and work are prerequisites to a successful conference.

Introducing church members to the problems involved in home and foreign missions is often a vital need. Pictures, drawings, and models are all important, but there is a need for something that is more real in the missionary conference. This is where the guest speaker comes in. Most missionaries are very dedicated and, in fact, you can almost feel the power of God working in their lives—often this rubs off and others begin to let God take over their lives.

The absolute requirement to any Christian's life or activity is prayer. In August, 1960, the General Conference saw the need of greater missionary work, and special prayers were given that the church might enlarge its program for the service of Christ. In December of 1960, a letter of inquiry was received from Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, and thus began our missionary work in the Philippines. This is just one example of the power of prayer. Individuals who dedicate their lives to prayer and Christian living often find themselves becoming home missionaries.

In Sunday school classes, midweek prayer meetings, and home Bible study groups there is a good opportunity to discuss the problems of evangelism at home and abroad with others who are having similar problems. Christian sharing sessions have proven very important.

In the Blessed Hope Church of God in Rockford, Ill., we often take a few minutes in our Sunday school class to tell of our experiences, and the testimonies we have given through the week. We soon learn that Christians were not meant to hide in the corner with their mouths shut.

Introducing missions and evangelism to the various local church auxiliaries is also very important. Such groups as the ladies' organizations, the men's organizations, and the youth groups are all good places to introduce missions. Getting youngsters interested in missions will almost assure us that they will be concerned when they grow up and become leaders in the church. Ladies' Bible study groups are good places to invite our nonchurchgoing friends, too.

The gospel is very precious but, unlike an expensive diamond, it loses its value when it is kept locked up. We cannot keep the gospel locked within ourselves and expect to grow in grace and favor of our Lord Jesus Christ. Some will say, "I have told many people about Christ, but no one would listen." If, through prayer and love, each member of the Church of God would bring just one individual to Christ in a year's time, then in that year the Church of God could double its membership—providing we hold those we now have.

The whole New Testament speaks of the duties of the churches and individuals within these churches. If there were greater determination by more individuals to speak the Word of God, then local churches would soon become more missionary minded. Greater zeal in the local churches would lead to greater missionary work by the General Conference, and a greater service to God would result.

General Conference Progress

ANNUAL GENERAL CONFERENCE TIME

The forty-ninth annual Church of God General Conference will convene at Camp Alexander Mack, near Milford, Ind., July 27 to August 1. This is a time of prayer, teaching, preaching, sharing, fellowship, and conducting the Lord's business. Plan now to attend all or part of this conference. If you cannot go, do remember to pray for the success of the conference.

Delegate forms and statistical reports have been mailed to all church and conference secretaries. Those who have not completed and returned these forms are urged to do so at once so their church will be properly represented when conference convenes. All churches sending delegates are urged to enter the Delegate Pool so that travel expense is shared equally by all, whatever the distance from the conference site.

The theme of this year's Conference is, "One in Christ," giving emphasis to unity in the Lord's work.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Bro. T. M. Ferrell was appointed Superintendent of the Sunday School Department of the Church of God General Conference by the Board of Directors at their regular meeting in May. The Sunday School Board had requested that a Superintendent be appointed, preferably on a full-time basis.

Bro. Ferrell will work with the present Sunday School Board made up of Willis Turner, E. Milon Hall, Bernard Hightower, and Robert Petry. This will be in addition to his duties as editor of Church of God publications and supervisor of the sales department.

The Sunday School Board has been rather inactive in the past two or three years, partly as a result of the formation of the Council of Christian Education. There was some question about the relationship between the Sunday School Department and the Council. After considerable study, the Sunday School Board has decided that there is still a need for a Sunday School Department in the General Conference. It is its purpose to promote Sunday school work as the important educational arm of the church, hence the need of a superintendent.

Members of the General Conference staff assist churches and state conferences in special services on many occasions. In recent weeks Bro. T. M. Ferrell spoke at New Lenox, Ill., Graytown, Wis., Oregon, Ill., and held a week of meetings at the Morning Star church in South Bend, Ind. Bro. addition to the Troy View church at Troy, Ohio. Bro. S. O. Ross has held services at Lombard and Casey, Ill., and was sponsor of an Oregon Bible College Gospel Team to Litchfield, Eden Valley, and Minneapolis, Minn.

