Minutes of the 1976 General Conference

Tuesday, August 10

The Fifty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference convened at Riverview Park, Cedar Falls, IA, on Tuesday, August 10, 1976. Billie Kennedy, Chairman of the Board of Directors, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m., and David Johnson, Hector, MN, opened the session with prayer. Bro. Kennedy welcomed the delegates to the General Conference.

Ruth Overholser, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, seated the delegates and gave procedural instructions to the delegates and alternates. This is her nineteenth year of service on the Credentials Committee. Those delegates serving for the first time were introduced, and also the new ministers.

John Lewis, President of Oregon Bible College, explained the purpose of the booklets concerning the College program which had been prepared by the Board of Education for the delegates of the Conference. Copies were passed out to all delegates present.

S. O. Ross read the communications and greetings to the Conference from Bro. and Sr. J. R. LeCrone, Bro. Orville Westlund, and C. F. Pryor.

Chairman Kennedy called attention to the special reports on pages 7 and 8 of the June, 1976, issue of *Progress Journal*. Charles Jones moved and Charles Graham seconded that the special reports be accepted. Motion carried.

Russell Johns gave a report on the activities of the Board of Directors, explaining how the Board functions and asking for the prayers of the delegates in behalf of the Board of Directors.

Executive Director S. O. Ross reviewed the nine-month Financial Report included in the delegate folders. This report covered the period from October 1, 1975, through June 30, 1976. Bro. Ross careful-



ly reviewed each item. The report included a General Funds Statement of Assets and Liabilities; a Statement of Income and Expense; General Funds; a Statement of Assets and Liabilities Restricted Funds; a Statement of Income and Expense Restricted Funds; and an up-to-date report on Dormitory finances. It was moved by Joe James and seconded by Charles Knapp that the Financial Report be accepted. Motion carried.

Chairman Kennedy called on Hugh Harman to report on the Berean Youth work. Bro. Harman reported that the attendance at Camp Mack was somewhat lower than a year ago; however, the attendance at Shipshewana was higher than a year ago. He reported a successful Coins-for-Christ Crusade, naming the top three contributing youth groups as: Guthrie Grove Church, SC; Brush Creek Church, OH; and Blanchard Church, MI.

The publishing report was given by S. O. Ross in the absence of J. R. LeCrone. He reported a new booklet on the "Preexistence of Christ" which is in process of printing. Bros. LeCrone, Johnson, and Landry were complimented on the fine work being done in the publishing department.

Ruth Overholser reported for the Credentials Committee that 176 delegates had been seated: 8 Board of Directors, 56 ministers, and 112 church and conference delegates. This compared with 157 delegates last year.

The meeting was recessed at 11:25 a.m., with prayer by Bob Smith, Blanchard, MI.

Wednesday, August 11

The second session of the 1976 Church of God General Conference was called to order by Chairman Kennedy at 10:00 a.m., August 11. The secretary read the minutes of Tuesday's session and they were approved. Correspondence from the Lighthouse Church of God, Digby, Nova Scotia, was read.

S. O. Ross introduced the fraternal delegate, Nelson Melvin of the Advent Christian General Conference. Mr. Melvin brought greetings from Joe Tom Tate, president of the Advent Christian Conference. He exhorted us to be faithful.

Chairman Kennedy called upon Rachel Carr to report on Mission Department business. Some time was spent on comments and questions on foreign missions. S. O. Ross reported to the delegates of a possibility of future work among the Korean people of Chicago, IL.

Recommendation No. 1 was presented: We recommend that the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference be reconstructed as follows:

a. That there be a Foreign Missions Board of three members elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Foreign Missions Board Chairman.

b. That there be a Home Missions Board of three members elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Home Missions Board Chairman.

c. That a Superintendent of Missions be appointed by the Board of Directors of

the Church of God General Conference, either on a part-time or full-time basis, as the need requires.

d. That both the Foreign Missions Board and the Home Missions Board serve, together with the Superintendent of Missions, as the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference. That the Superintendent of Missions be the chairman of that full Board.

Kent Ross moved that the recommendation be adopted; seconded by John Huston.

It was moved by Ron Macy and seconded by Charles Graham that sections a and b of recommendation No. 1 be amended as follows: to be added at the conclusion of section a: "A member of the Foreign Missions Board may not be a member of the Home Missions Board"; to be added to section b: "A member of the Home Missions Board may not be a member of the Foreign Missions Board." Motion carried.

Recommendation No. 1, as amended, was passed. We recommend that the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference be reconstructed as follows:

a. That there be a Foreign Missions Board of three members elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Foreign Missions Board Chairman. A member of the Foreign Missions Board may not be a member of the Home Missions Board.

b. That there be a Home Missions Board of three members, elected by the General Conference delegates. That one be elected each year for a term of three years. That immediately after the election each year, the Board elect one of its number to act as Home Missions Board Chairman. A member of the Home Missions Board may not be a member of the Foreign Missions Board.

c. That a superintendent of Missions be appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, either on a part-time or full-time basis as the need requires.

d. That both the Foreign Missions Board and the Home Missions Board serve, together with the Superintendent of Missions, as the Missions Board of the Church of God General Conference. That the Superintendent of Missions be the chairman of that full Board.



1976-'77 Board of Directors

Nominations were called to elect a member of the Home Missions Board for 2 years. Kent Ross and Sydney Kirkpatrick were nominated for the position. Moved by Maurice Robinson, seconded by Ed Bender, that nominations cease. Kent Ross was elected as Home Missions Board member for 2 years.

Nominations were called to elect two members for the Foreign Missions Board. Mardy Lawrence was nominated for a three-year term. It was moved by Joe James and seconded by Ron Macy that nominations cease and the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Mardy Lawrence. Motion carried.

Nominations were opened for another member for the Foreign Missions Board for one year. Don Swartz and Francis Burnett were nominated. Moved by Milon Hall, seconded by Emory Macy, that the nominations cease. Motion carried. Don Swartz was elected for a one-year term.

Recommendation No. 2, that we discontinue financial support to the Mexico mission work at the present time, was presented to the delegates for adoption and discussion. Moved by Kent Ross and seconded by Don Swartz that we adopt this recommendation. After much discussion it was moved by Willis Turner and seconded by Milon Hall that this motion be tabled. Motion carried.

Recommendation No. 3 was presented: That a qualified General Conference representative be sent to each of our mission fields to remain so long as feasible for the purpose of administration, teaching, and preaching. Jim Babcock moved and Joe Astolfi seconded the motion to adopt this recommendation.

Bill Lawrence presented an amendment to this recommendation, that the words "who is willing to be trained" be inserted in the recommendation, as follows: We recommend that a qualified General Conference representative (who is willing to be trained) be sent to each of our mission fields to remain as long as feasible for the purpose of administration, teaching, and preaching. With the amendment inserted, the recommendation was passed.

Ruth Overholser gave a report of the Credentials Committee for the Wednesday session: 8 Board of Directors, 60 ministers, 115 delegates—a total of 183, compared with 165 at the same session last year.

The Wednesday session was recessed with prayer by John Fauntleroy, Happy Woods, LA, Church at 11:50 a.m.

Thursday, August 12

The third business session of the Fifty-Sixth General Conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Kennedy. The session was opened with prayer by Bro. Hollis Partlowe, Phoenix, AZ. Minutes of Wednesday's session were read to the delegates.

Ron Macy gave a report of the distribution of literature at the booth in Washington, DC, during the Bicentennial Celebration. He reported that 8,000 tracts were given out, along with 150 *Restitution Heralds*. He said there would be a letter sent out shortly giving a full report of their activities.

James Graham invited everyone to attend the Sharing Sessions on Sunday School work and gave a brief report on the Christian Workers Seminar.

The floor was opened to nominations for members of the Board of Directors. Chairman Kennedy said that three Directors would finish their term this year—Russell Johns, Kenneth Milne, and David Johnson. Nominations were opened for Director No. 1. John Huston of Brush Creek Church, Tipp City, OH, nominated Richard Worley. Don Swartz, Columbia Station, OH, nominated Russell Magaw. Charles Jones moved and Orene Robinson seconded that the nominations cease. Motion carried.

Nominations for Director No. 2 were requested. Warren Sorenson, Tempe, AZ, nominated Dr. Bill Lawrence of Phoenix, AZ. Arnold Johns of Fredericktown, MO, nominated Jack Harper of Omaha, NE. John Huston moved and Dan Landry seconded that the nominations cease. Motion carried.

The floor was opened for nominations for Director No. 3. Don Overmyer nominated Wayne Laning of Ripley, IL. Sydney Kirkpatrick nominated Willis Turner of Rockford, IL. Dan Stone nominated Joe James of Greenville, SC. It was moved by Maurice Robinson and seconded by Ed Bender that nominations

cease. Motion carried. The nominees were all introduced to the delegates.

Bro. Ross announced that the pool expense for this year was \$88.45. He reported to the delegates that there was a lack of cabins sufficient to house everyone coming to Conference this year. He also stated that this camp would not be available to the Church of God for this same week next year. The possibility of using Rockford College, Rockford, IL, was presented. The price per day would be \$12.00 per person for everyone over 12 years of age; \$9.00 for children 3-12 years; and nothing for children under 3 years. He explained the dining facilities, air conditioning, recreational activities available, lounges, family-type facilities, etc. He stated that the college seemed eager to work out any arrangements we deemed necessary for carrying out our Conference activities. This proposal is to be voted on at Friday's session.

John Lewis, president of Oregon Bible College, gave a report on the progress of the College. He explained the agreement between Oregon Bible College and Sauk Valley Community College to provide the General Education courses necessary for the graduation of Oregon Bible College students. Many questions were asked President Lewis regarding their accreditation and the possibility of transferring those credits.

Vernis Wolfe gave some general information as to how the Board of Education functions. It is a board of recommendation to the General Conference Board. It is not an administrative board.

Ruth Overholser gave the Credentials Committee report for the Thursday session: 8 Board of Directors; 58 ministers; 112 delegates—totaling 178 compared with 163 at this same session last year.

Chariman Kennedy called on Russell Johns for prayer and the meeting was dismissed at 11:45 a.m.

Friday Morning, August 13

The fourth business session of the Fifty-Sixth Annual General Conference was called to order by Chairman Kennedy, with prayer by E. Richard Smith, Hillisburg, IN. The minutes of Thursday's session were read by the secretary.

The Credentials Committee seated the delegates for the election of new Board Directors.

S. O. Ross made an announcement of the Men's Retreat at Camp Shipshewana, IN, November 5, 6. James Graham announced the Christian Workers Seminar for March 6-12 at Camp Mack, IN. It was also announced that the tape ministry

will be moved from Dayton, OH, to the General Conference office.

After September 1, Bro. Francis Burnett will be available for Prophetic Meetings.

Bro. Burnett presented the work of the Sunday School Department. Some fifty churches used the vacation Bible school material this year. Over 15,000 extra sheets were used. The material was well received.

Francis Burnett reported also on the Christian Workers Seminar. Tuition will be \$40.00 for a single application; \$75.00 for a couple. It was moved by Scott Ross and seconded by Jack Hearp that the Sunday School Department report be accepted.

Scott Ross made the following statement: "Bro. Francis Burnett has faithfully sought to serve God these past eight years as an employee of the Church of God General Conference. During this time he has served on the staff of Oregon Bible College, in the Youth Department, on the mission field of Nova Scotia, and most recently in the Sunday School Department. He has resigned now from the staff of the General Conference as of August 31.

"I move the delegates of this Conference give Bro. Burnett a standing expression of our appreciation for his faithful service to God through our Church of God General Conference these past eight years." Motion seconded by Jack Hearp. The motion carried.

The election of members to the Sunday School Board was as follows: for member No. 1 the nominations were Joe Myers, and Michael Mattison, nominated by Bros. Dale Ramsey and Kent Ross, respectively. Benny Mattison moved and Mary Patrick seconded that the nominations cease. Michael Mattison was elected.

Nominations for member No. 2 were opened. Russell Magaw nominated Scott Ross. Dan Stone moved that the nominations cease and that the secretary cast a unanimous vote for Scott Ross. Motion seconded by Alton Shaw. Motion carried.

The election of new Board of Directors members was reported. For Director No.

1, Russell Magaw of Columbia Station, OH, was elected. For Director No. 2, Bill Lawrence of Phoenix, AZ, was elected. For Director No. 3, Joe James of Greenville, SC, was elected. Bro. Clyde Randall moved and several seconded that a rising vote of thanks be given to retiring members of the Board-David Johnson, Russell Johns, and Kenneth Milne.

Recommendation No. 4 was then presented to the delegates. We recommend an amendment to the Constitution. Article II (delegates) Section 3 now reads: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with the licensed ministers of the Conference and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large and have the same powers as the delegates from the churches." We recommend that Section 3 read as follows: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with licensed and/or ordained ministers of the Conference who are pastors of a church, co-pastors of a church, serving on the Conference staff, retired pastors, or associate pastors, and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large, and shall have the same powers as the delegates from the churches." This recommendation was moved by Francis Burnett and seconded by Darrell Maddock.

It was moved by Roy Graham and seconded by Russell Johns that the recommended amendment be amended as follows: "The officers of the Church of God General Conference, together with licensed and/or ordained ministers of the Conference who are pastors of a church, co-pastors of a church (active evangelists, and active missionaries), serving on the Conference staff, retired pastors, or associate pastors, and one delegate from each state or district conference, shall be considered as delegates at large, and shall have the same powers as the delegates from the churches." After much discussion the amendment was defeated. Recommendation No. 4 was also defeated.

The following motion was presented to the delegates by Clyde Randall: I move that the Board of Directors be hereby authorized to erect a suitable historical marker commemorating the organization of the Church of God General Conference on the Iowa State Conference grounds, provided it is agreeable with the Iowa State Conference. Motion seconded by Emory Macy. Carried.

The following motion was presented by Ron Macy: I move that the Church of God General Conference meet next year

for four days during the second week of August and that it be held at Rockford College in Rockford, IL. Further, to instruct the Board of Directors to continue negotiations with the college for lower costs for the use of its facilities; and, if circumstances warrant, to choose another time and location for the Conference meeting. Motion seconded by Joe James. Carried.

Bro. James Mattison was given a rising vote of thanks for his writing on the Prophecy Page of *The Restitution Herald*.

A rising vote of thanks was also given to Cleo Dixon of the Omaha Church for the banner he made for the tabernacle-"Heritage of Our Faith." Clyde Randall moved and Otis Densmore seconded that a letter be sent to Cleo Dixon by the secretary conveying our thanks.

The Credentials Committee reported that there were 8 Board of Directors, 50 ministers and 113 delegates present for the Friday morning session-a total of 171 compared with 159 at the same session last year.

The morning session was recessed with prayer by Paul Overholser.

