Each semester, in cooperation with the Ministerial Association, a pastor spends a week


on campus. The Campus Chaplain speaks in chapel, leads devotions, and spends time with students.

God shows no favoritism

I was told a story about a retarded boy who was at a gathering where the others were giving testimony about how and why they believed in salvation through Jesus. No one expected this retarded boy to participate, but when his turn came he quietly sang "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so." That evidently was his level of comprehension.

While in India recently at a missionary hospital and with our two churches, I suddenly realized what I'd missed before, even after Mardy and I had been to India ten times and to Africa four times. GOD SHOWS NO FAVORITISM! Romans 2:11 says "For God does not show favoritism." In Ephesians 6:9c, Paul says, "there is no favoritism with Him." And in Acts 10:34b-35 we read, "I now realize how true it is that God does not show favoritism, but accepts men from every nation who fear Him and do what is right." We in the Church of God need to come to a better understanding of this important fact: that God does not show favoritism, but loves all who are in search of truth.

While we were in India, we worked with those who

had absolutely no education. In fact, they could not sign their names and I'd guess could not even make an X. Many were afraid and superstitious and pagan. At the hospital some confessed a belief in God after the simple Gospel message was presented. They said they wanted to be followers of Jesus. They wanted to be Christians because they saw Christianity and love in the lives of the care givers. They felt empty and afraid and with no hope like the Hindu man we saw worshiping a black concrete rat. Yes, arat. Often after leaving the

hospital these people will never have a chance to hear more from the Bible. Even though the Indian pastors try their best to follow up on all those who have made a confession of Jesus, they are simply physically unable to cover every remote village. These people will go back to a distant village where it is possible that no one can read, let alone have a Bible. At that stage all they know is that the Christian God is one of who they can say, "God is for me!" Remember, people are often at different stages in their Christian walk. Their understanding may also be different. In John's Gospel we learn that once a person has become a child of God, God puts His Holy Spirit in him. The Holy Spirit will then help, guide and teach that person in God's ways (John 14:26). Remember, God does not play favorites.

We in the Church of God need to deal with this. I'm not advocating universalism, but I am questioning the extreme exclusiveness of some of our people. We even had one person suggest that there were twenty-three different scriptural facts which had to be believed in order to be baptized. How can we accept twenty-three or thirteen or

whatever when Romans 10:13 says, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved"? It sounds like the Gospel may be more simplistic than I have made it in the past. Those at the hospital had called on the name of the Lord. "Where do we draw the line?" some will ask. The answer is: "God draws the line!" The thief on the cross, Luke 23:43. seems to have achieved salvation in a brief encounter with Jesus. In Acts 16:32-33 we find these words regarding the jailer and his family: Paul "spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all



the others in the house. At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and his family were baptized." Acts 10:43b: "Everyone who believes in him receives for giveness of sins though his name." Romans 10:9: "If you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

James 2:5: "Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the Kingdom He promised those who love Him?" Many reading this may think of themselves as poor. I'd ask: "In relation to what standard?" Of course God looks at all the world, all of humanity, all of the 6 billion people. In relation to the great majority of the world's people all of us in the United States are rich. Since we believe the Scriptures are God-breathed or God-inspired we need to look at James 2:5. Since it says that "God has chosen those who are poor to inherit the Kingdom," we'd better believe that and know that maybe most in the Kingdom will be the poor of the world and not the rich Americans. Again I'll say it is time to expand our mental horizons.

Those who will be saved, according to Scripture, will come from all over the world. Look at the truth of Revelation 5:9. It says in part, "With Your blood You purchased men for God from every tribe and language and people and nation." I'd like to imagine that we of the Church of God someday will have converts from every tribe, language, people, and nation, but our history of the last 150 years does not lead me to think this is really likely. We in the Church of God have not done too good ajob of spreading the truths we've been given. Therefore it is conceivable that God could look elsewhere for people who will love Him, trust Him and walk with Him by faith to accomplish His mission of evangelizing the world.

With the above Scriptures in mind, especially Revelation 5:9, I believe we need to expand our views and rein in our prejudices and realize that we may not have the exclusive scriptural interpretation on who will be saved. What I mean is that even though I firmly believe that what the Church of God believes and teaches is biblically correct, I no longer feel that only these people who believe exactly like the Church of God will be saved. Obviously it is impossible for me to state where the line is drawn and likewise I believe it is impossible for others to draw this line which is only known to God. The truth is, there are people all over the world who are being reached for Jesus Christ who may not understand EV-ERYTHING exactly the way we do; but God is the one who will judge their hearts in light of their biblical understanding and their relationship with Him.

The truth is important and I believe the Bible, as we know it, is the infallible Word of God. We who have the Scriptures and the education to read the truth need to pursue that truth as has been the history of the Church of God. There is, however a balance each individual must determine between their own commitment to perusal of truth and reaching the lost for Jesus through personal contact. I believe the typical Church of God member knows enough now that Jesus may say, "Now get with sharing your knowledge — my Gospel!"

The sooner we open our minds and hearts to this great fact the better off we will be. The Bible does not support and promote the teachings of the Church of God; the Church of God supports and promotes the teaching of the Bible. Let's open our minds and hearts to the people of the world, battle against ignorance and sin, and bring the Gospel to all people.

We live in a world that is becoming increasingly hostile to Christianity.

Second Semester Begins

Seven new students enrolled at ABC for the second semester. Four students did not return. Since there is a normal net loss from the first semester to the second semester, we are grateful for this gain. We are glad to welcome both Church of God students and community students to our program. We continue to appreciate the prayer and financial support that enables the college to continue its ministry.

Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors met on the campus January 7-9 to conduct regular business and to engage in long-range planning. The Board discussed and took action on the following topics:

- 1. Reviewed and approved the work of the Program Committee for the 1999 Summer General Conference.
- 2. Reviewed outreach efforts of several churches.
- 3. Discussed church planting opportunities.
- 4. Discussed the Y2K issue as it relates to our organization. Computers for our organization are fully Y2K compliant. Though there are concerns that this problem may affect the world economy, our trust is in God who is in control of all things.
- 5. Reviewed and complimented the Doctrinal Distinctive Curriculum which is currently in use in our Sunday schools.
- 6. Approved the continuation of membership in the National Interreligious Service Board for Conscientious Objectors. The General Conference has a long-standing policy of supporting those who choose to be conscientious objectors.
- 7. Discussed leadership needs of our churches. A letter will be sent by President Krogh to all OBC/ABC graduates from recent years who are not currently involved in pastoral ministry, encouraging them to enter/reenter pastoral ministry.

- 8. Received a report from the Ministerial Recognition Board regarding the charismatic/Pentecostal issue. The MRB is continuing work on this subject.
- 9. Designated September 19, 1999, as ABC Booster Sunday. Board members, staff, and students will visit many churches to report on the college.
- 10. Awarded the Spring 1999 Church Builders Appeal to Beloit New Life Church in Wisconsin.
- 11. Granted Church Development Aid to the Litchfield Church of God in Minnesota.
- 12. Reviewed all of the work of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, considering accomplishments of the past year and challenges we face this year.
- 13. Discussed the filling of the following ABC/General Conference positions: Youth/Recruitment Coordinator, Spiritual Life/Evangelism Coordinator. Individuals interested in serving are invited to send a resume to President David Krogh.
- 14. Adopted a motion to pay tuition expenses for the Youth Specialties Convention for local youth leaders and spouses. There is a limit of two people per church. \$100 per couple will also be given to help with the cost of meals. Local churches and/or the youth leaders will be asked to cover the cost of travel and lodging. Additional information will be provided to pastors and youth leaders.
- 15. Heard a preliminary report of the work of the Organizational Task Force.

The Board will meet again on the campus April 9 and 10.




Sources of Income for ABC/COGGC



College Invitational

On the weekend of March 5-7, Atlanta Bible College hosted prospective students and sponsors. A total of 44 guests participated in the special weekend activities. Participants visited ABC classes, were interviewed by staff members, toured Clayton College and State University campus, took part in devotions and two special evening services, and heard several presentations about opportunities for ministry and programs of Atlanta Bible College.

Focus on the Kingdom Radio Program

In August 1998, the Timberland Bible Church in South Bend, Indiana began broadcasting Anthony Buzzard's "Focus on the Kingdom Radio Program." After six months of broadcasting, they feel that God has greatly blessed this endeavor. Forty listeners have phoned for literature, six have visited services, and two are now regular attenders. Unfortunately, the radio station has abruptly cancelled the broadcast because of opposition from some area churches. An effort is underway to find another station that will broadcast this Biblical message regarding the Coming Kingdom of God.

The program is currently being aired on 10 stations including the Internet. We would encourage other churches and state conferences to consider airing this program series. An Outreach Focus

If one of us were looking out our front window and saw a bully beating a child and our neighbor attempting to stop the battle, but without much success, most of us would run out and help the neighbor to stop the beating. We would not refrain from going if our neighbor is a non-Christian, an agnostic or even an atheist; nor would we withhold our aid if our neighbor is from an orthodox church or, in fact, even if he is a minister of an orthodox church. I'll wager it would not matter to us if the child was Christian, non-Christian or orthodox Christian; or black, white, yellow or red.

This country is full of evils such as abortion, infanticide, assisted suicide, and euthanasia — just to mention a few practices Jesus would abhor. Unfortunately, we may never be able to stop these horrible evils from happening, but is there more we could do in order to show God's unconditional love to the world?

