Now Is the Time

ALL the world watched with awe as the nation of Israel, regathered from many lands and established as a sovereign nation only twenty years ago, carried out a lightning six-day war and for the third time in twenty years overwhelmed its attackers. In June, 1967, Israel's outnumbered armies swept out of their besieged borders and swiftly captured the Sinai Desert to the Suez Canal, Jordanian lands west of the Jordan, including Old Jerusalem, the Gaza Strip, and the hills overlooking the Sea of Galilee. Israel seems determined to keep these new lands, with their shortened and more easily defendable borders.

The events which have electrified the world in these past few months are of great prophetic significance. The fast-paced movements of nations and the diplomatic struggle that has followed were foreseen by the Bible. They are indications that we are nearing the conclusion of this age, and may soon see the return of Jesus Christ to this earth and the establishment here of the eternal Kingdom of God.

The regathered nation of Israel is in itself one of the outstanding signs that this age nears its end. "The miracle of Israel" is a favorite phrase of writers who have visited this amazing state. Called back to its homeland in keeping with ancient prophecies, revived Israel is a sign of Jesus' soon coming. Fulfilling prophecies of Ezekiel 36 and 37, Israel is being regathered to await its Messiah.

The enmity of Israel's neighbors was predicted in Psalm 83, which anticipated that they would take "crafty counsel against thy people," and say, "Come, and let us cut them off from being a nation; that the name of Israel may be no more in remembrance. As a result of this enmity and their ill-advised adventures against Israel, the words of Ezekiel are being fulfilled: "Surely the heathen that are about you, they shall bear their shame."

The desire of Russia to gain control over Israel has been brought to light as a result of the defeat of Russia's allies. In the diplomatic fencing which has resulted, it has become apparent to all the world that Russia covets the land of Israel and entertains an inbred hatred against her people. True to the ancient prediction of Ezekiel 38 and 39, Russia stands ready for a personal confrontation with Israel in the struggle that will end this age with the direct intervention of the Lord.

Of most significance, is the fact that now, after more than two thousand years under Gentile domination, Jerusalem is again an Israeli city. Controlled by one Gentile power after another since the days of Babylon (606 B.C.), Jerusalem was set free and claimed by Israel in June, 1967. One recalls the prophecy of Jesus: "Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled. . . . Then shall they see the Son of man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh" (Luke 21:24-28).

In these awesome yet perilous times, we encourage you to look up. Look up to Jesus. Accept him as your Saviour. Live faithfully in his service. Watch and pray for his coming again. Now is the time to set your house in order, for the day of the Lord draws near.

GOAL FOR THE PAST YEAR


Though we do not have the exact figures at the time of this writing (10 days before the end of the month) we are sure that we will have made the Goal for the past fiscal year by the end of September. We praise the Lord for his blessings and thank you for your faithfulness in contributions to the Lord's work.

NEW GOAL FOR GIVING

The Goal for Giving for the new fiscal year (October 1, 1967-September 30, 1968) is the largest ever to be approved by the General Conference delegates. The total Goal of \$79,215.00 needed in contributions reflects growth in missions, an enlargement of the staff to carry on the expanding work of the Conference, and the rising costs of materials and services required to operate the various departments of the Conference ministry. As has often been stated, there is no "padding" or "cushion" in the Goal. If anything, it is a conservative estimate of needs in view of the anticipated expenses for services that have been requested and approved.

The membership of the Church of God is to be highly commended for its faithful stewardship. When one realizes how many pastors, buildings, and programs are being supported by a comparatively small number of people, it is obvious that many are giving with genuine sacrifice.

While more and more people and churches each year are participating in the support of the General Conference, there are still many individuals and many churches who do not share in this opportunity for expanded service. We hope that many who have not been sharing in this work will do so in this new fiscal year.



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

Sorenson was re-elected to a four-year term by the delegates at the General Conference in August. This Board meets several times during the year to plan, evaluate, and promote the work of missions.

Each year the month of November is set aside as Mission Month. Each church is asked to set aside one Sunday of the month to especially emphasize missions. The first Sunday of November, which this year is November 5, is generally considered to be Mission Sunday throughout the Church of God.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

In the September PROGRESS JOURNAL it was noted that used clothing could no longer be shipped to the Philippine Islands due to new customs regulations. We are now assured by Bro. Eleodoro S. Ortiguero, supervisor of the work there, that this law does not apply to religious organizations and that used clothing can be mailed when addressed as follows:

Bro. Santiago Somera of the Quezon Church of God recently assisted Alfredo dela Cruz and Carmelita Marcos in putting on Christ in baptism. Bro. Ortiguero is now fully recovered from his motorcycle accident and is able to resume his full schedule of duties. The evangelistic team has resumed holding rallies in various churches and other places.

As a safeguard against further accidents, the Philippine Conference Board has voted to sell the motorcycle and use the sale price as a down payment on a bantam car for Bro. Ortiguero's use.

INDIA

Bro. S. S. Manoah reports a continued interest of new people at the services since the new building is in use. Six new families are coming to services regularly and some military people are coming from a nearby military colony. Bro. Manoah says, "Now that the building has been provided, it is our duty to work harder and harder, bringing more souls to Christ and to spread our truth and faith wider and wider, not only in our immediate area but even outside the city of Bangalore in other parts of India."

MISCELLANEOUS

Bro. and Sr. Raymond Brown and family are now settled in Digby, Nova Scotia, and have begun a full schedule of services with the Lighthouse Mission Church of God there.

Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore and their family and Sr. Rachel Krogh have returned to Mexico after attending General Conference. Bro. Moore and Sr. Krogh both worked at the Berean Youth Camp at Camp Mack also.

Because of the civil war being fought in Nigeria it is impossible to get mail in or out of Eastern Nigeria, so we are quite isolated from our new work there. Some mail can be delivered through a mutual contact in Lagos. Bro. I. U. Inyang of Nigeria had planned to begin school at Oregon Bible College this semester. He has not arrived as yet due to travel difficulties out of Nigeria. We trust he will be able to come at a later date.

Oregon Bible College Phase Two

Pictured below is the architect's preliminary conception of a new women's residence building for Oregon Bible College. The building will be about 46 x 100 feet in size, built on one and one-half floors. There will be a street-level entrance to the first half floor which will contain a lounge-canteen area, laundry and ironing rooms, and a boiler room. There will be a street-level entrance to the second full floor which will contain rooms for 24 women and a housemother's apartment. The building will be built on a high, sloping lot across from the present women's residence.


The present women's residence is the former Golden Rule Home. While it has been as well maintained as possible, the building is 109 years old and is not arranged for efficient or safe operation.

Included in the Phase Two development plan (Phase One was the construction of the new men's residencelibrary-cafeteria building) is the remodeling of the present Oregon Bible College administration and classroom building to provide a new classroom for up to ninety people; a quiet study area; and a canteen-lounge area for between-class use.

It is hoped that these new facilities can be in use by the Golden Anniversary of the General Conference—the fall of 1970. If sufficient funds and commitments can be secured, construction could begin soon. In view of the need for space and the rising costs of construction this would be advisable.

The vast majority of present ministers of the Church of God received all or part of their education from Oregon Bible College. The majority increases each year. Many other leaders in the Church of God received at least part of their education from Oregon Bible College. As the need for leadership increases, provision must be made for expanded educational facilities at Oregon Bible College.

As the line of demarcation between the Church of God and the world grows wider and as secular colleges be-(Please turn to page 5)

MINISTERS' FUND AND RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION

There appears to be some confusion about the Ministers' Fund and the proposed Ministers' Retirement Association.

The Ministers' Fund is now in existence and has been for several years. By action of the General Conference it is administered by the executive secretary, the president of Oregon Bible College, and the ministers of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon Churches of God. The Fund is used to make loans (up to \$300.00, interest free for two years) or gifts (up to \$300.00 in any calendar year) to ministers or ministers' widows who have an emergency need. The Fund is maintained by contributions from individuals and churches.

There have been several cases in which the Fund has been used recently to great advantage. The Fund is now somewhat diminished, with a balance of about \$1,900.00. Contributions for this Fund are welcomed and encouraged.

The Ministers' Retirement Association is not yet in operation. It will require the enrollments of several churches before this organization can be formed and the retirement program begun. To successfully conduct such a retirement program over the years will require the enlistment and support of all the ministers and churches of the Church of God. Several copies of the Prospectus and enrollment forms have been sent to the churches and to ministers in the past three years, but the required number of enrollments has not been reached.


Your church magazine, *The Restitution Herald*, is now a monthly publication. The December issue will appear with a four-color cover and special articles for the season.




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Evangelism and Missions Progress

This building was constructed at a total cost of thirty-five hundred dollars, including a few furnishings within. The land cost five thousand dollars. Funds for this building accumulated by contributions from the membership of the General Conference through a special drive.

Attendance continues to grow, with new interest in the community. Bro. S. S. Manoah and his membership plan to begin holding more services in other areas of Bangalore.

Bro. Manoah writes, "Self, my wife, and my congregation members are sending our Christian love, good wishes, and regards to you and all the brothers and sisters of our noble mission. May God bless all of our ministry work to glorify his name."

Plans are now moving ahead for Bro. Manoah's trip to the United States and Canada in 1968. His plane fare and preparation costs will be provided by the Foreign Missions Fellowship of Oregon Bible College. Tentative plans call for him to be at Oregon Bible College the week of March 25 to 29 for special services, and also for him to take part in the Junior-Senior weekend program at the college on April 25, 26. Bro. Manoah will then tour and speak at as many churches as possible in the following few weeks under direction of the Mission Department.

NOVA SCOTIA

HOME MISSIONS

The Pastoral Aid program gives financial assistance to small, growing churches that are not yet quite able to support a full-time pastor on their own. Eight churches are now receiving this help. Because it is not a college of the world but of the Lord, it must be built and developed by the Lord's people. To fulfill its function, it must be staffed by people of the Lord qualified to impart the faith as well as the facts. This places great responsibility upon us to provide the students the funds, the faculty, the loyalty, and the prayer that are necessary to proceed.

Costs and Commitments

The estimated cost of the Phase Two development of Oregon Bible College is \$150,000.00. This money must come from contributions and commitments to be paid by 1970. The Search For Unity

By the Editor

ENGAGED in research in the historical archives of the Church of God General Conference, we rediscovered the truth that the history of the Church of God in North America has always involved a search for unity of faith as well as actions to share that faith with others. From its beginning, the Church of God in North America has been united in the basic fundamentals of doctrine still outlined in the By-Laws of the Church of God General Conference, and in most local church and state conference constitutions.

These basic principles were included in a recommendation by a committee headed by Bro. J. H. Willey, who was later elected as first president of the General Conference organized in 1888. The recommendation became the articles of faith. Bro. Willey wrote: "We are fully persuaded from the Scriptures given by inspiration of God through the Holy Spirit, that repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ are necessary in order to Salvation; and that faith worketh by love, thus proving its genuineness. We believe in and practice, as taught in the Scriptures, the ordinances (1) of Baptism, that is, immersion, in water of believers, into the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ; and (2) of the Lord's Supper.

"We are also fully persuaded that the Lord Jesus Christ will come personally and visibly to this earth a second time, and that it is God's purpose to give him the throne of his father David and establish the everlasting Kingdom of God upon the earth under the administration and kingly rule of his Son.

"Furthermore, we are as fully persuaded that man is mortal in his present condition, and that eternal life and immortality are only bestowed upon him through Jesus Christ and the resurrection from the dead at his coming.

"We are assured that the wages of sin is death, and not

eternal torment in excruciating agony, and that the wicked perish as a consequence of their persistent iniquity.

"We also look for the 'restitution of all things which God hath spoken by the mouth of all his holy prophets since the world began,' and accordingly 'look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness' as the future abode of the people of God.

