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Minutes of the 1973 General Conference

The Fifty-Third Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference convened at Riverview Park, in Cedar Falls, Iowa, on Tuesday, August 14, 1973. Harold Doan, chairman of the Board of Directors, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. and opened the session with prayer. He welcomed the delegates to the General Conference and outlined the roles and responsibilities of delegates.

Ruth Halls Overholser, Chairwoman of the Credentials Committee, seated the delegates and gave procedural instructions to the delegates and alternates. The credentials committee later announced that a total of 151 delegates had been seated, 8 Board of Directors, 52 ministers, and 91 church and conference delegates. Chairman Doan reported that Pastor Wilson W. Waters, Jr., of New Albany, Ind., will be present for most of the Conference, as a fraternal delegate from the Advent Christian Church.

Six churches from the following areas were represented this year for the first time: Van Nuys, Cal.; Pleasant Hill, Ohio; Freeport, Ill.; North Hills, Ohio; East Oregon, Ill.; and Greenville, S.C. Approximately thirty delegates were in attendance for the first time.

Executive Secretary S. O. Ross read a letter from Sister Leota B. Hanson, in which she expressed her greetings and best wishes to the Fifty-Third General Conference.

Chairman Doan called attention to the "Special Reports" on pages 7 and 8 of the June, 1973, *Progress Journal*. Charles Jones and J. Don Swartz moved that the reports be received and approved as printed. The motion carried.

Charles Knapp, vice-chairman of the Board of Directors, reported on the activities of the Board. He explained that the Board meets during the fall and spring, and also during General Conference. Telephone conference meetings are called, when necessary, between the regularly scheduled meetings. Bro. Knapp emphasized the careful and prayerful deliberation given to the various issues by the Board of Directors.

Executive Secretary S. O. Ross reviewed the "Nine Months Financial Report" included in the delegate folders. These reports covered the period of time from October 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. Bro. Ross carefully reviewed each item, explaining that two sets of books are now kept, one of "General Funds" and the other of "Restricted Funds." This is done on the recommendation of the auditors. The report included: a General Funds Statement of Assets and Liabilities (\$306,339.45 and \$7,946.32 respectivelv): a Statement of General Funds Income and Expenses (\$177,978.92 and \$170,603.50 respectively); a Statement of Restricted Funds Assets and Liabilities (\$242,171.19 and \$56,472.05 respectively). Charles Graham and Edward Goit moved that the delegates accept and approve the financial report. The motion carried.

Chairman Doan called on Francis Burnett to report on Berean Youth Department activities. Bro. Burnett stated that the recent Youth Conference was very successful and that enrollment reached the capacity for Camp Alexander Mack. Twenty-four individuals accepted Christ at the Conference. During the past year, much attention has been directed toward the observance of the 75th anniversary of the Berean Fellowship. These anniversary activities climaxed during Youth Conference. The historical book for the 75th anniversary is available. A new Berean


Scripture Studies book and a new tract, developed especially for our young people, were printed this year. Napkins, buttons, and other items commemorating the 75th anniversary are also available. The midwinter retreat and day-to-day business and planning were other items in Bro. Burnett's report. Bro. Burnett gave special recognition to Cleo Dixon for the donation of his excellent art work, used at Youth Conference and General Conference.

The meeting was recessed with prayer by Francis Burnett, at 11:50 a.m.

Wednesday, August 15

The second business session of the 1973 Church of God General Conference convened at 10:00 a.m., August 15, with Chairman Harold Doan presiding. The opening prayer was given by Pastor C. F. Prvor. Ruth Overholser, of the Credentials Committee, announced that the 151 delegates present at yesterday's session represented an increase of 12 over the first session of the 1972 Conference. Executive Secretary S. O. Ross reminded delegates to turn in forms for the delegate expense pool. He also announced that the cost of providing meals by Riverview Park management is greater than the amount paid by our people. The price paid by delegates for meals was agreed upon before the recent soar in food prices. To assist in meeting this deficit, special offerings will be taken today and tomorrow at the afternoon services.

Dr. Alva Huffer, President of Oregon Bible College, reported on the status of programs at the College. He said that last year the enrollment was 41 for the first semester and 44 for the second semester. John Lewis, vice-president, reported that 54 students are now enrolled for the

1973 fall semester. Twenty-two are freshmen and 32 are returning students. In the freshmen enrollment, there are 15 girls and 7 boys. There are 13 returning girls and 19 returning boys. Five male students are expected to graduate next spring.

Dr. Huffer gave a slide presentation, orienting delegates to the program and facilities of Oregon Bible College. The purpose and philosophy of the College was also emphasized during this presentation. He mentioned the need for qualified instructors and stated that a highly recommended English instructor, from the Oregon area, has been hired, on a parttime basis, for next year. Several comments and questions were received, and responses given, following Dr. Huffer's presentation. Dr. Huffer concluded by stating that he, the College staff, the Board of Education, and the Board of Directors constantly review the program, in order to provide the best possible Bible college for our General Conference. At the present time, the Board of Education is initiating an intensive study of the College, and will have reports, and perhaps recommendations, to present at a later

Ruth Overholser reported for the credentials Committee that 153 delegates were in attendance today, compared with 142 a year ago. C. E. Randall and Byron Jay moved that the business meeting be recessed until the next scheduled business

session, which will be at 10:00 a.m., Thursday, August 16. Motion carried. The session was dismissed with prayer by Joe James.

Thursday, August 16

The third business session of the Fifty-Third General Conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Harold Doan. Edward Goit offered the opening prayer. Executive Secretary Ross reported on the delegate expense pool, which amounted to \$58.84.

Chairman Doan clarified the roles of delegates, staff, and Board of Directors in Conference planning and decision-making, with the following statement: "For the sake of new delegates, I would like to briefly review the chain of command, which is spelled out in our 'Constitution and By-laws' and has been developed by precedent, through actions at General Conference.

"The staff at Oregon Bible College is responsible to the Executive Secretary, and through him, indirectly, to the Board of Directors. Working arrangements and salaries are reviewed annually by the Board of Directors and administered day to day by the Executive Secretary.

"The Board of Directors, in turn, is answerable directly to you. We are the ones to be called to account for whatever is done, or not done, in the Conference year. We make recommendations to you

in those areas where we need policy decisions. In those parts of the work where policy is already set, or there is no question of the Board's authority to act, we do not make specific recommendations. We simply report on activities in these departments. Staff members report for us, since they are most familiar with these departments. The responsibility, however, still rests upon the Board.

"You, as delegates, are not limited to acting on the recommendations of the Board. You can present motions or resolutions which express what you want done, to be accepted or rejected by this Conference. Those motions and resolutions which are accepted are then put into effect by the Board of Directors. The Board is answerable to you for its action or lack of action."

Minutes of the second business session were read

The first order of business for Thursday was the nomination of candidates for three members of the Board of Directors. The terms of Charles Knapp, Robert Smith, and Joe James expire this year. The floor was opened for nominations for Director Number One. Warren Sorenson was nominated by Rolla Hightower; Harry Lee by James Lippert; and Kenneth Milne by Z. B. Duncan. Dale Swartz and Richard Smith, moved that nominations be closed for Director Number One. The motion carried.

The nominations for Director Number Two were: Paul Overholser, by Charles Jones; David Johnson, by Delbert Jones; and Kent Ross, by James Graham. Z. B. Duncan and Charles Jones moved that nominations cease for this directorship. The motion carried.

The nominations for Director Number Three were: Russell Johns, by C. E. Randall and Emory Macy; William Andrew, by C. E. Lapp; and Don Overmeyer by Alton Shaw. Norman LaMunion and Dale Swartz moved that nominations be closed. The motion carried. The Chairman announced that the election of three directors will be the first order of business at the next business session.

Scott Ross, head of the Sunday School Department, presented a report for that department, calling attention to the report on pages 4 and 5 of the June, 1973, *Progress Journal.* Bro. Scott Ross announced that applications for the full-time position of Sunday School Director, to be created in September, 1974, will be

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received for several more months and that the job description will be published in the *Progress Journal* and *Sunday School Bulletin*. The Sunday School Director sees great days ahead for the department and for our Sunday schools. Bro. Scott Ross expressed appreciation to the Troyview, Ohio, Church, of which he is pastor, for permitting him to take the time to serve as part-time Sunday School Director for several months.

Chairman Doan opened the floor for nominations for two Sunday school directors. The terms of Joyce Knapp and George Scott are expiring. For Director Number One, Charles Graham nominated Joyce Knapp. Since there were no additional nominations, Edward Goit and Edward O'Neal moved that nominations cease and that the secretary cast a unanimous vote for Joyce Knapp. The motion carried.

Richard Smith nominated James Graham for Director Number Two. There being no other nominations, Kent Ross and James Babcock moved that nominations cease and that the secretary cast a unanimous vote for James Graham. The motion carried.

C. E. Randall, editor, presented a report for the Publishing Department. He called the delegates' attention to the written report submitted in the June, 1973, Progress Journal, page 5. Bro. Randall spoke enthusiastically of the growth of our publications during the Free Literature Campaign of the past year. He answered several questions regarding the future plans for literature distribution. J. Don Swartz presented a recommendation from the Columbia Church of God that more attention be given to the youth in The Restitution Herald, in order to make it a complete family paper.

Editor Randall said to the delegates: "Thank you for the cooperation given me and the kindly words spoken while I have been editor. The spirit at Headquarters has been superb. Thank you again for such a wonderful experience and pleasant time." The delegates responded with a standing ovation in appreciation for Bro. Randall's services as editor.

C. E. Randall and Hollis Partlowe moved the adoption of recommendation one, which reads: "We recommend that the Free Literature Campaign of this current year be continued indefinitely, using the present free tracts and additional material that may be written for this purpose." The motion carried.

Willis Turner and Z. B. Duncan moved the adoption of recommendation two, OCTOBER. 1973

which reads: "We recommend that *The Restitution Herald* be sent, subscription free, for one year, to all Church of God General Conference membership and to any others who are now receiving it, or who request it. The motion carried.

For the remainder of the business session, Chairman Doan called on the delegates representing new churches to give brief reports on these works. The following reported: Robert Petry, for North Hills, Ohio; Brenda Burchett, for Greenville, S.C. and Gastonia, N.C.; Michael Mattison, for Arlington, Tex.; Dick Smith, for Pleasant Hill, Ohio; and Dale Harshman, for Freeport, Ill.

Ruth Overholser gave the Credentials Committee report: Eight officers, 48 ministers and 95 delegates. The total of 151 compared with 145 a year ago.

Delbert Jones and Raymond Brown moved that the business meeting recess until the August 17 session. The motion carried. The session was dismissed with prayer by Kent Ross.

Friday, August 17

The August 17 morning business session was called to order by Chairman Doan. Dr. William Lawrence opened the session with prayer. The chairman announced that Pastor Waters, of the Advent Christian Church, is not in attendance at our Conference. The minutes of the Thursday business session were read.

The first order of business was the election of three members of the Board of Directors. Prior to casting ballots, the chairman introduced nominee David Johnson, who was not present Thursday when other nominees were introduced. Kenneth Milne was elected as Director Number One on the second ballot. David Johnson was elected to the position of Director Number Two on the second ballot. Russell Johns was elected as Director Number Three on the second ballot.

The next order of business was the presentation by S. O. Ross of the Missions Department business, and the status of the 1974 General Conference place of assembly. Several campsites have been investigated. These other facilities are either inadequate for a group of our size or too expensive. The search for other sites will continue. The Board of Directors has set the location and time of the 1974 General Conference as, Riverview Park, August 12-17.

Bro. Ross referred the delegates to the Missions Department report on pages 5 and 6 of the June, 1973, *Progress Journal*. In addition, he reported that eight

churches will be on pastoral aid next year. He praised the work being done by lay people in several areas, and especially that of Eunice Pearson in Nova Scotia. Bro. Ross also expressed appreciation for Clement Richey, a retired person, who has moved to Oregon and is working as Maintenance Superintendent, and to his wife, Rosalie, who is also contributing to Conference work. Bro. Ross brought the delegates up to date on our foreign missions. Ghana is the newest field and Nigeria has shown the fastest growth and development.

Bro. Ross explained the disappointing situation which developed in the Middle East, where the Conference had been contributing to the work of Jamal Sunna'a. Support of Jamal Sunna'a in Lebanon has been discontinued by action of the Mission Board and the Board of Directors. Bro. Ross listed the reasons for this action, which included: teaching of false doctrines by Sunna'a in his study course lessons; Sunna'a had stated that the lessons were translations of our Systematic Bible Study Course, but this was found to be untrue: Sunna'a solicited and received funds from the Conversion Center in Havertown, Pa., although he had said that he received no support from any group except the Church of God; his present church sign says "Holy Land Baptist Church" (in Arabic); and several other reasons, all of which have been documented. Bro. Ross answered several questions related to missions work.

Joyce Knapp moved that the Missions Board make a study of how lay workers could be used in Sunday school and church work, with the prospect of having a definite program to be presented, to enlist the help of interested lay workers. Robert Petry seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The chairman opened the floor for nominations to fill the expired term of Merle Patrick on the Missions Board. Merle Patrick was nominated by Delbert Jones and J. Don Swartz. Emory Macy and John Huston moved that nominations be closed and that the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Merle Patrick. The motion carried.

Ruth Overholser gave the report of the Credentials Committee: 8 officers, 50 ministers and 100 delegates. This was a total of 158 compared with 138 a year ago.

The chairman recessed the meeting until 2:15 p.m., and David Krogh dismissed the meeting with prayer.

The afternoon session was called to

order by Chairman Doan. C. E. Randall opened the meeting with prayer. The chairman announced that the new Board met during the lunch hour to elect officers. The following officers were elected: Harold Doan, Chairman; John Hearp, Vice-Chairman; Kenneth Milne, Secretary; and John Huston, Treasurer.

The Chairman opened the floor for a motion to adopt recommendation three. Delbert Jones and Arnold Johns moved the adoption of recommendation three, which reads: "We recommend that the 'Reaching Forth to Seventy-Eight' (Phil. 3:13, 14) program be adopted and promoted among the churches." The motion carried.

The floor was opened for a motion regarding recommendation four. Dallas Demmit and David Johnson moved the adoption of recommendation four, which reads: "We recommend that special assistance be given to churches which have a part-time ministry; that assistance be given up to half the salary cost of a full-time pastor: that this assistance be limited to not more than three churches at one time and that such assistance continue for three years: that this program be administered through the Home Mission Department, in accordance with guidelines established by the Board of Directors." The motion carried.

