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Minutes of the 1975 General Conference

Tuesday, August 12

The Fifty-Fifth Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference convened at Riverview Park, in Cedar Falls, Iowa, on Tuesday, August 12, 1975. John Hearp, Chairman of the Board of Directors, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m., and Clarence Lapp, Pastor of the Church of God, Oregon, Illinois, opened the session with prayer. Bro. Hearp welcomed the delegates to the General Conference.

Ruth Overholser, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, seated the delegates and gave procedural instructions to the delegates and alternates.

The Denver, Colorado, Church of God was represented this year for the first time. Those delegates serving for the first time were introduced, and also new ministers.

Chairman Hearp called attention to the Special Reports on pages 7 and 8 of the June, 1975, issue of *Progress Journal*. A further report on Dual Ownership was presented by Robert Smith. Charles Jones moved and Charles Graham seconded the motion that the special reports be accepted. Motion carried.

David Johnson, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors, reported on the activities of the Board. He explained to the delegates how the Board functions and how policies are developed.

Executive Director S. O. Ross reviewed the nine-months Financial Report included in the delegate folders. This report covered the period from October 1, 1974, through June 30, 1975. Bro. Ross carefully reviewed each item. The report included: a General Funds Statement of Assets and Liabilities (\$353,864.13 and \$28,351.74 respectively); a Statement of Income and Expense General Funds

(\$248,980.95 and \$233,953.99 respectively); a Statement of Assets and Liabilities Restricted Funds (\$327,226.83 and \$123,085.07 respectively).

S. O. Ross gave a report on the progress of the Oregon Bible College women's dormitory. He stated that \$85,000 has been received in commitments and cash. It was moved by Delbert Jones and seconded by John Huston that the Financial Report be accepted. Motion carried.

Chairman Hearp called on Hugh Harman to report on Berean Youth work. Bro. Harman stated that the most important program of the Youth Department is the Youth Conference. This year Camp Mack became strictly a high school camp, and housed 298 campers and 35 staff members. The Shipshewana Retreat Center became a strictly post-high camp and housed 67 campers and 19 staff members. The young people of the Church of God should be commended for their giving at Conference, which totaled more than \$2,300 for the six-day period. The Senior Caravan traveled to Fredericktown, Missouri, where it helped with the daily vacation Bible school and presented an evening service for the Missouri State Con-

Allan Ramsey gave a report on the Louisiana property and answered questions from the floor.

Ruth Overholser reported for the Credentials Committee that 157 delegates had been seated: 8 Board of Directors; 49 ministers; and 100 church and conference delegates. This compared with 143 delegates last year.

The meeting was recessed at 11:30 a.m. with prayer by Tessie Laning of the Ripley, Illinois, Church of God. The chairman stated that Sr. Laning had attended every General Conference except one.

Wednesday, August 13

The second business session of the 1975 Church of God General Conference was called to order by Chairman Hearp at 10:00 a.m., August 13, with the singing of "Standing on the Promises." The prayer was led by Roy Humphreys, Pastor of the Oak Grove Church of God, Arkansas.

The secretary read the minutes of Tuesday's session.

J. R. LeCrone, editor of *The Restitution Herald*, reported on the activities of the Publishing Department. He stated that he was pleased with the interest of the membership in their response of sending in copy for *The Herald*. Bro. LeCrone stated that the cost of the *Heralds* when bought in bulk quantities was approximately 25 cents per copy. About 8-10 churches outside our fellowship are receiving our Sunday School Quarterlies. It was suggested that there be a column in *The Restitution Herald* with responses from people around the world.

Bro. Francis Burnett, Director of the Sunday School Department, reported on the activities of that department. He stressed the importance of the Sunday school seminars. Dan Stone, Margaret Duvall, and Steven Knapp gave testimonies concerning the Christian Workers' Seminar and the benefits they derived from the Seminar.

Nominations were opened for two Sunday School Board members. The terms of Joyce Knapp and James Graham are expiring. For Board Member No. 1, Joyce Knapp was nominated. Moved by Margaret Duvall and seconded by Dallas Demmitt that the nominations cease and that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Joyce Knapp. Motion carried. For Board Member No. 2, James

Graham was nominated. Moved by Delbert Jones and seconded by Edith Eades that the nominations cease and that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for James Graham.

Chairman Hearp asked for the Committee on Louisiana Property to serve as a panel for questions and answers on the report given to the delegates. Allan Ramsey, David Johnson, and Merle Patrick answered many questions regarding the use and desirability of the property. Many suggestions as to its use were presented by the delegates. Moved by Russell Johns and seconded by Joe James to accept the Louisiana Property Committee report. It was further requested that the committee make an evaluation of questionnaires as they come in and make recommendations on how to proceed. Motion carried.

Ruth Overholser gave the report of the Credentials Committee: 8 Directors, 53 ministers; and 104 delegates. This was a total of 165 compared with 150 one year ago.

The Chairman recessed the meeting at 11:45 a.m. and Elmo Gaspar dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Thursday, August 14

The third business session of the Fifty-Fifth General Conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Hearp. The session was opened by singing "We Have and Anchor," followed with prayer by Edward Goit, Fonthill, Ontario, Canada, Church of God.

The secretary read the minutes of the Wednesday session.

Bro. Clyde E. Randall moved that the representative of the Advent Christian General Conference, Nelson Melvin, be extended the glad hand of Christian fellowship, seated as a fraternal delegate, and given the freedom of the floor to address the Conference in assembly. Seconded by Hollis Partlowe. Motion carried. Mr. Nelson Melvin addressed the Conference delegates. He commended us for our vision and our work in proclaiming the gospel.

Chairman Hearp opened the business with nominations for two Directors of the Executive Board of Directors. Nominations for Director No. 1: Bro. Wolfe nominated Mr. John Fauntleroy of Louisiana; Russell Magaw nominated Russell Reye of Ohio. Russell Johns moved and John Huston seconded the motion that nominations cease. Motion carried.

Nominations for Director No. 2: William Lawrence nominated Bro. Hollis Partlowe of Arizona; Robert Petry nominated Milon Hall of Ohio; Daniel Stone nominated Joe James of South Carolina. It was moved and seconded by Edward Goit and David Swartz that the nominations cease. Motion carried.

S. O. Ross gave a brief report on the chorus book that was to be studied. All things considered, it was decided that it was not feasible to print a chorus book for our youth.

A report was given from the committee appointed to study the new hymnbook; and the committee was instructed to continue its study.

Sr. Rachel Carr, Director of Foreign Missions, thanked the churches for their support of our mission fields. She restated the reasons of the Mission Board for not bringing Solomon Idiong to Oregon Bible College. She expressed gratitude to Bro. and Sr. Francis Burnett for helping in the Nova Scotia work after the death of Bro. Raymond Brown. She asked our people to pray for someone who will pastor the Digby Church. Alice Aldrich of the Mexico work was present, and was recognized.

Sr. Carr expressed to the Conference the need to strengthen the mission work that we now have, instead of expanding ourselves further. There is a definite need to strengthen the churches in our own land also, both spiritually and numerically.

S. O. Ross presented our home missions work. Two new churches were affiliated with the General Conference—Gulf Coast Church of God, New Port Richey, Florida, and Willamette Valley Church of God, Albany, Oregon.

The floor was opened for nominations for members of the Mission Board, one for four years and one for three years. Hollis Partlowe nominated Warren Sorenson of Tempe, Arizona. It was moved by Marge Overmeyer and seconded by Russell Reye that nominations cease and that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Warren Sorenson for Missions Director No. 1 to a term of four years on the Mission Board.

Nominations were opened for Director No. 2. Milon Hall nominated Paul Overholser; Richard Worley nominated John Huston. It was moved by Delbert Jones and seconded by Emory Macy that nominations cease. Bro. Paul Overholser was

elected as Missions Director No. 2 on the Mission Board for a term of three years.

Recommendation No. 2, that we accept the Church of God in Salala, Liberia, into the fellowship and membership of the Church of God General Conference, was presented. Moved by Ronald Macy and seconded by Patricia Beam that the recommendation be adopted. Motion carried

Russell Johns moved that Recommendation No. 3, which states that the members of the Mission Builders League contribute \$10.00 to each appeal granted by the Board of Directors, be adopted. Seconded by Joe James and carried.

Recommendation No. 4, that pastoral aid to a local church under the Pastoral Aid Program of the Church of God General Conference begin at \$125 per month, effective September 1, 1975, was presented to the delegates. Charles Graham moved and Alton Shaw seconded that this recommendation be adopted. Motion carried.

Kent Ross presented the following motion before the delegates: "That the present Mission Board be renamed the Foreign Mission Board, and that a Home Missions Board be established, to apply itself directly to our home mission opportunities." Motion was seconded by Delbert Jones. After some discussion, William Lawrence moved that this motion be tabled until the Friday session. Joe James seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Merle Patrick made the motion that the delegates give a rising vote of thanks to Robert Hall for his service on the Mission Board. Motion was seconded by David Johnson. All did rise.

The Credentials Committee gave its report for the Thursday session: 8 Directors; 51 ministers; 104 delegates—a total of 163 delegates compared with 151 at the same session last year.

Ronald Macy, Eternal Hope Church of God, Herndon, Virginia, dismissed with prayer at 11:40 a.m.

Friday, August 15-Morning Session

The fourth business session of the Fifty-Fifth General Conference was called to order by Chairman Hearp with the singing of "Stand Up," and was led in prayer by Pastor Linford Moore of the Waterloo, Iowa, Church of God.

The minutes of Thursday's session were read by the secretary.

The Chairman of the Board explained

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to the delegates that the fraternal delegate from the Advent Christian Church attending our General Conference in no way indicates that there is any attempt to nerge the two fellowships.

The Credentials Committee seated the delegates for the election of Board Directors. Those nominated were introduced to the delegates.

Bro. C. F. Pryor introduced to the delegates Dr. William E. Kammin from Savannah, Georgia, as a new member and minister of the Church of God. Dr. Kammin then addressed the delegates.

Dr. Alva Huffer reported on Oregon Bible College business. He introduced the College Staff and the Board of Education. Bro. Vernis Wolfe, Chairman of the Board of Education, outlined the operation of the Board of Education. Dr. Huffer explained his resignation as President of Oregon Bible College, and stated that he would be an acting consultant to Oregon Bible College in the coming year. He presented John Lewis, as the new President, to the delegates. Bro. Lewis announced that Hugh Harman will become Dean of Students beginning this fall. Bro. Huffer answered questions from the floor. Delbert Jones moved and Edward Goit seconded that a rising vote of appreciation be given Dr. Alva Huffer for his years of service in the College work. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the results of the election: for Director No. 1, John Fauntleroy; for Director No. 2, Hollis Partlowe.

Recommendation No. 1, the adoption of "Goals-Reaching Forth to Eighty" was introduced. It was moved by John Huston and seconded by Ronald Macy that this recommendation be adopted. Motion carried.

Russell Johns spoke concerning the banners that have carried out the theme of each Conference for several years and moved that Cleo Dixon of the Omaha, Nebraska, Church be recognized with ap-

preciation for his good work. Seconded by William Lawrence and carried.

Chairman Hearp asked the membership in session to stand in silent tribute to the two ministers who fell asleep in death since last General Conference—Raymond Brown and Ellsworth Routson.

The Chairman asked for all who had attended General Conference regularly for fifty years to go to the front of the tabernacle and recognition was given to each.

Edward Bender moved and William Lawrence seconded that the motion that was tabled from Thursday's session be brought to the floor. After much discussion, the motion was withdrawn. Kent Ross presented the following motion: That the present Mission Board be divided into a Foreign Missions Board and a Home Missions Board; implementation to be handled by the Board of Directors in conjunction with the present Missions Board, and be presented at the 1976 General Conference. Motion seconded by Delbert Jones. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported that there were 159 delegates in the morning session: 8 Board of Directors; 51 ministers; and 100 delegates. This compared with 150 last year.

The morning session was recessed with prayer by Emory Macy, Pastor at Omaha, Nebraska, Church of God.

Afternoon Session

The fifth business session of the Fifty-Fifth General Conference was called to order by Chairman Hearp at 2:20 p.m. C.D.T. We were led in singing by Pastor Stephen Bolhous with the song "To God Be the Glory." Dallas Demmitt of the Church of God, Phoenix, Arizona, led the session in prayer.

Executive Director S. O. Ross presented a plaque to Dr. Alva Huffer in appreciation of his service as President of Oregon Bible College for seven years.

Bro. Ross announced the officers of the Executive Board: Chairman, Billie Ken-

nedy; Vice-Chairman, David Johnson; Secretary, Kenneth Milne; and Treasurer, Robert Smith.

Allan Ramsey gave further information concerning the Louisiana property and made the following motion: That a three-member Administrative Board be appointed under the jurisdiction of the General Conference Board of Directors, to supersede the committee that had been serving. This board will study the use of the property and continue necessary work on this project. The motion was seconded by Ronald Macy. Motion carried.

Clyde Randall moved and Edward Goit seconded that a rising vote of appreciation be given to the two retiring Board Members, Bros. John Hearp and Dallas Demmitt. Motion carried.

Paul Overholser moved and Dallas Demmitt seconded a rising vote of thanks to Joyce and Steve Bolhous for their fine work with the music of this Conference. Motion carried.

S. O. Ross presented the proposed Budget for October 1, 1975, to September 30, 1976. Budget of \$277,000 with needed contributions of \$220,000. Edward Goit moved and David Cheatwood seconded that the proposed budget be adopted. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee gave the final report: Directors, 8; ministers, 32; delegates, 84; total, 124; last year, 121.

Russell Johns moved and Dallas Demmitt seconded that the final report of the Credentials Committee be accepted. Motion carried.

Moved by Arnold Johns and seconded by Robert Jones that the minutes of the Conference be approved as read. Carried.

Ronald Macy moved and Clyde Randall seconded that the Fifty-Fifth Annual Conference of the Church of God General Conference be adjourned. Motion carried.

John Hearp, retiring Chairman and Board member closed with prayer. This was followed with the singing of one verse of "God Be With You."

General Conference Minutes

The minutes of the delegate sessions of the 1975 Annual Church of God General Conference appear in this issue. Each member of the Church of God should carefully read these minutes. The actions taken and the recommendations passed set the policies and the goals of the conference for the next fiscal year (October 1, 1975 - September 30, 1976). It is now the duty of the Board of Directors and the staff to carry out these programs and recommendations.

Annual Budget

One of the actions of the delegates was the approval of the budget (see copy in this issue) for the fiscal year. The budget was presented item by item and as approved will require giving in the amount of \$220,000.00 for the year (\$18,333.00 per month). On behalf of the Board of Directors, department heads, staff workers and myself, we commend the membership for meeting the needs of the conference during the past fiscal year. May God continue to bless and provide that all of the conference programs may go on to completion and bear fruit for the Master.

Pastoral Changes

A number of pastors have changed pulpits beginning September first. The new Directory of Churches, Ministers and Staff Workers will appear in the November issue of *Progress Journal*. The new location of several pastors will be evident at that time.

New Dormitory

The new dormitory at Oregon Bible College is completed and presently is occupied by twenty-one female students. The facility is very fine and is being enjoyed by the residents. The lounge area is available to all OBC students.

It appears that the total cost of the building will exceed the estimates by about ten thousand dollars. This is due mostly to the cost of the lounge and other improvements in the basement. These were somewhat unknown items at the time of the estimates. God has blessed in the progress of the construction of the building.

Dormitory Furnishings

The furniture for the rooms in the new OBC Dormitory will cost about nine thousand dollars. Offerings were taken at the evening services during General Conference. About two thousand dollars was received.

Suggestion has been made that women's groups in the local churches be encouraged to have projects and raise funds to help furnish one or more rooms. The furniture cost is about \$500.00 per room, or \$250.00 per student.

The Alumni Association of Oregon Bible College has a project to raise the funds for the lounge furniture. We greatly appreciate this effort of the Alumni.

Dormitory Dedication Services

Dedication services for the new OBC Dormitory Building will be held in the Dormitory Lounge on Sunday afternoon, November 16, 1975. There will be an open house afterward. Plan now to attend this event and see the new facility.

Boards Meet

The Sunday School Board of the Church of God General Conference met in Minneapolis on September 26. The Board was in Minnesota to be guest workers in the Minnesota State Conference that weekend.

The Mission Board will meet in Macomb, IL, on October 24. Members of the Mission Board will be guest workers in the Southern Illinois Conference October 24 and 25.

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference and the Board of Education of Oregon Bible College will meet in Oregon, IL, on November 14 and 15 and attend the dedication of the Dormitory on the 16th.

Conference Finances

As this is written in mid-September, it is apparent that the goals for giving (\$17,387.00) for September will be reached. We are thankful that the total needs for the fiscal year were met. In addition, over sixty thousand dollars have been contributed and thirty-six thousand provided in loans to the Oregon Bible College Building Fund. These amounts, plus the special restricted contributions of the membership and churches, speak most highly of the stewardship of Church of God people. Praise God, and may he continue to bless as we all serve him.

Our recommendation is that we focus our primary efforts on helping our congregations abroad and at home to grow spiritually, as well as numerically.

We want to work toward the time when we can have people from here go to our foreign fields to assist them in their understanding of God's Word and in their spiritual development.

Therefore, now is the time when we need to learn who might be interested in possibly serving in a foreign field, either as a career or for a short period of time.

We have a Prospective Candidate Information Form which is for the purpose of learning who might be interested in mission work in the future. This is not a commitment, but simply a declaration of interest.

Home Missions

Seven churches are receiving assistance through the Pastoral Aid Program of the Church of God General Conference and three churches, Pomona, California; North Hills, Ohio; and Eldorado, Illinois, through the Special Church Aid Program this church year. This will help to fulfill the above-described purpose of strengthening the local church. May each of these churches grow both numerically and spiritually.