Friday Afternoon, August 13

The fifth business session of the Fifty-Sixth General Conference was called to order by Chairman Kennedy at 2:20 p.m., who called on Bro. Richard Eldred of Blanchard, MI, to lead the session in prayer.

Bro. Leland Hanson, past president of the General Conference, was in attendance and was given recognition for his many years of interest and service to the General Conference.

The officers of the new Board of Directors were announced: Chairman, Billie Kennedy; Vice Chairman, Bill Lawrence; Secretary, Joe James; Treasurer, Bob Smith; Directors, John Fauntleroy, Russell Magaw, and Hollis Partlowe.

A question was asked as to the report that books containing sexual remarks were required reading at Oregon Bible College. Fear was expressed that the Sauk Valley College arrangement might defeat our purpose for training ministers.

Dewaine Demmitt moved and Don Overmyer seconded that the delegates of this Conference give a vote of approval to the proposal by the Board of Education and the General Conference Board of Directors to enter into an agreement with Sauk Valley College as proposed. Carried.

Jack Hearp made the following motion: that the secretary write a letter of appreciation to the staff of Riverview Camp, thanking it for the cooperation during the years that we have met here. Seconded by Joe Astolfi, Carried.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Jim Babcock for the years he served on the Sunday School Board.

A proposed budget of \$287,000 with \$220,000 as "Goals for Giving" was presented to the delegates. John Huston moved and Joe Astolfi seconded that we adopt the proposed budget of \$287,000. Carried.

A rising vote of appreciation was given to Clement Richey for his work on behalf of the Church of God General Conference.

The Credentials Committee gave the following report: 7 Board of Directors, 41 ministers, 86 delegates - totaling 134, compared with 124 at the same session last year.

It was moved by Ron Macy and seconded by Francis Burnett that we accept the Credentials Committee report.

The minutes of both morning and afternoon sessions were read.

Robert Coverstone moved and Rex Shaw seconded that the minutes of the entire Conference as corrected be accepted.

Clyde Randall moved that we adjourn. Motion was seconded by David Cheatwood and carried.

The delegates sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." The Conference sessions were dismissed with prayer by Chairman Kennedy.

General Conference Minutes

The minutes of the 1976 annual Church of God General Conference delegate sessions appear in this issue. I encourage each one to read these minutes. The recommendations passed and actions taken set the goals and policies for the coming fiscal year (October 1, 1976, to September 30, 1977). The Board of Directors and Conference staff will try to carry out these programs and recommendations as directed.

Annual Budget

The budget for the next fiscal year (see copy in this issue) was approved by the delegates. The proposed budget was presented to the delegates item by item and, as approved, will require annual giving in the amount of \$220,000 (\$18,333 per month), which is the same as the budget for the current fiscal year. On behalf of the Board of Directors, department heads, staff workers, and myself, we commend the membership for dedicated giving in meeting the needs of the Conference. In addition to meeting the budget needs this past year, there have been additional contributions of nearly one hundred thousand dollars to the Oregon Bible College dormitory building and other earmarked funds. May God continue to bless and provide that all of the plans and programs of the General Conference, state conferences, and local churches may be carried on to successful completion.

Bicentennial Worship Service

The Church of God General Conference was invited to have a representative at the Bicentennial Worship Service that was held in Philadelphia, PA, July 4, 1976. Your Executive Director was unable to attend. Brother Joseph Fletcher, of Burke, VA, consented to represent the Conference. Brother Fletcher says: "The service was quite impressive. I was happy to represent the General Conference at this meeting. It was a thrill to be seated, with Constitution Hall in eyesight, on the morning of our Nation's 200th birthday. Thank you for asking me to serve."

Pastoral Changes

Twenty-four pastors of the Church of God General Conference have moved, effective September first. Eighteen went into new pastorates, two retired, and four: Bros. John Carr, Mark Ryan, Theodore Armes, and Paul Moore have left their pastorates for other fields.

Bros. C. E. Lapp and Harry Goekler have retired from the ministry. We praise God for the dedication and devotion of these two men and for the fruitful ministries they have performed in the churches they have served. May God's blessings go with them in their retirement years.

Staff Changes

Bro. Francis Burnett resigned as Sunday School Director and left that position August 31. We express our thanks and appreciation to Bro. Burnett for his dedicated service to the work of the Conference during the past eight years. During that time, he served as instructor and dean of Oregon Bible College, Youth Director, and Sunday School Director. We ask God to direct and bless Brother and Sister Burnett in their future work.

Dr. Alva Huffer, who has been Special Consultant to Oregon Bible College the past year on a part-time salary, will now serve in that capacity only on a project basis. We appreciate the work and devoted service of Bro. Huffer during the past eight years as president of Oregon Bible College and special consultant.

Sr. Mary Krogh has left her employment as Women's Dormitory Director. We appreciate the fine work that she has done in that capacity the past four years.

New members on the staff are Robert Jones, as Old Testament Instructor at Oregon Bible College, and David Wilsterman, a senior student, who is Men's Dormitory Director. We welcome both of these men to the General Conference Staff.

Conference Finances

As this page is written in mid-September, it appears that the Goals for Giving for the current fiscal year will be met. We thank the membership for responding to the budget needs in a wonderful way. These contributions help to carry on the work of missions, Sunday school, youth, free literature, Oregon Bible College, and the many other services provided by the Church of God General Conference.

Missions News

"This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness" (Matt. 24:14).

Two Missions Boards

As a result of action taken at the 1976 General Conference, the Missions Department now has two boards, the Foreign Missions Board and the Home Missions Board. Each Board has three members who eventually will serve three-year terms.

To institute the new Missions Boards, to preserve the term of office of the present Missions Board members, and to set up the continuity of henceforth electing Board members for three-year terms, this procedure was followed:

Home Missions Board

- 1. M. A. Patrick will serve out his unexpired oneyear term.
 - 2. Kent Ross was elected for a two-year term.
- 3. R. Warren Sorenson will serve out his unexpired three-year term. (Missions Board members were formerly elected for a four-year term.)

Foreign Missions Board

- 1. J. Don Swartz was elected for a one-year term.
- 2. Paul Overholser will serve out his unexpired twoyear term.
- 3. Mardy Lawrence was reelected for a three-year term.

After the election, the two Boards met and each chose its own chairman and secretary. Warren Sorenson and Kent Ross will serve as chairman and secretary, respectively, of the Home Missions Board. Those positions on the Foreign Missions Board will be held, respectively, by Mardy Lawrence and Paul Overholser.

In order to become organized and lay plans for the future, both Missions Boards plan to meet in Phoenix, AZ, October 26-28, 1976. We ask for your prayers for the Lord's direction in this important meeting.

Mexico Mission Work

One of the recommendations at General Conference this year was that financial support to the Mexico work be discontinued September 1, 1976.

The delegates felt that it was not necessary for them to vote on this recommendation, but that the Missions Board has the authority to discontinue a work if it is thought to be necessary. So the recommendation was tabled and turned back to the Missions Board.

Before the recommendation was discussed on the Conference floor, I spoke about the reasons for the discontinuation of support. I want to share with you some of the thoughts presented at that time.

We feel that the money currently being spent in Mexico could be used to better advantage in areas where there is response to the gospel. The people of the village of Labor Vieja do not seem to be interested in the church. We have also learned that some who had attended services will probably be moving away from the village to start ranches in other areas.

Alice Aldrich has served faithfully in Mexico for several years and we appreciate the work she has done. For some time now she has been the only American from the Church of God there. Because of the Mexican culture, it is difficult for a woman alone to build up a successful mission work. Alice herself would like to see one or two couples in the work there, but right now we know of none who are prepared and available.

Roberto Badillo wants to continue having services, and we are encouraging him to do so as a lay leader.

Our decision was not based merely on the fact that there have been few converts in Mexico. If leaders were being trained for future work, that might have been a different situation. Alice was willing to have classes for Roberto, but it was difficult with his other work to find the time for extra meetings. The other two members in the village are women and here again the Mexican culture would prohibit them from being effective leaders.

In a recent letter from Alice Aldrich, she expresses her thanks to everyone for all the prayers, support, and letters of encouragement that were sent to her. She asks that you continue to pray for the Mexican people. She is thankful to God for allowing her to share joys and heartaches with these brothers in Christ and to learn to understand and love them.

We express our appreciation to Alice for her dedication and her efforts in sharing the gospel and her life with the Mexican people.

Coins-for-Christ Campaign Completed

BICENTENNIAL DISPLAY REPORT Washington, DC, June 20-26, 1976

History articles were prepared which covered the 1869, 1888, 1910, and 1920 Conferences. Along with the 1910 Conference paragraph was included the 16 Articles of Faith that were adopted at that Conference. One paragraph named three of the early periodicals that were printed by the forerunners of our church. We had an 1894 copy of *The Restitution* on display. The rest of the display consisted of short paragraphs which outlined the history of each of the local conferences.

Of the 40,000 tracts that we had on hand, we were able to distribute about 8,000. These included 2,400 copies of "Introduction to the Church of God"; 1,800 of "Jesus Will Come"; 800 "First Steps in Bible Study"; 300 "Abrahamic Faith"; 900 "Signs of Jesus' Coming"; and 1,800 "One God." For some reason, the tract "Gospel of the Kingdom" was forgotten, and all 5,000 went unused.

Of the books, two "One God"; three "Russia, Israel, Christ and You" (I believe that one went to an Arab); two "God's Truth" (both to our church members); and (I couldn't believe it) one "Berean History" (to a man from Chicago) were sold. We also had on hand some of the "Words of Truth" concordances and sold two.

People from all over the country helped us in our work. Our history paragraphs were taken

from the history book compiled by Bro. Clyde Randall. Our banners were made by Bro. Cleo Dixon. The banner braces were made by Bro. Laurel Macy, and brought out by the Marvin Hart family when they came to help. Bro. Don Ward, together with his family and a brother from Michigan, came for a day. Don is from Missouri. Sheila Sheeley, Ted Lauder, and a friend of his named Dave, also came from Missouri. Ralph, Richard, and Gary Childs came from Dayton, Ohio. Harold and Bonnie Domigan came from Lawrenceville, Ohio. Yvonne Givens came with the Harts from Ohio. Kevin Demmitt, Mike Gallager, and David Supinger, from the Troy, Ohio, church helped, as did Bros. James Ritch, Jay Ramsey, and James, Steve, and Timothy Mattison.

We were able to put tracts on cars, and to hand them to people personally. I guess, to most of us, and especially to Richard Childs, the high point of the week came when five Russian agricultural experts came by on Thursday night. Richard brought out a huge picture of the joint United States and Russian space mission. It had some Russian printing on it. When he showed it to them, one of them gave him a small pin commemorating the Russian space program. They spoke little English.

One day three different people from Dallas,

TX, stopped at the booth. One was a Baptist minister. We were able to witness to people from all over the country and from many different religions. A Hindu stopped one day to chat for a few minutes. We had the chance to talk to a local radio evangelist who has been on Washington radio for 35 years and is 77 years old. We also talked with his son, who is in the ministry, about some of the things we believe in common with regard to Bible prophecy. Some people were looking for points on which we could disagree, almost as though they wanted to argue. Others just wanted to share their belief in anything religious.

I think that a special thanks should be given to the people of the Eternal Hope Church and the Virginia Conference for the many helps that they rendered. The Conference gave us much needed financial help. The people of Eternal hope not only helped with the booth; they also opened their homes to those who traveled across the country to be with us. I am firmly convinced that a great work for God was done that week. I know that the gospel of the kingdom will reach many across the country as a result of this outreach.

There is a tremendous potential for nationwide evangelism in the capital of our nation. I pray that we can make greater use of it in years to come.

Many thanks to all who prayed for this effort, and to those who gave financially to our General Conference to pay for the material that we used.

A Missionary Challenge

Prophecy informs us that the coming of Christ is near. Christ transforms us, that we may be ready for his coming. Study the world situation, and you will come to the obvious conclusion that the time clock of world affairs nears the dawn of the New Day when Christ shall rule. Bible Colleges Convention

President John Lewis, Eugene Stilson, and Dale Ramsey attended the American Association of Bible Colleges Convention in Chicago on October 29 and 30. We were able to attend sessions for presidents, academic deans, church music, and Christian education.

The sessions covered long-range planning, public relations, student recruitment, measuring educational outcomes, faculty development, competency-based Christian education, integrating Christian education and Christian service, and other sessions of interest and value.

Expenses for the faculty to attend the A.A.B.C. convention are provided from Booster funds.

Seminar

John Lewis attended a pastoral counseling seminar, conducted by the Sinnissippi Mental Health Clinic, October 20, at Sterling, IL.

The seminar approached the particular problems pastors have as personal counselors. The daylong seminar concentrates much knowledge and understanding into a few hours of conference and discussion.

New Class

During the winter semester, Hugh Harman will teach a new health class for juniors and seniors. The title of the course is "Environmental Health." The course is designed to acquaint students with many of the ecological imbalances, and how understanding this is essential to human health. The way to achieve harmony between the slowly changing inner environment and the rapidly changing outer environment is the theme of the course.

This course will be accredited by both the Bible College and Sauk Valley College. It is valuable to our juniors and seniors because it provides valuable resource information for their pastoral ministry.

Christ in the Concrete City

The students of Oregon Bible College are presenting another play this year, entitled "Christ in the Concrete

City." Within the limits imposed by a cast of six, it attempts to portray the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ from three points of view. Superintendents Survey

Scripture Press Ministries recently conducted a survey of several thousand Sunday school superintendents. One question in the survey asked the respondents to state the Sunday school problems for which they most sensed a need for help. Among the answers were the following: how to win more pupils and/or their parents to Christ; how to increase attendance; how to have an effective visitation program; how to encourage teachers to be more dedicated; how to train teachers; how to improve facilities; how to have an effective record system.

If you are a superintendent, you may be able to identify with some of these problems and you too may be seeking help in these areas. If so, I would like to recommend two things to you and all people who are involved in Sunday school work:

- 1) Purchase the Superintendents' and Workers' Sunday School Manual by Paul H. Overholser. This 70-page book is a must for all Sunday school workers. It will provide information which will help answer many questions and problems you may have. It contains many helps to conserve your time and help make your Sunday school more efficient and effective in reaching and teaching others. The cost is \$1.00 postage paid if payment accompanies your order. Do not be misled by the low cost of this book. It is worth many times the price. It is listed under Sunday School Supplies on the order form on the back cover of the current Restitution Herald.
- 2) I would suggest that you enroll in the Christian Workers' Seminar which will be held March 6-12, 1977 at Camp Mack, IN. See the back of the October and December Restitution Heralds for additional information. Sessions on "Advancing the Smaller Local Church," "Creative Bible Teaching," "Church Growth," and "Sunday School Work" will be especially valuable to Sunday school workers. Actually, these and other sessions will be of help to any worker in the church. All Christian workers are invited to attend.