The brush that had grown there was causing a hideout for vandals and undesirables and needed to be cleaned up. The usual summer maintenance and redecorating costs, plus the above unexpected items, have added at least two thousand dollars to the financial needs.

CONFERENCE FINANCES

The contributions for the month of June have fallen about eight hundred dollars short of the goal. We are confident that the membership of the Church of God General Conference will make these needs a matter of concern and prayer and that the shortage will be made up in the next month.

College tuitions and fees stop during the summer months, but the general overhead continues. Unexpected expenses occur and as the continual rising costs mount it all totals up to a need for even more sacrificial giving to meet the needs. The General Conference Board of Directors and staff members believe that the membership will meet this need.


The Mission Builders Appeal for the L'Anse, Mich., Church of God was recently completed, and brought a net of about forty-four hundred dollars; one of the highest ever.

Chairman's Message to the Delegates

GoD has been patient with us for a long time, and "Now Is the Time" for us to wake up and "move out." We are limiting the power of God when we don't think big as we plan our outreach program. God thinks big, for he has provided the means whereby all the world could be saved.

We obviously need to depend on God, for without him our efforts are to no avail. The time has come for us to call on him to exercise his power through us. This is not with the attitude of testing him; it is simply taking him up on his offer. History proves that the Bible is correct in that if we think abundantly with our Christian activities, and call on him for guidance and power he will bless abundantly.

Positive thinking is working in secular life, and we are sure this principle can be applied to the Christian life. Kenneth Lomott, in his book The Moneymakers, records and expounds on interviews with many millionaires. He states that a goodly number of them regretted that Horatio Alger no longer inspires young men as they were once inspired. One of these men, W. Clemet Stone, when questioned on how one becomes rich, said that it was "by having a positive mental attitude." "Think rich and become rich" is one of his tenets. This is not all there is to becoming rich, but it is certainly a major factor. I would like to encourage you to think big in your personal life also, for success breeds more success.

An example of thinking big can be learned from our National Bereans. In 1966-67 their budget was \$4,250. In 1967-68 it was doubled to \$8,500, and in 1968-69 it is \$10,000. They have thought big and made it and they still are thinking

big. The pilgrims in 1620 thought big when they set out for the American colonies in order to have freedom of religion. The U.S. government recently thought big in their program to put a man on the moon by 1970. Common to all these accomplishments is the fact that people said, "It can't be done." In our church activities it is necessary to think big and prepare for many. We need to build larger, better churches, order extra quarterlies for anticipated increase in Sunday school attendance, and step out in all aspects of our Christian endeavors. Abundant faith will be necessary for us to accomplish what the Lord wants and requires of us.

It is necessary to update our methods of evangelism. We can no longer concentrate on working with old worn-out tools, such as fallen-away members and ineffective methods. I am not suggesting that we abandon or forget them, but we must quit wasting our energy grieving. Our concentration should be directed at new. bright, sharp tools; i.e., new prospects and new methods. We must work with efficient tools. Learning from the success of others can be very profitable. We can learn from the experiences of an isolated missionary in some far off corner of the world, from the administrators of other Bible colleges, from ministers of successful denominations, from effective independent evangelists, and from successful evangelistic organizations.

The sales manager of one of the country's most successful real estate firms gathers his salesmen together every morning in order to analyze their successes. They don't waste time talking about the mistakes they made the day before, but they talk about what they did right and

how it came they made the sale, and then try to do the right things again. It is important for us to analyze our successes, not our failures.

A winsome attitude is very important, for if the attitude is right a greater number can be won from a small crowd than from a large crowd where the attitude is not right. We need to remember to be proud of what we have—actually, it is what God has.

Dwaine Demmitt says that the sales profession quotes that one in fifteen contacts will buy. These odds do not discourage salesmen. With the right attitude and with God behind us, and the prospect, we should do better than only one in fifteen of our contacts accepting the gospel of Christ, but even with this number those odds aren't too bad. An evidence of what the Lord can do was also reported to me by Dwaine Demmitt when he recalled that a whole clan of people—actually about seventeen—came to a knowledge of the Lord through the gospel invitation being given to one person.

