

change has resulted from financial considerations, there is a desire to more effectively and efficiently utilize our resources to prepare pastors and workers for our churches and for planting new churches.

Secondly, I believe we are experiencing a period of excitement and optimism in planting new churches. A great deal of pride, satisfaction, and confidence has resulted from recent church-planting efforts, especially that in Colorado Springs. This is stimulating us to look at other opportunities to begin new churches. California and Michigan are specific areas for such planning.

Thirdly, we are experiencing a phase in our development in which our membership and leaders as a whole are united in standing firm on the foundation of basic doctrinal truths of the Bible. There are other issues with spiritual implications which threaten to distract and divide us because of the diversity of positions and emotions attached to those issues. We need to continue to have open dialogue and Biblical reasoning in an environment of love and understanding, rather than isolation, ostracism, and anger. Historically, even in the New Testament Church, there were differences. We also find in the book of Acts that there was a conference and communication to attempt to resolve differences. The apostles continued dialogue and reasoned together to handle the issues. There is absolutely no room for compromise on the basic doctrinal truths of the Word of God. Where there is a "thus saith the Lord" we must staunchly uphold that teaching. Then we have prophetic topics regarding which some of the most respected Church of God ministers of today and times past had and continue to have different understandings and interpretations. Do we allow these different interpretations to divide us and distract our time and attention from the Great Commission?

Even more controversial are topics related to social customs and cultural Practices and which topics are someimes related to major social problems of our day. Strong emotions are usually attached to our personal opinions regarding these issues. In some areas I ear that we are being divided by personal opinions and emotions. The ord of God clearly, specifically, and dogmatically prohibits drunkeness, fornication, adultery, homosexuality, etc. These are behaviors and practices

which we can approach and present as sinful because the Word of God says these things are sinful. These things are not wrong because of personal preferences but because God says they are wrong. I submit to you that we must be united where God's Word speaks directly. I further submit to you that we must not allow different personal opinions to divide and destroy us as a Conference. It is my personal observation that some of the differing positions, such as those related to alcohol, are being exaggerated and misrepresented by rumor and hearsay. We must not allow our total time and energies to become absorbed in these issues. I would hope that our positions on these topics are harmonious with God's Word. I firmly believe that no minister or teacher in the Church of God is promoting behavioral practices which are harmful to the health, safety, and social or spiritual well-being of our people.


Brethren, we have a challenge in dealing with these matters maturely and responsibly. We must learn to discuss and deal with differences of opinion without destroying persons. This will become even more true as we extend our ministry beyond our present membership and even into other cultures.

Fourthly, we are in a period of difficulty regarding our financial management and planning. One year ago in my chairman's message I described some of the "cash flow" problems in the management of our General Conference. At the 1978 General Conference the delegates took action to significantly increase the proposed budget to allow for rather large salary

increases. These salary increases were deserved and our staff is still underpaid. While budget and expenditures increased, the increases in contributions to the "Goals For Giving" and increases in other sources of income were not sufficient to meet the budget approved by the delegates. We began to see a period of several years where costs of operations continued to increase while income was less than anticipated and less than expenditures. All of us are savvy enough to realize that that constitutes deficit spending. We borrowed from ourselves. The Board that I have chaired has taken steps to reduce this trend because we cannot afford to allow our resources to erode. You have received correspondences from me stating that budgets have been cut and for the coming year, that some reductions in full-time equivalents in personnel are being made.

Over the past four years, it has been necessary to borrow over \$100,000 from our restricted funds to maintain operations of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College. This has been the case because contributions for the period have been \$180,000 less than the Goals For Giving adopted by the delegates, and Oregon Bible College has spent more than budgeted for operations. The low enrollment and therefore less income from tuition and fees has been a complicating factor for the past couple of years. To offset some of the deficit, the General Conference departments have spent less than budgeted and some sources of income have exceeded projections.

The Board has responded to our deficits by reducing budgets and de-



C HAIR MASNMESSAGE

Brothers and sisters in Christ, it is indeed a pleasure for me as Chairman to welcome you on behalf of the Board and Staff to this Sixty-Fourth Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference. All of us gathered here in conference are responsible to the many local churches and state conferences which we represent. It is our responsibility in this Conference to make decisions, to elect Board members, and to establish policies and program directions which are in the best interest of our total constituency and which best facilitate the Great Commission as given by our Lord to "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15).

The Church of God General Conference is a fellowship of member churches and individual believers. We firmly believe in and support the autonomy of the local congregation. It is our common faith and goals that brings us together in conference. The Church of God General Conference was formed originally as a service organization and as vehicle of communication and collaboration by the local churches and members. Today, the General Conference continues to serve the needs of our local bodies of believers. There is no other reason for this organization to exist. It is the responsibility of the Board of Directors elected by you, the Delegates, to oversee the operation of the Church of God General Conference and Oregon Bible College and to assure that these organizations are responsive to the needs of our membership. The Board, then, is responsible and accountable to you.



You are responsible to the congregations you represent and we must all conform to the will of God because we are stewards of his work. We pray that God's Divine Power will touch each of us this week to lead us to take actions that will be pleasing to our Heavenly Father. We further pray that unity will prevail among us as we go through the business sessions and other activities of this 1984 General Conference. Most of all, we pray that throughout this Conference all of us will feel a oneness with our God and his Son, Jesus, and with each other.

The theme for this Sixty-Fourth General Conference is "Building on the Solid Foundation." I am reminded of the words of 1 Corinthians 3:11, "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ.' It is appropriate that we remind ourselves of the importance of a solid foundation for we are to be "built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone (Eph. 2:20). We must diligently hold to the foundation teachings of Jesus, the prophets, and the apostles. The truths of God's Word never change. The Board of Directors and staffs of our organizations are committed to faithfully upholding those Biblical truths which we share and which bring us together in fellowship and Conference.

Brothers and sisters, while we must continue to stand firmly upon the solid foundation, we must not forget that the proclamation of Jesus Christ-"Upon this rock I will build my Church"-still rings out loudly and clearly to us who are the workmen by whom our Lord will build his Church. A part of the theme for this Conference is on "Building." Our Conference theme reminds us of who we are and presents us with a great challenge. We must not simply give lip service to "Building on the Solid Foundation" but we must also resolve to commit ourselves and our resources to the challenge "to build." The seminars, sharing sessions, and classes of this Conference should help prepare us to mobilize ourselves to meet this challenge.

will we be able to meet the challenge a given by Christ. We must be reminde that we are stewards of the work of th Lord and will be held accountable for our performance. Jesus, the noblema has gone into a far country. He has le his work to us as his servants. One da Jesus will return and we must then give an account of our stewardship. It is m prayer that we as individuals and th Church of God as a whole will have favorable report to give to Jesus upc his return. I believe we can accomplis this goal best through a spirit of uni and cooperation and by edifying or another.

It is customary for the Chairma annually in his message to give a bri statement of our present situation he sees it. I believe that we are in period of evaluation and assessmer The Board of Directors, the staff, ar our pastors and other leaders are askin very crucial questions. Questions a being asked regarding the service fun tions and operations of the various departments of the General Conference The roles of Oregon Bible College a being evaluated in relation to the needs of our local churches. We a further struggling with issues related purpose, roles, structure, program and personnel patterns needed achieve the desired goals for the colleg We are evaluating also the effectivene of our General Conference and Bi College in communicating and keepi in touch with the pastors, church and general membership.

I believe that we are in a time wh many of our members are anticipati changes. As the Board met with ministers during their conference a spring, there appeared to be grown support for Oregon Bible College move to a strengthened focus of p paring pastors to serve in our church Although some of the impetus

veloping a planned repayment of loans. In the budget approved one year ago, a line item included a sum to begin to repay the amount borrowed. The budgets proposed to you this year include payments on these loans. Future budgets submitted to you will include repayment amounts until the loans are repaid. When the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation is at the point of having income to appropriate toward College operations, 25 percent of those appropriations will be used to reduce the indebtedness until the loans are repaid. It is projected that by following this repayment plan, the loans should be completely repaid by the summer of 1990. This repayment plan should not jeopardize ongoing operations and activities.

There is a positive side to all of this. In calendar year 1983, giving to the General Conference, Oregon Bible College, The Oregon Bible College Development Foundation, and to specific programs of our organizations reached an all-time high. We are taking steps to control our financial situation and our people are graciously responding This is a problem for all of us, not just a problem for the Board and staff. We will approve a budget this week Let us all resolve to return to our local churches to inform and gain the assistance of our membership in reaching the "Goal For Giving" as approved by you.

Fifthly, we are in a period of opportunity. We see this age coming to a close. Bible prophecies are being fulfilled before us. Doors are opening for us to present the Gospel of Salvation in many areas. Local congregations have opportunities to foster new works. The General Conference and College have opportunities to provide training opportunities, trained people, printed material, consultation, and assistance as these opportunities are developed. Along with the opportunities come the cha lenges to become personally involve and committed and to be willing t work long and hard. The prayer for th Lord of the harvest to send forth mor workers can be a dangerous prayer one who prays does not wish to be worker. Let us become committed t our stewardship.

I have been open, honest, and candi with you. Problems that I have pre sented were not stated to discourag us, but have been discussed as a chal lenge for us. We are "the called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28) and if we rely upon God and Jesus Christ, no challenge will overcome us. Let us ge forth from this Conference in the spiri of love described by the Apostle Pau in 1 Corinthians 13 and with the convic tion described by Paul in Philippians 4:13 when he said, "I can do all things through Christ, which strengtheneth me." MINUTES, 1984 GENERAL CONFERENCE

FIRST SESSION

TUESDAY, JULY 31, 1984

The 1984 General Conference Business Session was called to order by Chairman Joe James Tuesday, July 31, 1984, on the campus of Southeastern Louisiana University, Hammond, Louisiana, at 1:30 p.m. The meeting was opened with prayer by Pastor S. O. Ross. Chairman James then turned the podium over to Secretary Maurice Robinson for the introduction of a special guest. Maurice Robinson introduced Mr. Felix Laiche, Assistant to the President of Southeastern Louisiana University, who extended a




gracious welcome to the delegates to the Southeastern Louisiana University in Hammond, Louisiana.

Chairman James next called on the chairperson of the credentials committee, Janet Stilson, to seat the delegates to the 1984 General Conference.

Chairman James then made his report to the delegates. He reminded the delegates of the purpose of the Conference, the responsibilities of the Board, and the responsibilities of the delegates. The delegates were challenged to build on the solid foundation of Jesus Christ. (The entire text is to be printed in the next issue of PROGRESS JOURNAL.)

Next, Chairman James recognized the churches which were being represented for the first time. The Pleasant View Bible Church, Colorado Springs, Colorado, represented by Bro. Don Needham, was recognized. The McGintytown Church, represented by Bro. Tom New, was also recognized. Pastors attending for the first time since licensure—Pastor Jeff Smith from Harlingen, Texas; Pastor Lee Arp, North Hills Church, Springfield, Ohio; and Pastor Dick Eldred from East Oregon, Illinois—were recognized. Next, delegates attending as delegates for the first time stood and were recognized. There was a large number.

The special report from the Christian Conciliation Board, the Church of God Investment Fund, the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, the Li-



cense and Ordination Board, and the Ministers Fund were presented. Motion by John Huston, seconded by Tommy McCaw, to accept the reports as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Next, Chairman Joe James called on Secretary Maurice D. Robinson, Jr. to report on the activities of the Board of Directors during the past year. Maurice reported that the January meeting was held in Hammond, Louisiana, and included an extra day for planning of the 1984 General Conference and a visit to the Southeastern Louisiana University campus. He also reported on the May meeting in Oregon which included an open meeting with the pastors and an open meeting with the staffs of OBC and General Conference.

Chairman James then called on Bill Burnham, Director of Business Services, to present the financial report as printed in the PROGRESS JOURNAL. The statements were reviewed by Bro. Burnham. Bill also informed the delegates that the delegate pool would close at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday. Motion by Russell Johns, seconded by Keith Williams, to accept the reports as printed. Motion passed unanimously.

Chairman James called on Bro. Warren Sorenson to discuss his Outreach and Church Development report and answer any questions. In addition, Bro. Sorenson gave special recognition to Hugh and Mary Harman for their contribution to the Youth Department over the past years. Kent Ross, the new Youth Director, was introduced. Kent gave a report on the coming year, including a report on next year's site for the Youth Congress at Huntington College Campus at Huntington, Indiana. Several slides were shown to the delegates.

Warren reported further on the prospect-calling campaign used in some existing churches in Aurora, Dixon, and Rockford, Illinois; Omaha, Nebraska; North Hills, and Columbia Station, Ohio; and Colorado Springs, Colorado. Two teams will soon be going to

assist the two new church-planting ventures in Michigan and California.

A motion to accept the report of Outreach and Church Development was made by John Raymond and seconded by Charles Knapp. Motion passed unanimously.

Chairman James received a motion to express the appreciation of the Church of God General Conference to Hugh and Mary Harman for their work with the youth over the past several years and that the secretary be instructed to write a letter to express this appreciation. Motion by Hollis Partlowe, seconded by Dallas Demmitt. Motion carried unanimously.

The chairman called on Credentials Chairperson Janet Stilson for her report. Mrs. Stilson reported that there were 130 delegates, representing:

- 7 directors
- 50 pastors
- 73 delegates present at the first session.

