

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

HE BOARD elected by the delegates serves as the Board of Directors of the General Conference and Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College. As chairman of the Board of Directors and Board of Trustees, I welcome you on behalf of the Board and staff to this sixty-second annual meeting of the Church of God General Conference.

The theme for the 1981 General Conference was "You Are The Church." That program emphasized the importance of the body of Christ, the significance of each individual as a functioning member of the church, and the ministry of the church and its members. The theme for this Conference, "Let the Church Obey His Voice," continues to develop and emphasize that we are the Church of the Living God and that the Church is a living organism with a mission given by God. Paul describes the Church in Romans 8:28 as "them who are the called according to his purpose." It is our desire that we will leave this Conference with a greater understanding of purposes for which we are called. God's Word reveals the work and responsibilities of the Church. The sermons, seminars, and Bible study sessions will provide opportunities for greater understanding in a practical way what God would have us do as stewards and will assist us in preparing for tasks that lie before us. I firmly believe that every child of God has a ministry—that we are the called and that God has a purpose for each member and each local body. If one has not found a ministry it may be that his voice is not being heard, or that stewardship is being limited or denied by the member, or that fear and insecurity are interfering with the reception of his purpose, or that some other situation is present which may shut out the voice of him who has called us. Let us use this Conference to seek the will of God and to prepare ourselves to hear and obey the heavenly vision as the Apostle Paul did. (Acts 26:19.)

We who are assembled here as delegates to the sixty-second annual General Conference are a privileged people. We have as a unifying foundation our common beliefs and an understanding of basic Bible teachings related to God, Jesus, and the gospel of salvation. Gathered here in Conference as representatives from many local bodies, we have the unique opportunity to call upon the Lord for directions and wisdom and then to move forward by charting programs and making decisions that will lead the Church ahead. Being a privileged people also means that we as delegates have tremendous responsibilities. I believe that our presence here is no accident. I believe that "This is the LORD'S doing" (Psa. 118:23). Let us pray fervently and boldly this week for directions from God and that our actions and decisions will be in accordance with God's will.

The 1982 Berean Youth Camp had as the theme words from Jesus as recorded in Luke 19:13—"Occupy Till I Come." Recent events and fulfilled prophecy indicate that Christ's coming is near and this makes it even more urgent that we occupy—actively do business for the Lord. This is a great responsibility that we have as delegates assembled in Conference. This Conference is only a beginning for action. The programs we plan and the decisions we make will be implemented in the weeks, months, and years ahead. The real implementation and business done for the Lord

will also take place primarily in the local churches. Let us, therefore, not simply come together here for fellowship, study, and business sessions only to return home and file away or forget the commitments made in these sessions. But let us return to our local churches as ambassadors inspired, motivated, and desirous of obeying the Lord and committed to inspiring, motivating, and leading others to join us in moving forward in the directions charted. The General Conference and Oregon Bible College can assist us by providing resources and services but these will only produce results as we utilize them.

Our responsibilities as delegates continue well beyond the adjournment of this Conference. I have mentioned some of these responsibilities as they relate to action in the local churches. Strong local churches constitute the backbone for a strong General Conference. Our responsibilities also extend back to the General Conference and Oregon Bible College which serve numerous local needs. The competent staffs of these institutions need our prayers, encouragement, contributions of talents and—yes, our financial support in carrying out the programs and services we have approved or will approve. Again, we also have the responsibility of helping our local brothers and sisters in joining us in these efforts.

At this time I would like to again emphasize that this General Conference organization and Oregon Bible College only exist to serve the Lord and the needs of our local churches and members. Oregon Bible College constantly seeks to improve the program to better develop pastors and other workers for local congregations. The recent reorganization of the General Conference was implemented for the purpose of providing a greater focus on outreach and the development of local churches. We believe that positive results have come from these efforts. Local groups are experiencing the benefits of utilizing the services provided and we are seeing enthusiasm and encouragement in many areas. Do not wait for the services of our departments and college to come to you and to your church, but seek these services.

We have a printed agenda, published recommendations, and a proposed budget for consideration in our business sessions. One member of the Board of Directors-Board of Trustees will be elected. What would God have us do regarding these matters? It is appropriate that we apply our theme—"Let Us Obey His Voice." This is a time to really pray in a specific way for leadership. This is a time to open our minds to receive inspired directions. This is a time to hear and obey his voice and then to occupy—do business for the Lord.

The decisions made in these business sessions are binding upon the General Conference and the Bible College and the elected Board. As we consider and decide upon the recommendations, we are dealing with matters that will influence our directions for years to come. The authority to decide on these matters and to handle other Conference business lies with this delegate body representing the entire Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith.

Finally, we are a privileged people in that the precious

truths of God's Word are entrusted to us. We must never deviate from the Bible truths. Israel can be taken as an example. When the descendants of Jacob remained faithful to God and his commandments, they were blessed and prospered. Our blessings and prosperity also depend on our elationship to the Almighty through his Son. Having these truths entrusted to us also places great responsibilities on us. Jesus, the nobleman, will soon return from the far country and we must give an account of our stewardship. (Matt. 25:14-30.) Let us as delegates obey his voice and mobilize our resources and call upon God's power in carrying out the mission of the Church in this decade.

Minutes of the 1982 General Conference

Tuesday, August 3

The first session of the sixty-second Church of God General Conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m., Tuesday, August 3, 1982, by Chairman Joe James. Diana Hays of the Macomb Church of God taught two choruses, and David Krogh offered prayer.

Chairman James introduced Ruth Overholser, chairperson of the Credentials Committee, and she instructed the seating of the delegates. A total of 114 delegates had signed in: six board members, 36 ministers, and 72 delegates.

Chairman James gave his message to the delegates, stating that we should return to our churches not forgetting what we have learned here but move forward in the directions charted. The General Conference and Oregon Bible College have many resources but only will be successful as we take advantage of them. The churches have responsibilities to the Conference and the College by way of prayers, use of talents, and contributions of money.

A large number of persons are serving as delegates for the first time, and the Gospel Mission Church from Winter Haven, Florida, is being represented at General Confer-

ence for the first time.

Ed Goit moved and Maurice Robinson seconded that the special reports of the Christian Conciliation Board, License and Ordination Board, and Ministers' Fund be accepted. Motion carried.

Reporting for the Board of Directors, John Hearp reviewed the members of the Board and David Krogh and Charles Pryor, and informed that board members welcomed suggestions and ideas from churches and individual members.

David McClain explained the financial report. Michael Brown moved and Russell Johns seconded that the financial

report be accepted. Motion carried.

Charles Bottolfs moved and Robert Coverstone seconded that Recommendation No. 1 which states: "We recommend the creation of a corporation to be called CHURCH OF GOD INVESTMENT FUND. The purpose of the fund will be to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches. A reasonable rate of interest will be paid to depositors and a reasonable rate of interest will be charged to those churches that borrow from that fund. The Fund will be governed by the By-Laws which are proposed as a part of this recommendation," be accepted.

Much discussion followed the with main issue being: Is it Biblical to charge interest on money? Replies were given

that the Israelites were not to extract usury from their fellowmen, that the Israelites had charged exorbitant usury rates, that Leviticus 25:36 had reference to not charging usury for welfare items. Also Jesus in his parable of the pounds recorded in Luke 19 mentioned using usury. David Krogh reported that other church groups had used this plan, and it had been very successful for planting new churches and providing other services during the past 20 years. He also advised that since the General Conference would not be benefited from these transactions, the Conference would have no status change with the Internal Revenue Service. S. O. Ross informed that tradition would not be broken, for loans have been given from designated funds and repaid along with interest.

Other ideas presented were that tithes and offerings should be given to churches needing help and that we need to trust in God to provide money needed.

The motion passed by a vote of 85 to 9.

Dallas Demmitt moved and Joe Astolfi seconded the adoption of Recommendation No. 2: We recommend the following revisions to the Standards for Churches Applying for Mission Builders League Assistance. Article IV, C: "In the event the recipient church should cease operations, the funds received from Mission Builders shall be returned to the General Conference." This item formerly read "should."

Article IX, A, 4: (there are currently only three points in Article IX, Section a) "which have outgrown their present facilities and are enlarging, buying, rebuilding, or exchang-

ing."

Article IX, B: Delete entirely. This section is summarized in the new item four above.

Article IX, C: "In event that no church request is approved for Mission Builders League assistance, the money will become a part of the assets of the Church of God Investment Fund."

Scott Ross advised that the Omaha Church did not approve of Article IX, C because the funds have been given to be interest free. The church would like for this article to remain as it presently reads.

Scott Ross moved and Ray Hall seconded that the motion be amended to include only the first three revisions. Motion to amend carried. Motion to adopt the first three re-

visions passed.

Dallas Demmitt moved and William Lawrence seconded that Article IX, C be adopted. Motion passed with 55 votes for and 41 against. (over) The first session was dismissed with prayer by Cecil Smead.

Wednesday, August 4

The second session of the 1982 General Conference was called to order by Chairman James at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, August 4, and the minutes of Tuesday's business meeting were read.

The chairman called for nominations for one vacancy on the Board of Directors-Board of Trustees for a four-year term. Paul Overholser nominated Howard Shute of the Glad Tidings Church of God in Fonthill, Ontario, Canada. Don Needham nominated Scott Ross, pastor of the Omaha, Nebraska, Church of God.

John Huston moved and Francis Burnett seconded that the nominations be closed. Motion carried.

At 4:30 p.m. the nominees are to be in the Grace Roper Lounge to answer questions the delegates may wish to ask.

Russell Magaw, reporting for the Publishing Department, informed that there will be new lessons and a new curriculum in the fall adult quarterly. Also, an elective course on Distinctive Biblical Issues will be offered. Suggestions were made that this elective course would be good to use in midweek Bible study or Home Bible Study.

Discussing Oregon Bible College, Dr. Charles Pryor noted that six students had been graduated in 1982 from the four-year program, nine students from the two-year program, and seven students completed their internship. Several graduates plan to enter internships this fall. Of the 32 persons finishing the internship program with the intention of pastoring a church, 22, or 69 percent, have remained in the ministry.

Summer ministries have opened doors for young people and churches, and Dr. Pryor desires that this program be

Eighteen students are returning for the fall semester, and to date 16 young people have registered as freshmen.

Asked how students who do not have money to attend school can obtain necessary money, Pryor replied that

1. Parents should realize that they are not spending as much money at home when the student is away in school, and this money could be applied.

2. Ask grandparents for help.

3. Members at large can help by making contributions. Some churches pay tuition for students attending from their church.

Parents' and grandparents' weekend is planned for October 7-9, and Junior-Senior weekend is scheduled for March 10-12, 1983.

Maurice Robinson moved and Charles Bottolfs seconded that Recommendation No. 3 be adopted: We recommend the establishment of a corporation to be called Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. The purposes of the foundation are: to promote the education and cultural welfare of Oregon Bible College of Oregon, IL; to aid students; to solicit gifts, grants, and bequests in trust or otherwise, funds of all kinds to be used for the benefit of the school, its faculty, and its students. The foundation will operate in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation which are proposed as a part of this recommendation. An effort will be made to have assets of one million dollars by the 50th anniversary of Oregon Bible College in 1989.

This foundation will be a holding company established strictly to receive endowment funds as a nonprofit organiza-

tion. Maurice Robinson advised that in the last several years many small colleges have closed.

About one half of the contributions to the Conference are used for the College, and Oregon Bible College is our only place to train our ministers. This endowment fund will help stem the drain on the money coming into the General Conference.

Dwaine Demmitt reminded that in the 1960's the annuity funds were begun, and the conference is now reaping the benefits. In estate planning the government allows one to give as much as he wishes and this is a tax savings.

Motion carried.

Using Psalm 139:13 as criteria Don Needham moved and Ed Goit seconded the acceptance of the following resolution as a position statement of the General Conference: We believe life is a sacred gift from God which should be protected from the time of conception until the occurring of natural death. Therefore we oppose the practice of abortion (unless the pregnancy is life-threatening to the mother), feeling that it is morally opposed to the Word of God, and its practice results in the devaluation of all human life.

Joe Martin moved and Maurice Robinson seconded that the words "unless the pregnancy is life-threatening to the mother" be deleted from the resolution. Alva Huffer and Hollis Partlowe suggested that more study was needed and that a committee be appointed.

C. E. Randall moved and Hollis Partlowe seconded that this resolution be tabled and the chairman appoint a committee to study this matter and report at the 1983 Conference. Motion passed on a vote of 73 for and 49 against.

A report from the credentials committee showed that a total of 150 delegates had registered. Present on Wednesday were directors seven, ministers 51, and delegates 92. The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon with prayer by Russell Magaw.

Thursday, August 5

Chairman Joe James called the delegates to order at 10:00 a.m., Thursday, August 5. Pastor Kenneth Milne led in prayer. The minutes of Wednesday's meeting were read. The credentials committee reported attendance of seven directors, 55 ministers, and 94 delegates, with a total of 156.

Voting was conducted for one director.

David Krogh announced that the pool amount was \$139.75. More than five hundred persons have attended at least one meeting this week.

Dallas Demmitt reported on his forthcoming trip to China. Because of prayer, seeking ways to serve, he has served as chaplain for the Phoenix Suns basketball team. A group of the players and their wives are going to China and Dallas and Nancy will accompany them. They will be meeting with other athletes from many other countries and will discuss ways of evangelizing in their own countries. Dallas asked for prayer support for this endeavor.

Scott Ross was elected to a four-year term on the Board of Directors-Board of Trustees. The directors will meet immediately following this session for the purpose of electing officers.

Francis Burnett moved and Ed Goit seconded that the delegates give retiring director John Hearp a rising vote of thanks.

The chairman asked that next year churches be thinking about two directors to be elected at the 1983 Conference and that names be submitted to Russell Magaw, editor, before May 1.

Hugh Harman gave a resume of the International Youth

Camp held in July.

The seminars he conducted this summer in several states have been well attended. Plans are being made to have a

caravan next year.

Steve Grant, on behalf of the Missions Department, distributed a missions newsletter. He reminded the delegates that he and his wife are anxious to visit churches to help with mission goals and awareness. They will have a follow-up program contacting the 14 young people who served as summer missionaries. In November the Grants plan to go to Africa to spend several months. *The Mission Reader* is a very good book to use for mission knowledge.

Sydney Kirkpatrick moved, Maurice Robinson seconded, that the tabled motion be taken from the table. Robinson said this motion was in order because the tabled motion would die at the end of this session. C. E. Randall said he had no objection to this motion. The motion to remove the

motion from the table passed.

Kirkpatrick suggested that the policy statement be accepted with the amendment and that a study committee be appointed for further study. Randall responded that the entire Church of God should be made aware of this resolution before a final vote and have a share in the decision.

James Graham spoke for the amendment and the motion. Kent Ross said this group is only taking a stand on abortion and not making any judgment.

Vote on the amendment to the motion passed.

Tom Palmer said he thought that this motion was being railroaded through. Ed Bender supported the motion. Scott Ross supported the motion and felt that exceptions could be made. Jimmy Raymond agreed with the motion. Warren Sorenson said the delegates are voting primarily on whether or not they approve of abortion. Changes can be made next year on wording. Randall said he strongly opposed abortion but thought the delegates should not set a precedent of voting on moral issues.

The question was called for and seconded. Motion was passed to stop the debate. A ballot vote was taken on the

motion.

Greg Demmitt moved and Jim Hamilton seconded that the cost of the International Youth Conference be subsidized by the General Conference. David Krogh spoke to the motion, saying that the General Conference is underwriting the International Youth Conference now, but the hope is that the youth conference should be self-supporting. Many churches and conferences already are helping the young people. David Cheatwood reported that over \$1600 was spent at camp and that the young people seemed to have plenty of money. Hugh Harman said that the result of the vote will make no difference in what is done at the conference. Most other camps are more expensive with \$135 being the lowest. Money is not the thing that keeps the young people from going to camp. In years past young people who could not afford to come to camp had their tuition paid. Demmitt and Hamilton asked that their motion be withdrawn.

Ed Goit moved, John Hearp seconded, that the delegates

recess until 1:00 p.m. Motion lost.

The motion concerning abortion passed by a vote of 116 ves and $24\,$ no.

Sydney Kirkpatrick moved and Maurice Robinson seconded that the Board of Directors appoint a committee to do a comprehensive study on the life question, and report back to next year's General Conference for further consideration. Motion passed.

Francis Burnett moved and Ed Bender seconded that We, the delegate body of the 1982 Church of God General Conference, headquarters, Oregon, Illinois, express our concern regarding the attitude of our United States government toward the nation of Israel. We understand the Holy Scriptures to emphatically teach that Israel is God's people. We, this delegate body, do urge you to seek God's will through prayer and consultation in regard to Israel. May the Great God Jehovah be praised. Motion carried. Copies of this motion are to be sent to President Reagan, Vice President Bush, Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker, and House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neil.

The proposed budget was presented to the delegates. Krogh informed that the proposed budget had been changed from that printed in the June PROGRESS JOURNAL. There may be a short fall of almost \$40,000 in reaching this year's Goal for Giving. Although the goal for giving will be less than last year, there still is a need of additional contributions. The Conference and College need broader support from all our membership. The Archives Project was proposed and has been eliminated, and only the offerings received this week will be used for the archives. There has been a pattern of about \$21,000 increase in giving each year. John Huston moved and Ron Macy seconded that the delegates adopt the budget of \$402,830 as proposed. Motion passed.

Dr. Pryor introduced Anthony Buzzard to the delegates and informed that he will be a guest instructor during the '82-'83 Oregon Bible College school year. Mr. Buzzard thanked the delegates for accepting him into the family and will be happy to dialogue with anyone.

The secretary read the minutes taken at this meeting. Robert Coverstone moved and Joe Astolfi seconded that the minutes for the entire week be accepted. Motion carried.