In the parable of the Good Samaritan recorded in Luke 10:25-37, Jesus speaks directly to what we are to do when someone is hurting. Jesus didn't (maybe purposely) tell us the origin or faith of the robbed and beaten man. He did state that the "helper" was a Samaritan and pointed out that the Jewish priest and Levite were indifferent or even hardhearted. To our knowledge, at this time most or all of the Samaritans were not Christian and didn't even worship in Jerusalem, so their mixed Jewish heritage had not pointed them to the Jewish Jehovah or the Christian Jehovah and Jesus His Son. Regardless, Jesus said "Go and do likewise." Should we do any less?

I see such a need in reaching out to those who are hurting in the world like the child being beaten by the bully as well as those who have not accepted Jesus as their personal Savior. I mentioned in a previous article that I used to focus on teaching only the Church of God distinctives and I was not actively involved in practicing the things Jesus taught. I'm now certain in my mind that this previous attitude and focus was not pleasing to Jesus. I needed to let my belief in Jesus be seen in the way I lived. I needed to focus, not only on teaching the truths of God's Word, but also on modeling them in my everyday life. There are some areas where I (or you) simply cannot carry out the deep love action for our neighbors that Jesus commands, the "go and do likewise" love, unless it is in alliance with some other Christians. I'm a member of the Christian Medical and Dental Society. I was not asked to sign anything against my Church of God distinctive beliefs which are of great importance to me. In consultation with Hollis Partlowe on the membership application, I crossed out one word and wrote in another, at his suggestion, in order to clarify my belief about Jesus. I have worked in a Southern Baptist hospital in India while Mardy worked in and with our churches. Even then, no one has ever asked me to give up my beliefs. We've served Indian neighbors as Jesus commanded. There may be some time in the future when I will be asked to sign a paper in which my understanding of Jesus would be compromised. Some of you reading this may have found that to be true. In that situation, I would NOT compromise my faith.

My concern for the Church of God is that maybe we're not being blessed by God because we are not fulfilling Jesus' commandments and carrying out the great commission. Our numbers are diminishing, the percentage of churches we have pastors for is decreasing, and I don't detect a more loving, accepting, and forgiving attitude than we've experienced in the past. We've not even approached the natural growth we should have if our children were attending Churches of God. I'm convinced that if we were to be more of a reaching-out, neighbor-helping, loving, accepting group, we could turn around the deterioration in our numbers. "We are the only Bible some people read" was said by someone. I'm not saying we should compromise our doctrines, for my wife and I have not done that, but I am saying that following Jesus' commandments to love our neighbors and especially the family of believers (Gal. 6:10) is as important as trying to teach the doctrines that are unique to the Church of God of the Faith of Abraham. I am certain that, in my case, my past argumentative and critical spirit against those who disagreed with our distinctives was not evidence of loving my neighbor. Perhaps others in our churches can relate to that and maybe evaluate their attitudes as I have.

I am at the point where I know what we have done in the past and HOW we have done it, and it has not worked. We are losing our young people because they do not see a Christianity that relates to their everyday lives. WE HAVE TO DO BETTER!

There is a reluctance by some Church of God people and pastors to work with other Christian organizations. I've been told that it is because of the fear that the distinctive doctrines will be diluted and outsiders will assume that if we pray and work with an orthodox church or organization, then we believe like they do. The decision to work or not to work

with other Christian organizations will have to be an individual decision. It is obvious that our own children and other youth in our churches are not being stimulated or encouraged toward significant Christian service as pastors, youth leaders, missionaries, etc. Are we afraid to encourage or even allow our youth to attend for fear that they will be contaminated by orthodox thinking? If we have done such a tremendous job of educating our young people in the truths of God's Word, why do we worry that any kind of association with other Christian young people will cause our youth to go astray? Do you really believe that they will forget all they have learned in 18-20 years of life in the Church of God? Do we have a fear that our doctrines won't stand up to scrutiny? Jesus said, "O ye of little faith"! I'm convinced that our distinctive truths are well founded in Scripture and that they WILL hold up to honest scrutiny. The truth of Scripture will be preserved because God is behind His work. Doctrinal error will eventually be revealed for what it really is and the judgment will be left to God.

Some reading this will say that I am all hung up on numbers and that is no way to measure. It is one way to measure, and I am concerned that we are also falling short in another way to evaluate the health of a church. One measure I have heard of is "how many church members are going into full-time or part-time Christian work from any one church?" One of the reasons I have stopped to evaluate this is that in this area we are in deep trouble.

One of the subjects the Board of Directors struggled with at our last meeting (and previously) is an acute shortage of pastors for our existing churches. Our Bible College for a variety of reasons has practically no students dedicated to being pastors. Nationwide, in all denominations, this situation prevails.

One of my biggest concerns is this. In talking to many Church of God adults, I have found that a high percentage of their children are outside our church in their adult years and the majority are outside Christian gatherings. If this is accurate, and I must believe that it is, we need to critically assess what it is that has caused this situation to develop over the years. Have we been too critical toward those whose marriages have failed? Have we not impressed on our youth the important differences between truth and error? Have we tried to maintain the truth we've grown to love by trying to maintain power (control) in our church and not letting the new and younger converts take a leading role? These are important questions that each of us in the Church of God needs to address.

In summary, I see biblical evidence that we are to reach out in love regardless of who else is reaching out with us. Even though the Samaritan may not have been a follower of Jesus, Jesus' answer to His questioner was "go and do likewise." I believe we can work with organizations which don't interpret Scripture as we do without diluting our doctrines, as we all seek to show our Christian love in unity by helping the helpless.

These are serious thoughts and many will question my commitment to the Church of God. I'll reaffirm that I unquestionably believe our distinctive doctrines as outlined in our Church of God constitution. The record of the past and the present is that I love and am dedicated to the Church of God. I would be less than honest, though, if I did not state these questions and thoughts which I feel the Holy Spirit has laid on my heart.




Lindbergh Blvd. also intersects with Interstate 270. The hotel is about one mile south of I-270. (See map H-3; circle #38)

Recommendation: We recommend that the Church of God General Conference employ a church-planting assistant as soon as a candidate and funding are secured.

Explanation: A part of the College/Conference vision is to encourage and support the starting of new churches. At the 1998 Summer Conference, delegates approved a recommendation to "strengthen the programs and increase the resources allocated for evangelism." One of the proposed actions to be taken was to raise \$200,000 over the next 5 years to help plant new churches.

This recommendation presents a more specific strategy and use of the funds that will be raised. We envision that this assistant will work as a junior partner with an individual who feels called to church planting. The planting project will be a team effort between the General Conference employee and the church-planting pastor. The General

Conference employee will spend from 2 to 3 years helping to plan and launch a new work. The employee will then begin helping another work, and the church planting pastor will carryon the ministry of the new church.

From previous church planting experience, it seems advisable to have two workers who will provide encouragement, support, and accountability in launching a new church. It is also surmised that prospective church planters would be more inclined to start a new church if they knew they would be working with someone who would share the responsibility.

In the lifecycle of churches, we know that churches are started, reach maturity, and some eventually die. From 1965 to 1998, 63 Churches of God closed and 62 new churches were started. There continue to be a multitude of opportunities to start new churches. This recommendation is proposed to help us pursue the Great Commission of making disciples.

ANNUAL REPORT OF ATLANTA BIBLE COLLEGE/ CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

The past year has seen significant progress in the implementation of recommendations adopted by delegates at the 1998 Summer Conference. This annual report will review the steps that have been taken during this year to carry out the delegate's wishes and also summarize the ongoing activities of Atlanta Bible College and the Church of God General Conference.

Recommendations #1 and #2 – The Constitution is being reprinted with the revised purpose statement of the Church of God General Conference and the revised preamble to the Constitution.

Recommendation #3 – "Study and identify ways in which the Church of God can improve public relations with members and with those outside the church to better foster a distinct identity and increase the visibility of Church of God distinctives to those outside its membership."

Several proposed action steps have been accomplished:

- 1. A one-year task force was appointed by the Board of Directors consisting of: Charles Bottolfs, Chairman; Dale Brown, Frank Johnson, Joyce Knapp, and David Scheiding. The task force has met on the campus of Atlanta Bible College twice and they made a presentation to the Board of Directors at their April meeting and the Ministerial Association the end of April.
- 2. Last September, a meeting of ABC students and staff was held to discuss ways in which the College/Conference could enhance its image and identity through worship teams, recruiting, discussions with local churches, communications, college activities, etc. Many excellent ideas were offered. A follow-up discussion was held by the College/Conference staff.

Recommendation #4 – "Expand the current ABC program of study to include a Distance Learning Program that will provide education for lay ministers and local church leadership."

During the current school year, the ABC staff has experimented with new formats and resources in the delivery of classes. CD-ROM resources may be available to supplement distance learning courses. Staff computers have been upgraded which will provide appropriate technology for the development of courses to be delivered over the Internet.

During the 1999 – 2000 school year, ABC instructors will be delivering courses in other locations around the country in a weekend learning format. Courses will be available for academic credit or as continuing education credit.

The Higher Education Advisory Committee met in February to assist the staff in the development of the college program.