Please be informed that, from our hearts, we want to thank you for your concern for us, and for your contributions.

Gulf Coast Church of God started when several people in Florida, who were of like faith, gathered for Bible classes in homes near New Port Richey. In September, 1974, Bro. and Sr. Austin Railton moved to Florida, and joined the workers in prayer that God would build a church in Florida. We continued meeting in homes and developed a growing schedule of services. The area around us was visited many times for calls and the distribution of flyers. In about a year, more or less, two worker families moved away.

During the second year, we moved our Sunday morning services to the newly built Parkwood Civic Building. The attendance of children, and some adults, grew to the upper teens and twenties, and sometimes into the thirties. Last June, eight persons were baptized, including three adults. Two more adults were baptized in September.

However, evidence of declining interest, declining support, lack of a stable base of responsible workers, and problems with the location of meetings, all indicated that the work was slowing to a halt.

Pastor Railton received several calls to other churches and, after much consideration, accepted the call to go to Harlingen, TX.

Gulf Coast Church of God closed on the first of October, 1976. We wish that things could have been different.

Your contributions during the last two years have been greatly appreciated by us. We could not have survived without them.

If we receive any more contributions that are now on the way to us, we will return them to you.

We pray that Florida will have another opportunity for a church in the future.

That Family Feeling

■N 1976, for the second time in approximately fifty years, your editor was not able to attend the Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference. Nevertheless, I am convinced that it was a very successful one. This conviction is not based primarily upon the reports, formal or informal, of the business sessions. Neither does it have its origin in the enthusiastic reports of the sermons, classes, or musical programs. It is founded upon a more or less casual remark made by an old Church of God member who attended with a group, some of whom had never been there before, and the rest not for many years. I cannot recall the exact wording of the comment, but it was to the effect that the thing that impressed the group most was the strong "family feeling" that was much in evidence among the brethren. These people expressed their wish to return in 1977.

The more we reflect upon this comment, the more meaningful it becomes. Certainly, well-organized and conducted business sessions are essential to the work of the Conference. It is equally sure that unless the gospel that we spread is true to the Word of God, the work of the Church of God General Conference is in vain. But it took a comparative stranger to these sessions to make me aware of a primary spiritual value that we take so casually that we are scarcely aware of its precious contribution to our Christian lives—the family feeling.

The obvious joy that brethren from many parts of the world find in each other's fellowship during these few days is surely not the least of the benefits gained from these meetings. The family feeling is the most clearly visible mark of Christian brethren. Jesus recognized this when he

said: "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35). This influence will persist long after the sermons, the lessons and the music have been forgotten.

One would expect that in the smaller, more intimate gatherings of local congregations this family feeling would be even more obvious. Often it is, but not always. It is much easier to forgive and overlook differences of opinion, attitudes, and idiosyncrasies for a few days than to live with them from week to week, year after year.

Unhappily, under such circumstances the family feeling sometimes degenerates into bickerings and resentments that have nothing to recommend them as spiritual exercises. They have more in common with the worldly behavior that we expect in the families of unrepentant sinners.

When we find such conditions developing among the members of our local congregation, it is time for each member to carefully examine his own feelings and attitudes toward other members of that congregation. Is it possible that they reflect our own attitudes and behavior? If anyone feels unloved, unappreciated, and neglected, it is fair that he should prayerfully consider the love, recognition, and appreciation that he extends to the brothers and sisters in Christ among whom he lives.

Jesus set a high standard for us, and also issued a stern warning, when he said: "Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ye shall not be condemned: forgive, and ye shall be forgiven: give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same mea-

sure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again" (Luke 6:37, 38). Restoring this passage to its context we note that the principle of giving in order to receive is applied to both material possessions and spiritual blessings. The more love and appreciation we give to other members of our church families, the more love and appreciation they will heap upon us. Why not be the one to set in motion this ascending spiral of love and appreciation in your church family. Begin consciously to seek something to commend in the brother or sister whom you feel loves you the least. The results may surprise and gratify you!

We cannot overlook the fact that Jesus and the apostles sometimes found it necessary to reprimand those in error, but it is fatal for us to imitate these actions until we have copied their principle of first assuring those in error of our love. They were quite as ready to appreciate and praise. They usually praised openly, but reproved privately.

Of the centurion's declaration of his faith that Jesus could heal a servant from a distance, Jesus stated openly: "I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel" (Matt. 8:10).

To Peter's confession of his faith that Jesus is the Messiah, the Master answered: "Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 16:17). You can think of many more such examples.

For examples of Paul's use of this principle read Romans 1:8, 9; 1 Corinthians 1:4, 5; Ephesians 1:15, 16; Philippians 1:3-5, and others. Strong Christian families forgive each other readily, and appreciate and encourage each other.

May the birth of Christ, the Son of God, our Savior and coming King, be ever uppermost in our minds during the Christmas celebrations. May the year of 1977 bring joy and blessings to each one.

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, Illinois, November 11-13, 1976. All areas of the General Conference work were reviewed.

An agreement with the Lombard Community Church of God was approved. The State of Illinois has taken the Lombard Church and parsonage property for highway purposes and settlement has been made. It was the decision of the church not to rebuild at this time. By the agreement, \$100,000 of the settlement funds has been deposited with the Church of God General Conference, the earnings only to be used for Oregon Bible College at the direction of the Board of Directors.

Approval was given for the Executive Director to attend a National Advisory Council meeting of the American Bible Society in New York City in April. The theme of the meeting will be "God's Word in Today's World." We feel it is a great privilege for the Church of God General Conference to be invited to participate in these sessions, the greater expense to be borne by the Bible Society.

A detailed report of the Missions Department (both home and foreign) was received. A recommendation was approved that Bro. and Sr. John Lewis be sent to India in the summer of 1977 to teach the church leaders and teachers there for a two-month period. In accordance with the recommendation adopted at the 1976 General Conference, the funds for this trip (approximately \$6,000) will be raised by special appeal.

The Jay Street Church of God, Kokomo, IN, was approved for Mission Builders Appeal Number 38 for May, 1977. A committee was appointed to select and erect an appropriate marker at the site in Waterloo, IA, where the organizational meeting of the Church of God General Conference took place in 1921.

Action was taken to increase tuition, room, and board fees at Oregon Bible College effective with the 1977-'78 school year. Tuition will be \$325 per semester and room and board \$425 per semester. This will be an increase of \$100 per semester for dormitory students.

Approval was given to reduce the price of the Songs of Truth Hymnals Number Two. We still have a large inventory of these fine hymnals and the new sale price effective immediately is \$3.50 for the regular hymnal and \$4.50 for the loose leaf. There is a committee giving study to a new enlarged hymnal; however, this hymnal will not be available for several years, and will retail for a much higher sale price.

Hollis Partlowe, chairman, Robert Smith, William Lawrence, and S. O. Ross were appointed to plan the program for the 1977 General Conference. The committee met briefly and did some preliminary planning.

The Executive Director is also the Director of Development, in which capacity he deals with the membership on wills, trusts, life insurance, and other deferred gifts to the benefit of the Church of God General Conference and its departments. Approval was given for the appointment of an assistant to work with the Director in this important area of the work.

The Audit Report of the past fiscal year prepared by Allan Ramsey, of Warsaw, IN, was approved and will be published in the January issue of *Progress Journal*. The next meeting of the Board of Directors of the General Conference will be on April 28, 1977.

Conference Finances

We are sorry to report that the giving for the month of November has fallen \$13,000 short of the needs. This deficit giving makes it necessary to borrow from the restricted funds of the Conference to meet the monthly expenses. We pray and trust that the membership will respond to these needs.

Missions News

Report From Home Missions Board Evangelism Seminar, Kansas City, Missouri

The Home Missions Board—composed of Warren Sorenson, Kent Ross, and Merle Patrick—came into existence at the General Conference held at Cedar Falls, Iowa, in August of this year. The formation of this Board represents the awareness of our people of the need for a greater and more specific thrust in home missions.

We members of the Home Missions Board believe that God opened a door of understanding and direction by providing us the opportunity recently to attend a Consultation on Evangelism and Church Growth at Kansas City, Missouri. This came at the time that we were seeking to identify our purpose, and to come to grips with principles and procedures which are most effective in home missions and church growth. We recognize the need to offer to local churches practical, usable, down-to-earth principles of church growth, and at the same time to be willing and ready to offer direction as to how to implement these principles in an effective ministry of growth. At this consultation on evangelism and church growth we received valuable resources which represent years of study and preparation by many persons and church bodies. Many of these resources relate specifically to our present purpose and need. In this report we want to share these basics, and at the same time let you know that the Home Missions Board is working to build a program which will incorporate some of the basics learned.

- 1. It is vitally important that we come to an understanding of our purpose, and of our organization in relation to that purpose. The answer to the following four questions gives direction to the newly formed Home Missions Board, and will do so for the entire Conference and each local church. What is our purpose? What are our functions? What are our functions accomplishing? Are our functions unified in one mission?
- 2. It is vitally important to implement a prayer ministry as the basis of power for evangelism in and through the church. A specific prayer program is the beginning of specific results in church growth. Prayer is the continuing source of our power as we obey the leadership of God.
 - 3. It is vitally important that love be the motivating

force in evangelism and church growth. The compelling force of God is love! It is God's love that offers salvation to humanity. It is this love, in and through the church, that repeats God's offer of salvation to a needy world—the same world that "God so loved."

- 4. It is vitally important to stimulate evangelistic action at every level of church life. Most of us, in our churches, spend more time deciding on activities than in coming to grips with our purposes. Once we have established our purpose according to the will of God, we involve our people at every level of the congregation in working toward the fulfillment of that purpose.
- 5. It is vitally important that we develop a church growth conscience. There are four basic reasons why some churches are growing and some are not. Those churches grow which believe that church growth is God's will. Others do not. Those churches which pray for church growth, grow. Other churches do not grow. Those churches which know much about church growth, grow. Those churches which know little or nothing about it do not. Those churches that are doing what produces church growth, grow. Those which fail to practice these principles do not.
- 6. It is vitally important that the Sunday school implement an active program of evangelism. Since the Sunday school feeds church growth, the Sunday school must be growing.

The Home Missions Board makes the following recommendations as a beginning in growth for your church: that a spiritual life and prayer emphasis be started in your local church; that the local church define its purpose as a church; that each local church list its agencies and functions, and then evaluate these in terms of the stated purpose; that each church set goals with a specific time in which to meet these goals; that a specific plan of action by which the church can meet the stated goals be implemented; and that there be a periodic reevaluation of progress and goals.

Future seminars on church growth are being planned. Watch for one of these in the area of your church and attend if at all possible.

We covet your prayers for the Home Missions Board. We are seeking to follow God's leadership with the result that his will for growth will be realized throughout the Church of God.

Contemporary Christian Education

At the American Association of Bible Colleges Convention held in Chicago in late October, Dr. LeRoy Ford, from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, presented a seminar on contemporary trends in Christian education.

It is important to local churches, as well as to Oregon Bible College, that we keep in touch with trends and changes taking place in religious education. Churches, as well as Bible colleges, must be aware of these trends in order to take advantage of the best possible teaching techniques and attitudes, so that our people can grow in knowledge and faith under optimum conditions.

In modern religious education, church members seem to be assuming more authority in church affairs, and at the same time are succeeding in administering and operating their own local churches. We are living in a time when the Sunday school is under the direction and guidance of lay people more than ever before. More people are studying the Bible and making direct applications of their understanding to their own lives. If we wish to meet the needs of our people, our Sunday school and Christian education programs in our local churches should minister to the people's need for fellowship, instead of imposing a "program" on them.

Our Sunday school and education curriculum needs to be more broadly based instead of on only a few choice texts from the Bible. We must choose a Bible curriculum which views a broad context of the scriptures that will provide our people a broad perspective of the Bible. It is clear that in Christian education we need to evaluate progress in the Sunday school, as well as in other learning situations, in order to set up performance objectives, and to measure our student progress against these objectives.

On the local church level, a kind of educational experience that has been tried in a very few churches is individual learning. Individual members of churches may use video tapes, cassettes, and individual instructional materials for self-instruction at any time. Many churches are also using multi-generation learning. That is, they put students from a wide span of age groups in the same Sunday school and Bible study classes. Many churches are placing much less emphasis on organization and more on family life. It seems that in many situations we need to follow bold new approaches to the work of the church.

The goal is to create a demand for ministers of Christian education who can properly apply the teachings of the Scriptures to the needs of people in the church, on the street, and in the home. It is to our advantage to recognize and grasp the wide-open opportunities for Christian education to be found in our churches and communities. The Christian education ministries of Oregon Bible College and the local church are vital to each individual Christian living in obedience to Christ.

Christian Service

The Christian Service training program of the Bible college has been active in involving students in gospel teams and other Christian service activities.

The play cast has also had a busy fall schedule, presenting "Christ in the Concrete City." The first performance was in South Bend, Indiana, at the Morning Star Church. We also presented the play at Macomb and Ripley, Illinois, on December 11 and 12. We are glad that we will have opportunities to present this play at several of our churches during the months of January and February. We feel that the play has an excellent message and presents an opportunity for a spiritual growing experience. We are sorry that we are not able to take the play to all of the churches that have requested it.

Student Activities

The Social Committee, under the leadership of Donna Weidensall and Karen Circle, has involved the students in many activities.

On October 26, the students attended a Halloween party at Stronghold Castle, a traditional OBC Halloween setting. Students participated in a costume party, a hay ride, and game activities.

Twenty-four students take part in a bowling league, organized by Howard Robinson. The students meet on alternate Friday nights throughout the winter.

Post-High Midwinter Retreat

The Challenge of Christian Education

A student in the public school receives approximately 950 hours of schooling per year. A student who attends Sunday school regularly receives about 52 hours of schooling per year. This means that a student attending only Sunday school, with perfect attendance, would have to attend 18½ years to equal the amount of time spent each year in secular education, or it would take 219 years of Sunday school to equal a high school education. The challenge is to accomplish the task of Christian education with the greatest possible effectiveness.

Of course Sunday school is not the only agency of Christian Education. Morning and evening worship, junior church, midweek service, Berean Youth Fellowship meetings, summer camping programs, as well as good Christian literature, all help to multiply the Christian Education training of our people.

I believe the program of Christian Education in the Church of God should be the best we can possibly make it. The Lord expects it to be the best, and the Sunday School Board, the editors, the writers, and the entire staff are committed to this end.

Jesus Christ Is Not God

"Jesus Christ Is Not God" is the title of a book used as a text at Oregon Bible College. The book is written by Dr. Victor Paul Wierwille. Dr. Wierwille is president of a research teaching and training ministry called "The Way."

