

1986 GENERAL CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS



Registering for Conference

The 66th annual Church of God General Conference was held at Western Illinois University, Macomb, Illinois, July 28—August 1. The Theme, "Lord, Renew Us," was accomplished in the lives of many of the Conference attendants.

The main emphases throughout the week were on prayer, confession of sin, praise for our Heavenly Father, and a seeking to be filled with the Holy Spirit, based on the promise of Luke 11:13 and the command of Ephesians 5:18. God's Spirit was seen at work throughout the Conference as the fruit of the spirit was manifested in the lives of those who attended: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

A tremendous amount of prayer was invested in the Conference by hundreds of people, beginning with the first planning meeting last October and leading up to and including the Conference week. God graciously answered the prayers of his people by being present and by bringing about personal renewal during the Conference. It is the continuing

prayer of the delegates that the renewal which began at the conference will rapidly spread throughout every church and to the lives of every member of the Church of God. This will not be accomplished by our might or power, but by God's Spirit. (Zech. 4:6.)

Morning Worship Services

Tuesday morning the major theme of the Conference was introduced by four speakers who shared their view of the Spirit of God: Francis Burnett, David Cheatwood, Cecil Rademachir, and Eugene Stilson. This session was followed by a round-table discussion when many thought-provoking questions were raised by the audience as they explored and interacted with Scriptural teaching regarding the Spirit of God.

Wednesday morning Pastor Gary Burnham, who pastors in the Washingdon D.C. metropolitan area, emphasized the need for renewal in our urban churches. The focus of his message was that the Church of God must direct much of its future ministry toward meeting the needs of people who live in urban areas. Statistics were cited to show that there is a continuing

shift of the population to large metropolitan areas in North America and around the world.

Thursday morning Pastor Greg Demmitt emphasized the significant role that rural churches have and are playing in the work of the Church of God. They were commended for upholding the heritage of the Church of God, their spiritual commitment, and production of candidates for Oregon Bible College.

Evening Services

Monday evening, Pastor E. Richard Smith of the Bethel Church of God in South Carolina spoke regarding renewal in our times. Just as Paul's life was transformed as he met the resurrected Lord on the road to Damascus, our lives must be transformed as the power of God works in us.

Tuesday evening, Pastor James Ritch shared with the Conference 1 Corinthians 2:10-14, regarding the way the Spirit of God works in helping us to have a knowledge of God and a knowledge of his blessings.

Wednesday evening, Pastor Curtis Simpson shared from Psalm 51:10-12 regarding the need for confession if renewal is to take place. He also spoke from Luke 11:13 and at the conclusion of the service invited those who wished to have prayer for the filling of the Spirit to come forward. A time of prayer was held for those who responded to the invitation.

The Thursday evening service was a time of praise and prayer. The Board of Directors were installed by the Vice President of the Ministerial Association, Sydney Kirkpatrick, After appropriate changes to the Board and congregation, Pastors S. O. Ross, Sydney Kirkpatrick, James Mattison, and James Ritch laid their hands on the Board members and offered prayer.

The License Board presented four candidates who have met the requirements for licensure to professional ministry of the Church of God: Jeff Fletcher, Connie Scott, Craig Wagganer, and Jon Welch. the members of the License Board laid their hands upon the newly licensed candidates who were present at Conference and offered prayer for them and for their

Prayer Emphasis



Appointments

During the Conference, the Board of Directors made appointments as follows: Investment Fund Director: William D. Lawrence was reappointed to the Investment Fund Board of Directors.

Advisory committees: The Board appointed the following Board members to serve on the Advisory committees: Keith Williams, Foreign Missions Committee; Dick Eldred, Sunday School Committee;

Don Overmyer, Committee on Higher Education; Elmo Gaspar, Media Committee; Joe James, Youth Committee.

Oregon Bible College Development Foundation: The seven members of the Board of Directors also serve on the Foundation Board, and in addition they appointed the following six individuals for a one-year term: Pastor James Graham, Joyce Knapp, Paul Overholser, Pastor Scott Ross, George Sheeley, and Willis Turner.

Budget

A budget for the fiscal year June 1, 1987 - May 31, 1988 was approved by the delegates. It calls for contributions of \$401,170. This compares with \$374,000 for the current fiscal year. Delegates were encouraged to participate personally in contributing to the work of the Conference, as well as encouraging their local churches to be regular supporters of the Goal for Giving.

Presentation of Plaques

As a part of the Outreach and Church Development business, special recognition was given by Vice President Warren Sorenson to three new churches which were started during the last year. Plaques were presented to Hillview Bible Church, Bloomington, Indiana; Chapel on the Hill, Urbana, Ohio; Gospel Church of God (Faith of Abraham), Hilliard, Ohio.

The College offers very attractive facilities, and delegates and friends are looking forward to attending Conference in the Grand Rapids area.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE



Scott Ross

The Church of God of Abrahamic Faith has an important and significant message to share with the world. A study of the Book of Acts shows that the gospel consists of the things concerning the kingdom of God and the things concerning Jesus Christ (8:12; 28:23; 28:30, 31). We offer the world both Biblical and intellectual consistency on these two basic points of the gospel. In contrast, many people's understanding of the things concerning Jesus and the kingdom are confusing and contradictory. We cannot remain silent and passive. There is an urgency that challenges us to greater boldness in our proclamation. We have a message that the world needs to hear.

Because it is important for us to boldly proclaim our Biblical message to the world, and because we recognize that the message can most effectively change lives in the context of a local church, we have set a high goal of planting 75 churches in the next 15 years.

This conference is a call to renewal. Without renewal there will be no effective outreach. We must burn before we can shine (John 5:35); we must abide before we can bear fruit (John 15:5-8); we must receive power by the Holy Spirit coming upon us before we can be witnesses (Acts 1:8). Four things must happen if we are to be renewed and the goal of planting 75 churches by the year 2000 is to be reached:

- 1. Repentance
- 2. Vision
- 3. Commitment
- 4. Dependency

Real renewal is always preceded by real repentance. We must humble ourselves before God before he will lift us up. We must come to grips with our sin, honestly confess it, and seek God's forgiveness. Honestly looking at ourselves and having sincere repentance are not pleasant; they are painful. However, they are essential if there is to be renewal.

As we honestly look at ourselves, are we not guilty of a lack of love, the very touchstone of discipleship? Have there not been dissensions and bitterness that divided and weakened us, rather than the sincere love that unites and strengthens? Are we guilty of a failure to forgive? Brethren, let us love one another; let us forgive one another. God will not empower and bless for outreach a group that cannot love one another.

We also are guilty of an absence of evangelism. We are guilty of a selfishness that has made our focus inward, not outward or even upward. We have sat back, almost daring the world to come to us, instead of being obedient to Jesus' commission to go to the world. If our message is important—even essential (and I believe that it is)—we must share it with the world that is dying in ignorance and unbelief. Paul said to the Corinthians, "Some have no knowledge of God. I speak this to your shame" (1 Cor. 15:34, NASB). It is to our shame that many do not know the truths concerning Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God! We need to repent of our sins, confess our sins, and seek the healing of God's forgiveness.

Second, we must have a vision of what God wants us to be and to accomplish. J. I. Parker said: "A task without a vision is drudgery; a task with vision is ministry." I call you to ministry, not drudgery. I want you to catch a dream of the Church of God significantly impacting the world for God. I want you to catch the dream of

75 new churches being planted by 2000. I want you to catch the dream of a new wave of excitement and renewal sweeping our churches as we see that we are engaged in something significant that will make an eternal difference in many people's lives.

Vision will give focus to our efforts. It is easy to focus on the minor instead of the major. We can be tempted to focus on the differences that divide us instead of the basic gospel that unites us. But if we all share in the vision of significantly impacting the world by planting 75 churches by the end of this century, we can all get behind and support that which is really important.

Third, we need commitment. To plant that many churches we will need money and people. There must be sound and good stewardship by the board and staff so money is used prudently and effectively. And giving must be increased. Like the churches of Macedonia in the New Testament, we must give willingly, cheerfully, and sacrificially (2 Cor. 8:9). The Church of God does not have a money problem, but it may very well have a giving problem. We will not be able to plant new churches unless established churches are willing to look beyond their own borders to share in the financial support of these new works.

Not only do we need a commitment of money, but we also need a commitment of people. The churches in Macedonia not only gave willingly, cheerfully, and sacrificially, "but they first gave themselves to the Lord" (2 Cor. 8:5, NASB). We need people who are willing to give themselves to the vision of church planting. We will need many new pastors in the next 15 years. Oregon Bible College is vital to

the vision of church planting. We need more students at Oregon Bible College who believe in evangelism and are committed to church planting. Are there young people in your church who need your encouragement to catch the vision of church planting and to attend Oregon Bible College to prepare themselves? Are there adults in your church that the Lord is calling to full-time Christian service that ought to be enrolling in Oregon Bible College to prepare themselves? Are you yourself satisfied that you are where God wants you? Are you being called to Oregon Bible College?

As we see the great need for pastors, isn't it time we stop limiting ourselves by looking only at men as potential pastors? In our time and culture, women can effectively serve as pastors, and we need to begin training and calling women pastors.

Also we need to look at the people who have left the pastoral ministry. Have they left because God led them from the ministry or because they discovered that God never intended them for pastoral ministry? Or have they left because they were hurt, discouraged, and disillusioned? Perhaps these people might catch a vision of church planting, and be led back into full-time Christian service as church-planting pastors.

Not only do we need pastors for church planting, we need lay people willing to pull up stakes and relocate in church-planting areas to offer support and stability to new works. Is God challenging you to relocate and share in an exciting and significant ministry?

We need repentance, vision, and commitment. But the bottom line is that we simply do not have the people, talent, resources, or ability to plant 75 churches by 2000. We cannot do it! And it is good that we recognize and acknowledge our inadequacies. For we must come to the end of ourselves before we can come to the beginning of God. Paul spoke of coming to the complete exhaustion of his talents and resources. That was to make us rely not on ourselves, but on God. (2 Cor. 1:9.) We need to recognize and acknowledge our inadequacies so we will learn dependence upon God. It will not be by our might or by our power that we will succeed in planting new churches; it will only be by the Spirit of God. (Zech. 4:6.) With our own strength and efforts we cannot succeed, but with God's Spirit we cannot fail! Greater is he that is in us than he that is in the world. (1 John 4:4.) If God is for us, no one can succeed against us. (Rom. 8:31.) God is the God of all flesh, and nothing is too hard for him. (Jer. 32:27.) Let us call on him, and he will answer and show us great and mighty things. (Jer. 33:3.)

The task before us is exciting and challenging. Let us sincerely repent, that we might be renewed. Let us catch the thrilling vision of what God is calling us to do. Let us commit ourselves and our resources to him. And let us fully and completely depend on him who is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think.

1986 GENERAL CONFERENCE

Western Illinois University Macomb, Illinois

First Session Tuesday, July 29, 1986

Chairman Scott Ross called the meeting to order and welcomed the delegates to the 66th annual Church of God General Conference. Pastor Sydney Kirkpatrick opened the meeting with prayer.

Credentials Chairperson Jan Stilson gave instructions to the delegates regarding use of the delegate cards.

In his opening message, Chairman Ross reminded the delegates that we have an essential message. Citing the theme of the Conference, "Lord, Renew Us," he stated that renewal must be preceded by repentance, vision, commitment, and above all, dependence upon God. Our resources are inadequate, but His are not.

Chairman Ross welcomed those who are new delegates, and the Hillview Bible Church of God in Bloomington, Indiana, was represented at Conference for the first time.

Chairman Ross noted that no written communications have been received, but conveyed a verbal greeting to the Conference from Clarence and Louise Lapp.

The special reports printed on pages 21-22 of the Summer 1986 issue of the PROGRESS JOURNAL were reviewed. Willis Turner moved to accept the special reports as presented; Robert See seconded. There was no discussion, and the motion carried.

Robert Coverstone reported on the activities of the Board of Directors for the last year. He emphasized that each meeting is opened with a season of

prayer asking for God's guidance, and also closed with a season of prayer. He described how all action taken by the Board is by consensus, and reported on the special time of prayer and laying on of hands for each other's needs at the last Long-term planning meeting. He gave personal testimony of how this prayer session had affected his own life in a period of personal difficulties.

Bill Burnham reviewed the financial statements in the delegate package, noting that operating and restricted funds are reported separately this year for the first time. Bill informed the delegates that the \$3500 expended for energy controls in the Men's Dormitory had resulted in approximately \$1000 savings in energy costs in the first year alone. Chairman Ross noted that expenditures were less than one percent over the budget adopted by the delegates, so that deficits were the results of lower than budgeted giving, income from tuition, and income from The Restitution Herald sales. Charles Graham moved to accept the financial reports as given; Howard Shute seconded, and the motion carried without discussion.

Jack Hearp asked if tithes to the General Conference from churches should go to the Goal for Giving or to the Development Foundation. Chairman Ross replied that both areas are important, and contributions to the Goal for Giving should not be at the expense of the foundation. Russell Johns recommended that each person ask himself what God would have him do.

Warren Sorenson reviewed the Outreach and Church Development Department's activities, and urged the delegates to "pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth reapers." He reported on

the establishment of a Christian preschool in Salt Lake City, Utah, by Don and Shari Nunemaker and Ron and Sandy Carr as a church-planting effort. Three new churches were recognized with plaques: Hillview Bible Church of God, Bloomington, Indiana; Chapel on the Hill, Urbana, Ohio; and Gospel Church of God, Columbus, Ohio. Cecil Rademachir reported on progress in Bloomington, and asked for a minute of prayer for a Bible study to be held that evening. Kent Ross reported on National Youth Congress, noting that enrollment at 221 was down from last year, but most of the problem seemed to arise from scheduling, Youth Congress having started on 4th of July weekend. He reported that there were 12 decisions for Christ during the week. Discussion followed on several areas of the Outreach and Church Development report.

