Christian Education Advisory Committee Activities

Following General Conference, the Christian Education Advisory Committee met to discuss their work for the coming year. Their primary activity is the revision of the doctrinal distinctives Sunday School curriculum which occurs every three years in the curriculum cycle. Six teams have been appointed to review and rework lessons in each of the six age levels, pre-school through high school. Over thirty individuals will be involved in this project.

The committee continues to produce ideas for inclusion in the "keys notebook" which contains information on Sunday School openings, object lessons, skits, bulletin boards, devotionals, seasonal ideas, and more ideas for successful Christian Education programs.

The committee also has been working on ideas suggested by the Institutional Long-Range Planning Task Force that met in October of 1997. Goals to be accomplished in the next two years, within two to five years, and five to ten years and beyond have been prepared.

Meeting of the Board of Directors

The Board of Directors met on the college/conference campus October 7-9. Two days of the meeting were spent in a discussion of our vision, mission, purpose, core values, and strategic initiatives. Additional discussion will be held on these topics at the January meeting.

100th Anniversary of the Cool Spring Church of God Church Building

The Cool Spring Church of God was organized near Browntown, VA by Elder N. J. Morgan and his wife, Sarah F. Morgan in 1856. Meetings were originally held in schoolhouses and in homes of the brethren.

In 1899, the congregation built a 30 feet wide by 20 feet long church building. It was dedicated by Bro. Samuel Wilson of New York in the month of August. After the erection of the church, Brothers B. J. and J. D. Boyer held services occasionally. In November of 1900, Bro. J. F. Wagoner, Rochester, IN conducted meetings. Bro. W. H. Wilson of Chicago, IL came in April in 1903 and held services for a time. In 1907 Bro. George Neill of South Bend, IN held meetings. May, 1909 Bro. S. J. Lindsey from Oregon, IL conducted a meeting. In the fall of 1914, Bro. C. C. Maple of North Ridgeville, OH held meetings. In 1915, Bro. J. B. Craton held services for a time. From the fall of 1916 until 1922, Bro. J. H. Anderson pastored the church and also conducted meetings in July of 1924. During May 1925, Bro. F. E. Siple of Oregon, IL held meetings. During the summer of 1925, Bro. Harry Sheets served as pastor until about 1933.

Church records are incomplete from 1933 until 1951. In September 1951 until June 1955, Pastor C. F. Pryor from Hendersonville, NC served as pastor. Successive pastors have been:

Cybersex

Sex on the Internet

The Internet is filled with marvelous things to see and do. One can get a map of a city, e-mail missionaries in Turkey, chat with special interest groups and even get medical advice. With the advent of cyberspace has come an unbelievable array of benefits ... and problems.

Chief among the problems is cybersex, the use of the Internet for sexual activity. The Internet has become the newest and perhaps easiest way to access pornography or become sexually involved with another person. The technological impact of the web has not just assisted us in accessing information, but has also become a major venue for sin.

A recent study on the impact of the Internet warns that Internet users who would normally be unlikely to develop sexually compulsive behavior do so as a result of their Internet usage. The anonymity and instant accessibility of the web has enticed many a curious user into giving in to the temptation of viewing pornography. This is very easy to do given that pornography is the third largest sector on the Internet. Consider the following statistics.

*There are 19,542,710 unique visitors per month on the top 5 pay porn sites.

*There are 98,527,275 unique visitors per month on the top 5 free porn sites.

*70% of all e-porn traffic occurs during the 9 to 5 workday.

*Last year the Internet porn industry generated over \$1 billion.

*In 1998 there were 100,000 commercial porn sites.

*200 new porn sites per day are being added to the Internet.

*All sites offer free "teasers", meaning free viewing of porn pictures that are intended to allure the user to sign up to view more.

*Though all porn sites require the person to say they

are at least 18 years of age, any child can click "yes" and then view the free porn teasers.

Studies indicate that the Internet has had a major impact upon women. Internet usage by women has grown from 25 percent in 1995 to 39 percent in 1997. By next year, women will account for 50 percent of the online population. While men are mainly involved in porn viewing, women have greatly increased their involvement in unhealthy and ungodly relationships. Typically, a woman starts a relationship through "chat room" conversations that quickly become flavored with intimate disclosure. The relationship often progresses to the daily anticipation of hearing the voice box announce that "You have mail." From e-mail interactions comes the exchange of phone numbers, phone sex or even personal meetings. For the bored, unfulfilled or romantically inclined, the instant and confidential nature of the web makes participation too easy to resist.

Each day 37 million Americans sign on to the Internet from home and 32 million Americans use the Internet from work. The repercussions of misusage are staggering to contemplate. Usage of the Internet for sexual activity has already increased the number of referrals to my office of Christian men and ministers who are struggling with Internet pornography. I have also witnessed a number of marriages jeopardized by Internet romances. Family



problems nowadays include teenage porn viewers who have been caught by parents.

What can be done to help stem the tide of cybersex? Please consider the following suggestions:

- 1. Make sure everyone in your family and ministry understands the dangers and practices described above. The scripture declares that people perish for lack of knowledgeable foresight (Prov. 29:18). Christians who desire to keep their life pure need to be aware of the potential dangers of Internet misusage, especially related to cybersex.
- 2. Viewing Internet pornography together as a couple is damaging. Any exposure to porn viewing can being arousal that encourages further viewing and ultimately a problem for one or both partners. Additionally, any introduction of pornography into the bedroom will eventually damage the emotional and spiritual intimacy of the act of marriage.
- 3. Monitor Internet usage by checking the computer history log. If you have a Windows based program you can check the History file and find out if anyone has been visiting Internet porn sites or chat rooms. Simply go to 'Start' and click with the right hand mouse button. Go to 'Explore' and then to 'All Folders'. Click on the 'History (Hx)' file and it will show you all visited Internet sites.
- 4. If you have had difficulty being tempted with Internet porn or 'chat room' relationships, confess it to another person. Change starts with open recognition and admission of one's sin and weakness. Accountability to

another, who will pray for you and check on you weekly, will help considerably.

- **5.** If cybersex has become a pattern in your life, seek help. Once these practices become patterns and habits they fall into the category of compulsive or addictive sin bondages. An arousal template is being reinforced so powerfully that the individual needs expert help in order to gain freedom
- 6. Restructure your computer and Internet usage. Once an unhealthy pattern has been established, the user will find himself or herself being aroused by just signing on to the net. Have your spouse or a friend help you walk through a different way to sign on or ask them to be present when you do. Anything you do to break the pattern or cycle will help.
- 7. Get a safe Internet provider. There is more than one net provider that now offers screened or assisted usage in eliminating porn from your address. Safe Access, Safe Net, and Integrity Online are screened net providers that filter objectionable material. If you have America On Line you can get an address from them that forwards all unsolicited porn advertisements to a special mail-box which in turn informs the porn advertiser to take you off their list.

A New Year, Decade, Century, and Millennium

It is a special privilege to be alive at the dawn of the seventh millennium. It is interesting to look back at events that were happening at the turn of each of the previous millennia. One thousand years after Adam, there was a man living who was "righteous, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked with God" (Gen. 5:9). Noah, "a preacher of righteousness" (2 Pet. 2:5) faithfully and obediently served the Lord even though "the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence" (Gen. 6:11). We are thankful that God has provided the leadership and financial resources to bring us to this point in our history. We can truly say with the Psalmist "this was the Lord's doing; it is marvelous in our eyes" (Psalm 118:23).

The account of ministry in the Church of God can be told with countless stories of men and women who are hearers and doers of the Word. It is told as we look at the dedication of many who day by day reach out in love to the lost; who help to meet the needs of others in the body of Christ; and who serve without fanfare.

As we look to the future, we do so with optimism and confidence, knowing that God will honor His covenants of the past. We eagerly anticipate the soon return of Jesus. While we wait, we enter this new millennium with a renewed zeal to help reach this generation for Christ. Therefore, we faithfully serve, knowing that God will give the increase.





Special Events

Atlanta Bible College was pleased to host several special events during February and March. February 7-11, Church of God pastors met for their annual conference. Forty-eight were registered. Pastor Alan Cain was elected to serve on the Minister's Association Leadership Team. Pastor Dale Swartz was re-elected to a full term on the Ministerial Recognition Board. A number of helpful sessions were held on a variety of Biblical and ministry topics

February 11-13, the 9th Annual Theological Conference was held on campus. Approximately seventy-five were registered. The Conference began with a debate between Dr. Marian Hillar, Professor of Chemistry and Philosophy at Texas Southern University and Dr. Charles Thaxton, lecturer and author in the field of "Intelligent Design." This topic on creation versus evolution was very profitable. Dr. Richard Hiers, Professor at the University of Florida at Gainesville, made presentations on "Albert Schweitzer and the Quest for the Historical Jesus" and "The Delay of the Parousia." Kent Ross presented a paper on "The Emergence of the Minority Church in the Midst of the Orthodox Reformation." Kirk Ross presented a paper entitled "Toward a Definition of Radical Reformation: The Case of Theophrastus Paracelsus." Robert Hach of Miami, Florida had a session on "The Righteousness of Faith." Charles Hunting spoke on "Destroy This Temple – Jesus and His Agenda." Anthony Buzzard spoke on "Man and His Immortality: the Purpose of the New Creation." The conference concluded on Sunday morning with a series of faith stories by those who were in attendance and a final worship service at which Pastor Arlen Rankin spoke on "The Abrahamic Gospel."