Recommendation #5 – "Study and identify ways to improve the Atlanta Bible College program with the intention of achieving

excellence and meeting accreditation standards within the next five years."

The Higher Education Advisory Committee is working on several projects to continue to improve the quality of the Bible College program.

In October, application was made to the Accrediting Commission International for accreditation of Atlanta Bible College. An onsite visit was made in November and on December 19, Atlanta Bible College received accreditation from the Commission. This recognition and approval from an external organization provides added support to our recruitment efforts.

Recommendation #6 – "Strengthen the programs and increase the resources allocated for youth work in the Church of God."

We have been seeking applications for a full-time Youth/ Recruitment Coordinator. Pastor Jim Graham who has served as youth coordinator for nine years will conclude his work this summer.

The Board of Directors has authorized funding to pay tuition expenses for a youth worker and spouse from each church and conference to attend a Youth Specialties Convention during 1999. In addition to tuition, \$100 per couple will be given to help with the cost of meals. It is hoped that the local church will help with the cost of travel and lodging.

Recommendation #7 – "Further integrate the use of technology in the work of the College and Conference."

A new computer system has been installed in the offices of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference. The system is Y2K compliant. This new system is being used to preserve material in the college archives. Malcolm McLeod and Mike Moyer spent time on campus as volunteers to help scan Restitution Heralds.

In October, Pastor Steve Taylor was hired as a part-time technology coordinator with the College/Conference. He has been working on promotional videos for the College, a video magazine that will report on activities in our churches, and, a promotional video of the Quiz Program at last year's RYOT.

Recommendation #8 – "Strengthen the programs and increase the resources allocated for evangelism."

We have been seeking applications for a full-time Spiritual Life/Evangelism Coordinator.

Pastor Jack Hearp was appointed, last August as a Senior Ministries Coordinator in a volunteer capacity. Each church has been encouraged to appoint a Senior Ministries Coordinator. A quarterly newsletter is sent to pastors, secretaries, and Senior Ministries Coordinators. With the aging of the population, there are many opportunities for ministry in this area.

The membership has been informed of our plan to raise \$200,000 over the next 5 years to help start new churches. The membership has been invited to contribute to this Church Planting fund. We are currently looking for 400 families or groups that would be willing to give \$500 during the next 5 years (\$100 per year) to help start new churches.

A proposal to enhance our Church Planting efforts is being review by the Board of Directors.

Recommendation #9 – "Provide publications that can best enable the Church of God to fulfill the Great Commission."

Bill and Mardy Lawrence, at their expense, published and distributed to the membership last fall an evangelism booklet that offers suggestions on how to share Christ with others.

The Christian Education Advisory Committee has met to prioritize publishing projects.

Bob See is in the process of scanning on to a computer all Church of God adult quarterlies that have been published during the past 73 years. This project will permit us to print out comments on all the Bible verses that have appeared in the quarterly over the years.

Recommendation # 10 – "By the year 2000, secure 1000 active members of the Church Builders League."

A number of inactive members of the Church Builders have reactivated their membership and there are currently 527 active members. We are inviting each church to appoint a Church Builders Coordinator. The coordinator will receive a list of current members of the League for their church along with brochures, which can be used to encourage new members.

Vision

In addition to the recommendations adopted by the delegates, the work of the College/Conference continues to be driven by our vision to:

- 1. Provide quality Christian education for workers/leaders through ABC.
- 2. Offer assistance to start new churches.
- 3. Help strengthen each existing church and support pastors.
- 4. Faithfully proclaim the distinctive message of the Church of God to the public at large.

We continue to believe that this vision is very much in tune with the heart of God as revealed in scripture:

- 1. Church leaders are appointed by God to equip God's people for ministry (Ephesians 4:11, 12). Jesus modeled a training program when he equipped his disciples to be church leaders (Mark 3:14).
- 2. The church is essential to God's plan. Jesus founded the church (Matthew 16:18); He is the head of the church (Colossians 1:18); His commission for us is to make disciples (Matthew 28:19-20); the message is to be spread throughout the earth (Acts 1:8).
- 3. Each church is to be built up, unified in the faith, and made like Christ (Ephesians 4:13); the church is to grow (Acts 2:47; 4 or; 6:7, etc.).

4. Bible truth is essential. Truth is revealed in the Word (John 17:17); Jesus is truth (John 14:6); God wants all men to come to a knowledge of the truth (1 Timothy 2:4).

As the work of our organization is carried on, we are guided by these Biblical imperatives.

Mission

Furthermore, we continue to recognize that our mission is to make disciples by bringing the lost to Jesus Christ and leading believers to maturity (Matt. 28:19 and 20). We recognize that this must be the focus of our work.

In reviewing the work of the past 12 months, the College/ Conference has served you, our constituency, in the following ways:

COLLEGIATE SERVICES

Enrollment at Atlanta Bible College increased from last year. This year a total of 28 students were enrolled for one or more classes.

The school year began with a two-day retreat and orientation at the Timber Ridge Conference Center on the West Side of Atlanta.

A highlight of the school year was the accreditation of the college by the Accrediting Commission International in December.

Instructor, Joe Martin, completed his Doctoral Program at Columbia Theological Seminary and was granted his degree in April.

The college hosted several guests during the school year. Pastor Ray Hall of the Garden Park Church in Kentwood, Michigan represented the Ministerial Association as campus chaplain in October. Judy Myers representing the Lord's Harvest International Mission Board was on campus in February. Other members of the Mission Board were also present: Pastor Vivian Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Mardy Lawrence, Pastor Warren Sorenson, and Pastor Dale Swartz. Two task forces appointed by the Board of Directors also met on campus: Organizational Task Force: Norman Chandler, Donna Deane, Larry Johnson, Tim Jones, and Jim Ring; Public Relations Task Force: Charles Bottolfs, Dale Brown, Frank Johnson, Joyce Knapp, and David Scheiding.

The Board of Directors also met on campus in October, January, and April. The Higher Education Advisory Committee met in February. Members are: Kent Ross, Chairperson; Dr. Donna Deane, Pastor Scott Deane, and Dr. John Guthrie.

The Annual College Invitational Conference was held March 5 – 7. Forty-four prospective students and sponsors participated in the weekend activities. The theme was "How to Maintain Morals in a World That Has None."

PASTOR/CHURCH SERVICES

The College/Conference provides services to strengthen and assist local churches and to facilitate the starting of new churches. Services were offered in the following areas:

Christian Education

During the past year, the major work of the Christian Education Advisory Committee was preparing materials for the Doctrinal Distinctive quarterlies which were published for the winter quarter. A new quarterly was designed, written and edited for the preschool age. Our belief is that important foundations for understanding the truths of scripture begin in early childhood. Each of the other quarterlies was edited and improved by adding more active learning experiences to complement the lessons. An attempt was made to improve the appearance of the Teacher's Guides and make them conform to the format of the present David C. Cook material for an easier transition from their material to ours and back. An evaluation form was prepared and mailed to each local church to have teachers comment on the distinctive lessons. They are presently being compiled and will be discussed by the committee. Our hope is that they will provide valuable insights into the direction we should take in improving these materials for future publication.

Other work of the committee has included the mailing of ideas to be added to the Keys notebook that is an accumulation of a variety of Christian Education resources. A workshop on a Christian Education topic is also being planned for the 1999 Summer General Conference in St. Louis. There are a number of projects resulting from the task force meetings that are being addressed by the Christian Education Advisory Committee.

Media

The Restitution Herald is in its 88th year of publication. Pastor Jeff Fletcher serves as editor. The current circulation is 853. Several churches are ordering bulk subscriptions at a lower cost and distributing them to the members of their church. Other churches are encouraged to consider this method of distributing the Herald.

The Journal from the Radical Reformation is published four times each year. The current circulation is 316. Anthony Buzzard and Kent Ross serve as Senior Editors and Scott Deane, Greg Demmitt, and Jeff Fletcher serve as Associate Editors.

Missions

During the past year, Judy Myers, Chairperson of the Lord's Harvest International Board has spoken to several ladies groups and churches. She has written the mission edition of the Church of God Around the World and "March"ing for Missions calendar for the month of March; assisted with bulletin board material regarding the Russia trip last summer; published the Russia Newsletter provided by Tracy; sent periodic mission newsletters to mission committee chairpersons and pastors; provided photos of mission work to various churches and supplied ideas and information upon request.

The Lord's Harvest International Board met during General Conference and reviewed the work in Russia. A decision was made to bring Tracy to the U.S. for deputation in the summer of 1999. A summer trip to Malawi in 1999 was approved. Also, LHI approved a summer trip to Mexico this year after the Badillos requested a team.

LHI met February 5 and 6 in Atlanta. Time was spent meeting with Tracy who was in the U.S. to be married. Her husband Stepan was baptized by Joe Martin while they were here. Additional planning on both the Malawi trip and the Mexico trip along with choosing the Malawi team took place. The Mexico team will be

selected after applications are received. We also reviewed information on a group of pastors from Ghana who have requested affiliation with the General Conference.

Judy Myers, spent February 4 - 9 on campus at ABC as a representative of LHI. During that time interviews were held with several students who expressed an interest in missions.

Judy continues to maintain contact with several who have indicated an interest in missions. There is regular contact by email and telephone with Tracy in Russia.