Because of the lateness of the hour, review of the Publishing Department report was deferred until the next day's business session.

Pastor Michele Millard closed the first business session with prayer.

Second Session Wednesday, July 30, 1986

Chairman Scott Ross reconvened the delegates for the second business session, and called on Pastor Linford Moore to open with prayer. Chairman Ross expressed his appreciation for the music before the session provided by Dwaine Demmitt, Greg Demmitt, and Theresa Payne.

The minutes from the Tuesday session were read and accepted.

David Krogh reported that the pool amount for this year was \$167.10.

Merle Patrick promoted the History Newsletter published by Jan Stilson, and recommended that the delegates subscribe.

Warren Sorenson announced that Joyce Knapp would be available after the meeting to answer questions regarding prospect calling.


Chairman Ross opened the floor for nominations for Director (one to be elected this year). Stan Ross nominated Elmo Gaspar; Arlen LeCrone nominated Carlis Medley; Rex Cain nominated Don Haley; Jack Hearp nominated Hollis Partlowe. Robert See moved that nominations be closed, and Darrell Cardwell seconded. Motion carried. Chairman Ross asked the nominees present at Conference to come to the front to be introduced to the delegates.

Chariman Ross then opened the floor for nominations for members of the Media Advisory Committee. He explained that members elected by the delegates would serve four-year terms, except that this year one would be elected to a two-year term and one to a four-year term, to provide staggered terms, so that both members would not be elected at the same Conference in the future. Bill Lawrence nominated Dwaine Demmitt; Larry Mayberry nominated Tim Landry; Don Ward nominated John Smead; Scott Millard nominated Steve Taylor. Bob Lindner moved that the nominations be closed; Emory Macy seconded. Motion carried. Again Chairman Ross asked the nominees to come to the front.

Chairman Ross then opened nominations for the Youth Advisory Committee. Joe James nominated Jim Graham: Dick Eldred nominated Alan Demmitt: Bob Coverstone nominated Darrell Cardwell; Scott Ross nominated Bob Alcumbrack. Delbert Jones moved that nominations be closed; Marj Overmyer seconded. Motion carried. Chairman Ross called the nominees to the front for recognition, and explained that for each Committee, the person receiving the most votes would be elected to the four-year term, and the person receiving the second largest total would be elected to the two-year term, a majority vote being required in each case.

Russ Magaw reviewed the Publishing Department report. He commented that The Restitution Herald subscriptions were down, suggested some possible reasons for the decline, and some measures to reverse the trend. He urged delegates to use the form in the delegate package to subscribe or renew subscriptions to The Herald.

Dale Ramsey reviewed the Oregon Bible College report. He commented on



the improvement in student attitudes in the past year; the increase in Chapel services to five per week this year compared to two per week last year, and the spiritual benefits that resulted. He asked the delegates to send their students to OBC for solid Bible training. Dale announced the resignation of Gayle (Reye) Guthrie as Women's Dormitory Director, and the appointment of Becky Roseberry as her successor. He asked the delegates to actively promote Oregon Bible College, especially during OBC Booster month. Kent Ross discussed recruiting programs encountered this year. He emphasized that Oregon Bible College is the only institution in the world teaching the unity of God, conditional immertality, and the Kingdom of God on earth.

Joe James spoke to the delegates about the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation, explaining the use of Foundation funds. He reported on the present status of written commitments and cash received. He noted that the approximately \$600,000 raised so far came from 304 members; less than 10 percent of the member families in the Church of God. He reminded the delegates that the 50th anniversary of Oregon Bible College will be in 1989, and urged that the Foundation goal of \$1 million be met by that time. Chairman Ross reported on the agreement with Paul Moore to receive a \$20,000 gift to be placed in the John Lewis Collateral Fund, in exchange for a loan to Paul of a like amount to be invested at a guaranteed 18 percent annual rate of return.

Dick Eldred appealed to the delegates to make new or additional commitments to the Foundation, and to pastors to actively support the Foundation in their home churches.

Delbert Jones moved "that all churches and individuals who wish to contribute to the church planting be encouraged to send their checks to the General Conference headquarters. Funds could be earmarked for a particular church work. Churches who receive such funds should be encouraged to give quarterly reports to the Conference President." Ed Bender seconded the motion. Bro. Jones then spoke to the motion, giving his reasons for presenting it. Chairman Ross ruled that the

preceding is a major motion affecting policy, and will be voted on at the 1987 General Conference.

Dale Ramsey closed the second business session with prayer.

Third Session Thursday, July 31, 1986

Chairman Scott Ross reconvened the delegates for the third business session of the 1986 General Conference, calling on Pastor Michael Hoffman to open the session with prayer.

The minutes from the Wednesday session were read and accepted.

Credentials Chairperson Janet Stilson reported that 82 delegates and 59 ministers and directors were registered for the business session, for a total of 141, and called for a show of delegate cards.

Chairman Ross asked for ballots to be distributed and explained the voting procedure, noting that a majority vote is required for election for each office. After tabulation of the ballots, the following results were announced: for Director, Elmo Gaspar; for the Media Advisory Committee, 4-year term, Tim Landry; 2-year term, Dwaine Demmitt; for the Youth Advisory Committee, 4-year term, Alan Demmitt; 2-year term, Robert Alcumbrack.

Warren Sorenson reported on internal problems in the India work and asked the delegates to pray for Pastor Noel and the Governing Body, that the conflicts be resolved so that the work can go ahead. Bro. Sorenson answered questions which had been submitted regarding missions work at the Outreach and Church Development presentation. Robert Lindner voiced concern about the missions work of the General Conference.

President David Krogh asked the delegates to fill out the evaluation form in the delegate package to help in planning future Conferences, and also encouraged filling out the participation forms to offer help in working at future Conferences.

Leon Driskill announced the centennial celebration of the Nebraska Con-

ference (now called the Central High Plains Conference) August 13-17, 1986, at the Holbrook Church of God, Holbrook, Nebraska.

Joe James announced receipt of 12 commitments for the OBC Development Foundation since cards had been passed out the previous day; six repeat commitments and six new commitments.

David Krogh announced that the 1987 General Conference will be held August 3-7, 1987, on the campus of Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan. Bro. Krogh passed out brochures on the Calvin College campus and explained which buildings we will be using.

Chairman Ross asked for input from the delegates regarding George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, as a possible site for the 1988 General Conference. He asked for a nonbinding preference vote on the Virginia site vs. a midwest location. A show of hands showed a majority preference for Virginia.

Rex Cain asked if consideration had been given to a business-only Conference, with seminars and workshops scheduled for another time. Chairman Ross replied that consideration had been given to such a proposal. He then asked for a "straw vote" on a biennial Conference as opposed to an annual Conference, and a majority showed a preference for an annual Conference.

Chairman Ross then asked for a similar vote on a business-only meeting vs. our present format, resulting in a majority preference for the present format.

President Krogh moved adoption of the following resolution: "The members of the Church of God General Conference endorse the efforts of 'Christian Leaders for Responsible Television' as they call upon the television networks and advertisers to take immediate steps to reduce incidents of sex and violence and profanity." Delbert Jones seconded. Bro. Krogh also urged delegates to take the petition form in support of decency in television programming in the delegate package back to their home churches for other members to sign. Chairman Ross ruled that the preceding resolution is a major motion, in order to allow the churches time to consider it and instruct their delegates for next year's Conference.

Chairman Ross then opened the floor for other delegate business.

Dale Ramsey asked the delegates to give Bro. Ross a rising round of applause for his service as Chairman of the Board. President David Krogh presented Chairman Ross a plaque in appreciation for his service on the Board of Directors.

Chairman Ross asked President Krogh to present the proposed budget for the 1987-1988 year as shown on pages 16-17 of the Summer, 1986, PROGRESS JOURNAL. After discussion on various line items, Robert See moved adoption of the 1987-1988 budget as presented. Darrell Cardwell seconded. The motion carried with no further discussion.

The secretary read the final minutes of the third business session.

Ed Goit moved adoption of the minutes of the 1986 General Conference business sessions. Willis Turner seconded and the motion carried.

Howard Shute moved to adjourn. Scott Millard seconded. Chairman Ross called for those in favor to rise. Motion carried.

Is It Time for Your Church to Disturb the Status Ouo?

If your church has plateaued or is declining and you want to see a turnaround toward growth, it may be necessary to disturb the status quo! This alone will not result in growth but it can provide a time to level off and create an environment in which growth can begin.

How can a congregation disturb the status quo? Consider the following suggestions:

- 1. When members of the congregation experience renewal. The church will never be any different until someone in the church is different. The recent General Conference at Macomb, Illinois, provided opportunities for rediscovering our heritage as the Church of God as well as rekindling God's Spirit in our personal lives.
- 2. Along with renewal of the congregation is the renewal of the elders and church leaders. Some congregations have a retreat for this purpose. During the retreat leaders spend time in prayer, evaluating the church and planning for the future.
- 3. An important part of the renewal experience is the renewal of the pastor. A congregation which provides time and opportunity for its pastor to attend a seminar, conference, or a special event related to his ministry does both the pastor and the church a favor. Also, pray for your pastor and family and look for opportunities to encourage them.
- 4. Have a consultant assist the congregation. Often someone from outside the congregation can see things in a new perspective which can help the church develop appropriate strategies.
- 5. A special event. Planning and preparation for such an event interrupts the status quo and provides for members to get involved in a project with new zeal and excitement. Pictured is one of these special events. Last spring the OCD Department worked with the Louisiana Conference in conducting a seminar at Blood River. Joyce Knapp, Ron Macy, Russ Magaw, and Warren Sorenson served as staff.

PROGRESS OF THE ABRAHAMIC FAITH

The school year 1985-86 produced a number of fine opportunities for telling the world about the Abrahamic Faith. In November, 1985, Barbara and I were invited to take part in a World Congress of Religions near New York. On arrival we found 800 people gathered from 87 nations-Buddhists, Tibetan Monks, Jews, Christians of many denominations, etc. Almost every world religion was represented. We were divided into study groups of about 20 people. Each person in the group had prepared an essay describing his idea of "spiritual formation" and the essays had been printed in advance of the Congress, so that each participant might become acquainted with the others' views. Amidst enormous diversity, one thing united us: that believers in God should abandon possession of the ghastly weapons which now threaten to destroy us. This is a belief Biblical Christianity shares with other world religions. Christians everywhere can give the lead.

Our week in New York was fascinating. I especially remember the skeptical smile on the face of one of the participants when I told the group that I believed Jesus would return visibly to rule on earth. That great truth is likely to be greeted with some amusement by those who have not immersed themselves in the Scriptures.

In April, Steve Taylor invited us to take part in a World Religions Day at Central Michigan University. Along with representatives of many other faiths, western and eastern, we answered questions, dialogued, handed out literature, and marveled at the diversity—not to say chaos!—of the

different approaches to God. In the evening I took part in a panel discussion in front of a university audience. The experience was stimulating and leads to the belief that religion is at present one of the most confused areas of human activity. The world, and the churches, need desperately to know that God is One, and that Jesus is the Messiah!

Following the school year our family traveled to four New England states to meet families who had corresponded with us over the past year. We had never met these New Englanders, but were welcomed with warm hospitality, and found that there was no difference in Biblical understanding between them and us. The Abrahamic Faith is alive in these families, and some are holding small group meetings at home. These "contacts" were either ex-World Wide Church of God members or ex-Jehovah's Witnesses. Because of their rejection of the trinity they were not welcome in mainstream churches, nor did they feel satisfied with participation in orthodox Christianity. All had chosen to study at home and the rather large quantity of literature, including some Restitution Herald reprints we had sent to them, had helped to teach them the essential Abrahamic truths not known to the World-Wide Church of God and Jehovah's Witnesses.

This experience makes me think that the Abrahamic Faith needs plenty of up-to-date literature on the nature of God and Jesus and the kingdom of God. Where people are open minded (which is rare!) and willing to read and study, they will come to share some of the simple Bible truths on which the Abrahamic Faith is based.

If each of us could carry on a correspondence or visiting ministry with one other person, not yet a part of our faith, we could easily swell our numbers. A Christian is supposed to be one who teaches others, not necessarily in an "official" capacity (Heb. 5:12). There is a sense of usefulness to be found in spreading the faith. Why not make this the year where you can embark on a ministry to the unconverted? Ask God for opportunities, and begin to send out good material (there are lots of reprinted articles available). Paul's example in church planting was dialogue from dawn till dusk (Acts 28:23). In our small way we can follow him.





Current Situation







President's Progress Report

As a follow-up to the summer General Conference, members of the Conference/College staff are meeting with pastors around the country to discuss spiritual renewal. It is our desire to see the inspiration of the summer Conference spread throughout the entire membership of the Church of God. We recognize the need for spiritual growth and development and the need for the filling of God's Spirit as we face the challenges of Christian service in our generation. We invite you to work with your pastor to strengthen your own life spiritually, to encourage him in his spiritual growth, and to bring about renewal in your local church.

The students and staff of the College and Conference are taking renewal very seriously this year. In addition to our chapel and devotional periods each week, we have established discipling groups which emphasize the development of a consistent and meaningful devotional life; memorization of Scripture; inductive Bible study; and learning how to be a small group Bible discussion leader. We are pleased with the spiritual growth that is taking place among our students and staff.

Our staff is again emphasizing prayer and dependence upon God. At a recent chapel service, I shared that earlier in the day after the mail had been opened and deposits made, that it was necessary to borrow \$2,500 to pay the final bills for the month. Students and staff spent time in prayer asking God to provide for our financial needs. Later in the day, we were handed a check for \$2,540 for the general fund. We rejoice in God's immediate answer to our prayers. We are totally convinced that God touches the hearts of his people which causes them to respond to needs that they may not even be aware of at the time. It is my prayer that our entire membership will be open to God's leading as he convicts or prods us to do those things which will further his work.