Each year at the Theological Conference, many are in attendance who have received literature or heard the Focus on the Kingdom radio program. It is a pleasure to meet new truth seekers.

On the weekend of March 2-4, Atlanta Bible College hosted prospective students and sponsors. A total of 44 guests participated in the special weekend activities. Participants visited ABC classes, were interviewed by staff members, toured Clayton College and State University campus, took part in servant evangelism projects, heard presentations about opportunities for ministry and programs of Atlanta Bible College, and participated in two special evening services. We are thankful for all of the churches that sent prospective students to the campus.



(If this would be difficult for the church to cover this expense, we suggest that State/District Conferences be asked to provide a grant to help. Or a State/District Conference could choose to underwrite the expense for all the churches in the state to be filmed at the same time which would be much more cost effective.)
- 2. Travel time covered by ABC/General Conference.
- 3. Filming time covered by ABC/General Conference.
- 4. Editing time 2 hours free per year per church each hour beyond 2 there will be a charge of \$50.00 per hour (normal commercial rates are \$75.00 to \$100 per hour)

- 5. The cost of operating the Technology Department will be subsidized through the sale of videotapes. The Department will sell copies of children's programs, conferences, etc., for \$20 per tape. If multiple tapes are required for longer events, package rates will apply.
- 6. The college will establish charges for Distance Learning courses.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

The Board of Directors would like to propose the following amendment to the Constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference regarding delegate representation at the Summer General Conference:

Article II Section 1, Current Constitution: "Each member church of fifteen or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Proposed Change: "Each member church which has held at least twenty-four services during the year, and which has made a financial contribution to the operating budget of the College/Conference, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Explanation: Two of our smaller churches have expressed a concern about the Constitutional requirement that a member church must have fifteen or more members in order to be entitled to delegate representation. These two churches both

have weekly services and make financial contributions to the General Conference but they do not have fifteen or more active members. They have requested a revision to the Constitution, which would allow them to have delegate representation.

The Board is suggesting that it is reasonable that a member church have at least twenty-four services through the year, which would be two per month. The term "preaching" services has been deleted because some of our smaller churches may not officially have a "sermon," but they may have singing and a Bible study.

The provision to require a contribution specifically does not say how much that contribution needs to be. It has been a suggestion of the Board in the past, that even our smallest churches should be able to make a contribution of \$100-200 per year. Churches that are sending delegates to vote on a budget and activities that require funding should participate financially in helping to underwrite these actions.

The Constitution can be amended with proper notice to the membership and a two-thirds majority vote of delegates present at any General Conference meeting.

Position Description for Board of Directors

At the 2000 General Conference, two members will be elected to the Board of Directors of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference for four-year terms. The terms of Mr. Joe James and Dr. William D. Lawrence will expire at this conference. They may not be re-elected according to the Constitution.

Below is the position description for directors who serve on the Board:

Title

Director, Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference

Summary

The position exists to transact and administer the business of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference in accordance with the Constitution and By-laws.

Duties

- 1. Employ a President who is responsible to the Board of Directors for administering the day-to-day business of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference, for personnel, for planning, and for such specific matters of business as shall be assigned.
- 2. Serve as a Trustee of the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation (a total of seven members of the Board of Directors and six other members appointed by the Board).
- 3. Give general (external) supervision to all College/Conference affairs.
- 4. Engage in long-range planning and evaluation.
- Make recommendations to Conference delegates regarding:
 - a. Amendments to the Constitution and By-laws.
 - b. Major policies or major policy changes.

- c. Creation of major programs.
- d. Budgeting.
- 6. Acquire and dispose of real and personal property.
- 7. Approve plans to finance operations.
- Give of his/her private means to support the College/ Conference and be actively engaged in fund-raising activities.
- Establish controls to protect the rights and interests of contributors, member churches and conferences, and staff
- 10. Communicate the purposes and programs of the College/ Conference to the Church of God through public relations efforts.
- 11. Employ a competent auditor.
- Attend all meetings of the Board and the annual Conference.
- 13. Take action regarding the admission, discipline, dismissal, and restoration of member churches in the Church of God General Conference.
- 14. To do any other necessary acts for the establishment, prosecution, and accomplishment of the business of the College/Conference.

Organizational Relationships

Each Board member is accountable to the Conference delegate body for the carrying out of the duties of the office. The Board is accountable for the work of the President.

Qualifications

The qualifications of each director shall be those given in 1 Timothy 3, Titus 1, and such other scriptures as teach the qualifications of church leaders. A director may be either male or female.



The Board also voted to authorize the granting of a degree of Associate of Arts in Theology and Ministry to those who complete a two-year program consisting of a total of sixty hours with a minimum of twenty-six hours in Bible and theology, fifteen hours in ministry, and nineteen hours in general education
- 6. Kent Ross presented the plan for an experimental distance learning course which will be offered this fall (see item below for more information).
- 7. Voted to hold the 2001 General Conference in Atlanta, July 6-8. This will be a shorter conference and primarily a delegate conference. This is being proposed as an experiment and as an effort to reduce the cost of attending the conference. ANNUAL REPORT OF ATLANTA BIBLE COLLEGE/ CHURCH OF GOD GENERAL CONFERENCE

During the past year, the Board of Directors and staff have spent considerable time discussing the mission statement, core values, and strategic initiatives for our organization. These discussions are in response to recommendations from the Organizational Task Force and the Public Relations Task Force. These discussions are still underway and will continue as an agenda item at future Board meetings.

During the past year we have carried out our mission with a number of specific activities. The following pages contain a summary of the work of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference for the time period March 1, 1999 through February 29, 2000 with several updates for more recent activities.

COLLEGIATE SERVICES

ABC Report

Atlanta Bible College is enjoying a year of blessing. We began the fall semester with 32 students. Of that number, 12 have long been associated with the Church of God, 5 are now associated with the Church of God, and 15 are community students involved with and from other churches. We are receiving from our community students enrichment and new insights, and hopefully are giving to them rich biblical truth and encouragement in ministry.

Kent Ross and Dr. Joe Martin continue to teach the bulk of the courses throughout the year, with Anthony Buzzard, David Krogh, Steve Taylor and Jon Cheatwood each teaching in areas of their specialties.

Whenever the Board of Directors has met on campus, we have arranged a luncheon for the Directors, students and staff to give them an opportunity to get to know one another and for the interchange of ideas. Also at the last meeting of the Board, a special joint praise service was held in the chapel with the New Friends and Korean American Community Churches.

Jon Cheatwood and Steven Davis staff the College's Student Recruitment office. They have been in contact with Church of God students, plus other juniors and seniors, who have indicated an interest in ABC through their ACT or SAT tests. Letters go to each of them, often with follow-up phone calls. The office keeps in contact, when possible, through e-mails with the likeliest contacts. Two Community Open Houses were held to inform and explain ABC's programs to members from the area around the college. The Recruitment office has published quarterly news Hi-Lites to tell students of the things happening here. Also this office planned an excellent College Invitational weekend, always the first weekend of March, to which prospective students are invited to come and investigate the college and its programs. Thirty-five students and nine sponsors attended.

The ABC Alumni Association is headed by President David Riley, Vice-President Amy Kennedy and Secretary-Treasurer Daniel Smead, along with College Coordinator Kent Ross. Plans are being made to have an Alumni Reunion following General Conference. It will meet in Oregon, Illinois, August 3, the day the summer General Conference ends in Rockford.

The ABC Committee on Higher Education has not been meeting pending the report on the Mission Statement and Strategic Initiatives from the Board of Directors and Delegates. When that is complete, the Committee, consisting of Kent Ross, Chairperson, Dr. Donna Deane, Dr. John Guthrie and Pastor Scott Deane, will meet to discuss and make plans for the implementation of the Plan for the college.

During this year, in addition to the staff mentioned above, Janice Jones has served as library coordinator; Zachary and Zuaquis Ross have served as apartment managers; Jill Taylor has served as secretary to the President and Amethyst Burris as secretary to the Vice President.

PASTOR/CHURCH SERVICES

Many services were provided to strengthen and assist churches and to facilitate the starting of new churches. Services were offered in the following areas:

Christian Education

The Christian Education Advisory Committee continues to work on improvements for the Doctrinal Distinctive materials. Teams of individuals have been formed to design new student pages for each age level. We hope to incorporate more color into the workpages for the younger children and create interesting, appealing and relevant materials for all ages.

We continue to provide ideas to be added to the KEYS Notebook given to each church and pastor. These mailings contain a variety of Christian Education activities to be shared with teachers and leaders in C.E. and to be cataloged in the notebook for future use. We hope to present "one-a-day" (ideas) at General Conference and Christian Workers' Seminars to demonstrate their use.

A display was prepared for Christian Workers' Seminar to present the work of our committee. It included listings of the workshops we offer to churches and conferences, including 14 new titles. We hope it served as a reminder that we are available to actively serve our churches and members.

Our newest committee member, Myra Montgomery, has developed a series of lessons for adults that accompany episodes of the classic, "Andy Griffith Show" T.V. programs now available on video. She is in the process of compiling them into a lesson booklet and we hope to make them available soon through the General Conference.

We continue to be available for consultation and assistance at your request. We also welcome your suggestions and concerns.

Gayle Guthrie is Coordinator of the Christian Education Department. The Advisory Committee members are Paul Duncan, representing the Board of Directors; Myra Montgomery; and Carol Ring.

