Minutes of the 1972 General Conference

DELEGATES of the Church of God General Conference gathered in the tabernacle of Riverview Park in Cedar Falls, Iowa, on Tuesday, August 15, 1972, for the first session of the 52nd annual meeting. Chairman Harold Doan called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. and asked Bro. C. E. Randall to give the opening prayer. Sr. Ruth Overholser, head of the Credentials Committee, seated the delegates and gave necessary instructions. Delegate folders and pool expense forms (4¢ per mile for one car from each church) were distributed.

Approximately 30 delegates serving for the first time introduced themselves to the assembly. The Champion Community Church of God in Michigan was represented for the first time, and it was announced that the North Hills Church of God in Springfield, Ohio, would be organized next month. Past President, Leland Hanson was given special recognition by the Chairman.

After considering the Special Reports printed in *Progress Journal*, Charles Jones and J. Don Swartz moved that we receive the reports as printed. The motion carried.

Charles Knapp reported on activities of the Board of Directors during the past year relating the frequency of meetings and the fellowship enjoyed by those on this Board. He also stated that the Board meets with the various department heads regularly and with all others who request meetings.

Executive Secretary S. O. Ross reiewed the printed financial reports which included the Statement of Assets and Liabilities (totaling \$529,662.72 and \$65,656.07 respectively) and the State-

ment of Income and Expenses (totaling \$187,013.43 and \$173,917.57 respectively). These reports showed a gain of \$13,095.86 over the past 9 months. Delbert Jones and Russell Reye moved that we accept the financial reports as presented. The motion carried.

E. Milon Hall, speaking on behalf of the Sunday School Department, related the good response from recent seminars and stated that the Sunday school is a barometer of enthusiasm for the Church of God. Chairman Doan read recommendation number 1 regarding one full-time worker to be employed as Director of the Youth Department and the Sunday School Department, by September of 1973, but added that action would be delayed until the following day.

Scott Ross, Curtis Simpson, Robert Petry, and Iva Mae Holt were nominated for positions on the Sunday School Board. Scott Ross and Robert Petry were elected for 2-year terms. (Joyce Knapp and George Scott are the other elected members.)

S. O. Ross announced that 429 persons had registered as of 9 a.m., that the Oregon Bible College Alumni Banquet would be held Wednesday evening, that the Ministers' Voluntary Retirement Association meeting would be at 9 p.m., that it is very important for everyone to check out when leaving, and that a demonstration would be given at 3:30 today on how to use the newly printed booklet, *The Christian Family*.

The Chairman read a proposal submitted by Byron Jay and sponsored by the Glad Tidings Chapel at Dayton, Ohio, regarding the production of audiovisual aids especially tailored for Church of God

groups. This proposal would provide assistance to teachers in the various churches and Sunday schools, and would include a taped sermon ministry. After some discussion it was decided to refer this proposal to the Sunday School Board, the Board of Directors, and the Ministerial Association for further study.

There were 7 officers, 49 ministers, and 83 delegates present, making a total of 139, as compared to 137 last year. The meeting was recessed at 11:40 a.m. with prayer by Scott Ross.

Wednesday, August 16

The second session of the 1972 Church of God General Conference was called to order by Chairman Doan on Wednesday morning. After the opening prayer by Delbert Jones, the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Francis Burnett then reported on the Youth Department work. He related that this year's International Berean Youth Conference was one of the best, with 285 campers and 42 staff members present. Giving for the week totaled \$1,584. The Midwinter Post-High Retreat was very successful, but the Young Adult Retreat had to be canceled because only 9 reqistered. Bro. Burnett announced three future activities for the department: 1) an international Communion Sunday in November: 2) an international Prayer Day in March; and 3) an international Pen Pal Week. The Youth Director spoke at length about various publicity aids to announce and celebrate the 75th year of the Berean Youth work. The department plans to publish a History Book which will emphasize the youth work and cardinal doctrines of the Church of God

through the years, and a Berean Bible Study Book containing 52 lessons from past study books. It was suggested that a bulletin insert be available to the churches in addition to the bulletin covers. The Chairman commended Bro. Burnett for his work and the youth of today's church, approximately 40 of whom were present for the business session.

After the reading of recommendation number 1, J. Don Swartz and Joe James moved that this recommendation be adopted which reads: we recommend that one full-time worker be employed as the Director of the Youth Department and the Sunday School Department by September, 1973. S. O. Ross explained that at the present time Milon Hall is working 15 hours per week on Sunday school work in addition to his pastoral duties, and that Francis Burnett is working half time for the Youth Department and half time as College instructor.

Questions raised and discussed included the following: Would there be a job description for this person? What would be accomplished by combining the two positions? Are the two jobs compatible? Must we wait until 1973? Does the Board of Directors need delegate approval for such action? Would this be a temporary arrangement? and, Does the Board have anyone in mind for the position? The Executive Secretary spoke of the advantages of having one person handle the two jobs. George Scott and Jay Ramsey moved to amend the motion to read that two fulltime workers be employed. The motion to amend carried and the motion as amended also carried. (This action was reconsidered on Thursday, and on Friday recommendation number 1 passed as originally proposed.)

Publishing Department information was given by Editor C. E. Randall. We are currently sending out 2400 Restitution Heralds, 4000 Progress Journals, and 1500 Challenge magazines each issue. It takes approximately 40 man-hours for mailing each issue of The Herald and about the same for the Journal. The Editor stated that total quarterly printing costs for the summer quarter of this year were \$3,915.27, and mentioned the several requests of other denominations for our literature. Bro. Randall said, "We have a message which God wants us to give to the world. We will become a wit-

nessing people through the greatest evangelistic arm we have—our literature." Brothers C. E. Randall and Paul Johnson were commended for their services in the Publishing Department.

After the reading of recommendation number 4, Joe James and Francis Burnett moved to accept this recommendation which reads: We recommend a "Literature Free in '73" Campaign. 1973 pounds of Church of God literature to be provided free of charge and that a planned distribution program be set up by the General Conference staff. The motion carried.

Cecil Smead and Joseph Fletcher moved the adoption of recommendation number 3 which reads: We recommend that all subscriptions to The Restitution Herald be extended for one year and that all members of the Church of God General Conference and all present Herald subscribers receive The Restitution Herald free for one year. Several spoke in favor of this recommendation. It was suggested that more information should accompany the printed recommendations. Several felt that local churches should begin planning now to support this program. Bro. Randall spoke of a planned financial program and expressed his confidence in the success of this recommendation. The question was called for and the motion passed.

The Credentials Committee reported 7 officers, 50 ministers, 85 delegates present with a total of 142, as compared with 135 last year. The closing prayer was given by Kent Ross.

Thursday, August 17

The third delegate session of the 52nd annual meeting was called to order by its Chairman, Harold Doan, on Thursday morning, August 17, at 10:05. After the opening prayer by James Graham, a brief note of greeting was read from Sr. Evelyn Austin. Minutes of the Wednesday session were read and approved.

It was announced that the delegate expense pool this year amounted to \$53.99.

The Chairman informed the delegates that due to the recent resignation of Board Member Paul Shaw it was necessary to nominate and elect a third director. Results of the nominations were: John Hearp, Vernis Wolfe, and David Johnson for Director number 1; Dallas

Demmitt and Alton Shaw for Director number 2; and Robert Smith and Rex Cain for Director number 3. Positions number 1 and number 2 will be 3-year terms, whereas position number 3 will be for one year to complete Bro. Shaw's term. The election will take place Friday.

Rachel Krogh Carr, Superintendent of Missions, was called upon to report on the Foreign Mission work. She announced November 5 as Missionary Day and gave several ways to emphasize this day in the local churches. Mention was made also of prospective missionary worker forms and missionary interest survey sheets. Sr. Carr introduced the Raymond Brown family of Nova Scotia and they in turn spoke of the mission work there. Current information was also given on mission stations in Mexico, Israel, Nigeria, the Middle East, India, and the Philippines. Sr. Carr expressed thanks to the Mission Board and all present for the financial and prayer support of the General Conference mission program, and announced that S. O. Ross was to succeed her as Superintendent of Foreign Missions this month. Alva Huffer and Edward Goit moved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Rachel Krogh Carr in appreciation of her untiring work as Superintendent of Foreign Missions. Those present promptly stood and applauded in favor of the motion. The progress of the Nigerian work since Ephraim Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John J. Obot have returned was discussed briefly.

S. O. Ross, reporting on Home Missions, expressed his thanks to Warren Sorenson for assistance in this work. We hope to reach the goal of 1500 Mission Builder members by 1975. The Home Bible Study Course books have been a real blessing to many people. The visitation training seminars have been well received, and the team conducting such seminars is still available to churches. Bro. Ross expressed appreciation for passing the literature distribution recommendation and stated that C. E. Randall is being asked to head up this work. He also mentioned the shifting of responsibilities at the Conference offices resulting from the resignations of Rachel Carr and Mary Jo Brewer and the hiring of David Krogh as office manager and Sandy New as secretary. Six other Home Bible Study Courses in mimeographed form have not been printed because the demand has not been great enough.

Nominations were opened for the election of one Mission Board member, and Mardy Lawrence was nominated. There being no others, Joseph Fletcher and Willard Naylor moved that nominations be closed and that a ballot be cast for the election of Mardy Lawrence to the Mission Board for a four-year term. The motion carried. (Other members are: Lee McQuinn, Robert Hall, and Merle Patrick.)

Charles Pryor spoke on behalf of the Family Life Committee, relating its beginnings and purpose. The Committee, now composed of Charles and Lois Pryor, Dallas and Nancy Demmitt, and Bill and Mardy Lawrence, is offering Family Life Enrichment Seminars to the churches and has produced a study guide for small groups called, The Christian Family. Churches often think more of family duties toward the church than of church duties toward the family. The Chairman expressed his appreciation for this committee's continuing work and for the many volunteer workers of the Conference who devote many hours to the Lord's work.

Delbert Jones and Paul Moore moved that we reconsider the motion passed yesterday regarding recommendation number 1. After Bro. Jones stated that he now felt there were more pressing needs than hiring two full-time workers (one for Youth Department and one for the Sunday School Department), the motion to reconsider carried.

Delbert Jones and Joe James then moved to adopt recommendation number 1 as printed in *Progress Journal*—that one full-time worker be employed as the Director of the Youth Department and the Sunday School Department by September, 1973. Some spoke in favor of the original recommendation, while others expressed their disappointment. Figures of a recent Sunday school survey were used to show the present need for a full-time Sunday School Director. A proposed job description from the Sunday School Department was read.

Edward Goit and Cecil Smead moved to amend the recommendation to read—that two full-time workers be employed: one as a full-time Director of the Youth Department and one as full-time Director of the Sunday School Department by September, 1973. After considerable discussion James Graham and Lee McQuinn moved to table the motion and amendment until tomorrow. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported 8 officers, 51 ministers, and 86 delegates present with a total of 145 as compared to 144 last year. The closing prayer was given by Michael Mattison.

Friday, August 18

Chairman Harold Doan called to order the fourth session of the 1972 General Conference at 10 a.m. on Friday, August 18. Hollis Partlowe offered the opening prayer. Minutes of the Thursday business session were read and approved. Sr. Ruth Overholser gave special instructions to the delegates in preparation for the elections.

Those duly elected to the Board of Directors were: John Hearp and Dallas Demmitt for three-year terms and Robert Smith for one year to complete the unexpired term of Paul Shaw. During the noon hour the new Board of Directors (Dallas Demmitt, Harold Doan, John Hearp, John Huston, Joe James, Charles Knapp, and Robert Smith) met to elect officers. Those elected at that time were: Chairman Harold Doan, Vice-Chairman Charles Knapp, Secretary Joe James, and Treasurer Robert Smith. Immediately preceding the final business session the new Board was installed.

C. E. Randall spoke about copies of *The Restitution Herald* being available, and Dallas Demmitt spoke about the distribution and use of the group discussion booklet, *The Christian Family*, nearly 500 of which have been distributed at this Conference.

A show of hands revealed that 56 delegates would favor July 9-14 for next year's annual Conference and that 69 would favor August 13-18. This expression of preference will be considered when the Board of Directors makes the final arrangements.

Dr. Alva Huffer, President of Oregon Bible College, spoke at length on the beginnings, purpose, philosophy, and goals of the College. He related the progress being made in receiving state approval to operate as an institution of higher learning and to grant degrees to graduates. The President introduced members of the Board of Education, the College Staff, and those assisting in the internship program in Arizona. Vice-President John Lewis spoke regarding the operation of the College during the past year and stated that 41 are enrolled for the Fall Semester-20 of whom are freshmen. Sr. Mary Krogh will become women's dormitory director in September. Accomplishments of the music department under the

direction of Dale Ramsey were also re-

Dr. Huffer continued by explaining the College curriculum, by relating the six recommendations of the state visitation team, and by distributing a paper on the General Education requirements at Oregon Bible College. Thirty-two hours in General Education are to be required for graduation. Required courses not taught at the College must be acquired by the student from other accredited colleges or universities and transferred to Oregon Bible College. The student may either take the courses before coming, take them during the summer while attending. or take a part-time load from another school while attending Oregon Bible Col-

In response to a question about the new women's dormitory, it was stated that we need to develop a program first and know how many girls will be attending. Various Bible courses were named which are currently being offered to freshmen. A question was raised about whether the emphasis is on General Education or on Bible Education, and whether or not we want for the College what the state requires. It was expressed that some areas are being neglected. The College President emphasized that the recommendations of the state visitation committee to improve Oregon Bible College were substantially the same goals established by the College years ago.