NEW FISCAL YEAR BEGINS



October 1 marked the beginning of a new fiscal year for the Church of God General Conference. As a result of the decisions made by the delegates at the summer Conference, we are looking forward to this new year with optimism and excitement.

The delegates' decision to form the Church of God Investment Fund is a giant step forward in assisting our

churches. The purpose of the fund will be to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches. A reasonable rate of interest will be paid to depositors and a reasonable rate of interest will be charged to those churches that borrow from the fund. The articles of incorporation have been filed with the State of Illinois and later this fall the trustees will meet to implement this fund. This corporation has great potential to be a blessing both to investors and to churches which borrow.

The decision of the delegates to create the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation is reason for optimism. This new corporation will be extremely valuable in creating a strong financial base for our College. The future of the Church of God depends upon having a strong Bible College where our leaders and Christian workers can be trained. The Foundation will help insure the continuation of superior Bible and professional training for the Church of God.

The adoption by the delegates of a budget calling for contributions of \$402,830 during the next 12 months will permit the Conference to provide essential services to our members and churches, as well as to increase our church planting efforts. Several new churches are in the planning stages and we are thankful that financial resources are available in our new budget to undergird these efforts.

Church planting must become a major emphasis if we are to be obedient to the Great Commission.

Matthew 28:19, 20 commands us to disciple all nations, and in the Greek "all nations" means every caste, tribe, people, ethnic unit of mankind, every cell of people. Therefore the Great Commission goal is to develop a church of committed Christians in every community, in every city, in every countryside throughout the whole world.

The large map of the United States and Canada in my office shows vast areas where there are no Church of God congregations. And as we expand our vision to the rest of the world, it is clear there is a great unfinished task before us.

Please join me in praying that the Lord of the harvest will provide the resources necessary to bring in the harvest.


Financial Review



The Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith at McGintytown, near Greenbrier, Arkansas, has been a church that works together. The original church, built in 1918, set the example of individuals donating either materials or work for its construction.

Back in the early 1970's, the congregation realized that without more space in our buildings, we would not be able to grow. Not being either a large or rich congregation, we didn't know what to do; but being a congregation that believes God answers prayer according to our needs, we took this matter to him in earnest prayer.

By faith, with \$700 in the building fund, we started a sanctuary 34 by 60 feet. As we finished one step of the building, money would be there to start the next step. Thus, slowly but surely, we got it built. Much work was donated, a lot of it by the senior citizens in our congregation. Everyone



helped, with much of the work of cleaning up being done by the women and children. We finished the sanctuary with only \$2500 being borrowed, interest free. This was soon repaid, carpet laid, outside bricked, and a new piano and pews were added, all paid for at the time of installation.

During this time Bro. Alan McLain was our part-time pastor. As our congregation continued to grow, we began to wonder if we could support a full-time pastor. Again we went on our knees in prayer. Brother Dan Landry came as our first full-time pastor, serving three years, and we continued to grow. Brother Thomas New came as our second full-time pastor, and as growth continued we became very crowded for space, especially for Sunday School needs. Again we prayed, "Lord, show us what you would have us do."

We applied for Mission Builders appeal #46. With \$500 in the building fund, and a lot of faith, this "crazy" congregation held ground-breaking ceremonies for a new addi-

tion. This would consist of a basement with five large rooms, a fellowship hall, kitchen, plus the remodeling of the original building into a nursery, a prayer room, bathrooms, pastor's study, and entry. Later in the same afternoon we learned that we had been granted Appeal #46 from the Mission Builders Fund. Again God had supplied our needs.

In the middle of our building program we were offered the opportunity to buy a used school bus at a bargain price. Could we pay for it? We would try. Today, August 1982, we have the bus almost paid off. Again, no interest was paid on the money involved. The young people from the State of Arkansas made the trip to Camp Mack in the bus this year. It has been repainted and overhauled, and is a very nice way of transportation for VBS and other needed projects.

We have the remodeling of the old church almost finished, with only a few small items to be done in the new addition. We have a baptistry fund started; this is our next project. A lot of prayers are answered. Our congregation continues to grow. At VBS we were again in need of space; growing pains again? Wonderful! Praise the Lord!

Recently a lady from another church in a nearby community called me to ask, "How do you do all of the things you are doing there? Do you have someone who gives large donations for all of these projects, or do you borrow the money?" No, we aren't in debt! God does answer prayer according to our needs. But one thing is for sure: when you ask the Lord, "What do you want me to do?" you had better be ready to work Saturdays, nights after work, holidays, days off—anytime you have some free time! But also be ready to enjoy the wonderful fellowship of Christians working together for a dream our fathers had many years ago.

Again we pray, "Lord, help us to do your will, and give us the strength to do your work. Show us what you would have us do; lead and guide us. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen."

2.5 Billion Hidden People . . .

I want to talk to you for a moment about "hidden people." They are the 2.5 billion people for whom Christ died, that have never had an opportunity to know him.1 And why not? It is because no one has gone to their culture, learned their language, translated the Scriptures into their tongue, or identified Christ to them in a way they could understand and accept. I am not speaking of our neighbors who have not accepted Christ; I am talking of those who have not even heard the name of Jesus. Do you realize that even if every Christian in the world were to win all his culturally near neighbors to Christ, there would still be over two and half billion non-Christians left? Two and a half billion people lined up shoulder to shoulder would circle the world twenty-two times. With each passing day, that line grows 75 miles longer.²

We in the Church of God must not turn a blind eye to this mass of humanity that will only hear of Christ if someone is sent across cultural boundaries to reach them. Paul shared this very concern with us some 1900 years ago: "Every one who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?" (Rom. 10:13-15.)

What Are We Doing to Meet this Challenge?

1. First, we are awakening the local churches to their responsibility to the task. Mission work doesn't happen by itself or at the General Conference. It happens when men and women in local congregations begin to pray and strive to raise up their own missionaries and send them out. Pam and I have spent the last year traveling to as many churches as possible sharing about the "how to's" of starting their own mission program. To those we have seen, we have offered suggestions for getting started in "the great commission task."

Our first recommendation has been for the local church to form a mission committee. Then this committee needs to write a mission policy, to put on paper the plans, goals, and visions God would have their church accomplish through prayer and action. Then missions education needs to reach out to the children, youth, and adults. This education process is greatly assisted by sending key leaders of the church and mission committee to conferences such as ACMC (Association of Mission Committees). The next annual conference will be held in Wheaton, Illinois, July 21-24, 1983.

2. Secondly, we are offering short-term mission opportunities to those who wish to test their spiritual gifts of evangelism on foreign soil. Last year 14 young people from the Church of God had an opportunity to "taste" what it is like to serve God and share with brethren in a different culture. Four of these were students who gave their summers to serve in a short-term mission program, three in Mexico and one in the Philippines. This is the first step toward the development of career missionaries.

3. A third phase of our mission endeavor is about to begin. In December Pam and I will be leaving for the mission fields of Africa. For the next six months we will be growing in our understanding of Africa's needs and how we can help our national churches in their evangelistic efforts. This journey will take us to tribes in Kenya, Nigeria, and Ghana. While God is teaching us "how to be good news to another people," we will be searching out areas of need for future church planting and development. When we return in May we will be reporting to you our findings and how you can start meeting the tremendous needs of our African brothers.

4. And what is our ultimate goal? I feel it is the same as that of Paul when he spoke to the Roman church, "It is my ambition to bring the Gospel to places where the very name of Christ has not been heard . . ." (Rom. 15:20, NEB). This, too, is our ambition, that through God's directing hand we in the Church of God will raise up and send forth our own missionary teams to begin our part in reaching out to these 2.5 billion that are hidden from Christ.

It was one of those days when nothing seemed to be going right. I had been all thumbs at work, and classes were a disaster. While one portion of my brain was busy worrying about my job, grades, and next semester's tuition, another part was preoccupied with problems at home concerning family and friends. There were a few thoughts of past sins that had been lodged deep in my memory bank, but had tried desperately all day to enter into my consciousness. To make matters worse, there were a few thoughts of my future straggling around in the confusion. I became overwhelmed by a feeling of wanting to escape.

It was a beautiful spring day, in the middle of the afternoon, and it didn't take much more than that to convince me that I needed a long drive in the country. I jumped into my car, desperately trying to leave all those thoughts behind. I wasn't able to unwind until I had been driving for about an hour down a winding country

back road.

The sky was a brilliant blue with a few billowy white clouds drifting by. The grass was tall and looked soft and wonderful. I was looking off to my right, marveling at the beauty, when my eyes caught sight of a peculiar-looking oak tree. Its branches were loaded with leaves of red, yellow, and gold. It was a spectacular sight, but strangely out of season. My curiosity got the best of me. I stopped my car and headed off to see the odd appearance.

Approaching the tree, I became more and more amazed at its beauty. After I stopped and gave a quizzical look I said, "Hey buddy, you sure are pretty, but I think you've got the wrong season."

Then came a harsh but mighty voice, "Actually, I just wanted to get your attention." I jumped back and was ready to run when I tripped over a rock and fell flat on my face.

"Don't be afraid, child," came the voice again.

I looked up, seeing no one, and asked, "Who said that?"

"I did... God—the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; remember me?"

I scuffled to my feet, brushed myself off, and cleared my throat "Oh, of course, Sir. I, ah . . . "

"I haven't heard too much from you lately. It seems you've got a lot on your mind."

In a trembling voice I answered, "Yes, yes Sir—that's true. I've been trying to straighten a few things out. I know I haven't been too successful, but if you give me a little more time I'm sure . . . "

"Haven't I said to cast all your cares

upon me?"

"Well, yes Sir, you did. But it just didn't seem too fair, you being so busy and all. And I realized that I had brought a lot of those problems on myself anyway."

"Oh child, you have so much to learn," he said with a chuckle. "This is the reason I have brought you here. I have some things for you to do that will help you learn. I want you to go to Mexico this summer and serve as a missionary."

"What? Mexico! A missionary? I think you've got the wrong person, if you'll excuse me for saying so, Sir. I've scarcely ventured out of Illinois, and now you're asking me to go to Mexico? Why, that would mean I'd probably have to fly. I've never flown before; I'm afraid of heights! And as a missionary? I'm just not missionary material. Besides, I'm a student at IWU. Have you seen the cost of tuition lately? I have to work this summer or I'll never get back."

"Do you love me?"

"Of course I do, but . . . "

"Do you trust me?"

"Well, yes Sir, but you see . . . "

"I know what your thoughts are and what has been heavy on your heart. But trust me and do not rely on your own understanding. Now, will you go?"

There was a pause as I folded my hands behind my back, and swayed a

little as my foot fumbled with the grass in front of me. "Yes, I'll go, but what will I tell my family and friends?"

"Just tell them that I have plans for

you."

JUNE 17th . . .

I arrived at the airport at 5:00 a.m. I was greeted by a couple of sleepy missionaries who told me to change some of my money into pesos and then loaded me into a van with six other young volunteers. Here I was in Mexico City, the largest city in the world, riding down a highway packed with matchbox cars, destined for some unknown seminary in a van full of people I had never seen before; and all I could think of as I looked out my window at the buildings and walls to the sides of us was, "I wonder what the graffiti says?"

The three days at the seminary were very trying for me. I kept trying to figure out what God wanted me to learn. So far I had learned that there appeared to be eighty other young people who seemed to be much more anxious to spread the gospel than I did. And from the orientation sessions I learned the true meaning of paranoia. "Don't drink the water unless you're absolutely sure it has been purified. Don't eat fresh fruits and vegetables unless you're positive they are clean. Be wary of public restrooms and always carry toilet paper. Most of you will undoubtedly become sick at one time or another during the course of the sum-

mer, but do not let your parents or any other relative give you an injectionthey like to do that. Beware of amoebas, stray dogs, and the 'Latin Lover.'

When I arrived in my new Mexican home I was afraid to drink the coffee, pet the dog, and go to the bathroom. After one week I was sick for three days and quickly learned what was meant by Montezuma's Revenge. I also learned to respect stories the other team members were telling me of being served fish-eye soup, fried pig skin, and chicken-head sandwiches, when I watched my Mexican mom nibble on a couple of juicy, yellow chicken feet. (I found ways to avoid such delicacies.) But I adjusted to the family life quickly. I had gained two wonderful sisters, two brothers, and immediately fell in love with Mama and Papa. I was also placed with another team member who spoke the language on about the same level as I did, which meant we smiled and nodded our heads a lot.

The first few weeks I didn't have a lot to say to God. I was struggling with the language and so searched desperately for English-speaking Mexicans. I cursed the city every time I blew my nose for its fierce pollution. And I spent a lot of time devising ways to avoid the Metro, which was the major transportation system. It was used by masses of people daily and was where I learned the identity of the "Latin Lover." I also spent a lot of time dreading the fact that we would be doing door-to-door evangelism very soon. But the big day came quickly and I felt all but prepared.

We divided into teams of ten and then scattered throughout neighborhoods in the city. Our team met in a small church near our house to discuss the details. We were going into the neighborhood in two's. We were given a few tracts and Bibles and then assigned to our partners. I sighed a heavy sigh of relief when I found out my partner was a guy named Philip who was very fluent in Spanish, until he said he was going to let me do all the talking until I got stuck and would then bail me out.

The first house we went to I introduced my partner and myself, said where we were from and why we had come to Mexico, then Philip had to bail me out. I didn't catch most of the conversation, only to know that he had asked this lady if she thought she would be saved if Jesus returned today. I wasn't sure what the lady said but I smiled and looked profoundly interested.

Besides counting down the days of door-to-door visitations we had remaining, I walked away feeling very heavy hearted. If Jesus did return today, would I be saved? I had been baptized, but was I really committed? Was I allowing him to be Master of my entire life? Memories of past sins started shooting off like tiny firecrackers in my brain. Fear and weakness began to overpower me and those familiar feelings of wanting to escape returned. Realizing that a drive in the country was impossible, I ran to the only place of solitude I could find—the roof of our apartment building. I curled up in a corner and began to cry. I felt so unworthy and thought for sure God thought I was too.

"There you go again, putting words in my mouth," came that familiar voice. "I know the thoughts I think toward you, thoughts of peace and not evil."

I kept my head hung low and through a few sniffling sighs I said, "But Lord, I am so very weak. I know that without you I am nothing. And I know I must serve you with all my heart and not just a portion, and I truly want to. But I'm afraid of so many things and I fall so easily.

"Listen, my child, the former things are in the past and I have new things for you to do. There is no need to be afraid; I will help you. I love you. When you call upon me and pray to me, I will hear you. And when you seek me you will find me when you search for me with all your heart."

I dried my eyes, thought about those words, and later descended from the rooftop with a new feeling of strength and peace. I began serving the Lord with new vitality. The more I worked in the church, being involved with the choir, the youth group, and the Bible School, the closer I got to God. I began to grow tremendously through our team Bible studies and the close friendships of other committed Christians. I couldn't pray enough, not only to ask God to help me but also to thank him for his faithfulness in answering me.

Everything was going really well, except for a few lingering fears and the continuing struggle with the language, when my roommate and I were called upon to revisit a woman whom two of our team members had visited during the initial door-to-door visits. The woman lived in our church neighborhood so it was my roommate and I who were responsible to go back. She hadn't had time to talk the first time, but we were told that she had invited us back. The only problem was that my roommate wasn't able to go with me at the requested time. I panicked, and then went to the Lord. "Now, you know I'll do anything for you God, but don't make me do this! I'm still having a terrible time with the language. I've been here four weeks and all I've done is introduce myself. And I have no idea

what to say."

"Take no thought of how or what you will say, for it shall be given to you in that same hour what you will say," said the

In the same hour! I had only had a day's notice about the visit. It had taken me three days to prepare a five minute testimony for church and God was telling me not to worry! I was kept so busy from the time that I was told about the visit until I had to go, that I had to trust in the Lord. I did, however, take my Mexican sister Edna along with me for extra security.

When we arrived at the woman's house I knocked lightly on the door. Answering it was a short, middle-aged woman with small features and wavy long hair. Her eyes were gentle but tired, and her face appeared eager as she invited us in. She lived alone with her two young children in this two-roomed house, and it was obvious that she was very poor. My sister proved to be an excellent translator to help me understand the woman at first. But the more I heard of her problems and seeing tears come to her eyes when she spoke of her children, the less I relied on Edna and the more attentive I became. I began to understand what she was saying and before I realized it I was talking right back, sharing Scripture and speaking of how God had worked in my life to bring comfort and peace.

We spent one hour in the woman's house and I walked away feeling exhausted. As my sister and I walked home she said, "I really liked all the things you said to her." I stopped in my tracks. "Hey, I did say things to her, a lot of things, and in Spanish even! God did give me things to say." I went back to that woman's house every week after that for Bible study. Later she started coming to church.

It was wonderful.

I left Mexico with new knowledge and understanding. I learned first of all that God uses imperfect people to do his will. The more willing a person is the more God will use him. I learned that every Christian is called to be a missionary. That doesn't mean we have to go overseas or go door to door. The mission field is immense; there are hungry hearts of empty people who do not know of the love of Jesus Christ. We are called to tell those who don't know, whether they be members of our own family, friends, neighbors, people of Mexico, or some naked tribe in Papua, New Guinea. Perhaps most importantly I learned that I can take all my thoughts and fears to the Lord, that I can depend on him more than anyone else in the world, and that he is my strength.





Are Missionaries Unbalanced?

Are missionaries unbalanced? Of course they are. I'm one. I ought to know.

A missionary probably began as an ordinary person. He dressed like other people; he liked to play tennis and listen to music.

But even before leaving for the field he became "different." Admired by some, pitied by others, he was known as one who was leaving parents, prospects and home for—a vision. So he seemed to be a visionary.

