## O Bethlehem, Bethlehem...

The "Holiday Season" is coming up-Thanksgiving and Christmas. Rebekah is looking for a new computer, and my son Jeremy (the computer expert) and I have talked about going on a buying spree on "Black Friday" Nov. 29. Sometimes the season is about "STUFF!" "What should you buy for the person who has everything? NOTHING! But you don't have the guts to do it!!" (Tony Campolo)

However, as I was rereading Micah 5, I realized more and more it is about an amazing human being born in an obscure, almost nothing, village in Judah. I still do not know how Jesus did it, "steadfastly set his face to go to Jerusalem," (Lk 9:51) endured his "cup," after praying fervently, "Father, if you are willing, let this cup pass from me, nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will." (Lk 22:42) WOW!!!

Part of the answer, as I continue to study, may be in the fact that Jesus knew who he was and could be from scripture in intricate detail. One of the main passages is about Bethlehem. Let's review that to get a glimpse of the "real Jesus." In Micah 5:2, the context is Israel/Judah under attack. Then we have this phenomenal prophecy about Bethlehem, a village just five miles southwest of Jerusalem at 2550 ft . elevation. "YOU ARE SMALL," figures in well with how God does things. We compare Gideon, the "least from the littlest." In Jacob's time it was called "Ephrath" or fruitful. It was the burial place of Jacob's
beloved Rachel. Later it is known as Bethlehem (literally "house of bread") מִבֵּ $\square י ת$ לֶחֶם in Judah. In Ruth 4:17, Ruth and Boaz have a kid named Obed (cp. Hebrew ebed = servant). Obed has a kid named Jesse (meaning "I possess"). And the littlest of Jesse's kids was David (meaning "beloved one"), and as Paul Harvey used to say, "and now you know the rest of the story." (See II Sam 7:16 for the Davidic covenant) Interesting... a... Servant ...I possess... My beloved one,

eventually gives us Jesus, the ultimate servant (Mark 10:45).
"One will come from you to be ruler over Israel for Me." (v. 2 continued) Daniel 9:25 connects the ruler and the "anointed one." "From the time the word goes out to restore and rebuild Jerusalem until the anointed one, the ruler, comes, there will be seven 'sevens,' and sixty-two 'sevens.' (NIV) Therefore, at this point, this ruler could potentially be "the Christ!" But, he is a ruler "for Me." The ruler rules for God! Revelation says Jesus is the ruler of God's creation. (Rev 3:14 NIV) Later in Micah 5:4, the HCSB has "He will stand and shepherd them
in the strength of Yahweh, in the majestic name of Yahweh His God!" Jesus also said "I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd lays down His life for the sheep. (Jn 10:11 NAS) This ruler will shepherd us for His God and in the majestic name of His God, YHWH. Remember, the throne of Israel, was the throne of the LORD/ YHWH! See 1 Chronicles 28:5, where David says, "Out of all my sons -- for Yahweh has given me many -- he has chosen my son Solomon to sit on Yahweh's sovereign throne over Israel." (NJB) Jesus rules for God in the kingdom!

This ruler's "origins, are from of old, from ancient times." (Mic 5:2 NIV) מִִימֵםי עוֹלָ, "Min Yom Olam,", "from days long ago." Many have tried to read a literal preexistence into this, but it is simply stating that God had planned (cp. logos/dabar) Jesus from wayyyy back. In fact, the "protoeuangelion," the first good news is of the "seed of the woman," a human being, crushing the serpent's head, (Gen 3:15). In this context we see not only the "seed of the woman," but... the "seed" of Abraham blessing the world (Gen 12:3), "the scepter not departing from Judah" (Gen 49:10), "the star coming from Jacob" (Num 24:17), the descendant of David's throne enduring forever (II Sam 7:16), nations conspiring against "the LORD's anointed one" (Psa 2:2), in fact, "the lamb slain from the foundation of the world!" (Rev 13:8) This ruler of Bethlehem was planned $\mathbf{A}$ LONG TIME AGO!!!

## Prophecy Page

It was "Dictators Week" recently at the United Nations building in New York City. While the nations of the world gathered supposedly to provide updates and warnings concerning their individual territories, the single-most important reason for the gathering continues to boil in turmoil. It is about one nation, one mount that provides political tensions that will certainly result in war. Mount Moriah-the Temple Mountcontinues to be the fuse that will trigger mankind's final war prior to Christ's second advent.

Since the Jimmy Carter administration's 1979 breach with Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini, the political rhetoric between the U.S. and Iran has just kept escalating. So, it was reasonable for the primary talk at the beginning of the big New York gathering was of the potential meeting between President Barack Obama and the new Iranian second-in-command, President Hassan Rouhani. Just one photo op of the two shaking hands. That would instill hope that a solution to the Iranian nuclear buildup could find a solution. Their hopes were dashed as the Iranian would have no part of the handshake.

In spite all of the high-powered world leadership in attendance at the UN summit, world peace really boils down-whether thinking in terms of secular perspective or in Bible prophecy perspective - to the matter of Jerusalem, Israel, and, most particularly, the Temple Mount. Iran's nuclear development program, almost certainly for the primary purpose of producing nuclear weaponry, directly relates to Jerusalem, Israel, and the Temple Mount.

This Iranian Islamist leader is just like the last-same theme. He wants Israel off the Holy Land, out of the Middle East-removed from planet Earth. Ditto for a large majority of all leadership gathered at the UN summit. The leaders of the Muslim states surrounding Israel and those other Islamist dictatorships all want Israel bulldozed into the Mediterranean so they will not be distracted on killing each other.

Trouble is reaching a boiling point over the control of the Temple Mount area. On this spot where the two previous Jewish Temples sat-where Abraham brought Isaac to be a sacrifice, where the ark of the covenant sat, and near where Jesus Christ was cruci-
fied for the sins of man-are in evidence, as always. The violence exploded again during the Jewish Sukkot holidays just past, as the following excerpt reports. The Al-Aqsa mosque on the Temple Mount was the scene of clashes between Palestinian youths and Israeli police, the latest in a series of skirmishes as Jewish pilgrims had flocked to the site over the holiday.

After Palestinians in the courtyard began stonethrowing and rioting, police officers stormed the compound. Ma'an News Agency reported that police fired stun grenades at the rioters. Seven Palestinians were injured, according to Ma'an.

Just before the Jewish New Year, on September 4, fifteen Palestinians were arrested after fighting with police, and hundreds of Muslims were denied access. Security forces have been on high alert during the entire holiday period. (Lazar Berman, "Troops Clash with Palestinians on Temple Mount," Times of Israel, 9/25/13)

It seems something akin to insanity, the fact that Israel has been attacked in major assaults on three occasions by Muslim coalitions in 1956, 1967, and 1973. Each time, Israel defeated the vastly superior in numbers forces and won territory from its attackers. Then, each time, Israel, under UN pressures, gave back much of what was won in war. Particularly flabbergasting is the fact that Israel gave controlling authority over the Temple Mount to the Muslims following the 1967 Six Day War. No one has been able to fully fathom to this day why the hardened Israeli general, Moshe Dayan, did so.

All of that, then to consider that Muslims are given free rein to worship and visit its shrines atop Mount Moriah while Jews are strictly forbidden from worshipping there and from visiting except under the most stringent of regulations, is just mind-bending.

There is building a desire by the Jewish people to push back against this restriction against interacting with this most holy place in its history. The Muslim Arabs and others are becoming just as exercised while the Jews are ratcheting up demands that they be given access to the Temple Mount.

As noted in other emails and the Electronic Restitution Herald, the Korean Extension is in a tough situation because many students were "scared off" enrolling due to the lack of response to recertification. Many of you have received a Fall Church Builders League request to help both our campuses during this time. Despite the hard times, many have responded with both prayer and financial support. Several unexpected gifts have also made recruiting new students and helping current ones possible. The board meets in November to review this and other items.

We have a good group of students, and we ask for your continued prayer for them. There is a weekend "GO SERVE" trip planned in November to the Louisiana-Arkansas Youth Retreat at the Blood River Church at Tickfaw State Park (a few miles from the church.) The theme of the weekend is M.A.D., Make A Difference!

We hear lots of good news from churches. I attended the Heritage Conference at North Hills. Rebekah and I spoke at Lawrenceville church, sharing about the Africa mission. I also attended the $50^{\text {th }}$ anniversary of the Jaynes Street Church, Omaha. God bless you as we continue to work together to get and disciple kingdom citizens.

## Warren Sorenson Honored

Pastor Warren Sorenson was recently recognized by the presentation of a plaque for 52 years of outstanding service on behalf of mission work of the Church of God General Conference. Greetings to the saints of the Church of God and all that look forward to the appearing of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

I consider it a privilege to be part of a people who have always looked forward to the return of Jesus Christ to redeem both His people and the earth which His heavenly Father created.

I can't remember a time in my life that I didn't think it was possible that Jesus would be returning soon. I was 11 during Israel's sixday war in 1967. I was just entering my senior year of high school during the Yom Kippur War in 1973. I entered pastoral ministry at the end of the 1970 's and in the next decade we saw the fall of the Iron Curtain and the rise of radical Islam. The Common Market added its much anticipated tenth nation and didn't stop there. In the last decade of the previous century the United States invaded a Middle Eastern country, and China arose as a dominant economic power in the world. In this century
the United States suffered a terrorist attack in New York City and has fought on multiple fronts in the Middle East.

As I write this, the Middle East has multiple places where conflict could erupt. Our CogPastor list serve was alive with speculation that cataclysmic events could begin with the fall feast days which God gave Israel, yet those days have now passed.

The words of the Apostle Paul remain relevant. "So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest-time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith." (Gal. 6:9-10)

As I write this, the board continues to spend a great deal of time and energy in addressing budget needs. The General Conference technically ended the 2012 fiscal year in the black although uncollected debt actually put our bal-
ance in the red. The board continued to pare down the budget last year, but the unexpected delay of our recertification with INS resulted in substantial tuition income loss for the current budget resulting in the need for further cuts.

The board will meet in November, and we request your prayers for wisdom. It has been suggested that we look for doors which the Lord might be opening even as it appears to grow more and more challenging to have international students on our Georgia campuses. Pray that the Lord will give us vision.

I believe Paul gave his admonishment because he knew that believers would grow weary. We make decisions to persevere because we know that the harvest is coming and we want to take part in the Lord's harvest. It's a privilege to be a part of God's people and we want to be faithful to the calling which He has given to us.

## General Conference Delegate Business Session

## July 11, 2013

Chairperson stand-in Greg Demmitt offered welcoming comments. Rob Helenburg offered the opening prayer.

Greg Demmitt recognized first time delegates, new churches, and also recognized newly licensed pastors. Greg offered thanks to Pastor Mike Montgomery and the Guthrie Grove Church of God for their hospitality in hosting General Conference.

Greg addressed the delegates with the chairman's message. Greg offered explanation on how the board of directors is organized internally regarding chairperson, secretary, and treasurer positions as well as the changes he has observed in serving, including the priority that the board has placed on bringing our spending in line with our expense and income expectations. It is the board's intention to not borrow from restricted funds and rather use a line of credit to meet the needs. The board is committed to developing new leadership and to encourage new ministry possibilities that our members envision. Isa. 55:6 was the parting thought meant to inspire.