Lord's Harvest International

The missions department of the Church of God General Conference, Lord's Harvest International (LHI), directs the mission effort of our association of churches.

Teams were sent to Malawi and Mozambique in the summer of 1999. LHI was involved in organizing the trip; provision of necessary information to each of the team members; publicity for this project. We are thankful for each of the individuals who gave of their time to be a part of that team (Jim Cramer, Travis Hamilton, Paul Madonia, Joe and Rebekah Martin, and Jim Mattison). A trip to Mexico was also approved but because of health reasons, it had to be canceled.

Materials were provided for the "March"ing for Mission calendar and *Church of God Around the World* for the March publication. Periodic letters to Pastors and Mission Committee Chairpersons have been sent to share information about the works and contacts that we have in various areas.

The Mission Coordinator, Judy Myers, taught mission classes in the Southeast Conference last May and at General Conference.

The Lord's Harvest Board met twice during the past year. At the meeting during General Conference, deputation procedures were discussed that would take place when Tracy Savage Zhykhovich was able to secure the papers necessary for coming to the States. It was decided to look for a different insurance carrier for her medical insurance, and work began on fund-raising guidelines for mission trips.

At the February meeting in Atlanta, trips to Peru, Malawi, and Mexico were approved for the summer of 2000. A timeline policy for trips was developed and adopted and the fund-raising policy was completed. It was decided to temporarily discontinue having an LHI representative on the ABC campus, and it was requested that the Board of Directors give consideration to making funds available for Urbana 2000 (a missions conference for young people). The Board met with Jon Cheatwood and discussed how the Youth Department and LHI could work together to provide mission service opportunities for our youth, and there was discussion of the Africa work and trip proposal with Joe and Rebekah Martin.

With support from the Morgan Estate authorized by the Board of Directors, the Mission Board encouraged churches to send a representative to the ACMC (Advancing Churches in Missions Commitment) Conference in Atlanta in July 1999. Eight individuals took advantage of that offer. The Board of Directors has approved funding for interested church mission leaders to attend the 2000 ACMC Conference in Dallas, TX, July 20-22.

Tracy Savage Zhykhovich was able to come to the States the first part of August. LHI was involved in developing a deputation schedule for her and assisting her in her travel arrangements. She

visited a number of homes and churches. We are pleased with the response that was given to her report and her fund-raising.

The Lord's Harvest Board continues to maintain contact with individuals who have expressed an interest in missions as well as be available to help local churches in any way possible in the promotion of missions.

The Lord's Harvest Board members are: Judy Myers, Coordinator; Charles Bottolfs, representing the Board of Directors; Pastor Vivian Kirkpatrick; Mardy Lawrence; and Pastor Warren Sorenson.

Publishing

Pastor Jeff Fletcher serves as the editor of the *Restitution Herald*, which is in its eighty-ninth year of publication. It is published every other month. The current circulation is 820. An increasing number of churches are ordering bulk subscriptions at a lower cost and distributing them to all the members of their church.

The Journal from the Radical Reformation is published four times each year. Anthony Buzzard and Kent Ross serve as senior editors and Scott Deane, Greg Demmitt, and Jeff Fletcher serve as associate editors. The current circulation is 316. It is mailed free to a number of theological and seminary libraries.

Daniel Smead, the Technical Director of Publishing, coordinates all publishing activities, including the publication of our Truth Seekers Sunday School curriculum. Quarterly editors are: Pre-School, Gayle Guthrie; Early Elementary, Irene Sorenson; Elementary and Upper Elementary, Paula Kirkpatrick; Middle School, Warren Sorenson; High School, Terri Moore; and Adult, Daniel Smead.

Senior Ministries

Jack Hearp serves as coordinator for the Senior Ministries program of the General Conference. A quarterly publication is sent to local church Senior Ministry coordinators and pastors of each church. It offers suggestions for organizing a seniors program, and suggested activities and ideas that have been sent from coordinators of our churches.

Jack has also taught classes on Senior Ministry at CWS and the summer General Conference.

Technology Department

Significant advances were made in the Technology Department this year. Among them was the employment of Steve Taylor as an on campus full-time employee. In addition, numerous pieces of equipment were added which allows greater quality in our productions as well as improved efficiency. A Non-Linear Editor with external disk storage has been our most helpful purchase. This device has opened up production possibilities that we otherwise would not have. A portable light kit has also been purchased as well as tripod heads for our new cameras, color TV monitors, and tripod travel cases.

Video projects done this year have been: taping the 1999 Christian Workers' Seminar, 10 new half-hour cablecast-ready programs, ABC Booster Campaign video, Pine Grove, MN Children's Christmas musical, 2000 Theological Conference,

2000 Ministerial Conference, Lawrenceville, OH Church seminar with Anthony Buzzard, and 2000 Bible Quizzing promotional video. Continuing projects include a primary focus on distance learning for the College, an ABC promotional video and Church of God video magazines.

An exciting development during this year has been Internet broadcasting. We now have the ability to webcast live and recorded events. Weekly webcasts of "Focus on the Kingdom" radio go out as does Today's Good News Television programs. Additionally, we were able to webcast sessions from Ministerial Conference, Theological Conference, and ABC Invitational.

Live webcasting offers us a promising avenue for college distance learning. We are inviting feedback from pastors about the possibility of webcasting a Basic Bible Doctrine class on Wednesday evenings this fall. We would also provide interactive capabilities via other computer software. Pastors and churches interested in this project could use this one-hour class as a midweek Bible study elective.

An area that we are exploring is the development of 30-second or 15-second commercial spots to be placed in various areas via the Turner television network. Through our research we have cost projections for several U.S. cities where we have churches. We believe the cost for some markets is financially feasible. Commercials for those cities could be placed from Atlanta, the home of Turner broadcasting – a distinct advantage in having the College/Conference located in this area. With the financial cooperation of various individuals and state conferences we have the potential to impact a significantly larger audience than ever before through this means. Individuals or groups interested in exploring this possibility should contact us.

We are grateful for the opportunities this new Department provides to reach out to our world with the message of truth and salvation.

Youth

Jon Cheatwood began working full time as the Youth Coordinator for the Church of God General Conference in August 1999. Prior to assuming the position he conferred with many youth leaders, workers, and pastors, listening to what Church of God people wanted to see in the National Youth program, especially RYOT.

Jon continues to speak to Church of God people about their needs and wants in our program. He has traveled to Indiana, Virginia, Ohio, South Carolina, Georgia, and Arkansas representing both the national youth program and Atlanta Bible College at retreats, conferences and seminars.

During the fall semester, Jon taught an ABC class on *Christian Education* with a focus on Youth Ministry. This course work is being revised and will be offered as *Purpose Driven Youth Ministry* for the fall 2000 semester. In the spring 2000 semester he taught a class on *Practical Youth Ministry*.

In November, more than 30 Church of God youth workers met in Cincinnati, Ohio for the National Youth Specialties Youth Worker Convention. Most of the costs of this Convention were paid with a grant from the General Conference from the Morgan

Estate. The Youth Advisory Committee (consisting of Joe James, Tom New, David Riley, and Jon Cheatwood) met to discuss plans for RYOT and other youth ministry efforts. A group meeting was held for all those who wanted to talk about RYOT and the national youth program. This was a good opportunity to get to hear from many workers at once.

The RYOT leadership team has been assembled. Team members are Pastor David Riley, Pastor Seth Ross, and Jon Cheatwood. The program at RYOT will pursue a Purpose Driven Youth Ministry model. The Purpose Driven model sees that God has set forth the following purposes for the church: fellowship, evangelism, worship, discipleship and ministry. We believe that any work we do should aim to fulfill one or more of these purposes. Our planning for RYOT takes these into consideration so that we can offer a well-balanced program.

Pastor David Riley was appointed last fall to the Youth Advisory Committee to fill the position vacated by Pastor Dale Bliss. Due to an employment change, Pastor Tom New has recently resigned his position on the Youth Advisory Committee, as well as his position as Bible Quizzing Director. Seth Ross has been appointed to fill the unexpired term on the Advisory Committee.

Jon appreciates the opportunity to serve the Church of God in the area of youth ministry.

BUSINESS

During the past year we have continued to learn about and expand our new computer system. We've been learning how best to make it assist in our work as a college/conference. We've also been adding software to further assist us. Most specifically we have nearly completed a new membership database and the incorporation of new financial software.

Our web-site has just recently been completely redesigned. We encourage you to visit us on the web — www.abc-coggc.org.

We have scanned into computer files several volumes of older issues of *The Restitution Herald* from the 1920's and 1930's. Later this year they will be available on CD-ROM — two CD ROMs per volume.

All of our technology doesn't change the foundation of the business office. We still record contributions, pay bills, invest funds, etc.; and we do so at every turn with the desire to be faithful with and efficient in the management of the assets with which God blesses us.

Gary Burnham is the Controller. Marcy Cly is Assistant to the Controller and Mailroom Supervisor. Jim Wood is Coordinator of the Maintenance Department and is assisted by Jerry Briggs.

Finances

The College and Conference depends upon contributions from churches, individuals, conferences, and groups to fund 51% of our operating budget. The balance of our income is generated from interest earnings, college tuition, fees and rent, and sales.

During the past year, there was a slight decline in the number of individuals and families who contributed as compared to the previous year. Sixty-three churches provided support along with nine conferences, and fifteen other groups.