Now that he's come home again he's even more different. To him some things—big things—just don't seem important. Even the World Series or the Davis Cup matches don't interest him especially. And apparently he doesn't see things as other people see them. The chance of a lifetime—to meet Toscanini personally—seems to leave him cold. It makes you want to ask where he's been.

Well, where has he been?

Where the conflict with evil is open and intense, a fight not a fashion—where clothes don't matter, because there's little time to take care of them—where people are dying for help he might give, most of them not even knowing he has the help—where the sun means 120 in the shade, and he can't spend his time in the shade.

But not only space; time too seems to have passed him by. When you talk about jive [1948; beatniks, 1960; New Wave, 1982] he looks puzzled. When you mention Duke Ellington [1948; Harry Belafonte, 1960; Bob Dylan, 1982] he asks who he is. You wonder how long he's been away.

All right, how long has he been away? Long enough for thirty million people to die without Christ, with no chance to hear the gospel—and some of them died right before his eyes: when that flimsy riverboat overturned;

when that cholera epidemic struck; when that Hindu-Moslem riot broke out.

How long has he been gone? Long enough to have had two sieges of amoebic dysentery, to nurse his wife through repeated attacks of malaria, to get the news of his mother's death before he knew she was sick.

How long? Long enough to see a few outcaste men and women turn to Christ, to see them drink in the Bible teaching he gave them, to struggle and suffer with them through the persecution that developed from non-Christian relatives, to see them grow into a steady band of believers conducting their own worship, to see this group develop an indigenous church that is reaching out to the community.

Yes, he's been away a long time. So he's different. But unnecessarily so now, it seems. At least, since he's in this country, he could pay more attention to his clothes, to what's going on around the country, to recreation, to

social life.

Of course he could.

But he can't forget—at least most of the time—that the price of a new suit would buy 3,200 Gospels; that while an American spends one day in business, five thousand Indians or Chinese die without Christ.

So when a missionary comes to your church or your Christian group, remember that he will probably be different. If he stumbles for a word now and then, he may have been speaking a foreign tongue almost exclusively for seven years, and possibly is fluent in it. If he isn't in the orator class, he may not have had a chance to speak English from a pulpit for a while. He may be eloquent on the street of an Indian Bazaar.

If he doesn't seem to warm up as quickly as you want, if he seems less approachable than a youth evangelist or college professor, remember he's been under a radically different social system since before you started high school, and maybe is unfamiliar with casual conversation.

Sure the missionary is unbalanced. But by whose scales? Yours or God's?

MISSIONARIES TODAY

-WHAT KINDS?

by Theodore Williams

A NOTE ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Theodore Williams is the General Secretary of Indian Evangelical Mission, one of the largest Indian mission agencies. He is a well-respected leader in the cause of missions. I.E.M. has trained and sent out more than $120\,$ Indian missionaries that are taking the message of Christ to people groups in central and north India.

Before Mr. Williams accepted the directorship of I.E.M., he was a successful pastor in Bangalore, India. While carrying on his duties in the pastorate, he also took time from his busy schedule to "disciple" our own Pastor M. R. Noel. For two years Mr. Williams taught Noel and worked very diligently with him. We are thankful for Mr. Williams' interest in our pastor and appreciate the wise advice he offers us in this article.

* * *

Our greatest need in missions today is the need of dedicated personnel. As I read missionary magazines and listen to missionary talks, the plea is for persons who would be available for various tasks. Even our Lord said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest" (Matt. 9:37, 38, RSV).

Our greatest difficulty is to get quality workers. As there is much unemployment in our country of India, those who just want a job apply to missions. They may say the right words and put on the right front to get the job, but after they are sent to the field we discover that there is no depth in their commitment to Christ and his purposes. Or, even worse, they may not be genuinely converted.

I believe that the only Scriptural safeguard to avoid these pitfalls is to pray earnestly that the Lord will send us those whom he has called. Recruitment through prayer rather than through advertisement seems to be the Scriptural method. However, let us remember that even among the twelve whom the Lord chose, one turned out to be Judas! That is a heartache we cannot always avoid.

As we recruit our missionaries and train them, what do we look for in them? From the late 60's missiology has become a popular subject among aspirants for theological degrees. In some missiological training, the danger is that of too much emphasis on the sociological, anthropological, and cultural aspects, and on methods to the exclusion of the spiritual dimension. In the recent gathering of the World Evangelical Fellowship Missions Commission held here in Bangalore, 40 delegates representing various missions and missions associations from all over the world discussed the subject of "Missionary Training." I would like to share with you some of the emphasis that came through.

Most of the leaders of the emerging missions in Africa, Asia, and Latin America felt that the spiritual training of the

missionaries should have priority. Spirituality and servant-hood should be the two major emphases of our missionary training.

Spirituality

1. Missionaries must be trained to walk in obedience to the Lord, trusting him for their needs and in their difficulties. Living by faith should be their lifestyle.

2. They should be trained in prayer, to prevail by prayer in impossible situations, seeing satan bound and God's redemptive power released. They should be trained to combat the forces of evil through prayer.

3. They should be taught what resources and spiritual authority they have in Christ. There is a boldness of the Holy Spirit which our missionaries must have in order that they may face the rulers of this world and the principalities and powers that are behind them.

4. They should learn how to live and work in fellowship with others. They should be trained in community living. Most of our missions have problems of relationships in the fields. The emphasis should be on teamwork, and excessive carnal individualism and independence should be curbed. As L. E. Maxwell, former principal of Prairie Bible Institute, said, "Home missions are great, foreign missions are wonderful, but submissions are the best of all."

5. Young missionaries must be trained to submit to godly leaders in the field and in the headquarters. They should be made to work with experienced missionaries for a period. Such apprenticeship training is Scriptural.

Servanthood

1. In these days there is much talk about leadership training, but very little is said about training in servanthood. Yet this is what the New Testament emphasizes. Missionaries should commit themselves not only to be servants of Christ but also servants of people (2 Corinthians 4:5).

2. They should be trained for costly involvement in the needs of the people whom they serve. This includes their physical and social needs as well as spiritual needs. Training in relief and development work is very necessary. Most of the people among whom we work constitute the oppressed and exploited masses. If we are to serve them even as our Lord served, we cannot evade involvement in their social and economical situations. All such involvement should be in the spirit of servanthood. We are not called to be commandoes or liberators but servants of the Servant Lord.

May the Lord give us the right perspective as we recruit, train, and send forth laborers into the harvest fields.






We are grateful to the Jays for their dedication and interest in getting a work started in Florida. They have invested much of themselves in seeing this come to reality.







Good News from the Churches

by the editor

IN MY TRAVELS during the summer and fall of 1982, I discovered that good things are happening in Church of God General Conference churches. From members who rarely attend services to pastors who never miss a meeting, the obvious good being created in communities across the country is evident. The following random selections will illustrate what I mean.

- A cafe owner opens his banquet room every Thursday morning to a group of merchants and school teachers for the purpose of prayer and Bible study over breakfast. Specific Bible truths and prayer needs are shared. The breakfast becomes a focal point for spiritual activity in the community.
- One of our ministers offers his services as a handyman to his small community, charging a minimal amount as compensation. Pensioners in his parish appreciate his skills and he is happy to offer them as part of his ministry.

- Each week the Church of God in another community receives from an individual a list of all the newcomers to the area. Because of the uniqueness of the service this person offers, he is able to know about new families moving into the community, so he contributes his information.
- While serving in an advisory capacity on a board in his community, this Church of God minister finds out the continuing education needed to become a counselor for the Fifth Step in the Alcoholics Anonymous program. He takes the training. Now he offers his services to AA and has helped several individuals in his area through that step.
- Several laymen, as members of service clubs in their communities, keep in touch with special needs of people groups of their area. Often these laymen of the Church of God personally go out of their way to help meet those needs "in the name of Christ."
 - From his vantage point as pastor

in a particular setting, another Church of God minister has contributed copy for a national magazine. His observations are considered worthwhile to a larger audience.

Another pastor writes a regular column for the community's weekly paper. Many people in the town have stopped him to tell of the help he has

been through the column.

This small sample of the many acts of kindness, forms of service, and contributions of spiritual guidance only proves that good things are taking place daily in Church of God churches. When the church moves out of its walls and works in its community, it finds untold opportunity to minister. If the truth were known, every Church of God church contains individuals who are active in some type of community ministry. Each story could not have been told on this page, but God has already assured us "that nothing you do in the Lord's service is ever useless" (1 Cor. 15:58, GNB).

Board Meetings

The Board of Directors of the Church of God Investment Fund met in Oregon, IL, November 29. The members of this Board are Bill Burnham, Joe James, David Krogh, William D. Lawrence, and Robert Smith.

The Investment Fund was created by action of the delegates at the Business Session in August. Its purpose is to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches.

The Board adopted policies regarding the implementation and operation of the Fund. Additional details will be available in future issues of the PROGRESS JOURNAL.

On November 30. The Board of Directors-Trustees met in Chicago, IL. The major topic of the meeting dealt with plans for funding the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. Several items regarding the work of the General Conference were reviewed, including plans for the planting of a new Church of God in Colorado Springs. The Lord is opening several doors of opportunity for starting new congregations.

Conference Staff Travels

Members of the Conference staff have traveled extensively this fall, presenting services and assisting in the ministries of many congregations. Staff members have conducted services in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota, North and South Carolina, Florida, and Michigan. Members of the staff are happy to provide consultation on church development, outreach, missions, faith-promise giving, Sunday School development, and Christian stewardship. The Conference exists to help local churches to be more effective in their ministry. Please let us know how we can help you and your church.

Equations for Action

 $120 \times 3,357 \text{ families} = 402,840$

Our Goal for Giving could be reached if 3,357 Church of God families would make gifts of at least \$120 to the General Conference during this fiscal

In the past several weeks, approximately 200 Church of God families have sent contributions; have made

commitments to give \$10 per month; or made a commitment to give at least \$120 by the end of the fiscal year on September 30, 1983. Contributions and commitments have thus far totaled \$28,624.

I am very grateful for each family which has responded to the appeal to share in the ministry of the General Conference.

To balance our equation, we must still hear from more than 3,000 Church of God families. I will look forward to hearing from each of you who have not yet joined our family of supporters.

Rounding Off Odd Numbers

76.64¢ x 60 minutes x 24 hours x 365 days = \$402,819.84.

One of the Equations for Action which I shared with you earlier shows that 76.64¢ is needed every minute during the present fiscal year if we are to reach our goal for giving by September 30, 1983.

Several weeks ago, one Church of God family sent a note to me which said: "Why not drop the odd numbers?" and on their Equations for Action card they had circled \$2,819.84 in the figure \$402,819.84. Enclosed with their card was a check for \$2,819.84!

Not only did this generous check round off our budget needs to an even \$400,000, but that check provided the entire support for the ministries of the General Conference for $2\frac{1}{2}$ days (\$2.819.84 ÷ .7664 \div 60 minutes \div 24 hours = 2.55 days).

Another generous donor sent a check for \$1,000 which will meet our needs for nearly one full day.

Special thanks are extended to each one who has laid in store as God has prospered him (1 Cor. 16:2).

Christian Emphasis Week 1982

"Choose for yourselves today whom you will serve ... but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (Josh. 24:15, NASB).

With those words as a theme Doug and Monie Todd, Arizona State legislator and members of the Tempe, Arizona, Lakeshore Bible Church of God, worked and lived among the students and staff of Oregon Bible College—bringing a week filled with challenge and inspiration to serve God by being true servants to mankind. During Christian Emphasis Week the Todds attended and participated in classes, addressed the entire campus through Chapel and participated in a "Day of Prayer."

During the chapel period the Todds reviewed the history of the Church of God in Arizona and told how their family and the church had grown up over the generations. The church continues to play a major role in their lives as Doug serves his District in the Arizona House of Representatives. Brother Todd's message included a number of important guidelines for Christians in today's world.

"Take a stand on issues affecting people and life." Doug pointed to the importance of Christians caring enough about the activities of their government to get involved. Involvement begins by becoming a part of the process—by registering and by voting. According to Brother Todd, the Christian's voice can and should be heard clearly through the political process. As a legislator he welcomes direct contact from his constituency. In response to an often-heard objection that politics are corrupt Doug commented, "Evil grows best when a few good men do nothing."

In Counseling Class the Todds were asked to discuss the helping skills they want their pastor to possess in order to minister to their needs and the needs of others. Highlights of that discussion were as follows:

- Friendship—he should be a friend who will listen with an open mind
 —no immediate answers expected.
- An appreciation for the work of others. A sounding board for ideas and ideals.
- One skilled in human relations—prepared for the independence of other people—willing and able to work with self-sufficient people.
- Skilled in dealing with the tough issues of people's lives.
- Sensitivity—be able to read people without words, to initiate, to respond.

Through input from laymen, ministry students were able to relate classroom activities and textbooks to life situations.

The students, faculty and staff are deeply grateful to Doug and Monie Todd for giving a week of their time, experience, and insightful counsel to Oregon Bible College during Christian Emphasis Week, 1982.

Progress on the Archives

The archives have been moved into the new location in the basement of the College Library. Some preliminary work has begun on organizing and cataloging the book materials. 

Oregon Bible College Development Foundation

The Board of Directors of the General Conference/ Trustees of Oregon Bible College unanimously approved the launching of the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation Challenge Campaign on November 30, 1982. The Challenge Campaign will be conducted over the next two years (1983-1984) to raise \$1,000,000 for the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation.

Development Foundation

The decision by the Board of Trustees of Oregon 3ible College to initiate a major gift campaign to secure capital endowment for OBC was based upon the results of the four-month feasibility study carried out by Adam Anderson Associates during the months of August-November of 1982.

There was a strong and favorable response from the majority of individuals interviewed during that period to establish the Development Foundation for OBC and to provide capital gift support directly to the Foundation through financial commitments over a three-year period.

Since 1980 the college has had a modest invested endowment. The earnings have made it possible to employ students with financial need in campus workstudy positions and to supplement ministry internships. It has thus been possible for smaller churches to participate in that valuable training program.

The first significant contribution to the Development Foundation was made by a couple who are members of the Church of God and have been loyal supporters of OBC over the years. Their gift has been given in the form of a financial commitment of \$100,000. The first \$25,000 has been contributed to the Foundation as the initial installment of that \$100,000 leadership commitment.

The Challenge gift of \$100,000 was made with considerable thought and prayer by its donors in hopes that every member of the Church of God will seriously consider the part each one will take in contributing toward a solid financial base for OBC.

The successful raising of one million dollars for the OBC Development Foundation will depend in large part on the sacrificial gift support of those who will make leadership gifts during the Development Foundation Challenge Campaign.

Total gift participation on the part of the Board of Trustees, administration, and staff of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College is anticipated in the early phase of the campaign.

During this first phase of the Challenge Campaign, major gift solicitation will be carried out by Adam Anderson, President of Adam Anderson Associates, and Dr. Charles Pryor, President of the College. They anticipate making personal contacts with several hundred members of the General Conference throughout the country. Broader gift support for the Development Foundation is anticipated as group presentations are made to the churches within the General Conference.

The future growth of Oregon Bible College and the quality of the leadership it produces for the outreach ministries of the Church of God General Conference depend to a large extent on the successful outcome of the OBC Development Foundation Challenge Campaign.

New Church-Planting Effort at Colorado Springs

Outreach is an exciting and essential part of the ministry of God's church. One of the most exciting things to happen this year is the launching of a new Church of God in Colorado Springs, Colorado, with an official beginning in June.

We have seen God's leading in many ways during the past couple of years. In December, 1980, Irene and I met with the Bible study group in the home of Preston and Dorothy Landry in Colorado Springs. The idea of starting a church was kicked around and then left to further thought and prayer. A visit to the city by David Krogh and his family further fostered the plan. With a couple more visits by Irene and me, telephone conversations, the leadership of God working in the lives of the Needhams, their visit to Colorado Springs and discussions with the core group, what once was just an idea was coming closer to reality.

One of the outstanding results of God's leadership has been in the provision and selection of a pastorleader. Bro. Don Needham, his wife Becky and their sons will be moving to Colorado Springs early in June to serve as church-planting pastor. Their earlier visit to the city and discussions with the core group resulted in determining a mutual attitude in relation to purpose, motivation, and philosophy for the establishment and ministry of this new church, Bro. Needham has resigned from a very successful and comfortable pastorate at Blanchard, Michigan, to accept the ministry of building a congregation of believers in Colorado Springs. It is exciting, challenging, and frightening to step out into a venture of church planting. But faith and dedication are key elements. Praise God for the evidence of both of these elements in the lives of the Needhams and their willingness to step out in faith in this new work for God. Not only is faith involved, but also faithfulness, for to be faithful requires that we continue to expand and extend the Body of Christ. To do this, new fields of ministry must be opened through which Jesus Christ and the gospel of the kingdom of God can be shared. Your prayer support of the Needhams is coveted. I encourage you to uplift them daily as they prepare for this move.

During this semester at Oregon Bible College I am teaching a class on the Principles of Church Planting. The Colorado Springs project is being used as a visible and tangible opportunity for the implementation of

these principles. The plan is to select a team of students from this class to go to Colorado in June to assist in community outreach. Irene and I, the team of students, and the Needhams will begin working in a selected area of the city to build a prospect list and invite persons to attend home Bible studies. The northeast section of the city has been chosen as the target area after studying a great deal of data. Growth factors of the expansion of the city in this area along with other pertinent information indicates this to be the choice location for a church planting effort. A specific building site will be purchased at a later date.

The finances for this church-planting venture will come from contributions from the core group, the church development aid fund of the General Conference, and from churches and individuals who desire to be a part of this project. If you or your church is interested in helping to financially support this project, please contact me for more information.