We rejoice in the many people who came to the Oregon Bible College campus for our Homecoming Weekend in early October. An enjoyable time of fellowship was experienced by alumni of Oregon Bible College as they met to reminisce, to attend classes, and to take part in Oregon's annual Autumnon-Parade Festival.

The Program Committee for the 1987 General Conference met in Grand Rapids, Michigan, during October. The conference will be held at Calvin College August 3-7. The 1987 Conference will be a "working" Conference, rather than just a "listening" Conference. Delegates will become involved in specific planning and strategizing regarding church planting and the development of Church of God ministries through the rest of this century if the Lord tarries. We encourage churches to send delegates to the Conference who are willing to actively participate in planning and implementing the Church of God vision for the future. All members of the Church of God are invited to attend the conference whether you are appointed as a delegate from your church/conference or not. Your input, participation, and involvement will be appreciated.

Though I am confident that Church of God members are not overly concerned about the tax implications of their giving to the Lord's work, I encourage each Church of God member in the United States to be aware of the tax reform law that has been passed by Congress. A careful examination of the reform law indicates that there are many attractive reasons to give generously during 1986. In essence, by providing generous tax deductions for charitable gifts, the Federal government makes it financially attractive to give. Of each dollar that you contribute to the Lord's work, your taxes are being reduced in some cases by a sizable amount, depending upon your current tax bracket. Please keep

these thoughts in mind as you plan your giving for the remainder of this calendar year.

Many thanks to all of you who have responded to the membership mailing from my office in early October. Hundreds of Church of God members have signed petitions supporting the effort to improve prime-time television. It is apparent that many Church of God members share my deep concern about network programming. Your words of support and encouragement are greatly appreciated. Thanks also for your contributions which accompanied your response cards and petitions.

Conference and College staff members have traveled extensively this fall to many local churches, State Conferences, and youth retreats. We welcome invitations to participate in local and district meetings by providing guest speakers, gospel teams, musical groups, seminars, etc. Our earnest desire is to serve you by assisting in your ministry.

I urge each member of the Church of God to carefully consider involvement in the Oregon Bible College Foundation. Bulletin inserts have been provided to each of our churches for use this fall. It is our desire to inform all members of the progress that has been made toward our million-dollar goal, and to gain support for this worthwhile project.

Though we are pleased with the quality of students who are attending Oregon Bible College this year, our enrollment is down from the figures that were projected a year and a half ago when our budget was prepared. This will reduce our projected income by about \$50,000. Our staff is doing everything in its power to reduce spending; however, there is an urgent need to increase contributions. (Please see page 9 for additional information regarding our current financial situation.) Please make the financial needs of the Conference a matter of prayer.

Chapel on the Hill Celebrates First Anniversary

On August 25, 1985, The Chapel on the Hill Church of God in Urbana, Ohio, had its first service. A plaque of recognition was presented at General Conference this past summer to this new congregation. The plaque was delivered by Ruth Overholser and presented to Gilbert Pensyl. Gilbert, who assists the congregation with pastoral duties, is shown with his wife Dotty holding the plaque presented by the General Conference.



On August 24, the first anniversary was held with more than 86 attending. In the last five months three persons have been baptized into Christ.

We praise God for this new congregation and the ministry of the Church of God going forth in Urbana, Ohio.

News From the Church of God, Ogden, Utah.

In early January a small group of Church of God families began meeting for individual Bible Studies with the Don Nunemaker family near Ogden. At the same time Don ran advertisements in the local newspapers concerning the Bible studies. This particular effort soon produced one regular family for the studies, and after six months three of the family members were baptized.

In the spring this group made a bold move and began construction of a church constitution. The main purpose

was to establish a Church of God in the Utah valley. The group faced the perplexing problem of how to make contacts and evangelize the people of the area. In this area, to penetrate the community with the word of Christ is most difficult because 70% of the people are Mormon.

However, the answer to the problem came from within the group. Ron and Sandi Carr own a Not-for-Profit Christian preschool. This school makes it possible for Ron and Sandi to evangelize parents and grandparents of the preschoolers.

Considering the fact that one of the greatest needs of the area is for preschools, the Step-by-Step Preschool provides a good opener to the homes in the area. At present the school has no facilities. It is the intention of the Church of God core group in Utah to help Ron and Sandi construct the needed facilities. Once completed the facility would be beneficial to both the preschool and the Church of God.

Ron and Sandi will refer to the church all those desiring to know more of Christ and the Word. Also, Church of God services will be held in the school.

In order to start this endeavor, financial help is needed from brothers and sisters in Christ. Initial contractor estimates range between \$10,000 to \$20,000 to remodel a garage to house the preschool and provide a facility for Church of God services.

The core group in Utah states, "We confidently predict that eight families a year can be successfully evangelized and incorporated into the Church. We also predict after a period of two to three years it will be necessary to relocate to a larger facility because of anticipated growth. Therefore we make this plea for your assistance."

municated the message through human witness which resulted in spiritual and numerical growth and *geographic* expansion.

The Church of God, in obedience to Scripture, has the same responsibility and opportunity. It is vital that the Church of God extend its ministry with the message of salvation to more geographic locations. Just how vital this is is underscored by the comments in a letter from Pastor Dick Eldred of the newly planted North Kent Church of God. A man Dick baptized last March died and Dick had his funeral. The man's son said to Dick, "If Dad had not met you, he would be lost today." This, friends, is the heart of why Church planting is a must. The message we believe is important for salvation must be shared with a broader scope of the population than we are reaching at the present. Progress Report From the Fox Valley Church, Aurora, IL

A renewed effort of outreach resulted from the congregation's decision to meet once a week and pray for God's direction using four specific questions:

- 1. Whom does God want us to reach as a group? as individuals?
 - 2. Does God want us to relocate?
- 3. Does God want us to minister in a way we are not now doing?
- 4. What commitments does God want us to make that he will bless?

There was also prayer for the unity of the group and strength to do God's work through outreach.

Pastor Ron Macy states, "There has been a perceptible change in the unity and attitude of the group, especially among those who have committed themselves to meeting at 9:30 every Sunday morning for prayer."

Renewed efforts of prospecting were started in the Naperville area. Following sample calling in various areas the Springbrook Crossing/Brook Crossing subdivisions were determined as the target area of concentration. Prospect visitation to 175 homes resulted in contacting 106 people, with 13 of these indicating possible interest.

The Robert Clow Elementary School in the center of these subdivisions has been secured for an experimental midweek Bible study. In support of this outreach Bible study, eight of the regular attenders were present and two newcomers.

The Fox Valley members are supporting the effort with an organized prayer program. The members are given updated lists of the prospects for whom they can pray. The list will be divided into six groups. An individual will pray for one group each day of the week and so will be able to pray for all the prospects each week. Each church family will start praying for a different group; thus all prospects will be prayed for daily. Information about the prospects will be provided to the prayer-support people.


We all have an opportunity to support this effort with our prayers.



1987 Summer Conference

The 67th annual Church of God General Conference will meet August 3-7 at Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Dozens of workshops, classes for all ages, sermons, special music, and a variety of recreational opportunities have been planned for this four-day Conference.

Delegates and friends will be taking a close look at the mission of the Church of God through the rest of the 20th century. Attendees will participate in local church and state conference caucuses to develop plans for strengthening existing churches and planting new churches in the coming years.

We urge all of you who have an interest in the future of the Church of God to be present for this pace-setting Conference.

Board of Dirctors Meet

The Board of Directors met in Oregon, Illinois, January 8-10, for its annual mid-winter long-range planning meeting. Among the items discussed and acted upon were:

- 1. Review of the financial reports of the Conference/College.
- 2. Approval of the audit report prepared by Lindgren, Callihan, Van Osdol, and Co.
- 3. Heard reports from Oregon Bible College regarding the development of a policy manual, further education for staff members, and the relationship of the College to the entire work of the Church of God.
- 4. Heard a report of the Outreach and Church Development Department regarding church planting, mission trips, publishing plans, and a church-planting conference to be held in January.
- 5. The organizational structure of the Conference was reviewed.
- 6. Long-range planning topics relative to relocation, student recruitment, fund-raising strategies, efforts to assist local pastors, and efforts to meet the needs of all segments of the Church of God were discussed.
- 7. A resolution was unanimously approved expressing appreciation to the entire staff for their faithful service.

Advisory Committees Meet

Five Advisory Commmittees met before and after the Board of Directors meeting to deal with specific aspects of the work. The five committees are: Higher Education; Foreign Missions; Sunday School; Youth; Media.

Each committee consists of two individuals selected by the delegates, a member of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board, and a member of the staff appointed by the President. The Committees are involved in research and long-range planning, and they serve as vehicles of communication to and from our church membership. They serve as advisors to the Conference/College staff.

Putting Your Wheels to Work

In the past two years, we have encouraged the donation of vehicles to the Conference/College to assist with our transportation needs. We are very grateful to the Valley View Bible Church, Scottsdale, AZ, for the gift of a used 15-passenger van. We also appreciate the gift of a used Volkswagon from Dean and Shirley Vance, West Milton, Ohio. We greatly appreciate these two gifts. We continue to encourage others to consider this way of contributing to our work.

Financial Update

As of January 31, contributions for the current fiscal year were approximately \$21,000 above those received at this same point a year ago. We are very grateful for the consistent giving of so many Church of God congregations, conferences, and individuals.

We are particularly grateful for many end-of-the-year gifts which permitted us to reach the Goal for Giving.

Many of you contributed funds during the past year to purchase a replacement van for the Conference/College. In light of the donated van from Valley View, the funds will be held in escrow and will be used for future vehicle replacement. Thanks to all who contributed to this special fund.

Feasibility Study in London, England

The possibility of starting a Church of God in London has been under consideration the last couple of years. We have two men in England, John Cunningham and Ken Newman, who are very interested in the Church of God. A literature distribution of *The Restitution Herald* produced more contacts in the area. It now seems necessary to take further steps in developing a work in London and to followup on the contacts secured there.

Warren and Irene Sorenson plan to conduct a feasibility study in London March 9-19, 1987, to accomplish the following objectives. 1) To conduct a sample door-to-door survey as a means of evaluating the receptivity of the people and to determine appropriate methods for building a nucleus to start a church in London. 2) To meet with John Cunningham and Ken Newman and followup on as many contacts as possible to determine their interest and possible involvement in starting a church. It is planned to meet with these contacts individually and to arrange for a group meeting if possible. 3) To evaluate the feasibility of starting a church in London. To interview clergy of various churches as a means of gathering data to assist in planning appropriate strategies for planting a church there. 4) To evaluate if it would be appropriate for a ministry team to go to London, and if so, to determine the area best suited for its work in starting a church, and what would be the best approach for a team ministry.

Your prayer support will be greatly appreciated. The approximate cost will be \$2500. Designated contributions can be made to the London church-planting project.

Cross-Culture Mission Trips

Lima, Peru

Early in January Anthony Buzzard made a trip to Lima, Peru. The purpose of his trip was to meet with Mario Olcese who lives in Lima and discuss the possibilities of working with him in establishing a Church of God mission field there. He also investigated the advisability of sending a ministry team to Lima to assist in this work.

Mario is already preaching to a small group. During the four days which Anthony spent there he met with Mario for intensive Bible study (seven hours each day). Occasionally





1987 Annual General Conference

Enclosed with this issue of the PROGRESS JOURNAL is a brochure and registration form for the 1987 General Conference. Additional registration forms are available in local churches. A separate registration form should be filled out for each person

attending conference.

I urge each church to send delegates and interested persons to this Conference. Conference delegates play a very strategic role. Their function is to make the wishes of their local churches known as decisions are made on the Conference floor. They have an equally important responsibility to report back to their local churches the decisions that have been made and help to implement them. A position description for Conference delegates will be included in the summer JOURNAL.

The summer PROGRESS JOURNAL will contain reports of departments and special boards and committees. A budget draft for the fiscal year June 1, 1988 - May 31, 1989, will be proposed. Several recommendations will be presented. Nominations for two positions on the Board of Directors-Trustees will be included. After being reviewed by the membership, delegates should be instructed how to accurately reflect

the wishes of the congregation.

Concerted prayer by delegates and members should accompany the preparation for the General Conference and the business sessions. As we focus upon those who are lost and our evangelistic effort, we must experience God's direction.

Board of Directors' Meeting

The Board of Directors is meeting April 26-28 to finalize plans for the summer Conference and to conduct other business of the Conference and College. Your prayer support for our Board members will be appreciated. Board members contribute many hours in service to the work of the Church of God each year.

Ministerial Conference

Church of God pastors are meeting in Oregon, Illinois, for the annual Ministerial Conference, April 27 - May 1. The theme of the Conference is, "First Aid for Wounded Soldiers." The program will focus on uplifting and encouraging pastors of local churches. The program is being planned by ministers from the southwest.

Financial Report

The end of March marked the conclusion of 10 months of our fiscal year. Contributions are approximately \$12,108 short of our Goal for Giving. The amount needed for 10 months is \$310,440; the amount received for 10 months is \$298,332. Since contributions have been less, and less income has been received from tuition, board, and room because of the small college enrollment this year, it has been necessary to borrow \$26,300 to carry on our work this year.

We continue to invite Church of God families to become members of the Development Council, which includes a commitment of \$500 or more during the calendar year; or to become a member of the Founders' Circle with a commitment of \$120—\$499 per year. We appreciate those who have made commitments thus far, and we appreciate the faithful support of many individuals, families, churches, and

conferences.