Nova Scotia

The Mission Board is still looking for someone to take the position of pastor of the Digby congregation. Bro. Francis Burnett has consented to remain until January, 1976, but after that, this growing and active group of people will be without a pastor. The church building at Gattaran, which was destroyed by a typhoon last October, has been replaced with a new building and was dedicated to the Lord July 20.

We are still receiving funds from members of the Oregon Bible College Alumni association toward the purchase of lounge furniture for the new facilities at the college.



Evangelization Forum

My husband John and I are grateful for the opportunity we had to attend the Evangelization Forum in Kansas City, September 29 and 30. About 150 delegates from all over the country met together to discuss the work of evangelism, especially during this Bicentennial Year. The sessions were enthusiastic and stimulating. We were glad to be a part of the forum.

Permit me to share a couple things that we heard while there. A pastor by the name of Lucian Robinson spoke to us concerning the place of prayer in evangelism. At one time, in his church, the people were asked to mark on a prepared sheet the activities in which they wished to become involved as part of the work of the church. Many different levels of involvement were included, so everyone could mark something. One was simply: "I want to want to become a soul winner." Also included was: "God helping me, I will endeavor in the next three years to lead to Christ twelve people, and endeavor to mature them in the faith." That was a man-sized commitment!

A fellow named Tom came to the pastor and said that he wanted very much to sign his name to this commitment, but he just didn't know where he would start. He didn't feel that he came into contact with that many people. His pastor told Tom to go ahead and sign the commitment, and that he would pray with him that God would put someone in his path.

As a result of this, the pastor and Tom came up with a little morning prayer recipe: Get up every morning and pray:

- 1. God, I'm available. I want you to use me today.
- 2. Please put someone in my path. (Cause me to sit down by the right person in the bus. Cause me to meet somebody on the street. Let somebody walk through the door. Send me to the right place so I can talk to somebody about Christ.)
- 3. Use your Holy Spirit to go in front of me to get that person ready to listen, and then let your Spirit work through me to teach me what to say.

The first week that Tom and his pastor prayed that way together, Tom found out that his garbage collector was not a Christian. This led to a visit in the home, where he discovered that the wife was not a Christian either. Tom never did win the garbage collector, but he won the wife. The number of people

Student Council Project



Recreation and the Church

Have you ever wondered why many teen-agers become church drop-outs? In a recent survey of teen-age drop-outs, the above question was posed. The answer most frequently given was: "Not enough activity for youth." Yet another survey revealed that the youth are directly influenced by the degree of awareness of, and concern for them which adults in the congregation display.

There has come into existence an increasing awareness of the needs of youth. In response to this need, many churches are instituting recreational opportunities for their young people and adults. The question: "Does recreation have a place in the church?" I think that it does! Some may ask, "What does recreation include?" It includes sports, games, parties, retreats, fellowships, socials, banquets, and camping.

Recreation brings people together. It is an activity that allows people, young and old, to be themselves: to drop social and age barriers and enjoy the fellowship of other Christians. You may say, "We're together on Sunday for services, isn't that all that should be necessary?" Certainly, we are but, let's face it, this really provides very little opportunity for members to get to really know each other. To get to really know someone requires the time and opportunity to share activities and interests in a relaxed atmosphere. Recreation promotes this kind of exchange. It encourages friendships and wholesome fellowship. It provides an opportunity for people to work together, play together, and come really to know each other in an informal atmosphere.

I recently read: "Recreation in the church promotes contact; contact leads to friendships; friendships contribute to a satisfying experience at church." Recreation also provides an opportunity for Christian outreach into the community. People have a habit of bringing others to share the things that they enjoy. Recreation frequently attracts people who are unresponsive to other influences, and brings about contact with them in a church setting. This makes it easier for them to "zero in" on the fact that the church is not a place where people pretend to be something which they are not, but is a place where people can be, and are, real people.

I believe that the congregation of any church can benefit from a well-planned and executed recreational program.

that he won in three years went far beyond twelve.

One of the men who was scheduled to present a session at the forum was a black minister from Los Angeles. Several days earlier, he had called to say he wouldn't be able to come. Another black minister, who headed a Christian day school in the area, had been beaten by a gang. The next day, he died from the wounds. Our scheduled speaker needed to be at the funeral of his fellow worker. A militant group took the credit for the beating, and said that they had a list of others who would get the same treatment. Our speaker was on that list, and had been advised by the FBI to remain close to home.

Sometimes we think of persecution as happening in other countries, but it is beginning to happen here as "evil men . . . wax worse and worse." Our hope is in our Lord. Only as we trust him can we have peace in the midst of trouble.

Church Entrepreneurship

By David Johnson

ATTHEW 25:14-30 contains Jesus' famous story of the talents. The main character in this story is the master, who is taking a journey into a far country. When we compare this text with Mark 13:34, we learn the exact identity of the master. "For the Son of man is as a man taking a far journey, who left his house, and gave authority to his servants, and to every man his work, and commanded the porter to watch." So the master, in the parable of the talents, represents Jesus. He was leaving on a long journey, and decided to leave his wealth in the care of his servants. He wanted them to develop and increase it. To the first servant, the master gave five talents; to the second servant, three talents; and to the third, one talent.

Matthew 25:15 says that he gave "to every man according to his several ability; and straightway took his journey." The master differentiated between three levels of ability: five talents, two talents, and one talent. A talent could be worth from \$10,000 at the time of the Babylonians to \$1,000 at the time of Christ and the Roman Empire. Whatever the value of the talents, the master recognized among these men differences in their abilities and attitudes.

In the same way, the Master sees each one of us as endowed with different types of gifts. We possess different measures of ability to handle responsibility and consequent stress. Such capacities differ from person to person. I define capacity as the ability to develop, or perform, useful work. That was the difference between the three servants dealt with in the parable of the talents.

Such differences in capacity are much in evidence in our lives today. Throughout my lifetime, I have been able to obThis article was taken from a recording of an address delivered by Bro. serve great differences in levels of capacity, especially in relation to my farming experiences.

When I was a young man, I lived on the home farm. We raised cows, chickens, and pigs. My brothers—Frank, Bob, Dale—and I were in charge of the care of these animals. We would get up at 5 a.m. to milk the cows by hand; clean the barn, by hand; shovel manure, by hand; and bed the cows, by hand! We had to work awfully hard in those days, upon which we tend to reflect so often.

In contrast, I now have a friend who feeds and milks fifty cows, all alone. A machine milks the cows and sends the milk up a pipeline into a cooling tank. It is entirely automated. Gutter cleaners can clean the barn electrically. In fact, gutters can now be eliminated through the installation of slats in the barn floor. The capacity of a man in a dairy barn to complete many tasks in a short time has been greatly increased. This has been the result of the genius of man's mind. Man has learned how to take his arm out of work, and to put his mind into it, thereby increasing his capacity.

All of these discoveries have come about in my lifetime. We used to plow with a two- or three-bottom plow. Work was slow because it would unhook every time it hit a rock. The engines did not have much power. I now have a tractor that has a 225 horsepower diesel engine and an air-conditioned cab. It has twelve

forward speeds and can pull an eight bottom plow. It has an automatic reset. When it hits a rock, it trips up and then falls back into place. In a day's time, I can plow five times as much as I did before.

Man's genius has put this tractor together, to give it the gears and mechanical leverage to make use of the capacity of the huge engine. We have increased our capacity. That's what this parable of the talents is talking about. It is all included in the world "entrepreneurship." This is a special word to farmers because it means the ability of a farmer to recognize opportunity and to assume the risk of developing it.

As we work in our various churches, perhaps "entrepreneurship" should be added to our vocabulary. We need to see our opportunities and to take advantage of them. I talked to a young minister at the Christian Workers' Seminar. I thought that this man would bubble over when he talked about promotion. He could see many opportunities to promote the work of the Lord. He talked about turning loose balloons in a community, and of having a parade to promote vacation Bible school. These are outlandish things for a church to do, but they work. We need to spread the Word.

At times, many of us are like an egg. We are covered with a shell—wrapped up in a kind of cocoon. In this condition, we have not let our light reach very many people. Now is the time to peel off the shell and to let our lights shine to those around us.

That is what Christ was telling us in the parable of the talents. He was talking about peeling off the shells and using our opportunities. Regardless of the amount (Please turn to page 8)

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, Illinois, November 14, 15, 1975, and then remained in Oregon for the dedication of the new Oregon Bible College Dormitory, November 16. The work of each department was reviewed.

The Mission Board made a recommendation regarding the rearrangement of the Mission Board into Home Mission and Foreign Mission segments, both under one Superintendent of Missions. Final details need to be worked out, and a recommendation will be presented to the 1976 delegates for approval. It was noted that Brother Francis Burnett will return from Nova Scotia January 15, having completed one year of interim pastorship there.

Brother and Sister John Carr have been given a two-month leave from the Macomb, Illinois, Church, to go to Nova Scotia to lead the work there for two months. We express our thanks to the Macomb brethren for so graciously agreeing to this arrangement, so that the mission work in Digby will continue to have pastoral leadership. We trust that other churches will be willing to do the same, that the pulpit in Digby can be supplied until September 1, 1976, on such temporary basis. The Mission Board has "called" a pastor to be beginning September 1. Announcement concerning this pastor will be made when all arrangements have been completed.

The committee to study the use of the Louisiana Property gave a final report, after reviewing the completed questionnaires. In accordance with the action of the delegates at the 1975 General Conference, a board of three members was appointed to further study and evaluate this property and the use for it. The board is Brothers Allan Ramsey, Chairman, John E. Fauntleroy, and Vernis Wolfe.

Brothers Kenneth Milne, John E. Fauntleroy, and S. O. Ross were appointed as a committee to plan the 1976 General Conference program. They will be meeting early in 1976. Any suggestions regarding the program will be appreciated.

Action was taken at the meeting to receive one half section of land in the State of Utah. This property is being deeded to the Church of God General Conference by Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence of Phoenix, Arizona. We do extend our thanks to Brother and Sister Lawrence for this fine contribution to the Church of God General Conference.

The Annual Audit Report for the past fiscal year was presented to the Board by Brother Allan Ramsey of Warsaw, Indiana. The report was duly approved and accepted, and will be published in the January issue.

The Board toured the Golden Rule building, but no action was taken concerning future use of the building.

Dedication O.B.C. Dormitory

The New Dormitory at Oregon Bible College was dedicated on Sunday, November 16. About two hundred fifty attended the dedication, open house, and tour of the buildings. All of the Conference and College facilities were open during the afternoon.

Several churches sent special greetings by letter and telephone, and we do appreciate the many folks who traveled from various parts of the United States and Canada to attend this very special event.

Drama Group on Tour



The role of youth leaders and their responsibilities seem to vary from congregation to congregation. The expectations seem to fluctuate from teacher, to entertainer, to disciplinarian.

It seems to me, however that, as youth leaders, we really want to insure that something is accomplished in the lives of our young people. Only through deep involvement of youth leaders and the churches can this really be accomplished.

Adolescence is a time of transition between childhood and adult ways of living and feeling. We need to help to facilitate this transition, as well as to guide young people into a meaningful and maturing relationship with Jesus Christ.

How do we accomplish this? We begin by taking the time to listen to them and try to understand them, not reacting to their questioning and probing by becoming intolerant and critical. Our school system teaches our young people to question and probe. The act of learning is no longer thought to consist of memorizing information, but of constantly reevaluating and searching out new truths and ideas. Our young people bring this concept into our churches. On many occasions we as adults, or youth leaders, are unwilling to take the time to aid them in their search for the answers to their doubts; or, we may misunderstand the intent of their doubts, and fail to meet their need. Unconsciously, we communicate to them, by our attitudes, that we consider them to be something less than Christian if they have doubts.

I strongly feel that we should accept their feelings of doubt as normal, encourage their questioning, guide them in searching for answers, share with them our faith in God and his Son, and allow them to discover their own personal commitment. This is when Christianity really becomes relevant to them.

We can learn a great deal from young people. When we accept a teen-ager as a person, and share our opinions and experiences with him in mutual love and trust, we find that our own needs are met as well as his. We, too, will mature spiritually. Teens need the opportunity to share with adults, not simply to listen to them. We function best as youth leaders when we involve our teen-agers in meaningful exchanges and reponsibilities in the church setting. We must strive to meet them where they are, and to help to guide them into a wholesome relationship with our God.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

New! Different! Exciting!

These words summarize the goal of the Sunday School Director and Sunday School Board members. The writers of the manuals which are being printed are fully cooperative with the Sunday School Board. Sample copies of Lesson One of each manual should have reached your pastor and Sunday school officers by now.

For several years, Vacation Bible School leaders and teachers have been requesting changes in the material being produced. Change should be made cautiously, after careful study and consideration. The Sunday School Board has followed this rule. Procedures to be followed were carefully studied. Persons who have led and taught in Vacation Bible Schools were interviewed.

One goal was to decrease the overall cost of materials. This will be accomplished in the 1976 material. Manuals are being produced for the Bible School director and teachers.

Seven Manuals!

There will be seven manuals. One is for the Bible School director. It will contain many ideas for openings, helps for promoting the Bible School, suggestions for closing programs, and other suggestions to help make Bible Schools successful. Six manuals are available for various age groups: Number One is for preschool and kindergarten; Two is for first and second grades; Three is for third and fourth grades; Four is for fifth and sixth grades; Five is for seventh and eighth grades; and Six is for high school. The material has been written by those who are experienced with the age group for which they wrote.

Preplanning Meetings

It is our desire that Vacation Bible School preplanning meetings be held in the Spring of 1976, either with local churches or with district meetings. Your Sunday School Director or one of the Board members would like to be invited to attend, in order to explain the new materials. Successful vacation Bible schools do not "just happen." Invariably they are the result of informed, thorough, and painstaking planning and preparation beforehand. When the last class has been held, and the pupils sent home, the work of the teachers and leaders is not yet over. The follow-up must be equally carefully planned and executed.

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

Junior-Senior Visitation

It has been decided that the format for the Junior-Senior Weekend at Oregon Bible College this year will be completely different from what it has been in former years.

We will not have one weekend in which we invite all of the high school juniors and seniors to visit Oregon Bible College. There are several reasons for this. First, so many students were coming that it doubled our population and placed a strain on our physical capacities and personnel. The visitors influenced our program so much that we felt we were not able to give them a true picture of college life. We also felt that many visitors were coming to be with their friends, and not to visit the college.

We are instituting a new system that we hope will solve many of these problems. For this new system to work, it will require much promotion at the local level. Therefore, we are depending on the individual help of pastors, youth leaders, and members of the congregation to promote this idea.

Instead of having one weekend in the spring for all students, we are designating special weeks throughout the winter semester for certain areas or states. Only students from the designated states may visit that week.

During the week of February 1-7, we will invite all of the students from Illinois to visit. Any time during that week, juniors and seniors from Illinois can visit the campus one night, and visit classes the next day. During the week of February 8-14, students from Minnesota, Nebraska, Colorado, Iowa, and Wisconsin are invited to visit. February 15-21 is the week for Michigan and Missouri. February 22-28, students will come from Arkansas, Texas, and Louisiana. February 29 through March 6, the Indiana young people will receive a special invitation. The states of Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina will receive special attention March 7-13. Ohio and Fonthill, Ontario, will complete the visits for the year during the week of March 21-27.

We will be sending special invitations to each of the churches. Please respond by letting us know when you would like to visit OBC. If there are those who would like to attend and have not been designated in this letter, please contact us.

Gospel Teams



SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

Church of God Bible Quizzing

A large percentage of our churches are involved, in one way or another, in our Bible quizzing program. This program has been successful since its inception, and continues to grow from year to year. The enthusiasm that it generates among our young people is something to behold.

For the benefit of those who do not know, we will provide an overview of how the Church of God Bible Quiz program operates.

On January 1 of each year, information concerning the material to be used is sent out to all pastors, youth leaders, and the known quiz coaches. This packet contains not only the material to be used, but also the quiz manual and sample questions. Quiz teams are then formed in the local churches, and regular practice sessions are set up. Often these teams will compete with those of nearby churches for practice purposes. In the case of an isolated member, or only one young person in a congregation who desires to quiz, accommodations are made by the state youth leader to allow that young person to practice and compete.

For several years, it has been the practice to have a state or area team to represent that state or area in the competition at the International Berean Youth Conference. The criteria used for the selection of this team are determined by the state youth leader, in conjunction with the team coaches. Usually, these criteria involve some form of quiz-off, in which members of the various teams, along with isolated members, compete against each other for the highest scores. The four highest scorers then become representatives at Youth Conference, where the championship is determined.

We are making some changes in the National playoffs in 1976, and they promise to be exciting. These changes include: 1) three teams quizzing at one time, with the aid of an electronic system; 2) every team playing at least five games; 3) a winner's and consolation bracket after three matches, with trophies for each division; 4) six teams in finals on Tuesday; 5) competition held in the tabernacle with outside spectators invited to come and cheer their team on.

To operate this system properly, we need at least twelve teams involved. Last year there were nine. We need them back, plus three more. How about state teams again from Arkansas, Iowa, Virginia, and Canada?

That You May Know!

During the last several years, considerable interest has been shown among the Church of God brethren in the Sunday School quarterlies and their makeup. Surveys have been taken and the results revealed that many felt a definite need of some change in the teaching content of the quarterlies.

Through the advice and help of the Council of Christian Education Committee, changes were made in the Beginner's Quarterly. And there has been considerable change made in the Junior and Teen-Age Quarterlies.

Such a process is not done in a matter of weeks. The quarterly materials, such as lesson topics and Scripture texts that will be used, are selected and/or revised as much as nine months to one year before they are used in our Sunday schools. Editors of the quarterlies send out the assignments at least six months before they are used.

One of the problems is communication. It is not easy to put something on a piece of paper and have it understood by the reader as the writers or the editors intended. In August, during the 1975 General Conference, the Sunday School Board and the Director met with Sue Hall concerning the editorship of the Beginner's Quarterly. Sue had prepared two sample lessons and had submitted them to the Board. In early October, 1975, two Board members met with Bro. Jesse Pestle, editor of the Adult Quarterly, and discussed the future of that quarterly and needed changes.