The Chairman announced that the new Board of Directors would meet on the platform after this session and that the final delegate session would begin at 2:15 p.m. There were 138 present (8 officers, 44 ministers, and 86 delegates) at the session and the same number at the corresponding session one year ago. John Lewis closed the session with prayer.

Friday Afternoon, August 18

The final delegate business session of the 52nd annual General Conference was called to order by its Chairman at 1:50 p.m. on Friday. Stephen Bolhous gave the opening prayer.

Dr. Alva Huffer concluded his morning presentation on the College. Questions were raised about how much money has come in for the new women's dormitory and the capacity of the present dormitory. Money received for the new building is approximately \$8,000 and the present dorm capacity is 14 for the women. Chairman Doan thanked Dr. Huffer and his staff for all their work on behalf of Oregon Bible College.

The motion and amendment concerning recommendation number 1 were lifted from the table. The Chairman related the Board's thinking on this recommendation and told how most recommendations come to the Board of Directors. He spoke of Milon Hall's resignation as head of the Sunday School Department effective October 1 and of the fact that no personalities were directly involved in this issue. The Board believes that the part-time positions of Youth Director and Sunday School Director are compatible and that one person could handle the two jobs. The additional annual expense for two full-time employees would be between \$15,000 and \$20,000. S. O. Ross related there are currently twelve full-time and three part-time Conference employees.

Don Overmyer and Willard Naylor moved to amend the amendment to read that the Board of Directors be authorized to employ two full-time workers, as qualified personnel are available and as the faith of the Conference is evidenced in adequate giving. After some discussion the Chairman called this amendment to the amendment a substitute motion in actuality and later ruled it out of order. The amendment to recommendation number 1 which called for two full-time workers by September 1973 failed with 83 no and 34 yes ballots cast. The delegates were then instructed to cast ballots on the original recommendation number 1, which reads-that one full-time worker be employed as the Director of the Youth

Department and the Sunday School Department by September, 1973. The vote was 103 for the recommendation and 15 against (one extra vote cast). Edward Goit and Edward Bender moved to let the vote stand. The motion carried,

Announcement was made concerning pictures taken by Byron Jay during the Conference. It was reported that there were 100 children enrolled in the Conference Bible School under the direction of Doris Brown and Lois Pryor with an average attendance of 88 and a missionary offering totaling \$27.06.

Joseph Fletcher and Dallas Demmitt moved the adoption of recommendation number 2 which reads-that a person, committee, or group be selected to provide education concerning tithing throughout the churches of the Church of God General Conference. The motion car-

Lee McQuinn and J. Don Swartz moved the adoption of recommendation number 5 which reads-We recommend a continuation of the efforts to fulfill the "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five" goals before September 1975. The motion car-

John Hearp and Edward Goit moved that a rising vote of thanks be given to the retiring members of the Board of Directors. The motion carried. Dale Swartz and Charles Knapp moved that we thank the Waterloo Church for the use of their organ during this Conference. The motion carried. Charles Jones and Joseph Fletcher moved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Milon Hall for his service on the Sunday School Board. The motion car-

S. O. Ross gave an explanation of the proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1972, and answered several questions. Charles Pryor and Bill Andrew moved that the proposed budget of \$134,000 for the General Conference be adopted as printed. The motion carried. In connection with Conference finances it appears that the Faith-Promise method of giving has helped. Several spoke of the benefits of this type of giving to local and state conferences. A comment was made regarding the low salaries of Conference workers and the need to improve them.

The Chairman complimented the delegates for their alertness, in spite of the high temperatures during the week. The final Credentials Committee report showed 117 delegates in attendance as compared to 107 last year. (Average attendance this year was 135.) Minutes of the morning and afternoon sessions were read and approved. John Huston and George Sheely moved that the minutes of this 1972 General Conference be approved. The motion carried. Edward Goit and Edgar Harvey moved that the Conference be adjourned and that we sing one verse of "God be With You." All stood in favor of the motion, and the Secretary gave the closing prayer.

General Conference Minutes

The minutes of the 1972 General Conference business sessions are in this issue. We urge each member to read them carefully. The decisions and recommendations made are directives to the Board of Directors and the General Conference staff for the next year. May the Lord richly bless the total programs of the Church of God General Conference in this new fiscal year.

Herald—Journal Mailing

With this issue *Progress Journal* and *The Restitution Herald* will be mailed together to the membership. Since *The Herald* is being sent without charge for one year, this will save some handling and printing costs. All *Herald* subscriptions are being extended for one year.

Literature Distribution

Each church will soon be receiving a direct mailing regarding the Free Literature Program. We trust that each individual will accept the responsibility of taking part in this worthwhile campaign.

Board of Education

At the General Conference in August, Bro. Dallas Demmitt, a member of the Board of Education, was elected to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors appointed Dr. William Lawrence, Phoenix, Ariz., to fill the one-year unexpired term of Bro. Demmitt on the Board of Education.

Sunday School Director

Bro. Milon Hall resigned his part-time position as Director of the Sunday School Department, effective September 30, 1972. A recommendation passed at the recent General Conference directs that one full-time person be employed as Director of the Youth Department and Sunday School Department by September, 1973.

In view of the above facts, Bro. Scott H. Ross, pastor of the Troyview Church of God, Troy, Ohio, has been appointed to temporarily fill the position of Sunday School Director until the full-time appointment is made. Bro. Ross is presently an elected member of the Sunday School Board. He will fulfill these duties in addition to his pastorate of Troyview Church.

Pastoral Changes

The new General Conference directory will be printed in the November issue of *Progress Journal*.

There were a number of pastoral changes September first, and these will be reflected in that issue.

1973 Conference Dates

The 1973 General Conference will be held August 13-18 at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa. Make plans now to set this week aside to attend these important sessions.

Annual Budget

The budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1972, requires contributions in the amount of \$134,000. This budget approved by the Conference delegates can be found on page 4 of this issue.

Eight thousand dollars of this amount will be needed to help carry out the Free Literature Crusade, including *The Restitution Herald* free to each member and each subscriber for one year. Funds are needed to carry on the work of the Sunday School Department, Berean Youth activities, Mission work (both home and foreign), and the general services of the Conference. The education of our young men and women at Oregon Bible College and the cost of publications of the General Conference need to be subsidized by contributions.

We trust that each member will make this a matter of prayer and concern and help to meet these needs each month of the fiscal year. Eleven thousand one hundred sixty-six dollars (\$11,166) will be needed in contributions each month to fully carry out this great work.

Conference Finances

Due to the combination mailing, it is necessary to cut off the list of contributors early in the month. Those who contribute the latter half of the month will appear in the next issue. We do express our thanks to all who have helped to meet the financial needs of the 1971-72 fiscal year. As this is written, \$10,351.00 has been received, so the September Goal has been met. Praise God!

Missions News

Superintendent of Missions

I am pleased to be writing this page again as Superintendent of Missions. I assumed this position on September 1, along with my duties as Executive Secretary and Home Missions Director. Most will recall that I was Superintendent of Missions from September, 1961, to September, 1969, when Sr. Rachel Krogh (now Carr) was appointed to that position.

We want to take this means to express our gratitude and appreciation to Sr. Rachel Krogh Carr for her excellent work in this department for the past three years. She resigned to move to Macomb, Ill., where her husband, John Carr, has assumed the pastorate of the Macomb Church of God.

November, Missions Month

November has been designated Missions Month in the Church of God General Conference for the past twelve years. The first Sunday of November has traditionally been Missions Sunday. We trust that each church is making plans to observe this special event on a Sunday of November. The Missions Page of the September issue of Progress Journal cited many ideas and suggestions that can be profitably used.

Bulletin inserts will be provided on Missions for use during the month of November.

Lebanon

A recent report from Bro. Jamal Sunna'a in Lebanon tells of the camp that was held in August. More than one hundred adults attended and two have asked for baptism.

Bro. Shaker Iskander and his family have returned to Cairo, Egypt. He has had some difficulty in finding suitable housing for his family and for the services. Please pray for this need that acceptable quarters will be found.

Mexico

Bro. Francisco Martinez and his family have now moved to the village of Labor Vieja and he has assumed the pastorate there. A new church building has been recently completed and a full schedule of services is carried on each week. Fifty attend the Sunday night services and there were thirty-five at a recent midweek Bible Class.

In August, Sr. Alice Aldrich returned to Mexico for a week to assist with a vacation Bible school. More than fifty children attended the school. Evening services were held several nights and the church was full at each service.

Philippine Islands

The radio broadcasts continue from the station at the village of Tuguegarao in spite of the persecutions suffered by our missionaries there a few months ago. Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero is reluctant to go to the station in person yet, feeling that "some danger may still await" him there. Some of the other pastors have been delivering the messages and a congregation has been organized in the village for the converts as a result of the radio broadcasts.

The court matter over the radio incident has not come up for hearing as yet. An attorney has been retained to defend Bro. Ortiguero and the others when the matter comes to trial.

Nigeria

Reports from Nigeria reveal that the work is going forward under the leadership of Ephriam Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John J. Obot. Several have been baptized, and many in the area are beginning to ask about the Church of God. The three leaders are having meetings and Bible studies with church leaders and interested individuals in the area.

Literature Distribution

Plans are under way for the Free Literature Distribution Program for the new church Year. Each church will soon be receiving information and guidelines on how to help carry out this fine outreach program that was approved by the delegates to the recent General Conference.

Each member is encouraged to become a part of this program. This is an opportunity for each one to help reach someone with the gospel message.

Home Missions

Four churches will be on the Pastoral Aid Program for the next year.

Missions Month

Special effort is made this month to emphasize missions and to pray for all the missionaries and for the many mission projects. Missions of the Church of God is big business, as approximately sixty thousand dollars were expended the last fiscal year in mission efforts.

Pray for our missionaries in India, Mexico, Philippine Islands, Nigeria, Lebanon, Egypt, and Nova Scotia. Pray for the Home Mission efforts; and for the Literature Distribution Campaign. God has wonderfully blessed the Church of God. May we work together in a united effort to spread God's great message of salvation. God will give the increase.

India

The church-medical building in India is now under construction. This building will be the place of worship of the former Austin Town and St. John College congregations. It will be a medical station for the members and people of the local area. A full-time doctor will be on duty. The doctor will be supported by contributions from a non-member individual who has a real concern for the sick and needy of India. We had the privilege to assist in the cornerstone laying ceremony on the lot while in India last February. The current Mission Builders Appeal is for the India building. It appears that this appeal will net the highest amount of any of the twenty-eight appeals to date.

Bro. P. M. Paulson continues his mission efforts in the Hyderabad area. There are five congregations hav-

ing regular weekly services. Arrangements are being made for Bro. Paulson to spend two weeks with Bro. Manoah for further study and understanding of Christian work. Bro. Paulson and his main helper, Philip, have been given bicycles for their mission work in several villages.

The Chinnaya Palya (see photo) congregation celebrated the first anniversary of their church in August. Special services were held and many attended from the other churches. During those services, special prayer sessions were held asking God's blessings upon the General Conference sessions which were held about the same time.

The Bible Quizzing Program

We know that a large percentage of our churches are involved in one way or another in the Quizzing Program of the Bereans. This is one phase of the Berean work where enthusiasm and excitement run high. Often, inquiries are made in the fall soon after the Youth Conference is over concerning the material for the following year.

For the benefit of new members in the church and as a reminder to all, we will give a few details as to how the quizzing is conducted. On or about January 1 of each year information about the material for quizzing is sent out. Other quiz material is sent to state youth leaders, and known quiz coaches.

Quiz teams are then formed in the local Berean groups. Each team member begins to study the material. Practice sessions are held with team members. Often a team will ask the adults to guiz against them and local teams play each other in practice. It has been the practice for the past several years to have a state or district team which represents all the young people in that state. This team is chosen by having all the teams in a district or state conference quiz together to determine the champions. Generally, the members chosen to attend International Berean Youth Conference is done by selecting the persons who have the highest scores. By doing this, members from throughout the state are chosen and not all are from one church or Berean group. Most state conferences pay the camp cost for quiz team members.

In 1972, eight teams competed at Camp Mack. There is a possibility of having eleven teams if all conferences participate. The double elimination process is used. Each team plays two games. And, of course through winning, some teams play four games and, possibly, as it was this year, five games.



Report on the Free Literature Crusade

By the Editor

T THE 1972 Church of God General Conference, the delegates voted to approve a Free Literature Crusade for the coming year. The Conference Board of Directors asked the editor to direct this evangelistic outreach which was started October 1, 1972.

The Crusade is well underway. The Restitution Herald, which comes under the Free Literature classification, was more than double in circulation in November over the same month last year. The December printing will be almost triple that of a year ago. One of my daily prayers since taking over the editorship of The Restitution Herald has been that its circulation might be doubled. The Restitution Herald is our most effective evangelistic outreach.

Since the Free Literature Crusade was started, over 100,000 tracts have been printed or are on order. I believe it is a conservative estimate to say that during this Crusade year a million tracts will be printed and distributed.