She maintains regular contact with Jim Mattison, our Malawi liaison. She receives periodic reports from Peru and other parts of the world. She reads mission books and magazines to better understand the field of missions. Two valuable mission magazines have been helpful: Russian Life which provides a good understanding of Russia and Evangelical Missions Quarterly provides information on methods that are working and those that no longer seem to be effective.

Currently preparations are being made for summer trips. Judy Myers will be a part of the Mexico trip and will put together information packets for all participants on Malawi. The packet will include a history of the work, cultural things that team members need to be aware of, basic words or sentences, dress codes, etc.

A mission workshop will be offered at the summer General Conference.

Senior Ministries

Jack Hearp was appointed last fall as coordinator for the Senior Ministries program of the General Conference. Our goal is to both encourage ministry to seniors, and also to assist them in finding various areas of ministry and outreach to others. The past three years Jack has served on the chaplaincy staff at the over four hundred bed Ohio Masonic Home which has been most helpful in providing insights into various areas of ministry to Seniors.

A quarterly publication is presently being sent to the Senior Ministry Coordinator, Pastor and Secretary of each church. It offers suggestions for organizing a Seniors program, and suggested activities and ideas that have been sent from coordinators at various churches.

The Senior Ministry Coordinator attended two very helpful seminars. They were, "Spirituality of Aging: Ministering with and to Older Adults," and "Churches Riding the Age Wave." Ideas gleaned from them will appear in future publications. The interest being shown, and diversity of people in attendance at these seminars indicates that we are on the 'cutting edge' of a ministry that has great potential!

In reading the valuable book, "Catch the Age Wave" by Win and Charles Arn some eye-opening facts jump off the pages: "The 55+ age group in America is growing three times faster than the national average." "Many unchurched senior adults will not be reached by existing ministries in today's churches." "Only 10 of every 100 young people stay in the same community in which they grow up." By way of contrast, most senior adults, age 55 and up are 'there to stay'. Their prayer ministry, experience and willingness to serve are an invaluable resource to the local church. Your thoughts, ideas, and suggestions may be sent to the Senior Ministries Coordinator.

Technology

This year saw major advances in the area of technology. Pastor Steve Taylor was employed last October as a part time Technology Coordinator. Our media work now includes both cablecast programming as well as numerous non-broadcast projects.

During the year cablecast programs were produced for the Lafayette, Indiana area, and the Lawrenceville Church of God in Ohio. Churches have also indicated an interest in cablecasting, including Timberland, South Bend, IN where programming will begin in April. We have an interested individual in the Detroit, Michigan area and cablecasts should be starting there soon.

During this year, our equipment has been modified so that full-color computer graphics can now be imported over any video source. We also purchased two digital video camcorders for use in productions. The quality improvement is considerable. These units will serve us well since these camcorders will interface with computer editing equipment and will also adapt to HDTV - the new television standard that is expected to replace today's television standard within 7 years. We also purchased a multimedia computer which will allow video work to be done directly through it.

The majority of our efforts are being put into non-broadcast video productions. Our highest priority was to complete and distribute 2 ABC promotional videos - one geared for prospective students, and one geared for parents. Additionally, work has been completed on the first Church of God Video Magazine. A youth quizzing promo video was also produced and distributed.

The Technology Coordinator has visited several churches to videotape segments for use in productions.

Special thanks to Andy VanBuren and Bill Wyatt for their volunteer assistance with the work in video production in Lafayette. They have devoted many hours and much creativity to our video efforts. Also, thanks to Justin Taylor for the many hours of work that he has put into developing the Today's Good News Television Internet website. Also, thanks to those who have been generous in their financial support of this area of our ministry.

Youth

The 1998 RYOT was a tremendous success. There were 308 students, youth workers, guests, and staff present. Ten students made a decision to accept Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Two students were baptized. The Louisiana Quiz Team was the 1998 quiz champion. Illinois was the runner up.

We have appreciated the nine years that Jim Graham has served as the Youth Coordinator for the Church of God General Conference. In light of our decision to appoint a full time ABC Recruitment/Youth Coordinator, Jim will conclude his service during the summer of 1999. Jim plans to continue to be active in youth work while pursuing a Master of Theology Degree at Fuller Theological Seminary. He also will continue as pastor of the Valley View Bible Church.

Tom New serves as coordinator for the Bible Quizzing Program. The quiz material for this year is taken from Acts 1-5. A Bible quiz video was distributed to Youth Leaders.

In order to provide support for youth ministry in the Church of God, the General Conference will pay the tuition expenses for a local youth worker and spouse to attend a Youth Specialties Convention in 1999. In addition to the tuition, \$100.00 per couple will be given to help with the cost of meals. State/Regional

Conference Youth Workers and their spouses are also eligible to attend. It is hoped that local churches will assist with the cost of travel and lodging. The National Youth Workers Conventions will be held in San Diego, October 21 - 25, and in Cincinnati, November 18 - 22.

BUSINESS

This year the computer system at the College/Conference was upgraded. The building was recabled for both phone and data lines. Our hardware was replaced and most software has been upgraded or replaced. The balance of our software replacement will take place over the next few months. At that point, the system will be fully 2000 compliant; Y2K issues should not affect any of our internal operations.

The staff now has simultaneous high-speed connection to the Internet. It also allows all e-mail messages to be read immediately upon being received; a 'pop-up' message tells each person the moment they have received new mail.

Recently we have redesigned our web site to make it both more attractive and more user friendly. Please be sure to visit our web site at www.abc-coggc.org. A visitor to this site can learn about the college and conference, see some publications on-line, and get registration information for Christian Worker's Seminar, General Conference, Atlanta Bible College, etc. If you have comments or ideas regarding our web site you may call us or e-mail us at info@abc-coggc.org.

As the old system has been disassembled, we are providing local computer stations to pastors and churches who have never had a computer before. Several more pastors and churches will now be able to access e-mail and the Internet.

As a result of upgrades we've done, we have a technologically advanced system that will help us more effectively and efficiently serve the needs of Atlanta Bible College and the Church of God General Conference.

A credit card account has been established which will permit the use of Visa and MasterCards for ordering books, paying registration fees for General Conference, Christian Workers Seminar, RYOT, and fees to ABC.

Finances

Fifty-eight of the 86 churches that are members of our association of churches contributed to the General Operations Goal for Giving in 1998. The Board of Directors would like to invite all churches to participate in the support of the College/Conference. We appreciate the faithfulness of each church that contributes a portion of their income to support this work.

We are also grateful to the 531 individuals and families who also contributed during 1998. We also appreciate support from state/district conferences and groups.

At this point in the fiscal year, contributions to the Goal for Giving are approximately 11% more than last year at this time. However, contributions are about \$50,000 less than the Goal for Giving for this fiscal year. Part of the short fall has been made up by increased revenue from a larger enrollment at Atlanta Bible College, and from bequests that have been received during the year; expenses have also been reduced.

OTHERACTIVITIES

The Christian Workers Seminar held in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee in April 1998 was the 25th Annual Seminar. The attendance of 181 was the largest ever. The previous high attendance was 154. Kent Ross is Seminar Coordinator.

Summer Ministry Teams conducted Bible schools and assisted various churches during the summer of 1998. Merry Peterson and Sarah Buzzard were Summer Ministry Coordinators. Teams assisted at the following churches: North Hills, OH; Pennellwood, MI; Blanchard, MI; Minnesota Camp; New Friends, GA; Cool Spring, VA; Hedrick, IN; Wenatchee Washington Camp; Farmington, MO; East Oregon, IL; and children's classes at the Summer General Conference.

A new church was started in Sharpsburg, Georgia which is approximately 40 miles from the Atlanta Bible College campus. Pastor Dan Kennedy and a core of Church of God members including some ABC students have participated in the planting.

Financial Aid has been given to several churches during this year through our Church Development Aid Program. The following churches have received aid during 1998 – 99: Beloit New Life, WI; Cornerstone, GA; Blessed Hope, Rockford, IL; Farmington, MO; Winnebago, IL; Sharpsburg, GA; Troy View, OH. Church Planting Aid has been provided to the following churches during this year: Cornerstone, GA; Farmington, MO; Winnebago, IL; and Sharpsburg, GA. Both aid programs are on a schedule of payments that decline at the end of each year. Church Development Aid is spread over five years and Church Planting Aid is spread over four years.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation

The Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation is a separate corporation from Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference and it is governed by a Board of Trustees consisting of 13 individuals. The purpose of the foundation is to "Promote the educational and cultural welfare of the college... and to develop, expand, and improve the college facility so as to provide broader educational advantages and opportunities, to encourage research and increase the college's usefulness to the members of the Church of God General Conference." The Foundation has over \$1,200,000 in investments. Over the past several years, the investments have earned about 12% per year.

Each year, the Trustees of the Development Foundation meet to: review investments, review recommendations from the College for the use of funds, act upon spending requests, and elect officers.

During the 1998 – 99 school year, interest earnings have been allocated as follows:

\$30,000 Basic Grants for Students

\$ 5,000 Library Books and Equipment

\$ 3,000 Library Periodicals

\$ 5,000 Holy Land Grants

\$ 5,000 Computer Grants (pays rent for computers for ABC/Clayton students)

\$ 2,500 Staff Training

\$ 2,500 Periodicals, Books, and Dues for Staff

During this year, the membership of the Church of God has been invited to participate in a special prayer emphasis entitled "Praying the Church into the 21st Century." We live on the brink of a new decade, century, and millenium. Within our membership there are many who are sensing a need for us to focus more on prayer. We recognize that we have many opportunities and challenges to face as we carry on ministry in our times. There is strength in numbers and there is power when we are united in prayer. We continue to encourage all of the membership to be partners in prayer with other Church of God members.