Several factors indicate this to be one of great potential:

- 1. A committed core group with a solid Bible foundation and a strong motivation to see a Church of God established in this city.
- 2. A dedicated mature pastor-leader who has pastored a growing vibrant church and feels the leadership of God in this church-planting effort.
- 3. The city is growing rapidly. One of the indicators of receptivity for growth is new people moving into a new area.
- 4. Evidence of God's leadership in the steps of planning and preparation.
- 5. The expressed desire of people to help launch this church-planting project.
- 6. The willingness and availability of trained Oregon Bible College students to help in making contacts in the community.

This is a pilot program in church planting and we need you to help:

Throughout recent months I have been in correspondence with Pastor S. U. Mbaba in Nigeria. He has been interested in our work even though he has not been affiliated with us. Last fall he was sent a packet of literature which included the 29 lessons of the Systematic Bible Study Course. He received this packet October 28, 1982.

It gives me pleasure to share with you two giving programs which are being launched throughout the Church of God. The two programs are:

Church of God Development Council

Church of God Founders' Circle

These two giving programs are designed to provide a large portion annually of the necessary funds to support General Conference ministries. Involvement by all Church of God people in one of these two programs will go a long way in providing necessary support for Conference services.

Development Council

To become a part of the Development Council requires an annual contribution of \$500 or more during the calendar year of 1983. Those who become a part of the Council will:

- 1. provide advice and counsel to the Conference whenever and wherever helpful.
- 2. give leadership gift support to underwrite the daily operations of the Conference.
- 3. assist the General Conference in promoting the vital services provided by the Conference to members of the Church of God.

Founders' Circle

For many years the Conference has had a planned program of spending in the form of an annual budget. The giving programs mentioned on this page will make it possible for us to have a planned program of income. To achieve fiscal responsibility we must be certain that spending is balanced by income.

To effectively carry out the ministries of the Conference, we must make commitments to staff to provide salaries and benefits; we must make commitments to local churches to provide Church Development Aid; and we must make commitments to provide Christian educational material to our churches and members. Through the Development Council and Founders' Circle it is possible for Church of God people to assure us of their support of the decisions made by the delegates. With the cooperation of all Church of God people we can not only maintain the present services of the Conference, but we can move vigorously ahead with planting new churches; launching mission efforts overseas; providing assistance for the revitalization of existing churches; strengthening Sunday School and youth programs; and upgrading our Christian Education materials.

With the Lord's help and the cooperation of many willing workers, we face a bright future in the Church of God.

Heart and Soul of Outreach

The heart and soul of outreach is sharing Jesus Christ with those who need him. In these simple words of Jesus, his purpose is expressed with convincing clarity, "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10).

The responsibility of this mission is shared through the parable of the marriage feast of Matthew 22:9; "Go yetherefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall find, bid to the marriage."

The reality of these scriptures comes to life as men and women come to Jesus Christ through the ministry of believers in local churches. At this point it is no longer words; it becomes a personal experience. New believers share in the joy of salvation and fellowship in the body of Christ. The following testimony illustrates the power of God at work to change lives.

Pastor David Cheatwood wrote recently, "I baptized Larry Janssen into the body of Christ. We worked a little over two years with Larry, stopping by to visit him and encourage him and let him know we as a people were interested in him. Larry had some difficulties and ended up in jail. During this time I continued to visit him on a weekly basis. It was while he was in jail that he accepted Christ as his Savior when he came to the realization that the church and his wife were the only friends he had. All the others deserted him once he got into trouble.

"As a result of that witness through the period of time he was in jail he completed the Systematic Bible Study Course. After finishing the course and completing his time, I baptized him at Long Lake. He is presently working with his wife in a discipleship program, learning how to better serve the Lord. He is growing and becoming more involved in learning the things of God.

"He has also joined AA and is now the chairman of the Litchfield AA group and working hard at helping others see that there is a better way of life than chemicals.

"Pray for Larry and Anita as they grow in Christ and mature in the faith. They've brought great joy to our lives in Eden Valley and it is fun to watch them grow.

"Because of the time and energy I've invested in Larry's life, his conversion has been a personal joy. I've learned an important secret. The time, energy, love, and friendship given to others is repaid when the Lord reaches down and brings about their conversion. But let Larry tell his story."

Larry's Testimony

I was born and raised on a farm. Since my parents didn't attend church, I seldom worshiped as well. When I was 18 I joined the armed forces for two years. It was during this time that I started drinking and doing drugs.

When I turned 21 everything went backwards. My alcohol and drug dependency overwhelmed me to the point that I was committed to a state hospital to solve my abuse. But I wasn't ready to stop, so I played their games to the point that I was finally dismissed.

By the time I was 25 I took my worst slide downhill. I ended up in a state penitentiary for some things I did while under the influence of alcohol and drugs. I was in for a year.

During that year I took a look at myself. My whole life had been spent in and out of jails, I wanted a change from it all. I still didn't believe in God, but after my release I stayed out of trouble for four years.

But something was missing from my life; I didn't know what it was. I got married at the age of 28, but it didn't bring me what I needed and we got a divorce after five months.

I began to get into trouble again with the law, drinking and using drugs. This went on for a couple years until recently.

Then while in jail again I came to know Christ as my Savior. I have been learning more about him every day and I feel a lot better about everything.

I hope my story will help someone else avoid the troubles I've been in

Sincerely in Christ, Larry Janssen.

What a joy to read of a ministry resulting in a person coming to Christ. This is the focus of outreach.



EULOGY FOR A LEADER*

Harold "Doc" Doan

When a well-known servant of the church dies, we look at his life and ask what guided him. As I looked at Harold Doan's life, I saw three questions that needed to be answered. Was he a man of Providence or coincidence? Was he a man of the Promises of God or a seeker or popularity? Was he a man just passing time or prepared to do the Lord's will?

First, was he a man of Providence or coincidence? Solomon in the book of Ecclesiastes says, "Time and chance happeneth to them all" (9:11). He goes on to say, "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die . . . a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance" (3:1-4); and then "He hath made every thing beautiful in his time . . ." (3:11). We, too, must recognize the aspects of coincidence and chance in the lives of men. It is a part of life. Even for the believer, one cannot expect a perfect life. We expect some difficult times. If there is a religious fanatic that says by believing in God "everything will be all right," we can only say with Solomon, nonsense (see Eccl. 8:12-14, Good News Translation).

However, as we study the question "Providence or coincidence?"—and look at Bro. Doan's life—I can only say that I feel there was more to this life than coincidence. After many years of service with the General Conference, the Doans moved to California. Since the move Doc provided a tireless, dogged, loving effort to establish the Valley Bible Church. After meeting in a YWCA and later in another women's club in the valley, he saw a need to formalize the church within the framework of a nonprofit corporation. He spent many hours organizing the church. Having worked with the Conference at length, he was well aware that if the local church was not strong, there could be no General Conference. He died twelve days after he felt the church strong enough that he did not have to be a member of the Board of Directors for our local church. Our annual

meeting was January 16; he died January 28. While Jean, his wife, talked to the family the morning of his death, saying, "We've expected this for eighteen years" (he had some health problems earlier), I felt a deep sense of the Providence of God. I believe Harold Doanwas a man of Providence, not coincidence God was using this man.

Second, was he a man of the Promises of God or a seeker of popularity? When considering Harold's dedication to the Church of God as Pastor, Executive Secretary, Editor, and Chairman of the Baord of Directors, no doubt he was a popular person. His wit, charm, and impeccable dress helped us to like him. However, for those of us who were fortunate to know him in some depth, there is no question that the force behind his service was that he believed in the promises of God. For those unaware, he traveled almost fifty miles to church each Sunday morning. At an elders' meeting this past year he emphasized his commitment, "If I didn't believe in the promises of God, the kingdom of God on the earth, the covenants made to Abraham and to David, in our total message, do you think I would be driving these distances? I would go to the church down the block." He believed in the sure Word of God. A Church founded upon our heritage of biblical faith was essential.

Some of those promises that he totally accepted are relevant to our remembering him. Job asks the question, "If a man die, shall he live again?" (14:14.) Speaking of the resurrection, Job says, "All the days of my appointed time will I wait, till my change come. Thou shalt call, and I will answer thee . . ." (14:14, 15). When God through his Son resurrects the faithful, I believe Harold Doan will be in that resurrection.

Occasionally Doc could get a facial expression with a "set jaw" that for those near him meant disapproval. This often came as a result of some policy that he felt would not in the long run benefit the church. Though he was popular, he cared more for the promises.

Third, was Harold Doan just passing time or was

he a man prepared? I believe he was a man prepared-prepared not only to do the Lord's will through working with the church and Conference, but also prepared when dealing in his business ventures. Anyone who knew him well knew that he carried his end of any project. Whether it was the Study Committee to reorganize the General Conference or a committee for working in the local church, he came to the meetings with his thoughts already organized in a manner that told all of us that he had spent much time in preparation. At the Lord's return, when the faithful are given authority and Jesus says, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things. I will make thee ruler over many things" (Matt. 25:21), I won't be surprised if Harold is given rulership over ten cities. He was prepared and served us well.

Not only was he personally prepared, he and Jean have continually supported the preparation of others, especially students at Oregon Bible College. Through scholarships and direct support, many of us are now prepared for service through their help. Someone asked me, "Do you think we will affect as many lives as Doc did?" My reply was, "Probably not; he touched and influenced so many."

I cannot help but think of Hebrews 11 as a summary. In an age that lacks heroes and great leader/servants, I sincerely believe we are remembering one today. Verse thirteen is applicable, he "... died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off . . ." and was "... persuaded of them, and embraced them." He was a leader of the Church of God, a man of faith. He was a man of Providence, a man of the promises, and a man prepared. We will miss him.

His Wisdom and Impact

I have come here today to this Memorial Service as a representative of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference; as a representative of the General Conference staff; and as a representative of Church of God people everywhere, to pay tribute to a man who has had an enormous impact upon the Church of God.

For 13 years, Harold Doan served as Executive Director of the General Conference, as well as serving as Youth Director, Editor of Publications, and part-time instructor at Oregon Bible College. He served for nine years during three terms as a member of the Board of Directors, five years of which he served as chairman. In 1978 and '79 he served as the chairman of the General Conference Study Committee, which helped to reorganize the Conference and to plot a new direction.

Through these long years of service, Bro. Doan influenced the lives of many people, and he provided professional management for the Conference. Many of the programs which he implemented years ago are still in place and operating successfully.

I bring to you, Jean, and to your children, per-

sonal words of sympathy from each member of the Board who could not be here today. The Board was meeting in Hammond, Louisiana, when we received the sad news of Harold's death.

In our time of sorrow, the Board turned to the Lord, in thanksgiving for Harold's life and work, and we asked the Lord to heal the pain of loss, not only for you, Greg, and Chris, but also for each of us.

Harold's death is a personal loss for the Board. Three of us who sat around the Board table were his students at Oregon Bible College, and we each expressed the great impact that he had on our lives and our ministries. The others at the table were long-time friends, colleagues, and fellow servants, who had labored together with him for the Lord.

Our churches have lost a man of great wisdom—a man who loved the Lord and who served well.

Our prayers are with you, Jean, as you face tomorrow, confident in the great hope of the return of Jesus and the resurrection of the dead in Christ.

The Annual Financial Statement on these pages was prepared by McGladrey Hendrickson & Co., Rockford, IL, and accepted by the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors, January 27, 1983.

To the Board of Directors Church of God General Conference Oregon, Illinois

We have reviewed the accompanying balance sheet of Church of God General Conference as of September 30, 1982, and the related statement of support and revenue, expenses and changes in fund balances, and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All of the information included in those financial statements is the representation of the management of Church of God General Conference.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Conference personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an examination in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activities:

The Church of God General Conference is a nonprofit corporation organized under the laws of the State of Illinois for the purpose of assisting members, churches, and conferences of the Church of God and to operate a Bible college to prepare students for church leadership, the ministry, and teaching. The Conference is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, its accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

Current unrestricted funds are those funds presently available for use by the Conference at the discretion of the Board of Directors. If the Board specifies a purpose where none has been stated by the original donor, such funds are classified as Board-designated current funds. Current restricted funds are presently available for use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donor. Such restricted amounts received but not yet earned are reported as deferred revenue.

Endowment funds result from the donors' specifications that the funds be invested and that, generally, only the income be used.

Tuition, Fees, and Subscriptions:

Tuition, fees, and subscriptions are recognized as revenue in the applicable period to which they relate. Unearned amounts are included as unrestricted deferred revenue.

Property and Equipment

Expenditures for the acquisition of property and equipment are capitalized at cost; the fair value of donated property and equipment is similarly capitalized. Conference and college buildings are not depreciated. All other buildings and equipment are depreciated using the straight-line method.

ONE MILLION GHANIANS EXPELLED

Amid the forced exodus of an estimated one million Ghanaians from Nigeria back to their small West African homeland, an international relief and development agency has rushed \$55,000 in emergency medial supplies to Ghana for distribution in the capital city of Accra.

World Vision International announced plans for the initial project today as agency officials in Accra surveyed the situation in anticipation of a large increase in emergency funding. The rapid influx of the refugees has left the already economically troubled coutry of Ghana in the grips of a severe national crisis.

Russ Kerr, World Vision Africa's relief director,

Russ Kerr, World Vision Africa's relief director, said from Accra that the deportees are facing an imminent crisis of major proportions.

"Several deaths from starvation, dehydration, and disease have resulted from their perilous journey," said Kerr. "The threat of a massive outbreak of cholera exists due to unsanitary conditions among the masses who are arriving on foot."

World Vision, a Christian agency with projects in 86 nations, has budgeted \$2.5 million for ongoing programs in Ghana this year, including the care of some 10,000 children in 38 childcare projects

"Whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well." Within each of us there is a "generous impulse" to make use of our resources and assets in a way that will benefit others. Like so many other things in life, this impulse needs to have planning and foresight if it is to be meaningful. Many people are willing to leave to happenstance the distribution of their assets, thinking that, as if by magic, those persons, institutions, worthy causes, and charities will receive a share of the estate.

If you have ever felt the "generous impulse" it is important for you to ask yourself three questions:

• Who, now in my responsibility, may need care and support in the event that I may no longer be present to fulfill my responsibility?

 What institutions, organizations, worthy causes, or charities are worthy of my support? Which of these have I helped and which ones will continue to need help?

• Whom can I rely on to see that my concerns, expressed in my giving, are carried out?

If you have taken the foregoing questions seriously, you are now confronted with the task of seeking to do some planning so that your estate may adequately take care of your responsibilities as well as providing funds for worthwhile causes and organizations. The method for doing such planning is called "Planned Giving." It's not as complicated as it sounds. Actually, it is a method, or methods, whereby financial aid is made available to designated individuals, causes, and/or institutions, at a deferred or later date.

To a great extent many of the social, educational, cultural, health care, and religious institutions have depended on private financial support. Our way of life has always put a premium on helping one's neighbor. Thus, the prime motive for contributing to charitable organizations is to further their work and goals. The Church of God General Conference has established itself as a multi-faceted church ministry dedicated to the servicing of the members of the Church of God. Since 1922 the Church of God General Conference has endeavored to meet the spiritual needs of the denomination and maintain and preserve its unique distinctives as a church body. In earlier years, the short-term gifts of churches and individuals bore the financial burdens.

The time has now come when, if the Church of God General Conference is to expand its goals and deepen its commitment, its financial base must be solidified through the planned gifts of individuals who subscribe to its purposes.

METHODS OF PLANNED GIVING

Basically, there are five methods of planning your estate so that others may enjoy the full benefit of your gift or bequest, in whole or in part, at some future date. Some of these provide reasonable tax-sheltered income from gifts and investments. These methods are:

- Wills and Bequests
- Revocable Living Trust Agreements
- Life Income Agreements
- Gifts of Property and Securities
- Life Insurance

Let's take a look at each of these methods, with particular emphasis on your interest in continuing, and enhancing, the scope of the Church of God General Conference.

Wills and Bequests

The making of a will should be a part of your total stewardship of life. It not only insures the financial welfare of your family, but it also gives you the opportunity of specifying gifts to your favorite cause or organization. This method of "planned giving" allows you to specify how your estate is to be divided rather than letting state and federal governments disburse your assets. For instance, a significant way is to include the Church of God General Conference as a beneficiary in your will.

Revocable Living Trust Agreements

A revocable living trust is a flexible agreement set up by a donor during his or her lifetime with a charitable organization. The donor transfers income-producing properties into the trust agreement with the right to change or revoke it at any time, reclaiming the full assets of the trust. The purpose in setting up a revocable trust is to secure better management of the assets placed into the trust, receive a guaranteed life income, and establish desired distribution of it at death to beneficiaries without passing it through probate court. Usually, the remaining principal goes to a charitable organization like the Church of God General Conference.

Life Income Agreements

This method of "planned giving" provides substantial gift advantages to a donor who transfers properties on an irrevocable basis to a charitable institution. These kinds of gifts—for example, a Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust, Charitable Remainder Unitrust, Pooled Income Fund—offer significant tax benefits, the avoidance of probate costs, reduction of estate administration costs, increased income to you and your loved ones and, ultimately, contribute to the future financial stabilization of the Church of God General Conference.

Gifts of Property and Securities

Persons who have accumulated property or securities may find it to their advantage to make their contributions to an organization such as the Church of God General Conference in the form of a gift of property or securities. While there are specific tax advantages to this kind of planned giving, the important benefit resides with the receiving institution which increases its capital assets and expands its endowment fund. This method of planned giving is especially advantageous to the donor in those cases where the property or securities have increased substantially in value over a period of years.

Life Insurance

An increasingly popular way of providing philanthropic support for organizations like the Church of God General Conference is through life insurance policies. A simple and informal procedure is for the insured to change the beneficiary of an existing policy from a relative who no longer needs protection to a favorite charity. Once the institution has been named as the irrevocable beneficiary and owner of the policy, then the premiums can be counted as tax deductions.

