Foreword

With this issue of The Berean Searchlight we are presenting the second of a five-year series of studies from the Bible. The first six-months' study was devised as a foundation study into which later and more detailed studies might be fitted. As in the first book of the series, so also in these lessons, we not only have defined an aim for the book, but we have given an aim for each lesson as a yardstick for the leader in definitely taking a forward step in Bible study at each session together.

This book is made in a pocket edition to carry for a guide to a daily reference to the Scriptures. For this purpose there are six phases of thought on each lesson. Pursue each phase thoroughly, so as to have a wellrounded foundation for each study.

In classwork, use only your Bibles. This book is not to replace your Bible, it is to guide you in using it. Let the leader prepare three questions on each phase of study (eighteen questions in all) and use these questions as a basis for class discussions. Make your questions satisfy the aim of the lesson. The only interesting class periods are those in which all come prepared to discuss the lesson.

The only way the Bible can be appreciated is to fix in mind the general make-up of the Bible and to be able to find supporting texts readily. This can be done only by special study of the Bible as a whole. Get acquainted with our wonderful Book. Do not neglect memory work, as it will be most helpful in deriving rightful pleasure from future study.

Discussion 2. Miss K. does not desire to attend church because she feels she will be more popular by appearing worldly in attending more questionable places. Is this true? Must we have respect to have popularity? Which is respected more? Will Christianity give us favor with man as it did Christ?

Discussion 3. George L. presented himself at the altar of a large church, and, after repentance and prayer, he was told that he was saved. Did this event correspond to John's teaching? Were John's requirements sufficient? What else was required? In what way? In what way could it be harmful?

Discussion 4. Mrs. H. feels that she has attained the ultimate in righteousness, so declines to attend church or participate in any worship service. Would Christ have attained His spiritual growth had He not engaged in prayer and meditation? Is one purpose of worship to show our adoration of God? If, then, we refuse to worship, does it imply we do not have the spiritual attainment we think we have? It is true that the more righteous we are, the more we will desire to attend church?

Thoughts for Consideration

Has anyone received his reward as yet? Will everyone receive the same reward? What is our promised reward? To what extent will we be given the means of enjoying eternal life? Is peace dependent upon righteousness? What will be the extent of the future peace?

Aim: To fix in mind the facts of this series of lessons.

Guide to Daily Study

By use of concordance, and so forth, make a daily study of one of each of the following subjects:

God's ultimate desire for man. The place of our eternal inheritance. The nature of the earth in eternity. The effects of Christ's rule over the earth. Our resurrection nature. Steps to the goal of salvation.

Class Period

Let each member of the class tell one Scriptural question which these lessons have satisfactorily answered in his mind, and give the reason why certain scriptures have added to his faith on this subject. Let the leader also give a list of words suggested by the concordance, seeing who can find the references first. Check the results of this test with the ability of the class to find references at the beginning of the series.

Aim: To give proper recognition to those who have satisfactorily completed the preceding course of Bible work.

Class Period

It is the desire of the National Berean Society officially to recognize all members who satisfactorily complete this five-year course of study. For this class period, any minister of the Church of God may receive free, upon request to the national secretary, a list of questions upon these lessons, together with grading instructions. After grading the results of this examination, he may submit the names and the grades of all those making seventy-five or more points to the national secretary and a special certificate of recognition will be sent showing the grade by which they have completed the study. A list will be maintained at national headquarters for special recognition from time to time.

If you have no minister, any elder of your group or older Berean leader may secure a copy of the questions and conduct the examination, after which the papers may be submitted to any minister you desire for grading. In this case, however, include the instruction sheet with the papers and be sure to put your full name and address on each paper.

Ministers will please secure and send in the full name of the member, the grade received, and state that it is for the second six-month's series of Bible study. A full list of those receiving grades of ninety-five or more will be published as a roster of honor roll students.

Whether or not you make the honor roll, you will find much pleasure and profit from taking this examination.

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