We are thankful for the many pastors and lay workers who serve the Lord throughout the Church of God. We are thankful for individual initiative and the commitment of so many in advancing the cause of the kingdom.

We continue to be grateful to God for the resources that he provides to enable us to continue our work. Day by day, we are dependent upon him to provide for our financial needs. He has worked through many of you and your churches to advance the ministry of the Church of God.

As our entire association of churches focuses upon obedience to the Great Commission, we are optimistic that the Church of God can have a greater impact in our world.

Christian Conciliation Board

Focus on the Kingdom

Focus on the Kingdom radio program has now been airing for some three years. We expanded in 1998 into short-wave out of South Bend, IN, broadcasting at the same time over the local area. A number of visitors came to Timberland as a result of the contact via radio.

In 1999 American Christian Network began airing our programs over four stations in the Spokane, WA area. At the same time, WLQV began to feature the program with large coverage in Detroit, MI. We are completing a year's programming in Augusta, GA and WFAX in Washington, DC has been giving coverage thanks to support from the COG at Fair Oaks, VA.

Our monthly magazine now goes to some 800 people across the world, including isolated believers in a number of African countries. Plans are that we should create another year of programming, perhaps more in the format of commentary verse by verse with close attention to the Abrahamic Faith. Most recently, some stir was caused in South Bend and a number of clergy lobbied WHME with the protest that I was not a Trinitarian (they had visited our website). This led to a sudden cancellation of the local and shortwave/internet coverage. This was a surprise to our agents who were apologetic and supportive, even reminding us that "New Testament Christians were sometimes persecuted."

Investigation is underway for another outlet for short-wave/ internet so that our foreign listeners will not be denied access to Abrahamic truth of the Gospel. Responses continue to be enthusiastic. One lady in New Jersey phoned to tell me she was "in a state of shock. We have been taught wrong on some of the basic Christian teachings." She immediately began to lobby her own Church and the Pastor is trying to warn her to avoid contact with us! Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

This association, in existence since 1968, provides retirement benefits for Church of God pastors and employees of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference and their families.

Membership consists of 30 participating pastors/staff members and 3 non-participating pastors/staff. There are 38 churches and 7 conferences that contribute to the Association.

Lump sum settlements have been distributed to 33 pastors/ spouses. Monthly benefits are being distributed to 3 pastors and 9 spouses. \$627,000 has been distributed in lump sum settlements and monthly benefits since the inception of the program.

The members of the Association meet every other year at the Summer General Conference to review the work of the Association and to take appropriate action.

Explanation of Budget

The proposed budget for July 1, 2000 to June 30, 2001 will fund the following programs and activities of the College/Conference in accordance with our mission.

Anticipated Expenses

- Salaries and Wages-compensation is provided for 25 employees (6 part-time editors, 3 part-time coordinators, 2 part time student workers, 1 ten-month instructor, 1 five-month instructor, and 12 full time workers. This budget also includes support for Summer Ministry team members who are paid by the week.)
- 2. Social Security-amount matched by the employer
- 3. Employee Benefits health insurance, workmen's compensation, conference premium for Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, and registration fee for summer General Conference.
- 4. Assistance to Churches funds provided for eight churches on a declining scale of payments each year.
- 5. Ministerial Association support for programs and other expenses of the Church of God Ministerial Association.
- Youth Ministry funding to help subsidize the cost of the annual R.Y.O.T.
- 7. Printing and Binding-includes all materials printed by the College/Conference and the binding of permanent materials for the Library.
- 8. Postage-Shipping charges for the *Progress Journal*, the *Restitution Herald*, *A Journal from the Radical Reformation*, tracts, books, and all correspondence.
- 9. Purchases Bookstore textbooks and other materials, which are purchased for resale.
- Purchases Cook material Creative Teaching Aid Packets and other Cook material that is resold as a part of our Sunday School Curriculum.
- 11. Royalties fees paid for the use of the David C. Cook curriculum and copyrighted material used in our publications.
- 12. Basic Grants assistance to ABC students in the amount of up to \$110 per semester hour to subsidize their tuition at ABC.
- Clayton Rebates during the first three semesters of education, ABC students who attend Clayton College and State University are eligible for a rebate to offset the out of state tuition until they can establish residency.
- 14. Advertising-Recruitment-includes travel, telephone calls, printing, and postage primarily to promote ABC.
- 15. Library Periodicals religious and theological journals and other magazines for the Library collection.
- 16. Library Books newly published books are acquired to keep the Library collection up to date.
- 17. Periodicals, Books, Dues-a small allowance is provided to professional staffto purchase resourcematerial for classes and to participate in professional organizations.
- 18. Staff Education professional staff members are encouraged to attend at least one seminareachyear to remain current in their field of study.
- 19. Program Development the purchase of resources to enhance teaching programs at ABC and for the Lending Library.
- 20. Travel includes travel for Board members, advisory committees, special boards and committees, Gospel Teams, Summer Ministries, and staff.
- 21. Motor Vehicle Expense-license plates, insurance, and maintenance for three vehicles.

- 22. Office Supplies-paper, printer cartridges, stationary, envelopes, etc.
- 23. Professional Services the constitution requires an annual audit.
- 24. Telephone-basic and long distance service, including the cost of all "800" number calls which are provided toll free to the caller.
- 25. Insurance-non-plant-liability insurance for employees and directors.
- 26. Supplies and Expenses printing supplies, piano tuning, towel and paper products, and other operational expenses.
- 27. Repairs/Maintenance-non-plant-maintenance agreements and repairs for office and library equipment.
- 28. Plant Expenses includes all expenses for buildings and property.
- 29. Contingency-this budget is being prepared 15 months before the fiscal year begins. This item provides a cushion for adjustments when the fiscal year begins on July 1,2000.
- 30. Vehicle Replacement-money is set aside in a restricted account to be available when a vehicle needs to be replaced.

- Sunday School Materials includes all sales of Sunday School Curriculum.
- 2. Books, Tracts sale of textbooks as well as other materials to the membership and the public.
- 3. Subscriptions-subscriptions for *The Restitution Herald* are \$13 per year, \$24 for two years, \$33 for three years; *A Journal From the Radical Reformation* is \$24 per year.
- 4. Tuition-income is based upon projected enrollment of the equivalent of fifteen students at ABC taking an average of 12 credit hours (students are also enrolled for additional hours at Clayton College) and 20 extension students taking an average of 5 semester hours during the year.
- 5. Housing-rentreceived from ten apartments on the College Campus.
- 6. Laundry-income from laundry facilities in apartment building.
- Late Fees/Rent and Fees interest income and registration fees from students.
- 8. ABCDF transfer of interest income from the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation.
- 9. Interest-money earned on checking account through the year.
- Transfers In funding for Church Planting is supplemented by restricted trust funds.
- 12. Bequest Distribution the College/Conference is the recipient of annuity payments on a contract of a deceased member.
- 13. Transfer from Morgan Fund to subsidize budget.
- 14. Contributions Needed to accomplish the goals of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference for the 2000-2001 fiscalyear, contributions of \$391,760 will be needed from churches, conferences, and individual families. This is approximately \$32,650 permonth.

In 1998, churches, conferences, and groups gave over \$178,310 to the Goal for Giving. We are thankful for this faithful giving and encourage each member church to designate a portion of its income to assist with the work of the College/Conference.

To close the gap between contributions needed and the amount provided by churches, conferences, and groups, we rely upon faithful giving of individuals and families. Approximately \$213,000 is needed in contributions from individuals and families. In 1998, 552 families contributed an average of \$238 during the year for a total of \$131,552. There is a need for additional support from other member families of nearly \$100,000 to help underwrite the work of the College and Conference and to meet this budget. A gift of \$130 from each Church of God family would totally meet the needs of the College and Conference for the year.

Praying the Church into the 21st Century

The following is a true story shared by a missionary who was home on furlough.

While serving at a small field hospital in Africa, every two weeks I travel by bicycle through the jungle to a nearby city for supplies. This was a journey of two days and required camping overnight at the halfway point.

On one of these journeys, I arrived in the city where I planned to collect money from a bank, purchase medicines and supplies, and then begin my two-day journey back to the field hospital.

Upon arrival in the city, I observed two men fighting, one of whom had been seriously injured. I treated him for his injuries and at the same time witnessed to him of the Lord Jesus Christ. I then traveled two days, camping overnight, and arrived home without incident.

Two weeks later I repeated my journey. Upon arriving in the city, I was approached by the young man I had treated. He told me that he had known I carried money and medicine. He said, "Some friends and I followed you into the jungle, knowing you would camp overnight. We planned to kill you and take your money and drugs. But just as we were about to move into your camp, we saw that you were surrounded by 26 armed guards." At this I laughed and said that I was certainly all alone out in that jungle campsite. The young man pressed the point, however, and said, "No sir, I was not the only person to see the guards. My five friends also saw them, and we all counted them. It was because of those guards that we were afraid and left you alone."