Plans include a meeting of all quarterly writers and the editors in Oregon, Illinois, on Friday, April 30. This will be an 8- or 10-hour meeting, with discussion on how to write, and what to write. One member of the staff of the Printing Department will have time to explain editing.

The Sunday School Board and your Director want you to know that much thought is being given to updating our quarterly materials. And we desire that you make known your likes and dislikes. It may not be possible to meet all of them, but each and every idea will be given consideration. Most important of all is that you pray for God's guidance to be upon the Sunday School Board, editors, and writers. Only God can know, with any degree of accuracy, the ultimate outcome of alterations in the style and content of our Sunday school literature. With his help, progress will be made.

Church Entrepreneurship

E COME NOW to the servant with one talent. He was full of fear. He said, in effect, "Lord, you are not fair. You expect to reap grain, but you put out no seed. I was afraid to take the first step. I could not justify the risk, so I buried the talent, and that is exactly what I am returning to you now."

The master replied, "Well, you lazy servant, you didn't even take it to the bank and get interest. What kind of a fool are you?" So the master took the talent and gave it to the one with ten, and cast the lazy servant away. Fear can, and does, cause us to not take the first step in profiting by our opportunities. We will not reach any goal until that first step is taken. Jesus expects us to risk the first step. He will then give the increase.

Looking very specifically at our General Conference, we feel sure that there are ways in which we may increase our capacity. I believe that our Lord has great plans for the Church of God in coming years. Hopefully, in twenty years we will have twelve thousand members and two hundred churches. Then we can look back and remember when we had eighty-five churches and five thousand members. I believe that God has that plan for us, if we are willing to step out and take the risks.

We need to develop the skills, and to develop and work the plans. We must find the tools through which this can be brought about. Oregon Bible College is the springboard to the future. This has been the evidence of the past. The students that pass through Oregon Bible College will be imbued with the attitude of progress or with the attitude of regress, depending upon the quality of the education they receive. Oregon Bible College has the potential for becoming the center of learning for our entire General Conference. Vast amounts of study could, and should, be done in and through the resources of the College. Because of very hard times in 1939 when the College was reconvened, a policy of conducting classes only in the mornings has been standard practice. policy, and to develop ways and means to permit the College to conduct a full day of classes. The depression is over.

Oregon Bible College needs to think about a five-year program, which must be completed before a graduate is licensed to preach. Hopefully, the extra year of schooling-studying the humanities and the relationships that exist in our terribly complex culture—would prepare and mature our young people more adequately. I certainly believe that a period of internship should be included in that extra year of training.

We should begin to think about building a new adminstration building. The time when the school is in one part of town, and the students live in another part of town should come to a close. I truly believe that the evidence that we have seen in the past year, the outpouring of \$85,000-much of it sacrificial giving-is the greatest compliment that could be given by our people in support of our General Conference. But perhaps the philosophy behind this kind of development is not entirely right. Maybe we should be thinking about paying for these buildings over a longer period of time. Possibly we have allowed our priorities to be a little tilted. It is great to have things paid for, but I think that future generations also have a responsibility to bear part of the cost. We should, perhaps, be looking at a five- or ten-year cash flow analysis that will demonstrate the ability to carry a debt load of X, whatever that may be.

Certainly, with the number of trust funds that exist, and the amount of support that is forthcoming in our organization, the money is available to produce and develop a new administration building. If we can pay for it over forty years, I do not see why we must wait for five or ten years before we build it. This would be a major step toward making of our College campus something of which all of us, and especially the students, can be proud.

I believe that a task force should be assembled to study the problems of the small church. Something like fifty of eighty-five supporting churches have less than fifty supporting, or active, members. This, perhaps, is a generality, but nevertheless the condition has existed too long. We have not grown as rapidly as we should have. My home church is a small church, and I appreciate the problem. We do not know the answers. Too often, we have used the "shotgun" approach in seeking the solution to our problems. We have not identified the exact problem.

I believe that a task force should include men from larger churches; from smaller, struggling churches; and from the academic community. They should study this problem in relation to all existing parts of the Church of God organization, researching to find a recommendation that will solve the problem. Should the findings be applicable, our small churches will grow and mature. Our economic base will become broader, salaries for pastors will be higher, and our whole organization will be stronger.

I see, in some of these churches, the eternal struggle to stay alive. I also see some that are not making it, and falling by the wayside. The necessity exists for this proposed task force to work with the churches that are dead. Perhaps life can be breathed into the situation. If they are truly dead, let's bury them, and develop a process which will prevent this from happening in the future. It does no good to grieve over a dead church, sinking time and talent into it for years. Let's go on and develop a new work.

I believe that it is incumbent on each of us to grow and mature, increasing our capacity to do more useful work for the Lord.



Mission Builders League

HE above photo is the Garden Park Church of God in Grand Rapids, Michigan, constructed with the assistance of Mission Builders Appeal Number Twenty-five. This is one of thirty-four congregations that have built, purchased, or remodeled church buildings with assistance from the Mission Builders League. There have been thirty-five appeals, two of which were for the Lighthouse Mission Church of God in Digby, Nova Scotia, Canada. Because this is a mission church, appeal number three was used to build the basement (which was used as a church for a few years). Appeal number eight helped to build the superstructure.

The Mission Builders League was organized in 1958 by action of General Conference delegates. Individuals, churches, classes, and various organizations signed up, agreeing to pay \$5.00 or more to each appeal approved by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, with not more than two appeals per year. On occasion, there have been well over one thousand members in the league. Due to deaths, classes becoming nonexistent, and various other reasons, the membership does drop off and change from time to time. At present there are 863 active members.

In 1971 the General Conference delegates voted to encourage members to increase their giving to each appeal from \$5.00 to \$10.00, due to the increased costs of construction since the league was formed. Delegates at the 1975 General Conference approved the following motion: "That the members of the Mission Builders League contribute \$10.00 to each appeal granted by the Board of Directors." Construction costs have more than doubled since the league was begun, so the increase is just.

Guidelines have been established for determining who will be approved for an appeal. A congregation must be a member church of the Church of God General Conference, organized, have a record of doctrinal and of spiritual stability, and employ a full-time, or nearly full-time pastor, who is licensed by the Church of God General Conference.

Paragraph eight of the guidelines states: "The Mission Builders League will be used primarily for those congregations buying or constructing church buildings which have not owned a building previously and, secondarily, for those congregations which are meeting in a building of their own that is not specifically suitable for worship and are buying or con-

structing church buildings. In the event that no appeals have been received from either of the two categories mentioned, the following will be considered: those congregations which are remodeling, repairing, or enlarging their present building; those congregations relocating to a more desirable site; and those congregations which have outgrown their present facilities and are buying or rebuilding. The last three categories are not listed according to priority. Priority will be given to the congregation which is least able financially to proceed with such plans unaided."

Churches that have received assistance from Mission Builders to date, in order, are Dayton, Ohio; San Jose, California; Digby, Nova Scotia; Bedford, Ohio; Peoria, Illinois; Hector, Minnesota; Troy, Ohio; Whitnel, North Carolina; Denver, Colorado; Omaha, Nebraska; Columbia Station, Ohio: Minneapolis, Minnesota; Uddiawan, Philippine Islands; Raymore, Missouri; Lombard, Illinois; St. Louis, Missouri; Eternal Hope, Virginia; Phoenix, Arizona; Macomb, Illinois; L'Anse, Michigan; Pomona, California; Happy Woods, Louisiana; Graytown, Wisconsin; Garden Park, Michigan: Columbus, Ohio: Royal Village, Virginia; Bangalore, India; Rockford, Illinois; Pleasant Hill, Ohio; Quezon, Philippine Islands; North Hills, Ohio; Flagg Center, Illinois; Lafayette, Indiana; and Blanchard, Michigan.

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Missions News

Nigeria News

At the Edienne Church, pastored by Ephraim Udo, special activities were conducted during November. The first week was spent in Bible lessons for laymen and Sunday school teachers. Prayer meetings were held each night. The following week, a house-to-house campaign was conducted. Pray that fruit may come from this and similar efforts.

During the last week of November, Bro. Udo went to the city of Calabar, capital of the Southeastern State, where a new group has been started. We trust that it will grow to become a strong witness in that city.

The foundation stone for the new church building in Edienne was laid in January. The building is expected to be completed sometime in the next eighteen months.

Ghana Update

This school year is seeing the largest enrollment ever in the Northern Volta Business College at Nkwanta. With one hundred six students, the enrollment is about double that of last year. The students began their second term last month. The first term runs from September through December, and the third from May through July.

The school has a four-year program. In addition to Bible classes, there are classes for students who study science, art, and business. Students in each branch are expected to complete four years of study, to prepare for examinations which will lead to the General Certificate of Education.

Members of the school's staff, headed by Pastor Oliver Amani, are mostly graduates of senior high school, and specialists, who teach specialized courses in certain subjects. Some of these teachers are people whom Bro. Amani met while conducting evangelistic efforts in various towns. Four of the six teachers are baptized members of the Church of God.

Each month, Bro. Amani visits the new group of Christians in Kwamikrom. In his latest letter, Bro. Amani said that a major evangelistic effort was being planned for that village, to be conducted during the month of January.

With Faith . . . Growth

Bro. Cornelius Boykai, in a recent report, states: "With faith in Christ Jesus, our church will grow like

an elephant in Liberia." We are glad for the growth that the Salala Church of God has experienced in the past two years. Including recent baptisms, the total membership is now one hundred one.

Services at the church are usually conducted in two languages, English and Kpelle. If there are more English-speaking people present, Bro. Boykai will use that language, with an interpreter to repeat in Kpelle what he says. If more Kpelle-speaking people are there, the reverse will be true.

Hindu Festivals

Pastor P. M. Paulson, located near Hyderabad, India, writes of an opportunity for literature distribution. From January through May, 1976, many Hindu festivals are being planned. Bro. Paulson says that the churches need much literature to distribute among the many people who will be on pilgrimages. Pray for this outreach plan.

Three weekly services are held in the Ravulapalem Church, and four co-workers of Bro. Paulson hold services in six other locations.

Philippine Activities

During November, Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero and some of the other workers went on a "church tour," on which they visited all but two of the outlying churches.

At the Lupao Church, there was evangelistic outreach preaching, and one person accepted Christ and was baptized. Although most of its members have moved away, attendance at the Lupao Church is beginning to increase.

Outdoor assembly and preaching are strictly prohibited in the area of the Agbannawag Church, so all services there were held indoors.

The Liwan group was very glad to have the visitors come. These people requested that the radio work be moved to their area again. This request is likely to be granted. (From time to time, the radio broadcast is sent out from different stations. Bro. and Sr. Eleodoro Javar are presently in charge of the radio work.)

The tour group could not reach two of the churches because of swollen rivers, and also of deteriorating peace and order in the area.

Bro. Ortiguero asks that we pray that he may be able to overcome the harassments and persecutions that are still threatening.

Post-High Midwinter Retreat Concluded

The Annual Post-high Midwinter Retreat, held December 29 - January 1, 1976, was a tremendous success. The number attending this year was twenty-six, thus becoming one of the smallest midwinter retreats that we have had for some time. However, the majority of those who attended agreed that it was an extremely meaningful experience. Hugh and Mary Harman, and Jim and Charleen Graham served as the staff for this retreat.

The midwinter retreat was originally arranged for post-high young people, but they have not been able to fill it out. As a result, it has been expanded to include twelfth graders. Eighteen post-high and eight twelfth graders made up the number attending. The retreat was held in the Ulrich Retreat Center, at Camp Alexander Mack, near Milford, Indiana. This center is equipped to accommodate forty people, so we have some room for growth.

It is difficult to describe the experience and fellowship that one can enjoy at a retreat such as this. In three nights and two days, some meaningful relationships are developed that will last forever. I believe that it can safely be said that there is no better way to spend time over the New Year holidays.

The retreat is vc.y loosely structured. It allows time to do things just because you enjoy doing them, like sitting around talking, enjoying a game of checkers or chess, gathering around the fireplace to sing, ice skating, or maybe building a ten-foot snowman or indulging in a good snowball fight. We were fortunate that there were five inches of snow on the ground and that the lake was partially frozen. Everyone also enjoyed the roller-skating party, which was held during one afternoon of the retreat. This year, the roller rink in Winona Lake was rented. We had the rink all to ourselves and the roller rink staff accommodated us with several games, races, and other special events. Everyone seemed to have a real good time.

The study program was centered around a workshop from Serendipity, entitled "Destiny." This material was related to "Discovering Your Call." It involves what Serendipity refers to as "conversation starters," "icebreakers," and "Scripture heavies." These are considered by small groups of six or eight, which are referred to as "families." Two-hour sessions were held each morning and evening.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOPE

For some as yet undetermined reason, Bro. Francis Burnett's column failed to arrive in time for inclusion in this issue. Your editor takes this opportunity to express some thoughts concerning Sunday school work.

Word of Appreciation

Our General Conference Sunday School Board is working diligently to improve both the Sunday school materials available to our Sunday schools and the talents of the teachers who will use them. We take great satisfaction in observing that they are making every effort to keep the teaching in our Sunday schools both attractive and doctrinally sound. They are helping our Sunday schools to grow in attendance, but have carefully avoided the pitfall of sacrificing quality for the sake of quantity. They see no reason why our Sunday schools cannot have both. Neither do we.

Sunday School Attendance Promotions

A bus ministry is now considered to be vital to the attendance increase of any Sunday school. It is a very valuable tool, but it also has its dangers. Bus pastors, competing with those of other churches, sometimes yield to the temptation to go to ridiculous extremes in seeking to entice children away from other congregations, and to their own. A newspaper clipping that came to me begins: "'Unethical and unscriptural gimmicks' by competing churches have forced a Des Plaines (IL) church to halt its five-year-old bus service for those attending its Sunday services."

The pastor of the church discontinuing its bus service charged: "The church offering the most sensational gimmick or entertainment of the week won. I shudder to think what conception of the church and the Christian gospel some of those children now have." He said that his church "had provided breakfast, refreshments, toys, special parties, incentive prizes and the like" to attract bus riders.

The great danger in such promotions is that the means sometimes becomes an end in itself. The purpose of the Sunday school is not to entertain but to instruct and inspire. A huge enrollment and large attendance do not necessarily mean that a Sunday school is fulfilling the purpose for which it was created. We are sure that our Sunday school leaders recognize that a child who switches from Sunday school to Sunday school in response to enticing promotions is not likely to receive a sound spiritual foundation upon which to build his life. We are sure that the growing bus ministry of the Church of God is wisely used.

LOUISIANA PROPERTY

This is the first of a series of articles designed to better inform you concerning the Board's future plans to put to use the Louisiana Land, and to answer many questions which have been asked

Introduction

The Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, at the November 15, 16, 1973, meeting, appointed a committee of three to study the possible uses of the 51.2 acres of land located a short distance south of the City of Hammond, La. This land was donated to the General Conference on June 21, 1967, by Carl E. Bottolfs and Hattie Bixler Bottolfs.

A detailed preliminary report was presented by the committee to the Board of Directors and the General Conference last August. Even though the committee felt that the report presented at the 1975 General Conference completed the work of the committee, the Board of Directors asked the committee to continue until the distributed questionnaires could be received and evaluated.

The committee evaluated the questionnaires which had been received prior to the Board of Directors meeting, November 14, 15, 1975. A report on the results of the questionnaires was presented to the Board of Directors at that meeting.

At the 1975 General Conference, the dele-

gates passed the following motion:

That a three-member Administrative Board be appointed under the jurisdiction of the General Conference Board of Directors to supersede the committee that had been serving. This Board will study the use of the property, and continue necessary work on the project. Accordingly, at the November, 1975, meeting, the Board of Directors appointed an Administrative Board of three members to continue the work begun by the committee. This Board will be disseminating information to you through the Progress Journal concerning its work with the Louisiana land.

BIBLE READING MARATHON

The Flagg Center, IL, Community Church of God began a Bible Reading Marathon at 1:00 p.m., Sunday, December 28, 1975. Our intention was to read the Bible aloud night and day, beginning with Genesis, and reading through Revelation. We wanted at least two people present in the church at all times—one to read, and at least one to listen. When one person finished reading, another immediately continued from the place where he stopped. We had planned a New Year's Eve fellowship and watchnight service to begin at 10 o'clock Wednesday, December 31, so we read as rapidly as possible. We allowed ourselves 81 hours, but finished in 76.

To prepare for the marathon, a chart was made which sectioned off the hours, and volunteers were requested to fill in their names as readers or listeners. Thirty persons volunteered to read, and Bros. S. O. and Kent Ross joined with us to make thirty-two. Alphabetically by families, the volunteer readers were Ray Beach; Gladys Bearrows; Robert and Connie Coffman; Ward and Grace Countryman; Ray Foster; Peg Huntley; Rose Johnston; Gordon, Barbara, Joel, Gigi, Jennifer, and Barry Landry; "Bud" and Betty Mickey; Jim, Mary, and Monte Mickey; Vern, Barb, Lance, Gwen, and Corey New, Ruth Patterson; Vicki Roberts; Jerry and Bonnie Seebach; and Mable Stadeble.

We were a little slow in recognizing the advertising potential of the marathon. We did send a notice to a Rochelle paper and the local radio station. It was not until after the marathon had started that the paper was asked if it did not think there was something newsworthy in the program. A photographer was sent out and a picture of Mable Stadeble reading and Vicki Roberts listening was subsequently featured on the paper's front page. The story was picked up by a Rockford paper on New Year's Day. A quick call to a Rockford TV station after the marathon ended at 5 o'clock got us a two- or three-sentence mention on the 6 o'clock news. We would advise others who might want to try this program to take full advantage of the advertising potential. It's an excellent way to call attention to your church.

