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Where Is Your Faith?

WHERE is your faith?" These words were spoken by our Lord after he had calmed the storm on the Sea of Galilee that threatened the lives of the disciples. (Luke 8:22-25.)

In the corresponding text in Matthew 8:26, Jesus said, "O ye of little faith." This expression is used by Jesus—and Jesus only—four times to rebuke four different states of mind: anxiety, fear, doubt, and forgetfulness. (See Bullinger's Lexicon.) These four states of mind are opposed to faith.

We believe a majority of our shortcomings and failures as individuals, and as a church, are traceable to a lack of faith.

Anxiety

In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus talked about the relative importance of things temporal and eternal. He assured his listeners that God is concerned about the needs of every living thing — from lilies, to sparrows, to mankind. He said, "If God so clothe the grass of the field, . . . shall he not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith? Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed?" (Matt. 6:30, 31). Jesus did not say, "Don't think about food, drink, or clothes," but, "Be not anxious" (Diag.) about these things.

Anxiety divides up and distracts the mind from its proper goal. Our goal is the Kingdom of God, and the desire to help others prepare for it. Anxiety says to the individual, "Nobody else is looking out for you." Anxiety says to the church or conference, "You're doing too much; where will you get the money?" Faith says, "Trust in God; put first things first and he'll bless you."

Fear

In the story of Jesus and the disciples on the Sea of Galilee, alluded to in our introduction, Jesus said to them, "Why are ye fearful, O ye of little faith?" (Matt. 8:26).

Joseph F. Newton, onetime writer of the newspaper feature "Everyday Living," branded fear as "Private Enemy No. 1." There are legitimate fears, and areas involving caution. However, many of our fears are unfounded. We must unmask those, but we must also have courage; and, something beyond courage — faith. Faith drives out fear.

Churches and conferences also have fears—real and fancied. Faith is the answer here, too. Using the brains and talent in the church, all of the angles should be figured, and the cost counted. Naturally, a church with fifteen members shouldn't build a million dollar church! But, there are other goals within reach, with effort. Jesus told the disciples, "Launch out," but they said, "We've tried that already." (Luke 5:4, 5.) They did what he said, and succeeded. The Preacher said, "He that observeth the wind shall not sow; and he that regardeth the clouds shall not reap." So, he advised us to go forward in faith along

may fail. (Eccl. 11:1-6.)

several fronts, because some endeavors

Matthew 14:22-33 records the story of Jesus walking on the water. When

the disciples saw him they were disturbed, thinking it was a "phantom." Jesus spoke to them, but Peter said, "Lord, if it be thou, bid me come unto thee on the water." We all remember how Peter started to walk on the water, too, but he began to sink and cried out for Jesus to save him. Jesus did rescue him, but said, "O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?" When they came into the ship, the disciples said, "Of a truth thou art the Son of God." Their minds were reassured, but they had doubted that he was the Son of God. They had stood in two ways, not really believing in his Sonship.

As individuals, or as a church, we cannot hope to be faithful workers and effective ambassadors for God, if we harbor doubts about the importance of our message—the coming Kingdom and the Messiahship of Jesus.

Forgetfulness

On an occasion when the disciples had failed to take food with them, Jesus warned them of "the leaven of the Pharisees." They didn't understand, but imagined he was chiding them for forgetting the food. "Which when Jesus perceived, he said unto them, O ye of little faith, . . . Do ye not yet understand, neither remember the five loaves of the five thousand, and how many baskets ye took up?" (Matt. 16:6-12). They then realized his main object was the warning of the evil teachings of his enemies, but the secondary lesson was they had forgotten his power to multiply food for their needs. (Turn to page 8)

General Conference 1971

The annual Church of God General Conference in 1971 will be held in Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa. The conference will convene on Monday evening, August 9, and end on Saturday, August 14, at 9:00 a.m. This change was made necessary due to a conflict at the camp on Sunday. It appears that there will be many advantages in starting on Monday and we trust the inconveniences will be minimal. Registration will begin at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, August 9.

This is not a survey of the area but rather a self-survey of the church and its various inner departments.

Samples of this material have been mailed to each church. The number of forms needed will be supplied upon request.

Conference Finances

As this page is written it appears that the contributions for the 1969-70 fiscal year will probably fall short of the Goals for Giving. With ten days remaining, nearly \$5,000.00 is needed to meet the goal. Pastors and church boards have been made aware of this challenge. We believe that with this special effort most of the amount will come in.

As we come to the close of another fiscal year of General Conference activities, we express thanks and appreciation to all who have contributed in any way to make the conference year a success. These thoughts of appreciation are on behalf of the staff, the Board of Directors, and your executive secretary.

Conference Budget

The delegates at the 1970 General Conference sessions voted a budget of \$105,000.00 for the 1970-71 fiscal year. This is an increase of \$6,000.00, due mostly to a lower anticipated income; this item fell far short during the past year. Following is the budget as adopted:

Life in the Balance!

The world held its breath for four days as three astronauts hurtled through space with life hanging in the balance. On more than one occasion, the difference between life and death depended on what happened in as little as thirteen seconds. The precious value of life was felt by all who watched with concern for the safety of these three brave men. The world looked to God for help for the safety of life.

The precious value of life is the motive for our evangelistic efforts and concerns. The promise of God through Christ is life, "for God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). When this present life is so precious, how can any of us think lightly of the gift of everlasting life through the Son of God?

The difference between life and death is Jesus Christ. "He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son hath not life" (1 John 5:12). It is as simple as that. The motive for earnest evangelism is obvious. How many funerals must there be before we take God at his word?

"God grant the courage to do all things which thou dost require of us, and grant us the wisdom to put first things first."

Men are God's method. He has control over the elements, power over the mountains and the seas, but he has chosen to share Christ through the lives of MEN.

Success in evangelism must be measured in God's terms. We suggest these three steps in meeting the measure of God's program of evangelism:

A renewal of the horizontal outreach. Reaching out to those who have not yet come into the fellowship of the redeemed.

A renewal of our vertical relation to God. Reaching up toward God, expecting to find his hand reaching down to help in our service to him.

A renewal of our circular relationship with those in Christ. Increasing the effectiveness of the fellowship of faith. —R. Warren Sorenson, Mission Board Member.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

Graduate Internship Program

The Graduate Internship Program for Oregon Bible College began this fall in Arizona. This program, administered and coordinated by the president, is provided for graduates and ministers. It utilizes facilities of the Bible Church of God at Tempe and Phoenix, the services of Church of God professional persons in the area, and selected courses at Arizona State University for helping students prepare for the pastoral ministry, missionary work, or advanced study in theology and research. The program lasts for the entire academic year and the student pays the same tuition charged for courses on campus in Illinois.

Joe Martin, who was graduated from the College in May, has become the first student enrolled in the program. He lives at Palm Wood Apartments, Apt. 23, 2108 South Rural Road, Tempe. His program includes pastoral study sessions and practical pastoral experiences through working with Pastors Hollis Partlowe and Lee McQuinn. He is enrolled in two classes at Arizona State University. He serves as a Director of the Church of God Collegiate Fellowship, the church's student religious organization on campus recognized by the university. Under the leadership of Dallas Demmitt, Joe Martin is engaged in a program of counseling and is attending meetings of many professional organizations. He feels that his future ministry will be enriched by his having participated in this graduate program.

Largest Enrollment

Oregon Bible College began its new academic year, September 4, 1970, with its largest enrollment thus far. Fifty-four students registered for courses on campus at Oregon, Ill. One student, Joe Martin, began the Graduate Internship Program at Tempe and Phoenix, Ariz. This makes a total of fifty-five students. We have an excellent student body. There is a wonderful atmosphere of dedication to academic and spiritual growth.

Dale Ramsey Teaching Music Course

One of our new full-time students preparing for the ministry is Dale Ramsey of the Fort Valley Church in Virginia. Last June he was graduated from Elizabethtown College, Elizabethtown, Pa., with the Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education. This semester he is teaching a two-semester-hour course each Monday evening, Music Fundamentals and Directing. He is also giving private organ, piano, and voice lessons. He plans to present a pipe organ recital in the Oregon community sometime this fall.

The Use of Visual Aids

A visual aid is any method that through a "seeing experience" presents an opportunity of a "learning experience." The visual aid should not be the center of the "teaching experience" since the truth, conviction, or "living experience" must be the center of the "growing experience." The visual aid is a supplementary device.

The use of visual aids is definitely Biblical. Consider: Jeremiah 18:1-6; 1 Kings 3:16-28. Jesus used visual aids on many occasions: a child, fig tree, catching fish, money, miracles, healings, and praying.

The use of visual aids make for effective teaching. Our psychologists tell us that we remember:

1% of what we taste 3½% of what we smell 1½% of what we touch 7% of what we hear 87% of what we SEE!

Never use them as: a) an entertainment feature, b) a "crowd getter," c) a substitute for preparation. Use them to make learning faster, more permanent, enjoyable, to enrich other methods, and to change effects in teaching. They can be used as background material, to introduce an idea, develop a subject, explain and clarify points, or to review a previous lesson.

Many times the question of what to use for a visual aid can best be answered by another question—What do you have in your hand to use? Samson had a jawbone, Dorcas had a needle, David had a sling. Easy objects to obtain are often the best. The common things bring the lesson back to mind each time they are seen. Unusual visual aids tend to lead the pupil to remember the object and forget the lesson.

The Mission Board and the Sunday School Board both held meetings in September. The Board of Trustees of the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Fund met on October 16. A committee to study the further use of Annuities in General Conference financing also met on October 16. The Board of Education of Oregon Bible College is planning a meeting. Many people give freely of their time and effort to serve on these various boards and committees and should be commended for their dedicated service.

Staff Travels

Members of the staff of the Church of God General Conference travel a great deal to fill pulpits and conduct services among the churches. In recent weeks Bro. John Lewis spoke at Koszta, Iowa, and Eldorado, Ill., during the Illinois State Conference. Bro. T. M. Ferrell filled the pulpit at Guthrie Grove, S.C., early in October. Sr. Rachel Krogh spoke at Lombard, Ill., and at the Dayton, Ohio, Missionary Conference. Bro. S. O. Ross also spoke at the Dayton Missionary Conference and has held services at Flagg Center, Casey, and Eldorado, Ill.; Monroe Center, Wis.; and Fredericktown, Mo. Bro. Eugene Stilson spoke at the Oregon, Ill., Church in September, and Bro. Francis Burnett in October.

Bro. Ross has been privileged to appear on two television programs recently. On October 10 he and the four

Oregon Bible College students from Nigeria appeared on Channel 23, Rockford, in an interview program, and the Nigerian men sang a few songs. On October 9, on a live color telecast on station WSIL, Harrisburg, Ill., he and Bro. Dennis Baldwin, pastor of the Eldorado Church of God, were interviewed for twenty-five minutes regarding the work of the Church of God General Conference throughout the world. Conference Finances

Nova Scotia

"So Much the More"

NOT forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching' (Heb. 10:25).

This verse means much to me, and it should mean much to every Christian. The "assembling of ourselves together" is, quite logically, attending church in some form or other, as Christians, to worship. When a person attends church, Bible study, or other activities of the church, he gains in Christian maturity. He is able, in discussing things with other Christians, to gain values he may never have thought of, and he will have Christian fellowship. To start with, these are very important things: to always keep in touch with your fellow Christians, to keep Christian ideas, so that you will not waver when worldly problems come to your door.

Your Minister

Have you ever thought of church attendance in regard to your minister? How do you think he feels if one Sunday he gets up to preach and sees only about half as many people as there really should be? It is a really demoralizing thing for him, especially if he has worked hard to prepare his sermon and really wants to tell it to everyone. It is especially hard for him if this happens quite often. And more likely than not, those staying away aren't really doing so because they really cannot come. How many times have you stayed home from church because you had company, had to go on a picnic, or some similar "reason"? Staying away from church gets to be a bad habit. You learn to grow away from the brethren instead of growing toward them in love and faith. In staying away from church you soon begin to tolerate little things that are unchristian which, in turn, grow into big things that are unchristian. You, as a church, have hired a minister to come and live in your town, to preach for you, to guide you as Christians. So, therefore, it is YOUR responsibility to support him not only in money, but in your attendance; listening to what he has to tell you. He isn't up there just talking for the fun of it. What he is saying really matters; it is what this world is really all about. And when the attendance is like it should be, and everyone is listening and working in the church like Christians should be, then your minister has a far greater peace of mind and it helps him to be a better minister.

Being a Christian

What is this world all about anyway? Is it just running around, working to make more money so we can run around some more? This working is, of course, an essential part of daily living. But, if you profess to be a Christian — that is what living is all about, being a Christian—you have to live it 24 hours a day. It includes quite a list of requirements and it does take a lot of nose-to-the-grindstone type of effort to really be one. It is not always easy. But one thing that makes it easier is your regular attendance at church. The regular assembling of Christians together to hear God's words, to talk and discuss together the ways and problems of our lives, is

one of the biggest helps in the world toward becoming AND remaining a good Christian.

The Day Approaching

At the end of our opening verse it states "and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." What day? The day that all of us are praying and waiting for, the second coming of Christ. That is our aim as Christians. We have studied and read our Bibles, and we believe that certain things are happening in Israel that the Bible predicts, and it does not seem far off when that great day of Christ's return will be an actual thing. But it says "so much the more." So much the more should we "assemble ourselves" and exhort one another as we see this day coming. Certainly we feel that the ever-increasing calamities of the world which come before this glorious day should drive us to seek the sanctity of the church and the help it can give us. We are truly fortunate that we can still turn to our churches and ministers. It is not in every country that it can be done today. And we may yet face a time when persecution is coming to us. So, while our churches and services are yet available, let us not take them for granted. If we want to be in the number to be saved when the Lord does come we must remember that we must always, unwaveringly, stand fast for him. God is not going to remember us unless we constantly remember him in our everyday lives.

General Conference Progress

Board of Directors Meet

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference held its first regular meeting since the 1970 General Conference on November 13 and 14. The full Board was present.

Bro. Allan Ramsey of Warsaw, Indiana, who conducts the annual audit, reviewed the financial report with the Board. He pointed out that the operation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1970, shows a net loss of \$471.73. By comparison the net loss of the previous year was nearly \$9,000, and the year before that over \$11,000. From these statistics, it is encouraging to see that our general operating picture has steadily improved over the past few years. We want to commend the membership of the Church of God General Conference for making this progress possible. The main portions of the financial report will appear in the January issue.

The committee to study annuities made its report, and the Board of Directors set up certain guidelines for annuity contracts. The annuity plan is an excellent way to make gifts to the General Conference and still retain income benefits for life. This is especially beneficial to older people. Contact the Executive Secretary, Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061, for more details.

The department heads met with the Board and presented their respective reports. It was noted that Oregon Bible College began the year with a total enrollment of fifty-five, the highest ever. One Nigerian student, Anthony Idiong, decided to leave the college, however three others remain to continue their education. Sales for the past fiscal year were up \$6,200 over last year. One new tract, "Do You Ever Think About God?" has been made available and many other tracts have recently been reprinted.

A great need in the Publishing Department is more subscriptions to *The Restitution Herald*. Many Church of God families do not now subscribe to this fine paper. Several churches subscribe for each member family. The General Conference Board would encourage this practice for all churches, so each member would receive the paper.