At this point in the sermon, one of the men in the congregation jumped to his feet and interrupted the missionary and asked if he could tell him the exact day that this happened. The missionary told the congregation the date, and the man who interrupted told him this story:

"On the night of your incident in Africa, it was morning here and I was preparing to go play golf. I was about to putt when I felt the urge to pray for you. In fact, the urging of the Lord was so strong, I called men in this church to meet with me here in the sanctuary to pray for you. Would all of those men who met with me on that day stand up?"

The men who had met together to pray that day stood up. The missionary wasn't concerned with who they were — he was too busy counting how many men he saw. There were 26.

This story is an incredible example of how the spirit of God moves in mysterious ways. If you ever hear such prodding, go along with it.

The membership of the Church of God has been participating in a special prayer effort during this year entitled "Praying the Church into the 21st Century." As we approach a new millenium, now is an auspicious time to pray for God's direction and blessing upon our work.

Many are praying that our membership will seek God with all of their hearts (see 2 Chronicles 15:1-15), experience the power of God in their lives, and participate in a revival that would cause us to minister to the lost with new zeal. Many of our people are experiencing God at work in their lives and in their church in new ways. At the summer conference, a number of testimonies were shared by participants of how God is being faithful in blessing the ministry of individuals and churches.

There is strength in numbers and there is power when we are united in prayer. We invite you to join us in being a prayer partner as we "Pray the Church into the 21st Century."

Summary of Summer Conference

The 79th annual Summer General Conference was held at the Henry VIII Hotel in St. Louis, MO. One hundred fifty-seven were preregistered for the conference and approximately forty-five others attended evening services or other events. The theme was "The Body of Christ" based on Ephesians 4.

On the Sunday prior to Conference the Missouri churches hosted special services, sightseeing, and meals.

Charles Bottolfs of the Happy Woods Church, Hammond, Louisiana and Pastor Greg Demmitt of the Lakeshore Church in Tempe, Arizona were elected to four-year terms on the Board of Directors to replace Pastors David Cheatwood and Dale Swartz whose terms expired. Plaques of appreciation were presented to retiring board members at the business session.

Myra Huffer Montgomery was elected to a four-year term on the Christian Education Advisory Committee replacing Christy Ross who chose not to be renominated.

The Board of Directors elected officers as follows: Chairman, Joe James; Vice-Chairman, Charles Bottolfs; Secretary, Greg Demmitt; Treasurer, Robert Huddlestun.

The Board of Directors appointed Keith Williams to a three-year term on the Investment Fund Board; Michele Millard was reappointed to a six-year term on the Christian Conciliation Board; and Mardy Lawrence was reappointed to a three-year term on the Lord's Harvest International Mission Sending Agency Board.

During Conference the Board of Trustees of the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation met. They elected officers as follows: President, Charles Bottolfs; Vice President, Wanda Gerullis. The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Directors (Greg Demmitt and Robert Huddlestun) automatically serve in the same capacity for the Foundation Board.

During the business sessions, reports were received from two task forces appointed following last year's General Conference. Charles Bottolfs reported on the Public Relations Task Force. Members of the task force will be meeting with the Board of Directors at their fall meeting to discuss a mission statement and core values. Larry Johnson reported on behalf of the Organizational Task Force. A motion was adopted by the delegates to continue the work of the Organizational Task Force since by delegate action it had been appointed for only one year. This task force will serve as advisors to the Board of Directors in implementing improvement in the organizational structure of the college and conference.

A recommendation regarding the employment of a Church Planting Assistant was tabled in light of ongoing discussions about the organizational structure of our organization and the development of strategic initiatives.

A budget for the 2000-2001 fiscal year was adopted by the delegates. It calls for contributions of \$402,160.

Delegates expressed their appreciation to Recruitment Coordinator, Andy Cisneros and Youth Coordinator, Jim Graham who are leaving the college/conference staff.

The Ministerial Association elected Dale Swartz to serve on the Ministerial Recognition Board, replacing Pastor John Railton who resigned.

A little over \$2,000 was received in offerings during Conference for Church/Planting/Evangelism. Delegates at the 1998 Conference voted to launch a campaign to raise \$200,000 over the next five years to assist with our church planting and outreach efforts. Four hundred families and/or groups are being sought to contribute \$100 per year for five years in order to reach this goal.

President's Message to Delegates by David Krogh

Thank you for coming to this 79th annual Conference of the Church of God. As delegates you are important decision-makers as you select individuals to serve on the Board of Directors and Advisory committees; as you act on recommendations, and as you adopt a budget. You also play a significant role as you return home to represent Atlanta Bible College and the Conference to your church and state conference. The vote and voice of each one of you are important. Some elections have been decided by one or two votes. Suggestions offered, or issues raised by only one individual have resulted in new directions, new ministries, and new services for our organization. Each one of you is vital to the work of this Conference. All ideas and suggestions offered are seriously considered by our Board and staff. Who you are and the work you do make a difference.

The theme of this year's conference is also vital as we focus upon our individual role and our corporate role as the body of Christ. I have been challenged by the speakers who have called our attention to the importance of unity and commitment to truth and to love. As the body of Christ we have been called to make a difference in our world. We have been called to be faithful as we face challenges in ministry.

I want to assure you that I believe that the Church of God is strategically positioned to have a greater impact on our world in the time remaining before the second coming of Christ. I believe the best days of the Church of God are in the future.

I would like to share with you 6 reasons why I believe we are in a position to advance our work significantly in the days ahead:

1. The accreditation of Atlanta Bible College during the past year. This was a giant step forward. Accreditation has been a long-term goal. Last fall, an unbiased outside organization reviewed our programs, our staff, our facilities, our financial resources, and our services, and they gave us their unqualified stamp of approval. The Accrediting Commission International has accredited over 160 schools and colleges. ACI was very complimentary of what we are doing as a college. The membership of the Church of God is to be commended for making education a priority in our organization. And our membership is to be commended for providing the financial resources that make it possible for the college to operate. Our staff is to be commended for their dedicated service and for their commitment to making ABC

an excellent educational institution. We are glad to welcome new members to our staff: Steve Taylor, Technology Coordinator; Jon Cheatwood, Youth/Recruitment Coordinator; Jill Taylor, Secretary to the President. I would like all the staff members of Atlanta Bible College and the Church of God General Conference to stand. (Round of applause.)

2. The expansion of the ministry of the Church of God into new cultures and racial groups. According to Rev. 5:9, there will be people in the kingdom from every tribe, language, people group, and nation. Many of us have been praying for opportunities to reach out to other groups. Over the past few years, the base of the Church of God has been substantially broadened. There has been outreach to the black community, and just recently doors have opened to Americans of Korean descent. Last fall, a Korean immigrant, Steve An, enrolled in Atlanta Bible College. He is a mid-career person who is a dedicated Christian and student of the Word. He has been an avid learner and clearly his heart yearns for ministry. Steve has a powerful testimony of how he became a Christian and the power of God in answering prayer in his life.

Recently Steve asked about the possibility of starting a Korean Church as a daughter congregation of our New Friends Bible Church that meets in the college chapel. As we explored with him his desire to start a church, he said that it was clear to him that the message that we are teaching is Scriptural. He said, "You can substantiate your teachings directly from the Bible." He said it was clear to him that the church that he was attending could not support their beliefs from Scripture, and his desire is to establish a Korean church that teaches the truth of Scripture.

This new group was started several weeks ago and we are renting the college chapel to this new group for a Sunday afternoon service, as well as an early morning prayer service Tuesday through Saturday mornings, as well as a midweek Bible study. And in August they will start a Saturday program for young people. A medical doctor is a part of the new group and he wants to offer a free medical clinic for a few hours on Saturday for people in our community.

We also rejoice in contacts overseas: Malawi, India, Mexico, Ghana, the Philippines, and from many African countries because of the Focus on the Kingdom radio ministry over shortwave. We also rejoice in contacts made through our Theological Conference in Austria, Hungary, and Haiti.

We give God praise for opening doors so that the message of truth and salvation can be presented by Atlanta Bible College and the Church of God to other races and people groups who have every right to hear the message of Bible truth.

3. The Focus on the Kingdom radio program. This radio program is fulfilling Matthew 24:14, The Gospel of the Kingdom is being preached in the whole world as a testimony to all nations. Through shortwave and the Internet, the message of the Kingdom is available all over the face of the earth. We rejoice in the many responses we have had to this program, and we also rejoice in the baptisms that Pastor John Railton mentioned in his testimony the other night.

Several Church of God families generously provided the financial resources to get this project launched. Since then, many churches and State/District Conferences have provided additional financial support to expand the broadcasting to 11 stations, plus the Internet and shortwave.

I am also pleased to report that an anonymous donor recently contributed \$750,000 to Restoration Fellowship to expand the Focus on the Kingdom radio ministry. We praise God for the advance of this work, and the potential to reach multitudes all over the world with the message of truth and salvation.