Charles Bottolffs is serving as parliamentarian.
Gary Burnham has been unable to attend this year due to family illness. David Krogh presented the financial report in his place. David noted that there are three items that have contributed to the income shortfall. General Income contributions were less. Smaller enrollment in ABC and also ABCKE. Tenant income was less than expected. New leases have been developed in the building and we expect additional revenues. Salaries and wages are nearly

half of the expense budget. Reductions in employees as well as wages have helped decrease the shortfall. Publications are increasingly being sent electronically which helps save in printing expenses. Please sign up for the electronic version.

A $\$ 20,000$ loan and $\$ 32,000$ loan were repaid this past year but are not noted in the financial report. The true deficit was actually $\$ 73,427$ for this past fiscal year. This is the third year for free tuition to ABC for Church of God students.

Greg Demmitt explained that the terms of Carrie Briggs and Joe Myers expire this year. They may not be re-elected. He then opened the floor for nominations. Bob Collier and the Indiana State Conference recommended Dan Knowlton for a board position. Joe James and the Guthrie Grove Church of God submitted for nomination Chris James as a nominee for the board of directors. Bob Collier nominated Valerie Sharp for the board of directors as submitted by Andy Cisneros and Timberland Bible Church. These three nominations were previously submitted and published in the Herald.

Rob Helenburg moved and Scott Millard seconded that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

Dr. Joe Martin presented a CAO Report. He believes the second half of the year has been a tremendous blessing. His latest class was a very fulfilling experience this past semester. Several of the COG events (Pastors Retreat, Theological Conference, and CWS) were very successful. Dr. Joe continues to make intentional efforts to connect with

individuals and churches. Then Joe spoke on his vision To Join God, knowing, growing, going, serving, teaching, and preparing for His Kingdom through His Son and Spirit both our generation and the next. Joe continues to focus on serving the local churches. The strength of the local church will lead to a strong General Conference. Joe shared a recent experience driving home from a traffic jam and gave us the spiritual analogy. He encouraged us to tune into what God desires and join Him. Joe shared some experiences from Africa and that the churches in Mozambique are bursting. He is excited about how God is moving and how God is calling us to the tasks ahead as we consult Him.

Steve An presented the report for the ABCKE extension. He shared Acts $1: 8$ as inspiration. Spring semester had 73 students enrolled. Seven Korean graduates were granted degrees. Two graduates were hired by local Korean churches, and one graduate applied and was accepted by New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Pictures of the newest Korean church were shared as well as pictures and experiences from his latest recruitment travel to South Korea with his wife, Young. They met with nine prospective Korean students and prayerfully are awaiting the SEVP re-certification.

Greg Demmitt shared the immediate need for a report to come back from INS by Aug. 27 in order to allow international students to continue their studies at ABCKE and ABC . A time of prayer will be scheduled before the end of General Conference.

David Krogh presented the budget proposals for 20132014 and 2014-2015. The board previously decided to change the budget proposal in fiscal year 2013-2014 by increasing tenant income $\$ 20,000$, raising the original $\$ 65,000$ to $\$ 85,000$ and by decreasing general contributions by $\$ 20,000$ to $\$ 344,000$.

David Krogh closed the session with prayer.
July 12, 2013
Greg Demmitt opened the meeting with a welcome. Prayer was offered by Mark DeYoung.

Minutes from the July 11 meeting were read and approved at the close of yesterday's meeting.

Dr. Joe Martin presented plaques to Carrie Briggs and Joe Myers in honor of their service on the Board of Directors. Your service is greatly appreciated.

Greg Demmitt conducted a straw poll inquiry with the delegates on whether a weekend conference for next year's 94th Annual General Conference in Atlanta, Georgia, might be better attended with a change of the traditional days of the week. Thoughts from the delegates were collected.

Elections were conducted for the position of director to the board of directors. A director must be elected by a majority of the votes. Chris James and Dan Knowlton were elected.

David Krogh provided a report on behalf of the Lord's Harvest International Mission Board (LHI). David thanked delegates for their prayer support as well as generous financial support. A couple was sent to check on the work of the eight churches in Pakistan this spring. They have sent an extensive report that David and the LHI is reviewing. The committee will report on the work there soon. A team will be traveling to Peru this fall to encourage ministry there. The work in Haiti continues and re-building efforts still take place from the earthquake in 2010. Mexico and Tanzania are also two countries that LHI continue to focus efforts toward. Rebekah Martin reported on the latest trip to Africa. Their trip was exhausting but very beneficial. Joe and Rebekah Martin, and Jack Kmiecik visited Malawi, Mozambique, and Kenya in June. They visited churches and met with the boards that oversee the work. They thanked the churches for all their support financially and with prayer. A team will go back next May.

Delegates were asked to approve the revised 2013-2014 budget. Jeff Fletcher moved and Joe James seconded to approve the 2013-2014 budget. Motion passed unanimously. Michael Hoffman moved and Rob Helenburg seconded to approve the 2014-2015 budget. Motion passed unanimously.

In 1975 our pastor, Dr. William Kammen, asked the congregation if anyone would be interested in becoming a friend during the upcoming Billy Graham Crusade? He said that volunteers would have to sit by their phone and wait for a call during the program that was aired on TV. I volunteered and my name and phone number were passed to the Crusade which was in Detroit.

At the time I was working in a factory during the day and the program started at 8:00 p.m. When I got home from work I waited near the phone, and then it rang. It was a man named Phillip who lived close by. I was shocked when he said he planned to commit suicide. I said to him, "Phil, please talk to me. I know you called the program number because there was no other place to turn. Please promise me you will not do anything until we have a chance to talk. Tell me what is going on to make you so depressed?"

He said, "My wife divorced me, and I am not allowed to see my two daughters, and I'm losing my job and I am drinking heavy, and there is nowhere else to turn." "That's not true," I told him. "I will show you a way out of your problems, because we serve a loving God who loves us if we love Him. I am not going to
bore you with all the details of my life now, but if God helped me he will surely help you. Do you believe in God?" "Yes." "Do you believe in God's Son?" "Yes." "Do you know why Christ was crucified? He was crucified for Rick and Phil." He replied, "He was crucified long ago, and He did not know you or me." "Phil, if we are sinners, He does know us and loves us and wants to save us. Promise you will call me tomorrow night."

He agreed. Over several phone calls I learned he was a Catholic, but had not been to church in years. We talked every night for weeks before he agreed to come to Bible study. We met every Thursday at my next door neighbor's house. We welcomed Phil as one of our own, and he came every week. He even visited his church and quit drinking and got a job. After about a year, Phil walked into our church with his two daughters. All I could say was "PRAISE GOD."

God puts people's lives together His way. No, Phil did not join our church, but changes happened in his life. When we plant seeds, we must not forget that God adds the increase. When we are put in a position to help someone, God expects us to help like the good Samaritan.

# Finding Comfort in the Promises of the Messiah <br> By Dustin Smith 

As the season of Advent quickly approaches we will soon be directing our attention toward the birth of the Savior. While our holiday season urges us to reflect on the birth of baby Jesus, which was performed when the Holy Spirit overshadowed Mary to bring about the miraculous begetting of the Son of God, we should never lose sight of the significance of his position as God's Messiah. As the Father's anointed king of the coming kingdom, Jesus is the figure in whom all of God's promises are to be fulfilled.

I wanted to spend some time reflecting on a remarkable passage from the Hebrew Bible which sometimes gets overlooked when churches study the promises of the coming Messiah. My hope and desire is that we find comfort in the words of these promises as well as discovering new opportunities to further our appreciation of the significance of the man Jesus Christ. This passage can be located in Jer. 23:5-6 where the prophet writes: "Behold, the days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will raise up for David a righteous branch; and He will reign as king and act wisely and do justice and righteousness in the land. In His days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell securely..."

This prediction of Jesus Christ is full of amazing truths worth reflecting on. First of all, God promises to bring about a figure who is described as the righteous branch of King David. David was the famous king of Israel to whom God promised the establishment of his descendants, throne, and kingdom forever (2 Sam. 7:12-16). Jesus, as the human descendant from the line of David, is considered the righteous branch of the Davidic family tree. Other passages likewise describe the coming Messiah as a 'branch' from the Davidic line (cf. Isa. 4:2; Jer. 33:15; Zech. 3:8; 6:12; 4QFlor 10-14).

Secondly, the promised king is said to reign, act with wisdom, perform justice, and exhibit righteousness (a big word which means "loyalty to God's standards"). The history of Israel is full of kings who failed to rule with integrity or who acted foolishly. Some of the terrible rulers failed to demonstrate any sort of justice and righteousness dur-
ing their tenure. The qualities spoken by Jeremiah are essential for the ruler of any kingdom, even into the present day. The kingdom of America, with its recent financial crisis, attests to our need for Jesus to return and reign as the king of kings, apart from any corruption or immorality.

Another gem of truth found within this promise of the coming Messiah is the assurance that His reign will be located in the land. The coming king of the kingdom, contrary to the teaching in most churches, is not destined to reign in the heavens. Rather, the Scriptures repeatedly attest to the geographic specificity of Christ's promised inheritance. As this passage states, it is the land which will benefit from the Son of God's righteous rule. This everlasting era of peace will be exhibited with the rescue of Judah from foreign oppressors. The Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ, will not tolerate war or violence in God's kingdom. Even Israel is promised to dwell securely, which is certainly good news in light of the numerous wars and conflicts which have taken place on her soil over the years.

As we draw our short study to a close, it is important for us to reflect on the many valuable truths which the prophet Jeremiah attributes to the coming Messiah. Jesus Christ is to be the human descendant of King David, drawing his covenant promises to a climax. Christ will also administer his everlasting kingdom with wisdom, justice, and righteousness. These qualities are great news to those who are frustrated with the current governments which have failed to demonstrate a just and honest tenure. Finally, the coming Messiah will rule on the earth which will be highlighted by the absence of war, violence, and oppressive nations. In short, we can take these promises foretold by Jeremiah and use them to bring a greater appreciation to our understanding of the birth of the king of God's coming kingdom: Jesus Christ our Savior.

# Faith to Live By

"The pen is mightier than the sword." That's because the words produced by the pen persuade minds, change hearts, and produce a faith to live by. The words may be a rallying cry for revolution, freedom, communism, Christianity, or some other commitment. On the other hand, the sword forces external compliance while increasing internal resentment and resistance.

The mightiest pens are the ones which wrote the words of God and which today explain those words to us. "For the word of God is living, and energetic, and more cutting than any twoedged sword, cutting through even to a separation of life and breath, and of joints and marrow, and able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart." (Hebrews 4:12, Emphatic Diaglott translation of the New Testament.) But without the response of faith and obedience, those words are unprofitable. As an example, for those who followed Moses out of Egypt, "the word of the report did not profit them, not being mingled with faith in the hearers." (Hebrews 4:4, Diaglott.)

When God's pen is unsheathed, its power is backed up by accountability to an all-seeing God. "No creature is concealed in his sight, but all things are naked and exposed to his eyes whose word is addressed to us." (v. 13, Diaglott.) But we are also offered help from the sympathetic one on the throne of grace (vv. 14-16). This could be called the carrot and stick approach. The word of God offers a warning and an incentive at the same time to obey by faith.