At this point in the fiscal year, contributions to the Goals for Giving are running less than last year at this time. A larger enrollment at Atlanta Bible College has provided increased revenue from tuition fees and rent.

In 1996, a bequest was received from the estate of Troy and Geneva Morgan. Nearly \$550,000 of the bequest was used to pay off re-location loans. Since then, funds have been used for a number of projects including: support for a number of training opportunities: Youth Specialties Convention last fall; a missions conference in August 1999; providing Crossroads Youth Ministry material to all of our churches requesting it; support for pastors/wives retreat; travel for long range study and task force meetings; \$60,000 was transferred to the General Fund in 1998-99 and \$90,000 has been transferred in 1999-2000 to help fund programs initiated from the Institutional Long Range Planning Study and recommendations adopted by the delegates. These funds have underwritten additional staff for the College and Conference as well as an upgrade to the computer hardware and software to make our system Y2K compliant.

As of March 31, there is a balance of \$428,451 in the Morgan Fund. Of this amount, delegates have approved a \$90,000 distribution to the General Fund to carry on programs during the 2000-2001 fiscal year, and the proposed budget contained in this Journal for the 2001-2002 fiscal year contains a proposed additional \$90,000 distribution to the General Fund. The Board has authorized funding for persons who wish to attend a Missions Conference, Christian Education Seminars, and the Pastors/Wives Retreat in 2001. The Board has also authorized funding to complete the upgrade of computer hardware and software. With commitments made, the balance of the estate will be \$183,951 by June 2002 not including anticipated interest earnings.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

The 26th Annual Christian Workers' Seminar was held at Pigeon Forge, TN in April 1999. One hundred sixty-nine persons were in attendance. This is the second highest attendance at seminar. The April 2000, the attendance reached an all time high of 229. Kent Ross is seminar coordinator.

Summer Ministry teams conducted Bible schools and assisted various churches during the summer of 1999. Merry Peterson served as Summer Ministry coordinator. Teams served the following churches: Southeast Youth Camp, North Hill, OH; Cool Spring, VA; Arkansas Youth Camp; Freedom in Christ Ministries, Canada; Summer General Conference; New Friends, GA; Timberland, IN; Washington State Camp. Those assisting with one or more events were: Kristin Creecy, Denise Enyart, Mary Amanda Johnson, Michelle Turner, and Natalie Whibbey.

A new church was started in the past year, the Korean American Community Church of God. The congregation is pastored by Steve An who is a student at Atlanta Bible College. He has been granted a license by the Ministerial Recognition Board. The congregation meets in the ABC chapel Sunday afternoons. They

also have a mid-week service on Wednesday nights and a program for children on Saturdays. This church was recently approved as a member of the Southeast Conference and the General Conference.

Financial aid has been given to several churches during the past year through our Church Development Aid program. The churches received aid during 1999-2000: Farmington, MO; Winnebago, IL; Blessed Hope, Rockford, IL; North Kent, MI; Litchfield, MN; Freedom in Christ Ministries, Welland, Ontario. Church planting financial aid was provided to the following churches: Farmington, MO; Winnebago, IL; and Freedom in Christ Ministries, Welland, Ontario. Both aid programs are on a schedule of payments that decline at the end of each year. The Church Development Aid is spread over six years and Church Planting Aid is spread over four years. With both programs, a church can begin with financial support of \$1,000 per month. Aid was discontinued during the year to: Troy View, OH – their associate pastor, Michael Montgomery, resigned to become pastor of the Glad Tidings Church in Fonthill, Ontario; Jubilee Christian Fellowship, Sharpsburg, GA - services were cut back and Pastor Dan Kennedy assumed full-time secular employment.

Two churches received assistance from the Church Builders League. They were: Beloit New Life, WI and Grace Fellowship, Front Royal, VA. A campaign continues to increase the number of individuals and groups that contribute to the Church Builders League to 1000. Currently, about 800 contributors participate in each appeal. A maximum of two appeals is issued each year and a gift of \$25 for each appeal is requested.

The Focus on the Kingdom radio program continues to be broadcast on nine stations, as well as on shortwave and the Internet. We continue to receive enthusiastic responses from listeners. We are thankful for the generous individuals, churches, and conferences that sponsor these broadcasts.

CONCLUSION

We praise God for His faithfulness in directing the work of Atlanta Bible College and the Church of God General Conference during the past year. The Board and the staff regularly seek God's direction for our work. Our desire is to serve you, our constituency, to the best of our ability. We continue to be optimistic as we look to the future. Our confidence is in the God that we serve and as long as our churches are faithful in reaching out to those who need to hear the message of truth and salvation, we will be blessed.

We are thankful for those who faithfully serve the Lord in so many ways and we are thankful for those who support this work with their finances and prayers.

SPECIAL REPORTS

Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation

The ABC Development Foundation continues to provide financial support for the ongoing programs of Atlanta Bible College. Monthly distributions are made from interest earnings from the Foundation.

During the 1999-2000 school year, interest earnings have been allocated as follows:

\$30,000 - Basic grants for students

10,000 - Capital expenditures for library and equipment

3,000 - Library periodicals

5,000 - Holy Land grants

5,000 - Computer grants (pays rent for computers for ABC/Clayton students)

2,500 - Staff education

3,000 - Periodicals, books, and dues for staff

15,000 - Recruitment

2,000 - Grants for students to attend summer Conference and Christian Worker's Seminar

1,000 - Program development

2,000 - Clayton College general education grants

3,000 - Vehicle replacement fund

\$81,500 - Total Distribution to College

In addition, \$10,000 of interest earnings will be added to the Foundation principle and \$2,000 is allocated for operating expenses for the Foundation, which consists primarily of an annual audit.

At the last Foundation Board meeting, Charles Bottolfs was elected as President and Wanda Gerullis as Vice President. The Secretary and Treasurer of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference Board of Directors serve in these same positions for the Foundation board. The Secretary is Greg Demmitt and the Treasurer is Bob Huddlestun. Other members of the Foundation board are: Ms. Andrea Anders, Pastor Scott Deane, Mrs. Sue Lapp, Mr. Paul Duncan, Ms. Gaye Wood, Mr. Rob Helenburg, Mr. Joe James, and Dr. William D. Lawrence.

Trustees of the board meet each year during General Conference to review investments, act upon spending requests, and elect officers.

Christian Conciliation Board

The Conciliation Board is a service of the Church of God General Conference for the enrichment of our church family. The New Testament church and its leadership had problems, and it is from their experiences that we can learn how to reconcile, forgive, and restore each other. The members of the Conciliation Board are available individually and/or collectively to help churches and pastors. The members are glad to provide assistance over the telephone, or when necessary one or more members can travel to a church to provide on-site assistance.

The Conciliation Board also provides some educational services related to its mission. Members of the board taught classes at the 2000 Christian Workers' Seminar. Presentations will also be included in the 2000 General Conference Program. The three board members last July attended an Alban Institute Seminar on

managing and resolving church conflicts. This learning opportunity enhanced the board's ability to serve churches and conferences.

We encourage churches and pastors to contact the board before a problem or conflict gets out of hand and beyond conciliation.

The services of the Christian Conciliation Board may be secured by contacting a board member directly or through the President of the General Conference.

Church of God Investment Fund

The Church of God Investment Fund exists to make loans to churches for the purchase of property, remodeling, construction of buildings, purchase of parsonages, etc. The fund balance is currently \$84,101. The Trustees of the fund are: Mr. Clarence Jones, Mr. Keith Williams, Mr. Joe James, Mr. David Krogh, and Mrs. Terri Tschaenn.

Ministerial Recognition Board

The Ministerial Recognition Board serves as the committee given the responsibility, by the General Conference, for ascertaining which individuals should hold Ministerial licenses from the General Conference. It is chaired by Pastor Ray Hall, of the Garden Park, Michigan Church of God. Other members of it are Pastor Dale Swartz, of the Litchfield, Minnesota Church of God, Mr. Charles Bottolfs, Elder in the Happy Woods, Louisiana Church of God, and Kent Ross representing ABC.

The Board monitors the Continuing Education credits for the Ministerial Association. One CEU or 10 hours of continuing education is required each year to maintain ministerial recognition.

The Board has met at General Conference and it again met prior to this year's Ministerial Conference in February. At this meeting, Steve An, of the Korean-American Community Church of God, was interviewed and granted his Provisional License. Kent Ross and David Krogh installed him with his congregation on February 27, 2000. Kent Ross, on behalf of the MRB, preached and participated in the Installation of Pastor Mike Montgomery at the Glad Tiding Church in Fonthill, Canada.

The MRB has both live and phone interviews with pastors with the intent of encouraging them in their ministries. They seek to work in conjunction with the Ministerial Association and the Christian Conciliation Board for the betterment of our ministers and for the glory of God. – Kent Ross

Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association

The Retirement Association provides retirement benefits for Church of God pastors and employees of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference and their families. There are thirty-four participating pastors/staff members, one non-participating pastor, forty churches, and state conferences. Total assets connected with the retirement program are \$1,389,285.

Members of the association will meet at this summer's Conference to review the work of the association and to take action on a proposed amendment to the rules and regulations.

Explanation of Budget

The proposed budget for July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002 will fund the following programs and activities of the College/Conference in accordance with our mission.