The Council on Christian Education reported, and much progress is being made there. A further report will be made in a few weeks. Report was received from the

committee to study the need for a Board of Family Life; further study is in process in this area.

A parsonage has been erected on the Digby, Nova Scotia church site adjacent to the Lighthouse Mission Church. The brethren there should be commended for this forward step to provide housing for their pastor.

A committee to study the shortage of pastors made its report. A survey was taken of those men who have left the ministry. Further study is being made to determine how to best stop this trend.

The Board of Directors and all the Staff at General Conference headquarters extends Christmas greetings to all the members and friends of the Church of God General Conference. May the New Year of 1971 bring you abundant blessings.

Mission Builders League

The present active members of Mission Builders League have been renumbered and the total is now 724. Each of these members agrees to pay five dollars or more to each appeal approved by the General Conference Board of Directors, with a limit of two each year. If you would lik to join this group, send your name and address to Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061. Garden Park, Grand Rapids, Michigan, is receiving appeal number 25 now in the mail.

Conference Finances

We are sorry to report that for the second straight month of the new fiscal year the contributions have fallen far short of the goal. It appears that the November giving will be \$2,000.00 short of the needs. With a higher budget, the giving needs are greater. We trust that the membership of the Church of God General Conference will meet the needs.

Lebanon

India

Last month Bro. S. S. Manoah and others visited three villages near their church in Thomas Town, where they distributed nearly fifteen hundred tracts and witnessed to the people. In one of the villages the response was good, and here a Bible class is held each Wednesday afternoon. Nearly sixty children and youth are attending the class which is conducted by Bro. and Sr. Raja Singh. Bro. Manoah feels that through the children, the adults can be 'brought to the knowledge of Christ.

Bro. Theoplus is in charge of the combined Sunday school of the Austin Town and Wilson Gardens areas,

and Sr. Daniel takes care of the children in the Sunday school conducted near St. John's Medical College. The boys and girls at the Thomas Town church completed their Sunday school examinations and enjoyed a social gathering, at which time prizes were awarded and refreshments enjoyed.

Nigeria

The district committee and the trustees of the Nigerian churches met for their regular district meeting the last part of September. Bro. A. A. Obot reported on his trip to the United States, and other business was discussed and acted upon.

Three of the Nigerian students are continuing their studies at Oregon Bible College. Bro. Anthony Idiong felt it necessary to discontinue his studies, and he left Oregon the last of October.

Missionary Personnel Needed

We are thankful for the many prayers and the fine financial support of our people for the cause of missions. There is one more thing, however, that we do need, and that is people who are willing to go to the mission field to help teach others of Christ.

There are three areas where missionary workers are needed. We feel that a married couple would be beneficial to the work in Mexico. Sr. Alice Aldrich has been doing a good work with the children, but it would be helpful to have someone to work with the young people and the adults, along with Bro. Francisco Martinez.

To help at the Lighthouse Mission Church in Nova Scotia, we are interested in finding a retired couple that would be willing to live in Digby and assist in the church work as good lay workers.

When Bro. Obot was here from Nigeria, he asked that we consider sending someone from here with a teaching degree to be the head of their commercial high school. Up until this time they have had to depend on people who are outside of the church, and they would rather not do this.

We would ask each of you to prayerfully and carefully consider the question that the Apostle Paul once asked, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?"

Academic Calendar

Our academic calendar is divided into three parts: fall semester, winter semester, and spring session. The two semesters consist of fifteen weeks of classes each. The spring session will be four weeks, April 26-May 21. Each semester is divided into two sections. A two-semester-hour course consists of 1500 minutes of class time; a three-semester-hour course consists of 2250 minutes of class time. Classes which meet during the morning are held for two fifty-minute class periods, five days a week, for 23 or 24 days for a three-semester-hour course. When courses are completed at the end of a five-week block, exams are taken; the students then go on to other courses during the next block. This plan enables students to concentrate on a few subjects at a time and the possibility of learning is increased.

Winter Semester

The calendar is set for the winter semester which will start January 4. President Alva Huffer will teach Systematic Theology, John Lewis will teach New Testament IV, Bible Survey II, Christian Ethics, Introduction to Doctrine, and Preaching IV. Eugene Stilson will teach English II, Between the Testaments, Evangelism II, Principles and Practice of Teaching, and Church History I and II. Francis Burnett will teach Misused Texts, Old Testament II, and Old Testament IV. Rachel Krogh will teach Choir and Spanish II. Stanley Ross will teach Church of God History. Dale Ramsey will teach History and Appreciation of Music. Robert Jones will teach Introduction to Physical Science, and Iris Burnett will teach Today's Woman and the Church.

Evangelism and Your Sunday School

The Great Commission is basic in detailing the burden that should rest on everyone who would maintain a daily hope in the coming of Jesus Christ. To the Sunday school worker, student and teacher alike, he is saying: "Go ye therefore, and teach" to lead them to accept me as their Saviour, and then continue "teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you" (Matt. 28:19, 20). We must all keep talking of the things that are precious concerning our Lord and his coming Kingdom.

Close Personal Work

It is recognized that the pastor works in close fellowship with his flock, but seldom if ever does he have opportunity to maintain close teacher-student relationship with a particular age or grade group as does the Sunday school teacher. This relationship brings with it a personal caring, that for the teacher can only be expressed in personal loving, reaching, and teaching. This closeness of relationship brings a blessedness in opportunity that says (through personal conviction and consecration of the teacher), "I love you and I want to show you and tell you about my Saviour who died for both of us."

Membership Roll

The teacher has a weekly, automatic, powerful incitement to action in the Sunday school attendance book. Even though others should mark the book each week for attendance, the teacher should go over that book to know definitely who is absent. The efficient superintendent will be sure that each teacher has either the attendance book or a list of the absentees every Sunday.

Sunday School Teaching Includes Calling

No one in Sunday school work should separate personal calling from teaching. "To reach them best in the classroom, you must reach them in their home at least quarterly."

The teacher must call on ALL of his students.

On the regulars: to encourage their faithfulness in attendance and participation in class activities and in calling on other members and prospects of the class.

On the absentees: to give Sunday school papers, bulletin, etc.; to give a brief summary of lesson(s) missed; to tell of future plans of class activities, such as projects, lessons, and socials; to offer to pick them up next Sunday if needed; and to let them know that they were sincerely missed. Personal calling can produce more fruit for God's glory than classroom teaching. We need both.



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Known Only to God

By a Concerned Pastor

ANOTHER pastor is leaving the ministry! How can this man who took a vow to faithfully serve his God by ministering to God's people in the church so callously ignore and forget the "high calling"? Has this man been wooed by the glitter and pleasures of this world? Before drawing some quick conclusion and condemning this man consider the following.

His Call and Training

With a heart full of a desire to serve, this man sacrificed a possible lucrative position to study—long and hard—for the ministry. At last graduation day came. After being duly questioned, he found he had a license to "perform all services incumbent on a minister of the gospel."

This pastor never expected to get rich in the ministry, and he knew that some people have little respect for God, Jesus Christ, and the church, so he did not expect anyone to bow at his feet.

Now every good Christian knows that God understands all about our troubles. Certainly, if any man lacks anything he should talk to the Lord about it; all good pastors have this ingrained in them. A pastor should never complain about working conditions (he chose the ministry); the condition of the parsonage (Jesus did not have a place to lay his head); the cantankerous board members (Jesus had his Judas); and certainly should never mention money (the love of money is the root of all evil).

So, when the minister has had all he can stand—the tires are worn thin, the shoes run over, the bills unpaid,

and his ulcers are about to put him in his grave—he throws in the sponge and says, "I've had it!" Who really is to blame?

Known Only to God

The agonies through which the pastor passes as he tries to walk the tightrope over the Niagara of some persons' whims; the hours he spends trying to figure how he can make his \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00 a year gross salary meet the bills in this economy are "known only to God"! It is time they become known in the midst of the Church of God!

A man will work his heart out if he is praised rather than criticized. When his work is picked to pieces, after a time he will say, "What's the use?" The seven last words of the church could well be, "We've never done it this way before"! Back your pastor and his program for the good of the Lord's work!

That Time of Year

This is the time of year when pastors and churches are considering their positions for the 1971-72 church year. Church board members should look realistically at their pastoral programs. Whether we like it or not, an underpaid pastor cannot do a good job. Instead of saying, "How little can we pay and still keep our pastor?" you should ask, "What would happen to the Lord's work if we did not have a pastor?" Looking realistically at the last question, you should then ask, "How MUCH then can we pay? What unproductive things can be cut from our church budget? What costly frills can be removed from the Sunday school and church programs so we can meet the rising cost of living for our pastor?"

Be realistic! The average pastor spends \$1500.00 per year for automobile expenses; \$1500.00 plus per year for food; tithes \$500.00 on a salary of \$5,000.00; and income taxes and Social Security for a husband and wife would be about \$500.00 per year. (Incidentally, your pastor pays 7% Social Security tax on the rental value of the parsonage.) Utilities cost about \$525.00 per year, and his insurance program about \$240.00. He attends conferences, pays dues, buys books, etc., for a total annual ministerial expense of approximately \$200.00. After all of this come state income tax, personal property tax, and state automobile excise tax; also the doctor, dentist, and barber; then clothing, furniture, a vacation (?), and savings (What's that?).

High Hopes

Your pastor goes to a board or congregational meeting feeling that surely this will be the time his need will be acknowledged, and a raise—at least equal to the rise in the cost of living—will be granted. Instead, it is decided to carpet the sanctuary and install air conditioning, have a "superduper" Sunday school picnic, buy new church pews, and put in different color stained glass windows that will "be more appealing to the eye."

So, back to the parsonage, back to the bills, back to a review of the church's apathetic attitude toward community outreach, goes the pastor!

Financial Report

The Financial Report for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 1970, appears on page six in this issue. The report shows that the net cash received in excess of expenditures for the total operation was over two thousand dollars. This covers all income and expenditures including earmarked funds.

We find that the Church of God General Conference has become a rather sizeable institution when monies received including sales, bequests, and all contributions total well over two hundred thousand dollars for the year. The Net Worth of the Conference at the end of the year is over three hundred thousand dollars.

Staff Travels

Members of the General Conference staff travel many miles and put in many hours of time to fill pulpits, assist in services, and promote the work of the several departments of the Conference. In recent weeks Sr. Rachel Krogh took part in the missionary conference at Columbia Station, Ohio, and visited the Mexico mission fields, and had services at five churches en route.

Bro. Francis Burnett accompanied the three Nigerian students to Minnesota for services at the Faith Community Church of God in Minneapolis, and attended the Minnesota Missionary Conference there. He also spoke at Rockford, Ill. Bro. John Lewis was speaker at the Oregon Church in November, and Bro. T. M. Ferrell in December. Bro. S. O. Ross has been at Rockford and Casey, Ill.; Hope Chapel, Columbus, Ohio, and was guest speaker at the dedication of their recently acquired church building; Columbia Station and Troy View, Ohio; and Eden Valley, Minn. The staff members are thankful for these opportunities to serve.

Reaching Forth in Seventy-One

The delegates at the 1970 General Conference adopted five-year goals called "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five." These included two-year and five-year goals. Each church and each individual should be challenged to begin striving for these goals. Some of the more immediate goals were that every member family be a subscriber to *The Restitution Herald;* that Oregon Bible College attain an enrollment of sixty, and that each member of the Church of God General Conference teach at least one person. Conference Finances

The delegates to the 1970 General Conference, who represent the entire membership of the Church of God, voted a budget which requires \$105,000.00 in contributions to meet the goals. During the first three months of the fiscal year the giving has fallen behind. Commitmer are made that must be met regularly such as: support to foreign missionaries; pastoral aid to churches; staff and employee salaries; monthly accounts payable; and heat, light, postage, general upkeep, and the many miscellaneous bills that need to be paid.

We are thankful to each person, each church, and each state conference which has so generously assisted in the years past. As we begin this new year of 1971 we challenge each one to a further dedication to the meeting of these needs, and we solicit the prayers, concern, and support of the entire Church of God family. Best wishes for a happy and prosperous 1971 in the Lord's service.

Bro. and Sr. Jamal Sunna'a continue to work with the peoples of the Middle East. At the present time there are thirty-eight members in all—twenty-two in Beirut; eight

Madaba, Jordan; three in Damascus, Syria; three in Baghdad, Iraq; and two in Tripoli, Lebanon. Bro. Sunna'a hopes to travel to Egypt, visiting the cities of Cairo, Alex-

andria, and Asyout, where people have shown an interest in knowing more of the truths of God's Word.

Your Call?

"But I don't feel that the Lord has called me to be a missionary," said the young man to the missionary worker who was home on furlough. Perhaps his words express the feeling of others in regard to missionary service. When we speak of a missionary "call" some people may think of a special vision or some other kind of unusual experience which they would know to be a definite call to service in the mission field. But such experiences are not commonplace.

Actually there are two aspects of the missionary call, the first of which is general. This is synonymous with the Great Commission that Jesus gave, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations." It is the call that Christ gave to all those who follow him. Just as the invitation to accept salvation is general and given to all sinners, so is the call to service given to all Christians.

But, the call to salvation is incomplete until the sinner responds by coming to Christ; and the call to witness is also incomplete until the Christian freely offers himself for service.

Then there is the particular aspect of the missionary call. It is here that we run into the question of where and in what capacity a person will serve. This aspect of the call is more a matter of guidance—letting God lead us into that place where he needs us.

As we can see, the first call is fundamental to the second. If we have not responded to the Great Commission, then certainly there is no need to discuss any further aspects of missionary service.

The need is great! It has been estimated that people are being born into the world thirty times faster than the church is making converts. More missionaries need to be sent out to reach these people with the message of life in Christ.

Consider again very carefully the command of Christ, then let God have complete control and be sensitive to his wishes. It may be that he is calling YOU into his service.

In the parable in Luke 13 it is stated, "Unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required: and to whom men have committed much, of him they will ask the more."

Much has been committed to the Church of God. He has entrusted us with his Word, the message of salvation found in Christ. The responsibility is obviously great.

Oregon Bible College feels the weight of this responsibility. As we come nearer to the time in which Christ will return to the earth we must ever expand our program in every way to provide better training and preparation for Christian workers. By being adequately prepared for the problems that confront them in full-time Christian service our young people can resist the discouragements that come with difficult problems. In increased confidence in his professional development for the Lord Jesus Christ the young person makes himself and others around him able to stand.

For increased ability in Christian service we must not be fearful of the unknown or the untried. It must not be said that we sinned through ignorance, that we could not present excellence in Christian service because we did not know and were too fearful to try new methods and ideas in training.

Youth Week Winner

Big Business

The BIGGEST business in the world is that of the church. The BIGGEST feeder of people into the church is the Sunday school. Thus, the Sunday school is really the BIGGEST business on earth and produces the world's finest product—Christians.

Just because it is big is no reason to think it will coast along and continue to be big and successful. It is big because over the years many people have dedicated their lives to God in this work and he has blessed. He has opened doors and then given the strength and necessary talents to go through and "do business" for his glory.

The "bigness" and "blessing" demand our BEST. Never should any Sunday school worker be guilty of giving less than his best in this work of all works. This is especially true of those who lead. The following are some considerations for the Sunday school superintendent. If you are not the superintendent, read the following that you might help yours be a better one. The order of this list in no way indicates importance—all are.