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How to Disagree

O BE able to disagree agreeably seems to be one of the most difficult skills for zealous Christians to acquire. The more strongly we feel about a doctrine, a policy, a course of action, or an attitude, the greater becomes the temptation to allow our feelings to cause us to deal unkindly with those who cannot grasp truths that seem clearly evident to us. Failure to seek the help of the Lord in overcoming such temptations may bring tragic consequences. Friends may be turned into enemies. Potential friends may be led to reject our friendship, and along with it the Christianity that was not strong enough to permit us to control ourselves.

This is not to imply that anyone should pretend to agree when he does not. It is to insist, however, that each one should prayerfully seek to express his feelings in a way that will not wound others. When we disagree in a kindly and considerate manner, we leave the door open for further amiable discussion of the issue at stake at some future time. When we allow our comments to become acrid or insulting, we slam a door that we may never be able to open again! To be able to disagree without uttering disparaging remarks is a skill that not only helps to gain and keep friends; it will also help to spare you high blood pressure and ulcers. To allow a disagreement to make us insensitive to the needs and feelings of others is a luxury that none of us can afford. In the end, it may destroy us.

"A soft answer turneth away wrath: but grievous words stir up anger. The tongue of the wise useth knowledge aright: but the mouth of fools poureth out foolishness" (Prov. 15:1).

Think of the times that you have lost your temper and "told somebody off." Are you glad now that you did? Were the results worthwhile? What did you gain by it? What did you lose? Are you a better and more effective Christian now because you lost your temper? You are not trying to convince somebody else of how right you were, so be honest with yourself in evaluating your outbursts.

If another's opinions and the way that he expresses them irritate you, begin by forgiving him for disagreeing with you. This will open the way for you to calmly and objectively consider what he believes to be true. If you cannot accept his views, tell him so kindly and acknowledge his right to disagree with you. After all, you are claiming the right to disagree with him! Be fair! You may find that you didn't understand his view to begin with.

The Apostle Paul's charge to the Ephesian brethren was: "Be ye angry, and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath: neither give place to the devil" (4:26, 27). The New English Bible expresses the same thought: "If you are angry, do not let anger lead you into sin; do not let sunset find you still nursing it; leave no loop-hole for the devil."

But how does one so quickly overcome his anger against one who has rejected his opinions, refusing to even give them a fair hearing? Jesus has the answer: "I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:44, 45). It is a spiritual impossibility to pray for one who has provoked our anger and still be angry with him. If you are presently angry with someone, you are challenged to prove this principle by giving it a test. Pray for him!

Assuming that a brother has used you so unjustly that you feel that a settlement is demanded, Jesus outlined a procedure

for a faithful follower of his to pursue. "If thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican" (Matt. 18:15-17). It is absolute disobedience to Jesus to skip the first two steps of this procedure and go directly to the last two. If we do, our case may be even worse than that of the brother who has offended us.

Another word of caution: Do not go beyond the first step of this procedure unless you are willing to uncomplainingly accept the judgment of the one or two brothers of the church, or of the church as a whole. They may conclude that you are the one who is in the wrong, and the one who should make amends! Are you humble enough to do this?

Be very sure that the issue you are raising is really worth the risk before you pursue it. Evidently those who pray for them that despitefully use them belong to the same category as peacemakers, for Jesus promised them the same reward. "Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God" (Matt. 5:9).

James pointed out that "where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle and easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace" (Jas. 3:16-18).

Most of the cabins have cooking facilities, so families have the option to cook their own meals if they so desire.

Watch future issues of the *Progress Journal* for further information on the Conference Program. Reservations for Conference will be accepted *after* May first. This is a family camp, and families are urged to stay together in cabins. Make your plans now to attend.

Visitors in India

You will remember that in March of 1975, Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence of Phoenix, Arizona, spent some time with our Indian brethren. February 4, 1976, the Lawrences arrived in Bangalore for a six-week follow-up visit. During their stay, they plan to conduct intensive Bible study and spiritual growth classes for all who can understand English. We are grateful to the Lawrences for their willingness to make this important trip. Sr. Lawrence is a member of the Mission Board and Bro. Lawrence is a member of the Board of Education of Oregon Bible College. Both are well qualified to give the needed help. Won't you pray for them as they minister to our brothers and sisters in India?

Information on India

Here are some facts about India and its religions which may be of interest to you.

India has a population of 584,704,000, which places it second only to China, but its area is less than half that of the United States. Most of the people live in small towns and villages, with only 18 percent dwelling in cities. Bombay is the largest city, but New Delhi is the capital. The people earn their living mostly from agriculture, but there is some mining and manufacturing. The average per capita income is \$90 per year.

The official language is Hindi, and English is an associate language. In addition, the constitution recognizes 14 national languages. It is estimated that a total of

1,652 languages and dialects are spoken. Sometimes a husband and wife each speak and understand a different language, and must communicate in a third language which they both know.

The Christian community makes up 2 to 3 percent of the total population, and 40 percent of all Christians live in the southwestern state of Kerala. There are great areas of this country that are unevangelized, and in some places even Indian missionaries are prohibited.

Of the total population, 83 percent is Hindu, 11 percent Muslim, and 2.6 percent Christian (including Roman Catholics). Christianity is the third largest religion among India's many groups, and has the largest rate of increase (33 percent between 1961 and 1971). Most of its converts come from the lower caste and tribal peoples. There are approximately 5.5 million Protestants (about 1 percent of the population), belonging to over 100 denominations.

We are grateful to God for the workers that we have in India. Pastor S. S. Manoah and his fellow-workers minister to those in the city of Bangalore, and Pastor P. M. Paulson and his helpers work with people in towns and villages farther north.

Ghana

Tract distribution in Ghana is conducted by giving a number of tracts to certain members, to be distributed in house-to-house visitation on Sundays after church services. Tracts are even given to illiterate people, who then give them to relatives who are able to read to them. This way, the message reaches all segments of the community. They also enclose tracts in letters to friends and relatives.

Missions Superintendent in Nova Scotia

Pastor and Mrs. John Carr arrived in Digby, Nova Scotia, January 16, 1976, to begin Bro. Carr's work as interim pastor for eight weeks. They are glad for this opportunity to serve, and are grateful to the Macomb Church for granting them leave of absence.

At this writing, plans are being made for future interim pastors to work here. Pastor Vivian Kirkpatrick of Oregon, Illinois, who pastors the Graytown, Wisconsin, Church, will be here for the months of May and June. In July, Pastor John Hearp of the Glad Tidings Church in Fonthill, Ontario, Canada, will come to serve. We are glad for the willingness of those servants of God to come and minister.

Professional Preparation

Each student at Oregon Bible College who is preparing a minor in Pastoral Studies is required to take five hours of a course called "Pastoral Work." This class is designed to bring together the theoretical ideal of pastoral responsibility and the practical aspects of its administration.

The course will acquaint the student with the various problems, responsibilities, and work of the ministry. It includes: the nature of the call to the ministry; the nature of the pastoral office; the minister's private devotional life; his relationship to the church and his parishioners; and also his relationship to the denomination and the community. It explores the areas of: worship, religious education, and ministerial etiquette. In addition to these areas, the student will study: church organization, church finance, working with young people in the church; the role of men's and women's organizations in the church, the responsibilities of pastoral visitation, medical counseling, and the proper way to conduct weddings, funerals, and baptisms.

Not only does the student come to understand the theory of how best to lead in these activities, he also gets a very practical knowledge by actually participating in and practicing directing baptisms, funerals, weddings, and counseling sessions.

The morning began with breakfast, but no food was served. Instead, the group fasted, and spent the time in prayer for each other and in devotions. The entire group participated in creatively expressing the meaning of prayer in pantomime.

Youth Week-1975

This organization came into being by reason of the efforts of Eunice Pearson and Elaine Handspiker of Digby, N.S., and Walter Johnson, then an inmate of Stony Mountain Penitentiary. After three years, in which much work was done and many letters written, the C.P.A. (Christian Prisoner's Association) was officially recognized by the Canadian government, and a charter issued, September 1, 1975.

The purpose of the C.P.A. is to present the gospel to those in correctional institutions, to visit them when possible, to encourage them with letters and Christian literature, and to show kindness and love, that they may know that others care.

FROM OUR MAIL

From Welling, England

The following is taken from a letter which Bro. S. O. Ross received from A. O. Hudson, editor of The Bible Study Monthly, published in Welling, Kent, England: "We recently received from one of our readers in the United States a few leaflets published by your good-selves, including one entitled 'Your Introduc-tion to the Church of God,' from which we perceive that your outlook in the Scriptures and the doctrines of the Faith are very much in line with that for which our own journal stands and which we, in our very small way, are trying to promulgate in this country." Mr. Hudson then suggested an exchange agreement between Bible Study Monthly and The Restitution Herald. He also extended to us the privilege of copying from publications which he edits, provided only that we give proper credit for them.

From Jersey, Channel Islands

"The article by Hazel Cramer in December's magazine was a very sound warning on the evils of divorce." The letter was signed by F. B. Murfin, Holly Lodge, Five Oaks, Jersey, Channel Islands. He approved of Sr. Cramer's article, but insisted that the Bible does not permit divorce for any cause. It is not our purpose to argue the question here, but merely to point out how far the printed word travels, and the influence that it may have.

From Decatur, Michigan

Typographical errors travel just as far as does the literature which contains them. This letter starts out: "I read The Restitution Herald from cover to cover each month. For some time I have felt that a problem should be corrected.' The letter goes on to point out that scriptural references are sometimes given incorrectly, i.e., are not found where the article designates. It ends with the words: "Our Herald carries such a wonderful message. Please, let's have it perfect.'

Not wishing to embarrass the writer, we have withheld the name. We have assured the writer that we will be extra careful about this. However, as long as The Herald is prepared and published by imperfect people, it will likely be imperfect in some respects. These references are carefully checked at least three times, but still errors slip through. Unlike misspelled words, which usually don't "look right," numbers can be transposed, left out, or incorrectly written, and still the result is not easily detectable because they look OK, especially to tired eyes that are weary from reading much proof. We promise to be careful, but we cannot promise no mistakes.

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Given to Hospitality

An Editorial

NE OF THE THINGS that often impresses strangers when they visit one of the Churches of God is the evident love and esteem that the members have one for the other. This is good, and highly commendable. It should be encouraged. But, unfortunately, it sometimes seems equally evident to these same visitors that the membership is only mildly nterested in, and sometimes distinctly cool toward, visitors with whom they are not acquainted. The members do not deliberately snub them; they simply gather together in little groups with their close friends and ignore the visitors. The result is that the visitors leave with the distinct impression that no one in the church really cared whether they were there or not. This is inhospitality!

Though the Bible contains many fine examples of hospitality, the word itself appears in our King James Version of the Bible only four times. Twice it is pointed out as one of the characteristics of one who is qualified to be a bishop (overseer), and twice it appears as an admonition to all Christians. (Read 1 Tim. 3:1, 2; Titus 1:7, 8; Rom. 12:9-13; 1 Pet. 4:8-10.)

According to the Greek word that is translated "hospitality" in each case, simply inviting people into our home or into our church is not, in and of itself, hospitality. In the New Testament the word "hospitality" is translated from the Greek word philoxenos, or philonexia. About the nearest that we can get to an exact translation of the word is "the love of uests." We are not really exercising hospitality until that love becomes clearly evident to our guests. The same word is translated as "entertain strangers" in Hebrews 13:1, 2. When this same passage

speaks of entertaining angels, another Greek word is used. It is *xenizo*, which means "to be a host."

It would be possible to entertain guests in our homes regularly and well, without ever once being hospitable. This could come about if we were entertaining them even though we were doing so reluctantly. Having guests does not necessarily make us lovers of guests.

We all know, from experience, that entertaining guests in our homes is a family project. We depend upon every member of the family to help make the guests feel welcome and comfortable in our midst. Even when the guests are people we love, it requires thoughtfulness and consideration to accomplish this.

When we transfer this principle to our "church home" and "Christian family," we begin to understand that extending hospitality to visitors in the church is the privilege and responsibility of every member. We are not exercising our hospitality when visitors are in Sunday school or worship services simply because we invited them there. Only when we happily assume responsibility for helping them feel welcome and comfortable in our midst are we being hospitable. We must remember that they feel strange. They are not familiar with the routines that have become so much a part of us. They are fearful of feeling embarrassed because they don't know which class to attend, where the class meets, or even the name of its teacher. It is up to us to help. The same is true of the worship service. Visitors, typically, are unsure of their status and ill at ease. They will appreciate our kindness and volunteer assistance.

Some of us are naturally shy in the pres-

ence of strangers. We are afraid to speak, lest we say the wrong thing and so offend them that they will never come back. This is, of course, a remote possibility, but highly unlikely if we remember the Golden Rule, and seek to treat them as we would want to be treated if we were in their place.

This is not the time to interrogate our quests with regard to their doctrinal convictions, and much less to seek to correct any views that the guests may express which we feel are in error. When they feel sure of our regard for them, and comfortable in our companionship, they will much more readily and comfortably discuss doctrine with us. At the moment, they are gaining impressions of us as a church family. Do they want to make ours their church home? Have they been sufficiently impressed with our attitudes and behavior to want to come back next Sunday? For the time being, they are much more concerned about our attitudes than they are about the doctrines which prompt them.

We will get to know them much faster in an informal atmosphere. Let us invite them to our homes if we would love the situation thus brought into existence, welcoming the opportunity to enjoy fellowship with some newly found friends. When we have established with them a mutual love and trust, we will still want to continue our hospitality toward them, and hopefully enjoy their hospitality as well. In any event, because we were lovers of guests, we have made spiritually profitable contacts.

"Wherefore receive ye one another, as Christ also received us to the glory of God" (Rom. 15:7).

Nova Scotia Storm

The worst windstorm remembered hit the Maritime Provinces February 2, 1976. Hurricane-force winds, up to 118 miles per hour, buffeted Nova Scotia, causing damages estimated at close to \$50 million.

The Digby Neck area (a peninsula and several islands southwest of Digby) was declared a disaster area. Many fishermen lost their boats and thereby their livelihood. Buildings and wharves were washed away, as well as thousands of lobsters and traps.

Our Lighthouse Church of God stands on the highest point in Digby, and feels the effects of the wind, even on ordinary days. It lost half of the heavy plastic siding on two sides of the building. Insurance will be of help in repairing the damage.

We are grateful to the Lord for his protection and are thankful that there were no serious injuries or deaths.

My husband and I enjoyed our time spent in Digby. We are glad for the opportunity to become acquainted with the brethren of the Lighthouse Church of God.

Both of these men are presently enrolled in the Systematic Bible Study Course. Pray for them, as they continue their study and grow in the Christian faith.

The Kipsigis

Recently, I read an interesting article written by Richard Adkins, missionary to the Kipsigis tribe in Kenya, East Africa. He had made a trip through the dense bamboo forest with two porters and two guides from this tribe. In the evening, they sat around the campfire and talked about the various customs and religious beliefs of the Kipsigis people. Some very interesting things were revealed.

Nearly every grouping of mankind has in its history the story of a flood covering the earth. The Kipsigis do also. In fact, they can trace the migration of their people from the site of Noah's ark, through Canaan, and up the Nile Valley into East Africa! But they tell an additional story. Long ago, their enslaved ancestors escaped their captors. As they were fleeing, they came to a large body of water. When they thought that all was lost, the waters parted and the fugitives crossed over. As their enemies began to pursue them, the waters closed and drowned them. The Kipsigis people say that their leader was named "Musa" (Arabic derivative for Moses)! It is interesting to recall that the Bible says a "mixed multitude" went up out of Egypt at the Exodus.

The Kipsigis consider the pig unclean, and offer blood sacrifices for wrongdoing. They do not worship idols or carved images, but believe in a Supreme being, Creator of the world. Their prayers are addressed to Asis, the sun, who represents that Power. Asis has a son, who shall some day come to rule the earth as a Prince, bringing peace to all nations and tribes.

But these things are about all that remain of what their ancestors learned from their Israelitish neighbors. The events of Romans 1:18-25 happened to this people. They chose to forsake righteousness and go their own way. They began to attribute bad things that happened—drought, flood, sickness—to evil spirits. This people became fearful and felt obligated to appease these spirits. So the first missionaries to the Kipsigis found them in spiritual darkness, having lost the light and the way back to God.

Mr. Adkins told his four companions about the Son of God, the Prince of Peace, who had come. He told how Christ had died for their sins and rose from the dead, and that he wants to save them.

The four Africans did not accept Christ that night. Prayers continue to go up to God for them, as missionaries labor to bring the saving knowledge of our Savior.

Circumstances

Circumstances may provide a convenient excuse for not sharing the gospel with others. But circumstances seem to favor those who, through dedication to God and his Word, are prepared to share it when opportunities arise. Learn the way of salvation well, and God will open the way to teach it to others.

It is our hope that, through this program, students will gain much practical knowledge and many skills directly related to pastoral abilities. Through this program, the students will learn to apply the theoretical knowledge they have gained during their four years of Bible College education. The internship program places the student in a one-to-one relationship with a professional pastor. Through this close personal contact and guidance, he will receive direction and encouragement, while testing his own abilities.

The college will maintain complete administration and control of the program, asking for the cooperation of ministers and churches. The college will select the churches and ministers to participate in the program. Those selected will be asked to participate on a year-by-year basis.

A pastoral internship manual will serve as a guide for both students and cooperating pastors. The manual outlines the specific duties and areas of participation in which the student is to be involved in the local church. Initially, the internship program will be entered voluntarily. We hope that soon we may require it of all graduating pastoral studies majors.

The means for financing the internship program has not been determined. In these first years, we are asking the churches that cooperate in the program to provide some funds for the support of the students who intern in their church. We feel that churches should not think that they are hiring an assistant pastor when a student interns at their church. Certainly, both students and churches will benefit from this internship program. However, any funds that they provide should be considered a gift on the part of the church, not viewed as payment for work that the student is doing. We feel that this arrangement is necessary, to maintain the freedom and integrity of the internship program.