Total Mobilization

To bring all our resources to bear in the

Free Literature Crusade, there must be a total mobilization of the combined strength of the General Conference, the local churches, and individuals.

General Conference

The General Conference has acted and set in operation the necessary machinery to implement the Free Literature Crusade. We are thinking only in terms of success! The General Conference will provide the literature. The distribution is a work that can only be done by the local churches and isolated members.

The Local Church

Evangelism and outreach must come through the local church. The success or failure of the Free Literature Crusade will depend wholly on the local churches. YOU ARE IMPORTANT!

Statistically speaking the average congregation uses about one-fourth or less of its potential strength—depending on the faithful few to carry on the work of the church. The Free Literature Crusade provides a unique opportunity to enlist and mobilize the full strength of the church.

Members who are not trained to do personal visitation work can become involved in literature distribution. Anyone can enclose a tract in a letter which has been written to a friend or relative.

Individuals

When Nehemiah pointed out the desolate condition of the wall around Jerusalem on the return from Babylon, the people replied, "Let us rise up and build." Our people are no less dedicated! When leadership is given and opportunity afforded, they will respond by saying: "Let us rise up and work." The Free Literature Crusade can be a great spiritual uplift to every church that will become fully mobilized and involved!

In this Crusade of Free Literature, we are dealing with people. People are opportunities! Widespread saturation of our literature is not as effective and productive as person-to-person—eye-ball-to-eye-ball. To succeed in personal contacts, we should determine what the other person needs. Here we should stop, look, and listen. Meeting people's needs with suitable tracts can be door openers.

Mexico

Bro. Francisco Martinez and his family are now located in Labor Vieja, a small village in the State of San Luis Potosi. The brethren have carried on a work there for several years under the leadership of Roberto Badillo, a dedicated lay worker. A new church building has been erected there recently and the services averaged thirty-seven in October. Bro. 


ROCKFORD ILLINOIS, CHURCH OF GOD

Missions News

Mid-East

The accompanying picture is a women's class in Cairo, Egypt. The work there is progressing under the leadership of Bro. Shaker Iskander.

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a of Lebanon continues to make great use of literature, especially the Systematic Bible Study Course, which he has translated into Arabic. A man in Algeria, North Africa, has taken the course and is now asking or baptism. Many Arab countries are receiving the gospel through the written word.

There are several baptized members in Jordan who were holding regular services in their homes. Due to the political problems there, no group meetings are allowed in homes at present so they had to discontinue their services.

Philippine Islands

A recent report from Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero states that six men and four women were baptized at the relatively new church in the village of Lupao. Bro. Calixto Marini is the pastor there.

We call attention to all the recent problems in the radio work in the Philippines. Bro. Ortiguero writes, "The troublesome church is no longer doing its program on the Tuguegarao station. The station manager removed that program in spite of the many appeals by them to continue. We do not know of the reason of its removal, as they do have plenty of funds to pay for the programs. We have hopes that the removal of the program of that troublesome church at that station will give eace of mind to our speakers."

Because of all the political problems in the Philippines, the President has ordered martial law imposed. Fortunately, freedom of religion and freedom of worship



were not affected, except that no meetings either inside or outside can be held after dark. Bro. Ortiguero and his people are glad for the order, since no serious crime has been committed since the proclamation. Before that time, violence was in evidence on every hand.

Nova Scotia

Bro. Raymond Brown recently conducted five devotional services at the local radio station in Digby. Recent reports show that seventy-five calls were made in September and seventy-four in October. Attendance continues to average about sixty for both Sunday school and church.

India

Bro. S. S. Manoah has traveled to Andhra Pradesh, near Hyderabad to spend ten days with Bro. P. M. Paulson and the workers there. They will study together regarding the true doctrines and beliefs of the Church of God, Abrahamic Faith, make arrangements for printing of tracts in the Telagu dialect, and lay plans for the future work within the five congregations there.

Special Mothers Day services were held on October 29, 1972, at Thomas Town, Bangalore, honoring all the mothers of the several churches. Each of the churches in India held special Communion services in conjunction with the Berean Fellowship Communion Sunday on November 26.

It is the hope that the Church-Medical building in the John Nagar section of Bangalore will be completed within six months. Mission Builders Appeal No. 28 for this building has brought in over six thousand five hundred dollars, the largest Mission Builders Appeal ever.

Nigeria

Bro. Solomon Idiong and his wife have been quite ill with malaria. Both are some better but they are asking for prayers for their complete recovery.

The youth of the Nigerian churches held special Communion services on BYF Communion Sunday, November 26.

A Missionary Conference was held at the Ediene Church on November 18. Plans were made for outreach in the surrounding villages. Special meetings are being held with a group at the village of Asarama. A number there plan to be baptized into Jesus Christ at special services early in January.

Mexico

Bro. Francisco Martinez reports that attendance has been lower due to rain and cold weather. He made nineteen visits in November. One lady came forward and will be immersed in the waters of baptism shortly.

Bro. Martinez says, "We trust in the Lord that very soon others will give their lives to Christ. Thank you for your letter, which gives me great strength and blessing. We wish a happy Christmas and blessed New Year to all the brethren of the Church of God."

Annual Financial Statement

On pages six and seven of this issue you will find the Financial Report for the past fiscal year. The full report of forty pages was presented to the Board of Directors at its regular meeting on November 16-18, 1972, and was approved at that time.

Board Meeting Actions

The Board of Directors appointed Bro. Francis Burnett to the position of full-time Youth-Sunday School Director for one year beginning September 1, 1973. At the end of that year it is the plan that a full-time Director be appointed for the Youth Department and also for the Sunday School Department. This appointment was made in accordance with the action taken by the delegates at the 1972 General Conference.

The Conference delegates directed that a person, committee, or group be appointed to provide education concerning tithing throughout the churches of the Church of God General Conference. The Board did appoint Bros. Z. B. Duncan, Chairman, Joe James, and James Mattison to that committee.

A proposal was presented at General Conference that a tape and cassette library of sermons and messages be started. The Conference Board of Directors appointed Bro. Byron Jay, Chairman, and Rex Cain to a committee to begin setting up such a library.

The recently organized Pleasant Hill Church of God, at Pleasant Hill, Ohio, has asked for and been accepted as a member church of the Church of God General Conference. The first service was held on December 3, with seventy-two in attendance.

The Board of Education of Oregon Bible College recommended that an increase be made in tuition and room and board. By action of the Board of Directors, effective with the 1973-74 school year, the tuition will be increased to \$250.00 per semester, and room and board to \$350.00 per semester. This reflects an increase of \$25.00 in each.

About four hundred fifty dollars was received from the auction sale of antique items held at the 1972 General Conference. The Board of Directors has approved these funds to be used to build the fireproof vault in the General Conference building. Bros. Joe James, John Huston, and S. O. Ross, with John Hearp as alternate, have been appointed to a committee to plan the 1973 General Conference. This Conference will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 13-18. The Committee will be meeting in early January. If you have any suggestions or ideas for the Conference program please contact one of the Committee.

The Board spent four hours on Saturday morning in long-range planning for the overall work of the Church of God General Conference. Many thoughts, ideas, and possibilities were discussed.

Ministers Fund

The Ministers Fund of the Church of God General Conference is a special fund used for loans or gifts to ministers or ministers' widows in emergency situations. One disabled minister and one minister's widow are receiving a small amount from this fund each month. The funds are being depleted. We encourage churches and individuals to remember this fund with an offering or a gift that a balance may be maintained for an unexpected emergency. The fund is administered by the pastors of the Rockford, Dixon, and Oregon churches, the Dean of Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Secretary of the General Conference.

Conference Finances

Contributions for the month of December are twenty-five hundred dollars short of the needs. Extensive printing costs due to the enlarged *Restitution Herald* mailings and the extra tract printings, added to the general work of all the departments, require that the goals be met each month or a bank loan will be required. One of the important student organizations of Oregon Bible College is the Mission Fellowship Activity. The goals, activities, and projects of this group make a significant contribution to the spiritual growth of the student body. The purpose of the mission activity of the school is threefold: first, mission activity is to glorify God; second, it is to take a significant part in spreading the gospel to every creature, and, finally, to edify brothers and sisters in the faith.

With a membership of twenty students, the club has been active in both home and foreign missions. In the early part of the semester interest has been concentrated in the home missions area. Following the example of the early apostles, students this year conducted literature distribution and visitation campaigns in the city of Oregon. During a special sale day sponsored by the merchants of Oregon, students distributed Bibles and tracts on the street. On that same day the club sponsored a car wash to raise funds for the various activities. We are also conducting services in a rest home for elderly people on a regular basis.

One project we feel is important to the College is the OPERATION OUTREACH program. The goal of this project is to reach every house in Oregon, giving information about the College and witnessing for Christ. The program is not complete, but already some Oregon people have responded to our visitation. Many people have shown an interest in the Church of God. The Mission Fellowship Activity also conducts one chapel service each month. Through these activities we pray that the Mission Fellowship Activity will bring glory to God and be of help to people in need. We welcome any encouragement from the brethren.

Contributions for Library Needed





General Conference Headquarters

The above picture is of the general offices building of the Church of God General Conference located at 131 N. Third St., Oregon, Illinois. The right-hand portion of the building has the publishing department, the mailing room, and the General Conference staff offices. The left-hand portion houses Oregon Bible College staff offices, classrooms, student lounge, and chapel. In addition to this building there is the women's dormitory (the former Golden Rule Home) and the men's residence building which includes the library, music room, kitchen and dining facilities, and twelve dormitory rooms each housing two students. There is also a large lot in the dormitory area used for parking which may be used for future expansion.

The higher portion of the Conference building is well over one hundred years old and has been used for publishing and Conference use since March of 1922. The addition was built in 1950. The present facilities are in good repair and a credit to the community and to the General Conference membership.

General Conference Outreach

The Word of God is going out in a wonderful way through the various efforts of the Church of God General Conference. Thousands are being reached in at least seven foreign countries through the direct preaching and teaching ministry of the Mission Department. At least fourteen Mideast countries are receiving the gospel through the written Word (Systematic Bible Study Course in Arabic) being distributed by Bro.

Sunna'a in Lebanon. The radio ministry in the Philippine Islands is reaching many with the Word.

The Free Literature Crusade of this church year is a tremendous tool for reaching the multitudes in our home areas as well as reaching into many foreign countries. We envision a million pieces of literature being used this year. The number of *Restitution Heralds* of the 1973 March issue will be nearly four times the number used in March 1972.

We recently received an order from the West Indies for thirty Songs of Truth hymnals. We have just received a Systematic Bible Study Course request from Jamaica. Letters arrive almost daily from foreign countries and from people in the United States and Canada requesting to know more about the biblical teachings held by the Church of God General Conference. Some people in Australia are reaching out to the Church of God for direction and leadership. Churches of other denominations are using our Sunday school quarterlies and hymnals. One Bible college is using the book, Systematic Theology, by Bro. Alva Huffer, as the textbook in its Systematic Bible Study Course. We prais God for all these opportunities available to the Church of God. We ask that you earnestly pray for guidance that each challenge will be met and that many will find Christ in this next year through the united efforts of the Church of God General Conference.

The picture shows Bro. Oliver Amani (on the left) of Ghana, West Africa, and E. K. Dzoko and E. K. Afenyo, two schoolteachers who were recently baptized by him. Bro. Amani is leading a group in services at Wora Wora village, where he has secular employment. He also returns to his former home of Jasikan for services on occasion. Several of the Jasikan members are government employees and have been moved to other locations, which has curtailed attendance.

At the village of Wora Wora a lady is providing a meeting hall rent free for his services. He asks that the membership pray for this work that the Lord might continue to bless. He continues to thank God for saving his life in the taxi accident a year ago.

Philippine Islands

Bro. Insturo Magno, a faithful and dedicated pastor, has resigned and retired from the active ministry. He was one of the first to join Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero in the Church of God mission effort in the Philippines. Due to age and ill health he felt led to this decision. He is a well-educated man and speaks excellent English. His leadership will be missed by the members of the Roxas congregation.

Bro. Rudencio Luzano, a very talented and consecrated young man, has taken over the pastorate at Roxas. Iskander and a few other interested people are already having some Bible study services in Alexandria.

A new group has become very active in the Arlington, Texas, area (between Dallas and Fort Worth). Bro. and Sr. Albert Harper, dedicated layworkers from the Omaha, Nebraska, church, have gone to Arlington to give them pastoral leadership for several months this winter. Berean Youth Week

The 1972 Berean Youth Week is history and, from all indications through letters and reports, was perhaps one of the most successful ever held. The date for this last year was September 18-24.

The first place winner was the youth of Garden Park Church of God, Grand Rapids, Michigan. Second place award was given to the Bereans of the Blanchard Church of God, Blanchard, Michigan. Others that we would give ratings to but no awards are: Southlawn Church of God Bereans, Wyoming, Michigan, third place; Faith Chapel Church of God Bereans, East Peoria, Illinois, fourth place; East Oregon Church of God Bereans, Oregon, Illinois, and Hedrick Church of God Bereans, Hedrick, Indiana, fifth place. Fifteen other groups sent in reports that showed much activity among their groups and in their churches during the Youth Week.