What would change in your life if you began to live more by faith in God? Motivational speakers and books assert that what the mind can conceive can be achieved. In other words, believing is seeing! While it's true that faith in yourself can create new efforts and new realities, faith in God is not based on our imagination but on his promises.

There are many promises given in both the Old and New Testaments.

"The Faith Chapter", Hebrews 11, tells of ancient people who believed in the power of God for their lives. It tells of what they accomplished and endured because of their faith. We stand in awe of their strong faith. But for all of them it started weak and grew. One famous example is Abraham's wife. "In faith, also Sarah herself received power for conception, even beyond the proper period of life, since she regarded him faithful who promised." (Heb. 11:11, Diaglott.) She went from laughing at the promise to living the promise! Even the apostles started out
as disciples (followers) who were weak in faith. Eventually they became apostles (sent-out leaders) as their faith grew.

Who do you look up to as a person of great faith and significant influence? For me that was my Dad. As most of you know, he just died on Nov. 11, 2013, just short of age 90. I was in awe of who he was and what he did. Only after this giant in my life died did I understand his humility before his God. In his own eyes he was small and dependent. What mattered to him was faith in Jesus his Savior, love, prayer, and the hope of being in the coming kingdom of God on earth when Jesus returns. It's hard for me to go back in my mind 85 years, 80 years, 75 years, to when he first knew there was a God, to when his faith started, and to know how it grew.

He must have been influenced by S. J. Lindsay, his grandfather who was the first editor of the Restitution HerALD, who lived until my Dad was 14. My Dad spoke often of important advice he heard at age 16 from Pastor Clarence Lapp about praying for God's help in finding a spouse. For the next five years he prayed for that continually until he met and married my Mom. He became a prayer warrior. But this faith, love and concern for others, and prayer life had to grow slowly. His last ministry was a regular column in the Restitution Herald called "Verses to Live By". As he grew old, his writing became simpler and his calls to following Jesus became more direct.

## Prophecy Page

Not all families were making precious and happy memories over the Thanksgiving-Christmas season. Consider some headlines in the past few weeks.

- 11-year-old Dallas girl arrested after stabbing mother nine times
- Arizona man guns down young daughters in New Year's Day murder-suicide
- Man allegedly kills 13 -year-old son with axe; believed he was demon-possessed
- Redlands California man suspected of killing his mother, wounding his sister
- Man 'killed girlfriend's baby son because he was crying during a football game'
- Florida teen murders his mom on Christmas Eve
- Arizona man kills wife, daughter, male friend in murder -suicide
- Husband, wife and two sons found dead in upstate New York murder-suicide

Paul warns us of all this in 2 Timothy 3:1-5:
."This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away."

Highlighting just a few of the words from this passage with the headlines indicate we are living in the age of this passage.
"perilous" This word describes times of annoyance and oppression that will be troublesome, dangerous, and hard to bear.
"lovers of their own selves" This phrase is one word in the original and appears nowhere else in the New Testament.
"proud" The idea expressed in this word is that of show one's self above others with an arrogant estimate of one's own means or merits. The word is used in the New Testament only in a bad sense. God is always against the proud (James 4:6).
"unholy" The word "unholy" means "to be impious," "wicked, or "irreligious."
"without natural affection" This expression means there will be an absence of love and affection among family or kindred.
"incontinent" That is, without power or self-control, intemperate.
"fierce" Savage, beastly.
"despisers of those that are good" This is one word in the original, meaning "opposed to goodness and good men. "
"traitors" "Betrayers," used only elsewhere in the New Testament with reference to betraying Christ by Judas (Luke 6:16) and by the people (Acts 7:52).
"heady" "Rash" or "reckless," "falling headlong."
"lovers of pleasure" This is the only appearance of this word in the New Testament.

How far the world has gone and probably will go from these verses:
"Children, do what is ordered by your fathers and mothers in the Lord: for this is right. Give honour to your father and mother which is the first rule having a reward, So that all may be well for you, and your life may be long on the earth. And, you fathers, do not make your children angry: but give them training in the teaching and fear of the Lord."
(Ephesians 6:1-4 BBE)
in the faith in spite of harsh conditions. But with that as a foundation and many more resources, how much will we do? What is your vision for how living more by faith in God would change your life and actions? It doesn't have to be a spectacular change. Everything starts small. As someone said, "we cannot accomplish great things, only small things with great love." And as Jesus said, do these things for the "small people" and we do them to Him. (Matthew 25:40.) That is living by faith!

Anote on the Korean effort is that the process to receive international students has been extended again. Praise God! It is still not totally resolved, and the wheels of bureaucracy seem to be spinning ever so slowly. But, progress has been made. We now talk to real people, and receive e-mails directly from real people.

Also, Steve and Young An will be traveling to Korea, per board action, to start a branch campus of Atlanta Bible College there! Their flight is scheduled for Feb. 4. See Steve's plans on a separate page. Please pray for this effort.

Many of you have heard some of this personal story, but it has dominated much of my thoughts and prayers lately that I think it best to share more. On December 11, Rebekah (my wife) went into the hospital for bladder surgery. It was an extended surgery, but the surgeon came out, noting that I should be able to see her in an hour or two. After three hours, I felt something was up. The nurse coordinator came to me and said the doctors wanted to meet with me. In a nice little "counseling room" (evidently where they need to share difficult information) I heard the words "Your wife has had a heart attack." An echocardiogram had been done along with blood tests and the results were... she had a heart attack.

I tried to call both my adult children, luckily my daughter was working, as a nurse, and couldn't take a call. When I tried to speak the words to my son, "Mom had a heart attack," they just wouldn't come out. Finally they came out through tears, but then the story really began. It was a "mild attack" and occurred because her blood pressure dropped to around 50/30 which caused the heart to be deprived. For those who know Rebekah, she is about the most health-conscious person I know.

The saga continued in that she could not eat. She kept continually throwing up. Finally, after the cardiac ICU,
they did an X-ray of her abdomen and there was an intestinal blockage, a large one. Evidently when the intestines are manipulated in surgery, they are very sensitive and can just shut down. She had not eaten for a long time, and she became uncommunicative. My daughter, the nurse, was here and it was bad. I remember praying on the way up during that time. I had no words left to pray, I had prayed them all. I couldn't think of a thing I hadn't prayed. The elders had anointed her with oil per scripture. All I could do was pray "Father, oh Father, Father, Abba Father..." all the way up to the hospital.

Finally, (with a major push from the family) they put an intravenous line in direct to the heart to feed her. It is called TPN, Total Parenteral Nourishment. She started doing better immediately. She got out of the hospital January 10, after a full month!! She is doing her own TPN at home and, LORD willing, surgery will be avoided to clear the blockage as she progresses. Thank you all for the cards, letters, calls, and visits by those nearby. Keep praying. I know this is extremely personal, but that is life at present.

Other news is that Atlanta Bible College semester has started and is in full swing. Please pray for the staff at both campuses. The ministers will be meeting Feb. 1014 at Cornerstone Church near the college. We look forward to student, staff and ministers interaction. Their special guest will be Kermit Zarley. Seth Ross has volunteered to head up FUEL this year in conjunction with the Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) and other workers. Thanks Seth. The board is asking for input and meetings with youth leaders and workers, before a new Youth Coordinator is appointed. The board is to meet at the Troyview Church in Ohio for meetings, Feb. 20-22. The planning of the $75^{\text {th }}$ anniversary of Atlanta Bible College at the summer General Conference will be part of their meeting. Remember all these things in your prayers.

## Verses to Live By

## WHAT IS JESUS DOING IN HEAVEN NOW?

"He is able to save forever those who draw near to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them."

Heb. 7:25
"Christ Jesus is He who died, yes, ...who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who also intercedes for us."

Rom. 8:34
"If anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the
Father, Jesus Christ the righteous;
and He Himself is the propitiation for our sins..."
1 Jn. 2:1,2
A man recently asked me the above question. At first I was surprised, for I thought all Christians knew why Jesus was in heaven at the right hand of God. But as I pondered the question and looked up the verses, I saw it was a really great question which required a Bible answer.

There are several Bible words that help us understand Jesus' present work at God's right hand.

- An advocate is one who pleads the cause of another.
- One who intercedes is to act between two parties to reconcile them.
- One who makes propitiation is one who appeases and makes acceptable.

God asked Jesus to do three things to save us eternally:
be the sacrifice for our sins; be our high priest to intercede for us, and be the coming king of kings in God's coming kingdom.

To put it simply, Christ is there at God's right hand interceding for us, daily finishing our complete salvation process. When we accepted Jesus' gospel message of the coming kingdom of God and Christ as our Savior and were baptized, at that moment all our sins up to that time were forgiven. But what about the sins we commit after baptism? How are they forgiven? As we come to God daily asking for forgiveness for the sins we commit after baptism, our Savior pleads our case with His Father, asking Him to have mercy on us and forgive us. This is a very important work Jesus is doing for us now.

It is "a keeping us constantly in the saving process" by daily giving us forgiveness in our imperfection. It is for us a daily being forgiven. That is why Jesus is our high priest.

Israel's high priest went into the Holy of Holies once a year on the Day of Atonement to make atonement before God for the sins of Israel. Jesus is the antitype of this. He has entered into the Holiest of all, even heaven itself, to intercede for us before God (Heb. 9:24).

Look up all the high priest verses in the book of Hebrews. We would list them here, but they are very numerous. And while you are studying this subject, also look up all the verses on mediator and intercession.

Jesus' sacrifice work is done. He is now mediating for us before His Father. He will come as King.

This is how this Bible student understands Jesus' present work in heaven.-Jim Mattison

Iam fascinated by the early church's presentation of Jesus and how sometimes the modern church's presentation is "different." Sometimes we do not ask the same questions they ask, such as "Are you the Christ, the Son of the Living God?" A key verse in this exploratory thought is Acts 2:36, "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ." (KJ) The NIV says, "Therefore let all Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Messiah. Compare the title, "Master and Messiah."

The context is Peter preaching to the crowds on the day of Pentecost. The background is that between Passover and Pentecost there are fifty days. We know Jesus was killed shortly before Passover, was in the grave (sheol, hades) three days, was resurrected and appeared to them for forty days preaching the kingdom of God. (Acts 1:3) That leaves about a week, 7 days, with a group ( 120 people, Acts 1:15) in prayer waiting for the promise of the Holy Spirit. The spirit came in Acts 2, with some fifteen named categories of people in Jerusalem celebrating Pentecost.

Peter took his stand, with the eleven, and explained to the crowd that they were not drunk since it was only nine in the morning. In verse 22 , he explains it is about Jesus, "a man attested to you by God with miracles and wonders and signs which God performed through Him... ." In fact, he further states, "This Jesus, God raised up again, to which we are all witnesses." (v. 32)

The pivotal verses that explain about the day's events begin in verse 33 , that Jesus, "...exalted to the right hand of God, and having received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit, He has poured forth this which you both see and hear." (NASB) The explanation is that the Spirit is being poured on them by Jesus! A further reference from the Hebrew scriptures (Psa. 110:1) notes Jesus' position again, "The LORD (YHWH) said to my Lord, sit at my right hand... ." (This is the most referenced [20+ times] Old Testament verse in the New Testament!) Evidently, the Spirit is now flowing to them through this person Jesus.