I would like to present to you a new concept that was recently brought to Mardy's and my attention. It is applicable to every phase of life. It has given direction and plans to many individuals by providing day-by-day guidance to those without definite goals. We know that its application has brought great financial success to those corporations that have adopted it. We feel as though it is really an exciting concept. The principle is to set a goal you would like to reach in five years. Make it nearly unbelievably ambitious. To set the goals, we should really think big. In order to arrive at these goals at the end of five years decide where we

Minutes of the 1969 General Conference

Monday, July 28, 1969

Monday morning, July 28, marked the opening of the forty-ninth annual conference of the Church of God. Chairman William Lawrence presided at the meeting, calling upon Bro. Harry Sheets for prayer. Delegates were seated according to the procedure explained by Sr. Ruth Halls, chairman of the Credentials Committee.

Hope Chapel, Columbus, Ohio, was recognized as a new church, along with its delegate, Fred Pensyl. Other persons who were acting as delegates for the first time were asked to stand and introduce themselves. New minister delegates recognized included Bros. Steve Bolhous, Bedford, Ohio; James Graham, Hedrick, Ind.; Don Hightower, San Jose, Cal.; and Mike Mattison, Blanchard, Mich.

There were no special communications to be read by the secretary. Chairman Lawrence then presented his message to the delegates. (See page one.) He stressed that we need to emphasize our successes, not our failures. Think big! Delegates were then asked to refer to the special reports as published in the June issue of the Progress Journal, specifically the Board of Education, Board of Arbitration and Counseling, Ministers Retirement Association, License and Ordination, Military Personnel Committee, and the Ministers Fund reports. A motion to accept these reports was made by Bro. Milon Hall, seconded by Bro. Ed Goit, and carried.

Secretary Delbert Jones was called upon to read the report of the Board of Christian Education, as submitted by the chairman, Robert See, which was not included with the published reports.

A report of the business activities of the General Conference Board was given by Bro. Kenneth Vancil, board member. Bro. Stanley Ross was asked to give the treasurer's report, and some time was spent with questions and answers. Bro. Willis Turner moved that the treasurer's report be accepted, seconded by Bro. Don Swartz, and carried.

Chairman Lawrence asked for further discussion regarding the report of the

Board of Christian Education. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Bro. Milon Hall to recess until 10:00 a.m. Tuesday. This motion carried after being seconded by Bro. Joe Fletcher, and Bro. Clarence Lapp gave the closing prayer.

Credentials Committee reported for Monday: officers in attendance, 8; ministers, 40; and delegates, 82; for a total of 130.

Tuesday, July 29, 1969

Bro. Milon Hall was called upon for prayer, which opened the business session. After the secretary's report was read and approved, Ruth Halls gave the credentials committee report. Additional new delegates were recognized at this time

In the absence of retiring youth director Paul Shaw, Francis Burnett, who will be assuming this position in September, was asked to answer any questions which might be asked concerning their program. A motion was made by Kent Ross, seconded by Lee McQuinn, that the following be adopted: "We recommend that a youth caravan be held in the summer of 1970, provided it is deemed advisable by the youth delegates at the 1969 International Bercan Youth Conference, and providing sufficient funds are appropriated in the 1969-70 youth budget." The motion was passed unanimously.

Chairman Lawrence introduced Milon Hall, secretary of the Sunday School Department, who spoke briefly on the importance of the Sunday school program. Willis Turner and Robert Petry, members of the department whose terms will be expiring this year, also talked on the vital work of the Sunday schools.

Nominations for two new department members were then received, with Milon Hall nominating Joyce Knapp, and Mary Pack nominating Iva Mae Holt for the first director. Bernard Hightower nominated Richard Dick for the second director to be elected, while Leon Driskill nominated the retiring chairman, Willis Turner. The election was subsequently held, with Joyce Knapp and Willis Turner being elected.

Kenneth Vancil displayed one of the new church signs which feature the General Conference emblem. These are now available, and he urged members to take some home with them, saving postage charges.

Terry Ferrell spoke for a short time on publishing and related topics. Time was allowed for discussion of these subjects.

Although the consideration of mission business was scheduled for Wednesday morning, the business session was moving along so rapidly that Chairman Lawrence asked that they begin their presentation on Tuesday morning before lunch. Chairman Lawrence introduced Rachel Krogh as the new Director of Missions.

