College/Conference Update

Relocation Updates

Over the past few months, relocation activity has been ongoing. Here are some guick updates.

The three empty lots reserved for future student houses in McDonough, GA, were sold to a builder for \$110,000.

The rezoning meeting in North Hampton went well, with much local support. The rezoning of the property was approved, and it may now be used for religious purposes.

A survey of the property was done, and a title search was concluded successfully.

The Rex Cain Foundation donated \$250,000, which will cover the \$200,000 purchase of the OH property and other associated costs, such as surveys, permits, etc.

Dave Kizer is a retired architect who is a long-time Church of God member from IN who designed a number of churches across the Church of God. He offered to do some preliminary consulting for us as we consider our building needs and design ideas. The board met with Dave to discuss his thoughts and our next steps. One step he recommended is finding an architect in OH who knows the local area.

The board met with Kapp Construction, a local design/build company, to interview them to potentially do our architectural work and construction.

We will continue to share plans as they develop so everyone can follow the progress.

The archives preserve important materials from our history that not only document our movement's development, but they also establish a record of our doctrinal foundations. The Church of God has a varied and diverse background that should not be lost.

Blood River Church Fund Raiser-Ponchatoula Strawberry Festival

While we were working on our church building projects, it was apparent we would need to raise some external money to complete the last phase. We decided to look into the Strawberry Festival. The first Strawberry Festival was in 1972 and 15,000 people attended. Last year approximately 500,000 people attended the festival over three days! The objective of the festival is to support local strawberry farms and provide opportunities to local non-profits.

We had an individual that had worked in three previous booths at the Ponchatoula Strawberry Festival and had connections on the festival board. This individual was tasked with securing information about participating. We were informed that we could sell crawfish pies. They are a Louisiana delicacy that looks like a half-moon pastry that contains a spicy sauce and peeled crawfish tails. Each nonprofit on the festival grounds is allowed one protected food item and the freedom to sell others as well as drinks from one of the festival sponsors.

In the meantime, one of our church members dined at a New Orleans seafood restaurant and had an appetizer of crawfish queso and chips. They adapted a cheese sauce recipe that they had, to create our own cheese sauce and added crawfish tails. It was decided to include this on the menu.

The first year, we made 48 gallons of the queso! The second year we made 72 gallons of queso. In the winter, we had many of our church members taking home prepared kits of ingredients and a recipe to cook the queso and freeze it until the festival in the spring. We had cheese drives and built a wall of donated Velveeta bricks in the front of the church. One day a visitor saw the wall of bricks and asked if Velveeta sponsors our church.

There are many challenges every year such as unthawing the frozen queso and crawfish tails fast enough during the peak times of the festival. Other

challenges included weather (heat, cold, rain), festival traffic, putting up a booth, tearing down the booth, transporting the booth, transporting equipment, preparing food,



cooking food, serving food, dealing with vendors, buying supplies, festival board meetings, Louisiana state requirements, coordinating the booth, and the biggest is having an incredible work force that comes primarily from the church, our relatives and friends.

We have made money to help with our building project every year, even the year we rained out on a Saturday, the biggest and longest day of the festival. On a good year we now make about seven times more than the first year. Although the money is measurable and important, the closeness that comes from working toward a common goal and working together to achieve far beyond what we imagined, has made our body of believers, as well as those participating, collectively and individually stronger and closer! Not to mention the impact on those around us that marvel at how we treat each other and work together.

You may have noticed that I have not mentioned a single name, there are two reasons; 1. It is not possible to mention everyone that has had a hand in this ministry. 2. The timing, the way things have come together and the success we have enjoyed is just a glimpse of how God works through His people when we are all pulling in the same direction!—Jim Wilson

Atlanta Bible College Report Michael Cisler, Academic Dean

Six students participated in our Fall Ministry Trip from October 11-19: Will Dunn (Garden Park

Church of God, MI), Andrew Madonia (Family Bible Church, IN), Nik Ransom (Pennellwood Church of God, MI), Coleton Stacey (Lawrenceville Church of God, OH), Dylan Stormont (Oregon Church of God, IL) and John Evans (McGintytown Bible Church, AR), who joined us for our time in Arkansas. These students participated in leading worship services, preaching, joining in fellowship, and service. This ministry trip gave our students an opportunity to practice many of the concepts they have been learning in the classroom, while meeting folks from our churches and serving them through worship.

The team visited New Hope Church (AR), Clark Chapel (AR), McGintytown Bible Church (AR) pictured below, Forest Hills Church of God (AR), Cornerstone (TX), isolated members in Oklahoma City (OK), TruthPoint Bible Church (AZ) pictured above right, and Lakeshore Bible Church (AZ). These churches opened their homes to us, provided meals, and blessed the team in wonderful ways. Thank you to



those churches and people who provided the opportunity and support for this trip. You can find pictures of this trip below.