The book views the nature of God and the nature of Christ in much the same way as the Church of God views them. Dr. Wierwille does hold some views which are different from those held on this subject by the Church of God. The principal difference is that he presents God as a spirit being and not a corporeal being. The argument that he presents on the nature of Christ is good and sound. The book is quite acceptable for Church of God study and research. He does have some weakness in his use of Greek in presenting his argument on the nature of Christ and the interpretation of Scripture. A Greek student will probably differ on some of his interpretation of texts and understanding of Greek terms.

Overall, however, the book would be an excellent addition to a Church of God library.

Student Council Project

Each year the student council of Oregon Bible College undertakes a project for the benefit and improvement of College facilities. This year the students are carrying over the same project they had last year. They plan to purchase a video tape machine for classroom use in preaching, speech, and teaching classes. Through the use of the machine, students will be able to view themselves in various teaching and speaking situations. The cost for the project is between \$2,000 and \$2,500. They hope to have enough funds raised by the end of the year to be able to purchase the machine. We commend the student council for this project and feel that it will be a good addition to Oregon Bible College facilities.

Ministerial Conference

The Annual Ministerial Conference for Church of God ministers will be in Oregon, April 25-29, 1977.

This year's program committee is made up of Oregon Bible College administration and faculty members, consisting of John Lewis, Eugene Stilson, and Dale Ramsey. We are glad for the opportunity to plan the conference program and feel that we will be able to communicate many ideas that will be helpful to the ministers of the Church of God. We feel that we will

also greatly benefit as faculty members by being able to understand the thinking and needs of the ministers of the Church of God.

Board of Education Meeting

The Board of Education met in Oregon, Illinois, December 29 and 30. We welcome Bro. John Hearp of Fonthill, Ontario, Canada, as a new member of the Board of Education. The Board made decisions concerning future plans and development, supporting various programs of the Bible College and the use of the Bible College facilities.

In early January Bro. Charles Pryor, a member of the Board of Education, left for India where he will be teaching for the University of Houston.

General Education

The cooperative agreement that Oregon Bible College has with Sauk Valley Junior College is working quite well to the advantage of the Bible College. Through this means, Oregon Bible College is able to provide general education courses for our students and at the same time get credit for these classes from an accredited institution. Historically, OBC has provided general education courses for students. In the 1962-'63 catalog, 12 general education courses were made available, and in the 1965-'66 catalog, 33 general education courses were made available to students.

It is important for us to provide the 32 hours of general education that are critical for any young person entering the Christian ministry or other Christian service. It is an advantageous opportunity for us to have a junior college available which can provide a cooperative education program whereby our students can receive credit toward Oregon Bible College graduation and, for those students who plan to go into other areas of work and service, toward other degrees as well.

Camp Leadership-More Than Possessing Skills

Leadership, like many other personal qualities, is very difficult to define. A dictionary definition of a leader is: "a person or thing that leads; guiding head." However, a person may be capable of doing many things well and still be unable to impart his knowledge to others. Simply giving instruction as to how to do a certain thing does not necessarily constitute leadership.

Have you ever tried to tell a small child how to tie his shoe laces? He couldn't accomplish it until you showed him, step by step, how to proceed. Leadership involves the ability to guide another through the entire process that you followed in gaining your own skill. Someone has appropriately defined leadership as: "taking others where you have already been." This involves allowing others to observe and emulate your execution of a skill.

It would seem, also, that the old adage, "Patience is a virtue," is surely high on any list of qualities for good leadership. One must be able to put himself in the shoes of those being led and to remember that the skills in which he has become proficient were at first very difficult, and are still equally difficult for a novice.

Another important leadership quality is sensitivity. A leader must be aware of the individual strengths and weaknesses of each of those who follow his guidance. He will know where each member of his group is, in motivation and maturity.

Think back to the process by which you gained your skills and you will realize that their acquisition involved a great deal of experimentation. Not everything that you learned from a book worked to your satisfaction. You found better ways by which to accomplish some ends. It follows that another vital part of good leadership involves displaying tolerance for the innovation and creativity which prompts experimentation on the part of those just learning. It means allowing others to deviate from the leader's way and to learn by experience what works best for them.

The whole concept of Christian leadership involves being a servant to those whom one is leading, even to the extent of putting the needs, desires, and interests of the group above his own, as Christian leaders must. Let us seek to develop these leadership qualities as we prepare to lead others along the path that we have followed.

In mid-October, Joyce Knapp conducted Sunday school training sessions for the Fonthill Church in Canada. November 11-13, the Sunday School Board met in Grand Rapids, MI, to conduct Sunday school business and to present training sessions for the members of the Michigan Conference. Attendance at the Thursday and Friday evening and all-day Saturday sessions was excellent. Among the items discussed by the Board in its meeting were the 1978 Bible School material, final plans for the Seminar, and our relationship to the new Home Missions Board.

Count It All Joy

T SEEMS safe to assume that all of our readers are well aware that, as the Bible uses the word, a "temptation" is a testing of faith. Just as an athlete grows strong by constantly testing the strength and endurance of his body, so the Christian's spiritual condition improves each time the strength and endurance of his faith are tested and proven. James called this spiritual endurance "patience." The Greek word hupomone that James used. and which is translated as "patience" in the quoted text, is defined by Strong's Greek Dictionary of the New Testament as meaning "cheerful (or hopeful) endurance, constancy."

Peter may have been seeking to prepare the brethren to develop the spiritual strength that would enable them to come victoriously through such testings as he experienced when he thrice denied Jesus. He spoke of the salvation "wherein ye greatly rejoice, though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations: that the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ" (1 Pet. 1:6, 7; see also vv. 4, 5).

How deeply our faith goes, and whether we are willing to face testings in order to develop cheerful endurance is revealed each time a testing comes our way.

Let each person examine his own reaction when brothers and sisters in Christ become difficult and unreasonable (at least from his point of view) and block a cherished plan for activities or projects for the congregation of which he is a member. Ask yourself: Can you endure it cheerfully, or does it cause you to become surly and vindictive in your attitude toward them? Can you rejoice in another opportunity to develop your patience and

"My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing... Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him" (Jas. 1:2-4, 12).

strengthen your faith?

In the world of business, are you willing to temporarily lay aside the dictates of your faith in order to take advantage of an opportunity to increase your wealth by so doing? How much of a gain would be sufficient to induce you to be unfaithful to the vows that you made at the time of your baptism, when you promised to seek to obey the Lord in every department of your life? Would anybody believe, judging by your actions, that you consider "the trial of your faith" to be more precious than gold?

Can our rejection of worldly pleasures be safely laid aside on Saturday night and reinstated again on Sunday morning? What would it do for your patience? for your faith?

Sooner or later, every active Christian must face testings, whether it be as an apostle, a prophet, an evangelist, a pastor, a teacher, or in some other type of Christian service—whether it be in an official or an unofficial capacity.

Observation and experience strongly suggest that many young pastors decide to seek another profession because they are unwilling, or unable, to cope with the temptations that often go with their positions. Where they feel that they have a right to expect wholehearted cooperation, they sometimes find opposition. Where they had anticipated understanding, they may be confronted with what

appears to them to be deliberate misunderstanding. Convinced that he and his family are entitled to live, dress, and eat as well as the members of his congregation, he may be affronted by their display of their own "high standard of living" and their apparent indifference to the comparatively low standard that they make necessary for him. He chafes at the spiritual laxity of the congregation as compared with the stern self-discipline that is expected of him.

Soon, he decides that there *must* be an easier and more pleasant way to earn a living. He begins to look for a compromise which will permit him to practice some kind of spiritual ministry while at the same time enjoying the same affluence and spiritual laxity which the lay members of the congregation seem to find so satisfying. Patience is given no opportunity to perform her perfect work.

Parishioners sometimes feel that they have been cheated because their young pastor has not yet developed the capacity to cope satisfactorily with every aspect of his position. They fail to recognize that they, too, are being tested. They do nothing to improve their opportunity to help their pastor to become the capable leader that they want him to be. They, too, are failing to rejoice in their testing, and so deprive patience of her opportunity to do her perfect work. Both pastor and congregation are losers because they did not understand that temptations are often opportunities which are not recognized as such.

"My brothers, whenever you have to face trials of many kinds, count your-selves supremely happy, in the knowledge that such testing of your faith breeds for-titude, and if you give fortitude full play you will go on to complete a balanced character that will fall short in nothing" (Jas. 1:2-4, NEB).

Attendance Up -- 10 New Sunday Schools Started

THE GRAPH on this page shows the total Church of God average Sunday school attendance for each Sunday during the months of October, November, and December, 1976. Also shown is the average attendance for each of these months in 1966. Sunday by Sunday figures were not available for 1966. The averages are based on figures from all of our Sunday schools in the United States and Canada.

For the three months, the average was 4,352 in 1976 and 4,148 in 1966. The 1976 high was 4,727 on December 19 and the 1976 low was 3,818 on December 26.

In addition to these figures, our churches in Nigeria, Liberia, and the Philippines reported an average attendance of 1,237 each Sunday during these three months. Figures from Mexico, India, and Ghana were unavailable.

By combining the figures from the U.S. and Canada with our reporting churches overseas, we arrive at an average of 5,589 per Sunday.

Figures from our mission churches were not available for 1966. However, our churches in Nigeria and Liberia have been added during the past 10 years, and the attendance reported by these two countries averages about 950 per Sunday. So there has been substantial growth in our overseas attendance during the past 10 years.

A graph such as this has one major weakness. Though it tells us what growth took place, and when the growth took place, it cannot tell us why growth took place.

10 New Sunday Schools Started


One of the factors that has affected our attendance totals is that 10 new Sunday

schools were started during the past 10 years. I am very happy that many people and groups were willing to put forth great effort to start these new Sunday schools. And I am thrilled with the great success that several of these new works have experienced.

In addition to these 10 new works here at home, new mission work has also been undertaken in Nigeria, Ghana, and Liberia.

On the other hand, we have also lost some Sunday schools. There were actually 9 groups existing in 1966 that were no longer in existence in the fall of 1976. Some merged with other Sunday schools, and some went out of existence for lack of interest or some other reason.

I am very thankful that our overall attendance has increased during the past 10 years. However, as we look to the future, I would like to urge each Sunday school to set an attendance goal and then put forth every effort to invite new people. I would also encourage each group to vigorously pursue absentees and encourage all people to be regular in attendance. Let's all work together to build our Sunday schools and churches for the glory of God and the salvation of people everywhere.

Know Your Directors

Pastor Russell Magaw was born in Tipp City, OH, attended school there, and was graduated from the local high school in 1957. He was graduated from Oregon Bible College in the class of 1961.

Brother Magaw was pastor of the San Jose, California, Church of God for six years, the Lafayette, IN, church for five years, and has been pastor of the Columbia Station, OH, Church of God since 1972.

Brother Magaw is married to the former Joyce Wilson of the Holbrook, NE, Church of God and they have three children—Kent, Sharon, and Robert. He was editor of the Junior Berean Lesson Manual for a few years, has worked in several youth camps, and is presently manager of the Northeast Youth Camp of the Church of God. Brother Magaw is an energetic, dedicated Christian. He was elected to the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference in 1976 and brings an abundance of warmth and enthusiasm to the Conference Board.

Group Tax Exemption

The Church of God General Conference has had a Federal Tax Exemption since at least 1949. It has been assumed that churches affiliated with the General Conference would also enjoy that exemption.

It came to our attention several months ago that this is not necessarily so. We were urged by the Federal government to apply for a Group Tax Exemption. After filling out a multitude of forms, completing many statements and affidavits, and making a number of telephone calls, we did receive a Group Tax Exempt status. The order was dated January 4, 1977, and does cover the Church of God General Conference and all the churches that have recorded their affiliation statement with the Conference. We will shortly receive a group exemption number.

Upon receiving the number, we will send to each affiliated church a copy of the exemption order and the number. This will facilitate applications for permit mailing and for tax exempt matters.

Ministerial Conference

The annual Ministerial Conference of the Church of God will be held in Oregon, IL, April 25 to 29. This is a time of fellowship, worship, and study for the pastor, and brings strength to the work of the local church. We trust that each church will urge its pastor to attend and participate in the travel pool.

General Conference, 1977

The Church of God General Conference will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, IL, on August 8 to 12, 1977. The conference will begin Monday morning and end on Friday morning. The cost per person for the conference is \$48 for adults, \$36 for children 3 to 12, and no charge for children under three. Make plans now to attend. Full details on reservations will appear in the April issue of *Progress Journal*.

Conference Finances

We are thankful to the membership for the response to the budget needs. We are about one thousand dollars short of meeting the total needs for the month, including the deficit. We express our sincere thanks to each member, each church, and each state conference that have made special effort to erase the deficit. In addition to the budget needs, many are making regular contributions to the Oregon Bible College Building Fund and to other special needs of the Conference. The balance due on the Dormitory Building loans is now \$62,000. \$37,000 of that amount is from churches and individual members and the balance is a mortgage loan from the local bank.



Conference Reservation Information

The Fifty-Seventh Annual Church of God General Conference will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, August 8-12, 1977. Because we will need to make firm commitments to Rockford College as to attendance, it will be necessary to have firm reservations for the Conference.

We do have a reservation application that must be used to give us the necessary information. Please ask your pastor for the application. An isolated member who does not have access to a pastor can write to Conference Reservations, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061, and ask for the application blank.

The cost of the Conference is \$48 for an adult, \$36 for those 3 to 12 years of age, and no charge for anyone under 3 years. This includes room, board, use of the grounds and buildings, insurance, recreational facilities, bed linens, blanket, and pillow.


For those staying off the campus the cost is \$24 for meals and the use of all facilities, except a sleeping room, for all three years old and over.

Because a firm reservation is required by Rockford College, there will be a deposit of \$5 per person required with the reservation (the full cost of the Conference can be paid with the reservation, if desired).

The Conference will begin on Monday, August 8, with registration at 10:00 a.m. There will be an orientation service at 11:00 for those who have arrived and the full schedule of activities will begin at 1:15 p.m. We encourage everyone to be prompt in arriving at Conference and to plan to stay until the closing service on Friday morning. We will not be able to honor parttime reservations at this Conference.

Trailer parks are available within five to ten miles of the campus. A list of these parks will appear in the May issue of *Progress Journal*.

We trust this will be the best Church of God General Conference ever. The facilities are excellent. See your pastor for the reservation form and additional information needed and get your reservations in early. Deadline for reservations will be July 25.



Ministry to Prisoners

The Christian Prisoner's Association, Digby, Nova Scotia, started by Eunice Pearson and Elaine Handspiker, was officially recognized by the Canadian government and received a charter September 1, 1975. The purpose of the C.P.A. is to present the gospel of Christ to those in correctional institutions, to visit them, to encourage them with letters and Christian literature, to encourage them to take the Systematic Bible Study Course, and to show love and kindness so they will know that others care.