Stanley Ross, Executive Secretary of the General Conference, was called upon to report on the work in Africa. He stated that although \$150.00 a month had been set aside for the support of the nine men working there, no funds had been sent since January. The regular monthly report was not received in January and no word was received from then until just prior to conference time, although approximately eight letters had been sent to them. The correspondence just received, which was sent by registered mail, informed the General Conference that they had written letters and about seven or eight of their men had been dispatched to Lagos to mail them, since they had no service in their area because of the civil war. The men disappeared and never returned, and Pastor Obot was among the men who have not been heard from since.

Bro. Ross continued that in their recent letter they requested that no funds be sent to them until the mails were once more reliable. He further stated that the General Conference has been working with the Advent Christian group, cooperatively, in regards to getting information. The churches with whom we are still working are liberated and in the country of Nigeria.

Lee McQuinn added to the report on the African work, after which Rachel Krogh took the opportunity to thank the conference for its support of the Mexican missions. She also expressed the hope

that someone might be interested in joining Alice Aldrich in the Mexican work.

Chairman Lawrence urged the people to be considering nominations of willing individuals who have agreed to serve as members of the Board of Directors. At this time a motion to adjourn until 10:00 a.m. Wednesday was made by Kenneth Vancil, seconded by Emory Macy, and David Krogh was called upon to offer the closing prayer, asking, as had been requested, for special prayers for particular individuals in need, as well as for the Nigerian brethren.

The Credentials Committee reported 8 officers in attendance, 47 ministers, and 94 delegates, for a total of 149.

Wednesday, July 30, 1969

The session was opened with prayer by Vivian Kirkpatrick, after which the secretary's minutes were read and approved. Lee McQuinn illustrated on the blackboard the area changes in Africa where our churches are located.

Nominations were then in order for two new directors to fill the posts formerly held by Merle Patrick and Kenneth Vancil. For director number one Jesse Pestle was nominated by Cecil Patrick, and Russell Magaw was nominated by Willard Naylor. It was moved by Richard Worley and seconded by Don Swartz that nominations be closed for director number one. The motion was passed.

Don Overmyer was nominated by Warren Sorenson for director number two, while C. F. Pryor was nominated by Mary Pack, and Wayne Laning was nominated by Jack Hearp. Jerry Cooper then moved that nominations be closed and the motion carried, after being seconded by Rolland Stilson. The candidates were asked to stand and be presented.

The chairman then read a statement on the interpretation of the resolution which was passed two years ago on Communion, the original recommendation reading: "Be it resolved that the Church of God General Conference believes in and practices Open Communion and will not license or ordain anyone who advocates, teaches, or otherwise promotes Communion contrary to this principle. The table of the Lord is not a place of discipline. Each professed Christian may exercise his privilege to partake or not partake of the supper (1 Cor. 11:28, 29). Be it further resolved that this resolution will be in force for the coming year, pending a further study of Communion by the ministers."

The chairman continued, "Being a conglomerate organization, coming from many different backgrounds, it becomes

impossible to legislate all matters, but it is necessary to have some rules to work within. The License and Ordination Committee found it hard to work with the resolution which was passed two years ago. Also, it was reported to us that the language of the resolution was offensive to some. Consequently the General Conference Board, the License and Ordination Committee, the Editor of The Restitution Herald, the Executive Secretary, and several other interested and involved persons, formulated a statement which we thought best explains what you delegates thought two years ago and think now. The interpretation is: 'Open membership Communion, without discipline.' This is what we think the vast majority of the delegates had in mind when the resolution was passed two years ago, an interpretation which all who have heard feel is practical. The License and Ordination Committee feels that it can act intelligently and fairly within the framework of this interpretation."

Since the Mission Department business was not concluded the day before, at this time the chairman called upon Executive Secretary Stanley Ross, who is also Director of Home Missions, to speak regarding that phase of the work. Bro. Ross stressed that it would be the responsibility of each individual member of the church to witness to others. He asked for consideration of the recommendation which reads: "We recommend that, for the purpose of promoting home missions and involving the total membership in a revival effort, the year 1969-70 be known throughout the Churches of God of the Abrahamic Faith as 'Jubilee Witnessing Crusade,' and that the crusade culminate in the Jubilee conference of 1970."

Edward Goit moved that this recommendation be adopted and the motion was seconded by Don Swartz. The chairman asked if there was any discussion regarding the motion. He suggested that we should have one or two fiery speeches for the motion from some fired-up witnesses. Elaine Verdi spoke in favor of the motion.