"We are convinced from the sure word of prophecy of the restoration of Judah and Israel to the land of their fathers.

"These and other kindred truths distinguish us as a people from the great religious bodies of our own time; and living as we believe near the close of this dispensation for taking out a people for God's name, we recommend our preachers, evangelists, and churches to place and keep these too-much-neglected doctrines of the Scriptures prominently before the people."

In details of belief, aside from those listed and adopted by the first General Conference delegates, there was considerable difference of opinion. In fact, in the early days of the church there appears to have been considerable latitude even in regard to some of the fundamentals of faith. The following year, 1889, delegates to the General Conference in Chicago cautiously recommended that each church be encouraged to adopt some articles of faith, but that they not be so detailed as to cause controversy or to hamper freedom of conscience or private interpretations of the Scriptures.

The struggle between protecting the faith from heresy and the right of individual believers to come to personal conclusions about the Scriptures, was evident and still persists. It should not be thought remarkable to us that each new church generation must wrestle with this matter and decide upon policies. (Please turn to page 5)

General Conference Progress

EMBLEM OR SYMBOL

Many organizations, secular and religious, are identified in their advertising by an emblem, symbol, or trademark. The purpose of the emblem is to create a simple, attractive identifying mark that symbolizes the organization's purpose and work. Such emblems are used on road signs, letterheads, advertising pieces, buildings, and in other places, where a person seeing the emblem will immediately recognize it and associate it with the organization.

The Board of Directors is interested in receiving ideas for such an emblem for use in the Church of God. The emblem should be simple, symbolic, original, have only one or two basic elements (circle, triangle, candle, wheel, etc.), be sketched in black ink on white paper, and should be a design that could be used by the General Conference, state conferences, and local churches in their advertising.

Entries should be sent to Church of God General Conference, Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061, by April 1, 1968. They will be judged by the Board of Directors and, if a design is selected, the design and name of the designer will be publicized.

STAFF AND STUDENT SERVICES

We are thankful for the opportunities to serve at various churches and conferences and to maintain this personal contact with the work in the field.

RETIREMENT HOMESITES

Church of God General Conference has been given fifty acres of fine, wooded property between Hammond and Ponchatoula, La., by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Bottolfs. The land is to be used by the Conference for church purposes and cannot be sold or used for any commercial ventures.

The Board of Directors is studying the possibility of offering low-cost or no-cost lifetime leases on homesites to

Church of God members who might be interested in retiring in Louisiana. Persons could erect retirement homes here for lifetime use. The homes would then eventually become part of the property held under the present contract agreement and could be used for low-cost rental retirement homes for ministers or other members.

Evangelism and Missions Progress

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The schedule of services of the evangelistic preaching team has been stopped for a time, due to the continuous heavy rains throughout northern Luzon where most of our Philippine churches are located. Attendance at the Sunday services in the churches holds up well, however, with Uddiawan having an average of one hundred twentyfive and San Nicolas with seventy-five. The team will resume services as soon as weather permits.

NIGERIA

The Nigerian brethren have submitted their membership list and it reveals that twenty-one hundred twentyfour have been baptized since the acceptance of the doctrines proclaimed by the Church of God. There are nine pastors shepherding this flock and, in accordance with the action taken at General Conference, temporary pastoral aid support was begun in November. The nine pastors receive a total of \$150.00 per month.

These brethren are in the process of securing a small printing press to provide tracts and literature in the Efik language.

The civil war continues in Nigeria, and many of the members have lost clothing and other personal items taken by the opposition forces. Mail service is still not available directly to the brethren. We do, however, correspond with the leader of the work, Bro. A. A. Obot, through a mutual contact in Lagos.

MEXICO

There is a possibility of starting services in the mountain village of Bisnaga, about thirty-five miles from Saltillo. This is near Sierra Hermosa, where services are being held from time to time. There is a small abandoned church in Bisnaga which they plan to use.

The new Church of God tract, "Now Is the Time," has been translated and will be printed in Spanish. Bro. Dean Moore has been working on the translation of this tract, visiting in many homes, surveying the field at Sierra Hermosa, and holding services in El Potosi and Labor Vieja.

NOVA SCOTIA

Bro, and Sr. Raymond Brown are now putting out a monthly newsletter called "The Lighthouse Beacon." This should be helpful in keeping the members and friends of the Digby church informed on the progress and plans of the church.

Bro. and Sr. Brown are now working with two choirs in the Lighthouse church, one a Berean choir and the other a combined choir. The membership is working on applying the second coat of paint on the new building.

INDIA

The youth activities of the Bangalore brethren have surged. The young people are assisting in hospital calling, distributing tracts there and other places, and holding special prayer services with the sick.

Bro. Manoah's eldest son, Vijayan, assisted in the evening "Sing Song" service recently by reading the Scripture lesson in the English language.

Bro. Manoah has set up a first-aid medical treatment station at the church for members and friends near the mission. There is a retired nurse in the congregation who is administering care for wounds, fever, colds, etc. "This is another good means of the propagation of our mission work," says Bro. Manoah.

The Bangalore church is in the process of installing a church bell. This is a great help, as most members do not have clocks, and this alerts the people that church is about to start. The Macomb church provided funds for the bell.

Bro. Manoah is translating several of our Church of God tracts to be printed in Tamil. Others are being reprinted for distribution in and around Bangalore. A man in Hyderabad, India, is also using many of our tracts since he has come to know of our doctrinal beliefs.

LEBANON

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a, who put on Christ in April, 1966, when Bro. S. O. Ross was on his world tour, has been granted his ministerial license. He reports one hundred thirty-seven children at Sunday school recently and thirtyseven adults at the morning and evening services on Sunday. Bro. Sunna'a was recently granted \$25.00 per month pastoral aid. His services are held in El Chibbak, a suburb of Beirut.

ACCREDITING ASSOCIATION MEETING

CHAPEL SERVICES

CHRISTIAN SERVICE ACTIVITIES

This fall we have had a full schedule of gospel teams. In September, teams went to the Illinois Youth Retreat and to the Hillisburg Church. In October, teams went to the Oregon Rally Day, the Northeast Conference, Hedrick, and Eldorado. In November, teams went to Macomb, South Bend, and New Lenox. Plans are made to go to Peoria in December.

With the rest of the staff, I recently attended the meeting of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges. At a workshop of Christian service directors I learned what other Bible colleges are doing. One thing of interest was discussion of the *purpose* of the Christian service program. All Christians are called to do service for Christ. It is natural that a Bible college should provide a program through which the students can serve God. As the students advance in training, practical experience becomes a part of their training. Assignments are made that will supplement class learning.

There are serveral ideas that we might adapt to our program. One is a freshman course called "Orientation to Christian Service." This would explain the different kinds of service and give opportunity for discussion and observation of personal evangelism, tract distribution, song leading, teaching, and house visitation. Another idea is field work to enrich class work. Principles of teaching plus practice teaching, pastoral work plus hospital chaplaincy these also are ideas that can be used. Musical gospel teams could be established on a year-long basis.



YOUTH WEEK IS FEBRUARY 19-25

February 19-25, 1968, are the dates chosen for the observance of Youth Week among Churches of God. February 25 will be observed as Youth Sunday. During this week, the youth of our churches are encouraged to plan special activities and projects and to present at least one of the church services on Youth Sunday. There will again be a contest held and a plaque awarded to the group which carries out the best observance of the week. Materials providing suggestions for activities are being mailed to the groups.

YOUTH GIVING BELOW PAR

Contributions by Bereans and Berean groups to the Youth Department budget will have to take a considerable upward swing in the months to come if this year's \$8,-500.00 goal is to be reached. Giving for October, the first month in the new fiscal year, was \$131.36. This is only a few dollars more than the amount given during the same period last year, when the goal was only half as large.

The Coins-for-Christ Crusade, the annual stewardship project-contest of the youth of the church, will be held during March and April. Last year's Crusade resulted in a winning contribution of \$312.90 (by the Oregon, Ill., Bereans), and total contributions of \$2,292.82.

THE SEARCH FOR UNITY (Continued from front page)

Each church congregation as it adopts a constitution and determines standards for membership faces the issue. Each state conference, as it forms and administers its constitution and deals with member churches, faces the issue. The General Conference in its various programs, guided by its By-Laws, faces the issue.

To our knowledge, no church has ever completely solved the problem. Some authoritarian groups find themselves unable to apply their detailed rules of faith and overlook all but the most obvious and blatant heresies and wink at the presence among themselves of dissenters. Some liberal groups eliminate standards one by one or remain "willingly ignorant" of the fact that the constituency has departed from the faith. Some have devised elaborate articles of faith where dissent means disfellowship and the result has been a fracturing of the group into innumerable parts at issue over minor points.

Somewhere is the fine Biblical line between "contending for the faith" and "trying the spirits" which can result in "unity of the faith."

The writer has a natural vocational desire for unity. How wonderful it would be if we could speak as a people on all Biblical matters with "one mind and one mouth" (Rom. 15:6)! Such a miracle would cut our editorial decisions and correspondence in half. The fact is that in those matters of consequence on which we always have been agreed, we *do* speak with one mouth and we *are* of one mind! There are always new phases of truth coming to the surface through the diligent study of men and women of God. There are new points of emphasis and expanded understanding and new depths of appreciation reached by personal and group study and discussion, but essentials remain intact.

Perhaps George Fox was right in his slogan: "In essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty," and perhaps we should be satisfied in our search for unity with essentials.


every day of the year. This newsletter will also contain the latest news and information about our mission work and short biographies of some of our missionaries, especially those with whom many of us are not personally acquainted.

Jessie Mingo Scroggs, was born in Rochester, N. Y., in 1897, and died on October 28, 1967, after a long illness.



THE REAL PROBLEM

D OCTORS tell us that there is no cure for the common cold. All we can do for a cold is to treat the symptoms. However, when many people get colds, they begin to gulp down huge quantities of pills, medicines, and Vitamin C, smear greasy ointments on themselves, use sprays, and do many other things designed to cure the cold. Man has a knack of attempting to solve his problems in the wrong way.

For instance, there have been wars on the face of the earth for thousands of years. Man has come to the conclusion that wars are caused by a lack of communications, the language barrier, and a lack of understanding. So he attempts to solve the problem of war by getting all nations of the world together in an organization called the United Nations. In the United Nations, men can overcome the communications problem, the language barrier, and even the understanding problem. The only difficulty encountered is that wars and "trouble spots" have increased by leaps and bounds instead of diminishing as they were supposed to once men sat down face to face to solve their differences.

Race troubles have plagued this country for many years. Nearly everyone was quite certain that the solution was integration of white and colored people. The solution seemed very simple. Send soldiers and force integration. No doubt, Negroes do have more opportunities now, but race relations, the original problem, is worse now than ever before.

American people deplore the senseless slaughter of fifty thousand people and the injuring of many more thousands on our highways each year. Since the blame has to be put somewhere, it is put on the "unsafe" automobile. The solution doesn't seem to be too difficult. Just build safer cars. This is like saying that, since germs are often passed by breathing contaminated air, we should try to keep people from breathing. This is just another example of how man tries to solve his problems in the wrong way.

Political scientists tell us that communism makes advances in many poor countries because it is easy to incite rebellion and riots. After all, when people are hungry, poor, and without the basic necessities of life, it is easy to get them to riot and revolt. Again the solution seems fairly obvious. Send economic assistance. Whether foreign aid prevents communist takeover is yet to be proven, but we do know that economic deprivation is not the reason for riot and rebellion. One only needs to look at the United States to see that this is not so. It seems that the more sophisticated, educated, and wealthy we become as a people, the more rebellious, riotous, and anarchistic we become as individuals.