A motion to adjourn was made by John Huston, seconded by Bobby Partain and dismissed with prayer by Hollis Partlowe.




SECOND SESSION

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 1, 1984

The second session of the 1984 General Conference was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday. The meeting was opened with prayer by Bro. Ray Hall. The chairman next called upon Bro. Joe Martin for an announcement.

Bro. Joe Martin tendered his resignation from the Board of Directors/Board of Trustees effective at the close of the 1984 General Conference so that the delegates would have an oportunity to elect a replacement at this session.

Next, the floor was opened for nomination to the Board of Directors of the General Conference and



Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College. Those nominated were as follows:

- (1) Elaine Shute—Fonthill Church, Ontario, Canada, nominated by John Huston;
- (2) Charles Bottolfs—Happywoods Church, Hammond, Louisiana, nominated by Maurice Robinson, Jr.;
- (3) Keith Williams—Pennelwood Church, Grand Rapids, Michigan, nominated by Howard McClain;
- (4) Dick Eldred—East Oregon Church, Oregon, Illinois, nominated by Don Needham;
- (5) William Lawrence–Valley View Church, Phoenix, Arizona, nominated by Hollis Partlowe; and
- (6) David Wilsterman—Happywoods Church, Hammond, Louisiana, nominated by Charleen Graham.

Motion by John Huston, seconded by John Hayse, that nominations be closed. Motion carried unanimously.

Next, the secretary read some correspondence from Marj Overmyer, Burr Oak, Indiana, expressing her regrets that she was not in attendance and sending best wishes to everyone.

Bro. Russ Magaw, Director of Publishing, gave the Publishing Department report as printed in the PRO-GRESS JOURNAL. He urged the delegates to enter their subscription to the *The Restitution Herald*. Russ also answered several questions from the delegates. Motion to accept the report was made by Tommy McCaw, seconded by Jerold Brewer, carried unanimously.


Next, the chairman called on Dr. Charles Pryor, President of Oregon Bible College, to present his report on Oregon Bible College as printed in the PROGRESS JOURNAL. Charles gave an update of the OBC Development Foundation. Charles asked each of the delegates to help to recruit students for Oregon Bible College, noting that at present only twenty-nine (29) students were expected for the 1984-85 school year. Charles then answered questions from the floor regarding Oregon Bible College and the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation. Motion to accept the report was made by Scott Ross, seconded James Mattison, carried unanimously.

The chair recognized Bro. Joe Myers. There wa motion by Joe Myers, seconded by Jim Graham, the the Executive Board and Board of Trustees be direct to appoint a study committee to explore the educatio alternatives to our current four-year Bible college the purpose of preparing ministers, missionaries, a workers in the Church of God. These findings with recommendation are to be presented to the 19. General Conference. After discussion, the moti carried unanimously.

Next, the chairman called on Bro. Michael Hoffma Brush Creek, Ohio, who gave a report on the recen concluded and very successful building program he at their church.

Next, the chairman called on the Credentials Committee Chairperson, Janet Stilson, for her report S reported that there were one hundred thirty-five (13 delegates in attendance, representing seven (7) directors, seventy-eight (78) delegates, and fifty (50) min ters.

Motion to adjourn by Joe Myers, seconded by Jo Fletcher. Motion carried. The meeting was closed wi prayer by David Krogh.



THIRD BUSINESS SESSION THURSDAY, AUGUST 2, 1984

The third business session of the 1984 General Conference was called to order by Chairman Jo James at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, August 2, 1984. The meeting was opened with prayer by Bro. France Burnett. The secretary read the minutes of Wedness day's meeting.

The first order of business was the election of t^h Board of Directors. It was announced that there we^r three to be elected, two to a four-year term to repla^C

the retiring directors, and one to a three-year term to fill the unexpired term of Joe Martin, who tendered his resignation. Those elected to four-year terms were (1) Pastor Dick Eldred, and (2) Dr. William Lawrence. Elected to the three-year term was Keith Williams.

The next item was to consider Recommendation #1. Motion by Robert Coverstone, seconded by Joe Astolfi to adopt Recommendation #1. Much discussion followed. There was a motion by Kenny Vancil to postpone indefinitely the consideration of this motion. Seconded by Allan Ramsey. Discussion followed. The vote on the motion to postpone indefinitely was defeated. Discussion continued on Recommendation #1. It was called for secret ballot by Richard Smith. The motion failed, with sixty-one (61) for, seventy-one (71) against.

A motion was made by Dallas Demmitt, seconded by Jeff Fletcher, to adopt Recommendation #2. Discussion followed. Motion carried unanimously.

Next was a motion by John Huston, seconded by Joe Astolfi, to adopt the Proposed Constitutional Amendment. Discussion followed and motion carried unanimously.

Willis Turner next requested that the Board check into the legalities of having employees of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College having a vote as a delegate at the business sessions.



Next, there was a motion by Francis Burnett to adopt the proposed budgets. Motion was seconded by David Johnson. Discussion followed. There was an exhortation by Bro. S. O. Ross that as we consider adopting the budget, we commit ourselves to support the goals for giving as set forth in the budget. Motion carried unanimously and budgets were adopted.

Kenny Vancil moved, "Be it resolved that the Church of God General Conference go on record as being against the consumption of alcoholic beverages." Seconded by John Hayse. Much discussion followed.

Joe Martin proposed an amendment to the motion which would have the motion read as follows: "Be it resolved that the Church of God General Conference go on record as being against substance abuse such as alcohol and other addicting drugs." Seconded by Russ Magaw. Discussion followed on the amendment. The question was called for to shut off the debate, but the call for the question was defeated forty-six (46) to forty-three (43). After further discussion, vote was taken on the amendment. Motion carried with a vote of sixty-one (61) for and twenty-nine (29) against Next, a vote for the motion as amended was called for. There was a request for a ballot vote. Vote was then taken by ballot on the motion as amended. Motion passed with a vote of eighty-nine (89) for and twentysix (26) against.

Next was a motion by Michael Hoffman that the delegates instruct the Board of Directors to prepare recommendations for the 1985 General Conference to implement a Bi-Annual Conference as soon as possible. Seconded by Cecil Rademachir. There was a motion to table by Dean Urish, seconded by Charles Graham. Motion to table carried with forty-seven (47) for and forty-five (45) against. Next, the chairman called on the chairperson of the Credentials Committee for her final report.

The minutes from Thursday's meeting were read. There was a motion by Charles Knapp, seconded by Robert Coverstone to approve the minutes of the 1984 General Conference. Motion carried.

A motion to adjourn was made by Dallas Demmitt, seconded by Robert Coverstone, and the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Maurice Robinson, Jr.



1984 General Conference

The 64th annual Church of God General Conference was held at Southeastern Louisiana University, Hammond, LA, July 30 - August 3. The sermons, seminars, and classes effectively presented the theme, "Building on the Solid Foundation."

Pastor Richard Eldred and Dr. William D. Lawrence were elected to four-year terms on the Board of Directors-Trustees to replace retiring members Joe James and Maurice Robinson, Jr. Pastor Joe Martin resigned from the Board during Conference, and Keith Williams was elected to fill the remaining three years of his term. The officers of the Board are: Scott Ross, Chairman; Dallas Demmitt, Vice-Chairman; David Johnson, Secretary; and Robert Coverstone, Treasurer.

Recommendation Number One, regarding the license and ordination of pastors, was discussed extensively with many important questions raised. The motion eventually failed with a vote of 71 to 61. Recommendation Number Two, which amends the standards for Church Builders League recipients, was adopted.

The Constitutional amendment, which gives the Executive Director and Oregon Bible College President a vote at delegate business sessions if they do not meet the voting requirements of other provisions in the Constitution, was adopted.

Two budgets for the time periods October 1, 1984 to May 31, 1985, and June 1, 1985 through May 31, 1986 were adopted by the delegates. A copy of these budgets appears on page 8 along with additional information.

Please review carefully the minutes of the business sessions which are printed on pages 4-7 of this issue.

The Thursday evening worship service entitled, "Celebration to Service," was a time of inspiration and blessing. The Board of Directors was installed by Ministerial Association President S. O. Ross. Special plaques of appreciation were awarded to retiring Board Members Joe James, Joe Martin, and Maurice Robinson, Jr. Michael Gallagher was granted a ministerial license by the License and Ordination Board. A plaque was presented to the Pleasant View Bible Church of Colorado Springs, Colorado, in recognition of its official application to become a member of the Church of God General Conference, Warren Sorenson, Director of the Outreach and Church Development Department, presented the plaque to Don Needham, pastor of the Pleasant View Church. A communion service was conducted and retiring secretary Maurice Robinson brought words of encouragement and challenge to the delegates.

It was announced that the 1985 General Conference will be held at Wittenberg University at Springfield, Ohio,

July 29 - August 2. A program committee consisting a pastors and lay members from the southern Ohi churches, along with the President of Oregon Bibl College and the Executive Director of the Genera Conference, will plan the 1985 Conference.

A great deal of excitement was generated during th Conference regarding the planting of two new Church c God congregations this fall. Pastor Richard Eldred anhis family are planting the North Kent Bible Church 1 Rockford, Michigan. Pastor Bobby Partain and thy members of the Pomona Church of the Open Bible and planting a new church at Phillips Ranch. Additiona information on these church-planting projects is reported on pages 11 through 13 in this issue of the JOURNAL

Considerable discussion took place and a motion wa adopted by the delegates regarding alcohol and drug abuse. Since Conference, a statement prepared by the Church of God Ministerial Association in 1948, entitled "Guides Toward Christian Conduct," has come to light This statement deals with the alcohol issue along with 10 other issues which the ministers felt should be dealt with in 1948. A copy of the guides is available by writing to: Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061.

Financial Update

As of July 31, contributions toward the Goal for Giving were approximately \$6,600 short. We trust that the entire membership will make this a matter of concern so that by September 30 this shortfall can be made up.



CHURCH-PLANTING PROJECTS

Church-planting teams under the direction of Warren Sorenson and Russ Magaw have been busy working this summer providing prospect-calling assistance for several existing churches and two churchplanting projects. We are thrilled at the Lord's blessing on the efforts that have been put forth this summer.

In June, Warren and Irene Sorenson, along with team members Angie Dickerson, Sue Lee, James Raymond, Tom Schmitt, and Jay Smith did prospect calling in Omaha, NE, and Colorado Springs, CO.

In July, Russ Magaw traveled with the team to North Hills Church in Springfield, OH, and the Columbia Station, OH, congregation.

In August, Warren and a team did prospect calling in Conway, AR, and they traveled on to Pomona, CA, where they worked with Bobby Partain and members of the Church of the Open Bible in doing survey work in the Phillips Ranch community of Pomona, CA.

In late August, Russ Magaw, Jan Stilson, Tom Schmitt, Rob Rand, and members of Michigan churches, did survey work in the Rockford, Michigan, area. Thousands of calls were attempted and hundreds of prospects were discovered for existing and new churches.

NORTH KENT BIBLE CHURCH

The new church at Rockford, Michigan, will be called the North Kent Bible Church. A temporary SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER, 1984 meeting place has been secured at the Independent Bank at the corner of 10 Mile Road and Main Street in Rockford. A conference room has been made available at no cost. The room will hold about 50 to 60 people. The first service is being held September 9. Pastor Richard Eldred and his family are providing leadership for this new congregation. The Michigan Conference is providing much of the financial support and members of the Michigan churches are providing assistance in prospect calling and follow-up.

The General Conference will be providing church development aid in the amount of \$500 per month.

PHILLIPS RANCH CHURCH

Phillips Ranch is a community situated on a set of hills that overlook Pomona. It is sandwiched between two major freeways that service the area. There are approximately 1,200 homes that have been built in the last five years in an area with a combined population of around 3,500. New homes are continually

being built and when the master plan is completed, there will be approximately 3,300 homes with a total population of 10,000. The community has been built in such a way as to be a private planned community with its own elementary school, shopping center/office complex, and a large community park between the school and shopping center. There are no churches currently operating in the Phillips Ranch area.

Pastor Bobby Partain and members of the Church of The Open Bible in Pomona are providing the leadership for this church-planting project. They have rented the auditorium of Decker Elementary School, which seats 250 people, for Sunday worship and adult education. They have rented 2,000 square feet of space from the Montessauri Preschool, where nursery and children's Sunday School classes will be held.

It is estimated that to plant this church it will cost approximately \$5,000 as start-up costs, and \$2,500 per month to keep it growing. The leadership of this new work is soliciting earnest prayer support from the Church of God, along with financial support.

We thank God for the initiative of the Michigan Conference, the Eldred family, the Church of the Open Bible in Pomona, and the Partain family in seeing the opportunities and pursuing the details of planting these two new churches. We believe that there are countless opportunities in each of the states and communities where we currently have churches, along with innumerable opportunities in other parts of the country, to plant new churches. It is our earnest prayer that each local congregation and each State Conference will look at themselves as church planters and, while the Lord tarries, we pray that many people will be brought to Christ and to a knowledge of the truth through our church-planting efforts. We believe that God is willing to bless in proportion to our willingness to step out in faith in obedience to commands of Scripture.

We also are earnestly praying that the Lord of the harvest will send forth laborers to prepare for Christian service and to assume leadership positions in our new churches. We urge all people of the Church of God to join us in praying earnestly for leadership and for a willingness to step out in faith as God presents us with opportunities.

