1980 GENERAL CONFERENCE REPORT



RADITIONALLY, as Chairman of the Board of Directors, I welcome you, in behalf of the Board of Directors and staff of the Church of God General Conference, to this sixtieth annual meeting of the Conference. In reality, however, we are not welcoming you to our conference—as delegates, you are the General Conference.

As we are organized under the Church of God General Conference Constitution and By-Laws, you, as recognized delegates to this conference, have the ultimate authority and almost unlimited power. The General Conference staff is responsible to the Board of Directors; the Board of Directors is elected by and responsible to you, the delegates. You are the final authority, under God, for the work of the General Conference. It's rather like the chain of command in education: the teachers are afraid of the superintendent; the superintendent is afraid of the Board of Education; the Board of Education is afraid of the parents; the parents are afraid of the children; and the children aren't afraid of anybody. But seriously, the delegates to this Conference have great authority and, consequently, great responsibility.

We have a printed agenda which we will follow as closely as possible. It provides for the reporting and discussion of the various phases of the Conference activities, for the election of directors, and for the introduction of general business from delegates. We will follow Roberts' Rules of Order, in the interest of orderly conduct of the business, but we want these meetings to be open and not stifled by formality or complicated procedures.

This has been a year of transition in the General Conference work. The reorganization of the Conference departments began this year, in fulfillment of the recommendations of the Study Committee which were adopted at the 1978 General Conference. Due to the tragic deaths of John and Ruth Lewis and Russell Reye, even more changes were required than originally had been anticipated.

During this past Conference year, S. O. Ross graciously delayed his planned retirement and continued to serve as Executive Director. David Krogh, who has been invaluable to the Conference by stepping into interim positions, has served as Acting President of Oregon Bible College. Russell Magaw is completing his first year as Director of Publishing, drawing all the publishing activities of the Conference into his department. David McClain is completing his first year as Director of Business Administration for the General Conference and for Oregon Bible College. Warren Sorenson, Director of Outreach and Church Development, has been engaged in special studies and programs at Fuller Seminary in California. In spite of what appears to be a very transitory situation, much has been accomplished in the General Conference work in this past year, as will be brought out in the sessions that follow.

We are now entering into a new fiscal year, with the permanent staff in place. The Executive Council, made up of the Executive Director, President of Oregon Bible College, and the Directors of Departments, is organized, meeting regularly and functioning efficiently. In this new year, David Krogh will begin his responsibilities as Executive Director. Dr. Charles Pryor has begun his service as President of Oregon Bible College. Russell Magaw will continue his work as Director of Publishing. David McClain will continue his work as Director of Business Administration. Warren Sorenson has completed his special courses of study and is now working full time out of the Conference office as Director of Outreach and Church Development.

We believe that the Conference has an efficient organization and an excellent management staff and we look forward to exciting progress in the new fiscal year and the new decade as the Church of God General Conference strives to fulfill its stated purpose "to assist members, churches, and conferences to perform their commission to

feed the Church of God and preach the gospel to all the world by providing trained personnel, services, resources, and materials."

The theme for the Conference meetings this week is: "Sharing God's Love From the Foundation of Truth." There is a dual emphasis—the importance of sharing the love of God and the importance of revealed Bible truth as a basis for and integral part of this sharing. Sermons, seminars, classes, and other meetings will be centered in this dual theme message.

This theme concerning truth and love reminds me of the story of the ship captain who was a stickler for the rules. Everything had to be done by the book. One day the first mate came on duty and he had obviously been drinking. The captain, in spite of the protests and pleading of the mate, felt it necessary to enter into the ship's log, and hence into the first mate's record, the notation, "The first mate was drunk today." A few days later, when the first mate was on duty and the officer of the day, he made an entry in the ship's log, "The captain was sober today." This was, of course, true, but the implication was that this was such a monumental occasion that it had to be memorialized in the ship's log. Truth, in this case, lacked fairness and love.

In my opinion, there is an amazing unity in the Church of God in defining the elements of Bible truth. Our understanding of the essential truths of God's Word, as set forth in church constitutions and in the General Conference Constitution and By-Laws, and as taught and preached in the Churches of God, demonstrate one mind and one accord in definition of essential Bible doctrines.

Our individual attitudes toward Bible truth and our personal ideas about how to relate Bible truth to ourselves and to the world in which we live, differ, however. Everyone does not place the same degree of importance upon each of the things commonly believed among us. We do not each feel and observe the same needs in ourselves and in others,

and hence sharing God's love and God's truth may not mean the same thing to each of us.

It is like the two shoe salesmen who were sent to two different undeveloped countries to try to find new sales markets for their companies. After the first month, one sent in his report saying, "This is the worst place in the world to sell shoes. Everyone here goes barefooted." The other salesman sent in his monthly report, saying, "This is the greatest place in the world to sell shoes. Everyone goes barefooted." It is obvious that different people have different attitudes and different outlooks, even in the same situations.

In our Conference meetings here, we have a genuine cross section of the Church of God in North America. We are different personalities. We come from different cultural backgrounds. We live in different worlds or environments. We do different kinds of work. We have had different pastors and teachers. All of these factors influence our personal attitudes, and what we perceive to be the needs and the ways to fulfill those needs.

One might consider these differences to be a weakness in the body. I perceive these differences to be a source of strength, if we understand them and use them. The Apostle Paul's famed comparison of the church to the human body (1 Cor. 12) illustrates the *unity* of the body in Christ, but it also illustrates the *differences* in the individual members of the body. Each member is unique and has a different gift and specific function. These differences are melded by Christ, and the experiences and abilities and gifts have a synergistic effect; that is, the effectiveness of the resulting body is much greater than the sum of its individual parts.

We are united in faith, in purpose, and in hope for the coming of our Lord and full salvation in the kingdom of God. As we share our beliefs, opinions, experiences, and gifts, we will minister to one another and the body will grow stronger as we share God's love from a foundation of truth.



Monday, August 4
Chairman Harold Doan called to order the first business session of the sixtieth annual Church of God General Con-

ference at 2:00 p.m., August 4, 1980, at Rockford College,

MINUTES OF THE 1980 GENERAL CONFERENCE

Chairman Doan welcomed all the delegates and members in attendance. Special recognition was given to new delegates and one newly licensed minister.

Ruth Overholser, chairlady of the Credentials Committee, seated the delegates and explained procedures for the business sessions. She also told the delegates that they have a great responsibility in making their decisions.

Chairman Doan, in his keynote address, noted that this has been a year of transition, where changes have been made in accordance with the Study Committee's report. Stan Ross continued to serve as Executive Director, and David Krogh was acting president at Oregon Bible College.

Russell Magaw, editor, and David McClain, director of business services, have completed their first year. This next fiscal year, David Krogh will be serving as Executive Director of the General Conference, and Charles Pryor will be president of Oregon Bible College. Russell Magaw will continue as editor of all Church of God printed material, and David McClain will serve as director of Business Administration. Warren Sorenson begins his work at Oregon as director of Outreach and Church Development. Chairman Doan admonished that the Conference move forward under this management.

The special reports of the annual report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, as printed in the June, 1980, PROGRESS JOURNAL, were discussed. John Huston moved and Charles Jones seconded that the special reports as published in the June, 1980, PROGRESS

JOURNAL be received. Motion carried.

Dwaine Demmitt, vice chairman, gave a report on the activities of the Board of Directors during the past year. He explained that much time had been given to policy development and long-range goals. Oregon Bible College is attempting to become recognized in the State of Illinois as a Bible College.

S. O. Ross informed that the \$5,000 note on the Oregon Bible College women's dormitory had been returned by the Morse Mill (MO) Church of God as a contribution. Therefore, all indebtedness on the women's dormitory has been

completely paid.

David McClain presented the financial reports for the first nine months (October 1, 1979 - June 30, 1980) of the current fiscal year. Charles Graham moved and Robert Coverstone seconded that the financial statement be received. Motion carried.

Russell Magaw reported on the Publishing Department and expressed appreciation for the workers in his department. He informed that Shirley McQuinn is conduct-

ing a writing seminar at this conference.

The credentials committee reported that 122 delegates had registered. C. E. Randall moved and Maurice Robinson seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Ed Goit dismissed with prayer.

Tuesday, August 5

Chairman Harold Doan called to order the second session of the sixtieth annual Church of God General Conference at 2:00 p.m., August 5, 1980. Cecil Smead led in prayer. The minutes of the August 4 meeting were read.

The chairman informed that C. E. Randall serves as the conference parliamentarian. He also announced that S. O. Ross was appointed by the Board of Directors to be chairman of the Ministers' Voluntary Retirement Association. C.

E. Randall, who has been chairman of this association since its inception 12 years ago, did not wish to be chairman any longer.

Chairman Doan encouraged members of the conference to discuss with the Board of Directors any questions,

suggestions, or concerns they might have.

Chairman Doan explained the background for the Outreach and Church Development Department. The Youth, Sunday School, and Missions Departments were consolidated into one department as they are all related to church growth. Warren Sorenson was appointed to be director of this department.

Warren Sorenson thanked all the people who had helped him during his past year at Fuller Theological Seminary. He plans first to prepare a profile of each church in the General Conference, then talk with the pastors. After that, seminars, clinics, and workshops will be conducted. He advised that the local church is the key to church growth. The General Conference can give help, but the local churches make growth happen.

Hugh Harman reported on the youth work. Three hundred fifteen persons were involved in the International Youth Camp this summer. Dates for next year's camp are July 12-18, 1981, at Camp Alexander Mack. The Midwinter Retreat is scheduled for January 2-4, 1981, at Look Up

Lodge in South Carolina.

A youth caravan, composed of nine young people, traveled through Illinois, Arkansas, Louisiana, South Carolina, Virginia, and Ohio, visiting churches where it

received excellent receptions.

David Krogh informed that 115 persons attended the Christian Workers' Seminar in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, last March. Dates for the seminar next year are March 22-27, and it will be held in the Sheraton-Gatlinburg Hotel at Gatlinburg, Tennessee.

Joe James moved and David Cheatwood seconded that recommendation number one, that the contributions to Mission Builders League assistance be increased to \$20.00 for each appeal, be adopted. Motion carried.

The credentials committee reported 150 delegates present: eight officers, 46 ministers, and 96 delegates.

Russell Johns moved and Maurice Robinson seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Ray Hall dismissed with prayer.

Wednesday, August 6

Chairman Doan called the third business session to order at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 6, 1980. Arnold Johns offered prayer. Bro. Doan explained how the election of officers will be conducted on Thursday.

The meeting was opened for nominations for the Board of Directors: three members to be elected. The following

people were nominated:

Kenneth Vancil and Charles Bottolfs moved that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

Chairman Doan asked David Krogh, acting president of Oregon Bible College, to give his report. Bro. Krogh expressed his thanks for the contributions for the women's dormitory; informed that there would be two intern students this year: Charles Durham at the Rockford Church and Bobby Partain at the Phoenix Bible Church. A pole maintenance building has been erected on the college campus; the Golden Rule building is still being renovated.

Dr. Charles Pryor was introduced, and he gave a resumé of making his decision to become president of Oregon Bible College. He sees three needs for the college:

1. Continued support from everyone through prayers and communications.

2. Expanded recruiting procedures.

Cooperation and input from pastors of the Churches of God.

Joe James moved that the delegates to the 1980 Church of God General Conference recognize by a standing vote of appreciation the outstanding contribution of Bro. David Krogh who has served as acting president of Oregon Bible College during the past year.

John Hearp asked for a rising vote of thanks to Carroll Bennett, Eugene Stilson, Ed Schroth, and Dale Ramsey who have helped with repairs to the Golden Rule building.

Ruth Overholser reported for the credentials committee that 156 voting delegates were registered—eight officers, 50 ministers, and 98 delegates.

Maurice Robinson moved and Don Swartz seconded that the meeting be adjourned until 2:00 p.m., Thursday. Motion carried. Richard Worley dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Thursday, August 7

The fourth and final business session of the 1980 General Conference was called to order at 2:00 p.m., Thursday August 7 by Chairman Doan. Prayer was offered by Stanley Lawrence. Minutes of Wednesday's meeting were read.

Ruth Overholser seated the delegates, with 160 being registered.

The stead

The election of officers to the Board of Directors resulted in the following:

Maurice Robinson, Jr., was elected on the second ballot. Joe James was elected on the third ballot.

John Hearp was elected on the third ballot.

Dwaine Demmitt moved that the delegates of the Church of God attending this 60th General Conference declare this day, August 7, 1980, as Stan and Peg Ross Day with a rising vote of appreciation to Stan for his 11 years of service on the Board of Directors and his 19 years of service as office manager, superintendent of missions, and executive director at the General Conference.

Through the chairman, Adrian Shepherd, Executive Vice President of the Advent Christian Conference, conveyed his thanks to Stan and Peg for their friendship during the

past years.

Charles Pryor moved and Alva Huffer seconded that the General Conference delegates give a rising vote of thanks to Paul and Ruth Overholser for their generosity and love as demonstrated through their contributions to renovate the Golden Rule building into college class rooms and administrative offices.

C. E. Randall moved and John Huston seconded that a suitable enlarged picture of Bro. and Sr. Paul Overholser be placed in the remodeled Golden Rule building in honor of their contribution to the remodeling. Motion carried.

Robert Lindner moved and Joe Astolfi seconded that the Outreach and Church Development Department of the Church of God, headed by Warren Sorenson, send out letters to pastors, youth leaders, and other parties of the Church of God who are able to supply information on lessons and activity helps in problem areas of youth life for a new youth program. After receiving materials, they would be correlated into seasonal information packets that all our churches would be able to purchase. Motion carried.

Charles Bottolfs moved and David Swartz seconded that the delegate expense pool allowance of six cents per mile be increased to 18 cents per mile, beginning with the 1981 General Conference.

Ed Goit moved and Robert Coverstone seconded that the motion be amended to read 12 cents instead of 18 cents.

The Amendment lost and the motion lost.

Maurice Robinson, Jr. moved and Charles Bottolfs seconded that the basic mileage rate per mile for the General Conference delegate pool be determined by the General Conference business manager by taking the average price of gasoline per gallon and dividing it by 10 and rounding it off to the nearest penny. Those who travel by plane will be paid the basic mileage rate per mile for the number of air miles traveled, or the amount of their air fare, whichever is less. Motion carried.

This information should be announced in the PROGRESS JOURNAL far enough ahead of the Conference so churches

could take care of this expense.

Jim Graham moved that the delegates give a standing vote of thanks and appreciation to Rachel Carr for eighteen and a half years of service to the General Conference.

C. E. Randall moved that the delegates give a rising vote of thanks to the retiring members of the Board of Directors: Carroll Bennett, Don Needham, and Charles

Pryor.

David Krogh moved that a round of applause be given in recognition to the members who worked on the songbook committee: Stephen Bolhous, Beth Vancil, Dale Ramsey, Louise Lapp, David Krogh.

S. O. Ross had copies of letters he had sent and answers he had received from various political leaders

concerning the government of Israel.

David Krogh presented the proposed budget. Joe Martin moved and Russell Johns seconded the adoption of the Goals for Giving in the amount of \$359,000. Motion carried.

Ruth Overholser, reporting for the credentials committee, reported eight officers, 51 ministers, and 101 delegates

present, making a total of 160.

The chairman asked that the secretary read the minutes for today's meeting. Ed Goit moved and Willis Turner seconded that the minutes of the entire conference be accepted. Motion carried.

S. O. Ross dismissed the meeting with prayer.



General Conference Minutes and Budget

The minutes of the 1980 annual Church of God General Conference delegate sessions appear in this issue. The annual budget appears on page 4. If you were unable to be present at Conference in August, I hope that you will give special attention to these two items so that you will be aware of the actions of the delegates who represent you.

You will notice that the Goal for Giving for this new fiscal year is \$359,500. This is a 3.3% increase over the Goal for the previous fiscal year. This year's goal could easily be met if each member family in the Church of God were to contribute \$100 to the General Conference during the year. Naturally many of us will want to give more than \$100 during the year and this will help to make up for those families who may be unable to give that much. But together and with the Lord's help, we can meet the budget requirement.

1980 Senior Youth Caravan a Success

Now that the 1980 Senior Youth Caravan is past tense and enough time has elapsed to fully evaluate what took place, I feel strongly that the program was successful and that God blessed us all the way.





To the Church of God . . . With Love

The phrase, Sharing God's Love From the Foundation of Truth, echoed from several sessions at this year's General Conference at Rockford, Illinois. This theme set the tone for a fine conference. An atmosphere of anticipation of great things to come could be felt by many of the delegates. At the same time, a spirit of concern has been expressed by many in relation to possible changes within the Church of God. Both the anticipation of great things to come and the con-

cern in relation to change are linked to the reorganization of the structure of the Conference and changes in


staff personnel.

The creation and function of the Department of Outreach and Church Development generates questions which deserve forthright answers, such as: What effect will this have upon the doctrinal heritage of the Church of God? and, What is church growth?

Our Doctrinal Heritage

In response to the first question, the theme of this past General Conference, Sharing God's Love From the Foundation of Truth, expresses my philosophy for the Church of God and the Department of Outreach and Church Development. We cannot compromise Bible truth. The message is God-given; it is his, not "ours." We have no options in relation to revision of the content. The message cannot be changed without violating God's truth and our responsibility as his church.

What can change is our attitude toward others who need this message, and our commitment to God and the task of world evangelization. Dean Kelly in his book, Why Conservative Churches Are Growing, presents his thesis that conservative churches are growing because they know what they believe and are strongly committed to their faith. The conservative base is the strongest upon which we can build our ministry as the Church of God. Without commitment,



however, we lack a basic ingredient that identifies and motivates the conservative church. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth" (Eph. 6:14) but he did not say, "Stand still." The impact of committed persons is expressed in the following quote from Dean Kelly's book, "For when a handful of wholly committed human beings give themselves fully to a great cause or faith, they are virtually irresistible. They cut through the partial and fleet-

ing commitments of the rest of the society like a buzz

saw through peanut brittle."