Political leaders are trying to build a "great society." What is wrong with our society the way it is? Everyone can see that we have poverty, ignorance, disease, and crime. If these things can be eliminated, we will have a "great society." For the last few years, politicians have been declaring war on poverty, crime, etc., but crime rates are increasing, divorce rates soar, publications and movies become more obscene, cities are torn with riots and bloodshed, venereal disease is in epidemic proportions in some areas, drug addiction is becoming a very serious problem everywhere, many college students all over the country are restless and rebellious, and the "hippies" flourish.

The purpose of the emblem is to create a simple, attractive identifying mark that symbolizes the organization's purpose and work. Such emblems are used on road signs. letterheads, advertising pieces, buildings, and in other places, where a person seeing the emblem will immediately recognize it and associate it with the organization.

The Board of Directors is interested in receiving ideas for such an emblem for use in the Church of God. The emblem should be simple, symbolic, original, have only one or two basic elements (circle, triangle, candle, wheel, etc.), be sketched in black ink on white paper, and should be a design that could be used by the General Conference, state conferences, and local churches in their advertising.

Entries should be sent to Church of God General Conference, Box 231, Oregon, Ill. 61061, by April 1, 1968. They will be judged by the Board of Directors and, if a design is selected, the design and name of the designer will be publicized.

Two carloads of young people and adult advisors will leave Oregon, Illinois, June 9 and make a large "horseshoe" trip out to the Great Southwest and conclude the caravan in Little Rock, Arkansas, on June 23. The cost will be approximately \$40.00 per person. (The Youth Department will be paying an additional \$65.00 per person to make the trip possible.)

nine young people elected to assist the youth director in the administration of the Youth Department, met December 29, for a very productive all-day meeting in Little Rock, Arkansas. Eight members were present.



THE REAL PROBLEM

(Continued from page 1)

All of the foregoing examples are like the people who take pills for colds, but the pills just do not seem to help. The reason is that we are not getting to the bottom of the problem. We are just treating symptoms. This was evidently the case in the days of Isaiah. Israel was divided as a nation and had ignored the religion of their fathers. Many social problems faced them and they were evidently trying to solve their problems, but were going about it in the wrong way. This prompted Isaiah to ask, "Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread? and your labour for that which satisfieth not?" (Isa. 55:2).

The real cause of trouble in everyone of the problems noted was sin. Wars are not caused by a lack of communications or the language barrier; they are caused by greed, lust, and pride. These are sins. Integration will not solve our race problems. Racial strife is caused by hatred and prejudice. This is sin. When hatred is removed from the hearts of men, they will live in peace. Unsafe automobiles are not the primary reason for the slaughter on our highways. We are told that at least fifty percent, and many authorities believe this to be as high as seventy-five percent, of all highway accidents are caused by drinking drivers. If a person has drunk enough alcoholic beverages that he cannot control his automobile, he is drunk. Drunkenness is sin. Hunger alone does not make

people riot. It is a sinful, rebellious nature. Man is in constant rebellion against authority, whether it be man's authority or God's. A "great society" can never be built when man is controlled by sin, no matter how much money and effort is spent to eliminate crime, poverty, disease, and ignorance.

If the real problem is sin and man's effort to solve his problems seem to fail, what is the real solution? or is there one? The Apostle Paul writes about man's failure and inability to solve the problem of sin in the seventh chapter of Romans. After much discussion of his inability to control or overcome sin, he says, "Miserable creature that I am, who is there to rescue me out of this body doomed to death? God alone, through Jesus Christ our Lord!" (Rom. 7:24, 25, N.E.B.).

Progress Is Change

DROGRESS of necessity implies change. Progress Γ implies movement. Sometimes there is a change in direction, a change in methods, a change in purpose, a change in attitude, a change in outlook, or a change in leadership. All changes do not necessarily result in progress, but all progress involves changes.

Paul wrote, "Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers by whom ye believed, even as the Lord gave to every man? I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase. Now he that planteth and he that watereth are one.... For we are labourers together with God: ye are God's husbandry, ye are God's building" (1 Cor. 3:5-9). The changes which took place in the church in Corinth were for progress. The seed of the Word was planted, watered, and reaped by different leaders, each of whom was used of God to increase the fruit to the glory of God.

In all of the changes, God was unchanged and his work was still in his control. The laborers changed and the work grew, but God continued as the husbandman and the harvest was his.

In this season of the year, changes are being made in churches. Ministers and other leaders move from one place to another. New churches secure pastors for the first time. Work is organized in different ways. New ministers enter the field. Some men retire from the work. These changes are often difficult to make, and they do not always seem to immediately result in benefits. Such changes can be the forerunners of progress, of new ideas, of new ways to do things, of accomplishing goals that others thought impossible, of opening new doors, of mending broken fences. In all, it should be remembered that it is the Lord's work and we are but "labourers together with God."

It is possible, of course, to change too frequently. Churches which change ministers often, lose much time when the minister is learning the field and then bringing loose ends together to leave the field. Programs which are changed too frequently cause people to lose confidence and give the church a sense of instability. It is good to give leaders and programs time to prove themselves, and to give the Lord time to work before changes are made. There is a time for change and there is a time for perseverance.

There is an inbred human resistance to change. There is something comforting about the status quo, and there is often dismay at that which is unknown and untried. Thus changes are often met with opposition, rational and irrational. Emotions come into play as one comes to the fork in the road and sees before him an unknown way. Often the new road will lead to lands of opportunity one would have missed on the old path, but how difficult it sometimes seems to decide to change or to accept a change!

It was a good thing that the Apostle Paul moved on from Crete and left Titus to "set in order the things that are wanting" (Titus 1:5). It was a good thing that Apollos was in Ephesus long enough for Priscilla and Aquilla to strengthen his understanding of the gospel. It was good that he moved on to Corinth to follow up the work of Paul and to become one of the acknowledged great leaders of that church. It was even good that Paul and Barnabas had a falling out and went separate ways to double the effectiveness of their missionary endeavors. It was a good thing that the staid, settled old church at Jerusalem was shaken to its core and scattered, because its members "went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4).

Progress is change and movement. There can be no progress without change and movement.



TUITION INCREASED

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY PROGRESS REPORT



Are Small Churches Doomed?

IN THIS age of giant corporations, mergers of businesses, and consolidation of churches into larger and larger bodies which seem to be in a numbers race with one another, we may have become oriented to the idea that the small church, like the small grocery, is doomed to tfailure. Yet, in spite of this underlying pessimism, many new churches *are* springing up. Most have few members, tfewer leaders, little funds, and dismal prospects of obttaining professional pastoral assistance. Underlying their tefforts, however, is a sense of need on the part of the tfounders for more fellowship with others of like faith, ggreater knowledge of the Word, opportunity to rear their children in the faith, and an outlet for worship and service.

One of our Oregon Bible College class members, Bro. Michael Mattison, prepared an excellent survey of the Churches of God in North America. His survey reveals t:hat there are ten churches with more than 100 members; sixteen with between 50 and 100 members; 36 with between 25 and 50 members; and 21 with fewer tlhan 25 members. Also of interest in his survey is the fact tlhat about one third of all these churches are in cities with more than 100,000 population, and the largest percentage of the total membership lives in large cities. The Church of God is no longer a predominantly rural church!

The facts show, however, that more than half of the organized churches reviewed have fewer than fifty membeers, and must be considered small churches. Leaders of these churches are the first to realize that their major need iss to enlarge these churches—to gain in membership and in participation by the membership. It is true that if these smaller churches could develop in size there might be a corresponding increase in influence and potential for reaching out to others. There would also be a stronger base from which to carry out the international programs of the C'hurch of God.

These facts, however, should not be allowed to detract from the great contributions being made by these churches to the lives of men and women and to the work of the Lord. Nor should the struggles and problems that face the small church today deter others from making such beginnings in the many, many places in the world where there is no Church of God. Because at the moment there seems to be not enough pastors to fill the pulpits that already exist; because there is not an evangelist free to start new churches; because there is not enough money to subsidize each new church; this should not prevent those families in isolated places from banding together to fellowship and study and give one another comfort and aid in the gospel.

It would be difficult to assess the good which has been done by the little groups of people in diverse places who faithfully gather together in the name of the Lord. From some of the groups have come future pastors and evangelists. In some of these groups families have been held together; individuals touched by the Spirit of God and brought to the Lord; lives strengthened and kept from falling.

Is seems to be a fact that in some cases these small groups have filled a need that could not have been filled by a larger, more formal, and perhaps more impersonal church body. In the intimacy of a home meeting questions may be answered and problems solved that would never have come to light in the formal church setting. In fact, some larger churches are finding it advantageous to break the congregation into smaller groups by geographical location for meetings in the homes on weekday evenings to gain the very atmosphere that the small church naturally affords.

No, the small church is not doomed! It is the hope for the future, should the Lord tarry. These groups should grow and, with the vitality and depth of spirit gained through the struggle for existence, be the backbone of the church of tomorrow. There is a challenge and an opportunity in the grass roots of the church where things can and must happen!

GENERAL CONFERENCE FINANCIAL REPORT

This is one of twelve congregations which are affiliated with the Church of God General Conference, having a total membership of over two thousand. Nine of the ministers of these congregations are licensed by the General Conference, and three are now making applications for license.

Two of the Nigerian brethren, A. A. Obot and John E. Ukpong, are making plans to come in September to enroll in Oregon Bible College. It is their plan to study here and then return to teach their own people in a school they plan to open there. Pledges are being taken among the members of each of the twelve churches for the construction and support of this training school.

Bibles in the Efik dialect, communion sets, and a few . Songs of Truth hymnals have been sent to Nigeria from (General Conference contributions.

IPHILIPPINE ISLANDS

In a recent report Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero expresses thanks to the Moorefield, Neb., church for a box of used clothing and to the Foreign Mission Fellowship of Oregon Bible College for their financial support of the Philippine radio broadcast. He has asked the Fellowship to prepare a thirty-minute tape to be used on one of the broadcasts.

MEXICO

Because of continued health problems and due to educatiion difficulties of their children, Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore have elected to move out of Mexico. They are now residimg in Edinburg, Texas, which is near the border.

Sr. Rachel Krogh has also decided to move to this same area, feeling it not wise to remain in Mexico alone. Bro. Moore and Sr. Krogh do plan to continue working with the Mexico missions on a part-time basis, traveling to Smltillo and other villages in Mexico as they are able. Saltillo and work with the surrounding villages on a full-time basis.





CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The Christian Service Program at Oregon Bible College is perhaps one of the most beneficial offered to the students. It is through this service that students have opportunity to combine classroom knowledge with practical experience.

The program itself actually consists of two divisions. One concerns itself with assigning students to local churches for service. of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18). Through the Christian Service Program, each participant endeavors to grow in his ability to serve the Lord by practically applying that which he has grasped in the classroom.

MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

On March 23, 1968, Oregon Bible College hosted its first Missionary Conference. This Missionary Conference was sponsored by the Foreign Mission Fellowship, a group of students at Oregon Bible College vitally interested in promoting foreign missions of the Church of God General Conference.

The idea of the conference goes back to a conversation of several fellowship members in the summer of 1967. Since that time considerable changing and shaping has taken place with that original idea. At the first meeting of the F.M.F. in the fall of 1967 the idea was presented. It was met with considerable discussion. It was given over to several committees who studied it in detail and made several recommendations. Finally it was decided to hold the Conference on March 23, 1968, the first Saturday that Bro. S. S. Manoah would be in the United States.

Once the decision to hold the Conference was made, preparation was begun. Publicity had to be gotten out. Facilities had to be obtained. The program had to be planned. Posters and charts had to be made. People to help had to be contacted. And, most importantly, prayer had to be offered.

Then the applications began to come. The F.M.F. was hoping for as many as sixty or seventy people. But, God truly heard our prayers and more than one hundred and fifty people attended. Due to this increased size over what was anticipated, it was necessary to switch the Conference to the Oregon Church of God facilities.