Atlanta Bible College celebrated a significant milestone recently. Our total scholarship balance surpassed \$1,000,000 for the first time! We only surpassed \$500,000 for the first time in 2020. To honor



the wishes of our donors, this money is restricted with a majority in principal for blessing and service to students. None of this money came from donations to the general fund. It is all part of the scholar-ship restricted funds.

Here is how we have realized such a blessed position. Since 2020, ABC has received over \$175,000 in memorial gifts, including seven families establishing memorial scholarships on behalf of loved ones or families remembering ABC scholarships in their estate planning. We appreciate those who remember ABC in these ways. In 2020, we also began using a sustainable approach to scholarship principal by restricting a portion of the earnings to increase the principal each year. One of our donor families designed this approach for the scholarship in memory of their loved one years ago, and it has served as a positive example for all of our scholarships today. It should also be noted, some of the \$1 million is earmarked for specific use beyond typical scholarships, such as staff education, internships, and counseling services for our students.

In the time that we increased our principal, we also provided over \$150,000 in scholarships to students, supported two students through counseling services, funded internships for five graduates, and provided support for two Masters degrees and one Doctorate for staff continuing education. We also have the resources to provide for the scholarship needs of our spring semester and the internship of our next graduate, John Evans.

We made a large purchase of Bibles for Malawi and Mozambique.



A generous gift was given to replace a motorbike in Mozambique. We hope to provide for some others in the coming year. Some travel distances are too great for bicycles to be practical.


Atlanta Bible College Korean Extension Report




We kicked off the 2025 fall semester on August 17, welcoming three new and twenty-six returning students, bringing our total enrollment to twenty-nine. They have collectively registered for 336 credit hours.

We are currently offering four Bible classes, two ministry classes, and two general subject classes, all taught by five dedicated instructors. Our core focus remains on teaching biblical truth and helping our students grow spiritually. One student, Siwon Woo, will graduate at the end of the semester. She has already applied for the Master of Arts in Divinity degree program at Reformed University in Lawrenceville, GA, which is accredited by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), and has received an uncondi-

tional acceptance letter. Over the last three years, four students have enrolled in the Master of Arts in Divinity degree program at this school, located approximately 10 miles north of us. We anticipate having an ample number of in-



ference pastors, will continue to support our graduates in maintaining the Abrahamic Faith they acquired in the

The Development of Summit Youth Camp Ministries (SYCM)

The Past

When the Ohio (Northeast Conference) summer youth ministry camp first started, it was called Northeast Junior Youth Camp. It was a summer camp where kids could connect with each other and develop a relationship with God. Year after year a group of hardworking and devoted adults hosted this camp for kids to escape "reality" and gather with like-minded believers. In the 1970s, it was under the direction of pastor Jim Ritch, who was at Lawrenceville. Later the camp was led by pastors Michael Hoffman, Steve Fewell, Seth Ross and Mark Tschaenn. Others joined to help: John Huston, Susan Bradley, Andrew Weaver, and Chris Lucas, who took over as director in 2022.

The name of the camp program was changed to SUMMIT (Students Understanding Ministry Motivated In Truth). In 2014, Chris Lucas initiated a base camp for SALT (Student Action Leadership Team) members after realizing that in order to truly reach kids, SUMMIT was going to need to be more than a summer camp. The base camp teams did work in the community of Troy. In 2022 the base camp program transitioned into more extensive mission work by traveling to other areas. Teams went to Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, as well as serving our local churches in Ohio. In 2025 we went to Kokomo, Indiana.

The Present - Personal Experience

I have attended SUMMIT Youth Camp for the past eleven years as well as the mission trips for the past four years. I started camp because my mom, Karen Via, became the camp cook in 2014, and my older sister was there too. I always enjoyed the activities and lessons, and I can't really remember a summer without it. My favorite themes when I was a camper were Camp Christmas and Armor Up.

Once I reached high school age, in 2021, I became a SALT member and then in 2022, I joined the mission team. I'm not sure what led me to be a part of the mission team, but I'm glad that I did it because now I can say that helping other people is comfortable for me. As an introvert who was always shy and unsure in group settings, the mission trips didn't seem like my "place." Over time, I became comfortable with the uncomfortable and found the strength to test my communication. I just recently graduated, and I can firmly say that since helping at camp and serving others, I now feel ready to help people outside of group missions. This year I was a counselor, a job that demands patience, communication, and responsibility. I loved it, and I can't wait to continue connecting with young kids who aren't very different from how I was just eleven years ago at my first camp.

The Future - Expanding

Looking toward the future endeavors of SYCM, we have plans for retreats for the older age group (high school-college), expanding our mission trips, and reaching more people. We will alternate between local and out-of-state trips. The hope is to do more work in the community, like working at soup kitchens, food banks, and various other service projects. With these mission trips, SYCM is seeking to not only work for our churches, but also for their communities. Attending mission trips is a fantastic way to build a firm foundation rooted in faith and service. Therefore, anyone is welcome to do missions with SYCM.