- 1. Arrive at least 20 minutes before S.S. starts.
- 2. Be at your best when you arrive. (You wouldn't handicap your wages by lack of sleep; respect God's work more.)
 - 3. Pray daily for your staff and teachers.
- 4. Set and publish goals: for your entire S.S.—growth; for each class—attendance, projects, evangelism; for each teacher—faithfulness, calls made, class growth, study lesson daily, attend teacher training.
 - 5. Provide continuous teacher training.
- 6. Schedule and program special days. (Appoint a different committee for each special day.)
- 7. Attend other services of the church. You can't teach and not do.
- 8. Provide a monthly report for the church board; attendance, offering, evaluation of past and future program.
 - 9. Confer with your pastor personally; seek his advice.
 - 10. Know what is being taught in each class.
 - 11. Be sure that supplies are ordered ahead of need.
- 12. Begin and close ON TIME. If you don't, why announce a time? People who care are punctual.
- 13. Deputize responsibility. The chief cause for failure among S.S. superintendents is refusal to let others take responsibility, and failure to supervise those who are given responsibility.

Child Training and the Faith

By the Editor

THE BIBLE has much to say about the faith and the important relationship child training has in the continued existence of the faith on the earth. We are sure that if the Lord should tarry, the faith as we know it would become extinct because Christian parents are failing to teach their children.

Three Great Forces

There are three great forces operating in the building of a life—heredity, environment, and the will. "The child is born in part, he is made in part, and in part he makes himself."—Horne.

Heredity. We all inherit qualities and potentialities from our parents and other ancestors. We also inherit weaknesses and tendencies. We believe this is how God visits "the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation" (Ex. 20:5). We may not be able to affect the color of hair and eyes of our future unborn offspring, but we can insure by clean and healthful living that they will receive a good start, physically.

Environment. It is not a case of heredity OR environment, as both are important in the development of one's personality. Mother and father—home conditions—are important in the formation of character. It is said that the age of two marks the half-way point in the amount of influence a parent can exert in his child's life. It is important that we begin training our children from infancy to have proper attitudes toward God, the church, and the Bible!

The will. Until one has reached the age of accountability—has learned that he is responsible for controlling his own personality, heredity and environment dominate. The will—the decision-making power, volition, self-control—is the third powerful force in forming a life. Environment can overcome heredity, but the will can override both.

Our Duty

As Christian parents, we realize our "children are an heritage of the Lord" (Psa. 127:3), that they are "loaned" to us for a few short years. It is our duty to bring them up to know the God who gave them to us. It is our duty to give them godly instruction, firm correction, and a strong example.

Instruction. "Train up a child in the way he should go: and [even] when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Prov. 22:6). The word "train" here means to "dedicate, give instruction" (Y.C.). We must begin our instruction early, as the first twelve years of life are the age of instruction; after that comes the age of reason. Correct instruction is important, because youngsters will believe what they are told, right or wrong.

Of our father Abraham God said, "I know him, that he will command [charge] his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord" (Gen. 18:19). Rabbi J. H. Hertz says of this text: "An important doctrine is here taught in connection with the word 'command."

... It is the sacred duty of the Israelite to transmit the Jewish heritage

to his children after him. The last injunction of the true Jewish father to his children is that they walk in 'the way of the LORD.' "—Pentateuch & Haftorahs.

It is because of Israel's faithfulness in teaching her children that the nation exists today. God commanded through Moses that his words should be taught "diligently" by the parents to their children in the home situation. (See Deut. 6:4-9.) God commanded us in the church to do the same thing when he said: "Ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture [correction] and admonition [instruction] of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4). The Sunday school is man's attempt to make up for the failure of the parents in their duty to teach.

Correction. One of the saddest records of parental failure to correct is the story of Eli and his sons. God said he would judge the house of Eli "because his sons made themselves vile, and he restrained them not" (1 Sam. 3:13). "Either he did not rebuke them severely enough (2:23, 24); or . . . he rebuked them too late."—Wycliffe Commentary.

The Proverbs are full of advice about correction. "He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth him betimes" (13:24). "The rod and reproof give wisdom: but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame" (29:15). It is not love to leave a child uncorrected.

Example. The old saw, "Do as I say, not as I do," is not valid. "Like

Nigeria

Bro. A. A. Obot, director of the Nigerian work, reports that recently "one hundred people were baptized, and we praise the Lord for his love and care towards us in his work." The classes of the Ross Commercial School are in progress and a new building is nearing completion.

In the December issue of Progress Journal we reported that Bro. Anthony Idiong felt it necessary to leave his studies at Oregon Bible College. It was our understanding when he left here that he would return to Nigeria. However, since that time, we have learned that Bro. Idiong did not return home and is still in the United States.

Philippines

We were happy to hear from Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero that through the radio work many of the scattered brethren have been strengthened. You may remember that early last year members of the Mangandingay Church (who are farmers) had to settle in other places because of the lack of rainfall. Now these people, who settled in the forested area of the Quirino Sub-Province, have formed a congregation and have been conducting Sunday services since September. They are now requesting a pastor to come to be with them.

Other scattered members have also reassembled and are desirous of having a minister for their group. In addition, Bro. Ortiguero has received requests for tracts, visits in homes, and evangelistic meetings. Continue to pray for the radio work in the Philippines.

December 28-31, 1970, the ninth annual Philippine Church of God Conference was held at the Uddiawan Church. Many of the brethren gathered to make decisions concerning the Lord's work in the year ahead.

A group of armed terrorists called the Huks have been causing trouble in Villaros where Bro. Insturo Magno is pastor. They have convinced some of the people of the village to join them and have threatened death to those who may be found against them. Pray earnestly for the brethren in this area that the Lord will protect them. Pray also that through the witness of the Christians, the Huks may come to know Christ. With God all things are possible.

Mexico

On December 21, 1970, the Superintendent of Foreign Missions left for Mexico to visit the mission work there. Accompanying her were Jane Cupp from Oregon Bible

College; Sharon Guiles of Rockford, Ill.; Lynne Knapp and David Krogh from Grand Rapids, Mich.

The group arrived in Saltillo, Mexico on Christmas Day and participated in the program held that evening in the home of Sr. Alice Aldrich. About one hundred fifty people attended the program, which included recitations and special music by the children and young people.

The following day we traveled to the village of Labor Vieja (300 miles south of Saltillo) where Bro. and Sr. Roberto Badillo and family live. They, too, had saved their program until our arrival and it was held on Sunday evening outdoors under the stars. Again about one hundred fifty people gathered to hear the recitations and songs of the children and to see the play presented by the young people. We were impressed with the fine job done by all who participated and by Sr. Badillo who worked with them and directed the program.

Monday evening a service was held in the church building with the Saltillo and United States visitors offering musical selections and Bros. David Krogh and Francisco Martinez presenting messages.

On the return trip to Saltillo the next day a stop was made at the village of Potosi for a service and time of fellowship with the people there.

During the holidays people from the mountain villages come out and stand by the highway with boxes outstretched so the travelers will give them money or food. We took advantage of this and distributed many pieces of literature to these people and others we saw as we traveled.

In Saltillo on New Year's Eve the brethren gathered in Alice's home for a time of fellowship. Everyone enjoyed singing favorite gospel songs with the guitars and accordion followed by the celebration of the birthdays of Lynne Knapp and Abel Alvarez. We began the new year with a season of prayer in which all participated.

While traveling in the United States stops were made at the Gatesville, Harlingen, and Beaumont, Tex., churches, the Happy Woods Church in Hammond, La., and the New Hope Church, Little Rock, Ark., for a special missionary service.

It was a blessing to return to Mexico and to see all of our friends again, and we are thankful for this opportunity. Again we see the great need of the people there and pray the Lord will provide more laborers for this field.

The tuition cost for the 1971 Berean Youth Conference will be \$33.00, compared to \$30.00 in the past. This is necessary due to a rising cost per day at Camp Mack. This price was in effect in 1970, but due to the fact that we had only a 5-day conference we did not raise the tuition. It may be necesary to raise it to \$35.00 in 1972.

The 1971 BYF Conference will be held six days. Many of the staff workers have already accepted the call to help. We are anticipating it to be a week of tremendous impact upon everyone who attends. There will be some new features, plus the tried and true and loved features—quizzing being one of the highlights of the past few years.

We will be limited to an enrollment of 300 young people. We have heard of several who are planning to attend for the first time. Enrollment blanks will be in the March-April issue of *Challenge*, and extra blanks will be sent to youth leaders.

Berean Youth Caravans

The delegates to the 1970 Berean Youth Conference voted to have two one-car caravans in 1971. The Junior Caravan will be for those in the ninth through the eleventh grades. The Senior Caravan for those twelfth grade and post-high. The Junior Caravan is scheduled to work in the Northeast Youth Camp, Troy, Ohio, in July. The Senior is to do "inner-city" work. The tentative arrangement is for this to be done in Minneapolis with Bro. Don Needham as sponsor.

Each caravan is to have five members and a sponsor. We feel this is a wonderful opportunity for the Bereans to reach out and use their talents to help others. Details for the Senior Caravan will be in the mail soon. An enrollment blank for the Junior Caravan will be in the March-April issue of *Challenge*.

A Special Kind of Crusade

The Advisory Council which met during the Post-High Winter Retreat decided to have a "walk-a-thon" crusade in April. This crusade will have a twofold purpose: 1) to be a witness for the faith, and 2) to raise funds for the BYF budget. The week set for the crusade is April 18-24, 1971. Material will be sent to youth leaders very soon. This is to be international in scope, and it is something in which every Berean group can participate. The success of the crusade will depend much upon the support given to the Bereans by the adults.

Handicapped

WE ARE all aware of the life and ministry of Jesus; how he went about doing good and proclaiming God's message wherever he went. He grasped opportunities to talk to people where he found them, like the woman at the well in Sychar, Samaria. His purpose was to preach and show the good news of the Kingdom of God. (Luke 8:1.)

We are all aware, also, that Jesus commanded his followers—in all ages —to do as he had done; to "preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15, 16). The disciples of the first century were zealous in carrying out his will, but we are not so good at this, because we're HANDICAPPED.

But, when we think of how we let our handicaps deter us from doing what we should, we should stop and realize that almost every servant of God mentioned in the Bible had something to hold him back from serving the heavenly Father.

Abraham Handicapped

When God called Abraham to follow him, he asked him to leave his country, relatives, and his father's house, to go into a land he would show him. God realized Abraham's family was a handicap to him. According to Joshua 24:2, Abraham's father, Terah, was an idolater, and this held Abraham back from serving the one, true God. In spite of his handicap, Abraham proved himself a man of faith.

When God called Moses at the burning bush in Sinai, Moses began to numerate his handicaps. (Ex. 3:1 to 4:17.) First, he said, "Who am I? What can I, just one person, do about

delivering my people from bondage?" God said, "Certainly I will be with thee." Moses' fourth difficulty was a true handicap, "I am not eloquent." God may have tired of this and chosen Aaron to be spokesman, but we know from the record that Moses was adequate in speaking for God in spite of his handicap.

Amos and Hosea were also handicapped, but they served God in spite of them. Amos said he was not a prophet, nor the son of a prophet, but a herdsman and gatherer of fruit, but God used him. (Amos 7:14, 15.) The Prophet Hosea had the handicap of an adulterous wife, yet God used him, and caused his life story to be a type of God's relationship with his adulterous wife. Israel.

Apostles Handicapped

The apostles who served the Lord so faithfully were also handicapped. It was noted of them that they were "unlearned and ignorant men," that is, unschooled laymen. (Acts 4:13.) Yet, the Jewish leaders could not deny the words and works of these men, and the church grew by the thousands.

The Apostle Paul is noted for his great missionary labors. Yet, according to his own words, he performed in the face of a handicap—"thorn in the flesh" (2 Cor. 12:7-11). Paul said he asked the Lord three times to remove this handicap, but was reminded that his grace was sufficient, and his strength made perfect in weakness. One has only to read of Paul's labors and his trials to realize what a handicapped man can do, with God's help.

The early church as an organization

or movement was also handicapped. It was opposed by the Jews at every turn. Its leader and Lord, Jesus, was put to death. Stephen was stoned to death, and James was killed with the sword. The Romans also saw this movement as a threat, so they did their best to stamp out Christianity. But it thrived under these handicaps.

Our Handicaps

As a church, and as individuals, we have handicaps. Our organization is small, with our General Conference budget being smaller than many individual churches of other faiths. Many of our congregations are so small they cannot support a full-time minister, and their budgets barely large enough to keep the doors open. Many of our buildings are inadequate for growth, or are unattractive. Our doctrine is a "handicap," in that it cannot be learned in a day, and its demands discourage some.

Besides the organizational handicaps, we all are handicapped in some way. Some say, "I'm too young to teach." But, he Bible is full of examples of the young serving God. Some say, "I'm ashamed of our church and doctrine." For 'his we must give account. "I'm just one person," others say. Multiply what you can do by the number in your church, and you will

see it is considerable.

Dr. John W. Gardner once said, "We are all faced with a series of great opportunities - brilliantly disguised as insoluble problems" (RD, March, 1966). With God's help we can overcome our handicaps and be effective workers for him.

Annuities and Special Gifts

Some members of the Church of God General Conference are aware of deferred giving to the General Conference and to their local churches. Many are not yet aware of these programs. There are several ways one can make a contribution to the church or conference that can be beneficial to the donor also by tax savings and income assurance for life.

Some avenues for this type of giving are through life insurance, revocable gifts, short-term trusts, transfer of properties, bargain sale gifts of property or stocks and bonds, and annuities. The annuity program is one that is especially inviting to older people. It assures income for life, avoids gift taxes for the recipient, and has some tax credit benefit to the donor at the time of establishment of the program.

Each annuity is a separate contract and established on its own merits, however the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference has set up certain guidelines. The minimum age for a man is 60 years and for a woman 59 years. The donor deposits a sum of money with the General Conference, and the Conference pays to the donor a payment (usually semi-annually) at the rate established in the contract. The tentative rate schedule used is: at age 60—5.5%; age 65—6%; age 70—6.5%; age 75—7%.

Gift to General Conference

Late in 1970 Dr. and Mrs. William D. Lawrence and family of Phoenix, Ariz., donated to the Church of God General Conference an office building located at 1801-1815 W. Indian School Rd., in Phoenix. This building is occupied by seven individual firms. Rentals cover all payments and expenses and the building is growing in equity and bringing in a small profit.

Such gifts of appreciated property are advantageous for the donor and, of course, are a valuable asset to the Church of God General Conference. The tax credit for the donation is figured on the appraised value at the time of donation and in this age of inflation this often represents a considerable amount.

The Church of God General Conference is prepared to guide and advise those who are interested in donations of appreciated property as well as the handling of wills, bequests, annuities, and so forth. These often provide the donor with real tax savings as well as being a blessing to the Lord's work.

On behalf of the membership of the Church of God General Conference, we take this opportunity to express our thanks and appreciation to the William Lawrence family for the donation of this office building. The General Conference will invest the proceeds in the Lord's work.

Figuring Goals for Giving

The delegates to General Conference adopt a budget and set the goals needed for the fiscal year. One twelfth of this total amount is needed each month to keep up the operation of the General Conference work. For the past several years when the giving for a month is below the needed goal, the balance needed before the end of the fiscal year was divided by the number of months remaining so the goal for the remaining months would be increased. This means that the deficit for that month would not be entirely reached until the end of the fiscal year, when the actual need is current or already past, and probably had to be met by loan. We believe the following system will be more advisable.