The Conference began with a prayer session for God's power to be among us and in us. (A prayer that was answered!) After a singspiration and welcome by F.M.F. Chairman Scott Ross, Bro. Billie Kennedy challenged the delegates with a stirring keynote address. Then the Conference broke into seven smaller workshops. These workshops, under the fine leadership of Lorraine Gaspar, Charles Graham, Don Hightower, Joyce Knapp, James Lippert, Donald Needham, and Rex Shaw, were centers of stimulating discussion concerning missionary promotion in the local churches. Following the workshops was a period of fellowship, during which there was opportunity to view displays and charts depicting the work in the various mission fields and the progress our missions have made in recent years. 

BOARD OF DIRECTORS TO MEET THIS MONTH




GRADUATES


REMEMBER YOUTH CONFERENCE POOL

Severe drouth in the area of the Abut Church has caused several families to move from that area. Due to this situation, and because the building there was severely damaged by a typhoon last winter, it was decided to discontinue services in Abut. The members there will attend either the Minagbag or Quezon Churches, which are quite near.

Bro. Eleodoro O. Javar and his family, who have been pastoring the Abut Church, have moved to Mangandingay to begin a new work there. Several church families have located in this area.

The evangelistic team held a series of services in the village of Villaros recently. This is the place Bro. S. O. Ross was unable to visit in 1966, due to the impassable jungle roads. Bro. Eleodoro Ortiguero says, "Due to the dry season, we were fortunate to be able to drive over the road with the jeep." The Sunday attendance has shown an increase since the rally.

The Uddiawan Church continues to lead the Philippine Conference in attendance, with the average running about one hundred twenty-five.

LEBANON

Bro. Jamal Sunna'a reports that they have completely outgrown their home meeting place and have been forced to rent a room. They now are attempting to find some kind of seating to use.

The Sunday school has reached one hundred seventy children. Fifty adults attended the morning service, forty eight the evening, and forty-seven the midweek service recently. Two came forward to accept Christ and will be baptized as soon as weather permits.

NIGERIA

The civil war continues to rage in the area where the Churches of God are located. Bro. A. A. Obot reports that four church buildings have been "lost," his own house severely damaged and his brother Joseph has been killed. One of the faithful workers, J. E. Eyo, has been "detained" (we assume captured), and his whereabouts is not known. Things are very difficult for many of the members, as their houses have been looted and damaged and the families often harrassed and caused much suffering.

Bro. Obot says, "Kindly give our love to all. Remember to pray for us, and may God bless you and the work of the Church of God."

INDIA

The work in India carried on rather well while Bro. S. S. Manoah was away from it visiting here. The membership, however, did miss him and his messages a great deal and were most anxious for his return. One of the young men who was to fill the pulpit part of the time became ill and had to enter a hospital for surgery. Sr. Manoah reports that he is doing well and hopes to be back in the services soon.

Bro. Manoah upon his return will be starting to hold services regularly at villages surrounding Bangalore. These groups will meet in homes at the start and will be pastored by young men who Bro. Manoah is now training for this work.

MEXICO

Late in February Bro. Dean Moore advised the Mission Board that he was moving his family to Texas due to the adverse health and education problems they were encountering in Mexico. He suggested that support to him would stop. He was, however, supported fully until April first. He was also offered mileage and some subsistance for the trips he would make to Mexico to continue to supervise the work there.

On April 24, by letter to the Superintendent of Missions, Bro. Moore has resigned from his position as missionary to Mexico for the Church of God General Conference. We commend Bro. and Sr. Moore for the fine work they have done and pray God's richest blessing. on them in the days ahead.

Sr. Rachel Krogh has returned to Mexico and is carrying on the work of preparing materials, teaching, and other service to the missions there. Sr. Alice Aldrich, a graduate of Oregon Bible College, has gone to Mexico at her own expense to live with Sr. Krogh for the summer.

STUDENT SUPPORT IN INDIA

About a year ago, in correspondence with Bro. S. S. Manoah, we asked him what was most needed for the work of the Lord in Bangalore, India.

We learned that education, or lack of it, was one of the greatest drawbacks of the work. He informed us that they do not have public schools and compulsory education as we have. To receive even an elementary education a child must be sent to boarding school. There one must pay not only tuition and board, but must buy books, uniforms, and all supplies. This is too expensive for most of the church people.

Bro. Manoah stated that if even a few children could get some education it would be a great help in reading the Bible, teaching, and preaching the gospel. This would assure teachers and preachers for the future church.

This was discussed at the Northeast Conference, and it was voted for the conference to support at least two boys in English schools, and individuals were encouraged to do the same. Three families, one Sunday school, one Sunday school class, and one missionary board pledged to support one student each. This makes ten boys being supported in English schools.

There are two types of schools; the local dialect and the English schools. These cost approximatey \$8.00 and \$10.00 respectively (in American money) per month, twelve months each year.

It was deemed best to enroll the boys in English schools so they might be prepared to come to North America for college work, which is not available there.

Much appreciation for this support has been shown by the students, their parents, and Bro. Manoah, who says all of the boys have the potential for ministers of the gospel.

This work was not publicized outside of the Northeast Conference because it was a new venture and was being tested. Then, too, we did not want money used for this purpose which would otherwise be sent to the General Conference. This was to be over and above that given regularly to the Lord's work.

We feel that the Lord has blessed this project. We know we have been blessed by it and feel that is should be continued and cularged. All the money for the support has gone through the General Conference office. Eunice M. Pearson.





MRS. OLIVE BURNHAM



Annual Report of the Church of God General Conference Board of Directors

This report of the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference was approved at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors in Oregon, Illinois, May 10, 11968. The report is presented in this form so that delegates to the 1968 General Conference business sessions (August 41-9, Camp Alexander Mack) will have opportunity to situdy it and form opinions and seek suggestions from the groups whom they will represent.

This report covers only the first eight months of the fiscal year, therefore programs inaugurated since last Conference have not run their full course. Those activities which occur between now and General Conference will be reported orally at Conference. The report includes some general observations of the work of the Church of God as a whole as well as reporting the activities and accomplishments of the various departments of the General Conference.

Several resignations have caused a number of personnel changes. We feel that these transitions will be made samoothly with your prayers and the Lord's blessings and guidance. We praise God for his many blessings upon the work of the Church of God in this past year and we thank him for the progress that has been made and for opportunities that have come to his people.

Youth Department

The director of the Beran Youth Department is Bro. Il'aul Shaw. Since September 1, 1967, the work of the Elerean Youth Department has been administered by Bro. Shaw from Little Rock, Arkansas, where he is pastoring the New Hope Church of God. A cooperative arrangement has been worked out between the General Conference and the local church which provides for a division of Bro. Shaw's time between the youth department and the church work.

During the year, Challenge and Youth Workers' Memo have been published regularly. Youth Workers' Memo has been changed to a bi-monthly publication, rather than monthly, and from a lithographed to a mimeographed paper. On January 1, 1968, the Berean Lesson Manuals were revised as to form of printing. They are currently being distributed as a free, mimeographed publication distributed only to youth leaders, pastors, and those who request them, rather than as a lithographed publication on a purchase basis with copies for individual class members. This action was taken by the delegates at the 1967 Intermational Berean Youth Conference because the manuals were being purchased in insufficient numbers and a loss of more than \$2,000.00 per year was being realized.

Contact continues to be maintained with state and distiriet youth directors in an effort to improve the total youth program. The third annual meeting of conference youth directors was held in Oregon, Illinois, November 17, 18, 1967.

A slide set with taped narration based on the 1967 Youth (Conference was produced by Pastor Rex Cain. The set has been viewed by more than forty churches since its release iin January. The program of Berean contests, under the direction of Bro. Jim Mickey, experienced another successful year, with a number of churches participating in the Berean Bible Quiz Contest and the Christian Speech Contest.

The annual Berean scholarship to Oregon Bible College was increased to \$150.00 this year and was awarded to Dale Swartz on the basis of competitive testing at the Berean Youth Conference.


Enthusiasm and participation in Youth Week observances were at an all-time high. The second annual International Youth Week Award plaque for excellence in carrying out an observance of Youth Week was awarded to the Bereans of the Faith Chapel Church of God, East Peoria, Illinois.

A traveling, singing ensemble and gospel team called the Americana Youth Caravan is scheduled to tour churches and youth camps in the Midwest, Plains, Southwest, and Southern states during June. The decision to take the Caravan to the Southwest was part of a five-point program of contact and increased interaction with the Southwest Conference called "Operation Southwest," enacted last summer by the youth delegates. Operation Southwest included setting up a pen pal program between Bereans of the Southwest Conference and Berans of other conferences, publishing a special issue of Challenge which would feature Southwest young people, giving \$500.00 toward the transportation costs of Southwest Conference youth attending the 1968 International Berean Youth Conference, inviting Southwest Conference youth to present a special program at the Youth Conference, and establishing the Southwest as the destination of the Americana Youth Caravan. Each of these items has been carried out.

The young people of the Church of God took a bold and daring step, by their standards, during the delegate sessions of the 1967 International Berean Youth Conference. Having reached their all-time high giving goal for 1966-67 of \$4,250.00 almost two months early, they decided to *double* their giving goal for 1967-68 and set it at \$8,500.00. The young people are to be commended as they take on more responsibility each year in financial support of the youth work. The youth budget and giving goal are maintained within the framework of the budget and goals for giving of the General Conference.

Two stewardship projects were carried on to aid in the raising of these funds, as well as to teach good stewardship. The Coins-for-Christ Crusade was held for the fifth consecutive year, with a large number of Berean groups participating. The Mission Dollar Club had its most active year, with a membership of 204, compared with last year's membership of 175. These Bereans agree to contribute \$1.00 per month during the year.

The International Berean Youth Conference held last summer was a source of great inspiration to those who attended. The attendance was again at a record high for the eighth straight year, with an attendance of 303 campers. Plans for the 1968 Youth Conference anticipate an attendance of about the same, or a slightly larger, number.

Tuition is being raised to \$30.00 per camper. Due to overcrowding and other reasons, the lower age limit for attendance has been raised from entering eighth grade to entering ninth grade.

The young people of the Church of God are to be highly commended for their enthusiastic participation in the local, state, and international youth programs of the church. It is for their benefit the programs are planned and it is their participation and support which make them successful.

Publishing Department.

The Publishing Department of the Church of God General Conference is responsible for publishing The Restitution Herald, Progress Journal, Truth Seeker's Quarterlies, Songs of Truth, Systematic Theology, Vacation Bible School books, and many tracts, booklets, and other literature.

During the year The Restitution Herald became a monthly publication. It appears now with a full-color cover, and nineteen three-column pages of type. Many appreciative comments on the new covers and format have been received. Unfortunately, almost half of the membership of the Church of God does not subscribe to The Herald.

About 7,000 Truth Seeker's Quarterlies are mailed each quarter. During the year some changes in cover layout and interior format improved the appearance and readability of the quarterlies. Nearly every Church of God Sunday school uses some or all of the quarterlies. The editors and writers deserve much appreciation from the Conference for their diligent service.

The free Systematic Bible Study Course continues to be circulated widely. Many people in various parts of the world have been enrolled and have completed the course.

In December and January a tract, "Now Is the Time," was distributed. More than 18,000 copies were mailed during those months.

The 1967 General Conference moved to create a Christian Education Council to advise in matters of curriculum and content of all teaching materials of the Church of God General Conference. A steering committee was appointed to work out further details in regard to membership on the permanent Council. It has met and has established guidelines for this Council.

Printing of Church of God publications is now done by

commercial printers. Until June, Bro. Harold Doan we editor of *The Restitution Herald* and *Progress Journ* and general publisher. He was succeeded in June by Br T. M. Ferrell. Bro. Paul Johnson serves as managineditor of all publications, handling all technical prepartions.