Anticipated Expenses

- 1. Salaries and Wages compensation is provided for 22 employees (6 part-time editors, 2 part-time coordinators, 2 part-time student workers, 1 ten-month instructor, 1 five-month instructor, and 10 full-time workers. This category also includes support for Summer Ministry team members.)
- 2. Social Security amount matched by the employer
- Employee Benefits health insurance, workmen's compensation, conference premium for Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association, and registration fee for summer General Conference.
- 4. Assistance to Churches funds provided for eight churches on a declining scale of payments each year.
- 5. Ministerial Association support for programs and other expenses of the Church of God Ministerial Association.
- 6. Youth Ministry funding to help subsidize the cost of the annual R.Y.O.T.
- 7. Printing and Binding includes all materials printed by the College/Conference and the binding of permanent materials for the Library.
- 8. Postage Shipping charges for the *Progress Journal*, the *Restitution Herald*, *A Journal from the Radical Reformation*, tracts, books, and all correspondence.
- 9. Purchases Bookstore textbooks and other materials, which are purchased for resale.
- Bookstore Cook material Creative Teaching Aid Packets and other Cook material that is resold as a part of our Sunday School Curriculum.
- 11. Royalties fees paid for the use of the David C. Cook curriculum and copyrighted material used in our publications.
- 12. Basic Grants assistance to ABC students in the amount of up to \$110 per semester hour to subsidize their tuition at ABC.
- 13. Clayton Rebates during the first three semesters of education, ABC students who attend Clayton College and State University are eligible for a rebate to offset the out of state tuition until they can establish residency.
- 14. Advertising Recruitment includes travel, telephone calls, printing, and postage primarily to promote ABC.
- 15. Library Periodicals religious and theological journals and other magazines for the Library collection.
- 16. Library Books newly published books are acquired to keep the Library collection up-to-date.
- 17. Periodicals, Books, Dues a small allowance is provided to professional staff to purchase resource material for classes and to participate in professional organizations.
- 18. Staff Education professional staff members are encouraged to attend at least one seminar each year to remain current in their field of study.
- 19. Program Development the purchase of resources to enhance teaching programs at ABC and for the Lending Library.
- 20. Travel includes travel for Board members, advisory committees, special boards and committees, Gospel Teams, Summer Ministries, and staff.
- 21. Motor Vehicle Expense license plates, insurance, and maintenance for three vehicles.
- 22. Office Supplies paper, printer cartridges, stationary, envelopes, etc.
- 23. Professional Services cost of an annual audit and annual fees to accrediting association.
- 24. Telephone basic and long distance service, including the cost of all "800" number calls which are provided toll free to the caller.

- Insurance non-plant liability insurance for employees and directors.
- 26. Supplies and Expense printing supplies, piano tuning, towel and paper products, and other operational expenses.
- 27. Repairs/Maintenance non-plant maintenance agreements and repairs for office and library equipment.
- 28. Plant Expenses includes all expenses for buildings and property.
- 29. Contingency this budget is being prepared 15 months before the fiscal year begins. This item provides for adjustments when the fiscal year begins on July 1, 2001.
- 30. Vehicle Replacement money is set aside in a restricted account to be available when a vehicle needs to be replaced.

Anticipated Income

- Sunday School Materials includes all sales of Sunday School Curriculum.
- 2. Books, Tracts sale of textbooks as well as other materials to the membership and the public.
- 3. Subscriptions subscriptions for the *Restitution Herald* are \$13 per year, \$24 for two years, \$33 for three years; *A Journal from the Radical Reformation* is \$24 per year.
- 4. Tuition income is based upon projected enrollment of the equivalent of twenty-five students at ABC taking an average of 12 credit hours (students are also enrolled for additional hours at Clayton College) and 20 extension students taking an average of 3 semester hours during the year.
- 5. Housing rent received from ten apartments on the College Campus.
- 6. Laundry income from laundry facilities in apartment building.
- 7. Late Fees/Rent and Fees interest income and registration fees from students.
- 8. ABCDF transfer of interest income from the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation.
- 9. Interest money earned on checking account through the year.
- Transfers In funding for Church Planting is supplemented by restricted trust funds.
- 12. Bequest Distribution the College/Conference is the recipient of annuity payments on a contract of a deceased member.
- 13. Transfer from Morgan Fund to subsidize budget.
- 14. Contributions Needed to accomplish the goals of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference for the 2001-2002 fiscal year, contributions of \$448,190 will be needed from churches, conferences, and individual families. This is approximately \$37,000 per month.

In 1999, churches, conferences, and groups gave over \$183,000 to the Goal for Giving. We are thankful for this faithful giving and encourage each member church to designate a portion of its income to assist with the work of the College/Conference.

To close the gap between contributions needed and the amount provided by churches, conferences, and groups, we rely upon faithful giving of individuals and families. Approximately \$265,000 is needed in contributions from individuals and families. In 1999, 518 giving individuals/families contributed an average of \$248 during the year. There is a need for additional support from an additional 500 individuals/families to help underwrite the work of the College and Conference in order to reach the Goal for Giving for 2001-2002.

NOMINATION FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Roger Crocker was born in Spartanburg, SC in 1949. He is a member of the Bethel Church of God in Pelzer, SC and has been a member since 1963. He graduated from Draughons Business College with studies involving business administration and accounting. Roger has retired from the life insurance industry after 24 years. He served as secretary treasurer, vice president and then president of the National Association of Life Underwriters. He also served on the Board of Directors for the same organization.

His civic activities included serving as a youth baseball coach a scout master with Blue Ridge Council BSA, and an Eagle Scout. He served on the board of directors of the Carolina High School Athletic Booster Club for 5 years; and served a term as President for 2 years.

Roger has been married to Patricia for 30 years, and is the father of Matthew who is 24 years of age. Roger's parents were V.M. and Leila Crocker, both long-time members of the Bethel Church of God. He is the grandson of William J. & Emma Hammond; who were charter members of Guthrie Grove, Church of God.

Roger has been involved as a Sunday School teacher for 10 years, and a S.S. Superintendent for five years. He has served as a Trustee and as Deacon for a total of 23 years. In that time he also served a term as board chairman. He has been involved on a weekly basis with the Pastoral Prayer Team for 9 years. Roger is consistently involved with the outreach programs of the local church and supports them with his time, talent and resources. He has worked at the southeast camps and is currently a member of the Southeast Conference Board, as Vice President. Roger also is serving as Chairman of the Church planting & renewal committee for the South East Conference.

Roger feels the work of the College and Conference is crucial to our bonding together to reach the world with the message of Jesus Christ and the Kingdom of God. He sees the role of the General Conference as giving the leadership and vision necessary to encourage the local churches with their work of ministering the love of God. He sees their role as providing opportunities and planning for reaching the lost in ways that we could not do alone or individually.

Roger sees the work of the Bible College as training men and women for ministry and equipping them to share our unique and important message with the world. Proposed Constitutional Amendments and Recommendation

Action will be taken by the delegates at the Summer Conference on the following items:

Constitutional Amendment, Article II Section 1

The Board of Directors would like to propose the following amendment to the Constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference regarding delegate representation at the Summer General Conference:

Article II Section 1, Current Constitution: "Each member church of fifteen or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Proposed Change: "Each member church which has held at least twenty-four services during the year, and which has made a financial contribution to the operating budget of the College/Conference, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Explanation: Two of our smaller churches have expressed a concern about the Constitutional requirement that a member church must have fifteen or more members in order to be entitled to delegate representation. These two churches both have weekly services and make financial contributions to the General Conference but they do not have fifteen or more active members. They have requested a revision to the Constitution, which would allow them to have delegate representation.

The Board is suggesting that it is reasonable that a member church have at least twenty-four services through the year, which would be two per month. The term "preaching" services has been deleted because some of our smaller churches may not officially have a "sermon," but they may have singing and a Bible study.

The provision to require a contribution specifically does not say how much that contribution needs to be. It has been a suggestion of the Board in the past, that even our smallest churches should be able to make a contribution of \$100-200 per year. Churches that are sending delegates to vote on a budget and activities that require funding should participate financially in helping to underwrite these actions.

Constitutional Amendment, Article IV, Section 5

The Board of Directors proposes the following change in Article IV Section 5: Current Constitution: "Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship."

Proposed Revision: "Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than *one more nomination than the number of directorships*."

Explanation: Several times in recent years, there have been insufficient nominees to meet the Constitutional requirement. This proposed revision reduces the number of candidates required to close nominations. If approved by the delegates, this

amendment will take effect immediately and will apply to nominations at this summer's Conference.

Recommendation

An Organizational Task Force was created by delegate action at the 1998 Summer Conference. The Board of Directors appointed Larry Johnson, Hector, MN, Chairman; Norman Chandler, Anderson, SC; Donna Deane, Springfield, OH; Tim Jones, Tempe, AZ; and Jim Ring, Metamora, IL to serve on the task force.

At the 1999 Conference, the task force presented a draft of a report that called for a restructuring of the College/Conference. At the April 2000 meeting of the Board, the Task Force presented a revised plan that was endorsed by the Board and is hereby presented as a recommendation to the delegates:

Revise the current organizational chart. Revisions include a Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) and a change in the title of Vice President of the College to President of the College. In addition there will be an Implementation Team for two (2) years which will help facilitate an expedient change in the work of the College and Conference.