4. We also rejoice in the number of baptisms throughout the Church of God. In the early part of this decade, delegates to the annual Conference adopted a recommendation proposed by the Ministerial Association that we establish a goal of having 2,000 baptisms by the year 2,000. We currently have documented about 1.500 baptisms in this decade. However, we have only been able to secure baptism reports from 2/3 of our churches, even after repeated requests. Some of the non-reporting churches are small and may not have had many baptisms during the past 10 years, but some of our larger churches have also not reported or at least not every year. We have been reluctant to estimate the number of baptisms in these non-reporting churches, so we have reported only actual numbers. Furthermore, we have not included in this count, baptisms that have taken place overseas. There have been a significant number of baptisms in Malawi, perhaps in the hundreds, but we have not received names and firm numbers from there, so these numbers have not been included. But it seems obvious that when baptisms from this fall are included, along with the baptisms from non-reporting churches and from non-reporting mission fields, we will have exceeded the goal of 2,000 baptisms by

the year 2000. For the size of our association of churches and the number of our churches, I must say that this has been tremendous progress in making disciples in obedience to the Great Commission.

- 5. I believe that we are strategically positioned to move ahead in a significant way because of the financial blessings that God has bestowed upon us. During this decade, the net worth of the College and Conference almost doubled. The assets of the ABC Development Foundation, ABC Scholarship Endowment Funds, and Annuity Funds, have increased remarkably. These assets have not only strengthened the base of our organization, but also enabled new projects to be funded. Also, the assets of the Ministers' Retirement Association have increased to over one million dollars which is providing retirement benefits to pastors and widows of pastors. God has blessed us far beyond our expectations.
- 6. The final reason why I am optimistic about the future of our work is our prayer effort entitled "Praying the Church into the 21st Century. A year ago last May our pastors encouraged us to move ahead with this prayer effort, and during 1999, a number of our people have indicated that they are standing together in this united prayer effort. To me, this is a fantastic way that we can be unified in our work. There is strength in numbers and there is tremendous power when people unite in prayer. This is evident in a true story told by a missionary who was home on furlough (see page one of this JOURNAL).

Is this really the way prayer works? I choose to believe so. This story prompts me to be more alert to begin praying when I feel prompted to pray; it encourages me to pray more; and to pray with others. I don't believe we can even begin to fathom what God will do in the Church of God during the rest of 1999 and into the 21st century when we join in united prayer.

Yes, there are many indications that we are positioned to do greater ministry — the recommendations you passed last year; our new staff members; our work on distance learning. We have every reason to be optimistic as we face the future. We can expect more baptisms, more victories, and more financial blessings. God is at work in the world, and it is evident that God is at work in our midst. When we join Him where He is working, we cannot fail. He is not willing for any to perish but that all should come to repentance. Thank you for working together in obedience to the Great Commission.

Minutes of General Conference Delegate Business Sessions

Tuesday, July 13

- 1. The Tuesday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:25 a.m.
- 2. Pastor Scott Ross opened the session with prayer.
- 3. Chairman James officially welcomed the delegates to the 79th Annual General Conference. The Missouri Conference and Conference President Dale Brown were thanked for helping to host us in their home state. Steve Taylor and Jon Cheatwood were welcomed as new members of the college/conference staff.
- 4. Chairman James delivered the Chairman's message to the delegates. He noted various steps the Board of Directors has taken over the past year to implement recommendations adopted by the delegates during the 1998 General Conference Delegate Business Sessions. Chairman James urged the delegates to confidently face the future of the Church of God, expecting to be used by God to meet the opportunities that lie ahead of us.
- 5. Michelle Turner, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 32 pastors, 57 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 96 delegates at this business session.
- 6. Vice-president Kent Ross gave a report about Atlanta Bible College, especially noting the presence of several new students who had no previous connection with the Church of God and the challenging and interesting task of exposing these students to doctrinal teachings new to them.
- 7. The Annual Report printed in the May *Progress Journal* was considered.
- 8. The Special Reports printed in the May *Progress Journal* were considered.
- 9. Gary Burnham made comments and fielded questions on the financial reports printed in the delegate packet.
- 10. The floor was opened for nominations for two four-year terms on the Board of Directors. Pastor Jeff Fletcher nominated Charles Bottolfs. Pastor Scott Ross nominated Pastor

- Greg Demmitt. Marge Overmyer nominated Pastor Gary Turner. Lynn Berry nominated Keith Williams. Pastor Jim Ritch moved and Ruby McCaslin seconded a motion to close nominations. The motion passed. Nominees will be available in the lobby of the hotel this afternoon for anyone who would like to talk with them prior to the election. The election will be held during the Wednesday delegate business session.
- 11. The floor was opened for nominations for a four-year term on the Christian Education Advisory Committee. Pastor Scott Ross nominated Pastor Mark Tschaenn. Pastor Dale Swartz nominated Myra Montgomery. Charles Bottolfs moved and Pastor David Cheatwood seconded a motion to close nominations. The motion passed. The election will be held during the Wednesday delegate business session.
- 12. Charles Bottolfs, Public Relations Task Force Chairperson, gave a brief report about the continuing work of this Task Force. He introduced the other members of the committee: Dale Brown, Frank Johnson, Joyce Knapp and David Scheiding.
- 13. Pastor Dale Swartz moved and Pastor Don Ward seconded that we give a public thank you to the Public Relations Task Force for their work. The motion passed.
- 14. Anthony Buzzard gave a report on the status of the *Focus* on the Kingdom Radio Ministry, as well as the printing of the book, *The Doctrine of the Trinity: Christianity's Self-Inflicted Wound.*
- 15. Pastor Russell Magaw moved and Pastor Dave Riley seconded adoption of the Recommendation, "we recommend that the Church of God General Conference employ a church-planting assistant as soon as a candidate and funding are secured." Following discussion, Bill Lawrence moved and Sarah Ross seconded a motion to table the motion on the floor. The motion to table passed.
- 16. The Tuesday delegate business session was adjourned at 12:05 p.m.
- 17. Pastor Ed Goit closed the session in prayer.

Wednesday, July 14, 1999

- 1. The Wednesday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:20 a.m.
- 2. Pastor Jeff Fletcher opened the session with prayer.
- 3. The minutes of the Tuesday, July 13 delegate business session were read. No corrections were noted.
- 4. Michelle Turner, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 33 pastors, 58 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 98 delegates at this business session.
- 5. Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference President, David Krogh, delivered the President's message. President Krogh shared six reasons why he is confident the best days of the Church of God lie ahead: Atlanta Bible College has received accreditation and has a dedicated staff, our ministry has expanded into new cultures, the Focus on the Kingdom radio program can literally be heard around the world, we will exceed our goal of 2000 baptisms in the decade of the 1990's, God has granted tremendous financial blessings to the college/conference, and we have placed a special emphasis on prayer during the past year. Further, President Krogh urged the delegates to continue to place a special emphasis on prayer.
- 6. Following several ballots Charles Bottolfs and Pastor Greg Demmitt were each elected to serve a four-year term on the Board of Directors.
- 7. Those running the children's ministry this week were given an appreciative round of applause for their excellent work.
- 8. Appreciation plaques were presented to retiring Board members Pastor David Cheatwood and Pastor Dale Swartz.
- 9. Pastor Wally Winner informed the delegates the Southeast Conference is continuing the process of reprinting the six-part Berean Bible Study series. Books #1 and #2 are currently available.
- 10. President Krogh reviewed the various items enclosed in the delegate packets.
- 11. Gayle Guthrie reviewed the specifics of a resource materials notebook available through the Christian Education Advisory Committee. She also emphasized the important work of editing curriculum for doctrinal truth and the importance of the doctrinal distinctives material provided for

- one quarter every three years. Teams of volunteers will work together to help further develop the doctrinal distinctives curriculum. Volunteers are requested to work on these teams. Volunteers are also needed for various writing projects the Committee is working on.
- 12. Myra Montgomery was elected to serve a four-year term on the Christian Education Advisory Committee.
- 13. Judy Myers announced the ACMC Conference will be held in Atlanta July 29-31. The General Conference is underwriting tuition costs and providing housing in the college apartment building.
- 14. Judy Myers updated the delegates on the progress of Tracy Zhykhovich's residency paperwork. Tracy will be in the United States this summer and available to visit in some of our churches.
- 15. Larry Johnson, Chairperson of the Organizational Task Force, reported on the work of this task force. Other task force members are Norman Chandler, Donna Deane, Tim Jones and Jim Ring. The task force's written report outlines seven specific recommendations. Since time allowed for only limited delegate input, the delegates were asked to read over the committee's report and be prepared for further discussion during the Thursday delegate business session.
- 16. Pastor Seth Ross moved and Ruby McCaslin seconded the Organizational Task Force be kept in place in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors. The motion passed.
- 17. President Krogh reviewed and fielded questions on the proposed 2000-2001 fiscal year budget. Delegate action on the budget will be taken during the Thursday delegate business session.
- 18. Dale Brown moved and Diane Huddlestun seconded that \$4000 be added to the 1999-2000 fiscal year budget to help underwrite a retreat for the Priscillas.
- 19. The Wednesday delegate business session was adjourned at 12:05 p.m.
- 20. Pastor Kent Ross closed the session in prayer.

Thursday, July 15, 1999

1. Prior to the delegate business session being called to order, Pastor Scott Ross, Moderator of the Ministerial Association Leadership Team, led the installation of the 1999-2000 Board of Directors.