Scott Deane, who finished his course work in December, is presently involved in the internship program under the supervision of Pastor Richard Smith in South Carolina.

It is our joy to graduate these three very gifted students, who have excelled in their studies at OBC. We pray God's guidance and protection on their lives.

High School Invitational

Many students from our churches got a "Preview" of what it's like to be an OBC student for a couple days at our recent High School Invitational. It was held the weekend of April 9-11.

The highlight of the weekend was a concert by a young up-and-coming Christian contemporary musical group, *Surrender*, a six-man band from Warsaw, Indiana. We had it in the local high school to help attract

Recruitment

What is the primary motivator when a senior in high school comes to the point of decision regarding his vocation and career? I imagine most are like I was at that age. was the key to achieving it (I thought).

"Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven . . . for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matt. 6:33, 20, 21.)

London Survey Trip

When Irene and I boarded a 747 Jumbo Jet at Newark International Airport bound for London, England, we did so with some degree of apprehension. We had conducted feasibility surveys several times previously. This was our first attempt in another country, and the unknown usually produces some nervousness.

When we boarded the plane for the return trip on March 19th we were filled with optimism and expectation of what God can do through the Church of God in England. The reasons for this came from our experiences during the nine days we spent in the London area.

We very much enjoyed our association and conversations with Ken Newman and John Cunningham, our contact persons in England. Ken and John are dedicated faithful men who love the truth. Their interest in the gospel and desire to see others come to understand it is refreshing. They have conducted Bible studies with various individuals from time to time. Presently they are the two who share our doctrinal views.

The prayer support which many of you gave us was greatly appreciated. Irene and I could sense the prayers of God's people on our behalf. We were very much aware of God's presence and assistance as a result of this support in prayer. We experienced God's protection in several waysespecially while driving in unfa-

miliar territory and in strange traffic patterns. It's difficult getting used to steering from the right side of the car and traveling on the left side of the road.

We also felt God's leadership in helping us to accomplish our purpose. Certainly if God answered prayer regarding a preliminary survey about the possibility of establishing a church in

England, he will continue to answer as we carry through with the reality of a Church of God in England. Specific prayer is needed for these:

- John Cunningham and Ken Newman, who continue to hold the truth in England.
- That God will call someone to be a Church Planter in England.
- That God will provide the needed resources for the Church-planting project.
- That there will be unity of purpose among Church of God people in this mission effort.

One question regarding the potential of establishing a church in the London area was:

How would people there respond to strangers? We soon discovered that England is a land of people with a heart. We met people who were very open, friendly, and kind. Irene and I drove into a neighborhood just to talk to people. We were invited into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cuddeford and spent the entire afternoon with them. They graciously served tea and biscuits (cookies) and talked freely about themselves and their church affiliations.

Another point of interest in our survey was to learn something about the churches in England and the attitudes of people concerning the gospel. We visited a small church which has been growing since returning to a more Bible-based ministry. This congregation had many young families in its membership. The service on the Sunday we attended was conducted by the youth group. We learned through conversations that some churches in England are growing and that growth results when the church uses the Bible and allows God's power to work. There are few of these churches in England. Thus the opportunity is there to plant a Bible-based spiritual church. It is challenging to realize that people are interested in a church with a Bible message. The Church of God certainly has an important Bible message to share.

The conviction that there is potential for establishing a Church of God in England is based upon the dedication and zeal of John and Ken, who provide a doctrinal stability; the openness of people in the area to respond; and the fact that people are interested in a Bible-based spiritual church (for many years the Church of England has provided a "decorative cathedral religion" without substance or meaning). Irene and I met a couple from the Baptist denomination who were in England for the purpose of starting a church; we met a couple of men from the Seventh Day Adventist Church who were doing the same thing; and we talked to a couple of J.W.'s who were going door to door. We have the vision that God wants the voice of the Church of God to be heard there also. If we as his church respond in faith, it will become a reality. Faith is not only believing God can—it is believing God WILL.







Prayer Day brought us all closer to God, Christ, and each other. There was no way anyone could have left Prayer Day without feeling the power of God's Holy Spirit within.














PRESIDENT'S PROGRESS REPORT

As we conclude the 67th year of operation of the Church of God General Conference, we praise God for his sustaining hand and direction. In many ways, the past year has yielded rewarding results, while at the same time presenting significant challenges to our membership.

The year began on a high note as we focused attention on the theme of the summer Conference, "Lord, Renew Us." The Conference helped to focus the attention of the Church of God upon prayer, confession of sin, praise for our heavenly Father, and a filling with God's Spirit, based on the promise of Luke 11:13 and the command of Ephesians 5:18. During the year there has been evidence of God's Spirit at work in the lives of our pastors and the membership. Many of our members have experienced a deeper spiritual life; God has become closer and more personally real. The filling of God's Spirit has brought greater peace and joy to many lives.

The renewal of our members is evident in the greater emphasis upon prayer and dependence on God. Renewal has been evident as members have shared their faith and experienced the joy of leading others to Christ.

Churches that have become renewed are catching a vision for new ministry in the church, in their neighborhoods, and in the world. Renewed churches have directed their focus outward to needy persons.

Two worthy churches were granted Church Builders' appeals during the year: Pine Grove Community Church, Minneapolis, MN; North Kent Bible Church, Rockford, MI. Church of God members responded generously to provide financial assistance to buy land and to help construct a building for the Minneapolis congregation. A second appeal for the North Kent Church was used to assist with building costs. Hopefully, many Church of God members will be able to attend the dedication of the North Kent Church on August 2 at 3:00 p.m., prior to General Conference in Grand Rapids.

Oregon Bible College hosted two special events during the year: an Alumni Homecoming Weekend in October, and a High School Invitational Conference in April. We were delighted to have guests visit the campus to observe the programs and activities of the institution for higher education for the Church of God.

Additional highlights at Oregon Bible College include: evangelism calling and lifestyle evangelism practiced by our students. There has been a tremendous sensitivity to ministering to the unconverted by our students. Practical experience in ministry is an essential part of the program

of Oregon Bible College.

Students at Oregon Bible College experienced a new emphasis on discipling techniques. Second Timothy 2:2 is a classic text on the principle of equipping followers of Christ to equip others to be equippers. The things that Paul had taught to Timothy were to be passed on by him to men who would in turn teach others. The principles of discipling are based upon a multiplication of followers of Christ. Spiritual growth took place as students encouraged each other in prayer, devotional Bible reading, Scripture memorization, and Bible study.

In the area of outreach, we have seen continued emphasis on reaching lost people in other lands. Visits were made to Peru, London, Mexico, and other contacts were cultivated through correspondence. The vision of the Church of God extends to the four corners of the earth.

During the year we have seen a ground swell of support and excitement about planting new churches. State Conferences are giving attention to church planting; Oregon Bible College students have been assisting with prospect calling; the staff of the Conference and College are investing time and effort into the strengthening of recently planted churches along with exploration of sites for new churches.

This year we have seen a growing number of people around the world express an interest in the distinctive teachings of the Church of God. A recent exciting contact is from an author in Boise, Idaho, who is writing a book on conditional immortality. He found our name in Edward Fudge's book, "The Fire That Consumes." He wrote to us asking our staff to review his book prior to publication. We have discovered that not only does he share a common belief on conditional immortality, but he also shares our understanding of the nature of God and Jesus. We rejoice in the spirit of inquiry which is causing large numbers of people to study the Scriptures and to come to an understanding of Bible truth.

The strength of the Church of God is based upon the strength of local churches. We rejoice with the churches who are developing a deep love and concern for those who are lost and who are willing to pay any price to reach them. It is exciting to see people involved in ministry.

An Outreach Focus

Looking back on the 67-year history of the Church of God General Conference, we recognize that there have been many changes in programs and activities as the Conference has attempted to serve the needs of Church of

God members, churches, and conferences. As society has changed, the ministry of the Church of God has changed to meet new needs.

As we face the future, there is a continuing need for us to be submissive to God's will and follow his direction. As you read the reports contained in this PROGRESS JOURNAL, you will observe our emphasis on the salvation of the lost, based upon a foundation of Scriptural truth. It is God's will that no one perish, but that everyone come to repentance. (2 Peter 3:9.) Therefore, the entire ministry of the Church of God must be focused upon finding the lost, responding to their need for salvation, assimilating them into our churches, and nurturing and equipping them for ministry.


The Bible Church of God stands in an enviable position today, with a solid foundation on the Bible, a proud history, and a bright future. As a body of believers, we must make Jesus Christ the Lord of our lives; we must make evangelism a part of our lifestyle; and we must go forth with joy to proclaim Bible truth to the world.

The Church of God can make a difference in the world through the rest of this century, if the Lord tarries. The local church, with Jesus Christ as its head, is at the center of God's plan for this world.

The leadership of the Conference and College is committed to training future professional leaders for the Church of God who have an outreach vision. Courses are being redesigned to equip our students, not only for ministry to existing churches and existing members, but ministry to new churches and new people. Students are being exposed to the challenges of ministry in our contemporary, secular society, along with ministry to Biblically illiterate individuals. Students will be gaining first-hand experience in church-planting, discipling, and evangelistic ministries. Additional information regarding improvements in our training programs will be shared at the summer General Conference.

Support of Conference/College Ministries

The following graph shows contributions received during the first 11 months of this fiscal year. Our Goal for Giving is \$31,000 per month. Contributions in December marked an all-time high of nearly \$57,000. However, giving was below our needs eight of the past 11 months. As of April 30, 1987, contributions were \$20,000 less than the Goal for Giving for the year.



We are very thankful for the many new families who have helped to support the Conference work during the past year. The giving levels for 1986 compared to 1985 are as follows:

As a result of a very successful Booster campaign, the number of supporters increased considerably in 1986. We encourage more individuals and families to help undergird our work in 1987. The General Conference seeks to be in partnership with all those who are committed to upholding the truths of Scripture and who have a burden for those who are lost.

OUTREACH AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT Vice-President's Progress Report



Warren Sorenson, Vice-President, Outreach and Church Development

The Church of God is in a very important period of time in its history. Significant issues and decisions need to be considered. A time of transition has been taking place within the Church of God and it is important that we intelligently evaluate the long-term effects. We also need to keep in mind the importance of following through with projects which have been started.

Some specific areas which involve the Department of Outreach and the transition taking place include:

1. An assertive church-planting effort.

2. An emphasis on evangelism as an essential

ministry of the local church.

3. The need for more involvement of the members of the local church in the ministry of the church and the role of the pastor as an equipper and leader of congregational mobilization.

4. The need to become more directly involved in missions by preparing Church of God people for

mission service.

5. The need to put a focus on a "harvest theology."6. Striving for qualitative and quantitative growth.

7. The need to allow God's Spirit to work in personal lives and in the life of the church.

As change begins to take place our "comfort zone" is challenged, and perhaps threatened. Personal growth takes place when we are willing to stretch ourselves. There is some degree of discomfort but it is important to reach forward. The Church of God is in the process of stretching beyond its comfort zone. The maintenance mentality which had crept into our churches has had a damaging effect on our effectiveness and has created many problems with

which we now have to deal. It is crucial that we continue to move forward with an emphasis on spiritual commitment, adhering to the truth, and obedience to the great commission.

There are some barriers which have to be crossed if this forward movement is to continue.


One of these is a defensive resistance to growth concepts and this usually comes to the surface when growth isn't taking place in the local church. It appears that an emphasis on growth produces some guilt if growth hasn't been taking place in the church.

A second barrier is the tradition that the "paid professional" does the work of the ministry; that's what he's paid to do. The mobilization of the congregation for ministry must take place if the church is to become

effective.

A third barrier is a lack of leadership which puts a focus on evangelism. Some pastors are uncomfortable with personal evangelism and one-to-one contact with people. This discomfort in evangelism is part of our history. Our heritage is to "preach truth," and we have found comfort in preaching that truth to those who already believe it. This is within our comfort zone. This emphasis on evangelism must begin in Oregon Bible College and permeate all of our congregations.

The process of development is for the pastor to take the lead. The second phase is to train and equip his people to follow that lead. As the people grow in ministry the pastor gradually gives more responsibility over to the congregation. As this takes place the pastor is leader of ministry and evangelism but not the only doer. The following diagram illustrates this principle. Note the increase of congregational involvement in the work of ministry.

CHURCH-PLANTING PROGRESS

Bloomington, Indiana

The Hillview Bible Church of God in Bloomington has been in the emerging stage since June, 1986, when pastor Cecil Rademachir and his family moved there to direct the church-planting effort. Two families, formerly from Ohio, and two young people attending Indiana University, make up the core group. A summer ministry team from OBC went to Bloomington to assist in developing a list of prospects. Irene and I have made various visits to provide consultation to the group. Russ Magaw has also provided on-site assistance as well as helping in prospect calling. Various methods including prospect calling, contacting new arrivals in the community, and mass mailing have been used to generate prospects. They have had some response from these efforts and presently one new couple is attending services.

Fox Valley, Aurora, Illinois

The church has been meeting in a rented facility in North Aurora. During the past year Ron Macy and calling teams from OBC did some prospect calling in the Naperville area. As a result a Bible study was started. Interest generated through the study led to renting a school in the area for Easter worship services. There was good response from the community with six new families attending on Easter. Because of this response Sunday services were moved to the new location. The school is no longer available and the group is looking for a new location in the Naperville area.

North Kent, Rockford, Michigan

North Kent is finishing its building project and good things are happening in the congregation. Early in the North Kent work three families were lost due to doctrinal differences. Recently two of these along with a friend contacted Dick expressing interest in renewing discussion on some of these differences. At least one discussion has taken place thus far. During General Conference at Grand Rapids, Dick will be conducting a workshop on how to teach Church of God doctrines in a positive manner.