We are being thrust into the waters of conviction that the great commission requires total commitment within the Church of God. This is a time when we are challenged to reaffirm our convictions of the gospel message, and a time of awakening to our opportunity and challenge to be bearers of this message. We have a gospel to proclaim that gives meaning to life and urgency to the ministry of the church. The time of isolation and timidity is over. We have a message to share and there is urgency about telling it!

Our Growing Churches

I will respond to the second question, "What is church growth?" on the basis of what I consider church growth to be and my nearly 30 years of ministry in the Church of God. One of my first pastoral experiences was in Hedrick, Indiana. Following the close of the morning service a man walked to the front of the church to give his life to Christ and as a public testimony of his request for baptism in the name of Christ. In a couple of weeks several young people followed his example and believers were added to the Body of Christ and the local congregation. That's Church Growth! But there's more.

Experiences throughout my ministry have helped clarify church growth. Through Bible study and sharing in Christian relationships I've seen persons grow in

faith, commitment, and a loving relation with Christ and fellow human beings. An increase of Bible knowledge and spiritual changes in personal application of faith resulted. *That's Church Growth!* But there's more.

Today I have many personal Christian friends who are not blood relatives of the charter members of churches. Where did these Christian friends come from? Christians sharing with the unchurched, new faces appearing in services and fellowship circles of the church, and the power of Christ and the gospel bringing conversion has resulted in new persons and families coming into membership of the Church of God. That's Church Growth! But still there's more.

Congregations have formed in new locations and have established churches. Mission fields have opened and missionaries are sharing Christ and the gospel in various cultures. *That's Church Growth!*

What is church growth? It is the growth of the Body of Christ as members of church families come to Christ in baptism; it is an expansion of the family of God by bringing the unbeliever to faith and commitment in baptism to Jesus Christ; it is the extension of the church by adding new congregations, which become established churches; it is bridging cultures through mission activity. In my understanding of God's commission to his Church, all of this is in accordance with his will; in fact, it is required if we are to be accounted as faithful stewards of the gospel.

As Director of Outreach and Church Development I speak to the Church of God with love, a love for the Church of God demonstrated by nearly 30 years of ministry. I appeal to you to evaluate church growth by its specific issues and not merely by a "term." I understand the concern for the heritage of the church, and this is as it should be, and yet assumptions that church growth will result in betraying this heritage are unfounded and do not consider the specific issues of church growth.

Keep in mind that the name of the game is not "numbers" but names in the Book of Life. If God counts the number of fallen sparrows and the number of the hairs on the head, he most surely counts the number of baptized believers. I'm sure God wants us to remember the reason for the death of his Son and to build our ministry upon his purpose, "that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life." The agony of the cross and the triumph of the resurrection are demonstrations of God's concern for results. (2 Pet. 3:9.) It is time we as the Church of God also demonstrate a concern for results.



Success With Sunday School Promotions

When you hear someone speak enthusiastically about an unusual Sunday School promotion held by another church, are you eager to hear the results of that promotion or are you more apt to be "turned off" by the "gimmicks" that were used in the mechanics of the presentation of that promotion?

If prayerful consideration is given to the following five steps for developing a good Sunday School promotion, "gimmicks" will not be a justifiable name for the "incentives" that are chosen to stimulate enthusiasm for the ultimate success of your promotion:

Identify the Need

1. The NEED or purpose for having a special Sunday School promotion. What goal would you choose to represent the area of need in your Sunday School? Perhaps you wish for more families to worship and study together, or you may desire a general growth in attendance, or you may want to stimulate personal Bible study and memorization, or you may realize and want to fill a need for brotherly love among your Sunday School members.

Enlist Workers

2. WHO will be your best and most capable workers (do not play the game of "suggester's it")? A prayerful study of your Sunday School membership list should be made to choose key people and, better yet, key families, with just the right talents and attitudes to serve as captains of teams to work out the details for the encouragement and participation of all your Sunday School members. These key people should prayerfully work toward the ultimate goal with a Christ-like spirit of friendly competition.

Use Incentives

3. INCENTIVES will certainly vary with the goal you are trying to reach. If you are going to promote families worshiping together, the incentive should be planned as a family award. If you are going to encourage individual outreach or personal growth, your incentives should be chosen for their personal value. Incentives can surely be fun without demeaning the purpose for which the promotion is being held.

Build On Unity

4. UNITY of participation will make the most rewarding and fruitful promotion. Too often promotions are based upon the premise that the children of your Sunday School will be the key to the promotion's success. There is a tendency to think children aren't afraid to invite their friends to Sunday School, so mentally the adults hide behind the children and let them do the work, if in fact, any work is done at all. The more successful alternative is to have your promotion be family oriented. When you are planning for outreach, each family should be encouraged to discuss together who will be invited, how the family members can be supportive of one another, and what details need to be given to those they have selected to invite. Those being invited need to know such details as: total time involved. what classes are being taught and by whom, whether there be another friendly face there, what transportation will be available, and who will be overseeing the welfare of a child until he returns home.

Another vital area to be considered for unified Sunday School promotion is planning for the hospitality of each person the Lord sends you. Each Sunday School class should discuss how they will receive someone new, what kind of welcome should be given by each class member, who will be willing to ask someone to sit beside him in the opening exercises, who will show the new attender to class, and who will explain class procedures.

Follow Through

5. COMPLETION of a Sunday School promotion is attained when a "follow-up" procedure has been carried out. If increased attendance is your goal, your plans must include visitation of the guests you have received during the promotion. If you have a round-up of old members, you must include a campaign of personal contact with warm and loving messages of concern for those individuals who respond to the promotion. If your goal is to advance personal Bible study and memorization, you must plan to incorporate these learning experiences into your Sunday School openings or into special class-time opportunities.

God truly does expect you to be aware of the needs within your Sunday School and he does hold you responsible to work with him to answer these needs. Special days and Sunday School promotions can and are the answer to many of your Sunday School needs.

MISSION NEWS

Note: Tim Thal of the Phoenix Bible Church recently visited with Steve Grant in India. The following is his letter to his home church (used by permission).

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I recently had the privilege of visiting one of our

mission stations which is located in Bangalore, India. Two major accomplishments of the trip were (1) seeing and experiencing first-hand the work God is doing there through his missionaries among millions of unbelievers, and (2) sharing in the work for a time with Steve Grant and being an encouragement. It was meaningful to be able to view God's world in a totally different light.

God has blessed India with great beauty. But the enormous spiritual need along with unforgettable poverty left an equally vivid impression on me. God has much work to do there. But there are many vibrant Christians in India, many who have given up much to devote themselves entirely to the sharing of the gospel, depending on God alone to provide their needs. Steve and I had several opportunities to work with some of these in the slum areas of Bangalore. The message of hope in Christ is welcome in these villages where disease and gnawing hunger are day-to-day realities.

Steve has fully adjusted to the different environment offered by India and is in good health and spirits. He has gotten used to, and is even able to enjoy, a spicy hot Indian meal once in a while. He is well accepted and respected and has formed many close friendships. His language study is coming along well and conversation in Tamil comes easier every day. He also leads a Bible study each week and holds a special discipleship class for the church leadership. Steve also recently had the opportunity of taking a course in village health work. The training could be especially valuable if he should in the future find himself in a ministry working with villagers far removed from any doctor.

One of our churches is facing some difficult problems at present. Witnessing some of these problems made me feel fortunate to belong to a strong, healthy church like the Phoenix Bible Church. There is not too much we can do but pray that God will work it out his way. Please pray that he will give encouragement to Pastor Noel and convict by the Holy Spirit those that are standing in the way of the Lord's work in the church.

Finally, Steve sends his love to all of you. He has grown to enjoy India and love the people there, but he also misses his family at the Bible Church. He sends his thanks for all the encouragement he receives from Pastor Jim and all of you. I also thank you for your prayers while I was gone. There were some times over there when I sure needed them. I know that God will use this experience to help me be of better service to him.

Warning About Cults

After reading some of the latest statistics on cults and because of continual pressure put on young people to join, I felt like the following information, originally published in pamphlet form and distributed by the University Religious Council of the University of California at Berkeley, would serve as a teaching tool to parents of teens and young adults alike.

Learn to Be a Listener

When you feel alone, lonely, and totally overwhelmed by a decision you need to make, and find yourself wishing that someone would just tell you what to do—when you feel like the world used to make sense but now everything is falling apart, you're vulnerable!

When you're hurting (or even when you're not):

Beware of people with magical answers of solutions who are excessively or inappropriately friendly. There are no instant friendships!

Beware of invitations to isolated weekend workshops having vague goals. There is no reason to be vague unless there is something to hide.

You should know that the two basic principles of mind control (brainwashing) are:

- 1. If you can get a person to behave the way you want, you can get that person to believe the way you want.
- Sudden, drastic changes in environment lead to heightened suggestibility and to drastic changes in attitudes and beliefs.

Don't be foolish—protect yourself! Don't go away for a weekend or longer with a stranger or group, unless:

You know the name of the sponsoring group.

You are thoroughly familiar with its beliefs, affiliations, and goals.

You know what will be expected of you.

You know that you will be free and able to leave at any time.

So, if you ever feel overwhelmed, lonely, confused, or in need of friends or direction, reach out to someone you trust: a friend, a teacher, a parent, a counselor, a crisis hotline, a member of the clergy, a member of the campus ministry; or, if you know someone who has these feelings, urge that person to reach out to someone he can really trust.

General History of the Golden Rule Building

The Gilbert Mansion was purchased by the General Conference in 1922, but the history of the building pre-

dates that purchase by several decades.

The Golden Rule building now being renovated as an administration/education facility for Oregon Bible College, was first built in 1858, for \$2,000. It was called the Union School. It was a two-story, four-room elementary schoolhouse with a main entrance on the south and another on the north which opened to a play area.

The building was set apart from the rest of the small community, for no other buildings were in that part of town except two homes on the highway south of the hill. The sight of children walking through the meadows and up the hill to school must have thrilled many frontier mothers and

fathers.

As the inside of the building was being demolished last year, the secrets of its rich history were revealed with each new day. It had long been suspected that it was a former school building, but it had not been proven. The discovery of old chalkboards plastered directly onto the lath, old school papers, and the manner in which the north rooms had been built all convinced us—this building was the old Union School the history books mentioned.

When exterior bricks were discovered beneath wallpaper in the north upstairs bedrooms, and limestone headers over doorways matched those over windows, it became evident that the north portion of the building had been added sometime after the original construction. This was documented by checking with the history books. A high school addition was built on the Union school in 1875 due to the growth of the community and the increased interest of the people in education. It was built in the play yard to the north. The Union School had been rediscovered!

The design of the schoolhouse included a hallway dividing each floor into two rooms, with a stairwell at the north side. The winter heat was provided by wood stoves, one in each room. As a measure of fire protection, a brick fire wall was placed along one side of the hallway. There was an abundance of clay in the Oregon area, and bricks were an inexpensive building material. When the high school was added, it included two more rooms, the exterior brick wall serving as firewall between the two buildings.

In 1896, it became necessary to build a new school, and the Union School was sold to the Gilbert family. To convert it to a private residence, the inside was totally remodeled.

Two fireplaces were constructed on the first floor, back to back in the center of the old hallway. The larger, more formal fireplace was the center of a large parlor. The smaller one was used in the family sitting room. A kitchen and dining room were built into the north high school addition. A small vestibule with an open stairway completed the downstairs. Upstairs, no less than nine bedrooms were partitioned, which opened on to a serpentine hallway which could have been mistaken for a maze. Such a lavish home must have been the site of much entertainment.

When the General Conference purchased the home for \$24,000 in 1922, the large rooms and many bedrooms of-

fered the greatest attraction. It was to be used as a retirement home for elderly members of the Church of God who had no families to care for them. For \$1,600 or less members could enter the home in return for loving care administered in generous doses. However, without endowment, the economics of operating the retirement facility proved too costly. Gradually the retirement use was phased out and student use as a dorm site phased in.

In 1957, male students moved into the Golden Rule Men's Dormitory. They lived in harmony with the remaining elderly residents, "Red" and Mabel Lindsay and Sr.

Elizabeth Ordnung, for several years.

Following completion of the new Men's Dormitory in 1963, the Golden Rule Dormitory became a women's facility. In 1975, when the new Women's Dormitory was completed, use of the Golden Rule building ceased, except for hotel purposes for visiting Church of God dignitaries.

It was during this period of time that the question arose as to the future use or destruction of the building. Some thought it should be torn down to make space for a new facility. Others, realizing its historic significance, objected. Finally it was decided to restore the building to its former glory, using modern energy-saving materials and methods.

The work was begun in the summer of 1979. The interior demolition proved to be very dirty work, but yielded several exciting surprises. As partitions were pulled down and the fireplace razed, an old mural was discovered in one schoolroom. It covered the entire wall with an arch of Christmas greenery, ribbons, and candles. Beneath the arch was

"Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men."

Later, when the lath and plaster were being pulled from the ceilings, many old school papers fell out. These included exercise books of spelling and penmanship, teachers' notes and tests, report cards (which were issued at the end of each week), attendance sheets, and notes. We have speculated that at the end of the term, happy kids wadded, twisted and tore up their booklets, and threw the trash in the teacher's basket. She, seeing that a repair project was underway for the summer, tossed the materials into the open floor.

Dated 1865, most of the papers have been excellently preserved and are fun for history buffs to laugh about. A decision is pending on which agency would be better able

to preserve and display the material.

During the renovation, energy-saving measures have included sealing up of cracks in the foundation to prevent heat loss, insulation of attics and walls to an efficiency of R35, use of double-glazed windows with tinted glass to complement the exterior of the building, and an addition of vestibules at each entrance.

Designers of the new interior have tried to be true to the building's original educational purpose. The small fireplace was removed so the hallway could be restored. The top floor contains classrooms and the ground floor contains a reception area, offices, and a conference room.

The exterior has received attention also. In order to preserve the brick, sanding, tuck-pointing, and sealing are

being done. Where unused openings have been sealed, old brick from the project and other 19th century buildings in Oregon have been used, so that "patches" are "matches." Even the color of the mortar used in tuck-pointing has been selected to match other buildings of that period.

Several people worked on the design of the Oregon Bible College Campus and the Golden Rule Building in particular. Bro. David Seger designed the basic concept of a unified campus, lending support to the idea of saving the old building. Following his tragic death in April, 1979, several staff persons including Eugene Stilson, Paul Newell, Stan Ross, and David Krogh worked out a design for the renovation project.

Many craftspeople have donated their skills and labor on this project. Bro. Carroll Bennett of Minnesota, Bros. Edward and Ronald Schroth and sons of Ohio. Bro. Eugene Stilson and son, Bro. Dale Ramsey, and several students of Oregon Bible College have spent many long hours of diligent work. Mr. Charles Mongan and Dean Dye of Oregon have often served as consultants.

Other members working at the site have included Walter

Bolhous who has specialized in the finishing aspects, and Walter Spangler, whose crew has done a tremendous job of solving the tangle of plumbing problems connected in such a renovation project.

All this has been made possible by the prayers of the people, and the generous funding of the project by Mr. and

Mrs. Paul Overholser of Springfield, Ohio.

Members of the General Conference and friends of the Oregon Community can be proud of the work which has gone into the revitalizing of the old Union School. It's a work of labor and a work of love. It's love of the Lord Jesus and education for service of God for which this building is dedicated.

A Dedicatory Service has been scheduled for November 16, 1980. Friends of the Oregon Community and Members of the General Conference are invited to attend and share the blessings of the day.



General Conference Progress

Board of Directors Meeting

The General Conference Board of Directors met in the new Conference room of the remodeled Golden Rule Building in Oregon, Illinois, November 14 and 15. The Executive Director presented his first message to the Board after assuming this position, which consisted of an analysis of the state of the Church of God, and an overview of the great opportunities and challenges which we have before us in the future. The need for specific, measurable, and achievable goals in our churches was emphasized. And the need for the Church of God to have confidence that God will bless us if we will believe that he can "do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us" (Eph. 3:20).

The Board heard reports and suggestions from the heads of the three Conference Departments: David McClain, Business Administration; Russell Magaw, Publishing; and Warren Sorenson, Outreach and Church Development. The Board spent time discussing each aspect of the work.

In other action, the Board approved a policy authorizing the License and Ordination Board to work out the details of permitting pastors to be ordained in their local churches if they so choose. A motion was passed approving the creation of a Pension Trust for the General Conference employees. The employees will make their own contributions to this tax-sheltered trust through payroll withholding.

The next meeting will be held in Oregon, January 29, 30, 1981. This meeting will be devoted almost exclusively to discussing topics of long-range significance to the Conference and College, and adopting policy where needed for the smooth operation of our work. Board and staff members were given assignments to prepare presentations for the next meeting, which will serve as a springboard for discussion. Some of the areas to be discussed will be: long-range goals, future staffing needs and priorities, policies regarding our educational materials, discussion of our Mission Builders standards, and college campus development.

Any member who has suggestions for the Conference, or any area of concern, please communicate with a Board member or the Executive Director. The Conference exists to serve our churches, and it is only as we become aware of your needs that we are able to successfully do our work.

Management and Communications Seminar

Early in November, Dallas and Nancy Demmitt of Phoenix, AZ, conducted a management and communications seminar for the College staff and Department heads of the Conference. They were in Oregon to conduct Christian Emphasis Week for the College, and they graciously donated their time to conduct the Seminar for the staff. The sessions proved to be very helpful in developing better communication and better understanding among the members of the staff.

Price Increase for Sunday School Quarterlies

Due to increased costs, the price of all Sunday School quarterlies with the exception of the Beginners Teacher's packets, will be increased 10¢ effective with the March-May 1981, quarter. Each quarterly will cost \$1.10. The Beginners packet will rise from \$5.00 to \$5.25. It has been nearly two years since the last price increase. This price adjustment will help us to more nearly meet the actual cost of publication.