In our key verse 36, we are to "know assuredly" (KJ), "know for certain" (NASB), "be assured" (NIV) of several key points! First, "GOD MADE... ." The events at the birth of the
 church that are happening are under the authority of Almighty God! "For God so loved the world..." is the beginning of everything. "In the fullness of time, God sent forth His son, born of a woman..." (Gal. 4:4) "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself... " (2 Cor. 5:19) Notice, it does not say, "God was Christ!" as some modern traditionalists preach. It says first, "God was in Christ...!" By the way, as Christ should be in you and me as spirit-led Christians! (Gal. 2:20).

Secondly in our key verse, v. 36, it says "God has made Him both Lord and Christ." Because of obedience to the ultimate sacrificial death, God confirms Jesus' identity in two ways. He is both Master and Messiah to all of humanity! "Lord" can be a generic title and, as we know, especially a name, YHWH, that the translators use in abbreviation of the name of God. If one deducts the 6,828 times YHWH is translated LORD, from the 7,102 times Lord is used in the O.T., that leaves some 274 times "Lord" is applied to others not necessarily the LORD God Almighty (YHWH El Shaddai!). Sarah called Abraham, "Lord." (Rebekah, my wife, has not done that to me... yet! ©) Joab, Bathsheba, and Nathan, referenced David as Lord, etc.

I have grown to appreciate the work of the actor Russell Crowe, as many others have. In Gladiators, he is a "man's man!" He comes back from total adversity to avenge the evil Lord Emperor! Especially, in Master and Commander, though almost totally destroyed at sea, he, as ship master, comes back and conquers! He is more "human" in $\boldsymbol{A}$
Beautiful Mind where he portrays a genius with schizophrenia. (PS-He will play Noah, in Noah coming out this year.) It should be interesting. He is a "Master" or "Lord" in many of his movies.

In the New Testament, "Lord" is used 651 times, with many times for the Lord God, and most times

for the Lord Jesus, but also there are other "lords." For example, Festus tells Agrippa that he has nothing to write to "his lord" (meaning Caesar, since Paul appealed to Caesar). Thus Caesar is a "Lord." In the book of Revelation, John speaks to one of the elders saying, "My lord, you know." (Rev. $7: 14$ ) But in our key verse God is making Jesus Lord over all humanity for all time by virtue of his resurrection! "There is no other name under heaven that has been given among men by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:12 NASB) Jesus is Lord of all so-called lords! Of course, the LORD God is still Jesus' Lord and God! (cp. I Cor. 15:28 where "the Son Himself also will be subject to the One who subjected all things to Him, so that God may be the all in all." [some Greek manuscripts have $\tau \mathbf{d}$ $\boldsymbol{\pi} \mathbf{a ́ v} \boldsymbol{\tau} \boldsymbol{\alpha} \boldsymbol{\varepsilon} \mathbf{\varepsilon} \boldsymbol{\pi} \boldsymbol{\pi} \mathbf{a} \boldsymbol{\sigma} \boldsymbol{\imath} \boldsymbol{v}$ THE ALL IN ALL]) God will be the all in all, with Jesus reigning for Him in the kingdom.

The third major aspect of our key verse is "Messiah!" "God has made this same Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Messiah/Christ." Some versions read Christ, and some read Messiah. Same thing! However, to be more Hebraic, it is good to fully understand our Master and Messiah from how "God made..." him this.

Christos, the Greek, comes from Mashiach, the Hebrew, which originally simply means to "anoint." Moses mashached (mashach occurs 770 times in the O.T., so many things are anointed) the tabernacle and everything in it, the altar and Aaron. Of course eventually, the prophets anoint the king that YHWH determines. The king then becomes "The Anointed," or Ha Mashiach. The
king who eventually will reign forever is the ultimate Ha Mashiach, THE CHRIST!

Psalm 2 further clarifies the connection between God and Jesus, "Why do the nations conspire and the people plot in vain...against the LORD [YHWH] and His Anointed One... ." (Psalm 2:1,2) The LORD God is working through His Christ, compare Acts 3:18, 4:26, Rev. 11:15, 12:10. God makes it personal that Jesus is "His Christ!" He is the one God is working through to bring us salvation and to rule in His Kingdom.

At Jesus' birth, in Luke 2:11, the shepherds are told that one is born who is "Christ the Lord!" The ultimate question to Jesus was "Are you the Christ the Son of God?" Contrariwise, the question was never, "Are you the Christ, God?" Jesus told the Pharisees, "You believe in God, believe also in me." (Jn. 14:1) Joel Hemphill suggests one of our purposes now needs to ask the modern church, "You believe in Jesus, believe also in God" who made him both Lord and Christ, Master and Messiah for all time.

Jesus, Yeshua or Yahshua, in scripture is called the "Holy One of God," the "Christ of God," the "Lamb of God," the "salvation of God," the "gift of God," the "bread of God," the "power of God," the "wisdom of God," the "image of God," the "priest of God," the "word of God," the "ruler of God's creation," etc! THANK GOD FOR JESUS! Jesus has shown the way, the truth, and the life. He is the Way! He was "tempted in every way as we are, yet without sin." (Heb. 4:15) He is our brother, but our Master and Messiah. King Jesus, we submit to you

## Natural Church Development (NCD)

This feature in THE RESTITUTION HERALD \& Progress Journal highlights concepts from NCD. Rather than focus on a church's growth statistics, NCD

is a tool designed to help a church focus attention and effort on its health.

## Are Your Small Groups Holistic?

This article is the sixth of eight articles offering an extended view into each of the eight quality characteristics of Natural Church Development. The sixth quality is Holistic Small Groups.

All churches have small groups, but those small groups may or may not be holistic. What does holistic mean? We'll get to that shortly! You might find it interesting to note that people that experience truly holistic small groups, when asked about their church, most often first talk about their small group. Why? Because for them it is the highlight of their church experience.

Please know that small groups are not just Bible study groups-likely our first thought when focusing on small groups. While small groups may very well be formed primarily for Bible study, they also may be formed primarily for fellowship/relationship building, for a task (i.e., worship team), or for other reasons.

Generally speaking, a small group is holistic when group members are participating on a variety of levels: Bible study, prayer, relationships, service, leadership development, etc. Does this list describe what you receive in a small group in which you are a member?

NCD measures four critical components for churches seeking to build and maintain holistic small groups.

The first component addresses the development of a spiritually oriented community. To what degree is scripture and prayer part of the small group life? In what ways do the small groups nurture group members' spiritual growth? How well have the small group members learned to trust each other and rely on each other? How transparent are group members with each other about what is really going on in their lives?

The second component considers multiplication of disciples, leaders and groups. What clear process is in place to train, apprentice and coach small group leaders? How do we assess leaders' effectiveness and provide accountability? In what ways does our small group "system" support successful multiplication of both leaders and groups?

The third component evaluates how well we integrate newcomers. In what ways do our small groups bring in new people and help them feel welcome? To attract newcomers, what events do small groups plan? When someone visits a small group, what follow-up is provided to engage the potential new group member? How successfully do our groups incorporate new people?

The fourth component measures group relevance. How are group activities and topics of discussion chosen to ensure they are relevant to group members' lives. How do we make small group involvement an integral part of group members' lives? What do we see that indicates groups really help people with the challenges in their lives? How well, and in what ways, do group members interact with each other between group meetings?

My vision is to see churches of God all around the world evidencing the eight quality characteristics of NCD. I see healthy churches ministering well to members, friends, and entire communities, making an eternal difference in folks' lives.

On behalf of the Korean Extension staff and the student body, I thank all of you for your consistent support for the Korean mission and providing the Korean Extension with the opportunity to convey the Abrahamic Faith to the Korean Community in the United States and in South Korea.

As a method to enhance our efforts to provide God's message, the Korean Extension was established in 2003. During that time, 19 students from South Korea enrolled and began their studies. In the following year, the Korean Extension student body increased to 48 and to 64 in 2005 and climbed to 102 in 2010.

As of May 2013, we have awarded 50 Korean students with bachelor's degrees and three students with associate's degrees, and all have moved on into various mission fields in South Korea as well as the U.S. More specifically, a number of graduates have accepted positions as Bible college instructors, pastors, assistant pastors, and private chaplains in the South Korean military while others have pursued higher education.

As most of you know, we are experiencing unreasonably delayed processing times for our school's I-17 certification from the U. S. Citizens and Immigration Services (USCIS) to accept foreign students into our program. Of course our theological knowledge and the quality of our teaching is what attracts our students, rather than the immigration department's certification. Nevertheless, we do not believe that God's will is to stop the Korean ministry. Rather He is providing the Korean Extension with a new opportunity, possibly to establish the Korean Extension operation in South Korea. ("...and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." NIV Matt. 28:20)

In the last ten years, a number of Korean students were unable to complete our program for various reasons, such as the lack of finances, other personal problems that they have experienced in the U.S., and also to serve a mandatory term in the Korean military. Most students have reassured us that they had plans to return to the U.S. to complete their studies.

Furthermore, many prospective students who I met during my travels to South Korea were eager to enroll into the Korean Extension but later realized the high living cost in the U.S. The difficulty in securing an entry visa from the U.S. Embassy also discouraged them from applying to our program.

Thus, we proposed (and the board approved) establishing an additional Korean Extension branch campus in South Korea besides the Duluth campus, to meet the needs of individuals overseas. It has become clear that the Korean Extension in South Korea will be more effective and successful alongside a campus in the U.S. What is more, future students as well as former students would have the opportunity to complete the program. Also, they will be pleased that they do not have to spend thousands of dollars to travel to a foreign country to hear and learn the truth. In addition, a second campus means that we would not have to undergo strict government regulations including immigration department facility requirements; students are not obligated to take 12 semester hours; proper immigration department documentation of foreign students is not necessary; and we will not have to be certified by USCIS. By establishing a program in South Korea, we can focus more effort and time in developing our Christian curriculum in order to provide the Korean students with meaningful classes. The core value of the Korean Extension, both in the U.S. and South Korea, is to offer Korean students quality Christian instruction, which is what our students are seeking.

Young and I are scheduled to depart on February 4. Once we arrive in South Korea, we will stay in a motel until we find and rent an apartment. We have attained a list of several units from a website, and once we choose an apartment, it should be available to us to move in hopefully between $2 / 15$ and $2 / 20$. The city of Chun-an is located approximately 50 miles south of Seoul. Since we will not purchase a vehicle (maybe rent if necessary), the location is ideal because of its close proximity to public transportation giving us convenient access to travel to three different cities such as Seoul, Dae-jeon, and Chung-ju where the classes will be held in church buildings.

Please continue your support for the Korean mission.

## Prophecy Page

T
he Blood Moon series of 2014 and 2015 is generating a significant amount of speculation that these could be signs connected with the second coming of Jesus Christ.

These four consecutive total lunar eclipses are known as a "blood moon tetrad." What calls attention to this series is that they fall on the same Jewish Feast days in the next two years. They fall on Passover (April 15, 2014, April 4, 2015), the first of the seven annual Jewish feasts, and the Feast of Tabernacles (October 8, 2014, September 28, 2015), which is the last of the seven annual Jewish feasts as given in Leviticus 23. We also have a solar eclipse that will occur on the first day of the religious New Year on the Jewish calendar, Nisan 1, which is March 20 in 2015.