We greatly appreciate the financial support which many individuals, churches, and conferences have given to the members of the church-planting teams. At this point, nearly all of the expenses of the team members have been met.

CHURCH PLANTING AT ROCKFORD, MICHIGAN

When Dick, Carol, and Tim Eldred moved to this small community with many subdivisions north of Grand Rapids on August 6, they constituted the church.

Just six days later a prospect-finding team sent out by the Outreach and Church Development Department of the Church of God General Conference arrived to assist the Eldreds in finding a congregation.

The team, consisting of Russ Magaw, Jan Stilson, Tom Schmitt, Rob Rand, and John Raymond, spent two weeks surveying the area for prospects. Several members of the Southlawn, Garden Park, and Pennell-wood congregations assisted in the work.

The very first day of prospecting saw the work of the Lord in the lives of those visited. Garden Park pastor Ray Hall and Rob Rand returned after the first morning just glowing with four prospective families. In all, the team found 30 prospects on that first day. By the end of the first week 85 prospects were found in just 241 homes for a success ratio of 35 percent—the highest percentage in the two years General Conference teams have been prospecting.

By the end of the two weeks over 800 homes had been contacted and a newsletter list for North Kent Bible Church had mushroomed to over 300 on the mailing list.

The first meeting of North Kent Bible Church took place September 9 in the Independent Bank. Future

meetings will be held in one of Rockford's elementary schools.

Already the fledgling congregation has a core group of some four families. A fellowship dinner is planned after the second service September 16. Individuals from the three Grand Rapids churches continue praying and sending letters of affirmation to the Eldreds.

The church-planting project is underwritten by the Michigan Conference. Financial aid has come from the Michigan churches and individuals. North Kent Bible Church also receives church development aid from the General Conference.

As of this writing (Aug. 29), we don't know how many attended that first service. In next month's JOURNAL we will provide further news of North Kent Bible Church.

May God be praised, his people blessed, and many persons found for Christ.

PROSPECT FINDING IN DIXON, ILLINOIS

"I met a middle-aged person who had lived a very tough and rugged life before meeting Jesus. I was welcomed in and we sat and talked for 30 minutes or so.

"Listen to what some of our team members have to say:

"'If only one person is won for the Lord from the hundreds of calls it's the greatest feeling, especially when that one is the person you talked to first.'—*Jean Rowe.*

" 'Of the doors that were opened for Jean and me, the people were very friendly and talkative.'—*Jennie Sarber*.

"'The thrill that you get from finding a prospect is second only to the thrill from seeing your prospect coming to church for the first time. Prospecting made it possible for me to stop feeling so guilty.'—Kevin Rademachir.



Oregon Bible College Study Committee

An ad hoc committee was appointed in response to delegate action at the 1984 General Conference to "... explore educational alternatives to our current four-year Bible College for the purpose of preparing ministers, missionaries, and workers in the Church of God. Those findings, with a recommendation, are to be presented to the 1985 General Conference.

The Oregon Bible College Board of Trustees appointed Scott Ross to chair a committee. Other members include Joe James, Dean Urish, David Krogh, and Charles Pryor. Chairman Ross has established a plan for the committee and has assigned strategic tasks to each committee member. He has worked closely with Dr. Charles Pryor and David Krogh to assure accurate data collection. Pastors and members throughout the Church of God will have opportunity to give input to the committee. You are encouraged to share your ideas and dreams for OBC with us as the committee's work proceeds.

Oregon Bible College's Stand on Substance Abuse

At the delegate business session a motion was passed placing the General Conference on record as being opposed to substance abuse, with particular concern regarding the abuse of addictive drugs such as alcohol. No segment of society is immune to the reality of substance abuse. It can subtly become a problem in any home, Christian or not. The motion calls direct attention to a very real problem spanning all classes of American society.

Oregon Bible College has recognized the existence of the problem throughout its history and has maintained a strong policy forbidding the consumption of alcoholic beverages and the use of other addictive drugs while in residence at the college. The College Catalog states, "The use of tobacco, non-medicinal drugs, and alcoholic intoxicants is expressly forbidden." The Student Handbook accents the above as follows: "Activities to be avoided. Some activities in no way promote Christian character nor contribute to a positive testimony. Participation in such events jeopardizes the student's spiritual credibility among other students and calls into question his/her intentions within the Church of God and within the community. The following activities are examples of the above: gambling; attendance at movies containing violence, obscene language, sex, and nudity; use of chemicals representing potential abuse to the body which is the Temple of God. Included are tobacco, alcoholic intoxicants and nonmedicinal drugs. Use of them is viewed as unacceptable." The Oregon Bible College faculty is well aware of the substance abuse problem, and instruction in the advanced ministry classes and counseling course include training in recognition and intervention strategies to help individuals and families cope.

Adult and Continuing Education at Oregon Bible College

During the fall semester Continuing Education classes will be introduced to the Oregon Community. Classes will be advertised throughout the area churches and enrollment will be open to persons regardless of church affiliation. Those classes are being offered as the result of several requests from churches in the area. Classes offered will include Counseling Skills for Laymen, taught by Dr. Charles Pryor, Church Leadership Skills for Laymen, taught by Dale Ramsey; and the Prophecies Contained in Daniel and Revelation, taught by Anthony Buzzard.

Off-Campus Class Sites, Fall 1984

Churches frequently request on-site courses from Oregon Bible College. Plans are in the final stages for offering classes at one or more of the following locations: Hammond, LA; North Hills, OH; South Bend, IN; Northern Illinois; Arkansas; Rockford, MI; Colorado Springs, CO; and Southern California.

Eugene Stilson, Academic Dean, indicates a mid-October start-up time is realistic for the extension classes. That is an exciting dimension of this fall's program. Your support through prayer and promotion will help assure success. If one of the above sites is near you, consider enrolling. Churches not listed above may wish to be included in extension course planning. If your church wishes to be included, please contact Eugene Stilson or Charles Pryor al 815-732-7991 or contact us by letter.

The congregation has been seeking the advice and counsel of Pastor Eldred on many concerns. Emphasis continues on follow-up of interested people. For the



The Message of the Abrahamic Faith Goes Forth



A CONFERENCE WASHELD at Haney, British Columbia, October 5-7, 1984. This gathering of some 120 truth seekers was organized by Clifford Forward, formerly a missionary for Jehovah's Witnesses. His object was to provide a forum for open dialogue between ex-Jehovah's Witnesses and members of other groups. At this conference Bill Wachtel, Dave Opel, and Anthony Buzzard were invited to present the Church of God Abrahamic Faith's view of God and Jesus.

Of all the many topics discussed at this conference, the subject of God and Jesus produced the liveliest interest. Many were intrigued by the teaching, which they had not previously encountered, that Jesus was a man who began to exist at his conception. Numerous copies of the booklet Who is Jesus? were circulated, and every possible question was asked. During these meetings a spirit of love and tolerance prevailed and the Abrahamic Faith made considerable headway. Bill Wachtel, Dave Opel, and Anthony Buzzard have now been invited to present papers at another conference to be held in January in Tucson, Arizona. A number of Catholics are expected to attend in addition to other openminded searchers for Biblical truth from various denominations.

In September a contact was made between Anthony Buzzard and a congregation of Christian Jews in Bellington, Washington. A large quantity of literature was sent to this group, and this resulted in their leader subscribing to *The Restitution Herald* and purchasing "Systematic Theology" which they described as "an excellent presentation of the essentials of the Christian faith." Copies of the booklet *Who is Jesus?*, sponsored by the General Conference, were requested by these Jewish Christians, and they have expressed agreement with it. They are inviting us to make contact with a similar group of Jewish Christians in Israel.

These developments show that an opportunity for wider ministry is now open to the Abrahamic Faith. Of special significance is the world-wide discussion in theological circles about the nature of God and Jesus. The Abrahamic Faith stands ready to speak with conviction on these matters. We will do all we can to supply appropriate literature to those engaged with us in the search for the truth as it is in Jesus.

On October 16, 1984, Merle Patrick was listening with interest to the lecture on Religion in America being given at Ashland Theological Seminary to a graduate class. The speaker was author David Rausch and he had been discussing various prominent writers on Religion in this century. Merle Patrick was startled when David Rausch handed to the class a xerox copy of Anthony Buzzard's article in the October Restitution Herald on the nature of Jesus. Rausch then proceeded to read the article aloud to the students, pointing out that the view presented was a significant one in current theological debate, and deserves careful consideration. The trainee pastors seemed a little taken aback! David Rausch is one of several scholars who are beginning to recognize the soundness of the Abrahamic Faith.

A Special Message from the President

Dr. Pryor Accepts Associate Professorship

In July, 1980, my family and I came to Oregon, Illinois, with a very definite charge and goal to stabilize the administration of Oregon Bible College, to continue to develop the direction of accreditation, and to bring about financial stability. Some of those goals have been realized, some are in process, some have been aborted.

Over those same years, circumstances brought about changes in personnel and in programs. It is for the continued realization of important goals and for the continuing positive development of Oregon Bible College and its personnel that I am requesting you to engage in a special time of prayer for Oregon Bible College.

At 10:30 a.m. on October 9, Dr. Don Locke from Northeast Louisiana University called me and read a letter addressed to me from the Dean of the College of Education. I received the letter the following Friday, the essence of which was as follows:

Upon the recommendation of Dr. Don Locke, Head of the Department of Teacher Education, and with the approval of President Dwight D. Vines, I am pleased to offer you a position as Associate Professor of Education in the Department of Teacher Education at Northeast Louisiana University. Your employment would begin Monday, January 14, 1985.

Monday, October 22, 1984, I accepted the offer from Northeast Louisiana University. I am resigning from my position at Oregon Bible College effective January 15, 1985. My family and I are making plans to sell our home here and move to Monroe, Louisiana. I have been working on the transition plans for Oregon Bible College and will continue to plan a smooth transition. I appreciate the opportunity I have had to serve the Lord through Oregon Bible College the past four and a half years.

On Monday, October 29, a special Board-appointed Study Committee met with Oregon Bible College and General Conference administrators to review the College, its personnel, and it programs, and to make recommendations for the future. Some very carefully designed recommendations have been forwarded to the Board of Trustees/Directors and will be considered at upcoming Board meetings. I believe God has been with me during my years here and especially felt his leading through the Study Committee deliberations on October 29. Please pray for your College and its ongoing development.

Evangelism Explosion Ministries are having a substantial impact upon the Church of God this fall. Pastor Billie Kennedy has launched a semester of training with many members from the Blood River Church participating. The Happy Woods congregation in Louisiana, under the direction of Pastor David Wilsterman, is also involved in Evangelism Explosion training. In late October, an Evangelism Clinic was held at the Brush Creek Church in Ohio with representatives from five churches receiving the training. It is a thrill to see new members being added to the body of Christ through these evangelism efforts.

The Outreach and Church Development Department has been contacted by several groups which are seriously interested in planting new congregations. Russ Magaw, who is assisting Warren Sorenson in the Outreach Department, will be visiting with these groups in late November to explore future steps to be taken to bring new churches into existence.

Several existing Church of God congregations are exploring relocation options and are considering ways of expanding their ministries to more effectively meet the needs of people in their communities. Many members have caught a vision of the possibilities for reaching out to the lost.

A church-growth class is being offered at Oregon Bible College this semester. Students are developing "church-growth eyes," which enable them to see the possibilities for growth and how to apply appropriate strategies to gain maximum results for Christ and his church. Thirteen dedicated students are enrolled in the class and I believe that they have the potential to make a difference in the Church of God as they use their new-found knowledge to further the gospel.

Though enrollment is down at Oregon Bible College, the student body consists of dedicated young people who are spiritually minded. It is a joy to work with young people who are putting Christ first in their lives.

Exciting plans have been made for youth ministry in the Church of God this year under the direction of Kent Ross. A Midwinter Retreat will be held at the Minnesota Campground December 28 - January 1. *Challenge* magazine is being published again and plans are being made for the 1985 Youth Congress at Huntington College.

Through the efforts of Anthony Buzzard, Bill Wachtel, and others, the message of the Abrahamic Faith is being presented to many groups who have a genuine interest in understanding Bible truth. (See a report on page 5.) It seems apparent that the Church of God is taking advantage of a wider ministry opportunity to influence the theological thinking of many people.

I rejoice in the multitudes of Church of God people who have determined to understand God's will for their lives and who have chosen to be fully obedient to his will.

Film Series


A film series on missions is available from the General Conference for showing in local churches. The series is entitled TO EVERY PEOPLE. It consists of four films:



Interviews With State

Arkansas

Arkansas

Ever since the last meeting of the Arkansas State Conference, the member churches have come to a turning point.

That's the hope for the Arkansas churches in the viewpoint of Conference President Joe White. What's made the difference for White to draw that conclusion?

"We had Warren Sorenson to present the whole program, and he excited

us about the possibilities of our becoming a churchplanting conference," explained White.

In the past the conference has prided itself in maintaining a good youth department with its own campgrounds. But changes were made recently to allow the thought of church planting.

"For years our adults spent much time and money getting the campgrounds ready for youth camp. Now we rent a camp for our youth work, which allows us to place our energies into church planting. We'll still maintain a good youth program, but our physical and financial efforts can be placed in new churches," White added.