Another way to use life insurance as a "planned gift" is to maintain members of the family as beneficiaries of the policy, but instruct the insurance company to send all dividends to the designated organization. If you should choose this method of planned giving, you could count such dividends paid to the Church of God General Conference as cash do-

nations and list them among your charitable deductions on your income tax return.

NOT LEFT TO CHANCE

This information has attempted, in brief form, to outline some of the primary ways whereby you may want to consider making a "planned gift" to the Church of God General Conference. WITHOUT YOUR SUPPORT, in a way that insures long-term benefits, the Church of God General Conference cannot continue to exist. Planning your gifts through the use of "planned giving" will provide the kind of endowment fund which will insure the work of this organization, as well as providing you with the satisfying knowledge that through your gift a portion of yourself will live after you.

"Not what we have, but what we use..." Planned Giving offers each person, NO MATTER WHAT THE SUM TOTAL OF HIS ESTATE MAY BE, a way whereby he can contribute to the charity of his choice. Don't let it rest to chance; too much is at stake, for you as well as those who will come after you.

MAKE YOUR DECISION TODAY

Choose one of these ways in which to help perpetuate the work of the Church of God General Conference:

- 1. Put the Church of God General Conference in your will; see your lawyer.
- Make a gift of property or securities and receive important tax advantages; ask your tax advisor.
- Make a gift through life insurance; talk to your insurance counselor.
- 4. Improve your income and your tax position by arranging a gift through your estate NOW.

- 8 Praise God for the love, faithfulness, example, and service of the mothers in your church. Thank God for your mother and her contribution in your life.
- 9 Pray for pastors who are in a time of transition in their places of ministry. (Several pastors will be moving to new locations of service this fall.)

We keep plugging starting new churches! Why? Because starting new churches is essential...for several reasons:

- 1. God has commissioned the church with the ministry of reconciliation (2 Cor. 5:17). The church is the means by which God has chosen to convey the message of redemption. It is God's will that local churches be started throughout the world in order that the message of Jesus Christ be delivered through the fellowship of a body of believers.
- New churches are necessary for effective evangelism. Newer churches are more effective in reaching people.
- 3. Several churches can penetrate an area far better than a few large ones.
- 4. Growing denominations plant new churches.
- 5. Denominations usually decline when new churches are not started. This pattern of decline crosses denominational lines. In a recent publication it was stated that a denomination must start at least 50 churches per year in order to survive, "for that's about how fast we close dying churches." It is tragic when a church closes its doors. But we must realize that this does happen and our greatest preventive measure is starting new churches. We won't be able to prevent all church closings, but we will be able to maintain an active ministry of reaching the lost with the gospel of truth through Jesus Christ.
- 6. New churches are necessary to reach a variety of ethnic groups, cultures, and homogeneous units. A few churches reach only a narrow scope of the population (consider Rev. 5:9).

Most of our readers are aware of the church planting project to be launched at Colorado Springs this summer. A team of Oregon Bible College students will be used to help launch the new church. A specific area of the city will be canvassed by the team members and people will be invited to participate in Bible studies. YOUR CHURCH CAN BE A PART OF THIS PROJECT. Student members of the team will be giving up their summer jobs for this ministry. And giving up a summer job means giving up income needed for college tuition next fall. Some local churches in the past have sponsored students for shortterm mission service. We are encouraging local churches to get behind our students and help sponsor them for this summer's project at Colorado Springs. NEEDS IN GHANA SHIFT

In an effort to further assist in the repatriation of some 20,000 needy Ghanaian deportees from Nigeria, World Vision, an international relief and development agency, has initiated a \$180,000 resettlement project there.

The project will include a month-long supplementary feeding program for those still remaining in transit camps, immediate transport of 400 persons from border camps to their home villages, and medical attention for approximately 6,000

World Vision officials in Ghana's capital of Accra report that although the crisis situation has past, significant long-term development

needs remain.
"The main thrust of further response will be in long-term resettlement projects as the country begins the monumental task of reabsorbing these people into society," said Russ Kerr, the agency's Africa relief director.

Although the deportation crisis did not reach expected proportions, Ghanaian officials fear the economic consequences of the influx of one million unskilled workers into an already-failing economy.

1982 A BIG YEAR FOR SCRIPTURE DISTRIBUTION

Distribution of Scriptures in the U.S. by the American Bible Society last year topped the 124 million mark

That made 1982 the second biggest year in the 167-year history of the Society's work in the United States.

The precise figure was 124,362,426 copies, bettering the 1981 total by over 26 million, or 26.6 percent.

This figure does not include distribution ABS helped achieve in other countries.

By far the greatest jump, 28 percent, was in the use of Scripture Selections. Demand for these single or double-page Bible passages, usually from the Gospels or Psalms, and addressing specific life situations, has risen dramatically in recent years. Use in community outreach is a

prime reason for their growing popularity.

More than 3.2 million New Testaments were distributed, an increase of 900,000 over 1981. Recorded Scriptures, still relatively small by comparison with the printed variety, showed a gain of 30,000 during the year.

Top ABS executive Alice E. Ball, general

secretary who supervises work throughout this country, attributes the upswing to three basic factors.

"There is of course a greater demand for the Word of God, which we tend to see in times of social and economic upset," says Miss Ball.

'We also are now able to deal with the need for Scriptures more quickly when and where it arises, and have a good team of representatives out in the field."

Above all it is the great work of the thousands of volunteers all around the country, who are helping so much with this ministry in their own home towns."

Giving a series of boosts to the distribution total were a number of special programs over and above regular demand.

and above regular demand.

When prison chaplains throughout the country offered free New Testaments to inmates they asked for over 1.5 million copies, of which 914,577 were distributed by the end of the year,

with more of them going out this year.

Participants at the Knoxville World's Fair and in surrounding areas put in a call for over two million special Scriptures. They were among scores of churches and organizations ordering copies of the Word with their own name imprinted on them.

Scripture orders for Christmas rose above the 40 million level, a three million increase over the previous year. Faster also showed a hig rise as

previous year. Easter also showed a big rise as youth and refugee groups presented a greater need in 1982.

A pocket-size booklet with Scripture passages, interleaved with sayings by William Penn, helped a million Pennsylvanians celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of their founder's arrival on these shores.

One of the year's biggest success stories was the use of attractive daily Scripture cards for patient bed trays in hospitals. This program brought in requests for over 17 million cards.






Throughout his 68 years of ministry, Clyde touched innumerable lives with his love and concern for

epitomized in her. She rejoiced with those who rejoiced and wept with those who wept. She could empathize with those who bore great burdens and suffered much grief.



Chapel—Devotions—Prayer Day


Time spent getting closer to God is an important part of one's day. Besides personal devotion time each day, chapel is an opportunity



to worship God with the rest of the students and faculty. Speakers at chapel range from our own faculty and senior students to guest




speakers. Sometimes the worship experience takes place without a speaker, as in the case of New Song Sings or films.


















Description of Church of God General Conference

The Church of God General Conference was incorporated in the State of Illinois as a corporation not for profit, June 3, 1922, under the name "National Bible Institution." The corporation name was changed May 17, 1961, to "Church of God General Conference."

The purpose for which the Church of God General Conference is incorporated is to assist Church of God members, churches, and conferences to perform their commission to feed the Church of God and preach the gospel to all the world by providing trained personnel, services, resources, and materials.—Article I, Section 1, By-Laws.

The Church of God General Conference directly serves approximately 6,500 baptized members of the Church of God, 77 member churches, 14 State and District Conferences, approximately 24 nonmember churches, and the public at large.

The offices of the Corporation are located at 131 North 3rd Street in Oregon, Illinois.

The Conference is organized into three departments: Publishing, Outreach and Church Development, and Business Administration. Oregon Bible College, which was established August 8, 1939, is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Conference. Two subsidiary corporations were established August 18, 1982: Oregon Bible College Development Foundation, and Church of God Investment Fund.

Delegates and interested members of the Church of God meet annually in August to confer in all matters pertaining to the spiritual life and business of the churches.

Each member church of 15 or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, is entitled to one delegate for each 50 of its active members or fraction thereof.

A member church is a Church of God which adheres to the Statement of Faith contained in the Constitution and which has on record at the General Conference office a Statement of Affiliation with the General Conference.

Members of the Board of Directors, one delegate from each State or District Conference, and certain licensed and ordained ministers are recognized as delegates at large.

A seven-member Board of Directors is elected by the delegates for four-year terms. These Board members also

serve as the Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College and the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation.

During the past 12 months, approximately 31 percent of operating revenue came from earned income. Approximately 69 percent came from contributions of individuals, churches, and conferences.

Dear Church of God Member.

This annual report of the Church of God General Conference is presented with rejoicing to God and thanksgiving for each of you who has labored in the Church of God during the past 12 months.

As we review the events of the past year and make plans for the coming fiscal year, we have a sense of excitement and optimism. Positive situations we find in the Church of God today are:

Church Revitalization

During the past year, giant strides have been made through the Department of Outreach and Church Development in assisting several of our churches. As a result of visits and consultation by Conference personnel, several churches have adopted clearly defined purpose statements; they have evaluated their current activities and situation; and they have implemented new ministries and programs that are helping them to achieve their purposes. Several churches have experienced good numerical growth, spiritual growth, and renewal.

Personal Evangelism Strategy and Discipling

Several churches have recently launched evangelism ministries which include a clear, short presentation of the gospel in the homes of prospects. The Lord is blessing these efforts with increased church attendance and baptisms. As new members are being added to the church, discipling ministries are being used in several churches to assist babes in Christ to come to maturity.

Church Planting

It has become apparent to the Church of God that the cutting edge of growth lies in the planting of new churches. Our efforts to revitalize existing churches will continue, but the survival and expansion of the Church of God will depend upon new churches. During June, 1983, the first steps were taken to launch a new work at Colorado Springs. Other possible church-planting sites are being explored.

Foreign Missions

During the past few months, our missions emphasis in the Church of God has taken a new leap forward. Conference personnel have visited many of our churches, creating missions awareness. The mission trip to Africa will provide valuable input as we plan our trategy for the future.

The development of a proposed missions policy for local church use, and the creation of a missions SUMMER 1983

philosophy document which will be acted upon by the delegates, will provide needed direction and clarification in missions planning.

Oregon Bible College

Forty-four years of continuous service to the Church of God concluded with commencement exercises on Friday evening, May 13. Five men graduated from the ministry studies program and nine persons received two-year church leadership certificates. Each ministry graduate will be in active service by the end of summer. Five additional ministry candidates completed internships during the 1982-83 school year. Oregon Bible College continues to provide trained leaders for the Church of God.

Oregon Bible College Development Foundation

Substantial progress has been made in funding the College Development Foundation. That new corporation will be extremely valuable in creating a strong financial base for our College. The future of the Church of God depends upon having a strong Bible College where our leaders and Christian workers are being trained. The Foundation will help insure the continuation of superior Bible and professional training for the Church of God.

The Future

It seems apparent that the Church of God as a whole should attempt to grow and expand as long as there are significant unmet needs in the world. The General Conference is poised and prepared for that growth, both in present ministries and in new opportunities God is presenting. Questions of growth will center on where to concentrate funds and expertise. Some degree of frustration will undoubtedly occur as needs and opportunities exceed available resources.

We ask you to join us in facing the future with the assurance of God's blessing, an attitude of optimism, and a determination to work hard to accomplish as much as possible before our Lord returns.

Ten Church of God members from six churches attended the Conference of the Association of Church Missions Committees at Carbondale, Illinois. They returned home with a new awareness of the great unfinished task of world-wide missions.

1982 General Conference

Over 550 persons attended one or more of the Conference sessions. The theme "Let the Church Obey His Voice" provided valuable information on evangelistic outreach for our churches. Scott Ross was elected to the Board of Directors.

New Ministers

Seven persons received ministerial licenses from the License and Ordination Board at General Conference: Kathy Anger, Darlene Burkhart, Gary Burnham, Joe Good, Cecil Rademachir, Howard Robinson, and Janet Stilson.

Oregon Bible College Development Foundation Incorporated

As a result of action taken by the delegates at the summer General Conference, articles of incorporation were filed August 18, 1982. Adam Anderson of Anderson Associates was retained to conduct an audit regarding the feasibility of raising one million dollars for the Foundation.

Church of God Investment Fund Incorporated

Bill Burnham, Dr. William D. Lawrence, and Robert Smith were appointed as trustees of the Investment Fund to serve along with Joe James, chairman of the General Conference Board of Directors, and David Krogh, Executive Director. Articles of incorporation were filed August 18, 1982.

Oregon Bible College Fall Semester

Thirty-five full-time and five part-time students began the 1982-83 term Sunday evening, August 22, 1982. Anthony Buzzard began his service as guest lecturer.

Parents' Weekend at OBC

Parents and grandparents of students visited the campus October 7-9. They attended classes and participated in special activities.

OBC Christian Emphasis Week



Know, Apply, and Communicate God's Word

At Oregon Bible College students receive instruction in the truths of the Bible and in the rich heritage of the Church of God, develop deep understandings of those truths, and gain an appreciation for church life and structure. They learn to maximize the use of their gifts and talents within the framework of the Church of God.

For Whom Is OBC?

Whether one is a high school student or a career person considering a change of occupation, OBC may be for him or her. Members of the current student body range in age from 17 years to the mid-forties. Most are single. Others are married and have children. The Oregon community becomes home for each college student and members of his/her family.

Diplomas Offered

Two-year Program

A two-year diploma in Church Leadership is offered upon completion of the requirements of a 60-hour program consisting of 24 hours of Bible and Theology, a broad foundation in General Education, and Ministry Courses. Two-year graduates apply their learnings as leaders and workers in their home churches as they pursue secular careers.

Four-year Program

The professional studies program in Christian Ministry requires 120 credits in Bible, General Education, and Ministry Courses. The four-year program includes a major concentration in selected areas of ministry.

The educational experience at Oregon Bible College is provided by a variety of resources and activities. Those include faculty advisement, courses, student discussion groups, Christian Service experiences, Seminars, guest speakers, and library resources. The student must do acceptable work and have a grade average of at least "C" for the entire program.

Students may pursue six hours credit in General Education per semester through Rock Valley College. Credits thus earned are fully accredited and transferable. While they are a part of the Oregon Bible College curriculum requirements, general education courses are earned through Rock Valley College or by transfer from an approved College. If a student desires, he/she may structure a curriculum plan whereby an Associate of Arts Degree can be accomplished simultaneously with the completion of the graduation requirements (four-year) at Oregon Bible College.

Internships

Students planning to become pastors in the Church of God General Conference serve at least two semesters in internship. The internship is administered by Oregon Bible College and is supervised by a cooperating pastor in a Church of God congregation. The typical procedure is for one to spend a school year as an intern pastor immediately following graduation. Other plans may be developed based upon the student's academic standing, summer experiences, and/or special needs.

The Cost of Education at OBC

Oregon Bible College is dependent upon the Lord to work through his people to supply the financial needs of day-to-day operation and development. Each student pays less than half the real cost of education. The remaining costs are met by the Church of God General Conference through member contributions and through the friends and alumni who make direct contributions.

You are encouraged to share in the support of Oregon Bible College as God directs your interests and provides you opportunity to do so. Individuals and families are encouraged to include OBC when preparing wills and purchasing life insurance policies.

During the 1983-84 school year, full-time students in residence halls will pay approximately \$2,800 for their College expenses.

Payment of Accounts

New students will be billed upon acceptance by the College. Both new and returning students are encouraged to pre-pay all or part of the fall semester costs during the summer months. Estimated bills will be mailed during June. Students who pre-pay college expenses will receive interest at the rate of 34% per month on monies held by the College during June, July, and August.

The College is a not-for-profit organization with limited reserve funds. It is necessary to operate on a cash basis. All tuition and fees plus one month's room and board are due and payable upon registration for each semester. Remaining room and board may be paid monthly in advance.

The Foundation has been established: "To promote the education and cultural welfare of Oregon Bible College of Oregon, Illinois, and to improve the school facilities so as to provide broader educational advantages and opportunities; to encourage research, and to increase the school's usefulness to the members of the Church of God General Conference...."

Further purposes include: "To solicit and accept ... gifts, grants, and bequests in trust or otherwise, funds of all kinds, including property both real and personal, whether principal or income and tangible or intangible, vested or contingent, for the purpose of providing funding for the College... and for the purpose of providing scholarships, activities, and research... and other such designated benefits for the school and its faculty and its students, as may be prescribed by testators or donors to the corporation and to receive, hold, and administer such donations...."

New Church in Colorado Springs

The launching of a new church in Colorado Springs is an exciting venture of faith. From the planning stages, it has been realized that God's leadership is necessary for this work to be successful.

Following the lesson of the parable of the sower (Matt. 13:3-23), a study was made to first test the soil as a means of finding an area of the city with good potential for growth in which to launch the new church.

Important and exciting steps of progress have been made toward launching the new church. Brother Don Needham and his family will move to Colorado Springs this summer. We feel God has put his stamp of approval on this effort in providing Brother Don as pastor. Recently, a 5.4 acre piece of property was purchased as a future site. A third important step of progress is that people have expressed a willingness to dedicate their efforts to see the church become a reality. A survey team of five young people will spend the major part of the summer going house to house for visitation. In this survey we will look for receptive people and from this prepare a prospect list for follow-up calling. During the calling program, people will also be invited to attend Bible studies. A group will meet in temporary facilities until it is feasible to begin a building program. Several persons and churches have expressed a willingness to support this effort financially. Many have expressed that they are praying regularly for this new work. These prayers and others that are offered by members of the Church of God in various congregations along with other supportive actions will be a major factor in the eventual success of the Colorado Springs Church.