Colorado Springs, Colorado

Alan Demmitt reports a renewed interest in outreach evangelism taking place throughout the congregation. New families have started to attend and the congregation has worked through some transitional problems. It is encouraging to see a growth pattern taking place in the Colorado Springs Church.

Hilliard, Ohio

Richard Smith, a member of the Pleasant Hill, Ohio, congregation, has been helping this new church by going once a month and holding services. It is intended to increase this to twice a month. The group meets regularly for services even though it does not have a pastor.

Urbana, Ohio

Fred Pensyl is continuing to work in the developing of the new church at Urbana. He plans to resign his work with the Pleasant Hill Church as a means of spending more time with the new group in Urbana.

Other Opportunities

Two small congregations, Metairie, Louisiana, and Ashtabula, Ohio, are very much interested in finding pastoral leadership to continue the development of establishing a church.

The group in Louisiana has a small building and worships on a regular basis. James Raymond served as pastor for a short time following his graduation from OBC.

Members of the group in Ohio have been meeting faithfully for Bible study for several years. They want a pastor to help lead them in developing beyond the Bible-study stage.

Prospective Church Planting Opportunities

Prospective church-planting opportunities include: London, England—a detailed report appeared in the last issue of the JOUR-

PROGRESS JOURNAL

NAL; Atlanta, Georgia—there is still a great deal of interest in establishing a church there. Contributions have been made and a fund established for this purpose; Missouri Conference several meetings, which included representatives from the General Conference, have been conducted to organize this project. They are actively seeking a church-planting pastor to launch this work in September, 1988; Peterborough, Ontario-the Fonthill congregation and the Bible-study group in Peterborough are planning a lecture series to take place in October, 1987. A facility has been rented for this purpose and plans are under way to launch this project.

State Conferences and local churches are important parts of our church-planting strategy. During General Conference at Grand Rapids, time will be devoted to meet with representatives of state conferences and all those interested in church planting.

A major problem in our church-planting effort is the lack of pastors to lead various projects. We have more opportunities than pastors to fill the leadership role in seeing these opportunities come to reality. The solution rests within our local churches. Our people need to unite in prayer for God to send forth workers into the harvest and at the same time support the training of these workers through Oregon Bible College.

YOUTH ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Youth Advisory Committee consists of Joe James (representing the Board of Directors), Bob Alcumbrack, Alan Demmitt (elected), and Kent Ross (representing the staff). Its most recent meeting was in January, prior to the Board of Directors' meeting, but there have been several consultations throughout the intervening months.

Plans are being finalized for Berean Youth Congress, this year being held at Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington, IL. Kent Ross continues as program director of the Congress program, but Pastor Greg Demmitt is functioning as coordinator of the program for youth workers, Pastor Jim Graham is coordinator for the post-high participants, and Pastor Tom New is coordinator for the high-school program. We anticipate a good representation from around the country.

One of the concerns has been the Challenge magazine. The Youth Advisory Committee felt it was needed as a way of communication between kids from all of our churches. With the low state of the Conference finances, and the low number of subscribers, it was not possible to publish until just recently. But the kids have contributed generously through Coins-for-Christ and our first issues are now coming out. The first is already in the hands of our young people and the second is in the works. Pastors Dick Alcumbrack and Greg Demmitt are functioning as editors for the next issues, and have exciting plans for the magazine.

Plans for next year include making Fall the time for our Coins-for-Christ Crusade, and putting the Youth Week emphasis in the Spring.

The committee solicits your prayers and active input regarding the program that will enable us to better serve our young people. Feel free to write and give us your advice and suggestions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Foreign Missions Advisory Committee met on January 10, 1987, to discuss the work of missions within the Church of God and to clarify the role the members are to play in missions.

The trip Judy Myers made to Mexico and ways we could be supportive of the Badillos in their ministry were discussed. The Badillos have suggested areas they would appreciate help in by teams coming down in the summertime. These were discussed at length. They are willing to work with us in providing crosscultural experience for anyone interested in mission work.

The India work was discussed and what role we could play considering the distance separating us from the work in India. It was felt that we could not run a mission work by remote control and that until we are able to provide personnel on the field our hands are tied.

We also discussed the trip the Sorensons would be taking to London and the hopes for a future church there.

The Outreach Newsletter will be published three times each year.

We spent time discussing what each member considered to be his/her areas of expertise and how these could aid the mission work of the Church of God.

This committee is to advise, and provide information to, the people of the Church of God. We are willing to go to any church to provide seminars or to assist in any way we can. It is the local church that provides the needed persons for missions. Neither the General Conference nor the Foreign Missions Advisory Committee is responsible for world evangelization. That is the job for the local church. The committee is only a resource center. Without the local church doing its part, we can do nothing.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The initial action of the Christian Education Advisory Committee was one of determining our purpose and establishing our objectives.

Purpose: As a Christian Education Advisory Committee, we view our purpose as one of assessing the needs of the Church of God educational ministries, directing our attention to solutions for those needs, and providing assistance and motivation for impacting life transformation changes through these educational

Objectives: 1. To send a letter to all pastors and S.S. Superintendents introducing ourselves as a committee, presenting our initial objectives, and inquiring as to how we can best serve them. 2. To promote the spiritual development of those in teacher/leadership positions. 3. To publish a quarterly Christian Education Newsletter to be sent to all workers in Christian Education. 4. To develop workshops pertaining to all aspects of Christian Education to be presented in local churches or conferences upon request. 5. To establish and continue to expand a resource center for the distribution of Christian Educational materials. 6. To request that one member of our committee meet with the

curriculum committee to coordinate our efforts. 7. To request at least one workshop on a Christian Education topic be presented each year at Christian Workers' Seminar and General Conference. 8. To attend workshops on Christian Education topics (including the National Congress of Christian Education). 9. To strengthen the role of the S.S. Superintendent. 10. To promote the involvement of the family unit in Christian education ministries.

A review of the responses to the survey sent to Pastors and S.S. Superintendents revealed items of major interest to them. The top five were: 1. Follow-up and visitation. 2. Teaching materials. 3. Sunday School openings. 4. Teachers' Meetings. 5. Audiovisual materials.

A quarterly newsletter, the "Focus," was created having each of the above topics as the central theme for a quarter. These were distributed with S.S. quarterly orders in November, 1986, February, 1987, and May, 1987.

Workshops on S.S. topics were conducted throughout the year by members of the advisory committee as follows:

Carol Ring—Christian Workers' Seminar and Brush Creek, Ohio.

Joyce Knapp—Virginia Conference; Gayle Guthrie—North Hills, Ohio.

We are prepared to conduct further workshops, and plans are being made for a S.S. convention to be held in the fall. The following are considered to be the individual strengths of the members of the committee: Dick Eldred—Personal Spiritual Growth; How to Tactfully Share Your Doctrine. Carol Ring—S.S. Openings; Award Systems; Teachers Meetings. Joyce Knapp—After School Programs; Follow-Up Visitation; Teaching Methods; Objectives—How to Write and Accomplish. Gayle Guthrie—Lesson Organization; Teaching Methods; Audiovisual Materials; Nurturing Your Students.

Joyce Knapp was appointed to represent the committee on the Curriculum Committee. She also attended the National Congress of Christian Education and reported that experience at our January meeting.

We continue to pursue our purpose and strengthening and developing the educational ministries of the Church of God General Conference and respectfully submit this report for your information and approval.

MEDIA ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Media Advisory Committee had its first meeting January 6, 7, 1987, and discussed an 11-point agenda, arriving at some startling results.

Meeting notes have been condensed to cover the following 15 observations:

1. The best advertisement of the Church of God General Conference/Oregon Bible College takes place in the lives of those in ministry who have been trained by the institution. Multimedia materials should be gathered of these persons in their ministry setting, showing the results of their ministry.

2. A multimedia presentation using some of the material noted in number 1 can be utilized in a presentation which staff

will take on the road, telling the story of the institution.

3. The Media Advisory Committee must contribute to the celebration of Oregon Bible College's 50th anniversary in 1989.

4. The Minneapolis Building Project scheduled for August, 1987, should be documented with media techniques.

- 5. Several "How To" packages relating to special media needs for local churches will be developed. The package will include ideas for use of the following:
 - Direct Mail
 - Church Introduction Packets
 - Print Ads
- 6. Be responsible for contemporary graphic design in all products produced by Printing and Publishing Services.
- 7. Assist in the production of an outreach publication as often as twice a year.
- 8. Establish a Media Department with the following functions:
 - · Graphic Design consultation
 - Scripting
 - · Archival/Librarial/Editorial consultation
 - Photography
- 9. Supply consultation for Oregon Bible College audio cassette correspondance courses.
- 10. Secure part time media consultation for special projects.
- 11. Establish a general philosophy of media for Printing and Publishing Services.
- 12. Urge a consistent ministry flow chart which might be indicated by the following:
 - a. All ministry begins at the personal, one-to-one level.
 - b. The local church is the front-line of ministry.
 - c. The General Conference supplies tools for local church needs.
 - d. Media interests only package the message of ministry. It is not a panacea to solve ministry problems.
- 13. The message of the church must be pitched to Baby Boomers who ask, "What's in it for me?"
- 14. Media provide communication that creates consciousness and enthusiasm for the ministry of the church.
- 15. In response to the above observations, assignments were designated as follows:
 - a. Investigate video production of Church of God recent history. Tim Landry estimated costs at \$20,000.
 - b. Empower a staff member to produce audio cassette OBC correspondence courses.
 - c. Create tools for church planting. Russ Magaw and Warren Sorenson in charge.
 - d. Request multimedia documents from local churches for future productions. Russ Magaw in charge.
 - e. Prepare "How To" materials (see number 5). Tim Landry in charge.
 - f. Investigate production of Christian music video using Church of God youth music. Youth Advisory Committee in charge.

The committee's next meeting is August 1, 1987, at Calvin College.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S PROGRESS REPORT Oregon Bible College

Another year has come and gone; for me, the 17th as a student and instructor at OBC. I have always been content that I am where I am supposed to be.

To define growth seems easy when I observe that which is specific and measurable. Kent Ross and Anthony Buzzard continue their studies in graduate school and the fruits are evident in new insights into Theology and the depth of content in the classroom. Janet Stilson took a group to South Bend to work in Hope Rescue Mission for a couple of days. The OBC Chorale performed over 20 concerts in churches, at organizations for the elderly, and in a state correctional center. A new student and his wife were led to Christ, baptized, and he came to OBC as a student second semester. Judy Myers and Alane Schmidlapp went to Mexico to minister at Christmas. Another student is corresponding and encouraging an inmate in a state prison. Several weekends students volunteered to do prospect calling. 
I very much appreciate the very capable and experienced help of Mary Hoffman, David Hall, and Bill Burnham in their respective disciplines. Each is well prepared and skilled at what he/she does. Dennis Cheatwood served as Men's Dorm Director for the second year. He is completing his time at OBC, will graduate, and go into the Internship Program.

Becky Roseberry joined our staff this year as Women's Dorm Director, musical associate and performed in a variety of functions as needed. She will be getting married in June to Jeff Bull. We are happy for her.

Our instructional staff has been complemented by various guest pastors. They are: Brian Atra, Jack Hearp, Scott and Shelly Millard, teaching intensives. We've been privileged to have a number of visiting pastors speak in Chapel and contribute to classes.

We began the year with 24 students which was down from the previous year. I hope and pray that next year I can say the opposite. We have tried to make contact and encourage young people to come to OBC. We are having some success in recruitment but it is not easy. For various reasons a Bible College education doesn't appeal to many. We were very much encouraged by the High School Invitational in April. Over 40 students came and "previewed" us. It was modestly successful and surely will provide additional help to students next school year.

Attempting to entice future students to enroll early, we introduced a \$300 incentive scholarship to any student who would complete registration by May 1. Ministers Fund

Church of God Investment Fund

The Church of God Investment Fund was incorporated in 1982. The purpose of this fund is to accept money from depositors and to lend money to churches.

Because of a rapidly fluctuating interest market over the past several years, the trustees have agreed to delay accepting funds from depositors.

However, the Investment Fund has been designated as the recipient of Church Builders funds that have been rethe pastor upon retirement and \$50 for the widow; these amounts have doubled from the starting benefits in 1968.

The Board of Trustees at the next Biannual meeting in 1988 will propose changes in the Rules and Regulations of the Association that will make it possible for the individual pastor to make larger contributions and reap larger benefits upon retirement. In recent years all funds were invested with Aetna Insurance Company. We are now using other areas of financing and investments as well to our benefit. RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation One

The following motion was presented at the 1986 summer Conference. The Chairman ruled that it was a major motion and that it would be presented to the delegates at the 1987 General Conference for action.

"Delbert Jones moved 'that all churches and individuals who wish to contribute to the church-planting be encouraged to send their checks to the General Conference headquarters. Funds could be earmarked for a particular church work. Churches who receive such funds should be encouraged to give quarterly reports to the Conference President.' Ed Bender seconded the motion."

Explanation: On the floor of the Conference last summer, it was expressed that implementation of this motion would make it possible for accurate records to be kept of how much money is being received by each of the new churches.



Recommendation Two

At the 1986 summer General Conference, the following resolution was offered for consideration by the delegates. The Chairman ruled that it was a major motion and will be presented to the 1987 General Conference.

"President Krogh moved adoption of the following resolution: 'the members of the Church of God General Conference endorse the efforts of Christian Leaders for Responsible Television as they call upon the television networks and advertisers to take immediate steps to reduce incidents of sex, violence, and profanity in television programming.' Delbert Jones seconded."

Explanation: Christian Leaders for Responsible Television is an organization of denominational leaders who

are taking the initiative in dealing with immorality on television. President Krogh represents the Church of God General Conference in this organization. The adoption of this resolution will provide a public statement of our concern as a group of believers regarding immorality on network television.