This year, Scott Millard will be interning at the Happy Woods Church in Hammond, LA; Dick Alcumbrack will intern at Pennellwood in Grand Rapids, MI; and Carl Jennings will be interning in Oregon, IL.

From Victoria, Australia

After mentioning a contribution for the new dormitory building, and for the expense of publishing The Restitution Herald, Bro. Ron Bray comments:

I am sure you will be interested to know that the magazine is still very welcome to its recipients. Pastor J. H. Finch reads it always with great interest, as do the other folk to whom I give it. On several occasions, extracts from messages contained in The Restitution Herald have been quoted in the bulletin of Mooroolbark Baptist Church.

I would love to see you all again, but such opportunity does not seem to be probable, as my wife's health is rather poor-heart trouble, I'm afraid. She is soon ill if she is too active. We are hoping to go to New Caledonia for a holiday soon. That is a French possession, about three hours by jet from Sydney, which is about as far as we dare go at present.

We are just in our summer and the weather is quite abnormal in much of the continent. This morning's news mentioned a ranch in western Queensland, where in two days there fell a normal two years rainfall. Alice Springs, in our 'dry heart' is cut off by flood waters, and even the city of Townsville on the coast is isolated. Down here in Victoria it is more normal, but the temperature goes up and down like a yo-yo! The last couple of years, the southeast monsoon seems to have come much further south than usual; it usually only reaches to the top of the continent.

My wife joins with me in sending our love in Jesus to you all in Oregon; you are in our pravers.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE

FROM THE SIDELINES

INQUESTIONABLY, Oregon Bible College is one of the most popular, if not the most popular, of all of the continuing activities of the Church of God General Conference. When we consider how closely the college is bound up with the future of both the young people who attend, and of the teaching of those precious truths upon which our faith is based, this is not surprising. The brethren have demonstrated that they believe this by encouraging young people to attend Oregon Bible College, and by liberally contributing to the financial needs of the college. This is highly commendable. They are entitled to a realistic appraisal of what they may logically expect of the college in return.

Your editor is not directly associated with the college (i.e., not on the staff or any of the committees that deal with it). I am, however, in a favorable position to make certain observations from the sidelines.

It is a foregone conclusion that when we send our young people to a Bible college, we want them to develop an intimate, working knowledge of what the Bible contains. We also agree that specialized courses should prepare those who plan to enter the Christian ministry to deal effectively with the opportunities and problems that they will encounter after graduation. It is our hope that those who do not intend to devote their lives to the ministry will, nevertheless, gain special skills that will enable them to better serve in the congregations with which they may become associated. This is the practical part.

Overshadowing the practical aspects of their experiences as students at Oregon Bible College are the spiritual values that they will carry with them when they leave. For the most part, these are "caught" rather than "taught." The personality and attitudes of the members of the faculty influence this much more than any information that a course of study can cause them to store in their minds. They also are susceptible to "catching" such values from fellow students. More than most of them realize, older students have a powerful influence on the younger.

For the most part, freshmen at OBC have just graduated from high school, and for one reason or another have decided to attend here. We need to remember that when they arrive, they are just that -high school graduates who have come to college. The attitudes and practices that their homes, churches, and schools have begotten in them are not left in storage at home. Therefore, these students must be met where they are, and be led into spiritual experiences that will serve to enrich and mature their attitudes. These gains will stay with them long after the information they gained in class has been forgotten. As a product of the Bible Training Class, which was the forerunner of Oregon Bible College, I know this to be true in my own experience. My teachers and fellow students have powerfully influenced my life ever since.

Occasionally, a student may arrive who seems determined to alter the rules and regulations to make them more to his liking, or, failing this, to disregard them altogether. Obviously, if this attitude persists, with no real effort at improvement, there is no alternative but to dismiss that student from the college. It would be unfair to all concerned to permit such an attitude to grow, develop, and bear its

evil fruits. "A little leaven leaveneth the whole lump" (1 Cor. 5:6). Fortunately, such occasions are rare.

It is a pleasure to watch the students develop and mature from month to month and from year to year. As their insights deepen and they become spiritually more confident, their horizons broaden. No longer is their chief concern to satisfy their own desires, but to follow that which is right in the sight of their heavenly Father, and to encourage others to do so as well. They have a message to share, and they have learned to share it with confidence, knowing that the Lord will bless them in this.

Not a few of them have found their life's mates at Oregon Bible College. This is not the purpose of the college, but we can safely say that it is an important by-product that quite often appears. No one would deny that a zealous Christian mate is a priceless asset to anyone who wishes to devote his life to serving the Lord. To my knowledge, beyond accepting the responsibility of keeping their courtship within prudent Christian limits, and emphasizing the advantages of having a mate who will encourage their Christian service, no effort is made to guide these choices.

Though new graduates commonly believe that they are competent to handle any situation that may arise, they soon come to the knowledge that they are still maturing, and need sympathetic and understanding help. Indeed, my personal experience indicates that forty or fifty years later, they will still be of the same opinion.

We older students can say and do much that will either encourage or discourage them. The Christian way is to encourage.

WOMEN'S DORMITORY By Mary Krogh

The large home pictured above was originally used as a grade school for the city of Oregon. In 1922 it was purchased by National Bible Institution and after some remodeling it was used for elderly Church of God members. It was dedicated on December 31, 1922. On the same afternoon the name "Golden Rule Home" was chosen by those assembled to be the official name.

In 1956, boys who attended Oregon


Bible College lived here. In 1958 the boys lived at the Magaw home and the girls took residence here while attending the College.

When I came to Oregon in 1972 as Dormitory Director, there were thirteen girls living here. In 1973, there were seventeen girls living here and six lived at the Dorm Annex at 710 Washington Street. We have many happy memories of living here.

Early in April, 1975, construction was started on the new dorm at 710 Franklin Street. The last of August, twenty-one girls moved into their beautiful new home. They are enjoying the larger facilities and the lovely carpeted floors and large study areas. The spacious lounge is used by all students. Dedication of the new dorm was held in the lounge on November 16, 1975, with over two hundred attending. There were many present from out of state.

We thank our heavenly Father for being with us and directing us in this project, and we know that he will continue to guide us if we remain faithful to him.

STUDENT COUNCIL By Gary Smith

The student government at Oregon Bible College has been organized into a Student Council. The main function of this Council is to represent the student body to the administration and vice versa. Students are encouraged to channel their opinions, grievances, and suggestions through the Student Council. The Council is expected to consider these matters and take appropriate action.

The Council assists in arranging extracurricular activities. The Student Council constitution provides for various standing committees—such as Social Committee and Christian Service Committee—to plan many of the activities. These committees are responsible to the Student Council.

If the Council does take some course of action with which the students do not agree, the student body may reverse the Council's decision by a two-thirds majority vote.

In addition to these officers, each class has two representatives on the Council. One of these is the class president and the other is an elected representative. Committee heads and a faculty advisor make up the balance of the Council's members.


The main functions of the social committee are to provide student activities where each individual can become involved and, as we interact with other students, we hope that we may have a closer relationship with the Lord.





It becomes apparent to everyone that such a church is inadequate. All had forgotten the true message of the gospel, and so they were at a loss at delivering the message to others.

The individual members tell the newcomer the different reasons they go to church, which range from wearing new clothes to being forced to go by one's own spouse. Finally, they persuade the visitor to join and they all rejoice as the chairman says, "Always does my heart good to see another soul saved!"

After the final bow, the program was opened up for discussion with the audience. They were asked to give their opinions on how they felt about the play and whether or not it applied to the church. It was very interesting to note the different remarks and we were glad to discover that not one church took offense at the play.

The play cast enjoyed each other's company so well that we had a party at the Jennings' home to celebrate. We hope to put on more plays in the future for the benefit of the students and especially for the ministry of our churches.





How Important Is Good Adult Leadership?

A nationwide survey, conducted a few years ago among teen dropouts from church, indicated that more than half of them had complaints directly related to the teachers and leaders to whom they were exposed. They also expressed dissatisfaction with adult leaders who show either a lack of interest or a lack of understanding.

On the opposite side, literally hundreds of Christian young people have cited the help rendered to them by adult leaders to whom they were exposed as the major reason for their still being strong, effective Christian workers.

Strong, close, spiritually healthy classes and youth groups can, to a great degree, be directly tied to mature, strong, understanding, and spiritual adult leadership. Strong, healthy youth leadership is also necessary for classes and groups, to a large degree; however, this is developed through the adult leadership. Young people need, and desire, adults with whom they can talk and confide, as well as follow their examples.

What kind of persons are qualified to be leaders of youth? Should they be young or older? Does age make a difference? I think not!

The basic endeavor of a good youth leader is to guide young people toward spiritual maturity. To accomplish this, leaders must know, love, and follow Christ. This is absolutely necessary if they are going to lead others to know, love, and follow our Saviour. They must be knowledgeable about the Bible, and familiar with doctrines and truths as set forth in God's Word. This is not to say that they must necessarily be advanced students of the Bible, but knowledgeable. A youth leader must be dependable. Consistency plays a major role in the presentation of any program. If the leaders are not dependable in fulfilling their responsibilities, it becomes difficult, if not impossible, to lead youth to be dependable and responsible.

Time and hard work are primary requirements for successful workers with youth. There must be a willingness to learn along with the teens for whom they are responsible. It is essential that they be mature, both spiritually and emotionally.

If a youth leader says, "Who is sufficient for these things?" let him be reminded that these are desired goals toward which they may work, as the Lord enables them to do so.

Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

Theme: "Heritage of Our Faith"

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors on April 29, 1975. The report is presented here so delegates to the 1976 General Conference business sessions (August 9-14, 1976, Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, IA) can become familiar with it and can be instructed by their church or state conference regarding same.

This report is for the first eight months of the fiscal year, and my special items of interest in the interim will be reported brally at General Conference. The progress and activities of the several departments are reported herein, with some additional comments on the work as a whole.

The new dormitory at Oregon Bible College has been used since school began in August, 1975. The building is working out very satisfactorily, and is a tremendous asset to the work of Oregon Bible College. All of the physical facilities of the General Conference are in good repair. The literature campaign continues to be a blessing to the churches and individuals who are involved in this program of distributing the written Word.

We extend our thanks and appreciation to all members of the General Conference staff for their dedicated service. Following is a report of each of the several departments of the Church of God General Conference.

Berean Youth Department

At the time of this writing, several programs sponsored by the Berean Youth Department have been successfully completed. Others are in the planning stage.

The major program of the Berean Youth Fellowship is Youth Conference. A very successful Conference was held July 20-26, 1975. Camp Alexander Mack and Shipshewana Retreat Center played hosts to our young people. Camp Mack became an all-high-school camp. Two hundred ninety-eight young people and 33 staff members were present. Shipshewana Retreat Center became an all-post-high camp. Sixty-seven campers and 18 staff members were present at this facility.

The same two camps have been obtained for the 1976 Youth Conference, to be held July 18-24, 1976. Camp Mack will again be an all-high-school camp and the Retreat Center will host post-high through age 25. Married couples of the right age will again be allowed to attend. Plans for this program, for the most

part, have been completed and the staff for 1976 has been established.

Again, due to increased costs passed on to us by the site owners, we have had to raise the tuition cost to \$53.00 for 1976.

There was no Junior Caravan during 1975, but the Senior Caravan traveled to Fredericktown, MO, where it conducted the annual vacation Bible school and participated in the Missouri State Conference. The Caravan was sponsored by your Youth Director and his wife, and was held July 27-August 2, 1975.

The slide-sound set of the 1975 International Berean Youth Conference was prepared and put into circulation in January of 1976. At this time, the set is scheduled to be shown to some 28 churches.

Youth Week was conducted October 20-26, 1975. There were 18 groups which participated by sending in reports for judging. Again this year, the responsibility for judging was given to the Youth Advisory Council. This was accomplished at the annual meeting of the Council during the Midwinter Retreat.

The first-place traveling trophy was awarded to the Blood River Bereans of Springfield, LA. The second-place traveling trophy went to the Columbia Bereans of Columbia Station, OH. East Peoria, IL, Hope Chapel, South Bend, IN, and the Lakeshore Bible Church, Tempe, AZ, also ranked high. It was apparent from the reports received that a great deal of planning and work had been put forth by the Bereans and their leaders.

The annual Post-High Midwinter Retreat was held December 29-Jaunary 1 at Camp Alexander Mack. Thirty-two young people were in attendance. Hugh and Mary Harman and Jim and Charlene Graham served as staff for this retreat.

Publications of the Youth Department include Challenge and the Junior Berean Lesson Manual. The Junior Lesson Manual, containing 27 lessons, was put into printed form in July of 1975 and was made available to the churches. Very few copies were used, and it was decided to hold off on the publication of another manual until a future time. Challenge, edited by your Youth Director, continues to be published on a bi-monthly basis. Also, Youth Workers Memo and other literature are sent out as needed.

We are, as always, thankful to God for his blessings, and (Please turn to page 3)

Publishing Department

The Publishing Department of the Church of God General Conference is in a healthy condition. In addition to the regular editions of *The Restitution Herald* and *Progress Journal, Challenge*, quarterlies for all age groups, the Oregon Bible College Catalog, and the *Maranatha Issue* each year, several tracts and booklets have been published and made available. These have been well received and widely used by the brethren. The demand for literature has been sufficient to keep the staff members of the department fully occupied.

We should like to take this opportunity to express appreciation for the editors and writers of our various publications. They are putting forth great effort to insure that the material submitted is of high quality, and that we receive it early enough to permit getting dated material out on time, with no frantic rush at the last minute. This contributes greatly to making it possible to give each publication the unhurried attention which helps to promote good quality, both in the actual printing of the publications and in their content.

No doubt you have noticed that an increasing number of people are contributing material for *The Restitution Herald*. It is encouraging to note that we have several very promising writers among the younger men and women. Sometimes their early efforts require considerable editing, but they learn by experience and usually improve rapidly. We find great satisfaction in the knowledge that, should the Lord tarry and the older writers pass from the scene, an abundance of literary talent will still be available. Literary talent knows no age limits.

Two or three of our state or area ministerial conferences have undertaken to supply an article each month from one of their particular group, with the responsibility for producing the article of the month rotating among the members of that conference. A number of lay people are also contributing. We encourage this, feeling that the work of lay people often has a broad appeal to other laymen which surpasses that of full-time Christian workers.

Brethren who do not themselves write for publication often make valuable suggestions. Some good ones we cannot use immediately because of other factors that must be taken into consideration. Some we can use very soon, or in some cases immediately.

The "Honor Church" page, which was designed for the purpose of promoting a better acquaintance with the location and background of our churches, will be discontinued for lack of fresh material. It has been a disappointment to your editor that so many of the congregations failed to respond, but we sincerely thank the many who cooperated so beautifully.

Foreign Missions Department

The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conference presently consists of the following persons: Mardy Lawrence, Merle Patrick, Warren Sorenson, Paul Overholser, S. O. Ross, Superintendent of Home Missions, and Rachel Carr, Superintendent of Foreign Missions. The Board meets three times each year to discuss and make recommendations concerning home and foreign mission work.

During the past year, Sr. Alice Aldrich has lived in Labor Vieja, Mexico, with the Roberto Badillo family. She has conducted a vacation Bible school, prepared a hymnbook and Sunday school materials, and assisted with the regular services of the Labor Vieja Church. Bro. Badillo has continued to help with the preaching and teaching in the church.

The Nigeria work continues under the leadership of Ephraim Udo, John Obott, and Solomon Idiong. The brethren there gathered in December for their annual conference. Attendance was over 500. Plans are underway for the construction of a new church building in Edienne. During the past year, it was decided by the Mission Board that it would be best to alter our plans to bring Bro. Solomon here for further study, and he did not come to enter Oregon Bible College in September.

As a result of delegate action at last year's General Conference sessions, the Church of God in Liberia, led by Pastor Cornelius Boykai, R.N., came under the direction of the General Conference. Previously the work had been a project of the Northeast Conference. Present membership in the Salala Church of God is one hundred one. In addition to his church work, Bro. Boykai operates a successful clinic.

Our mission work in Ghana is under the direction of Pastor Oliver Amani. A literature campaign, held last summer, resulted in the baptism of seven. A "first" for the Church of God members occurred last year when they gathered for a conference with the theme: "Getting to Know Each Other in the Faith of Abraham." The Northern Volta Business College has about doubled in size, with one hundred six students enrolled this past year. Work continues on the church building in Nkwanta, with much of the expense being covered by the tithes and offerings of the people. Bro. Amani visits monthly the group of Christians in the fishing village at Kwamikrom.

In February and March of 1976, Dr. and Mrs. William Lawrence visited and worked with the people in India. They held classes in Bangalore each evening and twice on Sunday, using home Bible study materials and Systematic Theology. Response was good. A more detailed report will be given later. Pastor P. M. Paulson and his co-workers continue to work near Hyderabad. They have recently been teaching and practicing tithing in the various groups and have found it a new and exciting experience. Many pamphlets have been purchased for distribution during the Hindu festivals.

Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero oversees the work of eight churches and their pastors in the Philippine Islands. In November, he and his wife and Sr. Aguinaldo visited all the churches except two which were inaccessible. Two new church buildings have been dedicated since our last report, the Agbannawag Church in May and the Gattaran Church in July. The radio ministry continues under the able direction of Bro. Eleodoro Javar.

During the past year, a pastor for the Digby, Nova Scotia, congregation was sought. Pastor Dale Swartz plans to assume the pastorate September 1, 1976. In the meantime, interim workers have been serving the congregation. Francis Burnett was there for all of 1975; John Carr served for two months at the beginning of 1976, followed by Vivian Kirkpatrick, who will remain through June. John Hearp will go for the month of July. Since our last report, the Christian Prisoners Association has been formed by Eunice Pearson, Elaine Handspiker, and Walter Johnson. Other activities include the annual Maritime Conference and Bible School, literature distribution, and a missionary conference where faith promises totaled \$1,750.00.