Consultation to Churches

An important and enjoyable part of the work as Director of Outreach and Church Development is the time spent in consultation with pastors and congregations. During the past 12 months, 24 visits to local churches involving 21 churches were made. These sessions ranged in length from one service to one week, depending upon the need and time available. An extended seminar for several weeks was conducted with the Rockford congregation. Eight congregations have availed themselves of the services of the department for assistance in seeking services of a pastor.

In addition, four core groups (currently having Bible study and/or Sunday services) were visited. These groups have potential for the establishment of a future church.

Christian Workers Seminar 1983

A highlight of the year for many is the gathering for spiritual fellowship and instruction at the Christian Workers' Seminar. Each year the attendance has increased. This year, 157 persons were in attendance, to make this by far the largest Christian Workers' Seminar to date. The beautiful setting of the Sheraton Hotel in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, adds to the enjoyment of the Seminar. The staff, consisting of Charles and Lois Pryor, Scott Ross, David Wilsterman, Judy Myers, Joyce Knapp, Anthony Buzzard, Warren and Irene Sorenson, and Russell Magaw, tuaght a variety of classes covering Practical Training for Workers in a Local Church, Doctrinal Bible Study, and How to Implement a Missions Program in a Local Church. The fact that many return year after year to the Seminar is a testimony to the quality and helpfulness of the fellowship and instruction experienced.

Church Planting Class

A renewed vision for starting new churches is beginning to have a positive effect within the Church of God. A class with 11 students enrolled (covering the strategies of church planting) was taught during the second semester at Oregon Bible College. The class focused on both instruction in the classroom and practical experience. Two major projects provided opportunity for experience. The students learned how to evaluate the potential of a given area and conducted a feasibility study (evaluated an area to test its potential for starting a church). A second major aspect was to learn various strategies for getting a new church started. Learning what steps to take was reinforced through researching a church recently started and finding out what steps had been taken to bring the church into being.

Many denominations have realized that unless they continue to start new churches, the denomination declines. One major denomination has to start at least 50 churches each year to keep up with the ones that close. For the Church of God, we have to face the reality that some churches will close. It is imperative that we embark upon an active program of starting new churches.

Foreign Mission News

The work in Ghana and Nigeria is covered in "Letters from Africa" on page 9. The work in Bangalore, India, is going well under the leadership of Pastor M. R. Noel, and also the clinic under the supervision of Emily Manoah. Brother Dean Moore has made some trips into Mexico to encourage the congregation and Robert Badillot who serves as pastor in Labor Viega.

We regret the fact that it became necessary to remove Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero from his leadership role in the Philippine Conference. Confirmed reports of unchristian and unethical practices led to this decision. The Board of Directors and members of the License and Ordination Board reviewed the circumstances and appropriate action was taken to remove his ministerial license.

MISSION TRIP REPORT

January 3—Arrived safely in Nairobi, Kenya.

January 4—Interviewed Gerald Morrison, Director or Canadian Assemblies of God Mission for Kenya and Uganda. Works with 62 missionaries and 2,000 churches.

January 5—Interviewed Pastor Mpaayei, a pastor of the Masai tribal people. Talked with James Njarogi, evangelistic coordinator for World Vision.

January 6—Discussed Christian education efforts in Africa with Roger Coon, who works with Africa Inland Mission. Conferred with Stephen Talitwala, Director of Day Star School of Communications. This organization teaches nationals how to present the gospel in ways that are understandable and effective.

January 7—Met with Takunboh Adeyemo, the head of the Association of Evangelicals of Africa and Madagascar.

January 8—Discussed relief efforts of World Vision with Ahuma Adodoadjj. Saw Dr. Ken Harder, who is the Africa Inland Mission missionary.

Week of January 9—Met with Dr. Edgar Eliston of the Christian Missionary Fellowship. His task is to measure the receptivity of a people group and decide if CMF should begin a work among them. We have discovered that it is not possible to start a mission work as a denomination in any country in which you are not registered. Visited many village churches. Sam and Emily Voorhies have been very hospitable and helpful.

January 14-20—Lived with Christian Missionary Fellowship missionaries in Norok, Kenya. Studied and assisted work among the Masai tribe.

January 21 - February 10—Visited and assisted in the Assemblies of God work in Uganda. Taught in their Bible college, preached, did carpentry, and Pam worked in Bible studies and rural health nursing.

February 11-20—Worked with Wycliffe translators. Worked on visas for Sudan. Bought supplies for Sudan.

February 21—Flight to Sudan.

February 22 - March 8—Worked with Sudan Interior Mission to understand their mission efforts.

March 9-13—Returned to Nairobi and prepared for trip to Ghana.

March 14—Flight to Accra. Rode up north to Tamale with some Wycliffe missionaries in an attempt to find Oliver Amani. Food very expensive here. Three oranges and seven bananas cost us \$7.00. A large yam costs \$50.00 and rice is \$7.00 a pound if you can find it.

March 17 - April 5—The country of Ghana is basically under siege. All the borders are closed, so goods such as food, gas, car parts, and tires are in short supply. We just bought twelve eggs for \$13.00. A tube of toothpaste, if you can find it, costs \$12.00

Pam—Wycliffe Translators have been very helpful to us. Steve has been using his carpentry skills to build pump shed, bookshelves, and other items. We have discovered that in Ghana time adjusts to people, rather than people adjusting to time. In Ghana they don't try to finish a task by a specific time or on a specific day. This is rather frustrating!

Steve left yesterday (March 28) to find Oliver Amani in the Volta Region. We heard by short wave radio that he made it there and is staying with some Wycliffe families in that area. Steve has been as healthy as a horse, and I've only had two days of the "revenge."

Steve—Wycliffe leaders offered me the use of a new motorcycle to try to find Brother Amani. I carried all needed gas and supplies and drove 1,000 kilometers in search of him. After two days and 12 hours of bumpy dirt roads, I found him near the village of Kwamikrom. Bro. Amani is a farmer now. His school has closed due to lack of funds. He is a good man. I spent time in Bible studies with him. The church is badly in need of revival.

April 6—Left for Nigeria.

April 7-14—We found our way to Abak and the church folks. Congregation built a nice mission bungalow for visiting mission people. With their own money they have erected a large concrete block church (35' x 100'). The need of the people for training and spiritual development is very great. I have been teaching Bible studies at 5:00 a.m. daily as this is planting season and all must work in the fields all day. I have scheduled a pastors' conference in early May.

Conclusions of our trip thus far. Africa has tremendous needs. It is hard to know where to begin. Africa is in a state of change—over the next couple of decades it will become Christian, Muslim, or Communist. Paganism is on the way out. We have gained lots of ideas and are growing in our concepts of missions. We are being overwhelmed with information and materials.

Urgent Financial Need

I rejoice each day as I receive a report of the contributions that have been received in the mail from those of you who share our vision for the Lord's work. Though some of you may initially sacrifice in order to contribute to Conference ministries, I know that God is

The Restitution Herald Readers' Survey

In the March, 1983, Herald issue a Readers' Survey appeared on page 18 to ascertain exactly what subscribers are reading in the magazine. Responses were highly complimentary of The Herald's effectiveness in achieving its purposes. In addition, 88 percent of the respondants read every issue of the magazine. 
An abundant number of additional comments were given to the survey. Many of these have been or will be printed in the "Letters to the Editor" section of *The Herald*.



WHERE EACH DOLLAR OF INCOME TO THE CONFERENCE/COLLEGE GOES





CHRISTIAN CONCILIATION BOARD

The major emphasis of the Christian Conciliation Board is to help educate all the people of the Church of God in the Scriptural means of resolving disputes, as outlined in Matthew 18:15-17.

Jesus could foresee the potential for conflict and disagreement within members of his body, so he wisely listed three clear steps that should be followed when the inevitable occurs.

The Christian Conciliation Board will not only help local churches to understand this process, but it will strongly encourage the use of this process in even the smallest of conflicts. The individuals of the Board will be available to consult over the telephone to assist persons to work through the Scriptural process. If it seems necessary, a church can ask the Board to come to the local church to assist in the resolution of the dispute.

The Christian Conciliation Board will present a session at the 1983 General Conference as a follow-up to the seminar held at the 1982 General Conference. Other workshops and seminars designed to help prevent disputes and crises are being considered for the future.

REPORT OF LICENSE AND ORDINATION BOARD

The Board met several times during both the Ministerial Conference and the General Conference. During the Ministerial Conference week, we met with the Sophmores of Oregon Bible College. This is for the purpose of presenting to them the copy of the Standards for Ministerial Recognition and give them an opportunity to ask questions. It is viewed by both the Board and the OBC president as a part of their education. A meeting also was held during the luncheon hour on Wednesday with the OBC Seniors. It was for the purpose of answering any questions they might have in regard to their responsibility toward the Board in applying for a License.

Routine business during the General Conference consisted of signing the Certificates of License which are issued to each one who has applied for a Ministerial License and has been approved, discussing the preparation for the special service on Wednesday, and general business. The number of applicants approved for a Ministerial License in 1982 was seven. For the first time in General Conference history, Certificates of License and Recognition Cards were granted to those entering other "ministries" beside that of a pastor. Those "ministries" include Christian Education, Music, and Associate Pastor.

During the worship service on Wednesday evening, the Certificates of License and Recognition Cards, good for one year, were given to the seven candidates who had been approved. In the Fall of 1982, a Certificate of License and a Recognition Card was granted to another. Also during the Wednesday evening service, Bro. David Wilsterman and wife Janis were introduced to the audience. David had been ordained in the church where he is pastor. That is the Happy Woods Church, Hammond, LA Pastor Billie Kennedy

had charge of the ordination service. He was chairman of the License and Ordination Board at the time.

In addition to those who received Recognition Cards for the first time in 1982, 54 others were handed out or mailed.

The Board members made some recommendations to the General Conference Board of Directors, asking for studies to be done as to 1) what is an Oregon Bible College equivalent and, 2) a review and updating of the information and questions A to Z on the Application for Ministerial License. These suggestions were made in a meeting of the Board members with the General Conference Board members on Thursday, August 5. Since that time some changes or guidelines have been established and are to be further studied.

The Board members enjoy being able to serve the Church of God General Conference and its membership. We hope and pray that it is to the glory of God. We desire your prayers and support.

CHURCH OF GOD INVESTMENT FUND

By action of the delegates at the 1982 General Conference, the Church of God Investment Fund was created. The purpose of the fund is to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches. A reasonable rate of interest is to be paid to depositors and a reasonable rate of interest is to be charged to those churches that borrow from the fund.

According to the By-Laws of the Corporation, the fund will be managed by three directors appointed by the General Conference Board of Directors, the Chairman of the Conference Board, and the Executive Director. The Board of Directors of the General Conference appointed Bill Burnham, Robert Smith, and Dr. William D. Lawrence, to serve as trustees along with the Chairman of the Board of Directors, Joe James, and the Executive Director, David Krogh.

The first meeting of the trustees of the Church of God Investment Fund was held in Oregon, Illinois, November 29, 1982. Bill Burnham was elected Chairman and Robert Smith was elected Vice Chairman. The Executive Director serves as Secretary-Treasurer of the Corporation.

The following items of business were discussed:

Rules and Regulations governing the savings department were reviewed.

- 2. Loan, documentation, and disbursement procedures were reviewed.
- 3. Interest rate for depositors and interest rate for loans were discussed.
- 4. Plans to advertise the Investment Fund were discussed. Implementation of the fund will proceed as soon as legal and paper work is completed, and adequate staff is available in the Business Office of the General Conference.

The trustees will meet at the annual General Conference in August.

MINISTERS VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION

During General Conference this year the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association will become 15 years of age since the Association was organized at the General Conference in 1968. The assets of the association have increased each year. Presently there are 12 ministers and three ministers' wives benefiting in drawing monthly retirement checks.

At the biannual meeting last August the rules were changed to allow full-time General Conference employees to enroll in the plan. Two of these employees have taken advantage of this change and enrolled. Other recently licensed ministers have enrolled as well. We would urge churches and ministers who are not yet in the plan to seriously consider enrolling. The more who come in the plan the stronger the program will become. For further information contact anyone on the Board of Trustees of the Association. The funds are invested in and managed by Aetna Life Insurance Co.

Presently there are 47 ministers, three ministers' widows, 47 churches, and seven conferences in the association.

The Board of Trustees is made up of the Chairman, who is a pastor appointed by the Board of Directors; a Vice-Chairman, elected by the delegates at a biannual meeting; and the Secretary-Treasurer, who is the Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference. We trust that God's blessings will continue to shine upon the plans and purpose of this association.

ABORTION STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

At the August 1982 Delegate Business Session at General Conference, a motion was passed as follows: "We believe life is a sacred gift from God which should be protected from the time of conception until the occurring of natural death. Therefore, we oppose the practice of abortion, feeling that it is morally opposed to the Word of God, and its practice results in the devaluation of all human life."

A motion was also passed by the delegates which called for the Board of Directors to appoint a committee to do a comprehensive study on the life question and report back to next year's General Conference for further consideration.

The Board appointed Don Needham, Nancy Craig, and Dr. William D. Lawrence to serve on the committee.

The committee has conferred and has concluded that the resolution which the delegates adopted on August 5 clearly states the position to which the Church of God General Conference should hold. The committee wishes to make no further recommendations.

RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATION ONE

We recommend the adoption of the document entitled "A Philosophy of Missions for the Church of God General Conference."

This document is being proposed so that members of the Church of God General Conference might be able to more clearly see God's perspective of world evangelization and our part in that work through a defined philosophy. This policy of missions for the Church of God will help to:

- A. Clarify our understanding of the purpose of the church.
- B. Define the relationship of the denominational organization and leaders, and the local church.
- C. Clarify our definition of missions in the field of ministry to which this philosophy applies most directly.
- D. To establish a working policy of missions by which our purpose as a General Conference can be administered efficiently and function effectively in missions.

Explanation:

The Church of God General Conference has been involved in mission work for nearly 30 years. We have learned many important mission principles through our experience over the years, and through professional training

from those who have been involved in mission work longer than we have.

In order for our mission work to move ahead, this written mission policy has been prepared. We are committing to paper policies and procedures that have been transmitted in oral form previously. A written policy makes it much easier to administer and provide continuity to our mission ministries.

Complete copies of "A Philosophy of Missions for the Church of God General Conference" have been distributed to pastors and missionary committees of each Church of God. The copies are available for review by delegates and members prior to the August General Conference. Additional copies may be secured from the Church of God General Conference.

Along with this proposed Mission Policy for the Church of God General Conference, a Mission Policy for the local church which is in harmony with the General Conference policy has been prepared. Copies of this policy are available to serve as a model for local churches who wish to prepare a written policy.

RECOMMENDATION TWO

We recommend that the name "Mission Builders League" be changed to "Church Builders League."

Explanation:

An urgent need among many congregations in the Church of God is to relocate. Some of our churches are located in declining neighborhoods and/or in places that have poor accessibility or visibility. If growth and revitalization are to take place, the church must relocate to a more favorable location.

However, relocation poses substantial problems for many of our churches. The cost of buying property in growing communities is enormous; the cost of erecting new buildings is overwhelming; and usually it is impossible to sell the old property for a reasonable price.

Though a church may have been in existence for 50 to 100 years, this does not make it easy to face the challenges of relocation, change, and a huge debt.

Two years ago the Mission Builders Guidelines were amended to more strongly emphasize appeals for churches which chose to relocate, and to assist churches which had outgrown their present facilities, to enlarge, buy, rebuild, or exchange buildings.

The guidelines continued to recognize the importance of assisting new congregations and those who had not previously owned a building to buy or construct one. However, the revitalization of existing churches was recognized as well

The name "Mission Builders League" has caused some to feel that funds could only be used for new works. The word "mission" was interpreted to mean a new, small work. The

word "mission" has a much broader definition, however, and this recommendation is being proposed to help clarify the matter and to help emphasize the need for revitalization of many of our churches.

It seems apparent that the Builders League has never been more important than it is today. As we look forward to planting new churches, and as more of our existing churches become revitalized, the League will be called upon to provide essential assistance.

In order to provide vital support, not only must many new members be enrolled in the League, but present members must be encouraged to think in terms of the maximum gift that they can make to each appeal. Though members are asked to contribute \$20 or more to each appeal, much larger gifts must be encouraged.

Changing the name to "Church Builders League" will help to focus new attention on this worthwhile program and help to chart a modified course for the future.

NOMINATIONS FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Minnesota State Conference would like to enter the name of David Cheatwood as a nominee to run for an office of the Board of Directors of the General Conference.

Pastor David Cheatwood is a graduate of Oregon Bible College, has pastored several churches, has served on the staff of Berean Youth Conference and several state camps. He is a member of the Minnesota State Conference Board and is the president of the Minnesota State Missionary Society. He is on the License and Ordination Board and vice-president of the National Ministerial Association. He has held several positions of responsibility in various types of business.

The Minnesota Conference Board feels that his experience in the ministry and his experience in various areas of business makes him well qualified for the position.

David L. Johnson and his wife Miriam have four children. Allison is an R.N. in Minneapolis, Blair was a student at OBC and graduated from Moorhead State University in Minnesota, Haley is an art student at Moorhead State, and Darris is in high school.

David's occupation is farmer-businessman-entrepreneur. He started farming in 1957... Developed Rovid Farms into a thriving prosperous business. It is composed of several sections of prime ag land coupled with a full line of modern machinery and a grain elevator system.

Dave served on the Renville County Sugar Beet Co-op as a director for 10 years. During that time a 60 million dollar beet-processing facility was conceived, sold to 300 farmers which own it, and financed by a complicated lease leverage system of finance.

Dave has been active in church work—local, state, and national. For many years he was Sunday School teacher for the adult class. He has served as an elder for many years and Chairman of the Board. He served the General Conference as a Director and for two years was Vice President.