Many may ask about the procedure used in judging the winners. The basis used has been one which has been gradually added to during the years. Much consideration has been given to the matter as to what should be considered important. What should a youth group be expected to do that would truly show it deserved to be a winner. Christian service should be the object of the group and performed by the group. One of the first items, and a very important one, is preplanning. Some groups have planning meetings three to four months in advance. The kinds of Christian service used for judging are: witnessing to individuals personally; handing out of tracts; canvassing the local church neighborhood; giving out invitations to attend church; visiting homes for the aged or other institutions where the less fortunate live; teaching of the youth by the adults in Sunday school teacher training; attendance at a board meeting; work at the church; and other things that fit into this classification. It is our thinking that banquets and parties are nice, but are not really emphasizing the evangelical spirit of the church.

The date was set by the Advisory Council at its meeting December 29, 1972, at Camp Mack, Milford, Indiana. The date is the last full week of October—October 22-28—with Youth Sunday being October 28. The Sunday School Superintendent

Sometime during the coming year nearly every Sunday school in our General Conference will be electing their Sunday school superintendents. Careful thought and consideration should be given to whom we elect to this important position.

It is important to elect qualified people as Sunday school superintendents. The most important qualification is that he be a dedicated Christian, leading a consecrated life. Such a person would be faithful to all church services, would witness, would tithe, and would lead a life separated from worldly practices. No matter how many other qualifications he might have, if he is not such a Christian, your Sunday school will be handicapped.

There are other qualifications that are important. He ought to have a vision of what the Sunday school can accomplish and of its work, be a good organizer, be enthusiastic, be a person that makes a good impression, and be able to work closely with the pastor. It would be helpful if he had a teaching background. Let's elect qualified Sunday school superintendents to lead our Sunday schools.

THE CHURCH AFLAME

COMETHING is happening in the Church of God! It's on fire! It's aflame with a new spirit. It is taking on the character and zeal of the New Testament church when its members "went every where preaching the word." In the early days of our organizational existence in this country, the members were staunch witnesses for the truth which they had searched and found and loved. Ministers served as evangelists, going into new fields with the message which they ardently believed was essential to salvation. They were aflame with zeal, and their earnestness and the biblical logic of their message found a response in many hearts and lives, with the result being, congregations of believers sprang up all over the country. Their conviction that the second coming of Christ was at hand gave urgency to their work and message. The passing of time seemed to quench the spirit in the children and children's children. However, history is repeating itself. A new wave of evangelistic fervor has taken hold of us.

Pastors and churches are being stirred anew. The Free Literature Crusade has provided both a means and a challenge,

and is capturing the hearts and hands of many and turning them into witnesses for the saving message of salvation. Some of the evidences of this new awakening can be seen in the programs and practices of the churches. Troy View Church, Troy, Ohio, is carrying on a seven-week tract distribution to 1500 homes in the church community, with a climax of taking *The Restitution Herald* to all these homes and a week of meetings by the editor.

The Columbia Station Church, Ohio, is having a Literature Distribution Campaign, and in March and April will distribute 500 copies of The Herald. Implementing this effort will be pre-Easter services, April 3-8, with James Mattison as speaker. Hope Chapel, South Bend, Indiana, has organized for a systematic distribution of The Restitution Herald in March to 1,500 homes. Dixon, Illinois, will be using 1,000 Heralds for the months of March and April in their Literature Outreach. Hillisburg Church, Indiana, has ordered 1250 Heralds for April. The Phoenix Church is carrying on a well-planned Literature Crusade and will be using 800 Heralds in April.

Every month we continue to receive

new subscriptions and the number of copies in bundles is increasing.

Add to this outreach the thousands of tracts being distributed, new Bible study groups being organized, Faith Promise plans being adopted by churches, missionary seminars held, Sunday school seminars being conducted, revival meetings—all these ongoings reveal an increased awakening among the churches.

The Literature Crusade is surpassing our fondest expectations. We are thrilled! God be praised! There is no limit to what can be done with "the Lord working with [us]" (Mark 16:20). This was the secret of the power, perseverance, and performance of the early church. Surely the Lord is in our camp! So far the Free Literature Crusade has been well supported financially. It is worthy of the support of each and every one.

KEEP THE FLAME GLOWING

With ready response to the mercies of God-yielding ourselves as living sacrifices to the Lord, and being able to say, "O God, our eyes are upon thee" and our ears open to his voice, the church will continue to be aflame.

There were six baptisms last month, two from the Utu Abak Church (Bro. John Obot, pastor) and four from the new group at Asarama. The Nigerian brethren have need of one hundred *Songs of Truth* hymnals. These will be supplied shortly, even though it is not in the Mission budget. Bro. Udo and his co-workers, John Obot and Solomon Idiong, are doing a great work in leading the Church of God General Conference mission field of Nigeria.

Mexico

We are happy to report that Eulogia Padron was baptized into Christ by Pastor Francisco Martinez in the Labor Vieja Church of God. We hope that her example and testimony may encourage others to take the stand for Christ.



POWER is available to the Church of God! This power is twofold: 1) The Word of God which we have been called and commissioned to preach is powerful and it is sharper than a two-edged sword. It is God's power to salvation. Said Paul: "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Rom. 1:16).

This was the power which the early church used when they "went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). As result of this combined effort on the part of the membership it is recorded that "the word of God grew and multiplied." So fruitful was this evangelism of the Word, the church was accused of turning "the world upside down" (Acts 17:6).

Mobilization

The early church was enthusiastic about the importance of the commission which Jesus had given that the "gospel of the kingdom" must be preached in all the world as a witness. They had the assurance that the Word that went forth would "not return . . . void." With confidence of victory and awareness of the power present and divineness of their mission, the man power was mobilized and both men and women "went every where preaching he word."

We have the Word—the power today. Our immediate task is to TURN ON THE POWER! The Word is just as potent today as it was when spoken. We must real-

ize the divineness of our mission. The General Conference is ready and willing to help states and local churches mobilize their man power and provide ideas and materials in carrying out the Great Commission.

The Easter season, when special emphasis is placed on the resurrection of Christ, is a good time to emphasize the POWER of the risen Christ. As Paul put it: "That [we] may know him, and the power of his resurrection" (Phil. 3:10). With this power at its command, the church can give light to a dark world; it can win souls to Christ; it can increase attendance; it can witness to others willingly; it can build and maintain enthusiasm; it can help saints to grow up in Christ who is the Head; it can glow and grow! It must, however, TURN ON THE POWER.

The Holy Spirit

The first disciples were charged to stay in Jerusalem until they were "endued with power from on high" (Luke 24:49). This enduement was the bestowal of the Holy Spirit upon them.

2) The Holy Spirit was POWER. In the beginning of time this spirit moved upon the face of the deep and brought order out of chaos. It was and is creative. It was creative in the lives of the early Christians. It created dynamic witnesses out of fishermen, tax collectors, and untrained individuals. So evident was the power and spirit of this conglomerate group of witnesses that the Sadducees, scribes, priests,

and rulers marveled at them, and of Peter and John said that "they were unlearned and ignorant," yet they perceived "that they had been with Jesus" and took knowledge of them (Acts 4:13). Individuals lacking in the wisdom of this world, when possessed of that wisdom which is from above, become bold, dynamic, living epistles "known and read of all men."

Every person baptized into the death and burial of Jesus and raised to walk in newness of life (Rom. 6:3-6) is promised the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:38, 39). With this power, plus the power of the Word of God, we can do all things necessary, through Christ who strengthens, to witness and win people to obedience of the gospel.

Any church can be evangelistic if it believes its message important!

The days of evangelism are not over. Neither will they be over until the Lord descends "with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God." The Word must be preached while the door of salvation is still open. It will be proclaimed. God has purposed that his Word should be preached in all the world for a witness. We as a church can be faithful in this ministry. If we are not, God's purpose will not be defeated. He will raise up a witness—even if the stones must cry

Excuses for not preaching, teaching, publishing, and sharing the gospel by person and purse will have no bearing on the proclamation of the message, other than

Literature Campaign Financing

The Literature Distribution Campaign is well under way and most churches have organized plans to spread God's Word in their communities. Fourteen thousand copies of *The Restitution Herald* will be sent out this month. We praise God for the response of the membership to this challenge of taking the gospel into "all the world" through the written Word.

Eight thousand dollars was placed in the current budget to finance this program. We find that this amount will fall far short of the total cost for the year. During the first six months of this current year the Literature cost was \$9,609 (tracts, \$2,971 and Heralds,

\$6,638). This cost includes *Restitution Herald* covers, and the typesetting and printing of *The Herald* and tracts. Additional costs not reflected in these figures would be mailing costs and staff time. We know that the membership will meet these needs. We pray that many might find Christ through the literature effort. God has said in Isaiah 55:11, "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." We must sow the seed (God's Word); God will give the increase!

eliminate the excuser from work in the harvest field. BUT, responsibility and accountability will be upon every soul that knows to do good and does it not (Jas. 4:17).

There is no community where the Word does not need to be scattered. It is our job to sow the good seed and the Lord has said that he will give the increase (1 Cor. 3:7). Sometimes we become "weary in well doing" because the increase is slow in showing. In looking on the whitened fields, there are churches that seem to find little to garner, while others are burdened down bringing in the sheaves. All programs of study at Oregon Bible College include a major in the Bible and Theology. In addition, each program includes a minor selected by the student: Pastoral Studies, Christian Education, Music, or a Music-Christian Education minor.






Another highlight for the activity was the sponsoring of a Religious Folk Concert.



Sunday School of the Month

The Sunday School of the Month for May is the Hope Chapel Church of God in South Bend, Indiana. This Sunday school has been selected because of the vast outreach program that has been developed. This church reaches out with the gospel through a van ministry. The van is full every Sunday. A second way it reaches out is through its radio ministry. Part of the program each Sunday is used promoting events at the church. Since beginning the program, there has been at least one contact each week as a result of the broadcasts. A third way this church is reaching out with the gospel is through a literature distribution program. The Restitution Herald and a group of tracts have been distributed to 1,500 homes in the area of the church. A fourth way this Sunday school is reaching out is through a sound education plan, including adult and junior departments (each with its own superintendent), elective adult classes, and ample use of visual aids. And a fifth way this church is reaching out is through regular promotional programs. For example, during the month of March there was a "Marching Through March" campaign, with Induction Sunday, Ammunition Sunday, where everyone was given a supply of ammunition (tracts), Attack Sunday where the neighborhood was "attacked" with 1,500 packets of literature, and Victory Sunday. There even was a theme song written by Bro. Elmer McChesney especially for this promotion.

This Sunday school with its programs of outreach has seen rapid growth in recent years, both numerically and spiritually. Congratulations to the Hope Chapel Church of God, to its pastor James Graham, and to its general superintendent Lottie Pickerl.

Church of God Historical Research

For a long time it has been recognized there was a need to research, compile, write, and publish a comprehensive history of the Church of God, its organization and progress in the United States and Canada, and its later endeavors in the foreign mission field.

At first the church was indicated merely as the "Church of God," without any definition or separation from the bodies of similar name or designation. In this year of A.D. 1973, such designation is now recognized as "of Abrahamic Faith." This gives separation in this respect, for it now adds to the original name used by the Apostle Paul to those people and fellow workers of his time, a special biblical indication of faith founded in the patriarch Abraham, a special promise to a special people, and later a special body of faith.

This need of a history relative to this body of faith under a designated denominational name was long recognized at various times by those parties and conferences in which it was stated as a desirable endeavor and should be instituted as a policy and work of a General Conference. This desire was crystalized in a motion or resolution put forth in the winter of 1944 by the assembled ministers in their annual winter meeting held in Oregon, Illinois. This resolution to organize such an endeavor was presented in the Conference of the National Bible Institution and General Assembly that met in Oregon, Illinois, in August, 1944.

Excerpts from the General Conference minutes give the presentation of the proposition of the ministers: "Wanted a Church History." "M. W. Lyon mentioned that the Ministerial Association passed a motion introduced by Vivian Kirkpatrick to recommend to the General Conference that it employ a historian to prepare a Church of God history. M. W. Lyon and Sydney Magaw moved that the General Conference take steps in keeping with the recommendation to publish a Church History, and, if necessary, to employ a qualified minister for this work. Arlen Marsh and the Secretary spoke of the importance of such a book, showing need of same as a textbook for Oregon Bible College. G. E. Marsh mentioned that our brethren do not appreciate that Church of God work in America antedates that of some of the larger denominations (the Methodist Church, for instance), even antedating the period of the American Revolution, and, there are people of our Faith abroad." Motion carried. (Restitution Herald, Vol. 33, No. 45, Aug. 15, 1944.)

In the General Conference of the "Church of God of Abrahamic Faith" that convened in Oregon, Illinois, on August 14, 1945, an extensive report was given by the History Committee which is here quoted in its entirety.

"Upon the call of the Chair, the Secretary read the motion passed at last year's General Conference in reference to publishing a history of our church work. G. E. Marsh, as head of the Church History Committee, reported that he and C. E. Randall had accepted the responsibility of preparing this church history. He spoke at some length, explaining the assignment is a stupendous task, that included in the work should be some consideration of the history of doctrine, that consideration of work in foreign countries by organizations similar to our own should be included, that there would be necessitated a large amount of correspondence, and possibly considerable travel. Brother Marsh spoke emphatically of being satisfied only with material that is authentic, planning to present a book eventually that will be absolutely dependable and true in regard to historical data.