Clyde E. Randall moved to amend the recommendation by striking out the words "of the Abrahamic Faith," and substituting the words "with head-quarters in Oregon, Ill.," to correspond with the signs which are being promoted. The amendment was seconded by Harold Routson. After some further discussion, both pro and con, the amendment was voted upon and lost by a vote of 68-54.

Roy Humphreys then moved that the original recommendation be amended with the addition of the words, "with

headquarters at Oregon, Illinois." This was seconded by Darrell Maddock. After some discussion, the amendment was voted upon and passed.

The amended recommendation was read, as follows: "We recommend that, for the purpose of promoting home missions and involving the total membership in a revival effort, the year 1969-70 be known throughout the Churches of God of the Abrahamic Faith, with head-quarters at Oregon, Ill., as 'Jubilee Witnessing Crusade,' and that the crusade culminate in the Jubilee conference of 1970." It was passed unanimously.

Cecil Smead then moved and Darrell Maddock seconded the motion that recommendation number three be adopted. It reads: "We recommend that each local church of the Church of God General Conference enter into a positive evangelistic program for Jubilee Year, and that effort be made to increase both attendance and membership by at least ten percent."

There was considerable discussion with regards to the term "Jubilee Year," some questioning of the use of the word 'jubilee," and the chairman read a resolution as adopted two years ago establishing this. It reads: "Resolved: If the Lord Jesus tarries, the year of our Lord 1970 will be known as 'Golden Jubilee' throughout the Church of God General Conference. Be it further resolved that our Conference chairman appoint a committee sometime this year to work with the Executive Secretary to develop a suitable Jubilee Year program and conference agenda." Harold Routson then called for the motion which was voted upon and carried.

Nominations were then made for a new member of the Mission Board, to fill a four-year term just being concluded by Edith Eades, Merle Patrick was nominated by Jesse Pestle, Doris Richmond was nominated by John Denchfield, and Darrell Maddock was nominated by Dean Urish. It was moved by Cecil Patrick and seconded by Charles Jones that nominations be closed. The election was concluded, with Merle Patrick being elected.

The motion to adjourn was made by Harold Routson, seconded by Mardy Lawrence, and the closing prayer was offered by Steve Bolhous.

Credentials committee report: Attendance for the day included 8 officers; 48 ministers; and 93 delegates for a total of 149.

Thursday, July 31, 1969

Chairman Lawrence called the business session to order, and prayer was offered

by Kent Ross. The secretary's minutes were read and approved.

The first item of business was the election of new officers of the Board. While the ballots were being tabulated, Rachel Krogh, Director of Missions, extended an invitation to all to attend the Maritime conference which is to be held in Nova Scotia in August. Following her invitation, Clarence Lapp informed the delegates of an adult retreat to be held in Minnesota in October.

Terry Ferrell reported that the delegate pool expense averages \$47.29 per participant. Kent Ross took the opportunity to issue an invitation to all to attend the second annual missionary conference, which is being planned for September 20, and to be held at the Dayton, Ohio, church.

The chairman stated that people have frequently inquired as to what transpires in the many board meetings. He went on to explain that since next year will be the Jubilee year that perhaps many more persons will be attending conference and that this could present a problem, so the Board was looking into the possibilities of a larger camp. He added that this was one of the many things which require so much time in discussions. He then asked for a show of hands and took an informal poll as to which times of the summer would be best for holding conference, explaining that most of the camps available naturally save the prime time for their own groups.

At this time the tellers announced that the votes had been counted for director number 1, and that Jesse Pestle had been clected.

Don Overmyer was called upon to tell of plans being made for a men's retreat to be held this fall. This is being planned as a laymen's retreat for study, inspiration, and a time for assessing how the laymen can become involved in the Jubilee year to further the work of the church. Tentative plans call for the one-day meeting to be held at a camp now under consideration as a future conference site.

Vernis Wolfe described the progress being made in the construction of the new Happy Woods, La., church and expressed the thanks of the people there for the help of the conference with its pro-

The tellers then announced that the votes had been tallied for director number 2, and that Wayne Laning had been elected. Clyde E. Randall moved that a rising vote of thanks be given the retiring officers. The motion was seconded by the standing of the delegates.