God is blessing this ministry to prisoners, and many of them have become members of the C.P.A. and have enrolled in Bible courses.

One man, who has taken every correspondence course that Oregon Bible College has to offer, says, "I am still searching God's Word and also attending the Bible study group we have. I wish more inmates would get involved in the courses through C.P.A., as it is hard for me to explain all the change I can see in myself. I think, though, the greatest change is that I am no longer walking on pins and needles, ready to blow up over some little thing that amounts to nothing. The Bible courses and Bible study here have made me a kind of man that I never thought I could be."

This man requested Eunice Pearson to write to a friend of his in the prison. "I have not talked all that much Bible to him, but have mentioned it occasionally and he seemed to show a great interest in what I have done so far, and also in the improvement that he says he can see has taken place in me in the past few months."

There is need for more Christians to write to these prisoners, to pray for them, to teach them the Scriptures, and to encourage them to become Christians and live for Christ instead of for sin. Right now there are more prisoners wanting to hear from someone than there are people to write.

COLLEGE CHOIR





Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

Theme: "Life on a Higher Plane"

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors on April 28, 1977. The report is presented here so delegates to the 1977 General Conference business sessions (August 8-12, 1977, Rockford College, Rockford, IL) can become familiar with it and can be instructed by their churches or state conferences regarding same.

This report is for the first eight months of the fiscal year and any special items of interest in the interim will be reported orally at General Conference. The progress and activities of the everal departments are reported herein, with some additional comments on the work as a whole.

Each department of the Conference has been asked to give detailed study to the forward-looking progress of the department. You will find at the end of the report the goals and projections for the various departments.

We extend our thanks and appreciation to all members of the General Conference staff for their dedicated service. We especially recognize Brother Clement Richey, who acts as Superintendent of Maintenance without remuneration. The dedication of both Brother and Sister Richey to the work of the Church of God General Conference is greatly appreciated. Following is a report of each of the several departments of the Church of God General Conference.

Berean Youth Department

Several significant programs are sponsored by the Berean Youth Department. These include: International Berean Youth Conference, Post-High Midwinter Retreat, Youth Week, Coinsfor-Christ, and the Mission Dollar Club.

The major program is the annual International Berean Youth Conference. Youth Conference is conducted in two separate camps. The one at Camp Alexander Mack near Milford, IN, has become our high school camp. Those entering the 9th grade through the 12th grade attend this program. The program conducted here is geared to this age group. The other facility which we use is the Shipshewana Retreat Center, and is located approximately 35 miles north of Camp Mack near Shipshewana, IN. This camp serves the needs of all post-high students through age 25. The program offered here differs a great deal from the other, as it is designed to meet the needs of this older age group. Married couples who meet the age requirements are welcome to attend this program.

1976 saw these two facilities play host to 336 Church of God young people. This number included 264 high school and 72 post-high students. Several new programs were instituted during the 1976 Conference which proved to be successful. We will continue to incorporate new ideas and methods into our camping program as time goes on. From evaluations received from campers, we can truly say that God certainly blessed the 1976 Berean Youth Conference.

The same two facilities are being used for the 1977 Conference, to be held July 17-23. Due to increased costs passed on to us by the site owners, we have had to adjust our tuition cost. Tuition for the 1977 Conference is \$55.

The annual Youth Week competition was held during October 25-31, 1976. This was the recommended week to be used; however, groups were permitted to use any week during the months of October and November. This was done to encourage those groups to participate which perhaps would have encountered a conflict with other church activities on the suggested dates.

Historically, Youth Week has been a time when the young people of a church could assume roles of leadership which are not normally open to them. They could teach, serve as deacons, superintendents, song leaders, give sermonettes, and sing specials. This was done in order to facilitate a little insight into church leadership. They also become involved in many Christian service projects such as visitation, literature distribution, service to the needy, and so forth.

Sixteen groups participated in 1976 by sending the required report to this office. The reports which are received by this office are judged by the Youth Advisory Council at its meeting at the post-high winter retreat. The winners selected by this Council were: First place, the Blood River Bereans of Springfield, LA; second place, East Peoria Bereans of East Peoria, IL; third place, Bible Church of God, Phoenix, AZ; and fourth place, Hope Chapel Bereans of South Bend, IN. Several other groups sent in outstanding reports on their activities which indicates there are many active groups of young people in our churches.

The annual post-high midwinter retreat was held at Camp Alexander Mack from December 30, 1976, to January 2, 1977. This retreat is open only to post-high students through age 25. Twelfth graders are taken on a first-come first-served basis in the (Please turn to page 3)

event that post-high students do not fill the capacity of the camp.

This retreat was attended by 40 young people from 9 different states. Represented were Arizona, Michigan, Louisiana, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, Illinois, Colorado, and Missouri. The staff for the 1976 retreat were Hugh and Mary Harman and Jim and Karen Babcock. The classes were centered around the 13 chapters of the Book of Hebrews. Two one-hour classes in the morning and one in the afternoon were devoted to the study of this book.

The annual Coins-for-Christ Crusade was held during the months of March and April. This crusade is a fund-raising project carried out by the Church of God Bereans for the express purpose of raising funds to support the programs that are sponsored by the Berean Youth Department. The 1976 Crusade proved to be highly successful, with 15 groups participating and contributing over \$5,000. During 1977 the groups are allowed to select any one month from September to June in which to conduct their campaign. This was done to allow the groups to use the month which posed less conflicts for them than a designated month would. From earlier reports received, there appears to be a lot of enthusiasm for this year's campaign.

Problems were encountered with the production of the 1976 Berean Youth Conference slide-sound set. This production is normally ready for viewing about the first of January, but it was not available until May.

At the present time, *Challenge*, the only publication of the Berean Youth Department, is a 16-page publication made up of articles and news pertinent to our young people. It is edited by your youth director on a bimonthly basis.

We are thankful to God for his blessings and continue to pray for his leading in the planning of all youth-related activities.

Publishing Department

We happily report that the Publishing Department is alive and well, and operating with full cooperation on the part of the brethren. Due to the fine quality and abundance of articles which the brethren have sent in, and with the help of Bros. Johnson and Landry in preparing them for printing, we have a publication of which we can be proud in any company.

In March, Bros. S. O. Ross, Paul Johnson, Gordon Landry, David Krogh, and your editor met for the purpose of exploring ways and means by which the Publishing Department can serve the churches even better. As a result, several recommendations were agreed upon, which were then passed on to our Board of Directors for consideration. No doubt any of these which the Board finds meritorious and feasible will be presented for your consideration and acceptance or rejection.

The number of *Restitution Heralds* distributed has increased during the year. The figures are as follows:

Of these, 4,500 go into the homes of members of the Church of God.

The average number distributed to both members and nonmembers has risen by an average of 515 per month.

We rejoice in the fact that we have recently received requests from two professors of comparative religions for copies of *The*

Herald to be used in preparing their lessons. Hopefully, this trend will continue and others will be led to see and embrace the beauty and reasonableness of Biblical doctrines as the Church of God understands them. We also get communications from those who have examined Restitution Heralds in the homes of others, and wish to be put on our mailing list.

We wish to thank those who have put forth the effort necessary to prepare articles and send them to us. We do, at the moment, have sufficient (especially of the longer articles), but should the brethren cease sending them in, that could change very quickly.

The page for honoring various churches has been dropped for lack of further material. We have replaced it with the "Voice From the Past" page, which has proven to be quite popular. The Church of God has had many learned and skilled writers in the past. It is remarkable how up-to-date some of their articles sound.

New publications since the last report include two tracts and the booklet, "Jesus Christ: Whose Son Is He?" Also, some tracts have been reprinted, and Bro. Alva Huffer's "Systematic Theology" has been reprinted in both hardback and paperback editions.

Some pastors are using the Systematic Bible Study Courses for class study, and are reporting good success with it. It is also being used by lay teachers for classes consisting of young people and adults. They report enthusiastic acceptance of the course.

We again thank the brethren for their keen interest and hearty cooperation in the field of literature.

Missions Department Introduction

The past year has seen a major change in the organization of the Missions Department. Instead of one Missions Board responsible for both home and foreign missions, a division has been made with one board in charge of home missions and the other responsible for foreign work.

Since last summer's General Conference, the two boards have met several times to discuss and plan the work of missions at home and overseas. We appreciate the time and effort that each member gives for this important work. Sr. Rachel Carr continues to serve as Superintendent of Missions and, as such, is chairperson of the full Missions Board.

Foreign Missions

Gospel work is presently being carried on in the following countries: Ghana, Liberia, and Nigeria, West Africa; India; Philippines; Mexico. We are thankful for the work that the nationals have done in their countries and we know that, as a result, people have come to know Jesus as Savior.

The Foreign Missions Board—composed of Chairwoman Mardy Lawrence, Secretary Paul Overholser, and Board Member J. Don Swartz—has spent much time this past year in evaluating our foreign work experience, in researching missionary methods, and in reviewing our purpose and missionary philosophy.

In looking to the future, our overall aim is to teach the gospel of Christ and to make disciples (followers who teach). This aim is embodied in the command that Jesus gave to his disciples as recorded in Matthew 28:19, 20.

To help in future foreign mission work, we have written some principles to serve as quidelines.

1) Teach all our overseas mission churches to become self-supporting, self-governing, and self-propagating.

We have realized that when the temptations to compete for American funds are removed, the work and witness of the true c rch will be more stable and the spiritual life will improve. Natural leaders will surface and the talents and abilities of others will be used more to the glory of God.

2) Train, send, and support U.S. and Canadian missionaries to teach the gospel and to bring a body of believers to spiritual maturity so they may teach others. (2 Tim. 2:2.)

The main thing we want to emphasize in our overseas work is spiritual teaching. Our plan is to send missionaries from the U.S. to foreign countries to teach and preach the gospel and to train nationals to do the same.

3) To accomplish this, encourage the establishment of neighborhood house-churches of small groups of believers rather than larger, formal churches.

The main thrust will be to establish Bible study groups in the houses of laymen, helping them to learn to pray, read, and study the Bible, and apply its teachings to their lives. There will be a closer bond between the members of each church because of their close proximity so they can be of more spiritual support to one another. Less money will be needed when they will be meeting near their own homes without ostentatious buildings. To get there they will not need vehicles, gas, or buses.

4) Provide more literature and teaching materials such as Bibles, Scripture portions, Restitution Heralds, tracts, quarterlies, and Bible study guides.

Since it is our intent that the missionary be itinerant (traveling), these materials will be very useful to national leaders in carrying on the work between visits from the missionary.

5) If and when church buildings are desired, the nationals shall have full responsibility for their construction and maintenance.

There may come a time when several of the house-churches will want to combine and construct a church building for their worship and study. The people will be more apt to consider the church theirs if it is built and maintained because they want it and build it.

6) All present funding for extra projects such as education, radio work, conference expenses, etc., will be discontinued.

As a part of training the nationals to be self-supporting we want to encourage them to assume the responsibility for their special projects. Regarding education, in some countries the government is offering free education to their people. In others we want to encourage the Christians to continue this help, if they want to, for those who they feel would be able to use their education to serve the Lord.

Being given full responsibility for themselves and their witness will provide the national Christians with a greater sense of independence, accomplishment, and dignity.

Their faith will grow as they learn to look to God for their needs and find he really is there.

Persons interested only in material gain will not want to become involved, so will not be there to cause disruption of the work.

Home Missions

The Home Missions Board began its work as a newly established board with a preliminary meeting for organization. Warren Sorenson serves as chairman, Kent Ross as secretary, and Merle Patrick as the third member of the board. Rachel Carr, Superintendent of Missions, has worked closely with the board, and the Foreign Missions Board has met with us on two occasions.

All members of the Home Missions Board attended a convention on church growth at Kansas City, MO, October 11-13, 1976. During this time informal meetings were held to come to

an understanding of our philosophy of missions and to determine how best to apply the information and material received at the convention to our purpose as the Home Missions Board of the General Conference.

The board met at Tempe, AZ, October 25-28, 1976, during which time we sought to understand our purpose and our relationship with other departments and the General Conference. We developed a basic outline of the mission of the Home Missions Board. To guide us in our thinking and planning we adopted the following as our understanding of the mission of the Church of God. Using the Bible as a basis of ministry: to promote the worship and glorification of God; to mature a body of believers in Jesus Christ; to evangelize with the purpose of bringing persons to a saving relationship with Jesus Christ. We decided our purpose as a board was mainly concerned with the last two statements of this purpose.

A twofold thrust of church growth is being planned: 1) To strengthen the local congregation; 2) to establish new congregations. The program to strengthen the local congregation involves an inner spiritual life growth program as well as a program to extend the church through outreach evangelism. Spiritual life is the heart of evangelism. When a person is what he ought to be, he will best do what he ought to do. We are currently working on procedures to evaluate the effectiveness of our current programs.

The board met again at Oregon, IL, March 14-16, 1977, where specific goals for accomplishment, as well as procedures for implementation, were planned. The specifics of these will be presented and discussed at General Conference.

During the year we sought to give more direct assistance to the churches receiving financial aid through the General Conference. To do this we began communicating with the pastors and gathering data concerning the church as well as setting up a prayer support ministry. At this writing plans are underway for a representative from the Home Missions Board to visit each of these churches receiving aid.

A survey was taken asking the ministers to respond regarding their understanding of the mission of the Church of God and the purpose of the Home Missions Board.

Important areas involved in the planning of the board have been, and are: 1) an emphasis on the Mission Builders program to increase the number of members participating and to provide current information to our people; 2) the small struggling church, its immediate need and how the Home Missions Board can best be of assistance; 3) the printing of new tracts for the purpose of evangelism as well as a home Bible study evangelism program; 4) a short-term home missions program for post-high young people to work in some of our churches during the summer; 5) a close working relationship between the Home Missions Board and all the departments of the General Conference.

We would like to meet with the presidents of each state and regional conference sometime during General Conference this August.

We recognize our complete dependence upon God and have sought his guidance during all our planning throughout this year. We realize that we do not have all the answers to the needs for church growth. We ask for your cooperation in the mission which God has given us as his church, and covet your prayers for the work of the Home Missions Board.

OBC Annual Report

It is rewarding to assist young people in preparation for a life of Christian service and Christian experience. They mature and grow as they are here in preparation while at the same time they serve their own needs, the needs of the local church, and the needs of one another. To be a part of the Christian growth experience of young people is reward enough in itself.

Fifty-six students attended Oregon Bible College during the 1976-'77 academic year. The student body represented twelve different states and Canada. They mainly represent Church of God families and backgrounds. Eight seniors graduated in May: Kenneth Cook, Kokomo, IN; Linda Hollenback, Deltona, FL; Linda Jones, Pomona, CA; Sidney Magaw, Milford, OH; John Mattison, Maurertown, VA; Phyllis Prussak, Columbia Station, OH; David Wilsterman, Phoenix, AZ; Richard Young, Dayton, OH. There were 16 male students in the Men's Dormitory and 24 female students in the Women's Dormitory.