Rationale for Changes in the Organizational Structure

The recommended changes reflect a major reorganization. The current structure has not been entirely effective in facilitating forward movement in the Church of God. The results of the work of the Conference and College were briefly reviewed by the task force. We do not have a sufficient number of leaders being prepared, our churches have not grown significantly, and reportedly there is general apathy toward the work of the Conference among the churches, pastors, and membership. An organizational structure cannot be held totally responsible for all that happens in the College and Conference and the Church of God. However, the organizational structure and the personnel responsibilities can certainly reflect the placement of priorities. A change in the structure can provide us with a sharpened focus and a renewed vigor in our need to fulfill the Great Commission. The leadership of the College and the Conference must be in a position to initiate change and be held responsible for the outcomes of College/Conference initiatives. We need to explore radical re-design to assure change.

A major shift is recommended in order to increase the focus on preparation of leadership for the Church of God. The focus of the shift will be on expanding the College, its work of preparation of leadership, and its visibility. In order to fulfill any of our purposes noted in the constitution and to follow through on the recent recommendations approved by the delegates, there needs to be a shift in our priorities and the way in which we expend resources.

The proposed organizational chart is being presented to the delegates for consideration. The task force is not making any recommendations for people to the positions – we've focused on building a structure that will best meet the purposes of the Church of God. Notes on the proposed organizational chart:

• A triumvirate would provide the leadership for the College and Conference: A Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), the President of Atlanta Bible College, and the Director of Church/Pastor Services. The CAO will provide the coordination for all leadership responsibilities and will report directly to the Board of Directors. The President of the College and the Director of Church/Pastor Services will report to the CAO and will attend all



Board meetings and will also submit a report to the Board in relation to their set of responsibilities.

- The Comptroller will report directly to the CAO.
- An Implementation Team will be appointed for a period of two (2) years to assist with the organizational change. The purpose of the implementation team is to provide a panel of experts from outside of the current College/Conference staff who can augment staff changes and who can bring additional ideas to the table for change. Members of the Implementation Team will include the Board Chairperson, one other Board member and three (3) individuals from the current organizational task force who have expertise in organizational change and administration. Over the two years they will work closely with the CAO as well as the College President and the Church/Pastor Services Director to provide extra resources for making the change and to develop and expand the College, its work and its visibility.
- Right now approximately 50% of the expended resources are for the College. In order to institute change and place a priority on the development of leadership, it is estimated that 70% of the resources over the next three years should be allotted to the College.
- It is estimated that the budgetary impact of the proposed change would be approximately 10% of the total budget. After

the first two years when the Implementation Team is finished with its work, the costs would be further reduced. It is also assumed that approval of this recommendation would supersede action by delegates at the 1998 Summer Conference in which they voted to create a full or part-time Spiritual Life/Evangelism Coordinator position. With additional leadership included in the new organizational structure, this area could likely be handled by the Director of Church/Pastor Services, which would also reduce budgetary impact. The expected outcomes would be increased student enrollment, increased leadership preparation, and church growth.

Action To Be Taken

If approved by the delegates, the Implementation Team will immediately initiate plans for change in the organization. At this time, no names have been confirmed on any part of the organizational chart. All personnel and personnel additions, as well as their job titles would be identified and recommended to the Board by January 2001. The CAO and the Implementation Team along with the President of the College and the Director of Church/Pastor Relations would immediately begin to develop the strategies for change and the implementation of change.

Tuesday, August 1, 1:30 p.m.

1. Conflict Resolution in the Small Church - Michael Hoffman and Joe James. The Christian Conciliation Board attended a seminar on conflict resolution in the small church. Concepts from that seminar will be shared. Preventing and resolving conflicts will be considered. (Continued Tuesday, at 2:45 p.m.)

2. Big Things Small Churches Can Do - Michael Brown. Church smallness does not necessarily indicate inferiority. Experts say that being small is a plus if a church capitalizes upon its strengths. We will study ways that small churches can discover

their potential and build on it.

3. Eating and Fasting For Health - Dale Ramsey. Most of us are aware of the benefits of fasting as a spiritual discipline; but have we ever considered fasting for our physical health and wellbeing? Is it possible that God may have a better way of treating our high blood pressure, diabetes, heart disease, asthma, etc.? Our first impulse, when faced with physical ailments, is to call the doctor. In an emergency situation that is probably the wise decision. However, James 5:13-16 and long established health maintenance principles get lost in our options. Fasting and eating for health will be considered in light of the command to care for the temple of God.

4. Technology in Ministry – Steve Taylor. Many developments have been made this past year with technology as it applies to ministry and our mission. This workshop will focus on what is available through our General Conference website, distance learning through ABC and the Today's Good News television ministry. This workshop will assist you with some of the practical "how-to's" that will allow technology to enhance your ministry and Christian growth. We will also demonstrate technology tools and address

questions on technology.

5. Religion in a Public School - Tom Schmitt. The Constitution gives people freedom of and from religion. A pastor who serves as principal for a 480+ student public school shares insights on the law and public access to the students and facilities of OUR schools. Ministry options will also be highlighted in this workshop.

6. How to Reach Secular People - David Krogh. Much of the growth in churches today is transfer growth – people moving from one church to another. This class will present highlights from a book by George Hunter on reaching secular people.

Tuesday, August 1, 2:45 p.m.

1. Conflict Resolution in the Small Church - Michael Hoffman and Joe James. (This is a continuation from 1:30 p.m. See

explanation above.)

2. Following in His Shoes - Lord's Harvest International. We exist to bring glory to God through our worship. Missions exist because true worship does not. God's desire is that all mankind worship Him. That will only exist if and as we take the Kingdom message to them. We will look at the life of Jesus and see through His example how to be a discipler.

3. Sunday School Superintendent/Workers Forum - Carol Ring. Making the most of Sunday morning ... Discussion/sharing time, take-home ideas to use and share, plus a "freebie table" of

useable items.

Wednesday, August 2, 1:30 p.m.

1. Seven Habits of a Visitor Friendly Church - Chris Seiders. Is my church visitor friendly? How do I know? If you don't know or don't like your answers to these questions, this workshop will discuss ideas for becoming better equipped to minister to your guests.

2. Leading Small Groups - Seth Ross. There are a lot of ideas about how small groups should work and how effective they are, but how do they really work? We will discuss how we have experienced them in our church, both successfully and not.

3. Games That Matter - Youth Advisory Committee. Games don't have to be time wasters. They can be used to bring understanding to your teaching. We will discuss how games can be used

to accomplish something significant.

4. Spiritual Disciplines in the Life of the Believer - Jeff Fletcher. Do you sometimes feel that you are "stuck" in your spiritual growth? Are you tired of splashing around in the kiddie pool and ready to take a dive into the depths? There are a number of spiritual practices or disciplines that can help you on your journey to spiritual growth and maturity. Even if you're already a "mature" Christian, this overview of Spiritual disciplines might be just the thing you need to stimulate you to further growth.

5. Sunday School Curriculum. The Board of Directors will be holding an open meeting with the Christian Education Advisory Committee to discuss our Church of God Sunday School curriculum. This will be a brainstorming session to consider options on ways of getting doctrinally sound material into our churches as attractively and cheaply as possible. New technology may open

some doors for new approaches.

1. Shepherd's Training - Myra Montgomery and Gayle Guthrie. When is the last time you had a training or networking for the volunteers in your church's Christian Education program? What is the difference between training that inspires and training that simply fills up time? When SS teachers, VBS workers, Youth Leaders, Junior Church volunteers, Camp Staff, etc. are actively involved in learning, they are enriched. Bequests Received

ABC Scholarships Offered

Atlanta Bible College will offer a \$1,000 scholarship to each individual who is a member of the All-Star Quiz Team at this summer's RYOT. Atlanta Bible College wants to encourage and support the Bible quizzing program of our national youth department.

If not used immediately, the scholarship will be available through two years following the student's graduation from high school. The scholarship will apply to the fall semester the first time a student enrolls at the Bible College. It will be granted in addition to other scholarships and grants normally available to first-time students. Only one all-star quizzing scholarship will be available per student.

There will also be an election for a position on the Youth Advisory Committee. The term of Pastor David Riley expires. Advisory Committee positions have a term of four years. Incumbents may succeed themselves.

Appointments

Gary Burnham has been appointed by the Board of Directors to another term as chairman of the Ministers Voluntary Retirement Association. This is a four-year term.

Travis Hamilton has been appointed to serve on the Lord's Harvest International Mission Board. His term will begin following the summer General Conference.

Ken Millard has been appointed to serve on the Investment Committee of the College/Conference. Members of the Investment Committee provide consultation on the investment of College/Conference restricted funds.

Recognition for Outstanding Initiatives

The Church of God General Conference has a policy of recognizing outstanding local church initiatives in the area of evangelism and outreach. Such projects must be bold and aggressive, having a degree of risk. Recognition will consist of a monetary grant. Only one such award will be made annually. The granting of the award will not necessarily be based on the project's success. Please contact President David Krogh with reports of projects that might qualify for this recognition.

Staff Retreat

Members of the College/Conference staff met recently for an all-day retreat at a nearby farm/retreat center owned by members of the Cornerstone Bible Church. Gary Burnham, Kent Ross, and David Krogh led sessions during the day. A variety of topics were covered including a discussion of our vision, customer service, creating a good work environment, commitment to excellence, a review of the past school year, retention of students, and an assessment of our work to determine ways we can be more effective. The retreat provided a good time of staff interaction.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

he following two Constitutional Amendments are being published for consideration by delegates to the 80th Annual Church of God General Conference. The Constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference requires that proposed amendments to the Constitution be published three times in *The Restitution Herald* and/or the Progress Journal prior to the summer Conference. The Conference will meet in Rockford, Illinois, July 31 to August 3.