Goal for Giving

Thank you to all who have been so generous in responding to our October literature appeal. As of this writing we have added hundreds of names to the mailing list for *The Restitution Herald*, and we have received thousands of dollars. Replies are still being received and if you have not yet responded to this appeal, please do so immediately.

Later this month you will receive a gift catalog which will share with you many programs and projects which the General Conference and College are carrying on during this fiscal year. 


To the glory of God and his Son Jesus Christ we dedicate this building, that, with the blessing of God, it may be a means to assist many in training for greater Christian service.

SETTING GOALS FOR YOUR CHURCH

Why set goals for a church? we may ask; we are dealing with people—not merchandise.

I can only find one good reason: THEY WORK! From my own personal experience and recent experience at the Valley Bible Church in Glendale, California, we need to reassess our "If it's the Lord's will, it will be done anyway" attitude toward goals, and set some for our churches. Pastors, elders, and all church leaders should consider the direction, enthusiasm, and desire to do more. Often a goal generates such characteristics.

First, from my personal experience, goals work. Yes, even in "spiritual matters." Many ministers recount a recurring dream of entering the pulpit on Sunday morning without any preparation. (Okay, I think I have even heard a few like that too.) Seriously, in times past, I continually had that nightmare—waking up tired and frustrated, believing I was in the desperate situation of trying to preach a sermon without preparation or the Lord's support. Later I set a minimum personal goal of having at least a month's sermon titles established in advance. After having done this for the past several years, I have not had the problem of the recurring "Preacher's Dream." One little goal did it.

Someone might say, "Well, that doesn't allow for the Holy Spirit to work." To this I can only reply, "Why can't the Holy Spirit work a month in advance?" Goals work.

I was not real sure why they worked until I took a seminar with Olan Hendrix entitled the same as his book on the subject, "Management for the Christian Worker." I highly recommend the book and the seminar. In it, he really hit home. "The Immature Leader always feels he has got to do it now." If the plan does not work, he gets personally frustrated. In a lot of ways that is still me, but I am learning. Also he said, "The bottleneck is always at the top of the bottle." Again, "Someday' is never bologna (be $lo^{1}n\bar{e}$); put a date on it." He really stepped on my toes! I kept recalling my mental tapes, "Someday this week I need to start my sermon." "Someday, this church is going to double its attendance." One of his principles reads like

this: "The probability of a future event occurring increases as effort is applied systematically toward its realization" (p. 42). This is where goals come in. What is the dream you have for your church? What is that future event? Make it a goal and get to work.

In addition to Hendrix, I learn from Jesus; "he made up his mind and set out on his way to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51, GNB). From chapter nine until the words "It is finished," Jesus has a goal. Study Luke 13:22, 32; 17:11; 18:31-33; 19:11; and then Luke's account of his death. What a goal! Through 10 chapers Luke reminds us in the verses mentioned of that goal. Jesus had other goals that might be mentioned, like calling 12 rather than eight, but they are not as significant as the model he establishes in Luke 9:51 for you and me!

Secondly, from my experience with the Valley Bible Church, I have discovered that goals work. In November, 1978, the board adopted the following:

"Realizing that our aim as a Church of God is the building of our and others' relationship to God through Christ, we recommend . . . a goal for 1979 of '80 by 80.'"

We were to attempt to have 80 people in our congregation worshiping God before the year 1980. It was a pretty ambitious goal since our attendance for October averaged 33. We were a new church with a new building in a new community—just starting out. Still, we had a vision of what the Lord could do.

The Outreach Committee in that proposal adopted by the board outlined the strategy. Once a month there was to be a Saturday set aside for community calling. Progressive interim goals were established, 40 for Thanksgiving, 50 for Christmas, 60 for Easter, etc. The people owned the goal. It was not just the pastor or the elders or board deciding what should be done. Each one began to feel the need to have others in with us to worship God. As some of the interim goals were reached, 55 for Thanksgiving, 63 for Christmas, I could see the positive attitude building in the congregation.

Then and now I can hear critics saying, "You're just

looking for numbers." That is not true. Each number represents a person that may not enter the kingdom of God if I do not do my part to get the Word to the community in which I live. If a goal generates enthusiasm and direction towards more hearing the Word, why not use a goal? When Jesus told the parable about the feast and empty seats, the host did not say, "Well, that's okay, guys; you tried." Rather, he admonished his servants to go out and "compel" them to come in. I must confess, I was very pleased during April of 1979 when I preached my month's messages on Abraham's Faith-dealing with Resurrection, the Shema-One God, Jesus, and the Kingdom—that our attendance averaged 57 and not 33. If the people began coming because they wanted to reach a goal, that is fine with me; they heard the Word. In fact, I would encourage tools to "compel" them to come in, especially goals.


The Valley Bible Church is continuing to set goals to get more people involved. We've set youth goals, Vacation Bible School goals, goals to encourage Bible Study, goals to encourage personal growth (like a goal of two retreats per year), etc. The goals are not to the

glory of individuals but a glory to God as individuals grow in their relationship to him through Jesus our Lord. We praise God that on December 23, 1979, there were 90 people in our congregation worshiping and thus allowing our "80 by '80" goal to be met.

Of course all goals are not reached. We have some of those too. However, as Hendrix puts it, "If you do not have a goal, then any road will get you there." In listing the effects of unclear objectives, such as unclear methods, lack of measurement, and drifting, he states, "We rationalize, we exonerate ourselves, we excuse ourselves, but in the end we find we have failed." I encourage you to allow the Lord to work by stating your vision in the form of a goal, and working towards it for the glory of God.

Recently for our Rally Day, October 26, 1980, the board adopted a goal of 85. We only had 80 but I still feel great as I remember seeing that "extra effort" put forth by the congregation to bring them in. The message that morning was "The King Is Coming" Is there something that you would like to see accomplished before he comes? Try a goal and get to work. You may be surprised what the Lord can do!

Concerning Growth and Maturity of Our Youth

A recent study contained several interesting things concerning the growth and maturity rates of our preteen and teen-age young people. According to this study there is a great deal of tangible evidence to indicate that the youth of today grow up faster than ever before. However, according to this study most of this growth takes place in areas concerning money and pleasure. The fact is that our young people have more money than we did to spend on entertainment, cars, clothes, food, etc. With money in hand combined with the tremendous environmental demands placed on our youth today, it is quite natural that our teens are simply responding to these pressures.

The question being posed by the researchers concerns the emotional, physical, intellectual, and social maturity of our young people. Are they maturing in these areas also? Some observers think that in terms of independence youth are immature. They are more dependent on their parents for longer periods of time, less self-sufficient, enter the world of work later, and most marry later than the youth of yesterday.

Other observers indicate that the maturation process is accelerated today and are concerned about the problems arising from "shortcuts to adulthood." They feel that children and youth should have time to enjoy themselves. Instead, it seems that parents are attempting to burden them with heavy responsibilities and are pushing them into all sorts of things before they are developmentally ready. According to one researcher, "youngsters are being bombarded with an overwhelming amount of stimuli—sexual, intellectual, emotional, and social—and the mass media have an enormous impact on them. They see more, hear more, and they're expected to know more." They are expected on one hand to be dependent on their parents and on the other to behave like responsible adults with mature goals.

According to this study the process of "stop-and-go" development is leading to a great deal of confusion among our youth and they are not sure exactly how they are to make the transition to young adulthood.

It seems that the evidence points out that our kids are struggling for maturity. We need to be aware of this maturation process and the ways in which we can assist our kids in going through it.

"I know you believe you understand what you think I said, but I'm not sure you realize that what you heard is not what I meant."

Ever had that experience? Isn't it trying on your nerves and on the patience of your listener to explain what you said—time and again?

Perhaps such nonverbal indicators as gestures, facial expressions, or overall attitude give away the real meaning of your words—yet you've never understood yourself to speak that way. Certainly you've not given such a confusing message in words. . . .

Isn't it embarrassing when you or your hearer has to ask, "What was that I never heard you say?"

During the week of November 3-7, 1980, Dallas and Nancy Demmitt dealt with the problems of communication in various sessions and seminars for the benefit of General Conference and Oregon Bible College staff members. The Demmitts are co-authors of a communication book/program which helps understand the intricate problems associated with dialogue in the world of work and industry. The Demmitts brought their volume, "Working Together," to your staff and worked through its concepts during the week. By experiencing some of these concepts in open sessions, the staff began to grasp how to build bridges of understanding instead of hammering together walls of fear, doubt, and mistrust.

We shall always be grateful to Dallas and Nancy for the insights imparted to us during the week. As time progresses, we shall increase our use of these concepts in our work together.



and Progress

On October 14, 1980, the State of Israel lost another of its staunchest Christian friends. Casimir Lanowick, Director of the Christian-Israel Friendship League, based in Paradise, CA, died in his hometown of a heart attack at the age of 63, after devoting the last 33 years of his life to the cause of modern Israel, which he saw as the nation of prophetic destiny. In various ways—by lecturing, fund-raising, writing, publishing, and escorting tour groups to the Jewish State, Mr. Lanowick's unbounded zeal for Israel became known around the world.

In October of 1947 Casimir began editing and publishing a monthly magazine designed to acquaint Christians with the already amazing developments achieved by the Jews returning to "Palestine." "Israel's Restoration News" became a valued source of information to many Christian clergy and laity at a time when the non-Jewish world had limited access to comprehensive data about the new State of Israel.

As soon as possible Mr. Lanowick made his

way to the new Jewish State in 1950, spending three months combing the country on a research and photographic mission, witnessing and filming the arrival of thousands of immigrants. He returned to his office, then in Redwood City, CA, and put together a strikingly beautiful and informative film presentation.

Then ensued many years of worldwide lecturing. Mr. Lanowick passionately told the story of the miraculous rise of Israel, sharing the achievements, aspirations, and trials of its people by indepth reporting as its historic mission was unfolding.

Realizing that the finest way for Christians to appreciate Israel was by visiting the Land of Promise, in 1955 Casimir Lanowick began organizing and personally escorting tour groups to Israel. With his wife and working companion, Elva, Mr. Lanowick continued to make regular trips to Israel, including 15 months of residence in Jerusalem in 1958-59 on a journalistic mission. In 1973 Casimir Lanowick was awarded

the "King David Club Award" by El Al Airlines, given only to those who have played a key role in the development of Israel's civil aviation.

In 1974-75 Mr. Lanowick conceived and chaired the Lowdermilk Memorial Forest project, resulting in the planting of over 10,000 trees near Mt. Turan in Galilee in memory of the great Christian Zionist, Dr. Walter Clay Lowdermilk, of Berkeley, CA, the father and founder of Israel's national water plan.

Mr. Lanowick also organized numerous national Israel Seminars, and acted as the National Coordinator in the United States for the First International Congress for the Peace of Jerusalem held in the Holy City in January-February, 1978. He was a founding member of the International Christians for Israel organization which sprang

out of this Congress.

Casimir Lanowick is survived by his wife, Elva, and his 92-year-old father, Stephen Lanowick, also of Paradise, CA.





So far as is known no bird ever tried to build more nests than its neighbor. No fox ever fretted because he had only one hole in the earth in which to live and hide. No squirrel ever died in anxiety lest he should not lay up enough nuts for two winters instead of one. And no dog ever lost sleep over the fact that he did not have enough bones buried in the ground for his declining years. So many people put the emphasis on the wrong things. Webs of Contacts

Signs abound daily which tell us Jesus could return in our generation. So-called "messiahs" from dozens of cults proclaim their authority. Armies of men skirmish on battle-fields around the globe seeking political clout. Every 24 hours 20,000 persons die from starvation. Natural calamities from the eruptions of Mt. St. Helens to earthquakes in some of the strangest places take countless lives each week. Believers in communist lands suffer wrong for their faith.

In his Olivet Discourse Jesus warned about such signs as being the "beginning of sorrows. . . . But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved" (Matt. 24:8, 13). Then he made a startling statement. "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (verse 14).

While the "signs of the times" swarm around us, we are to tell the good news of the gospel of the kingdom. In another place Jesus charges us: "Occupy till I come" (Luke 19:13). How can we most effectively preach the gospel and care effectively for possessions in Jesus' name (that's "occupying") until our Lord returns? What can we do for friends, relatives, and those in our communities in order to let them know about the gospel of the kingdom?

We need to make use of the natural "webs of contacts" people have for the cause of Christ. What are "webs of contacts"?

Webs are social ties between people—common kinship, common community, and common interests. When a new person comes into the church, he is not only added to the roll, but he brings a new untapped web of friends and family outside the church. Church leaders must emphasize reaching people in such webs.

Present church members have unreached people within their webs. Research has shown that, on the average, each member has approximately eight personal contacts with unchurched people. Strategy should be developed to introduce these prospects to the church and show how Christ can, in these end times, have positive value in their lives.

Suppose Mary Smith just became a new member of the church. If she could get just three of her eight unchurched friends to come with her, and each of them has eight unchurched friends, the church would have 24 new prospects to reach.

Thus, if the church has a strategy for introducing new prospects to its fellowship, there's plenty of work to be done as we await Christ's return.

How about you? Where are you in these "webs of contacts"? What will you do with your contacts?

Press for a Decision in Your Calling

Churches with a regular program of calling and visitation on homes in their communities know the secret to success—how to press for a decision without being abrasive or pushy. But how can such an ideal be achieved? That question remains unanswered in the programs of churches which have had little or no success with calling in the community.

There is a technique involved which brings fruit for the Lord. But working it involves persistence and commitment on the part of the caller. He must never give up on families listed as prospects. These families are never removed from the mailing list of the church unless they move away or die. After awhile these families learn that they have a relationship with the caller which is constant.

The calling proceeds in a cyclic pattern. First visits consist of building a relationship with the people—getting to know the family. Another series of calls has as their purpose the imparting of information about the church, the Lord, the Bible, the caller's personal testimony. Opportunity is given for the family to make a decision. Whatever the decision, the caller affirms the family. He encourages the people to know that in time they will want to make a decision for the Lord.

Another series of calls deals with the need to make the decision for the Lord. But in this series the steps of building a relationship and affirmation are repeated so the family knows the caller has their best interests at heart.

This pattern has been used successfully by Mr. Mack McCarter, pastor of First Christian

Christian Service at Oregon Bible College

A sound program of Christian Service or field work goes hand in hand with formal studies in preparation for effective service. Bible College education is characterized by the place given to practical training. Oregon Bible College has a well-organized program of training in Christian service.

Rationale for Program

The essence of the Christian faith lies in relating divine truths to human realities. In Christian Service, the student is confronted with reality. He is brought into vital relationships with people. The practical aspect of the program is preparing the student for Christian ministry, with the underlying principle of learning by expression. Here classroom instruction becomes functional, integrating academic content and practical experience for the personal development of the student in areas of Christian Service.

Goals of Christian Service Program

1. To assist students in deepening and internalizing theological perceptions through integrating classroom and field experience.

2. To minister to the student, assisting and supporting his process of growth towards

maturity in Christ.

3. To provide opportunities for students to discover and develop ministry gifts through active involvement in ministry.

4. To assist each student in experiencing and teaching Scripture as God's revelation of that reality which believers are called to live.

5. To provide opportunities for students to serve Christ by serving people in local churches and in the community at large.

6. To provide a model for each student with whom he can enter into a close personal relationship.

Basic Requirements

1. Ministry Service

Each full-time student must successfully complete six semester units of practical Christian Service. Each two-year student must successfully complete two semester units of practical Christian Service. A listing of specific opportunities in the local churches and the community is provided for students to assist in selecting a ministry area.

2. Weekly Attendance

Students are encouraged through their Christian Service commitments to become consistently involved in one of the local churches. Regular attendance is not simply a requirement of the student's commitment to Oregon Bible College, but an opportunity to become involved with others in the worship of our Lord. Each student will be held accountable to his/her advisor for the consistent involvement in a church body. Attendance at Sunday School and at least two church services each week is required.

Chapel Attendance

Attendance at College Chapel is important for the growth of each person. Chapel provides the opportunity to worship together and to minister to one another. Each person's participation and contribution is important. Students are held accountable for regular Chapel participa-

4. Record Keeping

Keeping accurate records of weekly attendance and ministry activities is a requirement of the program. Reporting Christian Service activities is designed to assist students in defining goals, stimulating positive action, and assessing progress.



Either Dr. Michael or Dr. Jothi see the patients. Sister Mary is our nurse in charge of paperwork, shots, and medicines. Jaya Sheelan, our caretaker, not only keeps the place clean, but is also there to lend a helping hand with a tearful child.

Yet there is one more man without whom all our efforts would be in vain. His name is Samuel "Tata" (Tamil word for grandpa) to both staff and patients alike. Every morning as the clinic door opens, Tata is there to visit with the sick in the waiting room. His message is simple and true: "You must have faith in God, the doctors can help, but only through Jesus can you be healed." He prays with the sick and tells them about this wonderful man called Jesus.

Each morning about 10:30 a short sermonette is given. Pastor Noel, Tata, and Brother Stephen take turns giving the message and praying for the sick. When our missionary friend comes, Tata is always there to translate his message into any one of several languages.

At noontime, hungry little children from neighboring slums gather at the door. They are here for their daily portion of bread and milk, compliments of the Indian government but distributed by our church.

The efforts of Pastor Noel, Tata, and the rest of the Lalji Church and staff here brought new faces into our church these past Sundays. Last week, five new Hindus and three Moslem friends joined us for worship (PTL). May God continue to minister through his dedicated servants.



On Parent-Teen Communication

A recent survey of a national cross section of over 1000 young people between the ages of 13 and 18 indicates that part of the problem parents have in dealing with their children is the lack of communication. I believe that most of us as parents would agree that a wise recommendation would include the need to communicate to our most precious possessions, our children.