David and Miriam Johnson have made a leadership level commitment to the Oregon Bible College Development. Foundation, and David has agreed to work closely with staff members in setting up and making Foundation contacts during the coming months.

Budget Draft

The budget printed on this page was reviewed by the Board of Directors at its meeting April 30, 1983. This budget draft is printed here so that local churches can review it prior to the delegate sessions in August.

The proposed budget calls for total contributions of \$424,442, which is \$21,612 more than needed in the current fiscal year. This is an increase of about five percent.

CONFERENCE SEMINARS

Each afternoon during Conference, a number of Seminars will be offered. There will be two periods each afternoon of one hour each. The seminars last different lengths of time. Therefore, depending upon which Seminars you choose, you will be able to attend one or more. After the description of each Seminar there is a suggestion as to who might benefit from each one. However, all the Seminars are open to everyone. Please put a check beside the Seminar(s) you wish to attend.

Category 1

The following subject will meet a total of six hours. It will meet for two hours on two days and one hour on two days. If you choose this topic, you will be able to select one additional Seminar from Category 3 or two seminars from Category 4.

The Local Church Can Change the World—Judy Myers. This seminar will begin with a Scriptural study of the responsibilities of the local church. The dimensions of the current task of world evangelization will be viewed. You will have an opportunity to see how a typical missions committee functions. Through the use of a self-evaluation profile, you will be able to determine how missions minded your church is. You will learn how to increase missions mindedness in 10 vital areas. (For Pastors, Missions Committee members, Church Board members, and others interested in missions.)

Category 2

The following subjects will meet for a total of four hours: one period each day. If you select this topic, you may select two topics from Category 3 or four topics from Category 4. If you chose the seminar in Category 1, you will not be able to be involved in this subject.

_**Bible Study: Biblical Basis of World Missions**—Pastor Ron Macy.

A thorough study of God's will regarding missions will be studied in this class. The theme of the Conference will be presented from a Biblical perspective. (For all Bible students.)

_Youth Ministry Training—Hugh Harman.

Special helps will be presented in establishing an effective youth ministry in your local church. (For Youth Leaders and Sunday School teachers who teach young people.)

Category 3

The following subjects will meet for two periods. If you did not choose any classes from Categories 1 or 2, you may select all three of these topics. If you picked the topic in Category 1, you may choose one of these topics. If you selected a topic from Category 2, you may select 2 of these topics.

Your Missions Committee: Starting from Scratch—Judy Myers and Carol Schmidlapp.

If your church does not have a Missions Committee, or if you are just getting started, these sessions will be very helpful to you. Very basic information will be shared which you can apply in your church immediately. (For Missions Committee members, Pastors, and

others interested in missions.)

Developing Missions Leadership in Your Church: The Steps to Take—Steve Grant and Mardy Lawrence.

A Missions emphasis in the local church will happen only by training local leadership. This class will make it possible for you to train the leadership that you need. (For Pastors, Missions Committee Chairmen, and others interested in missions.)

_Missions Education in the Local Church—Mardy Lawrence.

Creating missions awareness in the local church is a matter of education. Practical ways of helping to educate your congregation in missions will be presented in this class. (For Pastors, Missions Committee members, and others interested in missions.)

Category 4

These subjects will meet for only one period. If you did not choose any classes from Categories 1, 2, or 3, you may select eight of these topics. If you selected the topic from Category 1, you may choose two of these topics. If you selected one of the topics in Category 2, you may select four of these classes. If you selected one topic from Category 3, you may select six of these topics. If you selected two topics from Category 3, you may select four of these topics. If you selected three topics from Category 3, you may select two of these topics.

____Faith Promise Giving: What It Is, What It Is Not—Pam Grant.

A comprehensive discussion of Faith Promise Giving will be conducted in this class. (For Pastors, Missions Committee members, and others interested in missions.)

____The Praying Church: Developing the Ministry of Intercession—Larry Gaspar.

Undergirding all successful mission efforts is the ministry of prayer. This class will discuss ways of increasing the effectiveness of the prayer ministry of your church. (For those involved in present prayer ministries of the local church, Pastors, and others interested in prayer.)

___Steps to the Field: Preparing Missionary Candidates— Steve Grant.

If a local church is going to be a seedbed of missions, it is necessary to prepare missionary candidates. This class will clarify the steps that must be taken in order to prepare missionary personnel. (Missions Committee members, Pastors, and others interested in missions.)

— How to Have a Successful Junior Choir—Louise Lapp. This class will discuss the value of a Junior Choir and the principles to follow in making it successful. (Music Committee Members, Choir Directors, and others interested in starting a Junior Choir ministry.)

—Resolving Disputes in the Local Church—Conciliation Board.

This class will review principles of resolving disputes which occur in a local church. (For Pastors or church leaders who might be involved in resolving disputes, or any Christian who is interested in bringing peace to those who are having conflict.)

_Using the Gifts God Gave You—David Wilsterman.

Many members in our local churches have studied spiritual gifts and determined their gift. However, many of our churches are not organized to make use of the gifts that people have. This class will provide help in utilizing the gifts of local members more effectively. (For Pastors, Church Board members, and others interested in spiritual gifts.)

Communicating Christ: How to Share Your Faith—E. Richard Smith.

This class will consist of very practical principles in witnessing. (For Pastors and laypeople who are interested in evangelism.)

Evangelizing Professionals—Dr. William D. Lawrence.

This class is a repeat of the very successful presentation made by Dr. Lawrence last year. The principles presented in this class are helpful in reaching those without Christ (For those interested in evangelism.)

__Principles of Calling a Pastor—Keith Williams.

A ten-point process will be shared stating the steps to be followed in calling a new pastor. This procedure will help to solve many of the problems that have been experienced in calling pastors in the past. (For Pastors, Church Board members, and others interested in this process.)

__Question and Answer Period.

Members of the General Conference Board, and General Conference and Oregon Bible College staffs, will be present to answer questions regarding ministries, programs, and activities which are being carried on by the General Conference and Oregon Bible College.

Additional Conference Information

Site: The 1983 Church of God General Conference will be held at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, August 2-6, Rockford College is located on East State Street (U.S. Highway Business 20).

If one is traveling on Interstate 90 he would take the Rockford Exit, which is marked "Business 20" and "State Street" (the Henrici Clock Tower Inn is on the East side of the interstate at the interchange.) One would travel from the interstate west on State Street about 3 miles. One would pass a large Ward's Store, St. Anthony Hospital, and next is Rockford College on the right. There is a large sign at the entrance.

If one is coming in from the south or west, he would come on bypass highway 20, which goes around the city of Rockford on the south side. At the Alpine interchange (on the southeast side of Rockford) one would go north on Alpine for about three miles to the intersection of State Street. Turn right (east) on State Street about one half mile and Rockford College will be on the left.

If one is flying to the General Conference, he can come into O'Hare Field in Chicago. There is a shuttle bus leaving O'Hare every hour (on the half hour) which comes directly to Rockford. The bus can be boarded on the lower level in front of Carson's Circle Restaurant. This is located between United and American Airlines. One would get off the bus at the Sweden House (the second stop) in Rockford. A Conference vehicle will meet each bus from O'Hare at Sweden House on Monday, August 3 (registration day) from 9:10 a.m. to 12:55 p.m. Other arrivals will be met if we are notified. There are a few flights that come directly to Rockford Airport. We will make arrangements for transportation from the Rockford Airport if we are notified of arrival data.

Registration: Registration begins on August 1, at 9:30 a.m. in Burpee Center. At the end of the main entrance to Rockford College is a parking lot marked "A." Please leave your car in parking lot "A" and walk across the street to Burpee Center for registration. At registration your housing assignment will be made. You will then move your automobile to the parking lot assigned for the dormitory in which you will be located.

Reservations and Conference Costs: Reservations for General Conference must be made prior to July 23. Reservations received after July 23 will be assessed a \$10.00 late registration fee. Registration forms are available in each local church. Isolated members may write to: Reservations, Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061 for the reservation forms.

The cost of the Conference this year is Adults (over 12 years of age) \$90; Children (4-12) \$80; Children under 4 years if college bed is used \$25; commuters \$18. There is a \$10 nonrefundable deposit required with each application. These costs include room, board, use of the grounds and buildings, insurance, recreation facilities, bed linens, blanket, pillow, and towel.

The \$18 per person for commuters is for those staying of campus and commuting to the meetings. This charge is for the use of the facilities, insurance, and miscellaneous costs. Should the commuter wish to take the meals, a total cost for the Conference would be \$54 for each individual 4 years and older. There is no charge for those under 3 years. There is no charge for one attending the evening services only.

Youth: Youth must be accompanied to the Conference by a parent or a responsible guardian. A full schedule of activities is planned for the youth. All youth attending the Conference will be expected to attend all of the planned services and activities.

Children's Classes: A full schedule of activities is planned for all children 8 years and under (See program in this issue.)

Hired sitters are being provided for children 2 years and under.

Junior Church will be conducted each evening at 7:00 p.m. for those 3 to 12 years of age.

Gymnasium and Pool: The gymnasium and pool will be open each evening from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. Anyone who plans to use the gym must bring gym shoes and proper gym clothing. Anyone planning to use the pool must bring bathing suit (bikinis not allowed) and girls or fellows with longer hair must have a bathing cap.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year delegates from the various churches and Conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel of those from far away and those who live nearby. Delegate Expense Pool forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary and each is urged to enter the pool This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation. The mileage rate this year is 12¢.







Brothers and sisters in Christ, it is indeed a privilege for me as Chairman to welcome you on behalf of the Board and staff to this Sixty-Third Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference. The Board elected by the delegates serves as the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference and as the Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College. The Board is responsible to you, the delegates, which represent our total church membership. You in turn have the responsibility of representing our total constituency by making decisions, electing Board members, and establishing policies and program directions which are in the best interest of the Lord's work and the entire Conference membership. We pray that God's power will work through us this week to lead us to act in ways that will enhance our stewardship and help us to get a vision of the mission God would have his church accomplish in these last days before the coming of Jesus and the establishment of the kingdom of God on this planet. Let us all take our responsibility humbly and prayerfully this week, calling on God's leadership and then submitting ourselves to his will.

The delegates have the responsibility and authority to make the important decisions regarding the present and future directions of our Conference and College. Let us, as Jesus admonished in Mark 10:35-44, see ourselves as servants—first of all, servants of God and, secondly, servants of our brethren whom we represent.

CHAIRMANS

The program committee of this and recent Conferences are to be commended for the progression in developing themes for our General Conference. In 1981 the focus of our Conference centered around the theme. "You Are the Church." Last year our theme was, "Let The Church Obey His Voice." The theme for this Sixty-Third General Conference is the practical and timely topic, "The Local Church: Seedbed of Missions." The business sessions, seminars, and messages should help us to gain knowledge, to develop enthusiasm and commitment, to get a sense of direction, and then to move forward in our local churches to carry out the "Great Commission" as presented

by Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, in Mark 16:15, 16. "It is high time to awake out of sleep," (Rom. 13:11). Now is the time to live and feel the words we sing, "Awake, Arise, O Church of God."

The General Conference delegates have taken bold actions in recent years. A few years ago the decision was made to reorganize our General Conference to better serve the needs and missions of the local church. Our subsequent efforts have been toward "Outreach and Church Development." The able leadership of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College have channeled our resources and activities in that direction. The works in Colorado Springs and other areas indicate that the "Outreach and Church Development" efforts are paying off. I believe that we are and have been sowing seeds that will continue to germinate and grow. The 1982 General Conference strengthened this approach toward local church development by establishing the "Church of God Investment Fund" to assist local building programs by providing loans at less than usual interest rates. I am happy to report to you that the Board of Directors has proceeded to implement this program by

establishing the "Church of God Investment Fund" as a corporation and implementing the standards and procedures of operation. This program will continue to go forward as planned.

The delegates to the 1982 General Conference also approved the establishment of the "Oregon Bible College Development Foundation." The Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College moved forward by establishing this Foundation as a non-profit corporation chartered in the State of Illinois. The Board further secured the consultative services of Adam Anderson, who in November, 1982, completed the first phase of implementation of the Foundation, the audit-informational phase. Continuing to use the services of Mr. Anderson, the Board and staff are well into the actual campaign of obtaining one million dollars in commitments to the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. As you know, this Foundation is an endowment for the College and its programs. Only the income from the principal sum contributed will be available on an annual basis to fund College projects and programs. This will provide greater financial stability for our educational institution. This effort represents a new approach to the solicitation of financial support for Church of God programs. I believe that we as a Conference should remain committed to the full implementation of this Foundation as approved one year ago. We should not be discouraged after one year that funds are coming in slowly. It has been my experience in being involved in many contacts with our people during recent months, that our membership is generally supportive of the Foundation concept. Financial commitments continue to be made and I believe that the growth of the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation will accelerate in coming months.

Oregon Bible College is essential to our denomination because of our strong emphasis on Bible truths. Because of our small student population, education at Oregon Bible College is costly.

MESSAGE

This past year the education of each student cost the Conference over \$4,000.00 per student. This was in addition to the tuition and board paid by the students. I share this with you to emphasize the importance of the Foundation.

I should also share with you that one important conclusion of the audit phase in the implementation of the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation is that the Board of Directors, the General Conference, and Oregon Bible College have not been as successful as we would like in communicating our programs, services, and overall purposes and functions to our churches and membership. Over and over members have said that they do not know about Conference and College programs. While we continue to use the PROGRESS JOURNAL and other printed matter, we are increasing communication efforts through person-to-person contacts. Our Executive Director and his General Conference staff are visiting more local churches and our President and his Oregon Bible College staff are greatly increasing contacts with our membership for student recruitment purposes and to inform our members of the programs and services of Oregon Bible College. In our modern society the flow of information is of paramount importance. No one person or group can successfully fulfill our communication needs. We must involve many people. I strongly recommend that current and former board members, the alumni of Oregon Bible College, the staffs of the General Conference and College, and the informed delegates who are involved in Conference affairs feel a responsibility and put forth intensified efforts to keep our grass-roots membership informed concerning the General Conference and Bible College.

It seems that much of our business eventually involves a discussion of finances. Money is important at the Conference level but only to the extent that it is related to the lives and salvation of people. The wise man, Solomon, frequently mentioned money

in a positive way in his writings. As we talk about money—the Foundation, budgets, and the Investment Funds-I want to be certain that no one gets the impression that we are near bankruptcy or "going down the drain." The Bible College and General Conference have solid financial foundations. We have a very positive situation when we compare assets and liabilities. We do, however, have cash-flow problems. It is the philosophy of the Board that we must not become involved in deficit spending which would soon erode our assets. As I speak to you this morning, the Board, the Executive Director, and the President are working diligently to present to this Conference a proposed budget that does not exceed anticipated income. We have not arrived at that point yet. We have the options of increasing "Goals For Giving" beyond what we would normally expect for 1983-1984 or further reducing an already tight budget. I believe that you as delegates representative of our membership need to be aware of these cash-flow problems. We are encouraged, however, that while contributions to "Goals For Giving" have been less than budgeted this year, overall giving has increased as our members have contributed to special projects, such as the new work in Colorado Springs and missions trips.

I believe that we have made a lot of progress in important areas during the past year. The Investment Fund and Foundation represent bold and progressive steps.

We must continue to evaluate our programs and efforts. For example, it has been suggested that we review our educational needs and the Oregon Bible College programs. Are we providing the appropriate level of education? Is our present program exactly what is needed or should we move more toward a graduate level seminary curriculum? I believe that the Board through the involvement of other people in our Conference should evaluate and seek answers to such questions. As we continue church-planting efforts through the Department of Outreach

and Church Development, our College must produce trained workers to function in these fields. Our General Conference must produce the materials and other resources to assist in these missions. Evaluation does not always mean drastic changes will result, but evaluation may simply affirm that we are on the right track.

We are continuing our endeavors to have more effectively coordinated programs. One example of these efforts is the work in Colorado Springs. Warren Sorenson, Director of Outreach and Church Development, taught a churchplanting course this past year for upper classmen at Oregon Bible College. This culminated in the selection of several course participants to serve on the team of workers in the Colorado Springs church-planting project. Such coordinated efforts will continue. Russell Magaw, Director of the Publishing Department, also works tirelessly to produce our excellent publications which relate to the projects and directions previously mentioned.

I believe that we are living in exciting times for the Church of God. God's people have always experienced great blessings which are accompanied by opportunities and challenges. We must recognize that the field is "white already to harvest" (John 4:35), and hear the Master as he said, "Occupy till I come" (Luke 19:13).

During our business sessions this week we will elect three members to the Board of Directors/Trustees, approve a budget, and act on recommendations. Let us take our responsibilities seriously, praying that God's Spirit will be with us to lead us as he would have his people go. We will attend seminars to enhance our vision and equip us with knowledge regarding missions to be sponsored by the local churches. We will attend Bible classes and hear sermons that will help us to put on the "whole armour of God" (Eph. 6:11-13). Let us leave this Conference committed to the task given to his followers by our Lord Jesus Christ in the "Great Commission" as recorded in Mark 16:15, 16.

1983 GENERAL CONFERENCE MINUTES

Tuesday, August 2

The first session of the 63rd Church of God General Conference was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, August 2, 1983. The meeting began with singing of choruses led by Diana Hayes and prayer by Hollis Partlowe.

After Chairman James welcomed the delegates, Janet Stilson, chairman of the Credentials Committee, explained the seating of the delegates, and thanked those churches and conferences that had properly completed the delegate forms.