Missions Department

The Superintendent of Missions is Bro. S. O. Ross. The Mission Board of the Church of God General Conferenis made up of the Superintendent of Missions, chairman Charles Jones, Chagrin Falls, Ohio, secretary; Warre-Sorenson, Macomb, Ill.; Edith Eades, Oregon, Ill.; an Lee McQuinn, Lombard, Ill. The Board has met severtimes the past year, including one business meeting b. telephone.

The mission work of the General Conference has progressed and new doors of service have been opened. Tracts *Restitution Heralds, Systematic Theology*, and the Systematic Bible Study Course have all served to spread the gospel via the written word in many countries of the world. This literature distribution continues to bring inquirie and correspondence and opens avenues to explain the teachings and beliefs of the Church of God (Abrahamic Faith Colombia, Belgium, Finland, Denmark, Norway, England and Ghana are a few of the countries heard from the pasyear. A tract distributing group in Hyderabad, India, i translating, printing, and distributing many of our tractin several of the Indian dialects.

The twelve churches of the Nigerian Church of Ge have been somewhat handicapped due to the civil war th has raged there the past year. Progress is being mad however, and two of the leaders of the work have enrolle to begin their studies in Oregon Bible College next Set tember. Nine of the ministers have been licensed by th General Conference.

The work in Lebanon led by Bro. Jamal Sunna'a is grow ing rapidly. Sunday school attendance has exceeded on hundred seventy children, and adult attendance at the services is about fifty. A suitable place to meet is a gree need here.

The work in the Philippine Islands is growing strong and has been enhanced by the weekly radio program. The church at Abut has been discontinued, due to many movinaway because of the severe drouth and because a typhoor greatly damaged the building. These members have beer absorbed into the Quezon and Minagbag churches and Bre Javar, the former pastor, has begun a new work in Mar gandingay.

Bro. S. S. Manoah, the national missionary in Indivisited here this year and many of you had the opportunity to meet him either at the first Missionary Conference even held on a General Conference level or at one of the thirty six churches that he visited while on tour. He is normaking plans to expand the work in India by startine many more churches in suburbs of Bangalore. His zeal enthusiasm, and prayer life were a very real inspiration t all who came in contact with him.

The Lighthouse Mission at Digby, Nova Scotia, continues to show strength. They are beginning to assummore financial responsibility and show general stabilit as time goes on. They are planning a "Maritime Confeence" for August, 1968, when Bro. and Sr. C. E. Laffwill be with them for special services. Bro. and Sr. Dean Moore have found it necessary to leave Mexico, due to recurring health problems and lack of proper education for their two daughters. They advised the Mission Board of their decision to do this late in February and the Board felt compelled to regretfully accept their decision, and full support was continued until April 1. Mileage and some subsistence were offered to Bro. Moore for trips he would make to Mexico to continue to supervise the work. On April 24, by letter, Bro. Moore resigned his position as missionary to Mexico. We are sorry ffor this decision and we do commend Bro. and Sr. Moore for the fine work they have carried on there for the past flour-and-one-half years.

Sr. Rachel Krogh continues to work in Mexico. Sr. Alice Aldrich, a graduate of Oregon Bible College, has gone to Nive with her for the summer. Bro. Francisco Martinez continues to pastor the Saltillo Church and to go to the surwounding villages for services.

Two churches have received Mission Builders assistance this year: Bible Church of God, Phoenix, Arizona; and the Macomb, Illinois, Church of God. Eight churches are on the Pastoral Aid program and receive support varying ffrom thirty to seventy-five dollars per month. Staff members and gospel teams travel thousands of miles each year and conduct several hundred services in local churches, state conferences, and youth meetings.

The General Conference staff stands ready to assist as they are able in the general work of the Church of God everywhere. We are thankful to God for the many doors of opportunity that have been presented to the Conference and we continue to express our thanks to the membership ffor the support and response you exhibit in your prayers, concern, and financial giving that God's work might conttinue to go forward.

Oregon Bible College

The 1967-68 school year began last September with an enrollment of forty-six students. Of these, forty were fulltime students (a course load of twelve hours or more), two were part-time (a course load of five to eleven hours), and four were special students (less than five hours). Horty-five students enrolled for the second semester, of whom thirty-nine were full-time, three were part-time, and three were special. Eight seniors were graduated on May 31: Don Hightower, David Krogh, Michael Mattison, Jim Mickey, Mary Mickey, Sara Jane Peters, Scott Ross, and Hex Shaw. Each of the men graduating has accepted a pastorate.

The staff included William M. Wachtel, President and Instructor; Eugene Stilson, Instructor and Christian Serwice Director; Kenneth Milne, Instructor; Harold Doan, Instructor; Stanley O. Ross, Instructor; Jean Doan, Instructor; Edith Eades, Men's Housemother; Elna Ross, Women's Housemother; and Nora Anderson, Cafeteria Director. Other staff members working on a part-time masis were Linda Cupp, Margene Rager, Helen Pryor, Dlive Stoffregen, Joe Duncan, Joe Martin, Joyce Railton, Wancy Foster, and Maria Marino.

Bro. Z. B. Dunean, pastor of the Church of God at Whitnel, N.C., conducted the annual Christian Emphasis Week, October 16-20. The annual seminar scheduled the first week of the second semester was not held this year, put a Missionary Emphasis Week was held March 25-29, with Bro. S. S. Manoah as guest speaker. The Freshman Foundation Year, begun in 1964-65, was continued without change. Certificates of recognition will be awarded during Orientation in September to all who have successfully completed the required freshman courses and elective hours during the past school year. The Foundation Year program will be enlarged during the coming school year by the addition of two new courses—Christian Service Orientation, and Church of God Missions and General Conference History.

The Board of Education met in August and twice during the school year. Out of these meetings came a number of recommendations to the Board of Directors and also suggestions and guidelines for the work and future expansion of the college. (Please see Board of Education report.) A Golden Anniversary program has been adopted to raise funds for the erection of a new women's residence. The goal of \$150,000.00 has been set, with a target date of August, 1970—the fiftieth anniversary of the Church of God General Conference.

Promotion of the college continues through the sending of letters, brochures, catalogs, the Junior-Senior Weekend, Booster Program, and Student Recruitment Committee of the Home Missions Fellowship. The latter will send out college students this summer, as last summer, to contact prospective students in various parts of the country. The Junior-Senior Weekend, held April 25, 26, has now been featured four years in succession. It draws many young people and their leaders to visit the college and provides them a glimpse of life here. The annual Booster campaign focuses attention on the college among the local churches and results in raising a sizable fund for the support of special needs.

The Layman Leadership Course, scheduled for June 3-7, had to be concelled because of insufficient enrollment. A restudy of this course is planned, with the possibility of offering it in future years at a different time during the summer to make it possible for more to attend.

Curriculum study has been carried on during the school year, and with the change in faculty there will be further study and revision of the curriculum. Bro. Alva G. Huffer, who becomes president of Oregon Bible College in September, is engaged in a doctoral program in education at Arizona State University. Bro. Huffer will have many constructive ideas for the improvement of the curriculum and total college program.

Faculty changes involve not only the naming of a new



president, but also the addition of two new full-time faculty members this fall—Bro. Francis E. Burnett and Bro. John Lewis. Bro. Eugene Stilson will continue as a full-time faculty member. Those leaving the faculty are Bro. William M. Wachtel, Bro. Kenneth Milne, and Bro. and Sr. Harold Doan.

Costs of college operation continue to rise, necessitating an increase in tuition. Tuition was raised to \$150.00 per semester for students from member churches and \$200.00 for students from non-member churches for 1967-68, and will be raised to \$175.00 per semester for students from member churches and \$250.00 per semester for students from non-member churches for 1968-69. The rate for board and room will remain at \$325.00 per semester. A number of scholarships and grants were provided to help students offset the rising cost of college education, and it is hoped that the program of scholarships and grants can be greatly expanded in coming years.

The Christian Service department maintained an active program, with gospel teams going out to various points during the school year, and a choir tour to churches in Indiana and Ohio at the end of March. Student organizations worked hard to carry out their objectives and programs—the Student Council, Foreign Missions Fellowship, Home Missions Fellowship, and Social Committee. A successful intramural basketball program with three teams was held again this year.

This report would be incomplete without a note of praise and thanksgiving to God for his blessing upon Oregon Bible College, for his presence and guidance in the work here, and the many prayers he has answered. Thanks are also due all those who have so faithfully supported the college with their prayers, good will, financial help, and with the gift of their own young people to be students here. The staff senses a heavy burden of responsibility resting upon us as stewards of the trusts committed to our hands. Please continue to pray faithfully for your college !

General Services

The Church of God General Conference staff performs a multitude of services for churches, conferences, ministers and individual members and friends, in addition to the specific departmental functions. It would be impossible to list all of these services; however they do include handling ministers insurance; maintaining the physical propertiof the conference; traveling to and speaking at state conferences, dedications, and special meetings; attending and speaking at various community affairs for public relations and providing information for various questionnaires from members and nonmembers as well.

There is a great deal of correspondence and counseling by mail on various matters pertaining to the conference work. There are many more such items of service that may seem minute and insignificant taken alone, however they are very time consuming and are of much import to the over-all functions of the General Conference.

General Conference Finances

The annual Goals for Giving of the General Conference has steadily increased each year, due to increases in costs of goods, Social Security, costs of all services, and cost of living. The General Conference Board of Directors and staff appreciate the sacrificial giving of the membership.

Many local churches have reached out in building programs, in evangelistic efforts, and in general services. State conferences are taking on more ambitious programs. The General Conference has increased the Mission program and other services. Yet the goals are met each year. We have fallen a little behind at the midyear point, however we know that the dedicated membership of the Church of God will provide the funds that all services that have been undertaken will be successfully completed and supported before September 30, 1968, the end of the fiscal year. May God bless and direct to the end that his work might movforward in even a greater way in the years ahead.

Recommendations for 1968

1) We recommend that a Youth Caravan be planned for the summer of 1969 which will consist of a gospel team of young people and adult supervisors traveling for about two weeks within the United States, provided that it is deemed advisable by the Delegates at the 1968 International Berean Youth Conference and provided sufficient funds are appropriated in the Berean Youth budget.

2) We recommend that Berean Youth Fellowships be encouraged to sell subscriptions to *The Restitution Herald* and that during November, 1968, the local group be permitted to retain 75 cents for each new subscription sold to be used for their projects.

3) We recommend that a Director of Christian Education be hired, as funds and the person become available. This position should be filled by a person with the following qualifications: a knowledge of and experience in education regarding curriculum planning, methods of teaching, and one who is sound in doctrinal understanding of the Bible. Selection of the director is to be made by the Board of Directors.

4) We recommend that the constitution of the Church

of God General Conference, Article IV, Section 6, b amended to read; "The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for four years. No director shall succeed himself for a second term."

(Explanation: The only change that this amendment would make, is that the term of office of directors would be for four years instead of the present three-year term. To implement this change directors shall be elected in this order: two directors in 1968, two directors in 1969, and in 1970 two directors for four years and one director for one year. Directors shall then be elected for four-year terms in the order in which their terms expire.)

5) We recommend that the mission work being carried on by Bro. Jamal Sunna'a at El-Chibbak, Lebanon, be ac cepted as a mission project for the Church of God General Conference, and that we accept into fellowship those members baptized since April, 1966.

6) Recognizing the necessity of additional degrees and education for our Oregon Bible College instructors, we recommend that the Church of God General Conference establish a scholarship fund for this purpose.

SPECIAL REPORTS

YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT

The Youth Advisory Council of the Berean Youth Department is a board of nine young people which serves in an advisory capacity in regard to the youth work. The Council meets once each year at a central location during the Christmas holidays and daily during the International Berean Youth Conference. Recommendations are formulated which are submitted both to the General Conference Board of Directors and to the delegate body at the Berean Youth Conference.