Yet a recent Gallup Youth Survey points out the fact that 25 percent of the young people surveyed did not discuss their activities with their parents. Another 42 percent indicated that no words of praise were received from their parents during a 24-hour period. During that same period 50 percent had not received a hug or kiss, 54 percent had not heard the words, "I love you," and 79 percent indicated they received no help with their homework from a parent.


This survey distinguished between those who attended church at least weekly, less than weekly, and those who did not attend at all. It is important for us to note that this part of the survey indicated that the young people who attend church regularly outranked those who do not in every category of the survey. 78 percent indicated they talked with their parents about the events of their day, 62 percent received praise from their parents, 54 percent had been hugged or kissed, 48 percent had heard the words, "I love you," and 22 percent had been given assistance with their homework.

Even though those who attend church outrank those who do not, it would seem that we as parents should look at this another way. Why would only about half of Christian parents tell their children "I love you," or why would only 54 percent hug or kiss their children during a day?

It is our responsibility to raise up our children in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord" according to God's Word. Can anyone picture God ignoring his responsibility? Can anyone picture God being anything but nurturing with us, his children? What constitutes nurturing? Does it include telling someone that you love him? Does it include showing love by a hug or kiss? If the above are part of the nurturing process, then approximately 50 percent of us are not carrying out our God-given responsibility to our children as shown by this survey. We are not immune! Let us back up our good intentions with action.





In summing up this method, McCarter says, "My pattern is relational / affirmational / decisional, in a continuously recurring cycle: Courtesy call — cultivation call — commitment call. Then, if they haven't decided positively yet, a continuing cultivation—commitment call cycle, maybe even two or three times. As I continue calling, we keep sending them a church newsletter and trying to influence them in whatever way we can. I try not to be afraid of rejection or

let my self-confidence be destroyed by fear."



Board of Directors Meeting

Pictured above is the current Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. These individuals are elected by the delegates from each church and State Conference. They receive regular reports from the Executive Director and President of Oregon Bible College, and they oversee the work. They spend many hours on behalf of the Conference and College.

The Board met in Oregon, Illinois, January 29 and 30. Among the items discussed and acted upon were:

1. The Hearp Memorial Loan Fund was renamed Hearp-Delap Memorial Loan Fund at the request of John and Louise Hearp. Bro. and Sr. Hearp made an additional contribution to this fund from the estate of Sr. Hearp's parents, and the new name of the loan fund more accurately reflects the memory of the Hearps' parents.

2. A committee was appointed to study ways of making the Board of Counseling and Arbitration more effective in assisting churches which have need of their assistance. This committee will report back to the Board at its May meeting, and any major changes would be submitted to the delegates for action at the summer Conference.

3. The McGintytown Church in Arkansas was approved as the recipient of the spring Mission Builders Appeal #46. Additional information regarding the expansion plans of this growing congregation will be mailed with the appeal later.

4. The audit report for 1979-80 was accepted and approved by the Board. A summary of this report appears on pages 10 and 11.

5. The Board authorized the employment of afull time Youth Ministries Coordinator/Instructor. This individual will teach Christian Education Youth Ministry courses in Oregon Bible College, and will direct Youth work in the Outreach and Church Development Department. This person will supervise all of our national youth activities, and give priority to training and assisting local youth leaders.

6. Steve Grant, who is continuing his education in cross-cultural communication, will be hired on a part-time basis, effective immediately, to assist Bro. Warren Sorenson in the Department of Outreach and Church Development. He will assist with research and policy development for our foreign mission work. He will also be available to visit local churches to report on his field work in India and to increase the mission awareness of all Church of God members.

7. The Board heard a report from the General Conference Planning Committee. The theme of the 1981 summer General Conference is: "You Are the Church." The emphasis in the Conference will focus on the ministry of the local church and individual involvement.

8. The Board spent most of its time at this meeting discussing topics of long-range significance to Conference and College.

OBC PROGRESS: A LOOK AT INTERNSHIP

Dr. Charles Pryor, President

A primary purpose of Oregon Bible College is to prepare men and women for the ministry in the Church of God. Internship is designed for persons who complete the professional studies program with plans to enter an active ministry. The period of internship takes place during the fourth or fifth year of the student's program of study and preparation.

Internship assignments and contracts are developed on an individual basis. All arrangements must be agreed upon by the intern, the cooperating church, and the internship coordinator for the College. Upon successful completion of internship the individual may be recommended for licensure by the License and Ordination Board.

During the current term two men are serving churches in an intern capacity. Brother Jim Graham at the Phoenix Bible Church is supervising the internship of Bobby Lee Partain, Jr. Bobby Lee is from the Guthrie Grove Church in Pelzer, South Carolina. At the date of publication, Brother Partain's post-internship plans were not definite.

The Rockford, Illinois, Church of God is the cooperating church for Charles Durham's internship. Pastor Sydney Kirkpatrick has been working closely with OBC to provide professional and spiritual growth experiences for Brother Durham.

The following interviews with intern Charles Durham and with cooperating pastor Sydney Kirkpatrick were conducted during February by Dr. Charles Pryor. The impact of the program on the pastor, the intern, and the church is easily recognized in the text of the interview.

DURHAM INTERVIEW

Pryor: As you completed your senior year, what were your thoughts about internship?

Durham: I was charged with the excitement of fultime ministry. In all honesty, I looked at internship as a hindrance to my getting on with my ministry. David Krogh applied his wisdom and persuasion to help me see I needed an internship. I complied. When I entered my internship, I immediately realized how much there was to learn through my *real* ministry as an intern.

Pryor: How was your location chosen?

Durham: David Krogh (then Acting President) and I discussed many possibilities and concluded Rockford would be a good choice. My first Christian Service assignment was in Rockford. Both Kim (my wife) and I were well acquainted with the members of the Rockford congregation and were confident they and their pastor could become vital contributors to our growth in the Lord's work. The members' sincere message was apparent in the lives they modeled. I also appreciated Pastor Kirkpatrick's approach to ministry. Pastor Kirkpatrick is real. He cares. I knew I would learn many invaluable skills by working with him.

Pryor: What was your first major challenge as an intern?

Durham: Within the first month the Pastor was called out of the country for over a week. I was left alone—in charge. God's help, the preparation I had from College, and the positive outlook of Pastor Kirkpatrick and the congregation quickly dispelled any anxieties I might have felt. Having been a student-pastor at East Oregon also contributed to my readiness to handle the office of pastor during Brother Kirkpatrick's absence.

Pryor: What has been the highlight of your internship? (Continued next page, first column)

KIRKPATRICK INTERVIEW

Pryor: What were your thoughts in anticipation of supervising an intern?

Kirkpatrick: Mine can be described as excitement — excitement at being able to develop and expand the ministry of our church while providing an invaluable training opportunity to a new pastor.

Pryor: How did you choose Charles?

Kirkpatrick: Charles had been assigned here for Christian Service during his first years at OBC. I was familiar with Charles and his abilities. All our previous contacts had been positive.

Pryor: What was your first major challenge as an intern supervisor?

Kirkpatrick: The awesomeness of what I was about to do. 2 Tim. 2:2 says, "And the things which you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses, these entrust to faithful men, who will be able to teach others also" (NASB). I began to recount all the things I would be able to pass along to Charles. I realized he would pattern some of his ministry after me. I then set about to examine my own life, my own style to be sure I

Durham: My daily life includes definite prayer time. The highest point of my internship occurred when persons for whom I had been praying stepped forward and publicly accepted Christ. I'll never forget the first time. I recognized that event as the real answer to the question, "What is the ministry all about?" I have experienced the power of prayer many times during these months of internship.

Pryor: I've heard you use the term "prayer coordinator" a number of times. What is a "prayer coordinator"?

Durham: In our church I coordinate a prayer ministry which reaches into each department. I must constantly be aware of the activities and needs of departments and the individuals who make up these departments. I then develop a prayer guide as an aid to members' daily prayer life. The guide keeps persons aware of needs. I'm currently cultivating laymen to take over my role as prayer coordinator. The ministry will continue because it is their ministry of prayer. All special activities of the church, such as home Bible Study and calling, are supported by specific individuals' prayers at the time the activity is scheduled to take place. (If readers wish more detailed information regarding the prayer ministry, they're invited to contact either Pastor Durham or Kirkpatrick.)

Pryor: Is there anything else about your internship you want to share with our readers?

Durham: One of the key things I've learned is that God definitely works in a series of stages of preparation. So often I've wanted to leap out on my own—get ahead of God's schedule. Frequently I've been stopped just short of leaping and have been amazed at what I've learned by being patient—taking time to get involved as an intern under the guidance of an experienced pastor—IT IS NOT A SIN TO TAKE TIME TO LEARN THOROUGHLY.

Pryor: It's Mid-March—just a few weeks of internship left. What's next?

Durham: Kim and I feel a definite call to pastor the Greenville, South Carolina, church. I plan to be interviewed by the License and Ordination Board in April and begin my pastorate in May of this year. I'm excited about entering the ministry. I feel a deep conviction that God has called me to a life of ministry. Breaking the positive bonds we have developed in Rockford will be painful, but I am ready to move forward in the Lord's work.

would be an adequate model. After all, I might see some of myself in his ministry in later years.

Pryor: What has been a highlight of your internship supervision to date?

Kirkpatrick: With an intern on our staff I have an opportunity to observe how effective an individual's ministry can be. Charles Durham has been especially effective in developing the ministry of prayer in this church. To observe the results of that ministry has been thrilling.

Pryor: Is there anything else about your role as an intern supervisor you want to share with our readers?

Kirkpatrick: Through this experience I've been able to realize just how much the church's outreach and effectiveness can be increased through a multiple ministry situation. The increase in ministry potential goes far beyond one plus one. I look forward to the continuing expansion of ministry specialties within the Church of God.

Pryor: Charles' internship will be over in a few weeks. What next?

Kirkpatrick: Our challenge at the Rockford Church is to continue the level of ministry attained through working with Charles Durham's internship. Good programs have been initiated. It's up to us—pastor and laymen—to see that they continue. Admiration and love between Charles Durham and members of this church are very high. Charles and Kim deserve much credit.





Did you ever want to be just like someone else? When you were young, was there a movie or television hero that you wanted to emulate? I have often wondered why young people so much want to be like these people.

There are many reasons, but I would like to share just one reason one person idolizes another. Our idols are the way we want to be. They face difficult situations with confidence and almost always overcome. The policeman always faces the danger and gets his man. The lawyer's mind is able to make all the right deductions and prove his client's innocence. We wish we could have the policeman's confidence or the lawyer's thinking ability. Probably one of the biggest things we want is to have people like us the way we and others like

them. Maybe if we were policemen or lawyers like them, people would like us, too.

Our admiration of others begins at an early age. The three-year-old looks up to his older brother, thinking, "My big brother gets to go to school. When I get older, I want to be just like my big brother and go to school, too." The gradeschool child looks up to the high schooler. The high schooler respects the collegiate. The first-year man on the job esteems the ten-year veteran.

Maybe we or our children shouldn't admire others like this, but it is done. It is a fact of life. It can be bad when the wrong heroes are chosen. But when the right heroes are followed, great things can happen.

Think of what Paul said in 1 Corinthians 4:16, 17. "Wherefore, I beseech you, be ye followers of me. For this cause have I sent unto you Timotheus, who is my beloved son, and faithful in the Lord, who shall bring you into remembrance of my ways which be in Christ, as I teach every where in every church."

Paul was a member of the body of Christ. He loved God and understood what God is like. He had accepted Jesus as God's Son and his Savior. Paul understood his personal duty in Christ's body. He knew he was to be a church starter, an evangelist. Paul also knew that not everyone was to be church starters. He knew some were called to be apostles and prophets and pastor-teachers. So what did he mean when he told others to follow his example?

I believe Paul recognized the importance of following in another's footsteps. Paul didn't want everyone to be evangelists; he wanted everyone to live godly lives. He wanted everyone to recognize their duty to the ones who followed in their footsteps—and to fulfill that duty. "Let others follow you even as you follow Christ."

Paul called for people to follow in his footsteps. That is up to us to do. Remember, though, someone is walking behind you. Someone is watching every move you make. Someone wants to live his life by what you are doing. What kind of life will he live? Will it be a life of which he will be proud? Will it be a life of which you would be proud? Will he do what God wants him to do or do your footsteps seek for excuses to get out of responsibility?

This is the challenge of discipleship: encouraging another to follow your footsteps. It is a challenge and a responsibility. Be a disciple-maker.

ATHEIST WORK IN KIROVOGRAD RECEIVES OFFICIAL PRAISE

LONDON (EWNS)—Agitator, the journal of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, carries an article praising atheist work in the Kirovograd region (November 21, 1980). The journal states that a broad network of "atheist" clubs has been established throughout the region in factories, schools, institutes of higher education, cultural museums, and on collective farms. Special tribute is paid to the work of the atheist club in a tractor parts Visiting scientists inform the workers of the basic aims of the atheistic upbringing and give advice

aims of the atheistic upbringing and give advice on methods in furthering atheistic work. "Such lectures," writes Agitator, "are needed not only for the benefit of believers, but also for the wavering and unbelievers. A good lecture catches the interest of the audience, stimulates a critical appraisal of one's ideas, promotes the formation of a materialistic outlook on life."

The club chairman stresses the importance of The club chairman stresses the importance of giving the lectures titles which would attract believers. "For example," he says, "atheistic evenings could be publicized as 'The Truth About Religion,' 'Freedom of Conscience in the Soviet Union,' 'Science and Religion in Universal Development,' 'A Discussion of Old and New Festivals and Customs,' 'What Are the Holy Scriptures and Who Wrote Them?' "An invitation to attend an evening on "The Truth invitation to attend an evening on "The Truth About Religion" states: "At this meeting you will hear about various religious trends in Christianity—Does religion teach goodness? The attitude of religion to women."

As a result of a recent questionnaire, the club arranged for a series of lectures about the ideology of contemporary Orthodox believers, Baptists and Adventists, and on the irreconcilability of communist and religious morality.

As well as lectures, the club organizes screenings of atheistic films followed by discussion and readings of atheistic literature. Most Soviet offices and factories have well-equipped atheistic "corners." The factory library usually organizes exhibitions of atheistic literature featuring such works as "Classics of Marxism-Leninism on Religion," "They Broke With Religion," and "Science Versus Superstition."

SCRIPTURE TRANSLATIONS REACH NEW PEAK OF 1,710 LANGUAGES

NEW YORK—Since the invention of the printing press, at least one book of the Bible had been published by the end of 1980 in 1,710 of the world's languages and distinct dialects, according to the American Bible Society.

The American Bible Society's annual language count revealed an increase of 27 languages over the 1979 figure of 1,683 and marks the first time the Bible or part thereof has been published in more than 1,700 languages.

Among the many new translations in which a whole book of the Bible appeared for the first time, eight were added in Latin America, three in Africa, five in Australia, three in the Philippines, and two in

Two complete Bibles were published for the first time: Kimbundu in Angola, and Kinandi in Zaire. Each was published by its own Bible Society under the auspices of the 66-member United Bible Societies, a federation of autonomous national Societies worldwide.

There were 24 languages in which complete New Testaments were reported published for the first time. New Testaments were the first Scriptures ever published in the languages of Ezaa, Ikwo and Izi. All are in Nigeria.

Geographically speaking, Africa has the largest number of languages (499) in which at least one book of the Bible has been translated. Asia ranks second with 434 languages and Latin America third with 283. In Australia and the South Pacific, Scriptures have been published in 251 languages, in Europe 179, and in North America 62.

The complete Bible has been published in 275 languages, New Testaments in 495, and portions in

Esperanto and Volapuk, commonly called international languages, are also included in the total

Seventy-five additional portions, (at least a single book of the Bible) were reported published for the first time in 1980. This represents 20 languages in the Philippines, 11 in Mexico, nine in Australia, four each in Brazil and Ethiopia and three each in Colombia and Guatemala.

The historic language tally, dating from the "first printed Bible in 1456," is compiled from copies of the new Scriptures received from various organizations by the ABS library, the largest collection of its kind in the world, with more than 39,000 volumes of Scripture, documents, and reference items.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES October 1, 1979 to September 30, 1980

ORGANIZATION
This organization is incorporated under the not-for-profit Illinois Corporation Act. It is exempt

from Federal Income Tax under the provisions of Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Annual "Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax," Form 990, is required to be filed with the Internal Revenue Service.

ACCOUNTING RECORDS

The books and records are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting. The bookkeeping system is divided into General Fund and Restricted Fund, with each fund being a complete and separate record. The receipts and expenditures of each fund are classified to the department to which they are applicable. All assets and income received which are restricted as to their use, either by stipulation of the donor or the Board of Directors, are recorded on the Restricted Fund books, including Annuities, Trust Funds, and Endowment Funds.

INVENTORIES

IVENTORIES Inventories are listed at cost

INVESTMENTS

Investments are listed at cost.

LAND, BUILDINGS & EQUIPMENT

The Land, Buildings, and Equipment are recorded on the accounting records at cost, except assets received as a gift in kind. Those assets are recorded at the established value when received, and continue to be carried at this substituted cost. All assets are titled in the name of the Church of

God General Conference, and not in the name of any separate department.

DEPRECIATION

The Administration Building has not been depreciated since September 30, 1967. The Men's Residence Hall has not been depreciated since September 30, 1966. The Women's Residence

INCOME & RECEIPTS

All monies received and designated by the donor for restricted uses are reported as income in the year received in the Restricted Fund. The receipts and expenditures are identified by the specific fund within the Restricted Fund section. Individual fund balances are maintained at all times on a continuing basis in order to carry out the wishes of the donors.



You Are the Church



THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Music is a vital part of the curriculum and outreach of Oregon Bible College. Most of the students are involved in some musical activity. Students use music as an avenue or vehicle to express their praise of God and also to share their faith with others. Through the musical activities at the college students can cultivate their special musical interests so that they may achieve this goal more effectively.