The total budget needs for this fiscal year are \$105,000. This divided by twelve months means that \$8,750.00 is needed each month to meet the goal. Henceforth, we will cite the goal for the month at \$8,750 plus any deficit up to that point. That is the realistic figure needed that particular month to carry out the work and cover the shortage for the past month.

Message from Sr. Emily Manoah

Sr. Emily Manoah, sister-in-law of Pastor S. S. Manoah, Bangalore, India, has been in the United States for correarly a year studying in Phoenix, Ariz. Following is the message she presented at the missionary conference held at the Bible Church of God, Tempe, February 6, 1971.

Dear Sisters and Brothers of Bible Church of God. I bring greetings from the fellow members of Bible Church of God, Bangalore, India. I received a letter from Bro. and Sr. S. S. Manoah saying that they are remembering us in their prayers and send their heartfelt thanks for each one of you. I praise God for his mercies and the wonderful ways he is guiding us. I am thankful for the good friends, and I am glad for this opportunity to stand before you and talk about my country and especially about the home church at Bangalore.

I would like to tell briefly about India. It is about one-third the size of the United States. There is a big contrast geographically, in climatic conditions, people, style, dress, and food habits. There is beauty, dust, dirt, and disease. The population is about 500 million.

The people are mild, friendly, hospitable, tolerant, and religious. India is not a Christian country. There are

three main religions — Hindu, sixty-five percent, Moslem, thirty percent, and Christian, about three percent.

There is a food problem. It is mainly because of population, which is also the reason for illiteracy and malnutrition. Since independence, the government has been trying to control population and to encourage education.

There are about twenty different dialects spoken throughout the states of India. There is a major difference between the northern and southern parts of India.

Bangalore is in South India. It is about the size of Phoenix, but the population is about a million. The Bible Church of God work in India was started by the Minnesota State Conference. It was carried out by Pastor Paul Vedantachari who was ordained in 1912. One of his converts, John Manoah, father of Bro. S. S. Manoah, continued the work in Bangalore. After his death, S. S. Manoah began preaching, and the Minnesota churches supported him. Later the General Conference assumed support of Bre. Mancah. Because of what has since been proven to be a misunderstanding, the support was stopped for some time. Bro. Manoah continued his ministry with some support from the Minnesota churches even though there were many hardships. The members of the church prayed earnestly and waited patiently. There was no church building and Sunday services were conducted in a small garage. In the vear 1964 the General Conference resumed support of the mission work in India. In 1967 a beautiful church building was built. We are thankful for all those who made it possible for us to have a place of worship. The church stands as a witness of your generosity and love towards your fellow Christians and non-Christians.

This church building was built at Thomas Town. There are seventy-five families in this area. Regular morning and evening Sunday services are held here. There are nearly two hundred people who gather for worship. Sunday school and youth meetings are conducted on Sunday, Bible study on

Tuesday, prayer groups on Thursday. The evening service on Friday, mothers' meeting on Saturday are also conducted here. We are thankful for Pastor Manoah who works very hard. I am sorry to say that we as church members do not do much for the church. I would like to stress the responsibility of each member towards the church. Regular cottage prayer meetings in members' houses, hospital visitation, preachers' training classes, and baptism classes are also conducted.

I am glad to say there is much progress made. It is mainly because of your financial support and prayers. There are three different places, namely John Nagar, Austin Town, and Wilson Gardens, where church groups are started. They are eager to learn the faith. These places are about ten to twelve miles from Thomas Town and conveyance is a problem. It is difficult for them to attend the church at Thomas Town. These three new groups are in three different places and we need a church in the center so that all these families can worship together. We are praying and request you to pray and contribute for the house of the Lord to bring more people to

Our poor children are receiving the education support. They are grateful to you and to God for the education they are able to get which their parents cannot afford. May God bless you abundantly and grant you joy for being responsible for educating the poor children.

There are many illiterate people in Bangalore and surrounding places who are in poverty and ignorant of the love of God. Recently Bro. Manoah and the church members have been able to carry the message of love to people in a small village where they went for open-air preaching. Regular Sunday classes are held, and one day we hope and trust that the whole village will accept the Lord.

There is poverty and sickness. Thanks for the medical aid sent from here. There is a full-time nurse and (Please turn to page 8)

Speech Theme for 1971

The title for the 1971 BYF Speech Contest, as chosen by contest director Paul Moore, is: Why Pass It On? This is in keeping with the general theme of the Youth Conference.

For the past two years, the contest has been divided into a contest for the men and one for the women. We would like to encourage more interest in the women's division. We have had especially good interest in the men's division for the last three years. Anyone entering the ninth grade through age 22 may enter the contest, with one exception. Anyone who may have had a semester in a preaching class at Oregon Bible College or elsewhere is not eligible.

The contest is based on the person's own ability to prepare and give a good speech. The length of the speech can be from 4½ to 7½ minutes, with approximately 6 minutes being considered a good length. The contestant is judged on platform behavior and topic, organization and development, delivery and language, and general effectiveness. The person giving the speech is to prepare his own. It is permissible to have help in the form of evaluation and criticism. But another should not prepare the speech to be given.

We ask you adults and parents to encourage those young people, especially the girls, who have the ability, to enter the 1971 Speech Contest at Camp Mack.

The "Walk-A-Thon" Crusade

Youth leaders, youth presidents, and pastors either have received material, or will soon, on this Crusade. The title adopted by the Advisory Council is: Blisters for Christ. As the title suggests, it is to be a walk in testimony of one's faith in Jesus Christ. One purpose of the Crusade is to raise money for the 1971 International Youth Department budget. Each young person who takes part will be paid a set amount per mile walked. The amount will be paid by the sponsor.

Who is the sponsor? The success of the Crusade will depend upon you, the adults, and your friends who will be the main sponsors. What does a sponsor do? You will agree to pay so much per mile that is walked—50¢, 25¢, 10¢. You pay after the walking is done, but you agree to pay before the walk. This is an incentive to the one doing the walking. Support your young people and also encourage your friends to support them. The week is April 18-24. Saturday, April 24, is the day for walking.

The Pastor and His Sunday School

The pastor is spiritual leader of the church—the entire church, which includes the Sunday school. This is his work. Peter said, in speaking of the work of the pastor, "Be shepherds of God's flock which is among you. Exercise the oversight not reluctantly but eagerly, in accordance with the will of God; not for base gain but with cheerful minds; not lording it over your churches but proving yourselves patterns for the flock to imitate" (1 Pet. 5:2, 3, Wey.).

To "exercise the oversight" means to beware, look diligently, even critically if necessary. Remember, as the church and pastor prayed for direction in his call, the pastor is God-appointed. Accept his leading, his pastoring.

The pastor oversees the overseers. This includes elders, superintendent, and teachers; overseeing not just their work, but their personal spirituality. We don't want any "talk only" leaders. The pastor is to lead them into a deeper spiritual experience with their Lord through prayer and Scripture. He is to feed them with spiritual food. He is to edify, help, assist, and aid them to serve in the best way in their respective fields. He is to support, lift, sustain, uphold, and maintain the closest spiritual bond possible in their relationships. As Jesus said to Peter, "Feed my sheep."

The shepherd will look for and recognize ill, faltering sheep in the flock and DO something about them. Let's not endure any Achans in our church. (See Josh. 7:1-11.) Paul said, "Whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it" (1 Cor. 12:26). He also told the young minister, Timothy, "Reprove, rebuke, exhort" (2 Tim. 4: 2). With tender love, the pastor must reach out to the spiritually sick, and especially as they may be found among officers and teachers. If he doesn't, who will?

The pastor's first work is to care for the flock, to see to their spiritual health and growth, and then to reach out beyond the flock to those outside the fold.

Now, what does all this mean to the members of the church? We have been talking directly to pastors, the shepherds of the flock. We hope every member of the flock has been listening, for now we would speak one word to the flock. Everything we have said that the pastor should mean to the flock, the flock should EXPECT! Encourage your pastor to be the shepherd of the flock. Invite him into your home, your life, that he may be your spiritual leader.

Krogh and Lawrence told of the "Faith-Promise" plan of giving to missions; a plan which has been proposed in several other places. A goal of \$3,000 was thought attainable, but before the twenty-minute session was finished, over \$6,000 had been "Faith-Promised." (Only the promiser and God are parties to this agreement.) The conference closed with a short resume of the cantata a fitting conclusion. One hundred twentysix people were registered.

were of their own making.



Sowing and Reaping

By the Editor

BE NOT deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Gal. 6:7-9).

An Unfailing Rule

It is an unfailing rule of nature that sowing and reaping are directly related; what we sow we will reap.

Paul applied this rule to the matter of church finance when he said, "He that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he that soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of [God's] necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:6, 7). The Preacher said, "Cast thy bread [seed] upon the waters: for thou shalt find it after many days" (Eccl. 11:1).

As Paul also indicated in his Galatian letter, this rule may also be applied to the moral life: "He that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption" (6:8). There is an indication here that a person who "sows his wild oats" will reap a harvest out of proportion to his sowing. Hosea 8:7 says Israel had wickedly "sown the wind," that is, to vain idols. God promised, "They shall reap the whirlwind." Israel received double for all er sins. (Isa. 40:2.) In pleading with the brethren to live pure moral lives, Paul said, "Flee fornication. Every [other] sin that a man doeth is with-

out the body; but he that committeth fornication sinneth against his own body" (1 Cor. 6:18).

The Spiritual Realm

The Scriptures are plain in showing the rule of sowing and reaping is applicable to the spiritual realm; the realm of truth.

Two of Jesus' well-known parables occur in Matthew 13; the Parable of the Sower and the Parable of the Tares. Sowing and reaping are involved in both. The former emphasizes the different soils and their reception of the seed, but the seed is all-important. Jesus said, "The seed is the word of God" (Luke 8:11). To receive the right kind of harvest — people truly dedicated to God—the good seed must be sown. We are held accountable for the purity of the seed we sow. (Gal. 1:6-9: 1 Cor. 9:16.)

The other parable in Matthew 13 has to do with tares. The wheat and tares are look-alikes at certain stages; but the darnel spoken of by Jesus is poisonous, and sown by the enemy. The end of the tares is to be by burning and destruction. In this parable the good seed represents the children of the kingdom—those who listen to God's Word and are on their way to the Kingdom. "The tares are the children of the wicked" (v. 38), "the children of disobedience," "the children of wrath" (Eph. 2:2, 3); those who do not listen to God's Word, and oppose God—men with fleshly minds.

We Are Sowing

Whether we realize it or not, we are in the process of sowing today. We are

sowing by word and deed; they are equally important.

There is a dangerous trend we see in this process of sowing and reaping. Some of the sowers among us are not very careful about the purity of the seed. They are distributing religious literature that is unbiblical, short on truth, and unable to bring a person to a saving knowledge of God and his Word.

More than this, many of our pastors are sowing seeds of liberalism and indifference. In a given week, they will be inviting their parishioners to participate in a community crusade led by a trinitarian, going-to-heaven, hellfire evangelist; join in a World Day of Prayer dedicated to social action, and led by a militant nun; join in a dialogue on the war in Southeast Asia; attend a seminar on methods of spreading the gospel given by persons who don't even know the gospel; attend a union "Good Friday" service; write to their congressman; accept a "member" into the church on a former immersion; vote for a novice for church office; or vote to discontinue services for the summer.

Remember the rule, we reap what we sow. Too, remember that in moral and spiritual deviations the reaping is often out of proportion to the sowing. We must be careful to sow only the best, for in this world even the best is choked out by the cares of this life. As a result of our sowing, will the harvest at the end of this age be a time of gathering righteous wheat into God's storehouse? or a time to burn chaff? Can God bless our sowing?

Largely speaking, our pupils get little or no personal attention for their Christian growth outside of what we as Sunday school teachers and officers give them. The moral "pollution" of the world "shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived." Just as it takes time to correct polluted water and air, so TODAY it takes time to teach, encourage, and introduce people—young and old—to the Great Purifier. (Mal. 3:3.)

Take Time

Decide right now—"I am going to *make* time to fulfill my Sunday school opportunities as I should." We MAKE time for the things we feel are important.

Teachers, budget your time and schedule personal calls on each of your students before summer vacations start.

Superintendents and pastors, arrange time when you can sit down with each of your teachers to discuss their teaching; giving them a chance to express their personal feelings about their teaching, their class, and possible problems.

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





For some time the brethren in the Wilson Gardens, Austin Town, and John Town areas of Bangalore have been holding their church services in homes, and they feel the need for a church building in which they can combine all three groups. A lot has become available to them at the cost of \$1,000.00, and they have asked us to help them secure it. We have agreed to provide the lot with the understanding that they will construct the building at a later time.

We remember your fine response to the appeal for funds to construct Thomas Town Church, and know you will want to help in providing the land for the second Church of God in India. The names of all those who contribute to this project will be published later.

Not long ago a person representing twenty families who live near the Wilson Gardens area came to Bro. S. S. Manoah requesting him to come and conduct services for them. Bro. Manoah was glad to go, and held the first service on April 4, 1971. He writes, "These people are Christians having Christian faith, but I must tell them and teach them our truth and faith. These people are laborers living in small houses and huts. They sing well in our local languages."

We have received correspondence from Pastor P. M. Paulson in Hyderabad who has seen some of our literature and is interested in translating it into the Telugu language for printing and distribution. Bro. Manoah hopes to visit this man to discuss with him the truths of God's Word. 

The OBC Alumni Association, with Kent Ross as president, continues its excellent program of student recruitment under the chairmanship of David Krogh. Through this program prospective students are provided with information and encouraged to attend the College.

The Booster campaign is sponsored annually during the month of May by the Board of Education. Persons in all of our churches become members by contributing at least one dollar to the Booster fund, which is used primarily to purchase books for the College library. Tuition and Fees for 1971-1972

Fall and Winter Semesters. The following table sets forth the charges payable by students each semester for the fall semester and the winter semester:

Board and room for dormitory students	325.00

Spring Session Fees. Full-time students who attend fall and winter semesters may attend the spring session without paying additional tuition fees. Visiting and part-time students will pay \$20.00 per semester hour for spring session courses.

Board and room for dormitory students during the spring session will be \$20.00 per week.

Payment of Fees. All bills for a semester are due and payable in full at the time of registration. A student is not registered and cannot attend classes until satisfactory financial arrangements have been made with the business office.

Should deferred payments be necessary for dormitory students, an installment agreement may be negotiated at an additional charge of \$10.00. Such arrangements will require the consent of parents for students under twenty-one and must be made well in advance of registration. Students who fail to meet the payment schedule will not be allowed to attend classes or remain in residence in the dormitory.

Programs of Studies

Oregon Bible College offers programs of studies leading to a Bachelor of Arts degree in Bible with a choice of three minors: Pastoral Studies, Missions, and Christian Education.

Each of these three programs includes a major in the Bible and Theology, with a minimum of 55 semester hours required in the major field. Each program requires courses in General Education and a minimum of 20 semester hours in the professional minor. A minimum of 126 semester hours is required for graduation.

The College continues to offer four correspondence courses (\$20 each), an annual Holy Land Tour Study Course, and four extension courses taught by Dallas Demmitt and Alva Huffer. Graduate programs in Pastoral Internship, Pastoral Studies, and Missionary Preparation are offered by the College in its graduate division at Tempe, Ariz.



SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

E. Milon Hall, Editor

Focal Point of the Sunday School

All Sunday school projects, programming, and activities are aimed at the teacher—outpouring Jesus to the student. Every work of the school is important, but none is an end in itself as is the relationship between the teacher and the student. The formulation and maintenance of that relationship is up to the teacher.

The study of the Old Testament is important in that the examples and warnings are aimed at leading us to see Jesus. (1 Cor. 10:11.) The law was a schoolmaster leading up to Jesus. (Gal. 3:24.) The person who does the personal teaching and leading to Jesus is the teacher.

The Pastor's Role

Pastoring the Sunday school is important, as the pastor is to provide spiritual leadership as shepherd. He improves the environment and creates a one-to-one relationship between himself and the teacher. Yet his ultimate goal is to improve the pupil-teacher relationship.

It is difficult to overemphasize the importance of the superintendent. He helps create and maintain the working rules of the school, that it may progress decently and in order. (1 Cor. 14:40.) He initiates the plans; he makes appointments; he supervises the entire program; he aids and counsels the teachers and the entire staff; he directs in every capacity needed; he sets goals and helps detail a program to reach them; and he works in a close side-by-side cooperation with the pastor in the leadership. Yet all his visualizing, his organizing, his deputizing, his supervising, and his analyzing lead to but one objective—to promote a situation wherein a teacher may lead students to Jesus.

Record Keeping

Record keeping is of no different value. It is important to know where you've been and to be able to profit from it. It is good to know where you are in order to realize it and to know where you want to "get from." Then it is vital to know where you are going and to clearly visualize it. But no record is worth its paper and ink unless it bolsters the class itself.

The purpose of every part of the program is for blessing, aiding, and assisting in a classroom situation where God's Word may be presented with love; that students may learn of God and his Son, accept Christ's Lordship, and grow in personally living for him.

Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors on May 1, 1971. The report is presented here so that delegates to the 1971 General Conference business sessions (August 9-14, 1971, Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa) will have opportunity to study it and form opinions and seek suggestions from the church or state conference whom they will represent.

This report covers the first eight months of the current fiscal year. The activities which occur between now and General Conference time will be reported orally at Conference. The progress and activities of the several departments are reported herein and some comments and observations of the work as a whole are also included.

We feel much progress has been made in most areas of the Conference work. At the 1970 General Conference two-year and five-year goals were set for each department. Many of the two-year goals have already been met. We trust that much more will be accomplished in the remaining months of this fiscal year. We are thankful to God and praise him for his blessings and guidance in all the activities of the various departments of the General Conference.

Sunday School Department

We praise the Lord for the cooperative spirit among the Sunday School Board members, and their continued expressed desire to be led by God. Each Board session was opened with consideration of a portion of Scripture and a season of prayer in which each took part. The Board consists of Willis Turner, Joyce Knapp, Russell Reye, Robert Huddlestun, and the Sunday School Superintendent, E. Milon Hall.

Two main problems have become apparent in endeavoring effectively to propagate and promote Sunday school growth:

- Presenting new ideas, methods, and procedures in such a way that they will be accepted and used.
- Endeavoring to eradicate old traditions that keep our Sunday schools from growing.

Our Sunday schools are only as strong as our pupilteacher relationship, and that relationship is the responsibility of a direct line of administration; first, the teacher, then the superintendent, and then the pastor. The pastor, as spiritual leader, feeds the superintendent and teacher. The superintendent helps the teacher put this feeding into practical teaching in the classroom, arranging the mechanical and environmental conditions conducive to good teaching. Thus the work of the General Conference Sunday School Board is to improve and promote the feeding, and to encourage the utilization thereof to its furthest extent. Yes, there can be successful teaching without the superintendent and pastor, but the probability is far less.

Our Sunday schools must be well-organized operative organisms, as was the early church, not a hit-ormiss approach with the hope of making a lucky hit.

During the past year the Sunday School Board activities have been numerous and varied, including the following:

Occasional meetings with members of the Council of Christian Education for confirmation of progress and ideas.

A survey was made whereby all of our Sunday schools were invited to participate, although only about half responded. The results of this survey served as a guide for planning our Sunday school seminars.

We have held Sunday school seminars in the following places: Michigan, Northeast Conference, Southern Illinois and Missouri, Northern Illinois and Iowa, and Indiana.

Each Sunday School Board member was assigned a special field for research and reporting. These were: Joyce Knapp, Home Study Courses; Russell Reye, New Ideas in Teaching Methods; Robert Huddlestun, Improving Teacher Training; Willis Turner, Organizing New Sunday Schools; Milon Hall, Standards for Teachers.

The results of the Sunday school survey revealed four outstanding observations: 1) our Sunday schools are tradition-bound; 2) they lack objectives; 3) they have little or no evangelism; and 4) little or no teacher training.

The Truth Seeker's Quarterlies printing dates were changed for four reasons: 1) To coincide with the school year; 2) Easter lessons will always be in the same quarter; 3) mailing of quarterlies will never be during the Christmas mailing rush; 4) to synchronize our publication with other publishers.

Promotion of the Home Study Courses was developed to consist of eight major courses. They are: General Bible Course, Bible Panorama, Prayer, Catechism, Prophecy, Youth, Science and the Bible, and What is the Holy Spirit?

In the consideration of the Sunday school seminars, it was decided that four elements are necessary for a successful conference. These are: a voice of authority, printed material, opportunity for individual participation, and a challenge for each to take home.

It was decided to compile and prepare a Sunday school folder to place in the hands of each one attending General Conference. This folder is to contain: 1) a welcome letter; 2) a copy of notes or papers presented in classes and sharing sessions on Sunday School Day; 3) a full set of the Home Study Courses; 4) a goals form, with a letter of challenge.

A Sunday school bulletin was published twice for the months of January and February, and a copy mailed to each Sunday school superintendent and pastor. This was published on a trial basis, and if found acceptable, and as time permits, is to be continued.

The General Conference Sunday School Board met at South Bend, Indiana, on four occasions.

Your Sunday School Superintendent conducted special Sunday school emphasis programming at the Southwest Conference October 21-25, and at Tempe, Ariz., October 27-29. He has also continued writing and editing for Sunday School Scope in PROGRESS JOURNAL.

Berean Youth Department

Youth Director Bro. Francis Burnett was privileged to attend the Southwest Conference in June, 1970, and to represent the BYF. The youth had asked for a special part in the 1970 General Conference program. This was granted, and a good program was given for which there were many commendations from the adults. A special feature during the program was to present a plaque to Sr. Evelyn Austin for her many years of faithfulness in the Berean work.

The 1970 Berean Youth Conference was among the

largest and, as usual, a fine time of fellowship and study. The attendance was 278 campers and a staff of 43. The theme was: They Came Rejoicing. A highlight of any Youth Conference is when young people will confess Jesus as personal Saviour. Twenty-seven did just this before the program ended. Several of them were from isolated communities and were baptized in Lake Waubee.

The Youth Caravan, which is sponsored by both the Bereans and the General Conference, was a huge success. Eight young people were chosen from among those who applied. This last caravan was made up of five young women and three young men, and Bro. & Sr. Burnett were the sponsors. The caravan left Oregon, Ill., on Monday, August 10. Its destination was Digby, Nova Scotia, to help in the Maritime Conference. The caravan spent eight days in Digby helping in the daytime with the Vacation Bible School and in the evening with the evangelistic services. The caravan ended its journey on Saturday, August 29, happy and weary after traveling 4,400 miles by car and 150 by boat.

The department work continues with all of the efforts of the past and a few new ones. Challenge is published bi-monthly. Bro. Kent Ross continues to be the editor and is doing a very good work. We, too, would like to thank all of those who take the time to contribute to Challenge in response to Bro. Kent Ross's request for this help. The Junior-Senior Lesson Manuals are published each six months. In a recent survey we found that approximately 55% of our Berean groups and leaders were using the lesson material. The Junior Manual editors are Bro. & Sr. Scott Ross, and the Senior editors are Bros. David Krogh and Michael Mattison. We would encourage you who are leaders of the church to look over these manuals. If your Bereans do not use them, it might be well to give thought to it. They are fine lessons and well prepared. At this time, we would like to thank all those who contribute lesson material to the editors. There are regular mailings of the Youth Leaders Memo, the Mission Dollar Club notices, the scheduling of the slide-sound sets, and many personal letters.

The Post-High Retreat of 1970-1971 was a tremendous success. It did just what it was purposed to do. This retreat was planned to give our post-high young people a chance to be together, and especially to give those in college a chance to relax. It was a most wonderful time, with 39 campers and 3 staff members in attendance. It was a real thrill for two or three to be on the ice on the lake for the first time in their lives. The retreat was held for three days and nights at Camp Alexander Mack, Indiana.

Youth Week, held in October, 1970, was very successful. We are thankful that you as adult leaders gave this time for recognition of our young people in your churches. Youth Week for 1971 will be October 18-24.

Planning is well underway for the 1971 Berean Youth Conference which will be July 25-31. There will be a staff of 45 and an expected enrollment of 300, which is near capacity. This full six-day program is a highlight of the year for any camper or staff member who is able to attend.

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department is responsible for publishing and distributing The Restitution Herald, Progress Journal, Truth Seeker's Quarterlies, Systematic Theology, Songs of Truth, Challenge Magazine, The Superintendents' and Workers' Manual, Systematic Bible Study Course, Vacation Bible School material, tracts, booklets, special bulletin covers, bulletin inserts, and promotional materials. It also fills orders for Bibles, concordances, and books; and procures all textbooks and library books for Oregon Bible College.

The publishing department staff includes Editor T. M. Ferrell, Associate Editor Paul Johnson, and Mailing Room Superintendent Mrs. E. E. Graham.

About 2,300 copies of The Restitution Herald are mailed each month; about 100 more than this period last year. This includes copies to individual subscribers, and for use in The Herald racks. There were two special issues of The Herald published last year. The November, 1970, Prophecy Issue proved very popular; 1,300 extra copies were printed. There was also a special issue on missions in May of this year.

A continued need in regard to The Restitution Herald is that of more subscribers. We strongly recommend the method practiced by several of our churches; that is, the church subscribing for each member of the congregation. If they wish to do so, the members then reimburse the church. We know of four churches which subscribe for all of their members: Burr Oak Church, Hope Chapel and Morning Star Churches, South Bend, and the Valley Church. Several churches subscribe for all new members. In the program "Reaching Forth to '75," our goal is to have every Church of God family receive The Herald by 1972. Reaching this goal will demand the concerted effort of the Church of God leadership, and a willingness on the part of the congregations to assist in this attempt.

We appreciate the fine effort of pastors and secretaries during the past year in helping us to revise the mailing list for Progress Journal. We believe we now have a more realistic mailing list, and about 3,950 copies are being printed each month.

A major change in the Truth Seeker's Quarterlies is taking place, in the rearranging of the quarters. The summer quarter is being abbreviated, in order to begin a new quarter September first. There are several reasons for this change, and we believe the quarterly users will appreciate these changes once they become accustomed to the system. The Council of Christian Education is continuing its study of the quarterly curriculum; this should result in improvements after the study has been completed.

We appreciate the work of the editors and writers of Truth Seeker's Quarterlies. About 8,000 copies are sent out each quarter. Many hours of study, writing, and preparation go into each lesson. The present editors are: Beginners: Genniel Anderson; Primary: Doris Brown and Amy Lou Schaefer; Junior: Ruth Lewis; Teen-Age: Milon and Joan Hall; and Adult: J. R. Le-Crone. We desire that all of our Sunday schools would love the truth enough to use this Bible-centered literature.

The Vacation Bible School material for 1971—"God Made All Things"—was edited by Sr. Irene Sorenson, with artwork by Sr. Lois Worley. At this writing, orders have come in well, and many of our churches are using this material. Sr. Sorenson has resigned her position, and a replacement is being sought. Our special thanks to her for her efforts in the two years she edited this material; it involves many hours of study and work.

Several new tracts were published in the last year; the most popular of which has been "Do You Ever Think About God?" This tract is already in its second printing, and many of our Christian workers are using this evangelistic-type tract. We would be interested in learning of specific experiences that any of our workers have had in using this tract. An attempt is being made to improve our tract ministry.

We appreciate the cooperation and interest of the membership in the publishing ministry of the General Conference. We pray that the substantial increase in this department during the past year may continue. Through the distribution of Biblical literature, we can be evangelizing twenty-four hours a day, throughout the world. Many are being reached by these silent witnesses. May we be faithful in sending forth the Word of life!

Foreign Missions Department

Four elected members make up the Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference. They are: Mardy Lawrence, secretary; Lee McQuinn, Merle Patrick, and Warren Sorenson. Superintendent of Foreign Missions Rachel Krogh serves as chairman of the Board. Three times during the year this Board has met,

Foreign Missions Department

Four elected members make up the Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference. They are: Mardy Lawrence, secretary; Lee McQuinn, Merle Patrick, and Warren Sorenson. Superintendent of Foreign Missions Rachel Krogh serves as chairman of the Board. Three times during the year this Board has met,

in addition to meetings during General Conference, and has carried on correspondence concerning the mission work around the world.

Several local missionary conferences have been held during the past year, and the Superintendents of Home and Foreign Missions, as well as the Mission Board members, have had the opportunity to participate in some of them.

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a is working with the Arab people in various Middle East countries. Regular services are held in Beirut, Lebanon, where there are twenty-two members. Other places where members are located are: Madaba, Jordan, eight members; Damascus, Syria, three; Baghdad, Iraq, three; and Tripoli, Lebanon, two.

In March 1971, Bro. Sunna'a spent ten days in Egypt visiting and studying with contacts there. He baptized several people, including Pastor Shaker Iskander who left his church for the truth.

There are several thousand students in fifteen different countries who are enrolled in the Systematic Bible Study Course, which has been translated into Arabic.

The brethren in Bangalore, India, under the leadership of S. S. Manoah, have been active in open-air preaching, tract distribution, and hospital visitation. A work with children has been started in a new village, with about sixty attending each week.

We have decided to provide a piece of property for the Wilson Gardens and John Town members, on which they will later construct a church building. Contributions are still needed for this project.

Sr. Emily Manoah, sister-in-law of Bro. Manoah, spent a year in this country taking medical training. She returned to India in May with many helps and ideas which she hopes to use among her people.

In Mexico during the past year regular trips have been made by Bro. and Sr. Francisco Martinez and Srs. Alice Aldrich and Aurelia Alvarez to the village of Labor Vieja. Here Bro. and Sr. Roberto Badillo and family conduct a work with the village children.

The interest in the Saturday school and the Sunday afternoon meetings which were held in Saltillo has declined. Now the weekends are usually spent in the village of Biznaga, where a Saturday evening service is conducted and Sunday school is held the next day.

The Mexican workers have been giving thought to concentrating their efforts in the Labor Vieja area where interest seems to be greatest.

In December, 1970, the Superintendent of Foreign Missions and several other young people visited the work in Mexico, attending and participating in several Christmas programs and other services. Missionary services were presented at several U.S. churches en route.

Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero continues to give leadership to the Philippine Church of God General Conference. The ninth annual meeting of the Conference was in December, 1970, with two hundred in attendance.