Blood moons are when the moon appears red due to lunar eclipses. They occur when the earth is positioned between the sun and the moon. The earth's shadow blocks the sun's light, which would normally reflect off the moon. The delicate layer of dusty air surrounding our planet reddens and redirects the light of the sun, filling the dark behind the earth with a sunset-red glow. This is in contrast to a solar eclipse where the moon is positioned between the earth and the sun causing darkness.

Israel has long felt that the Blood Moons bring disaster to them. The Jewish Talmud says: "When the moon is in eclipse, it is a bad omen for Israel. If its face is as red as blood, (it is a sign that) the sword is coming to the world.

According to this tradition: Lunar Eclipse = bad omen for the Jewish people and Israel; Blood Moon = sword coming; Solar Eclipse = bad omen.

Historically, these have happened only eight times in 2000 years. It is the tetrads that fell on Jewish Feast days that seem to validate the Talmud. It happened before the destruction of Temple/ Jerusalem A.D. 70. The tetrads of A. D. 14931494 coincided with the Spanish Inquisition. It occurred 1949-1950 while Israel was establishing
its statehood. It appeared again in 1967-1968 when Israel regained the Temple Mount.

While all this looks ominous for the Jews and nation of Israel, could it be the fulfillment of Joel 2:31: "The sun will be given over to darkness, and the moon to blood, before the coming of the great and terrifying Day of the Lord." (ISV)

Here are two events described by one verb. The sun turns dark, and the moon turns red, both at the same time. There are not two actions going on at the same time, one affecting the sun and one affecting the moon. There is only one event going on, and it's affecting both heavenly bodies at the same time.

Joel doesn't predict four lunar eclipses that will come a year apart. There's only one event: the darkening of the sun, followed by a red hue coming to moonlight. The red hue is coming from a startling and terrifying diminished output of visible light from the sun itself that causes the moon to turn red in appearance.

This seems to be in harmony with the corresponding passage as found in Matthew 24:29: "Now immediately after the troubles of those days, the sun will be darkened, the moon will not reflect its light, the stars will fall from the sky, and the powers from the heavens will be disrupted.'" (See also Revelation 6:12)

What Jesus said regarding the sun and moon does not seem to match current views about the events surrounding His return. Notice that:

First, the sun and moon being struck appears at the end of the time of trouble, not before it begins.

Second, the stars throughout the universe will fall from their courses (comet ISON is on its way this fall and may be seen by the naked eye during the daytime). Heavenly "powers" (whatever that may entail, the text doesn't say) will be disrupted.

Third, after all of these events occur Christ descends from heaven.

> Watch therefore, for you do not know what hour your Lord is coming...Therefore you also be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect. (Matthew 24:42, 44, NKJV)

## Nomination for the Board of Directors

At General Conference, one director will be elected to the board of directors. The term of Alan Cain expires. He may not be nominated. Currently we have one nominee. One additional nominee is required according to Article IV of the constitution.

## ARTICLE IV Officers of the Conference

Section 1. Seven directors shall be elected in General Conference delegate sessions; said directors shall constitute the Board of Directors of the College/ Conference. The Board of Directors shall organize by the election of necessary officers at the first meeting following each annual Conference election. These officers shall be a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and treasurer, and three board members. The term of office of a director shall begin at the close of the Conference in which said director is elected.

Section 2. No elected director shall be a paid employee of the College/Conference for a period longer than two months in any one year.

Section 3. The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of church leaders. A director may be either male or female.

Section 4. Nominations for the Board of Directors of the College/Conference may be submitted by: State or District Conference Boards of the Church of God; Churches that are members of the General Conference; Ministerial Association of the Church of God General Conference. Name(s) of nominees and resumes will be submitted to the Chief Administrative Officer of Atlanta Bible College/General Conference at least three months before the meeting, and will be published by the most effective means of general communications at least one month before the meeting.

Section 5. Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than one more nomination than the number of directorships.

Section 6. Nominations shall be made from the floor; but voting shall be done by ballot, and no nominee shall be elected unless he receives a majority of the votes cast. The total list of all nominees shall be submitted to the delegates for election. If no majority is reached in the first balloting, the list of nominees shall be reduced to the three receiving the highest number of votes. When no majority is reached with the list of three nominees, the one receiving the fewest votes shall be removed from the list. Of the two remaining nominees, the one receiving the majority of votes is elected. If other directors are to be elected, all names, except the one(s) previously elected, shall be resubmitted, and the same election process repeated until all positions are filled.

Section 7. The term of office for all College/ Conference directors shall be for four years. No director shall succeed himself for a second term.

Section 8. Any director who may become inactive through sickness, resignation, prolonged absence, or death, shall be replaced for the unexpired term by election at the next annual conference. Temporary appointment of such directors may be made by the Board of Directors.

|have been reading through Jeremiah, and I see that God is jealous for His worship. He does not tolerate idolatry, and compares it to adultery and harlotry! That is a serious charge! However, there are many supposedly "Christian" systems out there that are differing over the issue of the identity of the only true God. And they really don't seem to even be slightly concerned with this issue!

But it troubles me. Jesus said that he was "the way, the truth, and the life," and that no one comes to the Father but through Him. And so I am wondering to myself, if we don't have the "right" Jesus, will we be led to the "right" Father, the only true God?

It seems to me, based on my understanding of the Bible and the historical beliefs of Judaism and Christianity, that often we have not been led to the true God. In many systems, Jesus has been exalted to the position of Almighty God. If he is the Almighty God, this is not a problem. But if he not is the Almighty God, this is idolatry and blasphemes the only true God.

I think that much of the confusion over this issue stems from a misunderstanding of the term "Son of God." When applied to Jesus, this term is synonymous with other messianic titles such as Christ, Messiah, or Son of Man. All of these titles refer to the one who was appointed by God as the anointed king of the future kingdom of God. It does not mean that Jesus was God. This would violate the Jewish understanding of the Messiah.

The expected Messiah was to be a man, a prophet from among his brethren, the people of Israel (Deut 18:15-19). He would be a literal descendant of David and reign on the throne of David over the kingdom of God until the day when he hands it over to His Father.

This is made explicitly clear in Psalm 110, which is a purely messianic psalm and applied to Jesus in the New Testament, by himself and others, over twenty times. Psalm 110:1 says "The LORD says to my lord: "Sit at my right hand until I make your enemies a footstool for your feet." This verse is

translated correctly by the NIV, for it denotes the second "lord" in all lowercase letters, which accurately reflects the Hebrew unlike the traditional translation "Lord." This verse makes a distinction between two lords: the Lord God who is YHWH, and the lord Messiah who is Jesus. The Hebrew word that is translated "lord" is adoni, which means "my lord." Adoni is never applied to the Lord God, although it is frequently applied to human lords, like King David, and even angelic beings in some cases.

Therefore, it can be seen that Messiah was understood to be man, and not God. However, it must be acknowledged that the Messiah was no ordinary man, for he was born of a virgin by the power of God. Thus, Jesus is the Messiah, God's only begotten (uniquely born) son, the man appointed as the future king of the earthly kingdom of God.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the COGGC,
I want to personally thank you for your continued support for the Korean ministry. Most of you may already know about the recent addition to the Korean Extension. We are in the process of establishing classes in South Korea beginning in the fall, which will start August 2014.

Currently, there are three Korean Conference member churches in South Korea in Seoul, Dae-jeon city, and Chung-ju city, and they are providing support to our Korean Extension in numerous ways. All three church pastors, including the congregation, are assisting me by offering up their church facility, religiously advertising, and helping with recruitment. In addition, former Korean Extension students and graduates are also assisting in the efforts.

Initially, I will facilitate the classes at the three different locations rotating the schedule in order to meet the needs of the students. In this way, the students can choose a convenient location until we have established a firm location.

Presently we are holding Bible study classes at the churches (future campuses) on Wednesdays in Seoul, Saturdays in Dae-jeon City, and Sundays in Chung-ju City. I am facilitating the classes, not just as a means to present the Abrahamic Faith, but also for the purpose of advertising and recruiting in those areas.

It is somewhat ironic that Young and I immigrated to the United States 35 year ago, and we have returned with the truth to life and how to attain eternal life. It is quite difficult to put into words on how to express my excitement, joy, and happiness.

Most of Korean Christians are zealous for God. The issue has already been prophesied by God, "My people are destroyed from lack of knowledge" (NIV Hos. 4:6), and the idea has already been confirmed by the apostle Paul, "For I can testify about them that they are zealous for God, but their zeal is not based on knowledge" (NIV Rom. 10:2).

It is sad, but my family and I believed in the same faith similar to Paul when he practiced Judaism.

Paul met Jesus on the way to Damascus, and he was delivered from blind faith to the truth. After that, his heart was transformed into his own people, "For I could wish that I myself were cursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my brothers, those of my own race" (NIV Rom 9:3).

Please accept my appreciation for delivering me from blind faith to the light of truth and returning me to my people, so I can pass along the same lesson.

# Natural Church Development (NCD) 

This feature in THE RESTITUTION HERALD \& Progress Journal highlights concepts from NCD. Rather than focus on a church's growth statistics, NCD is a tool designed to help a church focus attention and effort on its health.

## Is Your Evangelism Need-oriented?

This article is the seventh of eight articles offering an extended view into each of the eight quality characteristics of Natural Church Development. The seventh quality is Need-oriented Evangelism.

While it can be said that most churches make at least some attempt at evangelism, the primary point of concern in this article is whether or not those attempts to evangelize are need-oriented.

A review of Jesus' ministry shows that almost without exception Jesus first met the need of a person or group of persons. Only then did He communicate about who He was and about His call on their life. Bottom line? Need-meeting preceded the message-giving. Is that how it works for you personally and for your church? Or, do you typically lead with the message first, failing to address a need in the person's life?

Need-meeting paves the way for message-giving!
NCD measures four critical components for churches seeking to build and maintain needoriented evangelism.

The first component measures the friendliness of your church. How well do your church folks meet and receive new folks with a high degree of openness and acceptance? As church events are developed, do they proactively include plans to welcome new folks and build relationships with them? When a new person comes to your church, how are they welcomed, how do they find their
way around, and how are they included? How does your church make it easy for new folks to build valuable relationships with others?

The second component evaluates your church's corporate evangelistic efforts. How do you help new believers establish a strong, growing faith? How does your church identify, equip, encourage and send out those with the gift of evangelism? In what ways does your church identify specific needs in the community around your building? What opportunities exist, and what avenues are built to help meet those identified needs?

The third component considers the level of personal evangelism in your church. How does your church encourage and assist folks to have contact with unchurched people in your community? What guidance do you provide to help folks discover and implement their personal evangelism style? In what way does your church help people identify the "pre-Christians" with whom they have contact? Then, how are people encouraged to regularly pray for and connect with those identified "pre-Christians"?

The fourth component addresses the degree to which your church is seeker-sensitive. Are church folks enthusiastic about inviting unchurched friends to various church activities? How does the church get feedback from church folks about the relevance of the church's evangelistic outreach? What innovative and successful outreach efforts has your church implemented? How has your worship team sought to make the worship experience less bewildering (language, activities, etc.) for unchurched folks?