Strong emphasis is given to the equipping of students to minister in music at the local church level. Classes in church music, conducting, theory, worship, applied music, and ensemble participation help develop the skill of the individual in music. Through chapel services, local church participation, gospel teams, OBC Chorale, and other outlets, the student is able to put to practice his present studies.



THE OBC CHORALE

The OBC Chorale offers specialized study and performance opportunities for vocally qualified students who are chosen by audition from the student body. The Chorale Repertoire includes unaccompanied and accompanied works of ancient and contemporary composers. A large variety of choral forms is performed.

In addition to concerts at the college, the Chorale travels extensively presenting concerts in churches, high schools, and various organizations. An annual tour is taken each spring to churches in Illinois and other states. The Chorale has concertized in 22 states and Canada. They've also produced four albums.

Dale Ramsey, an instructor in music at the college, has directed the Chorale since its inception 11 years ago. He is a graduate of Elizabethtown (PA) College and received a Masters Degree in Music from Northern Illinois University.

Coming in May - OBC BOOSTERS' CAMPAIGN

Does your church have Church Growth Eyes? When a congregation turns its attention toward a ministry of reaching persons who do not have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, a growth pattern emerges. A starting point is to develop a sensitivity to seeing the church and its needs and seeing appropriate strategies to make the church efficient and effective. Being "efficient" is concerned with doing things right and "effective" is doing the right things.

A starting point for any congregation is to understand its focus of ministry and clearly define its purpose. Who is the church ministering to and what is it seeking to accomplish, are questions which must be answered by

each congregation.

A part of the work of the Outreach Director is to provide assistance to pastors and churches in establishing a defined ministry which will lead to growth. This emphasis has motivated several meetings with pastors, church boards, and congregations. In these meetings, four objectives serve as a guideline: 1. to provide an introduction and overview of Church Growth principles; 2. to provide an opportunity for the evaluation of individual local churches; 3. to provide guidelines for future planning; 4. to assist in a goal-setting process. This format is potential-oriented rather than problemoriented.

The local church is the key to a successful ministry as the Church of God. It is with this awareness that several trips have been made by the Director of Outreach to make personal contact with the people involved in the local church.

In travel which has included Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Arkansas, Louisiana, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Arizona, Texas, and Illinois, a strategy of growth has been shared.

Pastors or churches interested in developing a growth ministry may contact the Department of Outreach and Development for assistance. Specific tools for evaluation and analysis provide a springboard for future planning and goal setting.

As Director of Outreach and Church Development, I am convinced that any church in a growth potential area can grow if the congregation is willing to make a commitment to growth principles. It is for this reason that we offer a consultation service to our churches.

The church grows when persons are converted and baptized. As these new members become actively involved Christians in the church, an air of excitement comes into the life of the church. Spiritual renewal often takes place in the church as new Christians spark new life in the congregation. One pastor recently wrote, "It's exciting." This can also be true for your church.

Returning home they have continued to study from their gift copy of Systematic Theology and have come to share our understanding of basic Bible truths. The drama continued to unfold when correspondence was received from a man in Sydney wanting names of any of our members in Australia. After receiving the name and address of Ray and Bettye he drove to Newcastle to meet them and discussed Scripture. After hours of discussion and the thrill of God's leadership in putting them together to share their faith, a Bible study effort was planned to begin in Sydney. Because of Ray's work (and the providential leadership of God) he will be in Sydney five days a week. Ray is very excited about sharing his new faith and starting a Church of God in Australia. In a letter received March 10, 1981, he writes, "This initial development (Bible study group) has an opportunity of a firm commencement (for planting a church). Please! Please! Please! circulate our need for prayer. Have the Conference pray for the Lord's blessing for this tiny seedling in Australia, that it might grow forth with great fruit to honor him and plant the flag of the Bible Church of God on our shores."



THE RESTITUTION HERALD Box 100 Oregon, Illinois 61061 THE EARLY pioneers who so "earnestly contended for the faith which was once delivered to the saints" now sleep in Jesus, awaiting the coming King. I thought it may be of interest to many of like precious faith to learn the history of its introduction into the Midwestern states so long ago.

First, I will go back and show how the truth first began to illuminate the minds of those who afterwards introduced it. Let your minds follow me across the Atlantic ocean to Halifax, England. About the year 1839, certain ones were enduring a great struggle in order that they might emerge out of the gross darkness of old Babylon and back into the full sunlight of God's saving message of life. Among that number was my father, Joseph Wilson, and his brothers (Benjamin, John, and James); also Benjamin's boys, and Richard and William Appleyard.

At that time they were all members of the same Baptist church at Halifax. About this time, Alexander Campbell began preaching what he called the "reformation," urging people to get back to the primitive faith and practice. He started well but stopped short of ascertaining the primitive faith. He introduced baptism for the remission of sins, ignored all human creeds, and established weekly Communion.

A congregation was organized on this partial reformation, called "The Disciples of Christ" at Halifax, England. The group mentioned left the Baptist church and united with this organization. The light which they had received made them anxious for more light. The congregation then formed itself into an investigating class, with a firm determination to search carefully the Holy Scriptures. They resolved to begin with the first chapter of Genesis and go through the entire Word of God. They had not progressed very far in the study of Genesis before they came across the covenants of promise made to Abraham and repeated to Isaac and Jacob. An inquiry was made as to whether those promises had been fulfilled or not. You can imagine how like a golden cord they discovered that those promises permeated and ran through both the Old and New Testaments and constituted the basis of the gospel of the Kingdom. It was at this point that the true light began to shine, and as the investigation progressed, the light shone brighter and brighter until they were led into obedience of the one true faith and hope of the gospel.

While the investigation was in progress, my uncles, James and Benjamin Wilson, and Benjamin's boys emigrated to America in 1844, bringing with them what light they possessed. Later in 1849, my father Joseph Wilson, his brother John and William and Richard Appleyard, also sailed for Geneva, Illinois, where my Uncle Benjamin had previously located and entered the printing business. Uncle James had bought a farm a few miles west of Geneva. Later still came Joseph Cockroft, who became a partner with Uncle Benjamin in the

printing business. Later still, George Westgarth and family became located in Geneva.


Meetings for Bible study were still continued in their homes at Geneva. About this time came Dr. John Thomas, who had been in the reformation work along with Mr. Campbell. He soon passed Mr. Campbell in Bible study, and obeyed the gospel of the Kingdom; then Mr. Campbell and Mr. Thomas became antagonists. John Thomas became a noted proclaimer of the gospel of the Kingdom and life eternal only through Christ. If I mistake not, he baptized my father and Uncle Benjamin. Both Mr. Campbell and Mr. Thomas then transferred their labors into the State of Virginia. For a time Virginia became a fierce battleground, where Mr. Thomas and Mr. Campbell waged many a conflict.

Finally John Thomas located in Hoboken, New Jersey. He planted a church at Brooklyn, New York. From Hoboken, he published a magazine called *The Herald of the Kingdom*. Hoboken was the center point from which the gospel of the Kingdom radiated in the eastern states, and Geneva, Illinois, for the western states. I remember as a boy witnessing baptisms at Geneva as first one and then another learned the true gospel message. A church of believers was then formed at that place.

At Saint Charles, Illinois, two miles north of Geneva, lived Mr. and Mrs. Underwood, father and mother of the publisher of The Restitution in 1906, and also John Christian and wife. They united with the church at Geneva. Brother Underwood engaged in a flour mill at Saint Charles and became quite an accomplished student of prophecy. Uncle Benjamin owned a printing office and commenced publication of a magazine called The Gospel Banner, which became an uncompromising exponent of the gospel of the Kingdom and eternal life only through Christ. Books, tracts, and hymn books were then published, and the light began to spread in every direction, Geneva being the center point.

The congregation began to grow and a church building became a necessity. Plans were made, and a plain stone church building was erected. I well remember one moonlight night how the men and their sons met to dig the foundation, bringing with them lanterns and spades. I as a boy

printed the first edition of the book from these plates on a hand press. I used to ink the plate by a soft roller while he worked the press. Thus from Geneva, as the early gospel center, issued one of the most useful aids for Bible study that ever issued from the press, in any section of this

About this time, Joseph Marsh issued a magazine from Rochester, New York, called The Prophetic Expositor. This magazine published much truth, but as he held the gospel of the Kingdom in a rather loose manner, it provoked the hostility of Dr. John Thomas, who would not tolerate the least infringement of the glorious


gospel of the Kingdom.

The Prophetic Expositor finally came into the hands of Thomas G. Newman. It finally merged with the Gospel Banner. The Gospel Banner in turn merged with The Herald of the Kingdom published by my oldest brother, Thomas Wilson of Chicago, Illinois. While in his hands, the name was changed to *The Restitution*. As time went on the contest for the gospel waxed hot. The worst foes we had to meet were the followers of Alexander Campbell and William Miller.

Indiana had a hard struggle with the Adventists, under the leadership of Joshua V. Himes, Dr. Field, and E. C. Andrus. These advent leaders put up a strong and bitter fight to capture the present conference of the Church of God in Indiana, but they failed. Brethren Corbaley, Wince, Wagoner, and Halstead were veterans in the struggle. Much interesting history may be given with regard to the great battle of the age of the supremacy of the Kingdom as against spurious gospels. I have been conversant with the contest from its early state in Geneva, and I felt that it might be of interest to many believers who know nothing about this memorable struggle.

I was a member of the Geneva Church and was baptized into the sacred name by Bro. Edwin Smith in the waters of the beautiful Fox River in 1857. Bro. Smith now rests in the graveyard where many old veterans lie buried. A few weeks ago, while I was filling an appointment, our much-esteemed Brother James Whitehead fell asleep. He was one of those who had learned the glad tidings at Geneva and was a member of that church. Sister Whitehead was, also. In the east, at Elizabeth, New Jersey, lived one of the old veterans, John O. Woodruff. This old veteran in his lifetime spent over thirty thousand dollars for printed literature in defense of the ancient faith of the gospel. Faithful believers have struggled hard to hand down to their descendants the pure gospel of the Kingdom unmixed with the traditions of men. Will you preserve it or will you suffer hobbies and liberalism to creep in and compromise it? I have placed these truths in book form, "The Pine Woods Bible Class," that it may find a place in your libraries, and through it shall still speak to you when I shall be unable to use either voice or pen.



Distillers Must Be Happy at Prospect

Alcoholism Program Shouldn't Get Budget Ax

It is unfortunate that the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism is slated for a virtual wipeout under the budget slashes now being presented to Congress by the present administration.

Ten years ago Harold Hughes, then U.S. Senator from Iowa, had a dream of a national alcoholism program. Primarily because of his influence and diligent efforts, it was passed by Congress and became known as the Hughes Act. On recommendation of Office and Management Budget Director David Stockman, its budget could be cut 70 per cent and its staff reduced 88 per cent. This comes at a time alcoholism is costing this country \$53 billion a year in lost production, health and medical costs, accidents, and violent crimes. No one can even dare to estimate the additional welfare load that is brought about by alcohol abuse. It must be at least 50 to 60 per cent of the total cost.

The cuts will come for the most part by making block grants to the states when, in reality, this is a national problem and is best dealt with on that level. A few states have done fairly well in their programs, but it is only from a national perspective that

comprehensive information can be gathered.

For example, it is confirmed in studies by NIAAA that there is a growing problem of alcohol abuse among young people and women. This information could not be obtained in piece-meal surveys in 50 states even if individual states had any interest or demonstrated any interest in the problem. (Nevada is not likely to send out much information on its excessive consumption.)

Senator Hughes puts it best in these words:

"I am a recovering alcoholic and I know the huge cost of alcoholism. I have devoted much of my life to causes that seek to reduce the devastating human and economic impact of alcoholism. Would you help me to keep the national alcoholism program alive? If you will, write now to your Senators, Congressmen, and President Reagan to ask that the nation continue to fight against alcoholism.

"'America's New Beginning'should not be the end of the beginning for our national

alcoholism program."

It has taken 10 years to make America aware of this worsening problem. It would be disastrous for it to be crippled or wiped out. The distillers and distributors of whisky must be getting ready for a big party (with plenty of drinks, of course) as they anticipate the ax coming down on this program.

TWO FORGOTTEN SOVIET PRISONERS

NEW YORK (EWNS)—Members of the Soviet Jewish community are rejoicing at the release of Iosif Mendelevich from a labor camp in the Tatar Republic, USSR, and his subsequent emigration to Israel. Mendelevich, one of the defendants in the infamous 1970 "Leningrad Trials," served 11 years of his 12-year sentence under particularly harsh circumstances: as an Orthodox Jew he was selected for special harassment.

Mendelevich had to fulfill his weekly quota of work in six days to be able to observe the Sabbath.

He had to fast during the Jewish holidays in order to keep the dietary laws of his faith. Frequently ridiculed and frustrated, he made a skull cap and a prayer shawl out of rags and insisted on wearing them. When these items were confiscated by the guards, he went on a hunger strike during which he lost more than 40 pounds, thus risking his health and life. Evidently Soviet authorities decided to get rid of the recalcitrant prisoner before he died, and permitted him to leave for Israel.

Two of his co-defendants in the "Leningrad Trials," however, are still imprisoned and their lives are in grave danger. Alexei Murzhenko and Yuri Fedorov, both Christians, had joined their Jewish friends in a plot to hijack a Soviet airplane. This event was not so much in hope of success as to express their protest against the Soviet system. Both of them are paying dearly for their

gesture and for their courage.

Fedorov is serving his sentence in the dreaded Potma Labor Camp. Hard work, inadequate diet, and non-existent medical care have affected his health. During a particularly agonizing attack of pain caused by renal malfunction, Fedorov unsuccessfully sought admission to the camp infirmary. When refused, in desperation he chopped off his finger so as to get admitted to the emergency clinic. Fedorov's wife Natalia Buzyreva and daughter Maria emigrated to the USA, and thus he is quite alone in the USSR, but still clinging to his hope that one day he will be able to leave the Soviet Union and live in the Free World.

Alexei Murzhenko, a graduate of the Suvorov Military Academy, was sentenced to 14 years in

labor camps where he contracted TB and chronic gastritis. He is not receiving adequate medical care, and if not released soon, he is doomed. His wife lives in the USSR in dire poverty, waiting for

Care, and if not released soon, ne is doomed. His wife lives in the USSK in dire poverty, waiting for Alexer's return and hoping that they will be eventually able to emigrate.

These two prisoners were made an example to the others because of their involvement in a "Zionist conspiracy." Their co-defendant, Eduard Kuznetsov, released in 1979, said of them: "Their fate is a symbol. By their example and by the example of all those who are persecuted, the Soviet government wishes to show. This is what may be your fate if you are not satisfied with Soviet power and if you want to emigrate to Israel. This will be your fate and no one will help you! But the West must help them, so that others may be saved from this horror and may feel that they are not defenseless."

Sharing Christ With Your Friends

There are many ways of sharing Christ. It may be by the example of living the Christian life. It may be done by distributing the written word (literature). It may be done by one-to-one witnessing—by discussing with the individual the plan of salvation through Jesus Christ. I believe there are "different strokes for different folks."


We must have some understanding of the individual so we can begin to deal with him where he is. If he appears to be an ungodly person, we would certainly treat him much differently from one who attends a church and appears to already have high Christian principles. We must first gain some confidence with him. We first become friendly with him and we can then have opportunity to bring up the subject of salvation or the Christian life.

In bringing up the Scriptural or religious subject, we must do it in a positive manner. Do not be apologetic that our church is small, that the pastor is not too skilled in the pulpit, that our doctrines are peculiar, or any other such negative aspect.

Be positive of the fact that we are all sinners (including self). Be positive of the fact that we all need forgiveness through Christ. Christ is the answer to most personal problems of the day. He is the only one who can bring us salvation: "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

Show love and concern to the individual. Share with him the simple gospel truths. The scriptures necessary for salvation are really very few—but they are very important. Let your friend know how much Christ and his plan of salvation mean to you. Live so that your life will evidence this fact.

The tract "Six Steps to a New Life" is very helpful in sharing the steps of salvation. May God bless each one as you continue to be an example and a witness to your friend.

Business Administration Department

The Business Administration Department has seen a number of changes during the past year. One change that will enable us to more accurately evaluate costs and benefits of individual programs was the creation of a separate set of financial ledgers and journals for Oregon Bible College. These records, which in the past were combined with those of the General Conference, allow for more detailed presentation of the cost of different activities of the Conference and College. The system was set up in such a way as to allow for a smooth transfer to an automated system, if one becomes necessary in the future.

The arrival of the new hymnal, *Psalms*, *Hymns*, and *Spiritual Songs*, has caused us to utilize a classroom vacated by OBC when it moved to the newly remodeled offices and classrooms. What seemed like a mountain of boxes of hymnals is quickly becoming an organized storeroom as more than 5,000 copies of the hymnal have been sold in less than eight months. This represents about one half of the total printed. We are grateful that a number of churches were able to pick up their hymnal orders at Conference time or during visits to Oregon to save on evertising postage costs.

I am glad to report that the financial position of the Conference is stable and strong. We have assets of nearly one and a half million dollars and liabilities of just under one hundred fifty thousand dollars. Through wills, bequests, trusts, annuities, and special gifts, reserves have been built to provide scholarships for Oregon Bible College students, floan funds for churches, and assistance to mission projects

and other Conference programs.

The General Conference Board of Directors and the staff members appreciate the dedicated financial giving of the membership, churches, and state conferences. Contributions, however, during the first half of the 1980-81 fiscal year have been only 87 percent of those needed during the same period according to the budget adopted at General Conference last August. This has caused us to limit expenditures and to carefully study each program that we have to allow us to meet day-to-day operating expenses. Giving patterns are being studied to allow us to more precisely predict cashflow requirements. Every effort is being made to obtain maximum utilization of each dollar we spend.

It has been a blessing to me to serve as Director of this Department during the past year. It is exciting to see the work of God in the Church of God churches and members. I am eagerly anticipating the plans God has in store for me in the coming months and years.