An area that White looks to for a possible churchplanting site is Conway, AR. Some preliminary calling was done in the city last summer when the churchplanting team from the Outreach Department spent a week in nearby McGintytown.

When asked if there were other areas possible for planting, White indicated that nothing had been discussed yet. The capital city of Little Rock with 350,000 population could support another church, but the New Hope congregation is not quite ready to mother a daughter congregation.

White sees the Rally Day concept practiced by the Arkansas churches as a strong point of the conference. "The five churches meet together three times a year on Rally Day for fellowship on Sunday afternoon. The host church provides the evening meal," he explained. "Because of these one-day meetings our camaraderie is probably stronger than in other State Conferences," White stated.

Five churches comprise the Arkansas Conference. About 80 attended the last meeting at New Hope in Little Rock the week before last summer's General Conference. The conference serves some 300 to 350 Church of God members.

Central High Plains

One of the newest churches in the General Conference exists in the area of the Central High Plains Conference. The church, Pleasant View Bible Church of Colorado Springs, helps boost the overall membership of the conference to over 100 members. Two other churches in the conference are Holbrook, NE, and Arkansas City, KS.

When Conference President Wayne Ewald was asked the strong point of the conference, he had to look at its annual meeting.

"Our annual meeting during a week in August helps the isolated members to gather together for fellowship and Bible study. Because we have so many individuals living throughout the plains, it's important to keep this meeting going," he said.

A couple attended the last conference session from the Colorado Springs congregation, which helped keep a tie with the new church. The Holbrook congregation always hosts the conference, and the local church shows interest in the year-old Colorado group constantly praying for its growth.

Ewald was asked if there were any planting possibilities in other areas of the plains. "I've thought some about that," he replied, "but no official action or discussion has taken place. The city of North Platte. NE, is a growing town and some isolated members live there. We also have three or four families living in Cozad, NE. So there are possibilities." Minnesota

Ask Stan Ross about the future of the Church of God and he'll give you a positive reply. Since June, 1984, he has been serving as Minnesota State Conference President. Already he is upbeat about the prospects for future churches in the state.

"Funds are set up and a survey committee has been established to investigate possible sites for new churches," Ross noted.

"Meetings of the committee have taken place, and thought has been given to one or two areas. Things are just in the talking stage, but we expect something to happen from this survey committee," Ross added.

Traditionally the Minnesota churches have supported their own campgrounds on Long Lake, and Ross sees this work continuing.

Conference Presidents

"Recently we remodeled our kitchen on the campgrounds. All the buildings are insulated and heated, so we are prepared for the Midwinter Retreat which is coming over the holidays," Ross observed.


At least two state conference meetings and several state youth retreats are held annually on the campgrounds. Some of the churches also hold local weekend retreats there during the year as well. Annually a State Sunday School picnic is held on the grounds.

When asked what were the strengths of the conference, Ross replied: "We have a core of dedicated people who want to see the conference progress. I expect we will see many steps toward progress in the next few years."

Five churches and about 450 members make up the Minnesota Conference.

Iowa

"Our Conference is getting interested in church planting because of the feasibility study accomplished in the Davenport area," declared Iowa State Conference President Stan Lawrence, pastor of the Waterloo congregation.



The feasibility study was done by Lee Arp and John Shirk while they were students in the church-planting class two years ago at Oregon Bible

College. "Our missionary committee with Pastor Francis Burnett as chairman is working on this area," Lawrence added.

When asked about the strengths of the conference work, President Lawrence had a ready answer. "A strong Bible foundation is our major focus. At our annual conference we bring in a guest speaker who helps undergird our Scriptural strength."

The conference also holds quarterly meetings in the six churches around the state. In addition, the state board meets once every two months to plan the work. Recently, meetings of the state ministers have added emphasis to the Iowa strengths.

Lawrence also noted a renewed interest in evangelism. "Personal evangelism is starting to show itself," he said. "This can be seen in the Belle Plaine church where, under the leadership of the Rankin families, young people are attending from the area."

Vacation Bible School is also conducted through a combined effort of the Koszta-Belle Plaine churches. Additionally, VBS is offered at the annual conference in Waterloo.

The state has six churches and around 200 members.

Progress at Fox Valley Church of God



When Pastor Ron Macy began his ministry with this fledgling congregation on August 5, 1984, the core group of six families welcomed his leadership in their community. Services have continued in the downtown location, but during the last three months Macy has been spearheading the effort to find a ministry area in or near Aurora

Part of the effort involves prospectfinding calling in a survey format. Macy has visited homes in "four distinct areas of Aurora-the east, south, southcentral, and northwest. I've sampled several neighborhoods in the northwest," the area where Macy lives, he says.

Since August 5 Macy has made over 800 calls and has discovered "between 40 and 50 prospects, 23 of those coming from the northwest neighborhoods." He's held five Bible studies in homes and has begun making follow-up calls to his survey work.

When asked about how he conducts follow-up calls, Macy indicated he's still experimenting to find the correct things to say. "I try to tell the prospect five things about our church," he replied. "But if that list becomes too burdensome. I narrow it down to two items. I stress the kingdom of God, using Daniel 2:44, and the name of Jesus, using John 20:31 as a basis. I write these verses down on a card, along with some introductory statements, and leave it with the candidate. I ask him to study these passages and indicate I'll return to follow-up some more."

Weekly attendance at the downtown meeting place averages around 35. Up to 15 or 20 persons come with Elder Doug Whisenant, who brings them from his area. Several of this group are Hispanic children.

Macy has continued a correspondence Greek course from Moody Bible Institute and began a self-taught course in Spanish using tapes from the local library.

Macy feels that a ministry area in the northeast has been identified. 


Financial Update





Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors met in Oregon, Illinois, January 24, 25, for its annual midwinter long-range planning meeting. Among the items discussed and acted upon during the meeting were:

1) Consideration of the 1985 General Conference summer program and schedule. On pages 2 and 3 of this JOURNAL is preliminary information about the summer Conference. Reservation forms will be available in local churches later this spring.

2) Review of the financial reports of the Conference and College.

3) Approval of the financial review prepared by Ramsey Accounting of Warsaw, Indiana.

4) Consideration of the Oregon Bible College Study Committee Report.

5) Review of the work of the Oregon Bible College Senate.

6) Discussion of proposed recommendations and Constitutional amendments to be taken to the delegates at the summer Conference. Three of the recommendations are on the adjoining page.

7) Review of Executive Director's State of the Church Message.

8) Approval of extensive student recruitment plans for Oregon Bible College.

9) Review of the work of the Executive Director.

10) Long-range planning. Consideration was given to the future of the General Conference and ways that we can be more effective in doing the work that God has called us to do.

Next Board Meeting

The Board will meet again in Oregon, Illinois, May 2-4. An open session of the Board will be held with the ministers at 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 2. Concerns or ideas regarding the General Conference work may be addressed to any member of the Board or the Executive Director.

Restitution Herald

The Restitution Herald will observe its 75th anniversary in October. All subscribers during this year will receive a special collector's edition of the 75th anniversary issue. If you are not currently a subscriber or have not renewed for 1985, I urge you to do so immediately.

Strategic Giving Programs

Again this year, we are inviting all Church of God families to make a commitment to one of the General Conference giving programs: The Founders' Circle or the Development Council. Members of the Founders' Circle agree to contribute \$120 to \$499 during this calendar year. Members of the Development Council agree to commit \$500 or more in gifts.

We appreciate the many Church of God families which have contributed regularly to the work of the Conference in past years. Contributions from individuals are very significant to the work of the Conference and College.

Some of our contributors have requested a book of coupons which would serve as a regular reminder to send gifts to the Conference and College. The book can be kept with one's checkbook and bills to be paid and contributions can be sent on a regular basis.

Each coupon will contain the donor's name, address, and General Conference account number, along with the date, amount paid, and what the gift is for. Postage-paid envelopes will be provided along with the coupon book.

If you wish to secure a coupon book for 1985, please use the coupon on the last page.

Financial Update

As of December 31, contributions for the current fiscal year were approximately \$6,000 short of our Goal for Giving. The goal adopted by the delegates in August, 1984, called for contributions of \$30,000 each month.

We are especially thankful for many year-end gifts to the Conference/College. The contributions of many people make it possible for the ministry of the Church of God to be sustained.

Constitution Revisions

At its long-range planning meeting, January 24 and 25, the Board of Directors adopted three recommendations which will be brought to the delegates at the summer Conference. Since these recommendations involve Constitutional amendments, they are being published in this and subsequent issues of the PROGRESS JOURNAL in order to comply with Constitutional requirements for amendments.

RECOMMENDATION ONE

We recommend the creation of a nominating committee for positions on the Board of Directors.

Explanation: There are two problems connected with our present system of nomination from the floor and electing on the following day. Delegates are unable to determine the wishes of their local church regarding possible nominees before arriving at Conference. We have also faced the problem of not having sufficient nominations required by the Constitution. This has required a last-minute search for a candidate willing to run.

This recommendation can be implemented by replacing Article IV, Section 4 with the following: "A nominating committee consisting of the State or District Conference Boards of the Church of God will submit name(s) of potential nominees for the General Conference Board of Directors by January 1 of the year of the election. Churches not represented by a State or District Conference may also submit nominees by January 1 of the year of the election. The name of each nominee must be accompanied with a resume of the individual. Names and resumes will be submitted to the Executive Director of the Conference and will be printed in the summer *Progress Journal.*"

New Section 5. "Nominations printed in the *Progress Journal* will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship."

Renumber Section 5 to Section 6 and delete "nominations shall be made from the floor; but"

Renumber Section 6 to Section 7. Renumber Section 7 to Section 8.

RECOMMENDATION TWO

We recommend that procedures be established for the introduction of resolutions, major motions (i.e.,

motions that have substantial effect on longstanding policy), or recommendations to the General Conference business session.

Explanation: Since our Conference is based upon the representative principle, we believe it is important for our churches to be aware of resolutions, major motions, or recommendations which will be acted upon by the delegates. Advance notice will permit local churches to instruct their delegates how to vote on these issues. Therefore, an orderly procedure should be established so that our churches and members can be properly informed of proposed action. We believe this can best be implemented by making the following Constitutional revisions:

Article III—new Section 2. "Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations should be submitted to the Board of Directors no later than four months before the Conference business session convenes. Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations may originate with individuals, churches, Conferences, or the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will receive and review the items for publication in the summer *Progress Journal*. Resolutions, major motions, and recommendations may also be submitted from the floor at the delegate session, but they may not be voted upon until the next Conference. The resolutions, major motions, and recommendations submitted from the floor will be published in the summer *Progress Journal* prior to the next Conference."

Renumber Article III—Section 2 to Section 3.

RECOMMENDATION THREE

We recommend that a member of the Board of Directors be permitted to succeed himself for one additional term.

Explanation: As the work of the Church of God General Conference and Oregon Bible College has expanded over the past few years, the policy and procedures of our operation have become more complex. Board members who serve for only one fouryear term often find their term coming to an end about the time they have a full grasp of all the work of the Conference and College. Permitting reelection for one additional term would provide more continuity for the Board. This recommendation can be implemented by amending the Constitution as follows:

Article IV—Section 6—replace the words "no director shall succeed himself for a second term," with the words "a director may succeed himself **for** one **a**dditional term."

Farewell to Pryors

It was with sadness that we bade Dr. Charles Pryor and family farewell on January 6, 1985. Charles, Lois, Bryan, and Todd had become an enjoyable fixture in all of our lives here in Oregon, Illinois. We will surely miss them.

Dr. Prvor served Oregon Bible College as President for four and a half years. He came to the Bible College with the sincerest desire to see growth as a result of his leadership. He was given the task of maintaining high academic standards. Because of that goal, Oregon Bible College is the better for it today. We are now in the midst of a campaign to establish a solid financial base for the future of Oregon Bible College. This was a vision of Dr. Pryor's that was brought to fruition. A strong staff with accredited degrees is now in place; a well supported curriculum is in place, though there are some revisions taking place to emphasize a one-year program aimed at the student who wants to attend for a limited time; and a recognized library that is part of the Northern Illinois Library System. One of his greatest contributions was to build a positive image of Oregon Bible College in the community. He also had a genuine interest in each individual and showed patience when others would have "thrown the book at them." We thank Dr. Pryor for his positive contributions to Oregon Bible College.

We in the Oregon Church also miss Lois. She was always warm, hospitable, and willing to help whenever asked. Her many talents contributed so much to our community and church. Bryan and Todd found their niches on our lives here. (Thanks, Todd, for selling me your beehive.)

We pray God's blessing on the Pryors in their new area of service.

OBC Senate

OBC is now being administered by the Senate, which includes the OBC staff as well as David Krogh, Warren Sorenson, and Russell Magaw, members of the General Conference staff who are teaching courses for the College. The team concept of leadership has worked well thus far. A sense of excitement and a feeling of joint ownership has occurred as a result of being part of the administration of the College. I feel we are governing ourselves more in the model of how a church is to function as directed by Paul in 1 Corinthians 12.

This may not be the traditional structure of a College, but faced with a difficult situation at the resignation of Dr. Pryor, the Board felt that this was the proper course to follow. This semester is serving as a testing period to discern the best route for the future. As Chairman of the Senate, I have been satisfied to see everyone increase his/her work load and productivity.