John Lewis served as president, registrar, and instructor; S. O. Ross was director of business affairs and instructor; Eugene Stilson was director of academic affairs, director of the library, and instructor; Dale Ramsey was director of music and Christian service, and instructor; Connie Mongan taught English; Hugh Harman was director of student affairs and taught Environmental Health; David Wilsterman and Mary Harman were dormitory directors; David Krogh was in charge of student recruitment; and Mary Harman replaced Connie Ramsey as director of the kitchen staff.

In October John Lewis, Eugene Stilson, and Dale Ramsey attended the American Association of Bible Colleges Convention in Chicago. In February Dale Ramsey attended a worship seminar on Dynamic Worship Services in Chicago.

Dallas Demmitt conducted a seminar on Christian counseling during Christian Emphasis Week. He led chapel services throughout the week and conducted individual counseling interviews with students.

David Wilsterman served as president of the student council and Karen Circle and Donna Weidensall were co-chairwomen of the student body social committee. Dick Young, Laura Brown, Pamela K. Davis and Christie Simpson were in charge of prayer day activities November 9 and February 22. Tom New served as editor of the school paper. Richard Young and Pamela K. Davis served as editors of Maranatha.

Robert Jones is a new member of the faculty this year and taught courses in Old Testament Studies. Eugene Stilson will soon finish the requirements for a Master of Arts degree in New Testament Studies at Wheaton. We are continuing to plan and prepare for additional faculty members trained in the specific areas of Biblical Theology and Christian Education.

This was the first year of the cooperative program with Sauk Valley Junior College. During the fall semester, Sauk Valley provided instruction in Introduction to Psychology and accredited our Introduction to Music and Public Speaking taught by Dale Ramsey and John Lewis. During the winter semester, Sauk Valley provided instruction for Introduction to Sociology on our campus.

This year, the Oregon community has entered the Rock Valley Junior College district in Rockford. Our cooperative program will then be with the Rock Valley Junior College.

Scott Millard and Carl Jennings successfully completed the internship program by working with Pastors Vernis Wolfe and Hollis Partlowe, respectively. Carl Jennings has accepted the pastorate at Hector, MN, and Scott Millard will go on to further seminary training.

Our students were involved in many Christian service activities. The play, "Christ and the Concrete City," under the direction of John Lewis, visited several churches during the winter months. There were also many gospel teams supervised by Dale Ramsey which brought musical programs and many sermons to various churches. The Chorale toured the western part of the United States for two weeks after the completion of the winter semester.

On May 21, 1976, Vernis Wolfe, Eugene Stilson, and John Lewis met with Dr. John Mostert to receive further counsel and advice regarding the improvement of the College program and curriculum. As a result of this meeting and further study, we are making improvements and changes in our program that will enable us to provide the best quality education for the students of the Church of God General Conference.

We appreciate the dedication represented in the Board of Education members who research, study, and meet with us throughout the year. The Board of Education consists of Chairman Vernis Wolfe, Robert Johnson, John Hearp, Charles Pryor, and John Lewis. The Board met in August in Cedar Falls, IA; in Oregon, IL, in December; and again in Oregon during the month of April.

Sunday School Department

The Sunday School Department is actively involved in many Christian Education activities. We recognize the need to take advantage of every opportunity to bring people to repentance, faith, and baptism, and then to equip them for the work of the ministry. (Eph. 4:11, 12.)

The 4th annual Christian Workers' Seminar was held March 6-12, 1977, at Camp Alexander Mack. Seventy-five students and seven staff members enjoyed a beautiful week together in fellowship with one another and with the Lord. Creative Bible Teaching, the Book of Acts, Advancing the Smaller Church, Church Growth, and Discovering Your Call were the classes offered. The staff consisted of Jim Graham, Joe James, Joyce Knapp, Michael Mattison, and David Krogh, teachers; and Verna Stine Brubaker and Meriam Sigler, cooks.

The theme of the 1977 Vacation Bible School material is "The Families of God." Jim Graham, Sylvia Black, Myra Hamilton, Mary Mickey, Sydney and Deirdre Kirkpatrick, Judy Myers, Gayle Reye, Michael Mattison, and Nancy Sundwall served as editors for the seven manuals. A theme and curriculum have been planned for 1978, and editors are preparing the material for next year.

After a pause of ten years, the Sunday School Department is again collecting Sunday school attendance figures from all of our Sunday schools. For the months of October, November, and December, 1976, we averaged 4,352. In 1966, the average for these three months was 4,148. This is an average increase of 204 people per Sunday, or a total growth of 4% for the ten years. As the attendance figures are collected in the coming months, periodic reports will be made to our people. It is our desire that these reports will make people aware of what is being accomplished in our Sunday schools as a whole, and perhaps it will

serve as an encouragement to put forth greater effort to reach people with the gospel message. Eighty-five percent of all church members come through the Sunday school, so if we expect our churches to grow, we would do well to invest more time and effort in building our Sunday school attendance. It is the suggestion of our Department that each Sunday school set a goal of increasing attendance by at least 10% per year.

In January, 1977, a survey was taken regarding the adult quarterly material used by our people. From the results that have been tabulated thus far, we have discovered that our adult Truth Seeker's Quarterly is being used in the vast majority of our classes. A number of excellent suggestions have been received from those who use the quarterly, and these have been shared with the editor of the adult quarterly, C. Jesse Pestle. Improvements will be made in the future.

Great improvement has been made in the Beginners quarterly material. A teacher packet is being produced which contains a teacher's guide, along with teaching aids, such as pictures, mobiles, books, booklets, maps, and handout sheets for the students. A cassette tape of instruction prepared by the editor, Sue Hall, was included in a recent packet.

The Sunday School Board greatly appreciates the work which all of our quarterly editors and writers are doing to prepare quality educational material for our people. The current editors are: Sue Hall, Beginner; Ruth Overholser, Primary; Ruth Lewis, Junior; Shirley Urish, Teen; Jesse Pestle, Adult. Many writers spend countless hours assisting the editors in the preparation of our lesson material.

The present Sunday School Board consists of Joyce Knapp, James Graham, Michael Mattison, Scott Ross, and David Krogh, Director.

General Services

Your Executive Director works closely with local churches in finding replacements for vacant pulpits. He has an information file on pastors and their families, and usually knows when a pastor may be available for a "call." Churches seeking pastors are encouraged to contact the Executive Director for assistance in this area. He is responsible for all personnel, for promotions and public relations, for the upkeep and maintenance of all properties, for the management of the day-to-day business, and generally supervises all the work of the Church of God General Conference. He is the administrator of the Ministers Insurance Program and the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association. As Executive Director, he is automatically the Secretary-Treasurer of the Retirement Association. The Executive Director is required to complete many forms and questionnaires from various governmental, civic, and religious agencies.

The Executive Director and the staff members of the General Conference perform many services in addition to the departmental activities related in the preceding reports. Staff members are available for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, seminars and workshops, and other activities. They often fill in when local pastors are ill or on vacation.

Your Board of Directors, Executive Director, department heads, and staff workers of the Church of God General Conference covet your prayers, encouragement, criticism, and concern, as they attempt to carry out the programs and policies that have been established and set forth by the delegates of the General Conference.

General Conference Finances

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the dedicated sacrificial giving of the mem-

bership, churches, and state conferences. The giving for the budget items has fallen short of the needs at this point, but we believe that, with your prayers and the concerns of many, the needs will be met.

We are aware that, in addition to the \$220,000 budget, many other contributions are given from time to time. More than \$30,000 has been paid on the Oregon Bible College Dormitory loan during the past year. Many special projects are funded by the generous giving of the membership, such as the mission trip of Brother and Sister John Lewis to India; the Booster and Library Programs of Oregon Bible College; many special missionary projects, such as student assistance and special needs in the mission fields; and other departmental special projects.

The budget items provide the funds for our free literature, subsidize the publications of the General Conference, carry on all the home and foreign mission work, support the work of the youth and Sunday school departments, provide about half the cost of the education of each student at Oregon Bible College, and fund the many general services provided by the General Conference staff.

Your Executive Director also serves as Director of Development for the Church of God General Conference. In this capacity he is available for counsel and assistance in estate planning and advice and suggestions as to how life insurance policies, annuities, trusts, and so forth can be beneficial both to the Church of God General Conference and the donor. Estate planning becomes more and more complicated as more and more laws are passed. Bequests in a will can now be made to a charitable institution such as the Church of God General Conference without deducting anything from the heirs of the estate. With proper planning, the charitable bequests would only lessen the amount of the estate taxes payable. The Executive Director appreciates the assistance of Brother Harold Doan of Santa Monica, CA, in the development area. Don Overmyer of the Indiana Conference, M. A. Patrick of the Northeast Conference, Maurice Robinson, Jr., of the Louisiana Conference, and Clarence Jones of the Missouri Conference are liaison representatives to the Executive Director in any of these development areas. Anyone who desires assistance in any of these deferred giving programs may feel free to contact anyone of the aforementioned people, or write directly to the Executive Director, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061.

God has richly blessed the Church of God in many, many ways. Our prayer is that he will continue to bless and that he will soon send his Son Jesus back to this earth to establish a righteous kingdom, with Jesus Christ sitting upon the throne of David as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND GOALS Departmental Goals

PUBLISHING DEPARTMENT GOALS

Tracts: We recommend that a series of tracts be designed and made available for use as a set; i.e., an introductory tract to be presented to a prospect on the first contact, with others designed for later contacts, up to ten—beginning with elementary Christian thoughts, and leading up to exhortation for positive action on the part of the prospect, to the end that he may not only recognize Jesus as the Savior, but may be baptized and align himself with the Master in his work.

Select a qualified person to take charge of preparing these tracts and either prepare them himself, or assign and supervise the preparation of one or more tracts by several writers. Tracts produced by the first method (one man doing it all) may be better coordinated.

Tracts need to be short, and more attractive in appearance, to increase the probability that they will be read. The use of larger type will make them easier for the young and the elderly to read.

We urge that five to ten new tracts be published each year, in order to keep up with a continuing supply for churches whose members seek new tracts for distribution during their home missionary campaigns. Let their content be supervised by someone who has experience in organizing and directing this type of work, and is qualified to evaluate the need and how best to meet it.

The Restitution Herald: Some denominations have had good results from placing advertisements for their publications in national magazines and/or local newspapers. The latter would call attention to local churches. Let the local congregations be encouraged to pay for ads in local publications (possible exception, mission churches). In the case of mission churches, let the cost of these ads be included in the General Conference Budget. It is important that this advertising be large and attractive, including a coupon to be returned for a year's free subscription to The Restitution Herald and/or the Systematic Bible Study Course.

Two years should be ample time in which to adopt the above courses of action and implement them.

To insure that as few as possible of *The Restitution Heralds* are being sent to noninterested people (the cost for literature sent to people who do not read it is the same as that sent to those who do), let a mailing be made to all members on the mailing list who have received *The Restitution Herald* free for several years. Let thanks be expressed to all who have contributed to the Free Literature Campaign, and explain how the free literature campaign works. Inclusion of a return envelope should encourage a response. Nonmembers should have at least a card to return if they wish to continue receiving *The Herald*.

Work on this could begin immediately.

Books: A Church of God Bible commentary would be a very useful tool. A great deal of Biblical research has gone into the production of quarterlies, Berean literature, articles for *The Restitution Herald* and other Church of God literature, including papers prepared for ministerial meetings, and even copies of letters written to explain some doctrine or Bible passage to a friend. Getting this material collected and arranged will be a time-consuming job, but, if properly done, a very valuable one.

Because of their proficiency in Hebrew and Greek respectively, we recommend that Bro. Robert Jones be asked to edit the Old Testament portion of the publication, and Bro. Eugene Stilson edit the New Testament part. If they wish, let an editorial committee be appointed to work with them on this project. This work must be suitable for laymen as well as for advanced Bible students. Wycliffe Bible Commentary would provide a good model as to format.

To keep interest high, let the commentary be published in several sections and each section be made available as soon as it is ready. Hopefully, some progress may be reported by next year's General Conference time, and at least one portion be ready for sale in ten years.

In the meantime, a book on "Misused Texts of the Bible" would be a very useful tool for all. Brother Alva Huffer is capable of doing a very creditable job with this. Let him be contacted to determine if he would be able to undertake preparing such a book. Several others among our leadership are also capa-

ble of producing such a work. Five years seems like a reasonable length of time in which to get such a work ready for the printers

Let us start now to set aside additional money, to be placed in a Revolving Publishing Fund. Such money would then be available for publishing the books mentioned, and eventually others as well. Let \$1,000 be included in the General Conference Budget each year, for the purpose of building such a fund. Placed in a savings account, it would continue to grow until needed for publication of the books.

International Literature Sunday: Let International Literature Sunday (usually the 3rd Sunday in October) be vigorously promoted among the brethren. Urge the use of more literature, and provide greater financial support for the Free Literature Campaign. We recommend that this be started immediately.

FOREIGN MISSIONS GOALS

FIRST YEAR-Explain to the membership, both at home and abroad, the foreign missions concept that has been developed through prayer, research, and experience.

ONGOING—Encourage local U.S. churches and district conferences to motivate young men or couples to train to become missionaries.

ONGOING-Establish a missionary training program.

ONGOING-Recruit and train U.S. missionaries.

ONGOING—Phase out all financial support for pastors in present overseas churches within the next five years at the rate of at least 20% per year, beginning October 1, 1977.

FIFTH YEAR—Have all overseas work self-supporting, self-governing, and self-propagating.

FIFTH YEAR-Have at least one trained missionary in a foreign field

TENTH YEAR-Have three trained missionaries in foreign fields.

HOME MISSIONS GOALS Immediate Goals '77-'78

- 1) 1,200 members in the Mission Builders League.
- 2) Develop an introductory evangelistic series with a manual and 4 lessons for home Bible study evangelism.
- 3) Hold regional seminars and participate in the Christian Workers' Seminar.
- 4) Develop new evangelistic tracts.
- 5) Visit and evaluate churches receiving pastoral aid and special church aid and provide church growth materials.
- 6) Provide a method of evaluation of these churches.
- 7) Develop a positive attitude toward church growth.
- 8) Start at least one new church.

Intermediate Goals '78-'80

- 9) A full-time director for both home and foreign missions.
- 10) 1,500 members in the Mission Builders League.
- 11) Develop literature saturation program and Christian Growth literature in lessons and tracts.
- 12) Reevaluation of church aid programs, particularly the amounts, and continue to provide our own church growth programs.
- 13) Provide spiritual growth programs.
- 14) Show an overall 5% gain in attendance and membership per year.
- 15) Begin 5 new churches by 1980.