"C. E. Randall, co-worker with Brother Marsh on this committee, likewise spoke of the amount of work involved and a necessity of writing with an unbiased mind. Both he and Brother Marsh are gathering material to be of service in the preparation of the history, and Brother Randall pleaded that great care be followed in saving historical data. He mentioned, for instance, how that upon one occasion valuable historical data were sold for ten cents at private auction, invaluable material thus being lost to our General Conference. Like Brother Marsh, Brother Randall also mentioned there

would be considerable expense involved in this work—travel being necessary to Aurora, Illinois, at least, to study Adventist records already assembled.

"Several delegates entered into discussion of the contemplated history. Arlen Marsh commented that this work would be strictly a history of the denomination, not a general church history book. Sister Railsback raised the question of the name of our church body, believing official action should be taken on that matter before publication of the book. The Chair replied that this question should be left until a little later for new business.

"F. E. Siple and A. J. Hoke moved to receive Brother Marsh's report on the Church History Committee and to encourage the Committee to continue its work. The motion carried." (Restitution Herald, Vol. 34, No. 35, Aug. 14, 1945).

Proposed Change in the Constitution and By-laws Church of God General Conference

ARTICLE II

Duties of the Officers

Section 6. The Board of Directors is empowered: (F) To employ a competent Executive (Secretary) *Director* who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned him.

Explanation: The Board of Directors proposes the above constitutional change by deleting the word "Secretary" and adding the word "Director." It is the sentiment of the Board that the word "Secretary" does not properly describe the administrative duties and responsibilities of this office. Many similar organizations are using the name "Executive Director." It is the feeling of the Board of Directors that this title would more clearly designate the duties of this position in the Church of God General Conference.

This proposal will be brought before the delegates for action at the 1973 General Conference Business Session.

Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

Theme: "The Truth Shall Make You Free"

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors on May 3, 1973. The report is presented here so delegates to the 1973 General Conference business session (Aug. 13-18, 1973, Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa) will have opportunity to study it and form opinions and seek suggestions from the church or state conference which they will represent.

This report covers the first eight months of the current fiscal year. The activities which occur between now and General Conference time will be reported orally at Conference. The progress and activities of the several departments are reported herein with some comments and observations of the work as a whole.

The buildings and all physical facilities of the Conference are in excellent condition. Some remodeling was done on the General Conference building: replaced the old stairway, remodeled one office and a storeroom into two offices, added a fireproof vault, and improved the main entrance. An outside basketball-volleyball court was built behind the Men's Residence Hall. The Oregon Bible College Chapel was redecorated and the front paneled since the last conference report.

The General Conference staff members assemble in the College Chapel each Monday at 1:00 p.m. for a joint prayer service. This is a real spiritual uplift to the staff and I am sure a blessing to the Conference work as well.

Much progress has been made in most areas of the Conference work. We feel the Free Literature Campaign has triggered an Outreach that is unequaled in Conference history. The membership of the Church of God General Conference has truly "put their hands to the plow" in this effort. By meeting the financial needs and enlisting in the great task of witnessing for Christ with literature and personal testimony, many are finding Christ and the great plan of salvation.

We are thankful to God and praise his wonderful name for his blessings and guidance in all the activities of the various departments of the General Conference.

Berean Youth Department

Since the annual report of 1972, these important events have made history in the Berean Youth Department. The first was a second successful Senior Berean "inner-city" Caravan. It was held in South Bend with Bro. James Graham, pastor of Hope Chapel Church of God, as sponsor and the Hope Chapel Church as host. Much literature was handed out and many persons were talked to in reference to their believing in and serving God and his Son Jesus. The results of such a campaign are hard to measure, but we know the young people involved were uplifted and stimulated as they took their stand for a testimony of the gospel.

There was a Junior Caravan for the first time in the Berean work. The delegates of the 1970 Youth Conference voted to receive permission from the General Conference Board of Directors to have two caravans. A caravan did not materialize in 1971. The Junior Caravan of 5 members was sponsored by Miss Pat Warner of the Pennellwood Church of God. This Caravan's destination was the Louisiana Berean Youth Camp. In this camp, the Caravan members helped with supervising recreation, acting as junior counselors, helping with the services, and gen-

erally doing whatever they were asked to do. En route, they visited with several Churches of God and had fellowship with the Bereans in each.

The major event of the Berean Youth Fellowship is the Youth Conference. It was held at Camp Mack, Milford, Indiana, July 23-29, 1972. There were 275 enrolled and a staff of 43. It is hard to describe in a few lines the enrichment and good that are received from Berean Youth Conference. All one needs to do is to discuss it with a person who attended. Great rejoicing was forthcoming when 17 young people did confess Jesus as their personal Savior. Some of these were baptized at the camp, while others returned home and were baptized.

Youth Week was the third week in September and, from all reports, was very successful. The purpose of that week is mainly to let the youth receive training in the work of the church. The Bereans of Garden Park Church of God received first place and the "traveling plaque" which is given.

The delegates voted during the 1972 Youth Conference to have an International Berean Communion Sunday and to try to get the youth of our churches in the foreign lands to have a part. Letters were written to the pastors and workers in the foreign lands about this special day and also to explain the Diamond Jubilee (75th) year and the meaning of Berean to them. Their response was "warming" to the heart and they were very happy to be a part with all of us. As a result, the youth of the Philippines organized into two groups and will have an annual conference on the last Sunday of November each year.

The fourth annual Midwinter Retreat was held at Camp Mack during the Christmas-New Year holidays. There were 34 campers and 3 adult counselors and teachers. It is a very special time of Christian fellowship for all able to attend.

The second International Prayer Day was held on March 25 throughout the world. Indications from letters received from the foreign pastors and youth leaders are that it was observed by all of them. Many of the Bereans in North America had special services.

The Senior Berean Lesson manual is not being printed until further notice. It was felt that the new Berean Scripture Studies book with 52 lessons was worthy of their study. *Challenge* continues to be a very popular magazine among our young people. Bro. Kent Ross is editor. The Junior Berean Lesson Manual, with Bro. Edward Bender as editor, will continue to be printed.

Bro. Francis Burnett is the present Youth Director. We thank our God that the Berean work continues to grow. Encourage your young people to serve God.

Oregon Bible College

Oregon Bible College is completing its thirty-fourth year as the institution of higher education for the Church of God General Conference. It is dedicated to the task of preparing men and women to present the gospel message to the whole world. A primary objective of the College is the preparation of persons for the ministry in the Church of God. Accordingly, the vast majority of graduates have become licensed ministers. Another important objective of the College, however, is the providing of Christian educational background for men and women who plan to enter other professions.

The College is not a liberal arts college nor will it become one. Oregon Bible College is the College of the Bible. It has the Bible in the middle of its name, at the heart of its curriculum, and in its center of emphasis. The College is able to accomplish its purpose and to experience continued growth through the faithful and prayerful support of its many friends.

We have had another wonderful year at the College. We have had an excellent student body, characterized by an atmosphere of dedication to the Scriptures and spiritual ideals. Forty-one students were enrolled for the fall semester and forty-four students were enrolled for the winter semester.

College Commencement was held May 25, 1973, with James Mattison as special speaker. Six seniors were graduated: Dale Harshman, Robert Jones, Daniel Landry, Joseph Myers, Timothy New, and Mark Ryan. Upon recommendation of the faculty, Robert Jones was presented the Silver Disc Award. He had received a straight A in all courses at the College. Paul Moore completed the Graduate Internship Program of OBC in Arizona. Total number of OBC graduates is now 130: 114 men and 16 women.

Administration and faculty during the year included: Alva G. Huffer, president; John R. Lewis, administrative vice president and registrar; Stanley O. Ross, director of business affairs; Eugene E. Stilson, Francis E. Burnett, Dale F. Ramsey, and Dallas R. Demmitt. Mary Krogh was director of the women's dorm; Dale F. Ramsey was director of the men's dorm. Vernis D. Wolfe presented a seminar on Celebrating God's Presence during the first week of spring session. Dallas Demmitt was guest speaker for Christian Emphasis Week, September 25-29, taught a seminar on the Christian Family, and a counseling seminar for the freshmen, and had individual sessions with students at various times of the year. Hollis Partlowe and Warren Sorenson were special instructors in our Graduate Internship Program.

As campus administrator, John Lewis is in complete charge of the campus when the president is not in Oregon. Faculty, dorm directors, and staff members are directly responsible to him. He oversees the general counseling of students. Joseph Myers was president of the Student Council. Michael Brown was president of the Mission Fellowship Activity.

Development of our Music Department, under direction of Dale Ramsey, has been an important area of growth for the College. With a Bachelor of Science degree in music from Elizabethtown College in Pennsylvania, he is now making excellent progress toward his Master of Arts degree in music at Northern Illinois University. At OBC, Brother Ramsey teaches Introduction to Music, Church Music, Music Fundamentals, Choir, OBC

Chorale, Brass Ensemble, as well as individual instruction in piano, organ, and voice. An attractive, carpeted new music room has been built in the lower level of the men's dorm and a new grand piano has been purchased for the chapel. Brother Ramsey was also in charge of gospel teams and other special studenservice groups.

The OBC Chorale has done much to promote the College through its sacred concerts during the year in local churches, before high school and college assemblies, and in churches in various parts of the United States and Canada.

Eugene Stilson, full-time OBC faculty member and library director, is making excellent progress toward another graduate degree. In 1971, he completed a Master of Science in Education degree at Northern Illinois University. He has also done graduate work at the same institution in the area of ancient history. Last September, Bro. Stilson began a program of studies at Wheaton College which will lead to the Master of Arts in Bible and Theology. This will assist the College in meeting its need for having at least two instructors with Master Degrees in Biblical Studies.

Plans for the College also include the development of our Department of Christian Education and Evangelism. With a specialist in charge of this department, the College could continue to enrich its curriculum in this area as it prepares Sunday school teachers and administrators. The College plans to offer college level workshops in Sunday school work for part-time students as well as promote research in Christian education.

The College wishes to thank its many friends who are responding in its campaign for special contributions to purchase additional books for the OBC Library. The Library needs basic reference works, up-to-date current books relating to courses being taught, as well as visual education materials. Every course in the College curriculum must be reinforced with adequate books concerning that subject in the library. According to the General Conference "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five Program," adopted by Conference delegates, the goal for the number of volumes in the library by September, 1975, is 10,000 books. Special contributions enable the College to purchase precise books needed directly from publishers usually at discount prices.

Details concerning admission procedures and programs of studies offered by the College are presented in the new edition of the College catalog for the academic year 1973-1974. A copy of the new catalog may be acquired by writing to Registrar John R. Lewis.

The Board of Education consists of the president of the College, Alva G. Huffer, as Chairman, and four other members appointed, each for a term of two years, by the Board of Directors. Current appointed members are: Joseph A. Fletcher, Robert D. Johnson, William D. Lawrence, and Vernis D. Wolfe. John R. Lewis, Administrative Vice President, also attends meetings. This Board acts in an advisory and promotional capacity and makes recommendations regarding the College to the Board of Directors, the governing board of the College. The Board of Education meets several times during the year.

The Church of God General Conference, by maintaining and promoting Oregon Bible College, enables many persons to gain an increased knowledge of God's Word, to experience spiritual development, and to prepare for Christian service.

Sunday School Department

The Sunday School Department is under the direction of the Sunday School Board, consisting of Scott Ross, Joyce Knapp, Robert Petry, and George Scott. On October 1, 1972, Bro.

Scott Ross assumed the part-time position of Sunday School Director. Bro. E. Milon Hall had faithfully served in this position for several years. The Sunday School Department is responsible for the "Sunday School News" column in *Progress Journal* and for the monthly "Sunday School Bulletin" that is sent to all pastors and Sunday school superintendents.

After carefully studying the surveys sent to our Sunday schools last year, the Sunday School Department began several new programs this past year. One program is the Sunday school tape ministry. It was felt there would be value in sharing some of the excellent talks made by various Church of God people by taping these and making them available to all of our churches. Thus far six presentations have been recorded. The response from our churches in ordering these tapes has been tremendous.

A second program the department has developed this past year is the monthly Continual Teacher-Training Guide Sheets. This program is designed to provide material for our Sunday schools to use for teacher training.

A third area is the gathering and cataloging of the present collection of teacher training materials owned by the General Conference. This catalog was sent out in the April "Sunday School Bulletin." Most of these materials will be loaned free to any Sunday school requesting them.

A fourth program is the development of a Sunday School Manual. This manual is to be a collection of papers presented by various Church of God people at various functions that relate to Sunday school work. These are to gathered, grouped according to topic, and then sent to each of our Sunday schools. At the present time the department is in process of gathering these papers.

A fifth program is the development of our own teacher-training slide-sound sets. Two sets are now in process of being produced. One will deal with the teacher's responsibility and the other with teaching methods.

A sixth program that this department is working on is the production of a teacher's manual to accompany our quarterlies. This teacher's manual would include suggested teaching methods, visual aids, object lessons, and illustrations.

Other areas in which the board has worked has been in the development of a job description for the position of Sunday School Director, the discussion of how to best train lay workers in our Sunday schools, and the present and the future structure of our quarterlies and curriculum.