Chairman James gave his report to the delegates. (This report will be printed in THE PROGRESS JOURNAL)

Pastor S. O. Ross, as president of the Ministerial Association, presented a resolution: "In the past few months we have lost four of our Conference pastors by death. Three of them were regular attenders of our annual conferences and were active in many facets of the conference work. I move, therefore, that this assembly stand for one minute in silent tribute to the great work of these four men: Bros. Clyde E. Randall, Harold J. Doan, Arnold T. Johns, and John Humphreys. They will be missed in the Ministerial Association and in the work of the Church of God in general. I also move that these comments be spread upon the minutes of this Conference and that we stand in silent prayer and remembrance at this time." David Krogh seconded the motion. The whole congregation stood in tribute to these four men.

A communication was read from the members of the Jaynes Street Church of God, Omaha, Nebraska, thanking the members of the Mission Builders League who participated in their church expansion.

John Huston moved, David Johnson seconded, that the special reports be accepted. Motion carried.

James Graham gave a synopsis of Board activity for the past year, explaining that a board member consumes much time in thought, meetings, and research. A special meeting was held at O'Hare Airport in November for the purpose of setting up plans for the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. The January meeting was at Hammond, Louisiana, where, besides taking action on business, focus was on longrange planning and brainstorming. The Board met again in April and also during this conference. The Board needs the prayers of the conference people at large.

Bill Burnham reviewed the financial report. He and Tim Jones recently have been hired to serve in the business office and this has greatly relieved the burden that has been shared by other administrators and their secretaries. Robert Coverstone moved, Dallas Demmitt seconded, that the financial report be accepted. Motion carried.

Delegate pool forms were distributed.

Warren Sorenson reported for the Outreach and Development Department and answered questions. There is hope that another new church will be planted in 1984. In foreign missions it is difficult to have an effective program and work by remote control and by a visit every few years. There is a need to raise up candidates to go into these localities to live. In Colorado Springs, the workers had an exciting summer where approximately 1100 calls were made, resulting in 108 prospective families interested in the church work.

Steve Grant informed that the people in Ghana are having a difficult time economically, physically, and spiritually. Nigeria is better equipped economically than Ghana because the people have resources that would allow them to do what God would have them do.

It has been determined that in foreign missionary work it is better if no salaries are paid to the native workers by the United States churches. The congregations of these pastors do not feel a part of the responsibility to the church or pastor when someone else pays the pastor.

Members of the conference were invited to attend a 50th wedding anniversary celebration for Emory and Mildred Macy in Roper Lounge from 3-5 this afternoon.

Ron Macy moved and Ed Goit seconded that the delegates adopt recommendation number one in regard to the Philosophy of Missions of the Church of God General Conference. Motion carried.

S. O. Ross dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Wednesday, August 3

The second session of the 1983 General Conference was called to order by Chairman James at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, August 3, with Cecil Smead leading in prayer.

The minutes of Tuesday's meeting were read by the secretary.

The chairman called for nominations of persons to serve on the Board of Directors/Trustees. Those nominated are:

John Hearp, Joyce Knapp, Robert Coverstone, Don Needham, David Cheatwood, Carol Schmidlapp, Mary Lou Brittingham, David Johnson, Wayne Laning, Joe Martin, Keith Williams, Scott Millard.

John Huston moved that nominations be closed. Francis Burnett seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The nominees were introduced to the delegates.

Maurice Robinson moved, Don Swartz seconded, the adoption of recommendation number two to change the name of Mission Builders League to Church Builders League. Motion carried.

Robert Lindner moved, Joyce Knapp seconded, that a sheet of paper be passed around for people to sign up personally or for their church to pay a part of the \$1700 needed for the Colorado Springs Church. Motion carried.

Dr. Charles Pryor reported about activities of Oregon Bible College and presented his fellow workers. Expectations are that nineteen to thirty-three students will be returning to the College for the fall semester, and twelve to twenty new students are expected.

There have been many more contacts with churches throughout the nation this past year. The president invited parents to visit the College during Parents' Weekend. Bill and Mardy Lawrence will be guest leaders at Christian Emphasis Week. The fall semester will end on December 9. Word is expected soon on the accreditation process. Dr. Pryor explained the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. A survey and audit were made to determine what goal should be set, with \$1,000,000 being determined as a makeable goal. Leadership contributions have been solicited, and the next phase will be presentations to all of the churches and a call made on all members to make a commitment—no matter how large or small.

Adam Anderson, campaign consultant, was introduced, and it was noted that he works for the College

six days each month. Mr. Anderson said fear of the unknown brings inertia and little activity, further stating that the very existence of Oregon Bible College in another decade may rest on the success of this Foundation. Every member of the Church of God must become involved.

Dr. Pryor thanked the delegates for their support and asked for their prayers.

David Krogh announced that the delegate pool was \$130.35.

The Executive Director introduced the members of his staff to the delegates.

Russell Magaw spoke about the Publishing Department, reviewing the report printed in THE PROGRESS JOURNAL. He solicited subscriptions to *The Restitution Herald*, and expressed his thanks to the delegates for their support through the year.

James Graham explained that plans are being made to change the structure of the International Youth Camp, the thought being to include youth leaders from the churches to attend and take part in seminars and workshops, thereby having a continuity between the camp and local church youth groups.

The delegates were asked to consider the idea of having the General Conference at Southeastern University, Hammond, LA, next summer. The expense would be less than is now being charged; it could be made into a family conference; and persons interested could also attend the World's Fair in New Orleans. There also would be opportunity for the delegates to view conference property near Hammond and to consider how it might be developed.

The Credentials Committee reported that seven directors, 43 ministers, and 75 delegates had registered. Thirty-three churches did not return delegate forms.

Francis Burnett dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Thursday, August 4

The third session of the 1983 General Conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, August 4. James Mattison opened the meeting with prayer. Janet Stilson took charge of seating the delegates for voting.

The minutes of Wednesday's meeting were read.

While delegates were voting on the election of members to the Board, other conference business was considered.

Krogh reviewed the contributions to the General Conference and urged each member of the General Conference to assist in the work of the Conference. He explained the Development Council and the Founders Circle. He announced that a sheet was being passed around this morning in response to the motion passed yesterday about receiving contributions toward the \$1700 expense for the church-planting at Colorado Springs.

The Christian Workers' Seminar will be held at the Holiday Inn in Pigeon Forge, TN, March 25-30, 1984. It is being called a Homecoming Seminar.

Many comments were received concerning changing the annual conference to various other locations. The


amount of the Conference Pool would be expected to be larger since more people would be traveling a longer distance. Most people in attendance favored a change of location for the 1984 Conference.

The credentials report showed seven directors, 44 ministers, 76 delegates present.



1983 General Conference

The 63rd annual Church of God General Conference was held at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, August 1-5. The sermons, seminars, and classes clearly presented the theme, "The Local Church: Seedbed of Missions." Pastor Joseph Martin and Robert Coverstone were elected to four-year terms on the Board of Directors-Trustees. David Johnson was elected to a two-year term. The officers of the Board for the coming year are Joe James, Chairmain; Scott Ross, Vice Chairman; Maurice Robinson, Jr., Secretary; Dallas Demmitt, Treasurer.

Recommendation Number One, regarding a philosophy of missions for the Church of God General Conference, was adopted by the delegates. Recommendation Number Two, which called for the name of the Mission Builders League to be changed to Church Builders League, was also adopted.

A revised budget was presented to the delegates which calls for contributions during 1983-84 of \$368,134. A copy of this budget appears on page 8 in this issue.

Please carefully review the minutes of the business sessions which are included on pages 4 through 7 of this issue.

At the evening service on Wednesday, six persons received ministerial licenses from the License and Ordination Board: Robert Alcumbrack, Brian Atra, Bruce Burnside, Richard Eldred, Deb Fletcher, and Jeff Smith. It is a pleasure to welcome these workers into the ministry of the Church of God.

On Thursday evening, special plaques were awarded to retiring Board members Bill Burnham, James Graham, and Shirley Urish, in recognition of their years of service.

The delegates gave overwhelming support to moving the annual Conference to other parts of the country. A proposal is being pursued to have the 1984 General Conference in Hammond, LA. Please watch the pages of the next issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL for information on the dates and location of the Conference.

Two highlights of the conference were reports by member of the Church-Planting Team in Colorado Springs and Steve Grant's report of his Africa Mission Trip. A synopsis of these two reports is contained in this issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL

The sermons, seminars, and Adult Bible Study classes were recorded at the Conference. Those who

wish to order copies of cassette tapes should use the order blank on page 9.

The Daily Walk Devotional Guide

Beginning in September, many of our churches will have available a new devotional guide called *The Daily Walk*. This guide provides a systematic program for reading through the entire Bible in 20 minutes a day. It is my hope that many Church of God families will begin using the guide each day. Copies will be available in local churches through December, and then beginning in January copies will be mailed to the homes of those who wish to subscribe. The cost for a year's subscription will be \$12.

Each isssue of *The Daily Walk* will have a message from the General Conference on the back cover and a reply envelope addressed to the General Conference in the middle.

I trust that you will join me in a daily walk through the Scriptures beginning this month.

Financial Update

As of July 31, 1983, contributions toward the Goal for Giving were approximately \$65,000 short. We have reduced spending as much as possible, but it has been necessary to borrow \$27,500, to pay all of our bills. It is our hope that many Church of God people will respond to this extra need between now and September 30, which marks the end of the fiscal year. The Board of Directors feels very strongly that we must end the year in the black.

Please be assured that members of the staff have done everything possible to reduce expenditures to cover only basic services and needs. Please make the financial needs of the Conference and College a matter of earnest prayer in the coming days.



AFRICA REPORT

Overall Reflections on Our Experiences in Africa

Our time in Africa was an enriching experience. It was a time for growth, maturing, and learning about the diversified cultures of this amazing land. To speak of "Africa" as a whole is like speaking of all of Western civilization as a single entity. Yet there are some general trends that we need to be aware of for future mission planning.

Politically, Africa is a continent in great turmoil. Political coups are a constant threat as the people search for political answers to their troubles. Missionaries will have to step cautiously in very nationalistic surroundings. They must realize that they are present as guests in a third-world country and can lose that invitation at any time. A new mission desiring to enter new areas must be invited as guests by the government or it will not get the visas necessary to enter. Missionaries and foreign workers need to be aware of their guest status. It is a serious matter that many nationals consider all foreigners from the U.S. to be C.I.A. agents. We need to live above reproach and show the true reason for being in their land.

Most countries on the continent would fit into the category of developing nations. Western materialism has attracted this new generation, and many are struggling to get ahead. Advances in education, agriculture, and industrial development were under way in the late colonial period of the 1940's and 50's. Since independence, many of these nations have regressed in development. Tribalism, political corruption, and war are major factors that keep the resources in the hands of the few in control instead of the many. Mission agencies and churches are assisting in the running of schools, hospitals, and clinics. These are necessary Christian ministries helping meet the needs of the whole person, yet we cannot fool ourselves into thinking they are doing the job of evangelism. The church needs men and women dedicated to making Jesus known to those who have not heard.

Difficulties in the African Church

The Church in Africa is growing rapidly. With this new birth comes much pain and difficulty. Many

millions are calling themselves Christians and some are serving the Lord with their whole heart. Yet, as one African leader put it, "Christianity is a very thin veneer in Africa today." The lack of strong biblical teaching shows in the church membership's understanding of Scripture and their lifestyle. Many have combined Christianity with their pagan traditions and have a mixed belief system. The lack of qualified ministers and teachers has many churches making their own theologies or following after every wind of doctrine. This brings confusion to the witness of Christ when unbelievers see thousands of different denominations all calling themselves "The True Church." Future missions need to build unity and strength into the existing African church, rather than bringing further division among the people.

NIGERIA

Pam and I had the opportunity of visiting five of the seven Nigerian churches. We spent time in Bible studies and meetings with the leadership. In addition, Pam had the opportunity of using her skills in medicine as she volunteered her time to a Christian clinic in Abak. The Nigerian churches are badly in need of revival. We are now feeling the effects of not having full-time mission workers on this field. Some of the leaders have strayed from the kind of Christian lifestyle that the Bible demonstrates to us. We shared our concern for them and confronted those who were living unbiblical lives. Please pray for these men, that God will convict their hearts and that they will listen to that conviction.

GHANA

In Ghana, the national crisis and state of the economy make effective church work difficult. The leader of the work, Oliver Amani, spends much of his time making a living through farming. I had a chance to visit two of the churches, and have records of some 11 house churches. The school that brother Amani was running is now closed due to lack of funds and resources (pencils, paper, books,). The Volta Region where Amani works is a "Christianized" area, yet it too is in need of revival. Some of the moral practices among the church membership and leadership are not biblical.

The visits to both these areas, as well as our observations of missions work in Kenya, Sudan, and Uganda just confirm our need to have full-time workers on the fields. The church will not grow unless men and women are brought to maturity through long-term discipling relations. Yes, our missions need your funds, but even more they need you.

COLORADO SPRINGS CHURCH PLANTING PROJECT

An Exciting Summer in Colorado Springs

A team of six young people, Pastor Don Needham, and Warren and Irene Sorenson spent an exciting summer in Colorado Springs planting the Pleasant View Bible Church of God.

Before the summer of 1983 and the launching of the church, some important steps of preparation had to take place. The first step in our pilot program of church planting was to choose a city which offered good potential for a successful effort. Colorado Springs is a rapidly growing city and already had a core group of believers dedicated to the establishing of a Church of God in their city. This led to the initial decision that Colorado Springs would be the place.

Once the city was chosen, the second step was to select a specific target area in which to concentrate our efforts. The selection was based upon the study of receptivity factors, population statistics, and projected major future changes. Literally hundreds of new homes have been and are under construction in the northeast

corner of the Springs. Information gleaned from the city planning department showed improvements and additions of major streets which indicated the city was planning for more expansion and growth in the northeast part of the city. The population explosion in this area was a major factor in our locating there.

A bonus in the early stages was the opportunity to purchase 5.4 acres at a very reasonable cost for a building site. The building site is in a very good location with high visibility and easy accessibility.

Another step in preparation was the training of those to do the initial work in making contacts with new people who potentially would become the congregation. A church-planting course was taught during spring semester at Oregon Bible College which covered the principles of church planting and methods of survey and evangelism. All of the survey-team members were instructed as to the purpose and method of our survey visitation. Survey forms were prepared in advance to provide a record of every call made.

Purpose:

In going to Colorado Springs with the survey team, we had a very simple set of objectives to be accomplished:

- 1. Get acquainted with people in the target area.
- 2. Find receptive people through the visitation process.
- 3. Develop a prospect list.
- 4. Find people interested in meeting for Bible study.

Strategy:

To accomplish our objectives, a specific step-by-step strategy was followed.

- Door-to-door visitation of every house in a given area. Daily assignments were made to the teams as to specific streets to be canvassed.
- 2. Meet people and build bridges (to build a bridge of friendship, it was important to engage people in

conversation and keep them talking as long as possible).


- 3. Survey their interest in our church planting project and their potential for involvement.
- Find out if they would be interested in hosting or attending a Bible study.
- 5. Keep accurate records of every call.
- 6. A specific strategy for follow-up on every prospect.
 - a. A handwritten letter was sent to each prospect the day after the call was made.
 - b. Each response sheet was reviewed and studied carefully.
 - c. We got acquainted with people on paper by studying their responses.
 - d. Specific prayer was offered for each prospect and prospective family.
 - e. Follow-up was done according to the individual prospect's interest.

Implementing Our Strategy

Each day began with a time of devotions. Team members led these on a rotation basis.

An important part of the devotion was specific prayer for prospects and to ask God to open doors of opportunity.

Much spiritual growth was experienced by all team members.





The next step was to divide into our teams, map out the assignments for the day and then to leave for the target area for door-to-door calling.



Door bells were rung at every house on the assigned streets.

About 1100 initial calls were made. Of this number many were not home. Callbacks were made to most of these.

We were able to talk to about 500 families and obtained a prospect list of 108 family units.

Most people were very friendly. We did not have any "bad experiences." Many who are active in their own church asked us to keep them informed of our progress.

A newsletter has gone out to all prospects and those who want to be kept informed.


Others who participated in calling but not pictured were: Diana Hays from Macomb, IL, and Donna Landry from Colorado Springs.

Survey calling was done mornings, afternoons, and evenings.



Each noon the team met at Chapel Hills Mall which is near our target area for lunch. During this time we reviewed the contacts of the morning and processed the information.





At the end of the calling day the team met to process the results of the day. All prospects were added to the list and follow-up began immediately. A hand written letter was sent to each one added to the prospect list that day. The week before the first service a letter was sent to every one on the newsletter list.

A Bible study was conducted each Wednesday at the Landry home. Home Bible studies were also conducted with prospects. The core group consists of: Preston and Dorothy Landry, Pat and Donna Landry, Sara Beddow, and Roween Frank.



Five hundred dollars of Church Development Aid is being provided through the General Conference budget. This aid started June 1, 1983. Another \$520 per month in financial aid is needed through interested persons and churches. We presently have commitments from several churches and groups totaling \$375 per month. Contributions to help support the Colorado Springs church should be made through the Outreach and Church Development department of the General Conference.





Worship services began at the Sheraton Inn July 24, 1983. An attendance of 60 resulted in an exciting service. Nursery service and Junior Church were also provided. Attendance thus far has averaged around 50. More than half have been new people as a result of the door-to-door visitation.

Summary:

The core group in Colorado Springs opened their homes to us and worked in harmony and cooperation throughout the entire summer. Their dedication will go a long way in making this effort a glory to God.

The team members were super! Complete cooperation made it a joy to work with them. It was thrilling to see their excitement from day to day as new friends were made through the door-to-door calling. One comment expresses their attitude . . . "This was fun!"

The interest, prayers, and contributions of many churches and individuals provided an encouragement and spiritual uplift for all of us in Colorado Springs. It really did help to know there were people behind us in the project.

Most important of all, all of us on the team realized that God was working in the effort and his blessing was very much in evidence. It became very clear that God was in the project and whatever happened was a result of his presence and blessing.