Recommendation Three

The Board of Directors recommends a revision of the Higher Education Advisory Committee for Oregon Bible College.



We recommend that the Higher Education Advisory Committee consist of one member of the Board of Directors, selected by the Board; a staff member selected by the President; one Church of God lay member elected by the delegates for a four-year term; and one Church of God pastor chosen by the Ministerial Conference Association for a four-year term.

Explanation: At the present time, the Advisory Committee consists of a Board member, a staff member, and two individuals selected by the delegates.

The primary purpose for Oregon Bible College is to train pastors for the Church of God. It is important to have at least one active pastor serve as an advisor to Oregon Bible College to represent the concerns and experiences of our pastors. Though it is possible that some of the other individuals elected or appointed to this committee may be active pastors, this recommendation will guarantee representation by the Ministerial Association on this important advisory committee.

If this recommendation is adopted by the delegates, the Ministerial Association will be asked to select its representative during this General Conference.

BRENDA WESSEL

The Illinois State Conference is hereby proposing the name of Brenda Wessel of Frederick, Illinois, as a nominee for the Board of Directors of the Church of God General Conference. Brenda has been a life-time member of the Ripley Church of God in Ripley, IL.

Brenda is the mother of two sons, ages 13 and 18, and is married to Jon (Tony) Wessel. Brenda is employed by the Illinois Department of Public Aid. She has been employed by them for over 20 years. She is now a caseworker determining eligibility of clients for assistance programs offered by the Department and maintaining case files for clients.

Brenda has served her church by holding several Berean offices, Assistant Sunday School Superintendant, Youth Leader, Church Treasurer, and Vacation Bible School Director.  - a. Employ a President who is responsible for the administration of the work of the Church of God General Conference and Oregon Bible College.
- 2. Serve as Trustee of Oregon Bible College.
- 3. Serve as a Trustee of Oregon Bible College Development Foundation (13 members).
- 4. Give general (external) supervision to all Conference/College affairs.
- 5. Engage in long-range planning and evaluation.
- Make recommendations to Conference delegates regarding:
 - a. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws
 - b. Major policy or major policy changes
 - c. Creation of major programs
 - d. Budgeting
- 7. Acquire and dispose of real and personal property.
- 8. Approve borrowings and other plans to finance operations.
- Give of his private means to support the Conference/ College and be actively engaged in fundraising activities.
- 10. Establish controls to protect the rights and interests of contributors, member churches and conferences, and staff.
- Communicate the purposes and programs of the Conference/College to the Church of God through public-relations efforts.

- 12. Employ competent auditor.
- 13. Attend all meetings of the Board and the Annual Conference.


Organizational Relationships:

Explanation of Budget

The proposed budget for June 1, 1988 - May 31, 1989, represents an investment in people, programs, and facilities. This proposed budget reflects spending for the following:

1. Salaries and Wages—compensation is provided for eleven full-time employees; two full-time employees who work only during the school year; four half-time employees who work 12 months; and five part-time employees who work during the school year.

2. Social Security—the social security tax rate for 1988 and 1989 is 7.5%. We are not required to match social security taxes for our student employees.

3. Employee Benefits—this includes the life and health insurance, workmen's compensation, participation in the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, and miscellaneous fringe benefits.

4. Guest Instructors—all honorarium and travel expenses are paid for guest instructors who teach during intensive courses.

5. Advertising, recruitment—in addition to this amount funds for recruitment are included in printing, travel, and telephone line items below.

6. Films, Speakers—honorariums are paid to non-staff speakers at chapel and graduation.

7. Foreign Exchange—when foreign currency is converted into U.S. dollars, there is an expense to cover the difference in value.

8. Auto Expense—license plates, insurance, and upkeep are provided for Conference vehicles.

9. Office and Computer Supplies—paper, ribbons, stationery, and envelopes.

10. Royalties—a small fee is used to secure use of copyrighted material for our Sunday school curriculum.

11. Editorial—a small honorarium is paid to editors of our Sunday school curriculum.

12. Magazines, Library—a collection of religious and theological magazines are a part of our library collection.

13. Periodicals, Books, Dues—covers expenses incurred by staff as support for classes and their participation in professional organizations.

14. Postage—includes the mailing of the PROGRESS JOURNAL, The Restitution Herald, quarterlies, and correspon-

15. Professional Services—an annual audit is required by our

16. Repairs, Nonplant—this item covers maintenance contracts on computers and other office equipment.

17. Staff Education-staff members are encouraged to attend at least one seminar each year to remain current in their field.

18. Mailing Supplies-includes envelopes, boxes, and miscellaneous items.

19. Supplies and Expense—includes printing supplies, piano tunings, towels and paper, memorial plaques and flowers, and a multitude of other small-expense items.

20. Telephone—includes basic service and long-distance calls.

21. Travel—includes staff travel on behalf of the Conference and College, along with travel for advisory committees and Board of Directors.

PRAYER AND PRAISE CALENDAR

- 22. Assistance, Mission Points—a small amount of money is provided in support of overseas mission projects.
- 23. Assistance, Churches—Church Development Aid will be available for three churches.
 - 24. Repairs and Maintenance—includes upkeep on buildings.
- 25. Supplies and Expense—includes cleaning and building supplies.
- 26. Library Books—an attempt is made to make a few acquisitions each year to keep our collection current.
- 27. Equipment—a reserve fund to replace equipment as necessary.
- 28. Resale—includes all items purchased which are resold—including textbooks for the College students.
 - 29. Food—purchases for cafeteria.
- 30. Contingency—since this budget is being adopted 10 months before the fiscal year begins, this item provides a cushion for adjustment when the new budget begins June 1, 1988.

Projected Income

- 1. Sales—this includes income from sale of all quarterlies, tracts, books, etc.
 - 2. Herald Subscriptions—subscriptions are \$12 per year.
- 3. Trust and Endowment—these are undesignated funds given to the Conference and College that are invested and earning interest which can be used for general operations.
- 4. Tuition, Board, and Room—this income is based on a projected enrollment of 30 students at Oregon Bible College in '88-'89 school year.
- 5. Miscellaneous—this includes income from washers and dryers installed in the dormitories, miscellaneous rental income, and interest earnings that are generated during the year.

Contributions Needed

To accomplish the program goals for the General Conference and Oregon Bible College for 1988-'89, churches, conferences, and individual families will need to contribute \$387,000. This is \$32,250 per month.

This projection compares with \$368,000 required for the 1987-'88 fiscal year.



ROLE OF CONFERENCE DELEGATES

The Preamble to the Constitution of the Church of God General Conference states that "Delegates and interested members of the Church of God will meet at a designated place and time to confer in all matters pertaining to the spiritual life and business of the churches."

The Constitution then proceeds to state in Article II that "each member church of 15 or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each 50 of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

In addition to church delegates, the Constitution provides for delegates at large as follows:

- "a) the Board of Directors and one delegate from each state or district Conference:
 - b) the following licensed or ordained minsters: one who is actively pastoring a church; a full-time employee of the General Conference; those who have met either of the above qualifications and have reached retirement age."

Conference delegates play a very strategic role in the work of the Church of God. Delegates from local churches should be selected with great care. Delegates shall be active members of the Church of God, and it is important that they be able to successfully represent their local church and have interest in the work of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College.

Before attending Conference, delegates should:

- Carefully read the reports, recommendations, proposed budgets, and other information regarding the summer Conference.
- Meet with the Church Board, or the congregation, to determine the wishes of the local church regarding the business which will be transacted at the Conference.
- Be certain that the local church secretary has submitted a delegate form listing active members, along with the names of the delegates.
- 4) Send a registration form to the General Conference to make reservations for attendance prior to July 20.

The delegate will have important duties to perform while in attendance at Conference:

- 1) Register with the Credentials Committee upon arrival at Conference.
- 2) Attend all business sessions of the Conference.
- 3) If unable to attend a business session, contact an alternate delegate from your local church to serve.
- 4) Take careful notes of decisions that are made and information which is shared.
- Be prepared to make a personal commitment during Conference to the financial support of Conference/College ministries.
- After returning home, the delegate's work must continue by:
- Presenting a report to the congregation and/or Church Board, sharing information from Conference, and decisions which were made.
- 2) Encouraging participation of local members in General Conference programs and activities.
- 3) Contacting local church families to encourage them to make a commitment to send at least \$10 per month to the work of the Conference/College.

The work of the General Conference and Oregon Bible College will be greatly strengthened by delegates who take their responsibility seriously and who will follow the guidelines mentioned above.

Summer Conference Information

Site: The 1987 Church of God General Conference will be held at Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan,

Registration: Registration begins at 2:00 p.m. in the Fine Arts Center, Enter from the west side of the building. At registration, registration fees will be paid and housing assignments made.

Reservations and Conference Costs: A program and reservation form were mailed with the April/May PROGRESS JOURNAL. Additional copies may be ordered by writing to: Conference Registration, P.O. Box 100, Oregon, IL 61061.

Those who plan to attend only the evening services are not required to pay a commuter charge. Pastors and families will receive a 10 percent discount off the standard rates.

Youth: Youth must be accompanied to the Conference by a parent or responsible guardian. A full schedule of activities is planned for the youth. All youth attending the Conference will be expected to attend all the planned services and activities.

Children's Classes: A full schedule of activities is planned for all children eight years and under. Babysitting service is available for children two years and under. Junior church will be conducted each evening at 7:00 p.m. for those three to 12 years of age.

Gymnasium and Pool: A gymnasium and pool will be available at various times during the Conference. Anyone who plans to use these facilities must bring proper clothing.

Delegate Expense Pool: Each year delegates from the various churches and conferences have opportunity to pool their expenses and thus equalize the cost of the travel for those far away and those who live nearby. Delegate expense pool application forms have been mailed to each church and conference secretary, and each is urged to enter the pool. This is a fair means of assuring general delegate representation. The mileage rate this year is 10 cents.



Summer General Conference Report, September/October, 1987

1987 CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

The 67th annual Church of God General Conference was held at Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan, August 3-7. The theme of the Conference was "Who Will Love Them?" The purpose of the Conference was to clarify our motive for evangelistic effort: caring for the lost; to develop a specific strategy for planting 75 new churches by the year 2000; to help each person, local church, and district conference see their role in achieving our long-range goal; and to strengthen local churches and individual members.

Delegates and members arrived at the Conference with a sense of anticipation, and excitement and enthusiasm continued to build through the climax of the final service.

Evening Services

Monday evening, the Conference/College President, David Krogh, spoke on the subject, "A New Beginning." He discussed the reason for the existence of the Church of God: our distinctive message; and the mission that God has called us to: the redemption of the lost. He shared a dream for the Church of God in which the church is built upon the foundation of truth, and consists of corner-

posts of evangelism, discipling, action, and commitment. The roof of the building is love for God and for all men. He shared a vision of revitalizing our existing churches and planting 75 new churches between now and the turn of the century.

It is anticipated that a number of similar church-planting projects will be undertaken in the coming years. These experiences will give our college students on-the-job training in ministering to new people in a new church setting.

As plans continue to unfold in the use of students and staff in planting new churches, the Board of Directors is giving prayerful and careful consideration to the eventual relocation of the Conference and College. CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Brothers and sisters in Christ, it is a great pleasure for me to welcome you to this 67th Annual Meeting of the Church of God General Conference. You as delegates are meeting here in conference at Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Michigan, to represent the total membership of the Church of God General Conference in acting on the annual business agenda of this conference. You have been empowered as delegates of local churches, state or regional conferences, pastors, staff members, or members of the board of directors, to express yourself and vote on issues which come before this body.

You as delegates have great responsibilities. First, as stewards of God's work, delegates are responsible for acting according to the leading of God's Spirit and for the glory and honor of God. Secondly, delegates have the responsibility to make decisions and take actions that are in the best interest of all our members and churches, especially as the membership endeavors to carry out the Great Commission given to us by Jesus Christ, the head of God's church.

We enter this conference seeking God's leadership and direction and we also wish to express our thankfulness to God for the rich heritage of our people. The study, teaching, faith, and steadfastness of our foreparents make possible the celebration of faith and worship at this annual conference. We can look back in a spirit of thanksgiving and humility while praising God for entrusting the truths of his Word to us and allowing us to share in the covenants of promise made to Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, David, and other heroes of faith. We are thankful to God that the gospel of salvation has been shared with us. We are ever grateful that faithful servants of God have brought to us the hope of the second coming of Jesus, of eternal life and resurrection, and of living forever in the kingdom of God—the earth restored.

What tremendous responsibilities this places on us; 2 Timothy 2:2 tells us that we have the reponsibility committing to others the message of salvation that has been shared with us. The world about us is in need of forgiveness, redemption, and salvation which only comes through Christ. We have the message that is needed by everyone. Mark 3:14 explains to us that Jesus set this process in motion as he chose his disciples, prepared them, and sent them forth to repeat what they had learned and experienced.

Yes, we have the heritage, the foundation of

Biblical truths, and the promise of God's power as described in Acts 2:38. The difficult responsibility of committing these to others is a major challenge before us today. It is imperative that we examine our mission in relation to the times in which we live and the needs of those about us. Jesus was not kidding when he gave the Great Commisson. It is time for us to approach God through earnest prayer, asking that he give us a vision of the mission he would have us accomplish during these final years of the twentieth century. I sincerely believe that God has approached us through our conference leadership with the burden of reaching the lost by planting 75 new churches by the turn of the century. Can each of us grasp this vision and make it our own vision? Can we pray individually for God to use us as he sees fit in carrying out this mission?