Joyce Knapp moved that the following guidelines be added to the "Guidelines for Special Aid Program": "The church receiving Special Church Aid would be expected to return one-tenth of its total

income to the General Conference, its state or district conference, or both, as a tithe unto the Lord, thereby making a covenant with the Lord to cause all endeavors of the church to be blessed beyond measure (Mal. 3:10)." The motion was seconded by Merle Patrick. The motion carried.

The next order of business concerned recommendation five. Willis Turner and Alton Shaw moved the adoption of recommendation five, which reads: "We recommend an addition to Section 4 of the 'Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance." Said Section 4 now reads: "The congregation should have the approval of the state conference with which it is associated. It is recommended that the congregation hold a joint deed with the state conference and (or) the General Conference." We recommend that a subdivision be added. as follows: a) That the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference will temporarily deed the property back to the local congregation by a quitclaim deed, when it seems advisable for the purpose of borrowing money. The motion carried.

The floor was opened for action on recommendation six, regarding the constitutional change. Charles Knapp moved that the word "Secretary" in Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution and By-Laws be changed to read "Director." The motion was seconded by C. E. Randall. The motion carried.

The floor was opened for general busi-

ness. Byron Jay moved that the Church of God pastors support the tape ministry by submitting tapes to the tape library and that the General Conference support the tape ministry by advertising in *The Restitution Herald* and other denominational publications the availability of tapes by title. J. Don Swartz seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Don Overmeyer moved that the Board of Directors appoint a committee to prepare and publish a songbook, similar to Youth Sings, which will be free of doctrinal error; and that this committee give due consideration to the Berean Youth Fellowship in regard to the content of this book. The motion was seconded by Edward Goit. Dallas Demmitt and Charles Knapp moved that this motion be tabled until General Conference 1974 and that the recommendation be submitted to the Youth Advisory Council for their consideration. The motion carried.

C. E. Randall moved that the Board of Directors be instructed to make a study, or appoint a committee, to research the need and advisability of implementing Section 1, paragraph (D) of Article 1 of the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference. Further, if such a study reveals the need for organizing a Board of Benevolences, initial guidelines of the nature and scope of the work be included in the report. The motion was seconded by Edward Graham. The motion carried.

John Hearp and J. Don Swartz moved that the mileage allowance of the delegate (Please turn to page 12)

Business Session Minutes

The Secretary's minutes of the business sessions of the Annual Church of God General Conference appear in this issue. We encourage all members to carefully read these minutes. The delegates in session set the policies and the programs for the new Conference year. It then becomes the duty of the Board of Directors and the General Conference staff to carry out these programs.

Annual Budget

The Budget for the year, October 1, 1973, to September 30, 1974, is on page 4 in this issue. This is the largest budget ever undertaken by the Church of God General Conference. Contributions in the amount of \$158,000.00 will be needed to meet the needs for the year. We are thankful that the total giving for the past fiscal year has nearly reached this amount. We praise God for his blessings upon the membership to make this giving possible.

Change in Title

You will notice a change in title for my position (see top of page). It is now Executive Director instead of Executive Secretary. The delegates at the last Annual General Conference made this possible by a constitutional change. This title more nearly describes the duties of this administrative position.

Conference Van

A decision was made to order a fifteen passenger van for use of Oregon Bible College Chorale and Gospel teams, for Youth Caravans, and for other Conference needs. The evening offerings at General Conference, which were designated for this purpose, totaled \$2,019.00. Since Conference time other contributions and pledges have brought the total to five thousand dollars which is only slightly short of the total cost. This vehicle has been ordered and will be delivered within the next few months. We are thankful for each one who has contributed to this special need.

Sunday School-Youth Director

Bro. Francis Burnett began his duties as full-time Sunday School-Youth Director September 1. The appointment is for one year. As Sunday School Director, Bro. Burnett is chairman of the Sunday School Board, which is composed of Scott Ross, Robert Petry, Joyce OCTOBER, 1973

Knapp, and James Graham, the latter elected this year at General Conference.

As Youth Director, Bro. Burnett works with the Youth Council, elected by the youth at the annual Youth Conference.

Literature Crusade

The decision was made at General Conference to provide tracts free of charge indefinitely. *The Restitution Herald* will be provided subscription free for one year. We encourage each church to organize a systematic way of distributing this written word during the next church year.

Pastoral Changes

There were a number of pastoral changes made September 1. The new Directory, which will appear in the November issue of *Progress Journal*, will list the new addresses of these pastors.

Pastoral Aid

Eight churches are on the Pastoral Aid Program of the Church of God General Conference. They are: Royal Village, Front Royal, Va.; Lombard, Ill.; Eternal Hope, Herndon, Va.; Flagg Center, Ill.; East Oregon, Ill.; Raymore, Mo.; Arlington, Tex.; and L'Anse, Mich., which is in the last year of the program.

Conference Finances

The goals for giving for the month of September have been met. We are thankful to the membership for this dedicated giving and to God for providing the needs.

As we begin this new Conference year, may God continue to bless and may all the work of the Church of God General Conference progress according to his will.

Ghana

Bro. Oliver Amani continues to do a good work in Ghana, West Africa. James Asare, Theodore Oboo, and Ruth Kufui were immersed in the waters of baptism by Pastor Amani. They are all from the village of New Ayoma and are employees of the Ghana Cocoa Marketing Board.

Bro. Amani reports that he is thankful for the tracts and quarterlies recently received and that they are most helpful in his ministry and evangelistic efforts.

A recent letter advises that Bro. Amani has been in the hospital for three weeks with a serious stomach ulcer. He says, "I am out of the hospital now and I hope to be able to resume normal work very soon. Greetings from the brethren here in Ghana and pray for me and the work here."

Mexico

Sr. Alice Aldrich spent six weeks in Mexico this summer. Susan Foster, of Sycamore, Ill., accompanied her at her own expense. They conducted Bible schools at both Labor Vieja and Potosi.

Bro. Roberto Badillo has assumed the leadership of the congregation at Labor Vieja. He has been a diligent lay worker for several years and is now speaking at the Sunday worship service as well as leading the midweek classes.

Bro. Francisco Martinez is pastoring the group at Potosi and conducting Sunday school and worship services each week. They have recently begun midweek services.

Philippine Islands

Eleven were immersed in the waters of baptism at the Uddiawan Church in July. There were two men, fifty and twenty-five years of age, and nine teen-age men and women. We praise God for each of these and ask your prayers for them as they begin their walk of life for the Lord.

Bro. Marcos Robles has been pastor of the Uddiawan Church. However, he is presently suffering with a lung ailment and is unable to continue his preaching ministry for awhile. Bro. Mariano Gallardo, a lay worker, is supplying the pulpit at present.

Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, leader of the Philippine Conference work, and Bro. Estifanio Sibayan continue to carry on the radio work. Much good response is in evidence and the Lord is blessing this work in a wonderful way.

Nova Scotia

The new siding for the church has arrived. The men will be busy trying to get the siding on before severe weather begins. Anyone who could go to Nova Scotia to assist in this project would be most welcome. Here is a real challenge for anyone to use his vacation in a spiritually profitable way, or for a retired person to serve the Lord.

A missionary conference will be held October 19-21 at the Digby Church of God. Bro. S. O. Ross will be there as guest speaker.

India

On August 5, special anniversary services were held at the Thomas Town Church. It was the seventh anniversary of this church. Many attended from the other churches located in and around Bangalore. Special prayers were held by Bro. S. S. Manoah and the members of the India churches during our annual General Conference, August 13-18.

Bro. Manoah says: "Please convey our special greetings and Christian love to each of the brothers and sisters of the Conference. Though we are very far from you and cannot partake with you, we are very near to you in our prayers."

The medical clinic is in operation in a temporary facility. This will serve until the new church-medical building is completed. Six hundred eighty persons were treated during July. Devotions are held in the waiting room several times each day.

Nigeria



expense pool be increased to 6¢ per mile, effective General Conference, 1974. The motion carried.

The next order of business was consideration of the Proposed Budget for 1973-1974. Edward Goit and Merle Patrick moved the adoption of the Proposed Budget, which included a "Goals for Giving" of \$158,000. The motion carried.

C. F. Pryor requested that the delegate body stand for a few minutes of silent prayer, thanking God for moving the membership to reach the needs in giving. Following the prayer, Delbert Jones moved that the delegates give a rising vote of appreciation to the retiring members of the Board of Directors. Several people seconded this motion as the delegates stood in appreciation.

Ruth Halls Overholser gave the final report for the Credentials Committee. At the afternoon session today, there were 8 officers, 39 ministers and 84 delegates present, for a total of 131 compared to 117 a year ago. The largest delegate at-

tendance this year was 158 compared to 145 in 1972. The smallest attendance was 133 compared to 114 in 1972. The average delegate attendance at business sessions was 145 this year and 135 in 1972.

Delbert Jones and John Huston moved that the Credentials Committee report be accepted. The motion carried.

Joe E. James, Secretary of the Board of Directors, read the minutes of the final business session. Alton Shaw moved that all minutes of the business sessions of the Fifty-Third Annual Church of God General Conference be approved. Howard Schute seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Russell Johns and Dale Swartz moved that the business session of the 1973 Church of God General Conference be adjourned. The motion to adjourn carried. Chairman Harold Doan dismissed the session with prayer.



Mission Month

November is Mission Month in the Church of God General Conference. Special emphasis should be given to missions in each church. Hopefully, each church will set one Sunday aside as Mission Sunday. Much is being accomplished in each of the mission fields of the General Conference. The Free Literature Campaign has been a great help in the "Outreach" that has been so successful in recent months, both in foreign fields and in local areas.

Each of the missionary leaders has written to express thanks for the tracts and materials being provided for their use. God is richly blessing the efforts put forth.

Nigeria

Reports from the Nigerian brethren indicate that much enthusiasm is being felt among the members. The youth are becoming more and more active under the direction and leadership of Bro. Solomon Idiong. A youth camp was held in August at the Ediene Church. This was a first for the youth there and was a real blessing to all who attended.

Seven were baptized at the Asarama Church. A special Communion service was held following the baptisms. The attendance at this church is over two hundred each Sunday. The Sunday evening service attendance average for August was one hundred twenty-two and the midweek average one hundred thirty-five.

Ghana

Bro. Oliver K. Amani continues to carry on a busy schedule in Ghana. Two prison inmates in Kpando village are studying the Scriptures with Bro. Amani and are asking for baptism. A fetish priest has been studying the Bible truths with him and also has asked for baptism.

Bro. Amani writes, "Many thanks to you and all the brethren for the monthly support. We are planning to establish a good strong congregation here in Nkwanta and to reach out to many of the surrounding villages with the truth of God's Word."

Philippine Islands

The gospel message is going out in a wonderful way in the Philippine Islands. Regular church services are carried on each week in the villages of Cordon, Gatta-NOVEMBER, 1973

ran, Liwan, Lupao, Minagbag, Pallagau, Quezon, San Nicolas, and Uddiawan. Each of these has a regular pastor and a full schedule of services.

Sr. Rizalina Aguinaldo works with each of the churches in music and in training workers for the children's classes. She also assists with the music in the radio broadcasts on occasion.

Bro. Estifanio Sibayan is now doing most of the radio work, with assistance from Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero. The radio continues to bring good response, and many are being led to Christ through the radio broadcasts and the follow up.

India

The Medical Clinic is in full operation and affords great opportunity to help many people both physically and spiritually. The clinic opens each morning with a chapel service at 8:30 for all the patients who are waiting and for the staff. Devotions are also held several times during the day.

Nine hundred sixty-seven patients were treated in August. Three hundred eighty-seven were new cases and five hundred eighty were returning for further treatment. Bro. S. S. Manoah says, "The clinic is progressing rapidly. Our church name is spreading. Slowly we must bring all of these people to salvation as well as to treat their sicknesses. Pray for this noble work and for all the efforts here in India."

Free Literature Campaign

We urge each church in the Church of God General Conference to make use of the many tracts that are available without charge. Several new tracts, in color, are now available. See the back page of *The Restitution Herald* for a complete list of literature.

Many churches have already organized plans to distribute the written Word. Nearly one half million pieces of literature were distributed during the past fiscal year. There are certain Bible study tools that every lay worker in the church should have in his library, if he wants to carry on an effective Bible study program. These tools would prove valuable to the Sunday school teacher, home Bible study leader, Wednesday night leader, or for personal growth.

Signs of Growth in the Church of God

By the Editor

T IS true of a church, as of any other organism, that nothing ever remains static. Either it is growing and developing or it is dying. To maintain the status quo over an extended period of time is simply not possible. For this reason, the direction in which a church is moving is of far greater importance than where it finds itself at any given point in time. This is true whether we think in terms of numerical or spiritual growth. It also becomes evident in the enthusiasm with which the church searches out and takes advantage of its opportunities to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God.

That the Church of God is very much alive and growing is evident from a number of indicators.

Not the least of these indications of growth is the enthusiasm with which the churches have entered into and made good use of the free literature provided by our General Conference. The 1972-73 budget provided \$8,000 for such literature. By the end of September, 1973 \$23,112.84 had been spent in the production and distribution of such literature. Total contributions had exceeded the total budget by nearly \$14,000 and our General Conference was in the black!

The brethren had devised many ingenious methods for using this literature effectively. Door-to-door distribution, sometimes for several weeks prior to a special evangelistic effort at a church, accounted for getting much of this literature into the hands of people who do not attend the churches. The result has invariably been larger and more enthusiastic attendance at the evangelistic services,

and increased attendance at the regularly scheduled services of the churches.

This trend continues. Since the last General Conference the following churches have distributed issues of *The Restitution Herald* to the families in the areas where their church is located:

Fonthill, Ont. 2,000 copies
Dayton, Ohio 1,500 copies
Lawrenceville, Ohio . . 2,000 copies
Hector, Minn. 1,000 copies
St. Louis, Mo. 500 copies
Rockford, Ill. 1,000 copies

In addition, hundreds of copies are being placed in racks located in such strategic places as laundromats, hospitals, rest homes, and other places where people gather.

Of course, we all realize that there is, in the final analysis, no such thing as literature that is "free." It may be free to the person who distributes it, and to the one who receives it, but somebody has to pay the cost of publishing it. This distribution of literature has been made possible by the enthusiasm and sacrificial giving of the brethren!