Publishing Department

God has blessed the Publishing Department with important contributions to the work of the General Conference in this last fiscal year. Briefly, take a look at some specifics to get an idea of what is involved in spreading the gospel through the printed word.

Periodicals head up the main thrust of our day-by-day existence. Ten issues per year of *The Restitution Herald* and the PROGRESS JOURNAL keep us very active writing, editing, and searching for copy. Several outstanding articles produced by interested Church of God writers appeared in

The Herald, plus the regular features written by contributing editors Hollis Partlowe, Carol Daniels, Rachel Carr, Shirley McQuinn, and Edward Goit. General Conference staff members David Krogh, Warren Sorenson, Charles Pryor, Russell Magaw, and Hugh Harman continue to supply copy for reports in the JOURNAL. Our youth magazine, Challenge, published six times a year, provides information to Church of God teens regarding their activities. In its pages this past year the results of a Creative Arts Contest were published. The response from our youth was excellent.

Sunday School curricula comprise a large amount of our expenditure of time and effort. However, without the fine work of many writers and editors, Christian education in the Church of God would suffer greatly. During the year, C. Jesse Pestle and Michael Mattison did excellent work with the adult curriculum, for which they are to be commended. Both resigned from their posts during the year and Scott Ross assumed the editorship of the Adult Quarterly and Adult Teacher's Guide. His staff of 22 writers will continue to expound the Word of God in the finest tradition of Church of God adult material.

Our educational curricula also include quarterlies and teachers' guides for Teens (Russell Magaw, editor), Juniors (Lynne Krogh, editor), Primaries (Ruth Overholser, editor), and Beginners (Sue Hall, editor). The 1981 Vacation Bible School materials—theme, "Jesus, My Special Friend"—were written by Joyce Knapp, Doris Brown, Myra Hamilton, Mary Mickey, Lynette Campbell, Carol Daniels, and Mike Montgomery. Each one of these editors and writers deserves much thanks and appreciation for countless hours spent in producing quality material.

The Publishing Department also handles, in one way or another, all printed matter done for other departments of the General Conference. Mission Builders appeals, advertising materials, order blanks, letterheads, envelopes, and forms are some services maintained on a continuing basis.

In publishing *The Herald* this past year we have offered writers a "Writer's Guide" which provided ideas, goals, and how to's in conjunction with our 1980-81 publishing goal for the magazine. We endeavored to publish ideas, concepts, and stories which Biblically and spiritually encourage the reader so he will rejoice with those who live the Christian life.

Several projects have been completed during the year. A partial list includes:

- The publishing of "Triumph of the Resurrection," a 132-page paperback by Dr. Alva G. Huffer on the important Christian doctrine of the resurrection of Christ. Difficult texts in the subject area are also treated in the book. Initial copies of this book will be available at General Conference.
- Implementation of a new Teen-Age Lessons Truth Seeker's Quarterly, a Teen-Age Teacher's Guide, and a Teen-Age Teacher's Creative Teaching Aid packet. The quarterly is in lesson-size take-home pages and has proven to be an excellent tool for many of our churches.
- Conducting a Creative Arts Contest in the pages of *Challenge* magazine and Teen-Age Lessons Truth Seeker's Quarterly. The response has been gratifying.
- Laying plans for 1982 Vacation Bible School materials centered on the theme, "A Walk Through the Land of Promise."

You will gain insight into the work of the Publishing

Department by taking an imaginary trip with a manuscript for one of our products (an article for The Herald, or a news item for the JOURNAL, or a lesson for one of the quarterlies, etc.) from the raw copy to its final printed form. Here are the steps:

1. The Director of Publishing, in conjunction with the product editor, reads the article and rewrites if necessary. Some copy-fitting preliminaries are done, then the article's style is meshed with photos/graphics used to illustrate it. It is then laid out on "dummy" page(s) and delivered to

2. The office of the Managing Editor. Here a copy editor checks spelling, punctuation, some grammar, and checks Scripture used. Then the Managing Editor does final editing and marking of the manuscript for the typesetter.

3. The typesetter sets the manuscript into type, using the Itek 1200 phototypesetting system. She then develops the

work by sending it through the processor.

4. The typeset copy is returned to the Managing Editor where a proofreader makes two photocopies, reads the work, and notes corrections on one of the photocopies. The typeset copy, one photocopy, and the dummy pages are delivered to

5. The Keyline Art Department. Here skilled hands paste up the art work with the typeset copy onto layout sheets for the printer according to directions from the dummy pages. The complete job is returned to

6. The Managing Editor's office where a proofreader reads all and notes corrections, marking them up for the

7. Typesetter. She sets the corrections and processes

them. Now all the work returns to

- 8. The Keyline Art Department where final corrections are stripped in. The proofreader and the Director of Publishing do final readings, a dummy is made, a purchase order is written for the printer, and the whole job is sent to him.
- 9. The printer shoots the camera-ready copy, strips the resultant line-shot negative onto a flat, screens photos for halftones, strips halftone negatives into windows in the flats, burns negatives onto plates, prints the job, folds, collates, staples, trims, and Conference personnel return the job to Oregon. The mailing department then fills orders for the product.

We continue to solicit your prayers and financial support of the Lord's work through the Publishing Department.

Outreach and Church Development Department

Church Development

Some exciting opportunities in relation to the growth potential of local churches has made 1980-81 a busy and rewarding year in the Outreach and Church Development

Department.

The major emphasis this year has been toward providing assistance to the local church in discovering its growth potential, and working with pastors in growth-oriented leadership. A basic purpose, upon which the activities of the department have been established, is that of assisting churches and individuals to become effective in achieving results in their Christian service. The desired results can best be measured by clearly defined purposes and objectives. Thus local churches have been encouraged to define their statement of purpose and to determine operational goals.

A growth pattern begins with a growth strategy which focuses on the right goal and purpose. This fact has been the springboard for much of the activity this past year and for planning for the future. Visitation trips were made to many churches for the purpose of stimulating them to develop a growth strategy defined by a specific purpose. Consultation clinics were conducted for a few churches.

Four objectives have served as the basis for a ministry to

pastors and local churches:

1. To provide an introduction and overview of church growth principles.

2. To provide opportunity for evaluation of individual

churches.

3. To give assistance in planning for the future.

To give assistance in a goal-setting process.

We are all concerned with results. It is recognized that attitudinal changes precede changes in activities and results. As negative attitudes are replaced with faith attitudes which expect God to work in a positive way, the real purpose of the church comes alive. As unchurched persons are brought to Christ, a new excitement surges through members of a congregation.

While this past year has been one of stimulating a focus on growth with faith that God wants the church to grow, and anticipation that it will be experienced, we must also look to

our intentions for the future.

Our expectations for this coming year include:

- 1. Providing consultation services to pastors and churches for an extended period of time. We realize that lessons and seminars share information, but it is by the implementation of plans that results are achieved. It is invalid to expect that the presentation of information will result in growth of the local church. Information is the first phase. Working with a pastor and local church through steps of implementation is the action phase.
- 2. To continue gathering statistics and information regarding each local church in the process of developing an accurate picture of each church. An on-site evaluation will be an important step in achieving this objective. Through a clear understanding of the specific and unique situation of each church, recommendations toward growth can be determined.
- 3. To assist local congregations in defining their statement of purpose and developing an effective ministry to accomplish this. The local church can more clearly understand its ministry needs as it understands its purpose.
- 4. To offer direction in determining operational objectives by which the church can more clearly define and plan for an effective ministry. These operational objectives are to be based upon the church's understanding of its purpose.
- 5. To offer assistance to the local church in a process of increasing the involvement of its members in the work of the church's ministry. The mobilization of the lay members of the congregation is vital for a growing church.
- 6. To offer assistance to a local congregation gaining an understanding of the community and the church's location potential. The community in which the

church exists is an important factor which affects growth potential. By working with a local church in this area, the congregation can become aware of its ministry potential in its present location.

- 7. We are in the process of developing a strategy for church planting. In addition to the development of existing churches, it is imperative that we embark upon a program of starting new churches. As this develops we are expecting opportunities and resource persons to emerge in various regions and conferences.
- 8. We are planning to develop a system of small group ministry opportunities which can be used in local churches. This will probably be ready for implementation following General Conference of 1982.

Our overall philosophy regarding the ministry of the local church is as follows: The Word of God provides the message which is proclaimed through the ministry of the local church. The conversion to Christ and baptism in Christ is the goal desired as a result of this ministry. The ultimate goal is that these persons will experience the gathering of those in Christ at his return and share in immortal life in the kingdom of God. Anything less is unworthy of the true church.

Foreign Missions

In relation to our Foreign Missions program, we have employed Steve Grant as an in-training part-time missions consultant. His responsibilities include giving assistance in missions awareness and education in the local church and assisting in the recruitment of missionary candidates. He will also aid in developing a process of training for these persons.

It is our philosophy that we must send missionaries from our home base that we might develop a more effective foreign missions ministry.

Present mission fields:

India. We are supporting three missionaries in India. Of major concern this year has been an internal dispute regarding control of the church building. Brother Noel has been recognized as the official pastor and the efforts of the congregation can now be turned to reaching people for Christ.

Ghana. A recent report from Brother Amani shows that he has had 32 baptisms since last October, bringing his membership to 413. He has 22 house churches and two chapels. One of these house churches is in Togo.

Nigeria. We are financially supporting four mission workers in this country. In addition we have another Church of God of around 600 members. While we are not providing financial support for Pastor Adum, we are sending literature to be used. We are in the process of assisting our Nigerian pastors in becoming ordained and having the churches officially registered with the government (a necessity in their country).

Philippine Islands. We are supporting eight workers. We have had communications from other pastors there inquiring about the Church of God.

Australia. A Bible study group has started using Systematic Theology as a study text. It is the intention of the leaders to start a Church of God.

Youth Work

In addition to the work being done by Hugh Harman as parttime youth ministries coordinator, Eugene Stilson has been leading youth ministry studies involving General Conference and Oregon Bible College staff members. These studies place emphasis on looking at youth culture and an appropriate ministry to our young people.

Youth-related programs sponsored by the Berean Youth Fellowship include the following: International Berean Youth Conference, Post-High Midwinter Retreat, and the Senior Berean Youth Caravan. Participation is also encouraged in the "Dollar-a-Month Club" and the "Coins for Christ Crusade" which are both fund-raising activities. The annual "Youth Week" competition is promoted to encourage participation of our young people in the activities of their local churches. One publication, *Challenge*, continues to serve as the source of communication to the youth of the Church of God. The information which follows concerns these programs for the year 1980-1981.

International Berean Youth Conference was again held at Camp Alexander Mack, near Milford, Indiana, on July 12-19, 1980. It proved to be quite a rewarding experience for those who attended. Again two separate programs were conducted on the same facility, one oriented toward the high school student and the other toward the post-high. Bro. Jim Graham directed the high school program while Bro. Don Needham directed the post-high program.

Attendance was good at both camps, with 169 attending at the high school and 87 attending at the post-high. These young people represented 14 states and conferences. Staff to supervise and carry out the extensive planned program of activities numbered 41, for a grand total of 297 in attendance.

Highlights of the week were many but none overshadowed the thrill of seeing eleven young people turn their lives over to Jesus on "Decision Night." Second in line would have to be watching the young people display their Godgiven abilities on "Talent Night." It is truly a sight to see.

The annual Post-High Midwinter Retreat was held this year on January 2-4, 1981 at Look-Up-Lodge, a facility which is located near Greenville, South Carolina. Thirty-six young people were in attendance at this event. A staff of four carried out the planned activities and a positive experience was reported by those who attended. Tentative arrangements have been made to use the same facility for the 1982 retreat.

The newly reinstated Senior Berean Youth Caravan proved to be a highly successful program. Nine young people, selected from some 27 applicants, and their two sponsors toured seven states and presented a musically oriented program to 10 churches.

Programs were presented in Illinois, Arkansas, Louisiana, South Carolina, Virginia, Washington, DC, and Ohio. The caravan was also given the opportunity to present part of their program at one evening service during General Conference. Based on its being so well received, another caravan will be sent out this year.

The fund-raising programs sponsored by the BYF are all still in progress, so no figures are available. However, it can be reported that the young people, through their efforts in these two programs, contributed approximately \$6000 during the 1979-80 year.

We truly thank all of you people who have so diligently supported the youth work through your time and efforts, and we truly thank God for the numerous blessings experienced during this past year.

Oregon Bible College

The 1980-81 school year has been a year of transition in administration and physical plant. Dr. Charles Pryor began his work as President of the College in July, 1980. In November, 1980, the Golden Rule Building was reopened after a complete renovation. It now serves as administration center and classroom building, including an audiovisual laboratory. The centralized campus has proven to be a blessing as the College continues to prepare Christian workers for the Lord's service.

College operations moved into the new campus center on Tuesday, November 4, 1980. A service of dedication held on November 18 was attended by over 150 local

persons and out-of-town guests.

Bobby Lee Partain of Pelzer, South Carolina, completed an internship in Phoenix, Arizona, with James Graham serving as his cooperating pastor. Charles Durham, also of Pelzer, South Carolina, completed an internship in Rockford, Illinois, with Sydney Kirkpatrick serving as cooperating pastor.

Dallas and Nancy Demmitt of Phoenix, Arizona, led a Christian Emphasis Week in early November. The concepts and communications skills developed during that week are evident in many ongoing campus activities. The week also brought spiritual renewal and strengthened working relationships among members of the College and Conference staffs.

The Alumni Association adopted the project of outfitting the conference room in the administration center. Funds are still being received in support of that effort. Alumni have also taken a more active part in recruitment efforts.

Approximately 55 persons attended two Junior-Senior Weekends to become better acquainted with OBC. Persons interested in attending College here are welcome to visit the campus during those special designated times or by contacting the Director of Admissions to arrange for a visit.

The officers of the Student Government for the year were: Gary Burnham, President; Tracy Chapman, Vice President; Debra Fletcher, Secretary, Kevin Demmitt, Treasurer. The *Maranatha* staff consisted of: Brian Atra, editor;

Tracy Chapman and Blair Johnson, co-editors.

Presently, the College Administration is developing a comprehensive financial aid program to provide assistance throughout the school year. During the months ahead, both current providers and prospective providers of financial aid and scholarships will be contacted to review criteria for awarding funds. Persons, churches, and/or conferences interested in providing ongoing student financial assistance funds should contact Dr. Charles Pryor.

Forty students were enrolled for the fall semester and 38 for the spring, 1981, period. Twenty-two churches are represented by the student body. Eight seniors graduated on May 8: Darlene Burkhart, Deborah Cook, R. Joe Good, Cynthia Isenhoff, Karen Mitchell, Cecil Rademachir, Daniel Shaw, and Vickie Wyrick. New internship assignments after graduation include: Darlene Burkhart at Lawrenceville, Ohio, with Pastor James Ritch and members of the Christian Education Committee; R. Joe Good at North Hills, Ohio,

with Pastor Joseph Duncan and Russell Dickerson; Karen Mitchell at Columbia Station, Ohio, with Pastor Steve Taylor and Mrs. Doris Brown; Cecil Rademachir at Dixon, Illinois, with Pastor Eugene Stilson; Daniel Shaw at Blanchard, Michigan, with Pastor Donald Needham.

The continuing support of the Church of God membership is a necessary part of Oregon Bible College's success and is appreciated, as are the direction and support pro-

vided by the Board of Trustees.

General Services

In addition to the work of each of the Departments mentioned above, the staff of the General Conference performs services for local churches and individual members such as the following:

1. Correspondence with churches or individuals who have questions regarding doctrine, spiritual matters, or

methods of carrying on the Lord's work.

2. Preaching for special meetings, dedications, state conferences, churches without pastors, or when a local pastor is ill or on vacation.

3. Administration of life and health insurance program for

Church of God pastors and their families.

Provide personnel for the maintenance of the retirement association for pastors.

5. Assistance to churches who are seeking pastors, and

pastors who are searching for churches.

6. Communication with agencies and individuals who desire information regarding the Church of God.

7. Assistance and counsel for individuals in estate planning and deferred investments through annuities,

trusts, and life insurance.

Our staff is happy to serve in any way that will further the work of local churches, and which will help individual members in the performance of their ministry. Requests for assistance can be directed to the Executive Director or to Department heads.

Looking to the Future

I believe that the Church of God has a heritage of which we can be justifiably proud. Church of God people have been diligent in studying the Scriptures, and for more than 150 years we have staunchly upheld the truths of the Scriptures. We are living in a day when orthodox churches are turning to many of the truths which we have emphasized for years. The second coming of Christ is widely believed; conditional immortality is becoming more widely accepted; and even the nature of Jesus as clearly taught in Scripture is understood by many people. We of the Bible Church of God stand in an enviable position today, with a solid foundation on the Bible, a proud history, and a bright future.

As we look ahead, there are several things which I believe

the Church of God must give attention to:

1. Rethinking, renewal, and revitalization. As churches and individuals, we need to rethink our attitudes and responses to those who are lost. We need to change from thinking about what will make us comfortable in the church, to what will meet the needs of those who are lost. There is an urgent need for many members to exhibit greater dedication and commitment to God and to the Lord Jesus. And our churches need to be injected with new life. Services and programs must be vibrant, exciting, and need-fulfilling.

churches needs to have its health checked, diagnosed, and a prescription written as necessary. It would be beneficial for each of our churches to have clearly written goals and effective progams that would achieve the goals.

3. Planting of new churches. The Church of God must not limit its witness to communities where our churches now exist. Countless opportunities exist to plant churches, and we must pray, plan, and proceed to accomplish the task.

4. Individual initiative. God has given to each member of the body of Christ abilities which are to be used in ministry for him. It is only as each member of the body functions that

God can be glorified and his will accomplished.