Members of this year's Youth Advisory Council are LeAnn Appleby, Barbara Sheeley, Jodi Lawrence, Lois Anthon, Mary Jo Brewer, Vivian Kirkpatrick II, Jim Graham, Paul Duncan, and Robert Laning. Vivian Kirkpatrick II is chairman.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

The Board of Education has met three times since our last annual report—at General Conference last August; on January 25, 1968; and on April 12, 1968. The next meeting will be held in August, during General Conference, with Bro. Alva G. Huffer as the new chairman. Bro. Huffer attended the last board meeting. Bro. Francis Burnett will leave the board when he becomes a faculty member in September, and Bro. Charles Pryor has been named to replace him at that time. The other members of the board are Sr. Ruth Halls, Secretary; and Bros. Don Overmyer and Dallas Demmitt. Each board member serves a two-year term, by appointment of the Board of Directors.

Meetings of the Board of Education are given over to study and discussion of the needs of Oregon Bible College, proposed improvements in program and procedures, and specific recommendations to be presented to the General Conference Board of Directors. Many of the distinctive features of our college program have originated in the thinking and planning of the Board of Education.

During this past year, planning has included promotion and student recruitment, faculty and staff recruitment, the summer course in Layman Leadership, the college library, the Booster program and budget, study of scholarshort six churches, and until the minimum number of ships and loan funds, curriculum revision, tuition charges, recreational program, student grades and discipline, and admissions policy.

The writer has been grateful for the opportunity of working with the Board of Education, serving as chairman for the past five years. Our prayers and best wishes are with the new chairman, Bro. Huffer, and with the Board of Education as they carry on the essential task of helping to guide the destiny of the college in years to come.

RETIREMENT COMMITTEE

For several years the Committee on a Retirement Plan for the ministers has worked to bring into being a workable Plan tailored to the size of the denomination. The goal set for the number of ministers that must participate before the Plan could become operative has been reached. We are churches willing to participate join in the program the plan cannot be put into operation.

The disappointing part of the effort is that the churches most able to share in the program have stayed out. The retirement plan is a modest one, and anything more than that would be doomed to failure due to the smallness of our churches and the conference in general. No denominational retirement plan for ministers started out with benefits anywhere comparable to that provided by industry. A denomination much larger by many times has, for years, had a smaller retirement plan than the one offered for our ministers.

One thing hard to understand is that individuals who have objected to the plan were either themselves under comfortable retirement plans or financially well-to-do. An earnest appeal is made to the noncooperating churches to come forward and help in bringing into being an honorable plan for the ministers. The only fund in existence to help our ministers in time of need is a meager one supported by birthday offerings and pennies collected from children in some of our Sunday schools, along with an occasional gift. BOARD OF ARBITRATION AND COUNSELING

For several years this committee has been in existence, but this past year is the first time its services have been used. One of our churches called upon the committee to give assistance, which it did, and found that the officers and members of the church were most willing to allow the spirit of Christ to lead in bringing about the "unity of the spirit in the bond of peace." It is doubtful if any problems ever confront a church that cannot be settled in amity and goodwill if brethren are willing to be led of the spirit. The Committee urges our churches everywhere to give out the testimony that Christ is declared to the world through their oneness. Jesus prayed that his followers "all may be one . . . that the world may believe that thou hast sent me" (John 17:21).

After prayerful consideration, the Board of Directors made a decision to use the same emblem as Oregon Bible College, which is an open Bible within a dark circle (see page eleven). The words, "Church of God" will be substituted for "Oregon Bible College" and the year removed, otherwise it will be the same. This will make one common emblem, except for wording, for both the Conference and the College.

We are thankful to those who did give their time and energies to prepare sample emblems for consideration.



Proper Church-Pastor Relationships

By the Editor

THERE are many pastoral changes being made this year. In some, the changes will have been made with good will on the part of the pastor and the congregation. In others, there will be feelings of resentment and misunderstanding, as a result of a poor relationship between the church and the pastor. Frankly speaking, many churches, and possibly many pastors, do not understand the relationship that *should* exist between a church and its pastor. In order to understand that relationship, we imust know the pastor's position, work, responsibility, and lhis due.

The Pastor's Position

According to Ephesians 4:11, 12, God gave the various spiritual positions, including pastors. Bullinger's Lexicon defines a pastor as "a shepherd, one who tends herds or fflocks, not merely one who feeds, but one who tends, guides, nourishes, cherishes, and rules, etc." He notes that the same Greek word is translated "shepherd" 17 ttimes in the New Testament.

Plainly, a shepherd is a leader, not a follower, of the ssheep. The position of the pastor of God's flock is that of sspiritual *leadership*. The pastor himself is not without a lleader, as Jesus is called "the chief Shepherd," or pastor of pastors. (1 Pet. 5:4.)

The Pastor's Work

As a shepherd of God's flock, it is the pastor's work to "feed the flock of God" (1 Pet. 5:2). He must lead them away from the "locoweed" of false doctrine, and feed them on spiritual food—the true Word of God. (Deut. 8:3.) As spiritual nourishment, God's Word contains insstruction, blame, correction, and encouragement in rightecousness. (2 Tim. 3:16.)

Paul charged Timothy, and all pastors, to "preach the

word; be instant in season; out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Tim. 4:2). This is not popular, and only a true pastor, who is interested in the eternal welfare of his members, will do this. The mere "hireling," as mentioned by Jesus in John 10:12, 13, cares nothing about the flock; he is not concerned about *feeding* the sheep, but *fleecing* the sheep! To the ministerial student concerned about making a living as a pastor, the late Bro. S. E. Magaw often counseled, "Feed the sheep, and they will clothe you!"

Preaching is not a pastor's only work. (There is a difference between a "preacher" and a "pastor.") The pastor is also a spiritual overseer of the flock. While "elder" denotes the dignity of his position, overseer (*episkopos*, bishop) describes his work or duty. He looks after the welfare of the flock. Ezekiel 34:1-6 describes the pitiful condition of the flock of Israel, when its shepherds failed in their work; the sick and diseased were not visited and helped, and the lost and strayed were not sought after, so the flock was scattered and devoured. The pastor's work, then, is complex and involved.

The Pastor's Responsibility

It is a pastor's responsibility to know his flock. Jesus said, "I . . . know my sheep, and am known of mine" (John 10:14). He also mentioned in this passage that the shepherd called his sheep by name. As the sheep passed in and out of the sheepcote the shepherd caused them to pass under the staff or under his hands. (Lev. 27:32; Jer. 33:13.) This familiarity with the flock enables the pastor to know if any are ill, missing, or in need.

It is also the pastor's responsibility to be an example to the flock. The adage, "Like priest, like people," is true to (Please turn to page 7)

General Conference Progress

ANNUAL GENERAL CONFERENCE TIME

The forty-eighth Annual General Conference will convene at Camp Alexander Mack, near Milford, Ind., August 4-9. This is a time of prayer, fellowship, sharing, teaching, preaching, and conducting the Lord's business. Plan now to attend this conference. If you cannot go, do remember to pray for the success of the conference.

Some churches have not yet returned their delegate forms and statistics reports. Please do so at once so that your church can be represented when conference convenes. All churches sending delegates are urged to enter the Delegate Pool so that the travel expense is shared equally by all, whether near or far from the conference site.

The theme of this year's Conference is "In Times Like These," with special emphasis on our times in the light of Bible prophecy. A full schedule is on page 2.

STAFF TRAVELS

Members of the staff travel many miles each month to supply pulpits, speak at special services, and assist the local churches or state conferences in various ways. Recent weeks have found Bro. S. O. Ross at L'Anse, Mich.; Monroe Center, Wis.; Casey and Salem, Ill.; Bro. T. M. Ferrell at Lombard and Oregon, Ill.; Bro. William Wachtel at Ripley and Lombard, Ill.; and Bro. Eugene Stilson at Waterloo, Iowa.

NEW BUILDING FUND PROGRESS

The Oregon Bible College Development Fund has now received \$17,350 in cash, plus considerable commitments for future giving. The next phase of this development program is the construction of a women's dormitory. A goal of \$150,000 was set to be reached by 1970, the Golden Anniversary of the Church of God General Conference.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Church of God General Conference was officially organized at Waterloo, Iowa, in the year 1921. The year 1970 will be the fiftieth year of the Conference, and a committee has been appointed to begin making preliminary plans for proper observance of the whole year, culminating at the 1970 General Conference sessions.

STEWARDSHIP

The Church of God is made up of people who do recognize the need for stewardship and who do contribute generously to the Lord's work. The Federal Government does make sizeable giving a direct deduction income tax wise. In addition, there are other effective ways of giving that can give the donor an additional tax break. Much literature is available along this line. We have available four booklets that we can send free of charge upon request. These are entitled: 1) Effective Giving Through Your Will; 2) Effective Giving Through Life Insurance; 3) Effective Giving Through Living Trusts; 4) Effective Giving of Stocks and Bonds. FINANCES

Contributions have fallen off slightly in June and the giving is \$140.00 short of the month's goal. The overall giving for the first nine months of the fiscal year, however, is slightly over the goal.

As was reported in an earlier issue of the JOURNAL, it became necessary in February to replace the conference automobile. This car is used for staff travels, transporting mailings to and from the post office, Youth Caravan and gospel team trips, and miscellaneous business travels for the conference.

This was an item beyond the anticipated budget cost and a loan had to be made. The Conference budget is so closely figured that any amount short of the goal for giving, or any additional expense not anticipated, puts a strain on the working cash balance when regular monthly payments need to be met.

We are thankful for those individuals and groups who do so faithfully support the work of missions, publishing, Oregon Bible College, Berean Youth Fellowship, and the other services of the General Conference. We know that the membership of the Church of God will make these extra items a matter of prayer and concern that the needs might be met.

NIGERIA




Bro. Ahaziah J. Umunah has already enrolled in Ore gon Bible College for the fall semester, and enrollment forms are expected from a second student shortly.


Explanation: The only change this amendment would make, is that the term of office of director would be for four years instead of the present three-year term.

a certain extent. Members seldom rise above the spirituality of their leaders. This is a great challenge!

The Pastor's Due

The tendency these days is not to respect positions of authority. We are to render to all their due. God's Word says pastors are to be esteemed "very highly in love for their work's sake" (1 Thess. 5:13). We are enjoined to remember them who lead the way, "who have spoken unto [us] the word of God"; to obey them, "for they watch for [our] souls, as they that must give an account" (Heb. 13:7, 17). A pastor is due his living because of his

A pastor is due his living because of his work; on the average of his parishioners. (1 Cor. 9:7-14.) "Elders who do their duties well should be considered as deserving twice as much as they get, particularly those who work at preaching and teaching" (1 Tim. 5:17, 18, Am. Tr.). A pastor is due the full moral and financial support of his congregation. The pastor is not merely an employee of the church, but is a servant of God. (Acts 4:29: 16:17: Phil. 1:1.) He is not paid to preach, but because he does. (over)

Church-Pastor Relationship

Above all, the church-pastor relationship is a working relationship! Paul said to the Corinthian church, "We are labourers to-gether with God" (1 Cor. 3:9). There is no double standard here. There are the same Bible requirements for minister and members; we are all brethren. (Matt. 23:8.) Little or nothing can be accomplished if pastor and congregation do not work together.

Balance of Power

There exists in the working church a delicate balance of power between the pastor, the church board, and the congregation. It is not unlike the balance that exists between the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of our federal government.

The position of pastor carries certain pewers vested in it by most church constitutions. He is a member of the church he is serving. He is ex officio an elder and a member of the church board, with full voting rights on all matters except his own employment. He is also an advisor and counselor of every committee and department of the church. The pastor will have his program, a plan of procedure; he should be allowed to present and try his program.