Action will be taken by the delegates at the Summer Conference on the following items:

Constitutional Amendment, Article II Section 1

The Board of Directors would like to propose the following amendment to the Constitution of Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference regarding delegate representation at the Summer General Conference:

Article II Section 1, Current Constitution: "Each member church of fifteen or more members, which has held at least six preaching services during the year, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Proposed Change: "Each member church which has held at least twenty-four services during the year, and which has made a financial contribution to the operating budget of the College/Conference, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God."

Explanation: Two of our smaller churches have expressed a concern about the Constitutional requirement that a member church must have fifteen or more members in order to be entitled to delegate representation. These two churches both have weekly services and make financial contributions to the General Conference but they do not have fifteen or more active members. They have requested a revision to the Constitution,

which would allow them to have delegate representation.

The Board is suggesting that it is reasonable that a member church have at least twenty-four services through the year, which would be two per month. The term "preaching" services has been deleted because some of our smaller churches may not officially have a "sermon," but they may have singing and a Bible study.

The provision to require a contribution specifically does not say how much that contribution needs to be. It has been a suggestion of the Board in the past, that even our smallest churches should be able to make a contribution of \$100-200 per year. Churches that are sending delegates to vote on a budget and activities that require funding should participate financially in helping to underwrite these actions.

Constitutional Amendment, Article IV, Section 5

The Board of Directors proposes the following change in Article IV Section 5: Current Constitution: "Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than two nominees for each directorship."

Proposed Revision: "Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than *one more nomination than the number of directorships*."

Explanation: Several times in recent years, there have been insufficient nominees to meet the Constitutional requirement. This proposed revision reduces the number of candidates required to close nominations. If approved by the delegates, this amendment will take effect immediately and will apply to nominations at this summer's Conference.

Keith L. Williams



80th Annual Summer Conference

The 80th Annual Summer General Conference was held at the Cliffbreakers Convention Center in Rockford, Illinois. There were 151 registered for the Conference and 121 others attended evening services or other events. The theme was "Fields Ready for Harvest" based upon the words of Jesus in John 4:34 and 35. Sermons and classes emphasized the needs and opportunities for service.

On the Sunday prior to Conference, Family Bible Fellowship hosted guests for the morning service and lunch. The Beloit New Life Church provided an evening meal and a worship and praise service.

Pastor Mark Tschaenn of the Lawrenceville Church in Springfield, Ohio and Keith Williams of the Pennellwood Church in Wyoming, Michigan were elected to four-year terms on the Board of Directors to replace Joe James and Dr. William Lawrence whose terms expired.

Pastor David Riley of Cornerstone Bible Church, McDonough, Georgia was re-elected to a four-year term on the Youth Advisory Committee.

The Board of Directors elected officers as follows: Chairman, Charles Bottolfs; Vice Chairman, Greg Demmitt; Secretary, Keith Williams; Treasurer, Scott Deane.

During Conference, the Board of Trustees of the Atlanta Bible College Development Foundation met. They re-elected officers as follows: President, Charles Bottolfs; Vice President, Wanda Gerullis. The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Directors (Keith Williams and Scott Deane) automatically serve in the same capacity for the Foundation Board.

During the business sessions, two proposed constitutional amendments were approved. One amendment permits each member church which has held at least twenty-four services during the year and which has made a financial contribution to the operating budget of the College/Conference, to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. In regard to nominations, the constitution was amended to permit nominations to be closed with one more nomination than the number of directorships being voted upon.

The Organizational Task Force recommendation to restructure the College and Conference was approved. An Implementation Team will be made up of three members of the Organizational Task Force: Dr. Donna Deane, Larry Johnson, and Tim Jones. The Chairman of the Board of Directors, Charles Bottolfs will serve on this team and Robert

Huddlestun was appointed by the Board to represent the Board on the team.

A budget for the 2001-2002 fiscal year was adopted by the delegates. It calls for contributions of \$478,990.

During the business session, Youth Coordinator Jon Cheatwood reported on a very successful RYOT held at Taylor University in July. Gayle Guthrie, Christian Education Coordinator reviewed progress on updating the Doctrinal Distinctives Sunday School curriculum. Chairman James announced that the 2001 will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, July 6-8. Other dates for 2001 were announced as follows: Christian Worker's Seminar will be held at the Holiday Inn in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, April 1-6; RYOT will be held at Taylor University in Upland, Indiana, July 15-20; and the Theological Conference will be held on the ABC campus, February 16-18.

During Conference, \$2,000 was received in offerings to be used for an emergency fund by the Lord's Harvest International Board.

The theme selected by the Board of Directors for this Concrence is "Fields Ready for Harvest" based on the words of Jesus in John 4:35 — "Do you not say, 'Four months more and then the harvest?' I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." Jesus went on to say in verse 38: "I sent you to reap what you have not worked for. Others have done the hard work, and you have reaped the benefits of their labor."

As we gather for this eightieth annual General Conference, we recognize that others have gone before us and have done much hard work. The reaping we are doing today is the result of those who have gone before us. Down through the years, multitudes of people have sown the seed. They started churches. They established organizational structures. They accumulated resources. They laid the groundwork. They built on the Foundation that was laid.

As an example of this, it is a pleasure to have Dr. Alva Huffer, former President of Oregon Bible College, and the author of Systematic Theology and The Triumph of the Resurrection with us at this year's General Conference. This year marks the fortieth anniversary of the publication of Systematic Theology and the twentieth anniversary of the publication of The Triumph of the Resurrection. These books have done much to solidify the doctrinal teachings of the Church of God and they have been a tremendous resource in spreading this word around the world. Many of you are aware that the Systematic Bible Study Course is now available on the web. Through the efforts of Vivian and aylene Kirkpatrick, the course was placed on line. We have had a number of people study the lessons and e-mail their answer sheets to us. Also, I want to make you aware that Alva Huffer has just granted permission for us to place the Systematic Theology book on our website. Millions of people around the world will have access to the great truths of the Scripture found in this book.

And so here we are in the year 2000, a tremendously blessed people commissioned to plant and water seeds, but also to bring in the harvest from seeds planed by others. Jesus asks us to open our eyes to see the fields that are ready for harvest.

It is my opinion that there are many kinds of people who are ready for harvest today. One group on which the Church of God is having a tremendous impact is with serious Bible students around the world who are beginning to question things they have been taught that do not make sense. They are beginning to see the same Bible truths that we have seen in Scripture. Or least they are open to exploring the message that God has given us to deliver. Through the writings of Anthony Buzzard – The Coming Kingdom of the Messiah, The Noctrine of the Trinity, and Our Fathers Who Aren't in Heaven, people around the world are

being exposed to Bible truth. Also through the Focus on the Kingdom radio messages by Anthony many are hearing Bible truth. Through our website and through the websites of others that are linked to ours, people with access to a computer are being exposed to the truth.

We are receiving a growing number of phone calls from people who are reading our literature, looking at our website or hearing our radio programs. One exciting call came three weeks ago from Bill Smith in Nashville, Tennessee. He goes to the large non-denominational Belmont Community Church – a church that is attended by musicians Amy Grant and Michael W. Smith. He had seen Anthony's book *The Doctrine of the Trinity — Christianity's Self-Inflicted Wound* advertised in *World* Christian magazine and he ordered a copy. By the way, that book is also being advertised in *Biblical Archaeological Review* and six hundred orders have been placed for the book.

Anyway, Bill Smith said he had read the book and agreed with it and he plans to talk to his church pastor and elders about it. He claims to have considerable standing in his church and he feels that his pastors and elders will listen to what he has to say. It is exciting to hear stories like this.

It is my prayer that all of us will leave this Conference with a renewed awareness of the fields that are ripe for harvest, and then concentrate all of our energy in bringing in the harvest. The harvest is plentiful. We dare not close our eyes to those who are lost in sin. We dare not let the lost die in their sin when we have at our disposal the means to bring them into the harvest.

The Mission of ABC/GC is to partner with you to help carry out the commission to make disciples of Jesus Christ. This is God's work and He invites us to join Him in bringing in a tremendous harvest in the months and years ahead until Jesus returns. May God help us to be obedient.

Minutes of General Conference Delegate Business Sessions

Tuesday, August 1

- 1. The Tuesday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:25 a.m.
- 2. Bill Lawrence opened the session with prayer.
- 3. Chairman James officially welcomed the delegates to the 80th Annual General Conference, reminding them that they will be representing the entirety of the Church of God during these business sessions. Recognition and applause were given to first time delegates; newly licensed pastors, Steve An and Mike Montgomery; and, represented for the first time, The Korean American Community Church of Morrow, Georgia.
- College and Conference President, David Krogh, read correspondence from Pastor Jack and Louise Hearp expressing regrets they were unable to attend General Conference this year.
- 5. Jill Taylor, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 36 pastors, 50 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 93 delegates at this business session.
- 6. Chairman James delivered the Chairman's message to the delegates. He recognized and thanked the General Conference planning committee for their work on this conference and the Illinois Conference for their support in hosting the conference. Chairman James reviewed the decisions to be made during the delegate sessions and the work to be done following those decisions. Further, he reminded the delegates of the Board of Directors' desire to receive regular input from them throughout the year.
- 7. The Annual Report printed in the May *Progress Journal* was considered.