5. Consecrated pragmatism. We need to get in the habit of evaluating the results of our efforts. Once we know our purpose, we need to evaluate everything we do in terms of that purpose. Things that are not contributing toward reaching our goals should be eliminated. Strategies must be found that will give us the results we are trying to achieve. We cannot afford to waste precious resources on things that are unproductive. Our pragmatism must be based on our understanding of what God wants us to do.

6. Attitude of optimism and faith. God is able "to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think" by working through us. (Eph. 3:20.) God is committed to building the church of his Son and, as we look to the future, we must do so with confidence that God will bless our

ettorts.

We sincerely appreciate the prayers, suggestions, and financial support which hundreds of Church of God members offer regularly. The combined efforts of many individuals is a powerful force in the Lord's service.

MINISTERS VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION

The Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association was organized at the 1968 General Conference, and ministers and churches who enrolled in the association began making contributions January 1, 1969. The Association started with no funds. Today the total assets are nearly \$180,000.

Eleven ministers and one minister's widow are now receiving retirement benefits from the association. This is a very real blessing to our ministry when they come to retirement age. Often their social security benefits are not large and the retirement check is a fine supplement.

The funds of the association are invested and supervised by the expertise of the Aetna Life Insurance Company. The Association is on a sound financial basis and will remain strong as the young men entering the ministry enroll and become active participants when they enter a pastorate.

The Board of Trustees is working on a number of proposals which will be presented to the membership at the next Bi-Annual meeting in August, 1982. One of these proposals, if passed, will increase the benefits, especially for the younger members when they reach retirement age. Other proposals will strengthen and broaden the association as a whole. The membership will be notified of these proposals at least six months before the meeting.

The Rules and Regulations of the association provides for a Board of Trustees. The Chairman shall be a minister appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. The Executive Director of the General Conference is automatically the Secretary-Treasurer. The membership of the association elects a Vice-Chairman. Bro. Clyde E. Randall has been Chairman of the Association since it began, but last August chose not to be reappointed to that office.

The Board of Trustees does encourage contributions and bequests to further strengthen the fund.

COUNSELING AND ARBITRATION BOARD

The services of the Board of Counseling and Arbitration have not been called upon this year. Since the government of our churches is congregational in form, and the Board being an agency of the General Conference and empowered only to act and serve "at the call of the church which may be having serious internal difficulties," the Board is limited in its work. Further, the Board as a neutral party after hearing both sides can only "suggest a solution."

The counseling work of the Board before problems develop to a crisis stage has not been used; although when the Board was first set up, it was authorized to "provide counseling for pastors and elders seeking guidance in solving church problems." If the Board had been empowered to bring about solutions to vexing situations before they developed to divisive proportions, several churches and pastors would have been spared the unhappy and unfortunate experiences that followed.

A committee was appointed by the Board of Directors to study ways of making this Board more effective. A recommendation regarding changes in this Board is contained in

this issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL.

MINISTERS' FUND

This fund is supported solely by contributions from the membership and churches. During the year a special gift was given to this fund in memory of the parents of Louise Delap Hearp. As of March 31, 1981, the fund balance was \$2,491.49.

Recommendations

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER ONE

We recommend that the present standards for the administration of the Mission Builders Assistance Program be replaced by the following standards:

Organization

A. The congregation requesting the assistance must be organized with a Board of Officers and Trustees for church property. Where necessary, the congregation must be incorporated to own church property.

B. Churches receiving Mission Builders League assistance must be member churches of the Church of

God General Conference.

Leadership

A. The congregation should have a full-time or nearly full-time pastor who has been licensed or ordained by the General Conference.

Consideration will be given in the event the pastor is

in the process of being licensed.

B. The congregation should have qualified spiritual leaders who have a vision for the growth and expansion of the church.

III. Stability

> A. The congreation should have a record of doctrinal and spiritual stability proved by a period of time in which services are conducted regularly and with reasonably consistent attendance.

> B. The doctrinal standards of the congregation must be in accord with those listed in the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference (headquarters

at Oregon, Illinois.) Article 1, Section 2.

Property

A. The congregation should own a building site and have a building fund, unless buying an established facility.

- B. The congregation should have the approval of the State Conference with which it is associated.
- C. In the event the recipient church should cease operations, the funds received from Mission Builders should be returned to the General Conference.

Location

A. The location should be one where there is potential

for growth and expansion.

B. Changes taking place in the area should reflect trends which indicate a positive future for the church.

VI. Building

- A. The congregation should have building plans that are in accord with local zoning laws, that are within the financial possibility of the group that will provide an adequate and attractive building; and that have been approved by the Board of Trustees of the congregation.
- B. Building plans should reflect a vision for growth and provide for increased membership and attendance.

VII. **Finances**

- A. The total cost of the building project should require, from the congregation, at least matching funds of the expected proceeds from the Mission Builders Appeal. (Special consideration will be given to a new church which would be considered a "Mission Church.")
- B. The financial stability of the congregation should be such as to be able to properly complete and maintain the property.

VIII. Purpose

> A. The congregation should agree in purpose and in spirit with the Church of God General Conference.

B. The congregation should demonstrate an active zeal for growth by consistent community outreach.

IX. Priority

A. Mission Builders assistance will be used primarily for these congregations

1. buying or constructing church buildings which

have not owned a building previously.

which are meeting in a building of their own that is not specifically suitable for worship and are buying or constructing church buildings.

relocating to a more desirable site.

B. Mission Builders assistance will be used secondarily for congregations

1. which are remodeling, repairing, or enlarging

their present building.

which have outgrown their present facilities and are buying or rebuilding.

(The order in which listing appears does not

necessarily indicate priority.)

- C. In event that no church request is approved for Mission Builders League assistance, the Appeal will be used for capital expenditures for the Church of God General Conference and/or Oregon Bible College. At the time the Appeal is mailed, a full explanation of how the funds will be used will be included.
- X. On-site Review

A. An on-site review will be conducted by a qualified person or persons to evaluate the church in relation to the above conditions.

B. Personal interview with the pastor shall be conducted by the person or persons making the on-site

review.

XI. General Conference Support

A. The congregation should promote membership in the Mission Builders assistance program.

B. The congregation should be supportive of the General Conference in contributions, attitude, and prayers.

Explanation:

These proposed changes in the standards will bring this valuable program more into line with the strategy and philosophy of the Outreach and Church Development Department which currently administers the Mission Builders League.

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER TWO

We recommend that both the pastoral aid and special church aid programs be replaced with a Church Development Assistance Program which would be administered through the Department of Outreach and Church Development as follows:

Purpose:

The purpose of the Church Development Assistance Program of the Church of God General Conference is to provide financial assistance, consultation, and training where needed, to churches which are unable to support a full-time ministry. It is the intention that the recipient church grow and become self-supporting.

Amount of Financial Assistance:

Financial assistance would be given up to a maximum of

one half of the salary cost of a full-time pastor—not to exceed \$500 (this ceiling may be adjusted in relation to cost of living increases) for a period of three years.

The specific amount will be determined in accordance with the church's financial base and current living costs. The

amount granted will be reviewed each year.

Consultation and Training:

The Department of Outreach and Church Development will be available to assist the church with consultation and on-site assistance as deemed necessary. The recipient church is expected to cooperate with the General Conference Outreach and Church Development Department.

Procedure for Granting Financial Assistance:

Application for Church Development aid would be made through the Outreach and Church Development Department of the Church of God General Conference. A thorough investigation will be made and each application considered on its own merits. The Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference will make final approval for Church Development assistance. Assistance will be granted to churches on the basis of need and growth potential.

The number of churches eligible will be determined by budget allocations for this financial assistance, with provision made for additional churches which have a significant opportunity and growth potential as funds are available. All other conditions being equal, financial assistance will be granted to churches in the order in which applications are

received.

Conditions to Be Considered in Granting Church Development Financial Assistance:

1) The church must be affiliated with the Church of God General Conference and have sufficient lay leadership to give the church a reasonable amount of stability.

The church should agree in purpose and spirit with the Church of God General Conference.

3) The pastor must be a licensed minister, recognized by the Church of God General Conference, who will develop the church he serves to be an active, participating member church in the Church of God General Conference. He shall have demonstrated a spirit of cooperation and unity and a quality of leadership which includes the growth and development of the local church.

4) The location of the church should be one where there is reasonable potential for growth and expansion.

5) The congregation should demonstrate an active zeal for growth by consistent community outreach. The church and the pastor must have and implement programs of evangelism.

6) The spiritual conditions of the congregation shall be such that growth can be expected. A history of internal difficulties is an indication of a lack of spirituality and

may be a growth-restricting obstacle.

7) The pastor will be expected to give full time to the ministry of the development of the local church and

programs of evangelism.

8) The membership of the church receiving Church Development assistance would be expected to support the pastor, to cooperate with the outreach programs of the church and pastor, and make effort to witness and

evangelize to assist in the church-growth program.

9) Reporting: The pastor of the recipient church will make a monthly report to the Department of Outreach and Church Development of the Church of God General Conference. He will keep in communication with the Director of Outreach and Church Development.

- 10) Review: A review will be made near the end of the first year of receiving aid. During this review, the Director of Outreach and Church Development will consult with the pastor, the church board, and congregation as deemed necessary relative to the development of the church. If it is apparent that there is a lack of cooperation within the church or on the part of the pastor relative to the purpose and intention of the development program, counsel will be given. Failure to improve may result in discontinuing the financial assistance.
- 11) The church receiving Development Aid would be expected to return one-tenth of its total income to the General Conference, its state-district conference, or both, as a tithe unto the Lord, thereby making a covenant with the Lord to cause all endeavors of the church to be blessed beyond measure. (Mal. 3:10.)

12) The Church Development Assistance Program will go into effect September 1, 1981.

Explanation:

This recommendation is being made in keeping with:

1. An emphasis on a balanced ministry of edifying the believers, evangelism and church growth, and worship and faithfulness to God.

2. The purpose of the General Conference is stated in the Constitution: "The purpose for which the Church of God General Conference is incorporated is to assist Church of God members, churches, and conferences to perform their commission to feed the Church of God and preach the gospel to all the world, by providing trained personnel, services, and materials."

3. The local congregation, at home and abroad, is where Church of God members are fed and matured, and it is the place where most people are brought to Christ and his salvation. The responsibility for evangelism and church growth is primarily upon the local congregation.

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER THREE

We recommend that *The Restitution Herald* be returned to a subscription basis beginning in January, 1982, and that a charge be made for tracts.

Explanation:

The free literature campaign was started by action of the delegates at the August, 1972, General Conference. Since that time, hundreds of thousands of *Heralds* and tracts have been distributed without charge to those who received them. We have spent in excess of \$225,000 for the literature campaign.

In considering the mission of *The Herald*, we believe it continues to be a valuable tool in building up our membership. *The Herald* also is an attractive tool to be used in making people aware of the Church of God and its message, when it is accompanied by personal contact.

However, as a tool of mass evangelism, it is apparent that other methods are more effective.

Therefore, if this recommendation is approved by the delegates, a subscription campaign will begin this fall and the December-January *Herald* will be the last one sent without charge. Beginning with the February, 1982, issue a regular one-year's subscription will cost \$8.00. More than three *Heralds* sent to one address for use in *Herald* racks and other distribution will be \$4.00 each for a one-year's subscription.

Tracts will cost \$1.00 per 100, beginning January 1,

1982.

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER FOUR

We recommend that the Board of Counseling and Arbitration be dissolved and that it be replaced with a Christian Conciliation Board.

This Board will be staffed by three members appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference, consisting of one pastor and two lay persons. When this recommendation is fully operational, the members will be appointed for a six-year term, with an appointment being made every two years. A chairman will be selected by the Board of Directors. The Board will normally make the appointment at its spring meeting, with the appointee assuming his position the following September 1. Appointees will be selected on the basis of their spiritual qualifications and their ability to work well with people. The spiritual gifts of wisdom, exhortation, discernment, and a manifestation of the fruit of the Spirit will be especially important.

If a member cannot serve because of illness, conflict of interest, or other reason, the two remaining members and the Executive Director will select an alternate to serve

temporarily.

Expenses of the Board will be paid by the General Conference. It is recommended that the local church contribute to the expenses of the Board when possible.

Services:

- I. The Christian Conciliation Board will provide educational materials which will: encourage Christians to use the three-step process for reconciling disputes explained by Jesus in Matthew 18:15-17; clearly explain the services of the Christian Conciliation Board and encourage the use of this Board before problems become irreconcilable.
- II. The Christian Conciliation Board will present seminars to pastors and lay members, explaining the means of resolving disputes by using the three-step Biblical process, and the services of mediation and arbitration.
- III. Members of the Christian Conciliation Board will be available as individuals for consultation over the phone. Persons interested in receiving help in dealing with difficult church situations can receive help without calling in the whole Board.
- IV. In specific disputes involving a church which is having internal difficulties, the Christian Conciliation Board will follow a standard operating procedure which has been approved by the Board of Directors.

Explanation:

This recommendation helps to clarify and expand the guidelines which were adopted when the Board of Counseling and Arbitration was created at the 1961 General Conference.

Additional Conference Information

Site: The 1981 Church of God General Conference will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, August 3-7. Rockford College is located on East State Street (U.S.

Highway Business 20).

If one is traveling on Interstate 90 he would take the Rockford Exit, which is marked "Business 20" and "State Street" (the Henrici Clock Tower Inn is on the East side of the interstate at the interchange.) One would travel from the interstate west on State Street about 3 miles. One would pass a large Ward's Store, St. Anthony Hospital, and next is Rockford College on the right. There is a large sign at the entrance.

If one is coming in from the south or west, he would come on bypass highway 20, which goes around the city of Rockford on the south side. At the Alpine interchange (on the southeast side of Rockford) one would go north on Alpine for about three miles to the intersection of State Street. Turn right (east) on State Street about one half mile

and Rockford College will be on the left.

If one is flying to the General Conference, he can come into O'Hare Field in Chicago. There is a shuttle bus leaving O'Hare every hour (on the half hour) which comes directly to Rockford. The bus can be boarded on the lower level in front of Carson's Circle Restaurant. This is located between United and American Airlines. One would get off the bus at the Sweden House (the second stop) in Rockford. A Conference vehicle will meet each bus from O'Hare at Sweden House on Monday, August 3 (registration day) from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Other arrivals will be met if we are notified. There are a few flights that come directly to Rockford Airport. We will make arrangements for transportation from the Rockford Airport if we are notified of arrival data.

Registration: Registration begins on August 3, at 9:30 a.m. in Burpee Center. At the end of the main entrance to Rockford College is a parking lot marked "A." Please leave your car in parking lot "A" and walk across the street to Burpee Center for registration. At registration your housing assignment will be made. You will then move your automobile to the parking lot assigned for the dormitory in which you will be located.

Reservations and Conference Costs: Reservations for General Conference must be made prior to July 25. Registration forms are available in each local church. Isolated members may write to: Reservations, Box 100,

Oregon, IL 61061 for the reservation forms.

The cost of the Conference this year is Adults (over 12 years of age) \$65; Children (4-12) \$55; Children under 4 years if college bed is used \$15; commuters \$12. There is a \$10 nonrefundable deposit required with each application. These costs include room, board, use of the grounds and buildings, insurance, recreation facilities, bed linens, blanket, pillow, and towel.

The \$12 per person for commuters is for those staying off campus and commuting to the meetings. This charge is for the use of the facilities, insurance, and miscellaneous costs. Should the commuter wish to take the meals, a total cost for the Conference would be \$40 for each individual 4 years and older. There is no charge for those under 3 years. There

is no charge for one attending the evening services only.

Youth: Youth must be accompanied to the Conference by a parent or a responsible guardian. A full schedule of activities is planned for the youth. (See program in this issue.) All youth attending the Conference will be expected to attend all of the planned services and activities.


Children's Classes: A full schedule of activities is planned for all children 8 years and under (See program in this issue.)

Hired sitters are being provided to attend the children 2 years and under.

Junior Church will be conducted each evening at 7:00 p.m. for those 3 to 12 years of age.

Gymnasium and Pool: The gymnasium and pool will be open each evening from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. Anyone who plans to use the gym must bring gym shoes and proper gym clothing. Anyone planning to use the pool must bring bathing suit (bikinis not allowed) and girls or fellows with longer hair must have a bathing cap.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year delegates from the various churches and Conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel of those from far away and those who live nearby. Delegate Expense Pool forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary and each is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation.



ELECTIONS DURING GENERAL CONFERENCE

Board of Directors: Two members will be elected to the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors for four-year terms. These Directors also serve as Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College. The terms of Harold Doan and Dwaine Demmitt expire at this Conference (these cannot be reelected).

This information is given so churches and State Conferences can instruct their delegates to be prepared to make nominations. Proposed nominees for any of these offices should be contacted beforehand to be sure they will serve if elected and to be sure they are free and able to attend the meetings of this important Board.

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of the General Conference met in Oregon April 30 and May 1 to discuss the work of the Conference and Oregon Bible College. Among the items discussed were the following:

1. The Annual Report of the Conference was discussed and approved. This report is printed in this issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL.

2. Pastor David Cheatwood was appointed to the Board of License and Ordination to replace Pastor Kenneth Milne, whose term expired. Our thanks is extended to Bro. Milne for his many years of service on

this important Board.

3. A special committee was appointed to study the matter of License and Ordination. The study will include a thorough study of the Bible teaching in this area, as well as the role that the General Conference should play in licensing and ordaining ministers. Pastor James Graham will be the chairman of this study committee.

4. Four Recommendations were approved which will be presented to the delegates in August for

consideration. See page 8.

5. A salary schedule for 1981-82 was approved.

- 6. A proposed budget for 1981-82 was approved. This budget will be printed in the July/August JOUR-NAL and it will be discussed by the delegates in August.
 - 7. Personnel matters were reviewed.
- 8. Other miscellaneous items of business were discussed.