The pastor presents his program to the church board, which acts as critic and (or) supporter of his program. The board acts as liaison between the pastor and congregation in matters of policy and business. The pastor and board should be on such terms that they will not be found working against each other. The pastor's program will be presented to the congregation on recommendation of the board, and a rejection of the program will then be a rejection of the board's recommendation and not of the pastor. A pastor should never be "voted out" by a congregation, except for reasons of gross error or misconduct. Securing or continuing his services should be on recommendation of the board. If, after review, the board cannot recommend the pastor to the congregation, he should be told and given opportunity to resign. Any difficulties should be worked out by the pastor and board as they arise, that a real crisis should be avoided. Above all, no member of the board should act unilaterally, that is, on his own.

In our congregational system, which we hold to be Biblical, the final decision rests with the congregation, and the majority rules. While the pastor and the board are answerable to the congregation, neither is answerable to any individual member of the congregation. Individual members are reminded that they are to support the congregation as a whole, and to abide by the deeisions of the congregation.

The Challenge

We are all frail mortal human being-. fraught with weakness. But, we are cagaged in the most important endeavor in the world-fitting ourselves and others for entrance into the Kingdom of God! The pastor, church board, and congregation have their powers, responsibilities, and work in the over-all effort. The ultimate benefit may be obtained only when there is a proper relationship maintained between them.

Pastor, know and love your flock! Lead. feed, cherish, nourish, and pray for your people. Sustain them, as you yourself are sustained by your Pastor in heaven. Members of the flock, recognize the leadership of your pastor; honor him for his work's sake, love him, and pray for him! Church boards. remember your most important position arepresentatives of the congegation, main supporter of the pastor, and primary medi-ator between both. May God bless our effortas co-laborers with him!

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

GENERAL CONFERENCE REPORT!

Chairman's Message to the Delegates

BY NOW you are all aware of the theme for this year's conference, "In Times Like These." You are probably equally aware of the implication that "these times" are those days shortly preceding the coming of our Lord.

It's not difficult to correlate the prophecies and warnings in the Scriptures concerning the last days to the restlessness, uncertainty, and chaos, that we see all around us.

As we considered these times several questions came to mind:

1) What effect is the thinking and turmoil of these times having on the Church of God of the Abrahamic Faith? Is it possible that we stand out like an island in this sea of humanity, completely untouched and unaffected by the wickedness, permissiveness, and doubting that typify our day?

2) What are the dangers that must be avoided or overcome, and how are we to do this?

3) What are the opportunities, and how can we take advantage of them?

In the few years that I have been associated with the Church of God many changes have taken place. The most notable is the change of general attitude. The church has moved from the provincialism of a few years ago, when, generally speaking, growth came when son John married and brought his wife and subsequent children into the church. A time of little missionary effort, as we think of it today. A time when we considered ourselves a peculiar little group of people that would probably always remain a little group, and the communities around our churches agreed with us.

Now the fire for missions is burning at least some brighter and we have had some, though obviously not enough, fruitful missionary experience. We praise God for this. Equally important is the fact that we have "arrived." In many areas the Church of God is an accepted and respected part of the community and considered a part of the religious society. No longer are we considered peculiar. But what was the cost?

You know, it's a sad but true fact that when a people become comfortable, whether in a church or in a community or in a land, as was the case with Israel, problems start to multiply. Things begin to happen. And things are happening in the Church of God. At the very time when our missionary efforts arc increasing, we see a letdown in the very thing that has brought us whatever missionary success we have had. Bros. Manoah, Ortiguero, or Akpan, or Sunna'a, didn't seek us out because we were a tolerant people or because we were friendly or demanded little. It was because of our teachings—doctrines, if you will. That word that has become, in the minds of many, so distasteful.

There was an article in our local newspaper recently, stating that one of the smaller Christian denominations was meeting to examine their position and to determine if they still had a reason for existence. As I read it I thought that this would be good for us as well. Not that there is any question in my mind in this regard. Certainly we have many good reasons to remain separate. But there is an obvious need to review and to reaffirm these reasons.

A few years ago the State Department of our federal government pursued a policy that became known as "brinkmanship"; that is, we were always on the brink of disaster. Most people considered it very dangerous, though some thought it necessary.

As we consider the dangers of these times I believe that some of us are practicing an even more dangerous brinkmanship policy of our own. Jesus warned in Matthew 10:28, "Fear not them which kill the body; but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell." As the ecumenical spirit continues to spread over the world, aren't we courting disaster each time we, individually, or as churches, become involved with other religious groups and organizations that we cannot fully endorse? Aren't we affirming, if not by word, then by association, that "after all, it doesn't really make any difference"? Apparently some have lost confidence in our position and are hoping that someone else will accomplish what we haven't.

It's also apparent that many of our people already subscribe to the now all-too-popular philosophy that "to get along with people it's not wise to be too sure of anything." So, instead of standing apart, they seek the fringes, not getting completely involved but still not wanting to offend by letting people see any sign of disapproval.

Paul warned that the greatest danger we will probably have to face in these last days is deception. We must not

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be deceived and we must not act in a way that will cause others to be.

From all of this some of you will think that I advocate a return to the "good old days," to which I quickly say, "God forbid."

We have come a long way. We have progressed in many areas. Missionary activity, both here at home and in other areas, has increased and we hope will continue to do so. Our college is growing and, with the addition of new staff members and the building program that is in progress, it will continue to improve. The Berean Youth Fellowship is a far cry from what it was even ten years ago; and now we look forward to a revitalized educational program. But, as is often the case, having left the extreme narrowness of the past we have allowed the pendulum to swing much too far to the liberal side of things. I merely advocate that we correct this swing; that we reassess our position and our program in view of these dangers.

And what of the opportunities? I firmly believe that opportunities for missionary success here in America and throughout the world were never greater than they are right now. Nor has there ever been greater need. As men search for truth and reason, we, by remaining steadfast, have much to offer.

These are not times for weakness or compromise for the sake of public acceptance, but, rather, for strength and decisive action. We must, by all means, preach and publish the *whole* gospel message, as we know it, and we must do it now, for time is surely running out.

Minutes of the 1968 General Conference

MONDAY, AUGUST 5, 1968

The Forty-Eighth General Conference of the Church of God was called to order at 10:15 a.m., August 5, 1968, by Chairman Robert Huddlestun. Pastor Cecil Smead offered the opening prayer.

Sr. Ruth Halls, chairman of the Credentials Committee, was called to arrange the seating of the delegates. Three newly licensed ministers were introduced; 18 delegates were serving for the first time, and one church was represented for the first time.

A communication was read by William Lawrence from the Bible Church of God, Phoenix, Arizona, which expressed thanks to the Mission Builders League for its contribution toward the building of their church. It is expected that the church will be ready for services on September 8, 1968.

Pastor Warren Sorenson read a letter from the Macomb Church of God which also expressed appreciation to the Mission Builders League. Macomb was the twentieth church to receive assistance from this source.

John Hayse conveyed greetings to the Conference from Sr. Evelyn Austin of Mt. Morris, Illinois.

Chairman Huddlestun then presented his message to the delegates, stressing the importance of the work and the attitude of the Church of God in these last days before the return of Christ. (See page 2.)

Attention was called to the special reports on page 7 in the June PROGRESS JOURNAL; an opportunity was given for questions concerning the reports. Willis Turner moved, seconded by John Hayse, that the special reports be accepted. Motion carried. Charles Jones reported for the Military Personnel Committee. Members of this committee are Charles Jones, Chairman; Joe Duncan, Sr., and Cecil Patrick. The purpose of the committee is: a) to compile a complete list of Church of God men and women in the services; b) to build up morale; and c) to keep alive their Christian faith and interest in the Church of God. Chaplain Orville Westlund has recommended that the committee write to Washington, D.C., for particulars on becoming a member of the General Commission of Chaplains in the armed forces.

Kenneth Vancil reported on the activities of the Board of Directors during the past year and introduced the other members of the Board and S. O. Ross, Executive Secretary of the Church of God. Chairman Huddlestun expressed regret over Bro. Harold Doan's resignation as Executive Secretary after 13 years of devoted service to the Church of God General Conference. He stated that we are most fortunate to have a man of Bro. Ross's capabilities to take over this office.

Lottie Pickerl moved that the Secretary be instructed to write a letter to Bro. Doan expressing our appreciation for his faithful service. Seconded by Mardy Lawrence, motion was unanimously carried.

S. O. Ross then presented the treasurer's report for the nine-month period of October 1, 1967, to June 30, 1968. After explanations were made and questions answered, a motion was made by Alva Huffer that the treasurer's report be accepted. Seconded by Edward Goit, motion carried.

Pastor Terry Ferrell was introduced as Chairman of the

Pool Committee, and delegates were instructed to turn in the mileage to him as soon as possible.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 40; delegates, 81. Total 129.

The meeting was recessed with prayer by Pastor Richard Worley at 11:45 a.m.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 6, 1968

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Robert Huddlestun at 10:00 a.m. Prayer was offered by Pastor Leon Driskill. The Secretary read the minutes of the Monday business session. They were approved as read.

S. O. Ross announced that enough ministers and churches had joined the Ministers' Retirement program to inaugurate the program, and that there would be an organizational meeting after the evening worship service. The names of the churches and ministers who have enrolled were read.

Paul Shaw reported on the work of the Bercan Youth Department. He stated that this had been a good year and in many ways a thrilling year in the youth work. This has been the most successful year so far in the quizzing contest. Eight conferences will be represented with quiz teams at the Berean Youth Conference this year. The plaque for conducting the best Youth Week program this year was awarded to the Bereans of the Faith Chapel Church of God, Peoria, Illinois. The Goal for Giving which was established at the Berean Youth Conference last year was \$8,500.00. At the present time the young people have given \$8,067.00 and they expect to go over the goal during the Youth Conference next week.

Dallas Demmitt expressed thanks for the Americana Caravan visiting the Southwest, and for the contribution which the Southwest Bereans received to help defray their travel expenses to the Berean Youth Conference. Bro. Demmitt then moved that the following recommendation be adopted, "We, the Bible Church of God. Phoenix, Arizona, recommend that a full-time Youth Director be employed, and we would like to give our full support to Paul Shaw." Motion was seconded by John Hayse. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Richard Dick and seconded by Milon Hall that the motion be amended to read: "We . . . recommend that a full-time Youth Director be *considered*" The motion to amend carried, and the recommendation as amended was adopted.

The Chairman asked for consideration of Recommendation number 1, which reads, "We recommend that a Youth Caravan be planned for the summer of 1969 which will consist of a gospel team of young people and adult supervisors traveling for about two weeks within the United States, provided that it is deemed advisable by the delegates at the 1968 International Berean Youth Conference and provided sufficient funds are appropriated in the Berean Youth Budget." Kent Ross moved that Recommendation number 1 be adopted. Seconded by Lee Mc-Quinn; motion carried.

Hollis Partlowe moved that Recommendation number 2 be adopted, seconded by John Huston. This recommendation reads, "We recommend that Berean Youth Fellowships be encouraged to sell subscriptions to *The Restitution Herald* and that during November, 1968, the local group be permitted to retain 75 cents for each new subscription sold to be used for their projects." Motion carried.

There was no report presented from the Sunday School Department, but it was announced that Terry Ferrell has been appointed advisor and correlator for the Sunday School Board.

Pastor Warren Sorenson reported for the Christian Education Steering Committee. He explained the importance of the Council of Christian Education and defined the basic difference between its function and that of the Sunday School Board. John Hayse moved that the report of the Steering Committee be accepted; seconded by Don Swartz; motion carried.

The Chairman asked for consideration of Recommendation number 3 which reads, "We recommend that a Director of Christian Education be hired, as funds and the person become available. This position should be filled by a person with the following qualifications: a knowlcdge of, and experience in, education regarding curriculum planning, methods of teaching, and one who is sound in doctrinal understanding of the Bible. Selection of the director is to be made by the Board of Directors." Darrell Maddock moved that Recommendation number 3 be adopted; seconded by Edward Goit; motion carried.