President of Oregon Bible College, Alva Huffer, introduced members of the Board of Education, told of the program of the college, and offered to answer any questions which might be asked. Quite a number of questions were asked on all phases of the college program from curriculum, tuition, future plans, and the internship program. Bro. Huffer stated that 225 students have attended OBC during the years.

Jerry Cooper stated that both the Tempe and Phoenix, Ariz., churches were wholeheartedly behind the internship program. He then thanked the entire membership for their prayers on behalf of Alva Huffer when he was near death, and reminded the people that it isn't necessary to have an emergency to call upon God in prayer.

Lucille Ratering moved that we adjourn until the afternoon session, George Reye seconded the motion, and Francis Burnett gave the closing prayer.

Credentials report: Present: 8 officers, 47 ministers, 93 delegates, total 148.

Thursday Afternoon, July 31

The afternoon business session was called to order by Chairman Lawrence.

Roger Denchfield offered prayer. The chairman announced that the newly elected board members met with the old, and the board was reorganized with William Lawrence being re-elected chairman; Dean Urish, vice-chairman; Jesse Pestle, secretary; and Dwaine Demmitt, treasurer

Lorraine Moeller informed the delegates that the Salem Church at Marshall, Ill., burned down, and added that what affects one affects us all. We express our sympathy to the Marshall Church brethren and pray that God will direct them concerning their decision on relocating or rebuilding.

Lee McQuinn moved that the delegates, alternates, and friends present, offer a rising vote of thanks to William and Mardy Lawrence in gratitude to them for their tireless, unselfish, and sacrificial contribution in the area of mission promotion during their recent world mission trip and good will tour in behalf of the General Conference and our Lord Jesus Christ. Emory Macy seconded the motion as the group was rising to its feet.

Jack Hearp moved that the conference accept and implement the "Ministers Information Form" and the "Church Information Form," giving consideration to the suggestions of the delegates and ministers. The motion was seconded by Milon Hall. After numerous comments on the motion, it was passed unanimously.

The chairman announced that Milon Hall has been secured as National Sunday School Superintendent on a limited, part-time basis.

Warren Sorenson was asked to report on the work of the Christian Education Committee. Commenting that the complete committee had not met, he explained that the work was very great, and they were studying not only the content of the Sunday school quarterlies but all of the other literature. He added that the committee encourages Robert See to continue his education in the field of Christian education curriculum planning.

John Denchfield spoke extensively on the need for evangelism, reminding us that too often we talk of evangelism yet do very little. He further declared that we have to have motivation behind our talk.

Elaine Verdi moved that two evangelists, namely, John Denchfield and Richard Smith, be appointed for the coming year. The motion died for lack of a second. Dallas Demmitt concurred with the previous thoughts and elaborated by enlarging upon the importance and need of personal witnessing.

Don Overmyer spoke in reference to the proposed budget, stating that he sees no allowance for an increase in salary, adding that our top men are making supreme sacrifices in order to work for us.

Harry Sheets moved, and Don Swartz seconded, that the proposed budget, calling for contributions of \$99,000.00, be adopted. Further discussion on the subject of the budget then took place. The motion carried and the budget was adopted.

Roger Denchfield then presented the following motion, which was seconded by Joyce Knapp: "I move that the Church of God General Conference, in view of the Jubilee Year, hire and make full use of an evangelist. This evangelist would speak at special services and state conferences; in-

struct in use of brochures and in organizing calling campaigns; and counsel and give advice on procedures for evangelism and home missions. The purpose being that we might effectively reach all possible in view of the 'signs of times.' "

After a considerable amount of time had been spent in discussing this motion, Jack Hearp moved that the motion be tabled, and the motion to table was seconded by Harry Sheets. Motion carried.

At this time the minutes of the morning and afternoon sessions were read by the secretary. Don Swartz moved that the minutes be accepted and a vote of thanks be given to the secretary and his assistant. This was seconded by Ed Goit and

passed.

Ruth Halls then presented the report of the Credentials Committee, stating that the largest attendance for the 1969 conference was 149 as compared to 154 last year. The smallest attendance was 130 at the afternoon session (compared with 140 in 1968), and the average attendance for the year was 141. Darrell Maddock moved that the report of the Credentials Committee be accepted, and it passed after being seconded by Herbert Stadden.

Jerry Cooper made a motion to adjourn, it was seconded by Harold Routson, carried, and Delbert A. Jones offered the closing prayer.