There are, of course, other indications of growth within the church. A quick check of the *Progress Journals* for the past year revealed that more than 190 baptisms were reported during this period. This number does not include those baptized in foreign missionary fields, which were reported on the page of Mission News, edited by Bro. S. O. Ross.

Other indicators of growth are the new Sunday schools and churches that have been started and are quickly taking root and growing. These things do not come about by accident. They require careful planning and hard work. From all reports, the planning has been thorough and the labor joyously given. More of our larger and better established churches are considering establishing other churches in promising fields.

The Systematic Theology Bible Study Course is being studied around the world and is proving to be spiritually fruitful. Not only is it being used for individual study, via correspondence, it is also being used for class study in a number of locations. Daily, requests for new sets of lessons come into the office, and reports of those who have completed the course constitute an ever-growing file.

Yet another indication of spiritual growth and development is to be observed in Oregon Bible College. Not only is enrollment up, but the quality of the students is high and their earnest desire to serve the Lord is evident to all. Gospel teams, and other groups which represent the College, find a warm welcome wherever they go.

All of this is wonderfully encouraging to all, but we must not conclude that everything has been, or is being done that can be done, and begin to relax and rest on our oars. The very minute that we do, we will begin to drift backward, and the progress that has been made will be lost.

With the clear and definite indications before us that our Lord's return to earth is very near, we cannot afford to be careless or indolent servants! We feel confident that the Church of God will become increasingly aware of its opportunities and will continue to grow.

Special Church Aid Program

The delegates at the 1973 General Conference approved a Special Church Aid Program to assist churches which have been operating on a part-time ministry to have a full-time pastor. Churches interested in this program can make application to the Executive Director, Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061. Following are the Guidelines for this program:

Purpose of Special Church Aid: The Special Church Aid Program of the Church of God General Conference is to assist churches which have been existing on a part-time ministry to go to a full-time ministry. The program would give the church an opportunity to endeavor to develop into a full-time work, with a full-time pastor leading them.

Amount of Special Church Aid: Special Church Aid would be given up to a maximum of one half of the salary cost of a full-time pastor (not to exceed \$300 monthly) for a period of three years; amount of salary to be based on current living costs. After the three years, the church may qualify for the regular pastoral aid program.

Procedure for Granting Special Church Aid: Application for Special Church Aid would be made through the Home Missions Department of the Church of God General Conference. A thorough investigation will be made and each application considered on its own merits. The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference will make final approval for Special Church Aid.

Not more than three churches will receive Special Church Aid at one time. All other conditions being equal, Special Aid will be granted to churches in the order in which applications are received.

Conditions to be Considered in Granting Special Church Aid:

- 1) The church must be affiliated with the Church of God General Conference and have sufficient lay leadership to give the church a reasonable amount of stability.
- 2) The pastor must be a licensed minister, recognized by the Church of God General Conference, who will develop the church he serves to be an active, participating member in the Church of God General Conference.
- 3) The church and the pastor must have an organized evangelistic plan that will tend to become an outreach in the community, and try to attain to the purpose outlined in these guidelines.
- 4) The location, the facilities, and the plans of the church should be such that growth can reasonably be expected.
- 5) The spiritual conditions of the congregation should be such that growth can be expected. A church with a history of internal difficulties may be a doubtful recipient of the Special Church Aid.
- 6) The pastor in a church receiving Special Church Aid would make monthly reports to the Home Mission Department of the Church of God General Conference. He would continue in close touch with the Home Missions Director. If it is apparent that he

is not performing reasonable service to his congregation, the pastor and the church board would be counseled with. If conditions are not improved, it may be necessary to discontinue Special Church Aid.

- 7) The membership of the church receiving Special Church Aid would be expected to support the pastor, to cooperate with the outreach programs of the church and pastor, and make effort to witness and evangelize to assist in the church growth program. If it is apparent that the church membership is not giving cooperation to the program, they would receive counsel. If conditions do not improve, it may be necessary to discontinue Special Church Aid.
- 8) The church receiving Special Church Aid would be expected to return one-tenth of its total income to the General Conference, its state-district conference, or both, as a tithe unto the Lord, thereby making a covenant with the Lord to cause all endeavors of the church to be blessed beyond measure (Mal. 3:10).
- 9) The Special Church Aid Program will go into effect September 1, 1974.

Statistics Report

The report of the Church of God Participation Statistics for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1973, has been mailed to churches, pastors, and Sunday school superintendents. More churches and more individuals contributed to the budget needs than in any other fiscal year. Total contributions were twenty-three thousand dollars more than the past fiscal year. We praise God for this dedicated concern of the membership of the Church of God General Conference.

We encourage each member to review this report and note the progress and development in many areas of the work.

Conference Finances

We want to call attention to the giving for the month of November. At the last report there was a five-thousand-dollar deficit. This, added to the November needs, made a goal of more than eighteen thousand for November. Contributions have fallen nearly \$8,000.00 short of that need. A Great Step Forward!

As has been reported in previous issues of *Progress Journal* and *Challenge*, the Berean Youth Conference in 1973 reached capacity for the facilities of Camp Alexander Mack. Discussion with the BYF Conference staff members last year brought forth the idea, and desire, that the camping attendance be increased rather than decreased. But how was this to be done? Our camping program is held at Camp Mack during one of the choice weeks of the summer. Most other camps are booked solid for the month of July. The 1973 BYF Conference staff expressed the opinion that to have two camps on different dates would not be workable.

Through the suggestion of Mr. Virgil Douty and his wife, we wrote Brethren Retreat Center, Shipshewana, Ind. God certainly blessed us. The same week in July, 1974, that is tentatively reserved at Camp Mack, was open at the Retreat Center. This camp is located about thirty miles northeast of Camp Mack. So the Brethren Retreat Center, Shipshewana, Ind., has been reserved for July 21-27, 1974.

What are the plans? First of all, the eligibility requirements will be broadened. Young people in eighth grade have been asking to be included. This request can now be granted. The older age limit is to be raised to 25, provided that the camper is unmarried. Married couples may not attend as campers.

The eighth through eleventh grade group will use Camp Mack. During the same week, the twelfth grade and post-high group will use the Brethren Retreat Center at Shipshewana.

It is tentatively planned to transport the senior campers to Camp Mack for Quiz championship night and for the formal worship service on decision night. Plans also are being considered to present a somewhat different type of program to the senior camp—such as church leadership and promotion.

Tuition costs will be higher in 1974. Rising food costs are the main reason. As of this writing, we can expect that camp tuition for 1974 will be \$42.00.

As youth director, I ask for your sincere prayers on behalf of this forward movement among our youth. It will take considerably more planning and developing to have two camps operating during the same week. Your full support is also desired. Any questions concerning this change will be answered to the best of our ability.

A Reservoir of Enthusiasm and Vigor

The November-December issue of *Challenge* contains an article which shows the importance of the Sunday school. The purpose is to encourage the young people to attend Sunday school and to seek a working relationship therein. The reminder of Paul to Timothy that he was to be an "example of the believers" is emphasized. This principle has not changed. Young people may still be "examples of the believers." Very often, adults are quick to remind the younger people of the importance of the impression that they are giving to others, especially to those outside of the "body of Christ." Adults may fear that the young people are, in reality, living the way that the adults have taught them to live.

In our several years of working with young people of the Church of God, as well as with many of their friends, it has become evident to me that they want to live good, clean, and upright Christian lives. They want to honor God and be good examples of followers of Jesus their Savior. They want others to know the way they feel. They want to share with their friends—both young and old—the experiences of their young Christian lives.

Too often, their enthusiasm is dampened by implying to them that their inexperience and youth are detriments to effective witnessing—that they cannot serve because they don't know how.

The Challenge article encourages young people to actively seek ways in which they may help in their Sunday schools. NOW we encourage all who read this column to diligently plan ways to take advantage of the enthusiasm and vigor of youth. Find, or create, ways to use them. The means that you develop for using them will aid in the spiritual development of the young people. In almost every instance, young people welcome good leadership and training. Show them how they can help by making calls in the community. Have special training sessions to acquaint them with the continuing needs of the Sunday school. They have the potential for becoming well-trained, faithful teachers who know how to prepare lessons and materials. They can make weekly calls on absentees or prospects, either by telephone or in person. They can help to maintain the church building and equipment in good repair. This, of course, will require the leadership and time of adults.

The History Committee, that was to research and work on the history of the Church of God, was voted into existence at the General Conference session of 1944. At the General Conference held in 1946, the Committee reported: "Prospective publication includes the publishing . . ., also, there are plans for publishing, eventually, a history of the Church of God." Bros. G. E. Marsh and C. E. Randall were to be the editors. Restitution Herald, 8-13-46.

In the minutes of the General Conference in the same Herald (p. 9), in a section labeled "Report of History Committee," appears the following: "The chair called upon Bro. G. E. Marsh for a report of the Church History Committee. Bro. Marsh reported that he had been too busy in his pastoral duties to develop the history book project, but thanked the brethren who had contributed pictures and other historical data during the year."

The next year, 1947, the Conference was given this information concerning the work of the History Committee: "Bro. G. E. Marsh reported that he and Bro. C. E. Randall are con-

tinuing work on the History Book Committee, but their assignment was stupendous. He thanked those who had been assisting him with information and pictures. He had in his possession a photograph album received from Sr. A. J. Eychaner, the album containing many pictures of historical signification toward church history. He explained that preparation of a history book would require several years of full-time work for one man if the work were to be done properly, so requested the brethren to be pa-tient as they look forward to the completed work."-Vol. 36, No. 45, p. 10.

In the same volume, on page 11, the minutes of the Conference state: "Bro. C. E. Randall, explaining that he has insufficient time for working on the historical book project, asked to be relieved from his place on the commit-

From this year on, Bro. G. E. Marsh carried on alone, reporting whenever requested to do so by the chairman of the annual Conference.

In the minutes of the Conference held in 1948 and reported in the August 10 issue of The Restitution Herald (p. 9), this report occurs: "Bro. F. L. Austin read a report of G. E. Marsh on the History Book Committee, said report being scheduled for the day's business. The chair called for the report which here follows: 'Much additional material has been assembled and something accomplished in the way of ar-

rangement, but the task is too great to be accomplished by a busy pastor in a short time. We will continue to do the best we can if it is desired. We suggest that a mimeographed outline be prepared to meet immediate needs as soon as possible.'-signed, G. E. Marsh, Committee on History."

At the 1949 Conference, Bro. G. E. Marsh gave this report: "G. E. Marsh, head of the History Committee, announced that his files of historical material were being put in order so that information in them could be used by others in case of need: no definite work had been done on any manuscript as yet. It was suggested that excerpts from the files be published occasionally, pending completion of a comprehensive history of The Church of God."—Vol. 38, No. 46,

p. 4.

The minutes of the conferences held in 1950

montion of any report by and 1951 contain no mention of any report by the History Committee on its book project. We are left to conclude that the work was being held in abeyance during these two years.

The minutes of the Conference held in 1952 contain no direct mention of work on the Church History Book project by the Committee. It is recorded, however, that Bro. Joe Lawrence, who was then chairman of the Conference, included the following information. He "called attention to the 'Friendship Circle' promotion work being done, a history of The Church of God, the efforts being made to compile accurate statistics."-Vol. 41, No. 46, p. 4. Bro. Francis Burnett and C. L. Netts moved to accept the report and to continue the Committee. The motion carried."

The reference by Bro. Joe Lawrence to the "Friendship Circle" must have concerned an independent effort, or possibly an advisory group, to the official Committee on Church of God History. The result of their work was not learned by this compiler. If anyone has information, or can identify or cite this Circle work, the compiler will be most grateful.

In the minutes of the Conference that was held in 1953, it is reported: "Bro. G. E. Marsh, reporting the progress of the History Committee of the Church of God, stated that a wealth of material had been gathered, but that he did not have the funds nor the time to properly organize the material for a history book."-Vol.

42, No. 46, p. 9.

The Conference minutes of 1954 do not mention any report given by the History Book Committee. The last member of the Commit-tee, Bro. G. E. Marsh, died November 23, 1954. There were no committee members nominated or appointed to continue the effort to research, compile, or publish such a book, so the effort, as far as an official Committee is concerned, ended in 1954 and has not, to this date, been resolved or reinstituted.

India



Board of Directors Met

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, Ill., on November 15 and 16. Many areas of the work were discussed. Each department head met with the Board and gave his report, and many decisions were arrived at, including the following actions.

The Report of the Audit was discussed and formally approved. The Board of Education of Oregon Bible College is making a Feasibility Study of all of the College operations. A written report will be made on this study at the May, 1974, Board meeting.

Two applications for the Special Church Aid Program have been received. The Church of the Open Bible at Pomona, Cal., is the first church approved for this Special Aid beginning September, 1974. The delegates at the 1973 Conference set a limit of three churches at any one time for this assistance.

AUDITOR'S STATEMENT TO CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

The annual audit of your books and records for your fiscal year ended September 30, 1973, has been completed by me and the complete audit report has been furnished to all members of the Board and to the Executive Director. The report was presented to the Board by me at its meeting on November 16, 1973, and reviewed in person with the Board.

The audit report shows that the General Conference, in total, is in a good and sound financial condition. However, you should note that there are no cash reserves or cash surplus for the general administrative operation of the Conference. All cash funds or reserves are specifically designated by the donors to be used for specified purposes, which are not general operating purposes. The specified purposes are mostly for future construction of facilities, special mission projects, special college projects and equipment. The continuing immediate need for giving appears to be more for the general operating budget. Some cash reserves for general operations would be most helpful.

Respectfully submitted, Allan M. Ramsey, Public Accountant. Allan M. Ramsey, and David Johnson, has been appointed to give study to the future use of the fifty-two-acre plot of ground near Hammond, Louisiana, that was donated to the General Conference in 1967.

A Constitutional Revision will be proposed at the 1974 General Conference regarding Article I, Section 1, Sub-Division (D) dealing with a Board of Benevolence. This is in response to action by the delegates at the 1973 Conference. This proposal will be published and explained prior to Conference.

Harold Doan, Dallas Demmitt, and S. O. Ross were appointed to the program committee for the 1974 General Conference. Any suggestions will be welcome. Please contact any member of the committee, prior to February first.

A very thorough and comprehensive report of the Council of Christian Education was given by the chairman, Eugene Stilson. Much progress has been made in this area in recent months. The Beginners Sunday School Quarterlies are showing some changes as a result of the work of this Council.

The possibility of printing a Church of God Youth Chorus Book was referred to the Youth Advisory Council for their suggestions and recommendations.