Vice President Kent Ross updated the delegates on the progress being made in distance learning for Atlanta Bible College classes, specifically the live streaming of a class beginning this Fall Semester.

- 9. Youth Coordinator Jon Cheatwood reported on this year's annual RYOT held at Taylor University in Upland, Indiana in July. Jon also reviewed the mission and goals of RYOT.
- 10. The Special Reports printed in the May *Progress Journal* were considered.
- 11. Gary Burnham made comments and fielded questions on the financial reports printed in the delegate packet.
- 12. Charles Webster moved and Pastor Michael Gallagher seconded adoption of the proposed Constitutional amendment to Article II, Section I regarding delegate representation at conference from churches that have less than fifteen members. This section would be changed to read "Each member church which has held at least twenty-four services during the year, and which has made a financial contribution to the operating budget of the College/Conference, shall be entitled to one delegate for each fifty of its active members or fraction thereof. Delegates named shall be active members of the Church of God." Passage requires a 2/3 majority vote of delegates present. Robert See moved and Joyce Knapp seconded to amend the proposed amendment by inserting the words "from said church" after the word 'delegate' and before the word 'for.' The motion to amend failed. The original motion to amend the Constitution passed overwhelmingly. The Board of Directors was asked to consider allowing the financial contributions of individuals of local churches to be considered as fulfilling the requirement that their local church make a financial contribution
- 13. Pastor Alan Cain moved and Pastor Greg Demmitt seconded adoption of the proposed Constitutional amendment to Article IV, Section 5 regarding the number of nominees needed to close nominations for the Board of Directors. This section would be changed to read "Nominations printed in the Progress Journal will be brought to the floor of the business session by the Chairman at least one day before the day set for the election. Additional nominations will be received from the floor, and shall not be closed with fewer than one more nomination than the number of directorships." Passage requires a 2/3 majority vote of delegates present. The motion to amend the Constitution passed overwhelmingly.
- 14. The floor was opened for nominations for two four-year terms on the Board of Directors. Pastor Alan Cain nominated Roger Crocker and Keith Williams whose nominations had been previously printed in the *Progress Journal*. Robert See nominated Frank Johnson; Frank Johnson declined the nomination and it was withdrawn. Pastor Dale Swartz nominated Pastor Mark Tschaenn. Bob See moved and Pastor David Cheatwood seconded a motion to close

nominations. The motion passed. Delegates were encouraged to talk with the nominees during the balance of the day today if they have questions to ask them prior to the election to be held during the Wednesday delegate business session.

- 15. The floor was opened for nominations for a four-year term on the Youth Advisory Committee. Pastor Alan Cain nominated Pastor David Riley. Bob See moved and Fred Gerullis seconded that nominations be closed and the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Pastor David Riley. The motion passed.
- 16. Christian Education Coordinator Gayle Guthrie reviewed progress on updating the doctrinal distinctive Sunday School material. Preview material was passed out for delegate review prior to a workshop on Wednesday.
- 17. The Tuesday delegate business session was adjourned at 11:55 a.m.
- 18. Pastor Francis Burnett closed the session in prayer.

Wednesday, August 2, 2000

- 1. The Wednesday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 10:25 a.m.
- 2. Pastor Cecil Smead opened the session with prayer.
- 3. The minutes of the Tuesday, August 1 delegate business session were read. No corrections were noted.
- 4. Jill Taylor, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 39 pastors, 54 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 100 delegates at this business session. During this business session an addi-

tional delegate was added, bringing the total to 101 del-

egates.

- Following several ballots, Keith Williams and Pastor Mark Tschaenn were each elected to serve four-year terms on the Board of Directors.
- 6. Christian Education Coordinator Gayle Guthrie urged the delegates to join the Christian Education Advisory Committee in insuring the very best teaching materials are used to teach in our

- churches. Further, delegates were encouraged to attend and participate in the workshop this Advisory Committee is leading later this afternoon. Additionally, Gayle continued from Tuesday's business session her review of the progress on updating the doctrinal distinctive Sunday School material. Small committees for each grade level are working on updates. Pastor Ray Hall and Lynne Krogh each reported about the update work their committee is doing.
- 7. Pastor Jeff Fletcher moved and Pastor Michael Gallagher seconded adoption of the recommendation to revise the college/conference organizational chart as presented in the May *Progress Journal*. A simple majority is required for approval. Organizational Task Force Chairman Larry Johnson briefly reviewed the work of the Task Force that led to this recommendation being presented to the delegates for their approval. Larry fielded numerous questions and comments from the delegates. A vote on the call for the question passed by majority vote. The motion to adopt the recommendation passed.
- 8. President Krogh reviewed and fielded questions on the proposed 2001-2002 fiscal year budget printed in the May *Progress Journal*. To reflect the delegates' passage of the recommendation to revise the college/conference organizational chart, \$30,000 will be added to the 'total expenses' line item, and also, therefore, to the 'total contributions needed' line item. Delegate action on the budget will be taken during the Thursday delegate business session.
- 9. Chairman James announced the 2001 General Conference will be held in Atlanta, Georgia July 6-8, 2001. Pastor Wally Winner expressed his concern about this move to a shorter, all business conference. A show of hands was asked for to show the support level for retaining a longer annual summer conference.

- 10. The Wednesday delegate business session was adjourned at 12:00 p.m.
- 11. Pastor Jim Ritch closed the session in prayer.

Thursday, August 3, 2000

- 1. Prior to the delegate business session being called to order, Pastor Russ Magaw, Pastors' Pastor and member of the Ministerial Association Leadership Team, led the installation of the 2000-2001 Board of Directors.
- 2. The Thursday delegate business session was called to order by Chairman Joe James at 8:55 a.m.
- 3. Bill Lawrence opened the session with prayer.
- 4. The minutes of the Wednesday, August 2 delegate business session were read. No corrections were noted.
- Chairman James asked the college/conference staff to stand and be recognized by the delegates. Members of all college/ conference committees were also asked to stand and be recognized by the delegates.
- 6. Atlanta Bible College/Church of God General Conference President, David Krogh, delivered the President's message. He named all members of the college/conference staff and their duties, spoke of the numerous opportunities arising to spread the doctrinal message of the Church of God, and expressed his confidence in God's desire and ability to work through us.
- 7. President Krogh and the delegates recognized outgoing Board members Joe James and Bill Lawrence, thanking them for their dedicated years of service.
- 8. President Krogh reviewed some of the items enclosed in the delegate packet, particularly asking delegates to fill out and return the conference evaluation forms.

- Gary Turner, pastor of the Winnebago New Life Church, updated the delegates on the exciting things that are happening as the church is growing and in the initial stages of constructing a new community-friendly building.
- 10. Anthony Buzzard informed the delegates about the growth and current status of the Focus on the Kingdom radio ministry. He read two sample letters that have been received by those thrilled to discover the message of this ministry. Additionally, Anthony spoke of other contacts the ministry has around the world.
- 11. Ruby McCaslin addressed the delegates, asking that the shortening of the annual conference proposed for next summer be seriously reconsidered by the Board of Directors. She strongly supports the longer, full-length conference.
- 12. There is currently an Investment Fund Trustee vacancy. Chairman James asked that any delegate interested in serving in that position or who knows of someone interested in serving in that position make that interest known.
- 13. The floor was opened to field questions and comments regarding the change in the college/conference organizational chart approved by the delegates in yesterday's business session. It was announced that the Implementation Team will be Charles Bottolfs, Dr. Donna Deane, Bob Huddlestun, Larry Johnson, and Tim Jones. Comments included: the significant increase in contributions needed for implementation, the need for an outreach and evangelism focus regardless of the organizational structure, no specific persons or job descriptions have been determined yet — these will be part of the work of the Implementation Team and the Board of Directors, concern that the college/conference may become top heavy and be drained financially, and concern that an unelected committee — the Implementation Team — may be making too many too important decisions. Chairman James clarified that the Implementation Team serves at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. Further, he urged delegates not to be anxious and push for the organizational changes to be implemented too quickly.
 - 14. Bob See moved and Ruby McCaslin seconded adoption of the proposed 2001-2002 fiscal year budget printed in the delegate packet, with the adjustment of adding \$30,000 to the 'total expenses' line item, and also, therefore, to the 'total contributions needed' line item to reflect the delegates' passage of the recommendation to revise the college/conference organizational chart. The motion passed.
 - 15. Jill Taylor, Chairperson of the Credentials Committee, reported 40 pastors, 55 delegates, and 7 members of the Board of Directors present, for a total of 102 delegates at this business session.

- 16. Christian Education Advisory Committee Chairperson Gayle Guthrie was given an additional opportunity to speak about the updating work being done on the doctrinal distinctives Sunday School material.
- 17. Christian Workers' Seminar will be held at the Holiday Inn in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee April 1-6, 2001.
- 18. RYOT will be held at Taylor University in Upland, Indiana July 15-20, 2001.
- 19. Theological Conference will be held on the ABC Campus Feb. 16-18, 2001.
- 20. The minutes of the Thursday, August 3 delegate business session were read. Pastor Ed Goit moved and Bob Jones seconded a motion to approve the minutes of all three sessions of the 2000 General Conference Business Session. The motion passed.
- 21. Jerold Brewer moved and Howard Shute seconded a motion to adjourn the 2000 General Conference Business Session. Motion passed. The Thursday delegate business session was adjourned at 10:35 p.m.
- 22. College/Conference President David Krogh closed the session in prayer.