Home Missions Department

This year we have six churches receiving pastoral aid from the Church of God General Conference. The churches are: Eternal Hope, Herndon, VA; East Oregon Chapel, East Oregon, IL; Arlington, TX; Gulf Coast, New Port Richey, FL; McGintytown, AR; and North Salem at Plymouth, IN. Three churches (Eldorado, IL; North Hills, OH; and Pomona, CA) were on the special church aid program. Due to the resignation of the pastor at the Pomona, CA, Church, assistance to that church was discontinued on February 1. Two churches (Blanchard, MI, and Litchfield, MN) have received funds through Mission Builders Appeal Numbers 35 and 36.

The free literature distribution campaign continues to be emphasized in many local churches. We express our thanks to the local missionary directors, and to all those who are cooperating in this program of distributing the written Word to the people of their communities.

Many inquiries continue to come to General Conference as a result of literature. These inquiries come from many countries of the world, in addition to the United States and Canada. Many people are enrolled in the Systematic Bible Study Course, both at home and abroad. These Systematic Study Courses, the free literature distribution campaign, and the Home Bible Studies that are carried on in many churches and communities, are cooperating to spread the Gospel Message of Salvation to many.

A proposal will be made to the delegates at the 1976 General Conference to reorganize the Missions Board of the General Conference. If the proposal is adopted, there will be both a Home Missions and a Foreign Missions Board. We feel that much study and development can be made in the home missions area with such a Board directing the work. May God continue to richly bless all the efforts of the Church of God General Conference in evangelism and missions throughout the world.

Oregon Bible College

It is an enjoyable and rewarding experience to see the steady growth and development of the Lord's work in the Bible College. Sixty-two students attended Oregon Bible College during the 1975-'76 academic year. The student body represented thirteen different states and Canada. With few exceptions, they represented Church of God family backgrounds. Ten seniors graduated in May: Richard Alcumbrack, Grand Rapids, MI; Kathy J Cooper, Grand Rapids, MI; Carl Jennings, St. Louis, MO; Pam Jennings, Springfield, OH; Larry Mayberry, Royal, AR; Scott Millard, Omaha, NE; Dan Ryan, Minneapolis, MN; Gary Smith, Blanchard, MI; Linda Whaley, Chagrin Falls, OH; and Richard Williams, Grand Rapids, MI. Twenty-one female students lived in the Women's Dormitory and twenty-one male students lived in the Men's Dormitory.

John Lewis served as president, registrar, and instructor; S. O. Ross was director of business affairs and instructor; Eugene Stilson was library director and instructor; Dale Ramsey, music and Christian service director and instructor; Connie Mongan, English; Hugh Harman, director of student affairs; Dale Ramsey and Mary Krogh, dormitory directors; David Krogh, student recruitment.

In October Eugene Stilson and Hugh Harman attended a seminar in Chicago conducted by the Theological School Inventory organization. They also attended the American Association of Bible Colleges convention held in Chicago in October.

Three guest instructors conducted seminars during the year. Scott Ross was speaker for Christian Emphasis Week in October and also taught a course on Pastoral Leadership. Dallas Demmitt taught a course on Christian Growth and Maturity during the first week of the winter semester, and Jim Graham taught a course on Church Evangelism during the first week of spring session.

Gary Smith served as president of the Student Council during the year. Steve Taylor and Linda Whaley were co-chairmen of the social committee. During the winter semester, Steve Taylor turned over his responsibilities to Michael Hoffman. November 11 and January 29 were set aside as prayer days.

Dale Ramsey has completed the requirement for the Master of Arts degree in music at Northern Illinois University. Eugene Stilson has plans to finish the requirements for the Master of Arts degree in New Testament Studies, this fall, at Wheaton. Robert Jones, with a Master of Arts in Old Testament Studies, will join the faculty this fall. We hope to improve our program by adding a full-time Christian Education instructor in the near future.

Students were busy in Christian service and gospel team activities through the year. More than thirty students were involved in two gospel teams, directed by Michele Millard and Dale Ramsey. The play cast visited several churches during the winter months, presenting the play "Forgive Us Our Chicken Coops." The Chorale made weekend trips during winter semester, and toured the eastern part of the United States during spring break.

Under the direction of the Board of Education, we planned and developed an internship program for graduating Pastoral Studies students. Initially the program is working on a voluntary basis. The students serve in a church during the school year under the guidance of a cooperating pastor. In the near future we plan that every graduating Pastoral Studies student will enter the internship program. A manual has been prepared that will serve as a guide for the student and cooperating pastor. Through the use of this manual, a student's progress can be checked and encouraged as he takes part in various pastoral responsibilities.

The Board of Education asked Dr. Mostert of the American Association of Bible Colleges to visit our campus and investigate

our organization, program, and curriculum, that he might evaluate and advise for future planning. Through the advice and information given to us by Dr. Mostert, we are more able to make wise decisions in our short- and long-range planning.

The Board of Education consists of: Chairman Vernis Wolfe; Robert Johnson; William Lawrence; Charles Pryor; and John Lewis. Alva Huffer is serving as special consultant to the Board of Education and Oregon Bible College. The Board of Education met in August in Cedar Falls, IA, in Oregon, IL, in November, and again in Oregon during April.

Sunday School Department

The Sunday School Department is progressing well in developing its program. Several new things have been accomplished in addition to the routine duties. August 31, 1976, will end two years of service for the first full-time director. It should be pointed out that one year out of the two, the director worked as full-time pastor in Digby, Nova Scotia. However, 75 to 80 percent of the Director's work was done from there, in addition to the work of being the pastor.

Three Board members were guest teachers in the Illinois State Conference, July, 1975. During General Conference, the Board had several sessions of meetings. The Quarterly editors present, and the vacation Bible school writers present, met with the Board in some of its sessions.

Minnesota State Conference hosted the Board in a full Sunday School Conference, September 26-28, 1975. All members were present and had complete charge of the program. All sessions were well attended. A Board meeting was held on Friday, the 26th, prior to the beginning of the Conference.

The vacation Bible school books, and planning for the same, are under the Sunday School Department. The Board planned the lesson titles, texts, themes, and some suggested ideas for writing the lessons. A chairman was selected to supervise the writing of material for each of the seven manuals. That chairman was encouraged to ask others to help. In all, seven manuals were written—one for the VBS director, and six for different age groups. The manuals have been received with commendation and praise by many who are using them.

The third annual Christian Workers' Seminar, February 29-March 6, 1976, was held at Camp Alexander Mack. Forty-eight students enrolled, and a staff of 8. During General Conference, please see one of the persons who will be wearing a button, "I Was There," and ask his reaction to the Seminar. It was tremendous!

A third new tract, "Meet My Friend," for junior age in Sunday school, was printed in the late summer of 1975. This makes a series of three tracts, all of which are especially for juniors to use in inviting friends to Sunday school, or, better yet, to know the Lord. Also printed in the fall of 1975 was an elective study course entitled "Growing in Christ." It has 13 lessons.

The Board had charge of the program for Indiana State Conference, April 24, at Morning Star Church in South Bend. There also was a meeting of the Adult Quarterly editor and writers in Oregon, IL, on April 30, 1976. The evaluation of the present Adult Quarterly, its material and usefulness, and the discussing of ways to make it better, will result in some improvements in time to come.

Your Director attended "Step Two Dynamic Church Seminar," in Kansas City, MO. Many good ideas in regard to materials and procedures are learned in such meetings.

The Sunday School Department is responsible for the news column in *Progress Journal*, and the *Sunday School Monthly*, JUNE, 1976

which is mailed to pastors and superintendents, encouraging the use of teaching materials such as film strips, tapes, and lesson plans. There is also much correspondence in connection with the planning and supervising of many activities, as well as to answer many questions and give information about the Sunday school.

Present Sunday School Board Members are Joyce Knapp, Scott Ross, James Babcock, and James Graham. Bro. Francis Burnett, Sunday School Director for the past three years, has resigned, effective August 31, 1976.

General Services

Your Executive Director works closely with local churches in finding replacements for vacant pulpits. He has an information file on pastors and their families, and usually knows when a pastor may be available for a "call." Churches seeking pastors are encouraged to contact the Executive Director for assistance in this area. He is the administrator of the Ministers Insurance Program, and the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association. He is required to complete many forms and questionnaires from various governmental, civic, and religious agencies. He is responsible for all personnel, for promotions and public relations, for the upkeep and maintenance of all properties, for the management of the day-to-day business, and generally supervises all the work of the Church of God General Conference.

The Executive Director and the staff members of the Church of God General Conference perform many services in addition to the departmental activities related in the preceding reports. They are available for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, and other activities. They also fill pulpits when local pastors are ill or on vacation.

We want to extend our appreciation to Clement Richey, who is in charge of the maintenance and general repair of the Church of God General Conference facilities. His services are done gratis, and his efforts in this area are greatly appreciated by all.

Your Board of Directors, Executive Director, department heads, and staff workers of the Church of God General Conference covet your prayers, encouragement, criticism, and concern, as they attempt to carry out the policies and programs that the delegates set out for them to accomplish.

General Conference Finances

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the dedicated sacrificial giving of many churches and their membership. God has wonderfully blessed the work of the Church of God.

The current fiscal year was begun October 1, with a deficit of \$6,000. The current budget is the largest in the history of the Church of God General Conference. These funds are used to provide the free literature, and to subsidize all of the publications of the General Conference, carry on the mission work, both at home and abroad, support the work of the Youth and Sunday School Departments, and provide about half the cost of the education of each student at Oregon Bible College.

At midyear, we find that our deficit is a few thousand dollars more than it was at the beginning of the year. We trust that the membership, individually and through the local churches and district conferences, will meet the needs and provide the funds to completely carry out the expanded work of the Church of God General Conference.

Let us, each one, be busy in the Lord's work, as we look for the soon return of our Savior and coming King. Let us be prepared and be mindful of the words of Paul, "Unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Heb. 9:28b).

Recommendations for 1976-77

- I. We recommend that the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference be reconstructed as follows:
 - a. That there be a Foreign Missions Board of three members elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year, for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Foreign Missions Board Chairman.
 - b. That there be a Home Missions Board of three members elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Home Missions Board Chairman.
 - c. That a Superintendent of Missions be appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, either on a part-time or full-time basis as the need requires.
 - d. That both the Foreign Missions Board and the Home Missions Board serve, together with the Superintendent of Missions, as the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference. That the Superintendent of Missions be the chairman of that full Board.

Explanations: The delegates at the 1975 General Conference passed the following motion: "That the present Missions Board be divided into a Foreign Missions Board and a Home Missions Board: implementation to be handled by the Board of Directors, in conjunction with the present Missions Board, and be presented at the 1976 General Conference." Upon consultation with the Missions Board, the Board of Directors makes the foregoing recommendation.

In practice, the Home Missions Board could meet alone or with the Superintendent of Missions. The Foreign Missions Board could meet alone or with the Superintendent of Missions. On some occasions, the two Boards would meet together, under the chairmanship of the Superintendent of Missions, to discuss like problems, and to keep a continuity in the mission work of the General Conference.

To institute the new Missions Boards, to preserve the term of office of the present Missions Board members, and to set up the continuity of henceforth electing the Board members for three-year terms, the following procedure for the 1976 General Conference is proposed:

Home Missions Board:

- 1. M. A. Patrick to serve out his unexpired one-year term.
- 2. Elect a Home Missions Board member for a two-year term.
- 3. R. Warren Sorenson to serve out his unexpired threeyear term.

Foreign Missions Board:

- 1. Elect a Foreign Missions Board member for a one-year term.
- 2. Paul Overholser to serve out his unexpired two-year term.
- 3. Elect a Foreign Missions Board member for a three-year term.

The fourth member of the present Missions Board is Mardy Lawrence, whose term of office expires this year. She may be reelected.

Duties and Guidelines of Home Missions Board: Study, evalu-

ate, and make recommendations in the following areas:

- 1. Pastoral Aid
- 2. Special Church Aid
- 3. Mission Builders requests
- 4. Ways to stimulate local church growth
- 5. Ways to start new Sunday schools and churches in areas where there is now no Church of God witness
- 6. Ways to make greater use of literature and personal witness
- 7. Solicit workers in new and small churches
- 8. Stimulate the membership to propagate the gospel and make disciples for Christ

Duties and Guidelines of Foreign Missions Board: Study, evaluate, and make recommendations in the following areas:

- 1. Present mission field operations and their needs
- 2. Present national workers
- 3. Christian and business principles to be used in mission fields
- 4. Amount of support in each field
- 5. Building and equipment recommendations in present mission fields
- 6. New fields of mission operation
- 7. Missionary personnel prospects
- 8. Stimulate the membership to greater mission concerns These guidelines are very general. A more specific job description will be prepared later, in cooperation with each elected Missions Board.
- II. We recommend that we discontinue financial support to the Mexico mission work at the present time (September 1, 1976) due to a lack of interest on the field there.

Explanation: Due to the cultural attitudes in Mexico, it is extremely difficult for a woman to build a mission work with any measure of success. Further consideration of mission work in Mexico may be given when conditions merit.

III. We recommend that a qualified General Conference representative be sent to each of our mission fields to remain as long as feasible for the purpose of administration, teaching, and preaching.

Explanation: Recognizing the need for more supervision in our mission fields, and recognizing the value of having an American representative in the field, the foregoing recommendation is proposed. It is suggested that money be raised by special appeal each time such a trip is made.

IV. We recommend an amendment to the Constitution.

Article II (delegates) Section 3 now reads: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with the licensed ministers of the Conference and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large and have the same powers as the delegates from the churches."

We recommend that Section 3 read as follows: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with licensed and/or ordained ministers of the Conference who are pastors of a church, co-pastors of a church, serving on the Conference staff, retired pastors, or associate pastors, and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large, and shall have the same powers as the delegates from the churches."

Explanation: This amendment would give General Conference delegate status only to those licensed and ordained ministers who are in a ministerial capacity. Any other licensed or ordained minister could be a delegate if so appointed as a regular delegate of a church or district conference.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

The biennial meeting of the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association will be held during the upcoming General Conference at Cedar Falls, IA. Some important decisions affecting the Association will be up for discussion and decision, which will have to do with increase in retirement benefits and a slight increase in membership payments.

This recommendation by the Board was made because of repeated requests of member pastors and churches. This is the first recommended increase in contributions from members since the beginning of the voluntary organization, although an increase in retirement benefits has been made.

Cooperation in this voluntary effort has been widespread, and each year as men enter the Church of God ministry, they seek partnership in this brotherly sharing. Likewise, churches and conferences have felt responsibility in assisting this retirement benefit for their spiritual shepherds.

At the present time, there are five ministers receiving retirement benefits.

Ministers' Fund

The Ministers' Fund of the Church of God General Conference is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon (IL) Churches, the dean of students of Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference. The Fund is supported by special contributions, and we are thankful to those who have contributed to the Fund during this past year. The fund is used for loans or gifts to ministers, or their families, in times of emergency.

At the last annual report, total assets in the Fund were \$4,528.57. Two are receiving monthly assistance from this Fund in the total amount of \$600 a year. There is at present one outstanding loan in the amount of \$300. The present Fund balance is \$4,762.20. We encourage contributions to this Fund so that help will be available for a pastor or his family should an emergency arise.

Counseling and Arbitration Board

The Counseling and Arbitration Board has not been called to serve in an official capacity this past year. The members of the Board have individually been active in lending encouragement and advice to pastors and churches.

It is the feeling of the Board that nearly all cases of internal problems can be resolved before they develop into devisive situations, if proper guidance is given and received. The Board much prefers to be called upon to provide such leadership before conditions develop which create difficult situations. Maintaining the "unity of the spirit in the bond of peace" is our prime objective.

License and Ordination Board

We begin our report with personal thanks and a note of appreciation to those faithful men and women who serve the Church of God as pastors and leaders. In the November, 1975, issue of *Progress Journal*, a list of 118 names was published. Of these 118 ministers, 23 were listed as inactive, having preached

fewer than 20 sermons during the church year. The list also included 10 licensed foreign mission workers. This would leave a total of 85 pastors who are serving the Church of God in America, and have presented more than 20 sermons.

Our records show that of the 85 active ministers receiving annual recognition cards, only 28 have been ordained by the General Conference. We do encourage pastors to consider this, and give more thought and prayer to the ordained ministry. All Church of God licensed ministers who have served in active work as pastors or evangelists for approximately three consecutive years may apply for ordination. Recommendation of at least two elders of the church in which one has served, or from two leaders in the community in which he has worked, is required.

We are happy to report the addition of: Bro. Michael Berry, who is pastoring the Southlawn Church of God in Grand Rapids, MI; Bro. Sidney Kirkpatrick, who is pastoring the Blessed Hope Church of God in Rockford, IL; and Bro. William Kammin, who is pastoring the Golden Rule Church of God in Cleveland, OH.

Again we must express our deepest regrets at the loss of a devoted fellow-minister, Bro. C. Alan McLain of Russellville, AR.

We commend each of our ministers for the immediate and almost complete response to the annual renewal of applications. We must state again that, if your name was not included in the November *Progress Journal*, it was because you did not respond. Application blanks are mailed out from headquarters about July 1. If you do not receive an application form, and have previously been licensed, write to the Executive Director, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061, and request one. This helps greatly in keeping our records, and in making an accurate directory of Church of God ministers for the November issue of *Progress Journal*. Recognition cards will be issued from applications received, and will be presented, if possible, during the General Conference meetings at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, IA. At present, it is still necessary for ordained as well as licensed ministers to make annual applications.

Family Life Committee

The Family Life Committee is composed of two couples, Dallas and Nancy Demmitt and Charles and Lois Pryor. They are appointed by the Board of Directors, and serve a three-year term. Bill and Mardy Lawrence have been serving on this committee until recently when they resigned because of their heavy involvement in other Conference programs, i.e., the India mission work.

Mardy and Nancy were primarily responsible for the writing and original publication of the study guides, "How to Enjoy an Abundant and Fruitful Christian Life," and "The Christian Family." Another booklet for leaders on how to use the discussion guides was written by them. Both Bill and Mardy deserve our thanks and appreciation for the outstanding work they have done on this committee.