The "Blitz Weekend," occurred on February 22-24, was a new approach to recruitment. Almost all of the staff and students left Oregon to meet prospective students and to represent ourselves to our denomination. It was exciting to be a part of approximately 30 worship services on one day. We're thankful to all who welcomed us and listened to our message. Though it was an exhausting weekend, we wait upon God to bless the fruits of our labor.

A New Church Is Launched in Bellevue, Washington

"We have experienced some really uplifting meetings and fellowship since we renewed efforts to bring the gospel and Biblical counsel to the Puget Sound area. We weekly thrill at the opportunity in our hands and would ask the brethren everywhere to pray for the furtherance of the faith here." So writes Arlen Rankin, pastor of the Faith Bible Church which regularly meets for Sunday School and worship services at 14821 Southeast 16th Street in Bellevue. Attendance runs in the mid to upper twenties with nonmembers regularly attending and visitors who are also involved in the services.

The launching of this church in August '84 came after a history of work being done in the greater Seattle area dating back to the 50's. A concentrated effort by Bro. Rankin produced results beyond expectations. Thus it was decided to locate a place to meet. Such a place was found in Bellevue and regular services were begun there on August 5th.

We rejoice that another congregation has been formed and that the Lord's ministry is being extended through church planting.

Relocation of the Valley Bible Church—Glendale, California

An uplifting service on February 10th marked an important step in the development of the Valley Bible Church. For about ten years the congregation met in facilities located on the corner of Lake and Western in Glendale, California.

It became more and more apparent that it was difficult for the English-speaking congregation to reach and minister to a neighborhood with many Spanish-speaking people. Because of this problem it seemed wise to relocate. The Lord opened doors and blessed their intention to relocate by the sale of their property and buildings. The congregation believed that God wanted the church to grow and thus it was united in the philosophy of moving to an area where there was potential to experience growth.

The first services in Simi Valley, California, were conducted February 10th in a rented facility. This target area of ministry northwest of the church's former location in Glendale was chosen because of its growth potential.

Michael Gallagher has been working with the congregation as part-time pastor. The congregation intends to hire a full-time pastor and launch a full-time program of reaching out to the people of Simi Valley. A great deal of background preparation work has been going on within the congregation to insure that the church will be ready to meet its opportunities and move forward in growth.

Sharing Good News

From Eden Valley, Minnesota—"Good news—the ideas of a prospecting club is on the move." Pastor Dave Cheatwood reports this information about the formation

of a group of adults and young people who intend to develop a regular program of prospect finding. This came as a result of a prospect-survey team from the General Conference under the direction of Russell Magaw who has been assisting the Outreach and Church Development Department in extending assistance to local churches.

From Baton Rouge, Louisiana—"Things are going well; we're excited about our newcomers." These words from Charlotte Mattison report exciting results of the prospect work done by a calling team under the direction of Russ Magaw. It was thrilling to hear the news that six new people were in services as a result of the calling.

The results which came immediately from the Baton Rouge congregation are somewhat unusual. An important part of the prospect program is that of follow-up. Usually you don't see this kind of result so quickly. It takes repeated follow-up and the building of a relationship with the prospects in order to get them involved in the church.

We need to keep in mind that prospect finding is just exactly what the name implies—finding prospects. At that point they are only prospects. It will take time and effort in order to get them involved in the church. This may come through mailings, phone calls, visits to the home, and special events and activities at the church as well as activities outside of the church program.

Answering the Door When Opportunity Knocks

Exciting things are happening in the Church of God. In looking over the reports of this outreach page let's note some of the ways the local church is progressing.

- 1. Church planting—the extension of the gospel through starting new churches is necessary if we are to be obedient and faithful to God.
- Helping the local church—the expansion of existing churches is also a vital part of God's church. The OCD Department has been assisting the Glendale congregation in its relocation project. Prospectcalling teams have been sent to assist in neighborhood-calling programs.

These two major ministries reflect the philosphy of the General Conference and the Outreach and Church Development Department. The extension of the gospel through church planting and the expansion of the local church are both extrèmely important. We are committed to helping local churches in the development and strengthing of their church. We are also committed to obedience to the call of God to start new churches. If this work is to move steadily forward, we need more workers in the Lord's harvest. Will you join us in praying for additional workers? "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Therefore beseech the Lord of the Harvest to send out workers into his harvest." We call upon the members of the Church of God to unite with us in praying this prayer.

Interview With A State President

Two years ago at a meeting of the State Conference the delegates expressed determination to become a church-planting conference. When asked recently about the progress, Conference President Kent Ross revealed that first steps have been taken.

"Currently two feasibility studies are underway in northern Illinois," he noted. "One study will cover the St. Charles area which is near Geneva where the Wilson brothers established early Church of God work in the 1860's."

"Another study will look into the possibilities for a work in the Mendota area," he added. "It is close enough to our Dixon Church that a new work could easily be monitored by the Dixon congregation."

Ross also points to what is happening at Aurora as an example of a fledgling congregation making use of church-growth/planting concepts.

"The Aurora congregation has been revived and revitalized because of its work in finding prospects and its willingness to deal with new people," he said. "The group is looking into acquiring either a church building or some other site to help sustain new growth."


In spite of the small steps forward the feasibility studies represent, Ross would like to see more activity from the 11-church, 800-member conference.

"We need a stronger sense of vision regarding church planting," he confesses. "With the strength of existing churches in the state, many new churches could be mothered and thrive in new areas," he concluded.

The conference meets quarterly and alternates sites between the northern and southern churches.

For over 60 years George Ring has been a member of the Church of God. He's enjoyed his association with God and his church through the decades. Perhaps a glimpse into his youthful years helps gain renewed appreciation for his later associations with the people of God.

Music has led Ring around the world in the Navy and the circus, performing for royalty, politicians, and common people everywhere.

He played brass instruments during most of his concerts while in the Navy under the leadership of the famous march master, John Phillip Sousa. Ring recalls several incidents during the Sousa era of his life.

Later he performed in England for the king and queen; then still later persons included in American audiences were such notables as Theodore Roosevelt, William H. Taft, and Woodrow Wilson.

After his playing days with the Navy, Ring joined the circus where he performed in two-a-day shows in spots all over the United States. He enjoyed his playing stint with the circus best because the crowds of ordinary folks were most appreciative.

During his 30's Ring settled down to farming and raising a family near Puxico, Missouri, where he lives in retirement today. He did not turn his back on music, and continued to play the violin during most of his farm years.

For the past 60 years Ring has allowed what he learned in music to help in his walk with the Lord. He

loves people, enjoys lending a helping hand, and attempts to do things himself, even though hindered by poor health.

His two children, Jim Ring and Sue Boster, are members of the East Peoria Community Church of God and they carry on the faith of their father.

1985 Annual General Conference

Enclosed with this issue of the PROGRESS JOURNAL is a brochure and registration form for the 1985 General Conference. Additional registration forms are available in local churches. A separate registration form should be filled out for each person attending conference.

I urge each church to send delegates and interested persons to this conference. A number of important matters will be brought before the delegates. Of special importance is the Oregon Bible College Study Committee report which recommends a reorganization of our structure and a redesigning of our program. The decisions made at this conference will help shape the direction of the Church of God through the rest of this century if the Lord tarries.

Each member church of 15 or more members is entitled to one delegate for each 50 of its active members or fraction thereof. Conference delegates play a very strategic role. Their function is to make the wishes of their local churches known as decisions are made on the conference floor. They have an equally important responsibility to report back to their local churches the decisions that have been made. Delegates are two-way ambassadors: they represent the church to the conference and the conference to the church. A position description for conference delegates appears on page 7 of this issue. As delegates are selected, please keep in mind the work which they are expected to do.

The summer PROGRESS JOURNAL will contain a complete listing of the recommendations and constitutional amendments which will be acted upon by the delegates. Reports of departments and special boards and committees will also be presented. A budget draft for the fiscal year June 1, 1986, through May 31, 1987, will be proposed. After being reviewed by the membership. delegates should be instructed how to accurately reflect the wishes of the congregation. Concerted prayer of delegates and members should accompany the preparation for the General Conference and the business sessions during conference. As we look to the future it is our earnest desire that God will direct us as a people in the use of our talents and resources. We live in a time of unparalleled opportunity for the Church of God. It is only as we are submissive and obedient to the Lord that we can be successful as a people.

Minister's Conference

As this is written, Church of God pastors are preparing

to attend the annual Church of God Ministerial Conference in Oregon, Illinois. The theme of the conference is "A Pastor's Personal Growth." The program begins with an evening of praise at the Oregon Church with a musical program under the direction of Dale Ramsey. On Tuesday and Wednesday, special sessions will be held on the emotional hazards of the ministry, the minster and assertion, the minister and role conflict, the minister and depression, the minister and self-esteem, and the minister and stress.

The theme of Thursday's program deals with the secular humanist movement and the inerrancy and authority of the Scriptures.

Wednesday evening Oregon Bible College and the Alumni Association are sponsoring a banquet for pastors and alumni. Thursday afternoon an open session with the Board of Directors is being held.

The program committee for 1985 is the Northeast Conference ministers.

The annual Minister's Conference is a time of spiritual enrichment for all pastors. We appreciate the financial assistance that many churches give to support this aid to our ministers.

Many other Church of God families have become members of the Founder's Circle with a commitment of \$120-499 per year. The faithful support of many individuals, families, churches, and conferences, make it possible to underwrite the important ministries of the conference and college.

During the four days of April 23-26, 1985, a four-member team from the Outreach and Church Development Department assisted 15 members of the Raymore Church of God in prospect calling. A total of 726 calls were attempted, resulting in 347 calls and 81 prospects found. Follow-up of the prospects will continue for the next two months through Vacation Bible School time scheduled June 3-7 in the evenings. The church is pastored by Don Ward. Team members from the Outreach Department included Dennis Cheatwood, Donna Enyart, Russ Magaw, and Jan Stilson.

God's hand was evident throughout the effort; in many calling situations he provided unique moments of acquaintance and bridge-building for future gospel work. To God be the glory.

PROGRESS JOURNAL

Constitution Revisions

At its long-range planning meeting, January 24 and 25, the Board of Directors adopted three recommendations which will be brought to the delegates at the summer Conference. Since these recommendations involve Constitutional amendments, they are being published in this and subsequent issues of the PROGRESS JOURNAL in order to comply with Constitutional requirements for amendments.

RECOMMENDATION ONE

We recommend the creation of a nominating committee for positions on the Board of Directors.

Explanation: There are two problems connected with our present system of nomination from the floor and electing on the following day. Delegates are unable to determine the wishes of their local church regarding possible nominees before arriving at Conference. We have also faced the problem of not having sufficient nominations required by the Constitution. This has required a last-minute search for a candidate willing to run.

This recommendation can be implemented by replacing Article IV, Section 4 with the following: "A nominating committee consisting of the State or District Conference Boards of the Church of God will submit name(s) of potential nominees for the General Conference Board of Directors by January 1 of the year of the election. Churches not represented by a State or District Conference may also submit nominees by January 1 of the year of the election. The name of each nominee must be accompanied with a resume of the individual. Names and resumes will be submitted to the Executive Director of the Conference and will be printed in the summer *Progress Journal.*"

New Section 5. "Nominations printed in the *Pro*gress *Journal* will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship."

Renumber Section 5 to Section 6 and delete "nominations shall be made from the floor; but"

Renumber Section 6 to Section 7. Renumber Section 7 to Section 8.

RECOMMENDATION TWO

We recommend that procedures be established for the introduction of resolutions, major motions (i.e., APRIL, MAY, 1985 motions that have substantial effect on longstanding policy), or recommendations to the General Conference business session.

Explanation: Since our Conference is based upon the representative principle, we believe it is important for our churches to be aware of resolutions, major motions, or recommendations which will be acted upon by the delegates. Advance notice will permit local churches to instruct their delegates how to vote on these issues. Therefore, an orderly procedure should be established so that our churches and members can be properly informed of proposed action. We believe this can best be implemented by making the following Constitutional revisions:

Article III—new Section 2. "Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations should be submitted to the Board of Directors no later than four months before the Conference business session convenes. Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations may originate with individuals, churches, Conferences, or the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will receive and review the items for publication in the summer *Progress Journal*. Resolutions, major motions, and recommendations may also be submitted from the floor at the delegate session, but they may not be voted upon until the next Conference. The resolutions, major motions, and recommendations submitted from the floor will be published in the summer *Progress Journal* prior to the next Conference."

Renumber Article III—Section 2 to Section 3.

RECOMMENDATION THREE

We recommend that a member of the Board of Directors be permitted to succeed himself for one additional term.

Explanation: As the work of the Church of God General Conference and Oregon Bible College has expanded over the past few years, the policy and procedures of our operation have become more complex. Board members who serve for only one four-year term often find their term coming to an end about the time they have a full grasp of all the work of the Conference and College. Permitting reelection for one additional term would provide more continuity for the Board. This recommendation can be implemented by amending the Constitution as follows:

Article IV—Section 6—replace the words "no director shall succeed himself for a second term," with the words "a director may succeed himself for one additional term."

GROUNDBREAKING AT SOUTH BEND

Groundbreaking services were held Sunday April 21, 1985, in South Bend, Indiana, for Timberland Bible Church. The congregation is now known as Hope Chapel but will become known by the new name upon relocation in the new facility. Hope Chapel merged with the Morning Star Church in November of 1980 and has worked actively since that time to find land, to build a new facility, and to engage in a larger ministry for the Lord, doing together what we could not do individually.