Beginning in September of this year, Bro. Francis Burnett will become the director of this department on a half-time basis. In September of 1974, a full-time Sunday School Director will be hired. Your Sunday School Board is encouraged by the work and the faithfulness of our Church of God Sunday schools and excited by the great potential that points toward even greater things to come.

Publishing Department

The Church of God General Conference Literature Crusade has been promoted through the Publishing Department. The response to this effort by the pastors and churches has been most heartening, and yet the potential in literature distribution has hardly been tapped. There has been an increasing tempo of interest in literature outreach. The churches which have organized for this campaign have discovered much latent talent and a ready willingness to share in the ministry of the Word by handing out and distributing the printed page.

So far this year, 138,000 tracts have been printed. Most of these have been reprints, but several new tracts have been added to our ever-growing list.

Perhaps, the most significant result of the Literature Crusade has been the awakened interest among the members of the church everywhere. A new zeal has taken hold of our people. A new awareness of the importance of our message has developed into an aroused consciousness of the responsibility to share this good news with those who know it not. For this exciting and challenging new day that has dawned upon us, we are indeed most thankful and grateful to our blessed Lord.

The regular publications which go forth under the sponsorship of the Publishing Department are *The Restitution Herald* (which in April had a 750 percent increase in circulation over the same month a year ago), *Progress Journal, Challenge, Truth Seeker's Quarterlies*, and *Vacation Bible School* lessons. To prepare copy, proofread, get it ready for the printers, and mail out requires quite a good sized family of employees and volunteer workers. The motivating spirit behind all these labors can be summed up in one phrase—love of the truth. This love embraces love for God, love for the Lord Jesus, love of the church, and love for mankind.

The past year has been a very fruitful one for all the Publishing Department. This has been made possible because of the members throughout the reaches of our work. Thank you, one and all!

Missions Department

Your Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference is made up of the following members: Mardy Lawrence, Secretary, M. A. Patrick, Lee McQuinn, Robert Hall, and S. O. Ross, Superintendent of Missions. They have held several meetings during the year and give much study to the mission of the Church of God General Conference.

In the past year several churches and state conferences have held missionary conferences. We encourage this among our membership. Your mission board is ready to assist in the planning and presentation of these conferences at your request. Often the Mission Board will attend a conference such as this and conduct a mission board meeting at the same time.

The work in and near Bangalore, India, continues to progress, with six churches having preaching services and nine Sunday schools being conducted each week. The Church-Medical facility is under construction.

Bro. S. S. Manoah in Bangalore, India, continues to work closely with Pastor P. M. Paulson near Hyderabad. Pastor Paulson is conducting services at five churches in that area.

Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero and his workers in the Philippine Islands continue to carry on a progressive ministry in many

areas of northern Luzon. Especially the radio work has been most exciting. Churches have been started in the villages of Liwan and Lupao, both as a direct result from the radio ministry.

In Mexico Bro. Francisco Martinez was pastoring at the Labor Vieja Church. Due to illness of Sr. Martinez it seemed desirable for Bro. and Sr. Martinez and their family to move to the village of El Potosi. Bro. Martinez is conducting services in that village and the response has been very good. The Labor Vieja work continues under the lay leadership of Bro. Roberto Badillo.

The mission work in Nigeria is progressing and growing. A new group at Asarama has about 250 members. Bro. Ephriam Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John Obot continue to give good leadership to the work in Nigeria.

The Lighthouse Mission Church at Digby, Nova Scotia, continues to reach many in the community with the gospel message. Another maritime conference and Bible school is being planned for the summer of 1973. Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown and their family and Sr. Eunice Pearson continue to give good leadership to the work in and around Digby, Nova Scotia.

Literature continues to be the main source of outreach in the Middle East. The Systematic Bible Study Course lessons in Arabic are going into fourteen Middle East Countries and many are accepting Christ because of the study of these lessons.

Bro. Oliver Amani continues to give good leadership to the work in Ghana. Services are being held in three villages: Jasikan, Wora Wora, and Nkwanta. A meeting room has been provided rent free by a lady in Wora Wora.

The free literature distribution campaign of the present church year has been a great help in taking the gospel message into all the world. This program has had a tremendous effect on the home mission area. The membership of the Church of God has really become involved.

Five churches are receiving pastoral aid this year. It appears that at least seven churches will be on the program in the next church year. The membership of the Mission Builders League continues to grow. The Blessed Hope Church of God at Rockford, Illinois, and the Pleasant Hill Church of God at Pleasant Hill, Ohio, have received the two mission builders appeals for this current church year. Lafayette, Indiana, will receive the November, 1973, appeal.

Five churches have been started and organized since the last annual report and are carrying on a regular schedule of services. They are located at North Hills near Springfield, Ohio; Pleasant Hill, Ohio; Freeport, Ill.; Gastonia, N. C.; and Arlington, Texas. We are thankful for these congregations and for the members who have given the leadership to get them started.

The Home Bible Study program is still being widely used

among many of our church members. Many people are coming to know of the gospel message and the doctrines of the Scripture as taught by the Church of God through these various Home Bible Study Classes.

Many inquiries continue to come to our General Conference. headquarters as a result of literature. Inquiries come from many places in the United States and Canada, as well as from foreign countries, wanting to know more about the Church of God and its teachings. Our prayer is that the Lord may continue to bless the efforts of missions and evangelism through the Church of God General Conference.

General Services

The Church of God General Conference staff members perform many services in addition to the departmental activities covered in the preceding reports. Staff members often fill pulpits when local pastors are on vacation or are ill. They are also available for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, and other activities.

Your Executive Secretary endeavors to give assistance in finding replacements for vacant pulpits. Churches seeking pastors are encouraged to contact the Executive Secretary for assistance in this area. He is also responsible for the administration of the Ministers Insurance program and the Ministers Retirement Fund program. He is required to complete many forms and questionnaires for information from various governmental, civic, and religious agencies. He is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of all properties, for the management of the day-to-day business, and generally supervises all the work of the Church of God General Conference.

The department heads and staff workers of the Church of God General Conference covet your prayers, encouragement criticism, and concern as they endeavor to carry out the policies and programs that the delegates set up for them to accomplish.

General Conference Finances

We are pleased that the Goals for Giving have been met for the first half of the fiscal year. Due to the expanded literature program and increased costs in operational expenses, there has been a need beyond the goals that were set. We praise God and thank the membership of the Church of God General Conference for meeting all of these needs through the first half of this church year.

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the sacrificial giving of many. We express our thanks and appreciation to each one who has helped to meet these needs and who is concerned about the Conference

work. We encourage everyone to have a part in this great ministry of preaching the Word of God to the people of the world. May he continue to bless all the work of the Church of God General Conference that it may continue to bear fruit for the Waster. We know Jesus is coming soon to set up his kingdom here upon this earth. We pray that that day might be soon. May we all be found busy in the vineyard and occupying acceptably until he comes.

Recommendations for 1973-1974

1) We recommend that the Free Literature Campaign of this current year be continued indefinitely, using the present free tracts and additional tract material that may be written for this purpose.

Explanation: Many fine results are already in evidence. Many churches are just beginning to get really moving with this campaign. Individual members are being challenged to evangelism as never before

2) We recommend that *The Restitution Herald* be sent subscription free for one year to all Church of God General Conference membership and to any others who are now receiving it or who request it.

Explanation: The subscription list of The Restitution Herald over the years has been about 2300 copies per month. Under the free program of the current year as many as 16,000 copies have been distributed in one month. The message is going out under this program. We feel that it should be continued to assist in this great effort of spreading God's message of salvation through the written Word.

3) We recommend that the "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Eight" (Phil. 3:13, 14) program be adopted and promoted among the churches. (See Page 9)

Explanation: This is an updating of the former "Reaching Forth to Seventy-Five" goals. We need to continue to reach toward new heights of progress.

4) We recommend that special assistance be given to churches which have a part-time ministry; that assistance be given up to half the salary cost of a full-time pastor; that this assistance be limited to not more than three churches at one time and that such assistance continue for three years; that this program be administered through the Home Mission Department in accordance with quidelines established by the Board of Directors.

Explanation: We have many small churches which have struggled for years with part-time leadership. This program would give them an opportunity to endeavor to grow and develop into a full-time work with a full-time pastor leading them. If approved, this recommendation will become effective September 1, 1974. The above-mentioned guidelines will be available at General Conference.

5) We recommend an addition to Section 4 of the "Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance." Said Section 4 now reads, "The congregation should have the approval of the State Conference with which it is associated. It is recommended that the congregation hold a joint-deed with the State Conference and (or) the General Conference." We recommend that a subdivision be added, as follows: a) That the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference will temporarily deed the property back to the local congregation by a Quit Claim Deed when it seems advisable for purposes of borrowing money.

Explanation: If a local congregation needs to borrow funds, there is great difficulty involved when the property is held in joint-ownership. Loans in such cases must be secured jointly by all owners. The Quit Claim Deed will clear the matter for the local congregation to proceed with such financing.

6) We recommend a Constitutional revision which would change the title of the "Executive Secretary" to "Executive Director."

Explanation: See "Notice" of Constitutional Change on page 15 in this issue for explanation.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Ministers Fund

The Ministers Fund of the Church of God General Conference is used for loans or gifts to ministers or their families in times of emergency. The fund is supported entirely by special contributions.

The Ministers Fund is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon churches, the dean of students of Oregon Bible College, and the executive secretary of the Church of God General Conference. Presently two are receiving monthly assistance from the fund and two ministers have outstanding loans.

At the last annual report, the total assets in the fund were \$607.26. The present balance, including the unpaid balance of the two loans, is \$511.31. This fund has been most helpful on many occasions. Your continued concern for this need is encouraged.

License and Ordination Committee Report

The names of one hundred fifteen licensed ministers of the Church of God General Conference were published in the November, 1972, issue of *Progress Journal*. This list did not include the names of four ministers who failed to get their applications

for renewal of their license in on time, and three who did not submit such an application.

Since that time, the following have received licenses as ministers: Ronald Macy, Robert Schrienk, Waldon Winner, Paul Moore, Dale Ramsey, Robert Jones, Dale Harshman, Timothy New, Daniel Landry, and Oliver K. Amani. Leonard Brown's license was renewed after a lapse of several years.

The members of this committee drew up a list of proposed revisions, eliminations, and additions to existing guidelines for the licensing and ordaining of ministers. This list was submitted to the ministers gathered at the Ministers' Conference, which was held at Oregon, Ill., April 30-May 4, 1973. After being examined and amended by the ministers, the suggestions were then passed on to the Board of Directors for their consideration and possible further action.

We should like to again remind all ministers that their licenses must be renewed annually. Application blanks for this purpose will be mailed to you from headquarters, about July 1. If you do not receive your application blank, write to headquarters and request one. Only the names of those from whom such applications have been received will be issued new recognition cards and have their names included in the list of recognized ministers to be published in the November issue of *Progress Journal*.

If you have submitted an application for renewal, ask for your new recognition card at General Conference. If you do not attend the Conference, your card will be mailed to you.

This committee serves pastors and churches in meeting and adjudicating problems which arise when called upon by either the pastor or church. The committee does not intervene in local matters except when called upon by one or both parties involved.

Ministers Retirement Association

The Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association continues to grow, and its financial stability increases each year. At the present time there are three ministers receiving retirement payments.

At the last biennial conference, the delegates voted to increase the pensions to widows of ministers to twenty-five dollars per month. Retirement pay to ministers and widows of ministers can and will be increased as reserve funds are built up to such an amount as will warrant increases.

Special contributions, bequests, and wills will hasten the day when such increases can be made. This work deserves hearty financial responses from the membership.

Additional Conference Information

SITE: The 1973 Church of God General Conference will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 13-18. This camp is owned by the United Methodist Church and is located on the west edge of Cedar Falls, just a block off of U.S. Highway 20. Watch for the camp sign a few blocks west of the junction of highway 218. Waterloo, a sister city of Cedar Falls, has an airport where some jet airline service is available.

CAMP COSTS: The costs at Riverview Park in 1973 will be \$4.50 per person per day (\$21.50 for the Conference). The daily costs are: breakfast \$.75, lunch \$1.00, supper \$1.25, lodging \$1.25, insurance and miscellaneous \$.25. (Meals are one half price for children under age eight.) In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are many other costs for promotion, travel, and supplies.

Your General Conference Board of Directors is asking that camp costs be paid at the desk upon registration or during the Conference. The evening offerings taken during the Conference will go to some special Conference project designated by the Board.

LODGING: Lodging is provided in cabins and two dormitories. Cabins will house three to fourteen people each, and families are urged to stay together. Two or more families will need to share the larger units. Reservations should be made ahead of time, if possible.

Riverview Park can accommodate some camping trailers, and water and electrical hookups are available, but no sewer. Two public camping facilities are located in the area. Tents will not be allowed on the grounds.

NOTE TO TEACHERS AND LEADERS: Teachers of General Conference adult and youth classes, and leaders of Christian Sharing Sessions, are reminded to prepare mimeograph copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared so those not able to attend a particular session will be able to secure copies.

ELECTIONS DURING GENERAL CONFERENCE: Board of Directors: Three members will be elected to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors. The terms of

Charles Knapp, Joe James, and Robert Smith will expire at General Conference. (These cannot be reelected.)

Sunday School Board: Two members to be elected. The terms of Joyce Knapp and George Scott will expire this year. (These may be reelected.)