Each week Bro. Ortiguero presents a Bible message over the radio, and the response to this program has been good. Through this work some of the scattered brethren have been strengthened, and two former congregations have reorganized and are again holding services.

In February, 1971, Bro. Ortiguero suffered a heart attack, but he is coming along well at this writing.

The Third Maritime Conference was held in Digby, Nova Scotia, in August, 1970, with Bro. and Sr. Francis Burnett and the BYF youth caravan as guest workers. Plans are being made for this summer's conference with Bro. and Sr. S. O. Ross and Sr. Rachel Krogh as quests.

In the past year a missionary society was organized in the Lighthouse Mission, a special evangelism emphasis with classes on witnessing was held, the Digby Bereans were second-place winners in the Youth Week program, and a parsonage was provided for the Browns.

Four young men from Nigeria came here last fall to attend Oregon Bible College. During the school year two left the College, one to return to his family in Nigeria and the other to go elsewhere in the U.S. Ephraim Udo and Solomon Idiong completed their year of studies before returning to Nigeria the last part of May. They intend to work with John Obot in leading and strengthening their people in the faith.

Oliver Amani in Jasikan, Ghana, is working with seven Bible study groups with a total membership of fifty-seven, forty of which have been immersed into Christ. These people are active in tract distribution and house-to-house visitation. This is our newest mission work, having been received into fellowship and membership last July at General Conference.

Considerable correspondence is received from various parts of the world asking for information and literature, which we are happy to provide.

We praise God for the opportunities he has provided and we are grateful for the interest and the support of the mission work by the membership. May we continue to spread the good news both here and throughout the world.

Home Missions Department

The Home Missions work of the Church of God General Conference is administered by S. O. Ross and the Mission Board. In the "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five" program adopted by the delegates to the 1970

conference, each one was encouraged to teach one in seventy-one. We believe that many have been working at this project and there is still time for all to accomplish this goal during this calendar year.

Two new churches in the General Conference was a two-year goal. This has already been accomplished with a new church at Champion, Mich., and one at Royal Village, Front Royal, Va. Many churches have programs of follow-up of the personal witnessing campaign.

Five smaller congregations are receiving assistance through the Pastoral Aid program that enables them to maintain full-time pastors. Two churches have had the assistance of the Mission Builders League in helping to provide a place of worship. These churches are: Garden Park, Grand Rapids, Mich., and Hope Chapel, Columbus, Ohio.

Much literature is being distributed, many inquiries received regarding our faith and teaching, and scores of people are enrolled in the free Systematic Bible Study Course. We praise God for each new contact and trust that many will be brought to Christ by coming to know and understand God's Word. May God continue to bless each outreach effort of the Church of God General Conference.

Oregon Bible College

Oregon Bible College is completing its thirty-second year as an institution of higher education for the Church of God General Conference. The 1970-1971 academic year began with 55 students; our largest enrollment. Forty-one students were enrolled for the second semester.

Seven seniors were graduated on May 21, 1971: John Carr, David Cheatwood, Joseph Duncan, David Graham, Delbert Rankin, John Railton, and Dale Swartz. This brings the total number of OBC graduates to 119: an average of 3.97 graduates per year since the first graduation in 1942, or an average of 3.72 graduates per year for the thirty-two years. Alumni members number between 250 and 300. A still larger number of persons have enrolled in the College for courses at one time or another.

Administration and faculty during the year included: Alva G. Huffer, President, instructor, and Chairman of the Board of Education; John R. Lewis, Administrative Vice-President, Registrar and Director of Admissions, and instructor; Eugene E. Stilson, Director of Christian Service, Library Director, and instructor; Stanley O. Ross, Director of Business Affairs and instructor in missions; Charles Pryor, Counseling Consultant; Francis E. Burnett, Dean of Students and part-time instructor. Other part-time instructors in-

cluded: Rachel Krogh, Dallas Demmitt, Ruth Lewis, Dale Ramsey, Robert L. Jones, and Iris Burnett.

The staff included also: Edith Eades, men's housemother; Elna Ross, women's housemother; Nora Anderson, Margene Rager, Myrle Claussen, Jane Cupp, Laverne Conley, and others who serve in the cafeteria.

Professional development of faculty members continues. Alva Huffer has completed work on his Doctor of Philosophy degree in the Administration of Higher Education at Arizona State University. Eugene Stilson will complete his Master of Science in Education degree at Northern Illinois University this summer. John R. Lewis is a candidate for the Master of Arts degree at Northern Illinois University and will complete work for the degree during the next academic year. Charles Pryor will complete his Doctor of Education degree next year. Other faculty members continue professional development through courses at universities, conferences, and seminars in various places.

Eugene Stilson, Library Director, reports that 7,100 books have now been catalogued in our library. Our goal is to attain 10,000 volumes by 1975. Friends of our College continue to contribute funds to buy needed books. The Board of Education continues to give special emphasis to the purchase of books through the Booster campaign. We need reference works as well as individual books to reinforce our curriculum. Additional visual education materials would strengthen our library.

Gospel teams this year were under the direction of Rachel Krogh. A select singing group, the Chorale, was organized by Dale Ramsey and presented concerts in various churches.

Oregon Bible College offers programs of studies leading to a Bachelor of Arts degree in Bible, with a choice of three minors: Pastoral Studies; Missions; and Christian Education. Each of these programs includes a major in the Bible and theology, with a minimum of 55 semester hours required in the major field. Each program requires courses in General Education and a minimum of 20 semester hours in the professional minor. A minimum of 126 semester hours is required for the degree.

The College continues to offer four correspondence courses, an annual Holy Land Tour Study Course, and four extension courses taught by Dallas Demmitt and Alva Huffer.

Graduate Programs in Pastoral Internship and Pastoral Studies are offered by the College in its Graduate Division at Tempe, Ariz. Graduate Programs, under the direction of Alva Huffer, utilize the facilities of the Bible Churches of God at Phoenix and Tempe, as well as Arizona State University, and the services of Church

of God professional persons in the area, who serve as part-time instructors.

Joseph Martin was the first student in the Graduate Internship Program during this past year. His program included: Conference and Workshop in Pastoral Procedures, directed by Hollis Partlowe; Pastoral Practicum in Preaching and Teaching, directed by Hollis Partlowe and Lee McQuinn; Reading and Conference courses with Alva Huffer; Counseling Sessions Seminar with Dallas Demmitt; Workshop in Pastoral Counseling, Dr. Ralph Earle, Instructor; two Sociology courses at Arizona State University; attendance at many professional meetings, lectures, and conferences, as well as other activities. Brother Martin is now pastor of the new church congregation at Front Royal, Va. At least three students will enter the program this fall.

A graduate program for persons preparing to serve as foreign missionaries has been planned by Oregon Bible College in cooperation with the Foreign Missions Department of the Church of God General Conference to be offered at Tempe, Ariz. Missionary medicine, foreign languages, world geography, social work procedures, cultural anthropology, and missionary practicum are among the factors included in the program. Precise elements of the program will be determined by the geographical area where the missionary plans to serve and by the particular type of ministry in which he will engage.

The Board of Education consists of the president of the College as chairman and four other members appointed, each for a term of two years, by the Board of Directors. Current appointed members are: Dallas R. Demmitt, Robert D. Johnson, Ruth Halls Overholser, and Vernis D. Wolfe. John Lewis, Administrative Vice President, also attends meetings. This Board acts in an advisory and promotional capacity and makes recommendations regarding the College to the Board of Directors. One of the questions being considered by the Board of Education concerns whether the College should seek to provide the total education needed by persons preparing for the ministry or whether students should be encouraged to take certain courses at other institutions either prior to entering OBC or while they are students at the College.

General Services

The Church of God General Conference staff members perform many services in addition to the departmental activities covered in the preceding reports. Speakers are often provided to fill pulpits when pastors are absent and are available for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, etc.

Your Executive Secretary is responsible for the

administration of the Ministers Insurance and the Ministers Retirement Programs; gives assistance in finding replacement for a vacant pulpit; answers questionnaires; and gives required information to governmental civic, and religious agencies. He is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of all properties, for the management of the day-to-day business, and generally supervises all the work of the Church of God General Conference.

The entire staff covets your prayers, encouragement, criticism, and concern as it endeavors to carry out the many aspects of the business of the Church of God General Conference.

General Conference Finances

The contributions to the Goals for Giving for the first half of the fiscal year have fallen about \$2,500.00 short of the goal. The year was begun with a deficit of \$3,500.00. On March 30 it was necessary to make a bank loan for the amount of \$6,000 to account for the above needs.

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the sacrificial giving of many. We express our thanks and appreciation to all who do support and who are concerned about the Conference work. We do praise God, for surely we, as a people, have been greatly blessed. May God's continued blessings and guidance abide that the work of the Church of God General Conference may continue to progress and bear fruit while we await the return of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Recommendations for 1971

- 1) We recommend that a Youth Caravan be held in the summer of 1972, provided the delegates to the 1971 International Berean Youth Conference deem it advisable; and provided sufficient funds are appropriated in the 1971-72 youth budget.
- 2) We recommend that a married couple be sent to the Mexico mission field as soon as they can be properly trained in the language.
- 3) We recommend that Mission Builders League members contribute at least \$10.00 or more to each Mission Builders Appeal approved by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, not to exceed two each year.
- 4) We recommend that each church in the Conference be encouraged to organize a Home Missions Department, and that a director be appointed or elected to head the department.
- 5) We recommend that each local church continue to emphasize the goals and aims of the "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five" (Phil. 3:13, 14) project adopted at the 1970 General Conference.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Ministers Fund

During the past year one minister has received assistance by way of a loan from this fund and one retired minister receives \$25.00 per month.

At the time of the last annual report the balance in the fund was \$693.47. The present balance is \$538.27. Contributions for the year have been about \$160.00. The fund is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon churches, the dean of students at Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Secretary of the Church of God General Conference. The committee held one meeting during the past year.

Military Personnel Committee

Ministers Retirement Association

The Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association has been expanded beyond anticipation as far as its solvency is concerned. Currently three ministers are receiving retirement benefits. There have been several contributions made to the Retirement Fund by concerned individuals this past year. The Retirement Board solicits the members of the Church of God to help build the financial resources of the Association. By building up the reserves of the Association, it will be possible to increase the benefits to the ministers of our church when their laboring days come to a close and they go into retirement. The Board of Trustees of the Retirement Association are Willard Naylor, S. O. Ross, and the Chairman.

License and Ordination Committee

At the present time, one hundred twelve ministers have ministerial recognition from the Church of God General Conference. This number includes three graduates of Oregon Bible College in 1970: Henry Joseph Martin, Carl Joseph Astolfi, Jr. and Vivian E. Kirkpatrick II. All three are now serving in pastorates.

Of the licensed ministers, eighteen report they preached less than twenty sermons during the year, and are listed as inactive. It is only fair to report, however, that some of them fill positions of leadership in their home churches.

Seven graduating students of Oregon Bible College were interviewed by this committee in April. The names of those licensed will be published later.

All ministers are reminded that their licenses must be renewed yearly. Those whose names appear on the recognized list

will receive application forms previous to the General Conference session. As many as possible of the recognition cards will be handed out during conference, and the balance will be mailed.

No applications for ordination have been received by the Committee since 1967. Those ministers with three years or more of experience in the field and who have definitely decided they wish to remain in the ministry for life are eligible for ordination. Applications for ordination may be obtained from the chairman of this committee.

It is a matter of great concern to this committee that several of our ministers (some of them ordained) have seen fit to leave the full-time ministry. Some humble soul searching on the part of both the ministers, and the churches that employ them, seems necessary in order to pinpoint and correct the reasons for this loss of full-time service for the Lord.

The Arbitration Committee is a standing committee ready to assist pastors or churches in difficult circumstances when called upon to do so. The committee does not intervene in any given situation except on request. This past year there have been no requests for its services.

Council of Christian Education

The Council of Christian Education consists of Charles Pryor, Warren Sorenson, and Eugene Stilson, Chairman. During the past year our purpose has been to identify the present educational practices of the Church of God, to analyze their effectiveness, and to formulate means of improvement. We see the effectiveness of the teacher, and the quality of our Sunday school publications as our immediate questions.

Teacher Effectiveness. In our curriculum study we have identified several areas in which our teachers need workshop experience. These ideas can be given to the National Sunday School Board for use in workshops. The teacher cannot really master these skills by reading a report. The teacher needs contact with a resource person, and the understanding that comes from group discussion, and group practice. Some of the needed areas are:

- 1. Gain awareness of the experiences that shape the lives of students.
- 2. Cultivate helpful relationships with students both in and out of class.
- 3. Gain awareness of the growth of students as a result of two or more years of experience in a Sunday school class.
 - 4. Develop skill in teacher use of media to present lessons.
- 5. Develop skill in involving students in group and teacherpupil interaction.
- 6. Develop understanding and skill in lesson planning with Church of God publications.

Revision of Sunday School Publications. The Council of Christian Education is presently revising the Sunday school publications. A study is made of the mental, social, physical, and spiritual characteristics of students in the pre-school, primary, junior, teen, and adult departments. Methods include observations, interviews with teachers in Sunday school and public schools, educational research, and consultation with specialists. Based on this we state mental, social, and spiritual objectives to be accomplished. Next we list instructional methods suitable for

the age level. We give sample lesson plans, and descriptions of the classrooom equipment needed. Next we analyze the contents on the present publications in terms of these specifications. We revise the contents to meet the specifications. We also adjust the methods to meet the specifications. The curriculum is then stated both in terms of the specifications, and according to principles of design to make the curriculum orderly in structure. These reports are given to the Sunday School Board for critique. They are also open to critique by the Board of Directors, and by

the Ministerial Association. By General Conference time we will have the curriculum revised for the pre-school, primary, junior, and teen quarterlies, plus recommendations for revision of the adult quarterly format. At that time we hope to have a combined session with all of the editors, and the Council to work through the problems of implementation. Some changes can at that time be made. Other changes that require major changes in writer organization may take as much as a year to get into operation.

Additional Conference Information

SITE: The 1971 Church of God General Conference will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 9 through 14. This camp is owned by the United Methodist Church and is located on the west edge of Cedar Falls on U.S. Highway 20. Waterloo, a sister city of Cedar Falls, has an airport where some jet airline service is available.

CAMP COSTS: The costs at Riverview Park in 1971 will be \$4.25 per person per day (\$20.00 for the conference). The daily costs are: breakfast \$.75, lunch \$1.00, supper, \$1.25, lodging \$1.00, insurance and miscellaneous \$.25. (Meals are one-half price for children under age eight.) In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are many other conference costs for promotion, travel, folders, printing, displays, supplies, etc.

Your General Conference Board of Directors is asking that camp costs be paid at the desk upon registration or during the conference. The evening offerings taken during conference will go to some special General Conference project which will be designated by the Board of Directors.

LODGING: Lodging is provided in cabins and two dormitories. Cabins will house five to fourteen people each, and families are urged to stay together. Two or more families will need to share the larger units. Reservations should be made ahead of time, if possible, to insure the accommodation you desire.

Riverview Park can accommodate some camping trailers, and water and electrical hookup is available, but no sewer. Two public camping facilities are located in the area. Tents will not be allowed on the grounds.

NOTE TO TEACHERS AND LEADERS: Teachers of General Conference adult and youth classes, and leaders of Christian Sharing Sessions, are reminded to prepare mimeographed copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared that those not able to attend their particular session will be able to secure copies.