Long-Range Goals '80-'87

16) Two missionary directors (superintendents), one for foreign missions and one for home missions.

- 17) 2,000 members in the Mission Builders League.
- 18) Provide evangelistic programs and materials.
- 19) Show an overall 10% gain in attendance and membership per year.
- 20) Begin three new churches per year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT GOALS

- To develop a coordinated and complementary program of Christian Education for our denomination among all departments of the General Conference, and encourage coordination within each local church among all its Christian education ministries.
- 2) Produce the best possible Sunday school material and home Bible study material which will be true to the Bible, effective in reaching the needs of our people, and able to lead people to apply and respond to the Word.
- 3) Provide the best training possible for our Sunday School Board members, and regular quarterly writers, and our editors. This training would consist of professional Christian Writers' Conferences, correspondence courses, writing courses at community colleges, and meetings of the writers and editors.
- 4) To strengthen the present Teacher's Manuals and expand this program to include all of our Sunday school quarterlies.
- 5) Develop a 10-year VBS curriculum totally coordinated with our Sunday school quarterlies.
- 6) To train teachers in the local churches to be able to teach God's Word in such a way as to lead students to the point of response.
- 7) To develop an adult elective course consisting of 8 undated quarterlies containing 13 lessons each.
- 8) To replace the present Teen-Age Quarterly with two quarterlies—a Junior-High Quarterly and a Senior-High Quarterly.
- Encourage each Sunday school to establish a home or extension department to minister to those unable to attend Sunday school and church.
- Encourage our local churches to start more home Bible studies.
- 11) Preparation of at least one additional correspondence or elective course each year: for use in home Bible studies, alternate material for Sunday school classes, or midweek adult Bible study, or for correspondence use.
- 12) Encourage each Church of God Sunday school to increase its attendance by at least 10% each year.

OREGON BIBLE COLLEGE GOALS

- By 1978, have 11,000 books, 100 periodicals, and 1,000 AV Units in library, student body of 60, and plan for the development and use of Golden Rule Dormitory Building.
- 2) By 1979, add a Christian Education Instructor to the faculty, add 500 books, 10 periodicals, and 100 AV Units to the library, have a student body of 70, and develop the basement of the Men's Dormitory.
- 3) By 1980, add a part-time library director to the faculty, add 500 books, 10 periodicals, and 100 AV Units to the library, have a student body of 80, have the Women's Dorm paid for, and add a floor to the Men's Dormitory.
- 4) By 1981, add a pastoral theology instructor to the faculty, add 500 books, 10 periodicals, and 100 AV Units to the library, have a student body of 90, and have music and office space available in the Golden Rule Dormitory Building.

- 5) By 1983, add a Theology Instructor, add 500 books, 10 periodicals, and 100 AV Units to the library, and have a student body of 100.
- 6) In each of the next five years add 500 books, 10 periodicals, and 100 AV Units to the library, and increase the student body each year by 10.
- By 1987, there would be in the library 15,500 books, 190 periodicals, and 1,900 AV Units, and a student body of 150.

Explanation:

We feel that the next few years are crucial in the development of Oregon Bible College as an institution of higher education for the Church of God General Conference. The administration, with the assistance and advice of the Board of Education, is currently putting together a developmental program that we feel is not only important but necessary for the college. We hope to indicate in somewhat specific detail our plans for the next ten years. These plans could change; but at the same time, there must be a definite goal and purpose in the minds of the administration and the Board of Directors.

Oregon Bible College has made administrative progress in recent years. To continue this progress and achieve the goals of the Ten-Year Development Program, we feel that organizational changes are in order for a more effective operation of the college and the attainment of these goals. Specific ideas and proposals are being prepared for presentation at the 1977 General Conference sessions. These ideas will be presented at this time for delegate action at a subsequent conference.

In order for us to reach these goals, there are certain specific steps we must take. Some of them are incorporated in this statement and some of them are made apparent in the ten-year goals already stated.

Specifically, in the area of development and recruitment, we need someone better trained in the techniques of recruitment by the year 1979. In keeping with a more aggressive recruitment policy, the recruitment officer and president must have time for the promotion of the college and the enlistment of students.

Two immediate priorities are a larger student body and a substantial financial base. Specific attention needs to be given to the establishment and growth of large endowments for the college.

We anticipate reconditioning the Golden Rule Home into an Administrative-Classroom building. Presently, it appears the best use of the building would be for music education.

The critical areas of development are faculty and student body. Emphasis, therefore, must be placed on the development of these two areas.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. We recommend: That a disaster Relief Committee be established in the Church of God General Conference for National and International disasters; and that the Executive Director and the department heads act as the committee with the Executive Director as chairman; and that, when a disaster does occur, the committee notify the membership and transmit aid received to the specific disaster area through already-established agencies.

Explanation: Concern has often been expressed that the Church of God General Conference has no real avenue to collect and dispense help in times of great disaster. The Michigan State Conference and others have recommended that action be taken to remedy the situation. The proposed committee will make it possible to give help in these times and, by channeling through the General Conference, the contribution will be tax deductible.

II. We recommend that: ARTICLE II (delegates), Section 4 of the Constitution be amended. Said section now reads, "An individual member who has attended at least four services, or who has made a financial or service contribution, during the year is considered an active member of his church. These shall be considered as minimum requirements only." We recommend that the word "four" in the section be changed to "thirteen."

Explanation: Many have been concerned that one can be an active member by attending only four services in a year. Suggestions have been made a number of times that this requirement should be higher. Thirteen services per year seems like a more reasonable requirement for active membership.

III. We recommend that: ARTICLE IV (officers of the Conference), Section 1 of the Constitution be amended. Said sec-

tion now reads, "Seven directors shall be elected in General Conference delegate sessions; said directors shall constitute the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. The Board of Directors shall organize by the election of necessary officers at the first meeting following each annual Conference election. These officers shall be a chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer, and three board members."

We recommend the following be added to the section. "The term of office of a director shall begin at the close of the Conference in which said director is elected."

Explanation: Presently there is no determination in the constitution as to when the term of office of the director starts. This would spell out the time that the term of office actually begins.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

The progress of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association is very positive. The Association began eight years ago with no funds and the total assets as of March 31, 1977, exceeds \$85,000. Since the last report, four of our younger ministers who have recently entered the ministry have enrolled and been accepted. A pastor who had been out of the Association for a few years applied for reinstatement and was accepted. There are now 50 ministers, 54 churches, and 7 Conferences enrolled in the Association.

At the last biennial meeting held in 1976, the contributions were increased from 1% to 1½% of earnings effective January 1, 1977. At the same time benefits to retired ministers were raised to \$100 per month. There are now 7 retirees receiving benefits.

We rejoice in the progress that has been made. We feel that, if the young men entering the ministry each year will enroll in the Association, the program will continue to grow stronger in every way. It will be possible then to increase the benefits as time goes on so that when the younger men reach retirement age the benefits will be quite substantial. We also encourage special contributions to this fund, and they are, of course, tax deductible.

The membership of the Board of Trustees is established by the Rules and Regulations of the Association. The chairman is a minister appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. The vice-chairman is elected by the Association. The Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference is automatically its Secretary-Treasurer.

Counseling and Arbitration Board

There has been no official action taken by the Board this past year, although the members may have individually made some helpful suggestions. The make-up of the ministry is relatively young and, as maturity and experience grow, a higher type of leadership is evidenced. An effective witness which pastor and church can project in a community is their unity (John 17:21). Your Board stands ready to assist in attaining this holy purpose.

Ministers' Fund

The Ministers' Fund of the Church of God General Conference is used for loans or gifts to ministers or their families in times of emergency. During the past year, a loan in the amount of \$300 and a gift in the amount of \$260 were awarded from the fund. Two are receiving monthly assistance from this fund in the total amount of \$600 a year. The fund balance as of March 31, 1977, is \$4,590. We encourage contributions to this fund so that help will be available for a pastor or his family should an emergency arise.

The Ministers' Fund is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon, Illinois churches, the Dean of Students of Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference.

Family Life Committee

The main thrust of the committee this year has been to conduct workshops on Family Life for interested churches and conferences. The Michigan State Conference, hosted by the Garden Park Church of God, had one of the largest workshops, with 62 participants registered for the 12-hour weekend. The Garden Park Church, pastored by Brother Ray Hall, had 31 in attendance. Some brief statements from the participants about the value of this experience will be reported in an upcoming issue of *Progress Journal*.

It was my privilege to conduct a workshop in the Brush Creek Church of God, the church fellowship in which I grew up. Plans are under way for what promises to be the largest workshop thus far for the Northeast Conference meeting at the North Hills Church of God near Springfield, OH. The focus for this workshop will be the Total Church Family. Other programs now in the discussion or planning stages are at Burr Oak, IN, and Pennellwood, Grand Rapids, MI.

The committee is compiling a suggested resource list of books, materials, and/or tapes on Family Life. One such set of materials upon which we were privileged to work as a consultant is being compiled here in Phoenix, AZ, by Lawrence Richards. From our exposure to it, we feel sure it will be a valuable resource for church and individual use.

Committee members, Charles and Lois Pryor, are temporarily living in India where Charles is on a teaching assignment. Nancy and I, the other two members of the committee, are in process of extending our education; however, we are available to lead weekend workshops. Joe James led an outstanding workshop at

the Christian Workers' Seminar on "Enriching Family Life," and may be available to lead other workshops.

We are thankful for an anonymous \$500 gift to the work of the committee, and ask the Lord to continue to guide us as we expand the activity and services available to enrich family life in the Churches of God.

Louisiana Property Administrative Board

During the past year, the older trees have been cut and disposed of for lumber. The total income received from the sale of the trees was \$314.67. At last report, some effort was being made to clean out the undergrowth and some general cleanup. I have no other information on this work.

One interested Church of God family visited the property and, upon returning, made a contribution of \$25 to be used on the property. These people had never seen the property before, but after hearing about it they went to see it. Perhaps others will be encouraged to do likewise.

The Administrative Board recommends a plan of procedure to begin development of the property as follows:

- Find a person who has the knowledge and skill, and who can make available his time, to review the Administrative Board's proposals, and draft preliminary basic engineering plans with land contours and elevations included.
- Study and review known apartments in existence which would be suitable for use, and obtain floor plans and types of construction.
- Prepare an appropriate brochure for promotion and publicity of proposed apartments, including floor plans and types of construction recommended.
- 4. Prepare an appropriate plan under which interested persons would construct apartments, and own and occupy them during their lifetime, with a nominal charge during their life for the use of the land and facilities. Preferably, if possible, upon the death of the owners and occupants, the apartment might become the property of the General Conference by gift. This would require an appropriate written contract between the parties and the General Conference.
- 5. After proper publicity, determine the feasibility of the "Apartment Phase," and evaluate it in accordance with the total reaction obtained, and the genuine interest generated in the plan.

All comments and criticism are encouraged in order for the Administrative Board and the General Conference to know your feelings and interests.

License and Ordination Board

As I begin this report, I feel that I must include a personal note of thanks to Brothers Kenneth Milne and James Mattison for carrying on the work of this Board so faithfully during my time of illness. We also appreciate all those faithful men and women who have served the Church of God as pastors and leaders. We commend each of our ministers for his response to the annual renewal of applications for license. We are anticipating changes to be made in our procedure that will eliminate the need for ordained ministers to renew their licenses annually. All ministers will be informed when this change is approved.

In the November, 1976, issue of *Progress Journal*, a list of 121 names was published. Twenty-three are listed as inactive as pastors, but many of these are in full- or part-time service for the Lord. The list also included 11 licensed foreign mission workers. At the time of the writing of this report, applications are coming in from the seniors of Oregon Bible College, who are intending to become licensed ministers of the Church of God. Some of these graduates have already been called to pastorates, which they will accept if approved as ministers by the License and Ordination Board. We congratulate these young men for their acceptance of the call of the Master and pray that God will fill them with his Holy Spirit.

We are happy to report the addition of Brother Larry Mayberry, who is now pastoring the Hillisburg Church of God, Michigantown, IN; Brother Gary Smith, who is pastoring the Troy View Church of God, Troy, OH; Richard R. Williams, who is pastoring the Denver, CO, Church of God; and Richard Alcumbrack, who is youth leader and an assistant pastor in the Royal Village Church of God at Front Royal, VA.

We praise God that two of our young men appeared before the General Conference delegates for ordination last August. They were Brother Dale Swartz, who is now a mission worker and pastor of the Lighthouse Church of God in Digby, Nova Scotia, and Brother David Cheatwood, pastor of the Church of the Open Bible at Bedford, OH.

Again we remind all licensed ministers that applications are sent out from headquarters about July 1. If you don't receive an application shortly after that time, write to the Executive Director, Brother S. O. Ross, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061 and request an application. It is possible that your name could have been left off the mailing list or overlooked. Type your name and address if possible, or write or print very plainly, so you can be accurately listed in *Progress Journal*.

Additional Conference Information

Site: The 1977 Church of God General Conference will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, IL, August 8-12. Rockford College is located on East State Street (US Highway Bus. 20).

If one is traveling on Interstate 90, you would get off the Interstate at the Rockford Exit, which is marked Business 20 and State Street (the Henrici Clock Tower Inn is on the east side of the Interstate at the interchange). One would travel from the Interstate west on State Street about 3 miles. You will pass a large Ward's Store, St. Anthony Hospital, and next is Rockford College on the right. There is a large sign at the entrance.

If one is coming in from the south or the west, he could

come on Bypass Highway 20, which goes around the city of Rockford on the south side. At the Alpine Interchange (near the east end of Rockford) one would go north on Alpine for about 3 miles to the intersection of State Street. Turn right on State Street about one half mile, and Rockford College will be on the left.

If one is flying to the General Conference, he can come into O'Hare Field in Chicago. There is a shuttle bus that leaves every hour and a half (hourly during the busy hours of the day) and comes directly to Rockford. The bus can be boarded on the lower level in front of the Carson's Circle Restaurant. This is

located between United and TWA Airlines. One would get off the bus at Sweden House (the 2nd stop) in Rockford. The General Conference van will meet each bus from O'Hare at the Sweden House on Monday, August 8 (registration day), from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. There are a few flights that come directly to the Rockford Airport. We will make arrangements to pick you up there, if we are notified of arrival data.

Registration: Registration begins on August 8 at 10:00 a.m. in Burpee Center. When one arrives at Rockford College, at the end of the main entrance is a parking lot marked "A." Please leave your car in parking lot "A" and walk across the street to Burpee Center for registration.

At registration your housing assignment will be made. You will then move your automobile to the parking lot assigned for the dormitory in which you will be located.