A goal must be ambitious if it is to be stimulating and challenging. The goal of 75 new churches by the year 2000 is indeed ambitious and challenging. To meet this goal we must constantly seek God's power and leadership by consistently using the medium of prayer. Last Sunday we shared in the praise and celebration of the dedication of the North Kent Church. The work of the Lord accomplished there gives all of us hope and encouragement that this success can be repeated over and over. God is powerful enough to accomplish the task of planting 75 new churches. We have access to the same power of God that produced the missionary and evangelistic zeal of the church during the days of the apostles. We are not in this work alone with only our own resources. Jesus gave the mission and added in Matthew 28:20, "...lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." First Corinthians 3:5-8 promises us that as we plant and water, God will bless our efforts with the increase.

Fellow delegates, the vision and goal of 75 new churches by the year 2000 is an ambitious goal for the foreseeable future. Many new persons will be brought to a saving knowledge of the gospel of salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord. The vision and the goals are only the beginning. How do we get there? We have already discussed prayers and God's power in this regard. I would now challenge each local church and state or regional conference to begin planning strategic moves toward achievement of church-planting goals. During this conference you will be told of the plans for the Gen-

eral Conference to plant a new church with a conference staff person relocated to the mission area. This project will not only be a church-planting effort, but will provide training opportunities for future church planters. Local congregations and conferences can duplicate this process. It will not be done unless we move from the talking phase to the planning and implementation phases.

Training and consultation are essential to the work of evangelism. We have outstanding consultation and training resources in David Krogh, Warren Sorenson, Russ Magaw, and others.

spiritual matters or that they accept error in doctrines represent barriers to church planting. In our local planning we must focus on the strengths and opportunities rather than allowing weaknesses and barriers to overcome us. David, the young shepherd lad, provides us a good example of this positive approach as he approached the Philistine giant. First Samuel 17:45 relates how David focused on his greatest asset and the opportunity of the moment as he exclaimed to the giant, "I come to thee in the name of the LORD of hosts." That he was small and the giant huge and that he only had a sling and stones while the giant had a sword and

Make use of their services in your local efforts. The regional caucuses on church planting and evangelism are beginnings. Continue to utilize all the resources of our General Conference. After this conference we in our local areas must develop strategic plans for reaching local evangelistic goals.

Establishing goals and designing plans to reach those goals can be both rewarding and frightening experiences. As we commence the process we do so with strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and barriers to overcome. That we are few in number, have limited resources, and live in a spiritually complacent society are perceived weaknesses. That we are God's workmen, that we have the truths of God's Word and the message of hope and salvation needed by the lost, that we have many dedicated and excited people, and that we have men and women who can train us to do evangelistic work are strengths. That there are communities of people everywhere in need of the message God has given us provides opportunities. That so many of these people are unconcerned with

shield were not the main components of David's strategic plan. It is a challenge for us to realize that we approach the Great Commission in the the name of the Lord of hosts.

The overall goal for our conference has been established. Planned and written evangelistic goals must now be developed by each local church and conference. These plans should have the input of as many local members as possible. The plans should include specifically defined objectives with targeted times for accomplishment. How do we reach the goal of 75 new churches by the year 2000? We accomplish this through our visions, our planning, and our efforts while relying on God through faith, prayer, and obedience and by adjusting our attitudes to know that we "come... in the name of the LORD of hosts."

Fellow delegates, the challenge is ours. If not us, who will the Lord send forth today to do his work? May God richly bless and empower each local body of disciples as we commit ourselves to the work that Jesus started in his earthly ministry and then committed to us.

DELEGATE BUSINESS SESSION— Tuesday, August 4, 1987

Chairman Joe James called the first delegate business session of the 67th Annual General Conference of the Church of God to order at 1:40 p.m. Pastor Greg Demmitt opened the session with prayer.

Credentials Chairperson Janet Stilson instructed delegates regarding seating and the use

of the delegate cards.

Chairman James then introduced the other members of the Board of Directors. In his opening message, he remainded delegates of their responsibilities as delegates and as Christians: That we must constantly seek God's power through prayer and study to be obedient to the Great Commission and to meet our goal of 75 new churches by the year 2000. He urged state and regional conferences to begin planning ways to meet the goal, reminding us that planning must focus on our strengths, rather than using our weaknesses as a barrier. He emphasized that the goal can only be met through planning and reliance on God's help.

There were no new churches represented for the first time, but Chairman James recognized delegates serving for the first time, and Pastor Craig Wagganer serving as a minister-delegate

for the first time.

President David Krogh requested the delegations to turn in their pool expense forms no later

than this evening's service.

Secretary Keith Williams read letters from the Pleasant View Bible Church in Colorado Springs, CO; Hillview Bible Church in Bloomington, IN; and Open Bible Fellowship, Baton Rouge, LA.

Chairman James directed delegates to the Special Reports given on pages 11 and 12 of the Summer PROGRESS JOURNAL, and asked for questions or comments. None being received, Robert See moved to accept the Special Reports as given. Seconded by Joe Myers. Carried.

Robert Coverstone reported on activities of the Board of Directors for the last year. He reported that some of the major concerns of the Board were budgetary problems. He expressed his enjoyment at serving on the Board, and thanked the delegates for giving him the opportunity to serve.

Chairman James called on Bill Burnham to review the financial statements in the delegate package. Bro. Burnham called the delegates' attention to various items in the statements of special interest. Robert See asked about allow-

ances for depreciation. Bro. Burnham replied that those items not budgeted for were acquired either as gifts, or by donations of money specifically for their purchase.

Robert See moved to accept the financial reports as presented. Seconded by Russell Johns.

Carried.

Chairman James reported that the Board of Directors had reviewed the organizational chart at the January meeting, as directed by the delegates at the 1985 General Conference, with no

changes being deemed necessary.

Warren Sorenson was called upon to review the Outreach and Church Development report as presented on pages 5-8 of the Progress Journal, and in turn called on Staff members Judy Myers, Gayle Guthrie, Kent Ross, and Russ Magaw to review the reports of the Foreign Missions, Christian Education. Youth, and Media Advisory Committees, respectively. Bro. Sorenson then called on Pastors Sydney Kirkpatrick, John Railton, and Ron Macy to report on church works in Minneapolis, MN; South Bend, IN; and the Aurora, IL area.

Chairman James then declared that Recommendation One, presented by Delbert Jones and seconded by Ed Bender at the 1986 General Conference, was on the floor and open for discussion. Charles Knapp moved to amend the last sentence of the Recommendation to read, "Churches who receive such funds will give quarterly reports to the Conference President." Robert See seconded. Joe Myers and Dick Eldred spoke against the motion. The motion to amend the Recommendation lost on a voice vote.

There being no further discussion on the Recommendation, Chairman James called for a voice vote, which was inconclusive. Upon a call by the Chairman for a vote by show of hands, the Recommendation passed by a vote of 53 yes to 39 no.

Chairman James announced that a straw vote would be taken at the Thursday session as to how many would attend the 1988 General Conference, tentatively scheduled to be held at George Mason University, Fairfax, VA.

Pastor Stan Ross closed the first business session with prayer.

DELEGATE BUSINESS SESSION—Wednesday, August 5, 1987

Chairman Joe James called the session to order at 1:40 p.m. Pastor Hollis Partlowe opened with prayer. The minutes of the Tues-

1987 General Conference, Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan day session were read.

President David Krogh announced that an additional showing of the Peru slides will be held on Thursday, at a time and place to be announced. The Pool amount this year is \$125.54. President Krogh then directed the delegates' attention to the "PACT" booklet (Planting Additional Churches Today) and asked members to pray how they may be involved in church planting. He described how the General Conference and Oregon Bible College plan to be involved. He announced that Warren and Irene Sorenson will be moving to Colorado Springs in the fall of 1988 to plant an additional church there. President Krogh also reviewed the paper in the delegate package on relocating the General Conference and Oregon Bible College.

Chairman James directed delegates to the position description for Directors found on page 15 of the summer PROGRESS JOURNAL, and described the commitment of time and energy by Directors; he then opened the floor for nominations for Director. Two are to be elected, the terms of Robert Coverstone and Keith Williams

expiring at this Conference.

Vickie Pulling represented the Illinois Conference in nominating Brenda Wessel. Dennis Baldwin, represting the Royal Village Church of God and the Virginia State Conference Ministers' Association, nominated Chris Ramsey; Stan Ross nominated Willis Turner. Don Overmyer spoke in support of the nomination of Willis Turner, James Ritch nominated Jerold Brewer; Scott Ross nominated Ron Macy; Robert Coverstone nominated David Cheatwood; and Scott Millard nominated Joe Myers. Robert See moved that the nominations be closed; John Huston seconded; motion carried. Chairman James asked the nominees to come forward for presentation to the delegates. He announced that nominees will be available for discussion at 6:30 p.m. in the lobby.

Chairman James directed delegates to Recommendation Three on page 13 of the PROGRESS JOURNAL, and opened the floor for discussion. John Hearp moved adoption of Recommendation Three as presented. Seconded by Eunice Pearson. Charles Knapp questioned how the Ministerial Association member of the Committee would be chosen. John Hearp replied that it would be by election of the members of the Association. Gary Burnham noted that the explanation mentioned an active Pastor, but the Recommendation itself did not so specify.

Gary Burnham moved to amend the Recom-

mendation to specify an active Pastor. Seconded by Ron Macy. Gary Burnham and John Hearp spoke supporting the amendment. Scott Ross asked if other members of the Committee should be specified as "active." The amendment carried.

Ron Macy moved to amend the Recommendations to change "chosen" to "elected." Seconded by Ray Hall; carried. Following discussion, the Recommendation as amended carried.

Chairman James opened the floor for nominations for Foreign Missions Advisory Committee member. Jeff Fletcher nominated Alane Schmidlapp.

Francis Burnett moved that nominations be closed. Seconded by Tim Jones; motion carried.


Chairman James then opened the floor for nominations for the Sunday School/Christian Education Advisory Committee. Dick Eldred nominated Joyce Knapp. Robert See moved that nominations be closed and that Joyce Knapp be elected by acclamation. Second by Tim Jones; carried.

Francis Burnett moved that Alane Schmidlapp be elected to the Foreign Missions Advisory Committee by acclamation. Seconded by Tim Jones; carried.

Dale Ramsey reported on Oregon Bible College progress. He announced that the OBC Alumni Banquet would be held at 4:45 p.m. OBC Booster Sunday will be August 30, and he especially urged promotion of Junior Boosters. Over 600 people participated in the Booster program last year (triple the previous year), and over \$12,000 was raised. He estimated 14-16 returning students this fall and 12 new students, which includes five older students with life experience. He emphasized the need for student funding, and asked for continued support in recruitment. Dale encouraged the delegates to come and hear Donna Deane as she spoke at the Alumni Banquet. He expressed his appreciation to the staff, and especially to Jan Stilson, who will be leaving the Staff. The delegates gave her a round of applause.

Linford Moore expressed pleasure at the increased enrollment, and asked Dale for his opinions on the reasons for it. Dale credited increased recruitment efforts and a more optimistic attitude. Dianne Rademachir challenged members in the Oregon area to send students to Oregon Bible College.

Eunice Pearson inquired about availability of correspondence courses. Bro. Ramsey acknowledged the need for more such courses, mentioned the Old Testament Survey Course.

Oral Miller asked about recruiting efforts in northern Illinois high schools. James Mattison encouraged sending students for one or two years to OBC before going to other colleges. Willis Turner commented that many of our recruiting efforts come too late. Joyce Knapp reported on the Garden Park Church's scholarship fund. Charles Currier noted that the Church of God needs trained lay leaders as well as pastors, and encouraged one or two years at Oregon Bible College.

Bro. Ramsey announced that the Berean Youth Fellowship scholarship has been awared to Christy Ross.

Chairman James directed the delegates to the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation Fact Sheet, on the back page of the Conference booklet, and recognized Rachel Newell for her work on the Foundation.

Chairman James commented that 373 members have contributed \$468,000 in cash, which is part of a total of over \$690,000 in written commitments. In addition, the Foundation is the beneficiary of a \$20,000 life insurance policy. He encouraged delegates to make a commitment to the Foundation.

Francis Burnett asked if the 373 had committed the \$690,000. Richard Smith asked if earnings are supporting OBC yet. Chairman James replied that earnings are being used at present to repay startup expenses. These should be repaid in 1989, and the fund should be generating income to the College in 1990. He asked for recognition of Rachel Newell's efforts, and she was given a round of applause by the delegates.

Stan Ross moved that the Board of Directors give study to the possibility of a bi-annual Church of God General Conference (one every two years) instead of the present annual Conference, and that they report back to the 1988 General Conference. Seconded by Dale Ramsey. Bro. Ross then spoke in support of the motion. James Mattison and Robert Lindner spoke in favor of an annual General Conference. Joe Myers commented that the motion was for a study only. Robert See asked for clarification whether a report or recommendation was stated. Chairman James replied that the motion stated a report was required. Motion carried.

Lynne Krogh closed the second business session with prayer.

DELEGATE BUSINESS SESSION—Thursday, August 6, 1987

Chairman Joe James called the third business

session to order at 1:45 p.m. Pastor E. Richard Smith opened with prayer.

The Ministers' Association has elected Joe Fletcher as a member of the Higher Education Advisory Committee.

Credentials Chairperson Jan Stilson asked for the names of alternates voting in place of regular delegates. She reported that 81 delegates, 46 ministers, and seven directors were registered, for a total of 134.

Pastor Joe Astolfi reported that, in accordance with the wishes of the members, the proceeds of the sale of the Maurertown Church building have been given to the Oregon Bible College Development Foundation and the Outreach and Church Development Fund, in the amount of \$22.250 each.

Chairman James read the constitutional provisions for election of Directors and instructed delegates on the voting procedures.

During the counting of the ballots, President David Krogh announced that ushers would be at the doors at the closing of the session to receive commitment cards from the "PACT" booklet, and would also receive them after the evening service. President Krogh gave instructions on checkout procedures from Calvin College, and asked delegates who had not settled with the Pool to do so.