The committee has received many expressions of gratitude from those who have used the discussion guides in the Home Bible Studies for which they were designed. Some Sunday school classes have used the booklets. Usually, Sunday school

class time is much too short for participation and discussion of the discoveries that individuals are making as they prepare in advance for the time together. The committee would continue to urge the use of the two booklets in Home Bible Study situations. A thorough knowledge of the Leader's Guide, which needs to be purchased separately, is highly recommended. The booklets are not intended to be used in a teacher-centered lecture style.

Since the last written report of the committee was given, a number of churches have had a "Family Enrichment Seminar" for their local congregations. Seminars have been held at the churches in Hector, MN; Louisiana Conference; Oregon, IL; St. Louis, MO; Burr Oak, IN; San Jose, CA; Blood River, LA; and Phoenix, AZ. At least five other new churches are, at the time of this writing, attempting to establish dates. Some churches have had, or are planning, a second seminar.

The interest in these programs began with the Family Life Committee presentations at General Conference over the past years. A 6:30 a.m. class has been much talked about by its loyal participants and "other observers." From this have developed the weekend programs that, it is expected, will become even more widely used by General Conference churches. The Committee does not receive any dollars at this time from the Conference budget. It would seem appropriate that there be a consideration of the funding of this program. At the present time, the leader of the seminar asks churches to be responsible for the transportation costs. Sometimes, additional monies are given directly to the leader or, generally, to the Family Life Fund. The Fund is intended to allow the support of programs where the local congregation is not able to pay the transportation expense.

The chairman of the Family Life Committee has met with the Sunday School Board to establish lines of communication and cooperation in providing ideas, materials, and programs to strengthen family life in our churches. Churches of the Conference will be no stronger than the families that make up our congregations. So very little has been done to help family members! I believe that the Sunday school will be in a position to do more as the needs and opportunities are recognized.

I think that the emphasis on strengthening family life should begin to get special attention in our Conference and church programs. The committee members will welcome your comments and suggestions.

The members of this Board have been asked to do preliminary work on drafting proposed by-laws under which it will organize and function. In the near future, the Board will meet and complete its first draft of proposed by-laws, which will be given further consideration and study.

The questionnaires which were filled out and returned to the predecessor committee have been given much consideration for the information and comments contained therein. The comments on these questionnaires will be used as a basis for much information for general consideration by the Board in the preparation of its preliminary planning.

The work to be done by this Board is long-range planning, and the work will be pursued step by step, thoroughly and cautiously, prayerfully seeking the Lord's guidance all the way. Remember us often in your prayer life.

Additional Conference Information

Site: The 1976 Church of God General Conference will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, IA, August 9-14. This camp is owned by the United Methodist Church, and is located on the west edge of Cedar Falls, just a block off US Highway 20. Watch for the Camp signs (on Division Street), a few blocks west of the junction of Highway 218. Waterloo, a sister city of Cedar Falls, has an airport, where some jet airline service is available.

Camp Costs: The cost at Riverview Park in 1976 will be \$8.10 per person per day (\$39.00 for the entire Conference). The daily costs are: breakfast, \$1.50; lunch, \$1.85; dinner, \$2.50; lodging, \$2.00; and insurance and miscellaneous, \$.25. (Meals are one-half price for children under age eight.) In addition to the actual charges made by the camp, there are many other costs to the Church of God General Conference for promotion, travel, supplies, and miscellaneous materials for the Conference activities.

Your General Conference Board of Directors is asking that camp costs be paid at the desk upon registration. Evening offerings taken during the Conference will go to some special Conference project, designated by the Board.

Lodging: Lodging is provided in cabins and dormitories.

Cabins will house 4 to 14 people each, and families are urged to stay together. Two or more families will need to share the larger units. Reservations should be made ahead of time, if possible.

Due to city zoning regulations, camping trailers will not be permitted on the campgrounds. Two public camping facilities are located in the area.

Note to Teachers and Leaders: Teachers of General Conference adult and youth classes, and leaders of Christian sharing sessions, are reminded to prepare mimeographed copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared to permit those not able to attend a particular session to secure copies.

Elections During General Conference: Board of Directors: Three members will be elected to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors. The terms of David Johnson, Kenneth Milne, and Russell Johns will expire at General Conference (these cannot be reelected).

Sunday School Board: Two members to be elected. The terms of Scott Ross and James Babcock will expire this year (these may be reelected).

Missions Board: If the proposed recommendation for reconstruction of the Missions Board is approved, three members will

be elected. One will be elected to the Home Missions Board, and two will be elected to the Foreign Missions Board. If the recommendation for reconstruction is rejected, there will be one Missions Board member elected. The term of Mardy Lawrence expires at this Conference. (Missions Board members may be reelected).

This information is given so churches and state conferences can instruct their delegates to make particular nominations. Proposed nominees should be contacted beforehand, to be sure they will serve if elected, and to be sure they are free and able to attend the meetings of the particular board to which they may be elected.

Young People: The youth are expected to stay with their families in cabins, and thus be under the direct supervision of their parents. The youth are expected to attend the youth classes, and the other activities planned for them during the Conference.

Children's Classes: Sister Lynne Krogh will be in charge of

the children's classes. Each day, Tuesday through Friday of General Conference, there will be classes from 9:00-11:30 a.m. for all children two years of age through sixth grade. In the afternoon, there will be classes from 1:30-3:30, only for those children from second grade through sixth grade. Parents, please note that no provisions will be made for those children under second grade during the afternoon sessions. Parents are requested to come to the classroom and call for their children at the time of dismissal, both morning and afternoon.

There will be refreshment breaks during the class periods. Those who wish to help are requested to please bring cookies.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year, delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses, and thus equalize the cost of travel of those from far away and those who live nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

General Conference Progress

This issue carries the programs, reports, recommendations, and other pertinent information regarding the annual Church of God General Conference that will be held at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, Iowa, August 9-14, 1976. The theme of this fifty-sixth annual Conference is "Heritage of Our Faith."

Delegate forms, statistical forms, and pool expense forms have been mailed to all church and conference secretaries. Secretaries are urged to complete these forms and return them promptly in the envelope enclosed.

No Trailer-Campers on Conference Grounds

Due to city zoning regulations, campers and trailers will not be allowed on the Conference grounds at Riverview Park this year. See the July issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL for a complete list of camping facilities in the area. There are several near the Conference grounds.

No Contribution Receipts

It has been the custom to mail a receipt for each contribution received by the Church of God General Conference. Due to the higher postage rates, it is the decision of the Board of Directors that beginning July 1, 1976, a receipt will not be sent unless requested by the contributor. Each contributor will receive a notice at the end of the year for income tax purposes, stating the amount contributed during the year. This will bring about a big savings in postage costs, and also in the cost of envelopes, receipts, and the time to prepare same.

Board of Directors' Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, IL, April 29 and 30. In addition to the item regarding no receipt for Conference contributions, it was decided to reprint the book Systematic Theology, by Dr. Alva G. Huffer, in both hard-cover and paperback. The sale price of each will be announced later.

The program, reports, and recommendations for the annual General Conference were approved. Reports were received from the Louisiana Property Board and the committee to study guidelines for license and ordination.

Robert Jones will join the Oregon Bible College staff August 1, 1976. Dr. Alva G. Huffer will be used in Oregon Bible College consultation only as needed on a project basis. The board approved the general restructure plans of the Oregon Bible College Internship Program. Students will work for two semesters with a pastor in the field, under supervision.

Boards, Committees, and Ministerial Conference

The Sunday School Board, the Oregon Bible College Board of Education, the Missions Board, and the License and Ordination Board all met during the ministerial meeting, April 26-30. Several other General Conference committees met also. Many people are involved in all these activities and are to be commended for their time and effort to help carry out the Lord's work.

The Ministerial Conference was most successful, with the highest attendance ever (68 registered). The program committee presented a well-rounded program for the ministers.

Your Call?

"But I don't feel that the Lord has called me to be a missionary," said the young man to the missionary worker who was home on furlough. Perhaps his words express the feeling of others in regard to missionary service. When we speak of a missionary call, some people may think of a special vision or some other kind of unusual experience, which they would know to be a definite call to service on the mission field. But such experiences are not common.

Actually, there are two aspects of the missionary call, the first of which is general. This is synonymous with the Great Commission that Jesus gave; "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." It is the call that Christ gave to all those who follow him. Just as the invitation to accept salvation is general and given to all sinners, so is the call to service given to all Christians.

The call to salvation is incomplete until the sinner

responds by coming to Christ. The call to witness is also incomplete until the Christian freely offers himself for service.

Then there is the particular aspect of the missionary call. It is here that we run into the question of where, and in what capacity, a person will serve. This aspect of the call is more a matter of guidance—letting God lead us into that place where he needs us.

As we can see, the first call is fundamental to the second. If we have not responded to the Great Commission, then certainly there is no need to discuss any further aspects of missionary service.

The need is great! It has been estimated that people are being born into the world thirty times faster than the church is making converts. Right now, on Church of God missions fields, there is a need for men to go to teach and preach for the spiritual upbuilding of the work that has been begun.

Consider again, very carefully, the command of Christ. Then let God have complete control and be sensitive to his wishes. It may be that he is calling YOU into his service!

From time to time you have read on this page about the work of our mission fields in using the printed page to share the gospel. This is a way that each one of us can help to get the Good News out to others. Our General Conference continues to provide, free of charge, a variety of tracts for distribution. 
Congratulations to the seniors, and a special "God bless" as each begins a new aspect of life as he leaves Oregon Bible College.

What Has Been Done

Discussion often arises concerning the advancement of work that has been planned. Projects or departments of our General Conference are given careful scrutiny by interested people. Others seem not to be interested enough to keep abreast of what, if anything, is being done.

The Sunday School Department of the Church of God General Conference has been the object of great interest during the past decade. Many hours of volunteer time have been spent in committee and board meetings for the purpose of promoting the work of the Department and of Sunday schools throughout North America and other parts of the world. Many laymen have made valuable suggestions to committees and board members. These suggestions have led to new ideas being incorporated into the Sunday school program.

The Sunday School Department of the Church of God General Conference is advancing. It is making progress toward better programs for training Christian workers, including teachers. The literature is being improved. A new Nursery Teacher's Guide has been added to the curriculum materials. All of the quarterlies have been improved, especially the Beginners Teacher's Guide, which is using a different approach for the Summer Quarter of 1976. Three tracts for those of junior age have been developed and printed in the past two years. Teachers' supplements have been added in the junior and teen-age sections. Two elective study courses—"Study of Romans" and "Growing in Christ"—have been prepared. Each consists of 13 lessons.

Vacation Bible School material, and the development of same, was put into the hands of the Sunday School Department when a full-time director was appointed. More churches are using the 1976 VBS manuals than at any time in the past five years. For the first time ever, the material covers the ages from preschool through high school. In addition, a special manual is provided for the VBS director.

Sunday School Conferences, with the entire Sunday School Board planning and producing the program, have been successfully presented in three areas since September, 1974.

Progress may seem slow, but much has been accomplished in the past two years. Praise to our God!

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES

To the Rules and Regulations of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

This notice has been duly sent to each member minister, member church, and member conference in accordance with Article VII, Section 1, of the Rules and Regulations of the association, pertaining to changes in the rules.

On November 11, 1975, the Board of Trustees of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association met in Oregon, Illinois. At that meeting, motion was made, seconded, and carried to propose several changes in the Rules and Regulations of the Retirement Association. These proposed recommendations will come before the bi-annual meeting of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, which will be held during the annual General Conference in August, 1976, at Riverview Park in Cedar Falls, Iowa.

Article IV, Section 1-Ministers, A, now reads:

"Member ministers agree with membership to contribute to the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association a sum equal to one percent (1%) of their gross earnings. Gross earnings include all income from wages, both ministerial and secular, and the value of parsonage or housing facilities, and utilities, and/or board and/or room when provided by the church, provided that a minimum of \$30 per year must be paid."

The Board of Trustees proposes the following changes in the above Section.

That the percentage of contribution be changed from one percent (1%) to 1 and 1/2 percent $(1\ 1/2\%)$ of their gross earnings.

Article IV, Section 2-Churches of God, A, now reads:

"Each member church agrees with membership to contribute at least one percent (1%) of its gross operating income per quarter. Gross income will include all contributed funds except for special funds, provided that a minimum contribution of \$50 per year must be paid."

The Board of Trustees proposes a change in this Section as follows:

That the one percent (1%) be changed to 1 and 1/2 percent $(1\ 1/2\%)$ of its gross operating income per quarter.

Article V-Payment of Benefits, Section 1-Amount of Benefit, A, now reads:

"Member ministers who have met the requirements specified above will, upon retirement, receive \$60 per month, but not before the member reaches sixty-five years of age, or later."

The Board of Trustees proposes that the

above Section be changed to read as follows:

"Member ministers who have met the requirements specified above will, upon retirement, receive \$75 per month, but not before the member reaches sixty-five years of age, or later."

Article V, Section 1, C, now reads:

"Widows of member ministers will, upon reaching the age of 65 years, unless remarried, be paid twenty-five dollars per month until death or remarriage."

The Board of Trustees proposes that the above Section and paragraph be changed to read as follows:

"Widows of member ministers will, upon reaching the age of 65 years, unless remarried, be paid \$37.50 per month until death or remarriage."

Article II—Membership, Section 1—Ministers, E, now reads:

"A minister who voluntarily withdraws from the Association will not thereafter be eligible for membership and forfeits all interest in the Association and funds except by contributing \$75 per year for each year his membership lapsed and being reinstated by the Board of Trustees."

The Board of Trustees proposes that in the above paragraph that the amount of \$75 per year be changed to \$125 per year.

The Board of Trustees further proposes that the above changes be made, effective January 1,

Explanation: Various members of the Retirement Association have urged the Board of Trustees to consider higher retiring benefits, and also higher contributions to the fund. For this reason, the Board of Trustees has taken action to present the proposed changes to the bi-annual meeting on August 11, 1976, at 9:00 p.m. during the annual Church of God General Conference.

The proposed changes, or any changes in the Rules and Regulations, may be made by a two-thirds majority of the members present at any duly held bi-annual meeting, provided proper notice has been given. Such notice has been duly given by mail. We trust that each minister member and each appointed delegate from a church or district conference who will be present at the bi-annual meeting will have given much thought, prayer, and due consideration to this matter prior to the bi-annual meeting.

Conference Delegates

Churches and conferences are urged to select their delegates early. They should also instruct their delegates how to vote on the proposed recommendations and other Conference business. I would also urge the church to select nominees for the positions to be filled by the elections, as listed in the June issue of *Progress Journal*, page eight.

Delegate forms, statistical forms, and pool expense forms have been mailed to all church and conference secretaries. Secretaries are urged to complete these forms and return them promptly.

Churches and conferences which are in the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association should select a delegate to the Biannual meeting of that association, which will be held on Wednesday, August 11, at 9:00 p.m. This may or may not be a Conference delegate.

Conference Program

The General Conference program can be found on page seven of this issue. Youth Fellowship and Publications business will be conducted on Tuesday, Mission business on Wednesday, Oregon Bible College business on Thursday, and Sunday School business on Friday.

The theme of the Conference is "Heritage of Our Faith." The evening messages and the Bible Classes will be geared to the heritage of our church and of our country on this Bicentennial year. This is a good time to reflect and cherish the rich blessings we have.

Camper-Trailer Facilities Near Riverview Park

It appears that campers and trailers will not be allowed on the grounds at Riverview Park during our annual Church of God General Conference, August 9-14, 1976. The following camps are nearby:

George Wyth Park – 2 miles east of Riverview Park on Highway 20. There are 96 electrical hookups, and 29 spots without hookups. The cost is \$3.00 per night without electricity, and \$3.50 per night with electricity. The park does provide modern toilet facilities and good drinking water.

Blackhawk County Park. It is located about 3 miles from Riverview Park. One would go east on Highway 20 a few blocks then north on Highway 218 about 2 miles and then left on Lone Tree Road. It has about 90 electrical hookups, and the cost is \$2.50 per night.

There are a few city parks available also, but none of these have electrical hookups.

Cabin Reservations

Cabin reservations for General Conference are now being accepted. Write to Cabin Reservations, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061, and state the number in your family or party that wish to stay together.

The cost at General Conference this year will be \$8.10 per person per day, or \$39.00 for the entire Conference. The daily charges are: Breakfast-\$1.50; Lunch-\$1.85; Dinner-\$2.50; Lodging-\$2.00; and Insurance and Miscellaneous-\$.25. Meals are one half price for children under eight. The cabins do have cooking facilities, so families do have the option of cooking their own meals, if they so desire.

Conference Offerings

Offerings are taken at each evening service during General Conference, and are usually designated for a special project. This year, the Board of Directors has voted to designate these offerings to the Library Fund of Oregon Bible College.

Contribution Receipts

The Board of Directors has taken action to eliminate the issuing of receipts for General Conference contributions unless specifically requested. This action is effective July 1, 1976. This will save the postage, plus cost of the receipt, envelope, and the time involved in preparing and mailing the receipt. Notice will be sent to each contributor at the end of the year with total contributions for income tax purposes.

Conference Finances

Contributions for the month of June are nearly \$9,000.00 short of the budget needs. The shortage, together with increased costs and no college tuitions in summer, has necessitated a loan of \$20,000.00 to meet the expenses. Please make this a matter of concern.

Growing Up in Foreign Missions

B ILL AND I truly felt God's presence and power throughout our recent seven-week mission trip to Bangalore, South India. Daily, we consciously felt blessed for having submitted to his will in going, even though we really did not want to. We had plans for a vacation, which I'm sure could not have been half as satisfying to us as the work in India. We feel that we really got to know and love our brothers and sisters in India in a very personal way, and to better understand their culture. The problems that confronted us were monumental but, with God's guidance, we think that we got to the bottom of most of them. We feel good about the decisions and changes that took place. We thank all of you who were praying for us and the work there.