Reservations and Camp Costs: Reservations for General Conference must be made prior to July 25. The pastors of the Churches of God have the necessary registration forms. Isolated members may write to Reservations, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061, for the reservation form.

The cost of the Conference this year is \$48 per adult, \$36 for those 3-12 years of age, and no charge for those under 3 years. This includes room, board, use of the grounds and buildings, insurance, recreational facilities, bed linens, blanket, and pillow.

For those staying off the campus the cost is \$24 per person for meals and the use of all facilities, except a sleeping room, for all three years old and over.

Gymnasium and Pool: Gymnasium and pool will be available each evening after the evening service. Anyone who plans to use the gym must bring gym shoes and proper gym clothing.

Anyone planning to use the pool must bring bathing suit (bikinis not allowed), and girls, or fellows with longer hair, must have bathing cap.

Note to Teachers and Leaders: Teachers of General Conference Adult and Youth Classes and leaders of Christian Sharing Sessions are encouraged to prepare mimeographed copies of their lessons or outlines. Enough copies should be prepared to

permit those not able to attend a particular session to secure copies.

Children's Classes: Sister Judy Myers will be in charge of the Children's Classes for those in second grade and younger.

Sister Iva Mae Holt will be in charge of the classes for children third through sixth grade.

Classes for children will be held only on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Parents are requested to go to the classroom and call for their children at the time of dismissal.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year, delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel of those from far away and those who live nearby. Delegate pool expense forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary. Each church is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.

Elections During General Conference



Foreign Missions Board: One member will be elected. The term of J. Don Swartz expires at this Conference (may be reelected).

Home Missions Board: One member to be elected. The term of M. A. Patrick expires at this Conference (may be reelected).

This information is given so churches and state conferences can instruct their delegates to make particular nominations. Proposed nominees should be contacted beforehand, to be sure they will serve if elected, and to be sure they are free and able to attend the meetings of the particular board to which they may be elected.

Church of God General Conference

This issue carries the programs, reports, recommendations, and other pertinent information regarding the annual Church of God General Conference that will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, IL, August 8-12, 1977. The theme of this 57th annual Conference is "Life on a Higher Plane."

Delegate forms, statistical forms, and pool expense forms have been mailed to all church and Conference secretaries. Secretaries are urged to complete these forms and return them promptly in the envelope enclosed.

It is necessary that each person attending the Conference complete a reservation form. Your pastor has the forms and the information on them. Isolated people can write directly to Church of God General Conference, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061 for the reservation form. Reservations must be in by July 25 since we need to give quite an accurate count to Rockford College prior to the Conference.

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference met in Oregon, IL, on April 28 and 29. The General Conference program, the reports, and the proposed recommendations and goals were approved.

Approval was given to have an open house of all the General Conference facilities on August 12 at the close of General Conference. The General Conference buildings will all be open from 10:00 to 3:00 on that date.

The Valley Church at Van Nuys, CA, was approved for Mission Builders Appeal No. 39 which will be going in the mail about November 15. The members have conducted services in rented buildings since their beginning, and are now purchasing a church building from another congregation.

A report was made to the Board of Directors by the committee to establish an appropriate marker at the site in Waterloo, IA, where the Church of God General Conference was organized in 1921. This marker will be dedicated during the Iowa State Conference in August.

The offerings taken each evening during the Church of God General Conference have been designated to set up a scholarship for the training of an Oregon Bible College librarian.

The Executive Director reported to the Board of Directors the highlights of his attendance at the Advisory Council of the American Bible Society in New York on April 12-14. About 65 men and women representing that many denominations were able to sit in discussion groups and made recommendations to assist the American Bible Society in distributing God's Word in an even greater way. The motto of the American Bible Society is: "Let the Word Speak." The translation, printing, and distribution of God's Word is supported by contributions.

We feel it was a great honor and privilege for the Church of God General Conference to be represented at this Advisory Council Meeting. Your Executive Director felt a spiritual uplift in meeting together with other denominational leaders to have input into another avenue of spreading the Word of God to the people of the world. The expense of the entire trip was provided by the American Bible Society.

Department Boards Meet

The Sunday School Board, the Home Missions Board, and the OBC Board of Education all held meetings during the ministerial conference in April. Their presentations for the Church of God General Conference were finalized and many items of business were discussed.

The various board members, together with the department heads and the Executive Director, held a joint meeting to share ideas and discuss the various programs of the General Conference.

The Golden Rule Dormitory Building has in it a number of pieces of furniture that can be classed as "antique." On Friday, August 12 (the day General Conference closes), at 1:00 p.m. there will be a sale of many items of this furniture.

On January 20, 1977, Bro. and Sr. Paul Overholser and their granddaughter, Elaine Brittingham, left Dayton, OH, for Africa, where they were to spend the next forty-five days. Most of their time was spent with the brethren in Liberia where Bro. Cornelius Boykai is working. Interest in the classes they taught was not as great as we had hoped, but we trust that those who did attend will find the things they learned useful in their lives and works as God's people.

Bro. Overholser went to Nigeria February 3, and spent six days with the Christians in that country. He was unable to go to Ghana because of the drought and disease which made conditions bad.

The Overholsers made this survey and teaching trip to Africa at their own expense, and we appreciate their dedication to the Lord's service and their willingness to help in this way in our missions effort.

Ghana Report

I would like to quote portions of an informative letter received from Bro. Oliver Amani, leader of our Ghana work.

"The total membership of our churches in Ghana now stands at 304. The group in Nkwanta numbers 81, Kwamikrom 123, Jasikan 16, New Ayoma 11, Akosombo 8, Tsyome-Sabadu 12, and the rest, 53, live in isolated areas. Most of the isolated are those in government service and they go on transfer from place to place. I do visit some of them and also correspond with most. The groups in Nkwanta and Kwamikrom have regular worship in chapels, but the others are essentially what I may term 'house-churches.' All of these groups have their teachers.

"I am sure you might have by this time known why the Overholsers could not visit us during their recent trip to Africa. Very acute drought conditions, coupled with Bilharzia disease, is giving us much discomfort in this district. So many people, including some of our students, are currently receiving treatment from the Medical Field Unit which has been sent by the government to help combat the disease."

Teachers for Nigeria

The Nigerian government has launched a massive Universal Primary Education program to provide free education for all children through grade seven. Thousands of new schools are being constructed to accommodate an estimated 11.5 million children by 1980.

Nigeria is looking for 40,000 teachers to fill regular positions in the government schools. The government pays travel expenses to and from Nigeria, provides housing, and offers a "comfortable" salary for teachers, who sign 36-month contracts. English is the language of instruction.

Bible Knowledge is a compulsory subject in all Nigerian schools for students who register as "Christian," and there is little restriction on teachers' extracurricular activities. It appears that there will be great opportunities for Christian teachers to share their faith in such a position.

CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

ARTICLE II (delegates), Section 4 now reads: "An individual member who has attended at least four services, or who has made a financial or service contribution, during the year is considered an active member of his church. These shall be considered as minimum requirements only."

We recommend that the word "four" in the

section be changed to "thirteen."

Explanation: Many have been concerned that one can be an active member by attending only four services in a year. Suggestions have been made a number of times that this requirement should be higher. Thirteen services per year seems like a more reasonable requirement for active membership.

ARTICLE IV (officers of the Conference), Section 1 now reads: "Seven directors shall be elected in General Conference delegate sessions; said directors shall constitute the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. The Board of Directors shall organize by the election of necessary officers at the first meeting following each annual Conference election. These officers shall be a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and treasurer, and three board members."

We recommend the following be added to the section: "The term of office of a director shall begin at the close of the Conference in which

said director is elected."

Explanation: Presently there is no determination in the constitution as to when the term of office of the director starts. This would spell out the time that the term of office actually begins.



BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION

Churches and state conferences are urged to give consideration to whom they would like to nominate to the Board of Directors, and should see that the people of their choice are nominated. The candidates should be contacted ahead of time to be sure they will accept and serve if elected.

Two directors will be elected for a term of three years each, at the 1977 General Conference. The terms of Billie Kennedy and Robert Smith expire at this Conference. They cannot be reelected. Following are four sections of the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference dealing with election of Board of Directors.

Section 2. No elected director shall be a paid employee of the Church of God General Conference for a period longer than two months in any one year.

Section 3. The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of the church leaders.

Section 4. Nominations for each director shall be by General Conference delegates in session at least one day before the day set for the election, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship.

Section 5. Nominations shall be made from the floor; but voting shall be done by ballot, and no nominee shall be elected unless he receives a majority of the votes cast. In case a majority is not received by any nominee in the first balloting, balloting shall continue after eliminating the name receiving the lowest number of votes, until an election is reached. Each director shall be elected separately.

OBITUARIES

We are saddened to report the deaths this winter of three long-time members of the Blanchard, MI, Church of God-well-known members of our community.

George Wisner, a man whose wit and humor amused and entertained so many, died on February 17, 1977. He was ninety-two years of age and well known for being involved in community affairs for many years.

Fellowship of Ministering

URING the Sunday school hour, those in attendance studied the Bible, sharing their thoughts concerning the topic of the lesson. The worship hour was characterized by joining together in singing hymns, enjoying the anthem sung by the choir, and everybody giving close attention to the message from God's Word. On this particular Sunday, each member shared a Communion service with all of the brethren. The pastor announced a congregational business meeting at one-thirty in the afternoon, a Berean meeting at six o'clock, an evangelistic service at seven-thirty, and Bible classes for everybody on Wednesday at seventhirty in the evening. Yet the word "fellowship" was not used until mention was made of a "fellowship hour" in the "fellowship hall" immediately following the Communion service. Everybody knew immediately that this meant refreshments, or possibly a complete meal, and maybe a game or two to liven things up a bit.

The English word "fellowship" appears in the King James Version of the Bible sixteen times. In fourteen of these, it is from the same Greek word, koinonia, which Strong's Exhaustive Concordance of the Bible defines as meaning "common, i.e., shared by all." In the other two instances, though different Greek words are used, the thought remains much the same. Metoche is defined as meaning "participation, i.e., social intercourse." Sugkeronomos translates literally into the English "coheir." By analogy, it is also used of a "participant in common."

The word "fellowship" is used with the following associations: "in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship" (Acts 2:42);

"called unto the fellowship of his Son" (1 Cor. 1:9); "have fellowship with devils" (10:20); "what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness" (2 Cor. 6:14); "the fellowship of the ministering" (8:4); "the right hands of fellowship" (Gal. 2:9); "the fellowship of the mystery" (Eph. 3:9); "fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness" (5:11); "fellowship in the gospel" (Phil. 1:5); "fellowship of the Spirit" (2:1); "fellowship of his sufferings" (3:10); "fellowship with us" (1 John 1:3); "fellowship with the Father" (ibid); "fellowship with him" (v. 6); and "fellowship one with another" (v. 7).

The Sunday school, the worship service, the Communion, the meal, the business meeting, the Berean meeting, the evangelistic service and the midweek Bible classes were all fellowships, i.e., the sharing of something with others.

Three forms of fellowship are forbidden, or warned against: "fellowship with devils," "fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness," and "the fellowship of righteousness with unrighteousness."

Obviously, all forms of fellowship are not suitable for Christians. Restored to its context, the warning against fellowship with devils appears to be closely associated with the worship of idols. The "unfruitful works of darkness" with which we are to have no fellowship are identified earlier in the chapter: "Fornication, and all uncleanness, or covetousness, let it not be once named among you, as becometh saints; neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient: but rather giving of thanks. For this ye know, that no

whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of God. . . . Be not ye therefore partakers with them" (Eph. 5:3-7).

The meaning of righteousness having fellowship with unrighteousness is identified in the same verse in which it appears: "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers." This applies to sharing any type of unrighteous activity, whether it be in the business, social, or religious realm.

The other types of fellowship mentioned in the New Testament are all associated with the sharing of worship of the one true God, and the service that we render to him as followers of his Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Among these, the one that concerns us most in our gathering together for General Conference is fellowship of the ministering. We are deeply impressed with our opportunities and obligations to share the blessings of the gospel with others. We concern ourselves with ways and means by which we may best carry out the great commission. The other types of Christian fellowship that we enjoy at these meetings are all incidental to the main purpose for which we come together. They are no less enjoyable and beneficial because of this. Indeed, our joy in them is enhanced by our harmony of purpose and the love that we feel one for another as a result. We enjoy fellowship in its best and most profitable form. We return home spiritually refreshed and strengthened, and know that we have grown and developed spiritually as a result of our fellowship of ministering.

Reservations for the 1977 Church of God General

Philippines

"The 16th annual conference of the Church of God Philippine Conference and the Berean Youth Conference were held April 7-10 and April 11, 1977, respectively, at the Uddiawan Church. The conference theme was 'Giving, a Test of Faith.' It was divided into some subjects such as: 'Giving Ourselves,' 'Giving Our Time,' 'Giving Our Talents,' 'Giving Our Tithes,' etc.

"April 11 was Berean Youth Day. It was a day of meetings, Bible studies, Bible quizzes, recreation, and ball games for the Bereans. Three young people were added to them through baptism. Those baptized were Samuel Javar, 14, of the Cordon Church; Luz Guzman, 16, of the Gattaran Church; and Carmelita Abobo, 15, of the Agbannawag Church.

Material for Youth

Many pastors and youth leaders have inquired of this office concerning material on the market which is prepared specifically for young people.

As I am sure you're aware, the Berean Youth Department of the Church of God General Conference does not publish any material of its own. However, I have come across material which I feel is worthy of use. Some of it I have used and some I have just read through. You may run into an occasional piece of material that is doctrinally incorrect, but the majority of it is not only usable but desirable. All of it will cost money but the cost is negligible when one considers the time that would have to be spent in putting together his own. Another advantage is that their resources are much more extensive than that to which any one individual could possibly have access.

The following are materials with which I have been impressed: Success With Youth offers a complete program for all ages. The program is designed for one full year, but an introductory kit may be purchased which allows the purchaser to use the material for one month without committing himself to a full year's program. The program starts with "Space Cubs," which is for preschoolers, ages 4 and 5. Following this are programs designed specifically for those in the grades. Grades 1-3 are called "Whirlybirds." Grades 4-6 are "Jet Cadets." Junior high youth are "Alpha Teens." High school youth are called "Omega." Each of these programs may be purchased separately. An introductory sampler kit may be purchased for \$1.00 for any one program offered by writing to: Success With Youth Publications, P.O. Box 27028, Tempe, AZ 85282.

Nido Qubein and Associates, Inc., offers a store-house of good materials for use with teen-age young people. Materials available include: "Bible Study"; "Creative Worship Sessions"; "Retreat Programs"; "Games and Crowd Breakers"; Films; Art; Drama; Music; and others. The publisher also offers a monthly 24-page publication called "AWY" which is full of resources and suggestions. The price of a subscription is \$12.50 per year.