The new facility will be built in two phases, the first of which will be 11,000 square feet, including a sanctuary seating 300, library/lounge, offices and education wing. The first phase of the project will cost about \$600,000 including land, professional fees, and construction. This portion of the building should be completed and ready for occupancy this fall. The second phase of the building will include a kitchen and a fellowship/recreational space.

The congregation wishes to take this opportunity to express sincere appreciation to brethren across the country for participation in the Church Builders appeal, and also to those who invested in our ministry through the Church Bond Program which financed our new building. As Paul told the Philippians, we "always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel." Thank you all, and may God use each of us in his service!

ROLE OF CONFERENCE DELEGATES

The Preamble to the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference states that "Delegates and interested members of the Church of God will meet at a designated place and time to confer in all matters pertaining to the spiritual life and business of the churches."

The Constitution then proceeds to state in Article II that "each member church of 15 or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each 50 of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

In addition to church delegates, the Constitution provides for delegates at large as follows:

- "a) the Board of Directors and one delegate from each state or district Conference;
- b) the following licensed or ordained ministers: one who is actively pastoring a church; a full-time employee of the General Conference; those who have met either of the above qualifications and have reached retirement age."

Conference delegates play a very strategic role in the work of the Church of God. Delegates from local churches should be selected with great care. Delegates shall be active members of the Church of God, and it is important that they be able to successfully represent their local church and have interest in the work of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College.

Before attending Conference, delegates should:

- 1) Carefully read the reports, recommendations, constitutional amendment, proposed budgets, and other information regarding the summer Conference.
- 2) Meet with the Church Board, or the congregation, to determine the wishes of the local church regarding the business which will be transacted at the Conference.
- Be certain that the local church secretary has submitted a delegate form listing active members, along with the names of the delegates.
- 4) Send a registration form to the General Conference to make reservations for attendance prior to July 20.
- The delegate will have important duties to perform while in attendance at Conference:
- 1) Register with the Credentials Committee upon arrival at Conference.
- 2) Attend all business sessions of the Conference.
- 3) If unable to attend a business session, contact an alternate delegate from your local church to serve.
- Take careful notes of decisions that are made and information which is shared.
- 5) Be prepared to make a personal commitment during Conference to the financial support of Conference/College ministries.
- After returning home, the delegate's work must continue by:
- 1) Presenting a report to the congregation and/or Church Board, sharing information from Conference, and decisions which were made.
- 2) Encouraging participation of local members in General Conference programs and activities.
- Contacting local church families to encourage them to make a commitment to send at least \$10 per month to the work of the Conference/College.

The work of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College will be greatly strengthened by delegates who take their responsibility seriously and who will follow the guidelines mentioned above.

Rebuilding the Body at Oregon Bible College




Brian Atra, pastor of the Church of God in Little Rock, traveled up here and for a week taught an intense session every day on the Gospel of John, and taught other theology classes also.





Description of Church of God General Conference

The Church of God General Conference was incorporated in the State of Illinois as a corporation not for profit, June 3, 1922, under the name "National Bible Institution." The corporation name was changed May 17, 1961, to "Church of God General Conference."

The purpose for which the Church of God General Conference is incorporated is to assist Church of God members, churches, and conferences to perform their commission to feed the Church of God and preach the gospel to all the world by providing trained personnel, services, resources, and materials.—Article I, Section 1, By-Laws.

The Church of God General Conference directly serves approximately 6,500 baptized members of the Church of God, 77 member churches, 14 State and District Conferences, approximately 24 nonmember churches, and the public at large.

The offices of the Corporation are located at 131 North 3rd Street in Oregon, Illinois.

The Conference is organized into three departments: Publishing, Outreach and Church Development, and Business Administration. Oregon Bible College, which was established August 8, 1939, is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Conference. Two subsidiary corporations were established August 18, 1982: Oregon Bible College Development Foundation, and Church of God Investment Fund.

Delegates and interested members of the Church of God meet annually in August to confer in all matters pertaining to the spiritual life and business of the churches.

Each member church of 15 or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, is entitled to one delegate for each 50 of its active members or fraction thereof.

A member church is a Church of God which adheres to the Statement of Faith contained in the Constitution and which has on record at the General Conference office a Statement of Affiliation with the General Conference.

Members of the Board of Directors, one delegate from each State or District Conference, and certain licensed and ordained ministers are recognized as delegates at large.

A seven-member Board of Directors is elected by the delegates for four-year terms. These Board members also serve as the Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College and the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation.




August

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

As I review the work of the Church of God General Conference for the past year, I am pleased with our accomplishments, and I am very appreciative of all who have contributed to our success during the year: Board members, our staff, our pastors, and many laymembers.

I have considered it a privilege to serve in a position of leadership in the Church of God during the past 12 months. As Executive Director I have been involved in the following activities: services conducted at 19 churches, Evangelism Explosion Clinic conducted in Ohio, taught classes at the 1985 Christian Workers' Seminar, taught a Church-Growth Class at Oregon Bible College first semester, taught Evangelism Explosion Level I and II at Oregon Bible College second semester, served on the Oregon Bible College Senate and on various Senate committees. served as chairman of the Executive Council, carried out the duties of secretary/treasurer of the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, served as secretary of the Ministers' fund, and served as a member of the Oregon Bible College Study Committee.

I have had a very optimistic attitude about the work of the General Conference during the past year. I believe that many significant things are taking place in the Church of God. Many programs are bearing fruit, and I am confident that we are building on a solid foundation.

A Vision for the Future

My staff and I are giving attention to projecting a vision into the 21st century. Our vision must be stated in terms of our perception of God's desire for the Church of God. Our vision must challenge our membership and point out the general direction which our movement must take.

Once our vision is clearly established, then goals can be established which become specific and measurable steps in accomplishing the vision. Programs and activities will arise out of our goals which will move us toward those goals and the greater vision beyond.

As leaders of the Church of God, I believe it is important for our staff and the Board of Directors to project a vision for our entire movement. Our organization and our churches can then establish specific goals and develop programs which will move us all forward in the accomplishment of the vision.

If there is no vision, the following things are likely to occur:

- 1. We will become ingrown and self-centered.
- 2. It becomes impossible to do real evaluation.
- 3. We tend to run programs for programs' sake.
- 4. We lose our passion for ministry.
- 5. It is hard to stimulate lay leaders.
- 6. It becomes easy to settle into maintaining a ministry rather than developing it.
- 7. We tend to not plan far enough ahead.
- 8. There tends to be an emphasis on activity rather than output.

Personnel

The success of the General Conference work in the past several years can be attributed in large part to the work of our dedicated staff. Many staff members work long hours above and beyond basic requirements in order to serve our churches and our membership.

The staff is organized into three departments as follows:

General Services: Bill Burnham, Director; Becky Hall, computer operator and secretary to Executive Director.

Publishing: Russell Magaw, Director; Gordon Landry, Managing Editor; Betty Hall, typesetter and receptionist; Judy Myers, mailing department and secretary; Barbara Landry, proofreader.

Outreach and Church Development: Warren Sorenson, Director; Judy Myers, Missions Coordinator and secretary; Kent Ross, Youth Coordinator; Russell Magaw, assistant.

Proposed Organizational Revisions

If the delegates choose to approve the report of the Oregon Bible College Study Committee, I am committed to the complete implementation of our reorganization.

I view the study committee recommendations as a very desirable refinement of our present structure to

emphasize even more fully the two-fold work of the Conference and our churches; namely, education and evangelism. Creating an organizational structure which makes education and evangelism the two main departments of our organization will tighten the focus and bring much closer coordination of all of our efforts. The total utilization of staff and resources toward the two-fold purpose will inevitably be productive.

Financial Situation

Much of the strength of the General Conference is attributed to the faithful financial support of our family of supporters. During the past year, contributions from individuals have remained approximately the same. However, contributions from churches, conferences, and groups increased, which gave us a 7% overall increase in contributions for the year.

Our two strategic giving programs for the General Conference—Development Council and Founders' Circle—continue to generate regular contributions from our donors. Earlier this year a contribution coupon booklet was made available for people who wish to make systematic contributions to the Conference. A number of contributors have requested the coupon book. A copy can be secured by filling out the form on the back page of this *Journal*.

We encourage those who have not yet made a commitment for 1985 to do so immediately.

Business Office Report to the Board of Directors

Bill Burnham, Director

A year ago this report dealt with changes and revisions of procedures and activities, advising that only refinements were anticipated in the future. This has been basically true and refinements will continue to be made.

Sr. Becky Hall has very adequately assumed the computer operation during the past year. A major savings in clerical time occurred using the computer for tabulation of contributions.

Energy savings have resulted from heating system changes in the Men's Dorm. In fact, the gas company delayed the December billing while investigating the reduced usage. Thermostats have been installed in the Women's Dorm which is expected to provide further savings.

Food service offered this semester appears to be satisfactory from all viewpoints, students and administratively. While we need more time to adequately determine that the operation is self-funding, the experience of this semester will be invaluable to us for development of future operation. Sr. Mary Hoffman serves as manager/cook, Sr. Shirley Wagganer (student's spouse) as cook, and Darlene Day (student) assists as needed. Sr. Hoffman attempts to balance nutrition and student tastes and most comments have been favorable. Sr. Connie Ramsey contributed considerable time to the initial effort to reestablish inhouse food service and continues to provide consultant assistance. At semester-end a full tabulation will be made to assure a self-funding operation. While 85-86 student food charges have been frozen at the current price, every effort will be made to operate within that figure, made easier with additional students.

David Hall provides efficient maintenance for all properties. He is assisted by part-time student workers.

The General Conference building on Third Street is presently listed with a realtor. The sale of this building and the construction of a new facility on the college campus will facilitate the utilization of staff and space.

The Business Office serves the other departments of the Conference/College by providing vehicles for Gospel teams, the Chorale, church-planting teams, and visits to churches. We are in urgent need of dependable automobiles. Please see page 24 for a way you can help.

REPORT TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

There's a new spirit of interest in evangelism in various forms moving through the Church of God. This is especially significant when we realize that attitude precedes action. With the change in attitude in many of our churches, it is thus logical that we can expect a change in the activities and what will happen in many of our local churches.

Several congregations have expressed an interest in learning more about prospect finding and also of having a team come to their area to assist them in getting a program going. David Krogh's Evangelism Explosion Clinics have sparked interest as well as results regarding a specific method of evangelism. People are beginning to see conversions, and others want to see "that happen in their church" also. Conferences and local churches are getting on the church planting bandwagon. Small churches which have been "quiet" for many years have come to life and are asking for direction and help.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand" (Rom. 13:11, 12). Rephrase this truth in terms that apply to our situation in the Church of God: "Now is the time when we are awakening from our sense of comfort, peace, and satisfaction in a ministry directed to ourselves, and we are beginning to look toward the lost with a ministry of redemption." Certainly the night is far spent; the day is at hand. We have seen a lack of results when we have concentrated on preaching to ourselves. Discontentment with this has spurred us to a more obedient response to the Lord's commission for his church. Now is the time for the Church of God to publicly apply the message of truth to a people-centered ministry.

My work as Director of the Department of Outreach and Church Development for the past year can be summarized as being a pastor's pastor, helping local churches, and extending the work of the Church of God through church planting. The following will provide a bit more detail.

Pastoral Consultation

One of the unique and frustrating aspects of being a pastor is that his role is usually not very well clarified. He is expected to be busy and to do a lot of things, but just what that is and what he is to do is often enveloped in fog. Almost everybody in the church is willing to tell you what the pastor's work is. The problem arises in that everybody's description of his job is different.

A second contributing cause of pastoral frustration is in recognizing the need for change and either not knowing how to create that change or meeting a brick wall of resistance. Quite often when you rattle the cage or rock the boat, you have to deal with some problems as a result.

Serving as a listening ear offers help to pastors. In the meantime it is important that as a conference we work toward the major solution, that of coming to a clearer understanding of leadership and followership. This will necessitate both pastor and congregation learning the true meaning of leadership and to be supportive of one another.

As Director of the Outreach and Church Development Department I have been called upon to assist when tension between the pastor and the congregation became too intense. The approach taken in these cases has been to identify the issues, seeking to clarify what the congregation expects from the pastor, to clarify the congregation's responsibility regarding their pastor, and to understand the congregation's philosophy of ministry. The next step is to work through the same questions from the pastor's viewpoint. The final step has been to seek ways to resolve any differences in relation to the issues. An underlying principle has been to sort out the issues and seek to resolve them, rather than trying to establish blame.

Pastoral Search

Several congregations have been working through my office in looking for a replacement pastor. This provides for a third party to work between prospective candidates and the interested church. Pastors may be willing to consider a move, but want to find out more about the church and community before getting into serious negotiations. Churches feel comfortable with the same option. Usually I contact a number of pastors and ask if they would be willing to have their name considered for further discussion and possibly to talk with a representative from the church. At this stage of the game, there is no commitment from either the pastor or the church This is simply a preliminary step of investigation.