A CHURCH CAMP KID

Several years ago, as we were sitting under the big white tent at camp during the week of SUMMIT, Julie Driskill asked me "How much time do you put into helping plan SUMMIT?" I was standing near the front of the tent, sweat dripping off my face and mosquitos buzzing my head. I had to pause for a moment to think. I then asked the question, "like how many days?" Julie nodded yes. I said, "I think about it like almost every day."

I began helping at church camp around 1987 when it was Northeast Youth Camp under the direction of Michael Hoffman. I continued to join the staff of dedicated adults who gave up a week of their summer to pour into the lives of students grades 4-8 every year. I will forever cherish the friendships made over the years as I served on staff. Whether it was from late night chats, planning and playing practical jokes on other staff, or sitting in the kitchen retelling stories and getting in the cook's way, friendships were strengthened, and memories were made. I have since been able to watch many of the students who have passed through the weeks of SUMMIT grow into exceptional adults who serve in their church, some on SUMMIT staff, and others in their community. I have witnessed very shy students become chapel speakers, campfire leaders

and teachers as they continue to come back each year to serve on the SUMMIT staff.

Camp has proven to be a great steppingstone for many of the students into adulthood as they learn to develop godly relationships with others and learn to strengthen their own relationship with God. Camp has provided many students with a week away from the chaos at home and school and provided them with a week of peace and understanding where they can be themselves and be accepted. For some students it's a week they look forward to from the last day of camp to the first day of camp the next year. Many have asked if they could just stay at camp all year. Secretly that, too, is my wish, or have it for more than just one week. Kids love camp and the peace and security it provides. I am thankful for the many weeks that I spent as a camper, developing friendships and strengthening my foundation in Jesus as I continued to learn and grow.

I love to see on Facebook the state/district conferences within our General Conference that hold youth camps. I believe it to be a very vital time for students to learn to grow and develop stronger relationships with God and Jesus. It is a time where they can come together to worship and develop godly habits in their daily walk that will enrich their lives as they grow into adulthood.

I was a church camp kid, and I am certain that those weeks spent at camp helped develop who I am today. I was shy and felt awkward growing up, but camp was different. I didn't feel awkward at camp. I felt acceptance and I felt that it was okay to be awkward. If you grew up as a camp kid, you can probably relate to how important camp is in the development of a student's life. Camp gives us one week out of 52 to give a student the best Kingdom-like experience that will hopefully change their life for good.

Just a few weeks after we wrapped up our SYCM activities last June, tragedy struck a church camp in Texas where 27 students and staff lost their lives to a devastating flood. As I watched the news in the days after I couldn't help but think how I would have felt, acted, or spoke after such a tragic loss. I sent an email to our SYCM staff to let them know how much I appreciated their selflessness in volunteering for weeks to serve on staff for the SYCM activities. I also shared with them my heartache over such a tragedy, and that we too mourn with the families, staff and students who were affected by such loss. We mourned because we had a shared bond of church camp.

Camp has a way of uniting people across many boundaries and cultural differences because we all meet at camp for the same purpose, to grow in our faith and to teach students to do the same. If your conference still provides a camp for the students that attend your churches, you are rich beyond measure. If not, look at some of the states nearby and encourage your students to participate in them. Camp should be an experience every student has the opportunity to experience while they are growing up.

As a church camp kid, I would like to thank all those adults who served on the staff of the camps I attended. The fact that each of you gave up a week during your summer to be involved in the lives of students seeking to have a kingdom-like experience is greatly appreciated. Our students need camp experiences now more than ever to get a healthy biblically-based foundation to build their lives upon.

Churches Helping Churches



You are invited to become a member of the Church Builders' League. The League is a plan for sharing the cost of facilities for new and existing churches here and overseas.

Church of God members voluntarily join the League by asking to be included each time a new appeal is mailed. Two appeals per year are sent – in the fall and spring. Members are asked to contribute at least \$25 to each appeal, though many contribute more.

The League was organized in 1957 by action of General Conference delegates. Since its inception, 135 appeals have been issued, generating

\$1,724,155!

The current appeal is for construction and/or repair of churches in Malawi and Mozambique. Hurricane Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record, with a duration of 36 days, destroyed many churches in its path in

the spring of 2023. Immediate help was given to these churches through contributions to the Lord's Harvest International, but many more buildings still need to be rebuilt or repaired.

The cost of rebuilding a church ranges from \$2,000 to \$2,500. Buildings that need to be totally replaced will cost at least \$3,000 each. Many of these congregations have 100-200 people in attendance per Sunday.

At one time, more than 1,000 Church of God members, churches, and groups participated in this League. 