My vision is to see churches of God all around the world evidencing the eight quality characteristics of NCD. I see healthy churches ministering well to members, friends, and entire communities, making an eternal difference in folks' lives.

## Explanation of Accounts in the Budget

The budgets proposed include both a revision of the budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 adopted by the delegates at the 2013 summer conference and a budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

## Income

1. General Contributions - non-specific giving by individuals, churches, and conferences
2. G. C. - Devises \& Bequests - periodically the college/ conference receives estate gifts in the General Fund
3. ABC Boosters - an annual giving program that raises funds for the college
4. Christian Education Materials - includes all sales of quarterlies \& Kingdom Quest materials
5. Books - sales of class and non-class books
6. Sale of Assets - income from the sale of unused assets
7. Tuition - estimated income from $\mathrm{ABC} / \mathrm{ABCKE}$ classes
8. Lodging/Apartment Rent - rent received from students for apartments rented by the college
9. ABCDF Support - transfer of investment income from the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation
10. Interest and Late Fees - finance charges on outstanding student accounts
11. Application/Miscellaneous Fees - charges for specific services for college students, such as application fees
12. Conferences $\boldsymbol{\&}$ Workshops - net income is tracked separately for each event; together, all events provide a modest net income
13. Interest - interest earned on checking account
14. Other Income - miscellaneous income
15. Tenant Income - income from tenants leasing space in the McDonough, GA office building
16. Transferred In - amounts transferred in from Restricted Funds; from interest income and from funds designed to support General Fund expenses

## Expenses

1. Salaries and Wages - compensation for all full-time and part-time staff.
2. FICA Tax - required payment of employer taxes
3. Employee Benefits - tax coverage, health insurance premiums, workers compensation, as well as conference premiums for Ministers' Voluntary Retirement Association for some employees
4. Assistance to Churches - grants to churches; Church Development Aid and Church Planting Aid
5. Ministerial Association - support for programs and expenses of the Ministerial Association
6. Youth Program - funding to subsidize the cost of Turning Point Youth Ministries and TPYM's production of FUEL and other events
7. Printing and Binding - includes all materials printed by the college/conference, such as adult quarterlies, The Restitution Herald \& Progress JourNAL, and the binding of permanent materials for the library
8. Postage and Shipping - shipping charges HERaLD / JOURNAL, tracts, books, and all correspondence
9. Book Store - textbooks and other materials which are purchased for resale
10. Advertising-Recruitment - includes newspaper, television, radio advertising (telephone calls, travel, printing, and postage are included under other line items)
11. Student/Staff Meals - meal expenses for ABC and the ABC Korean Extension
12. Library Periodicals - journals and other magazines for the library collection
13. Library Books - newly published books are acquired to keep the library collection up to date
14. Staff Periodicals, Books \& Dues - a small allowance is provided to staff to purchase resource material for classes and to participate in professional organizations
15. Staff Training - staff is provided opportunities to enhance skills in areas associated with their responsibilities, including pursuit of advanced degrees
16. Travel - for board members, advisory committees, special boards/committees, student groups, and staff
17. Office \& Misc. Supplies \& Expenses - paper, printer cartridges, stationery, envelopes, printing supplies, and other office expenses
18. Professional Services - costs of annual audit, as required by the constitution and annual fees to accrediting association
19. Telephone/Internet/Web/Data - basic and long distance service, including the cost of all " 800 " number calls which are provided toll free to the caller; also includes internet data lines and website fees
20. Office Machine/Software Lease \& Maint. - maintenance agreements and repairs for office equipment and software maintenance
21. Utilities - costs of electricity, water, gas, etc. at ABCKE campus, and ABC and ABCKE apartments

## Summer Conference Report By David Krogh

The 94th annual Summer General Conference was held at the Cornerstone Bible Church of God in McDonough, GA. This conference was a time of celebration of 75 years since the founding of Oregon/Atlanta Bible College. Throughout the Conference there were many reflections from those who have been a part of the history of our college. The first night, David Krogh presented a PowerPoint presentation which included photos of those who served as President, other staff members, facilities, and photos from the archives of groups of students over the years. Pastor Warren Sorenson spoke at the morning session on Thursday about his memories of the years that he and his wife Irene spent at the college in the late 1940s. On Thursday afternoon, Nola Jones led a session called "Inquiring Minds Want to Know" as she interviewed people who were involved in significant events at the college. Deceased individuals were represented by family members - Bob Jones for his uncle Delbert Jones who was among those who attended the first year in 1939;

Scott Ross for his father S. O. Ross who along with his wife Peg were house parents in the 1960s. Tim Pearson (class of 1947) and Ivan Magaw who attended in the early 1940s shared their memories. Dale Ramsey, Russ Magaw, and Dick and Carol Eldred reflected on the move to the Atlanta area in 1991 and the construction of the buildings on the Morrow campus. Dr. Joe Martin also made a PowerPoint presentation of photos from the past.

Following the first evening service, there was a birthday party for the college. The youngest graduate (Jack Kmiecik - class of 2014) and oldest graduate (Irene Sorenson - class of 1950) were invited to blow out the candles on the cakes. There was a photo booth sponsored by the Alumni association where attendees could dress up in graduation and party clothes to have their photos taken.

Ninety-four delegates consisting of 7 directors, 47 church/conference delegates, and 33 pastors conducted the business of the Conference. 170 were registered for the conference and more than 30 others attended evening services and the cook out at the beginning of the Conference. In addition to evening speakers David Krogh and Joe Martin, May 2014 graduate Jack Kmiecik spoke, and Steve An

David Krogh was reappointed to the Lords Harvest Board and Rick McClain was reappointed as the Board member who serves on this board. Charles Bottolfs was reappointed to the Ministerial Recognition Board.

We are very grateful for the hospitality of the Cornerstone Church that hosted the Conference. We also are thankful for all who served on the program and helped to make the Conference a great success. Thanks to all for the great food, great fellowship, and wonderful hospitality.

We are also grateful for the servanthood of the "Up Project" led by Andy Cisneros, Graysen Pack, and Julie Driskill. Fifteen young people gathered early to serve the General Conference and then headed to South Carolina on their project.

## O give thanks to the LORD, for He is good; for His steadfast love endures forever. Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, those He redeemed from trouble and gathered in from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south. Psalm 107:1-3

We gathered in McDonough, GA, earlier this month from the east, west, north and south. We gathered on the Fourth of July weekend, a time the United States celebrates those who made a Declaration of Independence in order to form a new country.

Many who signed the Declaration lost their lands and possessions. Just as the redeemed of the Lord say so, these patriots put their money where the mouth is.

The members of the Church of God General Conference stepped up this year as well, meeting a totally unexpected budget crisis.

As a board member, I remember lamenting several years ago that every time we lose a student we have to adjust our budget. This year, due to confusion over our status with U.S. Immigration, we lost three fourths of our projected enrollment, a financial hit of nearly a quarter of a million dollars, nearly one fourth of our budget.

One year later, however, we approach our summer conference in better financial shape that the year before. Not great, but better.

The members of the conference contributed $\$ 50,000$ more than was budgeted. That happened without any special appeals but simply an awareness of the need.

At the same time, our staff cut expenses at every opportunity. Thanks to the leadership of our CAO, Dr. Joe Martin for leading our staff in this challenge. And also thanks to our staff for their extra effort.

I definitely look back on this year with gratitude for all of God's faithful people who gave and served.

I think we can look forward to the future with hope as well.

Several years ago I spoke at conference about the Optimism/Pessimism study (The pursuit of happi-
ness, 2014) which demonstrated that an optimistic approach to life yields better results than a pessimistic approach. The study showed that pessimists had a more realistic appraisal of the challenges but that optimists were more successful in dealing with them.

As a group focused on the second coming of Christ, we almost welcome bad times as a sign of the Lord's return. We assume were in the days of Laodicea, where everyone is lukewarm. We must remember the words to the church at Philadelphia,
"Look, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut. I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name" (Rev. 3:8).

We might identify with a church that seems to have little power. Do we also have an open door set before us?

I believe that the challenges we are experiencing today in the General Conference are the challenges of growth and not the challenges of decline. Our giving increased last year. That's good. The problems with immigration spurred Steve and Young An to move to Korea to establish a new campus of Atlanta Bible College there. That's good. It will open in less than two months. Wow.

Having opportunities doesn't mean that life is easy. Steve and Young face many challenges in Korea. Their son Sam is rebuilding the Korean extension in Duluth.

We are currently expanding the McDonough campus with a new room for student activities and another for our archives on the second floor of the 2020 building. That same construction effort is also creating more space for tenants and we already have a five-year commitment for the rest of the second floor.

I look forward to what God has in store for our conference in this coming year.

Thank you to all the speakers at this General Conference where we are celebrating the $75^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary of our Bible College. David Krogh reviewed well our history. Warren remembered well the "good ole days." Steve An brought an international flavor to what we are doing. Jack Kmiecik brought a recent graduate perspective to what we should be doing now, Seeking the lost, Serving the Least, and Living the Kingdom now! Great job Jack! Tonight, I will be looking at the future as well as remembering my days at OBC and ABC.

Remembering the Vision statement of the conference, "To Join God... ," and the Mission statement, "To Serve Churches and Individuals..." with the Gospel, How do we proceed into the future? My first focus would be "At Your Word." The Church of God has a history of focusing on the Word. Let's turn to I Kings 18:36, where Elijah is having his famous contest with the 850 false prophets (of Baal, 450, and of Asherah 400). That would have been an exciting day, the taunts, the beatings, the cuttings, the fire, etc. In the verse, from the HCSB it says "...Elijah the prophet approached the altar and said, 'Yahweh, God of Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, today let it be known that You are God in Israel and I am Your servant, and that at Your word I have done all these things.'" Please notice the words, "at Your word."


As we move into the future, let it be as it was in the past of our heritage, at the Word of the Lord. I remember former preachers, Jim Mattison, John Lewis, Z.B. Duncan and others focusing on the Word of God. We will do as they have done, focus on the Word. Jesus in John 12:49 said, "I have not spoken on my own, but the Father Himself...has given me...what I should say
and what I should speak." We will follow the example of Elijah, Jesus, and our heritage of leaders and doing nothing except at the Word of the LORD!

Another example of this is based on Deut. 18:18, "I will raise up a prophet like you [Moses] and I will put my words in his mouth..." Verse 19 continues, "And it shall be that whoever will not hear My words, which He speaks in My name, I will require it of him" (Deut. 18:19 NKJ). Jesus has the very words of God. If we don't listen to him, WE will be called to account. Just as Peter, having fished all night, yet at the word of Jesus, he tried again. "But Simon answered and said to Him, 'Master, we have toiled all night and caught nothing; nevertheless at Your word I will let down the net'" (Luke 5:5 NKJ).

Secondly, since we are of Abrahamic Faith, "if you are Christ then are you Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise," (Gal. 3:29) then we must also have "Persistent Faith" as we focus on the future. Troubles will come, "evil will wax worse," economies will rise and fall, politicians will rise and fall, but our faith is in John 17:3, the only true God and Jesus Christ whom he has sent.