- 2. The Thursday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:30 a.m.
- 3. Pastor Dale Swartz opened the session with prayer.
- 4. The minutes of the Wednesday, July 14 delegate business session were read. No corrections were noted.
- 5. Chairman James noted that new appointments to the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation Board will be announced in print at a later time.
- 6. Chairman James, on behalf of the Board of Directors, shared the Board's response to the report of the Organizational Task Force. The Board is grateful for the work of this task force, and is supportive of the recommendations the task force has made. Core values and strategic initiatives will be major agenda items at the Fall Board Meeting. Other recommendations of the task force will be worked on during the next year, with a progress report being brought to the delegates at next year's delegate business session.
- 7. Larry Johnson, Organizational Task Force Chairperson, fielded additional delegate questions and comments about the task force's report. A major question raised was the place of the Ministerial Association in the sample organizational structure shown in the task force's report.
- 8. Pastor Francis Burnett moved and Pastor David Cheatwood seconded a motion to remove from the table the Recommendation, "we recommend that the Church of God General Conference employ a church-planting assistant as soon as a candidate and funding are secured." The motion to remove from the table passed. Following considerable discussion both for and against this recommendation, Pastor Greg Demmitt moved and Pastor Ray Hall seconded to table this recommendation until the new Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference organizational structure is in place. The motion to table the recommendation passed.
- 9. Joyce Knapp reminded the delegates that a church can be planted by lay people planting a Sunday School which later develops into a church. It was noted that both the Garden Park and Troy View churches were begun in this fashion.
- 10. Charles Webster spoke about the need for a pastor to come to plant a church in the Ocala/Orlando, Florida area.
- 11. Bill Lawrence praised Merry Peterson's effort to fully complete the Atlanta Bible College program at both ABC and Clayton College and State University. He noted she is very well prepared to enter ministry in the Church of God.

- 12. Andy Cisneros urged each delegate to identify a person with great ministry potential and to bring them to General Conference next summer. Chairman James thanked Andy for his excellent recent recruitment work for Atlanta Bible College.
- 13. Pastor Jack Hearp urged the Board of Directors to strengthen the programs and increase the resources allocated for Senior Ministries in the Church of God. His recommendation specifically asks the Board to help fund attendance at The Age Wave Conference for two people from each Church of God.
- 14. President Krogh recognized the 10 years of service of Youth Ministry Coordinator, Pastor Jim Graham, who is leaving the college/conference staff this year. The delegates showed their appreciation with a round of applause.
- 15. Howard Shute moved and Charles Bottolfs seconded adoption of the proposed 2000-2001 fiscal year budget printed in the delegate packet, with the adjustment of adding \$10,000 to the ABCDF interest income line item. Motion passed.
- 16. Pastor Scott Ross, Ministerial Association Leadership Team Moderator, reported Pastor Dale Swartz was elected by the Ministerial Association to serve on the Ministerial Recognition Board.
- 17. The delegates gave a round of applause to the Missouri churches for their work in hosting this year's General Conference.
- 18. Michelle Turner, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 33 pastors, 58 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 98 delegates at this business session.
- 19. The minutes of the Thursday, July 15 delegate business session were read. Jerold Brewer moved and Pastor Jeff Fletcher seconded a motion to approve the minutes of all three sessions of the 1999 General Conference Business Session. The motion passed.
- 20. Pastor Ed Goit moved and Pastor Mark Tschaenn seconded a motion to adjourn the 1999 General Conference Business Session. Motion passed. The Thursday delegate business session was adjourned at 12:05 p.m.

Atlanta Bible College's New School Year Begins

Eighteen new students joined the Atlanta Bible College family for this new school year that will take us into a new millennium. Students and staff gathered on the campus August 21 and 22 for registration and orientation. In part, the activities included a picnic supper for students, staff and their families followed by a worship service. Second year ABC student, Steve An and ABC President, David Krogh spoke.

At the beginning of each school year, all students are given a Bible Content Test to measure their grasp of the Bible. It is rewarding both to the students and the staff to see test scores increase each year that a student attends the college.

Also during orientation, a Personality Profile was completed by the students to assist them in understanding their personalities and how to relate more effectively to others.

Classes offered during the fall term are: Marriage and Family, Ensemble, Christian Education with emphasis on Youth Ministry, Pastoral Preaching, Personal Finance, Old Testament Survey 1 and 2, Church History 1, Systematic Theology 1, and a study of Galatians, Ephesians, and Colossians. In addition to day classes, seven classes are being offered in the evenings to serve students who are unavailable for classes during the day.

Instructors this semester are Anthony Buzzard, Jon Cheatwood, Paul Cook, David Krogh, Joe Martin, and Kent Ross.

Chapel services are held each Wednesday morning. Students and staff participate in planning and leading worship. A variety of speakers and programs are presented throughout the school year. The first chapel this semester was a report by Joe and Rebekah Martin and Jim Cramer who were members of the team that visited Malawi, East Africa in early August.

A number of churches throughout our conference observed Booster Sunday on September 19. Students, staff and Board members visited several churches on that weekend. We are thankful for the faithful prayer and financial support of so many members for the work of the college. This support is enabling the college to continue to prepare leadership for the 21st century during this school year. We have many churches that are looking for pastors and so the need for more workers is very apparent. The membership is invited to join us in praying for workers as Jesus instructed in Matthew 9:37, 38: "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into His harvest field."



Malawi and Mozambique Report

Jim Cramer, Travis Hamilton, Paul Madonia, Joe and Rebekah Martin, and Jim Mattison traveled to Malawi and Mozambique from August 2-16. Although among the poorest of the African nations, the people of Malawi and Mozambique are happy and contented with the good creation God has given them. All kinds of vegetation are everywhere for their use. The soil is fertile and they grow almost all their food. The gospel of the Kingdom and the love of Jesus mean everything to these people. It thrills them when we tell them God has invited them to be kings and queens in His coming righteous Kingdom on earth.

The people are emotional by nature. As they worship by singing praises, they sway back and forth to the rhythm of drums and many times clap their hands in a very orderly way. The main focus of the team was to share the great Bible teachings with the pastors and their wives so they could share them with the people. There were many others who attended also. When we shared with them the wonderful words of God they listened intently and took notes on tablets we had given them. We had three services a day, each lasting two to three hours. We shared the main teachings of the Bible: the great doctrines, the living of the Christian life, the necessity of living by God's laws. Joe Martin preached a marvelous sermon on the love of God. Jim Cramer, Travis Hamilton, and Paul Madonia all helped in the preaching and were well received by the people.

In every service there is a time of prayer for all, with each one uttering his own prayer to God, all at the same time. The whole service of worship is conducted in order and good taste. They certainly are not ashamed of the Lord Jesus and His wonderful Kingdom message. Their songs of worship all honor and praise God, Jesus, and God's coming Kingdom. Many of their songs reflect their love for Messiah Jesus; "Jesus, I Am Here for You," "I Am A Soldier for Jesus," "No One Can Be the Same As Jesus," "We Can Search the World Over and Never Find One Like Him," "When You Are in Trouble You Need to Come to Jesus," "Please Come to Him," and dozens more. Many times they make up a song about something important, such as the conquering of death by Jesus.

They like to share the joy of their faith with others. One day about fifteen women were all singing and swaying in a moving circle. I asked Margaret afterwards what they were doing. She said, "We are happy. That is why we dance and sing."


Rebekah Martin taught the women cleanliness and nutrition and answered some personal questions they had.

The closing day of the second conference that we held, nineteen people were baptized by Pastor Rabson Namaona in the large deep Ruo River (there are no crocodiles in this river).

With God's help we accomplished our mission. He was glorified, Jesus was lifted up, and God's word was preached. Our relationship with our brothers and sisters in Africa is a very close one. They have developed confidence in us, and we have come to respect them highly and have learned much from them.

Please pray with us for this work. These are all Abrahamic Faith people, who obviously know Jesus' favorite message (the Kingdom of God) in- and-out and love it. This is a large work. These African brothers and sisters need our encouragement and love. Their lives are very hard. Their faith means so much to them. Jesus is so real to them. The pastors work hard and are converting many, helping to fulfill Matthew 24:14. May God continue to bless and keep them all.

Haiti Report

Claire and I visited Haiti August 5-9. This island, on the west of the Dominican Republic, was a new part of the world for us. We had the opportunity to speak to 20 pastors representing about 1,200 folk, plus about 100 members, many of whom traveled many miles from the outlying churches, some in the mountains, to Port au Prince. I got to teach for many hours and was translated, although I used my French a great deal one- to-one and at the guesthouse and the church. The conditions in Haiti were not nearly as grueling as in Malawi. We actually slept in a guesthouse founded for missionaries by a Mennonite couple some years ago. Twenty-five dollars per night got us beds and two good meals. There was electricity but no air conditioning. It was very hot and humid.

During the visit I traveled in the back of a truck to the church everyday. They had power there and some camcorders and electronic machines which were used during the Sunday services. Obviously it is hard to tell exactly who is getting and understanding all that is said. But I would say Lesly Bertrand, who visited ABC last May for the theological conference, is a good man who understands the Truth well. He was dismissed from the Mennonites (having been trained in their Bible college) in 1996 when he learned the unity of God from our book on The Doctrine of the Trinity. In one of his messages he strongly presented the sleep of the dead to the people! He has a great love for the Kingdom message.

Claire went one day with some ladies who were visiting from Minnesota to a British run institution of 23 children who are mentally challenged. She saw a beautiful part of the island. There are many US and Canadian workers doing "good works" there. Haiti is very close to the US (two hours from Miami), and yet is very typical of the "third world."

We will continue to provide written materials to these Abrahamic faith people in Haiti.