General Conference Delegate Expense Pool

Expenses for delegate travel expenses to the summer Conference will be pooled again this year. I would urge each church and Conference near and far to participate, in order to equalize expenses for delegates from all Churches of God. By action of the delegates at the 1980 Conference, a new means of figuring the mileage rate will go into effect this summer. The rate will be determined by taking the average price of gasoline per gallon and dividing it by 10 and rounding it off to the nearest penny. The rate for this year has been set at 14¢.

Application forms for participation in the pool have been mailed to all secretaries, along with delegate forms and statistical forms. Secretaries are urged to complete these forms and return them promptly in the envelope provided.

Conference Reservations

Reservation forms are being received for the summer Conference. Each person planning to attend

Conference should complete a reservation form and send it along with a \$10 nonrefundable deposit fee to Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061. Forms have been sent to each church. Reservations must be received by July 25.

Financial Need

Youth contributions to the Church of God General Conference make it possible for many important ministries to be carried on regularly. As I write this page today, Bro. Warren Sorenson is meeting with ministers in Ohio to encourage them and assist them in their church ministries. Work is being done in the Publishing Department on Sunday School quarterlies and the paste-up of Dr. Alva Huffer's new book, "The Triumph of the Resurrection." The instructors and staff of Oregon Bible College are preparing final grades for the second semester and they are beginning to make plans for the fall semester. Missionaries whom we support are spreading the gospel in their native lands. And Steve Grant is preparing for work in missions.

These programs and projects are only a few of the activities that are made possible by the support of hundreds of Church of God people. Without contributions these things could not be accomplished.

As you can see in the chart below, contributions for the past 30 days have again been far short of our needs. In looking back at the records for last year, I observed that our deficit was over \$26,000 at this point in 1980. You responded to the need a year ago, and I have confidence that you will respond again this year and help us repay the loan that has been necessary to pay our bills.

Berean Youth Conference Class Descriptions

Each year we have numerous requests from young people and parents alike concerning the content of the classes to be taught at International Berean Youth Conference. The following are short descriptions of each class.

"Upstream Christian in a Downstream World"

What is right to do and what is wrong. Our world changes daily in its ethic of right and wrong. This is a study of the criteria of right and wrong. "COG-Log"





I am happy to announce that during the next fiscal year, Brother Hugh Harman's duties have been increased in the area of Youth Ministries. Hugh has been Director of Youth since 1974; however, since 1978 he has served in a limited part-time position. During the summer of 1982, Hugh will begin conducting training seminars for youth workers, and he will be available to visit churches to provide on-site assistance in developing local youth programs. Hugh and his family will continue to reside in Arizona.

We are pleased that Hugh has agreed to become more involved in assisting our churches in the important area of youth work. Hugh's availability to the churches is an important step forward in our efforts to assist local churches in their work for the Lord.

Triumph of the Resurrection

I am glad to report that final work is being done on the publication of Dr. Alva Huffer's new book, "Triumph of the Resurrection." Copies will be available at General Conference next month for \$4.95. If you are ordering by mail, postage and handling will be paid by us through August 10. Orders received after August 10 will require a 50 cents postage and handling payment. Dr. Huffer will be at Conference and will be available to autograph copies of his book.

August Conference

In preparation for the annual Conference which will be held August 3-7 at Rockford College, I would encourage the entire membership to pray earnestly for the Conference. Two members will be elected to the Board of Directors, four Recommendations will be considered, a budget for 1981-82 will be adopted, and other business will come before the delegates. Please pray that an attitude of submission and obedience to the will of God will prevail among the delegates. Pray too, that the theme of the Conference, "You Are the Church," will be clearly communicated and that it will cause renewed commitment and involvement of all Church of God members.

1981-82 Budget Proposal

The proposed budget for the coming year appears in this issue. The proposed increases in the budget reflect several major steps forward for the work of the Conference:

- 1. Funding for church planting efforts.
- 2. Distribution of additional special church aid funds.
- 3. The addition of Steve Grant as a missions employee beginning in January, 1982.

- 4. The employment of a full-time librarian, Janet Stilson, to replace our part-time librarian, Olive Stoffregen, who has retired.
- 5. Additional employment and travel expenses for our Youth Coordinator, Hugh Harman.

In addition to these increases, salary increases averaging about 8% have been provided for present employees, and an inflation adjustment has been made for most items in the budget.

The staff has cut many operating expenses in order to make it possible to move ahead in several new areas. We believe that the programs and activities which the budget will make possible will provide necessary services to our members and churches. Our programs are designed to strengthen and build up our local congregations.

The proposed budget will require nearly \$36,000 in additional contributions over this year's budget. This reflects a 10% increase in needed giving.

Present Giving Needs

Giving from May 10 to June 9 was much improved over the previous 30-day period; however, we still have substantial needs. With the fiscal year ending on September 30, it is imperative that additional contributions be received during the summer months to make up our current deficit. If you are one of the 2,500 Church of God families which have not yet given to the work of the General Conference this year, I would invite you to send your gift today. For all of you who have remembered our work this year, we extend our special thanks for your help.

Conference Finances

We extend special appreciation to the many individuals who responded to the membership mailing requesting contributions to meet our current deficit. However, giving from June 10 to August 9 was short of our goal by over \$10,000. This has increased our deficit for this fiscal year to over \$37,000. Your contribution is needed NOW to help support our missionaries, to provide pastoral aid to several churches, to make it possible for Oregon Bible College to begin the fall semester, and to provide the free literature which will be mailed during the next four months. I must ask each of you to pray about this Conference need and then determine what you are able to do to help.

1981 General Conference

The 61st Annual Church of God General Conference was held at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, August 3-7. The Conference theme, "You Are the Church," was clearly communicated by each speaker and teacher. There were over 500 persons present for one or more sessions during the week. There were 161 voting delegates compared to 160 at the 1980 Conference.

The new Board members elected were: William Burnham from the Columbia Church at Columbia Station, Ohio, and Dallas Demmitt from the Lakeview Bible Church in Scottsdale, Arizona. We wish to thank Bro. Harold Doan and Bro. Dwaine Demmitt, retiring Board members, for their years of faithful service on the Board of Directors.

The seven directors elect their own officers. For the next Conference year the officers are: Joe James, Chairman; John Hearp, Vice-Chairman; Shirley Urish, Secretary; Bill Burnham, Treasurer; and Dallas Demmitt, James Graham, and Maurice Robinson, Jr., Directors.

The four recommendations printed in the June PROGRESS JOURNAL were adopted with several amendments by the delegates. A budget

was approved that will require \$406,625 in contributions during the next fiscal year which begins October 1.

The minutes of the 1981 General Conference and the 1981-82 Budget will be published in the October issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL.

As a part of the Wednesday evening service, two ministerial candidates received their licenses from the License and Ordination Board. The two candidates were Bro. Charles Durham and Bro. Bobby Lee Partain. Both young men are from the Guthrie Grove Church in South Carolina, and both recently completed their internship programs. Bro. Durham is serving as pastor of the Greenville, SC, Church, and Bro. Partain is pastor of the Church of the Open Bible in Pomona, CA. Our prayers are with these two dedicated young men and their wives as they begin their pastoral ministry.

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors of the General Conference met each day during Conference at Rockford College. In addition to dealing with business matters being discussed by the delegates, the Board appointed the 1982 General Conference Program Committee. The members will be the Conference Executive Council consisting of David McClain, Russell Magaw, Warren Sorenson, Charles Pryor, and David Krogh; Shirley Urish, and Pastor Sydney Kirkpatrick.

The Board set its next regular meeting for November 9 and 10 at Oregon, Illinois. Any items of business that should be brought to the attention of the Board should be presented to the Executive Director or one of the Board members prior to that date.

Greetings From the President

Just one year ago I wrote about the parallels between my move to Oregon, Illinois, and Jonah's eventful journey to Nineveh. Now as school begins for the forty-third term, enrollment has dropped from the low 40's to the mid-30's. Exact information will be provided next month since enrollment was not complete at press time. The campus is filled with the sounds of workers and staff busily putting the finishing touches on buildings, course outlines, and schedules. Cool nights and bright, dry days signal the coming of autumn.

This autumn finds Oregon Bible College on the threshold of exciting but crucial times. As the American economy continues its inflationary trend, Oregon Bible College costs esculate proportionately. A decrease in enrollment diminishes the efficiency of operation, thus raising per-capita costs at a disproportionate rate. Many of the operating expenses are fixed costs—costs that would not change significantly until enrollment exceeded 60 plus. The solution is increased enrollment—increased demonstration of confidence in Oregon Bible College.

A Bible college should be on the growing edge, providing leadership training for the churches. OBC is in such a position. This year we have seven persons in internships. Karen Mitchell and Darlene Burkhart are pioneering internships in Christian Education Ministry. Ministers are beginning to take advantage of continuing education opportunities by taking courses such as audiovisual methods, counseling, and advanced Christian Education.

At their recent annual meeting the members of the Alumni Association expressed a renewed awareness of their responsibility to recruit and to encourage students to attend the Bible College. Such awareness must be followed by positive action. To assist alumni efforts in recruitment, College personnel and/or student representatives are available to meet potential students at state conferences, local churches, or at central locations where a meeting might be set up with two or more churches participating.

As Christians continue to monitor world events, the truth contained in the following statement becomes an ever-nearer reality:

"The day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up" (2 Peter 3:10).

News From Nigeria

Mrs. Virginia Blair recently spent a week in Oregon, IL, sharing with us her impressions of our mission work in Nigeria. An automobile accident a few years ago resulted in permanent injury to her leg and hip. She refuses to allow this handicap to deter her from actively working in missions.

She has made two extended visits to our churches in Nigeria, during which time she worked with Pastor Ephraim Udo, Solomon Idiong, and John Obott. Her first visit, January through March of 1979, was unintended. Her plans were to visit a different mission work in Nigeria. Pastor Ephraim was to meet her and transport her to another church. However, he took her to his church and she decided the Lord must have a purpose for her at Ephraim's church. After spending three months in Nigeria she returned to the States and contacted Bro. S. O. Ross with a first-hand report of our mission there.

Her second visit, March through May of this year, was spent working with our pastors and people giving them Bible teaching, suggestions for their building needs, teaching arts and crafts, helping them organize their church program, and instructing them in gardening and planting techniques.

Mrs. Blair plans to make another trip next January. When asked what we could send with her she responded, "communion sets." They need four more sets due to the number of members in the church. Another factor is that the sets they do have must be carried from church to church. In addition to communion sets, they need Bible-teaching materials, lessons from OBC, Sunday School materials, VBS material, and hymn books. Virginia mentioned that each of the pastors—Ephraim, Solomon, and John has asked for a suit of clothes. She also stated that the people can use summer clothing.

In response to the question, "What is the greatest need of our churches in Nigeria which we could supply?" she said, "The greatest need is for educational books for Christian training. They need books to give them information on how to organize and conduct their ministry effectively. Sunday School Superintendents need materials, they need literature, including tracts. A major need is for someone to go to Nigeria to conduct training courses in a Bible college setting." She stated that the door is wide open and they are eagerly waiting for us to send people to provide training for them.

I asked Virginia about the potential of our churches in Nigeria. To this question she answered, "The churches there can be very fruitful. The field is wide open and if you develop it for the glory of God you will never be disappointed." She also responded that, among the 40,000 people in the area, a significant number are not participating in any church and are responsive to the gospel.

The pastors are interested in their work and dedicated to the Lord. There may also be other churches in the area that may wish to unite with the Church of God General Conference.

My personal reaction to this is, we have a wideopen field which represents an opportunity and a challenge. God opens doors and calls for workers. The voice of the Lord to Isaiah echoes in our ears: "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" May we also hear the response, "Here am I: send me."

AND NEWS Warren Sorenson, Director

In a recent session at the 1981 General Conference a point was made that 40 years ago the Church of God had 5,000 members and today the number has changed very little. This alarming problem caused some questions to arise in my mind as to why this fact is true and what remedies are needed to change this situation.

As Bro. Warren Sorenson pointed out, truth in doctrine contains within it the necessity of declaring it to others. If we do have the concept of Bible truth and do not diffuse it, do we really have it? Possibly we should examine our church family to see what general characteristics we tend to possess, what kinds of people our forefathers were, and what is the nature of our contemporary world. With this information in mind, we should be able to become a growth-oriented body of believers.

Personal observation clearly indicates that we are an extended family of many interrelated families. It is possible to know personally nearly every member of our church. Families become interlinked with other families through internarriage, within the church group. However, when we marry outside the church, or if we move to a non-church locale, we tend to lose our church family connection. Selection of a mate within the group is not very wide. Statistics indicate that most people marry someone who lives within a mile of their homes.

If our churches were larger, therefore, there would be a greater tendency to marry someone of our own faith. If



we marry outside our church or if we move to another locale, normally we will become content to worship in a similar church, or become inert spiritually, depending upon the circumstances. Unlike many other groups, we do not use marriage as the occasion to proselyte or convert someone to our ways. Up to now we have not attempted to organize new groups in the community to which we move. If we were to do so, our numbers would expand by natural processes. However, since we lose our naturally growing numbers, the new converts just about equal our losses. Attracting new members to a non-expanding base keeps the membership about constant. If migrating members were to start new groups, and if our children and their families were to remain loyal, we would either double or even triple our base about every thirty years. The group of 5,000 of 1940 should be about 15,000 by 1970 and 25,000 by 1980. As Malthus, a nineteenth century clergyman turned economist, pointed out, population expands geometrically. If we remain stable in number, in reality we are fast losing ground. The

5,000 members of 1980 may well represent a net loss of 20,000 members since 1940.

Our church has a definite personality. We were founded by non-conformist Englishmen who were courageous truth-seekers outside the mainstream of their society. When they moved overseas they carried this love for truth and love for the Scriptures with them. Since they were unusual and different, they were often not accepted and easily became introverted and kept to themselves. If their children wished to conform to society, the tendency was to drop out of the group and not perpetuate the ideas of their parents. Other truth-seekers would join them but losses of the next generation made




expansion difficult. They were interested in quality and not quantity. Their views seemed strange to others, which could easily inhibit those seeking protection within the group. When threatened from without, human beings tend to desire the comfort and safety of their group. A tendency to distrust other people is natural in this situation and the desire to expand is easily thwarted. Because they were not readily accepted, they may have become reticent to publicize who they were.

Where do we find ourselves now in the contemporary world? Our society has evolved from an overtly churchoriented, spiritually controlled organization to a scientifically materialistic and depersonalized one.

he Seed

The authority of the Lord, his Word, and his Son, the living word, has been ursurped by the authority of Freud, Marx, Darwin, behaviorism, situation ethics, or self. Man has often placed himself in the role of the Creator responsible for no one but himself. In this climate it is difficult to approach mankind with a criteria featuring the authority of God and his Word and the need for deep personal responsibility. It is not hard to see why cults are the rage today. They are a response to the depersonalized man caught between the humdrum and modern technology. The charismatic movement found in all groups today is also not accidental. It is an unfortunate departure from reason by people seeking emotional re-



lease in a coldly logical world of affluence. It is excitement and magic in an unimaginative world. Is it not also indicative of conditions within the spiritual organizations during the last days? In our age of so-called scientific reason, such a flourishing of unreasonable emotional reactions in spiritual matters is indeed a paradox.

If spiritual and numerical growth is part of Scriptural truth, how then can we prove it by increasing our numbers dramatically? Why are we losing our young people to less spiritually enlightened groups through marriage and other means? Why can't we retain those who have been exposed to accurate knowledge? Why is truth secondary in so many lives? We need to know what are the forces we have to overcome to make our people committed to truth. We cannot afford to lose these valuable resources vital to our growth.

Those of us who migrate tend to seek out a church similar to our faith and attend there. Some of us find this very unsatisfactory and our spiritual life begins to decline. These migrants should be contacted and encouraged to start a cell group in their home much like the Apostolic church did. Our children, not reinforced by the larger family, usually fall by the wayside and another generation of church growth is lost. My father had this insight and wisdom. He remained in Fonthill, Ontario, Canada, at some inconvenience to his job so that our family could have the benefit of our church. As a result, all of us have retained our church connection and his faith has been perpetuated in many of his grandchildren. He envisioned also the need for a new church locale and the church plant at Fonthill is second to none in our whole family of churches because of such foresight. If our migrant members were to have a vision of a church in their new communities, our growth would be perpetuated naturally as well as in new members drawn by our zeal for their welfare. Growth would be geometric and dramatic.

The character of a truth-seeker has many desirable traits. He or she is a student seeking answers which lead to self-improvement and a better life. God has ingrained this instinct into human nature in part so we will seek him as he is the truth and the source of all truth. However, it is very easy for the means to become the end in this process. We can so intensely focus on obtaining the truth

that we lose sight of the fact that using it is the ultimate goal. Our vision should contain a dynamic truth, truth in action obtaining positive results. We should not fear rejection. Our Master was rejected by his society at large, but his message has transformed the world in spiritual matters. As God informed Moses, "They have not rejected you. They have rejected me." Visualize the completed picture first and God will build the material structure. This principle is as true as any law of physics.

The world today is hungry for truth, hope, love, acceptance, and individual worth, in spite of its overt cynicism and sophistication. The Word of God satisfies all hungers. However, many are falling prey and are vulnerable to false answers—cults, magic, drugs, charisma, etc. Our world is in a state of perpetual bomb scare. God's message of hope of eternal life for mortal man is irresistible. If we believe the Second Coming is near, we have the responsibility to shout it at the top of our lungs. This message alone should get the world's attention. All we need to do is publicize God's Word by our words and actions. Our church family has the quality. Let us add to quality quantity without diluting the message. If we plant and water, God will provide the increase to his honor.



Coins-for-Christ Contest

Only seven BYF groups entered the contest this year, but they averaged \$816.55 in contributions. For the sixth year in a row the Guthrie Grove youth topped the chart. Their winning total contributions reached the fantastic sum of THREE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED THIRTEEN DOLLARS AND SIXTY-EIGHT CENTS.