Jesus says seven times in the letters to the churches in Revelation 2 and 3, to the one who overcomes, is victorious, he will bless them. We must have persistent faith as we proceed into the future. Psalm 86:11 says "Teach me Your way, Yahweh and I will live by Your truth." (HCSB) We must live out the word in persistence of faith. Elijah had trouble also. Jezebel tried to kill him. Elijah went into a "pity party" and into a cave. The LORD said, Get up, get out, and do your work, "I have reserved 7,000 who have not bowed the knee to Baal" (I Kings 19:18). Though we may be small in number, compare Gideon, we persist in faith as we focus on the future. Matthew 24:14 fits also, the gospel of the Kingdom WILL be preached!

My third, and most important point in focusing on the future, is to "Focus on the Father." Psalm 20:7 says "Some take pride [trust] in chariots, and others in horses, but we take pride [trust] in the name of Yahweh our God." Paul says "Let God be true and every man a liar!" (Rom. 3:4) We stand with our God and his Word in persistent faith as we face the future!

Iam unable to express into words my joy and excitement of starting a new Bible college operation where I will have the privilege to teach the Biblical truth in my home country of South Korea. In 1979, 35 years ago, I left my home with my family and Young and I have come back with what I believe to be the most precious truth, the Abrahamic Faith. I would like to believe that when we departed South Korea for the U.S. 35 years ago in search of the truth, the scenario is that of the same as Abraham leaving his home country with his family. Since then, we have assimilated well into the Western culture; however, I have come to the realization that my home country has changed dramatically. Now, Young and I find ourselves struggling to assimilate into a culture that we are unfamiliar with.

Since our arrival to South Korea, Young and I have been spending most of our time and effort to fulfill three requirements in establishing a new operation, recruiting students, securing a classroom facility, and training and teaching the administrative staff. In terms of recruitment, I continue to contact former KE students who were unable to complete the program in the U.S. and returned to South Korea encouraging them to continue their studies in South Korea. In addition, I am preaching on Sundays and leading Bible classes regularly at churches in Chung-ju and Daejeon city. The pastors are extremely hospitable. They have allowed me to advertise our new school operation and offered their church facilities for classroom use.

In light of the church facilities, it will be critical to have a classroom facility in Seoul (capital city) in order to accommodate more students who come from various regions of South Korea. More than half the population of South Korea congregates in the capital city. Currently, we are in the process of leasing a facility that is approximately 1800 square feet, which was previously used for church meetings. Moreover, the facility comes fully furnished with sound equipment and furniture as well. It will be the first church planted in South Korea by a KE graduate (Young Hee An) and the first campus abroad.

The teaching faculty of the new operation will be myself (Steve An), pastor Young Hee An, Moon Sik Kim (KE graduate), pastor Daegeun Song (former KE instructor), and Jinsuk Han (KE stu-

dent) and my wife Young will provide support to the faculty.

The concept of having two Korean Extension campuses in two countries, South Korea and the U.S., will be advantageous to the operation. For instance, right now, I am in the process of advising two former KE students (Won Ki Kim and Sae Hyun Lee) regarding their continuation of their studies. Previously, the two individuals had no choice but to return to South Korea to fulfill their military duties, and both were discharged last spring. Now, since we will have two locations, they have choices on where to reenroll either in the U.S. or South Korea. Sae Hyun Lee has decided to remain in South Korea, so he will register at our South Korean location. Won Ki Kim has made the decision to return to the North campus in Duluth, GA.

In closing, the KE staff for both campuses and I continually work closely together ensuring to provide exceptional Christian education and leadership to our Christian students. In fact, since my departure from the U.S. in February, Sam An, Jae Yun Shim, and I have been communicating regularly through video conferencing, where we have collaborated on academic and administrative tasks. Another example is that KE classes from South Korea will be offered and viewed by the KE students in the U.S. and vice versa through the internet.

Please accept my wholehearted thanks for supporting the Korean mission. God bless!-Steve An

he spring 2014 semester for the Korean Extension closed with 20 Korean students this year. I am also happy to announce that almost all of the students will be returning for the following fall 2014 semester except two students who have communicated that they are facing some personal issues and must return to South Korea. Moreover, Steve has noted that he will make contact with the individuals and hope that they will be able to complete their studies at the KE campus in South Korea.

The KE is also proud and sad to announce that two Korean students, Chan Koon Im and Eun Ah Shim, have successfully completed their studies. Both students received a four year Bachelor of Theology degree and to celebrate the achievement, the KE scheduled a graduation ceremony for July $7^{\text {th }}$, 2014. Unfortunately, the ceremony was cancelled as both graduates notified our office that they would be unable to attend graduation that day.

As for the fall 2014 semester, we have already enrolled five new Korean students. The KE staff and I are working hard to continue to recruit for the upcoming semester. As most of you know, Steve and Young are now stationed in South Korea to establish a second KE campus, but they were able to take time out and fly back to the states to attend General Conference and also to facilitate a block
class at the KE campus in Duluth, GA and to collaborate with the KE staff in terms of preparing for the new semester. During his time at the campus, Steve has lead several meetings with the KE staff to discuss class scheduling and strategies on how to rally former students to return and to provide assistance during our registration process. In addition, we are also in the process of accepting six more new students who are interested in enrolling.

In terms of our situation with immigration, although approved to continue to accept students, we are still awaiting approval from immigration to be recertified. The decision by the government will determine whether we can continue to accept foreign students for enrollment. Please continue to pray for the Korean missions both here in the U.S. and in South Korea as we do need your assistance.

## General Conference Delegate Business Meeting Minutes

July 3 and 4, 2014
Cornerstone Bible Church of God McDonough, GA 30253

Thursday, July 3, 3:15 p.m.
Meeting called to order by Chairman Greg Demmitt.

Bob Morrison opened the meeting with prayer.

Greg Demmitt, chairman of the board recognized Elaine Poole - first delegate ever from the Isolated Members Conference. First time delegates: George Jordan new delegate from Guthrie Grove; Robin Todd from the Western Washington Church of God; and Cheryl Kmiecik from Omaha.

Chairman's message to the delegates:
"Let the redeemed of the Lord say so..." was the beginning of his message. Greg shared some stories of those who signed the Declaration of Independence and how they put it all on the line for what they believed.

Our heritage is the same as we stand for what we believe in and we 'say so'. We need to take an optimistic approach even if we face difficult issues, like the founders did as they put their names on the line.

Adventist groups in general are usually pessimistic because they expect things to get worse before Jesus comes. "I have set before you an open door that no man can close...and I know that you have little power, but you've kept my word and not denied my name."

We were living in a situation as a college where if 2 students didn't come we had to make cuts then we
had $2 / 3$ of our students gone due to INS. We took a hit of $\$ 250,000$ hit due to INS and yet we're in a better situation than we were last year. Because of faithful giving and sacrificial work of the staff. (applause was given).

As we 'hold things together' it's not just to hang on but because we have a huge mission to accomplish.

With all of our financial troubles who would have thought that we are weeks away from a South Korean College opening. God didn't bring Israel out of Egypt to die in the wilderness, neither did he bring us through this financial struggle to wilt in Georgia.

David reported that there are currently 41 church delegates, 7 Conference delegates, 7 directors and 33 pastors for a total of 88 delegates, more than last year and we're excited about that.

Open nominations for the Board of Directors. One individual will be elected to a four-year term. The term of Alan Cain expires. He may not be renominated. Here are the 3 nominees listed in the Progress JourNAL:

1. Charles Bottolfs - Louisiana Conference
2. Rob Helenburg - Fair Oaks Church
3. Scott Millard - Jaynes Street Church of God, Omaha, Nebraska

Scott Ross nominated Scott Millard to run for the Board of Directors on behalf of the Jaynes Street Church.

James Richardson nominated Charles Bottolfs for Board of Directors on behalf of the Louisiana Conference.

Jeff Fletcher nominated Rob Hellenberg for the Board of Directors on behalf of the Virginia Conference.

Joe James moved and Joe Myers seconded that the nominations be closed. Motion passed.

Joe Martin put the name of Andy Cisneros as a nominee for the YAC. Joe Martin also mentioned that Seth Ross was appointed as Youth Coordinator. Kent Ross moved that the nomination be closed and a unanimous ballot be cast for Andy Cisneros, Russ Magaw seconded. Motion passed.

Gary Burnham discussed the budget and financial reports. Gary shared some highlights of the $\$ 250,000$ hit in tuition income. Yet there was large reductions in staff salaries and benefits due to staff reductions and some staff going off of insurance and on to Medicare. Gary discussed the battle over the tax value of our building.

Bottom line we had a net gain of $\$ 10,000$ on the budget.

Presented the ABCGC Balance Sheet. Two good things:

1. Credit line went down $\$ 30,000$

2. Accounts receivable went down $\$ 66,000$. One other good thing is that even after moving a lot of money out of the foundation due to the build out of the second floor the value of the ABCDF is higher!

Proposed budget income and expense sheets were looked at. Three things the board wants known:

1. General contributions line item of $\$ 375,000$ is conservative since $\$ 396,000$ was given last year
2. Tuition Income at $\$ 220,000$ is a best judgment guess
3. Tenant income at $\$ 108,000$ which it was $\$ 95,000$ last year without the new contract so we believe $\$ 108,000$ is reasonable

Robin Todd asked about budgeting money for US church planting... "Is there a plan to review that?"
"There is no specific plan, but the board does review it regularly."

Darrell Cardwell asked about how much money we're putting toward the Korean College. The current Church Builders Appeal is for Korea.

Dustin Smith asked if the budget is including foreign students? The answer is yes. We are still certified and are planning on remaining that way.

Joe Myers asked about the free tuition "is it still going on?" The answer is "yes. It's in its 4th year."

Questions about $\$ 0$ on Library line. We have so many donated books that we can't even process them yet.

Joe Myers suggested that if the investments produce like they did last year that the board consider ways to help the staff who have made many sacrifices.

Greg opened the meeting for new business.

Kent Ross moved that the structure of the General Conference include a new 'board' to be called Home Missions Board of Evangelism \& Church Growth. Cheryl Ross seconded. Kent spoke to the issue sharing that we need to invest in home missions. Greg Demmitt, chairman of the board, declared as major motion so that the voting on this motion will be voted on next year. Greg encouraged people to talk to Kent and the board about this issue.

Rob Helenburg moved Charles Bottolfs seconded that we approve the budget for 2015-2016 as presented.

Discussion about raising the budget for advertising. Joe Martin shared that Rufus has been helping with that work and that a personal touch is better. Joe also reassured Rufus that he will not get the raise he desires. :)

Offering free classes to local church leaders has been effective. Also the sign on the building has been very helpful. Greg shared it would take an amendment to change the amount for advertising.

Joe Myers asked would it be possible to come to an amount that will be budgeted for the proposal that Kent offered on the national church planting effort. It's hard to say yet was the answer.

Motion Passed on the 2015-2016 budget.

Greg asked for any new business.
Kent Ross shared about the conference coming up November 6-8 at North Hills Church Springfield Ohio dealing with church growth. Kent also mentioned the Heritage conference in September.

Alan Cain read the minutes.
Kent Ross moved, Russ Magaw seconded that the minutes be approved as read and corrected. Motion passed.

David Krogh shared the credentials report. We have 43 Church delegates, 7 Conference delegates, 7 Board Members and 33 Pastors for a total of 90 delegates. This compares with 79 delegates last year. Greg Demmitt closed the meeting and Jim Ritch closed in prayer.