Nominations were opened for two Sunday School Directors. Directors whose terms expired this year are Bernard Hightower and Paul Overholser. Those nominated for Board Director number 1 were Milon Hall and Louise LaMunion. Nominated for Director number 2 were Bernard Hightower and Vivian Kirkpatrick. Elected as Sunday School Directors were Milon Hall and Bernard Hightower.

Terry Ferrell reported on the Publishing Department. Bro. Ferrell is the new Editor of *The Restitution Herald* and the PROGRESS JOURNAL. He answered many questions that were asked concerning the publishing and printing work.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 49; delegates, 95. Total 152.

The meeting was recessed with prayer by Bro. Vivian Kirkpatrick.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 7, 1968

The meeting was called to order at 10:15 a.m. by Chairman Robert Huddlestun. Prayer was offered by Pastor Ernest Graham.

Willis Turner announced that the National Sunday School Board had met and organized. Bro. Turner is the chairman; Pastor Milon Hall is the secretary.

Chairman Huddlestun presented Recommendation number 4 which reads: "We recommend that the constitution of the Church of God General Conference, Article IV, Section 6, be amended to read; 'The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for four years. No director shall succeed himself for a second term."" Francis Burnett moved that this recommendation be adopted; seconded by Milon Hall. C. E. Randall moved the following amendment; Warren Sorenson seconded, "The terms of office for all General Conference directors shall be for two years, with privilege of reelection for a second term if Conference delegates so vote." Following discussion, Dallas Demmitt moved to amend the amendment to read three years instead of two, with privilege of reelection. Bro. Randall agreed to change the amendment and, with consent of the second, the change was made. A vote was taken and the motion to amend the recommenidation lost by a vote of 89 to 66.

A vote was taken on the motion to adopt the recomimendation as it was originally stated. The motion was lost lby a vote of 87 to 49. A recount by ballot vote was called, and the motion lost by a vote of 86 to 67. The recommenidation was *not* adopted.

Edward Goit announced that the new church building at Fonthill, Ontario, Canada, will be dedicated on Sunday, October 6, at 3:00 p.m., and issued an invitation to all to attend. Pastor C. E. Rahdall will be the dedicatory speaker. (The date for dedication has been changed to INovember 17.)

Nominations were opened for the directors for the General Conference Board of Directors, two to be elected for full three-year terms, and one to be elected for two years to fill the unexpired term of T. M. Ferrell.

Nominated for director number 1: Wm. Lawrence, Ellsworth Routson, James Mattison.

Nominated for director number 2: Elmo Gaspar, Dean Urish, Billie Kennedy.

Nominated for director number 3: John Hayse, Linford Moore, Vernis Wolfe.

The Mission Board was called to the platform, and the members were introduced. They are Edith Eades, Lee Mc-Quinn, Warren Sorenson, and Charles Jones. Sr. Eades reported on her meeting with Bro. Sunna'a and told of his work in Lebanon. S. O. Ross reported on the work in other mission fields. Because of lack of time, the Mission Board was not able to complete its report and will resume in the next business session.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 52; delegates, 92; total, 152. Pastor Robert See dismissed the meeting with prayer.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 8, 1968

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Robert Huddlestun; prayer was offered by Dwaine Demmitt. The secretary's report of the Wednesday session was read and approved.

S. O. Ross announced that the Ministers' Retirement Program will not go into effect before October 1 at the earliest; ministers and churches will be notified.


Pastor Francis Burnett moved "In appreciation of the years of service and his spiritual life, I move that we stand in a moment of silence in memory of Bro. Harvey U. Krogh, Jr." Motion was seconded and carried.

The Mission Board was called back to the rostrum to continue their discussion of the mission work. Bro. Ross explained in more detail the work being done by Jamal

Sunna'a in Lebanon and the work being done in Mexico.

Chairman Huddlestun presented Recommendation number 5, which reads, "We recommend that the mission work being carried on by Bro. Jamal Sunna'a at El-Chibbak, Lebanon, be accepted as a mission project for the Church of God General Conference, and that we accept into fellowship those members baptized since April, 1966." John G. Hayse moved the adoption of this recommendation; seconded by Charles Graham; motion carried.

Nominations were opened for a Mission Board Director. Those nominated were Mardy Lawrence, Eunice Pearson, and Darrell Maddock. Mardy Lawrence was elected.

Ballots were then cast to elect three directors to the General Conference Board of Directors. Lila Van Fleet moved to permit a minister's absentee ballot to be allowed since he was away on Conference business. After discussion on the matter, Wm. Lawrence moved and John Hayse seconded that the motion be tabled until the time that it may be necessary to lift it as a decisive vote. Motion carried.

The three men elected to the Board of Directors were Wm. D. Lawrence, Dean Urish, and Vernis Wolfe.

C. E. Randall moved, Alva G. Huffer seconded, that we give a rising vote of thanks to the retiring Board members. Motion carried.

Members of the Harlingen, Texas, Church of God expressed their thanks for the prayers and financial assistance from interested and concerned individuals and churches throughout the church during the time of the Harlingen flood.

Pastor Alva Huffer, President of Oregon Bible College, was called to the platform to present the report on Oregon Bible College. He explained the goals and plans for the College and answered questions.

Chairman Huddlestun presented Recommendation

number 6, "Recognizing the necessity of additional degrees and education for our Oregon Bible College instructors, we recommend that the Church of God General Conference provide funds for this purpose." Alva Huffer moved that this recommendation be adopted; Dallas Demmitt seconded it; motion carried.

Edward Goit moved, John Hayse seconded, that we recess until 2:15 p.m. Motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 53; delegates, 93; total, 154.

The meeting was dismissed with prayer by Pastor Alva Huffer.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, AUGUST 8

Chairman Robert Huddlestun called the meeting to order at 2:30 p.m. Pastor E. Richard Smith offered prayer.

The secretary's minutes were read and approved.

The Board of Directors' officers for 1968-69 are Chairman, William Lawrence; Vice Chairman, Kenneth Vancil; Secretary, Delbert Jones; Treasurer, Dwaine Demmitt.

Pastor John Lewis moved, "We recommend that the Board of Education study the possibility of establishing an internship program for Oregon Bible College whereby graduating students may have practical pastoral experience before they enter the ministry." Seconded by Kent Ross; motion carried.

Pastor C. E. Lapp moved, "In memory of Bro. Tom Savage, one of our ministers from St. Cloud, Minnesota, who fell asleep in Jesus early last fall, I move we stand in memory of his dedication and service to our Lord and to the church." Pastor Emory Macy seconded; motion carried.

Bro. Merle Patrick displayed an emblem for the Church of God and explained possible uses.

Bro. C. E. Randall moved that we adopt this emblem. or something similar, for our General Conference, and that the Board of Directors make a study and report to our next General Conference the most feasible means of distribution to the churches. Seconded by Edward Goit. Jack Hearp moved that the motion be amended to read, "to report before next Conference if possible." Seconded by Milon Hall. Amendment carried. Motion as amended carried.

Linford Moore moved that the Board of Directors appoint a committee representing ministers and laymen to study and suggest a code of ethics relative to the hiring of ministers and to report back next year. Seconded by Wm. D. Lawrence; motion carried.

John Denchfield moved, "In view of the expressed desire of this Conference in various years past for the maintaining of a field man for evangelistic and related work among our churches, and with an awareness of the increasing urgent need of such a position of field worker to evangelize and thus better establish the work of the churches, I now move that as soon as financially practical, giving preference over less urgently needed positions such as director of Christian education, youth, etc., this position of full-time field worker-evangelist be established by our General Conference Board." Motion seconded.

Oral Miller moved, that the phrase, "giving preference over less urgently needed positions such as director of Christian education, youth, etc." be omitted. Seconded by Kenneth Vancil; amendment passed. The motion as amended carried.

Pastor Leon Driskill moved to consider the 1968-69 budget. Seconded by Nina Jean Hayse; motion carried.

\$700.00 was added to the budget for further education for Oregon Bible College instructors. This makes a total budget of \$82,400.00.

Pastor Kent Ross moved that a \$600.00 emergency fund be established for the Mission Department. (\$83,000.00 would then be the total budget.) Seconded by Sr. Ada Simpson.

Kenneth Vancil moved to amend the motion by omitting the words "for missions." Seconded by Robert See; motion to amend carried. Motion as amended carried.

C. E. Randall moved to adopt the budget of \$83,000.00. Seconded by Willis Turner; motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported the following attendance: officers, 8; ministers, 47; delegates, 85. Total 140. During the Conference there was only once that the attendance fell below last year's. The average attendance was 145, which was 3 more than last year. Seventy-two churches returned delegate forms. Two churches returned delegate forms for the first time; Hope Chapel, Columbus, Ohio, and New Lenox, Ill. The total membership recorded by churches which reported was 3,728 for United States and Canada.

The delegates stood in a silent memorial to Bro. T. A.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY REPORT

Part of the Phase Two development of Oregon Bible College has now been completed at a cost of approximately \$11,500.00. A large new classroom, a canteen, a study room, and a cloakroom have been added, with new desks and study carrels. The carpeted, indirectly lighted rooms are an attractive, quiet addition, doubling the space available to the students.

The rest of the Phase Two development will be construction of a new women's residence to replace the present 110-year-old structure. The goal for this construction (and rapid inflation may have already made this goal unrealistic) is \$150,000.00. Of this amount we have received through August, \$14,465.00 in each and commitments.

We know that you want to take part in this development program scheduled to be successfully concluded in 1970, the Golden Anniversary of your Church of God General Conference. Drinkard, minister of the Church of God, who fell asleep in death in the past year.

A fund has been started to purchase a dishwasher for the Oregon Bible College dining room. To date the fund stands at \$50.00. Healthwise, the present setup is not good, and we have wondered why the health authorities have permitted it.

Biblical Introduction, Bible Survey I, Teaching I, Systematic Theology I, and Isaiah, are courses being taught by Bro. Francis E. Burnett.

New Testament I, Ancient History I, Public Speaking I, and Preaching, are being taught by Bro. John R. Lewis.

Missions II is being taught by Bro. Stanley O. Ross, who is Superintendent of Missions.

FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATION

President of Oregon Bible College is Alva G. Huffer. He will continue to reside in Tempe, Arizona, where he is pastor of the Tempe Church of God. He is also a student at Arizona State University, completing work on the Ph.D. degree in the Administration of Higher Education. He will be at the College various times during the year and will be teaching the seminar on Archaeology and the Bible in February.

John R. Lewis is Registrar and Director of Admissions. He will handle correspondence and details in relation to student records, registration, and admission. He will preside at faculty meetings when the President is absent.

Eugene E. Stilson is Director of the Christian Service program. He will be in charge of chapel services, and will oversee the special days of prayer and the annual Christian Emphasis Week. He will also coordinate special worship services that the Home Missions Fellowship and Foreign Missions Fellowship may present.

The College Staff, meeting several times during General Conference in August, approved the revised edition, which incorporates many suggestions made by the Student Council last May and by members of the Board of Education.

The \$175.00 scholarship to Oregon Bible College, which is awarded each year at the Youth Conference on the basis of competitive examinations, was won by Ronald Macy of Oregon, Illinois. Selected as Berean President of the Year was Monte Salzman of Peoria, Illinois.

YOUTH GIVING GOAL SET AT \$10,000!

The youth delegates at this year's Youth Conference have set a giving goal of \$10,000 for the new fiscal year, \$1,500 more than this year's goal of \$8,500. On December 24, 1966, she fell in her home and fractured a hip. From this and a heart attack she never fully recovered. She died June 21, 1968.