ELECTIONS DURING GENERAL CONFERENCE:

Board of Directors: Two members will be elected to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors. The terms of William D. Lawrence and Dean Urish will expire at General Conference. (These cannot be reelected.)

Sunday School Board: Two members to be elected. The terms of Willis Turner and Joyce Knapp expire this year. (These may be reelected.)

Mission Board: One member to be elected. The term of Warren Sorenson expires this year. (May be reelected.)

YOUNG PEOPLE: The youth are urged to stay with their families in cabins and thus be under direct supervision of their parents. For those who may be there without their parents, there is one dormitory for male and one for female. Any youth who stay in these dormitories will be under the direct supervision of a youth counselor and will be expected to abide by the rules set by the youth director for General Conference.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES: Iva Mae Holt will be in charge of classes for children of all ages Tuesday through Friday of General Conference. The class schedule will be 9:00 to 11:15 a.m. and 1:25 to 3:00 p.m. Parents of children in these classes are requested to come to the classroom and call for their children at the time of dismissal both morning and afternoon.

There will be a refreshment break during the class periods and those who wish to help are requested to please bring cookies.

DELEGATE EXPENSE POOL: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the costs of travel for those from far away and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church and conference is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

Ministers Leaving the Pastorate

A Resume by Wm. D. Lawrence

The Church of God is now facing the problem of too many empty pulpits. Fifteen percent of our pulpits are empty and thirty-eight percent are filled with part-time Pastors who work at other occupations.

This problem can probably be attributed to the high dropout rate of our pastors. A significant number of trained, full-time pastors either leave the field after some time or do not enter pastorates after graduating from OBC.

The General Conference Board appointed a committee of three to prepare a questionnaire: Dwaine Demmitt, chairman, Rex Cain, and S. O. Ross. This was mailed to all the ministers who have been active in pastoral work, or have been graduated from OBC, and have not continued in the pastorate. Eleven out of the eighteen men contacted returned the questionnaire.

A group of twenty-one persons tabulated and studied the apparent reasons and trends behind this problem. Two meetings were held; at the first, fourteen persons were present, and at the second all twenty-one attended.

The study group found various reasons behind the high drop-out rate of ministers. Many answered on the questionnaire that somehow they did not feel genuinely "called." A prevalant feeling in all religions today is, "No one should enter the ministry who can avoid it."

The feeling of lack of security in their wives was a cause answered by several. Not owning one's own home or even the furniture can be disquieting; and then to have to move every five to seven years or less upset wives. It can be disturbing to have no security that you'll be "retained" by the board after their next annual meeting! Nearly universal was the comment that the pay was too low for the family to live comfortably.

Many pastors left because of the dislike for making pastoral calls. This is probably because of personal inadequacy, lack of self-discipline, and lack of confidence.

It is interesting to note that *none* of the responses were leaving because of lack of Bible education. This seems to indicate that our College is training well in the Bible subjects. However, there is cause to wonder whether or not the graduates are prepared to face the world and the people in it. They reported failure to establish proper relationships with their church as a leader and fellow worker. They felt they were not receiving the support of the lay leaders in the church's activities. Often it is a case of the weak leading the weak, for the churches with the least number of strong leaders seem only to attract the "weaker" pastors.

The committee felt that many of the men who had quit did so because of lack of maturity in themselves or in their wives.

We need to impress our students and trained ministers with the idea that the call to the ministry is the call to the highest profession. They need to know that they are in a high priority profession and train for it as much as others train for other top professions. Ephesians 4 says ministers are God's gift to the churches.

Students and their wives need to be taught principles of a positive approach to Christianity and to the problems they will face in life. They need to be taught management, how to lift up Jesus Christ, and how to witness well. They needn't feel they must do the converting themselves. Successful witnessing is introducing others to Christ and leaving the results to God.

Ministers should be taught self-confidence and should be instructed in what to ask for from the congregation they are serving or are anticipating serving. Wives should be trained for the things they will encounter in the ministry; for instance, counseling is a frequent task of the ministers' wives. Students should see some of the examples of the "dirty wash" they may have to face sometime in their pastorates.

For those men who feel they want two jobs, we might suggest that they choose a profession related to their religious ministry. A nurse, teacher, or counselor can incorporate the ambitions of the ministry into his profession much better than a manual laborer.

A congregation can help its pastor by

showing him and his family the utmost respect. This should lead them to paying an adequate salary; one that is at least an average of the members' salaries. They can support him psychologically by not having the attitude that he is their hired servant but that he is a fellow worker. With some pastors and their wives the congregation must be careful in offering them their cast aside clothing and furniture. Some of the articles that have reportedly been offered to pastors would make the Salvation Army ashamed. Congregation and church board should not rehash with the new pastor all the old problems hanging over from previous

The General Conference can do nothing to legislate to the churches, nor do they want to. However, they might, in certain instances, help churches to merge and consolidate their efforts until they are strong enough to stand separately, each with a full-time minister.

The Conference, through OBC, can educate the future ministers in areas where it is felt ministers can be strengthened. The College program could be arranged so the men would have some general education before entering OBC for their theological studies.

The internship program is one positive step that has been taken to help alleviate some of the problems that were expressed by the men polled with the questionnaire. The only student that has been in the program so far has now gone into his first pastorate and has stated that he thinks the internship program has been very helpful in his preparation for full-time pastoral work. Most of the study members thought the internship should be the minimum required before men enter the ministry after graduating from OBC. They felt this one program would be of great help to us in our efforts to retain our pastors.

More work and study will be put into this problem by the General Conference. Your suggestions would be highly appreciated. It is our aim, and yours too, we hope, to help the churches and pastors of the Church of God to better serve our risen Lord.

This will be the fifty-first annual Church of God General Conference and the theme will be, "A Converted People."

Delegate forms, statistical forms, and pool expense forms have been mailed to all church and conference secretaries. Please complete these important forms promptly and return them in the envelope that was enclosed.

General Conference Board Meets

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, Ill., April 29, 30, and May 1. Final approval was given to the conference program and departmental reports and recommendations which will be presented to the delegates in August.

Bro. T. M. Ferrell, editor of publications of the Church of God General Conference, submitted his resignation effective September 1, 1971. The Board accepted the resignation. Bro. C. E. Randall was appointed as interim editor for one year beginning September 1.

Bro. Alva G. Huffer has been granted his Doctor of Philosophy degree in Higher Education Administration from Arizona State University, Tempe, Ariz. Bro. Huffer has been appointed to continue to serve as President of Oregon Bible College.

Formal approval was given to expend one thousand dollars to purchase a plot of ground in Bangalore, India, for the use of the Wilson Gardens and Austin Town groups. They hope to construct a church building on the lot soon.

Mission Builders Appeal number 27, which will go in the mail about November 15, was granted to the Royal Village Church of God at Front Royal, Va. At least five churches will be receiving Pastoral Aid assistance during the next church year.

A resolution was adopted which directs that funds received in the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association be deposited through the Church of God General Conference records. This assures that funds contributed to the Retirement Association are tax deductible.

Members of the Board of Directors desire to visit member churches to speak on the work of the General Conference. We would encourage the local church to extend an invitation to one of the directors. The present Board is William D. Lawrence, Phoenix, Ariz.; Dean Urish, Oregon, Ill.; C. Jesse Pestle, Columbia Station, O.; Wayne Laning, Mt. Sterling, Ill.; Paul Shaw, Houston, Tex.; Joe James, Greenville, S.C.; and Charles Knapp, Grand Rapids, Mich.

A committee has given study, and did report, regarding the need for a Family Life Program within the Church of God. Charles Pryor of Sycamore, Ill., has been appointed coordinator of a Family Life Program.

Bro. Warren Sorenson, Macomb, Ill. was appointed to give assistance to the Superintendent of Home Missions, S. O. Ross, in planning and programming Home Mission emphasis. Bro. Sorenson's experience in many years of successful pastorates and his several terms on the Mission Board will be a real asset in this area. He will continue his full-time pastorate of the Macomb Church of God.

Conference Finances

Contributions fell three thousand dollars short of the goal for the month of May. The giving needs are even greater in the summer months when earnings from college tuitions, etc., are down. We trust that all will make this a matter of prayer and concern that the goals may be met.

Using Our Opportunities

GOD, our heavenly Father, is always giving us opportunities to tell others of Christ our Saviour. Let us but ask in prayer how to use these opportunities in grace and guidance to glorify him in our service. For, if we are children of God, we are to serve him to the best of our knowledge, with wisdom and love.

Most Effective Witnessing

Our most effective witnessing for Christ is by daily living a true Christian life before all those we come to see and know. Witnessing, or giving a personal testimony, is one of the most difficult services we are asked to do for our God. This should not be. When we have new worldly pleasures, we are more than eager to tell someone. Why, then, when we have the Good News about our Saviour who died for us, to save us and give us life eternal, are we not just as eager-even bubbling over-with the joy of this hope of salvation? This witnessing and providing a Christian example is what the world is crying out for today. It is religion at its best. A radiant Christian life can never be discounted; there it stands, and no one can deny it.

Take Someone With You

One way that is simple and easy is to take someone with us to Sunday school and church; a friend, a co-worker, even one of our own family. We should talk to these people about Jesus and God, our heavenly Father. One could never run out of words of praise to say about these two who loved *us* so much.

We should not feel that we have done our Christian duty by asking or taking someone to church. The next step is to invite this person to take Christ into his life. When one accepts our Saviour, Jesus, then there is a desire to go into the house of our Lord to worship.

Speak God's Words

In John 12:49, 50, it tells us that Jesus spoke the words God commanded him to speak: "Yes, because I have not spoken on my own, but the Father who sent me has commanded me what I must say and speak. And I know that his command brings eternal life. What I say, then, is what the Father has told me to say" (Good News for Modern Man).

God also commanded us: "Go ye into all the world" (Mark 16:15a), telling others about the way to eternal life. Those who are faithful servants and a living testimony need to speak out for Christ a loving message for the world to hear. TELL IT OUT!

A Neglected Calling

No calling in a Christian's life is more neglected than that of witnessing for Christ. Too many of us put our candle under a bushel or let it go out. A candle may seem like a very small light to let shine, but Matthew 5:15 tells us that it can give light to the whole household: "Neither do men light a candle, and put it

under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house."

Therefore, a Christian may think that his *little* light—deeds of kindness; loving, uplifting words—can't be of much effect in this big, dark, sinful world. How URGENT is the need to give, as never before, of ourselves, our time, our money, and our earnest prayers for those who find life difficult; for those who are hungry for the story of Jesus our Saviour.

"The gospel must first be published among all nations" (Mark 13:10); not only nationwide, but in our own town, community, at work, or anywhere we have the opportunity.

Paul, in Acts 26:22, tells us he went on serving and witnessing to the small and great, having obtained the help of God.

What is the Matter?

What is the matter with us so-called Christians? We have God to lead us and the Word of God to study to gain wisdom. We have so many blessings we can't even count them; as numberless as the sands on the seashore. Yet, we do not go to others and tell them of the wonderful Saviour we have; of life eternal God has planned for man because he loved him so. (John 3:16.) It is the Christian's duty to comfort others with the redeeming gospel of Jesus Christ.

Christians, let us get busy about our Father's work and bring others to know the Saviour.

General Conference 1971

The Fifty-First Annual Church of God General Conference will convene at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, on Monday, August 9, 1971. Registration begins at 2:00 p.m., and the first service is at 7:30 p.m.

Cost of the conference is \$4.25 per day per person (\$20.00 for the conference) and should be paid at the desk upon registration. For cabin reservations write Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061.

Church and state conference secretaries are asked to send in their delegate forms promptly along with their statistical sheet and application to enter the delegate pool. This will assist the credentials committee.

"A Converted People"

The theme of the 1971 conference is "A Converted People." Christ told Peter, "When thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren" (Luke 22:32b). Are we, the membership of the Church of God General Conference, truly a converted people? Are we really ready to strengthen the brethren? Are we ready to reach new people for Christ? Are we fruit-bearing Christians? The messages and classes of the conference are geared to this challenge. When Peter met the risen Lord on the seashore and confessed him three times, as he had denied him three times, he was really a converted individual. He then became the great fisher of men that he had been destined to be. He was then able to really "strengthen [his] brethren." I believe the Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith is really becoming that "converted people" for the glory of God and his Son Jesus Christ. Praise God!

Riverview Park

Riverview Park, site of the 1971 General Conference, is located on U.S. Highway 20 on the west edge of Cedar Falls, Iowa. The Park is only a few miles from the airport and bus station, and taxi service is available.

Beds are supplied with pillow and a blanket, however each one should bring his own linen. A very limited supply of linen is available for rental.

The conference site can accommodate several camper trailers, and there are two commercial trailer parks nearby. Tents will not be allowed on the grounds. Several motel units are also available in the area.

S.S. Quarterly Change

The present Sunday school quarterly is for only two months, July and August. Beginning September first

we will be using the fall, winter, spring, and summer system. Orders for the fall quarter (Sept.-Oct.-Nov.) must be in by July 15, since these materials will be in the mail early in August. Beginning with the fall quarter, the price will be sixty-five cents each for the quarterly and teacher's book.

Jubilee Year

The 1970 conference was the fiftieth annual conference, therefore we are now actually in our fiftieth year of operation of the Church of God General Conference. "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five" goals were set. Many of the two-year goals are already completed; two new churches in the conference, 7,500 volumes in the college library, and two additional workers to a mission field have already been attained.

One goal was to be reached this year, Each One Teach One in Seventy-One. If you have not done your part in this effort, you still have six months to reach this goal. With God's blessing each of these goals can be reached on schedule. May each one truly "reach forth" the rest of this year, and even on to 1975.

Conference Finances

Contributions to the Goals for Giving are \$3,097.00 short of the needs for the month of June. The budget is figured so closely that any shortage in contributions puts the business operation of the Conference into deficit spending.

The year began October 1, 1970, with a deficit of \$3,500. About \$2,000 has been expended for necessary equipment. The expense of training and returning the Nigerian students was about \$2,000 more than the special contributions for that purpose. These three items, plus the shortage in giving, have made a total deficit of more than \$10,000. A bank loan has been made to provide operating funds. May each member make this a matter of prayer and concern for the successful operation of the General Conference work.

Middle East Baptisms

On the evening of May 4, 1971, as he was returning home from a meeting in one of the homes, Bro. Shaker Iskander was attacked by some Coptic monks. (The Coptic Church is one of the major churches in Egypt.) They beat him and threw on him a bottle of flaming benzine which burned parts of his body. Bro. Iskander spent thirty-seven days in the hospital, but is now at the home of some friends. Bro. Sunna'a was able to make two trips to Egypt during this time to be with Bro. Iskander, and to help take care of the meetings in Cairo. If there are any who would like to help with Bro. Iskander's hospital expenses, please send your contributions to the Superintendent of Missions, Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061, and they will be sent on to him.

Work in Ghana Progresses

Despite the efforts of another religious group to discourage them, the Lord is helping the brethren in Ghana, and they are growing strong in the faith. Membership has increased to fifty-seven, and funds are being raised for the erection of a chapel, which the members plan to begin soon.

Many people in Ghana have lost their lives because of an outbreak of cholera. Bro. Oliver Amani asks us to pray that it will not come near any of the members.