The next Board meeting was set for May 2 and 3, 1974.

Conference Finances

The giving for the month of December has not met the goal. We ask that the membership pray about this matter. We hope that the January goals will be met, so that all of the work of the Church of God General Conference can go forward to completion.

Library and Music

The professional minor in Music at OBC is under the leadership of Dale Ramsey. There have been several major accomplishments during the past few years: a music room, a grand piano, choir robes, recording equipment, an annual LP recording, and a bus for tours. Another side to the growth of the music program is an Instructional Media Center. Music students need books, journals, records, tapes, and listening centers for enrichment of classes. A memorial fund will be used to purchase a listening table.

Team Leadership

In today's modern method of teaching, leading, and meeting the needs of children and young people, much emphasis is given to "team teaching." Two or more teachers share the same classroom, pupils, and equipment, but each teacher employs a different approach to teaching the same subject.

Our purpose for this column is not to dwell on the matter of teaching, but on directing and leading the young people of the church and community.

Very often, those charged with responsibility for selecting leaders for the various departments of the church hear: "I would be happy to be youth leader but I simply do not have the time." If this is your problem, why not consider the possibility of having more than one leader. You could designate them as leader and assistant leader or co-youth leaders. The titles make little difference in the results. One may be excellent at presenting God's Word in such a way that it may be easily understood. The other leader may be able to plan and guide social get-togethers, retreats, and conferences, and to do the other things needed to keep young people active and strong—physically and mentally.

The requirements of today's church programs and promotions are much different than they were a few years ago. This does not mean that the doctrines taught have been changed, nor are they to be changed. Few who are now over forty years of age can remember having gone to a summer camp.

We must recognize that learning about God and his creation; Jesus Christ as our personal Savior; the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives; may come about more easily in a controlled social situation than through Bible study alone. Regular, well-planned Bible study periods are not to be eliminated. Christian fellowship, through well-planned and well-supervised and managed social activities also contribute much to spiritual growth. In these, the ones outside the body of Christ may first be made to feel accepted and welcome.

Often, an older person can well fill one of the places of youth leadership. It has been proven that young people do not reject those who are older when they share enthusiasm for and with young people. We may greatly increase the number of young people reached by our church through well-planned youth activities.

Sunday School of the Month

Several times during the past year, a Sunday school has been honored by having its accomplishments recognized in this column. Each, in turn, was designated as "Sunday School of the Month." The following is an account of the efforts put forth by the brethren of the Blanchard Church of God, Blanchard, Michigan, to attain a Rally Day attendance of 201.

The "Break the Record Contest" was a smashing success in the Blanchard Sunday School.

Materials needed for this contest include: 1) a stand in which a 12-inch record can be inserted; 2) records which can be broken; 3) a hammer; and 4) a chart to show the goal for each Sunday.

The contest covered a five-week period. Goals were set for each Sunday, to be raised on each successive Sunday. The goal started at what was about the average attendance, with the hope of reaching a final count which would be approximately a fifty-percent increase.

The first week, all were shocked when a 110 goal was surpassed, with 152 present. The second week, a goal of 125 was smashed when there were 140 in attendance. The next two Sundays had everyone counting twice, as the goal of 140 was passed with 142 present, and a goal of 155 resulted in an attendance of 156. Then the pessimists were really stung, as a seemingly unreachable goal of 175 was crumbled when 201 appeared.

SUCCESSFUL CHURCHES

OW do you measure the success of a church? or, since the two are so closely associated, of its pastor? Do you count the number of people on the membership roll? Is it proper to measure success by attendance records? Is a large and beautiful church plant conclusive evidence that the congregation that worships there is successfully serving the Lord? Is the congregation that provides the most active social life for its members the most successful? Or would it be more practical and to the point to judge success by the balance in the treasury?

It would be more thoroughly in accord with the spirit of Christianity to judge the success of a church by the spiritual lives and attitudes of its members, regardless of the size of the congregation or the monetary value of its place of worship. In theory, at least, we all subscribe to this as the most satisfactory measure of the successful operation of a congregation. Any church that is taking worldly sinners, and being used of the Lord to turn them into devout and faithful workers in his vineyard, is operating successfully. Size, numbers, wealth, or influence are of little value unless the fruits of the spirit are in evidence among the brethren. "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance" (Gal. 5:22, 23). The congregation that fails to bring forth these fruits is a barren vine, and not worthy of its place in the garden of Christ.

In the business world, the enterprise that handles the greatest volume of business and nets the most profit is held to be the most successful. The doctor whose patients include many wealthy people who are able to pay high fees may be regarded by some as being highly successful. The politician who climbs to the

highest office is thought of as successful. The same principle applies in many realms of endeavor. We tend to equate size, or quantity, with success.

It is not surprising that the carnal standards of the world sometimes spill over into the churches. But among truly Christian people, this simply is not true. They have learned to think in terms of spiritual rather than material values.

Obviously, the more people we can persuade to attend the services of our church, the more we can expose to the precious truths of the gospel of Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God. And we find it a reason of great rejoicing that the brethren of the Church of God are proving themselves capable of putting forth heroic efforts to gain this end. For this they are to be highly praised! Many of them are performing this service to the Lord exceptionally well. This is the beginning of their effort, not the end. In and of itself, it is not success. It is, however, a desirable stepping-stone to successful evangelistic efforts.

They understand that even the number of people who have been persuaded to "accept Christ as their personal Savior" (a widely used, but not strictly Biblical term) and be baptized, is not the final measure of the successful ministrations of their church. They know that their success depends upon the spiritual development of these people, as they "grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 3:18).

This can be accomplished quite as successfully in the small congregation as in the larger one. There is no such thing as a small and unimportant congregation. Indeed, in certain respects, such a congregation may enjoy advantages not enjoyed by some of the larger congregations. Though it may be located in an area

where a sparse and scattered population severely limits the potential for numerical growth, a small church may still perform services that are vital to the overall welfare of the Church of God. The very fact that their numbers are small, and that they are not under the strains and stresses that often beset the larger congregations, makes it possible for them to concentrate more on that which is strictly Biblical and spiritual. It has no need for highly organized social endeavors. The members are under little pressure to attend to church functions that are non-essential spritually.

Many of our spiritual leaders received their early training under such conditions. The smaller congregations often make vital contributions to the work of the Church of God as a whole. Neither the small nor the large congregation can say to the other, "I have no need of you." The differing conditions under which they do their work may foster in each spiritual gifts valuable to the other. Together, they form an efficient and effective whole. They are the body of Christ!

Free Literature Campaign

The distribution of literature continues at a rapid pace. Nine thousand *Restitution Heralds* were mailed in December, eighty-five hundred in January, and a like number of the current February issue. Many fine evangelistic and doctrinal tracts are available free for this campaign. See the list on the back of *The Restitution Herald*. We urge each church to plan a distribution campaign, that God's Word may be spread in each community around the world.

Literature in the local dialect is now being provided for most of our mission fields. Bibles are also available in many of the dialects, through the American Bible Society. These are being provided through contributions to the Church of God General Conference.

Home Missions

A handy and useful manual for local mission directors is available through the Church of God General Conference. These are prepared by Sr. Karen Elliott of the Glad Tidings Church of God at Fonthill, Ont., Canada. She is the Missionary Chairman of the local

church there and presented a very informative sharing session on Home Missions at the 1973 General Conference. These manuals were available there. Since conference, a copy has been sent to each church. The manual is entitled, "Missionary Leadership in the Local Church." If any missionary director does not have this manual, please contact the Executive Director, Box 100, Oregon, Ill. 61061, and one will be mailed to you.

The Pleasant Hill Church of God, Pleasant Hill, Ohio, has been approved for the Special Church Aid Program beginning September 1, 1974. The Church of the Open Bible, Pomona, California, was previously approved. One more church could receive this assistance next year under the program adopted by the 1973 delegates.



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Missions News

The picture shows a group from the Edienne, Nigeria, congregation. We note the large number of young men and also many children. There are six congregations holding regular services.

Bro. Ephriam Udo, whose wife has been very ill, writes, "My wife is having some health improvement, but she has not completely recovered. Please continue to pray for her. Pray also for the work here to grow. Our wishes for a Happy New Year to all the members."

A Nigerian conference was held in December. More than three hundred attended. Bro. Udo reports that more would have attended but for the transportation difficulties. The average attendance at worship services at the six churches in November was: 39, 102, 50, 42, 78, and 236, the latter being the newest congregation of Asarama.

Philippine Islands

The youth of the Philippines Church of God met in conference December 30, 31, 1973, at the Uddiawan Church. This date was selected so they could meet and cooperate with the special services held each year on New Year's Eve at the Uddiawan Church.

Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero reports that the radio broadcast is being transferred to a larger station at Cauayan. The air time there will cost twenty dollars per month more than at Tuguegarao. However, the additional coverage will justify the added cost.

Pastor Placido Ortiguero, of the San Nicolas Church, has been holding evangelistic services at a neighboring village, Dalumpinas. The barrio (village) officers in Dalumpinas arranged a debate between Bro. Placido Ortiguero and a pastor of another denomination on the subject, "The True Church Founded by Christ." Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero reports, "A big crowd witnessed FEBRUARY, 1974

the victorious stand of Bro. Placido." Debates are common in the Philippines and are often used as a means of proclaiming the truth of God's Word.

India

A baptismal service was held during the morning worship hour on November 25, 1973. A. M. Johns, Ravi Dass, Bharati Dass, and Malatti Dass, were immersed for the remission of sins by Pastor S. S. Manoah. Bro. Manoah writes: "Please pray for these new converts, that they will have God's guidance as they begin their walk in the light."

November 25 was a big day for the Sunday school children at the Thomas Town Church, as they had special services, with songs and plays in both English and the Tamil language. Prizes were awarded to those who achieved the highest marks in Scripture examinations.

On November 25, 1973, a ground-breaking service was held on the site of the new Church-Medical Building. Bro. Manoah dug the first shovelful, then the engineer and his wife, and then all the members and children took active part. Construction began that day. The plan is that it be completed at least by May first. Bro. Manoah says: "We are thankful to God that our new building is born and that his blessings are always with us. We were able to get the permit for cement and steel, and have received a portion of our quota, so the work can go on. We are continually praying for progress of the construction of our church-clinic building." The construction has been delayed for more than a year, due to some difficulties with the lot, and delays in getting permits for materials.

A Christmas program was held in each congregation. "Eatables" were passed out to everyone at those services. Five hundred seventy-three patients were treated in the medical clinic.

Ghana

Bro. Oliver Amani reports that on December 9, 1973, he had the pleasure to immerse in the waters of baptism Ross Symon Kpolah, Ambrose O. Denteh, Albert Gemowurah, and Stanley O. Nyame. Two of them are instructors in college and the other two are students. We ask your prayers for these new converts. Bro. Amani writes that they are very grateful for the monthly support and for the tracts, Bibles, and supplies we have sent to them.



OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

Bible College Objectives

In the recent Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges convention, attended by the faculty members and board member Charles Pryor, convention participants placed emphasis on the importance of establishing Bible college objectives. Objectives are necessary for curriculum development and planning.

Robert O. Woodburn, academic dean of Washington Bible College, pointed out that because the Bible college is centered on the eternal truth of God's Word, it can set forth its precise objectives publicly, without fear of reprisal. These objectives will give purpose and direction to the college as an educational institution.

Mr. Woodburn continued by saying that objectives must be developed with certain criteria in mind. They must reflect the philosophy of the Bible college. Primarily, these objectives are to be Biblically based and oriented. They must also be theoretically sound. That is, they must reflect the educational principles drawn from Scripture and must be woven into a complete Christian world frame of reference. Third, these objectives must be formulated into something that is operational. The theory must become practical. Then these objectives must be stated in terms of specific behavior changes and, finally, these objectives must be measurable and subject to assessment. There must be clear evidence that the college is doing what it is purporting to do.

As objectives are more particularly related to the college, they must be reflected in the curriculum, giving it direction and providing guidelines for curriculum reform. Objectives also provide for the utilization of institutional resources. They help also in determining course content and provide a basis for curriculum assessment.

The importance of objectives for the Bible college is further evidenced in student life. Dormitory life and all student relationships and organizations are influenced by the objectives of the school. It is the objectives of the Bible college that make it distinctive from other institutions. The student must be aware of this and know exactly where he stands. He must be able to see the objectives reflected in the college philosophy, doctrine, social code, and personal expectations. There should be no question in the mind of the student concerning any of these areas. Objectives promote a sense of student unity and imply a standard of student con-

duct. The Bible college is a truth-oriented institution, with a mission that provides reasonable standards for students to follow. The objectives provide a basis for assessing the quality of student life. The student must feel that the administration is responsive to his needs in the college environment.

As Oregon Bible College continues, we feel the need to articulate, implement, and assess our objectives so that they reflect the precepts of Scripture and fulfill the educational needs of students.

Bible Eschatology

Pastor Hollis Partlowe, of Phoenix, Ariz., will be teaching a special seminar on Bible Eschatology at Oregon Bible College, March 25 through April 5, 1974. The class will meet for two hours each morning and for three evening classes. Bro. Partlowe will be dealing with Biblical prophecy and its relationship to our lives. This is a topic which is extremely relevant and should be of interest in the church. Laymen and pastors are welcome to attend. The cost of tuition is \$40.00.

Junior-Senior Weekend

Plans are already being made at Oregon Bible College for the Junior-Senior Weekend. We invite all high school juniors and seniors of the Church of God to visit the campus May 28 and 29. Young people should contact their church leaders for further information.

Board of Education Meeting

The Board of Education, consisting of Alva Huffer, Vernis Wolfe, Robert Johnson, and Charles Pryor met in Oregon, February 1 and 2, to discuss and plan further development in the Bible College program. William Lawrence is also a member of the Board but was not able to be present. He and Mrs. Lawrence have been traveling in Nigeria and Ghana.

Audio-Visual Teaching and Learning

"The hearing ear, and the seeing eye, the LORD hath made even both of them" (Prov. 20:12).

A proverb attributed to the Chinese has been quoted scores of times to emphasize the importance of audiovisual aids. The proverb asserts that "One picture is worth ten thousand words." The practice of using visual aids is considered as a *must* in the successful teaching of children. It has been proven that the consistent placing before a class of facts and figures, cartoon type figures, pictures, and objects, contributes to making the lesson real and alive to the pupils, and helps to fix it in their minds.