Churches have an opportunity to talk with potential pastoral candidates and to learn their thinking relative to

the church and its ministry and to compare their thinking with that of the prospective pastor. This allows for a time of discussion before it becomes necessary to make a decision. It allows a pastor to pursue a possible move without conveying to his church that he may be "moving on." It allows both the pastor and congregation to learn about the other, their thinking, etc., without making a commitment. Through the process those most interested rise to the top. At this point the negotiations are taken over by the local church. This provides a service to both the local churches and the pastors.

Consultation and On-Site Assistance to Local Churches

The development of the local church is a priority need within the Church of God. In this regard I have met with congregations, giving assistance in program development, helping to determine a focus and direction for the church, clarifying a specific philosophy of ministry for the church, providing assistance regarding expansion and/or relocation, extension through church planting, mediating between the pastor and the congregation when tensions between them exist, presenting instruction seminars, and working with the elders of the church in planning strategies for future development by the church.

This part of the work is enriching for me personally and it gives me an opportunity to work in a personal way with members of the various churches. It is my conviction that it is essential for conference staff to have personal contact with those in our local churches. The philosophy of the conference as a service organization becomes real when the local church can experience personal service from individuals on the conference staff.

Prospect-Calling Assistance

The prospect-finding method is a preliminary step in the process of evangelism. It is only a means of locating people for further followup contact. Using OBC students as a prospect-finding team has provided the local church with assistance in its evangelism program. This offers an on-site teaching demonstration. For the student it provides a field experience. Learning while doing greatly supplements classroom theory. Also the excitement of being on the front line and seeing some results does much to stimulate the student for further service and study.

Prospect-finding teams have been involved in calling programs at Rockford, Dixon, and Aurora, Illinois; Omaha, Nebraska; Colorado Springs, Colorado; North Hills and Columbia Station, Ohio; McGintytown and Conway, Arkansas; Phillips Ranch, California; North Kent, Michigan; Baton Rouge, Louisiana; and Raymore, Missouri.

Russ Magaw has been a big help in serving as a supervisor for some of these teams. Jan Stilson has also been involved in the calling program.

At least two summer ministries are in the stages of preparation at the present time for this summer.

SUMMER/1985

Church Planting

A church-planting class was taught at OBC which covered the basics of church planting.

Two new churches were launched; the Phillips Ranch Bible Church and North Kent Bible Church.

I worked with the Michigan State Conference board and Dick Eldred in seeing this church coming to reality. The prospecting team assisted in the development of a nucleus for the establishment of the church.

I worked with Bobby Lee Partain in laying the groundwork for the church at Phillips Ranch. The prospecting team also helped in covering the neighborhood in promotional work for the beginning of the church.

Attendance for both of these groups has been on a rollercoaster. This seems to be the case when starting with new people. It takes time to build commitment in the new work. Both churches have had first baptisms from the community. Home Bible studies supplement the ministry of both these congregations.

Miscellaneous Activities

Additional activities have included administration of the Church Builders' Program, furnishing copy for various Church of God publications, administration and teaching at the Christian Workers' Seminar, and conducting various sessions at General Conference.

I have also been serving as a member of the Sunday School Curriculum Revision Committee, have completed a study course through Fuller Seminary on the historical development of the Christian movement, am currently planning for two summer ministry teams from Oregon Bible College in prospect calling and followup, and attended a church planting seminar conducted at Fuller Seminary.

Conclusion

I am optimistic about the work of the Church of God and the progress and development for the future.

I personally appreciate the work done by our pastors. And all of us surely know that it is ultimately the people in the local church that get the job done.

It is a joy to have so many Christian friends in various churches. Irene and I have been privileged to enjoy the hospitality of pastors and their families and also various members in local churches. This has been a blessing to us and an encouragement in our ministry.

REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

One of the great joys of ministry at OBC is to see a young person, fresh out of high school, step foot on campus with all of his insecurities, shyness, homesickness, and "rough around the edges," begin a process of growth and maturity toward realizing his potential as a minister for the Lord. The greatest regret is to have to let go of the students in May and dissolve a family environment.

Twenty-four full-time students attended Oregon Bible College during the 1984-85 academic year. The student body represented nime different states; mainly from Church of God families and backgrounds. One of the joys is to see students who went to OBC several years ago return and finish their education. Connie Scott returned last year and was graduated this spring. Craig Wagganer moved his family from St. Louis at mid-term and is planning to stay until completion. It is a great step of faith.

Four seniors graduated in May: Connie Scott, Rockford, Illinois; Steve Fewell, Kokomo, Indiana; John Raymond, Springfield, Louisiana; and Jon Welch, Watson, Illinois. Connie, Steve, and Jon will be going into internship programs. John's plans are yet tentative. Completing the Internship program this year are: Lee Arp, Darwin Bronson, Darrell Cardwell, and Tim Trammell. We applaud these faithful students who have committed their time, money, and total lives to serve the Lord.

Dr. Charles Pryor began the year as president. He resigned in November after 4½ years of faithful service. We appreciate his vision in many areas of the OBC program and that dynamic is being missed. He has returned to teaching at Northeast Louisiana University where he served before coming to OBC. Eugene Stilson was terminated in his present role at OBC at the end of the second semester. Also serving as part-time instructors were David Krogh, Warren Sorenson, and Russell Magaw, members of the Church of God General Conference staff. Mary Hoffman joined our staff as director of the kitchen staff and head cook. She and Connie Ramsey restored the kitchen to an in-house operation after an alternative service first semester.

It was our pleasure to have William Wachtel on campus for our Fall Christian Emphasis Week. His ministry was well received and was a blessing. In the spring Eugene Stilson, Anthony Buzzard, David Krogh, and Warren Sorenson served on the staff of the Christian Workers' Seminar. During that week Brian Atra was a guest instructor and led a very exciting study of the Gospel of John.

Connie Scott served as president of the student council. Tom Schmitt served as editor of the *Student Voice*, and Angie Dickerson as editor of the *Maranatha*. Serving on the Sport's Staff were Jimmy Raymond, John Raymond, Alan Cain, and Susan Lee. Resident Assistants were Connie Scott, Angie Dickerson, Lana Gaddís, Mark Good, and Jon Welch.

Tom Schmitt and former student Sheila Miller were united in marriage on March 23. Jeff Fletcher and Karen Burnham were married in the fall. Several of our other students are planning marriages for this summer. OBC should not be criticized for being a place where young people find life partners. It is a wonderful dynamic that happens to most people at that age and OBC is a good place to meet others with compatible values and goals. Praise the Lord!

During our time of transition, the staff has been working diligently to prepare a program for the coming year that will meet the needs of young people and the churches they will ultimately serve. Many positive events such as "Blitz Weekend" and the High School Invitational Conference have given us a positive feeling about our future and the direction we are heading. We hear of a number of new students for our

fall term and this excites us. We sense God's sufficiency in our weakness. 

REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

During this fiscal year the Publishing Department has continued its efforts with *The Restitution Herald*, PROGRESS JOURNAL, and Sunday School quarterlies and Teacher's Guides for five age groups. Recently a two-year goals program was presented for the department to the Executive Council.

The Restitution Herald

Specific effort is being made to provide articles which deal with five areas of study. In each issue we hope to address a topic in all of the following general headings:

- Church of God Doctrine
 Contemporary Issues
- Bible Prophecy

Church Growth

Christian Living

The articles which come from the Sermon on the Mount have met the need in the Christian Living area. This series of unconnected articles will come to an end sometime this summer or early fall. We have also reprinted articles from Church bulletins and other publications to help fill this need.

Occasionally we publish an article on church growth from either David Krogh or Warren Sorenson.

I have been pleased with copy from different sources in the Church of God doctrine area. Recently Pastors Scott Millard and William Wachtel supplied excellent articles on the resurrection and God's oneness. Contributing Editor Anthony Buzzard keeps us well stocked with his doctrinal pieces.

Recently Pastor James Mattison was appointed as Contributing Editor of the Prophecy Page.

The April and May issues (1985) contained articles on contemporary issues. Reo Christenson's "The Truth About Pornography" came from a conference I attended on the subject in Cincinnati during the fall. United States Surgeon General C. Everett Koop's article on doing more to help women who have problem pregnancies was reprinted with permission from *Pastoral Renewal*, for which I am grateful.

Additionally, Contributing Editor Rachel Carr provides copy for a Children's Page each issue.

Recently members of the Oregon Bible College staff were assigned articles. Out of that situation Gayle Reye is producing a six-part series on audiovisuals. I hope Christian educators in our churches will find this series helpful.

Circulation of *The Herald* stands at exactly 1550 copies per issue. This number includes 1200 regular subscribers and 350 copies sent in bundles to subscribers who order three or more copies. Our major subscription push continues to be with the February issue. However, changes have been made with our computer mailing list to allow new subscriptions to be started at any time during the year. Subscriptions are down from 1700.

Format of the magazine will continue to emphasize a twocolor cover and black-and-white interior.

During the year another mailing of an issue went to 1000 more addresses in the London Outreach project. Response has been less than the first mailing.

PROGRESS JOURNAL

This free news promotional is published five times a year. About 3300 to 3500 homes receive it. Recently new features included interviews with state conference presidents, news of newly planted churches, and a biography.

Challenge Magazine

The Outreach and Church Development Department renewed the publishing of *Challenge* magazine for our youth. Over 200 indicated they'd like to receive it at the 1984 Youth Conference, but just 120 have paid \$5.00 subscriptions. Including active pastors and youth leaders and OBC students, the mailing list stands at 320. Kent Ross is editor.

Overall we are printing 4,330 copies of quarterlies and 600 copies of teacher's guides each quarter. These figures are down from a year ago; 4,575 and 735 respectively.

Curriculum Committee

According to the notes of the February 2, 1985, Curriculum Study Committee meeting, we will begin immediately to make improvements and revisions in the Junior, Senior High, and Adult quarterlies which are in keeping with the new Church of God objectives for each age group. These objectives will be published in a Curriculum Guide.

Additionally, the Committee established a time line for the introduction of four new age groups. A Toddler quarterly, using the Palma Smiley curriculum, will come on line in September, 1985. The Junior High curriculum, using the David C. Cook line as a source with Church of God distinctives plugged in, will start in March, 1986. A Kindergarten quarterly, again incorporating Cook curriculum with our distinctives, will also begin in March, 1986. Likewise a Primary quarterly, using Cook and our distinctives, will commence in December, 1986.

Edit work has already begun on the Kindergarten quarterly, and will soon start on the Junior High. However, major chores lie ahead regarding the rewriting of our distinctives into this new material.

Relationship to Staff and Equipment

While the director of the department provides general oversight of production and activity, daily operation is accomplished by his staff. Gordon Landry serves as managing editor; Betty Hall is the typesetter; Judy Myers does mailing, makes changes in quarterlies, and provides secretarial help; Barbara Landry is the proofreader (part time).

Other Activities

During the past year I have been involved in several projects with the Outreach and Church Development Department. I have led prospect-calling teams to several areas, and conducted several feasibility studies for planting new churches.

Constitution Revisions

RECOMMENDATION ONE

We recommend the creation of a nominating committee for positions on the Board of Directors.

Explanation: There are two problems connected with our present system of nomination from the floor and electing on the following day. Delegates are unable to determine the wishes of their local church regarding possible nominees before arriving at Conference. We have also faced the problem of not having sufficient nominations required by the Constitution. This has required a last-minute search for a candidate willing to run.

This recommendation can be implemented by replacing Article IV, Section 4 with the following: "A nominating committee consisting of the State or District Conference Boards of the Church of God will submit name(s) of potential nominees for the General Conference Board of Directors by January 1 of the year of the election. Churches not represented by a State or District Conference may also submit nominees by January 1 of the year of the election. The name of each nominee must be accompanied with a resume of the individual. Names and resumes will be submitted to the Executive Director of the Conference and will be printed in the summer *Progress Journal.*"

New Section 5. "Nominations printed in the *Progress Journal* will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship."

Renumber Section 5 to Section 6 and delete "nominations shall be made from the floor; but"

Renumber Section 6 to Section 7. Renumber Section 7 to Section 8.

The Board recommends that this amendment take effect for the 1986 General Conference.

ter for the 1900 General Conterence.

RECOMMENDATION TWO

We recommend that procedures be established for the introduction of resolutions, major motions (i.e., motions that have substantial effect on longstanding policy), or recommendations to the General Conference business session.

Explanation: Since our Conference is based upon the representative principle, we believe it is important for our churches to be aware of resolutions, major SUMMER/1985 motions, or recommendations which will be acted upon by the delegates. Advance notice will permit local churches to instruct their delegates how to vote on these issues. Therefore, an orderly procedure should be established so that our churches and members can be properly informed of proposed action. We believe this can best be implemented by making the following Constitutional revisions:

Article III—new Section 2. "Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations should be submitted to the Board of Directors no later than four months before the Conference business session convenes. Resolutions, major motions, or recommendations may originate with individuals, churches, Conferences, or the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will receive and review the items for publication in the summer *Progress Journal*. Resolutions, major motions, and recommendations may also be submitted from the floor at the delegate session, but they may not be voted upon until the next Conference. The resolutions, major motions, and recommendations submitted from the floor will be published in the summer *Progress Journal* prior to the next Conference."

Renumber Article III—Section 2 to Section 3.

The Board recommends that this amendment take effect immediately upon adoption.

RECOMMENDATION THREE

We recommend that a member of the Board of Directors be permitted to succeed himself for one additional term.