A Helper Goes to Nova Scotia

On June 7, 1971, Sr. Eunice Pearson, Dayton, Ohio, left this country to go to Nova Scotia to assist in the work of the Lighthouse Mission Church of God in Digby. She will be an active lay member in the church, assisting with teaching, training of workers, and calling, as well as other things.

July 11-18 the Fourth Annual Maritime Conference and Bible School will be held with Bro. and Sr. S. O. Ross and Sr. Rachel Krogh as guest workers. Connie

Ross and Merle Patrick will also be there to assist. A baptismal service is being planned on the closing Sunday afternoon as there are several who have requested baptism. Pray that others, too, may realize their need and accept Christ as Saviour.

Young People Visit Mexico

On June 6, 1971, a group of six young people and two adults left Little Rock, Ark., to go to Mexico to spend a week visiting the brethren there. While there, they had the opportunity to visit the villages of Bisnaga and Labor Vieja, as well as help Sr. Alice Aldrich with some of the Bible school preparation.

In May the Saltillo workers went to the village of Bisnaga for special Mother's Day services. Very early in the morning a group of six got up and went to the homes of the children who have been coming to the classes and serenaded their mothers—not an unusual way of honoring mothers in Mexico on their day.

Four persons in Bisnaga have expressed their interest in accepting Christ and living for him. Pray for them and those who counsel them.

The first weekend in June a visit was made to Labor Vieja for meetings. However, the church there had been damaged by hail- and rainstorms and more rain came that weekend which prevented their worshiping together as they would have liked.

Baptisms in India

All the groups meeting in Bangalore were invited to the Thomas Town Church on May 9, 1971, for the baptism of fifteen persons. After the service, a dinner—arranged by the families of those baptized—was served to all present, who numbered nearly five hundred. Also attending the service were some non-Christian friends who wanted to know more about baptism and its meaning. Bro. S. S. Manoah clearly explained it to them in his sermon.

Emily and Robert Manoah arrived home safely, and have been busy explaining in detail all about their visit in the United States, and the activities of our churches here.

Daily vacation Bible school was held in Bangalore May 12-22, 1971, with nearly one hundred children attending. The children were divided into four groups: one English section, one senior children Tamil section,

The "Un" Life

Unexperienced Goals

Almost everyone as a child chooses and decides that there is something special he wants to do or be. Often these early desires change, even as Paul relates; "When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things" (1 Cor. 13:11).

Even so, unrealized goals often haunt an adult individual. "Maybe I could have been" that great writer, statesman, minister, or whatever it was he felt he really wanted to be.

After finishing high school it is easy to try to find a "safe" job which will guarantee unlimited advancement, wealth, and at the same time not demand too much of our personal life. As time goes on and we begin to work at our chosen job, we learn that every occupation has its shortcomings, as well as its advantages. No job is safe or guaranteed in all respects. What young people were told to train to be ten years ago have in some cases declined in job openings and they now have an oversupply of trained personnel.

The world is constantly changing in its demands upon people. One must be flexible enough to face new experiences and conquer the unknown.

Analyze the goals you originally set for yourself. Are they still your goals? If you have changed them, what valid reasons can you give for changing them?

Unchallenged Life Styles

The news media constantly bombard Christians with the information that everyone has changed his life style attitudes. It is easy then to accept our peers' values and make them our own. After all, everyone else can't be too wrong.

Much of what is proclaimed to be changing living is merely the bringing out into the open of what God has declared to be simple unrighteousness. Solomon was right, there is nothing new, at all, about it.

God hasn't changed, either. He still watches men and is often disgusted with what he sees. Peter admonished the early Christians, "As he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation [living]; because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy" (1 Pet. 1:15, 16).

Has your life style changed? Has it changed so that you bring more glory to God? The individual who is unable to challenge the life styles of other individuals and evaluate them in the light of God's Word will indeed have a difficult life.

Unanswered Convictions

Faced with the reality that he is called of God, many people seek to answer God as simply as they can. "I just can't do any more for you, Lord," they say. "I'm doing more than my neighbor, can't you see?"

What has God asked you to do? How is your ability different from that of others? Have you ever asked him what he wants you to do? Have you just told him what you do? Is "enough" by your standard still enough for God?

"Wherein ye greatly rejoice, though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations . . . receiving the end of your faith, even the salvation of your souls" (1 Pet. 1:6, 9).

Let nothing stand in the way of your service to God, and God will let nothing interfere with your salvation. Come "Un" to Me

In Christ your life can bring both pleasure and the hope of future salvation. He alone can provide release from the tension and problems of these trouble-filled days.

Sunday School Influence

"After a 12-year study, Penn State concluded that teen-agers retain early-formed brand preference long after they marry and start housekeeping. Armour Meats feels that while youth are in their teens it is time to start building brand identification, confidence, and loyalty. More positive is the statement from *Television Age* indicating that brand preferences established in teen-age years will become 'unswitchable choices' for later years. Further, the *Journal of Applied Psychology* indicates that there is a high degree of youth loyalty toward brand names and 'it would appear that one's mind is made up early in life.' "—Dr. W. J. Hemphill, Ex. Dir. Nat. S.S. Assoc.

Modern advertising and production are aimed at influencing and supplying our young people with their desires. How wise were the words of Jesus when he said, "The children of this world are in their generation wiser than the children of light" (Luke 16:8). We need a jarring awakening to the fact that unless we reach and keep the younger generation NOW the proverbial "generation gap" will become their grave.

We are familiar with God's words, "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." "It is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth." "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." "Bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." "From a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus." If we really hear these words and see the youth on the outside of our Sunday school we will do something NOW to show interest in them, to let them know we love them and to influence them with our hope and joy in the anticipation in the coming of Jesus Christ.

Nothing But Leaves

BEAUTIFUL and meaningful song is the well-known duet, "Nothing but Leaves." It is based on an incident during the last week of Jesus' earthly ministry.

As you recall, Jesus entered in triumph into Jerusalem on what is called "Palm Sunday." According to Mark's account, he went out to Bethany that night with the twelve. "On the morrow, when they were come from Bethany, he was hungry: and seeing a fig tree afar off having leaves, he came, if haply he might find any thing thereon: and when he came to it, he found nothing but leaves" (11:12, 13). As a result Jesus cursed the fig tree, and the disciples later observed that it had dried up, or withered.

Israel, a Fruitless Fig

That the leafy, but fruitless, fig tree referred to Israel is quite plain. First of all, the fig tree represented Israel in other portions of Scripture. Most notable is Matthew 24:32-34 where the Parable of the Fig Tree was uttered by Jesus. He said the budding of the fig tree indicated the coming of summer; meaning that the stirring and restoration of national Israel would be a sign that Jesus' second coming and Kingdom were near. God referred to Israel as "my fig tree" in Joel 1:7.

It is immediately following the incident regarding the cursing of the fig tree that Jesus told the parable of the man who let out his vineyard to husbandmen and went into a far country. When harvest time came he sent his servants to receive the fruit that was his. But, as you remember, the husbandmen beat, stoned, and killed the servants that were sent, and

finally killed the owner's son. Plainly, this is referring to Israel. As Jesus could find no fruit on the fig tree—Israel, so God received no fruit from his vineyard—Israel. (Matt. 21:33-45.)

The result in both instances was the temporary setting aside of Israel while God chose to work with the called out ones of the Gentiles—"a nation bringing forth the fruits thereof" (v. 43). So, the Church of God is the new vineyard of God, the new fig tree for this age. We were not a people, but now we are. (1 Pet. 2:9, 10.)

Not Ornamentals

A horticulturist plants trees for fruit or beauty; the latter being called "ornamentals." It is a happy combination when a tree looks pretty and bears fruit! But, God is interested in our bearing fruit to his glory.

How can we bear fruit for God? Jesus said the branches cannot bear fruit by themselves, that is, cut off from the main stem. So he said, "As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, . . . no more can ye, except ye abide in me" (John 15:4). It is by our abiding in Christ, allowing his words and love to abide in us, that we can glorify God by bringing forth fruit. "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples [followers]" (v. 8). Our fruit unto holiness begins when we are made free from sin at baptism, and become servants of God. (Rom. 6:22.) It is by personal conformity to God's will that we can bear fruit-prove that we are not mere ornamentals, or all show.

We are not only to bring forth the fruits of the spirit in our lives, but we are to gain others for God through his Word. The one-talent man in the parable was not condemned because he had but one talent, but because he used his efforts in burying it, instead of gaining others through it. God has promised that his Word will not return unto him void. (Isa. 55:11.) We must teach and preach it faithfully, so it can do the work of multiplying.

We Can Become Unfruitful

As the Parable of the Sower indicates, the true seed—Word of God—can be sown in our lives, we can receive it with an honest heart, and it can begin to grow, but we still might not bear fruit. Jesus said, "He also that received seed among the thorns is he that heareth the word; and the care of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, choke the word, and he becometh unfruitful" (Matt. 13:22). We dare not allow this to happen! We must constantly allow ourselves to be fed and nourished through God's Word, and pruned and trained by its precepts.

Jesus is Coming!

Jesus is coming again to inspect and receive fruit from the branches of his planting. What will he find when he comes to us? Nothing but leaves? It will not be those who say "Lord, Lord," that will enter the Kingdom, but those who have his Word, and are bearing fruit. Let's add to our faith, that we "shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 1:5-8)!

Maritime Conference

The first Sunday of the Maritime Conference the record attendance of 104 for Sunday school (set in April) was broken with 106 present. On the last Sunday we were thankful that fourteen persons were immersed into Christ. May the Lord bless them.

Sr. Eunice Pearson has been in Digby since June, and likes it very much. She will be a big help to the Browns as she works with the Lighthouse brethren.

We enjoyed the time spent in Nova Scotia becoming acquainted and working with the people. We commend the Browns for their work, and pray the Lord's continued blessing upon them and the brethren.

News From the Middle East

June 11-18 a series of studies from God's Word was held in Beirut, Lebanon, with an average of 68 persons attending the evening meetings. The first Church of God vacation Bible school in Beirut was held the following two weeks with 160 children.

Bro. Shaker Iskander is getting along well and spent some time in Lebanon with the Sunna'a family at the time of their summer camp in July and August.

In July Bro. Sunna'a wrote, "Our meetings here in the church of Beirut, and the meetings in the mission station in Tripoli, Lebanon, are going so fine even though we are in the summertime and most of the people are on the mountains at this time of the year."

Two men were recently baptized into Christ. They are brothers, Philip and Hani Bakaron. Pray for them.

The Lebanese government has ordered that all recognized churches must have their own buildings before April, 1972, or they will be closed and their permits cancelled. Bro. Sunna'a asks that we remember them in prayer as they seek to solve this problem.

Changes in Mexico

For several years Sr. Alice Aldrich has been our only American missionary working in Mexico, and the Mission Board has been concerned about her being there by herself. Since the fall of 1969, Sr. Aurelia Alvarez, a young widow, has been living with Alice, but she was married this past summer and is living in another city.

The need for male leadership in the Mexican work has been felt for some time because of the culture of the country and for an effective work with the men and the young people.

For these reasons the Mission Board has decided that it is best for Sr. Aldrich to come back to the U.S. by the end of this year. The work in Mexico will continue with the national worker, Bro. Francisco Martinez, in charge.

We have appreciated very much the fine work Sr. Aldrich has done in the past years and commend her for her faithfulness in serving in this field.

We are interested in hearing from married couples who would like to work in Mexico.

Nigeria News

Our work in Nigeria is no longer under the direction of A. A. Obot, but is being headed by the three men who were here, Ephraim Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John Obot. We are sending each \$50 per month.

The men have been working with some people in the capital city of Lagos, and with others who have been corresponding with us and are interested in becoming members of the Church of God.

We are thankful that seven persons at the Ediene No. 1 Church have accepted Christ and were baptized in July. Pray for these new Christians.

We were sorry that the wife of Bro. Ephraim has suffered an attack of malaria and that their six-year-old son has epilepsy. Pray for them.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

New Year

On September 1 the fall semester started at Oregon Bible College. The following instructors will be teaching subjects in the Bible, theology, pastoral studies, missions, communications, and music.

John Lewis will be teaching New Testament I, Bible Survey, Preaching I, and Pastoral Work. Eugene Stilson will be teaching Biblical Hermeneutics, Bible Geography, English I, Christian Education of Youth, Greek, and Christian Education Field Work. Francis Burnett will be teaching Old Testament I, Isaiah, and Old Testament Wisdom Literature. Dale Ramsey will teach Introduction to Music, Choir, and Chorale. Stanley Ross will teach History and Survey of Missions, and Rachel Krogh will teach a three-hour Spanish course.

On this page you will find a rationale for some of these courses. The Oregon Bible College curriculum is planned to be directly applicable to the needs and plans of the Church of God General Conference.

New Students

At the summer Youth Conference more than forty young people indicated that they plan to attend Oregon Bible College. We are thankful to the Lord for the interest and dedication of the Church of God young people.

Spanish

The Spanish class taught at Oregon Bible College acquaints the student with the basic fundamentals of Spanish grammar and conversation. He learns to read and write simple compositions and to understand and speak easy conversational Spanish.

Spanish is a beautiful language and one that is relatively easy for English-speaking people to learn. It is of special interest to Church of God people because of our mission work in Mexico.

Because Oregon Bible College seeks to help in the training of missionaries for the Lord's service, Spanish is a valuable course in the curriculum. There are many countries where this language is spoken in which we have no missionary work. All of Central America and South America (with the exception of Brazil) use the Spanish language, and the need is great for missionary workers in these places. More workers are needed, too, in Mexico. Even if a person were to go to a country where he had to learn another language, his study of Spanish would be a help to him.

We are glad we are able to offer Spanish to the student as a part of his Bible college education.

Old Testament I

Old Testament I is a study of the first five books of the Bible. These are called by two names: 1) the Books of the Law, 2) the Pentateuch. The beginning of this course is given to a detailed study of the creation and the covenant made with Abraham. Special emphasis is made of the first twelve chapters of Genesis.

From Genesis twelve on through the rest of the Books of the Law, generally, equal time is given to all events that are recorded. Such incidents as the Passover, the giving of the law at Sinai, the wilderness journey, the numbering, and several other items are noted with care to make sure the student has an understanding of what is recorded.

There is much history in these books, but the doctrinal teaching is not to be overlooked. The covenants with Noah, Abraham, and others (Isaac, Jacob, and Israel) are very important.

What is most important, in our opinion, is to show the greatness of God. His mighty power is revealed over and again. He is the same God that we serve today.—Francis Burnett.

Bible Geography

Bible Geography is one of the basic tool courses for the Bible student. The purpose of the course is to gain knowledge of the people, and places connected with Bible events. This would include topics such as family life, occupations, economy, education, and religion. We will start with an overall view of the physical features of the Mediterranean Sea and the shores of Europe, Asia, and Africa. Then we will see the interaction between the great civilizations of Egypt, Babylon, Greece, and Rome. Against this general setting we will view the land of Palestine, and trace the journeys of persons such as Moses and Paul. Special emphasis this year will be given to New Testament backgrounds. Our textbook will be New Testament Times by Merrill C. Tenney. This will be supplemented with atlasses, history sources, and slides from the library. In the course skills will be developed in reading maps, and using history source materials. In later Bible courses the skills acquired are applied in studying the background of events.-Eugene Stilson.


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RUBY BROBERG RANDALL