"Audio" and "audience" come from the same root word. The audience hears. "Audio," according to the dictionary, means "to hear." As a teacher talks and explains, people hear through seeing. As an example, let us imagine a picture of an ocean. High waves are depicted as rolling toward the shore. The mind can be made to imagine that the ears are hearing the sound of the waves, just by looking at the picture and hearing it suggested.

Through seeing, there can also be generated a sense of feeling. Suppose we desire to show that the land of Palestine is mountainous. By using a relief map, the journeys of Bible characters who walked through this land can be made to seem more vivid and real.

One of the most commonly used visual aids is the flannelgraph. It may be used to tell stories, help memorize Bible verses, learn songs, and stimulate the imagination. The audio is connected closely with the flannelgraph. Even adults can learn much from visual aids made for children. Maps and charts are recommended for young people and adults. Even when the class is being held in the church sanctuary, it is possible to use such aids. Good portable easels are available that can quickly be put between the pews to support a map, chart, poster, or other illustration of the lesson.

Visual aids require additional effort on the part of the teacher. But the teacher need not make the charts and posters himself. It is a helpful policy to ask talented class members, or others who possess the needed talent, to prepare these aids. This has the additional advantage of keeping them active in the work of the Sunday school. Variety in our lives helps to keep them interesting. The Sunday school teacher should provide variety in teaching the gospel.

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Quezon Church of God, Philippine Islands



Only the Truth--All of the Truth!

An Editorial

SPIRITUALLY, the Church of God is built upon the premise that the Bible is the Word of God. This means, as the Apostle Paul explained to Timothy, that "all scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Tim. 3:16, 17).

The conviction that this is true has made us acutely aware of the warning contained in Revelation 22:18, 19. "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book: and if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book." Whether this was written concerning the Book of Revelation, or the Bible as a whole, is immaterial, since both are inspired of God, and no man has the right to change any of his Words.

We are also mindful of the admonition given to Timothy, but equally applicable to every individual and every organization that uses the Bible as the final authority concerning what is spiritual truth or falsehood. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. But shun profane and vain babblings: for they will increase unto more unqodliness" (2 Tim. 2:15, 16).

The result of the belief of our forefathers that the Bible is all true, and all

important, has been the development of a denomination of careful Bible students, determined to "be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; but speaking the truth in love . . . grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ" (Eph. 4:14, 15). This insistence upon truth, and accuracy in reporting it, has been given priority over every other consideration, even over the popularity and numerical growth of the churches. Many of the doctrines that they found in the Bible were unpopular, but they stubbornly refused to compromise Scriptural truth. Dedicated men founded and carefully nourished congregations that remained small. Pastors worked with these small but devoted congregations because they valued truth more than they valued popular acclaim and high salaries. We owe

It is your editor's belief that God was preparing a small group of truth-loving and consecrated people for the very day in which we now find ourselves living! Time has proven to be false the "private interpretations" (see 2 Pet. 1:19-21) of many who opposed solid Scriptural truth. Those who were deceived into depending upon these private interpretations of Scripture, and who built their lives around these interpretations, are now seeking something solid and permanent upon which they can depend. This is our opportunity to introduce them to the truth of God's Word, and many of the Church of God brethren are enthusiastically taking advantage of it. The truths

that we hold so dear are no longer unpopular, they are only unknown. Many who are now hearing them for the first time are thrilled to learn that they have been taught in the Bible for from two to six thousand years, and once they understand, they accept them readily. Our part is to make sure that as many as possible have an opportunity to hear the truths upon which their eternal welfare depends. Changing times demand no change in the eternal truths that God has given into our keeping. They have stood, and will stand, the test of time. Times change. God's truths, as proclaimed in the Bible, do not. What was true yesterday is still true today. What was false yesterday is still false

Because they believe this, the brethren are making use of every means of communicating the truths of salvation that is open to them. The Church of God may never, in this age, become the largest and most popular denomination in the world. Nor is this necessary for us to enjoy the approval of the Lord. Jesus asks only that when he returns we shall be found diligently laboring in his vineyard.

As we maintain our fidelity to Biblical truth, we will avoid dangerous half-truths. By our faithfulness to Biblical practices, we shall avoid those that appeal to and promote the lusts of the flesh.

To borrow a phrase from the courts of law, we have an inescapable obligation to "tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

We will then feel the satisfaction expressed by Paul, when he said, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase" (1 Cor. 3:6).

These men have come out of the Hindu religion, and are ministering to many people in the Hyderabad area. Bro. S. S. Manoah visits this area on occasion and continues to supervise the work there, although it is seven hundred miles from Bangalore.

Bro. Manoah reports that many activities were held in each of the Bangalore churches during the Christmas season. Many toys were given to the children and seventy-four sarees (women's apparel) were given to the widows and poor ladies of the church. On New Years Eve and New Years Day special services were held. Bro. Manoah writes, "During the holiday season at all the services the churches were overcrowded. The members remembered in prayer all the brothers and sisters at headquarters and all the members of the Church of God General Conference who are encouraging and helping all of our groups in Bangalore."

The construction of the Church-Medical building is progressing well. Nine hundred seventy-four patients were treated in the temporary medical facility during December.

Bring Them In!

How often the great old song containing this message has been sung and enjoyed by many of us. What of the meaning? How often have many of us sung the song without giving deep thought to the intent of the message? Jesus taught in the parable of the Great Supper that people were to be *forced* to come in. The account is recorded both in Matthew and Luke. From Luke we read, "Compel them to come in that my house may be filled" (14:23b). The Diaglott uses the word "constrain," and the New English Bible says "make them come in." All of these translations indicate action on the part of those who know the gospel, to cause others to be brought in to hear it.

Contests and promotions are used by many Sunday schools and churches as aids to increase attendance. Some feel that this is a poor way to get others to come into contact with the gospel. Would it be amiss to suppose that many who believed on Jesus may have first eaten of the bread and fishes? Could some of them have been healed when "as many as came unto him were healed"?

It seems reasonable that contests and attendance promotions should be more than just occasions on which to give out awards and prizes. The purpose should be to get more people into the house of the Lord. Those who promote the program should feel that they have reward enough when they are able to see the results. The goal should be to bring glory and honor to God—not to receive a prize.

To provide incentives for the pupils and teachers is good. To rule them out would be unwise. The Pennellwood Church of God Sunday school has had an active program in operation for months. A Teacher of the Month is honored. The goal to be sought depends on both pupils and teachers. Attendance increase is based on the class, and each member is involved. The "reward," basically, is to accomplish growth in attendance, both for Sunday school and worship services. Glad Tidings Chapel, Dayton, Ohio, is taking the teaching staff out to a dinner, and providing a special speaker for the evening. Glad Tidings Sunday School, Fonthill, Ont., began a contest on February 24. The theme is: "Telling more in '74." Promotions bring about interest. It is highly commendable to work hard and long for our God. Bring them in! Compel them to come in! Make them come!



The Wheat -- Not the Tares

An Editorial

VERY Bible-reading Christian is familiar with the parable that we call "The Parable of the Tares." In this parable, Jesus declared: "The kingdom of heaven is likened unto a man which sowed good seed in his field: but while men slept, his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat, and went his way" (Matt. 13:24, 25).

We will not dwell on tares, except to point out that they are generally identified as belonging to the family of weeds which a farmer knows as "darnel." The seeds are often poisonous to human beings on account of the parasitic growths that they contain. For this reason, it is still a common practice to carefully separate them from the wheat (which they closely resemble in their early stages of growth) and from other grain that is intended for human consumption.

In Jesus' parable, as soon as the tares became identifiable, the workers asked the owner of the field if they should pull them up. The answer was, "Nay; lest while ye gather up the tares, ye root up also the wheat with them" (v. 29).

Explaining the significance of this parable to his disciples, Jesus told them: "He that soweth the good seed is the Son of man; the field is the world; the good seed are the children of the kingdom; but the tares are the children of the wicked one; the enemy that sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; and the reapers are the angels.

"As therefore the tares are gathered and burned in the fire; so shall it be in the end of this world. The Son of man shall send forth his angels, and they shall gather out of his kingdom all things that offend, and them which do iniquity; and shall cast them into a furnace of fire: there shall be wailing and gnashing of teeth.

"Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Who hath ears to hear, let him hear" (vv. 37-43).

This parable could just as aptly be called "The Parable of the Wheat." Indeed, the tares and their destruction are only incidental to the harvest of the wheat. The primary purpose is the gathering of the good wheat into the barn of the owner, where they shall "shine forth as the sun in the kingdom of their Father."

Paul gave to Timothy a list of signs that will identify the "last days." But he warned Timothy to beware of becoming so bemused with the evils, and so preoccupied with trying to root them out that he neglected that which was his own responsibility. He could safely leave the rooting out of the tares to the angels at the end of the age. His advice to Timothy (and to every Christian) was: "But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them . . . All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (vv. 14-17).

The Message for Us

The zeal with which the Church of God is not only broadcasting the seed of the gospel, but is also carefully guarding and nourishing the developing seedlings, is the mark of a maturing church. We are avoiding the temptation to focus our attention on the tares, leaving the wheat at the

blurry edge of the picture. Instead, we are concentrating upon improving both the quality and the quantity of the wheat. We firmly believe that this is the correct procedure. Somewhere in our recent reading we ran across the following statement, or one very much like it. "It would seem reasonable to assume that the Divine Farmer will determine the time of harvest by the maturity of the wheat rather than by the progress of the tares."

Source of Seed

Someone has pointed out that it is not the shepherd who bears the lambs, but the sheep. The same principle holds true in the realm of vegetation. Future crops must of necessity spring from the fruitage of previous generations of the same species

The only way that your church and mine can possibly plant the fruits of faith in the lives of others is to first bring them to maturity in our own lives. We are the source of the seeds that must be the genesis of future crops.

An important indicator of our maturity is a growing concern with the quality of the seed that we are sowing in the lives of others, and the loving care with which we are caring for and nourishing growing and developing seedlings. This is to be observed in the increased interest in sowing the seed and also in the effort that we make to insure that it is fed the pure truths of God's Word, Literature, Bible classes, youth camps, radio broadcasts, missionary efforts, and home evangelism are all being developed for the sake of the wheat. Truly, there is an abundance of tares in the field. The angels will deal with the tares in due time. Our concern is with the wheat!

Annual General Conference

Literature

Literature distribution continues at a rapid pace. Two hundred fifty thousand tracts and forty-five thousand copies of *The Restitution Herald* have been printed in the first five months of this current fiscal year. Many are taking the Free Systematic Bible Study Course of twenty-nine lessons. The printed Word is going out. Many churches and individuals are taking hold during this Free Literature Campaign and we praise God for this effort. We are happy that the membership of the Church of God General Conference is doing its part to help fulfill Matthew 24:14, which

says, "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached [Diag., published] in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."

The cost of providing these free materials will exceed the amount placed in the budget. The cost of free literature during the first four months of the fiscal year is more than ten thousand dollars. Twenty thousand dollars was the total amount budgeted for the year, so the cost is exceeding the budget. We are thankful that the needs are being met by a dedicated membership.

Annual Ministerial Conference

The Annual Church of God Ministers Conference will be held in Oregon, Ill., April 29-May 3, 1974. This is a time of study, fellowship, and spiritual uplift for ministers attending. Consequently it becomes of great benefit to the local churches as the pastors return inspired and refreshed. We trust that each church will encourage and assist its pastor to attend. Travel expenses are pooled to even out the cost. Pastors from a general area are encouraged to travel together to hold down the pool expense.

Conference Finances

I am pleased to report that the goals for giving for the month of March have been met. The Staff, the Board of Directors, and I express our thanks and appreciation to the membership for consistently meeting current needs.

Due to increased costs for food, postage, and other current expenses, it is quite possible that total expenses will exceed the amount placed in the annual budget. We will make every effort to keep within the budget when possible. The Lord has richly blessed the membership of the Church of God General Conference over the years. May we give him thanks and pray for his continued blessings and direction in all that is done.

Trip Report by Sr. Mardy Lawrence

As secretary of the Church of God General Conference Mission Board, I, together with my husband Dr. William Lawrence, returned early in February from a visit to our mission fields in Nigeria and Ghana. We carried greetings of the Church of God General Conference to seven churches in Nigeria and one in Ghana as one of the purposes of the trip. For some time the mission board has felt that it was important that this area in Africa be visited by qualified General Conference workers.

My husband and I evaluated the progress of the General Conference efforts, the needs of the leaders, the needs of the people, particulars of how we can help, and restrictions on imports. We also investigated the relationships and anticipated future relations between American-sponsored Christian churches and/or schools and the Nigerian and Ghana governments.

We feel that the trip was very successful in accomplishing its purpose. It was certainly a fascinating trip, although at times a most difficult one. We are very appreciative of all the prayers that were offered on our behalf while on the trip.

We will show colored slides and give a full report on the trip at the annual Church of God General Con-APRIL, 1974 ference on Wednesday evening, August 14, at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa.

Mexico Trip

It was the privilege of the writer to visit Mexico in February. I flew to Monterey. There Bro. Dean Moore met me and we traveled in his Econoline Van to our mission stations in Labor Vieja, Potosi, and Saltillo. We carried our own food and water.

We enjoyed a time of rich fellowship with the brethren in Mexico. Bro. Moore acted as interpreter and guide, having been a General Conference missionary in Mexico for several years.

We find the work in Labor Vieja becoming much more stable under the leadership of Bro. Roberto Badillo. They have a fine new block church building, and more people are becoming interested in the gospel of salvation.

There is much building and expansion going on in the city of Saltillo. This appears to be a fruitful field for future missionary development. Bro. and Sr. Francisco Martinez are presently working in the village of Potosi, where many children are coming to Sunday school. The adults of the community seem to lack spiritual interest.

We ask for your prayers for Bros. Badillo and Martinez and their families, and for God's rich blessings on the mission work in Mexico.



The picture shows Oliver and Comfort Amani of Ghana. Pastor Amani is leader of the Church of God mission work in Ghana. He is thirty years old and a dedicated servant of the Lord. He had a very serious accident in a taxi two years ago when three were killed and another permanently injured. Bro. Amani was nearly decapitated but after many months in the hospital has fully recovered with only a large scar on the neck. He is sure the Lord spared him for a special work and he is completely dedicated to the service of the Lord.

The main mission thrust in Ghana is in the village of Nkwanta, where services are held in a rented hall. Thirty-six have been baptized here. Bro. Amani goes to many villages around the area to preach and teach, and has had a number of converts in these villages.