Mission Board: One member to be elected. The term of Merle A. Patrick expires. (May be reelected.)

This information is given so that churches or state conferences can instruct their delegates to make particular nominations. Proposed nominees should be contacted beforehand to be sure they will serve if elected and to be sure that they are free and able to attend the meetings of the particular board they are to be elected to.

YOUNG PEOPLE: The youth are urged to stay with their families in cabins and thus be under direct supervision of their parents. For those who may be there without their parents, there is one dormitory for male and one for female. Any youth who stay in these dormitories will be under the direct supervision of a youth counselor and will be expected to abide by the general rules for all campers. There will be a youth director in charge of the youth activities.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES: Lois Pryor will be in charge of the classes for children of all ages, Tuesday through Friday of General Conference. The class schedule will be 9:00 to 11:15 a.m., and 1:25 to 3:00 p.m. Parents of children in these classes are requested to come to the classroom and call for their children at the time of dismissal both morning and afternoon.

There will be a refreshment break during the class periods and those who wish to help are requested to please bring cookies

DELEGATE EXPENSE POOL: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel for those from faraway and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

Conference Issue

We encourage everyone to read these reports very thoroughly. The theme of this fifty-third Annual General Conference is: "The Truth Shall Make You Free."

Delegate forms, statistical forms, and pool expense forms have been mailed to all church and conference secretaries. Secretaries are urged to complete these forms promptly and return them in the envelope that was enclosed. Churches and conferences are urged to select their delegates soon and instruct them on how to vote on recommendations and Conference business. Consideration should also be given to selecting nominees for the positions to be filled by election as listed in this issue.

Board of Directors Meets

The Board of Directors of the General Conference met in Oregon, Ill., on May 3 and 4, 1973. The General Conference program was finalized and the Reports and Recommendations approved. A detailed report on the progress of the Literature Program was reviewed.

It was agreed that the used Elliott addressing machine that was recently replaced in the mailing room be offered for sale. Firm sealed bids on the machine will be received until July 1, 1973, when the machine will be sold to the highest bidder.

Bro. C. E. Randall was reappointed to a four-year term as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association. Other members of the Board of Trustees are Willard Naylor (elected by the retirement membership), Vice Chairman, and S. O. Ross, Executive Secretary, who is automatically Secretary-Treasurer of the Association.

Arrangements were approved to provide additional housing in a rented facility for female students of Oregon Bible College should the enrollment exceed the number that can be housed in the present Women's Dormitory. A Tentative Proposed Budget was approved. The Executive Secretary was authorized to seek additional information on possible sites for the Annual General Conference in future years.

We commend members of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference for their dedicated service which is so graciously given without remuneration.



Missions News

Sr. Alice Aldrich is making plans to spend some time in Mexico this summer to conduct vacation Bible schools in both villages and to supervise the mission work there.

Nova Scotia

The work continues to progress, with attendance on the increase the past few months. The outside of the building needs to be redone, since the finish siding was never applied. Plans are in the making to complete the project this summer, using a prefinished product that will never need paint. Members of the church hope to perform the labor, but some work at jobs that keep them from helping and others are not physically able to assist. The Digby Church requests that if there should be one or more who would like to volunteer to come to Nova Scotia to help in this project they would be welcome.

Nigeria

Attendance at the Ediene No. 1 Church, Ephriam Udo, pastor, averages well over one hundred on Sunday morning, with about eighty at midweek services. The church at Abak Urban with John J. Obot, pastor,

has an average attendance of ninety-nine, with over eighty at midweek services.

The new work at Asarama continues to grow. Thirty-four new converts were immersed in the waters of baptism recently. There is not a regular pastor for this new group, but Bros. John Obot, Ephriam Udo, and Solomon Idiong go there quite regularly for services. Bro. Idiong is the youth leader of the Nigerian mission field and it is his intent to visit Asarama quite frequently.

Lawrence Mission Trip

Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence spent about two weeks in April visiting our mission fields in Lebanon and India. The construction of the building in Lalgi Nagar has been delayed due to some needed changes in the plans. This building is the Church-Medical facility assisted by Mission Builders and will be a real blessing to the members in this area.

A full written report of the trip is being prepared by Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence and further details will be given later. We express our sincere thanks and appreciation to them for their dedicated concern for the mission work of the Church of God General Conference.

Philippine Islands

The radio ministry is becoming more difficult in the Philippine Islands. All scripts for a radio broadcast, accompanied by a certification that there is nothing subversive in the broadcast, must be presented to the Provincial Command for approval. Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero says, "In spite of these requirements, we are still happy to continue the radio work, because more and more people are hearing our radio preaching."

Several months ago, due to trouble from the Huks, the Villaros Church moved its services to the village of Roxas. On the order of the government these folks are asked to return to their former homes in Villaros so the services will soon be resumed there.

Literature Campaign

The Literature Distribution Campaign continues to progress. Many churches are having organized distribution programs. The churches in the foreign mission fields are picking up the tempo and are making special efforts to spread the written Word. May God continue to bless these efforts.

Spring Session



Proposed Change in the Constitution and By-laws Church of God General Conference

ARTICLE II

Duties of the Officers

Section 6. The Board of Directors is empowered: (F) To employ a competent Executive (Secretary) *Director* who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned him.

Explanation: The Board of Directors proposes the above constitutional change by deleting the word "Secretary" and adding the word "Director." It is the sentiment of the Board that the word "Secretary" does not properly describe the administrative duties and responsibilities of this office. Many similar organizations are using the name "Executive Director." It is the feeling of the Board of Directors that this title would more clearly designate the duties of this position in the Church of God General Conference.

This proposal will be brought before the delegates for action at the 1973 General Conference Business Session.

THE CHURCH AND ITS MESSAGE

The Church of God is founded on Peter's confession, "the Christ, the Son of the living God." This insures a solid foundation. Paul tells us that "other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ." Not only is Jesus the foundation of the Church of God, he is the "head over all things to the church, which is his body" (Eph. 1:22, 23). Being the Head of the church, he directs it and has given instruction as to how the work of the church should be carried on and what its message should be.

Church to Succeed

The Church of God was planned by its Head and its work designed and purpose set forth. Against this church the worst of all enemies, death, would not prevail. It is not presuming on the intended purpose and work of the church to say that the Head planned that the church would triumph over all its enemies. During the nearly two thousand years since its beginning, the church has been victorious. It has overcome all opposition and survived the greatest and worst persecution. We can look upon the church as being a victorious and triumphant body. We need to realize as never before what Elisha prayed for his servant when he said: "Open his eves that he may see." What did Elisha want the man to see? That "they that be with us are more than they that be with them" (2 Kings 6:15-17). We are not on a losing side when we are in partnership with the Lord. May we always be mindful of the fact that "we are labourers together with God." The Church of God should never think in terms of defeat, but with confidence and full assurance say, act, and live, knowing that we can "do all

things through Christ which strengtheneth [us]."

A Vision of Success

We must be aware of the apostasy that will be rampant in the last days. We can be so overwhelmed with a vision of apostasy and the fact that "evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived" that a vision of the whitened fields, the opportunities afforded, and the responsibilities which open doors lay upon us will be so blurred, that we will stand idly by, not realizing if we hold our peace, others will be called to garner in the ripened harvest.

The whitened fields are people needing the gospel message. People are opportunities. It was people which Jesus saw when approaching Jerusalem, who had bartered away the "day of visitation," and which moved him to weep (Luke 19:41, 42). The church needs a deep compassion for the unsaved that will move them to action.

The Message

The message which Jesus as Head of the church has commissioned the members to give to the world can be summed up in three words: "Preach the Word." This Word is powerful. It is life, spirit, and truth. The gospel of the kingdom which Jesus sent the twelve forth to preach was the "Kingdom of God." Likewise, the

seventy, when they were sent forth, were charged to proclaim that the "kingdom of heaven is at hand."

The Word of God is the tool which the Christian is charged to use in his witnessing. God has promised that his Word will not return unto him void, but will accomplish that which he pleases (Isa. 55:10, 11).

Lack of success or growth within the church cannot be blamed on the Head or the Word. We, the members, must assume full responsibility for the condition of our churches. The early church prospered and grew in numbers because the members went everywhere preaching the Word (Acts 8:4). Two accusations were leveled against them: 1) They had filled Jerusalem with their doctrine (Acts 5:28); 2) they had turned the world upside down (Acts 17:6). They accomplished this success through partnership with Jesus and the teaching and preaching of the Word. Thus, "the word of God grew and multiplied." It wasn't all easy, for they hazarded their lives in this ministry of the Word. The thing we need to note is that success and growth followed their efforts. With Jesus as Head, the Word as our message, and people our opportunities, success will come to our labors too. "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Gal. 6:7).

The message of the gospel of the kingdom is a well-balanced spiritual diet which contributes to both healthy spiritual life and physical well-being. The gospel of the kingdom is adaptable to all life situations. During the ministry of John the Baptist, three classes of people asked him, "What shall we do?" As today, the Word met their need (Luke 3:10-14). *

Missions News

The picture shows the congregation and meeting place at Asarama, Nigeria. This is the new group that already has over two hundred fifty baptized members. Bros. Ephriam Udo, John Obot, and Solomon Idiong are going here alternately for services until more permanent arrangements can be worked out. These people are hungry for the gospel message.

Bro. Udo reports that they have received the one hundred copies of the Songs of Truth Hymnals and the Bibles in the Efik dialect. These have been provided by special contributions from churches and individuals. Bro. Udo writes, "We pray the Lord continues to be with you all and bless you in your efforts to help us spread the gospel. To conclude, I use this chance to thank the Church of God General Conference, the Mission Board members, the Board of Directors, and all the individuals who contribute to make the spreading of the gospel in Nigeria a success."

Middle East

We regret to announce that support to the Middle East Mission field was terminated in May. Through tracts and other literature of another denomination we learned that Pastor Jamal Sunna'a was not being honest with us. Upon further investigation, and finally a visit to Lebanon by Bro. and Sr. William Lawrence, our concerns were verified.

We find that the many Bible study lessons in Arabic being used by Pastor Sunna'a were not in the Church of God General Conference Systematic Bible Study Course lessons, but were other lessons which teach scriptural error. We find many instances of deceit and untruth in our dealings with him over the years. We

also find that he has been receiving some support from another denomination for several years.

In view of all of this, action was taken at a telephone Mission Board meeting on May 22, 1973, to terminate our support to Pastor Sunna'a in Lebanon and Pastor Iskander in Egypt, effective immediately. More detailed information and further discussion of this matter will be presented at the annual General Conference in August.

Philippine Islands

In a recent letter from Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero we learn that the libel suit against him for the trouble at the radio station many months ago has finally been dismissed. The case was set and reset many times. Only two witnesses appeared and both were proven in cross-examination to be confused and untruthful.

Bro. Ortiguero says, "The complainant, realizing his defeat in court and fearing a counter-charge if defeated, offered to settle the case amicably. The complainant and I agreed to ask the court for dismissal. The court, upon the request, ordered the libel case dismissed. Many thanks to God and to all the brethren who have helped me much with their prayers and money for the attorney fees."

Over two hundred people attended the twelfth annual Philippine Conference. Classes were held for four age groups, business meetings were conducted, and evangelistic services held in the evenings. One evening session was an open forum held at the Quezon Municipal Auditorium when many people of other faiths came to study and ask questions. The Lord's Supper was observed on the final evening of the Conference.

Several contests were held during the Conference. The Bible Quizzing was won by the Uddiawan Church, Hymn Singing by the Lupao Church, Best Solo by a delegate from the Liwan Church, Bible Preaching by the Uddiawan Church, and a ball game by the Quezon Church. Prizes were given to the winners.

Fourteen persons, ranging in ages from eleven to sixty-three, accepted Christ and were immersed in the waters of baptism, the youngest being Eleodoro Ortiguero, Jr., son of the leader of the Philippine mission work.

India

Three men and seven women were baptized into Christ by Bro. S. S. Manoah at a recent service. The Thomas Town youth presented a concert about Jonah, and the schoolchildren acted out a scene about the healing of the lame man (Acts 3).

Sr. Manoah had minor surgery but is progressing well. Bro. Manoah says, "Please remember to pray for her, and also for the new ones who have decided to walk in his ways. We have to work hard and toil well to bring many souls to our truth and faith and to his fold because his coming is very, very near. Closing with our united Christian love, good wishes, and regards. Please remember me in your prayers."

Mexico

Bro. Francisco Martinez went to Labor Vieja for services over the Easter weekend. He planned to begin regular services at El Potosi in May. Sr. Martinez, who had been quite ill, is now much better.

Nova Scotia

Sr. Eunice Pearson, lay worker in Nova Scotia, is spending several weeks in the states on vacation. She is a fine help to Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown and the mission work in Nova Scotia.

You as God's Man

"Holiness and total commitment," are required of dedicated men of God in today's world. James Mattison, speaking May 25, urged these high ideals upon the 1973 graduating class of Oregon Bible College. He further stated that there must be a willing mind and a desire to teach God's Word to men. Every young person entering full-time Christian service must examine his motives for wanting to serve God. NOTICE OF Proposed Change in the Constitution and By-laws Church of God General Conference

ARTICLE II

Duties of the Officers

Section 6. The Board of Directors is empowered: (F) To employ a competent Executive (Secretary) *Director* who shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the business of General Conference, for personnel, for planning, for production, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned him.