## THE KEYSTONE OF THE CONFLICT: HATRED

They "never miss an opportunity to miss an opportunity" said Israeli diplomat Abba Eban of the Palestinians. We probably can throw in here George Santayana's observation "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." You could do a piece today or a decade ago about a homicide bomber, or "peace talks" being broken off for some reason or other, or escalating violence.

So, here we go again...escaladed fighting. Why? Is it difficult to understand just what the Palestinians want? Look at the history of negotiations.

Dennis Ross, the senior Middle East advisor to President Clinton, dispels once and for all the Palestinian propaganda regularly parroted as fact in the European and some parts of the U.S. media.

Here is what Arafat turned down according to Ross.

1. Yasser Arafat presented no ideas at Camp David.
2. The Taba talks would have happened in late September if not for the outbreak of violence. Arafat knew the US was ready to make a proposal and thus promised to control the violence, but didn't. (I think he was hoping that he could leverage the violence into political gain.)
3. All of Gaza and a net of $97 \%$ of the West Bank were offered at Taba.
4. The West Bank area offered was contiguous, not "cantons."
5. The Jordan valley would be under Israeli patrol for only 6 years.
6. The Palestinians were offered a capital in eastern Jerusalem.
7. There would be a "Right of Return" to the nascent Palestinian state.
8. A $\$ 30$ Billion fund to compensate refugees would be set up.
9. Taba was rushed due to Clinton's, not Barak's, end of term.
10. Members of the PA delegation thought Taba was the best they could hope to get and encouraged Arafat to accept it.
11. Arafat accepted everything he was given at Taba, but rejected everything he was supposed to give.
12. Arafat scuttled the Camp David offer. Arafat scut
tled the Taba offer. Arafat scuttled the Mitchell plan. Arafat scuttled the Tenet plan. Arafat scut tled the Zinni plan.

This is what his successor, Mahoud Abbas, rejected. Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert presented Abbas on September 16, 2008, with a similar plan for a two-state solution: He offered to make Jerusalem the capital of two states-Israel in the western part and a Palestinian capital in the east. The Old City of Jerusalem would be administered by a committee made up of so-called wise people including Palestinians, Jordanians, Saudis, Americans and Israelis. Surprising to some but not to others, Abbas likewise turned it down.

This is not and never was a secular dispute.
The indoctrination of hate for the Jews is the underlining issue taught to generations of Palestinians, past, present and most likely future.

As moms and dads get ready to send their kids off to summer camp to participate in boating, camping, and sports, Palestinian parents are sending nearly 10,000 boys at a time to another type of camp in the Gaza Strip.

At this camp some of the crafts taught are how to kidnap an Israeli soldier. Children between the ages of 6-16 are enriched by learning the fine art of crawling under barbed wire. The final activity for the day is a game of jumping over burning tires and ducking for cover behind sandbags as counselors fire live rounds over their heads.

Why would a mother happily send her children to commit suicide for the sake of a cause?

At the funeral of Izz Al-Din Al-Masr, the homicide killer that blew up the Sbarro restaurant killing 15 people in 2001, his mother had this to say:
"By Allah, today is the best day of my life. I feel that our Lord is pleased with me, because I am offering something [my son] for Him. I wish to sacrifice more [sons] for Allah's forgiveness, and for the flag of Islam."

This is a thinking that is difficult for most of us to fathom. Yet, it's the reality of the Middle East conflict.

They are responding to the invocations of a moderator at a Fatah event in 2012 who proclaimed: "Our war with the descendants of the apes and pigs (i.e., Jews) is a war of religion and faith. Long Live Fatah!" At least he's honest. Lauding the "moderate" faction of the new "unity" government, the speaker was just echoing Article 7 of the Hamas Charter of 1988:

Who are we? Colossians 3:12a states "We are Gods chosen people, holy, dearly loved." "How great is the love of the Father that we should be called the children of God!" (1 John 3:1). We are called citizens of the Kingdom (Eph. 2:19) and beloved (Deut. 33:12).

Since this is the way God sees us, how should we see others? Should we be critical or mean spirited? By no means! God expects us to see others and indeed ourselves as He sees us.

Lets read further in Col. 3:12b-13: "Cloth yourselves (or put on, in KJV) with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." God asks us to see others and ourselves as He sees us, with eyes of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience and forgiveness. "And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity" (v. 14). Notice we have some defining attributes of love in the preceding verse, compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience and forgiveness. "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as one body you were called to peace. And be thankful" (v. 15). Are peace and thankfulness more love definitions? "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (vv. 16, 17).

Now we have just looked at the manner in which we are to deal with everyone we interact with, no matter who they may be. Starting with ourselves, in our own mind, remembering that the way God sees us will help us to see others as He sees them.

Sometimes evil thoughts and attitudes invade our mind and we become discontent with ourselves and then we become very discontent with everyone around us. This makes us treat others unkindly and then they would prefer we just went away! We
must not be arrogant or argumentative. We dare not misuse God's grace in that manner lest we destroy the faith of another person.

The entire process of loving begins in our own mind. How we perceive ourselves rules how we perceive others. Remember that we act out exactly what is in our mind. One verse notes "As he thinketh in his heart, so is he" (KJV Prov. 23:7). So, how do we keep control of our thoughts? Brother Clell France has a saying about this one. "You can't stop the birds from flying over your head but you don't have to let them build a nest in your hair." Philippians $4: 8$ has a bit to say on the matter of where to keep our minds. "Finally brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable -if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about such things" That's a pretty tall expectation for us feeble humans! So how can we achieve this? Are we expected to do this all by ourselves? Let's hear from Isa. 41:9 and 10: "I took you from the ends of the earth, from its farthest corners I called you. I said you are my servant; I have chosen you and have not rejected you. So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand!" God promises His power to uphold us, to help us and ultimately to guide us. We are not left alone and helpless. Through the ages God did not change His mind on this!

In James 1 we see several statements which verify our present day access to the power of God. It brings about the ability to see others and ourselves as He sees each individual and to put into our lives the appropriate thought process. Verse 5 says "If any of you lacks wisdom he should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault and it will be given to him." The next verse states we must ask without doubt. That means asking with full confidence that God will empower us. Verse 17 tells us that all good gifts are from God, who does not change! That very power of God, referred to as the Holy Spirit is every bit as available to us today as it was in the times of old! So how do we

access that power from God? Recall verse 5: "ask without doubting the outcome." And $\operatorname{Col}$ 3:15 and 16: be thankful, and have gratitude in your heart.

Let's take a look at James 3:17 and 18, "But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. Peace makers who sow in peace raise a harvest of righteousness."

How do we know if the guidance we receive is from God through the power of the Holy Spirit? Does it match with God's word? Galatians 5:22-26 says: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other." If these traits are not in evidence then our guidance wasn't godly! Our lives, our words, our actions must evidence the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

In 2 Peter 1:1-10 it says: "Simon Peter, a servant and apostle of Jesus Christ to those who through the righteousness of our God and our Savior Jesus Christ have received a faith as precious as ours; Grace and peace be yours in abundance through the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord. His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires. For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness, and to goodness, knowledge, and to knowledge self-control, and to self-control perseverance, and to perseverance godliness, and to godliness brotherly kindness and to brotherly kindness, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measures, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But if anyone does not have them, he is nearsighted and blind, and has forgotten that he has been cleansed from his past sins. There-
fore, my brothers, be all the more eager to make your calling and election sure. For if you do these things, you will never fall, and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." Notice verse 5 starts out with "and add to." Our skills are always a work in progress. Philippians 2:1 and 2 tells us, "If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being likeminded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. Verse 4 says to look after the interests of others. 1 Thessalonians 5:11 and 14 ask us to be an encouragement to others and to lift them up, be joyful (v. 16) pray continually, (v 17) and give thanks in all things (v. 18).

One thought about all this. We don't come to Christ as a whole being. We are not born with Christ in our nature but rather must recognize our need to be born into Christ through baptism. Then and only then can we ask for the growth and knowledge given through the Holy Spirit. We see in Heb. 5:14 that maturity in Christ comes by constant effort to distinguish good from evil. May we go forth in our lives giving God our best, continually practicing peace, living in harmony and encouraging each other in the manner of Christ our Lord and example.

The UP Project for this year served in the Greenville area of South Carolina from July 5 to 12. There were around forty participants from different parts of the country. The goal for UP this year was to see how our faith impacted the world and the community around us. We were involved in various service projects throughout the week.

Places that UP helped out with this year included the Dream Center of Pickens County, South Carolina; WT Patrick Center; Children for Change; as well as serving our local churches: Guthrie Grove, Bethel, Joy Fellowship, Journey Outreach; and local congregation members. Landscaping was done at Guthrie Grove, the Lipperts, and Mary Milne's house. UP relayed a patio and fixed a fence for the Martin family. The youth room bathroom at Guthrie Grove was also painted. Pastor Terry Ferrell had a few people travel to Edgefield, SC to help clean out an antique shop and move items to his house down the road and was gracious to provide lunch for the group.

The Dream Center of Pickens County, South Carolina, is a nonprofit faith-based organization ran by volunteers working to meet the needs in the community without giving handouts. They have many programs which include a mentoring program; Santa Shop Assistance program; Hello Gorgeous! Clothing boutique; Project Prevention; SHINE soup kitchen; REACH; and 5 Point Church food bank. These programs use a class and voucher system. UP participants painted classrooms, removed radiators from the entire building, detail cleaned the Soup Kitchen, cut out radiator piping, and dug footer for a refrigerator outside to help with building renovations.

The WT Patrick Center coordinates with Greenville County to give mentally handicapped individuals an opportunity to work and create relationships with other people. Some UP participants went to give the workers ice cream and talk with them. Others assisted at Children for Change, a nonprofit organization, that wants to build houses to represent levels of poverty in various cultures and third world countries. The group helped build three different houses each made with a different type of material: a bamboo house, a pallet house, and a house made with bottles filled with sand. They also helped dig a well.

During the week we learned about some of the great pillars of our faith- Alva Huffer, Jim Mattison, and Mary Milne. Julie Driskill taught on how our personality and birth order affects our ministry for Christ. Andy Cisneros taught on spiritual gifts and how it was important to reflect God's glory, focus on other people instead of ourselves, and live in the spirit. Graysen Pack taught a class on creating change in the local community. On top of everything, we did a lot of activities working with the local communities, met in prayer groups to discuss the day and pray for each other, and had a discussion on deep theological issues and questions (Elephant Room). Steve Partain and Andy Cisneros led team building exercises that involved nonverbal communication as well as teaching that it is important to listen to others.

Guthrie Grove was a great host and provided a space for the group to settle during down time. The group was split up by gender each night and stayed at a different house which helped build great relationships with each other and a better community. During the end of the week, the UP Project leaders surprised the participants at 4AM to watch the sun rise at Pretty Place, SC, as a reminder that God gave us another day to live. We had a laying on of hands service which was symbolic of lifting up our hands to God to pray for a commission for a specific reason and purpose; baptism; or to give God's blessing to be on people. We were blessed to have Aaron Winner lead us in evening worship most nights. Thank you to everyone who made this week a great experience!