Bro. Amani has started a secondary school and has fifty students. He conducts a well-disciplined school. Many parents prefer it over other schools which are often too rowdy. Commercial and general education courses are taught in addition to religious courses.

Philippine Islands

Bro. Estifanio Sibayan, who has done the major part of the radio ministry for several months, is now ill with a heart ailment. We ask your prayers for his recovery. Bro. Eleodoro Javar, a very eloquent speaker, is now giving the radio messages.

The construction of the Quezon church building has begun. Mission Builders Appeal number thirty-one is for the cost of this building. Building costs continue to rise in the Philippines, as elsewhere, and the total cost will exceed the estimates. If you have not yet sent in

Berean Scripture Studies Number Two

Plans for developing a set of fifty-two lessons for another *Berean Scripture Studies* book are advancing well. Book One of this series was printed in the fall of 1972. It has been widely used.

This second book will contain several lessons that pertain to our time and the prevailing social conditions. Several Church of God brethren have been asked to prepare lessons. This will represent the composite thinking and views of our congregations.

Approximately one hundred seventy-five copies of Book One are still available. More can be ordered to meet any future demand. Book Two should be ready for sale by January 1, 1975.

Berean Youth Conference and Quizzing

Bulletins from several sources make it evident there is much interest in the quiz program for 1974. The quiz will be based on 1 Thessalonians, 2 Thessalonians, and Titus. Most district and state conferences will conduct play-offs for the purpose of selecting an all-star team to represent them at the Berean Youth Conference. This leads to exciting times, not only at the Youth Conference, but in the weeks prior to it which are given to preparation.

A new electronic system is being developed for use at the Youth Conference. It consists of a device to be held in the hands of the quizzers. The system will have six buzzers, one for each member of the teams. No group will be permitted to employ such a device for practice before attending the Youth Conference. Since it is not possible for every group to have one, it is fair that none shall have the advantage of previous practice with this system.

A Successful Sunday School

What is the measurement by which you determine whether or not your Sunday school is successful? Is it a most wonderful pastor? a Sunday school superintendent who is active and conscientious? liberal giving to the Mission Department of our General Conference? an exceptional building which provides adequate facilities for Sunday school work? a large membership roll? These items, and others, could be standards by which you measure the success of your Sunday school.

What do you mean when you use the word "success" in discussing Sunday schools? The degree to which the real purpose of the Sunday school is being accomplished is the true measure of its success. This purpose cannot be different from that of the church and its pastor. This purpose, of course, is to assure that those attending the Sunday school hear the Word of God—to be certain that they receive the truth.

John set forth an effective gauge of the success or failure of any Christian teaching unit. "I rejoiced greatly that I found thy children walking in truth, as we have received a commandment from the Father" (2 John 4). "I have no greater joy than to hear that thy children walk in truth" (3 John 4).

Any business measures its accomplishments by the success of its products. The public measures them by the degree to which they justify advertising claims.

In the same way, a successful Sunday school must deliver the benefits that it claims to produce. Its members must measure up to the standard of God's Word by knowing the truth. If the members are being brought to a knowledge of God's Word through the Sunday school, and are obeying it, the Sunday school is operating successfully.

The measure of the success of a Sunday school is greatly affected by conditions in the homes of its members. The quality of the home, in turn, may be greatly altered by the influence of the Sunday school. Does your Sunday school teach principles that tend to upgrade the quality of the homelife of its members?

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

At the 1973 delegate sessions, the following motion was duly passed, "That the Board of Directors be instructed to make a study, or appoint a committee, to research the need and advisability of implementing Section 1, paragraph (D) of Article I of the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference. Further, if such a study reveals the need of organizing a Board of Benevolence, initial guidelines of the nature and scope of the work be included in the report."

Article I, Section 1, Paragraph (D) By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference now reads

"That a board of benevolence be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise."

The Board of Directors has given study to this matter. Notice is hereby given that it will be proposed to the delegates of the 1974 Church of God General Conference that the above described Paragraph (D) be deleted from the By-Laws.

Explanation: This section of the By-Laws sets out the Purposes of the Church of God General Conference. Paragraph (D) does not seem to be one of the Purposes of the Conference.

Ministering to individual needs appears to be a Biblical requirement that can best be met at the level of the local church as the need arises. If and when a need should arise for the Church of God General Conference to act, it appears that the Board of Directors already has authority to do so. Article II, Section 6 (Duty of the Officers) Paragraph (H) states: "To do any other necessary act for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the Church of God General Conference"



Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

Theme: Tell the Good News!

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors on May 2, 1974. The report is presented here so delegates to the 1974 General Conference business session (Aug. 12-17, 1974, Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa) can become familiar with it and can be instructed by their church or state conference regarding same.

This report covers the first eight months of the current fiscal year. Oral reports will be given at Conference on activities that occur in the interim. The progress and activities of the several departments are reported herein, with some comments on the work as a whole.

The buildings and all physical facilities of the Conference are in excellent condition. We are thankful to Bro. Clement Richey, Superintendent of Maintenance, for his fine work in this area.

The General Conference staff members continue to assemble in the College Chapel each Monday at 1:00 p.m. for a joint prayer service. These sessions are a spiritual blessing to the staff. We urge the membership to pray with us each Monday at this hour.

The Church of God General Conference as a whole is showng much progress. The Free Literature Campaign continues to be a blessing to those who use this avenue to share and it is bringing the message of salvation to many. We are thankful to God and praise his name for his blessings and direction in all the activities of the various departments of the Conference.

Berean Youth Department

This report begins as of June, 1973. During this month, the "inner-city" Senior Caravan met in Grand Rapids, Mich., and spent ten days handing out literature and witnessing of their Christian faith to many on the streets. Bro. Kent Ross, pastor of the Pennellwood Church of God was their sponsor. That church acted as host to six team members. One cannot accurately assess the face value of such a venture. The Word was distributed and God will bless it.

The Junior Caravan, under the sponsorship of Bro. Carl Jennings, a student of Oregon Bible College, visited churches in South Bend, Ind., Michigan State, Graytown, Wis., Minneapolis and Litchfield, Minn., and the Minnesota Junior Youth Camp. The Caravan was in the youth camp during the entire week of camping. The Caravan members helped as junior counselors, assisted with classes, with recreation, and with the evening services.

The most important part of the Berean Youth Fellowship program is the Youth Conference. The 1973 Conference had the largest attendance ever. A total of 344 campers and 43 staff members filled Camp Mack to capacity. The Youth Conference orogram is designed first of all to teach Bible truths. In addition, ime is given for much fellowship and recreation. Much emphasis is placed on being followers of Jesus Christ. Youth Conference leaders, and many of the older campers, do not hesitate to

encourage those not in the church to accept Jesus as their personal Savior. As a result, twenty-four young people responded to the gospel invitation. Several of the candidates were baptized at camp and the others at their home churches. The young people of the Church of God, especially those who attended Youth Conference, are to be commended for their giving. More than \$1,700.00 was contributed during the six-day Youth Conference of 1973.

According to all reports received, Youth Week for 1973 was very successful. Faith Chapel Bereans of East Peoria, Ill., won the first place "traveling trophy." The Blanchard, Mich., Church of God Bereans won second place. This is also a "traveling trophy."

The Midwinter Retreat, held at Camp Mack December 29 through January 1, was the fifth annual meeting of post-high young people. There were 43, plus a staff of 3, attending. It was the largest and the best ever held.

A new approach to raising the Berean budget, which is a definite part of the General Conference budget, was accepted by the Youth Conference delegates. The budget was divided into different portions which are raised by allocation and the remainder was divided by the number of young people on the *Challenge* mailing list. This, in turn, was proportioned to each district or state conference. Many Berean groups have already contributed their portion for the year.

International Communion Sunday and International Prayer Day have become very meaningful to the Bereans. The Communion Sunday was November 25, 1973, and Prayer Day was March 24, 1974. This has done much to encourage each Berean to think of others.

Publications of the Department are: Challenge, edited by Bro. Kent Ross; Junior Berean Lesson Manual, edited by Bro. Edward Bender; the Youth Leaders Memo and other literature necessary for the promotion of the work.

Plans have been completed to use two camps, operating concurrently, for the 1974 BYF Youth Conference. Camp Mack will be occupied by those young people entering eighth grade through eleventh grade. Shipshewana Retreat Center, about 30 miles distant from Camp Mack, will be used by those entering twelfth grade through age 25. Due to rising food costs, the camps were forced to raise their prices. Therefore, camp tuition for this year is \$43.00.

Beginning September 1, 1974, Bro. Hugh Harman, formerly of Tempe, Ariz., will assume the duties of Youth Director. The Harmans will make their home in Oregon. Bro. Harman has worked on the Youth Conference staff, and is known to many of the young people.

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department of the Church of God General Conference has been very busy this year! We are happy to report that the brethren have been making enthusiastic use of the

Free Literature Campaign. The figures involved tell an interesting story. The month-by-month distribution of *Restitution Heralds*, beginning with last September, is as follows:

In addition, 250,000 pieces of other literature have been printed and made available to the brethren for free distribution.

No less important is the fact that consecrated efforts are being made to reevaluate and upgrade our quarterlies, vacation Bible school material, and other literature. This is not to fault the literature already in use, but to profit from what we have learned along the way. Your constructive criticisms are most valuable to this effort. Make your suggestions directly to the editors of the various publications.

In our estimation, the increased distribution of literature has benefits that go beyond the innate value of the literature and its message. Through it, the Lord is saying to each of us, "Don't ever say that there is nothing that you can do to help to spread the gospel of salvation." We can distribute literature, even though we have difficulty in expressing ourselves orally, or feel shy about talking to strangers. Even those who cannot walk can still put tracts in their letters, or hand them directly to their friends.

The printed Word never loses its strength. The literature that we hand out may still, should the Lord tarry, be influencing the eternity of others long after we have been put in the grave to await the returning of the Lord. Each piece of literature that you hand out is potentially a vital influence upon the eternal future of others. This service is important!

For these reasons, we are doing our best to insure that the literature made available for this purpose is both factual and inspirational. It must express eternal truths and values. The methods of telling them may change with time, but the truths themselves never change. There is no limit to how long a piece of literature may last, or how far it may travel.

The cost of literature distribution has gone beyond the amount of money budgeted for the purpose, but you have un-

complainingly met the rising costs, and have continued to intensify the use of the literature. For this we thank God! We may be assured that if we offer our Heavenly Father nothing but our best, he will bestow his best upon us!

Sunday School Department

Bro. Francis E. Burnett assumed the directorship of this department beginning in September. It has been on a part-time basis, since he is also director for the Youth Department. There has been quite a lot of activity in the department and much has been accomplished. The Director is chairman of the Sunday School Board and its members are: Scott Ross, Robert Petry, Joyce Knapp, and James Graham. This Board met in Oregon, Ill., on Saturday, September 29, 1973. At this time, all of the Sunday School Quarterly editors were asked to meet with the Board that a better and more thorough understanding of their work might be understood by all. Others invited to meet during the time with the editors were: Bros. S. O. Ross, Executive Director; J. R. LeCrone, Editor of Publications; and Eugene Stilson, chairman of the Council of Christian Education. All agreed it was a profitable and rewarding meeting.

The Board met again in South Bend, Ind., on Saturday, January 26, 1974. Bro. S. O. Ross met with the members for the purpose of all considering some applications for the position of Director which had been submitted. One of the important matters in the January meeting was the arranging for a Sunday School Seminar held in conjunction with other studies in the Spring Session of Oregon Bible College. The Sunday School Board has been urging this kind of training for the past two or three years. The Seminar subjects are taught by Oregon Bible College staff members: John Lewis, Eugene Stilson, and S. O. Ross.

The Department continues to encourage the use of a tap ministry and teacher training aids. The tapes were listed in the April, 1973, Sunday School News. Any information on these can be obtained by writing the Sunday School Department. The Sunday School Monthly is printed about the 15th of the month and mailed to all superintendents and pastors. There is also a Continual Teacher Training guide sheet printed each month and mailed to any who request it. It has a Leader's Guide sheet and one for a teacher's use. There are approximately 45 on the mailing list at the present time.

At the Board meeting held on May 7, the Quarterly editors again met with the Board members. Other items of business were: 1) final preparation for the Sunday School session during the 1974 General Conference, 2) ideas and promotional thoughts for the coming year.

The Director held evangelistic meetings at the Morning Star and Brush Creek Churches of God in October and November. He was also guest speaker and teacher for the Michigan State Conference, Grand Rapids, from February 27 through March 2, 1974. Special emphasis was given to the Sunday school. The Director and his wife Iris held a Sunday School Seminar of four sessions on April 19 and 20, 1974, at Raymore, Mo. There have been several letters of inquiry which have been answered and some materials sent out. The Director is also responsible for the Sunday School News in *Progress Journal*.

Mission Department

The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference is made up of the following members: Mardy Lawrence, M. A. Patrick, Lee McQuinn, Robert Hall, and S. O. Ross, Superintendent of Missions. They meet several times during the year to

give study to the mission work of the Church of God General Conference and to make recommendations in the area of Missions.

The Philippine Island mission field continues to grow. A new church building is being constructed in Quezon with assistance from Mission Builders Appeal number thirty-one. The radio broadcasts are now coming over a station in Cauayan, one of the largest in Northern Luzon. Three congregations have been started as a direct result of the radio ministry. There are ten churches holding regular services each week. Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero continues to give good leadership to the Philippine mission work.

The church-medical building in Bangalore, India, is nearing completion. A medical clinic is already in operation in a rented building. About one thousand patients are seen each month. The cost of the clinic operation is about one hundred fifty dollars per month. This amount is supplied by a family outside the Church of God.

Church services are held regularly in four locations in Bangalore in addition to Sunday school classes in other areas. Bro. and Sr. S. S. Manoah are giving excellent leadership and direction to all of the work of the Church of God in India. They are working closely with Bro. P. M. Paulson and his five congregations in Hyderabad, in inner India.

Bro. S. O. Ross, together with Bro. Dean Moore, visited the Mexico mission field in February. The work in the village of Labor Vieja is going well under the leadership of Bro. and Sr. Roberto Badillo. The Mission Board recently approved the reassignment of Bro. and Sr. Francisco Martinez. They had been working in the village of Potosi for several months with little success. They are now in the city of Saltillo, working in a new housing area. Sisters Alice Aldrich and Mary Jo Brewer will be in Mexico this summer conducting vacation Bible schools in both Labor Vieja and Saltillo and giving general assistance to the mission work there. The Mission Board is recommending that Sr. Aldrich remain in Mexico as a missionary for the next year.

Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence visited the mission fields in Nigeria, Ghana, and Liberia and were much impressed in each place. Bro. Oliver Amani in Ghana is holding services each week in the village of Nkwanta and also holds evangelistic services in the surrounding villages. Many have been immersed in the waters of baptism through these efforts. Bro. Amani has opened a secondary school and has fifty students.

The Nigerian work is under the leadership of Bros. Ephriam Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John Obott. Services are held in six villages. The largest congregation is in Asarama with nearly three hundred members.

The mission work in Liberia, under Bro. Cornelius Boykai, has been the mission effort of the Northeast Conference. Bro. Boykai is a registered nurse and conducts a clinic. A medical building and a church building are now under construction. The church services are bearing fruit, as over twenty were baptized there in February.

The Lighthouse Mission Church of God in Digby, Nova Scotia, is under the leadership of Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown. Sr. Eunice Pearson, a layworker from Dayton, Ohio, is giving much good assistance to the work there. A five-week canvass was held in the month of March. Each home in the city of Digby was visited, with literature, each week. In April, eight hundred copies of *The Restitution Herald* were distributed to the homes in the city.

Eight churches are able to have full-time pastorates this year, with assistance provided through the Pastoral Aid Program. Two JUNE, 1974

churches are being constructed this year with the help of the Mission Builders League of the Church of God General Conference. These churches are at Quezon, in the Philippine Islands, and the North Hills Church of God, near Springfield, Ohio.

The Free Literature Distribution Campaign continues to be a tremendous outreach both in the Home and Foreign Mission fields. Many members have become more involved through the use of literature. Many inquiries continue to come in to our General Conference headquarters as a result of literature. These inquiries come from many countries of the world, in addition to the United States and Canada, asking to know more about the Church of God and its teachings.


Many churches and individuals are holding Home Bible Studies. Through these classes, and the many who are taking the Free Systematic Bible Study Course, the Word of God is being presented to many people. Our prayer is that the Lord will continue to bless the efforts of missions and evangelism through the Church of God General Conference.

Oregon Bible College

Oregon Bible College is completing its thirty-fifth year as the institution of higher education for the Church of God General Conference. It is dedicated to the task of preparing men and women to present the gospel message to the whole world. We have had another wonderful year at the College. College visitors tell us that they are impressed with our excellent student body, characterized by an atmosphere of dedication to the Scriptures and spiritual ideals.

The 1973-74 academic year began with 54 students: 34 were returning students and 20 were freshmen. Fifty-one students were enrolled for the second semester. College Commencement was held May 24, 1974, with John R. Lewis as the special speaker selected by the graduating class. Four seniors were graduated: Bruce Burnside; Benjamin Mattison; Robert Storts; and Samuel Voorhies. The total number of OBC graduates is now 134: 118 men and 16 women.

Benjamin Mattison, having completed his graduation requirements in December, participated in the Graduate Internship Program of OBC in Arizona during the second semester. He had pastoral courses and practical pastoral experience working with

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

the Arizona pastors, Warren Sorenson and Hollis Partlowe. He took two courses at Arizona State University and one course at Mesa College. He had Pastoral Counseling classes with Dallas Demmitt and attended many professional seminars in the Phoenix area. Benjamin Mattison will become pastor of the Morning Star Church in South Bend, Ind., this fall.

Administration and faculty during the year included: Alva G. Huffer, president; John R. Lewis, administrative vice-president and registrar; Stanley O. Ross, director of business affairs; Eugene E. Stilson; Dale F. Ramsey; Dallas R. Demmitt; Hollis A. Partlowe; and Ruth Donaldson, who taught English I and II.

Dallas Demmitt was special speaker for Christian Emphasis Week, October 8-12, taught a seminar course on Enriching Family Life, had a counseling seminar for the freshmen, and had individual sessions with students at various times during the year. During the first week of the Spring Session, he taught another seminar course on Psychology of Effective Living.

Hollis Partlowe taught a special course in Bible Eschatology, March 25 - April 5. This two-semester-hours course involved a study of major Bible topics relating to God's plan for the future, including the second coming of Christ and his future kingdom on earth.

During the second semester, Alva Huffer, College president, taught the course, History of Western Civilization I. He taught this three-semester-hours course utilizing our College "block plan" of class scheduling, wherein the class meets two periods each day, five days each week for five weeks. He also had sessions in a course, Audiovisual Slide Production Project. Eugene Stilson, assisted by students, constructed a temporary Audiovisual Laboratory Workshop in the basement of the men's dorm.

As campus administrator, John Lewis is in complete charge of the campus when the president is not in Oregon. Faculty, dorm directors, and staff members are directly responsible to him. He oversees the general counseling of students. Dale Ramsey was director of the men's dorm; Mary Krogh was director of the women's dorm. Seven girls were housed in the women's dorm annex. Inez Gordon served as house mother for these girls until November. The girls were housed in the home of Mr. and Mrs. David Krogh.

Sydney Kirkpatrick was president of the Student Council.

Bruce Burnside was chairman of the Social Committee. Michael Berry was president of the Mission Fellowship Activity. Deborah Burnett was editor of the Student Voice. Special OBC Days of Prayer were held November 6 and January 31. The Junior and Senior Weekend was held March 28-29, with the larges attendance thus far: 58 juniors and seniors and 18 counselors, making a total of 76 visitors.

An important area of growth for the College has been the development of our Music Department, under the direction of Dale Ramsey. Having his B.S. degree in music, he is making excellent progress toward completing his Master of Arts degree in music at Northern Illinois University. At OBC, Dale Ramsey teaches: Introduction to Music, Church Music, Music Fundamentals, Choir, OBC Chorale, Brass Ensemble, as well as individual instruction in Piano, Organ, and Voice. He was also in charge of Gospel Teams and other special student service groups.

The OBC Chorale presented at least 46 sacred concerts during the year, in local churches, before high school and college assemblies, on television, and in churches in various parts of the United States and Canada. The OBC Choir presented at least 15 sacred concerts during the year. All students have the opportunity to be on a gospel team. Some students serve as student pastors on a regular basis for local churches.

The number of volumes in our College Library is now 9,000. The College thanks its many friends who are responding in its campaign for special contributions to purchase additional books for the OBC Library. The Library needs funds to purchase basic reference works and up-to-date books relating to courses being taught, as well as visual education materials. Eugene Stilson is library director.

Eugene Stilson continues to make progress toward acquiring an additional graduate degree, the Master of Arts in Bible and Theology, from Wheaton College. Plans for the College include adding another faculty member with a Master Degree in Biblical Studies in the near future. Plans for the College also include the development of our Department of Christian Education and Evangelism, with a faculty member in charge. With a specialist in charge of this department, the College could continue to enrich its curriculum in this area as it prepares pastors for their relation to education in local churches and Sunday school teachers and administrators for their positions. The College is seeking to add a new faculty member who will be in charge of this department.

The Board of Education consists of the president of the College, Alva G. Huffer, as chairman, and four other members, each appointed for a term of two years, by the Board of Directors. The current appointed members are: Robert D. Johnson; William D. Lawrence; Charles Pryor; and Vernis D. Wolfe. John R. Lewis, administrative vice-president, attends meetings also. This Board acts in an advisory and promotional capacity and makes recommendations regarding the College to the Board of Directors, the governing board of the College. The Board of Education met in August, January, and April.

The Church of God General Conference, by maintaining and promoting Oregon Bible College, enables many persons to gain an increased knowledge of God's Word, to experience spiritual growth, and to prepare for Christian service.

General Services

The Church of God General Conference staff members per form many services in addition to the departmental activities covered in the preceding reports. Staff members often fill pulpits when local pastors are on vacation or are ill. They are also available for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, and other activities.

Your Executive Director is available to give assistance in finding replacements for vacant pulpits. He has pertinent information on the pastors and their families, and usually knows when a pastor may be available for a "call." Churches seeking pastors are encouraged to contact the Executive Director for help in this area. He is also responsible for the administration of the Ministers Insurance program and the Ministers Retirement program. He is required to complete many forms and questionnaires for information from various governmental, civic, and religious agencies. He is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of all properties, for the management of the day-to-day business, and generally supervises all the work of the Church of God General Conference.

The department heads and staff workers of the Church of God General Conference covet your prayers, encouragement, criticism, and concern as they endeavor to carry out the policies and programs that the delegates set out for them to accomplish.

General Conference Finances

We are pleased that the Goals for Giving for the first half of the fiscal year have been met. The programs for this current year require the largest budget ever for the Church of God General Conference. The membership has responded to the needs.

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the sacrificial giving of many. Faith Promise services, total involvement through the Literature programs, and regular dedicated giving by the membership have combined to meet the needs of the expanded work of the Church of God General Conference. We express our thanks and appreciation to each one who is concerned about the work of the General Conference and who has helped to meet these needs. We know that Jesus is coming soon. We need to continue to be diligent in our efforts to preach, teach, and publish the truths of God's Word, that many who are dying without Christ may have opportunity to know him before God sends him back to this earth to set up his kingdom. May we all be found busy in the vineyard when Jesus comes.

Recommendations for 1974-75

1) We recommend that *The Restitution Herald* be continued indefinitely as a part of the Free Literature Program.

Explanation: The Restitution Herald has been a part of the Free Literature program the past two years. About ten thousand are reading this fine paper each month as compared to twenty-three hundred when it was by subscription. We feel that the effort of spreading the message of salvation through this media of the written Word should continue indefinitely.

2) We recommend that Sr. Alice Aldrich be sent to Mexico as a missionary, beginning September 1, 1974.

Explanation: Sr. Aldrich was a missionary in Mexico for a few years. We feel there is a need for her direction and assistance in this field. She will give needed help in the area of teaching, material preparation, and in doctrinal stability.

3) We recommend that Solomon Idiong of Nigeria be brought to Oregon Bible College to finish his training and graduate, and that his wife accompany him here.

 $\it Explanation:$ There is a need to provide more sound theological leadership to the expanding mission work in Nigeria. We feel

that one of the leaders should be a graduate of Oregon Bible College to assure this spiritual stability.

4) We recommend that Article I, Section 1, Paragraph (D) By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference be deleted.

Explanation: This paragraph under the purposes of the Church of God General Conference reads: "That a board of benevolence be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise." It does not appear that this is one of the purposes of the General Conference.

Ministering to individual needs can best be done on a local church basis. If and when such a need may arise for the Church of God General Conference to act, it appears that the Board of Directors already has authority to do so. Article II, Section 6, Paragraph (H) under Duty of the Officers states, "To do any other necessary act for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the Church of God General Conference."

5) We recommend that, in light of the current institutional study made by the Board of Education of Oregon Bible College, Oregon Bible College remain in Oregon, Ill., for the immediate future, with the understanding that additional buildings be erected in such a way that options are kept open so that campus facilities could be sold in the future, if so desired.

Explanation: The Board of Education of Oregon Bible College is conducting an in-depth study of all phases of the College operation. This recommendation is a result of that study.

6) We recommend that a structure be erected by September, 1975, in Oregon, Ill., to provide better housing for female students at Oregon Bible College.

We further recommend that the new building be designed in such a way that it could be sold readily in the future if it were so desired and be easily converted into a condominium, townhouses, or a series of apartments. It should be built in such a way that additional units could be added as needed.

Explanation: The present Women's Residence is the former Golden Rule Home and is one hundred sixteen years old. It is not large enough to house the present female students.

In designing the new building, primary consideration will be given to meeting the housing needs of the students and a dorm director and to providing for adequate student lounge facilities. The new building should be attractive and be congruent with a long-range development of an adequate campus. The 1973-74 school year found the largest number of female students ever at Oregon Bible College.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Ministers' Fund

The Ministers' Fund of the Church of God General Conference is used for loans or gifts to ministers, or their families, in times of emergency. The fund is supported entirely by special contributions.

At the last annual report, total assets in the fund were \$511.31. The present balance is \$666.50. Two are receiving monthly assistance from this fund in the total amount of \$600.00 a year. There are no outstanding loans at this time. I want to express thanks to those who made special contributions during the past year to keep the fund solvent. We urge more contributions, that this emergency fund for ministers may grow.

The Ministers' Fund is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon Churches, the Dean of Students of Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference.

License and Ordination Committee

The names of one hundred seventeen licensed ministers of the Church of God General Conference were published in the November, 1973, issue of *Progress Journal*. To this list, we must add the names of three who failed to get their applications in on time, making a total of one hundred twenty. Since then, the name of Bro. Daniel Fyfe has been added to the list, since he asked for, and was granted, a license. Two graduating Oregon Bible College students will be interviewed for possible licensing in May.

During the General Conference session in August of 1973, Bro. Z. B. Duncan, Bro. James D. Ritch, and Bro. Dennis Baldwin were ordained. It is our hope that other ministers will feel led to follow their example.

We would once more remind the ministers that their ministerial license must be renewed annually. If proposed guidelines are approved, this will no longer be necessary for those who are ordained. In the meantime, be sure to mail your application promptly. Your recognition card will be handed to you at the General Conference session in August or, if you are not there, it will be mailed to you after the Conference is over.

The names of graduating seniors of Oregon Bible College who were interviewed and approved in March were reported in the June, 1973, issue of *The Restitution Herald*. As this is being written, no seniors have been interviewed or approved in 1974, so we cannot report their licensing at this time.

Board on Counseling and Arbitration

When this Board was set up by action of the General Conference delegates at the 1961 Conference, the main thrust of its duties was to give counsel to pastors, elders, and local church officers. Quote: "This Board would also provide counseling for pastors and elders seeking guidance in solving church problems, through giving counsel to pastors and elders, local officers can become better equipped to handle many problems."

Arbitration is a final act and usually could be avoided if counseling had been sought and heeded. This past year the counseling services of the Committee have been sought and used in some cases which have "equipped" the parties with pleasant solutions.

The counsel of the Board is always available and we urge this early action rather than a final appeal to arbitration.

Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

The Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association continues to improve its stability in both resources and minister appeal. At present there are forty-nine ministers participating, fifty local churches, six state conferences, and the General Conference.

At present, four ministers are receiving retirement assistance. Since the cooperative effort was started, the amount paid to widows of participating ministers has been doubled. As reserves are built up through premiums paid, special gifts, and legacies, it will be possible to increase retirement benefits.