It was great to have time to teach, and a real thrill to see lives changed. The Scriptures came alive as the people learned to apply them to their own lives. We individually taught thirty-four Bible study classes lasting at least one and a half hours each. We used "How to Enjoy an Abundant and Fruitful Christian Life" and "The Christian Family" home Bible study booklets, selected lessons from Systematic Bible Study Course by Dr. Alva Huffer, and four of Rosalind Rinker's tapes on prayer. Bill taught in the Thomas Town Church, and I taught in the Laljinagar Church. In addition, Bill preached nine sermons. I preached one and led inductive Bible studies on prayer and witnessing at three Mothers' Meetings (Dorcas). We also conducted two baptismal services, with eleven adults being baptized. We held many private interviews and counseling sessions with any who wanted to express his or her ideas, frustrations, and/or requests. We held twelve pastoral training sessions and conducted twenty-two board meetings.

In order to carry out the intricacies of maintaining our organization in a country

with a myriad of new government regulations, we had many meetings with lawyers, doctors, contractors, and indigenous and American missionaries of other denominations. In addition, numerous visits were made to government agencies. Bill also thoroughly examined and cross-examined their account books, and helped the chartered accountants (CPA) get together the year-end statements for all the churches and the clinic for their first government-required yearly reports.

In order to determine what is available in India in the way of educational opportunities, we visited secular schools, Bible schools, Bible colleges, Christian bookstores, and other churches.

To evaluate the level and modes of charitable medical care we visited hospitals and clinics. We also accompanied workers of other denominations on their public health visits to outlying primitive villages. After advertising in the newspapers and by word of mouth (the Indian grapevine is very efficient!) we interviewed many doctors and nurses. We eventually hired a new doctor and nurse who we feel are more capable medically and definitely more spiritually oriented. This will help accomplish our purpose of introducing many to Christ through the medical clinic and its public health training program, which are supported by Dr. and Mrs. Wendell Rossman of Phoenix.

During the last thirteen years, we have had the opportunity to visit mission fields in many lands: five trips to India; three to Africa; two to the South Pacific and Orient; and one trip each to the Philippines and Lebanon. I, without Bill, went to Mexico. Prior to this trip we have had a feeling that all was not well. As we read the correspondence from several of our mission areas, and as the problems in India came to an explosive head, our concern grew, but it was only after this stay in India that our thoughts crystallized.

Babes in Missions

As "babes in missions" we and our organization have made some mistakes, as have most other charitable organizations. In fact, our mistakes have a striking similarity to those of other organizations. We would like to share these with you so that we can all "grow up in missions" together, and so become better stewards. Shortly before we left India, we feel that God placed in our hands some research on Asian missions which confirmed our decisions and gave us some guidelines for the future. These will increase the spirituality and effectiveness of the work, and will eventually enable the natives to carry on without our assistance. We feel very blessed to have learned these lessons at such a relatively early stage in our foreign, missions involvement. Other denominations have spent up to 200 years with full-time workers in the field learning these things by trial and error. We are deeply grateful to them for their willingness to share their experiences with us. We especially appreciate what we have learned from the Advent Christians and Southern Baptists. After much consultation, prayer, and discussion with our own brothers and sisters in India, we feel that our biggest mistakes in all our fields have been the following:

- 1. Sending money directly to a native missionary who has too little training and too little supervision.
- 2. Trying to elevate our indigenous leaders in underprivileged countries to our own standard of living.
- 3. Erecting buildings that are out of character with their congregations' economy.
- 4. Failure to teach them to trust God for their own support, through their own tithing.

By these actions, we have unwittingly encouraged dependency and caused them to confuse Christianity with materialism,

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resulting in jealousy, competition, blackmail, bribery, and misuse of funds in an attempt to satisfy everyone. Once they are truly "Christized," they can and will teach their own families and neighbors. To do that, they do not need fancy buildings, cars, washing machines, refrigerators, and other luxuries that no one else in their congregations could possibly even start to afford, and which are completely out of context for all but the few very affluent people in their countries. (The average yearly income in both Nigeria and India was recently reported as less than \$100!) Even the resident foreign missionary must be very careful not to have more of these things than is necessary for the health and welfare of his family.

What We Should Do

After much time spent in research, consultation, earnest prayer and soul searching, we have the following recommendations to make in order to rectify what we see as a deteriorating situation in foreign missions.

- 1. Our funds need to be redirected toward sending qualified men and women from here to teach the Scriptures and to help them learn to help themselves. In such a program, many potentially strong spiritual leaders will be reached and we will not have to be tied to one or a few. "The cream will rise to the top" if they have unpaid spiritual responsibilities. No new work should be attempted without an American in the field.
- 2. Teach our indigenous leaders how to use the study guides and materials we send them, such as quarterlies, concordances, and Bible dictionaries. What we have sent to India (and we suspect to other places also) has been unused because it was not understood. Once they understand, they can and should produce (not translate) much of their own materials. A goodly portion of our material is too complicated for them to understand, let alone teach. In the Indian churches there is a tremendous difference in the basic education of the members. The majority have little or no education, while a few have college degrees or above. This tremendous spread, plus the multiple languages and dialects spoken, creates problems unknown to the average church in America.
- 3. Teach them to support their own work at their own socio-economic level. Too much foreign aid fosters dependency, irresponsibility, and depression much like that of the son of an indulgent wealthy father. Almost no one in our

churches in India tithes, even though they have been taught the Biblical message on tithing, have numerous tracts that outline the blessings of tithing, and have been encouraged by us on several visits. I suspect that it is because they felt that their money was not really needed; because they have had no control over how it was spent; and they think that all Bro. Manoah has to do is to make his desires known to the General Conference, or individuals in America. As far as they are concerned, a character like Santa Claus is very much alive here in America. This is why they get so angry at Bro. Manoah when he doesn't grant their every wish. We feel they will be more enthused about the work, and more motivated to serve God, if they are supporting themselves. Remember how we were so proud of what our first dollar bought? The Laljinagar church members were so proud of a bell they had purchased with funds derived from Christmas caroling and taking up a special offering.

- 4. Do not bring students from underprivileged countries to America to train. This has been a hard lesson learned by industry and medicine, as well as other religious organizations. This program has been disastrous because the graduate does not want to go back to his homeland, or, if he finds it impossible to stay in the United States, he expects to go home and live at our standard of living, which quickly undermines the efforts there by causing jealousy and strife.
- 5. Train pastors and workers in a native Bible school and under the supervision of full-time or part-time resident Church of God American missionaries. Unfortunately the government of India will no longer allow full-time minister missionaries into that country, but pastors and laymen can go there for three months at a time as tourists, and as such are allowed full freedom to teach. Well-qualified persons in other fields are still being allowed long-term visas, and this is how much of the Christian work is being carried out in India.
- 6. Do not expect much from untrained native pastors. We give them a license through correspondence, and leave them in charge of growing congregations and growing problems, with little or no peer review or fellowship, and little if any opportunity for further spiritual growth training. Once we put them on the payroll, they and their wives are subjected to all sorts of temptations which they are not spiritually mature enough to handle. For example, exclusive access to and re-

sponsibility for foreign funds, coupled with a personal salary so much more than the income of anyone else in their congregation, results in their becoming targets for physical and mental harassment, due to the jealousy this situation creates. If they and their church program were congregationally supported, they could not live above the local standard of living, which would eliminate the jealousy. The people would then enforce discipline in the use of their own tithes and offerings. It would also assure us that the pastor's motivation was to serve God, and not to get on the American payroll. Often they do not see the funds that we send from our tithes and offerings as God's money, but as a gift from rich Americans, with plenty more where that came from. (Even a resident American missionary should not give more than the highest contributor in his own congregation. The rest of his tithe and contributions can be given to some broader base entity such as the General Conference.)

In summary, we have not been mature in missions, and serious mistakes have been and are still being made. At first thought you may be discouraged by these findings and this report. I presume that some will think that we are being too hard-hearted. I can understand that, for we, too, were eager to believe that they could carry on the Lord's work if they just had the money. Now we know there is a higher price to be paid if we really want the truth, as we know it, to be preached in foreign fields. We must give of ourselves by sending some of our leaders to work in the fields. Do not be too discouraged, however, for we have learned from our mistakes and they have learned from their mistakes. We now have a good strong nucleus to work with in India. A proper bookkeeping system has been set up for each church and the clinic. Committees have been elected, similar to our boards. Funds are sent directly to the bank accounts of each division, and officers have been taught how to conduct the business and handle the monies prop-

Jesus Christ is the greatest gift we can present to anyone. His help will not fail when foreign funds are withdrawn or prohibited. All indications point toward the Indian government severely restricting foreign funds as well as visits, so time is short. It is our hope and prayer that we will be able to secure the funds and qualified pastors and/or laymen to implement these suggestions in all of our mission fields.

Your Teen-Ager's Crowd

Have you ever felt apprehensive about the crowd with which your teen-ager is running around? Many of us are. I fear that this concern may cause us to make the mistake of being at odds with the normal desire of teen-age young people to be part of a group. I am assuming, of course, that the group he has chosen as his companions is not destructive in its nature. Certainly the most healthful and meaningful group your teenager could associate with would be a church group. Here they would, for the most part, share similar values and goals. This is an important reason for the family to be active in church.

As teen-agers advance from dependency to interdependency, they quite often pass through a very trying period—a time in which it seems that they are trying to achieve total independence from home and family.

Why does a teen-ager want to belong to a group? I am sure there are many reasons, but one seems the most appropriate. Through identification with a group, the process of maturation begins to take place. They start to formulate their self-images. They begin to search for the answers to such questions as "identity," "self-worth," and "purpose." Not always is it easy to come up with the right answers, but it is necessary to the establishment of a healthy self-image, which is vital if they are to become healthy, mature, and responsible young adults.

We parents need to be aware of this striving for independence and the desire to group. We need to get to know the friends with whom our teen-agers run. We need to get involved with them, to listen to them, and support them in their efforts to establish their identity. Most important of all, we must create an atmosphere which encourages open communication between ourselves and them.

If we attempt to understand the needs of our teenagers; if we are understanding as they seek to discover themselves; if we provide loving guidance when we see them straying; if we pray for much wisdom, patience, and love; and if we trust God to answer our prayer, we have every reason to believe that our teen-agers will come through this period of life as more mature and responsible young adults.

Editor and Writers' Meeting

Friday afternoon, April 30, 1976, following the Ministerial Conference, a meeting was held for the editor and writers of the Adult Quarterly. This meeting had been planned in advance, and each writer was invited to attend. Most of the writers are ministers, and were in attendance at the Conference.

The sessions began at 12:30 p.m., and continued until 6:00 p.m. Scott Ross was in charge of the first session. He presented ideas on "Creative Bible Teaching." After a short break, Joyce Knapp led another session devoted to the same subject, but setting forth a different approach to teaching procedure. After a second short break, Gordon Landry, one of the writers for the Adult Quarterly and also an employee in the printing department of our General Conference, presented a session entitled "Tips for Quarterly Writers."

Following Gordon's session, Jesse Pestle, editor of the Adult Quarterly, made some comments to all present. He expressed some of his thinking with regard to the Adult Quarterly, its format, and its content. A short time was then spent in discussing some of the items that had been presented and the future needs of the Quarterly and its writers.

One of the important items to come out of the meeting was that all writers felt the need for more such meetings—even suggesting as many as three or four during the year.

We are sure that you, the users of the product of these brethren's efforts, desire the best for them as they endeavor to illuminate truth for the student's learning.

The editors of the Quarterlies are paid a very small sum per quarter for the work they do. The writers do their part because they love to serve the Lord in this manner. Pray for these persons and encourage them in the work that they are doing. Many spend eight to ten days per quarter in research and writing.

Thursday, August 22, will be a day for thinking about Sunday schools. Beginning at 2:15 p.m., Bro. James Graham will present a new chorus (hopefully new to most everyone), tell a little about the Christian Workers' Seminar, and present the workshops. VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL AT FONTHILL, ONTARIO

The daily vacation Bible school at Fonthill was held during the public school spring break of March 22-26. We were blessed with an enrollment of 168, with a high attendance of 145 on Friday morning. We used the General Conference materials with the theme, "Stand Tall for God." The teachers found these lessons to be exciting and easy to use, as there were many good suggestions for activities. Our main purpose was to teach the children how to pray, and to involve them in the principles of communication with, and obedience to, God.

Some special activities we found to be profitable: One evening session, just prior to the school, was devoted to sorting out materials and making samples of the craft work. Several people, who could not otherwise be involved due to circumstances, helped with this.

Several weeks ahead of time, a "Bus Boosters" campaign was started. By this means, we were financially able to rent bus service, which was used well.

CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE Proposed Constitution Amendment

Article II (delegates) Section 3 now reads: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with the licensed ministers of the Conference and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large and have the same powers as the delegates from the churches.'

We recommend that Section 3 read as follows: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with licensed and/or ordained ministers of the Conference who are pastors of a church, co-pastors of a church, serving on the Conference staff, retired pastors, or associate pastors, and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large, and shall have the same powers as the delegates from the churches.

Explanation: This amendment would give General Conference delegate status only to those licensed and ordained ministers who are in a ministerial capacity. Any other licensed or ordained minister could be a delegate if so appointed as a regular delegate of a church or district conference.

GENERAL CONFERENCE PROGRESS

1976 General Conference

The Fifty-Sixth Annual General Conference is history. It was a most inspiring five days for the 549 who were in attendance. The evening offerings totaled \$2,623.50, and were designated for the library of Oregon Bible College.

The proposed recommendation to reconstruct the Mission Board was adopted. Kent Ross was elected to the Home Mission Board; J. Don Swartz was elected, and Mardy Lawrence relected, to the Foreign Mission Board. The present Mission Board: Rachel Carr, Supt. of Missions (Director over both Boards and chairman of the joint Board); R. Warren Sorenson, Chairman, M. A. Patrick, and Kent Ross, Home Mission Board; Mardy Lawrence, Chairperson, Paul Overholser and J. Don Swartz, Foreign Mission Board.

Michael Mattison was elected, and Scott Ross reelected, to the Sunday School Board. Holdover members are Joyce Knapp and James Graham. David Krogh will serve as Sunday School Director on a part-time basis beginning September 1.

Approval was given to move the 1977 General Conference to a different site, if satisfactory arrangements can be made. Announcement of the site will be made in the October issue of *Progress Journal*.

Approval was given for a one-year trial agreement for a working relationship between Oregon Bible College and Sauk Valley Community College near Oregon. Instructors approved by Sauk Valley (may be Oregon Bible College instructors when qualified) will teach some Christian Education and other related subjects at Oregon Bible College and credit will be given by Sauk Valley College.

The budget adopted will require contributions (goals for giving) in the amount of \$220,000, which is the same as the current budget needs. The full minutes and the budget will appear in the October issue of *Progress Journal*.

Board of Directors

Brothers Russell Magaw, Columbia Station, OH; William Lawrence, Phoenix, AZ; and Joe James, Greenville, SC, were elected to the Board of Directors for three-year terms. The Conference Board of Directors organizes itself. 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OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRESS

John R. Lewis, President

Sauk Valley College Program

In keeping with our policy to provide the best possible educational opportunities for students of the Church of God, we have entered into a cooperative program with another college during this school year.

In an agreement with Sauk Valley College, located twenty miles from Oregon, it will provide General Education courses for Oregon Bible College students. Students can enroll in both Sauk Valley and Oregon Bible College and receive credit at both institutions. The General Education provided by Sauk Valley can be accomplished in two ways. In those areas where our instructors are qualified, it will hire and pay Oregon Bible College instructors to teach the General Education course. In areas where we have no qualified instructors, Sauk Valley College will send instructors to the OBC campus.

Areas in which Sauk Valley College will potentially provide General Education are the areas of Communication and Writing Skills, Rhetoric and Composition, Literature, Technical Reporting, Fiction, Poetry, Introduction to Sociology, Western Civilization to 1648, Western Civilization from 1648, Introduction to Psychology, Basic Algebra, Principles of Modern Math, The Earth in Space, General Speech, General Principles of Speech, Group Discussion, Advance Public Speaking, Environmental Health, and Introduction to Human Relations.

All of these courses will not be taught in any one year at Oregon Bible College nor will any of the courses necessarily be taught.

These courses will be offered only as our curriculum and program demand. At this writing it appears that in this program six to twelve hours of General Education from Sauk Valley College will be offered each semester.

Tuition charged for these courses will be \$15 per credit hour. This is five dollars under the current Oregon Bible College tuition cost. We appreciate the opportunity to try this program and feel that our present Oregon Bible College instructors will have the freedom to concentrate their research and teaching in areas of their preparation and the main purpose of Oregon Bible College, which is giving instruction in the area of Bible and Theology.

We appreciate the opportunity to try this new venture in improving quality education.

Student Enrollment

It appears at this writing that Oregon Bible College will have approximately fifty students enrolled for the 1976-77 school year. There are thirty returning students and twenty students presently enrolled in the freshman class. We appreciate their dedication and cooperative spirit that have been exhibited.

We encourage our church leaders to take positive steps in providing leadership models for our young people so that they will choose careers in the areas of Christian Service.

Board of Education Meeting

The Board of Education met in Oregon August 7 and 8, before the General Conference meeting in Iowa. The Board discussed and took action on business dealing with the cooperative program with Sauk Valley College, the hiring of future instructors, the structure and organization of Oregon Bible College. It also considered curriculum ideas and development along with discussing a philosophy of the ministry.

We were glad for the opportunity that Board members had to meet with church delegates during General Conference and to discuss with them plans, programs, and progress regarding Oregon Bible College.

We want to hear the considerations and ideas of the people of the churches and want to share with them our goals and proposed programs.


General Conference Program

Bro. and Sr. Albert Harper, Omaha, NE, were in attendance at the Conference and freely gave of their spiritual maturity.