Explanation: As the work of the Church of God General Conference and Oregon Bible College has expanded over the past few years, the policy and procedures of our operation have become more complex. Board members who serve for only one four-year term often find their term coming to an end about the time they have a full grasp of all the work of the Conference and College. Permitting reelection for one additional term would provide more continuity for the Board. This recommendation can be implemented by amending the Constitution as follows:

Article \overline{IV} —Section 6—replace the words "no director shall succeed himself for a second term," with the words "a director may succeed himself for one additional term."

The Board recommends that this amendment take effect following the 1985 General Conference.

RECOMMENDATION FOUR

An Oregon Bible College Study Committee was appointed by the Board of Trustees of Oregon Bible College in August, 1984. The committee was appointed as a result of board and delegate action at the summer General Conference. The committee was composed of Scott Ross, chairman; Rex Cain, Joe James, David Krogh, Charles Pryor, and Dean Urish.

The study committee report as amended by the Board of Trustees is as follows:

The study committee reaffirms that the purpose of OregonBibleCollege is to recruit, equip, and motivate persons for both professional and lay ministries in the Church of God. We believe that the purpose is valid because it addresses the following needs of the Church of God: 1. Pastoral leadership for existing churches; 2. Pastoral leadership to plant new churches; 3. A recognition that every Christian is a minister, gifted by God for service; 4. Good lay leadership; 5. A mutual appreciation by pastors and lay members of each others' roles in the church; 6. Good spiritual teachers in local churches; 7. Present leaders in local churches need to be fed with resources to enable them to be more effective.

The study committee reaffirms that seeking accreditation should not be a priority for Oregon Bible College at this time. Rather than making a concerted effort to conform to external requirements, we must be guided by a sensitivity to the thoughts of our constituency and by the needs of our churches.


The study committee believes that it is very important for Oregon Bible College to have a strong first-year program that includes: 1. An overview of the Bible; 2. Little or no general education courses; 3. A challenge to students to full-time Christian service; 4. Daily chapel or devotions; 5. Christian service opportunities built into the curriculum; 6. Practical, transferrable church skills; 7. Emphasis on a strong spiritual and moral life.

The study committee believes that the remaining years at Oregon Bible College should be geared primarily toward professional development with continued strong spiritual emphasis. We believe that the internship program should be continued.

The study committee believes the educational needs of our people should also be addressed by: 1. Oncampus seminars; 2. Adult education on campus; 3. Institutes held at various churches; 4. Extension programs in local churches; 5. Correspondence courses.

The study committee believes that every aspect of our curriculum needs to be reevaluated in light of how it helps us to achieve our purpose.

The study committee believes that the organizational structure of Oregon Bible College and the Church of God General Conference needs to be designed so that one person is responsible to the Board of Trustees for all conference/college operations. The following organizational chart is recommended:



An executive council appointed by the president will continue to meet regularly to facilitate communication, coordination, and planning. A college staff senate will continue to exist for the purpose of planning, consultation, and communication regarding college matters.

In addition to full-time instructors, part-time and guest instructors will be used. The skills of all conference/college employees will be utilized fully throughout the ministry development center.

The Board recommends the adoption of this report and the implementation of the proposed changes.

RECOMMENDATION FIVE

We recommend the revision of License and Ordination procedures for the Church of God as follows:

A License Board will be appointed to license ministers for the Church of God. Licensure will continue to be based upon doctrinal, moral, and academic standards.

The License Board will consist of one Oregon Bible College staff member selected by the Oregon Bible College President; two members of the Ministerial Association selected by the Association; and a lay person currently serving as an elder, selected by the Board of Directors.

A new license application form based on the one developed by a study committee two years ago, will be used beginning immediately.

Local churches will be responsible for conducting an ordination service and/or installation service in the local church, commissioning their pastor to serve as the shepherd of their flock. Ordination forms and a suggested format will be available from the General Conference which can be used by the local church elders.

All ordained ministers in good standing will continue to be carried on the roll as ordained ministers of the Church of God General Conference.

Explanation:

This change in license and ordination procedure is being recommended as a result of discussions that were held at the 1984 General Conference and from input received from pastors during the past year. The reasons for this recommendation are as follows:

- This policy permits ordination to be practiced in a more Scriptural way than we are currently practicing it. Ordination becomes a commissioning to a specific ministry task.
- The new makeup of the License Board will provide official input from Oregon Bible College which is committed to high standards for our professional ministry. It provides input from the SUMMER/1985

Ministerial Association, which has an equally high commitment to quality professional minsters, and which has a vital stake in monitoring the professional conduct of all ministers. The License Board will benefit from having lay elder participation as a representative of our churches.

This proposal in its various forms has been under discussion by the Board of Directors, the License and Ordination Board, officers of the Ministerial Association, License and Ordination Study Committee, and the Ministerial Association for the past two and one half years.

A copy of the new license application form is available upon request.

RECOMMENDATION SIX

The Board of Directors recommends the creation of several Advisory Committees for the General Conference and Oregon Bible College.

The purpose of the Advisory Committees would be to work with the Board of Directors and the staff in specialized areas of our organization. The committees would be involved in research, long-range planning, and serve as a vehicle of communication to and from our church membership.

Each Advisory Committee would consist of one member of the Board of Directors, selected by the Board, a staff member selected by the President, and two Church of God members from the field elected by the delegates for four-year terms.

The committees would meet no more than two times a year in conjunction with regularly scheduled Board meetings, unless sufficient cause is presented for more meetings.

The staff member will serve as chairman of the committee and a secretary will be selected by the group.

The following committees will be established.

- 1) Committee on Higher Education
- 2) Sunday School Committee
- 3) Media Committee
- 4) Foreign Missions Committee
- 5) Youth Committee

The Board recommends that these committees be phased in over the next two years, with committees 1 and 2 to be established in the summer of 1985, and 3-5 in the summer of 1986.

If this recommendation is approved, two members will be elected to the committee on Higher Education, one for a two-year term and one for a four-year term. Two members will be elecated to the Sunday School Committee, one for a two-year term and one for a four-year term.

CHRISTIAN CONCILIATION BOARD

The Christian Conciliation Board is composed of the following persons: Joe E. James, Chairperson; Nancy Demmitt; S. O. Ross. Major emphasis of this Board is to help educate all the people of the Church of God in the Scriptural means of resolving conflicts according to Matthew 18:15-17.

Jesus could foresee the potential for conflict and disagreement within members of his body, so he wisely listed three clear steps that should be followed when the inevitable occurs.

The Christian Conciliation Board will not only help local churches to understand this process, but will strongly encourage the use of this process in even the smallest of conflicts. They are available as individuals to consult over the telephone to assist persons to work through the Scriptural process. If it seems necessary, a church can ask the Board to come to the local church to assist in resolution of a dispute.

Members of the Christian Conciliation Board presented seminars and sharing sessions at the 1984 General Conference. Two members of the Board presented classes and seminars at the 1985 Christian Workers' Seminar. Additional sessions are planned for the 1985 General Conference. These activities represent an ongoing educational effort of the Christian Conciliation Board.

CHURCH OF GOD INVESTMENT FUND

The Church of God Investment Fund was incorporated in 1982. The purpose of this fund is to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches.

After reviewing the unstable interest market, the trustees have agreed to delay implementation of the fund at the present time.

The fund currently has a cash balance of \$10,635.32. This money came from two churches that returned Mission Builder contributions when the property was sold. These funds are available to be borrowed by churches at a reasonable rate of interest.

The Directors of the fund are Bill Burnham, David Krogh, Dr. William D. Lawrence, Pastor Scott Ross, and Robert Smith. David Krogh, Secretary

MINISTERS' FUND

The Ministers' Fund of the Church of God General Conference is used for loans or gifts to ministers or their families in times of emergencies. The fund is administered by the pastors of the Oregon, Rockford, and Dixon, Illinois, churches, the Director of Student Services of Oregon Bible College, and the Executive Director of the General Conference.

During the past nine months, a \$300 loan was made to one of our ministers. Most of this loan has been repaid.

The fund balance as of April 30, 1985, was \$3,072.38. This compares with \$2,645.80 last year at this time.

We appreciate the churches and individuals who make contributions to this fund. David Krogh, Secretary

LICENSE AND ORDINATION BOARD

During the 1984 General Conference, Michael Gallagher, having finished the Oregon Bible College internship program, was interviewed and received his Certificate of License and a Recognition Card. Donald Nunemaker was recognized before the conference attendants as being ready to receive his Certificate of License and the Recognition Card. Don was not able to attend the conference.

Vivian Kirkpatrick, II, was ordained at his new pastorate in Hector, MN, on August 26, 1984. Pastor David Cheatwood represented the License and Ordination Board.

During the year, the chairman has written several letters which have to do with business of the License and Ordination Board and in answer to inquiries.

During Ministerial Conference, 1985, four men were interviewed in anticipation of their being licensed. Other meetings were also held during that week to discuss routine matters. Francis E. Burnett, Chairman

MINISTERS VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION

At the biannual meeting of the Church of God Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association held in August, 1984, the Rules and Regulations were revised to make the plan much more beneficial to our ministry, and to stabilize the Association.

Pastors who are not in the Association should be encouraged by their church to join and become a part of this united effort to assist our ministry when they reach retirement age. Any churches not now in the association should also consider joining. The Association can only be as strong as the churches, pastors, and state conferences are willing to make it. With full cooperation, benefits could be increased in years to come.

Presently there are 38 ministers, 48 churches, and 7 conferences in the Association. There are 12 ministers and 4 ministers' widows receiving monthly benefits from the Association.

More than \$331,000 has been paid into the Association by members. This amount has been reached in the seventeen years of existence since we started with zero assets in 1968.

The present Board of Trustees of the Association is comprised of Chairman S. O. Ross (a pastor appointed by the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference); Vice-Chairman Dean Urish (elected by the delegates of the Association at a biannual meeting), and Secretary-Treasurer David Krogh (Executive Director of the Church of God General Conference). ELECTION FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS-TRUSTEES

At the 1985 General Conference, two members will be elected to the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference for four-year terms. The terms of Dallas Demmitt and David Johnson will expire at this Conference. They may not be reelected according to the present terms of the Constitution. Nominations will be made from the floor as directed by the Constitution.

Below is the position description for Directors who serve on the Board. As nominations are considered, the following information should be taken into consideration.

Job Description for Director

Title:

Director, Church of God General Conference

Summary:

The position exists to transact and administer the business of Church of God General Conference in accordance with its Constitution and By-Laws.

Duties:

- 1. Serve as a Director of Church of God General Conference.
 - a. Employ an Executive Director who is responsible for the administration of all the work of the Church of God General Conference.
- Serve as Trustee of Oregon Bible College.
 a. Employ a President who is responsible for the administration of all the work of Oregon Bible College.
- 3. Serve as a Trustee of Oregon Bible College Development Foundation (13 members).
- 4. Give general (external) supervision to all Conference/College affairs.
- 5. Engage in long-range planning and evaluation.
- 6. Make recommendations to Conference delegates regarding:
 - a. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws
 - b. Major policy or major policy changes
 - c. Creation of major programs
 - d. Budgeting

- 7. Acquire and dispose of real and personal property.
- 8. Approve borrowings and other plans to finance operations.
- 9. Give of his private means to support the Conference/College and to be actively engaged in fund-raising activities.
- 10. Establish controls to protect the rights and interests of contributors, member churches and conferences, and staff.
- 11. Communicate the purposes and programs of the Conference/College to the Church of God through public relations efforts.
- 12. Employ competent auditor.
- 13. Attend all meetings of the Board and the Annual Conference.

Organizational Relationships:

Each Board Member is accountable to the Conference delegate body for the carrying out of the duties of the office.

The Board is accountable for the work of the Executive Director and the President.

Qualifications:

The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of church leaders. A Director may be either male or female.

SUMMER CONFERENCE INFORMATION

Site: The 1985 Church of God General Conference will be held at Wittenberg University, Springfield, Ohio, July 29 through August 2.

Springfield is located on Interstate 70, which runs east and west.

Individuals coming by car from the east by Interstate 80 should exit at US 40 (exit 62) and proceed westward to North Fountain Avenue, then north on Fountain five blocks to Stoughton Street. Turn left.

Those coming from the west on the Interstate should exit at US 68 (exit 52) and follow 68 North to Ohio 41 (First Street), then take First Street, which becomes McCreight Ave., eastward to Woodlawn Avenue, then south on Woodlawn to Stoughton. Turn right.

Registration will take place in Wittenberg Union at the corner of Woodlawn and Stoughton.

Those flying to General Conference should arrive at the James M. Cox Dayton International Airport at Vandalia. Shuttle service from the airport to the campus will be provided upon request. Notification should reach our office no later than July 18 if service is needed.

Registration: Registration begins at 2:00 p.m. in Wittenberg Union in the lounge off the lobby. At registration, housing assignments will be made.

Reservations & Conference Costs: Reservations for General Conference must be made prior to July 20. Reservations postmarked after July 20 will be assessed a \$15 late registration fee. Registration forms were mailed to each Church of God home. Additional forms are available in each local church. Registration forms may also be secured from Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061.

These costs include room, board, use of the grounds and buildings, insurance, and recreation facilities.



Delegate Expense Pool: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of travel of those from far away and those who live nearby. Delegate expense pool forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary, and each is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means o assuring general delegate representation. The mileage rate this year is 12¢.