Report of Layworkers' Study

The delegates at the 1973 Church of God General Conference passed the following motion, "That the Mission Board make a study of how lay workers could be used in Sunday school and church work, with the prospects of having a definite program to be presented, to enlist the help of interested lay workers."

The Mission Board has given considerable study to this matter. We find that many new and beginning Sunday schools and churches often lack sufficient teachers and leaders. We also find that often there are mature youth who have not yet located in a permanent position, who could give much assistance in the development of a new work. They would be encouraged to find employment near the church. We also have senior citizens, who may be retired from a business or profession, who could be a tremendous help in the teaching area and in giving stability to a new congregation.

The Mission Board is proposing that the Superintendent of Missions act as a clearinghouse for this project. We realize that any help by individuals in these projects would have to be on a strictly voluntary basis. Individuals who would be interested in giving assistance to one of these new smaller churches would give their name to the Superintendent of Missions. The Mission Department would usually know of the beginning church. These beginning groups would, however, be encouraged to report to the Mission Department that they would welcome such assistance.

The Superintendent of Missions would then make the name and location of this new group known through *Progress Journal* and also by personal contact with those who have made their names available.

The Mission Board recommends implementation of such a program to give encouragement, stability, teaching help, and whatever other assistance such volunteers might render to the new congregation.

dents with on-the-job training in Christian education work of the church through curriculum development, and teaching methods workshops; 4) presentation at the Leadership Training Seminar at O.B.C., and at the General Conference, of the results of this research; 5) development of courses for Oregon Bible College to provide trained leadership in this field; 6) cooperation with the editor in the revision of four quarters on the Preschool Quarterly. We thank God for a productive year.

Additional Conference Information

Site: The 1974 Church of God General Conference will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 12-17. This camp is owned by the United Methodist Church and is located on the west edge of Cedar Falls just a block off of U.S. Highway 20. Watch for the camp sign a few blocks west of the junction of Highway 218. Waterloo, a sister city of Cedar Falls, has an airport where some jet airline service is available.

Camp Costs: The cost at Riverview Park in 1974 will be \$5.75 per person per day (\$27.00 for the Conference). The daily costs are: breakfast, \$1.00; lunch, \$1.50; supper, \$1.50; lodging, \$1.50; insurance and miscellaneous \$.25. (Meals are half price for children under age 8.) In addition to the actual charges made by the camp there are many other costs for promotion, travel, and supplies.

Your General Conference Board of Directors is asking that camp costs be paid at the desk upon registration. The evening offerings taken during the Conference will go to some special Conference project designated by the Board.

Lodging: Lodging is provided in cabins and two dormitories. Cabins will house four to fourteen people each and families are urged to stay together. Two or more families will need to share the larger units. Reservations should be made ahead of time, if possible.

Riverview Park can accommodate some camping trailers. Water and electrical hookups are available, but no sewer. Two public camping facilities are located in the area. Tents on the grounds are discouraged.

Note to Teachers and Leaders: Teachers of General Conference adult and youth classes and leaders of Christian sharing sessions are reminded to prepare mimeographed copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared to permit those not able to attend a particular session to secure copies.

Elections During General Conference: Board of Directors: Two members will be elected to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors. The terms of Harold Doan and John Huston will expire at General Conference. (These cannot be reelected.)

Sunday School Board: Two memoers to be elected. The terms of Scott Ross and Robert Petry will expire this year. (These may be reelected.)

Mission Board: One member to be elected. The term of Lee McQuinn expires. (He may be reelected.)

This information is given so that churches or state conferences can instruct their delegates to make particular nominations. Proposed nominees should be contacted beforehand to be sure they will serve if elected and to be sure that they are free and able to attend the meetings of the particular board to which they may be elected.

Young People: The youth are expected to stay with their families in cabins and thus be under the direct supervision of their parents.

Children's Classes: Lynne Krogh will be in charge of the classes for children of all ages, Tuesday through Friday of General Conference. The class schedule will be 9:00 to 11:15 a.m., and 1:25 to 3:00 p.m. Parents of children in these classes are requested to come to the classroom and call for their children at the time of dismissal both morning and afternoon.

There will be refreshment breaks during the class periods. Those who wish to help are requested to please bring cookies.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel for those from far away and those nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring General Delegate representation.

The next Board meeting will be held at 2:15 p.m., August 13, at General Conference.

VBS—Potential for Growth

By the time that this issue reaches you, most of you will have made your vacation Bible school plans for 1974. This is as it should be. Any project, to be beneficial, must be preceded by a great deal of careful planning. The intent of this column is to encourage you to use this year's VBS as a gauge and guide for the future.

Vacation Bible school has been described as the recruiting arm of the Sunday school. Experience and the tabulation of facts prove this to be true. All agree that the primary purpose of VBS is to teach children the truths of God's Word. The pupils who are already in regular attendance at Sunday school and worship services, may find it a strengthening tonic. It encourages, instructs, and stimulates. A child brought to the VBS by recruiting may be introduced to the church building and its people for the first time. Often, it is his first opportunity to learn about God, Jesus Christ, and the Bible. He is prime potential material for membership in your Sunday school. With proper encouragement from fellow pupils and teachers, a portion of these can become interested members. Very often, these children become responsible for bringing brothers, sisters, friends, and/or parents with them.

Additional members of the Sunday school often spring from the seedbed of VBS. Of course, the seedbed must be fertile and well cultivated if the seedlings are to grow and develop well.

A vacation Bible school can also be a useful tool for introducing non-teaching members of the Sunday school to the challenges and satisfactions of teaching children, by asking them to serve as assistants.

The value of all of this depends on good planning and zealous execution of the plans. As little as possible is left to last-minute preparation or improvisation.

Take a thoughtful look at your own VBS program. Ask yourself some hard questions. Was your pre-planning and preparation adequate? How much, and for how long, did you plan? How much effort was given to instructing and training helpers? Was someone made responsible for directing a follow-up program of visits to the homes of those who attended, especially the homes of those pupils who are not already members of your Sunday school? Did you think to thank and compliment your assistants, and to encourage them to take further training to prepare themselves to be Sunday school teachers?

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

At the 1973 delegate sessions, the following motion was duly passed, "That the Board of Directors be instructed to make a study, or appoint a committee, to research the need and advisability of implementing Section 1, paragraph (D) of Article I of the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference. Further, if such a study reveals the need of organizing a Board of Benevolence, initial guidelines of the nature and scope of the work be included in the report."

Article I, Section 1, Paragraph (D) By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference now reads,

reads,
"That a board of benevolence be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise."

The Board of Directors has given study to this matter. Notice is hereby given that it will be proposed to the delegates of the 1974 Church of God General Conference that the above described Paragraph (D) be deleted from the By-Laws.

Explanation: This section of the By-Laws sets out the Purposes of the Church of God General Conference. Paragraph (D) does not seem to be one of the Purposes of the Conference.

Ministering to individual needs appears to be a Biblical requirement that can best be met at the level of the local church as the need arises.

If and when a need should arise for the Church of God General Conference to act, it appears that the Board of Directors already has authority to do so. Article II, Section 6 (Duty of the Officers) Paragraph (H) states: "To do any other necessary act for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the Church of God General Conference."



The background on the picture is the Uddiawan Church building. A Philippine Berean Youth Conference was held April 21, also at Uddiawan.

Two hundred eight people attended the conference. There were classes for adults, young married couples, youth, and children. There were ministers meetings, board meetings, and general delegate meetings to handle the conference business. Evangelistic meetings were held three nights, and many questions were answered and discussed in open forum. A Super-8 religious film was shown each night after the regular services.

Renewal for the Church

Youth Conference Plans Completed

Staff members for the two camps have been selected. The program has been prepared and assigned. Staff manuals have been mailed to those taking part. A total of fifty-four people will work in the two camps. Many hours of hard work on the part of the youth director and those on the staff are required to prepare activities, lessons for classes, material for workshops, and to prepare to discharge other responsibilities. Everything that members of the staff do is important to the success of the Youth Conference.

Each youth may receive instruction equal to more than six months in Sunday school. Experience in conducting church business is gained from approximately six hours of the week spent in business sessions.


OBITUARIES

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

At the 1973 delegate sessions, the following motion was duly passed, "That the Board of Directors be instructed to make a study, or appoint a committee, to research the need and

advisability of implementing Section 1, paragraph (D) of Article I of the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference. Further, if such a study reveals the need of organizing a Board of Benevolence, initial guidelines of the nature and scope of the work be included in the report."

Article I, Section 1, Paragraph (D) By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference now

reads,

"That a board of benevolence be organized to minister to individual needs as they may arise."

The Board of Directors has given study to this matter. Notice is hereby given that it will be proposed to the delegates of the 1974 Church of God General Conference that the above described Paragraph (D) be deleted from the By-Laws.

Explanation: This section of the By-Laws sets out the Purposes of the Church of God General Conference. Paragraph (D) does not seem to be one of the Purposes of the Conference.

Ministering to individual needs appears to be a Biblical requirement that can best be met at the level of the local church as the need arises.

If and when a need should arise for the Church of God General Conference to act, it appears that the Board of Directors already has authority to do so. Article II, Section 6 (Duty of the Officers) Paragraph (H) states: "To do any other necessary act for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the Church of God General Conference."

"Fitly Framed Together"

THE phrase, "fitly framed together" in Ephesians 2:21 is the translation of a single compound Greek word, sunarmologeo. It combines sun, which carries the thought of "closely together," with harma, a particle of union, and lego, which means "to lay forth." Its literal meaning is "closely fitted together."

Phillips' version retains the original thought by translating the sentence: "In him each separate piece of building, roperly fitting into its neighbor, grows together into a temple consecrated to the Lord. You are all part of this building in which God himself lives by his spirit."

This word is also used in Ephesians 4:15, 16, where Paul expresses the hope that the members of the church, by "speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ; from whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love."

Careful Assembling

Some time ago, your editor read an article about how one can get the most for his money when purchasing a new automobile. One bit of advice was to buy one that was assembled during the middle of the week. The reason for this advice is to be found in the workers on the assembly line. On Monday, many of them are afflicted with weariness or "hangovers" from their weekend, and so are in no condition to do their best work. On Friday, heir minds are more likely to be occupied with plans for the coming weekend than with the work that they are doing. On these days, the automobiles that come

off of the assembly line are not "fitly framed together," but have been so carelessly assembled that they are sometimes characterized as "thrown together." They lack the dependability and durability of machines that have been more carefully fitted together.

The same complaint is often heard concerning newly built houses, and industrial products of all kinds. In some cases, at least, it is probably justified.

Our Conference Machine

As your General Conference continues to grow and expand, its organization inevitably becomes more complex. Its departments, committees, boards, and projects must be fitly framed together if it is to operate efficiently, dependably, and satisfactorily in its capacity of a servant to the Churches of God.

This means, of course, that each part of its work must be carefully and prayerfully evaluated in relation to every other part.

Since our interests and talents differ, it is normal for individual members or member churches to become enthralled with, and excited about, one particular department or project. This serves a useful purpose. Without such enthusiasm little

would be done. It is important, however, to remember that other less glamorous but equally vital efforts must not be neglected while we concentrate exclusively on our pet project.

A Sign of Health

We find it a sign of healthful interest when searching questions are asked with regard to the present operation, future plans, and financial condition of the Conference of which you are a part. All legitimate questions are appreciated and seriously considered. When business sessions of the Conference are well attended, and carefully thought-out suggestions and motions are offered, this goes a long way toward assuring that the work will continue to be fitly framed together, and qualified to serve the needs of the churches well.

What You Can Do

Give thoughtful and prayerful attention to the reports and actions presented at our General Conference business sessions. Pray for those who have been placed in positions of leadership responsibility. Ask God to guide your thinking and, as far as is humanly possible, lay aside personal preferences and prejudices, and strive to take an objective and dispassionate view of the overall work. Ask God to reveal your own personal responsibility for its work, to the end that you may be fitly framed together with the whole.

Remember that, in the final analysis, the Conference does not control the churches; the churches control the Conference. It is both your privilege and your responsibility to keep it fitly framed together, with every part operating in harmony with every other part.

1974 General Conference

The fifty-fourth Annual Church of God General Conference is history. The session was held August 12 to 17 at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa with four hundred sixty in attendance. This was a most inspiring conference. Special thanks go to all who took part in any way to make this one of the best conferences ever.

All six published Recommendations were passed with only one small amendment. In addition the Recommendation in the Lay workers Report was adopted and will be implemented through the Mission Department of the Church of God General Conference. The complete minutes of the business sessions will be published in the October issue of *Progress Journal*.

The delegates approved the Annual Budget. For the fiscal year October 1, 1974 to September 30, 1975 contributions in the amount of \$195,000.00 will be needed to meet the needs.

Yet it is important that changes be made for the best interests of all.

Successful Sunday School

How can we build a better Sunday school? What can we do to make ours more successful? These, and similar questions, are often asked. What are the secrets of successful Sunday school development and growth? The following may be scorned by some as "the same old stuff."

Solomon wrote: "The thing that hath been, it is that which shall be; and that which is done is that which shall be done: and there is no new thing under the sun" (Eccl. 1:9). There must always be basic, fundamental principles, upon and around which all else is built. The application of these basics to new areas and in a variety of ways provides the impetus that leads to an exciting and growing Sunday school.

The following are some tried and proved principles that hold the secrets of success. 1) Zeal for Sunday school work must be clearly evident in the attitudes and actions of Sunday school workers. A cherished vision of the goals being sought is inseparable from accomplishment. 2) The Sunday school staff must be consecrated. The spiritual standards of a Sunday school never rise above those of its working staff. Such standards must be established and maintained by those who labor for the Lord. 3) Systematic and continuous training, for the purpose of enlarging and upgrading the staff, is essential. Teacher-training courses should vary as to content and approach, in order to challenge and inspire both experienced and inexperienced teachers. 4) A workable system of record keeping is important. Records are necessary to an efficiently operating Sunday school. A successful visitation program depends much upon well-kept membership and attendance records. 5) An active visitation program is as necessary as officers. There is no acceptable substitute. 6) It is important to keep the size of classes within reasonable limits. When a class becomes too large, it tends to become stagnant. Too small a class may discourage both teachers and pupils. By dividing or combining classes wisely to meet current needs, much can be done to help maintain enthusiasm. Ample supply of trained workers makes this possible. 7) Remember that teaching the truth is the ultimate purpose of any Sunday school. If it fails to teach the Bible simply, understandably, and comprehensively, even the largest and most efficiently operated Sunday school is only empty show.