Explanation: The Board of Directors proposes the above constitutional change by deleting the word "Secretary" and adding the word "Director." It is the sentiment of the

Board that the word "Secretary" does not properly describe the administrative duties and responsibilities of this office. Many similar organizations are using the name "Executive Director." It is the feeling of the Board of Directors that this title would more clearly designate the duties of this position in the Church of God General Conference.

This proposal will be brought before the delegates for action at the 1973 General Conference Business Session.

STRIKE-While the iron is hot!

E STAND on the brink of the greatest spiritual awakening in the world since the Day of Pentecost. The opportunity for preaching the gospel in this country and around the world is greater today than ever before in history.

Many groups, recognizing the opportunities, are undertaking massive evangelistic efforts to reach people with the gospel. Campus Crusade for Christ is mobilizing 100,000 men and women who plan to share the message of salvation with every person in every metropolitan area, university center, and village of the world by 1980.

Key 73 is an evangelistic movement uniting 150 denominations in our country, with the goal of spreading the good tidings of great joy to every person in the United States.

Because of our historical stand for the truth, we of the Bible Church of God cannot and we will not cooperate with the great evangelistic movements of our day, however, it will be an ungodly abomination if we choose to sit on the sidelines while this evangelistic furor sweeps the world.

Now is the time for action. I am convinced that if we tarry now, not only will we forfeit the opportunity to reach this generation for Christ, but I believe God will judge us severely on the day of Judgment. Luke 12:48 says, "Unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required." God has blessed us in a great way spiritually and materially and he is expecting much from us.

We of the Church of God can stand in the forefront of the evangelistic effort of our day, if we will do four things: 1. Be Doers of the Word

James 1:22-25 emphasizes the importance of not only hearing the Word, but doing something about what we hear. There is little point in going to a doctor unless we are prepared to do the things he says to us. Knowledge must become action; theory must become practice. And yet there are thousands of people who go to church every Sunday and who have heard many sermons on the Great Commission, and yet make little or no deliberate attempt to put this knowledge into practice in sharing their faith with other people.

Neither the world nor our next door neighbor will be saved if we fail to be doers of the Word.

2. Seek First the Kingdom of God

In applying Matthew 6:33, I think every Christian should analyze everything he does to see how this relates to the work of the Lord. Each Christian, regardless of occupation, should view his work as a work for the Lord. Every opportunity should be seized to stand up for truth and righteousness. Every opportunity should be exploited for witnessing of Jesus Christ.

The money earned on a job should be considered as a trust from God. Truly dedicated Christians will never stop with the tithe when the offering plate is passed. Dedicated Christians will make money for God and they will only deduct what they need for living expenses and give the rest to the work of promoting the gospel.

If we expect the rest of the world to hear the message of salvation, this mes-

sage is going to have to be our first priority.

3. Get Everyone Involved in the Work of the Ministry

In Ephesians 4:11-13 there are two things that need to be clarified. The word "saint" is a synonym for Christian—anyone who has accepted Christ and been baptized is a saint.

The comma after the word "saint" in our KJV does not belong there.

When we understand these two things, we come to realize that every Christian is to do the work of the ministry, i.e., meet the needs of people. And the greatest need of the people of the world today is to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ.

4. Use the Process of Multiplication

In 2 Timothy 2:2 we find Paul explaining to Timothy the process of multiplication in spreading the gospel. Each person who hears is to tell someone else. If we use addition rather than multiplication we can never get very far in spreading the Word. If one person were to contact one person each day, he could only contact 30 people in a month. However, using the process of multiplication in which each person who is contacted, in turn contacts someone else, in 30 days, over 1 billion people could be contacted!

Consequences of Failing to Act

If we fail to spread the gospel, God will hold us responsible (Ezek. 33:2-9). It is our responsibility to warn the wicked. If they fail to heed our words, it is then their own responsibility. Mordecai told Queen Esther that if she failed to act,

1973 General Conference

The Annual Church of God General Conference was held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 13 to 18. Five hundred thirty-one were registered, eight less than 1972.

Pastor Kenneth Milne, Pelzer, S.C.; Bro. David Johnson, Hector, Minn.; and Bro. Russell Johns, Bennington, Neb., were elected to the Board of Directors. The new Board was organized and the officers are: Harold Doan, chairman; John Hearp, vice-chairman; Kenneth Milne, secretary; John Huston, treasurer; Dallas Demmitt, David Johnson, and Russell Johns, directors. We express our thanks and commendation to the retiring Board members; Charles Knapp, Joe James, and Robert Smith.

I am sure that all who attended felt richly blessed, as a fine spirit of unity, cooperation, and fellowship prevailed throughout the Conference. The minutes of the delegate sessions will appear in the October issue of *Progress Journal*.

Board Sessions

The Board of Directors met several times during the Conference. Following are some of the actions taken:

Upon the resignation of Bro. J. R. LeCrone from the License and Ordination Committee, Pastor Hollis Partlowe of Phoenix, Ariz., was appointed to that committee. The full committee now is: C. F. Pryor, chairman, C. E. Lapp, and Hollis Partlowe.

Bro. C. E. Randall was appointed to act as Historian for the Church of God General Conference.

Appointments for a two-year term to the Board of Education were William D. Lawrence, Phoenix, Ariz., and Charles Pryor, Morton, Ill. Other members of this board are Bros. Vernis Wolfe and Robert D. Johnson, with Dr. Alva Huffer as chairman. The Board of Education is undertaking an Institutional Research Study to formulate long-range plans for Oregon Bible College.

Decision was made to receive applications for the position of Youth Director beginning September 1, 1974. Upon inquiry, an application and job description will be mailed.

It was agreed to extend the time for receiving applications for the position of Sunday School Director.

The Sunday School Board has asked that September 12 be set aside as a day of prayer to remember this need that the right person will apply and be accepted for this position.

A budget of \$158,000.00 was approved and will be printed in a later issue. The 1974 General Conference will be held at Riverview Park on August 12-17.

Mission Builders, Rockford Church

Mission Builders Appeal number twenty-nine in November, 1972, was for the construction of a new building for the Blessed Hope Church of God, Rockford, Ill. Because of extremely high bids on construction and other circumstances, decision was made by the Rockford Church not to build. Decision was made to purchase a used church building and parsonage from another denomination. The funds received from Mission Builders Appeal number twenty-nine were used for that purpose. Missions News

"This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness" (Matt. 24:14).



The picture shows Sr. Rizalina Aguinaldo and the children of the Agbannawag Church, Philippine Islands. This church was begun early in 1962. It grew and progressed well until April, 1963, when an uncivlized tribe burned the church. It was also in this area where three of the members of the Church of God were beheaded. The church was then abandoned and the members placed their membership in Quezon or other nearby congregations.

The Agbannawag congregation has been reorganized under the leadership of Pastor Domingo Valdez and regular services are being held. There is still much danger of persecution and harassment, but these people are determined to worship God in this place. Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero says, "A delegation of members from the Agbannawag congregation have promised to protect Bro. Valdez from any danger from headhunters." Pray for these people.

Nigeria

A youth camp meeting was planned for all youth of the Church of God of Nigeria at the Ediene Church in August. Bro. Ephriam Udo is pastor here. At the same time a vacation Bible school was being held at Utu Abak, where Bro. John Obot is pastor. Bro. Solomon Idiong is in charge of the youth work of the Nigerian Church of God.

Three were immersed in the waters of baptism at the Golden Rule Church in the village of Ntak Afaha, where the pastor is J. A. I. Ekpo, recently licensed by the Church of God General Conference.

These pastors take turns going to the new congregation at Asarama until a full-time worker can be trained to take the pastorate there.

India

The Church-Medical building that is being built with assistance from Mission Builders Appeal number twenty-eight has been delayed due to final approval on the plans. Construction will be underway shortly. In the meantime, a clinic has been opened in temporary quarters in the area, with a doctor on part-time.

Bro. S. S. Manoah recently visited the village in Ravulapalem where Bro. P. M. Paulson and Bro. Philip are leading a mission work of five congregations. The work there is progressing well and Bro. Manoah will return later for a more extended time of study and planning with these people.

Special services were held at the Thomas Town Church in July celebrating their seventh anniversary.

Free Literature Campaign

Sixteen thousand five hundred dollars worth of free literature has been provided through the Free Literature Distribution Crusade in the first nine months of this church year. Many people are reading God's Word through these tracts and *The Restitution Herald*.

We want to emphasize, however, that all literature ordered should be distributed. One Restitution Herald represents about twenty-five cents. One hundred of them on a shelf represents twenty-five dollars of someone's contributed money standing idle, or wasted. We encourage churches and individuals to make full use of the literature acquired. See that it gets into the hands of someone so that the message is proclaimed.

When one hundred or more copies of one issue of *The Restitution Herald* are ordered we have requested a report of how they were used. We would appreciate these reports so that others may benefit by your experiences. May the Lord bless the continued use of his written Word.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

John R. Lewis on Holy Land Trip

For many years, the Board of Education has felt that it would be ideal for full-time instructors at Oregon Bible College not only to have at least a Master's Degree in academic preparation, but also to visit the lands of the Bible as part of their graduate education.

Walking where Jesus walked and visiting cities and countries where the apostles preached the gospel would provide an excellent background for teaching courses at the College. It is a worthy goal that eventually all full-time instructors at the College will have had this experience.

This past summer, some friends of the College made it possible for Bro. John R. Lewis to have this experience. Bro. Lewis is Campus Administrator, Vice-President, and Registrar, as well as a full-time instructor. He visited the Holy Land, Europe, and the Mediterranean area, July 9-30, in the tour group directed by Alva G. Huffer, President of the College.

Bible Content Test

The student body of Oregon Bible College participates each year in a Bible Content test designed to determine their recall of factual information given in the Bible. The test consists of 150 questions that must be answered within a limited time period. The average score of the graduating students over the last ten years was 87.0. Breaking this average score down into fiveyear segments, we find that the average score for graduating students in the years 1964-68 was 87.9 and the average score for graduating students in the years 1969-73 was 86.8. These averages include, of course, the scores the students received when they took the test all four years, including freshmen. The highest average score of any student was 134.2 and the highest single score by any student was 146. All of these scores are out of a possible total of 150.

Library Additions

Several new books were recently added to the library through the generosity of John Mercer of Springfield, Illinois. In early June he turned over his entire collection of books for Bible College use. We are thankful for his contribution.

Gospel Teams

Oregon Bible College is glad for the opportunity to send young people to churches as gospel teams. Stu-

dents can serve the churches in a variety of ways. They can sing, play musical instruments, preach, and give talks.

New English Instructor

Mrs. Ruth Donaldson of Oregon, Illinois, will be teaching Freshmen English Composition this year. Mrs. Donaldson has a Master's degree and many years of experience in teaching. We welcome her to the Bible College faculty.

Dale Ramsey is teaching Introduction to Music, Choir, OBC Chorale, Brass Ensemble, Private Voice, Private Piano, and Private Organ. Stanley Ross is teaching History and Survey of Missions. Mrs. Ruth Donaldson is teaching English Composition I, and Dallas Demmitt will be teaching a Christian Emphasis Week Seminar.

Adult Leadership

This is being written for each adult to consider in regard to your own sons, daughters, and the young people among you. The Berean Department of the Church of God has shown a sizeable growth the last several years. There is a great potential. It is fully recognized that young people have much energy and zeal, which often result in successful projects in many of our churches. But the young people (Bereans in most of our churches) need leadership—adult leadership. In a few instances, the young people might deny this, but generally the wisdom, experience, and knowledge of adults are desired.

A trend in the last few years has been to let the young people take complete charge of their own department. As this trend has developed, many adults have dismissed the needs of the youth from their minds? These statements are made to cause all to reconsider the adult-youth relationship. As an adult, what have you done to encourage the youth leader in his position to help the young people? What has your pastor done to really encourage the Bereans in their desires and work? What has the church as a congregation done?

Why is this matter being considered in this column? Though the membership has grown in the Berean Department, and some of the activities have increased, yet in many instances the work has decreased. Let us be specific. Approximately four years ago, there were 4500 bulletin covers printed to be used during Youth Week or in that month. As this is being written, there are orders for exactly 850. In 1968, the Coins for Christ Campaign brought in contributions in excess of \$5,200, with 64 groups participating. In 1973, the Coins for Christ Campaign brought in just a little over \$1,800, with 33 groups participating. Why this reverse trend? In 1968 and 1969, there were more than 200 Bereans who were members of the Mission Dollar Club. In 1973, there are 143.

It is our personal observation that the Church of God young people have the ability of meeting all of these needs. It is the plan of the General Conference Board to hire a full-time Youth Director in 1974. This will increase the Youth Department budget by several thousand dollars. A conservative estimate of a budget for the Youth Department for 1974 is \$12,000. The youth are capable of meeting this challenge with the counsel, encouragement, and leadership of the adults.

Teacher training is a vital part in any successful Sunday school. The key to educating people in the Word of God is the teacher. Yet handing a person a lesson book does not make him a teacher. Every Sunday school ought to have some program of teacher training.

It should be added that teacher training in itself does not qualify one to teach the Word of God. A qualified teacher must have a broad knowledge of the Bible. After all, it is the Bible that needs to be taught. The Word of God has the power.