Chairman James asked how many had attended General Conference as children, and over 50 percent raised their hands. He noted that costs for next year's Conference would be approximately 20 percent higher, and asked how many would still attend. A majority responded affirmatively.

Kathy Tackett reported on the medical progress of her daughter Carolyn, who was injured in an automobile accident, and asked for additional prayers. Pastor Darrell Cardwell offered prayer for Carolyn Tackett.

Pastor Emory Macy thanked the Conference for their recognition of his church's homecoming activities.

Chairman James directed the delegates to Recommendation Two on page 13 of the summer PROGRESS JOURNAL. David Cheatwood moved to remove Recommendation Two from the table. Seconded by Mardy Lawrence. President Krogh called the delegates' attention to the paper concerning Recommendation Two in the delegate package, and spoke in support of the Recommendation. Robert See called for the question. Recommendation Two carried.

Chairman James commented on the relocation of the General Conference and Oregon

Bible College as brought up in the Open Board Meeting. He emphasized that the Colorado Springs project with Warren and Irene Sorenson in 1988 is a laboratory and learning project and is not related to relocation.

Russell Magaw described the Nazarene Church's church-planting project in the state of Oregon, and that the course on church planting at the Nazarene Bible College in Colorado Springs would be available to our students. Discussion followed.

Joe Myers asked that his name be withdrawn as a nominee for Director.

Chairman James asked how many would attend General Conference regardless of location. Approximately half raised their hands.

Arlen Rankin reported on the Bible Faith Church of God, a new work in Bellevue, Wash-

Brenda Wessel and Chris Ramsey were elected to the Board of Directors.

President Krogh announced that the Peru slides will be shown in Room 101, and a report on the India work will be given in the room in back of the stage at 3:30 p.m. The new Board will meet at 3:30 p.m. in the Conference Room in the Commons Building. President Krogh then presented plaques to Robert Coverstone and Keith Williams as outgoing Directors for their services on the Board.

Scott Ross moved to express appreciation to the outgoing Directors. David Cheatwood seconded. Carried.

Robert Lindner asked with regard to Recommendation One if contributions earmarked for a work would be applied to the amounts already targeted for that work. President Krogh replied that the first \$500 of contributions would be applied to General Conference budgeted funds for that work. Robert Lindner then asked who would be surveyed to determine the preference for or against a bi-annual Conference.

Robert See explained Delbert Jones's intention in Recommendation One was to enlarge members' focus from just one work to all churches needing aid.

Chairman James then opened the floor for

items of general business.

James Mattison expressed concern that The Restitution Herald does not have wider circulation, and suggested that churches subscribe for their members.

Don Overmyer moved to express appreciation to the Maurertown Fellowship for their gifts to the General Conference and their concern for the continued outreach of the Conference. Seconded by Francis Burnett and Stan Ross. Carried.

E. Richard Smith expressed concern for "dying" churches and asked what pastoral support would be available to pastors of such churches. Warren Sorenson responded that the situation depends on whether pastors are available who are willing to serve such churches. General Conference funds are limited and need to be used where the needs are greatest.

Chairman James opened the floor for discussion of the proposed 1988-89 budget. President Krogh directed delegates to page 16 of the PROG-RESS JOURNAL. Discussion followed. Robert Coverstone moved to adopt the 1988-89 budget as proposed. Seconded by Jerold Brewer. Carried.

Chairman James asked for a show of hands on approval of moving the Conference around. A majority raised their hands. Robert See mentioned the possibility of contracting for several years at one location to fix costs.

Ed Schroth supported moving the Conference around. John Hearp asked for comparative enrollment figures. President Krogh replied that actual enrollments are down, but the total number of people involved at Conference is up due to local attendance.

Credentials Chairperson Jan Stilson gave the final Credentials Committee report. The delegate count is down only two from last year. She encouraged more representation from State Conferences.

President Krogh reminded delegates once more of the commitment cards from the "PACT" booklet, and encouraged them to complete the evaluation form and volunteer forms for next year's Conference.

Secretary Keith Williams read the minutes of the final business session. Chairman James asked for any corrections. Darrell Cardwell moved to approve the complete minutes of the Conference as read. Seconded by Larry Mayberry. Carried.

Chairman James reminded Board members of the meeting immediately following the delegate session.

Jerold Brewer moved to adjourn. Carl Heiser seconded. Carried.

Chairman James recognized Cecil Smead as the oldest active minister in the Church of God, who then closed the business session with prayer.

Would you like to continue the remembrance of a deceased family member who had a significant spiritual impact on you and your family's life?

Many folks establish scholarships at Oregon Bible College in the name of such family members. It is a wonderful way to remember such people and assist OBC students who are preparing for the ministry.

Such family members who were spiritual giants should be remembered and this is one way to sustain that memory in the Church of God.

Issue of Accreditation

A favorite question often posed to me is, "Have you given up on seeking accreditation for Oregon Bible College?" Without giving me time to respond the inquisitor usually will proceed to state, "If you were accredited you would gain more students." My instinct is that, yes, they are probably right; however, my response is usually, "There are a lot of colleges (I think) in the land that aren't accredited and it doesn't seem to be hindering their ability to carry out the purposes for which they exist."

There is little question in my mind that accreditation is a very valuable status to achieve. The process of achieving accreditation checks and encourages financial soundness, academic credibility, legitimate goals, purposes, and understanding of mission. Recruiting I assume would be easier. From the viewpoint of a normal human it would appear to be a desirable goal to achieve.

With everything we could know and see, believing it a wise venture, we pursued accreditation with fervor in the '70's and first half of this decade. I believe the pursuit was a valuable exercise. We now have a faculty with graduate degrees, a library with recognition from and part of the Northern Illinois Library System, a financial foundation under construction, and a physical plant that is adequate in many respects. The goals of accreditation have been good for us. Whether we pursue accreditation again or not, we should continue to pursue many of the goals of accreditation.

Is accreditation necessary to carry out the mission of Oregon Bible College and the Church of God General Conference? Of course, there is no way of knowing unless we were there, so my thoughts are somewhat speculative at this point. We are gradually streamlining and narrowing our focus to better define our mission and achieve it. The typical model of an accredited college by the American Association of Bible Colleges would be an enlarging focus to provide more of a Liberal Arts education and majors other than Bible and Theology. We certainly want to address the whole individual, which Liberal Arts seeks to do, but our emphasis is becoming more technical in nature. If the student can get most of his general education at a local community college, we can expend our training more specifically.

Since our focus is aimed at training students to do specific tasks of the Christian Ministry, our courses will more reflect that aim. This means that, with less traditional general education courses being offered, there are less transferable courses that other institutions would accept. Generally speaking, this means a student would not come to OBC to get what he can get elsewhere. At OBC he will immerse himself in study of the Word and an understanding of the context in which it was written, learning and applying practical ministry skills, experiencing a lifestyle not understood by the secular world, and enjoying the OBC "family experience." This does not mean that our courses will not be transferable, because many have been, but the direction which we are going and which we feel God may be pleased with, denies the need to be recognized by an Accrediting Agency.

I want to emphasize that we are pursuing, and will continue to pursue, academic excellence, but accreditation may not be a present need. It is vital for prospective students and the parents of those students to believe that what's offered at Oregon Bible College is a worthy investment. I hope they would not feel that it is wasted money if it does not transfer into a program aimed at developing a specific job skill to earn a living.

We are charged with being the best stewards of the resources entrusted to us. We are trying to be responsible with the financial gifts given us so that our posture is pleasing to God. Regarding this aspect of the issue, pursuit of accreditation would not seem to be the wisest at this point in our history.

I have not covered all the ramifications, but have tried to touch some key issues. Oregon Bible College is not my college; it is yours, the Church of God; and I want to be responsible to the desires of our constituency. The subject of accreditation is certainly not closed, and I welcome the opinions and thoughts of each person who has a concern about the future of Oregon Bible College.

OUTREACH AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS (Warren Sorenson, Vice-President)

God has called the Church of God to a ministry of sharing his message with the intended purpose that those who are lost will find Jesus Christ as the way to eternal life. An important part of our response to God is learning to be submissive and obedient. The following testimony by Pastor Kevin Demmitt provides some lessons we all need to learn. As you read this testimony let it speak to your personal response to God. The insights which Kevin shares with us are valuable for effective service.

My Spiritual Journey

"They came to Capernaum. When he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' But they kept quiet because on the way they had argued about who was the greatest. Sitting down, Jesus called the Twelve and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must be the very last, and the servant of all' " (Mark 9:33-35).

The most basic lessons Christ taught are often the ones which can only be learned through experience. Like the disciples in the passage above, I entered the ministry with the ambition that I was going to make a name for myself through the preaching of the gospel. Starting with just two teen-agers at the church where I accepted the position of youth pastor, I set out to build a large youth group which would be a sign of my success. Thanks to a large family that chose to attend our church shortly after I arrived, our numbers began to grow. I catered to the needs of our young members, not out of a desire to serve, but because their presence on any given Sunday made me look good. However, I soon learned that this type of success easily crumbles. All it took was a couple of families to move away, and I was right back where I started. After one year in the ministry I had not achieved a single goal. I knew it was time to call it quits.

Several years have now passed, and I am once again in the ministry. I am serving at a church which breaks all the former measures I had set for success. But never have I felt more successful and prepared for the task at hand. I believe there are several lessons which God taught me during my leave of absence from the pastoral ministry which has better prepared me for such a task.

First, I learned that God never abandons his children. God opened the door for me to do graduate work at Arizona State University. He led me to Christian instructors who helped me take my eyes off myself and focus instead on the needs of others. He gave me a Christian wife who revived my vision of the lordship of Christ. In every way, God recognized my distress and he provided relief.

Second, I learned that I love to preach the gospei. Teaching at ASU, selling electronic equipment, and fixing tires all put bread on my table, but they all left me with a yearning for something more. It is rare that one finds an occupation which is also a ministry, such as a pastoral position. Never again will I take another job which does not allow me ample opportunity to teach from the Scriptures.

Third, I have learned that God will measure my success according to my service. God is more interested in my motive than my results. Efforts to bring others to Christ must be based on a love for the lost. Any other motive will lead to certain failure, regardless of the numerical results.

"Whoever wants to be first must be last" is a difficult but necessary lesson to learn. I am thankful for my years of study at OBC. They provided me with a foundation for studying the Scriptures which I hope to build on the rest of my life. But my training is far from complete. God is continually calling for me to apply what I teach. And some lessons, like the meaning of "servanthood," take a long time to learn.

Peru Report

Lima, capital of Peru, is an exciting place in more ways than one. Bill Wachtel, Barbara and I, and a team of four from Oregon Bible College—Alane Schmidlapp, Mike and Jackie Mattus, and Mark Martison—experienced the nervousness of a country threatened by Communism. In Lima a nightly curfew demands that all citizens be at home by 1:00 a.m. The penalty for noncompliance is death by machine gun—no questions asked. There was a five-on-the-Richter-scale

town squares. We had only to appear in the center of town for a sizeable crowd to form around us (all quite legal until 4:00 p.m). The Limans wanted to know what we were up to. Quite simply, the Americans were in town. What had they to offer?

Three of us—Mario, Alane, and Bill—were fluent Spanish-speakers. The rest of us were able to convey the gist of our message by pointing to our Spanish Bibles—Matthew 5:5 "Bienaventurados

world coming when Jesus returns makes an immediate appeal. What's more, they have never heard anything like that and have no inkling of the great promises of God in the Bible.

From hundreds we spoke to, some gladly agreed to come to our hotel from 7:00 every evening to study the Bible. There in the conference room provided by the (Jehovah's Witness) proprietress of the hotel we opened up the Santa Biblia and told the "old, old story"—God's promise through Abraham, David, and the Messiah Jesus to bring peace to our earth and salvation for individuals and for the world.

The majestic simplicity of this great biblical story is irresistible when people are humble, childlike, and hungry to know the meaning of life. After a month, six were baptized and others were beginning to attend. We left a house-church of dedicated disciples of the Word, led by Mario Olcese (you may remember his article in a recent *Herald*).

A short article can only give a glimpse of our exciting time in Lima. Our slides are available for any who want more detail. We ask you to join us in prayer for those young excited converts (Mario, an attorney; Carmela, his wife; Jorge, Jose, Carlos, and others), your associates in the Abrahamic Faith. And please pray for our weekly radio program reaching a potential audience of ten million people through Radio Star. We want the gospel of the kingdom of God to be announced world wide (Matt. 24:14). Our program, La Voz del Reino (The Voice of the Kingdom), is a small contribution to the massive heralding of God's coming intervention in world affairs when Jesus the Messiah will involve true believers in restoring the earth (Acts 3:21; Rev. 2:36; 3:21).

Your hopes are now shared by a small group of dedicated Peruvians. Such is the continuing aim of evangelism. What an unforgettable experience!



earthquake one night which had us all wondering whether the hotel was going to fall about us in ruins.

Our greatest excitement, however, stemmed from our month-long effort to speak of the gospel of the kingdom of God and the Name of Jesus Messiah (Acts 8:12), basing ourselves on the wonderful heritage of the Church of God, Abrahamic Faith. Here is what happened.

Armed with thousands of tracts challenging people of all classes to examine the Bible, we set out into the streets and los mansos: porque ellos recibiran la tierra por heredad" (Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth). What an attention-getter that verse is—so unlike what most have been taught!

Bit by bit we pieced together God's wonderful plan for our distracted world. Limans know much about the hardships of life, as they eke out a living of a few intis, selling at the street side, shining shoes, or just begging. (There are of course wealthy Peruvians, too.) The prospect of God's kingdom and the wonderful




